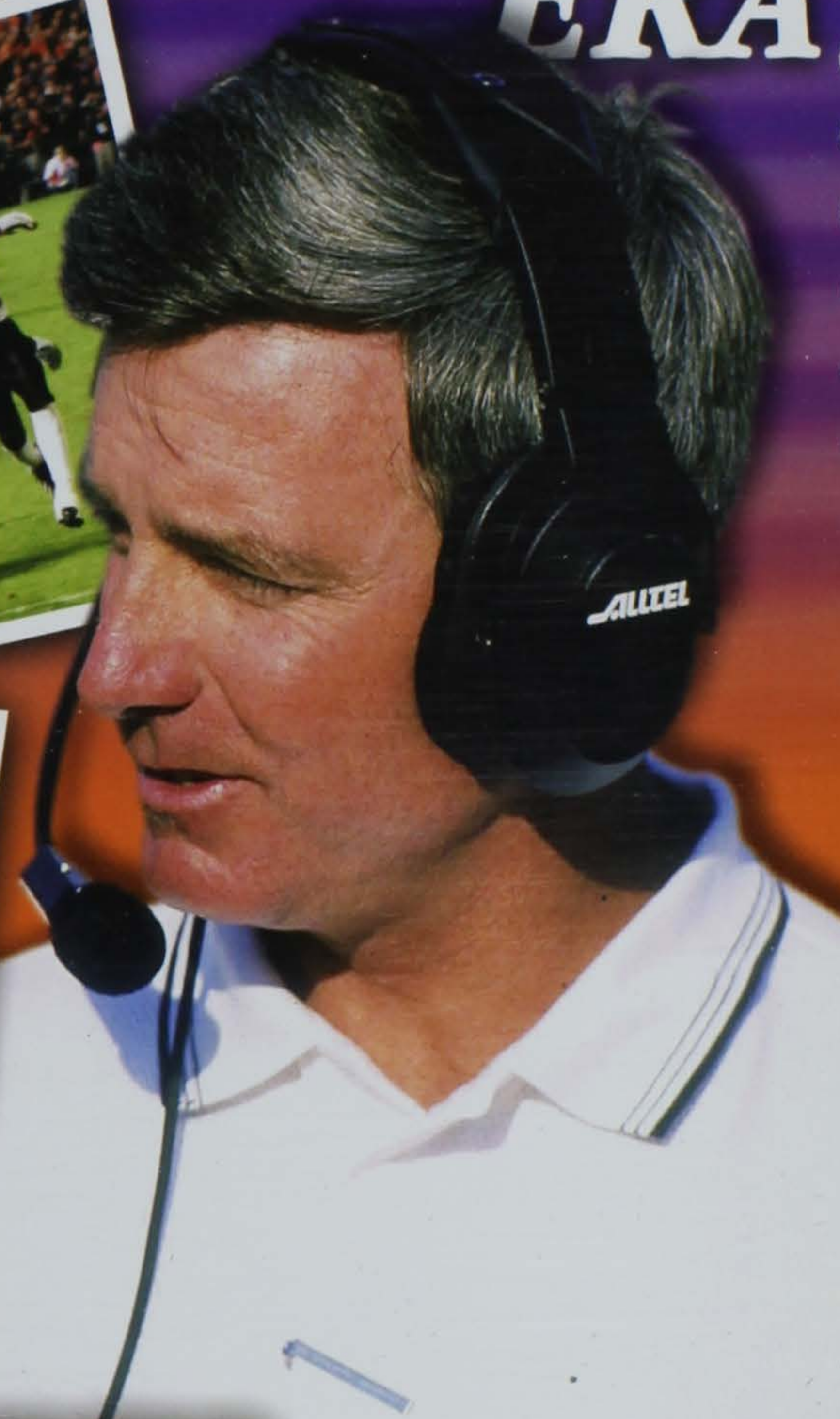
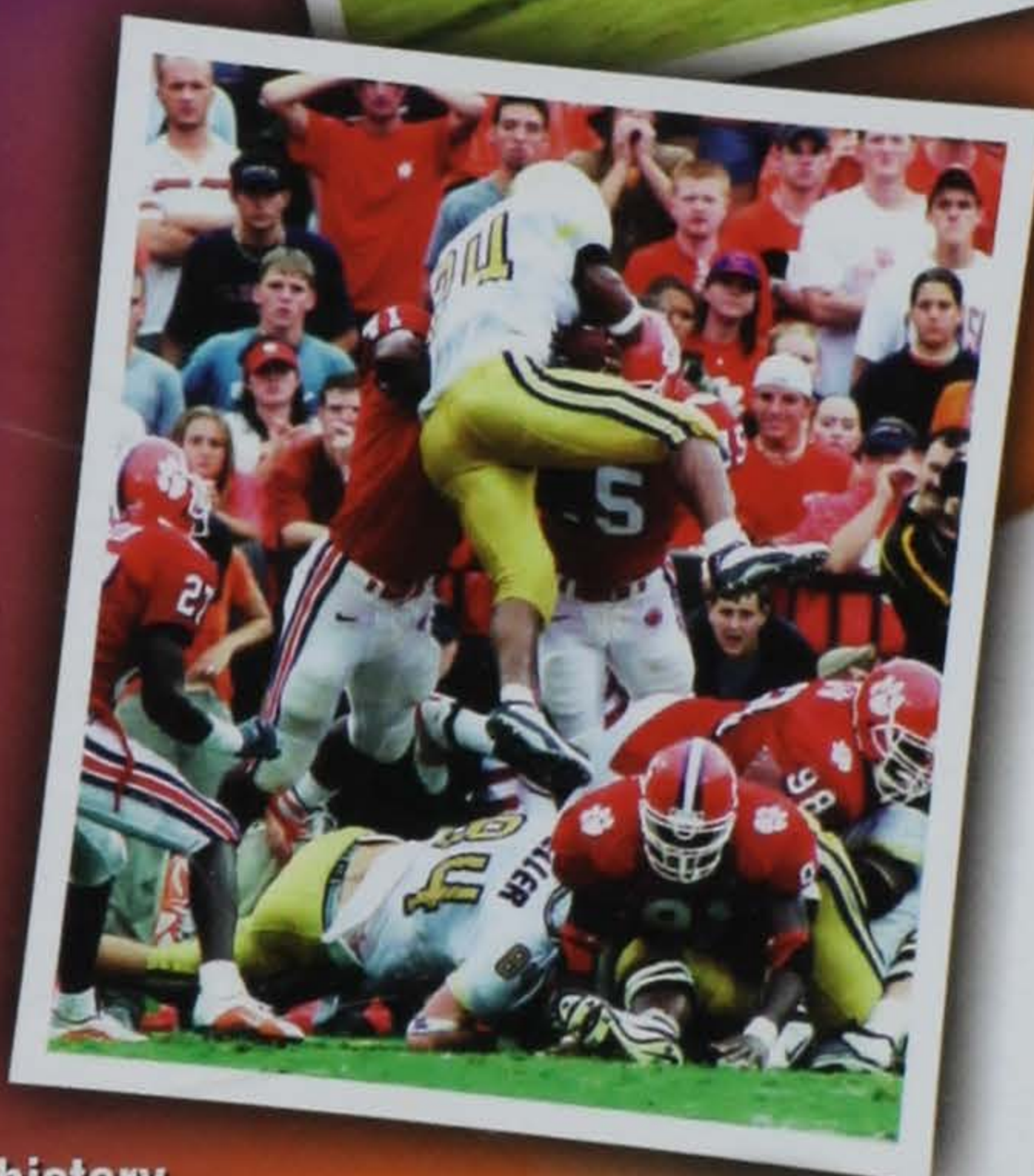
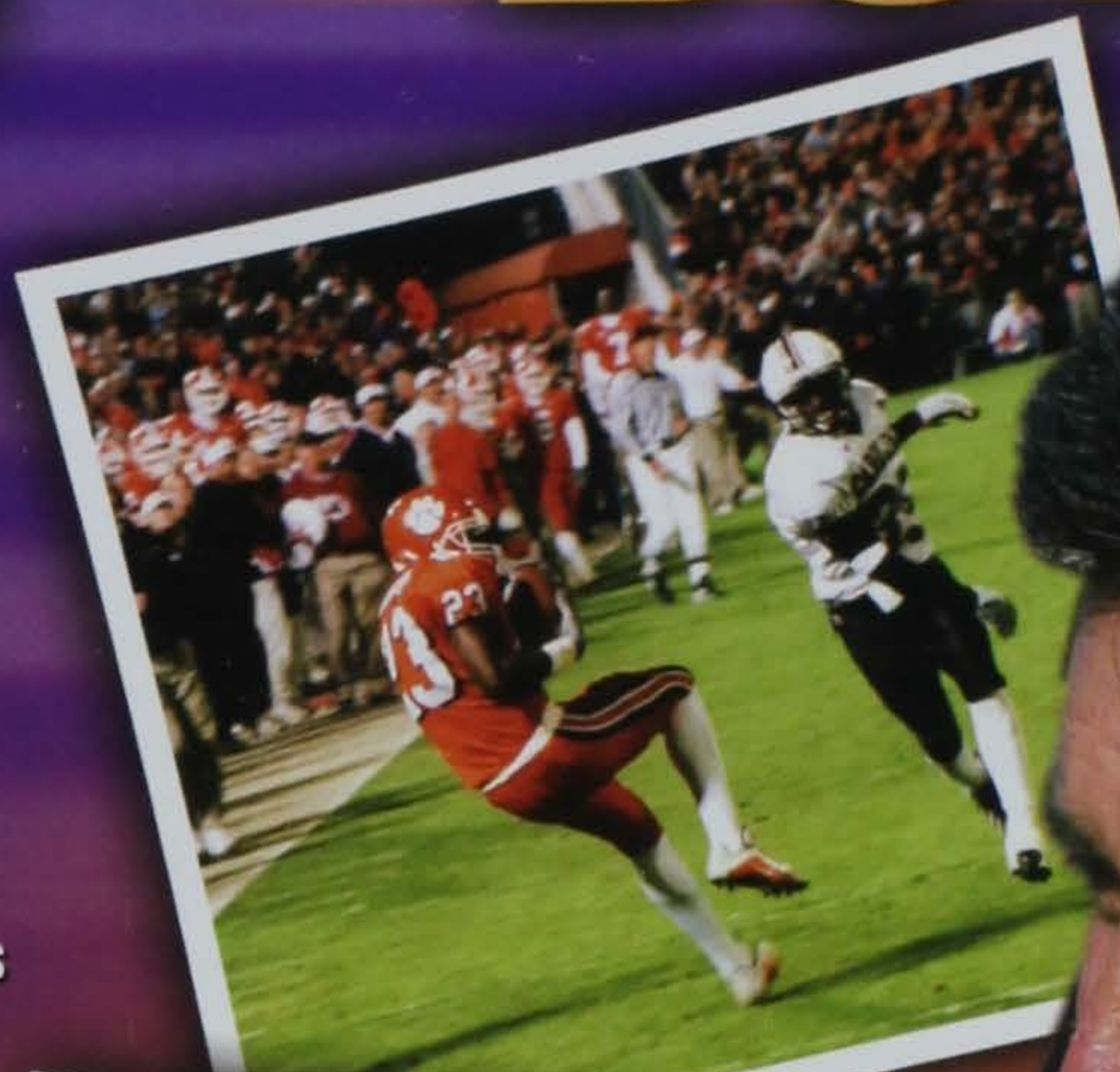

IT'S ABOUT PRIDE

Clemson *in the* BOWDEN ERA

- First Clemson coach in history to take Tigers to a bowl game each of his first four years with the program. Just the third ACC coach to take a team to a bowl game in each of his first four years with a program, he has a chance to become first coach in ACC history to take a school to a bowl each of his first five years.
- Clemson has had four of the top 10 attendance seasons in school history in the Bowden era.
- Clemson's exposure rate has risen considerably. Thirty-nine of the 49 Clemson games he has coached have been on live television. Clemson was shown on ESPN's family of networks eight times in 2002, more appearances than Notre Dame had on NBC.
- Has coached six players who have been named All-American eight times in his three years as head coach.
- Over 150 Clemson records have been established on offense, defense and special teams in his four years.
- Coached Clemson to a top 15 final ranking in 2000, school's first top 15 final ranking in 10 years. Team reached #3 national ranking in October of 2000, highest Clemson ranking in 16 years.
- Clemson offense has had three of the top five yardage seasons in school history under his watch.
- Clemson team defeated five teams with winning records in 2001, highest figure since 1990.
- Has coached the top four teams in Clemson history in terms of passing offense and completions.
- Has coached the top two total offense teams in Clemson history.
- Linebacker Keith Adams set ACC record and led nation in tackles for loss with 35 in 1999.
- Coached the first quarterback in NCAA history (Woodrow Dantzler) to pass for 2000 yards and rush for 1000 in the same season.
- Coached Washington Redskins first-round draft choice Rod Gardner, Clemson's career reception leader.
- Coached the second three-time first-team Academic All-America offensive lineman in college football history (Kyle Young).
- Has had 27 players in his four years earn degrees from Clemson before the end of their eligibility. Thirty-eight of his first 45 senior lettermen have received their degree from Clemson (84 percent).
- Has defeated rival South Carolina three of four seasons.

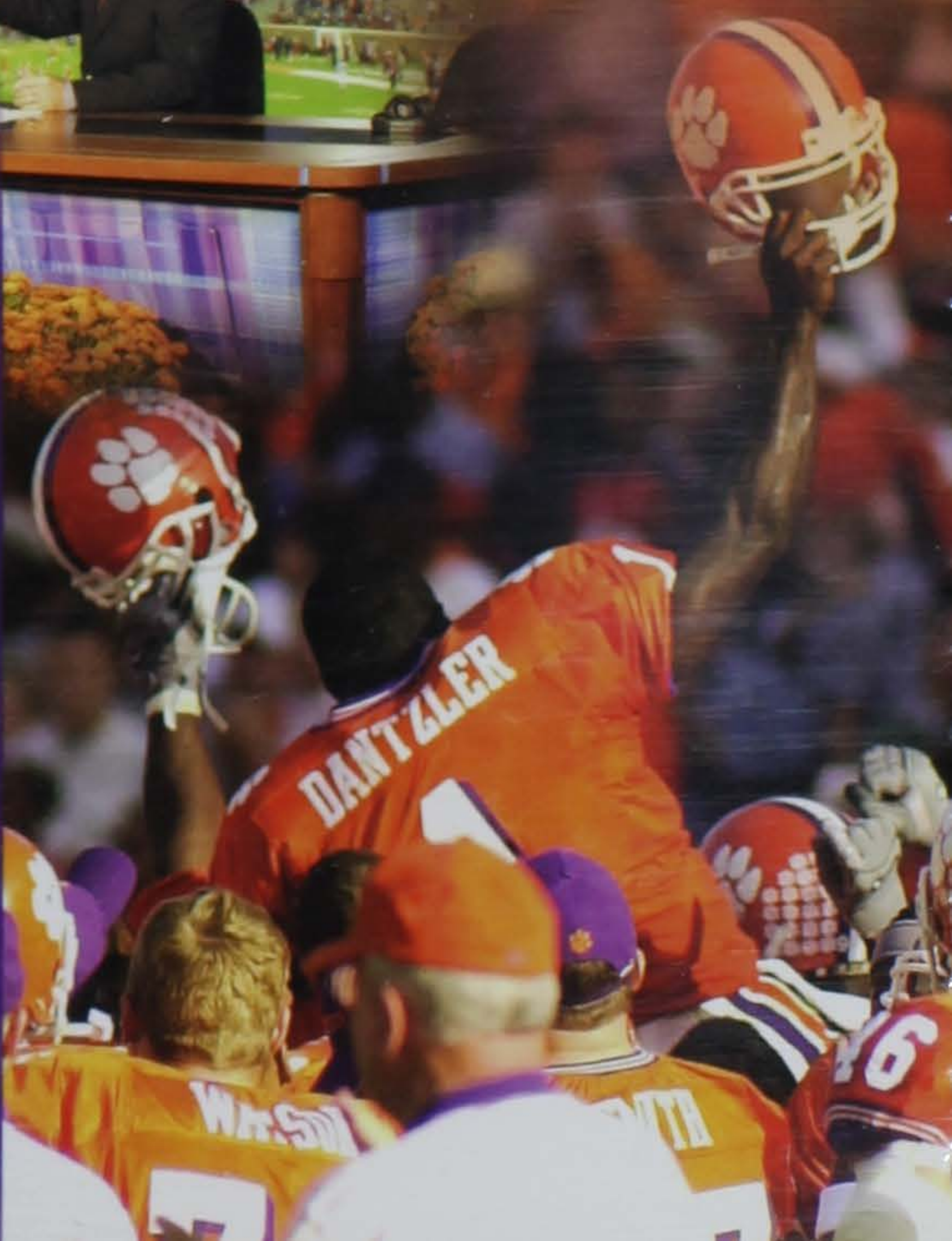

against Virginia, and 41-6-1 against Wake Forest since 1953. Clemson also has a winning record against Georgia Tech (11-9) since the Yellow Jackets joined the league in 1983.

- Clemson has won 13 ACC titles (12 outright and one tied), more than any other school. Florida State is second with 10. In two different eras, Clemson won three conference titles in succession. Those took place from 1965-67 and 1986-88.
- Clemson posted 15 consecutive non-losing seasons from 1977-91, an ACC record.
- Clemson also won the Southern Conference Championship in 1940 and 1948, giving the program 15 conference crowns over the years.

Coaching Success

- Clemson has a legendary history when it comes to coaching. Three former Tiger mentors (John Heisman, Frank Howard, and Jess Neely) are already in the college football Hall of Fame. Howard was Clemson's coach when the ACC was founded and promptly took the Tigers to six ACC championships. No coach had more league titles than Howard during his 30-year tenure at Clemson. He concluded his career with 165 victories, as his 30-year tenure still ranks second in NCAA history for a Division I coach serving the same school.
- Danny Ford coached Clemson to the National Championship in 1981 and won six bowl games in his Tiger career, second on the all-time ACC coaching list. His 76-percent winning percentage is also second best in ACC history. He was the consensus National Coach-of-the-Year in 1981 and remains the youngest coach ever to win the national championship (33).
- Current Clemson Head Coach Tommy Bowden has continued the tradition of outstanding Clemson coaches by leading the Tigers to bowl games each of his first four years, the only coach in Clemson history to do that. He is just the third ACC coach in history to take a league team to a bowl game in his first four years (Bobby Ross and Lou Holtz are the others). He has a chance to become the first ACC coach to go 5-for-5 in that area if he can lead the Tigers to postseason play in 2003. He was named the ACC Coach-of-the-Year in 1999.

Death Valley

- Clemson Memorial Stadium, known as Death Valley, has been Clemson's home since 1942. In 2001, it was listed as the top stadium in the ACC by **The Sporting News**. Many times in the last decade it has ranked among the top-10 football stadiums in the country. Clemson ranked seventh in the nation in total attendance during the 2000 season and has been ranked among the top 20 in the nation in average attendance 20 seasons in a row, including 2002 when Clemson averaged over 77,500 fans.
- Clemson Memorial Stadium has been the site of many memorable games, including the first meeting of father-and-son coaches in Division I history. That contest took place in 1999 when the Bowdens met in a memorable game in Death Valley.
- Death Valley has claimed 216 victims in its 61 seasons entering 2003. Clemson has a 71-percent winning percentage in the facility.



Death Valley has ranked in the top 20 in attendance for 20 consecutive years. It is steeped in tradition, as it was recently recognized as the top stadium in the ACC by The Sporting News.

First-Round Selections

- Rod Gardner became the 20th first-round draft pick in Clemson history when he was selected as the #15 pick in the first round by the Washington Redskins in April of 2001. Gardner finished his career as the school's all-time leading receiver and was third in total reception yardage.
- Gardner set an example for all future Clemson football players to follow. He was a first-team All-American, a first-round draft choice, and graduated in May of 2001. Few college football players could boast of that triple that year.
- Clemson had 10 players drafted in 1983, an all-time ACC record for players drafted from the same school in one year.
- Clemson has had a first-round draft choice four of the last seven years. The list includes Trevor Pryce, already a four-time Pro Bowl selection with the Denver Broncos, and Anthony Simmons, the top tackler for the Seattle Seahawks in 2000 and 2001.
- Clemson has had 179 players drafted over the years, including Nick Eason and Bryant McNeal, who were both taken in the fourth round in the 2003 draft by the Denver Broncos.

Hall of Fame

- Former Clemson All-American Terry Kinard was enshrined in December of 2001 in New York City. He was also inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor in 2001.
- Kinard is the only Clemson gridder to win a national individual award. He was named the 1982 National Defensive Player-of-the-Year by CBS Sports. That year, his senior season, he was a first-team unanimous All-American, the only unanimous All-American in Tiger history. He was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary football team in 2002 and was also listed among the top-50 athletes in the history of the ACC, regardless of sport.

- Clemson had a special night in New York City on December 11, 2001. That evening, Terry Kinard was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame and Kyle Young, a center at Clemson from 1998-01, was named a recipient of a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award. Clemson was the only school in the nation with one of each in 2001.
- Three former Clemson coaches are in the College Football Hall of Fame. The list includes John Heisman (1900-03), Jess Neely (1931-39), and Frank Howard (1940-69).

Academic Excellence

- Kyle Young and Chad Carson were first-team Academic All-Americans in 2000 and 2001. Clemson was the only Division I school in the nation with two first-team selections in each season. Young was named a first-team Academic All-American from 1999-01 and became just the second ACC player in history to be a three-time, first-team selection.
- Carson joined Young in graduating from Clemson Summa Cum Laude. In the winter of 2002, he reached the final stage of the Rhodes Scholarship selection process, the only Division I football player in the nation who could make that claim. Carson also won Clemson University's Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award for service to others.
- Clemson's football team posted a 2.56 team GPA for the spring semester of 2002, the second highest GPA on record. Even though he has served as head coach just eight semesters, each of the top-five team GPA semesters have taken place under Tommy Bowden's watch.
- Clemson's signees for 1996 had an 82-percent graduate rate, including a perfect 9-9 by African Americans.
- Clemson has eight players on its 2003 team who already have earned their undergraduate degree. That gives Bowden 27 players in his five years who will or have played their final season with a degree already on their resumé.

All-Americans

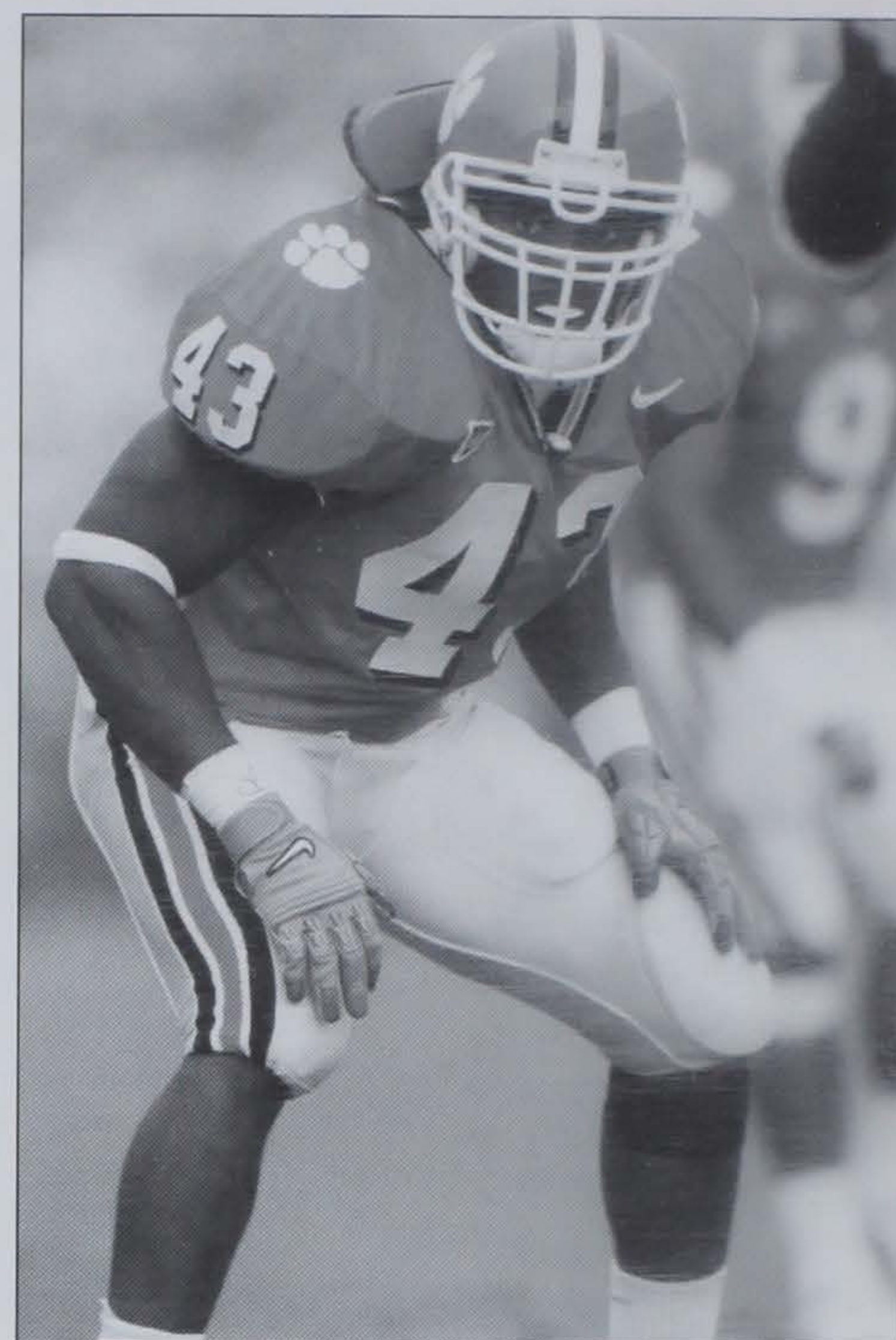
- Clemson has had a history of decorated football players. The program boasts 54 different All-America players in its history. The program has had at least one All-American in 27 of the last 28

years, the only ACC team that can make that claim. That list included 2002 when Brian Mance was named an All-American by **The Sporting News**.

- Clemson had nine players named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary team, more than any other school. The list of Clemson honorees shows the balance of the program over the years, as every area of a football team (by position) was represented. The nine players were Joe Bostic, Jerry Butler, Bennie Cunningham, Jeff Davis, Steve Fuller, Terry Kinard, William Perry, Michael Dean Perry, and Anthony Simmons. All nine were All-Americans at least once and played in the NFL.
- Cunningham was a two-time, first-team All-American as a tight end in 1974 and 1975 before he won two Super Bowl rings with the Pittsburgh Steelers. He was the only tight end named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary Team in 2002.
- Clemson's most celebrated All-American might be Banks McFadden, Clemson's first **Associated Press** All-American in 1939. An All-American in football and basketball in 1939, McFadden was named the nation's most versatile athlete that year. He was named Clemson's top all-around athlete of the 20th century by **The State** in 1999.

Bowl History

- Clemson has been to 26 bowl games in its history, among the top-25 totals in college football history. Clemson's 13 bowl wins is also among the top 25 in bowl victories in college football history.
- Clemson's first bowl game was a 6-3 victory over Boston College and Frank Leahy at the 1940 Cotton Bowl. Leahy is still ranked second in college football history in winning percentage.
- Clemson won five-straight bowl games between 1986-90, one of the top bowl winning streaks in

college football history. Clemson defeated Stanford, Penn State, Oklahoma, West Virginia, and Illinois during the stretch.

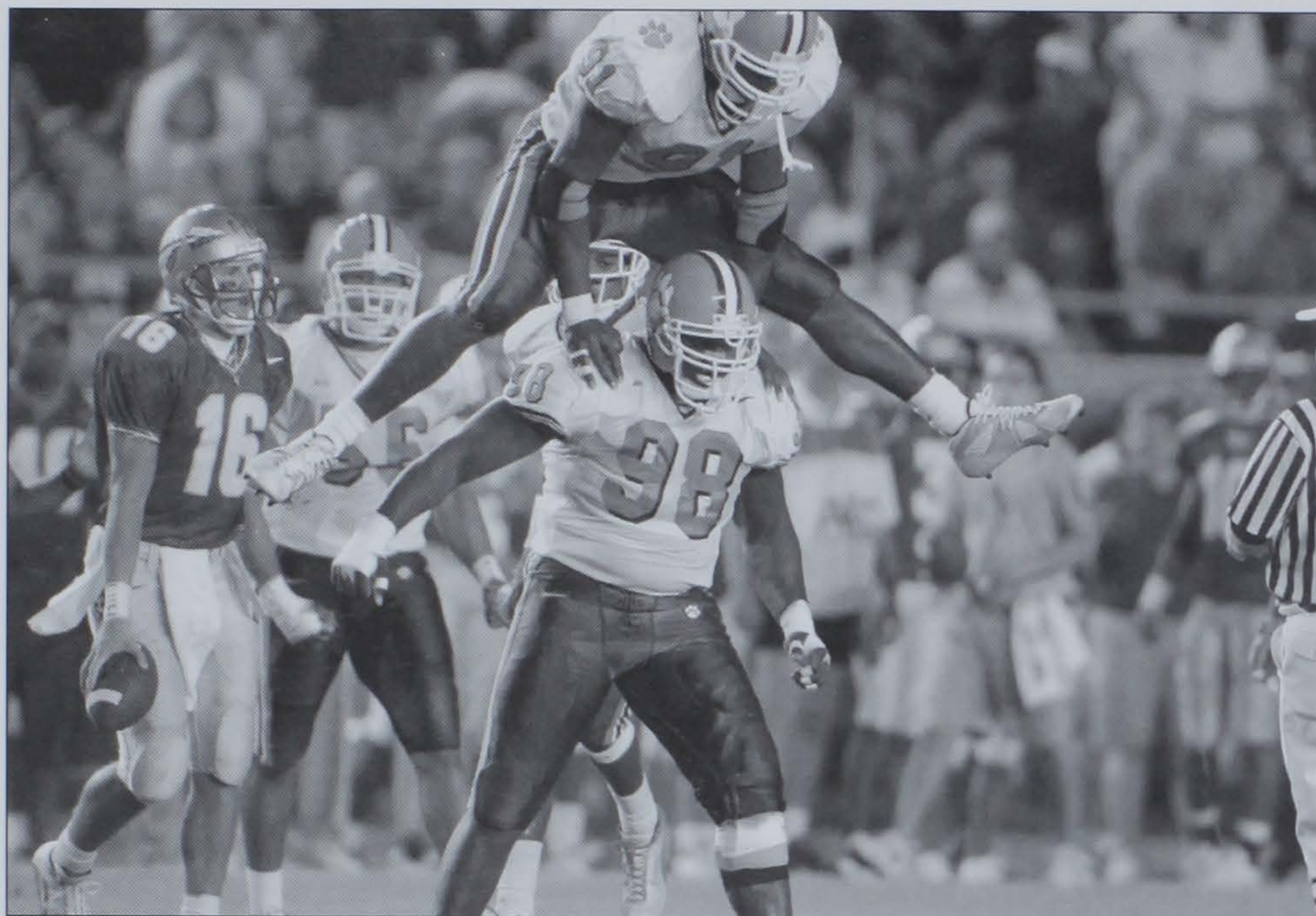
- Clemson has beaten some of the top coaches in college football history in bowl competition. Among the list of celebrated coaches who have lost to Clemson in bowl competition since the ACC was founded are Joe Paterno (winningest coach in Division I on a total-victories basis), Barry Switzer (fourth-winningest Division I coach on a winning-percentage basis), and Tom Osborne (fifth-winningest Division I coach on a winning-percentage basis). Hall of Fame Coach Woody Hayes suffered his final loss against Clemson in the 1978 Gator Bowl.
- Clemson has made 15 bowl appearances since 1985, a tangible representation of the program's consistency. Clemson ranks sixth in the nation among Division I teams in bowl appearances over the last 18 years. Only Florida State (18), Michigan (18), Nebraska (18), Tennessee (17), and Miami (FL) (16) have more. Since 1985, Clemson has made more bowl appearances than Alabama (14), Georgia (14), Notre Dame (13), Southern California (13), Oklahoma (11), and Texas (11).

Championship Traditions

- Since the ACC was formed in 1953, Clemson has more overall victories (325) and wins in conference games (201) than any other school. North Carolina is second in both categories with 301 and 180, respectively.
- Clemson has a winning record against each of the other charter members of the ACC since the league was founded in 1953. Clemson is 29-12-1 against Duke, 26-20-2 against Maryland, 28-15-1 against North Carolina, 22-20 against N.C. State, 34-7-1

Clemson has had at least 15 players on NFL rosters for 20 straight years. Bryant McNeal (#91) and Nick Eason (#98) will help keep that streak alive in 2003 with the Denver Broncos.

National Championship Tradition

- The Tigers were national champions by every service in 1981, as they were the only school in the nation with a perfect (12-0) record that season. The year included three wins over top-10 teams (Georgia, North Carolina, and Nebraska), the only team in college football to beat three top-10 teams in 1981. It was just the second football national championship for an ACC school.
- The 1981 team had five All-Americans on its roster, including first-team selections Terry Kinard, Jeff Davis, and Perry Tuttle. Thirty-one players on the 1981 team were eventually drafted by the NFL and 22 players on the squad eventually played in the NFL. Twenty-three different players on the 1981

roster were First-Team All-ACC selections at one time or another in their career.

NFL Influence

- Clemson had 18 former players in the NFL during the 2002 season, the 20th-consecutive year Clemson has had at least 15 players on NFL rosters. The 2002 list included nine different former Tigers who were either first-round draft choices, Super Bowl champions, or Pro Bowl selections.
- Over the years, 19 former Clemson players have won 27 Super Bowl Championship rings. The leader is Jeff Bostic, who was a starter on three Super Bowl championship teams with the Washington Redskins. Clemson has had an alum on the Super Bowl Championship team five of the last seven years.
- Trevor Pryce, an All-ACC player at Clemson in 1996, has already won two Super Bowl Championships and been a four-time Pro Bowl selection. He became the highest-paid defensive lineman in NFL history in 2001.
- Clemson has had a strong influence on the linebacker position in the NFL in recent years. Recent former Tigers who have been either Pro Bowl performers, first-round draft picks, or Super Bowl champions include Levon Kirkland, Anthony Simmons, John Johnson, Ed McDaniel, and Wayne Simmons.
- One of the rising stars of the NFL is Philadelphia Eagle strong (and we do mean strong) safety Brian Dawkins. A 1996 Clemson graduate, Dawkins was an All-American on Clemson's 1995 team when he ranked 10th in the nation in interceptions. He became the first NFL player in

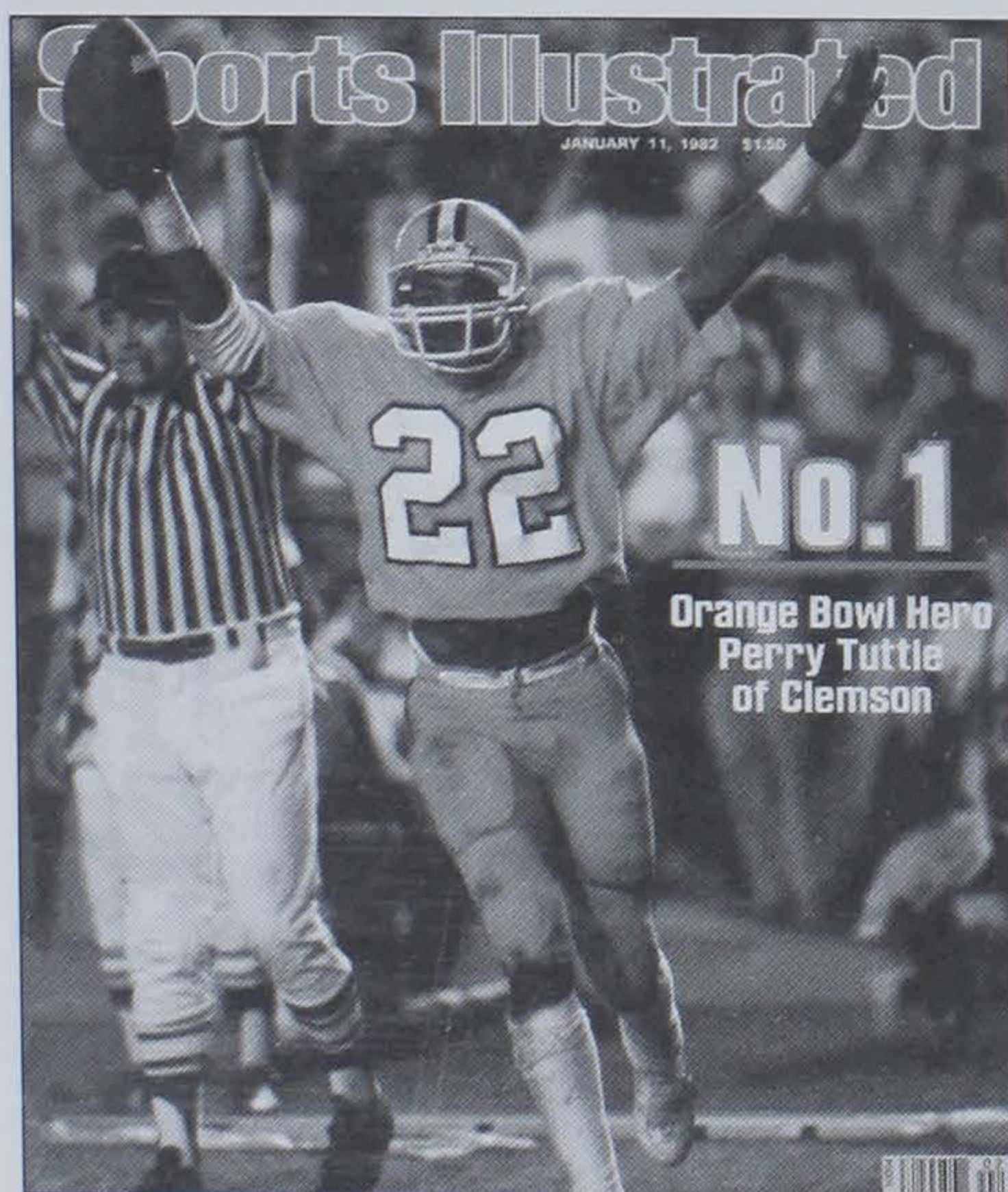
history in 2002 to have a sack, an interception, a fumble recovery, and a touchdown reception in the same game. He was also named first-team All-Pro and was chosen to the Pro Bowl for the third time in four years.

Poll Presence

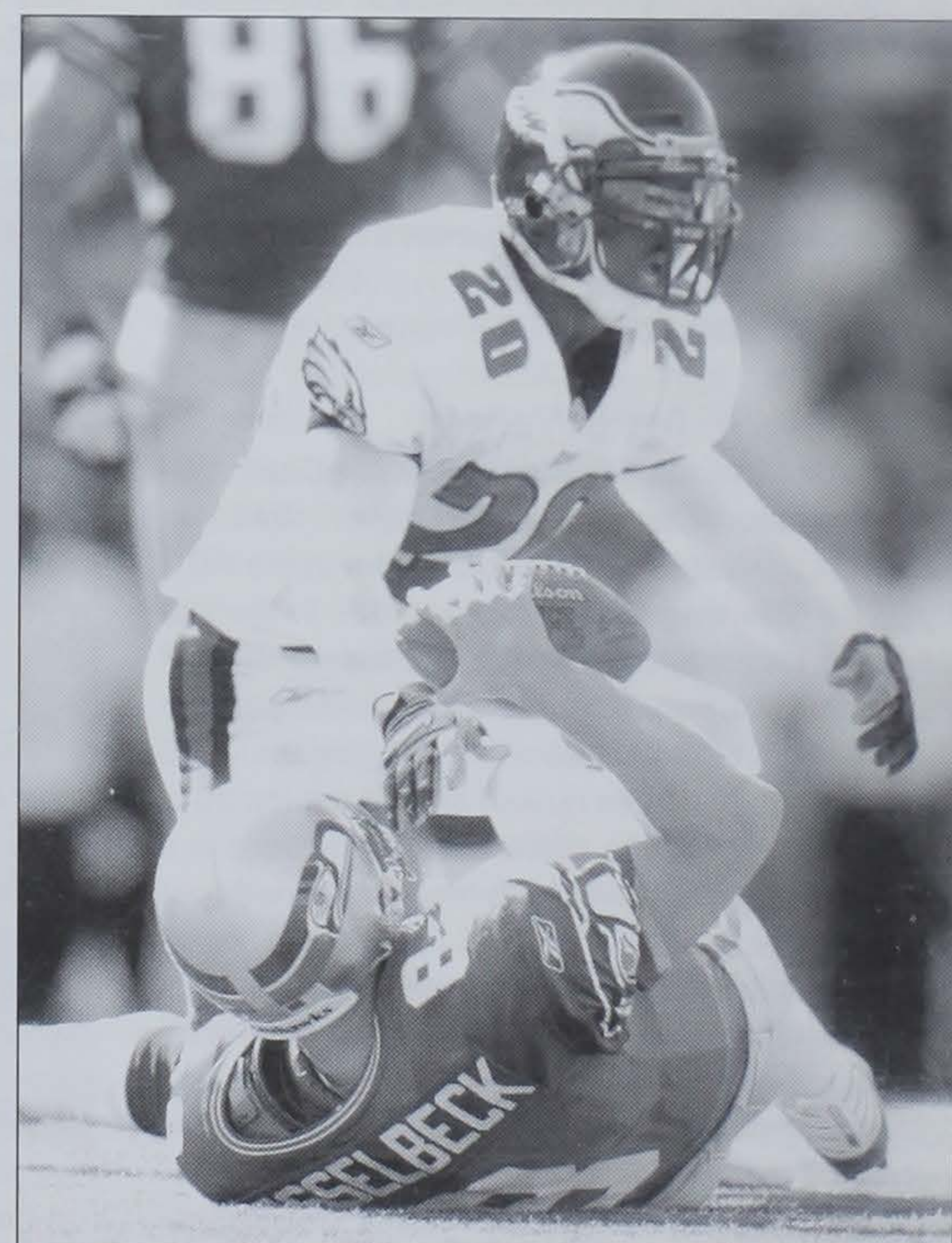
- The 2000 season marked the 20th time Clemson has been ranked in the final top 25 of the **Associated Press** poll. Clemson's highest ranking is #1 in 1981. The Tigers were ranked #16 in the final **Associated Press** poll of 2000. Clemson once had a streak of 46 consecutive weeks ranked in the AP poll during the 1980s.
- Clemson finished in the top 20 of all final polls in 1986-91, a six-year streak. Clemson had exactly two losses apiece in each of those six seasons.
- Clemson was ranked in the final top 20 of the AP poll six times in the 1980s. The Clemson program was fifth in the nation in winning percentage in that decade.
- Beating ranked opponents has also been a hallmark of Clemson's success. Clemson has beaten a ranked opponent in 14 of last 17 seasons, including 2001 when the Tigers won at #9 Georgia Tech in overtime by a score of 47-44. Clemson has 47 wins over AP top-25 teams over the years, including 22 that have come over fellow ACC schools.

Prominent Former Tigers

- Dwight Clark was the MVP of the NFL in 1982. He was the recipient of "The Catch" (from Joe Montana) for the San Francisco 49ers against the Dallas Cowboys in the 1981 NFC Championship game. It is still replayed on ESPN Classic every night when they introduce their Sports Century Feature.

- Charlie Waters was a three-time Pro Bowl selection with the Dallas Cowboys. He played on two Super Bowl Championship teams before going on to a college coaching career at Oregon.
- The Perry Brothers, William and Michael Dean, were starters on Clemson's 1984 defense. Both were named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary Team in 2002. William played on Clemson's National Championship team as a freshman, then on the Super Bowl Champion Chicago Bears of 1985. Michael Dean played in six Pro Bowls (with Cleveland and Denver), more than any other former Tiger. Both were named ACC Player-of-the-Year during their Clemson careers (William in 1984 and Michael Dean in 1987). They are the only brother combination in ACC history to make that claim.
- Chester McGlockton is a four-time Pro Bowl selection during his NFL career that has lasted since 1992. He joins Trevor Pryce and Brian Dawkins as multiple-year Pro Bowl players from Clemson.

Record-Breaking Players

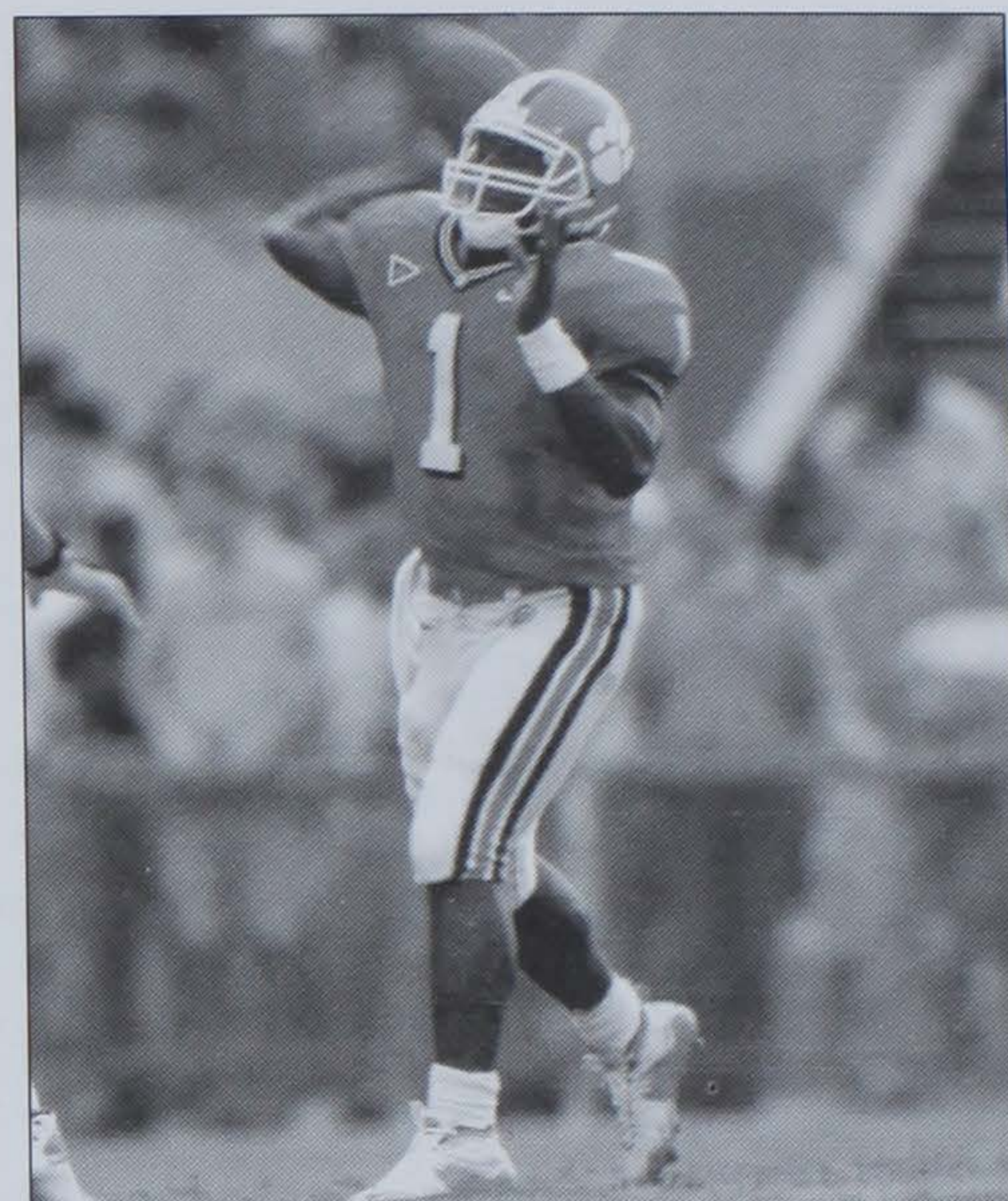
- Quarterback Woodrow Dantzler became the first player in Division I college football history to pass

for at least 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 yards in the same season when he collected 2,360 passing and 1,004 rushing in 2001. He finished his career as the ACC's all-time leader in quarterback rushing yards and ranks in the top 10 in ACC history in total offense. He is now with the Cowboys.

- A Tiger has led the ACC in scoring 12 times, more than any other school. The list includes two-time champion Nelson Welch, who still holds the league mark for field goals in a career with 70. Current Tiger Aaron Hunt will challenge his scoring record in 2003. He needs just 65 points to reach 302 for his career, one more than Welch.
- Clemson is known for its leaders on defense. In 1984, William Perry set the ACC career record for sacks with 27. Three years later, his brother Michael Dean Perry, broke the record with his 28th. Jeff Davis was named the ACC MVP in 1981, giving Clemson three of the five times in league history a defensive player has been named the conference's best player.

Traditions

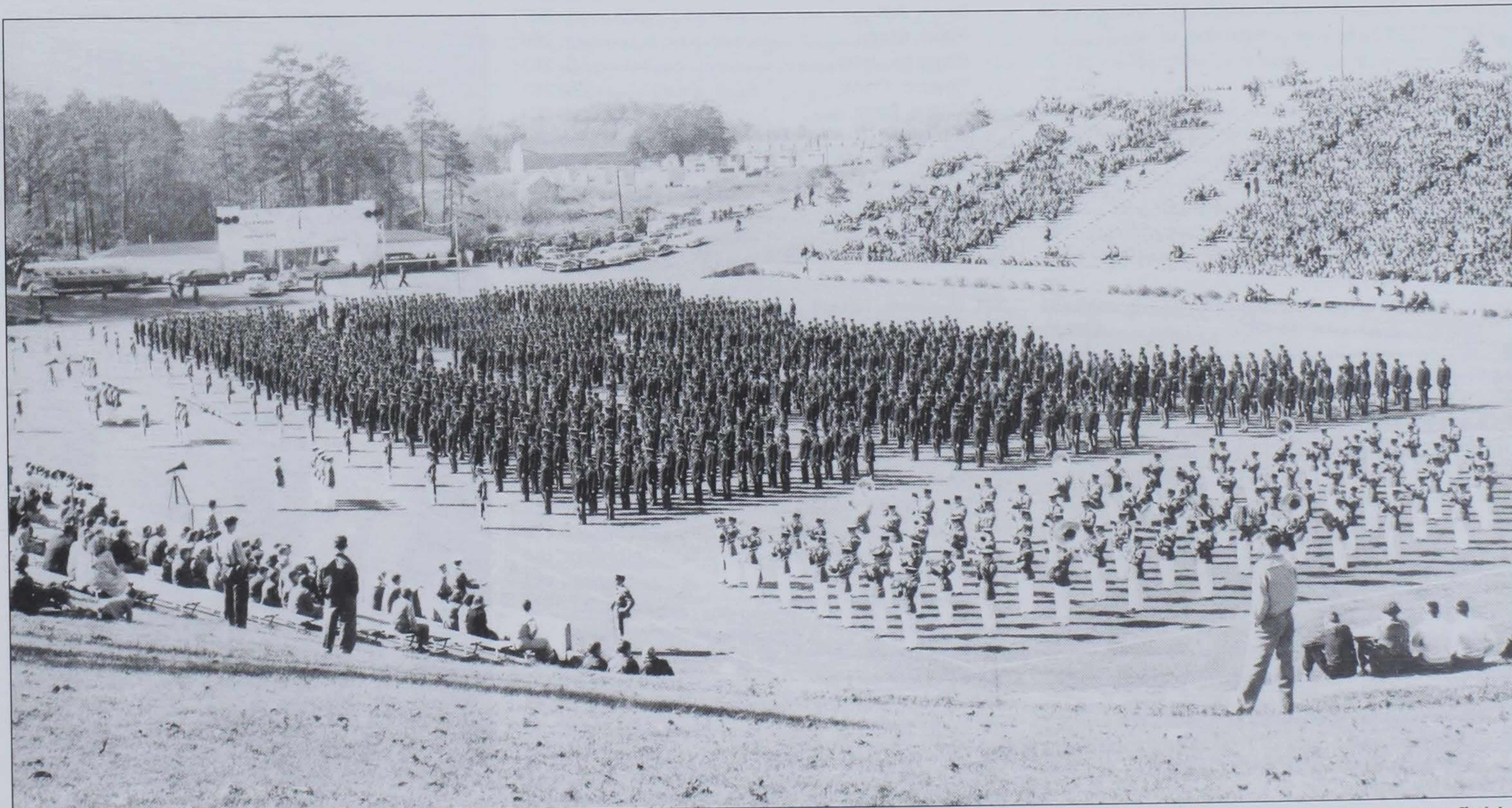
- Memorial Stadium is the center of many Clemson traditions. According to many, the Tigers have the top stadium entrance in all of sports. The team enters the stadium from the top of a hill at the East end of the stadium. Prior to running down the 100-foot hill, the team rubs Howard's Rock for inspiration. It is electrifying for the 85,000 Clemson fans who have come to root on the Tigers.
- Clemson was a military institution until 1955, and thus has many traditions with a military theme. In the early days of Death Valley, the day's color and pageantry began with formations on the field (see photo). Today, those traditions are revisited during Military Appreciation Day, which will be held on



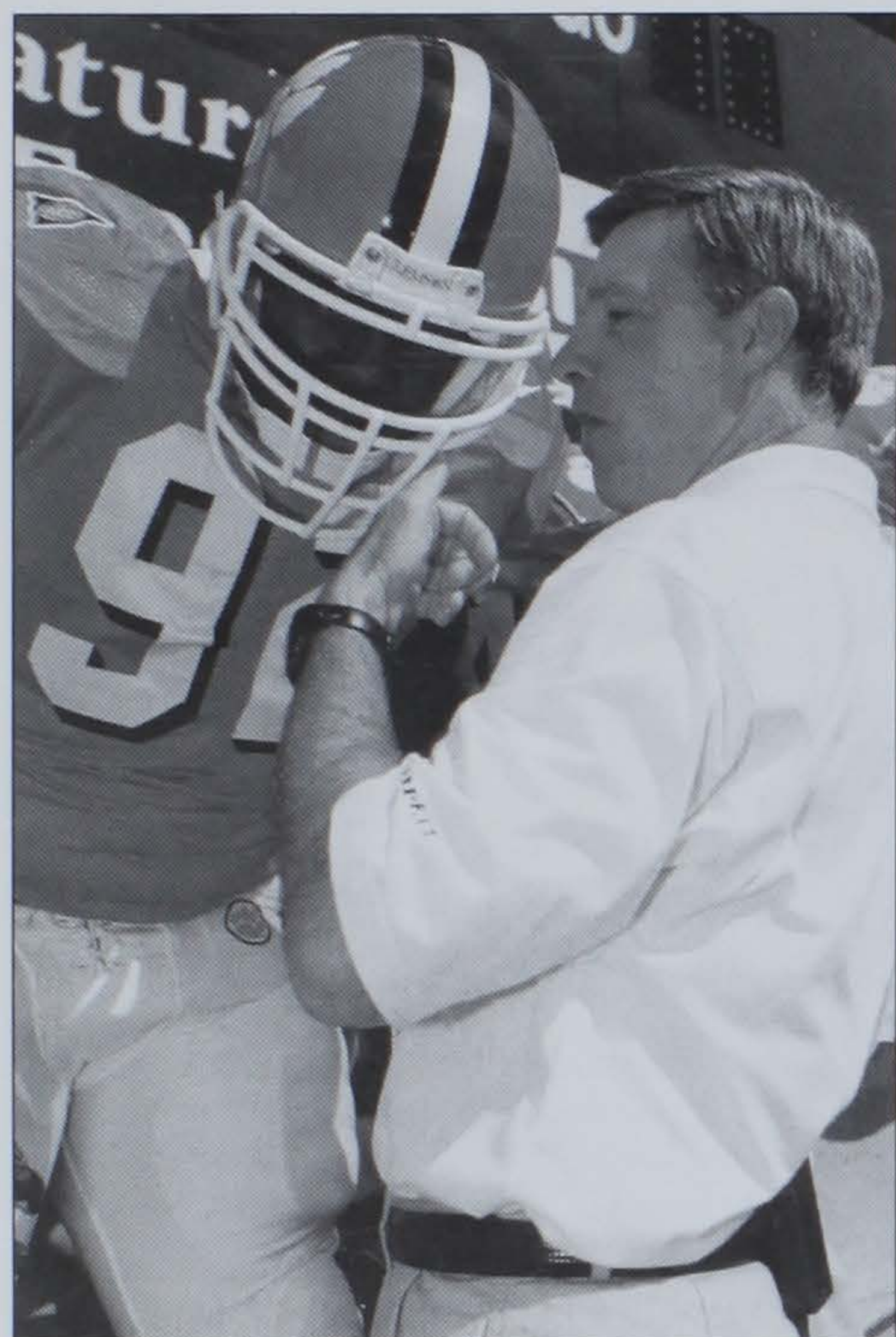
Woodrow Dantzler holds 52 Clemson records. He became the first 2,000/1,000 quarterback in NCAA history in 2001.

November 15, also Senior Day for the 2003 team. The Senior Platoon was an elite unit that still performs at some Clemson home games. They traveled with the team during the 1940s and 1950s, performing at, among other famous arenas, Fenway Park.

- Tigerama is known as the world's largest pep rally. It is held the Friday evening prior to Homecoming that features a pep rally, fireworks, skits, and a Homecoming Pageant all wrapped into a three-hour program at Death Valley. Upwards of 30,000 fans attend the annual event.



Many Clemson traditions date to its military heritage. In the early days of Death Valley, gameday began with a military review on the field.

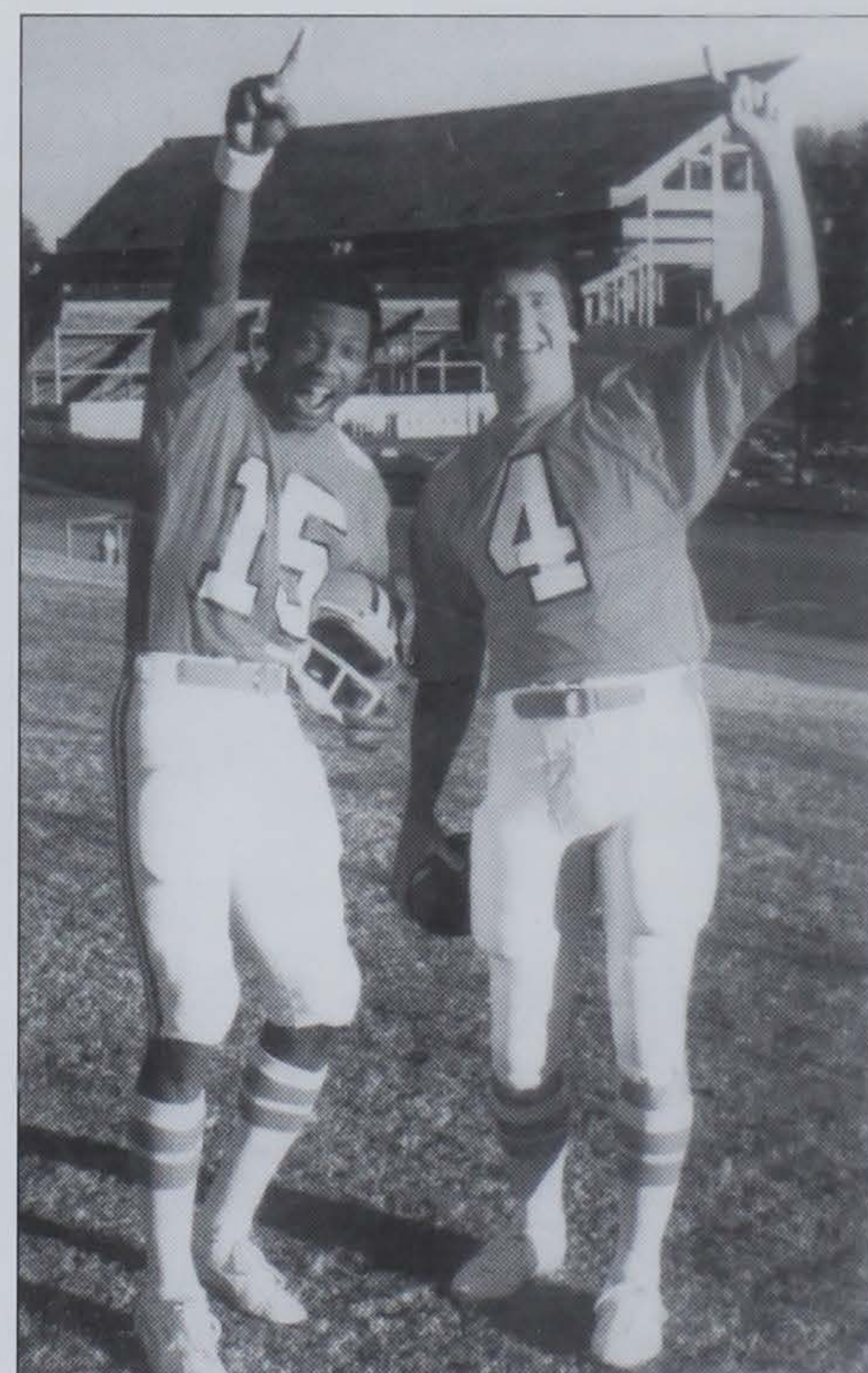

The Athletic Department will act in an ethical and honest manner, dedicated to compliance with all Federal, State, NCAA, Conference, and University rules and regulations.

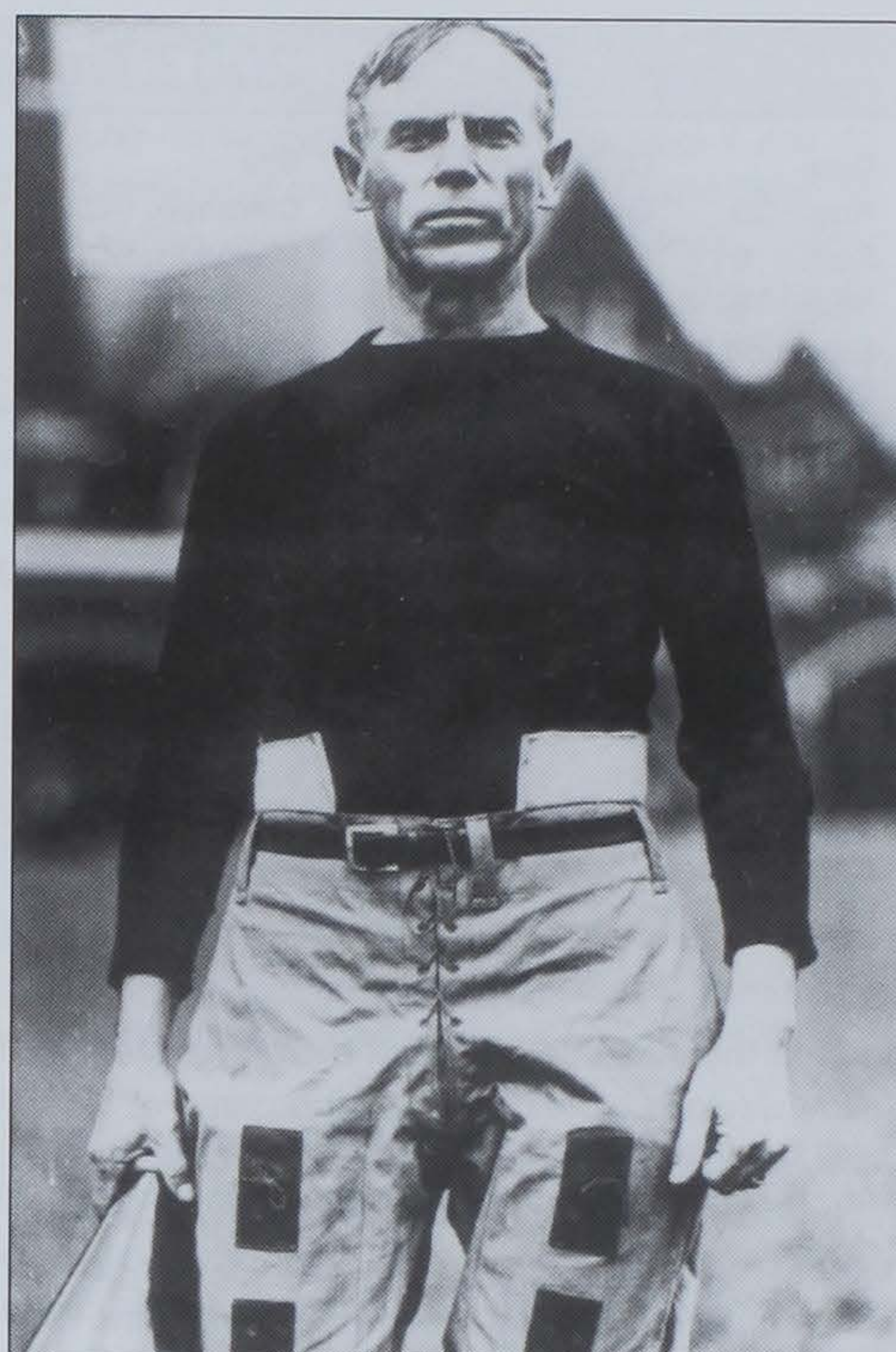

Georgia and Florida State will travel to Death Valley in the same season for the first time since 1995 according to the 2003 Clemson football schedule. The Bulldogs and Seminoles are two of the seven schools that will travel to Clemson this season.

Clemson will play a 12-game regular season schedule for the second consecutive year, including seven games at home for the second straight year. The Tigers open the season at home against Georgia on August 30, the earliest opener in school history and just the third August game in school history. It will be the Bulldogs' first trip to Clemson since 1995, when Georgia defeated Clemson in a hard-fought game by a score of 19-17. The contest will kickoff at 12:00 PM and will be televised by ABC to 50 percent of the nation.

Eleven of the last 16 meetings between the two teams have been decided by a touchdown or less, including the 31-28 Georgia victory in Athens last year. Georgia finished third in the final AP poll and should be ranked in a similar position to open the 2003 season. The highest-ranked team Clemson has faced in a season opener is a #4 Oklahoma team in 1963. When Clemson meets Georgia, it will be the first time Clemson has opened at home against an SEC team since 1971, when Clemson opened at home against Kentucky.

Clemson will play each of its first three games at home, all against non-conference opponents. Furman will travel to Death Valley for a September 6 contest. It will be the first meeting between the two state rivals since 1998, when Clemson won 33-0. The two teams met in the first game in Clemson football history back in 1896. The Tigers will face Middle Tennessee at home on September 13. It will be the first ever meeting between the two schools. Both of those games will kickoff at 5:00 PM.

Clemson's ACC opener will be at Georgia Tech. It will be the second-straight year Clemson has

opened the ACC portion of the slate against the Yellow Jackets. Clemson won the game at Death Valley last year by a score of 24-19. It marked the seventh-straight year the two teams have played a game decided by five points or less. Clemson has won each of the last two meetings between the two.

After an open date, Clemson will travel to Maryland for an October 4 game. It will be Clemson's earliest trip to Maryland since the 1990 season, when Clemson defeated Maryland 18-17 at Baltimore Memorial Stadium on September 15.

The Maryland game will begin a stretch of three straight games for the Tigers against league foes who finished the 2002 season ranked in the top 25 of both polls. Clemson will play host to Virginia on October 11, then travel to N.C. State on October 16. Clemson will take a seven-game winning streak in road games in the Tar Heel state into that contest.

The N.C. State game will be played on a Thursday evening and will be televised by ESPN. In making the late switch, Clemson was assured that a

maximum of only one Clemson home game would be moved to night for television purposes in 2003.

Clemson will play three of its last five games at home versus teams it has defeated 14 out of 20 times over the last four years. Clemson meets North Carolina on October 25, then travels to Wake Forest for a November 1 game. Clemson is 4-0 lifetime against the Demon Deacons on that date in history, including three wins in Winston-Salem.

The fifth meeting between the Bowdens will take place at Death Valley on November 8 when Clemson plays host to Florida State. Then Clemson will conclude its home schedule against Duke on November 15. Clemson will run down the Hill for the 300th time prior to that game. Duke has not won at Clemson since 1980.

The regular season concludes on November 22 when Clemson travels to Columbia to face state-rival South Carolina. Clemson has won five of the last six meetings with South Carolina and holds a 60-36-4 edge in the 100-game series.

"This is another outstanding schedule with five teams that finished in the final top 25 and seven teams that played in a bowl game in 2002," said Head Coach Tommy Bowden, whose Tigers faced the 15th-toughest schedule in the nation in 2002 according to the final Sagarin rankings."

"Death Valley will be at a fever pitch from the opening kickoff of the season when Georgia comes to town. I know every one of our players and coaches, and all of our fans are looking forward to that game. Georgia should be one of the top teams in the nation according to the preseason rankings for 2003."

"We certainly have a challenging home schedule, with games against three teams that will be pre-season top-20 selections. All four of our ACC road games will be against teams that played in bowl games last year. There is balance in this schedule in that we never have to go on the road on consecutive weekends. The open date comes at a good place in the schedule."

Clemson and Georgia will knock heads in the season opener. It will be the Bulldogs' first trip to Death Valley since 1995.

Postgame Interviews

The team dressing rooms are located beneath the west endzone stands, to your left from the press box. The two SIDs will escort writers wishing for postgame interviews to this area with about three minutes showing on the scoreboard clock. The Clemson dressing room is closed to all media, but **Head Coach Tommy Bowden** will be in his interview room (Tiger Lettermen's room), and players chosen by media members will be in their interview area (underneath west stands) for postgame comments following a short team meeting. Both coaches will hold their interviews in the Tiger Lettermen's room under the west endzone stands. The opposing coach will go first followed by **Coach Bowden**.

Press Box

There are two levels to Clemson's press box, located in the center of the club level of the South stands. The first level contains the photo deck, a



dark room, the outside PA, stadium operations, and security, along with booths for field telephones, radio networks, and Clemson athletic officials. The second level is for the print media, with seating accommodations for 124 members of the working press. This level houses Clemson's famous buffet and the work room.

Weekly Press Conference

Tommy Bowden's weekly press conference will be held on Tuesdays throughout the season. The first session will be Tuesday, August 26 and will be held in the Auditorium in Clemson's McFadden Building, the facility that is adjacent to the Jervy Athletic Center.

The media will interview **Coach Bowden** between 11:00 AM and 11:45 AM. Players will be available before and after **Coach Bowden's** press conference. The conference can be accessed by phone. Just call **Tim Bourret** to access the teleconference.

Player interviews will be held in Vickery Hall on the Clemson campus on Mondays between 10:00 AM and 1:00 PM, and at the McFadden Building on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. No player interviews are allowed after Wednesdays.

Tommy Bowden holds his weekly press conference Tuesdays at 11:00 AM.

Clemson's football program has been to a bowl game each of the first four years of the Tommy Bowden era. He is the first Clemson coach to achieve that distinction and it marks the first time since the 1985-91 era that Clemson has gone to a bowl game four consecutive seasons.

With the return of 13 starters, including eight on offense, plus the return one of the top placekickers in the nation in Aaron Hunt, and perhaps the top return tandem in the nation in Justin Miller and Derrick Hamilton, returning to postseason play is certainly an attainable goal for the 2003 Tigers. The elevation to active duty of a talented 2002 first-year freshman class that included 17 players who red-shirted should also enhance Clemson's outlook for the coming season. That class should give the Tigers the depth it lacked at times during the 2002 season.

The Tigers are coming off a 7-6 campaign that included a victory over arch-rival South Carolina to finish the regular season. It was Clemson's third win in the last four years over the Gamecocks under Bowden. Clemson also gained victories over bowl teams Wake Forest and Georgia Tech. The season began with a last minute 31-28 loss to eventual SEC champion and #3 Georgia. Clemson fans wonder what might have been had the Tigers pulled out the season opener that late summer night in Athens.

The Tigers were improved on defense in 2002, holding the opposition to 40 less yards of total offense per game. The point-prevention unit allowed the Bulldogs to gain just 203 yards of total offense, their season low in a 13-1 campaign. The Tigers intercepted 21 passes altogether in 2002, the program's highest figure since 1995, ranking 10th in the nation in that area.

The returning defensive leaders include sophomore All-America candidate Justin Miller, who led the ACC in both kickoff returns and interceptions,

linebacker John Leake, who averaged 13 tackles per game last year, fourth best in the nation, and defensive end Khaleed Vaughn.

Offensively, Clemson gained 4,726 yards in 2002, the sixth-highest figure in Clemson history. That total included a school record 3,157 yards passing. Two different Clemson quarterbacks (Willie Simmons and Charlie Whitehurst) passed for at least 1,500 yards, a first in school history. Whitehurst returns for his sophomore year and will be Clemson's starting signal caller. Three different Tiger receivers caught 50 passes, and two of them return (Kevin Youngblood and Hamilton). The top rusher (Yusef Kelly) and four of the five starting offensive linemen over the last half of the season are also back.

"We should be better across the board," said Bowden, who is the 10th-winningest active coach in Division I football. "Offensively we have veteran players back at all the key positions and we should have depth in all areas. We red-shirted some talented offensive linemen last year. If I had to do the season over, I would have played some of those first year freshmen."

"On defense, we return just five starters, but we played a lot of backups. As a result, we have four of our top six linebackers returning, six of our top seven defensive ends and six defensive backs who helped us make significant improvement in the secondary last year."

"We should be much improved on special teams. Aaron Hunt is one of the most accurate placekickers in the nation; and in Derrick Hamilton and Justin Miller, we have two of the top kick returners in the country. They can really make something happen. We will be improved in the punting game and in terms of coverage."

"Although we have gone to a bowl game each of the last four years, we certainly aspire to win more games and eventually challenge for the ACC championship and a BCS bowl."

To contend for that championship, a title Clemson has not won since 1991, Clemson will have to improve in the running game, offensively and defensively. Clemson failed to reach Bowden's stated goal of 2,000 yards on the ground offensively, and allowed teams to reach that 2,000-yard mark against the Clemson defense, although it took 13 games for the opposition to reach that number.

"This spring, we focussed on improving our running game and stopping the run. We made improvement in that area. The offense had the upper hand in the practices prior to the Spring Game, but then the defense had the upper hand in that area during the final scrimmage on Riggs Field."

"Last year, our longest run by a running back was just 32 yards. We had just nine rushes for 20 yards or more all year. We need to find a back who can go the distance, break a long run. On defense, we must stop the run better than we did last year."

Showing improvement in the victory column will be a challenge. The Tigers open the season for the second straight year against a top-10 Georgia team. This year, the contest will be in Death Valley, Georgia's first trip to Clemson since 1995. Clemson's four ACC road games are all against league opponents who played in bowl games in 2002. The Tigers close the season at rival South Carolina as well.

Offense

(8 returning starters, 16 returning lettermen)

Clemson returns eight players who started over the last half of the season, including four of the five starting offensive linemen. Balance has been a hallmark of successful Clemson teams of the past. The program has never lost a game in its history when gaining at least 200 yards passing and 200 yards rushing in the same game. Improving the ground attack, especially in short-yardage, to attain that balance will be a barometer Bowden will follow this year.

"We need to improve our short-yardage offense," said Bowden. "We struggled in short-yardage last year. That is something we spent a lot of time on in the spring and will continue to do that in August."

A more experienced and deeper offensive line could be the key for the Tigers in that area. Clemson's starting offensive linemen played every snap in a combined 35 games last year.

"We are counting on the red-shirt freshmen to contribute as either starters or backups. They have the potential to see a lot of playing time this year. We would like to get to the point where the starters play 50 snaps and the backups play 20 this year. We really haven't been able to do that since I have been at Clemson. But, red-shirting that group last year could allow us to do that. They got a lot of experience this past spring."

The review of Clemson's depth chart on offense starts at quarterback. Charlie Whitehurst is number #1 on the depth chart after a record-setting freshman season. Whitehurst was the starter over the last five games of the season when he led Clemson to a 3-2 record. He joined Rodney Williams as the only freshmen in Clemson history to lead the Tigers to at least three victories. He led the Tigers to wins over Duke and North Carolina on the road and South Carolina at home in the final month of the season, leading Clemson to a bowl bid.

The son of former Green Bay Packer quarterback David Whitehurst, Charlie completed 34-52 passes for 420 yards and four touchdowns at Duke in his first college start. He established Clemson single-game records for completions and passing yards in that first start, a 34-31 Tiger victory. The performance included leading Clemson to a game-winning field goal with just eight seconds left. His second week, he threw for just 274 yards, but again threw for four scores in a victory at North Carolina. His passing efficiency of 241 for that game was a Clemson single-game record.

For the season, Whitehurst set Clemson freshman records for completions (123), attempts (214), passing yards (1,554), and touchdown passes (10). His most impressive and important performance came against South Carolina in the regular-season finale when he completed 27-38 passes for 287 yards. He did not throw an interception and scored the tying touchdown on a nifty 11-yard run in the final quarter.

"Charlie is our starting quarterback," said Bowden. "He had an outstanding freshman year. He beat out a veteran Willie Simmons at midseason and was very impressive in three victories at the end of the season. He had a solid spring and won the starting job."

Simmons had another year of eligibility and went through spring practice. But, when he was not named the starter he decided to transfer to Florida A&M for his final year.

Bowden has two other players who will compete for the backup position. Red-shirt freshmen Will Proctor and Chansi Stuckey play the position with different styles, but both have the potential to be very effective signal callers. Stuckey was named the second-team quarterback at the end of spring practice. He showed outstanding running ability with some Woodrow Dantzler-like moves during scrimmages. He also showed an ability to hit on the long pass. Proctor completed seven of his last 10 passes in spring scrimmages.

Perhaps the strongest and most deep area of the team will be the four receiver positions. As stated above, Clemson set a school record for completions and passing yardage in a season in 2002. Players who caught 187 of those 268 passes return for this season. Four publications have named Clemson's receiving corps among the top-10 units in the nation.

Leading the receiver group are veterans Kevin Youngblood and Derrick Hamilton. Both caught at least 50 passes in 2002 and this will be the first time in history Clemson has a pair of 50-catch receivers returning. They combined for 111 catches for 1,193 yards and four scores.

Both are already ranked in the top 20 in Clemson history in total receptions and reception yards and are both ranked among the top-20 receivers in the nation by various preseason publications.

Youngblood led the way with 59 catches for 591 yards and two scores in 2002. He began the year with six catches for 66 yards at Georgia on ESPN and finished the year with a career-best 134 receiving yards on seven catches in an ESPN game against Texas Tech. The native of Jacksonville, FL caught at least one pass in every game last year. It was quite a comeback season for the native of Jacksonville because he suffered a broken leg in pre-season practice for 2001 and missed the entire season.

Hamilton had 52 receptions for 602 yards and two scores in 2002. He now has 105 receptions in two seasons, the first player in Clemson history to catch at least 100 balls by the end of his sophomore year. He is more than 60 percent of the way to Rod Gardner's school record of 166.

The junior is an all-purpose player for the Tigers. He was one of just two players nationally to record at least 200 yards rushing, receiving, in punt returns, and kickoff returns in 2002. He led the ACC in all-purpose yards with a Clemson record 1,883 yards, ranking 20th in the nation in that category with 144.8 yards per game. He had four games of at least 200 all-purpose running yards, including the victory over Georgia Tech when he had a 77-yard run and a 79-yard punt return.

Another big-play performer is junior Airese Currie, a starter in six of the 13 games a year ago. Ranked fifth in Clemson history in yards per reception with a 17.7 figure, Currie caught an 83-yard game breaker from Whitehurst at North Carolina last year, the longest pass play in the history of Kenan Stadium. He had 16 catches for 282 yards and three scores a year ago. Also an All-American in track at Clemson, he was clocked at 10.29 in the 100 meters when he won the NCAA East Regional championship last spring.

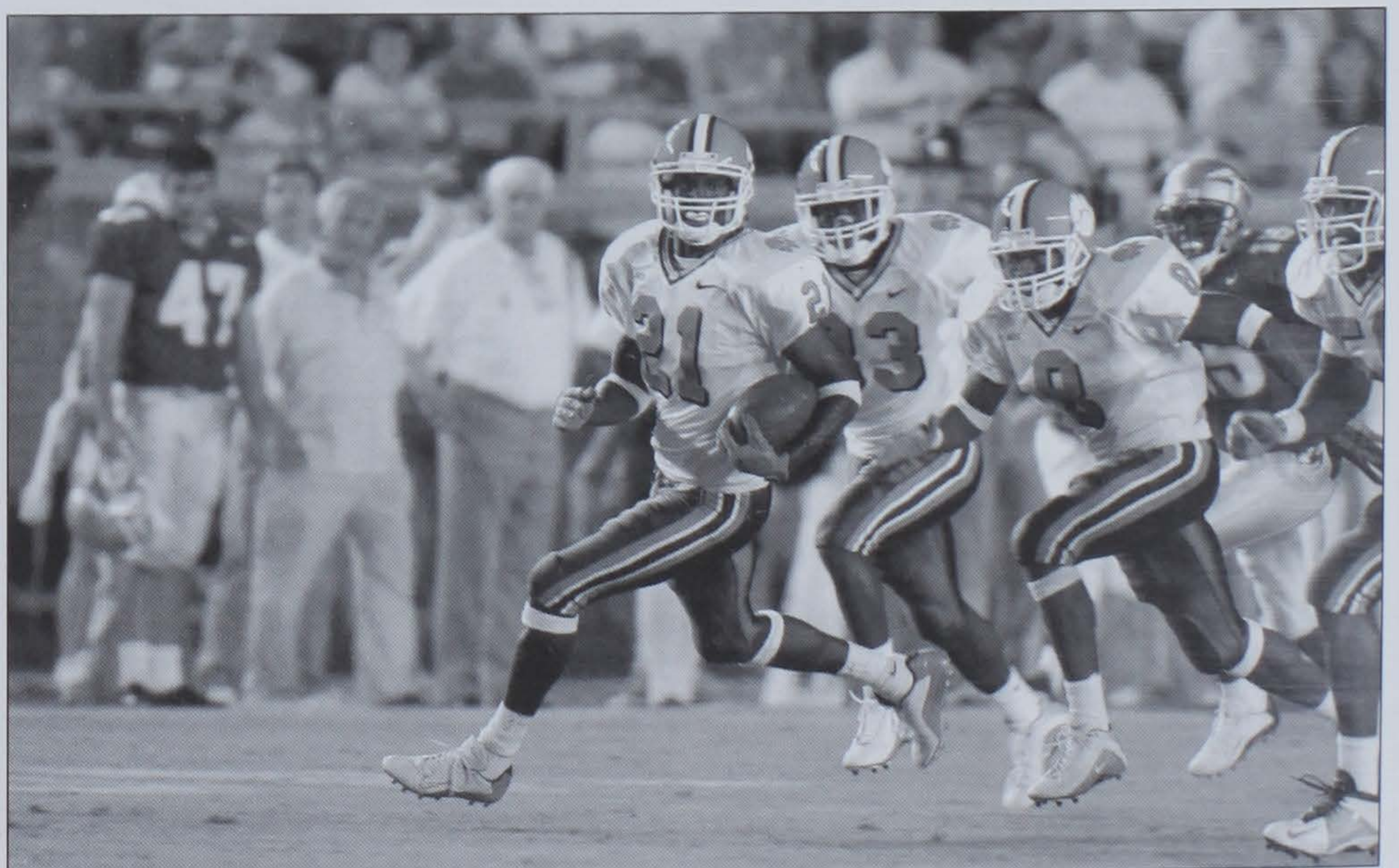
Clemson will miss 2002 seniors J.J. McKelvey (52 catches for 785 yards) and team-leader Jackie Robinson (18 receptions for 229 yards), but two newcomers should fill in nicely. Red-shirt freshman Kelvin Grant and Tennessee transfer Michael Collins are a pair of young, athletic, and tall receivers who will have an immediate impact.

"We have two outstanding additions to our receiver corps in Kelvin Grant and Michael Collins. They will get a lot of work in the fall, but are certainly capable of making the big play for us. This offense counts on receivers making big plays and they can both fill this role."

Grant had three catches for a team-best 72 yards in the Spring Game. Grant was the most highly-recruited member of Clemson's 2002 recruiting class. He was a **USA Today** All-American in 2001 who caught 59 passes for 1,184 yards and 13 scores. He was ranked as the #4 wide receiver in the nation by **SuperPrep**. Collins is a gifted all-around athlete from Georgia who also practiced with the Clemson basketball team last year.

Clemson's offense relies on the use of many receivers and that will be the case again this year. Tony Elliott is an original walk-on who is one of the most consistent all-around athletes on the Clemson team. He had 10 catches for 166 yards last year, second on the team in yards per reception. The engineering student already has his degree, but will return in the fall for his final year of eligibility. Curtis Baham is a red-shirt sophomore who made progress last spring.

The tight end position is in good hands with the return of Ben Hall and Bobby Williamson. Hall has been the starter each of the last two years and has 20 catches for 240 yards and four touchdowns over the two years. He was named a freshman All-American in 2001 when he caught a Clemson freshman tight end record three touchdown passes. Williamson had five catches for 47 yards and a touchdown last year. The outstanding blocker had a solid spring including a four-catch, 61-yard performance in the Spring Game.

Bowden has a diverse roster of running backs. He is looking for someone who can be a game breaker, something he has never had in his four previous years at Clemson. He has some young players who could fill that role, and still has tough veteran players who will give the Tigers that needed change of pace.

The top returning rusher from last year is junior Yusef Kelly. The bullish all-around back gained 520 yards in 125 attempts and scored eight touchdowns, sixth best in the ACC. He also showed his ability as a receiver with 18 catches, fourth on the Clemson team. He started just four of the 13 games last year, but ranked second on the team in runs of 10 yards or more. He had 48 yards rushing on the clinching drive in the win over South Carolina last year.

Chad Jasmin is another veteran back who is capable of contributing in the backfield in a number of areas. The graduate student from Louisiana has a 4.4 career rushing average and also has three career touchdown receptions, including two in the win at North Carolina last year. He is perhaps the best blocker among the Tiger running backs.

"We have many different types of running backs," said Bowden. "Yusef Kelly, Chad Jasmin, and Reggie Merriweather will get you some tough yards on the inside. Kyle Browning and Duane Coleman throw defenses a change of pace. David Dunham and Cliff Harrell are two fullbacks who will make a significant contribution. All of them catch the ball out of the backfield. That is important in this offense."

"We just need to find a runner who can break the long one."

The main candidates for the game-breaker runs are Coleman, Merriweather, and Browning. Browning saw limited action as a red-shirt freshman last year, but has shown that ability in practice. Coleman sat out last year, but the native of Naples, FL was regarded as the top running back in Florida two years ago when he averaged an amazing 11.4 yards per rush and scored 40 touchdowns. Merriweather was the top break-away threat in the spring when he had two runs of 75 yards during scrimmages.

Clemson returns four of its five starters in the offensive line. Plus, five red-shirts are ready to make an impact. Clemson must replace Gary Byrd, the 2002 starting right tackle, who was Clemson's most highly-rated offensive lineman last year.

Leading the returning starters is Gregory Walker, who will be in his third season as a starter on the line. A guard the last three years, Walker will be the starting right tackle this year. The 320-pounder led the Tigers in knockdown blocks in five games and was the highest-graded Clemson offensive lineman in seven contests. He played every snap in seven of the 13 games.

The other tackle will be graduate student William Henry. Slated to be a backup last year, he was thrown into the fire when starter Derrick Brantley tore an ACL in the second game of the year. Henry went from not playing at all in the opener against Georgia to serving as a mainstay at left tackle. In fact, he played the complete game in nine of the 13 games and played 797 snaps for the season.

Returning at guard is Cedric Johnson, a junior who played 887 snaps last year, the second-highest figure on the team. Johnson was the team leader in average film grade in five games last year and led the squad in knockdown blocks three times. Joining Johnson at guard will be red-shirt freshman Nathan Bennett, who won a battle with returning letterman Chip Myrick, at guard.

Jermyn Chester and Tommy Sharpe combined to start at the center position in 2002. Chester started the first eight games, while Sharpe handled the snapping duties the last five games. Chester suffered a knee injury in March that forced him to end his playing career, so the job belongs to the former walk-on Sharpe. He had an outstanding final five games of the season and was a big reason for Whitehurst's success during that time. He led the team in knockdown blocks in three of his five starts.

Bowden is excited about the prospects of his young offensive linemen. In addition to Bennett, Dustin Fry is an athletic 319-pound center who will bring competition to the center position. Roman Fry is a 285-pound tackle from Ohio who could be a factor. Brad Lee and Tim DeBeer are also slated to see action as backups in 2003. DeBeer must return from a dislocated ankle suffered in spring practice.

Defense

(5 returning starters, 23 returning lettermen)

Clemson returns just five starters from last year's defense, but there are nine other players returning who played at least 100 snaps from scrimmage during the 2002 season. The Tigers have also moved a couple of offensive players over to defense in an effort to improve the team's overall speed. Similar to the case on offense, the return of many talented red-shirt freshmen should help Clemson's depth and hopefully overall defensive performance in 2003.

Leading the Clemson defense will be three-year starter Khaleed Vaughn, leading tackler John Leake, and freshman All-American Justin Miller. All three are certainly capable of having breakout seasons.

Leake, who has added 20 pounds of muscle and now weighs 240, is one of the top returning tacklers in the nation. The native of Plano, TX had 169 tackles last year and his 13.0 per-game figure ranked fourth best in the nation. A team leader, Leake now has 312 career tackles to rank 13th in Clemson history. His 169 stops last year ranked fifth best for a single season. In his third year as a starter, Leake combines quickness and toughness to be one of the top linebackers in the nation. He is ranked among the top outside linebackers in the nation by various preseason publications.

"John Leake has gone from a special teams player as a freshman to our top tackler," said Bowden. "He is an outstanding leader of our defense in the middle. I look for John to have an all-conference type of season."

Clemson must replace Rodney Thomas, a senior in 2002 who had 167 tackles a year ago. Leroy Hill will battle for the starting middle linebacker position. Hill was the top special teams tackler on the Clemson team by far last year with 21 stops. He played just 47 snaps from scrimmage, but that figure will increase greatly this year. Also in the middle linebacker picture are Roosevelt Nelson, a special teams player much of last year, and Charles Bennett, who moves over from defensive end. Red-shirt freshman Anthony Waters, a highly regarded player during his first-year freshman season, and letterman Nigel Vaughn, will also be in the mix at a linebacker position.

Eric Sampson started 12 games last year at a linebacker position and had 79 tackles, the fourth-highest figure on the team. He had a season-best 15 stops in the win at Duke. Lionel Richardson, who had six first hits in the Spring Game, will also be in the mix at linebacker.

The most talented player on the Clemson team may be Miller, a sophomore cornerback. The native of Kentucky tied a Clemson record with eight interceptions last year. He was a first-team freshman All-American according to the Football Writers Association and **The Sporting News**. Miller led the ACC and ranked fifth in the nation in interceptions, quite an accomplishment considering he started just seven games on defense last year. He was Clemson's only first-year freshman to appear in a game last year. He is ranked as a preseason first-

team All-American by **The Sporting News** and is on the preseason lists for the Thorpe Award and the Bronco Nagurski Award.

Miller will hold down one of the cornerback positions. Last year he teamed with senior Brian Mance to give Clemson one of the top cornerback combos in the nation. Mance's replacement will be a battle between Tye Hill, Touré Francis, and Buddy Williams. Hill was listed as the starter after spring practice.

Hill was Clemson's third-leading rusher last year when he averaged a team best 5.4 yards per carry. He had a 100-yard game at North Carolina. But, Bowden wishes to make use of his speed on defense and he played well in the secondary in the Spring Game when he made a leaping interception. Hill is also a standout on the Tiger track team.

Francis was a starting cornerback in the season opener against Georgia last season, but he suffered a torn ACL just 12 plays into the game. He should be back to 100 percent in the fall for the opener against the Bulldogs. Williams is a highly regarded red-shirt freshman who will get a strong opportunity in the spring and fall.

Jamaal Fudge and Travis Pugh look to hold down the safety positions. They must replace 2002 starters and four-year players Eric Meekins and Altroy Bodrick. Fudge saw action as a cornerback last year and had 27 tackles overall as a reserve. Pugh had 34 stops as Meekins's backup a year ago

and has the range to be an outstanding free safety. He led all tacklers in the Spring Game with eight stops. Reserves Tavaghn Monts and Gerald McCloud (a converted receiver) are also in the mix in the Tiger secondary. Monts had an interception and a fumble recovery in the Spring Game at Riggs Field.

Clemson's deepest area on defense may be the defensive line. Clemson has eight returning lettermen for the four positions. The group is led by Khaleed Vaughn, who has started 25 of the last 26 Clemson games, including three bowl games. He had 60 tackles a season ago and

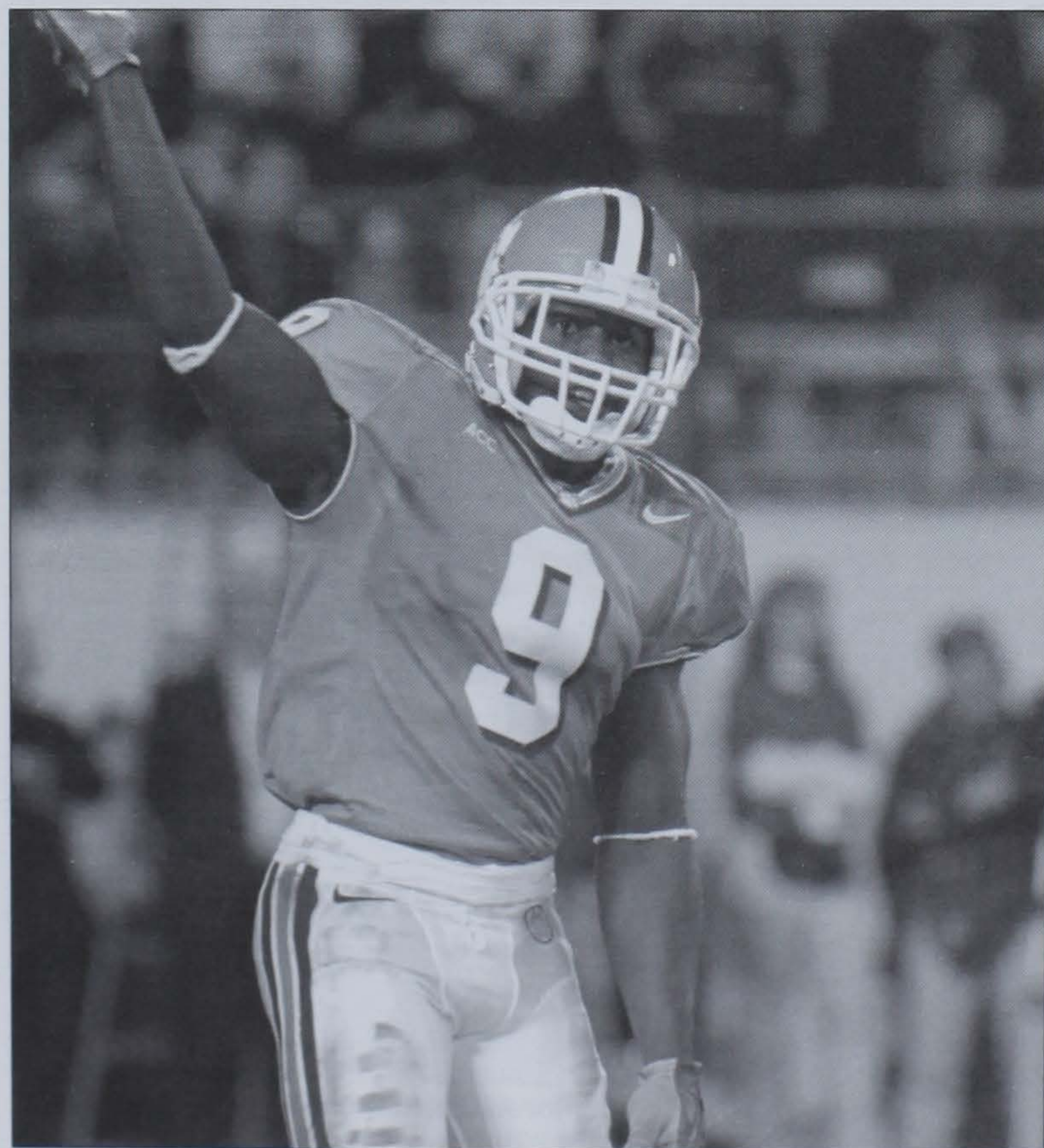
had six tackles for loss, including four sacks. He was second on the team in quarterback pressures (18).

J.J. Howard, an athletic defensive end in his fifth season in the program, should finally get his chance at a starting assignment. The graduate had 34 tackles last season, including four tackles for loss. An athletic player who runs a 4.48 in the 40-yard dash and can bench press 450 pounds, Howard can chase down an enemy quarterback and make the big play.

Junior Maurice Fountain, who played in all 13 games as a reserve last season, is another athletic defensive end. Fountain had two interceptions as a defensive end in 2002, including one in the late stages of the Louisiana Tech game that iced the Clemson victory. It was the first time since 1985 that a Clemson defensive lineman had two interceptions in a single season. Junior Vontrell Jamison, who played on the offensive line last year, and red-shirts Gaines Adams and Brandon Cannon, are also in the defensive end race this year. Adams led all Clemson players in sacks (5.5) in spring scrimmages.

The defensive tackle position is led by junior Donnell Washington and graduate student DeJuan Polk. Washington started all 13 games last year and had 55 tackles. At 6'6" and 320 pounds, he has the potential to be Clemson's chief run-stopper on the inside in 2003. Polk had 25 tackles as a reserve last year.

Eric Coleman will also challenge for a starting position. Coleman had 31 tackles a season ago, most among reserve defensive linemen. Senior Todd McClinton had 15 tackles in his 141 plays of action last year in an injury-plagued season. If healthy, McClinton could make a run for a starting position. Sophomore Trey Tate and red-shirt freshman Donnell Clark are a pair of young players who could contribute this year.

Special Teams

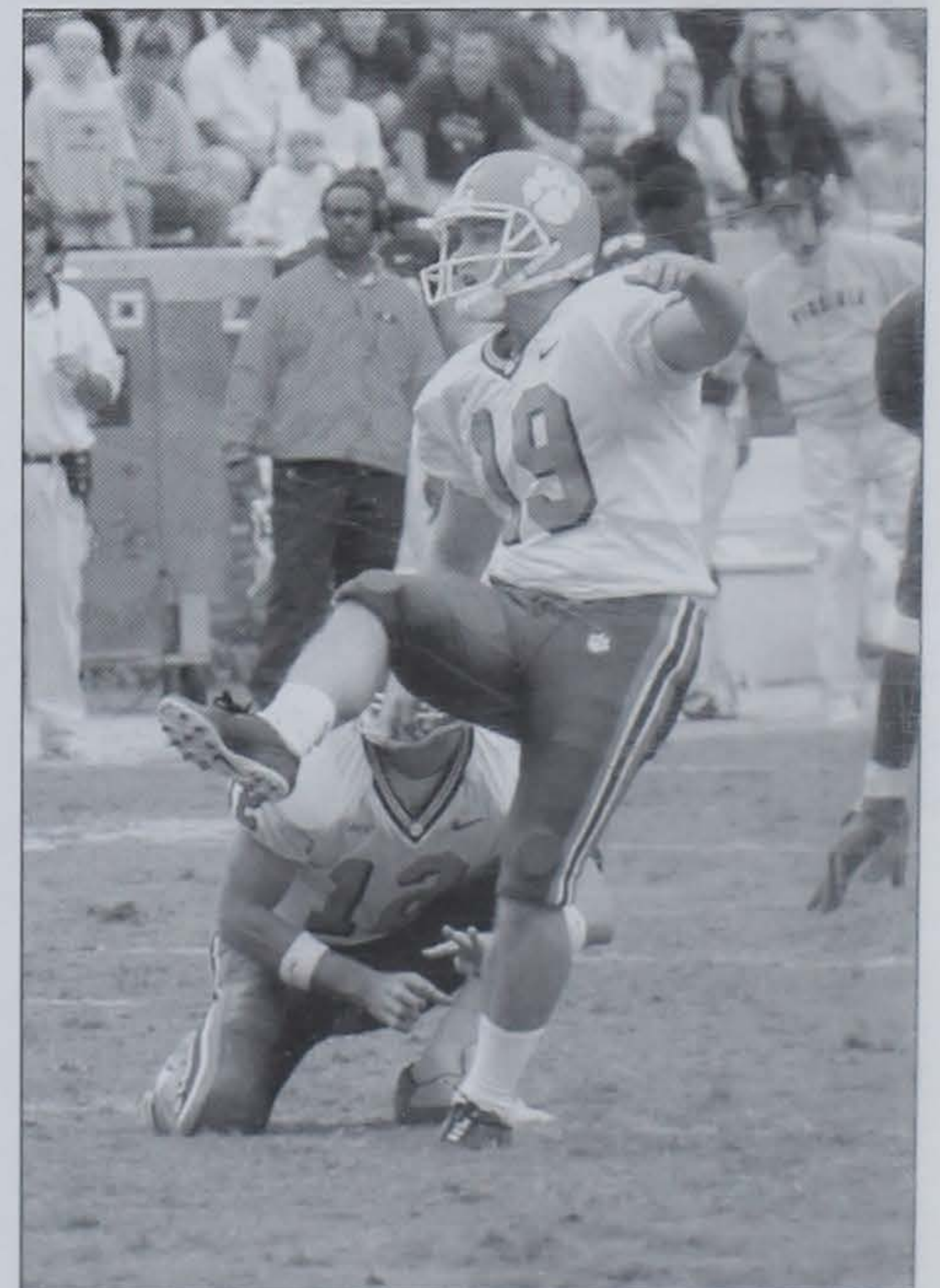
Aaron Hunt leads the Clemson special teams from the placekicking position, while Derrick Hamilton and Justin Miller, the last two ACC kickoff return champions, give Clemson two of the best return men in the nation.

Hunt has made 37-50 field goals in his career, including 17-22 in 2002 when he was a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award. Hunt is already Clemson's career leader in extra points (126-130). He also made 17 of 19 field goals inside the 40 last year. He has come through in the clutch twice in his career, beating South Carolina (2000) and Duke (2002) with field goals inside the last 10 seconds of the game.

Clemson will start a new punter this year, as Wynn Kopp has graduated. Red-shirt freshman Cole Chason could be the leader for that job. Stephen Furr returns to handle the kickoffs and could be a candidate for the punter job.

Hamilton led the ACC in all-purpose yards and his success as a return man had a lot to do with that. The junior was third in the ACC and 48th in the country in punt returns with a 10.8-yard average. He ranked third in the nation in kickoff returns as a freshman. Hamilton was named to some preseason All-ACC teams as a receiver, kickoff returner, and punt returner. Miller was the ACC champion in kickoff returns with a 35.1 average, a Clemson single-season record. He scored on an 80-yard kickoff return against N.C. State on his first career kickoff return.

Clemson must make improvement in terms of defending returns. The Tigers allowed three kickoff returns for scores and two punt returns for touchdowns in 2002. Bowden had not allowed any returns for touchdowns in his first five years as a collegiate head coach.

Alumni, Famous

Clemson lost its most famous alumnus this past summer when former Senator Strom Thurmond died at the age of 100 in Edgefield, SC. Though he is well known as a former governor and the longest serving senator in U.S. history, Thurmond got his start at Clemson College from 1919-23. And not only did he graduate in 1923 with a degree in horticulture, but he also was a part of the school's championship cross country and track teams in the early 1920s.

Accounts of Thurmond at Clemson say that he was a member of the teams for two years, during the 1921-22 and 1922-23 academic years. He was part of a historic event on November 24, 1921. Clemson's cross country team traveled to Athens, GA for the first ever intercollegiate track meet on Sanford Field and its first matchup with Georgia. The meet was held at halftime of the Clemson-Georgia football game. The Tiger track team, which had been practicing on a five-mile course, showed up surprised to find out it would be competing on a three-mile course. Thurmond finished 10th overall at the meet, which was won by Georgia 24-31.

Thurmond and the track program had their best year ever in 1922-23. They avenged their defeat to Georgia a year earlier by a 20-35 score and now senior Thurmond finished sixth. The team won its third-straight state title, earning Clemson permanent possession of the trophy cup.

Thurmond's athletic prowess at Clemson laid the foundation for a long and healthy life. He was well-known for his fitness and did not smoke or drink alcohol while serving as senator at the nation's capital. He did pushups daily well

into his 90s, and for his 65th birthday party he entertained media and assembled guests by performing 100 pushups.

Thurmond's contributions to Clemson athletics did not end with his graduation. He was one of the charter members of IPTAY, the University's athletic fundraising organization. Thurmond helped start what is known as the father of athletic fundraising. He and his fellow members helped raise over \$1,600 in 1934-35, its first year. Today, IPTAY raises more than \$10 million annually.

For his accomplishments in Clemson athletics, Thurmond was inducted into the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame in 1983. Although his political career will be his most-remembered legacy, Thurmond left his mark on Clemson University and the athletic department. Here is a list of other famous Clemson alumni:

Antonio, John

This man holds a special place in the hearts of Tiger fans and in the pocketbooks of sports marketing entrepreneurs. Antonio invented the Tiger Paw, the distinctive logo of the Clemson athletic teams that has become synonymous with this University's athletic success.

Antonio was an innovative account executive with Henderson Advertising in Greenville, and prior to the 1970 season, unveiled the Paw as Clemson's new logo. It has shown up all over the country on items owned by Clemson fans. Many institutions with a feline as mascot have used the logo, or an impression of it.

Antonio also came up with the phrase, "Fly the friendly skies of United," when he worked for the Leo Burnette Agency in Chicago.

"I've never had a logo or an emblem copied as much as the Tiger Paw," said Antonio, now 71 and living in Greenville.

Antonio still remembers the day he made the presentation of the Tiger Paw to the legendary Frank Howard, then the Clemson Athletic Director. "He wasn't saying much at all," recalled Antonio in an article in the **Greenville News** dated February 16, 1997. "I kind of thought I was losing this fight."

At this point Antonio pulled out an orange football helmet with a tiger paw painted on the side.

"Coach Howard's eyes got as big as saucers and he smiled. From there it was downhill. Coach Howard wanted that helmet." Those Tiger Paws are still on the Clemson helmets today.

Board of Trustees

Clemson athletes have a long history of success stories after their playing days are concluded. These stories are present on the current roster of the Clemson Board of Trustees. Two current members of the Board played a prominent part in Clemson's athletic tradition.

Lawrence M. Gressette, Jr. lettered under legendary Head Coach Frank Howard between 1951-53. He served as a co-captain of the 1953 team, the first year Clemson was in the ACC. A strong running back, he once gained 177 yards on 26 carries against Auburn in a 34-0 Tiger victory. That is still the most yards rushing by a Tiger against an SEC team. That rushing yardage total was the third-highest single game performance in the decade of the 1950s by a Tiger.

Bill Smith is the youngest member of the Clemson Board of Trustees and was named Vice Chairman in 2001. Smith, a native of Columbia, was a starting defensive end on Clemson's 1981 National championship team and is now CEO of Holmes Smith Developments, Inc. He had a career-high 10 tackles in the 22-15 victory over Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl. Smith, who red-shirted during the 1980 season due to injury, was a member of four bowl teams while at Clemson.

Clemson has had a long history of former athletes who have served the school and the board with distinction. Phil Prince, who went on to serve Clemson as University President, is an emeritas member of the board. He was one of the leaders of Clemson's 1948 undefeated team. Louis P. Batson is another former Tiger football player who is an emeritas member of the board. Former baseball star Doug Kingsmore is also a former trustee.

Calhoun, John

This senator from the state of South Carolina proposed a bill in the house in 1953 making it a state law that Clemson and South Carolina had to meet in football once a year.

Calhoun, John C.

Thomas Green Clemson, the founder of Clemson University, was the son in law of John C. Calhoun. Calhoun still holds the distinction of being the only Vice President of the United States who served under two different United States Presidents.

Clemson, SC

The city of Clemson has a population of about 13,500 full-time residents. But on Saturday afternoons in the fall, when over 80,000 fans are in the stands, that population increases significantly. In fact, Clemson moves all the way to the third-largest city in the state on home football Saturdays when up to 86,000 fans are in the stands. On those days, only Charleston and Columbia are larger.

Coaches, New

Clemson has two new additions to its coaching staff for the 2003 season. David Blackwell will serve as linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, while Dabo Swinney will coach the wide receivers. Both have ties to the area or Head Coach Tommy Bowden.

Blackwell came to Clemson from Pittsburgh, where he was a key to the Panthers success the last three years, especially in 2002 when the team finished with a 9-4 record and a top-20 ranking. Blackwell grew up in Greenville, SC and graduated from Berea High School. He then went to East Carolina where he played for that program before an injury ended his career in 1991. His ties to the Carolinas will certainly help his job as recruiting coordinator.

Swinney is a 1993 Alabama graduate and was a member of the Crimson Tide 1992 National Championship team. As a walk-on wide receiver at Alabama in 1989, his position coach was Tommy Bowden. His position coach his last three years was former Clemson Assistant Coach Woody McCorvey. Swinney was a part of five Alabama teams as a player or coach that finished in the top 10 in the nation.

Swinney has a striking resemblance to a young Jimmy Addison, quarterback of Clemson's ACC Championship teams of 1965-67 (see photos at the top of this page).

Colors

Clemson's official colors are burnt orange (PMS 165) and Northwestern purple (PMS 268), but many of Clemson's athletic uniforms are predominantly orange and white. Clemson has worn all orange for special games, and in 1991 wore purple jerseys with white pants and orange helmets against N.C. State and California. Clemson wore purple pants on the road for selected games in 2001 and 2002.

According to legend, Clemson used to have a pale purple and gold as the official colors. But Jess Neely changed that because he wanted uniforms that were more colorfast. It seems that the weather and constant washings were causing the uniforms to fade. So Neely worked with the Clemson school of textiles and developed deeper colors for uniforms, colors that held up under the rays of the sun and the workings of the washing machines.

Conference

Clemson is a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Tigers were charter members in 1953. Prior to that, Clemson was in the Southern Conference from 1921 to 1952. Clemson was in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association before that, and has been a charter member of every conference with which it has been affiliated.

Conference Championships

Clemson has more ACC titles than any other school, as the Tigers won or shared the ACC title in 1956, 58, 59, 1965-67, 78, 81, 82, 86-88, 91. Clemson won the Southern Conference in 1940 and 1948. Clemson tied for the ACC title in 1965, therefore Clemson has 12 titles outright and one shared, more than any other school.

Country Gentleman

Clemson is famous for its Tiger mascot and pushups after each score. But the school used to have two mascots. In addition to the Tiger, the school used to have the Country Gentleman, a student dressed in purple tails and top hat, carrying a cane. The Country Gentleman concept came about as a result of references to Clemson made by **Greenville News** sportswriter Carter Scoop Latimer as the Country Gentlemen. Clemson had the two-mascot system between 1954 and 1972.

Dawkins, Brian

Former Clemson strong safety Brian Dawkins was an All-American with the Tigers in 1995. He ranked among the national leaders in interceptions that year with six and was Clemson's most valuable player on defense.

But, few figured he would reach the heights he has seen in the NFL as a Pro Bowl safety with the Philadelphia Eagles. Known for his offseason conditioning regimen that includes workouts with Ultimate Fighting Legend Tim "Obake" Catalfo, Dawkins is now one of the highest paid defensive players in the NFL. This past spring, the 29-year-old signed a seven-year, \$43-million contract (including \$8-million signing bonus) with the Eagles.

Last year, he led the eagles in tackles (131) and forced fumbles (7). Last September, he became the first player in NFL history to have a sack, an interception, a fumble recovery, and a touchdown reception (off a fake punt) in a victory over the Houston Texans.

A player who makes plays all over the field, Dawkins has 10 career sacks and causes sleepless nights for opposing offensive coordinators. "You remember what Lawrence Taylor did for the outside linebacker position?...Well that is what Dawkins is doing with the safety spot," said Eagle linebacker Ike Reese in an article on Dawkins in **ESPN The Magazine** this past summer.

Dawkins says his goals for his position in the same article. "I want to take safeties from this image people have now of a boring last line of defense, into the first player you think about. I want to be the one who transformed the position."

Death Valley

The name synonymous with Clemson Memorial Stadium. The Stadium was dubbed this affectionate title by the late Lonnie McMillian, a former coach at Presbyterian. He used to take his teams to play at Clemson, and they rarely scored, never mind gained a victory. Once he told the writers he was going to play Clemson up at Death Valley because his teams always got killed. It stuck somewhat, but when Frank Howard started calling it that in the fifties, the term really caught on.

McMillian actually played against Clemson for Presbyterian in 1916. He even coached Presbyterian to victory over Clemson in 1925 and 1926, both times at Clemson's Riggs Field. Presbyterian had a 1-15 record in Death Valley, with the only victory coming in 1943 when the entire

Clemson senior and junior classes were drafted into the armed services.

Death Valley is now in its 62nd year. Many people think the name is derived from the fact that there rests a cemetery outside the fence on the pressbox side of the stadium. Although it would make sense, the name was first coined by McMillian.

Emergency Phone

In case of emergency at Memorial Stadium, call (864) 656-2999. The Clemson University police number is (864) 656-2222. For health care at the stadium, first-aid is available at Gates 9, 13, 16, and 20 in the upper decks.

Endowed Positions

Through the IPTAY Office, Clemson has established an endowment of positions program. The program began in April of 1994 when members of IPTAY attended the 85th birthday of legendary Head Coach Frank Howard. Contributions were made at the festive event and by others who could not attend, thereby endowing the Clemson Head Coaching position.

Since then, many generous IPTAY members have endowed various positions in all sports. The first to do it was the Bill Hudson Family, which endowed the Clemson offensive tackle position. Bill Hudson was a stalwart tackle at Clemson in the late 1950s and went on to a pro career with the San Diego Chargers, Boston Patriots, and Montreal Alouettes. He played in the 1962 AFL Pro Bowl. The program now has over 100 endowments counting all sports.

Esso Club

When you want to cover a Clemson football weekend and capture the true flavor of the entire proceedings, you have to make a pit stop at the Esso Club. If this sounds like a combination bar and gas station, well, you're right. They do not sell gas there anymore, but Clemson fans for many years have frequented this famous weekend watering hole.

It is a favorite establishment for Brent Musburger, regardless of the network he represents. He made two visits there in 1997, once during the football season when he broadcast the Clemson-North Carolina football game and once during basketball season when he brought the one and only Dick Vitale with him in conjunction with ABC's coverage of the Clemson-Georgia Tech basketball game.

Expansion

The Atlantic Coast Conference had a landmark summer. After much deliberation and negotiation, the conference extended invitations to Miami (FL) and Virginia Tech to join the ACC. The programs accepted on July 1 will be a part of conference schedules for the 2004-05 academic year. The scheduling and possible conference alignment will be determined some time this fall. The conference hopes to announce the 2004 football schedule in December of 2003 or January of 2004.

Clemson was one of the schools that favored the expansion of the league, sentiments that were made public by Clemson President James F. Barker and Clemson Athletic Director Terry Don Phillips early in the process. Barker played a key role in the expansion, as he served as president of the ACC President's Commission this year.

Clemson Head Coach Tommy Bowden and his players were in favor of the addition of the two schools to the ACC football landscape.

"We have made the ACC much stronger in football," said Bowden. "Either Miami or Virginia Tech have played in the national title game three of the last four years. We just added two top-10 programs to our conference. It certainly enhances our conference's credibility on a national scale."

"I know our players, our coaching staff, and our fans will be excited to see those teams play at Clemson. Having Miami in the league will give us an ACC presence in South Florida and help our recruiting efforts in that area. There are many outstanding prospects there."

"Clemson has not played Miami in several years, but we have first-hand knowledge of the level of play at Virginia Tech having played them in 1999 and 2000."

"I look at it as a great opportunity to make us better," said freshman All-American Justin Miller, who will get a chance to face the two new schools as a junior. "When you play quality competition, it makes you better. Virginia Tech and Miami are obviously among the best programs in the nation. All players like to compete against the best teams in the nation as often as possible."

Family Feud

Bowden Bowl I was one of the most exciting evenings in the history of Death Valley. October 23, 1999 will be an evening everyone remembers for years, as Florida State's Bobby Bowden faced Clemson's Tommy Bowden in the first Father vs. Son coaching matchup in Division I history.

The event received unprecedented national publicity for both schools, and certainly made Clemson, SC the center of the college football universe that weekend. Florida State came away with a 17-14 victory, its closest game in its National Championship season. Clemson held the Seminole offense to 23 points under its average.

The final press attendance number for that game was 755, by far a record for a game in Tigertown. Florida State has won each of the first four Bowden Bowls, but Clemson has made a run at the Seminoles in three of the four. This year's game will be at Clemson on November 8.

Great Scott!

When Head Coach Tommy Bowden started working on his staff for his first year as Clemson head coach, one of the first candidates he thought of was Brad Scott. One of the top offensive coordinators in the nation in the 1980s and early 1990s at Florida State, Scott had recently completed five years as head coach at South Carolina. He became the first coach in South Carolina history to win a bowl game.

Scott serves as assistant head coach, offensive coordinator, and tutors the tight ends. In his first year, Clemson tight ends were more prolific than in the last 15 years. The trend continued in 2001, as Ben Hall set a Clemson freshman touchdown record for tight ends. Hall and Bobby Williamson both caught touchdown passes in 2002, giving tight ends seven touchdown receptions in four years under Scott, seven more than they had in the previous 10 seasons. Scott now serves as offensive coordinator, the first time he has had that responsibility since coached Charlie Ward to a Heisman Trophy and helped Florida State to its first national championship.

Scott is the seventh coach in the last 14 years to coach both at Clemson and South Carolina. Rarely do you see this happen in such an intense rivalry. Here is a list of the coaches who have served at both schools in recent years:

Graveyard

Clemson has 47 wins over AP-ranked teams over the years, but some wins stand out. Winning over a ranked team in Death Valley is one thing, but gaining victory over a ranked team on an opponent's home field is an extraordinary accomplishment. To document these victories, Clemson has constructed a "Graveyard" at the entrance to the Clemson practice fields behind the Jervy Athletic Center. Clemson added to the area in 2001 when it defeated #9 Georgia Tech in Atlanta, 47-44 in overtime.

Hall of Fame Inductees

Six former Clemson athletes representing six different sports will be inducted into the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003. The formal induction ceremonies will be held September 5-6, 2003, the weekend Clemson will play host to Furman in football at Death Valley. The list includes three former Clemson athletes who were named to ACC 50-Year Anniversary teams this past year.

The list of inductees includes former men's soccer All-American Eric Eichmann, former track All-American Jim Haughey, Jane Forman, an All-American and member of the ACC 50-Year Anniversary women's tennis team, former All-ACC basketball player Vincent Hamilton, and former All-ACC baseball player and football standout Smiley Sanders. Whitey Jordan, who played football and baseball at Clemson in the 1950s and went on to coach football and golf in the 1960s and 1990s at Clemson, also will be inducted.

We also want to give a special mention in this area to former Clemson All-American Perry Tuttle, who was inducted into the state of South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame. Tuttle, who is already in the Clemson Hall of Fame, was an All-American on Clemson's 1981 National Championship team. He remains the only Clemson athlete to make the cover of *Sports Illustrated* while still a Clemson student.

Hash Marks

The old hashmarks were 53' 4" from each sideline. In 1993, they were moved to an even 60 feet from each sideline, meaning there is 6' 8" more area for the running backs to turn the corner and put that much more pressure on the outside linebackers to cover them than there was prior to 1993.

In 1938, the hash marks were moved from 30 feet away from the sidelines to 45 feet. Then in 1947, they were moved to one-third of the field, or 53' 4". And that was the distance until the 1993 season.

Heisman, John

Yes, the same guy they named the trophy after used to coach at Clemson. You have to go back to the 1900-03 era to find him, but he brought Clemson its first unbeaten season in 1900, a 6-0 ledger. Heisman coached at Clemson for four seasons, making an astronomical \$1,800 a year.

In 1904, Georgia Tech offered him \$2,250 plus a percentage of the gate, and he was gone to Atlanta. Clemson should have scraped up the extra money to keep him. With John Heisman as head coach, Clemson beat Georgia Tech 73-0 in 1903, but two years later, with Heisman at Georgia Tech, the Yellow Jackets downed the Tigers, 17-10. Coaching does make a difference.

Heisman Opponents

Clemson has played 19 games against teams that have had an eventual Heisman Trophy winner. That includes current New York Knicks point guard Charlie Ward, who won the award in 1993 and defeated the Tigers twice, including 24-20 at Death Valley in 1992. It also includes three games that 2000 Heisman Award winner Chris Weinke played against Clemson.

Clemson has played eight different Heisman Trophy winners for a total of 19 games. Clemson has never beaten a Heisman Trophy winning quarterback (0-9-1), but the Tigers are 5-4 against eventual Heisman Trophy winning running backs. The Tigers were 3-1 against South Carolina when George Rogers was playing for the Gamecocks, and

1-2 against Herschel Walker led Georgia teams. Clemson also defeated Mike Rozier and Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl. Billy Cannon and Louisiana State defeated Clemson 7-0 in the 1959 Sugar Bowl.

It is interesting to note that a Heisman Trophy running back has never scored a touchdown against the Tigers. Cannon, Rogers, Walker, and Rozier had a combined 171 carries against the Tigers in nine games, but never crossed the Clemson goal-line.

Homecoming

Clemson will face Virginia on Homecoming on October 11 this year. The Tigers are 27-3-2 since 1971 on Homecoming with the only losses coming to Georgia Tech in 1989, to Virginia in 1997, and to North Carolina in 2001. The first Homecoming game played at Clemson took place on September 30, 1922, when Centre defeated the Tigers at Riggs Field, 21-0.

Clemson has celebrated Homecoming every year since 1922 with the exception of the 1930 and 1938 seasons. Clemson has a 57-19-3 record on Homecoming games over the years, a .741 winning percentage, and has outscored the opposition 1,678-1,071 in those previous 79 games. The average margin of victory is 21-13.

Hoover, Doc

Fred Hoover concluded his 40-year career as Clemson's Head Athletic Trainer during the 1998 football season. He was as much a part of the Clemson athletic scene as anyone in the ACC era of Clemson athletics. The 1953 Florida State graduate worked 445 consecutive football games on the Clemson sideline. Ironically, his 400th game worked in the streak was against his alma mater. During his final season, he was honored by Clemson University, the ACC, the football officials, and the national trainer's organization at their national meeting in Kansas City, MO.

In his 40 seasons, "Doc" put up some outstanding numbers. He...

- worked with 39 of Clemson's 47 All-Americans.
- worked with 17 of Clemson's 19 first-round draft choices.
- worked with 17 future All-Pro selections.
- coordinated the training-room needs for all 19 of Clemson's Super Bowl Championship players.
- worked with 110 future NFL players (and that number should grow next year and the years after).
- worked 16 bowl games and with 11 ACC Championship teams.
- served over 950 football lettermen.
- ran down the hill 208 times and fell just once.

Hunter, Bill

Dr. Bill Hunter is the man to call if you are doing a story on "Running Down the Hill," the most celebrated entrance in all of sport. Hunter is still a Clemson resident and was a starter on Clemson's 1942 team. He was one of the first Tiger players to run down the hill. He still follows the Tigers avidly and rarely misses a home sporting event.

Inflation I

A ticket to the Clemson-South Carolina game in 1896 cost 25 cents. Two-thousand people attended the game. This year's ticket for the game in Columbia is \$37.

Inflation II

When Clemson first built Memorial Stadium in 1942, the construction cost of the 20,000 seat stadium computed to \$7.20 a seat. When Clemson added 15,000 seats with an upper deck over the north stands in 1983, the average cost was \$866 a seat.

Inflation III

Coaching salaries for assistants and head coaches have certainly improved over the years. An example can be seen in a letter recently uncovered from the late Bob Bradley's archives dated February 11, 1931. The letter is written from Jess Neely, then Clemson head football coach, to Frank Howard. Both are now in the College Football Hall

of Fame. The letter is Neely's formal offer to Howard to come to Clemson as an assistant coach for the 1931 season. The letter reflects the much simpler times of college athletics, but in many ways, things have changed a bit.

Mr. Frank Howard, University of Alabama

Dear Frank:

"I had a talk with the chairman of the athletic committee this morning and he agreed to let me have \$2,200 and board for you. If you would like to come here at that figure, you can rest assured that I will do all in my power to help you get a raise as soon as possible. As I said in my other letter, they are in debt a little at present and have insisted that we cut down on salaries. None of the assistant coaches have been staying here after school is out in the spring, so you will only be working about nine months."

"Hoping to have you with me and with kindest personal regards, I am..."

Sincerely Yours, **Jess Neely**

We aren't sure if Coach Howard negotiated a better entry-level salary or not. But, that letter was the beginning of a 43-year career as an assistant coach and athletic director at Clemson for Howard. He is the all-time legend of Clemson football.

IPTAY

IPTAY, Clemson's athletic scholarship fund-raising foundation, is one of the cornerstones of the Clemson Athletic Department. The foundation provides the funds for all athletic scholarships and has also been responsible for the funding of many facilities, including Vickery Hall, Clemson's athletic academic advising building.

IPTAY stands for "I Pay Ten a Year," the original name with a meaning derived from the minimum contribution of its donors when the organization began in 1934. It changed to "I Pay Twenty a Year," then "I Pay Thirty a Year." Six years ago, the minimum donation increased to \$100 a year. There are currently over 23,000 members, and the organization raised over \$10 million in 2003. IPTAY does a lot more for than pay tuition for athletes.

IPTAY also funds band travel, contributes to athletic facilities improvements (varsity and non-varsity), and has established the IPTAY Academic Scholarship Endowment.

Kinard, Terry

The 2001-02 academic year was quite a year for former Clemson All-American Terry Kinard. In those 18 months, he was inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor, inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame, inducted into the state of South Carolina Hall of Fame, and was named one of the top 50 athletes in ACC history. His induction into the College Football Hall of Fame was particularly noteworthy, as he was the first Clemson player chosen since 1959 when Banks McFadden was named.

Legend I

Frank Howard was known as Legend I around Clemson, and he will always be known as the legend. Clemson lost one of the rocks of its tradition when he passed away at the age of 85 on January 28, 1996. Incredibly, he died 13 years to the day after the passing of his former teammate Bear Bryant.

Howard was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame on December 5, 1989. He was a member of nine Halls of Fame, posted 165 wins in his 30 years as Clemson's head coach, and had 96 ACC wins, tied for the third-highest total in ACC history. He captured eight conference titles, took the Tigers to six bowl games, and six top-20 seasons.

Even with these accomplishments, we will remember his wit to his final days and his positive influence on young people, many of whom went on to be successful in fields outside of athletics.

Legend II

Former Clemson Sports Information Director Bob Bradley was known as Legend II. For many years, he and Howard were quite a pair, telling stories and contributing to the tradition and legend of Tiger athletics. Bradley passed away on October 30, 2000 after a long battle with cancer.

He certainly left his mark at Clemson, even in his final days. Ravaged by cancer but still as sharp as a tack mentally, Bradley worked 502 consecutive Clemson football games from 1955 to the October 14, 2000 game against Maryland. The 500th in the streak took place at Duke, and it was quite a celebration. After the game, he was presented the game ball by Tommy Bowden. It is the only time Bowden has given a game ball since he has been at Clemson.

On October 28, 2000, while in the Oconee Memorial Hospital in nearby Seneca, he was presented the Order of the Palmetto by the Governor's office. After his death, he was inducted into the Gator Bowl Hall of Fame and into the state of South Carolina Hall of Fame.

Bradley was a giant in his profession. He served as President of CoSIDA and was the recipient of the Arch Ward Award as CoSIDA Man-of-the-Year. In 1988, the Memorial Stadium press box was named "The Bob Bradley Press Box."

What was his level of respect? When he first became ill and was hospitalized in 1998, he received 550 get-well cards. Over 600 people came to his funeral in Clemson. He is buried on cemetery hill just a few 100 yards from the press box that bares his name.

Milestone Victories

Clemson has an all-time record of 585-404-45 in its 107 years. Thus, the 600th win is coming upon us, not this year, but hopefully in 2004. Clemson's first victory took place on October 31, 1896 at Greenville, SC against Furman, a 14-6 victory. Win #500 took place in 1990 at Wake Forest. In fact, each of the last three landmark wins (every 50) have taken place on the road. Georgia, Clemson's opening opponent for 2003, was victory #50 and #400 for the Tigers.

National Champions

Clemson has had four team national championships in its history. The first was the 1981 Clemson football team, a fact that is well documented in this press guide. The Clemson men's soccer program won two titles under Head Coach Dr. I.M. Ibrahim in 1984 and 1987. The Clemson men's golf program under Larry Penley added to the list this past May when Penley led the Tigers to victory at Karsten Creek in Stillwater, OK. Clemson had to defeat nine-time champion Oklahoma State on its home course to earn the title.

Nickname

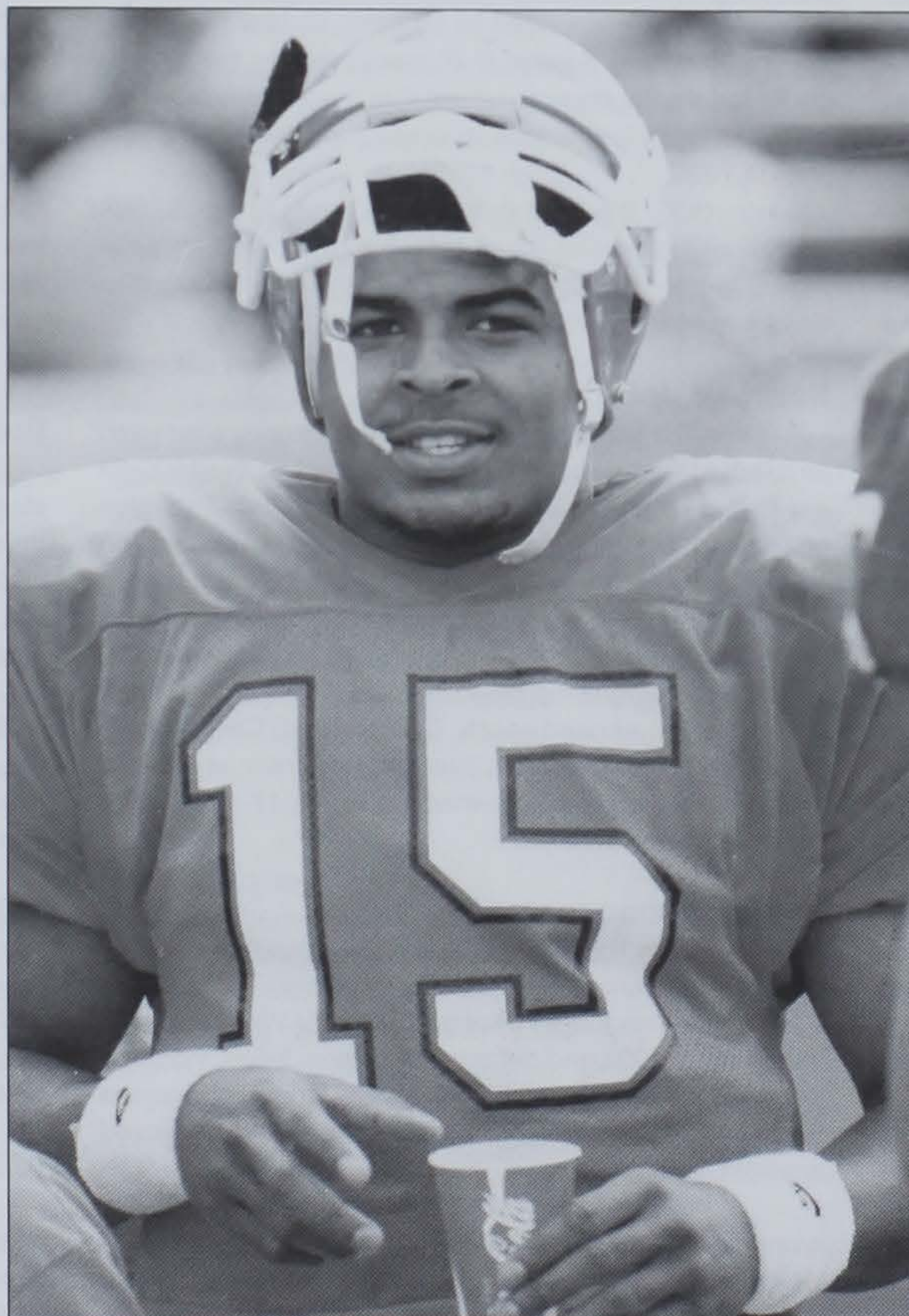
Clemson's nickname derivation goes back to the turn of the century. In those days, many players had long hair due to lack of helmet strength for more head protection. These long manes might have gained Clemson the name Lions had it not been for orange- and purple-striped jerseys and stockings players wore. The stripes resembled Tigers.

John Heisman's 1900 team was called the Tigers, and Clemson used an insignia of a Tiger's head with bared-fangs with the motto "Eat Em Up Clemson." Another theory on the nickname concerns Clemson's first coach. Walter Riggs came to Clemson to coach the team in 1896. His previous school was Auburn, which is also known as the Tigers.

Oh Canada

While former Clemson players have had a significant impact on the NFL for many years, including 2002 when Brian Dawkins and Trevor Pryce both were named to the Pro Bowl, former Tigers have had an impact in the Canadian League as well.

Clemson has three former players on teams north of the border in Darrel Crutchfield and Rahim Abdullah (Edmonton Eskimos) and Nealon Greene (Saskatchewan Roughriders). Through four games

in 2003 (the Canadian League begins its season in June), Abdullah was among the league leaders in sacks.

Greene got his season off to a great start by leading Saskatchewan to a 20-18 victory over Toronto in June. He threw two touchdown passes in the last 48 seconds, including a final "bomb" with just three seconds left to give Saskatchewan the victory. Greene is in his sixth year in the CFL. He had thrown for 9,090 yards, rushed for 2,522, and completed 58 percent of his passes in his first five seasons. In 2000, he threw for 3,059 yards and rushed for 765 yards.

Greene was a four-year starter at Clemson and left the program as the all-time leader in passing yardage, total offense, and completions. Woodrow Dantzler, who red-shirted behind Greene at Clemson in 1997, broke most of his records.

Orange & White

Publication founded by former Clemson Assistant SID Al Adams that is in its 26th season of issue. Al is no longer with the paper, but it is still going strong. To contact the publisher, Phil Batson, call (864) 260-1230. It is now the official publication of IPTAY and replaced the IPTAY Report, which dated back to 1952.

Overtime

Clemson and Duke played the first conference overtime game in history in 1997. The Tigers won the thriller 29-20, thanks to a David Richardson field goal and a 63-yard, game-ending interception return for a touchdown by Rahim Abdullah. It is one of the few games in the six-year history of the rule that has been decided by over seven points.

Clemson improved its overtime record to 2-0 in 2001 with a 47-44 victory over #9 Georgia Tech in Atlanta. It was a three-point victory, but the game was not decided on a field goal. Clemson gave up a field goal on the Yellow Jackets' possession, then Woodrow Dantzler won the game with an 11-yard touchdown run, a rare "walk-off" touchdown. That means Clemson has won both of its overtime games with a "walk-off" touchdown.

Panthers, Carolina

Clemson was the home of the Carolina Panthers in their inaugural season, 1995. The University realized about two-million dollars to be used toward scholarships and other fiscal benefits that will help students for many years to come.

Clemson Memorial Stadium was busy that fall. The field took a beating, as 16 games were played on Frank Howard Field between August 3 and December 17. A total of 975,534 fans attended the 16 games in Death Valley. That breaks down to 427,776 for six Clemson home games, 441,625 for eight Panther regular-season games, and 106,131 for two Panther exhibition games. Clemson averaged 71,296 for its six home games, and Carolina averaged 54,776 for its 10 games in the facility.

PawVision

In 1997, Clemson added PawVision, a one-million dollar instant-replay video board atop the west end-zone scoreboard of Memorial Stadium. The board provides fans with up-to-the-minute game statistics and scores from around the country. The video board uses four cameras located in various spots throughout Memorial Stadium, and has a workforce of 20 university students and staff.

Penn's Thin Natural Leaf

Type of chewing tobacco Frank Howard chewed in the 1940s. When they were pouring the concrete for the stadium in 1942, Howard put a plug in each corner of the stadium, giving it his form of an artistic signature.

Phillips, Jim

The "Voice of the Tigers" in his 36th year providing commentary on Tiger football. Phillips won the Brian Piccolo Award of broadcasting in 1982 when he gave the play-by-play account of the Western Carolina game only five days after back surgery. He recreated most of that game while standing up with a walker. He is also the voice of Clemson men's basketball (1,028 games), women's basketball, and

baseball. His voice is in the minds of nearly all contemporary Clemson fans when they recall a memorable Clemson moment. During his Silver Anniversary season (1992-93), Phillips was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame. Phillips will broadcast his 400th Tiger football game when Clemson opens the season against Georgia on August 30.

President Anderson

Clemson's Student Body President for 2003-04 is Fletcher Anderson, a native of Columbia. He is in his fourth year as a walk-on kicker on the Tiger football team. He is the first varsity athlete to be elected Student Body President since soccer player Jamey Rootes, a starter on Clemson's 1987 National Championship team, was elected in 1988. He is the third Clemson football player on record to serve as president of the student body. The others are Lawrence Gressette, who served as Clemson's President of the Board of Trustees from 2001-03, and Edgar McGee, a wide receiver under Frank Howard who went on to become President of IPTAY.

The only other Clemson athlete on record as having been elected Student Body President is Bob Fuzy, who was elected while he was a walk-on on the Tigers' 1979-80 basketball team that advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tourney.

Anderson has Clemson athletics and the law profession in his blood. We are not sure that will translate into a career in politics. His uncle is Ben Anderson, former Academic All-America defensive back for the Tigers in 1971 who is now General Council for Clemson University. His father, Joe Anderson, is a judge, while two other uncles, Gregg and Jeff, are lawyers.

Fletcher is very active in all aspects of his job as Student Body President. That even includes when Clemson is not in session. On June 1 (after school was out), he represented the student body at the Greenville-Spartanburg Airport when Clemson's National Championship Golf team returned from Stillwater, OK.

President James F. Barker

Clemson President James F. Barker is certainly in touch with all aspects of the University. He is certainly active when it comes to college athletics. No Clemson President since Dr. R.C. Edwards (1959-79) has been as omnipresent at Clemson athletic events. Edwards was known to

lead the Clemson football team down the Hill during the 1970s and still sends off many teams on their way to road games.

Barker took this enthusiasm to a new level in 2001 at the Clemson-Wofford football game. During the third period, he donned the Clemson Tiger mascot uniform. It was his intention to perform the responsibility of doing the pushups after a Clemson score. The Tigers obliged in the third period to take a 38-14 lead. Barker did the 38 pushups in 85 degree heat (much warmer inside that uniform), then revealed his identity, bringing a stunned ovation from the 75,000 fans in attendance.

Riggs Field

Currently the home of Clemson's national championship soccer program (1984 and 1987), but it was the home of Clemson football prior to Memorial Stadium. The field is named after Walter Riggs, Clemson's first football coach. He coached Clemson in 1896 and 1899. He had an 8-5 record for those two seasons, but ironically he never coached a game at Clemson. All of his 13 contests as head coach were played on the road.

Clemson returned to Riggs Field for the Spring Game of 2002 and 2003. The games have been a huge success, as a sellout crowd of 8,000 attended. The players and coaches certainly enjoyed the experience and the "turn back the clock" atmosphere.

Ring of Honor

The Ring of Honor is the highest honor accorded a Clemson athlete or coach. Terry Kinard was inducted into the Ring of Honor in 2001, the sixth Clemson football player and 10th person overall to join the list of honors.

The Ring of Honor committee meets every two years to consider candidates. Players' jerseys are retired (not the number), and a replica is placed in the trophy case in the Jervey Athletic Center.

Rock, Howard's

When the Clemson team gathers to run down the Hill (see Running Down the Hill), the players rub Howard's Rock because of the mystical powers it is supposed to give Clemson players. The rock is mounted on a pedestal at the top of the Hill and was given to Coach Frank Howard by a friend (S.C. Jones '19), who picked it up in Death Valley, CA. The rock was first placed on the pedestal on September 24, 1966, a game Clemson won 40-35 over Virginia. The team started rubbing the rock for the first game of 1967, a 23-6 win over Wake Forest on September 23, 1967.

Roy, Wallace

Clemson lost one of its oldest living former players in June of 2003 when Wallace Roy passed away at the age of 97. Roy was one of the early inductees into the Clemson Hall of Fame for his accomplishments as a three-sport athlete in the 1920s. He lettered on Clemson's 1924-25 football teams and on the basketball teams of 1925-26. He was most successful in track. He set a state record in winning the quarter mile in 1924 and became the Southern Conference Champion. In 1925, he finished fifth at the NCAA meet in the quarter mile, believed to be Clemson's first ever top-five finish at an NCAA track meet. In 1926, he won the Laval Medal as the best all-around athlete in the state.

After graduating in biochemistry from Clemson in 1926, he earned a master's degree from Kentucky and a doctorate from Minnesota. Roy was the chief chemist for the Florida Foods plant in 1946. His research led to the development of Minute Maid frozen orange juice in 1947. In 1960, Minute Maid was purchased by Coca Cola, and Roy was made a vice president of the company. He later developed Fresca and Fanta refreshment drinks.

Running Down the Hill

One of the most exciting 25 seconds (about 35 seconds when Clemson dresses 120 players for Homecoming) in college football from a color and pageantry standpoint. After Clemson's last warmup, the team retreats to the home

dressings room, located under the West Stands. At about 12:50 (for normal 1:00 PM game), the team boards two buses and drives around the periphery of the stadium to the east side of the field.

After everyone is properly collected, the cannon sounds, Tiger Rag is played, and Clemson charges down the hill (exactly 100 feet top to bottom) and onto the field. It is one of the most celebrated entrances in sport. The Tigers have done it for every game since 1942, except for 1970, 1971, and four games of the 1972 season.

In all, the Tigers have run down the hill 293 times heading into 2003. How in the world did the tradition of running down the hill start? There is no long involved explanation. It used to be the quickest way to get to the field. When the stadium was built in 1942, the football locker rooms were up the street in Fike Fieldhouse.

When the players were finished getting dressed, they used to walk out the front door and walk down the street to "The Hill." Head Coach Frank Howard continued the tradition when locker rooms were finally built inside the stadium, because Clemson fans used to get so fired up when they gathered at the top of the hill. That is when the buses came into use, to shorten the trip from the locker room to the other side of the stadium. Clemson has a record of 210-77-7, a .726 winning percentage, when the team runs down the hill. Clemson is 6-9 (40 percent) when it has not used the hill as its entrance.

Savior

Ronald Williams holds the Clemson rushing record for a first-year freshman when he had 927 yards in 1990. He was named the ACC Rookie-of-the-Year, a 10-2 campaign and top-10 final ranking for Ken Hatfield's team. The 1991 season was even more promising for Williams after he rushed for 585 yards over the first five games of the season.

But, that changed dramatically when he suffered a torn ACL during pregame practice for the N.C. State game that year. Williams played just one game the rest of the season and was limited in his effectiveness in 1992, seeing mostly backup duty.

Williams decided to turn professional after the 1992 season and was drafted by the Bengals. He never played in an NFL game, but found a home in the Canadian Football league. At the conclusion of the 2002 season, Williams had rushed for 6,205 yards and scored 71 touchdowns in seven seasons in the CFL. He also had 1,678 yards on 166 receptions. He led the CFL in touchdowns in 1997 and had three 1,000-yard seasons overall.

He had an impact off the field in 2002. Last September, he and six of his teammates saved the lives of various people at an apartment complex fire in Edmonton. Williams heard of the fire (just down the street) and gathered up some teammates to see what could be done. He and his teammates gathered and caught people as they leaped from the burning building.

"We just all joined hands and caught the people who jumped out of the building," said Williams in a wire-service story on the incident.

Section GG

This is the green grass section of the hill, which is located in the East Stands.

Skyboxes

The prime location to watch a Clemson football game. Memorial Stadium is one of just a handful of on-campus college stadiums to have private executive suites. Clemson has more executive suites than any other on-campus stadium in America (108 total, with 74 available for sale to individuals and corporations). The average cost, including an average of 22 tickets, is \$18,000 a year.

The suite is completely furnished with 22 theater seats, has a stereo system, kitchenette, closed circuit TV, maid service, meals, program, and is completely temperature controlled. The furniture was replaced for the 2000 season. Fans have their choice of piping in crowd noise, the PA system, or the Clemson radio network.

Tie Breaker

Teams that have played 60 minutes without determining a winner will flip a coin after regulation and alternate possessions from the 25-yard-line at the same end of the field. The team that is ahead after an equal number of possessions from 25 yards out wins. If a team does not score in four downs, it can retain possession by getting a first down.

A defensive player can win the game by returning a fumble, interception, or blocked kick the length of the field to the other end zone. But if the player is tackled inside the 25-yard-line, the ball reverts to the 25, where his team's offense starts its possession. Clemson had 45 ties in its history, with the last in 1991, a 20-20 tie with Virginia.

Tigerama

World's largest pep rally. The Friday night before Homecoming, about 30,000 people come to Memorial Stadium for a combination pep rally, beauty pageant, fireworks display, and skit presentation. It was the brainchild of former Clemson legend Gator Farr, who was the master of pep rallies in the 1940s and 1950s. This year, Tigerama will be held at Death Valley on October 10 at 7:00 PM.

Tiger Mascot

Since 1954, a Clemson student has adorned the mascot suit to entertain the Clemson faithful. Joined in 1993 by the Tiger Cub, these furry creatures can be seen imitating game officials (now against the rules), signing autographs, getting their pictures taken with dignitaries (like Presidents Reagan and Bush), shooting the cannon, or doing pushups each time Clemson scores.

Weather I

Every one of our major audiences for this press guide (fans, the media, recruits, coaches, and administrators) has interest in the weather. We get a lot of calls from people making their first trip to Clemson for a football game, and they want to be prepared. Well, if you are playing the percentages, prepare for a sunny day, about 70 degrees.

Over the last 24 years, the average temperature for a Clemson home game has been 69 degrees. Of the 145 home games played during this time, the weather has been predominantly sunny 100 times. It has rained just 12 of the last 145 games at Death Valley over the last 24 years.

Clemson did play in the snow in 2001 at the Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, ID. It was the first time since 1936 that Clemson played a game in the snow. Furman defeated Clemson in Greenville that day.

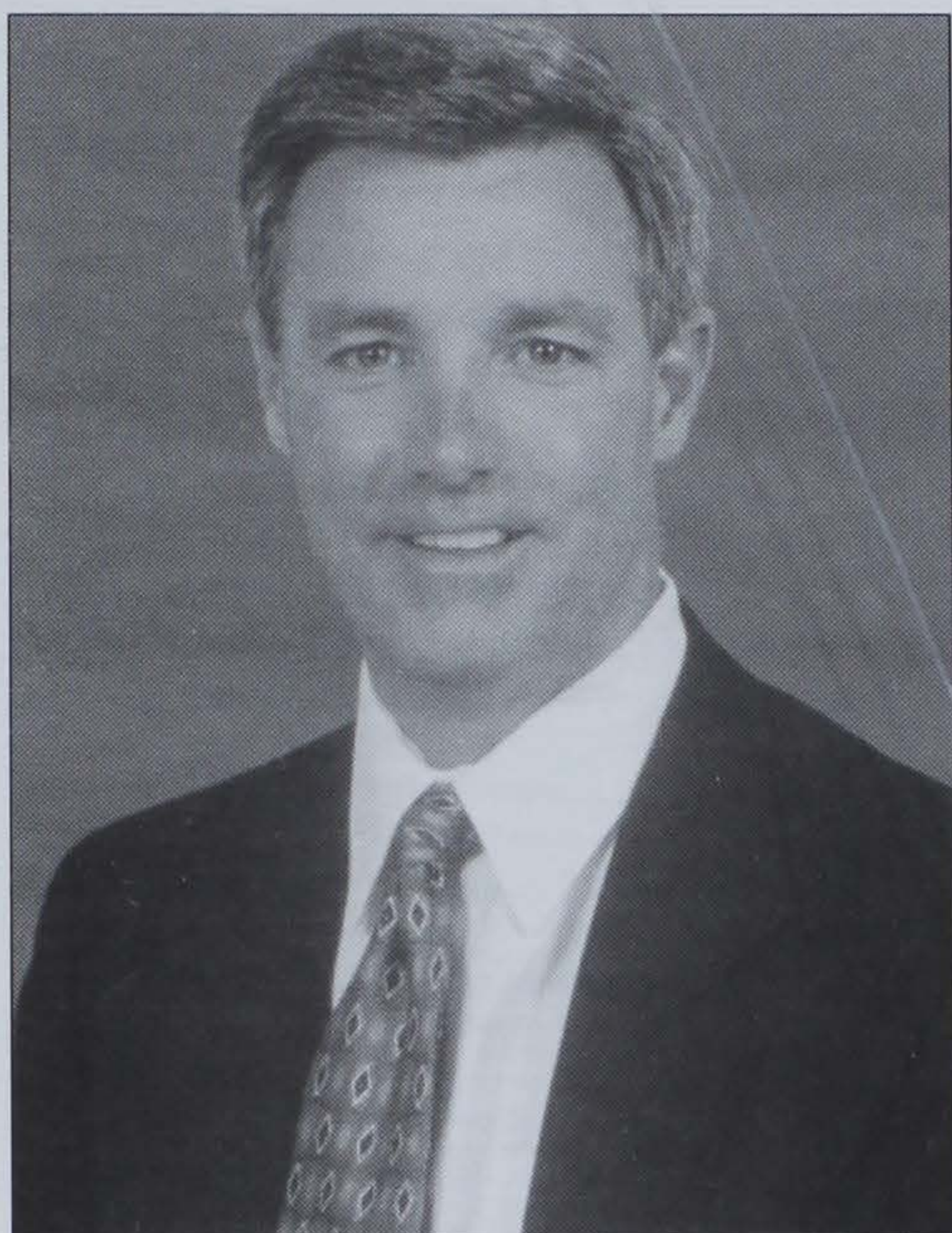
The most unusual weather for a Clemson game took place against Georgia in 1963. The temperature dropped 30 degrees during the game. At halftime, a hailstorm sent fans to cover. The second half was delayed 30 minutes to get the ice off the field. The game ended in a 7-7 tie.

Will Call

Located at Gate 13 at Clemson Memorial Stadium, Tim Bourret usually drops the passes off three hours prior to kickoff.



When Clemson was selected for the Mazda Tangerine Bowl on December 1, it meant that the Tigers would be making their fourth-straight bowl appearance - the fourth under Head Coach Tommy Bowden. With that selection, Bowden became the first head coach to take Clemson (and just the third in ACC history) to a bowl game in each of his first four seasons. In fact, no coach had ever done so more than twice to open their career at Clemson. That is also something that prominent predecessors Jess Neely, Frank Howard, Charley Pell, Danny Ford, and Ken Hatfield failed to do. Under Bowden's direction, Clemson appeared in the Peach Bowl in 1999, the Gator Bowl in 2000, and the 2001 Humanitarian Bowl prior to its Tangerine Bowl appearance.

Clemson's appearance in the Tangerine Bowl meant that it was the first time since the senior class of 1991 that the Tigers went to a bowl game four consecutive years. The seniors of 2002 were the first group Bowden recruited to Clemson, so it is an indication of the firm foundation his first group set for the program.

The 2002 season included victories over bowl teams Georgia Tech and Wake Forest, and a third victory in four years over arch-rival South Carolina. Clemson gained 434 yards of total offense in the 27-20 win over the Gamecocks, the most yards against Lou Holtz's defense all season.

The 2002 Tigers featured balance on offense and defense. Clemson's receiving trio of J.J. McKelvey, Kevin Youngblood, and Derrick Hamilton combined for 163 receptions for nearly 2,000 yards and eight scores. Running backs Yusef Kelly and Bernard Rambert collectively gained over 1,000 yards rushing, while quarterbacks Willie Simmons and Charlie Whitehurst threw for over 3,100 yards (a school record) and 16 scores.

The Clemson defense featured two of the top 21 players in the nation in terms of interceptions per game. Justin Miller had eight interceptions, best among all freshmen nationally, and Brian Mance had six in an All-America season. Clemson's defense was one of the most improved units in the ACC and

ranked in the top 10 in the nation in total interceptions (21).

Clemson had another record-setting season in 2001, a season that culminated with a bowl victory over Louisiana Tech. Clemson set school bowl records for points scored, touchdowns, and total offense in a bowl game in the victory. The Tigers threw five touchdown passes, a record for any Clemson game.

It was a record-breaking performance for the Tigers in Boise, ID, something that surprised no one who has followed the Tigers the last four seasons. In that short period of time, Clemson has set over 150 school records on an individual and team basis. Three of the top six total-offense seasons in school history have been recorded under Bowden, including the 2001 season when Clemson averaged over 30 points and 432 yards of total offense per game.

The 2001 season demonstrated Bowden's ability to win in the long run, as he had the second-youngest two-deep in the ACC. Thirty-four of his top 44 players were underclassmen. Only Duke had a younger group of top 44 players. Fourteen different freshmen saw action in 2001, including 10 who played in at least 10 games. Over twenty Clemson freshmen records have been set under Bowden in his short tenure. In 2001, Tiger freshmen receivers caught 106 passes, while freshmen defensive players combined to make 173 tackles and record 15 tackles for loss.

Bowden now has a record of 29-20 as Clemson's head coach and is 47-24 overall. He ranks 10th among active Division I coaches on a winning-percentage basis. He has recorded that ledger against a difficult schedule. His first year, Clemson's schedule was ranked in the top 10 in the nation. In 2001, his team defeated five teams that finished the season with a winning record, tied for the third-highest single-season figure in school history. One of the victories was a 47-44 overtime triumph at #9 Georgia Tech. It was the highest-ranked road win in 20 years for the Clemson program. In 2002, Clemson's schedule strength once again ranked in the top 15 by the **Sagarin** rating.

He has also gained that record with a group of over-achieving student-athletes. Of the 25 teams who went to a bowl game each of his first three years, only East Carolina had fewer players drafted than Clemson over that period. Two of the years Clemson has advanced to a bowl game under Bowden, Clemson did not have any players drafted (1999 and 2001).

When Bowden came to

Clemson in 1998, he inherited a team with a 3-8 record. By late October of 2000, just 14 months after his first game, Clemson was ranked third in the nation in the **USA Today** poll after an 8-0 start. That ranking was the highest for the program in 16 years. The final #14 ranking in that same poll was the highest final listing for the program since the 1990 season.

Making a swift improvement is nothing new for Bowden. In 1997, he took over a 4-7 Tulane program and brought the Green Wave to a 7-4 mark in his first year. In 1998, the improvement continued with an 11-0 regular season and #7 national ranking. In 1999, Bowden elevated the Tigers from 3-8 to a bowl game and a 6-6 final record. The 2000 Tigers concluded the season with a 9-3 record, its highest win total since 1993.

As one can see, considerable improvement is a common phrase for Tommy Bowden coached teams. In each of his first four years he coached at the Division I level, his team showed at least a three-win improvement over the previous year, believed to be a first in Division I college football history. Bowden is just the third coach in Clemson history to bring the Tigers to a three-win improvement in consecutive years and was one of just two Division I coaches (John Robinson of UNLV) to do it over the 1999 and 2000 seasons.

In 2000 and 2001, his dynamic offense produced a Heisman Trophy contender in quarterback Woodrow Dantzler, who placed his name next to 52 school records as the Tigers' signal-caller. The hefty total included seven single-game marks, 23 season records, and 22 career records. He is the school's

Winningest Active Coaches

Clemson Head Coach Tommy Bowden is 10th among winningest active Division I head coaches. According to NCAA policy, coaches must have been a head coach for five years to appear on the list. Bowden will be in his seventh year as a Division I head coach in 2003 and has posted a 47-24 overall record, a .662 winning percentage. He is currently just ahead of South Carolina Head Coach Lou Holtz, who has a .6616 winning percentage.

It is interesting to note that Bowdens hold down two of the top-10 positions on the list. Tommy's father, Bobby Bowden of Florida State, is ranked third with a .773 winning percentage. Bobby is 332-96-4 in his 37 years as a head coach. The winningest active head coach is Bob Pruett of Marshall, who is 80-13 in his seven seasons, an .860 winning mark.

career leader in total offense, passing yards, and touchdown responsibility, and set single-season marks in 2001 for total offense, passing yards, and touchdown passes. In 2001, he became the first quarterback in Division I history to accumulate 2,000 yards passing and 1,000 yards rushing in a single season. Dantzler was named a semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien Award in 2000 and 2001.

Center Kyle Young was a finalist for the Rimington Award in 2000 and 2001, and won the ACC's Jim Tatum Award, presented to the league's top student-athlete. He was one of eight players nationally to receive a National Football Foundation Scholarship and became just the second offensive lineman in college football history to become a three-time first-team Academic All-American. Linebacker Chad Carson also performed well in the classroom and on the gridiron. He and Young were first-team Academic All-American selections in 2000 and 2001.

Bowden's second Clemson team was one of the most decorated in history. Six different Clemson players were finalists or semifinalist for national position awards, including linebacker Keith Adams, who was one of the three finalists for the Butkus Award.

Young and Carson were both named first-team Academic All-Americans, making Clemson the only Division I-A school in the nation to have a pair of

first-team selections. For the second straight year, the football team had its highest team GPA on record in 2001 and a record number of ACC Academic honor-roll recipients. Nineteen of the 22 seniors on the 2001 team have already earned their degrees. The top-five semester GPAs on record have taken place under his eight-semester watch. Carson brought pride to the entire University in 2002 when he reached the final stage of the Rhodes Scholarship selection process, the only Division I college football player to hold that distinction.

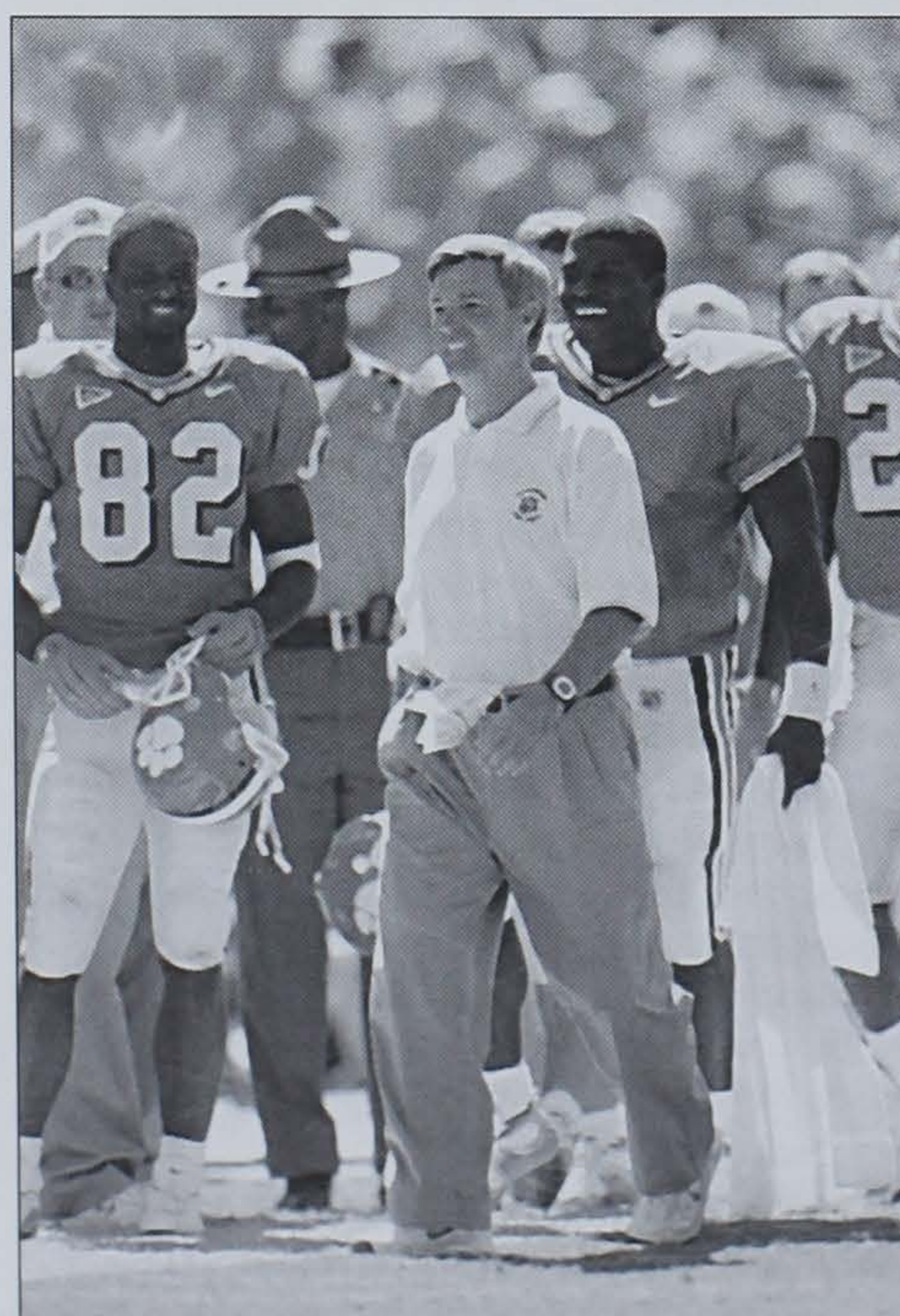
When Bowden came to Clemson, he had one simple goal - improvement. Bowden warned Clemson supporters that the Tigers were unlikely to be bowl participants in 1999, but his main focus was to improve. Bowden's goal of improvement was reached and he was happy to be wrong about his preseason prediction, as the Tigers were invited to the 1999 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl.

In 1999, Bowden accomplished a personal milestone that no Clemson coach had attained since 1981, the year the Tigers won the National Championship. He became the first Clemson coach since Danny Ford to be named ACC Coach-of-the-Year.

Bowden led the Tigers to a 6-6 record and 5-3 mark in the ACC against the nation's third-toughest regular-season schedule according to the Sagarin rating. The Tigers finished tied for second with Georgia Tech and Virginia in the final conference standings, a six-place improvement over the previous season, the greatest one-season jump in ACC history in league play.

The Tigers also made a four-game ACC-win improvement in 1999. It was just the fifth time in ACC history that a team made that big of a league victory jump. Bowden had taken over a team with a losing record and brought it to a bowl game in his first season, just the sixth coach in ACC history to accomplish that feat.

The Clemson program set or tied 41 school records in Bowden's first year, including 26 on of-

fense. Ironically, Bowden's first Tulane team set or tied 26 offensive school records.

The improvements in the ACC standings were thanks in large part to an innovative offensive attack. The Clemson offense ended the season averaging 402.6 yards per game, nearly a 100-yard per game improvement over 1998. The Tigers scored 26.8 points per game in 1999 compared to 19.8 in 1998. Clemson's 42 touchdowns in 1999 ranked fifth best in school history.

Under Bowden, Clemson continued its strong defensive tradition. With 47 sacks, Clemson was first in the ACC in that category for the second-straight season, and the final total established a school record. Three players (Keith Adams - 15.5, Chad Carson - 12.0, Robert Carswell - 10.8) all had nearly 11 tackles per game in 1999 to rank among the top-four tacklers in the league.

Adams, a sophomore that season, finished with 186 tackles, highest in the nation, and broke the Clemson single-season tackle record held by Anthony Simmons. They all contributed to the 17th-best pass efficiency defense in the nation, a unit that had 19 interceptions, ninth highest in the country.

Thanks to the wide-open offensive attack, several Clemson players made their presence felt in the national rankings and the Clemson record book.

Junior wide receiver Rod Gardner became the school's first 1,000-yard receiver. Gardner had 80 receptions for 1,084 yards, Tiger single-season records in both areas. He was 17th in the nation in receptions per game, with a 6.6 mark. He had another 1,000-yard season in 2000 when he was a first-round draft choice of the Washington Redskins.

For the first time in Clemson history, two Tiger quarterbacks threw for more than 1,000 yards in a season. Woodrow Dantzler passed for 1,506 yards, while Brandon Streeter passed for 1,466 yards during the season. The two diametrically opposite quarterbacks had total-offense games more than 350 yards, a testimony to Bowden's offensive system.

Four of Clemson's losses in 1999 came against teams ranked in the top 15 of the final AP poll. Bowden Bowl I, the first ever meeting between father and son head coaches in college football history, took place on October 23, 1999. Bowden faced his father Bobby's top-ranked Florida State team in Death Valley in front of a national television audience. The Tigers lost a tough battle to the eventual National Champions, 17-14, the closest margin of victory for the Seminoles and the fewest points they recorded all season by two touchdowns.

Making strong improvement in his first year with a program was nothing new for Bowden. In the two seasons he was the head coach at Tulane, Bowden took a team that had been 4-18 in the two years previous to his arrival, and emotionally and numerically reversed the team's fortunes with an 18-4 record, posted an 11-1 conference mark, and finished the 1998 season ranked seventh in the nation by both polls. Tulane and Tennessee were the only undefeated teams in college football in 1998.

His Tulane team had a 22-game average of 39.7 points, 5.1 touchdowns, 463 yards of total offense, 270.5 yards passing, and 192.6 yards rushing. The Green Wave averaged 6.34 yards per play, and converted on third down 47 percent of the time. Some say the most telling statistic in terms of wins and losses, and the most telling statistic when it comes to coaching ability is turnover margin. The Green Wave ranked fifth in the nation in turnover

margin each of his seasons at Tulane.

It didn't take Bowden long to put Tulane back on the college football landscape. In his first year, Tulane was picked last in the preseason polls of Conference USA. But he led the New Orleans-based school to a 7-4 record, a second-place conference standing with just one league loss, and set 33 school records in the process, including 26 on offense.

Tulane's accomplishments on offense were noteworthy in 1997, but its offensive charts reached uncharted areas in 1998. Tulane stood as the only

school in the nation that averaged over 300 yards per game passing and 200 yards per game rushing. The team ranked fourth in the nation in total offense (507.1 per game) and second in scoring (45.4 points per game).

The Green Wave scored 40 or more points in eight contests in 1998, including each of the last seven games. In one game, the Green Wave scored 72 points and rolled up 704 yards of total offense. They converted 52 percent of their third-down opportunities for the season and had just 11 turnovers in over 800 plays. The 1998 season saw the program post a perfect 11-0 regular season under Bowden, its first perfect regular season since 1931. The Green Wave won Conference USA, its first league title since Tulane won the SEC in 1949. Bowden was named Conference USA Coach-of-the-Year.

Bowden's team ranked seventh in the final AP poll and was a mainstay in the polls from the third week of the season on. Tulane had not been ranked at any time since 1979, and had not been ranked in a final poll since 1973. After Bowden accepted the job at Clemson, Tulane defeated Brigham Young in the Liberty Bowl, 41-27.

A look to the list of coaches who had undefeated seasons in the 1990s shows two other men named Bowden. His father, Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden, had a perfect regular season in 1996 and 1999, while his brother, Terry, posted a perfect regular season in 1993. Obviously, the Bowdens are the first family of college coaching and this "Wonder Years" environment had a lot to do with Tommy Bowden's decision to enter coaching.

The fatherly influence of a college coach who reached 300 career wins against his son in 1999, also had an influence on other members of the family. Terry has been a head coach at Samford and Auburn, posting a 47-17-1 record at the latter. Terry serves as an in-studio commentator for ABC's college football package. Jeff Bowden is in his ninth year as wide receivers coach at Florida State, his third as offensive coordinator.

Tommy Bowden began his college football experience as a walk-on wide receiver at West Virginia. He played for his father between 1973-75 and then for Frank Signetti during the 1976 season.

As a junior, he caught 15 passes for 189 yards and one score. Bowden remained at West Virginia for the 1977 season and began his coaching career, serving as a graduate assistant on Signetti's staff. His interest in coaching only became more intense after that first year as a graduate assistant. His father then hired him as a secondary coach at Florida State for the 1978 season.

That experience confirmed to Bowden that he was in a profession that would be his life's work. The Seminoles posted a 19-4 mark in his two seasons at Florida State.

In 1980, Bowden joined the staff at East Carolina, where he coached for the spring-practice session of 1980. That spring, he moved to Auburn and served as the Tigers running backs coach for the 1980 season. Among the players he coached was James Brooks, who went on to a 13-year NFL career and is still second in Auburn history in rushing.

In 1981, Bowden returned to Tallahassee as the tight ends coach. In two more years at Florida State, the Seminoles posted a 15-8 mark. The 1982 team ranked 13th in the final poll, claimed a 9-3

record, and won a Gator Bowl championship.

From 1983-86, Bowden served under Steve Sloan at Duke as the Blue Devils' quarterbacks coach. He was named coordinator in 1985. It was as a Duke assistant that Bowden made his first trip to Death Valley as a coach. Among the players Bowden tutored was Anthony Dilweg, who went on to the NFL.

After four years at Duke, Bowden became the wide receivers coach at Alabama under Bill Curry. It was there that Bowden refined his offensive coaching prowess under noted offensive mind Homer Smith, then the Tide offensive coordinator.

In 1990, Bowden returned to a coordinator role, serving Kentucky as its offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach. That season, he helped the Wildcats to their first upper division SEC finish since 1984.

In 1991, Bowden joined Pat Dye at Auburn. He would remain with Auburn for six years, his longest stint as a college assistant coach. During his tenure, Auburn was a combined 46-20-2, including a perfect 11-0 season in 1993. Auburn had four Associated Press top-25 seasons, including a #4 final ranking in 1993 and a #9 final rating in 1994. The Tigers were 20-1-1 in 1993-94 combined. Bowden worked under his brother, Terry, for his last four years at Auburn and the Tigers had a 36-9-1 record with both Bowdens on the staff.

Like Father, Like Son

- Florida State's record the two years prior to Bobby Bowden's arrival was 4-18. Tulane's record the two years prior to Tommy Bowden's arrival was 4-18.
- Bobby Bowden had Florida State in a bowl game, accumulated a double digit victory total, and a top 15 national ranking in his second year with the Seminoles. Tommy Bowden had Tulane in a bowl game, accumulated a double digit victory total and a top 10 national ranking by his second season with the program.
- Father and son both had perfect regular season records in the 1990s. Bobby Bowden's Florida State Seminoles were 11-0 in the 1996 regular season and in the 1999 regular season, while Tommy Bowden's Tulane team was 11-0 in 1998. Brother Terry Bowden was 11-0 as head coach at Auburn in 1993.
- Both coaches won at least two-thirds of their games after their first two years as a Division I Head Coach. Bobby Bowden was 15-7 after two years at West Virginia and Tommy Bowden was 18-4 after two years as a Division I head coach.
- Both Bowdens experienced just one conference loss in 1997 and 1998 combined.
- Tommy Bowden received his start in coaching under his father at Florida State in 1978. Bowden also played for his father at West Virginia between 1973-75.
- In recording an 11-win regular season in 1998, Bobby Bowden's Florida State team outscored the opposition by 20.6 points per game. In recording an 11-win regular season in 1998, Tommy Bowden's Tulane team outscored the opposition by 21.0 points per game.
- When father and son met at Clemson on Oct. 23, 1999, Florida State was victorious 17-14. It was the closest margin of victory and the fewest points scored by the National Champion Seminoles in 1999.

Brad Scott is in his fifth season with the Tiger program after serving at the helm of South Carolina from 1994-98.

The 49-year old (on September 30) holds the title of assistant head coach and offensive coordinator with the Tiger program, while also coaching the tight ends.

Scott is in his third year as coordinator of the offense. Earlier in his career at Florida State, he served in that capacity, including 1993 when he directed a Seminole offense and Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward to the national championship.

Scott has been a part of an offensive renaissance at Clemson. In his four years on the offensive staff, Clemson has established nearly 125 school game, season and career team and individual records on his side of the football. His tight ends have contributed to those totals by scoring nine touchdowns, nine more than Clemson tight ends had scored in the 10 years prior to his arrival. In 2001, freshman tight end Ben Hall scored three touchdowns for the Tigers, which is the most touchdowns scored by a freshman tight end in Clemson history.

Last year, Clemson established a school record

for passing yards and completions. Two of the top-four Tiger passing yardage seasons in history have been accomplished by offenses he coordinated.

Scott's 2001 offense gained more than 5,000 yards for only the third time in school history. The 5,184 yards rank as the second-highest total in Tiger history and are just 58 yards short of the total recorded by the 2000 team. Scott's kickoff-return team led the ACC in 2001 and has finished in the top 10 in the nation each of the last two years. Derrick Hamilton and Justin Miller have both averaged over 30 yards a return over the last two seasons.

Scott has been especially helpful on the recruiting front. Many of Clemson's top ranked recruits in a national top-10 class in February 2001 were players he recruited.

Scott's triumphs in recruiting, especially in the state of South Carolina, date to his days as an assistant coach at Florida State and the head coach at South Carolina. South Carolina had a record five players drafted in 2002, players recruited under Scott's tenure in Columbia.

In his first season at South Carolina in 1994, he led the Gamecocks to their first postseason bowl win in school history with a 24-21 win over West Virginia at the Carquest Bowl. The win climaxed a 7-5 season for the Gamecocks. The win that clinched the bowl bid was ironically a victory at Clemson. Scott posted a 2-1 record against the Tigers in Death Valley.

Before coming to South Carolina, Scott was a member of Bobby Bowden's staff at Florida State for 11 years. While at Florida State, the Seminoles went 10-0-1 in bowls. Scott is 12-3-1 in his career in bowls as an assistant or head coach.

He joined the Florida State staff in 1983 and spent his last four years there as the offensive coordinator and offensive line coach. Those four years included Florida State's 1993 national championship season.

Florida State posted a 44-6 (.880) record with Scott as offensive coordinator, which ranked as the most wins by a Division 1-A program during those four years. The Seminoles won four consecutive bowl games and finished ranked no lower than fourth in the nation during that span.

Scott served as the Seminole recruiting coordinator for five years (1985-90), where he built a reputation as a top-notch re-

He was tabbed the conference coach-of-the-year in 1982. It marked the second time he was a part of the DeSoto program, as he began his coaching career there in 1979 as an assistant coach.

Scott spent the 1981-82 years as a graduate assistant on Art Baker's staff at The Citadel. Before arriving there, he was an assistant at Hardee County High in Wauchula, FL for two years (1980,81).

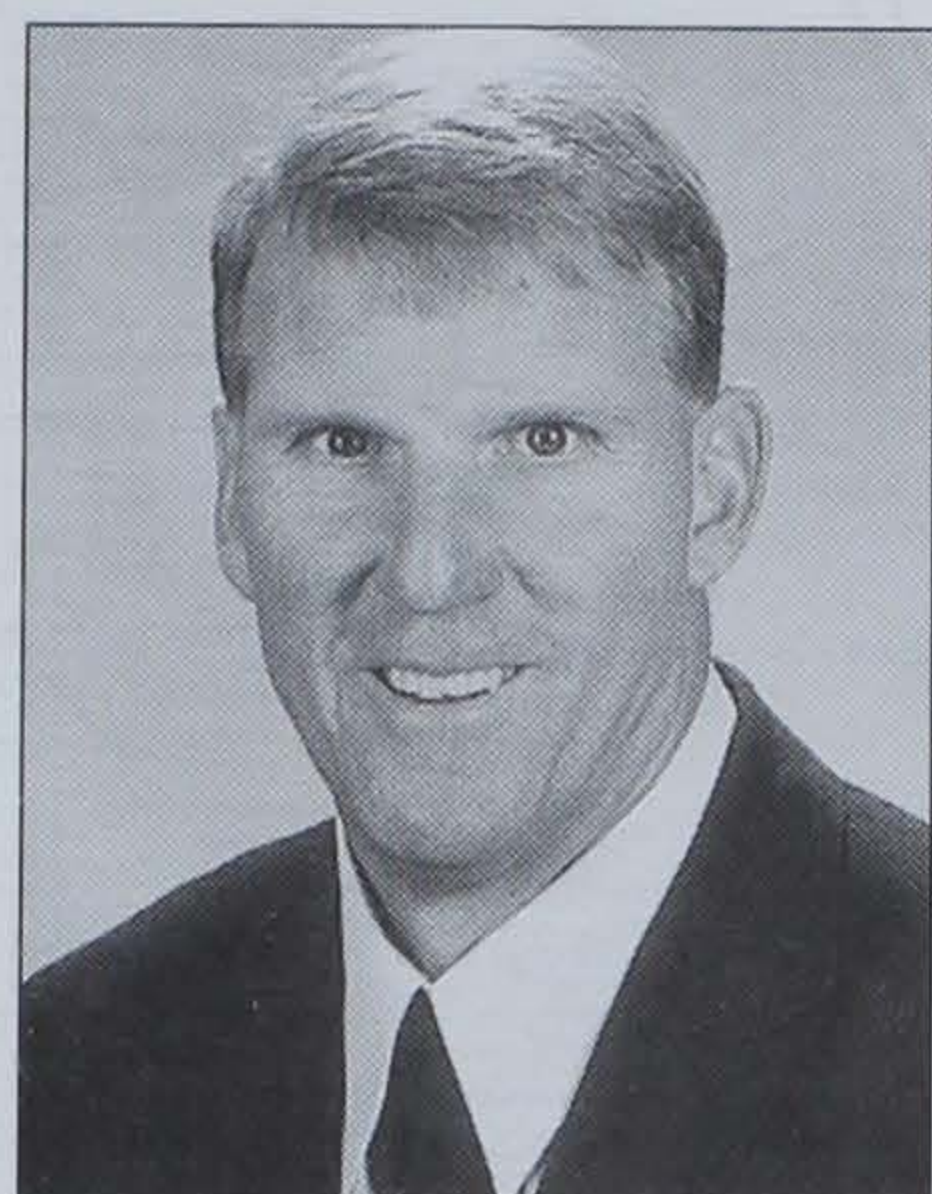
The players he has recruited and coached read like a "Who's Who" of NFL mainstays. While at Florida State, Scott recruited Deion Sanders, Edgar Bennett, LeRoy Butler, Dexter Carter, Carl Simpson, Clay Shiver, and ironically Chris Weinke, who in 1997 passed up on a pro baseball career to play college football and won the Heisman Trophy in 2000.

He is a 1979 graduate of South Florida, where he received a bachelor of arts degree in science education. He received a master of science degree in athletic administration from Florida State in 1984.

John Lovett is in his second year as the defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach with the Tiger program.

He came to Clemson after serving as defensive coordinator with the Auburn program for three seasons (1999-01).

Lovett has been an assistant coach at the college level for 24 years, including 14 seasons as a defensive coordinator. He has experience working with all levels of the defense, but has spent most of his seasons in the game coaching the secondary and outside linebacker position.

In his first year at Clemson, the program made a strong improvement in terms of pass defense. The Tigers picked off 21 passes overall, the 10th-best total in the nation. Two of Lovett's players, Justin Miller (5th) and Brian Mance (15th), ranked in the top 15 in the nation and held the top-two spots in the ACC in interceptions.

Mance was named an All-American by **The Sporting News**, while Miller was a consensus freshman All-American. Clemson's defense showed improvement of over 40 yards per game in total

defense and forced 66.7 percent more turnovers than the previous season.

Lovett helped Auburn to bowl games each of his last two years. His 2000 defense ranked 14th in the nation in total defense and 15th in rushing defense, helping the Tigers to a 9-4 record and a berth in the Citrus Bowl against Michigan. Auburn won the Western Division of the Southeastern Conference that season.

In 2001, his defense had a lot to do with Auburn's berth in the Peach Bowl. One of Auburn's victories was a 23-20 triumph over then #1 ranked Florida. Lovett's defense held the Gators to 20 points, -36 yards rushing, and 328 yards of total offense, season lows in all three categories for Steve Spurrier's team that finished the season ranked third in the nation. The Tigers also forced five turnovers in the game, including four interceptions of passes thrown by Heisman Trophy finalist Rex Grossman. Lovett's defense also held Georgia's high-powered attack to but 17 points in a 24-17 Auburn triumph. His unit held Georgia to 203 yards in 2002, the fewest yards gained by the Bulldogs that season.

The 51-year-old coach, who was born in Nyack, NY, worked under Tommy Tuberville for seven years, four at Mississippi (1995-98) and three at Auburn (1999-01). He coached the secondary all four years he was at Mississippi, including the 1997 season when the Rebels had an 8-4 overall record, including a victory in the Ford Motor City Bowl.

Prior to coming to Mississippi in 1995, Lovett worked as defensive coordinator at the University of Maine for two stints. He first went to Orono in 1985 and served as defensive coordinator and secondary coach from 1985-88. He also served as defensive coordinator for the Black Bears in 1994. The 1987 team won the conference championship and qualified for the Division I-AA playoffs.

Lovett began his career in coaching at Saint Joseph's Regional High School in Montvale, NJ in 1976. He worked at that school for two years, also serving as a track coach. He started his college career in 1978 at Union College in New York. He served as a part-time coach from 1978-80, then was elevated to full-time status in 1980. He worked with the inside linebackers in 1980

David Blackwell is in his first season as an assistant coach with the Clemson football program. Blackwell will

serve as recruiting coordinator and coach linebackers during the 2003 season. He takes over a linebacker group that features senior John Leake, one of the top tacklers in the college football ranks in 2002.

Blackwell has significant experience at the Division I level as both a defensive coach and as a recruiter. He was the linebackers coach at Pittsburgh from 2000-02. He was a big reason the Panthers went to three straight bowl games during that period.

The Panthers finished with a 9-4 record and #18 ranking in ESPN/USA Today Coaches' poll at the conclusion of the 2002 season. Their season included a 38-13 win over Oregon State in the Insight.com Bowl.

In 2002, the Panthers' point prevention unit ranked 14th in the nation in scoring defense, 12th in total defense, 15th in pass efficiency defense, and 24th in rushing defense. Pittsburgh was one of the

few programs in the nation to rank in the top 25 in all four major categories.

Blackwell's linebacker corps at Pittsburgh was led by Gerald Hayes, an All-American and three-time all-conference selection, who had at least 100 tackles in each of his last three seasons. Hayes was just one of many standouts coached by Blackwell, as seven of his former players have signed NFL contracts.

Prior to his stop at Pittsburgh, Blackwell was an assistant at Illinois State from 1996-99. He had a big part in one of the top turnarounds in NCAA I-AA football during that time period. In 1999, Illinois State compiled a school-best 11-3 record and advanced to the semifinals of the I-AA playoffs before losing to eventual national champion Georgia Southern.

Blackwell joined the Redbirds' staff as a defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator. He served as recruiting coordinator for four seasons. One of his primary recruiting areas was the state of Florida.

In his first season, Blackwell's defensive line accounted for 38 of the team's 47 quarterback sacks, the second-highest total in school history. He coached three All-Americans and 11 all-conference performers at Illinois State. In 1999, All-American

Galen Scott, one of Blackwell's linebackers, had 173 tackles, including 27 in one game, both school records.

Blackwell began his coaching career at his alma mater, East Carolina, as rush linebackers coach between 1993-95. The Pirates earned trips to the Liberty Bowl in two of those seasons.

On the gridiron, Blackwell went to East Carolina in 1990 as a freshman offensive lineman. His top game came against national power Florida State when he graded out at 85 percent. In 1991, a year in which East Carolina posted an 11-1 record and a #9 ranking in the final **Associated Press** poll, Blackwell's playing career was cut short by a neck injury. Blackwell remained close to the program and served as a student assistant on the coaching staff in 1992.

Blackwell, a native of Greenville, SC and a graduate Berea High School, went on to graduate with a B.S. degree in exercise science from East Carolina in 1997.

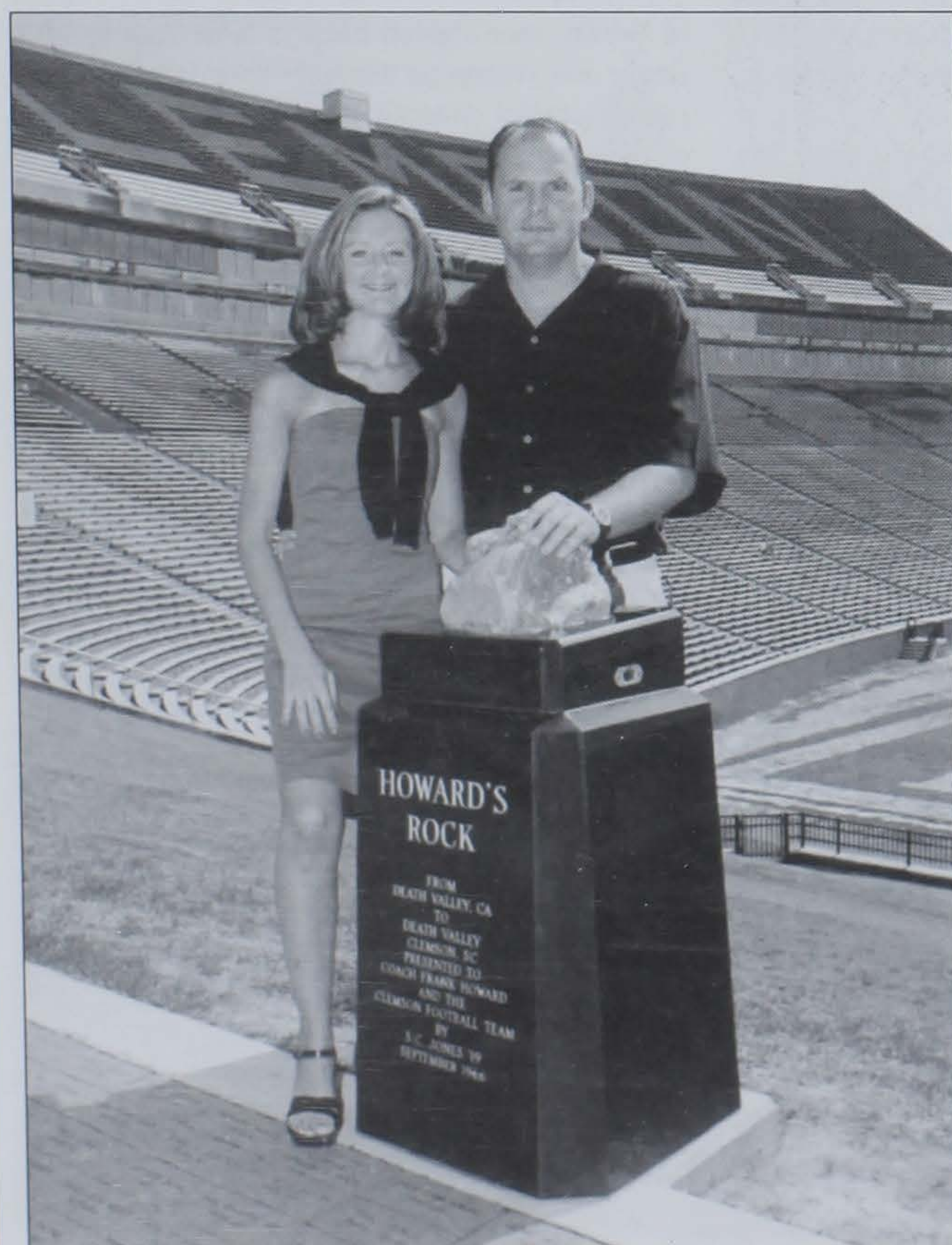

Burton Burns joined the Tiger coaching staff prior to the 1999 season, and now is in his fifth year as the Tigers run-

ning backs coach. He came to Tigertown after four seasons with Tulane, including two under Head Coach Tommy Bowden.

Clemson's ground game has prospered since Burns came to Clemson before the 1999 season. The Tigers ranked 10th in the country and first in the ACC in rushing in 2000 thanks in large part to the 1,027-yard season turned in by Travis Zachery. Zachery earned All-ACC accolades in the 2000 season and finished his career ranked fifth in Clemson history in rushing. Clemson has established nearly 125 records on offense since Burns came to Clemson, including Travis Zachery's career touchdown mark. His total of 50 touchdowns is second in ACC history.

Burns has shown an ability to teach his running backs all phases of the game. In his first four years, Clemson running backs have made over 125 receptions, more than any four-year period in Clemson history. Travis Zachery owns the Clemson

season and career marks for receptions by a running back.

The play of the Clemson running backs was a major reason Clemson made a six-place jump in the ACC standings in 1999, the best improvement in ACC history. Clemson made a four-win improvement in the Division-I win total and played Mississippi State in the Peach Bowl.

Burns has been a common denominator on the four bowl staffs the program has had under Tommy Bowden. He is one reason Bowden is the first coach in Clemson history and third in ACC history to take the Tigers to a bowl game in each of his first four seasons as head coach.

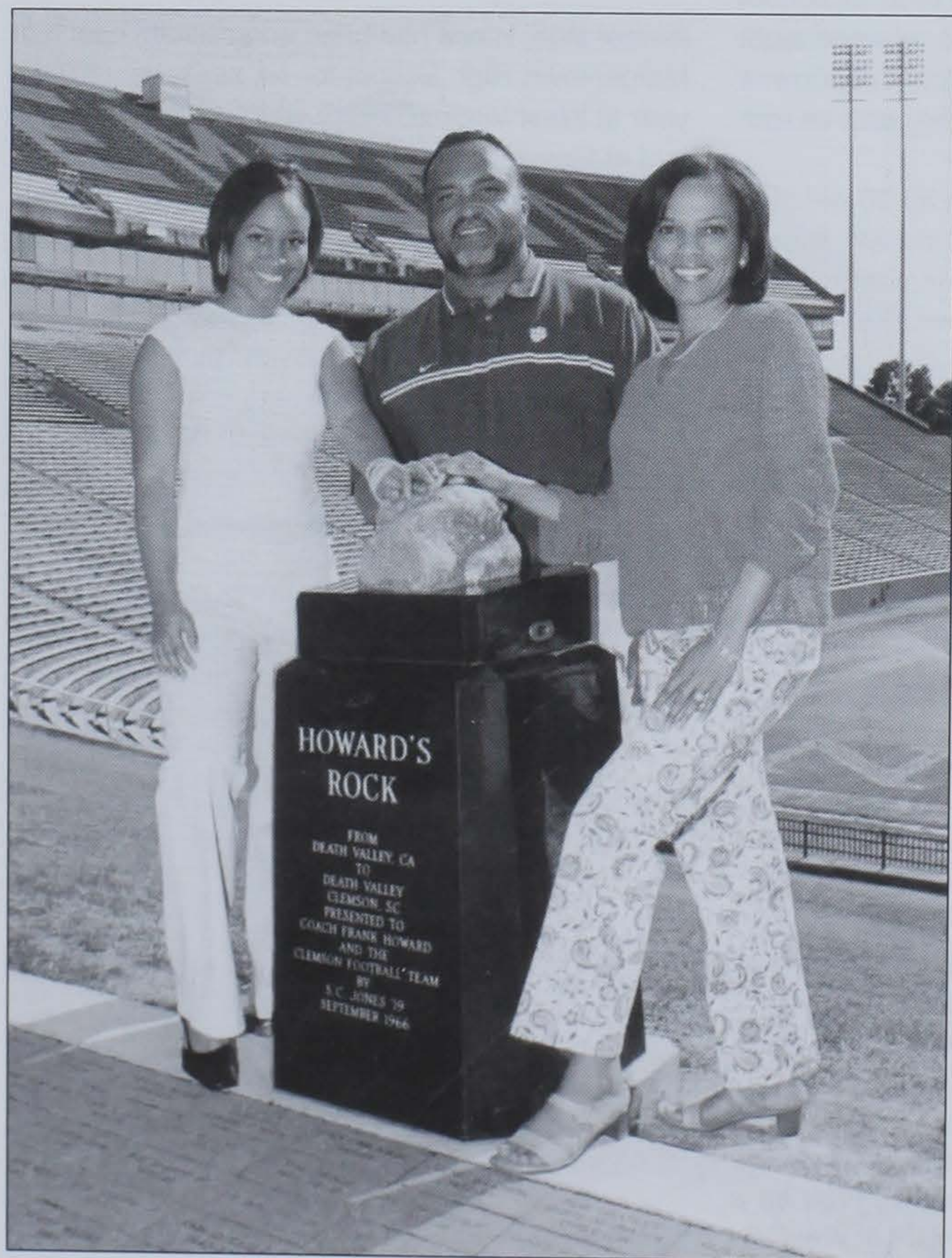
Burns spent the 1997 and 1998 seasons directing a much improved Green Wave running attack. In 1997, Tulane averaged 182.9 yards per game rushing. During the 1998 regular season, the Green Wave's ground attack improved to 202.4 rushing yards per game, which ranked 23rd in the country.

Burns was one of the coaches responsible for Tulane's incredible turnaround during the 1997 and 1998 seasons. The Green Wave posted a 19-4 record in those two seasons, including a 12-0 record and a #7 final ranking in 1998. The balanced offense and rushing game had a lot to do with

Tulane's scoring average of over 45 points a game, second best in the nation. Three of Burns' backs gained over 500 yards in the magic season.

Burns joined the Tulane staff on December 9, 1994 after nine seasons as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Saint Augustine High School in New Orleans, LA. He helped his high school alma mater to district titles in 1987, 1992, and 1993. Burns also coached at the school from 1977-79, and during that time the Purple Knights won three district titles and back-to-back Class AAAA state championships in 1978 and 1979 under head coach Otis Washington.

In 1980, Burns was an assistant coach on a district championship team at Booker T. Washington High School. Following that year, he would again work under Otis Washington at Southern University. During his five-year stint at Southern, the Jaguars finished in the top two of the Southwestern Athletic Conference on three occasions.

Jack Hines is in his fifth year with the Clemson program after serving on the staff at Auburn from 1993-98. The 53-

year old is responsible for "whip" linebackers and rovers in 2003. He coached defensive backs his first three years and linebackers in 2002.

Clemson's first year with Jack Hines guiding the secondary was very successful. The pass defense ranked 17th in the country and second best in the ACC. The Tigers accumulated 19 interceptions, the highest total by a Clemson team since 1995 and 10th best in Clemson history. The Tigers finished the 1999 season ranked ninth in the country in total interceptions.

These statistics were not recorded against second rate competition. Hines had to prepare to play five of the top eight quarterbacks in the nation in terms of passing efficiency. The list of opposing quarterbacks on the 1999 agenda included Chris Weinke of Florida State, Michael Vick of Virginia Tech, Chad Pennington of Marshall, and Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech.

Under Hines' coaching, Robert Carswell and

Alex Ardley both ranked in the top 20 in the nation in interceptions per game. It marked the first time Clemson had two of the top-20 pass interceptors in the country in the same year.

In 2000, Hines' defensive backs helped Clemson rank 18th in the nation in rushing defense and 23rd in scoring defense. Ardley and Carswell were both first team All-ACC selections and Ardley ranked eighth in the nation in interceptions per game. Clemson opponents threw just nine touchdown passes all year, second best in the ACC. Clemson's pass efficiency defense was also second in the ACC. In 2001, Hines coached second-team All-ACC defensive back Charles Hafley. He was ninth overall in the ACC in tackles per game with 11.0.

In 2002, Hines coached two of the top-10 tacklers in the nation in John Leake and Rodney Thomas. Their season totals are among the top-10 single-season figures in Clemson history. The play of the linebackers had a lot to do with Clemson's 40-yard-per-game improvement in total defense in 2002.

Hines' tenure at Auburn began in 1993 when he coached the defensive backs. His coaching contributed to Auburn's perfect 11-0 season and #4 final ranking in the Associated Press poll. In 1994, the Auburn secondary intercepted 22 passes, the fourth-highest total in school history. Auburn returned eight interceptions for touchdowns during his first two years as secondary coach.

In an exciting 30-26 win over Louisiana State in 1994, Auburn picked off four second-half passes and returned all for touchdowns. The last three seasons, Hines was responsible for Auburn's inside linebackers. The 1997 team won the Western Division of the SEC. Hines coached for six years at Auburn under Terry Bowden and served on the staff with former Clemson assistant Rodney Allison.

Before coming to Auburn, Hines spent six seasons at Samford where he had various titles. In his first year in 1987, he served as the school's recruiting coordinator. During the 1987-92 seasons, Hines was Samford's defensive coordinator as well as defensive backs coach.

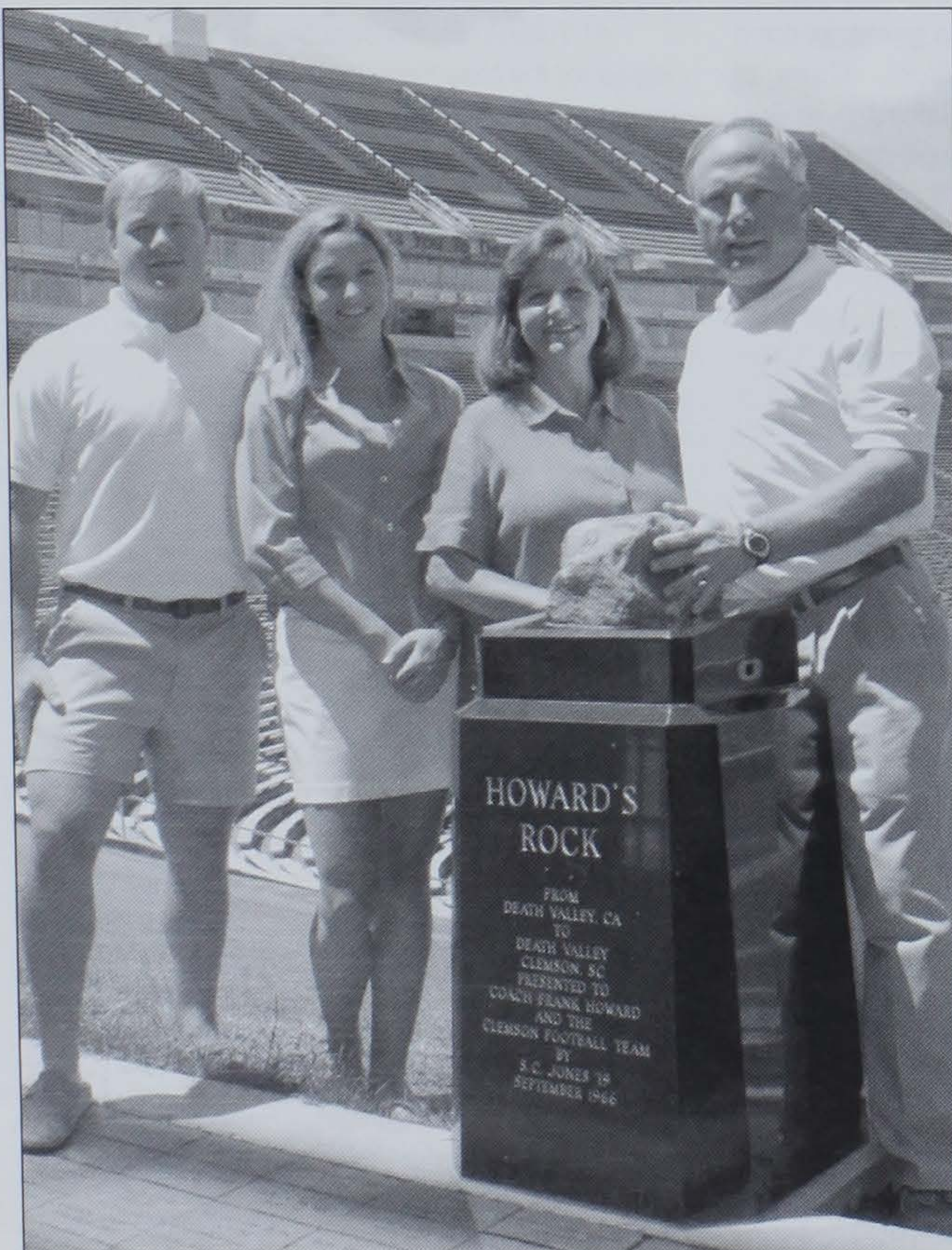

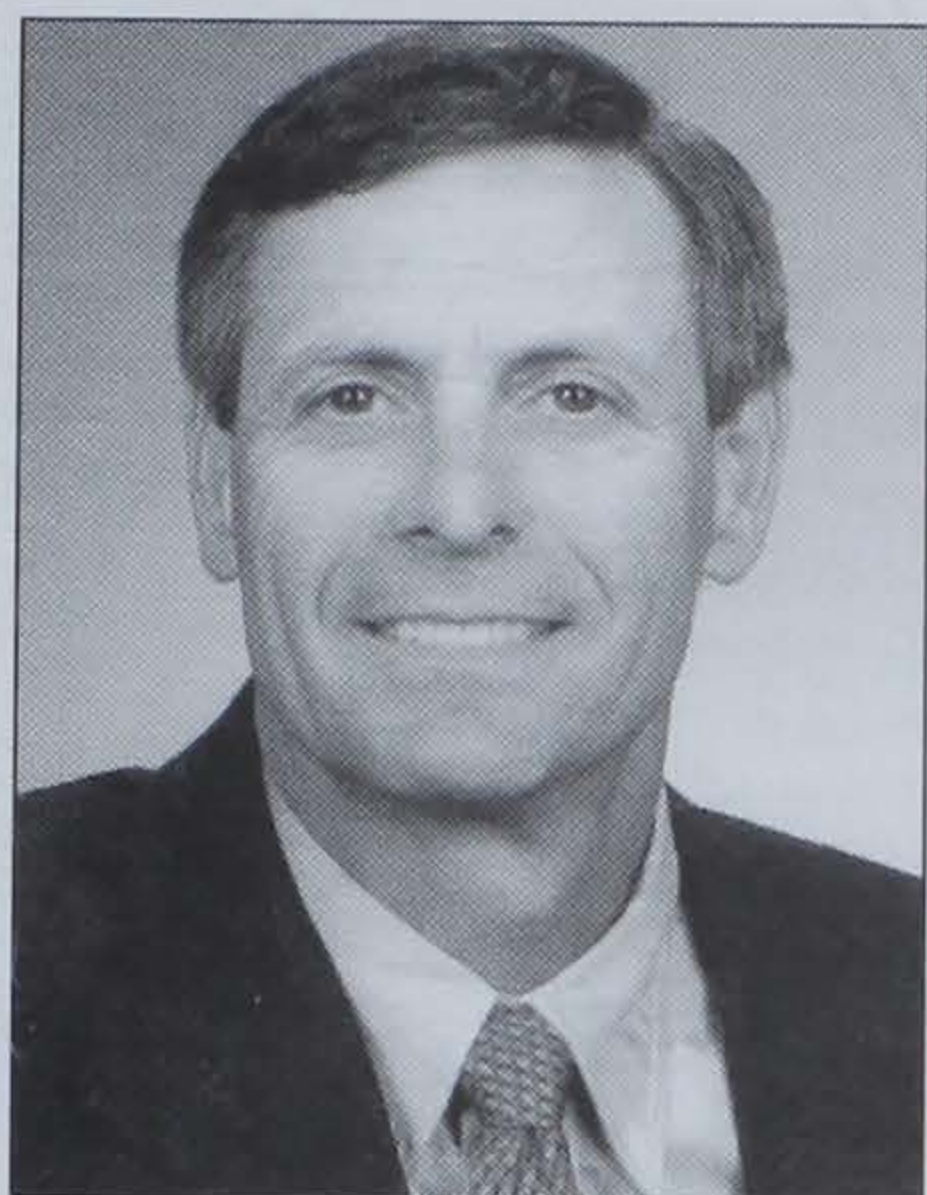

Mike O'Cain is entering his third season as a full-time Clemson football coach, but he is certainly no stranger to

Tigertown. A 1977 Clemson graduate, he has a number of family and personal ties to the area that date back many years. He brings 25 years of coaching experience to the Clemson offense in general and the quarterback position in particular.

O'Cain's tenure as the Tigers' quarterbacks coach got off to an impressive start, as he coached quarterback Woodrow Dantzler into the Clemson, ACC, and NCAA record books. In 2001, Dantzler became the first quarterback in NCAA history to gain at least 2,000 yards passing and 1,000 yards rushing in the same season. He set school records for touchdown passes, passing yardage, total offense, and passing efficiency.

Last year, Clemson set a school record for passing yardage in a season. He guided freshman Charlie Whitehurst to a noteworthy first year in which he set 22 Tiger records, including single-game marks for passing efficiency, yardage, completions, and touchdown passes.

O'Cain hails from Orangeburg, South Carolina, where he attended Orangeburg-Wilkinson High, the same school that produced Dantzler. O'Cain quarterbacked Orangeburg-Wilkinson to a 13-0 record, a state 4A title, and a #12-national ranking his senior season.

Upon graduation from high school, O'Cain decided to further his academic and athletic career at Clemson. A four-year letterwinner, he was the most valuable player of Clemson's 1976 team, working as both the punter and quarterback. He completed 91-182 passes for 1,291 yards and six touchdowns during his career. He still ranks 16th in Clemson history in passing efficiency. Also a gifted runner, he held the single-game quarterback rushing record until 1994 with 140 yards against N.C. State in 1976.

He received his bachelor of science degree in recreation parks administration in 1977 from Clemson. Three years later, he married his high-school sweetheart Nancy Farnum.

O'Cain began his coaching career at Clemson in 1977 as a graduate assistant. He was on the practice field and on the sidelines learning the game from some veteran coaches at the time and realized the thrill of victory, as the Tigers had an 8-3-1 season that culminated with a trip to the Gator Bowl, Clemson's first bowl appearance in 18 years.

O'Cain then coached the offensive backfield at The Citadel for the 1978-80 seasons. In 1981, he moved to Murray State, where he was an assistant under current Virginia Tech head coach Frank Beamer. He remained at Murray State through the 1984 season. After one year as the assistant head coach at East Carolina, he joined Dick Sheridan, his former high school coach, as quarterback coach at N.C. State. O'Cain served as a top assistant under Sheridan from 1986-92 and was a part of a staff that coached the Wolfpack in six bowl games.

In 1993, Sheridan decided to retire just five weeks prior to the start of August practice and O'Cain was promoted to the head coaching position. This short period of time for preparation did not inhibit O'Cain and the Wolfpack. He took N.C. State to a 7-4 regular-season record and an invitation to the Hall of Fame Bowl. He was the only rookie coach in the nation that year to lead a team to a bowl game.

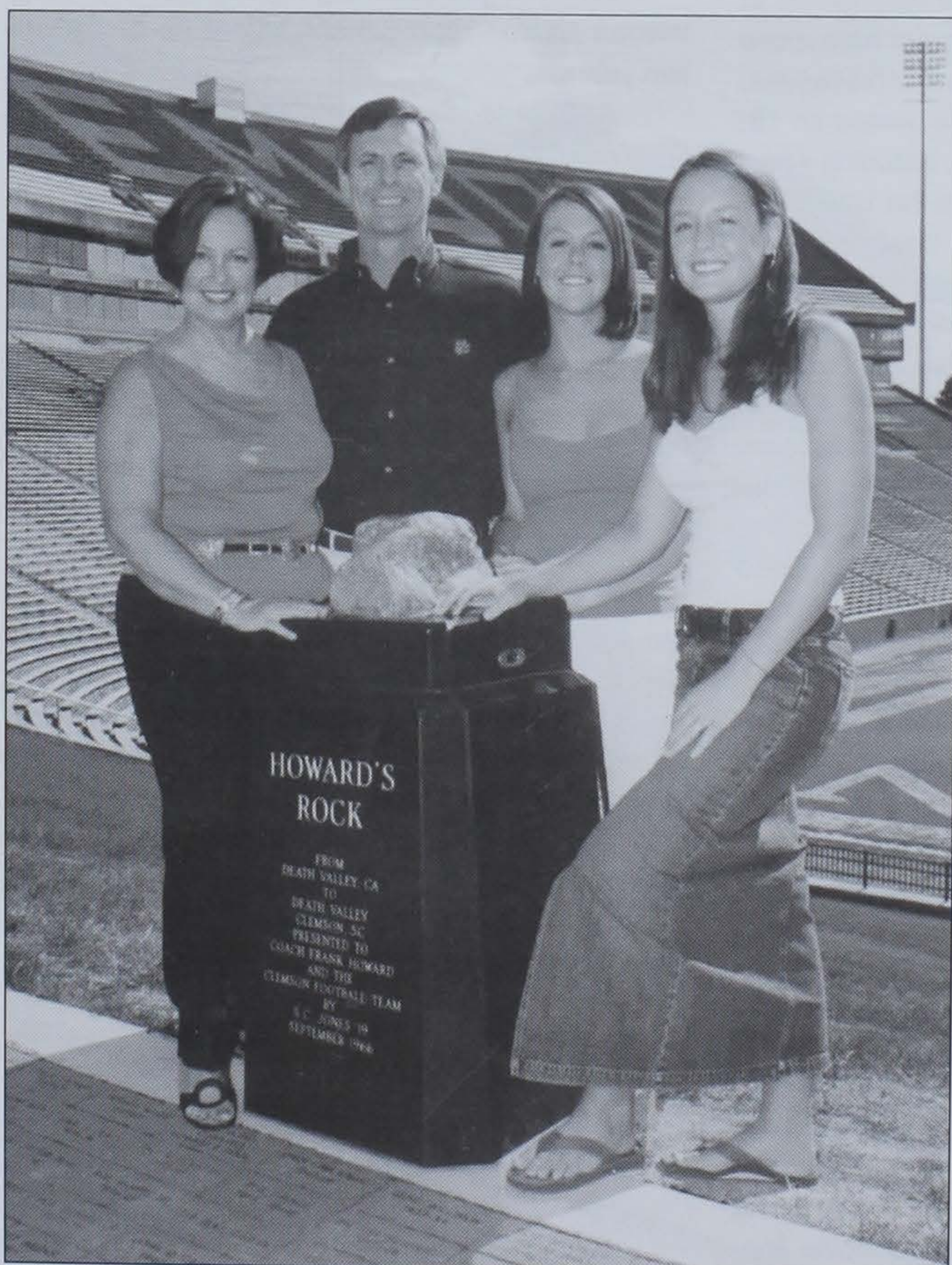

The next year, O'Cain guided the Wolfpack to a second-place ACC finish with an 8-3 record. One of the victories was over Clemson in Death Valley, as O'Cain became the first Clemson graduate to gain victory against his alma mater in Death Valley. He completed his season with a victory over Mississippi State in the Peach Bowl. O'Cain became the second coach in N.C. State history to take a team to a bowl in his first two seasons with the program. Current South Carolina head coach Lou Holtz (1972-1975) was the first coach to accomplish the feat.

In 1998, he opened the season with a victory at Texas, then won over #1 ranked Florida State. It was one of just two losses in league play for the Seminoles in the team's first nine years in the ACC. He coached the Wolfpack to their third bowl appearance in his tenure, against Miami (FL) in the Micron PC bowl. One of the stars on that N.C. State team was Tory Holt, a first-round draft choice who has gone on to fame with the Saint Louis Rams.

After the 1999 season, O'Cain joined the North Carolina football staff as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He helped the Tar Heels to a winning season in 2000, then moved to Clemson in December to replace Rich Rodriguez as quarterbacks coach. He served in an advisory capacity for the Gator Bowl, then took over the quarterback coaching reins in the spring.

O'Cain and his wife, Nancy, have two daughters, Jenny (18) and Lizzi (16). O'Cain is an active member of the Tiger Brotherhood Organization, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and the Clemson Community.

Thielen Smith is in his fifth year on the Clemson coaching staff, but his seventh under Head Coach Tommy Bowden. He was the coach of Tulane's interior defensive line from 1995-98, the last two years of that period under Bowden. He has been responsible for the defensive interior linemen at Clemson since 1999.

In 2002, Smith coached defensive tackle Nick Eason, who was a First-Team All-ACC selection. Eason was drafted in the fourth round by the Denver Broncos. It marked the second time in the last three years he had coached a protégé to First-Team All-ACC honors.

In 2001, Smith coached second-team freshman All-American Donnell Washington, who was the first Clemson freshman All-American defensive lineman since Chester McGlockton earned the honor in 1989. Washington will be the leader of the Tiger defensive line in 2003 at his defensive tackle position.

Smith's defensive linemen had a lot to do with Clemson's 85 sacks during the 1999 and 2000 seasons,

the highest two-year total in Clemson history. Clemson set a record in that category in 1999, with an ACC best 47.

Smith coached defensive tackle Terry Jolly to a First-Team All-ACC season in 2000, his second-straight year on an All-ACC team. Jolly's play was a big reason Clemson ranked 18th in the country in rushing defense. In 1999, Smith's first year in Tigertown, the Tigers ranked 17th in the nation in pass defense.

Between his time at Tulane and Clemson, Smith has coached in a bowl game in five consecutive seasons and been a part of two top-15 teams. In each of the 1997-00 seasons he was part of a staff that realized at least a three victory improvement.

Thielen (pronounced "THI-lihn") Smith worked 10 years at Tulane during two different stints. In fact, his first 16 years in coaching were all in the state of Louisiana. This position at Clemson is his first away from his home state.

Smith's first stint at Tulane came during the 1985-90 seasons. He coached linebackers and the defensive line and helped the Green Wave reach the 1987 Independence Bowl. His second stay at the New Orleans school lasted four seasons (1995-98).

Smith saw the resurgence of the Tulane program from close range. In his final two seasons, the Green Wave posted an 18-4 overall record, including a perfect 12-0 mark in the 1998 campaign. Tulane finished fifth in the nation in turnover margin in both 1997 and 1998, and Smith's defensive line had a lot to do with that. In 1997, the Tulane defense forced 34 turnovers, third most in the nation. Of course the 1998 team finished with an undefeated record, a top-10 national ranking and a Conference-USA championship.

The 49-year old came to Tulane in 1985 after six seasons at Louisiana-Lafayette. There, Smith began his college coaching career in 1979. During his six years at the school, Smith was responsible for the defensive line.

Between his two stints at Tulane, Smith had stops at his alma mater of Louisiana State and Louisiana-Monroe for two seasons each. At Louisiana State, he coached inside linebackers in 1991,92. He was the

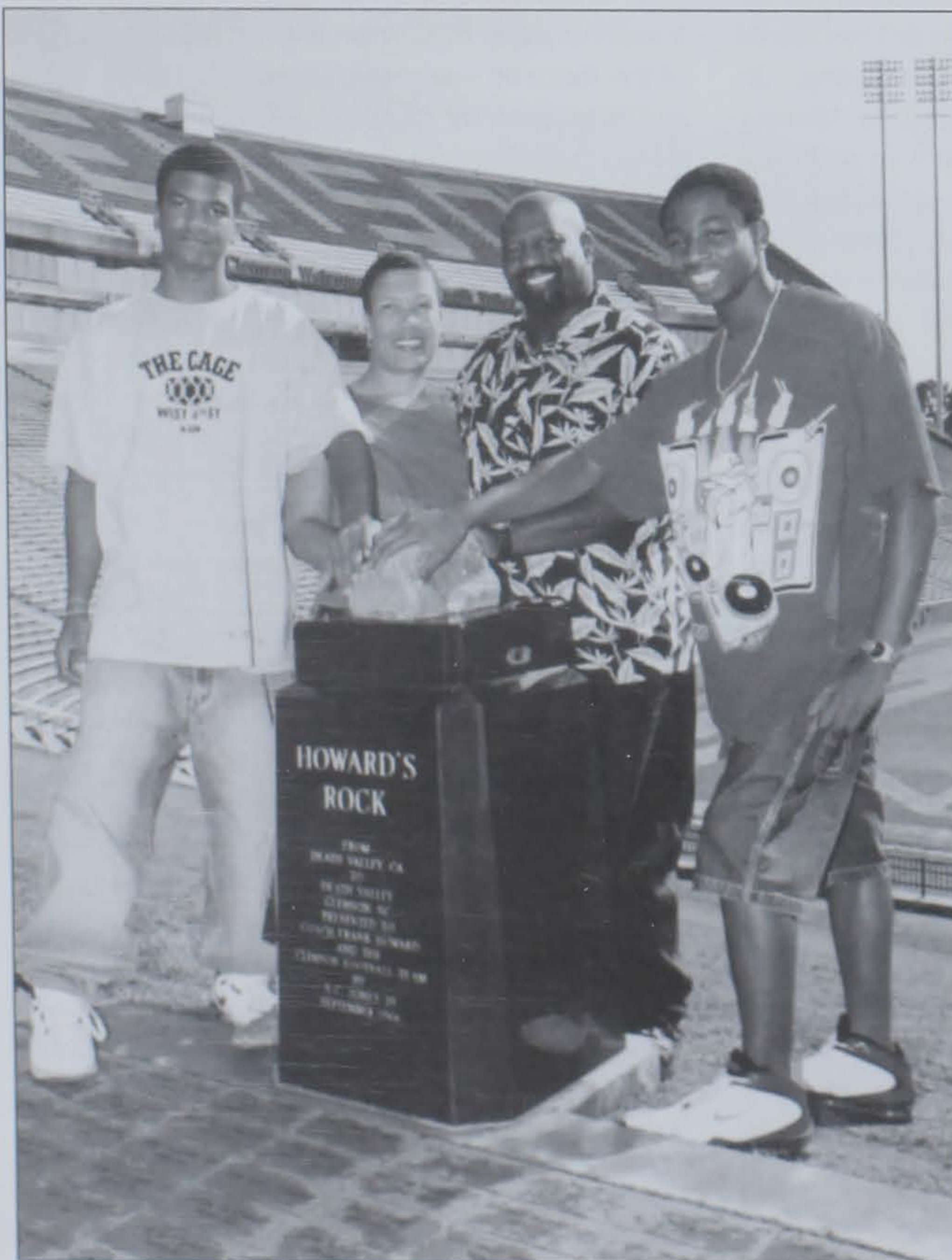

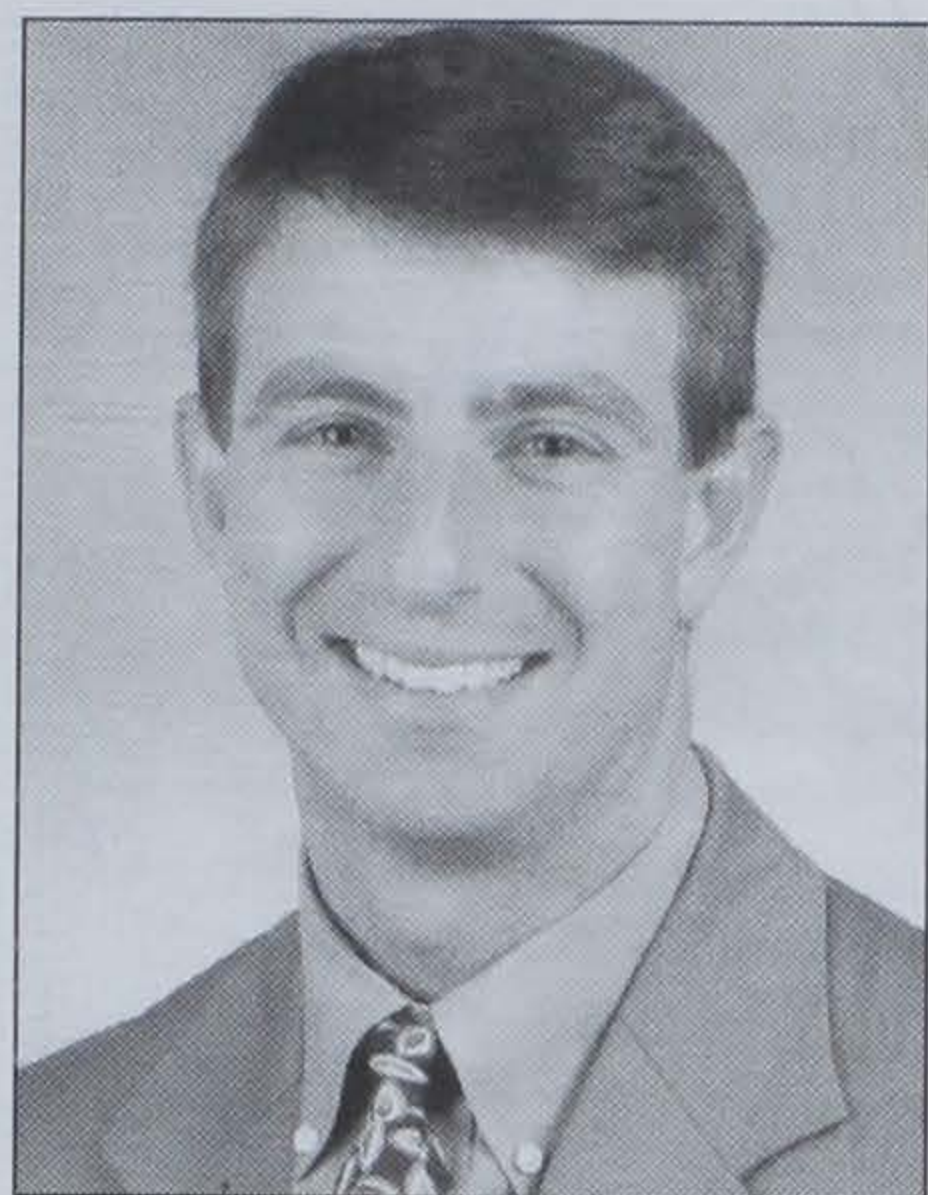

Clemson Head Football Coach Tommy Bowden announced the addition of Dabo Swinney (pronounced DA-boh)

to the coaching staff on March 17, 2003. Swinney replaced longtime assistant Coach Rick Stockstill, and will coach Clemson's wide receivers.

"Dabo Swinney is an outstanding addition to our staff," said Bowden. "I was his position coach when I was at Alabama. He came in as a walk-on and earned a scholarship. I have first-hand knowledge of his work ethic. Dabo played on a national championship team at Alabama in 1992."

"As a coach, he is an outstanding teacher who has learned the game from some outstanding coaches, including Homer Smith, who had a positive effect on my career. His resumé as a recruiter is most impressive. He signed 30 players in his career at Alabama."

Swinney, 33, received a bachelor of science degree in commerce and business administration at Alabama in 1993 after lettering three times for the Crimson Tide (1990-92). A walk-on who went on to earn a scholarship, Swinney played wide receiver

and was a member of Alabama's 1992 National Championship team under Gene Stallings. His position coach was Bowden in 1989 and former Tiger Assistant Coach Woody McCorvey from 1990-92. Swinney was also an Academic All-SEC member and SEC Scholar Athlete Honor Roll member in both 1990 and 1992.

Along with his appearance in the 1993 Sugar Bowl, his team played in the 1991 Fiesta Bowl, 1991 Blockbuster Bowl, and 1990 Sugar Bowl. Both Sugar Bowl appearances came after winning the SEC Championship game.

After his playing career, he served as a graduate assistant during the 1993-95 seasons at Alabama, where he coached in the 1994 Gator Bowl and 1995 Citrus Bowl. In both the 1994 and 1995 seasons, he coached Alabama in the SEC Championship game after winning the SEC Western Division title. In December of 1995, he received a masters of business administration at Tuscaloosa.

Swinney became a full-time assistant at Alabama in February of 1996 and coached a total of five seasons on a full-time basis. He was assigned to coach the Crimson Tide's wide receivers and tight ends in 1996, a season that saw Alabama win the SEC Western Division championship and make an Outback Bowl appearance. The following season,

when Alabama played in the Music City Bowl, he solely coached the tight ends under new Head Coach Mike DuBose. Then in January of 1998, he coached Alabama's wide receivers, a position he held for three seasons. At the end of the 1999 campaign, Swinney coached the Crimson Tide in the 2000 Orange Bowl after winning the SEC title game.

Swinney coached four players at Alabama who have played in the NFL, including Freddie Milons, Alabama's all-time leading receiver in terms of total receptions and second in yardage.

In all, Swinney was a part of six 10+-win seasons and five top-10 finishes at Alabama as a player and coach. From 2000 through February of 2003, he was in private business in Alabama. Now he returns to the gridiron to coach an outstanding collection of talented Clemson wide receivers. Three different services rank Clemson's receiving corps among the top 10 units in the nation. 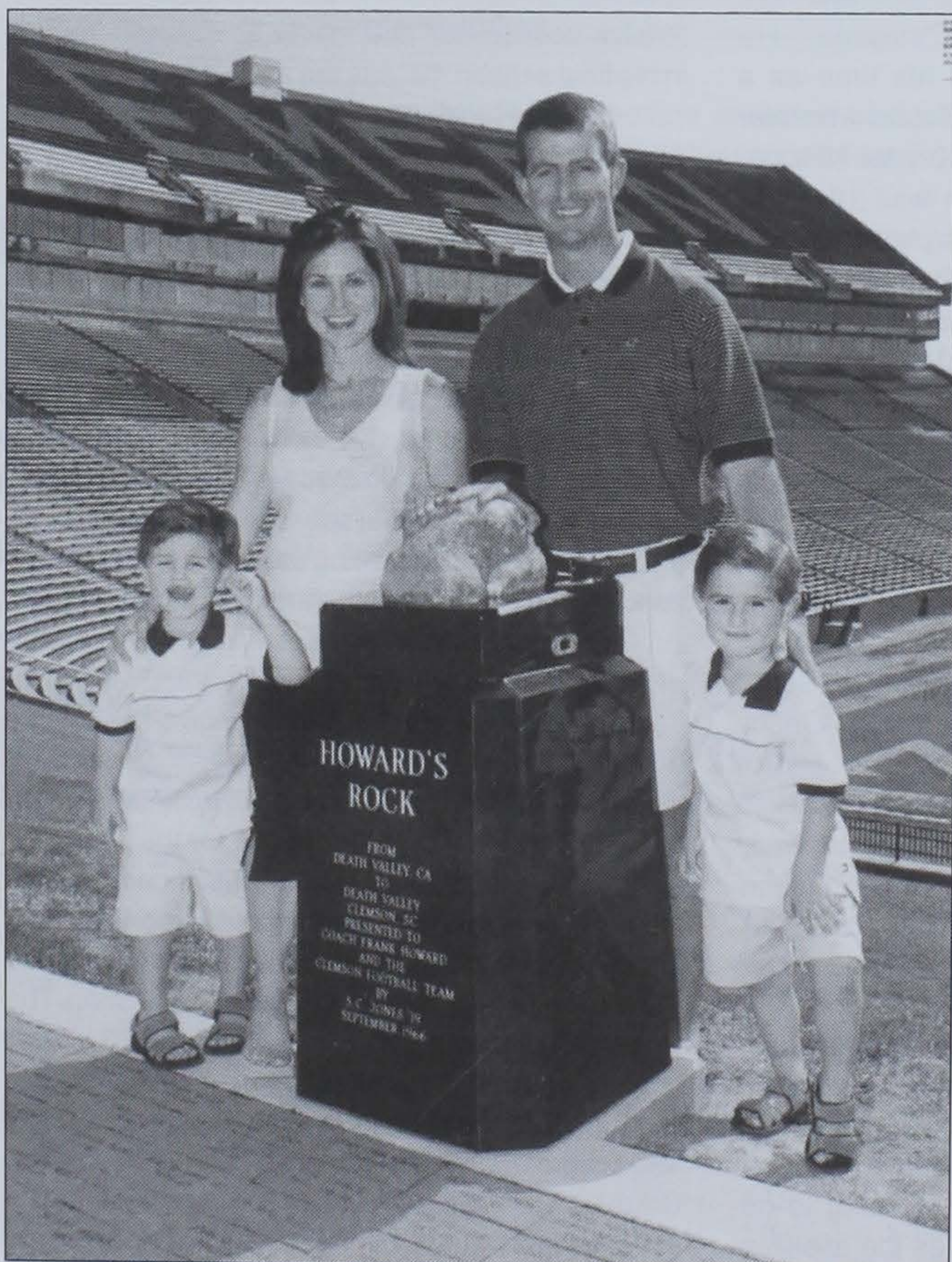

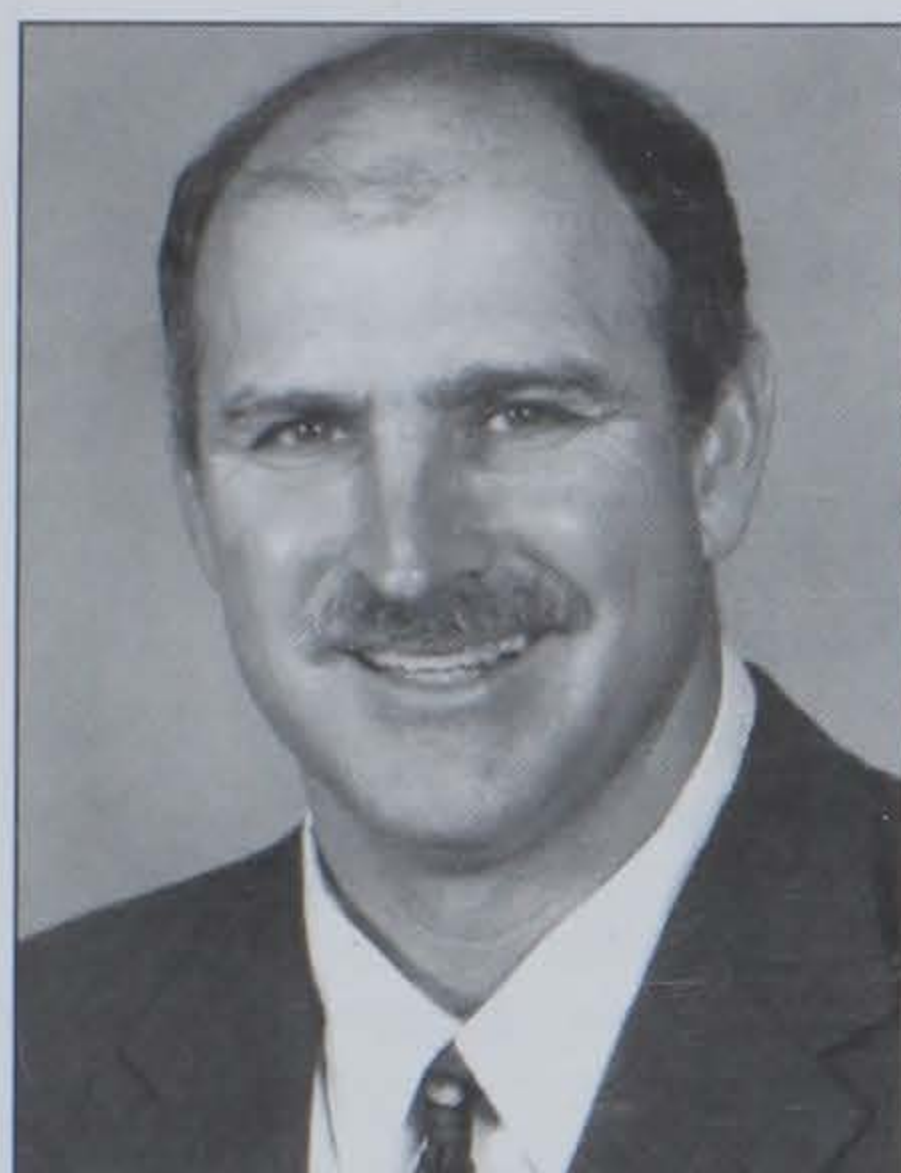

Ron West has helped bring Clemson to new heights in his four years as an assistant coach.

The Tigers have been to a bowl game every year he has been Clemson's offensive line coach. It has been a resurgence similar to the one he helped generate as a player in 1977 and 1978 at Clemson under the late Charley Pell.

In 1999, West returned to Clemson with Tommy Bowden to coach the Tiger offensive line. He inherited the smallest offensive line in the nation and the youngest Clemson starting five interior linemen since 1943. All the Clemson offense did was average over 400 yards per game of total offense, the third-highest figure in Tiger history, and score 42 touchdowns, fifth highest in Tiger history. His group helped pave the way for an offense that set 26 school records.

The records continued to fall in 2000, as 47 more offensive marks were established. Included in the marks was the single-season total offense record. Balance was the watchword of the Clemson attack in 2000, and the play of the offensive line was a key. Clemson was just one of six schools to aver-

age at least 200 yards passing and 200 yards rushing. The Tigers finished the season 10th in the nation in rushing and 14th in scoring. The scoring average was the highest by a Tiger team in 100 years.

His players have made great improvement over their careers under his direction. In both 2000 and 2001, center Kyle Young was a second-team All-American on the field and a first-team Academic All-American. Young was just the second offensive lineman in NCAA history to be named a three-time, first-team Academic All-American. Will Merritt was a Second-Team All-ACC choice in 2000 and 2001.

Clemson has set over 150 school records over the four years West has been on the coaching staff. The Tigers averaged 400 yards of total offense each year from 1999-01, the first time Clemson had three straight 400-yard seasons.

West was a member of two Gator Bowl teams for the Tigers as a reserve offensive lineman in 1977 and 1978. As a Clemson player, West saw action in over 200 plays as a reserve for both the right guard and right tackle spots in 1978. He transferred to Clemson from Marion Institute, where he was a junior college All-American.

Clemson finished 1978 with an 11-1 record and ranked sixth in the final AP Poll. A versatile player, West started two games that year, at right guard

against Virginia Tech and right tackle against Virginia. He spent most of his time as a backup to Joe Bostic, who later went on to a 10-year NFL career. Clemson was 19-4-1 in the two years he played with the Tigers. He was a member of the team that played in the 1978 Gator Bowl and gained victory over Ohio State. Thus he has been affiliated with Clemson as a player or coach for six years, and the program has gone to a bowl game all six seasons.

When West first left Clemson, he became a graduate assistant coach at Livingston University. He first met current Clemson coach Tommy Bowden shortly thereafter during a four-month stint at East Carolina between the 1979 and 1980 seasons. West went on to coach the offensive line at North Texas State during the 1980 season.

In 1981, he joined the Texas Tech staff as an offensive line and special teams coach. He served in that capacity for four years before switching to defense in 1985 as the assistant linebacker coach.

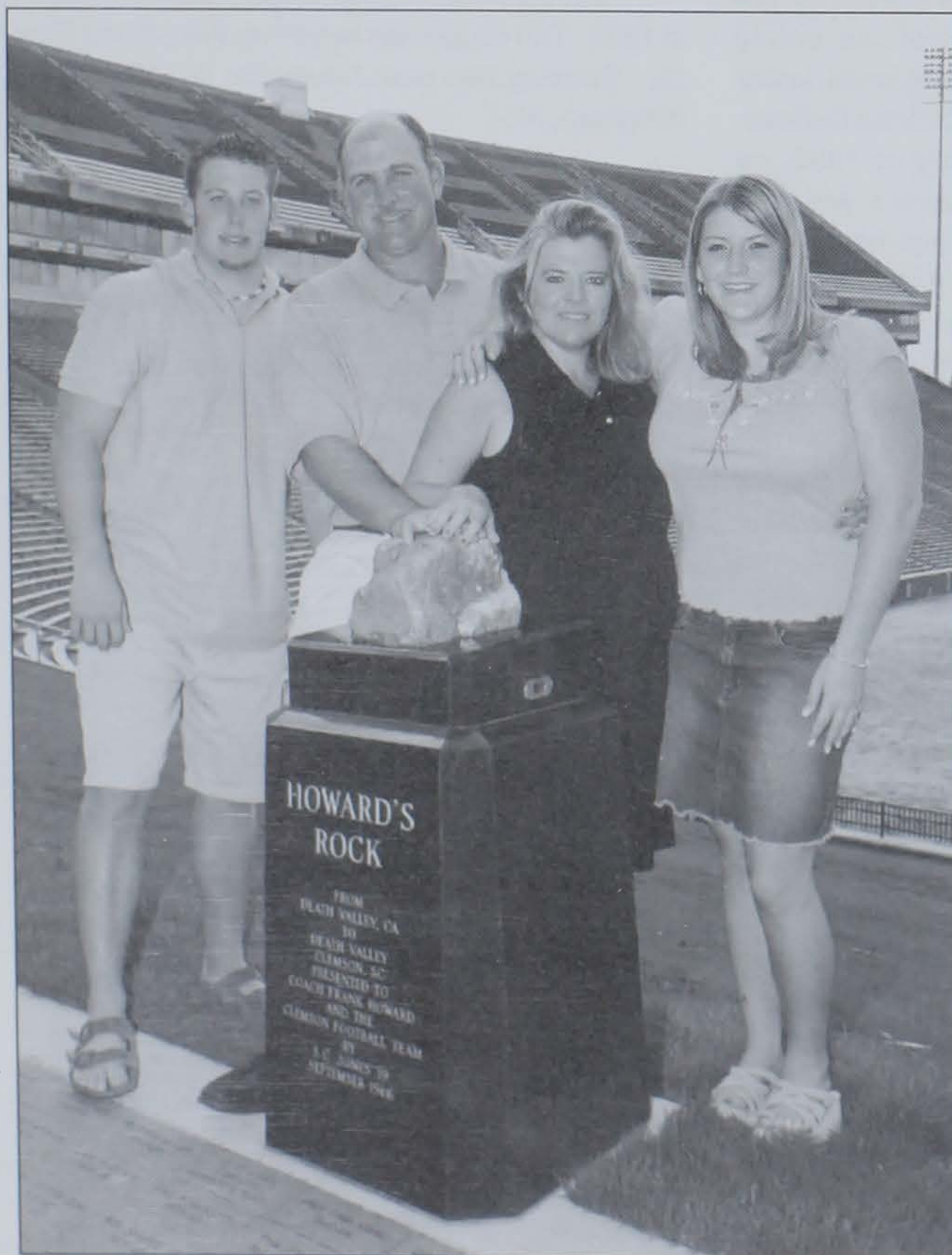

West's next stop was Louisiana-Lafayette. He spent seven seasons with the Ragin' Cajuns as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach. In his final season, he was the assistant head coach.

West's Ragin' Cajun defenses ranked among the nation's top 20 in total defense three times. Under West, the defense was ranked nationally in at least one defensive category for six straight years.

After leaving Louisiana-Lafayette, West joined the staff at Baylor as offensive line coach. There, he was a part of the Baylor team that was a co-winner of the 1994 Southwest Conference title. That season, the Bear offensive line helped set the school record for points and touchdowns in a season. During the 1994 and 1995 seasons, the Bears averaged more than 210 rushing yards per game. West joined the Tulane staff in 1997. His influence on the offensive line was felt immediately. In 1998, on the way to a 12-0 record, the offensive line helped Tulane become the only school in the nation to average over 300 yards passing and 200 yards rushing during the regular season. The team was ranked among the nation's top 25 in both categories throughout the season.

West is married to the former Becky Horne. The couple has two children, Brad (20) and Lori (16). Brad started seven games at linebacker as a red-shirt freshman at Appalachian State in 2002 and had 70 tackles, fifth on the team.

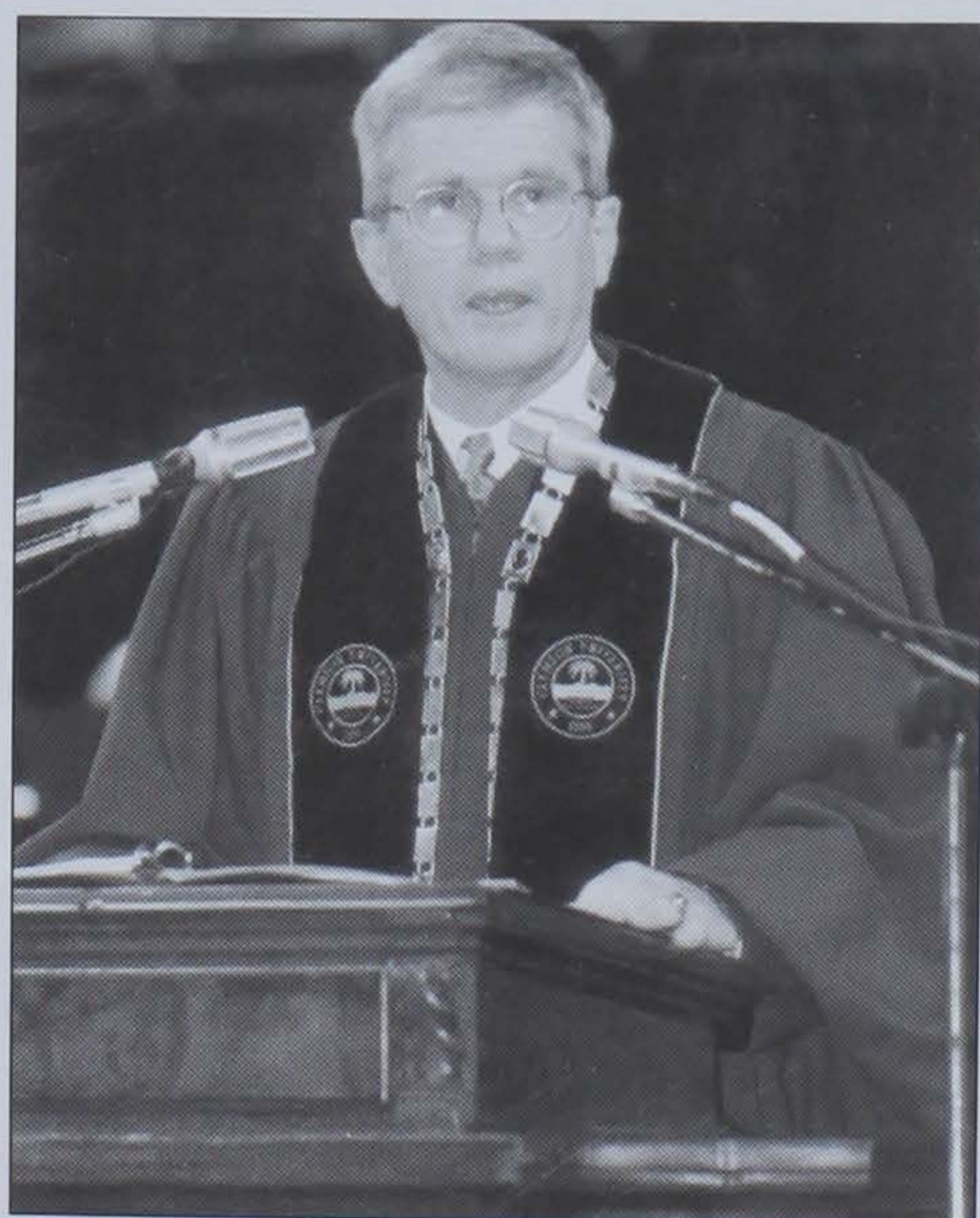
Barker earned his bachelor of architecture degree from Clemson and his master of architecture and urban design degree from Washington University in St. Louis, MO. Before returning to Clemson in 1986 to serve as dean of the College of Architecture, he was dean of the School of Architecture at Mississippi State University. In 1995, he became dean of the new College of Architecture, Arts, and Humanities, which was created after a comprehensive reorganization and has received national attention as a new model in education.

He is a recipient of the National Distinguished Professor Award of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture and served as president of that association. Barker was named Fellow of the American Institute of Architects. He also has been a partner in an architectural practice.

He has been awarded honorary doctoral degrees from S.C. State University and Mars Hill College, and has served on the Truman Scholars selection committee. He currently serves on the Commission of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the region's accrediting agency. In 2003, he received the Greenville Chamber of Commerce Buck Mickel Award for Community Service and was named one of **Greenville Magazine's** 50 most influential people in the area.

As chair of the ACC's Council on Presidents in 2003, Barker played a key role in the conference's expansion as well as the development of collaborative academic initiatives.

Barker co-founded Clemson's S.C. Design Arts Partnership to support community design outreach projects, initiated the Charleston Architecture Center, established the university's "Arts in April" program, and developed a Mayors' Institute to help city lead-



Barker became Clemson's 14th president in 1999. He is a 1970 Clemson graduate,

Clemson University President James F. Barker is first and foremost an architect. So it is no surprise that he came to the office with a clear blueprint of Clemson's future in mind - a future built around such ideas as collaboration, community, and quality.

A 1970 Clemson graduate, the former dean of the university's College of Architecture, Arts, and Humanities was named president in October of 1999 and embarked on a goal of making Clemson one of the nation's top public universities. From that vision came the development of a set of 10-year goals adopted in 2001 - goals that are already showing results, including:

- a 70-plus percent increase in research support over two years, earning Clemson a ranking as one of the nation's top 100 research universities and surpassing \$100 million dollars in annual research support;
- an academic plan that identifies eight emphasis areas where Clemson hopes to build nationally recognized programs;
- the recruitment of more outstanding young faculty, including 16 National Science Foundation CAREER award winners, given to the nation's most promising faculty;
- the enrollment of Clemson's brightest freshman class, with an average SAT exceeding 1205;
- recognition as **Time Magazine's** Public College-of-the-Year for its innovative Communication Across the Curriculum program.

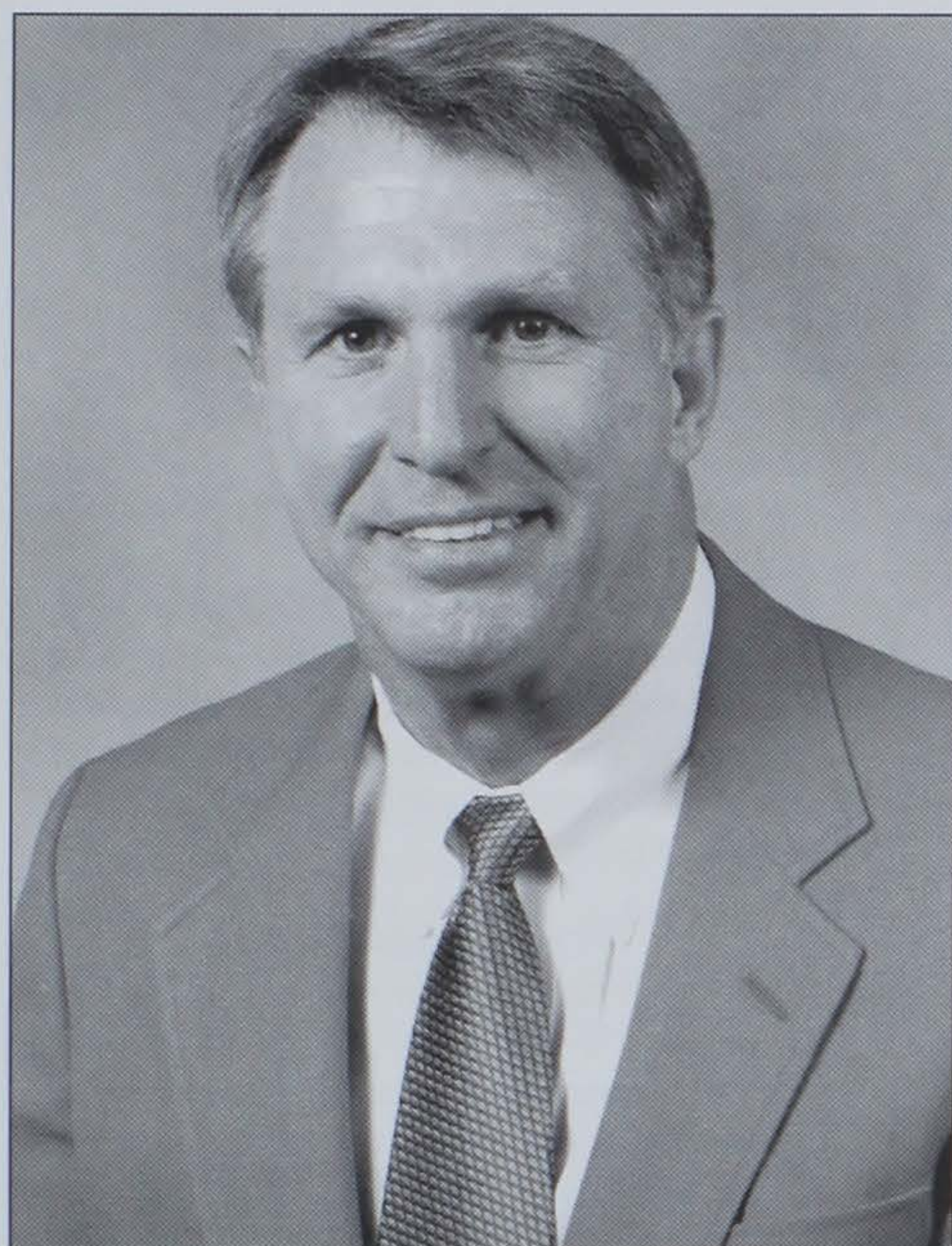

Despite his responsibilities as president, Barker remains committed to the classroom. Each spring, he is part of a team that teaches an undergraduate course exploring "a sense of place" in architecture, literature, and history.



It hasn't taken Dr. Terry Don Phillips long to begin to influence the direction of the Clemson athletic program. His first year as athletic director featured the establishment of a long-term strategic plan for Clemson athletics intended to provide opportunity for Clemson athletics to work toward becoming a model program, one that can compete at the highest levels in all sports. To become a model program, Clemson must be able to, not only compete at the highest levels, but do so with academic integrity, concern for the student-athlete, financial responsibility, and in full compliance.

"There is nothing worse than trying to maintain status quo," said Phillips, who became Clemson's 10th athletic director on July 1, 2002.

That motto has been a basic tenet that has characterized his career as an administrator and his pursuit to develop Clemson into a model athletic program in the 21st century. His beliefs are in line with the University's overall goal of making Clemson one of the top-20 public universities in the nation.

Strides were made toward these goals in his first year through facility improvements and the development of concepts that will serve the entire program. Littlejohn Coliseum and Doug Kingsmore Stadium completed renovations that now make them very competitive nationally. A new indoor track was completed in the summer of 2003 as well.

Phillips also introduced the West Endzone plan for Clemson Memorial Stadium. It is planned that in 2004, Clemson will begin construction at Death Valley that will add 2,000 premium club seats in the west endzone and create a new revenue stream for facilities at Clemson. After the completion of the club seats, future plans call for a new comprehensive football building at Memorial Stadium. The building will benefit the entire department, as it will create additional updated facilities for Clemson's Olympic sports program in the McFadden Building. A "One Clemson Center" to include the history of Clemson University and athletics is also a planned part of the project.

On the field of competition, Clemson won its first ever national championship in golf, with a land-

mark victory at Oklahoma State's Karsten Creek. Larry Penley's team was the #1-ranked team in the nation for the entire season and became the first golf program in history to win its conference, NCAA Regional, and NCAA National Tournaments. According to Phillips, this feat is a great tribute to Penley and Bobby Robinson, who laid the foundation for the Clemson golf program.

It was an ironic first national title at Clemson for Phillips in that he had been at Oklahoma State for eight years prior to his arrival at Clemson. He has now been the athletic director for three national championship golf programs in the last 10 years.

In terms of personnel, Phillips made national news when he hired Oliver Purnell as Clemson head basketball coach. Purnell had led Dayton to 20-win seasons each of the last four years, including a 24-6 campaign in 2002-03 that included a top-four national seed for the NCAA Tournament and the championship of the Atlantic 10 Conference. Departmental diversity was further enhanced with the hiring of two outstanding individuals - former NCAA administrator Phil Grayson and former Clemson All-American football player Jeff Davis - to assistant athletic director positions.

Phillips is also known around the Clemson athletic department for his love of Clemson traditions and spirit. He instituted a "Solid Orange" day in the department that encourages athletic department employees to wear Clemson school colors every Friday. The plan has spread across the state, as Clemson fans, where possible, wear orange to work on Fridays. School children have also adopted the plan across the state. He has also instituted the playing of the alma mater at all athletic events.

"While we're working on infrastructure and strategy, we're working just as hard on school spirit and re-energizing the great pride we all have in Clemson," said Phillips in **Clemson World**, Clemson's Alumni magazine summer of 2003 issue. "When it (our spirit and pride) really flows - as it can at Clemson - it's an amazing testament from every

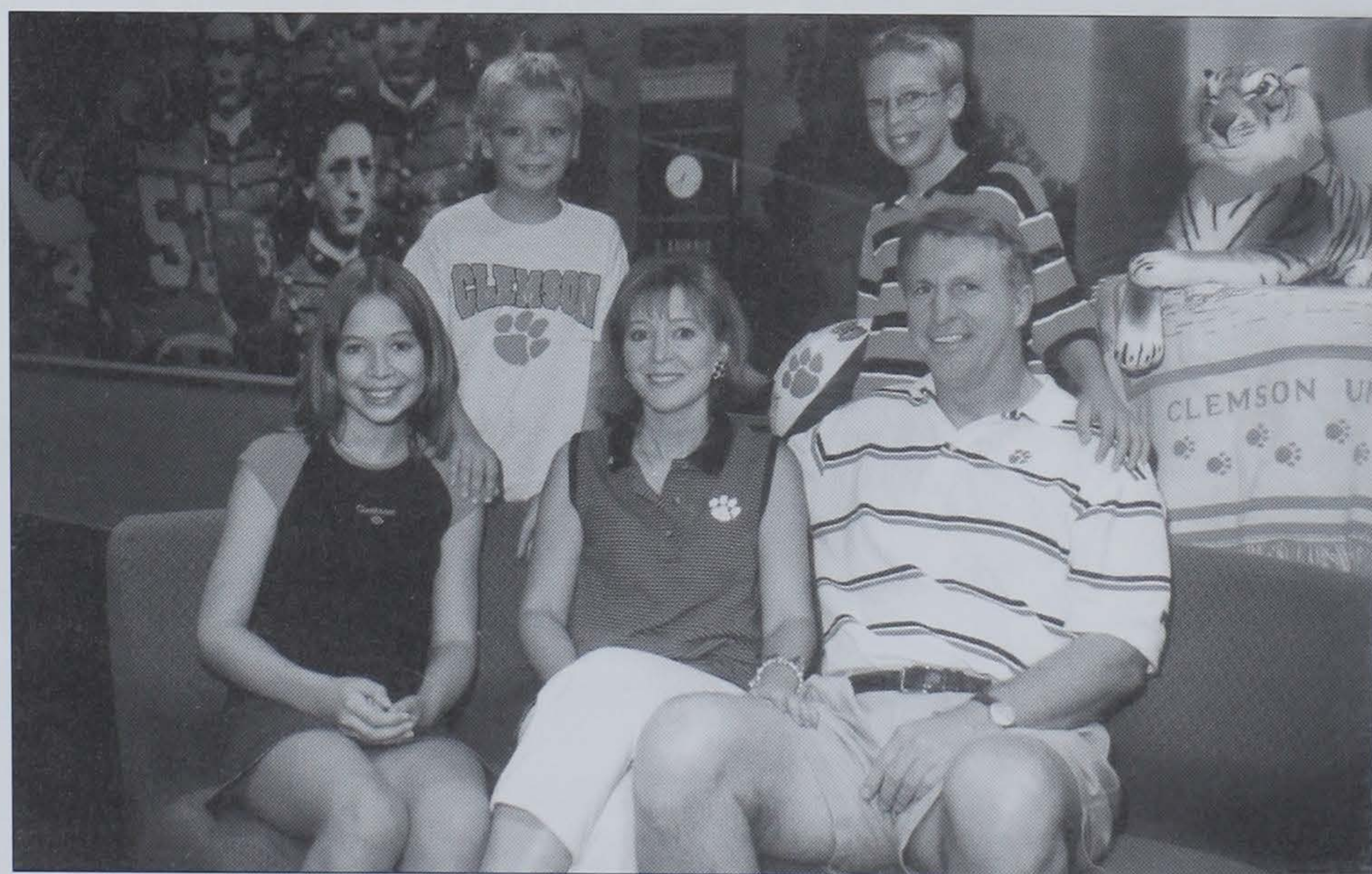
alumnus, student, and supporter, and a tremendous boost to every Clemson effort. That is the case in recruiting; not only athletic recruiting, but academic as well."

Phillips has an undergraduate degree from Arkansas (1970), a master's degree from Virginia Tech (1974), a doctorate from Virginia Tech (1978), and a law degree from the Arkansas School of Law (1996). He is a member of the Arkansas Bar, American Bar Association, and the Sports Lawyers Association.

From an experience standpoint, Phillips has worked in nearly all phases of college athletics. He served as an assistant football coach at Virginia Tech, supervised spring sports and student-athlete enrichment at the University of Florida, handled athletic fundraising and facility enhancement at Missouri and Arkansas, and had 15 years experience as an athletic director, including 13 at the Division I level prior to his appointment at Clemson.

When it came to success on the field and in the classroom at Oklahoma State, Phillips' programs were among the best in the Big XII Conference. The achievements of the Oklahoma State program during his tenure (1994-02) included a pair of national championships in men's golf, a men's basketball Final Four, two trips to the College World Series, a Women's Softball World Series, 13 Big XII Championships, and 11 individual national champions. Academically, it had 53 academic All-Americans.

Very importantly, Oklahoma State notched four football victories over arch-rival Oklahoma during his tenure, including an upset of a fourth-ranked Sooners team in 2001 that knocked Oklahoma from the national championship race. Before his arrival in 1995, the Cowboys had just three wins over Oklahoma in the previous 48 years and had won only a total of 14 games in the previous five years. The year in which he left, Oklahoma State won three more Big XII championships, a national championship in wrestling, and put nine teams in NCAA postseason play. The Oklahoma State football team again defeated the Rose Bowl Champion Sooners, making OSU's

wins over OU five out of the last eight years - something no other team in the Big XII has done. The football program also produced a 100-percent graduation rate based for the 1997 recruiting class, as well as winning the Houston Bowl.

From a facilities enhancement standpoint, the Oklahoma State program compiled a long list of successful facilities projects, including the completion of approximately \$65 million in new construction. The projects included a new athletics center complete with a strength/conditioning complex, locker facilities, player lounges, offices, meeting rooms, sports medicine area, an academic center, and the Heritage Hall, among others. Gallagher-Iba Arena, the Cowboys' basketball facility, was expanded from 6,000 to 13,611 seats, and 14 suites were added. CBS Sportsline named it the best college basketball venue in the nation.

Phillips also supervised the planning of a \$50-million renovation to the Oklahoma State football stadium that will add 2,300 club seats, 14 suites, and rebuilt concession, restrooms, press box, and concourse areas. All facilities were supported through new revenue streams and capital fundraising, as construction began in the spring of 2003.

Before leading Oklahoma State, Phillips served as senior associate athletic director at Arkansas from 1988-94. He ran the daily operations and had oversight of facility projects for the men's programs, and was president of the Razorback Foundation.

Phillips was also athletic director at the University of Southwestern Louisiana from 1983-88 and Liberty College from 1980-81. He was an assistant athletic director at Missouri from 1981-83, where he supervised athletic fundraising. Phillips began his administrative career in 1978 as an assistant athletic director at Florida, where he worked with spring sports and student-athlete enrichment.

Phillips began his career in college athletics coaching football. He started as a graduate assistant at Arkansas from 1970-71. He then moved on to Virginia Tech as an assistant coach from 1971-78 before joining the ranks of athletic administration. During his coaching career in Blacksburg, he served with former Clemson Head Coaches Charley Pell and Danny Ford.

Winning has been in Phillips's resumé since his playing days. At Arkansas, Phillips lettered on Frank Broyles teams of 1966, 1968, and 1969. The Razorbacks were a combined 27-5 in those three

seasons and played in two Sugar Bowl games. Phillips played for the Razorbacks in the famous 1969 Arkansas-Texas game that decided the National Championship. During the spring of 2003, the book *Horns, Hogs, and Nixon's Coming* chronicled that historic game. One of the assistant coaches on the 1968 and 1969 Arkansas teams was former Clemson Head Coach Hootie Ingram.

Phillips is the Chair of the NCAA Division I Infractions Appeals Committee, which serves the appellate role for all University and individual appeals arising from the Committee on Infractions. He also works with the NCAA Certification Program. He currently serves on the following ACC Committees: Finance Committee, Committee on Infractions and Penalties, Television Committee, the Men's Basketball Committee, and the Football Committee.

Phillips has two children - John Dennis (26) and Sarah Jane (22). He has three step-children - Meagan (14), Marshall (13), and Madison (11). He is married to Tricia Phillips, who earlier had an athletic administration career in marketing at Southwestern Louisiana and is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism.

Athletic Department Administration



Rick Bagby

Video Services Director

Rick Bagby is in his sixth year as the director of athletic video services, overseeing a department with an ever growing importance in college athletics. Bagby and his staff work daily with coaches to supply them with video of both the Tigers and their opponents. In 2002-03, he

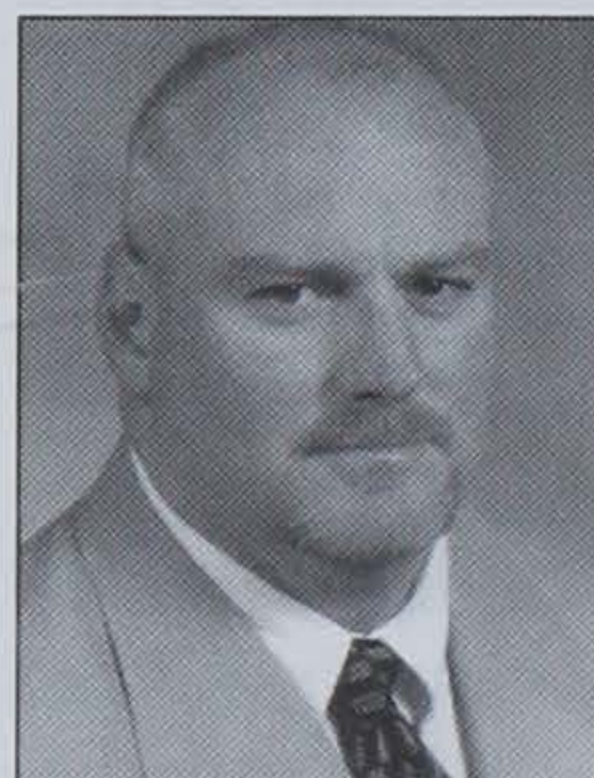
was named the top video services director in the ACC by the national organization.

The role of director of athletic video services has changed rapidly since he first arrived in Clemson. Video is now supplied to the coaches via an intranet system of 16 computer workstations and is combined with a database to allow instant access to any piece of video. "Cut-ups" or groupings of certain types of plays are now available instantly for the coaches to view instead of waiting hours or even overnight.

Bagby oversees a staff of eight students who are mainly responsible for shooting daily events for a variety of sports. His staff works with broadcast quality digital video cameras, another area Bagby has upgraded in his five years. Bagby takes an active role in the field of sports video. He has just completed a two year term as the President of the Collegiate Sports Video Association (CSVA) and now serves as the Chairman of their Website Committee as well as being an active member of the Information Display and Entertainment Association (IDEA). Bagby and his staff have also created a website for their department, www.clemsonvideo.com.

While all of this by itself could occupy Bagby and his staff of one full-time assistant and one graduate assistant's time, the Video Services Department has many other duties. They work closely with every television network to ensure the game day TV production of Tiger sporting events runs smoothly. They also work with all 19 Tiger sports, producing recruiting and banquet tapes. Bagby and his staff also work closely with ClemsonTigers.com and the IPTAY office, helping to promote Clemson Athletics.

When he is able to break away from his duties, he is an avid golfer and enjoys working on his personal website. He is married to the former Jennifer Robinson of Mooresville, NC. They have a girl, Payton, who was born in March.



Joey Batson

Strength Training Director

Entering his seventh year as Strength Training Director at Clemson, Joey Batson brings much experience to the position. Batson is familiar with the Tiger program, having served as a graduate assistant under Gary Wade in the Strength and Conditioning area from 1985-88.

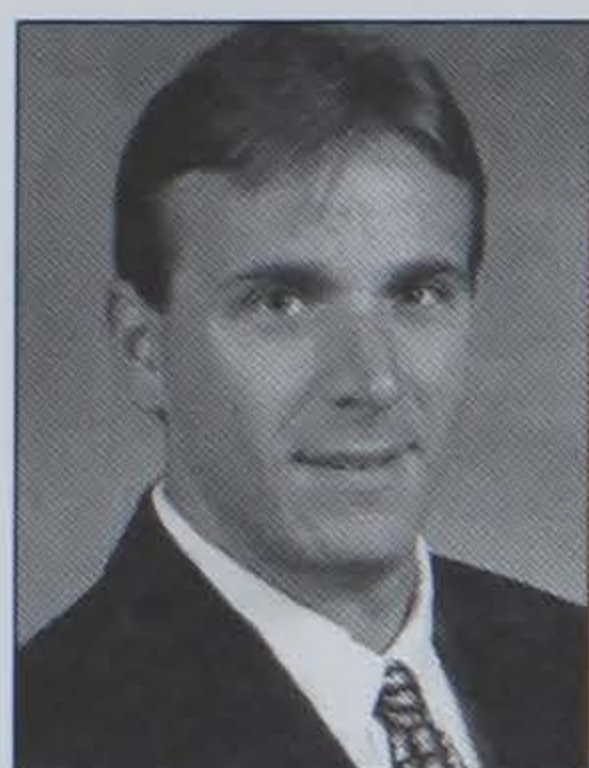
In the course of his professional career, Batson has pioneered many training techniques in the strength, speed and conditioning fields. Referred to by Batson as "Not So Basic Strength Training," the collection of innovative techniques has led to impressive results by many Tiger players over his career.

Prior to his return to Clemson, Batson served as the first full-time director of Strength Training at Furman University in Greenville. In 1996, he was named Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year in the Southern Conference by the National Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association. In addition to his four years at Furman, he also worked as the Director of Strength/Conditioning at Bowling Green and served a year at the University of South Carolina as assistant director of strength and conditioning.

Not only does Batson bring professional experience to the position, but he also brings experience as a player at the collegiate level. The Greenville native was a tight end at The Citadel in 1979 before transferring to Newberry College, where he was a two-year letterman and team co-captain as a senior. Batson earned his B.A. degree in Physical Education from Newberry and his masters in Education at Clemson in 1988.

Batson is a Specialist in Sports Conditioning (SSC) and Masters of Sports Science (MSS) through the International Sports Sciences Association, and is a member of several other professional groups, which include the National Strength and Conditioning Association, United States Weight Lifting Federation, and the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association. He has completed the Club Coach Certification program by the United States Weight Lifting Federation. He is a regular speaker and instructor on the strength training circuit.

Batson, who started his employment as director on June 2, 1997, is married to the former Susan Malone of Greenville. They have two children, Michael (7) and Benjamin (4).



Eric Baumgartner

Assistant AD • Compliance Services

Eric Baumgartner enters his fourth year as the assistant athletic director for compliance services at Clemson. He came to Clemson after working at Jacksonville University and Agnes Scott College. Prior to being named as the assistant director for compliance services, he served

as the assistant director of compliance, then the director at Jacksonville University. During his career at Jacksonville he worked with 20 different varsity sports programs in NCAA compliance education.

While at Agnes Scott College, Baumgartner, a 1995 Virginia Tech graduate, was the assistant soccer coach and interim assistant athletic director.

At Clemson, Baumgartner serves as the primary liaison between the NCAA and Clemson's offices of admissions and registration. He also directs rule education programs for new athletic staff members, athletic department personnel, and prospective and enrolled student-athletes.

In addition to a bachelor's of science degree in Exercise Science from Virginia Tech, Baumgartner also earned a master's of science in Sports Administration from Georgia State in 1997.

Baumgartner married his wife Angela in December of 1998. They have a three-year-old daughter, Kirstin, and one-year-old twins, MacKenzie and Evan.



Tim Bourret

Assistant AD • Sports Information

Tim Bourret is in his 14th year supervising the SID office, his 11th as an Assistant Athletic Director, and his 26th with the Clemson Athletic Department. He first came to Clemson as assistant SID under Bob Bradley in September of 1978 and was elevated to an associate SID

position in July of 1980.

The 47-year old Bourret has edited 103 award-winning brochures in his career at Clemson, including 31 that have dealt with Tiger football. The 2002 Clemson football guide and program series were both award winners. The football program has ranked in the top five in that country each of the last two seasons.

Bourret was a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference 50-Year Anniversary Committee and is presently a member of the ACC Committee on Media and Public Relations.

Bourret also has considerable radio experience, play-by-play and color. He has been the color voice of Clemson basketball since the 1980-81 season and served in the same capacity for Clemson football between 1982 and 1988. He gave up his football radio work to supervise the Clemson press box when Bob Bradley retired in 1989. He was also the play-by-play voice of Tiger postseason baseball (1980-89).

Bourret is a native of West Hartford, CT and 1973 graduate of Northwest Catholic High School. He was an all-conference baseball player in high school and played in the 1973 American Legion World Series.

Following in his father's footsteps, Bourret earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Notre Dame in business administration in 1977. He also earned his master's degree in communication arts from Notre Dame in August of 1978.

Bourret worked as an undergraduate and graduate assistant under Roger Valdiserri in Notre Dame's office for three years, where he was assistant editor of Notre Dame's 1977 football programs. The program series won Best in the Nation that year. He also served as commissioner of the school's famed "Bookstore Basketball Tournament" for three years, including the year it was featured in **Sports Illustrated**.

He joined former Notre Dame basketball coach Digger Phelps and **Sport's Illustrated's** John Walters as co-authors of the book "Basketball for Dummies." It was originally released by IDG Books in October, 1997. A second version of the book was released in October 2000.



Rebecca Bowman

Associate AD • Compliance Services

Becky Bowman is in her sixth year as the associate athletic director for compliance services. The native of Irmo, SC is a 1976 graduate of Winthrop College. She also earned a master's degree from Virginia Tech. Bowman came to Clemson from the NCAA where she served

seven years in the membership services area. While at the NCAA, she was named senior staff member, coordinated the NCAA Division I Athletics Certification program and peer-review training in addition to conducting institutional compliance reviews.

Prior to working at the NCAA, Bowman was the head volleyball coach at Charlotte from 1983-91. She served on the faculty while at Charlotte and served as its head softball coach in 1984 and 1985. From 1976 until 1983, Bowman was the head volleyball and basketball coach at Harding High in Charlotte, NC.

During her career at Winthrop, Bowman played on the basketball and volleyball teams, captaining the volleyball team her senior season. She was a member of Senior Order at Winthrop and was named to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities in 1976.

At Clemson, she coordinates the institutional rules compliance program. At the ACC level, she is a member of the league's Constitution and By-Laws Committee, chairs the ACC Rowing Committee, and serves as vice chair of the ACC Volleyball Committee. She serves on the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Committee. She has served on an accreditation team for Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and as a peer reviewer for the NCAA Division I athletics certification program.



Bill D'Andrea

Senior Associate AD

Bill D'Andrea is in his 12th year at Clemson, but he has been a significant member of the Clemson University family for much longer. His association with Clemson dates to 1983 when he served as a graduate assistant football coach.

Now as a senior associate athletic director, he is the primary administrator under Athletic Director Dr. Terry Don Phillips for all sports. He also supervises the operations of the equipment room, the training room, the weight room, and the student-athlete enrichment program.

Clemson's well-earned national reputation in student-athlete enrichment can be traced back to D'Andrea, who served as the director of Vickery Hall from 1991 (the year the facility was opened) until 2002. This program was named one of the top programs of its kind in the country by NACDA in September of 1999.

Clemson student-athletes made significant improvement academically in terms of overall GPA, academic honors, and graduation rates during his 11 years in Vickery Hall. The overall grade point average of the student-athletes rose from 2.35 in 1991 to 2.85 in 2002. During one stretch, the student-athletes collective grade point average improved 14 consecutive semesters.

D'Andrea, a Morgan, PA native, received his undergraduate degree in criminal justice from Indiana State in 1973. He was a member of the Sycamore football team as an offensive lineman for four years and played under former Clemson assistant coach Larry Van Der Heyden. He earned a master's degree from East Carolina in 1975.

D'Andrea came to Clemson in a full-time capacity in 1986 and served as an offensive line coach until the 1989 season. Clemson won three ACC titles and had four bowl victories and four top 20 Associated Press poll final rankings during that time. He coached Stacy Long, a first-team All-America tackle who was a finalist for the Outland Trophy. He moved into athletic administration in 1990.

D'Andrea and his wife Lee reside in Clemson.



Jeff Davis

Assistant AD • Major Gifts

Jeff Davis is in his first year as an assistant athletic director. He currently is significantly involved in fund-raising efforts for Clemson's WestZone Club seating area at Death Valley in addition to involvement in other athletic department and university fund-raising efforts. He also serves as the primary spokesman for the University's Call Me Mister Program.

Davis was an All-America linebacker from 1978-81 who captained the Tigers during their 1981 National Championship run and became a permanent fixture in Clemson football lore.

"The Judge" registered a then-Clemson record 175 tackles on the 1981 defense. That same season, he became just the third defensive player in ACC history to be named MVP of the league. And in the most important game in school history, Davis made 14 tackles as Clemson defeated Nebraska 22-15 in the 1982 Orange Bowl to claim its first national championship. He was named the Defensive Player-of-the-Game.

His collegiate accomplishments earned him numerous accolades. Davis was named to Clemson's Centennial Team in 1996 and was named one of the top-five Tigers of the 20th century. In 1995, Davis received one of the school's highest distinctions when he became the fourth member of the Clemson Ring of Honor. In 2002, he was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team.

Davis has made a name for himself outside of the Clemson community. A fifth-round draft choice by Tampa Bay in 1982, he played six productive seasons in the NFL. During his time as a professional, Davis also completed his remaining coursework and graduated from Clemson in 1984.

In 1999, he returned to the University as field director of the Call Me Mister program within the Department of Education, Health, and Human Development. Call Me Mister seeks to recruit, train, certify, and secure employment for African American males as elementary teachers in South Carolina's public schools. In 2001, Davis received a \$100,000 award for the program from Oprah Winfrey's "Angel Network."

Davis is also president of Goal Line Stand, an organization that supports young people as adults as they seek to remain committed to values that shape and govern their lives. An ordained pastor, Davis lives in Clemson with his wife Joni and their six children.



Bobby Douglas

Interim Student-Athlete Enrichment Director

Bobby Douglas is the Interim Director of Student-Athlete Enrichment at Clemson's Vickery Hall. The New Jersey native has worked at Clemson in some capacity for the last 21 years and has been at Clemson for over 26 years.

Douglas first came to Clemson in 1974 as a member of the men's track team. He lettered in 1977 and 1978 as a team manager. He served as the athletic department's assistant equipment manager beginning in 1978.

Douglas furthered his career in college athletics as the head equipment manager at Clemson from 1982 to 1991. At the creation of Vickery Hall, Douglas left the Jervy Athletic Center to become the institution's community service coordinator. Douglas served in that capacity for over two years before concentrating on academic counseling.

Douglas served as the academic counselor for men's soccer from 1991-01, women's soccer from 1993-01 and men's track from 1993-96. He also has served as the tutor coordinator during his time spent at Vickery Hall.

As Interim Director of Student-Athlete Enrichment, Douglas oversees the day to day operations of Vickery Hall. The position entails covering five specific areas: academic commitment, personal growth of the student-athlete, student-athlete career assistance, service commitment and athletic commitment.

Douglas received his undergraduate degree in industrial education from Clemson in May of 1979. He is married to the former Ann Skelton of Clemson. They have two children, Mary (13) and John (9).



Phil Grayson

Associate AD • Student-Athlete Development

Phil Grayson began his first year as Associate Athletic Director for Student Development on May 1, 2003. Grayson brings with him an extensive background in NCAA waiver processes and issues related to academic eligibility. He served as Associate Director of Membership Services for the NCAA from 1999-03. He also held the position of Membership Services Representative at the NCAA from 1995-99.

Prior to his positions with the NCAA, the South Bend, IN native worked as a school liaison for Charter Behavioral Health System in Mishawaka, IN. He holds a M.S. in education (Counseling & Human Services) and a B.S. in business administration (marketing) from Indiana University at South Bend. He transferred from Marquette University, where he played tennis for three years.

As Associate Athletic Director for Student Development at Clemson, Grayson will provide leadership and coordinate with all staff members who provide student-athlete welfare services, including the Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs. He will also serve as liaison to other campus offices, such as the Provost, University Counsel, Admissions, and the Registrar's office.

Other duties will include developing and facilitating programs that address diversity issues with the athletic department (including minority and international student populations), directing and monitoring assessment of athletic goals and objectives, and supervising the study of factors that impact graduation rates.



Van Hilderbrand

Associate AD • Ticket Manager

Van Hilderbrand has served the Clemson athletic department for 27 years and is in his 18th as an assistant/associate athletic director. He is in charge of the ticket office, and supervises parking and gameday operations. He is certainly familiar with the athletic department. He

started his association there as a student employee in the office during his college career, 1970-74. In 1976, he filled the newly created position of assistant ticket manager, and in 1980 he was named Athletic Department Ticket Manager. In 1985 he was made an assistant athletic director.

In 2001, Hilderbrand met the challenge of one of the top football attendance improvements in the country as the Tigers drew more than 80,000 fans per game. Clemson ranked seventh in the nation in total attendance in 2000.

Hilderbrand worked as athletic supervisor for the Greenwood Recreation Department for two years after graduation, and in 1976, he returned to Clemson.

Hilderbrand graduated from Clover (SC) High School in 1970. He was the school's all-time leading scorer in basketball until 1993, when former Tiger griddler Lamont Hall broke his mark. Hilderbrand earned his degree in parks and recreation administration from Clemson in 1974. The 51-year old is married to the former Diane Harris of Clover and they have two children, Van Jr., a 2002 Clemson graduate, and Lee Elizabeth, who will be 17 this fall.

In his spare time, Hilderbrand enjoys golf and working with the Boy Scouts.



Katie Hill

Senior Associate AD

Katie Hill was named a senior associate athletic director in July, 2002. She held the same position at the University of Arkansas for the nine years prior to her appointment at Clemson. She oversees all financial aspects of the athletic department and reports directly to Athletic

Director Dr. Terry Don Phillips. She is also charged with the direction of the sports information and promotions departments, and the operation of Clemson's athletic facilities. In her first year, she guided the renovation of Littlejohn Coliseum, Doug Kingsmore Stadium, and the construction of the new indoor track.

Overall, she worked for 14 years in Arkansas. During her decade with the athletic department, she worked primarily with the department's financial matters as well as handling special projects and other administrative duties. She was well-known for her expertise in business operations and financial issues.

Hill first joined the University of Arkansas in 1988 when the Razorback Scholarship Fund moved off campus to become the Razorback Foundation, Inc. Hill performed an important start-up role in the foundation, serving as its corporate treasurer and operation's manager. In 1992 she moved to the athletic department to become assistant athletic director for business.

In her nine years as senior associate director, Hill oversaw business operations, budgeting and accounting, contracts, travel and purchasing, and the economic issues related to the expansion of Reynolds Razorback Stadium.

She also oversaw the financing and development of Bud Walton Arena, the Baum Stadium (baseball), and the expansion of the Randal-Tyson Indoor Track Facility. The projects combined totaled over \$175 million. She also was responsible for the administration of the ticket office and athletic training room.

Hill has an undergraduate degree from the University of Central Arkansas and a MBA from the University of Arkansas.



Dr. Cecil Huey

NCAA Faculty Representative

Dr. Cecil Huey was named the Clemson Faculty Athletics Representative in 1992. As such, he is the University representative to the ACC and NCAA. He also serves as the ACC Representative of Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet of the NCAA and the NCAA Student Athlete Reinstatement Council. He serves on the ACC's Committee on Awards, the Committee on Nominations, and Postgraduate Scholarship Committee.

The professor of Mechanical Engineering on Clemson's campus is a member of the university's Athletic Council and was its chair at one time, was a faculty senator, and was a member of Clemson's self-study committee on intercollegiate athletics for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. He is involved in the selection of coaches, certifications of athletic eligibility, other on campus athletic affairs, and continues his full-time faculty position.

He won the Class of '39 award for excellence, one of the top faculty awards offered at Clemson. It recognizes distinguished faculty representing the highest achievement of service to students, the university, and the community.

Huey's association with Clemson is not solely in an academic light, although he earned his bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees in mechanical engineering from the university. Huey was an athlete during his undergraduate years with the Tigers. He was a member of the ACC champion mile relay team that posted a time of 3:14.2 and finished sixth in the country in 1964.

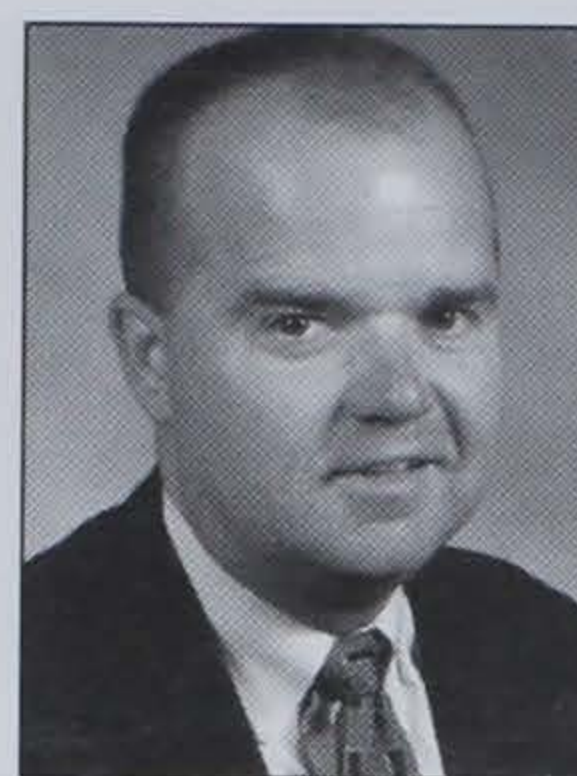


Tim Match

Associate AD

Tim Match, a native of Arlington, OH, is responsible for implementing the athletic department's sports marketing, sponsorship, licensing, and revenue-generating program. A 1985 graduate of Bowling Green State University, Match received his master's degree in parks, recreation, and tourism management with an emphasis in microcomputer management from Clemson in 1987. He worked in the sports information office under Bob Bradley for two years. Match became assistant sports information director at the University of Virginia, where he worked with many sports, including Terry Holland's NCAA Tournament men's basketball program that reached the Final Eight of the 1989 NCAA Tournament.

Match returned to Clemson in 1989 as an associate sports information director working directly with the Tiger men's basketball program and the football program. Clemson won the ACC regular-season championship in his first season in that position. He held that position for three years before moving into an assistant athletic director position under former Athletic Director Bobby Robinson.



Danny Poole

Director of Sports Medicine

Danny Poole is in his fifth season as Clemson's Director of Sports Medicine, but he is a veteran of more than 19 years working in the Tiger athletic training facility. He supervises the training needs of all student-athletes, but his primary area of emphasis is with the football program.

Poole, 46, has 25 years of full-time experience in the athletic training field. He served as head trainer for the Carolina Chargers of the American Football Association in 1979. In 1980, he became an assistant trainer at the University of Memphis. During his career as a full-time assistant at Memphis, he earned his master's degree in Health Education. In 1984, Poole came to Clemson when Bert Henderson moved from the athletic training staff into fund-raising.

A 1979 graduate of Western Carolina University, Poole earned a degree in education with a major in health and physical education. He was student trainer for the Catamounts for four years. He was published in the NATA Journal in 1979, "The D.P. Method for Blisters" as a student at Western Carolina.

Poole was honored in 2001 by his peers with the Athletic Trainers Service Award. The award is presented by the National Athletic Trainers Association to role models who are future leaders of the training profession.

Poole, a native of Charlotte, NC, is married to the former Beth Morgan and the couple has two children, Jacqui Elaine (16) and Abby Blair (14).



Dwight Rainey

Senior Associate AD

Senior Associate Athletic Director Dwight Rainey is an example of success gained from a wide variety of experiences. He is in his 29th year with the Clemson University Athletic Department. Rainey oversees the activities of the following Olympic sports: baseball, golf, soccer (men's & women's), swimming & diving (men's & women's), and tennis (men's & women's). For 17 years, he oversaw the entire Olympic Sports program.

While football and basketball may be the two highest profile sports at Clemson, the 17 Olympic sports have also enjoyed enormous success during the last 20 years. In 2003, Rainey was a part of a third national championship, as the Clemson golf team won the title at Oklahoma State. In 1984 and 1987, the men's soccer programs he oversaw captured the NCAA championship.

Prior to moving into administration, he served as Bill Foster's top basketball assistant for 13 years, including eight at Clemson. One highlight was the 1979-80 team that finished with a 23-9 mark. That squad advanced to the Final Eight of the NCAA Tourney, the furthest a Tiger hardwood team has advanced.

Rainey has also had experience outside of college athletics. Between 1967 and August of 1970, he worked with a division of the Chrysler Corporation in Atlanta, GA. Rainey earned a B.A. in business administration from Shorter College in 1967 and a Master's degree from Charlotte in 1972.



Robert Ricketts

Associate AD • Finance

Keeping the expense and revenue books of such a vast operation as the Clemson athletic department is no easy task, but Associate Athletic Director Robert Ricketts is well-qualified for the job. He is in his 18th year with the department and his 27th with the university.

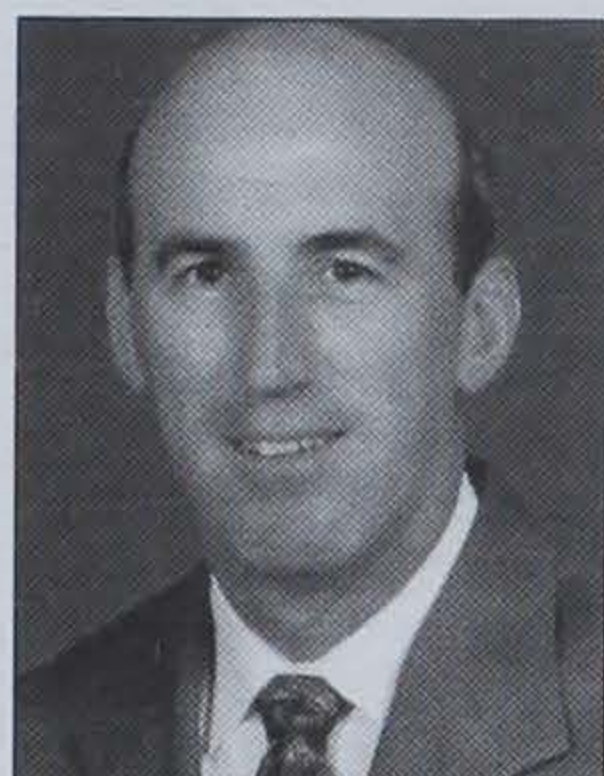
As associate athletic director in charge of business operations, Ricketts handles all purchasing and expense accounts. This job is old hat to the Anderson, SC native, who spent nine years working for Clemson in auditing and accounting departments. During these nine years, one of his main duties was the audit for the athletic department. He worked in the University's financial management division in accounting control and payroll benefits between 1976 and

Assistant AD • Promotions

John Seketa and his staff of student workers are responsible that Tiger fans enjoy the atmosphere of a Clemson sporting event. This involves the coordination of some 120 events during the year, including sometimes five events a day.

Now is his 18th year, Seketa is also involved in the promotion and management of all home NCAA and ACC tournaments at Clemson. He is a veteran of 36 NCAA Championships, nine ACC Championships, three National Invitation Tournaments, and three South Carolina High School Football title games.

Prior to arriving in Clemson, Seketa was the promotions director at Eastern Illinois University where he promoted all sports. In 1985, he staged a Make-Believe TV Football Game between Eastern Illinois and Western Illinois with ESPN, which was cited in the **New York Times**.

Seketa is a 1981 graduate of Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville. After receiving his Bachelor's degree in business administration, his work in athletics began at Western Illinois, where he attended graduate school followed by an internship at the University of Illinois.



Alphonso Smith

Head Equipment Manager

Alphonso Smith is in his ninth year as head equipment manager for football, and in his fifth year overseeing all equipment operations. Smith served as a basketball manager during his college years at Clemson during 1985-1991. He was a member of the staff of Clemson's

only ACC regular season championship team in history (1990). He also served as a graduate assistant in 1992. Smith worked as assistant equipment supervisor at the University of Memphis for three years. His responsibilities were assisting with football and he was head of men's and women's basketball, women's golf, men's and women's track.

Smith is a 1991 graduate of Clemson University and he earned his degree in social science secondary education. He is a member of the Athletic Equipment Managers Association. Smith is married to the former Kim Teel of Omaha, NE. They have a son, Andru Christopher.



Lynn Sparks

Director of Sales

Lynn Sparks is in her fourth year as Clemson's Director of Athletic Ticket Sales. She began her employment in this area of the athletic department in April, 2000, but has worked for the department for 11 years. She is involved in developing advertising and marketing plans to

increase sales on a season and single-event basis for football and basketball.

Gary Wade

Assistant AD • Facilities

Gary Wade is in his seventh year as the Assistant AD for Facilities, but is in his 19th year with the Clemson Athletic Department. Wade began his career in college athletics as the assistant strength coach at the University of Nebraska from 1976 to 1979 while working on his undergraduate degree in education and his graduate degree in exercise physiology. Working with Boyd Epley, Director of Nebraska's Husker Power Program, and the Nebraska Strength Training Staff, Wade became one of the founding members of the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA).

In 1980, at age 24, he became the Detroit Lions' first strength and conditioning coach. During his five seasons in the NFL, the Lions went to the playoffs twice and won the NFC Central in 1983. He received much credit for the Lions' immediate improvement as Head Coach Monte Clark took pride in Wade's work and results on the field.

In his 12 years in strength training at Clemson, 11 of his assistants became head strength and conditioning coaches at the collegiate or NFL level.

Wade, who was born in Nebraska City, NE, earned 10 varsity letters at Weeping Water High. He was all-conference in football for three years and was second-team all-state as a senior. He is married to the former Andree' Langlais.



Linda White

Associate AD • Senior Women's Administrator

In 1993, Linda White was promoted to associate athletic director and retained her title as Senior Women's Administrator. White represents Clemson at all university, conference and NCAA functions in the role of Senior Women's Administrator. She serves as chair of the ACC

committee for track & field and is a member of the ACC women's basketball committee, ACC Senior Women Administrators and Equity Committee, and the Clemson Area Sports Council.

White represents the athletic department at NCAA events, submits bids to host NCAA events, and coordinates the events if Clemson is awarded a bid. She has managed 24 NCAA events and nine ACC Championships.

She directly supervises women's basketball, volleyball, rowing, and track & field. She also monitors the athletic department's special events, facilities scheduling, student-athlete handbook and textbooks programs, coordinates the courtesy car program, and assists in the hiring of Olympic sports coaches.

White came to Clemson in 1986 as the head volleyball coach. She had a record of 138-81 in eight years, including six straight 20-win years. She coached at least one All-ACC player five of her six years at the helm of the Clemson program, while two of her former players were named Academic All-Americans.

Prior to her stint as volleyball coach at Clemson, White was a successful basketball and volleyball coach at Wando High School in Mount Pleasant, SC for 14 years. In 1982, she was named National Volleyball Coach-of-the-Year by the National High School Coaches Association.

In 2003, she was honored with the Pathfinder Award by the National Association for Girls and Women in Sport.

White earned her undergraduate degree from Winthrop. She earned an M.E. in administration and supervision from Clemson in May of 1987. She is married to Roger White. They have one child, Slater Martin White, who is five-years old. Their daughter, Lucia, lost her life in an auto accident in 1995.



George Bennett

IPTAY Executive Director

George Bennett begins his 11th year the second time around as Executive Director of IPTAY. Bennett returned to Clemson in February 14, 1993 after holding positions at Vanderbilt, Furman, and Baptist Hospital in Nashville, TN. Under his direction, the successful endowment program and the Tiger Cub program began.

Bennett, a 1955 Clemson graduate, entered as a freshman in 1951. He quickly got involved in campus life by being named president of his freshman class and holding other class offices throughout his career. He was president of Blue Key, the CDA, and held offices in Alpha Phi Omega and Tiger Brotherhood. He was a varsity cheerleader for three years and the head cheerleader as a senior. He persuaded his father to buy a small cannon that would be fired after the Tigers scored a touchdown. That tradition is still carried on today.

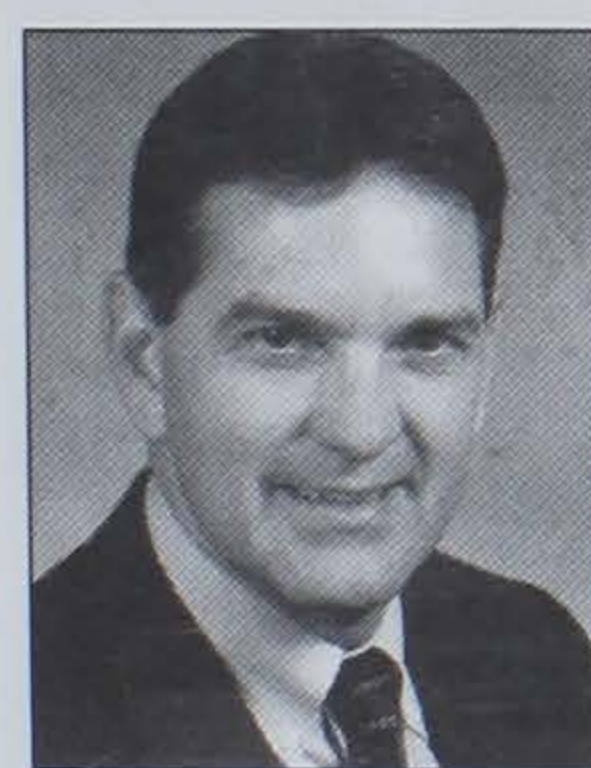
After graduating in 1955, he served two years in the army at Fort Knox, KY. In 1957, he started a nine-year sales career with ESSO. He returned to Clemson in 1967 as the first alumni field representative. He became an assistant athletic director for business and was later named Executive Secretary of IPTAY in 1977. Under his leadership, annual contributions doubled to more than 2.3 million and memberships increased from 9,800 to 15,000.

In 1979, he was named associate athletic director for financial development at Vanderbilt University. In 1986, he became athletic director at Furman and in 1989 was named Vice-President for Development at Nashville's Baptist Hospital. In 1984, he was named the National Athletic Fundraiser-of-the-Year.

His civic duties include serving as president of the Clemson Chamber of Commerce, president of the Sertoma Club, and serving on the Board of Governors of the Nashville Chamber of Commerce. In 2001, Bennett received the Order of the Palmetto, South Carolina's highest civilian honor.

He has been honored by Clemson as a member of the Athletic Hall of Fame and in 1986, he received the Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award. In 1999, Thurmon and Diane McLamb endowed his position in his honor and the David Wells Family created an endowment to honor his wife.

A native of Columbia, SC, he and his wife, Nancy, who has a master's degree from Clemson and was elected to Clemson City Council in 1996, have been married for 43 years. They enjoy activities with their two children, their spouses, and grandchildren, Jeff and Jodi Bennett, and Bonnie and David Dixon. Their grandchildren are sustaining Tiger Cubs - Megan 16, Bennett 12, Brooks 10, Augusta 9, Austin 6, Alex 3, and Cameron 2.



Bert Henderson

IPTAY Associate Executive Director

Bert Henderson's Clemson career began in 1978, as a trainer. His tenure has allowed him to become comfortable wrapping ankles or raising money for IPTAY, as well as being a part of Clemson's four national titles. His administrative stint began when he served as business manager and trainer for Bill Foster's basketball teams (1982-84). His duties included the team's travel arrangements and special needs. In 1984, he moved to Clemson's Alumni Center as a field agent. He set up visiting team headquarters and managed Clemson Alumni and Clemson Club meetings. He initiated the umbrella structure for which all alumni and athletic activities take place.

In 1985, Henderson rejoined the Tiger athletic department as IPTAY's first associate executive secretary. He headed up the athletic department's first-ever capital campaign and continues with the WestZone Project and future campaigns.

His duties currently include IPTAY's overall day-to-day activities. He provides leadership in life memberships, planned giving, real estate, and trust funds. He coordinates the **Orange & White**, serves as the advisor for IPTAY's student programs (Collegiate Club), and oversees the Tiger Cub and CATS programs. Bob Mahony

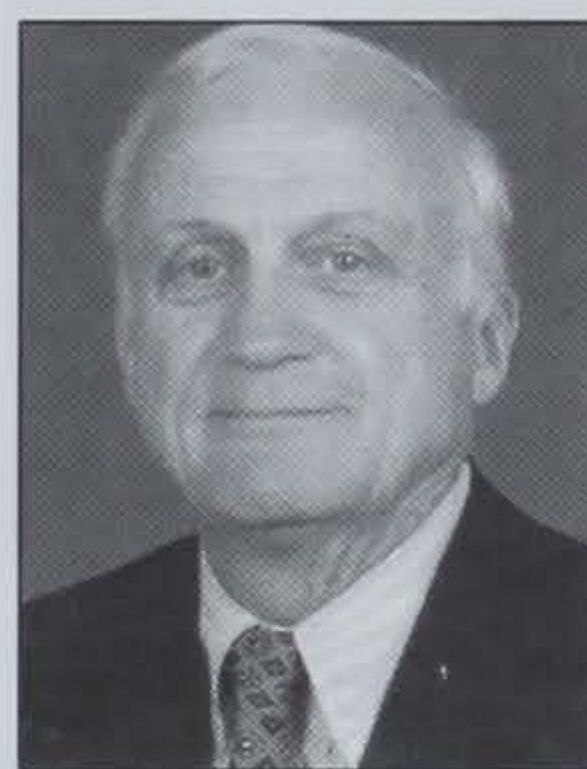
IPTAY Associate Executive Director

Charlie Bussey

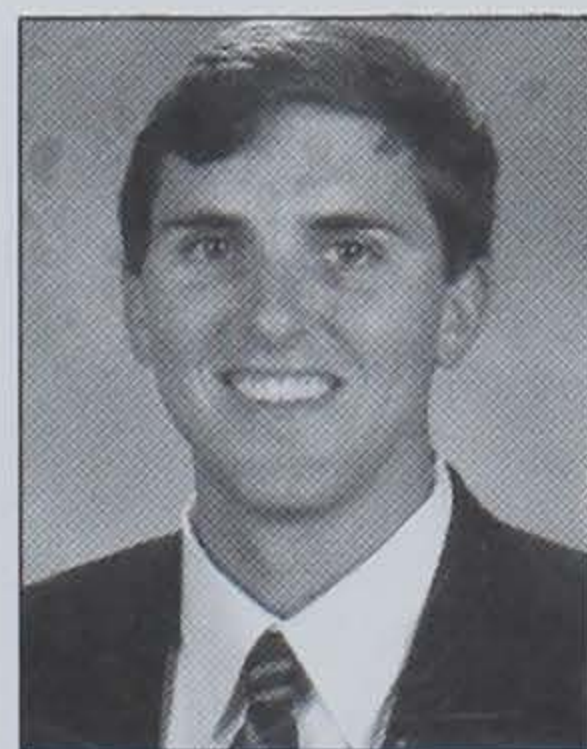
Tiger Lettermen's Association Coordinator

Charlie Bussey started his career at Clemson in 1953 under the legendary Frank Howard. He quarterbacked the 1957 Orange Bowl team and was Clemson's first Academic All-American. While at Clemson, he was a member of Tiger Brotherhood and Blue Key.

After graduation, he served in the Air Force as a pilot instructor, and his business career included positions with Laurens Glass, Louis Batson Company, and Palmetto Chemicals. He was also the athletic director at Louisiana Tech.

Bussey served Clemson in many varied areas, including President of IPTAY, President of the Tiger Lettermen's Association, and committee member of the Commission for the Future of Clemson. He is a member of the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame and serves on the board of directors of the Clemson Corps, a group whose mission is to preserve the military heritage of Clemson.

He was a recipient of the 2003 Alumni Distinguished Award. As coordinator of Tiger Lettermen's Association activities, he conducts reunions as well as the athletic Hall of Fame. Charlie and his wife, Joyce, have three daughters, Pam, Laurie, and Jennie, all Clemson graduates. Their grandchildren are all sustaining Tiger Cubs; Lauren, Ben, Jill, Meg, Blake, Hope, and Davis.



Brandt Gilbert

IPTAY Collegiate Club Coordinator

Brandt Gilbert serves as the Young Alumni and Collegiate Club Coordinator for IPTAY. Gilbert took over for Ellen Hepfer in June of 2002, but has been with IPTAY since 1996 as a student worker and graduate assistant. The IPTAY Collegiate Club is one of the largest student-booster clubs in the nation and the most visible organization on campus.

The native of Greenville, SC earned his degree in marketing from Clemson in 2000 and a master's degree in human resource development in 2002. He was involved with Tiger Brotherhood and the IPTAY Student Advisory Board.

Gilbert is married to the former Clay Heatly, a 2001 graduate of Clemson. His grandfather, Tom Salisbury, was a member of the 1948 Gator Bowl team, while his sister, Ashley, graduated from Clemson in 2001.

IPTAY is widely regarded as the father of athletic fundraising. The IPTAY Scholarship Fund traces its roots to the 1930s. Dr. Rupert Fike is credited with being the originator of IPTAY, but the seed that Dr. Fike needed for his now much-envied group was planted there by then Head Coach Jess Neely.

On October 16, 1931, Clemson suffered a surprising 6-0 loss against The Citadel in a game played in Florence, SC. After the game, Captain Frank J. Jervey, Head Coach Jess Neely, assistant coach Joe Davis and Captain Pete Heffner of the university military staff met in a car outside the stadium to discuss ways Clemson could help its football program get back on track. The meeting started the ball rolling towards the establishment of the IPTAY Foundation. Clemson would score just three touchdowns and win just one game during the 1931 season.

Soon Fike came into the picture through correspondence with Jervey. Jervey wanted to form the "50 (\$50) Club" but Fike wanted a smaller amount, which he thought, would mean more members and more money. Neely believed that if he could get \$10,000 a year, he could give the Clemson fans a winning football team.

Then in 1934, Dr. Fike wrote his now famous letter to Neely, stating "Last night we had a little meeting at our house and organized the IPTAY club." So began Clemson's athletic support group, which in those days, stood for "I Pay Ten A Year." At this time the purpose of IPTAY was "to provide annual financial support to the athletic department at Clemson, and to assist in every way possible to regain for Clemson the high athletic standing which rightfully belongs to her."

The organization was first established as a secret organization and initial membership dues were set at \$10 a year (I Pay Ten A Year). A little more than \$1,600 came into the coffers the first year of IPTAY, even in the heart of the Great Depression. Some payments were made in the form of barter. Milk, sweet potatoes, turnip greens and the like were accepted in the initial efforts to build membership.



The excitement about the organization carried over into the 1934 season and the Tigers ran to their first winning season since 1930. Clemson had gone 0-5-1 against Furman and South Carolina in those years, then defeated both teams in 1934. The fruits of the labor really began to pay off in 1938, said former Clemson publicist Joe Sherman. In 1938, Clemson went 8-1-1 and the following season, Neely coached Clemson to its first bowl game, the 1940 Cotton Bowl, where the Tigers capped a 9-1-0 season by beating Boston College and Hall of Fame Coach Frank Leahy 6-3. Clemson ended the season ranked #12 in the final **Associated Press** poll, its first top-20 season in history. Boston College was ranked #11 going into the contest and it was Clemson's first win over a top-20 team in school history.

With over 22,600 members in 2003 fiscal year, the organization plays a major role in ensuring that all 19 of the varsity sports at Clemson are given the maximum amount of scholarships offered by the NCAA. IPTAY donors have contributed over \$168 million since the inception of IPTAY, including over \$10.5 million in 2003 fiscal year.

While the basic principles of IPTAY outlined in 1934 remain the same, the scope of IPTAY has grown tremendously over the years. Not only does this unique organization provide for athletic scholarships, but IPTAY is a key toward building and maintaining the outstanding facilities that are essential for Clemson University to remain as one of the top intercollegiate athletic programs in the United States.

The 1983 construction of the upper deck on Memorial Stadium's north side and recent renovations were made possible by IPTAY.

In recent years, IPTAY has broadened its scope by building and renovating facilities that can be used by the entire Clemson University family - students, faculty, and administrators. In 1991, IPTAY funded the construction of a 27,000-square-foot facility to accommodate student-athletes' extended schedules and needs. When this facility, Vickery Hall, opened in 1991, it was the first support facility in the nation built solely for the all-around education of student-athletes. Even today, Vickery Hall and its programs are supported by funds from IPTAY.

The organization is also responsible for the installation of lights for the intramural athletic fields on campus, band uniforms and travel costs and a variety of other amenities enjoyed by students not on athletic scholarship. IPTAY provided funds for the hangar at the airport used for the university's planes.

Under the leadership of George Bennett, IPTAY kicked off the beginning of the endowment of positions program in April 1994 at the 85th birthday celebration for former Clemson head coach Frank Howard. The endowments are secure with a \$100,000 donation paid over a five-year period. The first endowment honored Howard, who coached at Clemson for 39 years, including 30 as head coach.

The first endowment was given by Bill Hudson, a 1956 graduate and three-year letterman at tackle who played professionally for the Montreal Alouettes, the San Diego Chargers, and the Boston Patriots. Hudson earned Pro Bowl honors in 1962 and went on to a successful career in the business world. Hudson helped start a new wave of support. In the first year of the endowment of positions program, four other football positions and a manager's position were made. Now there are more than 100 positions endowed.

The mission of Clemson University has not been overlooked by IPTAY either. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Endowment was created to help meet the need for more academic scholarships for non-athletes who are qualified academically. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Fund is presently the largest scholarship endowment of its kind at Clemson, helping more than 40 students.

IPTAY, under the guidance of its Board of Directors, is continuously making improvements and adding programs to enhance the organization and university. In recent years, some of the most impressive changes have been the addition of the Tiger Cub Club, IPTAY CATS (Clemson Active Teen Support), IPTAY Collegiate Club, and the Tiger Pride Campaign. It is now focused on the WestZone Club, the fundraising effort to greatly enhance Memorial Stadium's West Endzone, and the construction of a "One Clemson" museum, which will document the history of the university and its athletic program.

IPTAY is expecting even more growth in the coming years and its members track record of loyalty and generosity is well documented. Those loyalists include Alan Mac Johnstone of Orangeburg and Arthur Klugh, Jr. of Anderson, the only two of the 110 charter members that remain active. With their help and the help of many like them, it is no wonder IPTAY heads into year #70 as strong as ever.

This brief NCAA rules education is aimed at outlining basic recruiting rules to help potential students-athletes and parents better understand the process. Clemson University is committed to recruiting and conducting our athletic program with the highest level of integrity. If you have questions about NCAA rules, please contact compliance services at (864) 656-1580 or through our website at www.clemsonigers.com and click on compliance. You can also visit the NCAA's website at www.ncaa.org.

Important NCAA Terms

Academic Credentials - A prospect should check with his guidance office to see if he is taking classes that will meet NCAA eligibility standards. A prospect should do this early - at the end of his sophomore year - and keep track of core courses. A prospect will need to take either the ACT or SAT for NCAA certification.

Contact - NCAA rules define a contact as a face-to-face interaction with a prospect and/or his parents off Clemson's campus by a coach. The NCAA sets a contact period for football prospects from late November through the end of January. That is the only time coaches can meet with a prospect away from the Clemson campus.

Core Courses - Courses at a prospect's high school that are considered college preparatory. For the class entering Clemson in 2003-04, 13 core courses are required, including four in english, two in math, two in science, one additional from english, math, or science, two social sciences, and two additional courses. For the class entering Clemson in 2005, 14 core courses are required. English, math, science, and social studies will remain the same. However, a prospect will need to have three additional core courses. A prospect's guidance counselor will have a list of the school's core courses, or visit www.act.org/ncaa for more information.

Evaluation - In April of a prospect's junior year, coaches will come to a prospect's high school, and review his athletic and academic credentials with his high school coach. In the fall, they may watch a prospect compete one time, but they will not have any contact with the prospect.

Home Visit - During the contact period, a prospect may invite college coaches to his home to meet his parents, and to talk in detail about the football program and academic offerings at any college the prospect is considering.

Receiving Mail - When a prospect is in the ninth and 10th grades, NCAA rules allow Clemson to mail just a questionnaire and summer-camp brochure to a prospect. After September 1 of a prospect's junior year, Clemson coaches can provide a prospect with the following: write personalized letters, send a media guide and copies of newspaper articles, and a schedule card. A prospect can receive a football game program when he visits the Clemson University campus.

Recruiting - A term used to describe the process of acquainting a prospect with a college and the coaches of that college, who are striving to learn more about a prospect. Only coaches can recruit - no one else can try and persuade a prospect to play sports at a particular college.

Prospect - Any student who has entered the ninth grade. Once a person becomes a prospect, NCAA rules define how college coaches can interact with that prospect.

Telephone - Clemson football coaches can call a prospect once in May of the prospect's junior year. After September 1 of a prospect's senior year, a coach can call a prospect once a week. A prospect can expect unlimited calls during the contact period, before his official visit and once the prospect has signed a National Letter of Intent.

Frequently Asked Questions

• **Are a prospect's parents invited for an official visit?** Yes. NCAA rules allow a school to provide lodging and meals for parents or legal guardians who accompany their child on an official visit. NCAA rules do not allow schools to provide transportation for parents unless they drive with their son.

• **Can a prospect visit Clemson anytime during his high school career?** Yes.

A prospect can have his high school coach call Tiger coaches to set up an unofficial visit. He can attend a football game and talk with Tiger coaches, and it does not count as a contact when it is on Clemson's

campus. There are times a prospect cannot visit - NCAA rules refer to them as "dead periods," and coaches will not schedule to meet with a prospect during that time period.

• **Can IPTAY members help recruit me?** No. NCAA rules are clear; only Clemson coaches can telephone, contact, and evaluate a prospect. Only college coaches can offer unofficial and official visits.

• **Is the prospect's high school coach invited for an official visit?** NCAA rules are such that high school coaches may not be provided any expenses for official visits.

• **What is a National Letter of Intent (NLI)?** It is like a contract; a prospect and his parents sign a promise that the prospect will attend a particular college. In return, that college promises a prospect financial aid. A prospect signs it during his senior year (in February for football). Once the prospect signs it, he cannot be recruited by any other school, and it is binding for the prospect's first year in college. It's a binding commitment for the prospect and the school that offers it.

• **What is IPTAY?** IPTAY is an organization of Clemson fans. It generates financial support for the athletic department, and it is the best in the country! It has over 23,000 members.

• **What is an official visit?** After September 1 of a prospect's senior year, he can take five official visits, which are expense-paid. Before the visit, the prospect must present a high school transcript and proof of SAT, ACT, PACT, or PSAT test. Official visit invitations are extended by Tiger coaches only.

• **What is the NCAA Clearinghouse?** It is the agency that certifies a prospect's eligibility for NCAA Division I and Division II. A prospect should register with the NCAA Clearinghouse at the beginning of his senior year in high school. Applications are available in the prospect's guidance office. Cost is \$30.

Thomas Green Clemson believed that South Carolina needed an institution of higher education dedicated to science and agriculture. With his belief came the foundation that was laid for Clemson Agricultural College. On April 6, 1888, Thomas Clemson died, leaving most of his estate to the state of South Carolina with the purpose of establishing a college that would teach scientific agriculture and the mechanical arts to the young people of South Carolina.

The college formally opened its doors in 1893 with an enrollment of 446 students. As an all-male military school, the college quickly became recognized across the nation as an important part of the national system of state universities and land-grant colleges. In 1955, Clemson became a civilian co-educational college. As the school expanded its academic offerings and research pursuits, the state legislature renamed the college Clemson University in 1964.

Today, Clemson is much more than Thomas Clemson could have ever envisioned. The campus is located on 1,400 acres of beautiful rolling hills on what once was the plantation of former U.S. Vice-President John C. Calhoun. Landmarks such as Fort Hill, the former home of the Clemsons and the Calhouns, Tillman with its clocktower, the statue of Thomas Green Clemson, and the outdoor amphitheater all help retain the air of tradition.

The Clemson Education

- **U.S. News & World Report** ranked Clemson the leading national university in South Carolina and 39th among the nation's top public universities. The university's goal is to be one of the top-20 public universities in the nation.
- Clemson features a diverse curriculum, there are 84 undergraduate degree programs and 65 graduate degrees.
- Average class size is 31 students.
- Clemson's five different colleges include: Agriculture, Forestry, and Life Sciences; Architecture, Arts, and Humanities; Business and Behavioral Science; Engineering and Science; and Health, Education, and Human Development.
- The Calhoun Honors College strives to enrich the educational experience of highly motivated, academically talented students by providing opportunities for scholarship and research not ordinarily available to undergraduates. Established in 1962, Calhoun College is the oldest honors program in South Carolina.
- Clemson University is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award the bachelor's, master's, specialist, and doctoral degrees.
- Clemson was one of the two South Carolina institutions to be selected for inclusion in America's 100 Best College Buys, 2001-02.
- **Kiplinger's Magazine** ranks Clemson #20 in its roundup of institutions providing a top-quality education at reasonable prices. The editor also picked Clemson as one of the top public institutions pro-



viding the best education dollar for dollar.

- The finance department is among the best in the nation and is listed ahead of such schools as Yale and Penn State according to **Journal of Finance**.
- The management department is ranked among the top 10 in the nation by Decisions Sciences Institute in research productivity in production and operations management.
- Our department of parks, recreation, and tourism management ranks among the top three of its kind in the nation.
- Clemson's six-year graduation rate is 69 percent, 20 points higher than the national average for public universities.
- The Program for Educational Enrichment and Retention (PEER) helped bring Clemson's graduation rate of African American engineering students to the highest in the nation among predominantly white schools.
- Clemson's College of Engineering and Science grants more than two-thirds of all engineering degrees in South Carolina and enrolls nearly 75 percent of the state's engineering students.

The Clemson Experience

- Whether its walking to the Hendrix Center to have a milkshake, or taking a stroll through the State's Botanical Gardens, or even taking part in a pickup basketball game at Fike Recreation Center, there are plenty of activities for Clemson students when they are not in the classroom.
- Clemson has more than 230 student organizations active on campus, including 23 social fraternities and 14 social sororities. There are organizations related to every course of study, groups such as the Accounting Club and the American Institute of Architects. For students who enjoy writing or photography, **The Tiger**, the campus newspaper, TAPS, the university yearbook, and the Chronicle,

the student variety magazine, are available.

- Located in the University Union are the offices of the student government. Student government gives students the opportunity to influence campus policy.
- Fike Recreation Center, which just completed a renovation and expansion project, has a host of opportunities for students to let off steam through physical activity. Inside Fike is an eight-lane swimming pool, a diving tank, two gyms used for basketball and other activities, various weight lifting facilities, and room for aerobics. Outside Fike are

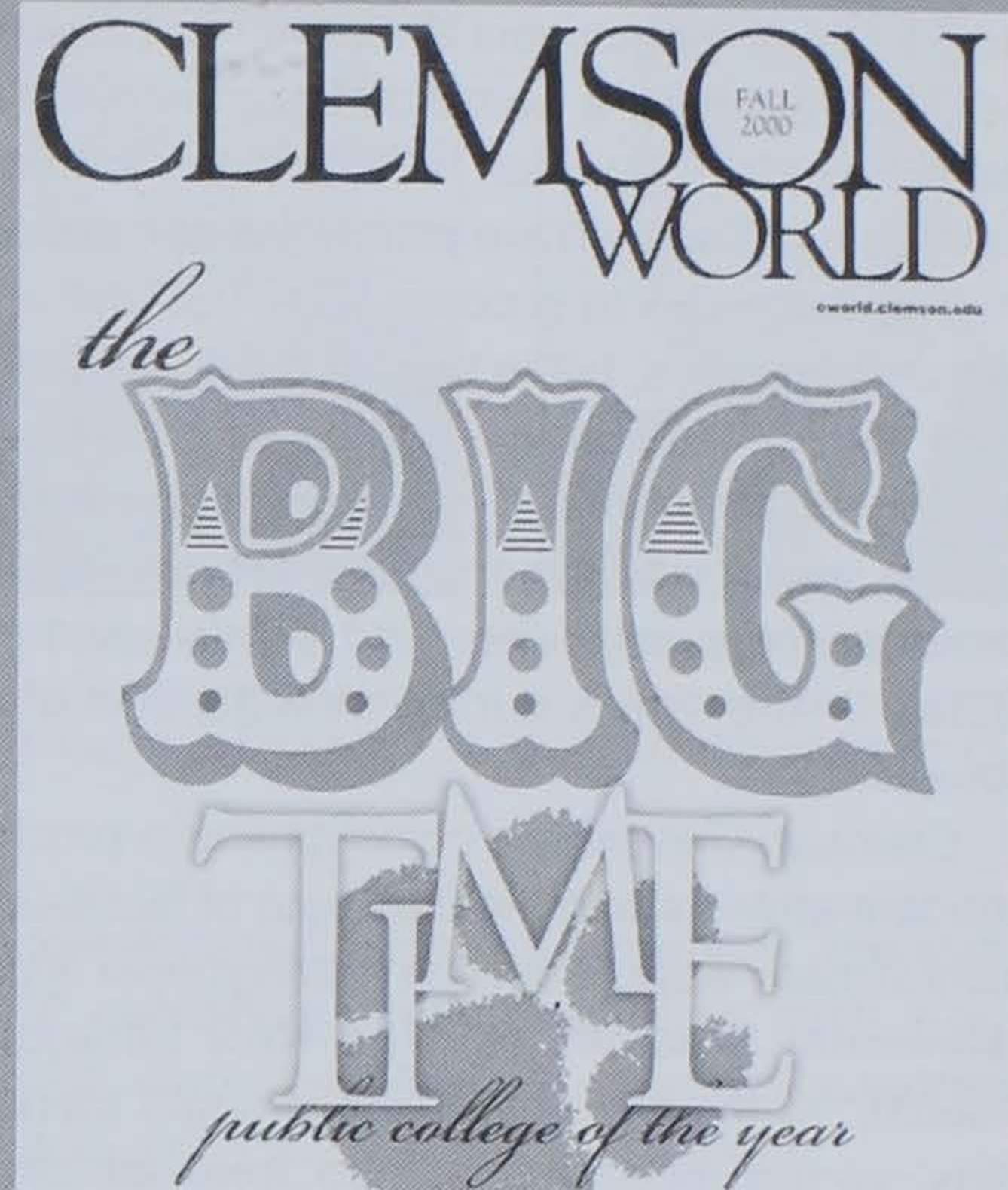
The Clemson Facilities

- Opened in January 2000, the Hendrix Student Center is a 108,000 square-foot facility in the heart of Clemson's campus that contains a convenience store, food court, movie theatre, hair salon, coffee shop, copy shop, and telecommunications center. The center has 15,000 square feet of meeting rooms and a 2,600 square-foot student lounge. The student center also is the home of the Office of Career Services and Placement, the multicultural affairs department, the student bookstore, the student media and the University Union.
- The main University library, Robert Muldrow Cooper Library, is situated in the center of campus. The library has become one of the national leaders in automated information retrieval. Its bibliographic records are accessible from anywhere in the world, easing the task of finding information in its collections, which total more than 1.7 million items. Numerous periodical indexes are housed online and available for automated searching. The collections are particularly strong in agriculture, natural and physical sciences, economics, and technology. Of special interest are the James F. Brynes and Edgar A. Brown Rooms, which have the collections of papers of these statesmen.
- A cornerstone of the University is its computer facilities. Clemson's computer center, which supports student course work and research in all disciplines, is also used by government and industry. The center provides general computing services on a network. Remote sites housing more than 1,600 terminals and 600 microcomputers are conveniently located in many different areas of campus. International and national telephone modem access is also available. **Yahoo! Internet Life** ranks Clemson as one of the nation's 50 most-wired campuses.

- All students are assigned a user identification code when they enroll, which allows them to use the various mainframe applications such as electronic mail, job placement service, library card catalog and information databases, and housing and course registration.
- The \$12.5-million Robert Howell Brooks Center for the Performing Arts opened in 1996. The facility brings an exciting array of fine arts productions to the University, while working to make the arts accessible to a new and larger audience.
- The Joseph F. Sullivan Center is one of only 75 nurse-managed, academic-based nursing centers in the nation. This center also earned the Provider Facility-of-the-Year Award by the S.C. Best Chance network for commitment to women's health programs.
- The Office of Career Services and Placement can help with planning and finding summer and full-time employment. The office assists in career counseling and planning, searching for a job, preparing resumés, and developing job interview strategies. Resources include staff expertise, books, videotapes, and literature provided by companies and agencies. Clemson has developed one of the best automated placement systems in the country, allowing students to research employers and sign up for interviews from any mainframe computer terminals on campus.

The Clemson Faculty

- Clemson's student-to-faculty ratio of 15-to-1 gives the faculty the opportunity to interact with many of their students on a one-to-one basis. Critical thinking, problem solving, creative learning, and self-development are just a few of the things emphasized in the Clemson classroom.
- The Clemson faculty includes 33 Fulbright Scholars and 59 endowed chairs, named professorships, and alumni professorships.
- Faculty members at Clemson come from a wide range of backgrounds. Over 500 institutions of higher learning that promote excellence in teaching, research, and scholarship are represented among the Clemson faculty.

- Over 85 percent hold earned doctoral degrees, the highest degree in their field, and many have achieved special academic recognition. Many have been honored by colleagues and students as master teachers for their excellence in the classroom and by Outstanding Educators of America.
- Clemson is among the top-25 universities in the nation in generated revenue from patents and intellectual properties according to the **Wall Street Journal/Southeast Journal**.

The Clemson Student

- In 2000, **Time Magazine** ranked Clemson its "Public College-of-the-Year."
- Almost 57 percent of last year's entering freshmen participated in the Advanced Placement program with more than 61 percent receiving credit for one or more courses.
- Clemson features a competitive student body, and thus a degree that has meaning. Clemson's 2002-03 entering freshman class achieved an average SAT score of 1205. This score is the highest ever attained by Clemson's entering students and once again leads the state's public colleges and universities.
- Since 1993, honors students have accounted for more than 10 percent of Clemson's freshmen class and 45 percent of incoming freshmen graduated in the top-10 percent of their high school class.
- Clemson has a mentoring program to help students prepare and compete for Rhodes, Truman, Marshall, and Fulbright Scholarships.
- Clemson's total enrollment of 16,876 represents 50 states and 95 foreign countries.
- More than 450 employers interview Clemson students on campus each year through the University's Career Center.
- The Clemson family includes a mentoring and support network of over 80,000 alumni worldwide.

Since its inception in 1991, the five-faceted Student-Athlete Enrichment Program has provided its student-athletes a continued commitment to excellence. Our approach is to address the total student-athlete, and we are committed to coaching our student-athletes to success (C.A.T.S.) not only in the athletic arena, but in the academic, personal growth, career, and service arenas as well. As an original member of the NCAA Life Skills/CHAMPS Program, we provide opportunities and services to address the changing needs and skills of student-athletes in the years during college and after graduation.

Clemson University's commitment to provide its student-athletes with the very best of facilities is evident in many ways. From the soaring upper decks of Memorial Stadium, to "The New Littlejohn Coliseum," to the state-of-the-art strength training facility, young men and women from all 19 of Clemson's varsity sports have the very best in facilities for training and competition.

Vickery Hall is no exception, as the \$3-million structure is as impressive aesthetically as any of the other facilities. But the importance of Vickery Hall to the Clemson University Athletic Department is not found in the structure itself, but in the many programs that the building houses.

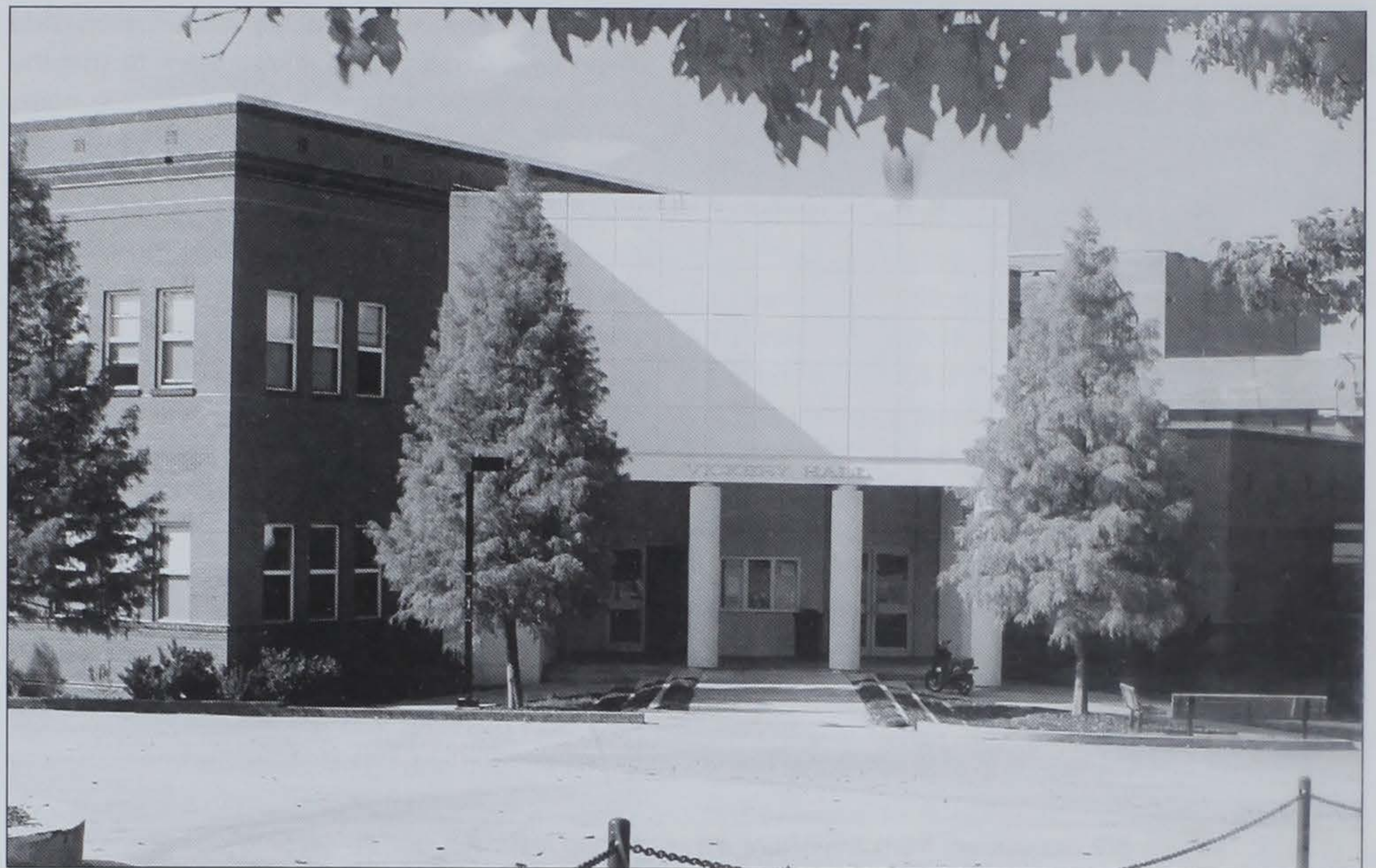
Vickery Hall opened in the spring of 1991 and was the first facility in the nation built solely for the all-around academic support of student-athletes. The two-story, 27,000 square-foot building is open all day and into the evening to accommodate the student-athletes' extended schedules.

The mission of the Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs is to monitor, guide, and encourage student-athletes to fulfill their long-term goals, and to achieve their academic and career potential.

Vickery Hall focuses on five primary areas to meet the student-athlete's needs.

Academic Commitment

A record eight Clemson athletic teams earned over a 3.0 GPA for the spring semester of 2003. A

record 231 student-athletes were named to the Academic Honor Roll for the semester. Student-athletes had a combined GPA of 2.84, second highest for a semester on record behind a 2.85 mark set in the spring of 2002. At least 200 student-athletes have made the Academic Honor Roll in eight straight semesters.

Thirty-six student-athletes had a perfect 4.0 for the semester, one short of the semester record of 37 set in the spring of 2002. A total of 101 student-athletes were on the dean's list, the fourth-straight semester the 100 mark had been exceeded.

These outstanding statistics have been a habit in recent years. The cumulative GPA of the athletic teams has improved 18 of the last 24 semesters, making a steady rise from 2.33 to 2.84 over the last 12 years.

Forty-eight student athletes went through graduation exercises last May. Fifteen times in the last five years a Clemson student-athlete has been named to a Verizon Academic All-America team, more than any other five-year period in Clemson history.

One of the most prestigious programs that has received recognition essential to the growth of Vickery Hall is the tutorial program. Of 450 tutoring programs certified by CRLA, the Clemson Student-Athlete Enrichment Program was one of the first three student-athlete programs in the country to be granted all three levels of certification from the College of Reading and Learning Association, International Tutor Certification Program. The program was also honored with the National Champs Skills Excellence Award in 1999, one of only six schools across the country to be honored.

Having tutor certification allows student-athletes to be provided the highest quality of academic assistance possible. Approximately 80 tutors are hired to provide academic support in the many subject areas offered.

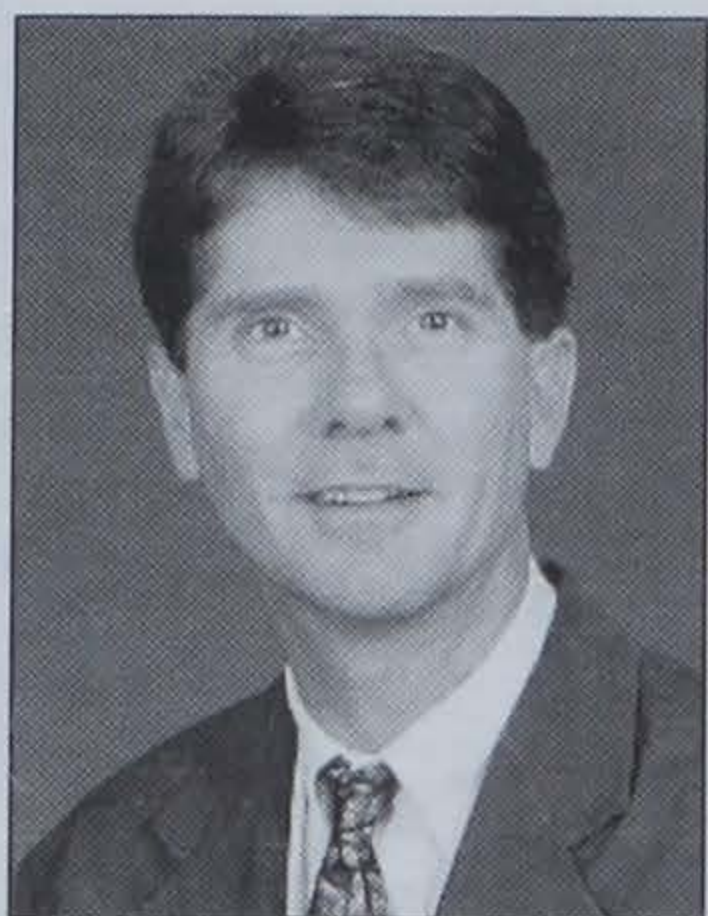
Many postgraduate scholarships and internships are also available to student-athletes continuing their education through postgraduate studies. Our student-athletes are provided timely information regarding these opportunities and the resources necessary to assist in the application process for either scholarships or internships.

The Department of Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs has recognized the need for students to have access to high-quality computing equipment and has made a commitment to provide the student-athletes at Clemson with one of the largest computer labs in the country.

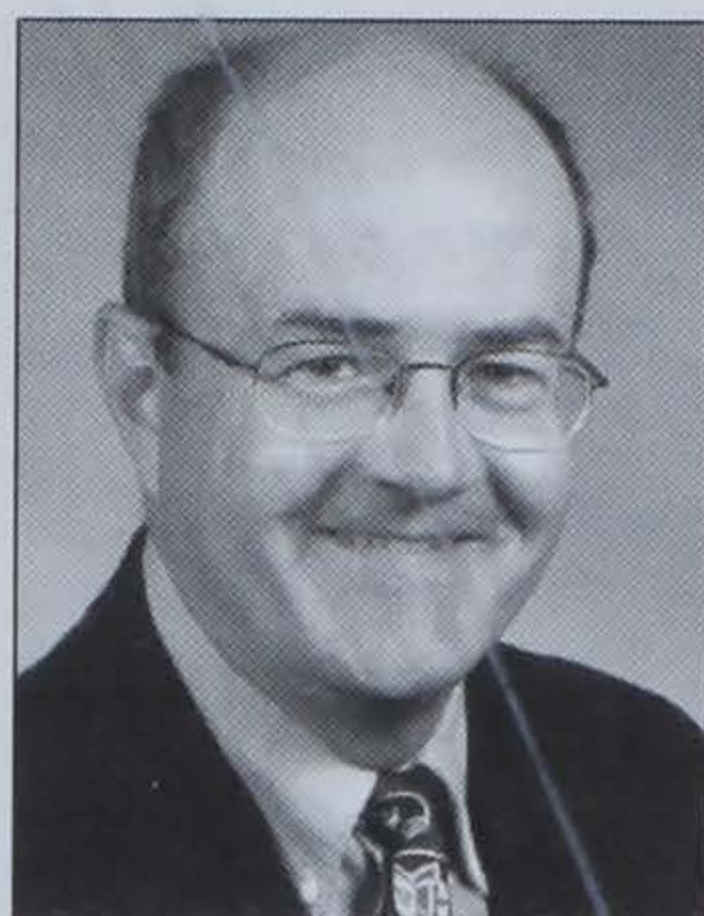

which allows students in the building with laptop computers to access the campus mainframe without physically plugging into the system.

The lab staff has a full-time computer manager, and also graduate students, many of whom are pursuing advanced degrees in computer science. Lab staff members are available for tutoring of any Computer Science course, as well as the many management, engineering, and business courses that deal with personal computers.

The Department of Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs is committed to providing state-of-the-art computing facilities. New computers have recently been purchased bringing the lab to a state of the art facility. More than 50 computers are available for student-athletes.

All computers are fully connected to the internet allowing for access of computers throughout the world for research and communication.

Athletic Commitment

Clemson had another strong year in 2002-03. Leading the way was the Clemson golf team that won the school's fourth national championship, the first ever for the Tiger golf program. Larry Penley's team was ranked #1 in the nation in every poll and became the first college golf program in history to win its conference, NCAA Regional, and National Championship in the same year. Penley was also named national coach-of-the-year.

The success started in the fall when both soccer programs advanced to the NCAA Tournament and ranked in the final top 25. The men's team reached the elite eight of the NCAA Tournament and defeated a top-ranked Wake Forest team along the way, the sixth time Clemson has upset the #1 team in the nation on the pitch.

The success continued into the spring. In addition to the exploits of the golf team, both tennis teams advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament and the baseball team was selected for the NCAA Tournament for the 17th-straight year.

Career Development Commitment

The Career Assistance Program provides student-athletes an opportunity to fulfill career aspirations by participating in various career seminars offered by the Vickery Hall staff. The philosophy of this program is to provide student-athletes with job-searching skills and strategies, internships, practical experience, and summer employment. These programs are designed to

address specific career opportunities and acquire information about the student-athletes for each year.

By using the resources available to the University, Alumni Center, and the Athletic Department, the staff is working to establish a network of businesses, companies, and executives who will help assist with the Summer Employment Assistance Program. The program's main goal is to provide the student-athletes with job experience and a work history, which he or she can apply to his or her academic discipline.

The Career Assistance Program is coordinated from the academic colleges, the Placement Center, and through the Athletic Department contacts. This program is designed to better prepare the student-athlete for full-time employment and focuses on resume writing and interview techniques.

The SAEP career assistance program has a full-time career counselor housed in Vickery Hall. Unique to our program, the career counselor is a member of the Michelin Career Center staff as well as the Student-Athlete Enrichment staff. This link between athletics and the Michelin Career Center provides student athletes the most up-to-date information and resources in career development and preparation for entrance into the job market upon graduation.

Personal Development Commitment

One of the most important programs that helps student-athletes reach their full potential and engage successfully in this college experience is the Personal Growth and Development Program.

One of the key components of this program is the first-semester freshman transition class designed to assist the student-athlete in making a successful transition into his/her university and athletic life.

All first-semester freshmen attend a semester-long series of workshops targeting the transitional issues of time management, organizational strategies, health and wellness issues, athletic issues, diversity issues, career orientation, and service training. Throughout the academic year, all student-athletes are required to attend four large-group programs, which focus on pertinent social, health, and athletic issues.

Service Commitment

Providing community and outreach service to student-athletes and the surrounding community by engaging the student-athletes in hands-on interactive programs is an important aspect of the

Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs. The staff of SAEP coordinates various activities each year to engage student-athletes in community outreach projects along with academic programs.

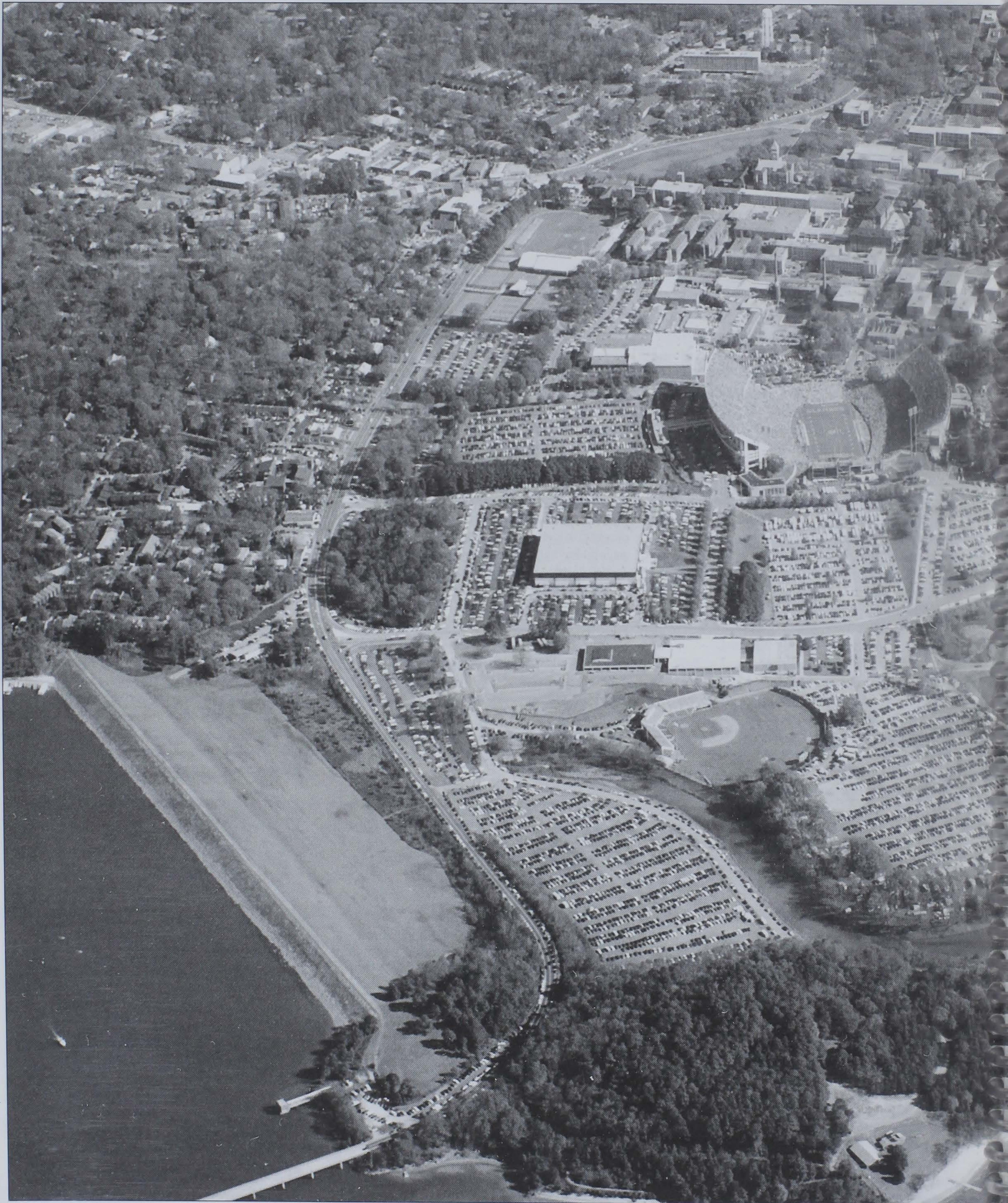
Another aspect of the service commitment is that of community service. The purpose of community service is to allow the student-athletes to become involved with the happenings of the community while giving back at the same time. Each year, every team is required to perform at least two community outreach projects. Recently implemented was a new community service program entitled "Success Away From the Game."

The purpose of this program is to combine athletes of different sports in community outreach programs. By doing this, each outreach program participates, thus creating a diverse group of athletes with new and different ideas. At the end of each year, six student-athletes who have demonstrated outstanding commitment and contributions to the community are recognized as the Top Six by the ACC.

To assist our student-athletes in becoming effective service leaders and communicators, we provide service and speaking training, which anticipates the demands placed on a student-athlete when he/she might be speaking with a group of young people with members of the media.

The signs on the side of the highway as you enter Clemson say "Clemson: In Season Every Season." From the point of view of most Clemson graduates, the seasons this slogan speaks of are football, basketball, baseball, etc. But a drive through town in the middle of spring, when the azaleas and dogwoods are in full bloom, or a walk through campus in October, when the trees are blazing in the brilliant colors of autumn, will leave little doubt that Clemson is indeed in season, every season.

Nestled in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains and caressed by the shores of the beautiful Lake Hartwell, Clemson is located in the northwestern corner of South Carolina, two hours northeast of Atlanta, GA and two hours southwest of Charlotte, NC. The town may not be one of the state's largest most days, but on many autumn Saturdays, it becomes one of the largest cities, as over 81,000 fans come from all directions to watch the Tigers play football; but the friendly residents of Clemson and the surrounding towns welcome the visitors home each year with a true dose of southern hospitality.

Clemson is steeped in history. The University campus is located on what was Fort Hill Plantation, home of John C. Calhoun, one of the great statesmen of the 19th century, and his son-in-law, Thomas Green Clemson. The house, which was built in 1806, stands in the center of campus and is open to the public. Also on the Clemson campus is a 1716 Lowcountry French Huguenot home (Hanover House), which was transported to Clemson in 1941. Just a mile or so down the road, is the Pendleton Historic District, where several other antebellum homes are open to the public. The entire village of Pendleton is on the National Register of Historic Places.

The area boasts a great variety of restaurants, ranging from the downtown barbecue and hamburger spots, to the historic Liberty Hall Inn and Calhoun Corners. Any palate or budget can find something to his or her liking, as more than 50 eating establishments are located in the Clemson/Pendleton/Central area. The area adopts "Clemson Fever," as Tiger Paws are omnipresent on local billboards and entrances.

The mild climate of the foothills lends itself to many outdoor activities throughout the year. Clemson has excellent and ample facilities for tennis, golf, fishing, swimming, hiking, white-water rafting, and various other pursuits.

And when one wants to leave the area, they do not have far to go to find whatever they are looking for. Pro sports are only a couple of hours away in Atlanta and Charlotte. Clemson was the home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers for eight regular-season and two exhibition games in 1995.

For sun and fun, it's an easy interstate drive to the coast of South Carolina, to Hilton Head Island, Myrtle Beach, or even historic Charleston. And for those who enjoy cooler climates, the mountains of North Carolina are only an hour's drive away.

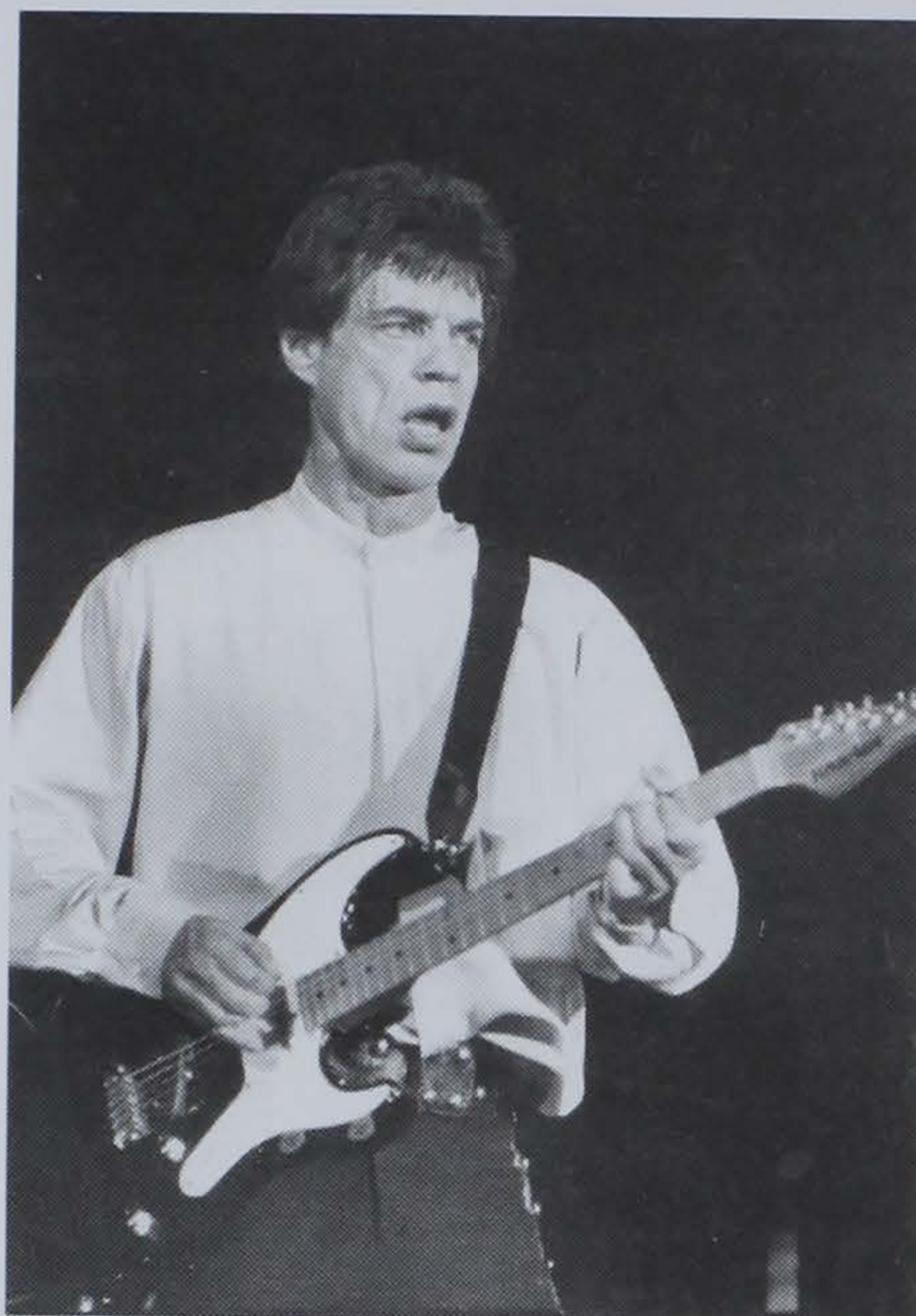

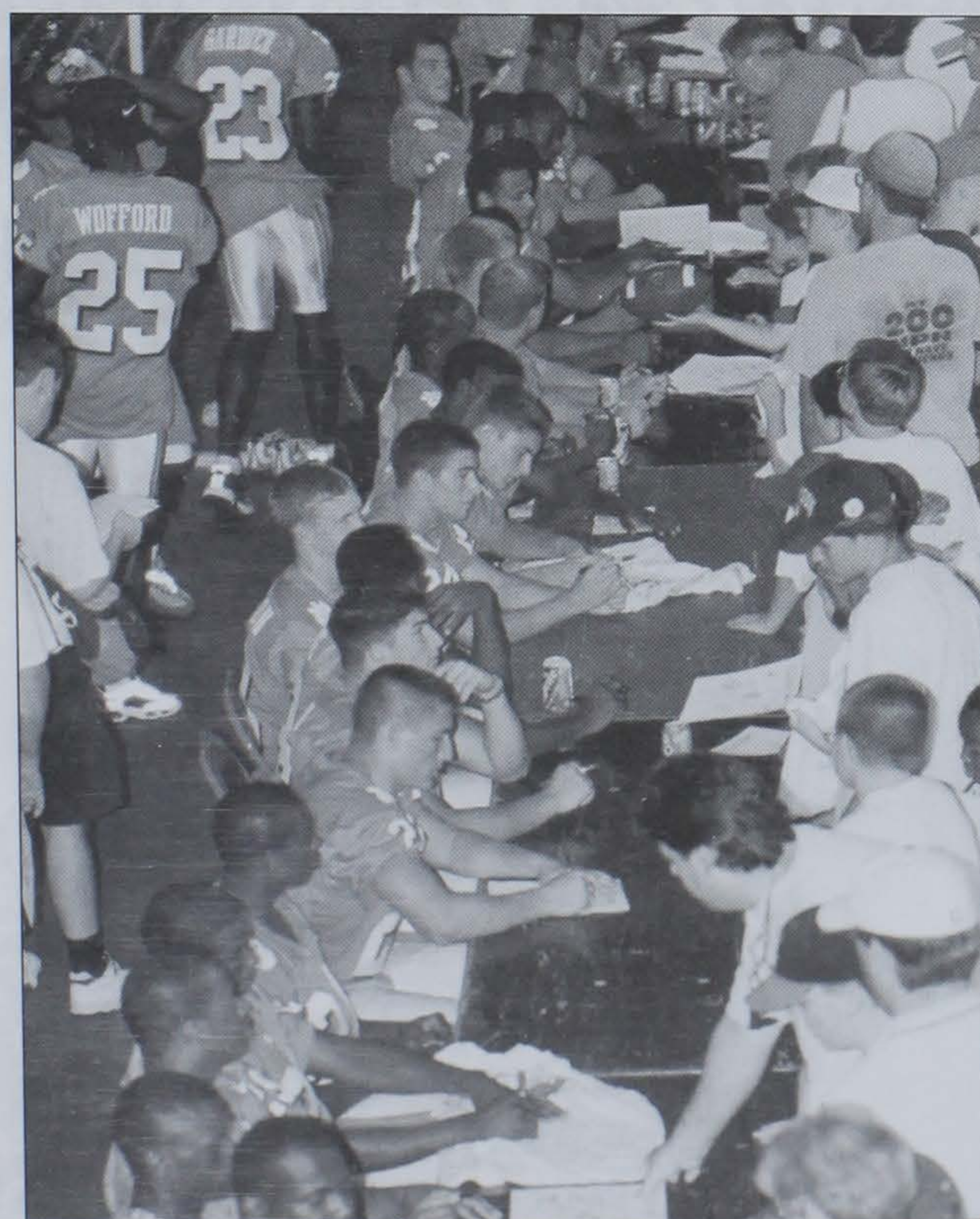
Homecoming & Tigerama

First Friday Parade

The Clemson football season kicks off each year with the First Friday Parade. The once-a-year event takes place on the Friday afternoon prior to the first home game (August 29 this year). Floats from various fraternities, sororities, and other campus organizations are represented in the parade that rolls down highway 93 in front of the President's Home in Clemson.



Tiger Paws Everywhere

The Tiger Paw is Clemson's distinctive logo. The Paw is on all highways leading to the Clemson campus. A popular activity on gameday is to paint the Paw on the cheeks of all Clemson fans. Members of Central Spirit provide that service at the stadium on gameday.

Tiger Band

Tiger Band has been at the focal point of all color and pageantry associated with Clemson football for over 80 years. Tiger Band attends all games, home and away, and significantly enhances the spirit of a Clemson football weekend.

Tiger Mascot

Since 1954, a Clemson student has adorned the mascot suit to entertain the Tiger faithful. The Tiger gets into all kinds of mischief during the game, but is most famous for its pushups. The Tiger does pushups that equal Clemson's point total after every score.

Head Coach Tommy Bowden's teams have set numerous scoring records, keeping the mascot near a state of exhaustion.



What has been described as, "the most exciting 25 seconds in college football from a color and pageantry standpoint," actually started out as a matter-of-fact entrance, mainly because of necessity.

The first 20,000 seats in Memorial Stadium were built and ready for use before the 1942 season. Less than a year before Pearl Harbor was bombed and the United States was at war.

The shortest entry into the stadium was a short walk down Williamson Road from Fike Fieldhouse's dressing rooms to a gate at the top of the Hill, which is located behind the east endzone. There were no dressing facilities in the west end zone - there was only a big clock where the hands turned and a scoreboard, which was operated by hand.

The team would dress at Fike, walk down Williamson Road, come in the gate underneath where the big scoreboard now stands and jog down the hill for its warm-up exercises. There was no fanfare, no cannon shot fired, no Tiger Paw flag, no Tiger Rag played...just the team making its entrance and lining up to do the side-straddle hop.

That's pretty much the way things went for the next 25 years.

Either in 1964 or 1965, S.C. Jones, a member of the class of 1919, made a trip to California. He stopped at a spot in Death Valley, CA, and picked up this white flint rock. He presented it to Coach Frank Howard as being from Death Valley, CA, to Death Valley, South Carolina."

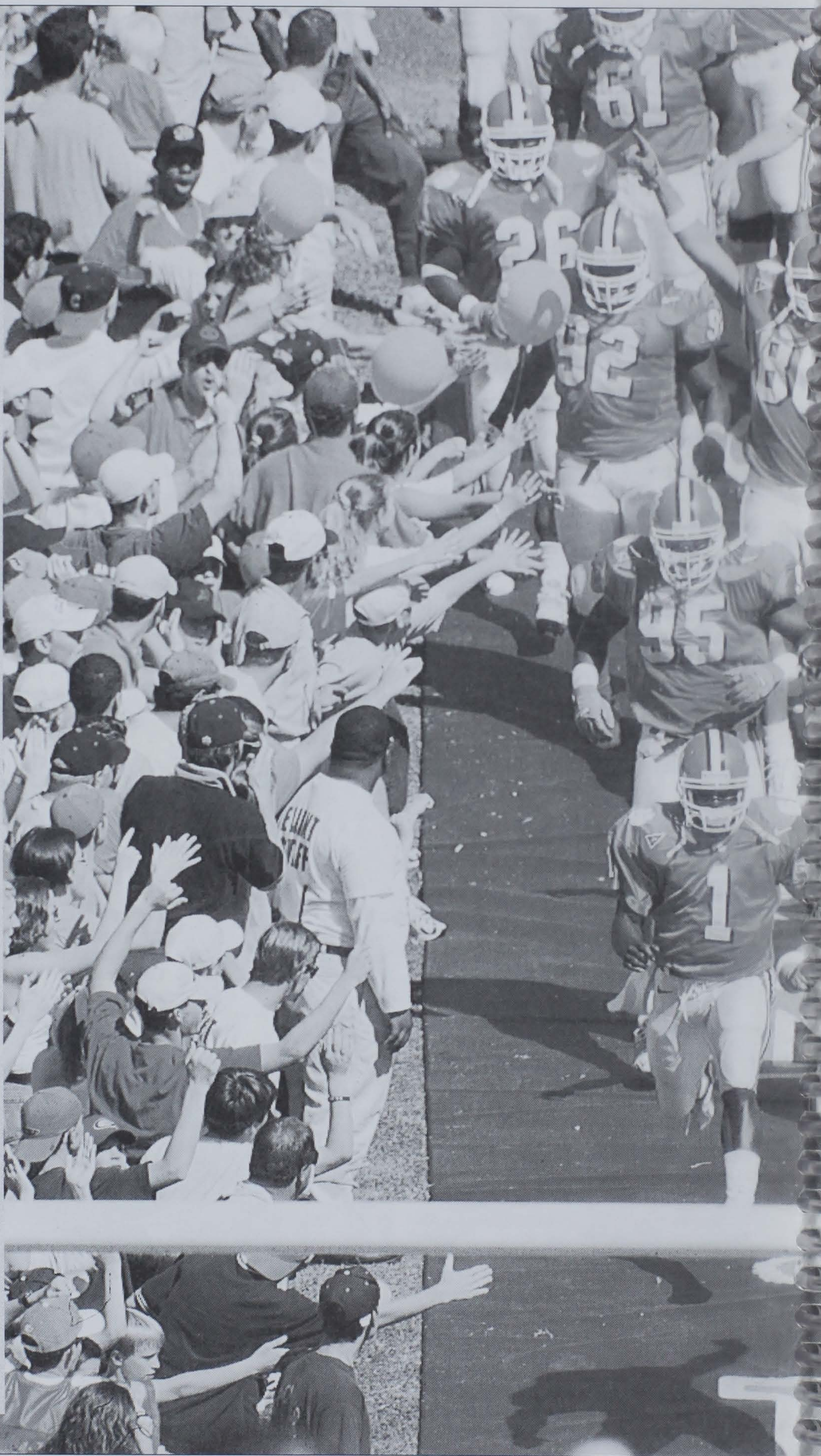
The rock laid on the floor in Howard's office in Fike for years. One day, he was cleaning up his office and he told Gene Willimon, who was executive secretary of IPTAY, to "take this rock and throw it over the fence, or out in the ditch...do something with it, but get it out of my office!"

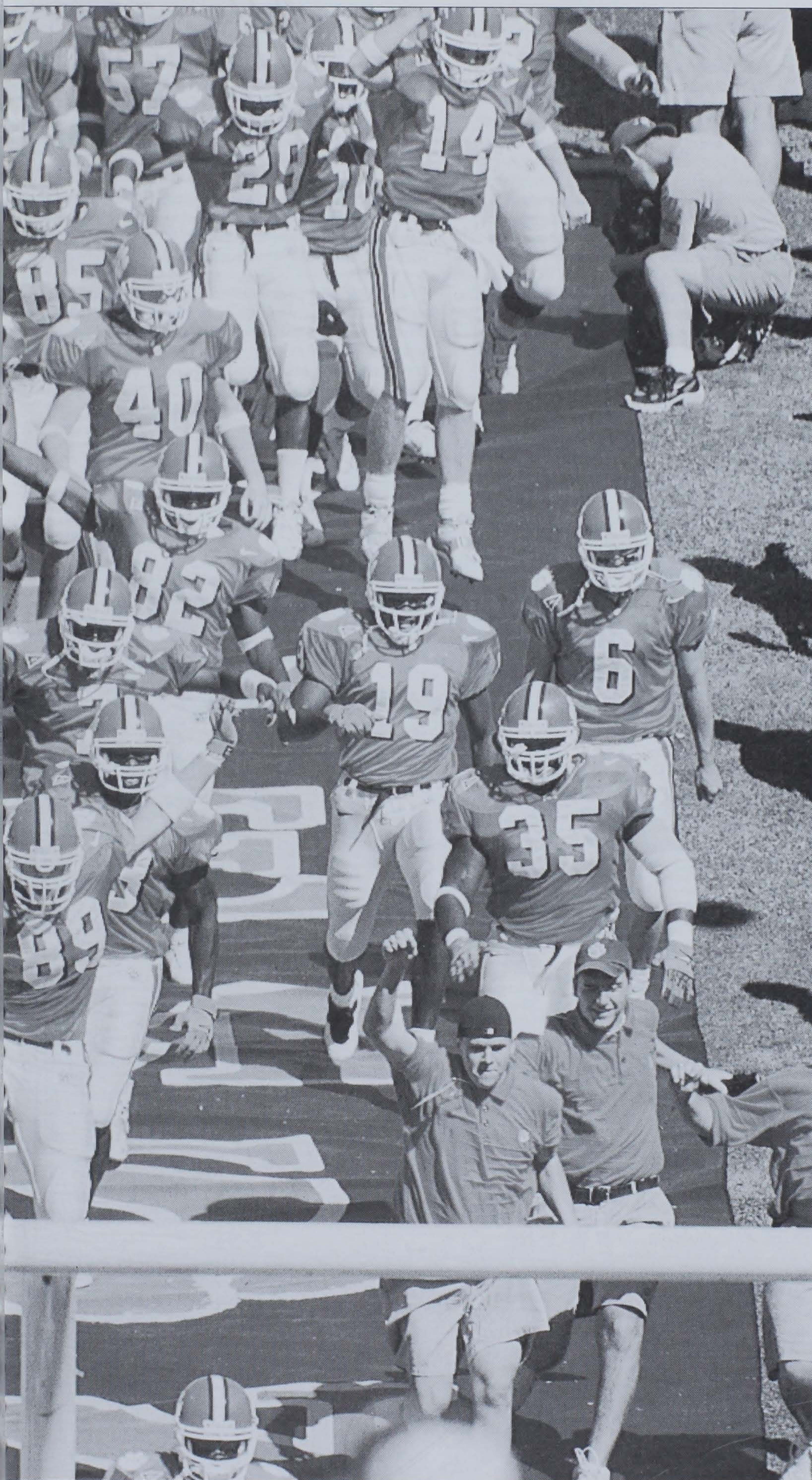
Willimon didn't think that was the way a rock should be treated. After all, it had been brought 3000 miles by a very sincere Tiger fan.

By the mid-sixties, Memorial Stadium was pretty well living up to its moniker, Death Valley, because of the number of victories that had been recorded there. Actually, the name was first used by the late Lonnie McMillian, head coach at Presbyterian College in Clinton in the 1940s.

McMillian and the other Blue Hose coaches before him used to open the season each year by coming to Clemson. Seldom scoring (24 shut-outs in 39 games) and with only three wins and four ties to show for it, his teams were getting killed by the Tigers regularly. In 1948, McMillian made the comment to the press that he was taking his team to play Clemson in Death Valley.

An occasional reference to Memorial stadium by that name could be heard for the next three or four years, but when Howard started calling it "Death Valley" in the 1950s, the name took off like wildfire. The Tigers celebrated the 50th season in the "Valley" in 1991.





But getting back to Howard's rock.

The rock was mounted on a pedestal at the top of the hill. It was unveiled September 24, 1966, on a day when Clemson played Virginia. The Tigers were down 18 points with 17 minutes to play and came back to win (40-35) on a 65-yard pass play from Jimmy Addison to Jacky Jackson in the fourth period. That was quite a spectacular debut for that rock.

The team members started rubbing the rock prior to running down the hill September 23, 1967, a day when Clemson defeated Wake Forest, 23-6. Prior to running down the hill that day, Howard told his players: "If you're going to give me 110 percent, you can rub that rock. If you're not, keep your filthy hands off it." Howard told of the incident the next day on his Sunday television show and the story became legend.

When Hootie Ingram succeeded Howard as head coach prior to the 1970 season, Ingram decided that the team would make its final entrance on the field out of the dressing room in the west end zone. In all home games in 1970 and 1971 and the first four of 1972 when the Tigers did not run down the hill, their record was 6-9. The team decided it wanted to come down the hill once prior to the South Carolina game in 1972. The result, in a cold, freezing rain, was a 7-6 victory when Jimmy Williamson knocked down a two-point conversion attempt which preserved the win.

The Tigers have made the entrance for every home game since 1942, except for the seasons mentioned above - 293 times heading into the 2003 season.

After Clemson's final warm-up, the team goes back into its dressing room under the west end zone stands for final game instructions. About 10 minutes before kickoff the team boards two buses, rides around behind the north stands to the east end zone and debarks to the top of the hill behind Howard's Rock.

At the appointed time, the cannon booms and led by a high-flying Tiger Paw flag, the band forms two lines for the team to run between and strikes up "Tiger Rag"...the frenzy starts in all sincerity and usually lasts for three hours.

It is a tradition that has inspired Clemson players for many years.

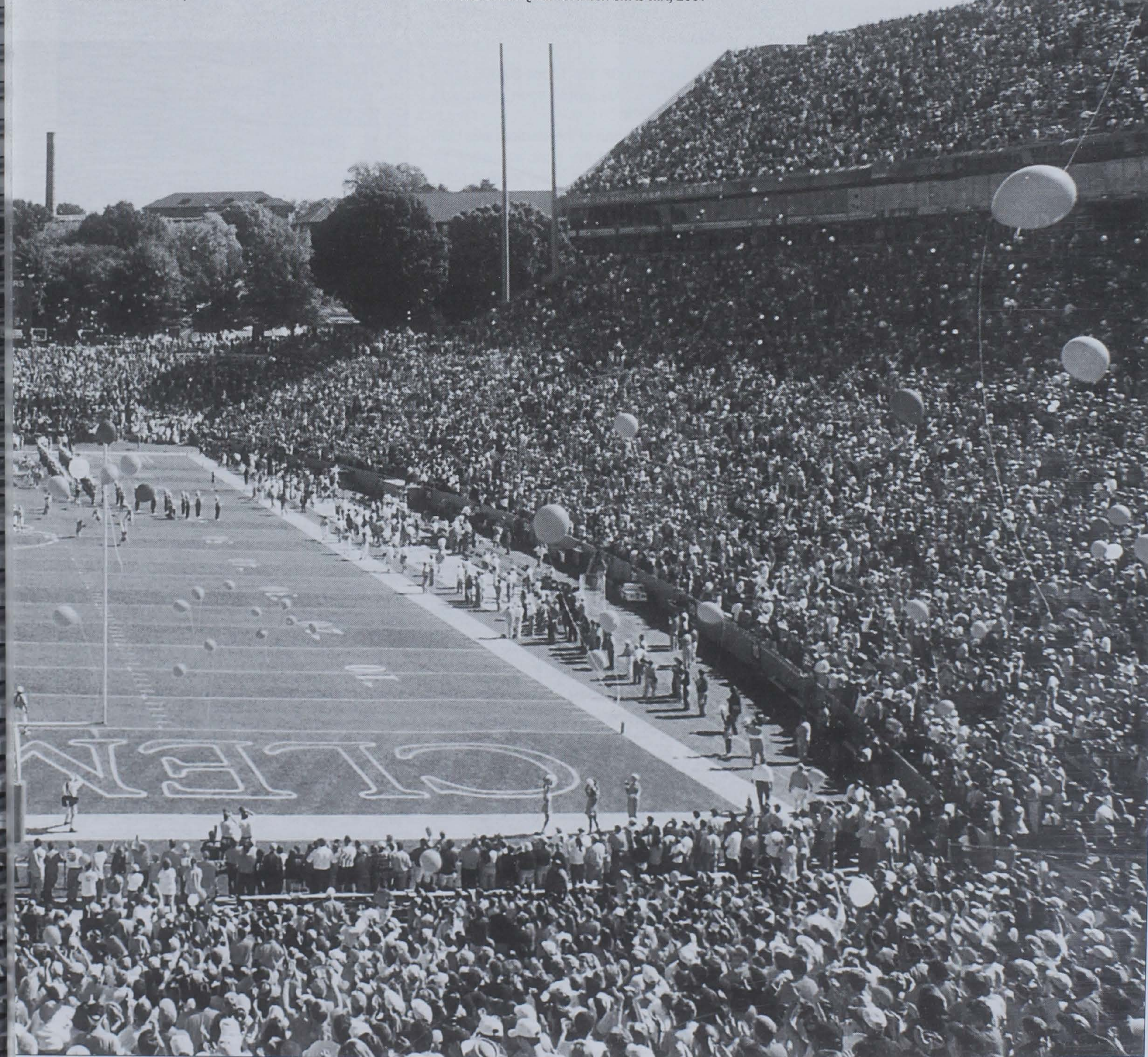

Clemson Memorial Stadium has been held in high esteem for many years. Whether it be players from the 1940s and 1950s, opposing players from the 1970s and 1980s, or even professional players in the 1990s, the ambiance of this special setting is what college football is all about.

The storied edifice added to its legend when the first meeting of father and son head coaches (Bowden Bowl I) took place before a sellout crowd of more than 86,000 fans in 1999. Clemson has ranked in the top 20 in the nation in average attendance 20 consecutive seasons. That includes 2001 when Clemson set an ACC record for total attendance. Last year, the streak continued when Clemson averaged over 77,500 fans.

In the 70s, 80s, and 90s, various publications named top-10 stadiums in college football and Memorial Stadium, affectionately known as "Death Valley," has been a common denominator on those lists.

The facility's mystique is derived from its many traditions, which date to its opening in 1942, the legendary games and players, and Clemson's corresponding rate of success. Clemson has won 216 games in 61 years there (216-86-7) and has won over 71 percent of the contests. Thirty-eight times since 1983, a crowd has exceeded 80,000.

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers, but the stadium was constructed against the advice of at least one Clemson coach. Just before head coach Jess Neely left for Rice University after the 1939 season, he gave Clemson a message. "Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the Y.M.C.A. That's all you'll ever need".

Instead of following Coach Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The place would take some clearing-there were many trees, but luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work, clearing, cutting, pouring, and forming. Finally on September 19, 1942, Memorial Stadium opened with Clemson

thrashing Presbyterian, 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for Opening Day would soon grow; and grow and grow.

When the original part of the stadium was built in the early 40's, much of the work was done by scholarship athletes, including many football players. The first staking out of the stadium was done by two members of the football team, A.N. Cameron and Hugh Webb. Webb returned to Clemson years later to be an architecture professor, and Cameron went on to become a civil engineer in Louisiana.

The building of the stadium did not proceed without a few problems. One day during the clearing of the land, one young football player proudly announced that he was not allergic to poison oak. He then commenced to attack the poison oak with a swing blade, throwing the plants to and fro. The next day, however, the boy was swollen twice his size and had to be put in the hospital.

There are many other stories about the stadium, including one stating that Frank Howard put a chew of tobacco in each corner of the stadium as the concrete poured.



Howard said that the seeding of the grass caused a few problems. "About 40 people and I laid sod on the field," he said. "After three weeks, on July 15, we had only gotten halfway through."

"I told them that it had taken us three weeks to get that far, and I would give them three more week's pay for however long it took. I also told them we would have 50 gallons of ice cream when we got through. After that it took them three days to do the rest of the field. Then we sat down in the middle of the field and ate up that whole 50 gallons."

Howard said that on the day of the first game in the stadium, "the gates were hung at 1:00 and we played at 2:00." But that would be all of the construction for a while. Then in 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added and in 1960, 5,658 west endzone seats were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large endzone, "Green Grass" section, this expansion increased capacity to 53,000.

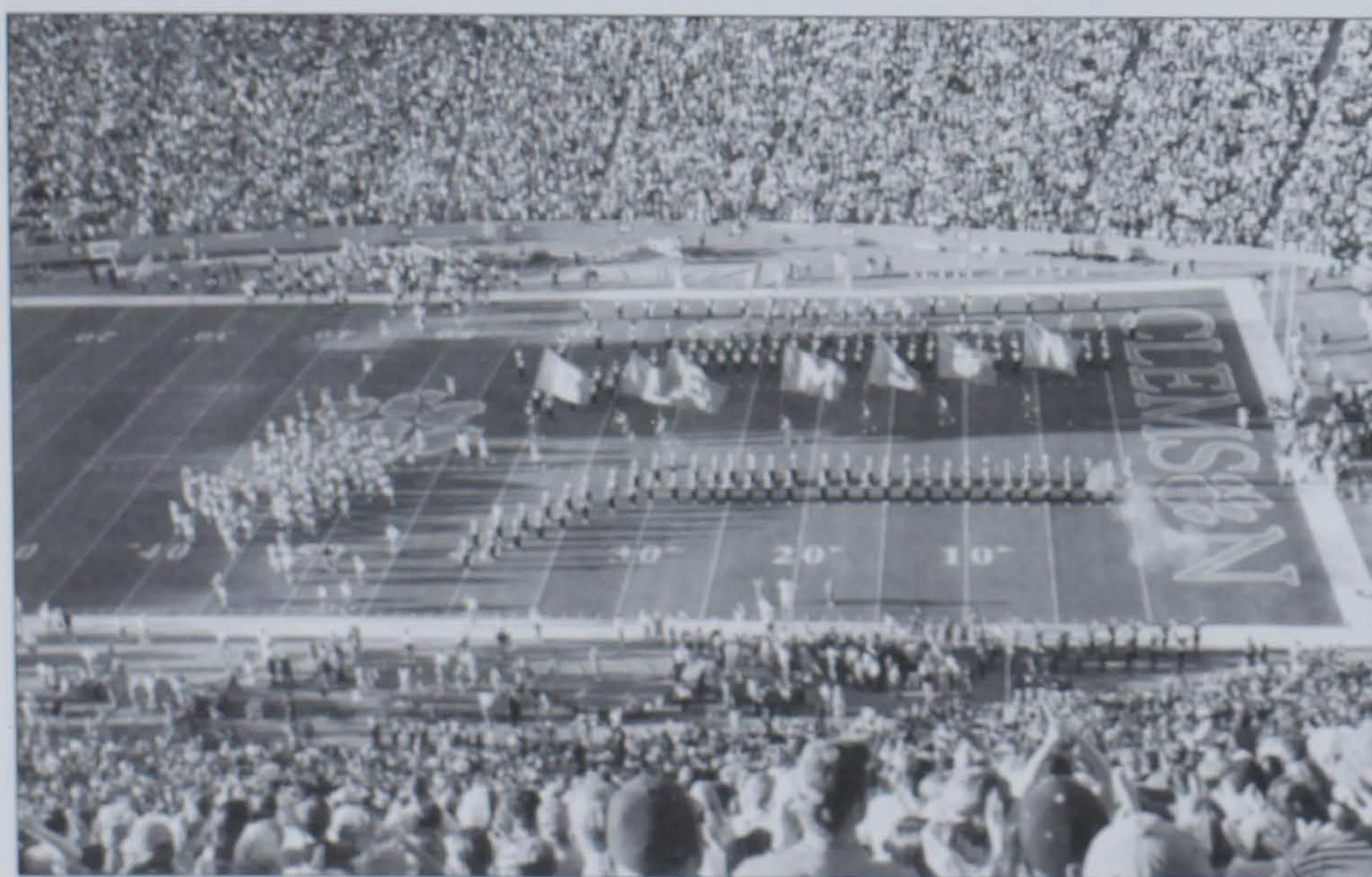
Later, upper decks were added to each side of as crowds swelled - the first in 1978 and the second in '83. This increased capacity to over 80,000, which makes it one of the largest on-campus stadiums.

The effect spiraling inflation has had in this century can be dramatically seen in the differences in stadium construction. The original part of the stadium was built at a cost of \$125,000 or at \$6.25 a seat. The newest upper deck was finished in 1983 at a cost of \$13.5 million, or \$866 a seat.

Through the years, Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death Valley." It was tagged this by the late Presbyterian coach, Lonnie McMillan. After bringing his P.C. teams to Clemson for years and getting whipped, McMillan said the place was like Death Valley. A few years later the name stuck.

In 1974, the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach because of his long service and dedication to the University.

Luckily, the stadium wasn't built behind the Y.



Clemson has had 38 home crowds of over 80,000 since the north upper deck was added at Death Valley in 1983.

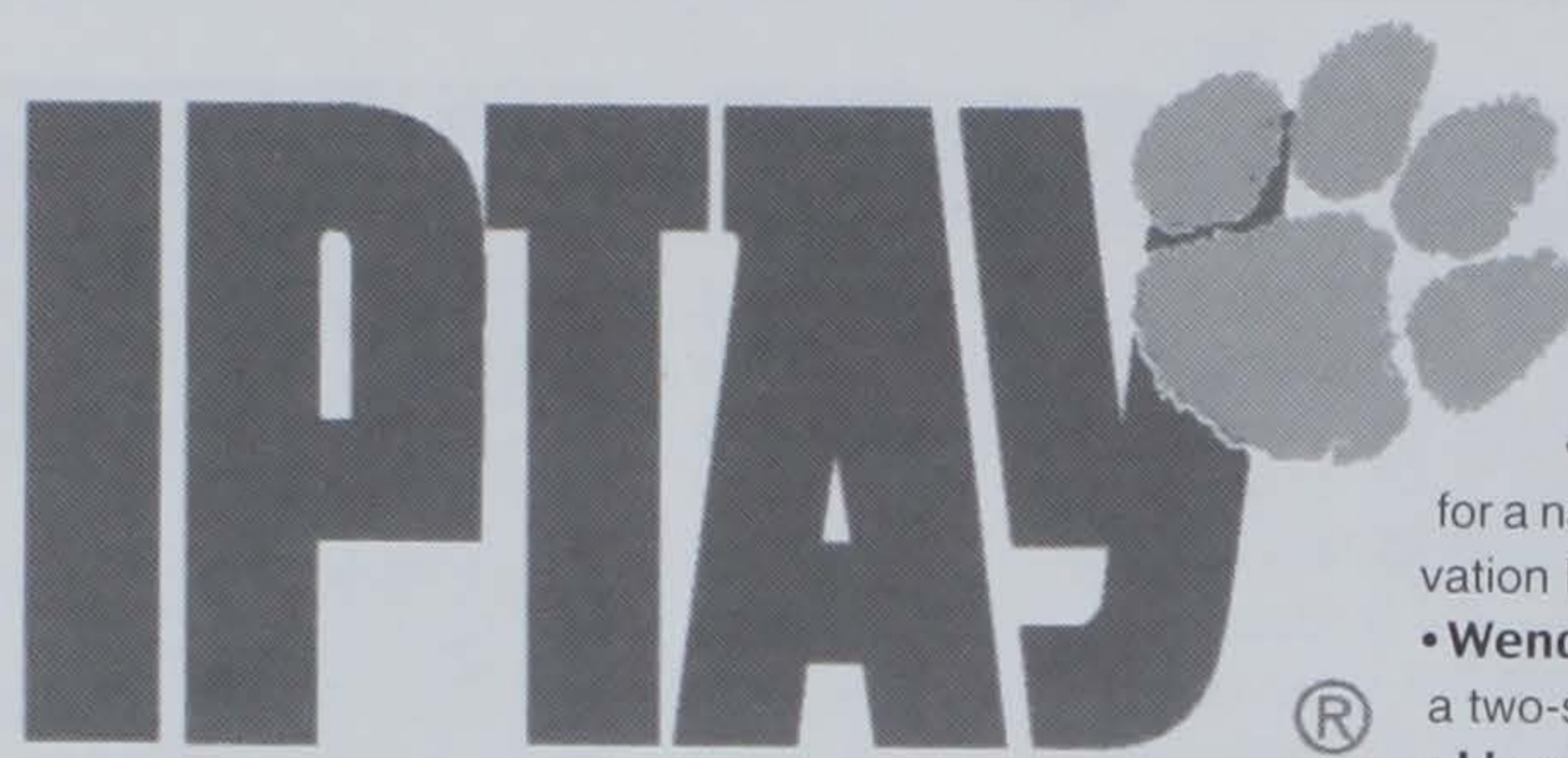

IPTAY Endowment Program

IPTAY is widely regarded nationally as the father of Athletic Fundraising. It all started in 1934 and from a private meeting of a small group of Clemson supporters has sprung into an organization that raised a record \$16 million in 2001. The organization plays a major role in ensuring that all 19 of the varsity sports at Clemson are given the maximum amount of scholarships offered by the NCAA.

The organization also has helped finance facilities that contribute to the well-being of student-athletes on and off the field. Vickery Hall is a 27,000 square-foot facility that houses the tutoring and advising programs for student-athletes. It is a major reason Clemson student-athletes have had their highest cumulative GPA on record for five consecutive semesters.

While IPTAY is primarily concerned with athletic fundraising, the mission of Clemson University has not been overlooked. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Endowment was created to help meet the need for more academic scholarships for non-athletes who are highly qualified academically. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Fund is presently the largest scholarship endowment of its kind at Clemson, currently helping more than 40 students at Clemson.

IPTAY Executive Director George Bennett has continued to keep Clemson among the best in the nation in terms of fund-raising by the establishment of the IPTAY Endowment Program. In April of 1994, he kicked off the beginning of the endowment of

positions program at the 85th birthday celebration for former Clemson Coach Frank Howard. The endowments are secure with a \$100,000 donation paid over a five-year period.

"This is a chance to broaden the horizons of IPTAY," said Bennett. "It gives an individual or a group of people an opportunity to endow a position that meant something during their college days, or to honor a person at a position. The money being endowed is going to secure our future as the interest is used to carry on our program forever."

The first endowment was for the head football coach position to honor the legendary Frank Howard. Howard coached football at Clemson 39 years, 30 as the head coach. During his tenure, the Tigers won 165 games, 100 of which were against conference foes.

"Former players and friends of Coach Howard made donations over the cost of attending the celebration program and that was enough for the endowment. Their gifts were a way of permanently thanking Coach Howard for all that he did for Clemson."

"Following Coach Howard's birthday party, we began to look for an individual to help us support and promote the program, and Bill Hudson's name came up. He was an outstanding player at Clemson who has been equally successful in the business world. We went to him and explained the program and its goals, and that we were looking for his leadership to help get the program going, and he accepted."

Hudson, a 1956 Clemson graduate, was a

three-year letterwinner at tackle who played professionally for the Montreal Alouettes, the San Diego Chargers, and the Boston Patriots. He earned Pro Bowl honors in 1962. Mr. Hudson sees this program growing into a large part of Clemson's athletic funding.

"When other people see information on the endowment program and learn what it is about this program will grow. Success builds on success. People who are looking to honor a friend or family member now have a great means to do that."

Besides the Hudson's family endowment, four other football endowments were made, and one managers position in the first year. Now there are more than 100 positions endowed. The goal of the program is to get every position endowed.

"From the free safety to the #3 player in women's tennis, we hope to have every position endowed," said Bennett.

"We will likely use the Avenue of Champions as a physical place to honor these people further for the positions they have endowed. That will have plenty of space, so we will be working to have as many endowments across all of our sports."

"The personal satisfaction that they helped Clemson University, specifically the athletic department, and that they are securing its future are the main reasons for becoming involved."

And with more involvement, Clemson University will have a very secure future for generations to come.

Clemson fans look forward to seeing tough, hard-nosed football when they come to Death Valley or travel to other schools to watch their Tigers in action. But some of the Tigers' most intense competition and action doesn't take place on autumn Saturday's and it doesn't take place on a field. Take a peek into the Clemson Strength Training Room at almost any time of day, almost any day of the week, at any time of the year, and you will see the Tigers building the foundation for their pursuit of a championship.

Perhaps the most impressive characteristic of the facility is its size. Several years ago, it was enlarged to an astounding 11,000 square feet, making it one of the largest in the nation. In 1998, it was expanded to 14,000 square feet. The facility boasts two full lines of Nautilus machines and over 12 tons of weights. The large number of machines and free weights allows the weight room to be used by athletes from several other sports at the same time, without anyone having to wait in line at a particular station.

Within the last four years, the dumbbell area and leg development areas were expanded as well as the nutrition and hydration area known as the Power Station. The Power Station features the energy and recovery drink to aid each athlete's recovery from intense training.

The plush atmosphere provides an interesting contrast to the physical exertion that takes place in the facility. When an athlete enters the etched glass

doors, he is greeted by plush, wall-to-wall carpeting, walls lined with mirrors, ceiling fans, and music from a 26-speaker sound system - a worthy backdrop for well over \$500,000 worth of state-of-the-art equipment.

Color television monitors are also positioned throughout the facility. These monitors are used for training and instruction, as Tiger strength coaches film the athletes and work with them on form correction.

The large staff of four full-time coaches, four graduate assistants, numerous student assistants, and volunteers ensures that each football player receives proper instruction on the fundamentals of strength and speed development. Training programs at Clemson are position specific and designed to meet the needs and demands of each athlete. Also, each position is appointed a full-time strength coach that serves as a personal trainer throughout his/her career.

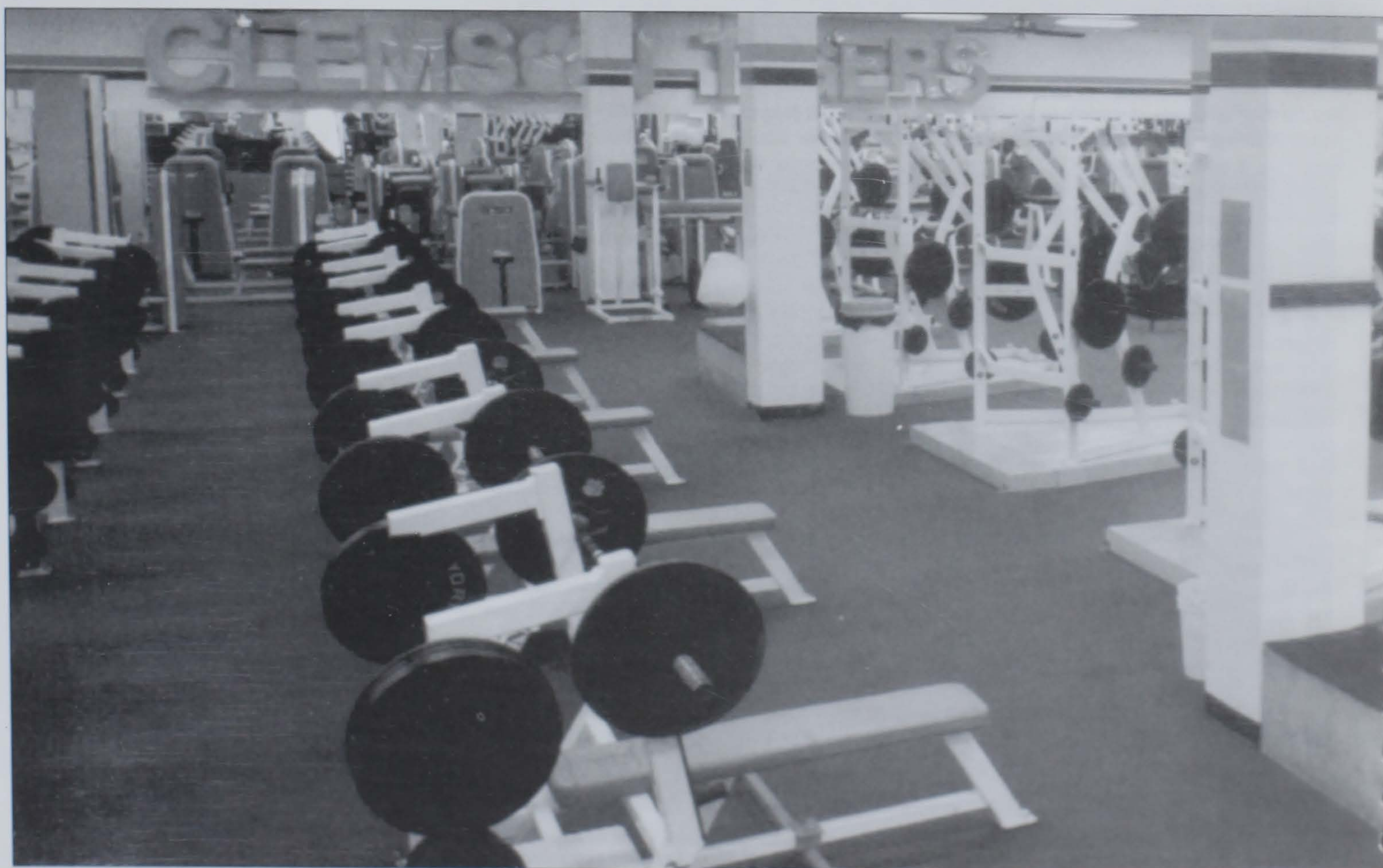

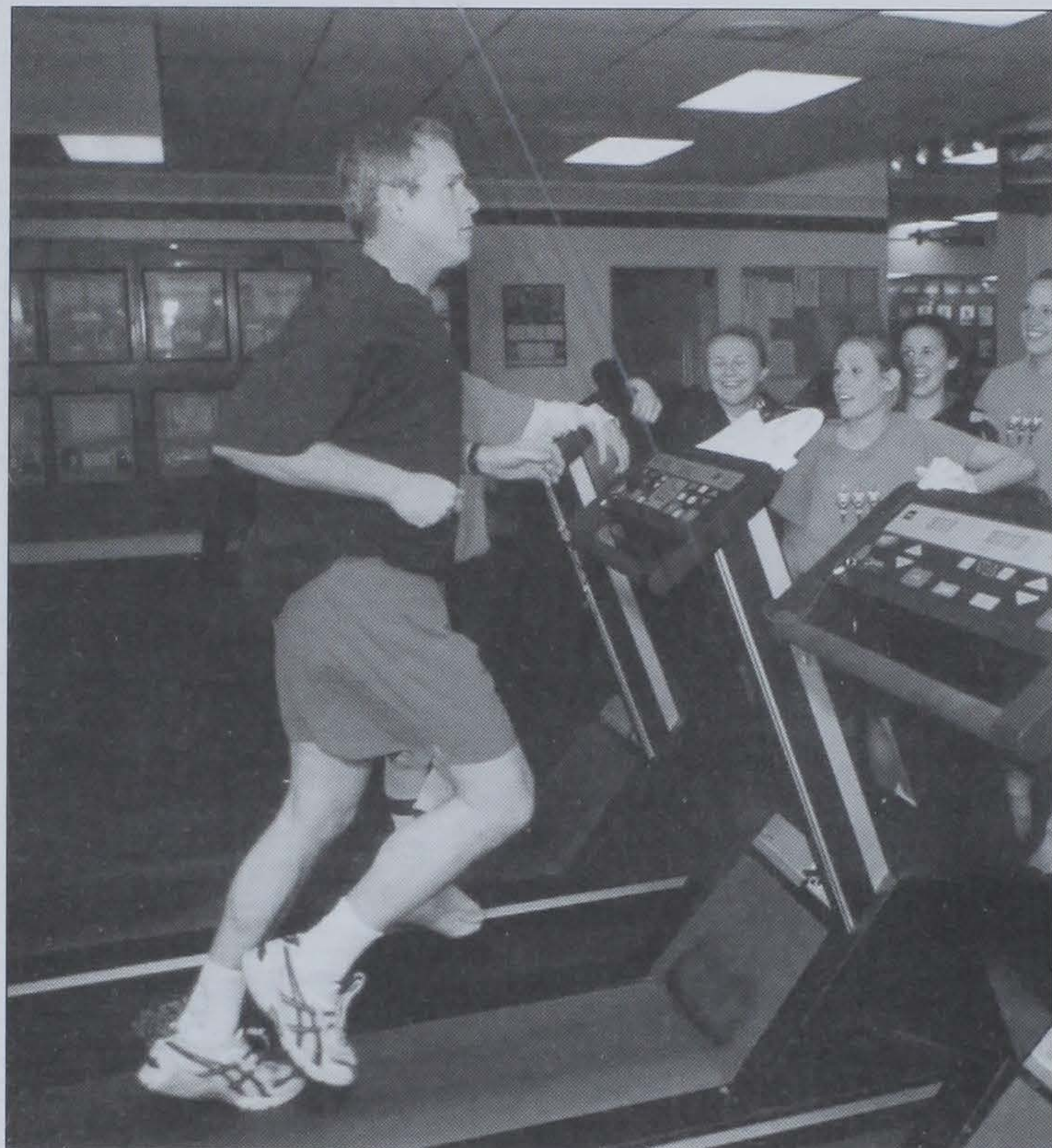

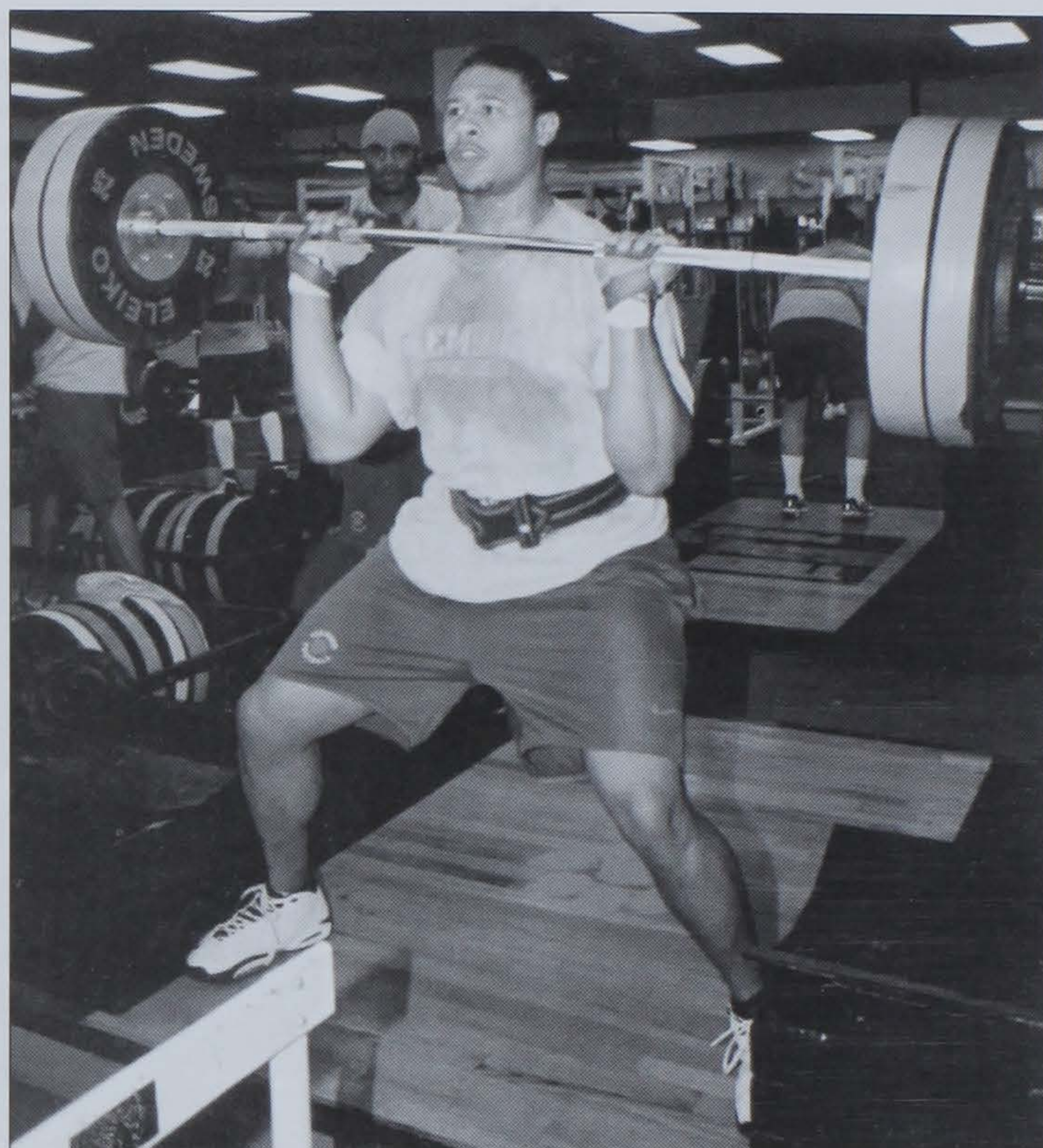

Clemson athletes in all sports now have the luxury of one of the top athletic training facilities in the nation. In the fall of 2000, the facility completed a \$500,000 renovation and was renamed the Hoover Training Facility. It is named in honor of Fred Hoover, who served as Clemson's head trainer for 40 years. He has been inducted into the Clemson Hall of the Fame and the National Training Hall of Fame.

The spacious facility features the latest in athletic training needs. There are offices for the employees and new taping tables, the latest in rehabilitation facilities, including bikes, stair climbers and an underwater treadmill, and a large hydro-therapy area.

This brand-new training facility is state-of-the-art in every aspect. Doctors have offices there and it includes an orthopedic examining room, a conference room and library. Most of all, there is plenty of room.

Danny Poole, director of sports medicine at Clemson, was in need of more room before this new training/rehabilitation room was built. "This place had been in the planning stage for a while as we continued to grow as an athletic department," Poole said. "We were allowed to design a place to fit what was best for us. We're just very excited to have this facility."

Because of the training room's size, trainers can now work on more athletes than ever before. The facility handles athletes from all 19 Clemson's sports, male and female. Trainers are present at 7:00 AM and stay until they aren't needed any longer

in the evening.

Poole has a staff of four full-timers, 13 students, and nine graduate assistants that are kept busy year round. One of its biggest advantages is the number of people who can be treated at the same time.

Video Department

Deep inside the Jervy Athletic Center hides the Clemson Athletics Video Department. The video staff is responsible for helping the Football Tigers prepare for each game as well as assisting with all 18 of the other sports within the department. However, helping prepare the Football Team is a full time job within itself. Practice video, opponent scouting video, self scout video, high school recruiting video, and highlight tapes are all necessary to help the Tigers win on Saturdays.

To handle such large and varied tasks, the

video department initiated a major upgrade of its equipment last year. Phase One of this ongoing task started with the purchase of new digital cameras and VCRs. This first step helped to replace aging cameras and started the move into a digital age.

The Second Phase, completed in July of 1999, saw the overhaul of all video equipment in the McFadden meeting rooms plus the addition of a state of the art digital editing system for football game tape analysis. This digital editing system will provide the

football coaches with instant access to any available game tape of the Tigers' opponents. This allows the coaches to create game-type situations in their weekly game planning meetings and instantly watch how the opponent will react.

Once the video department has prepared the football team to take the field in Death Valley, it immediately goes to work in the stadium taking care of video needs there. All 100 luxury suites contain a television and radio system that is maintained by the video staff. Plus all technical and in-house video needs for the PawVision video system are duties of the department.

Yet, the end of football season does not mean an end to the duties of the department. Basketball season presents the video staff with a whole new set of responsibilities. Gameday coach's video of the men's basketball team plus coach's video and highlights of the women's basketball team home games keep the staff busy during the winter months. And the arrival of springtime means highlight banquet tapes for both teams plus the onset of spring football practice and baseball season.

Working closely with the Tiger football, men's and women's basketball, and baseball staffs, plus the remaining 15 sports, campus, local television stations, the Atlantic Coast Conference office, regional and national cable networks, and network television, all the while trying to keep the Tigers video inventory of close to one million dollars up to date with the changing times proves to be a time demanding task. Yet, it is just another resource needed to help the Tigers win everyday.

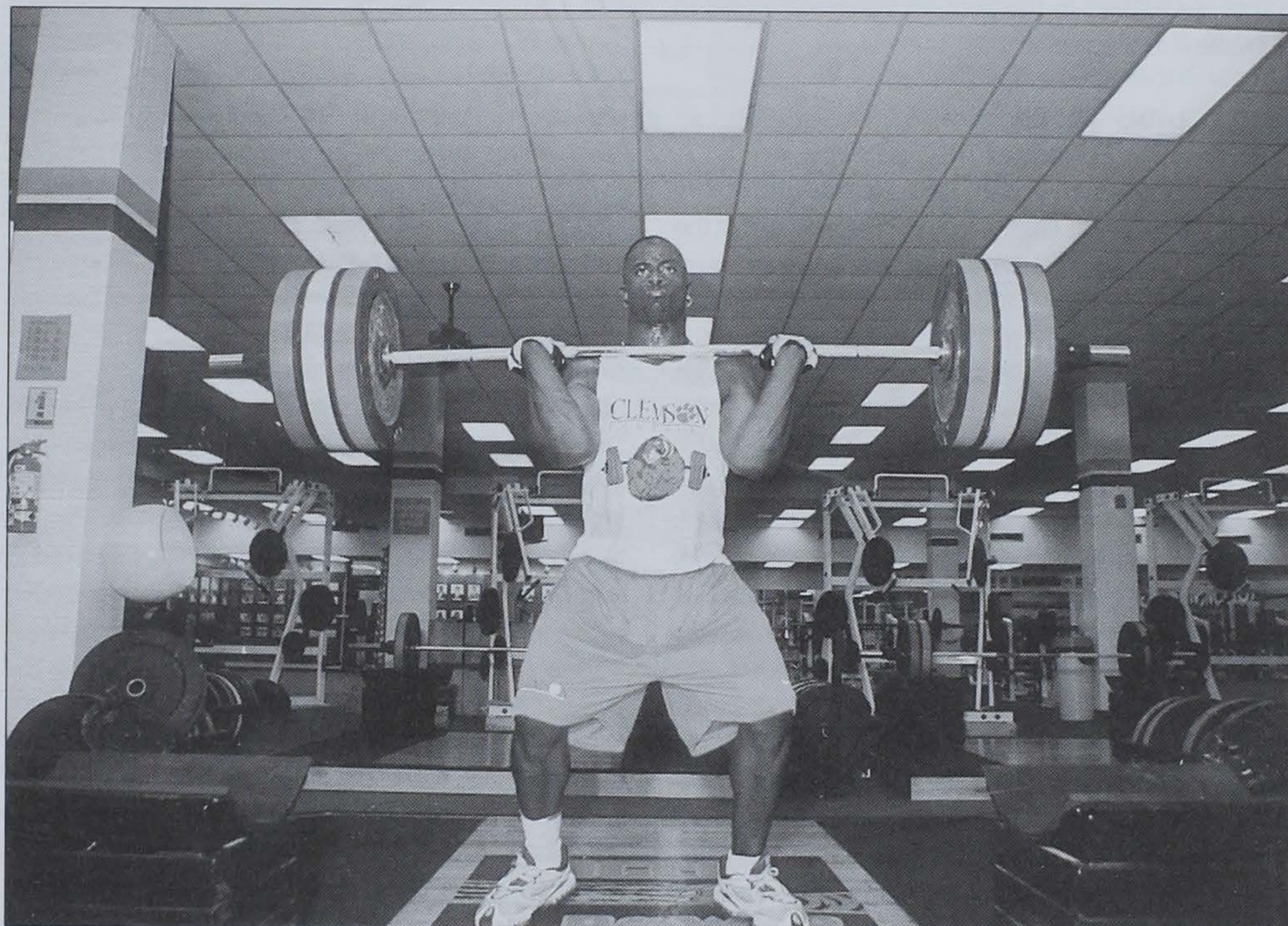
Pro Timing Day

When Rod Gardner was chosen as the #15 selection of the 2001 NFL draft it was the culmination of five years of hard work at the collegiate level for the All-America wide receiver. We won't say Gardner is a self made man, but his work ethic, especially in the strength training facility, had a lot to do with his high ranking among NFL scouts.

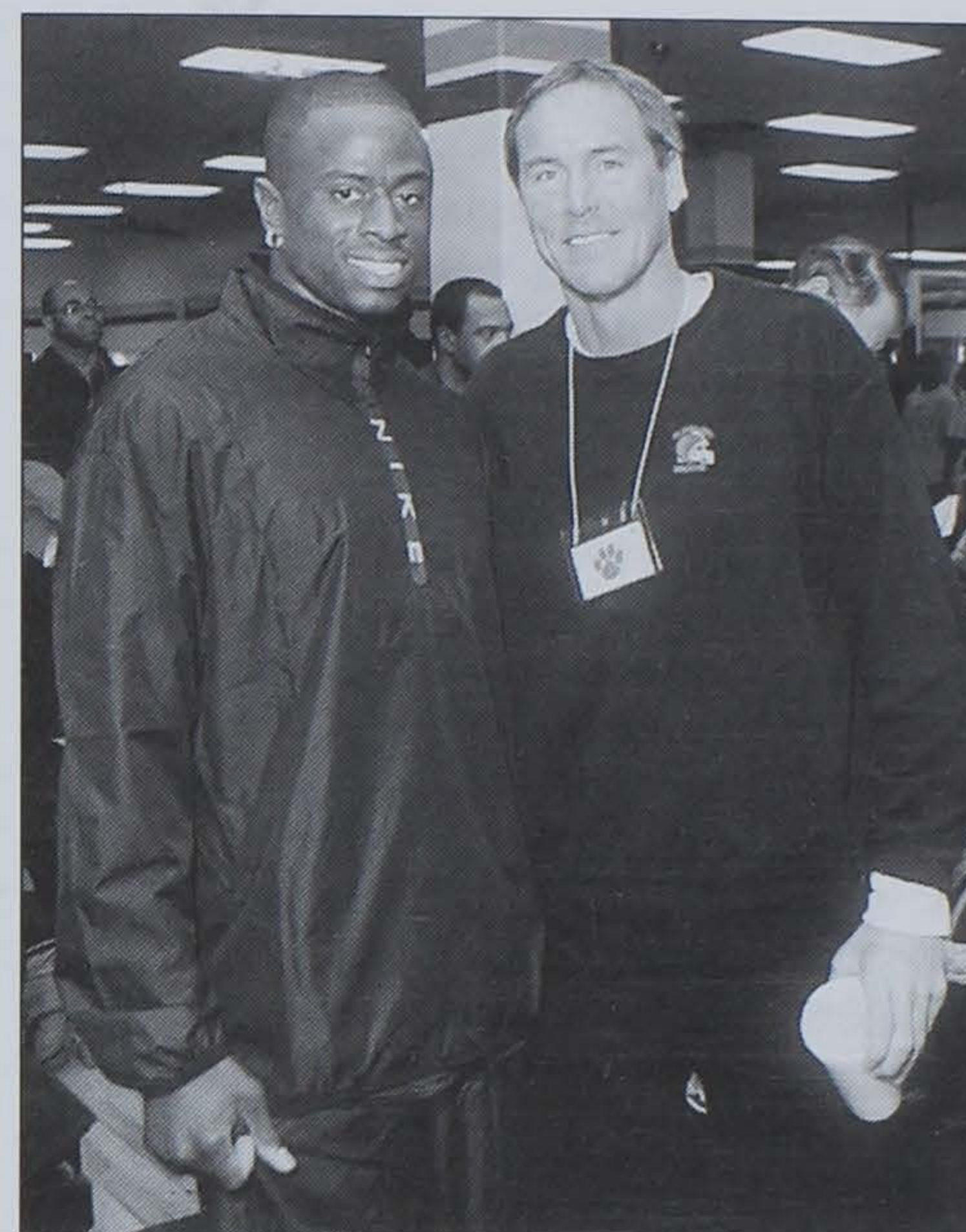
Gardner came to Clemson as a 220-pound quarterback with a body fat percentage of 13 percent. He ran the 40 in 4.61 and bench pressed 300 pounds. By his final season he was 215 pounds of

muscle with a 405-pound bench press who ran a 4.37 for the NFL scouts on pro timing day. He also had more than doubled his reps of 225 pounds and increased his vertical jump by seven inches.

Working with Clemson strength coach Joey Batson and his assistants made all the difference in the world for Gardner. Five years after playing quarterback and defensive back at Clemson as a freshman, he became a vital part of the Washington Redskin offense and looks to continue in that role for years to come.

September 5: Clemson 45, Wofford 10

Wofford, an NAIA school at the time, was a late addition to the schedule when Villanova dropped football in March, 1981. At the end of the first quarter the score was tied at 3-3. Think of the odds you could have gotten against Clemson winning the national championship at the end of that first period. Homer Jordan hit Perry Tuttle with an 80-yard touchdown pass for Clemson's first touchdown of the season and Jordan added a 14-yard run by halftime to give Clemson a 17-3 lead at intermission. Clemson won the second half 28-7, but the Terriers wingbone offense gained 165 yards rushing. Only Nebraska had more yards rushing against Clemson in 1981.

September 12: Clemson 13, Tulane 5

Clemson played its first ever game indoors, defeating Tulane in a defensive struggle. All five Clemson defensive backs had at least one interception and the Clemson defense forced seven turnovers overall. Tulane scored on a field goal and a safety to take a 5-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. But, Clemson's defense allowed just 40 yards rushing in the game and just 177 yards of total offense altogether. Jeff Davis had 20 tackles, while Terry Kinard had 12 tackles and an interception.

September 19: Clemson 13, Georgia 3

Clemson forced the defending national champion Georgia Bulldogs into nine turnovers, still the most in history by a Clemson opponent, in defeating the fourth-ranked Vince Dooley coached team. The win is the highest ranked triumph in the history of the Death Valley. The 13-3 victory was the only regular season defeat for Georgia during the Herschel Walker era (1980-82). Clemson held a 10-0 lead at intermission in front of a frenzied Death Valley crowd on an eight-yard touchdown pass from Homer Jordan to Perry Tuttle and a 39-yard Donald Igwebuike field goal. The two teams traded field goals in the second half. Walker rushed for 111 yards in 28 attempts, but never crossed the Clemson goalline. Jordan, a native of Athens, GA, had 59 yards rushing and hit 11-18 passes for 135 yards. Clemson wore orange pants for the first time in 1981.

October 3: Clemson 21, Kentucky 3

For the fourth straight game, Clemson did not lead at the end of the first period. In fact, the Wildcats had a 3-0 lead at intermission. But, Clemson took the second-half kickoff and drove 83 yards in 13 plays, as Kevin Mack went 11 yards for the touchdown. Clemson scored on its next possession after a Kentucky fumble. The Tigers drove 94 yards for a touchdown on its final scoring drive in the fourth period to win going away. Chuck McSwain, who had 107 yards rushing on 20 attempts, scored on a three-yard run to culminate the drive. Clemson outgained Kentucky 213-97 in the second half and moved to number-9 in the nation after the victory.

October 10: Clemson 27, Virginia 0

Clemson opened its ACC schedule with a 27-point thrashing of Virginia, its 21st straight victory over the Cavaliers. Clemson finally took a lead at the end of the first period on a field goal by Igwebuike. Cliff Austin scored two touchdowns and Jeff McCall scored once as the Tigers gained 265 yards on the ground. Jordan connected on 9-16 passes for 161 yards.

October 17: Clemson 38, Duke 10

Clemson's offense continued its improvement, especially from a balanced standpoint, and the Tiger defense held its incredible dominance in a 28-point win at Duke. Clemson gained 323 yards rushing and 240 passing. Jordan was 13-19 for 198 yards passing and added 47 on the ground. Cliff Austin had the top rushing game of the season by a Tiger with 178 yards in 19 attempts, including a non-scoring 77-yard run. Duke had 23 first downs in the game, but scored just one touchdown. The Blue Devils ran six plays from the one during one drive, yet failed to score a touchdown on the possession.

October 24: Clemson 17, N.C. State 7

N.C. State scored the first rushing touchdown of the season against the Clemson defense on a 13-yard run by Laramount Lawson on the Pack's second drive of the game. But, Jeff Davis and company took control in the second half and allowed the Pack

just 87 yards rushing for the entire game. Homer Jordan had just 43 yards passing, but gained 104 yards rushing in 21 attempts. Jeff McCall locked up the game with a 15-yard touchdown run with 8:30 left. Clemson moved up to number-three in the AP poll after the game, the highest ranking in Clemson history.

October 31: Clemson 82, Wake Forest 24

The Clemson offense exploded on this Halloween day game. The Tigers set 21 school, stadium and conference records, including 536 yards rushing and 756 yards of total offense. Eleven different Clemson players had rushing yardage and nine different players scored. When Craig Crawford scored on a 72-yard run, no one in the press box, nor the stadium knew who he was because he was not even on the pregame roster. Clemson was a perfect 12-12 on third-down conversions. Jordan passed for 180 yards, including 7-161 to Perry Tuttle, whose 75-yard touchdown reception on the first play of the third period gave Clemson a 55-14 lead.

November 7: Clemson 10, North Carolina 8

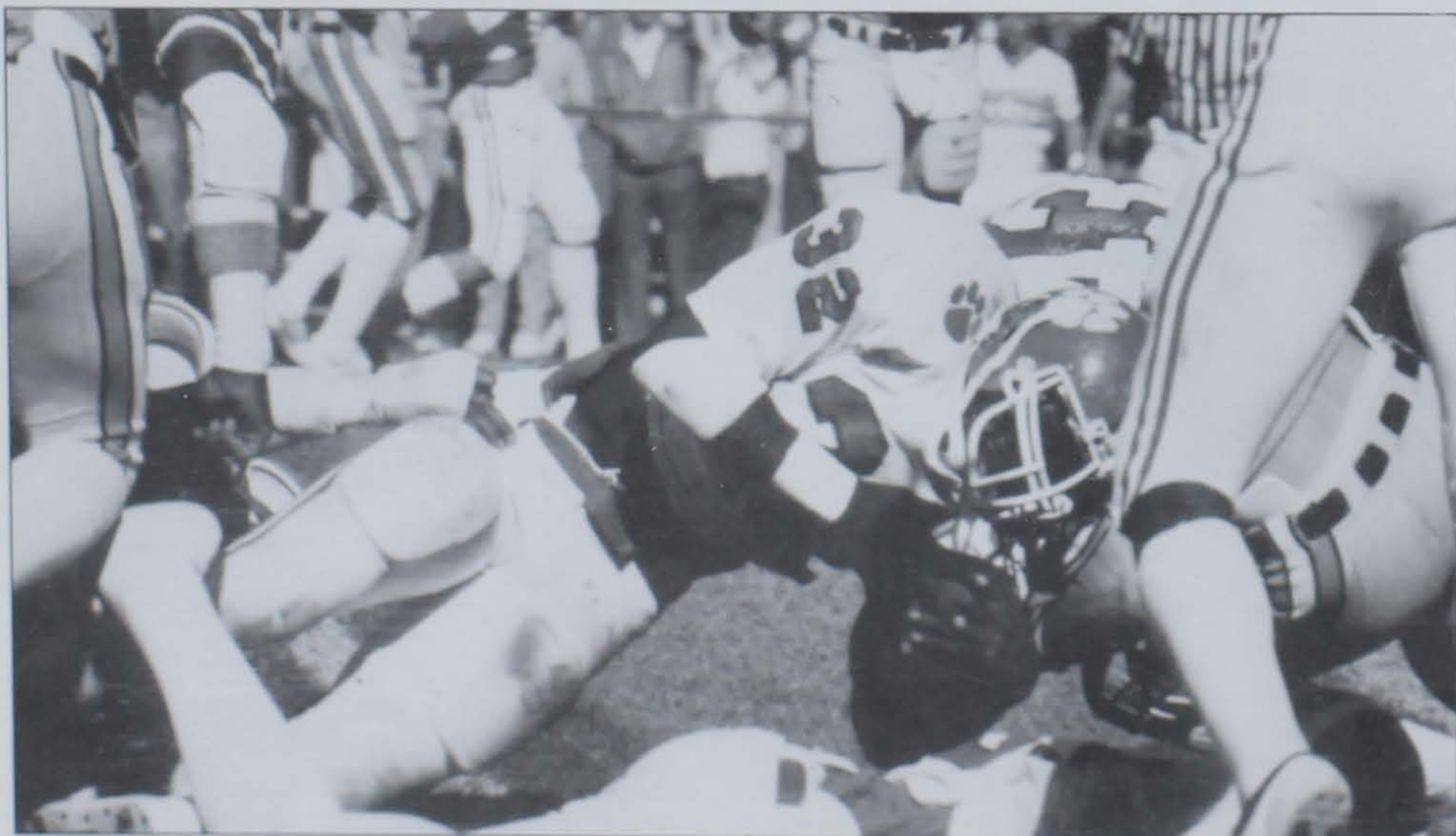
The showdown for ACC supremacy took place in Chapel Hill. It was ninth-ranked North Carolina against second-ranked Clemson, the first meeting of top 10 ACC teams in league history. Clemson led 7-5 at halftime thanks to an 81-yard drive that ended with a seven-yard run by Jeff McCall. The two teams traded field goals in the third period, making the score 10-8 heading into the fourth period. Dale Hatcher hit a 47-yard punt out of bounds at the Tar Heel two. But, North Carolina drove to their 40. With 57 seconds left, Jeff Bryant recovered an errant lateral to preserve the win. Bryant seemed to be the only player on either team who thought it was a backwards pass and his hustle play allowed Clemson to keep its perfect record.

November 14: Clemson 21, Maryland 7

Clemson clinched its seventh ACC title in history with a 21-7 victory over Maryland, Clemson's most bitter rival of the era. Homer Jordan was masterful, completing 20-29 passes (including 15-18 in the first half) for 270 yards and three touchdowns as he picked apart Maryland's wide-tackle six defense. Perry Tuttle caught 10 passes for 151 yards to become Clemson's all-time reception leader. Classmate Jerry Gaillard had his first touchdown reception of his four year career in his final home game. Clemson outgained Maryland 469-236 and had 28 first downs on offense. Boomer Esiason was the sophomore quarterback for Maryland and he had just 15-38 for 167 passing on the day.

November 21: Clemson 29, South Carolina 13

The Tigers concluded their first perfect season since 1948 with a 29-13 win in Columbia. South Carolina had a 7-6 lead after the first period behind a Johnnie Wright one-yard run. But, Clemson turned the game on a blocked punt by Rod McSwain. The ball was recovered in the endzone by Johnny Rembert. Both players would go on to be teammates with the New England Patriots. A Jordan touchdown run of 11 yards and a Bob Paulling field goal gave Clemson a 15-7 lead at intermission. While Rod

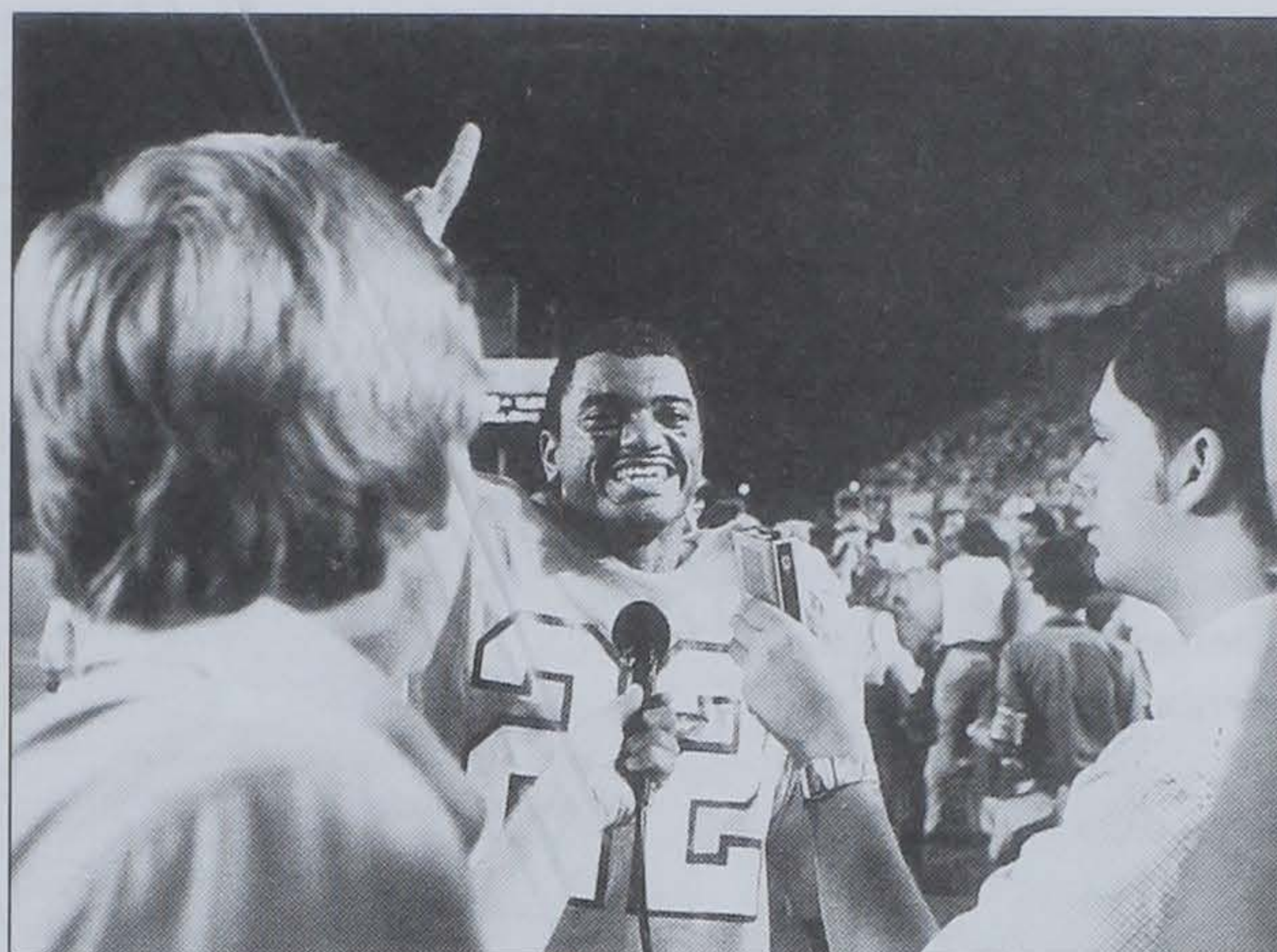
McSwain provided the big play of the first half, Chuck McSwain took over in the second and ended the game with 151 yards rushing.

January 1: Clemson 22, Nebraska 15

Clemson claimed its first National Championship by defeating Nebraska 22-15 in the Orange Bowl. It was Clemson's first Orange Bowl appearance in 25 years. Homer Jordan completed 11-22 passes and had 180 yards total offense in leading the Clemson offense. Jeff Davis had 14 tackles, while Bill Smith, now on the Clemson Board of Trustees, had a career-high 10 tackles. Clemson allowed just one pass completion in the second half. Cliff Austin, who had scored the deciding touchdown in the Gator Bowl win over Ohio State in 1978, had a key touchdown in the third period in this victory.

Notes of Interest on 1981 Team

- Clemson won its first national championship in any sport and the first national title for the ACC in football in 28 years.
- Clemson had five different players earn All-America honors, more than any other Tiger team in history.
- There was no controversy concerning the voting of the National Champion in 1981. Clemson ended the season as the only undefeated, untied team in Division I after the bowl games and was the only team with three wins over top-10 teams.
- Coach Danny Ford, at age 33 at the time, remains the youngest coach in history of college football to win the National Championship.
- Clemson forced 41 turnovers in the 12 games, still a Clemson record for turnovers forced in a season.
- During one stretch in the season the Clemson defense held the opposition without a touchdown for 18 straight quarters and no team had a rushing touchdown against Clemson the first seven games of the season.
- Clemson won the national championship in 1981 after going 6-5 the previous season. The Tigers were unranked in every preseason poll for 1981.
- Clemson's improvement of 5.5 games from 1980 to 1981 was the largest improvement in the nation.
- Only one team had more time of possession than Clemson all season, Wofford.
- Clemson had the lead at the end of the first period in just four of the 12 games.
- When Clemson defeated Wake Forest 82-24, Tiger mascot (Ricky Capps) did 465 pushups during of the game. He lost 10 pounds by game's end. The Demon Deacon mascot did the pushups after Clemson scored a touchdown to give it 76 points.
- Clemson scored 316 points in the regular season

A collective total of only eight games were missed by five starters all season.

- The headline in the **Greenville News** the Sunday after Clemson defeated North Carolina 10-8 in Chapel Hill was "Tigers are 10-8cious."
- No opponent had a run longer than 26 yards and no opponent had a play over 30 yards all season. The longest touchdown play against Clemson was 25 yards, on a halfback option pass from Mike Rozier to Anthony Steels of Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.
- During pre-game practice for the Tulane game in the Superdome, freshman punter Dale Hatcher hit the giant television screen that hangs over the center of the field. The screen is 155 feet above the playing surface.
- During offseason conditioning in the summer of 1981 strength coach George Dostal constructed a simple sign for his strength training facility: 1982 Orange Bowl, Clemson vs. Nebraska.
- Over the course 1981, counting game-week practices, pep rallies, pregame practice and games, the Clemson marching band played Tiger Rag 455 times in the 1981 season. That included 202 times during games and 55 times during pep rallies.
- The Clemson senior student who was in charge of pep rallies for the 1981 season was former CBS This Morning Anchor Jane Robelot.
- The day after Clemson defeated North Carolina in Chapel Hill, placekicker Donald Igwebuike flew to Maryland where Clemson's third-ranked soccer team defeated Maryland 4-0 to clinch the ACC. Igwebuike played on two ACC championship teams that fall that finished in the top 10 in the nation.
- Three Clemson players - Cary Massaro, Dan Benish, and Steve Berlin - attended the Pittsburgh-Penn State game at Pittsburgh on November 28th. The game, the Saturday after Thanksgiving, resulted in a 48-14 Penn State win and elevated Clemson to #1 in the polls for the first time ever.

In Retrospect

- Three members of the 1981 Clemson staff went on to become Head Coaches. The list includes Curley Hallman (Louisiana State), Chuck Reedy (Baylor) and Nelson Stokely (Southwestern Louisiana).
- Eleven of the 24 starters on the 1981 team went on to play professional football.
- Eleven different players on the 1981 team became All-Americans (first, second, or third team) over their career. That includes Terry Kinard, who was a first-team All-American by Associated Press in 1981 and 1982, the only two-time first-team AP All-American in Clemson history.
- Twenty-three different players on the 1981 Clemson team earned first-team All-ACC honors at one time or another during their careers.
- Six of the 24 players on Clemson's two-platoon Centennial team were on the 1981 National Championship team.
- Four different players (Perry Tuttle, Jeff Bryant, Terry Kinard, and William Perry) went on to become first-round draft picks in the NFL.
- Thirty-one different players on the 1981 Clemson roster, including four first-round, were drafted into the NFL. As the chart on page 75 shows, 22 different players from the 1981 team made it to the NFL, including 12 players who were in the NFL for at least five years. Six different players went on to be Super Bowl Champions.
- Six players on this team have already been inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame: Homer Jordan, Jeff Bryant, Perry Tuttle, Jeff Davis, William Perry, and Terry Kinard. Coach Danny Ford was inducted in 1999.
- Three players on the 1981 team (Jeff Davis, Terry Kinard, and William Perry) were named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary team in 2002.

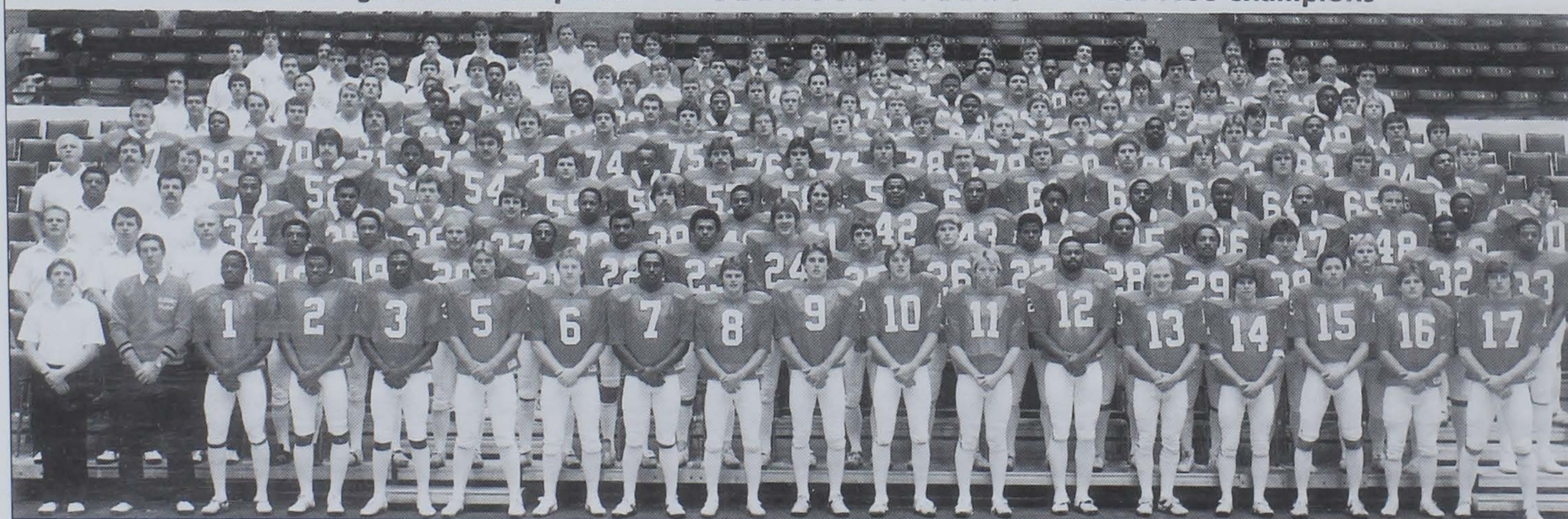

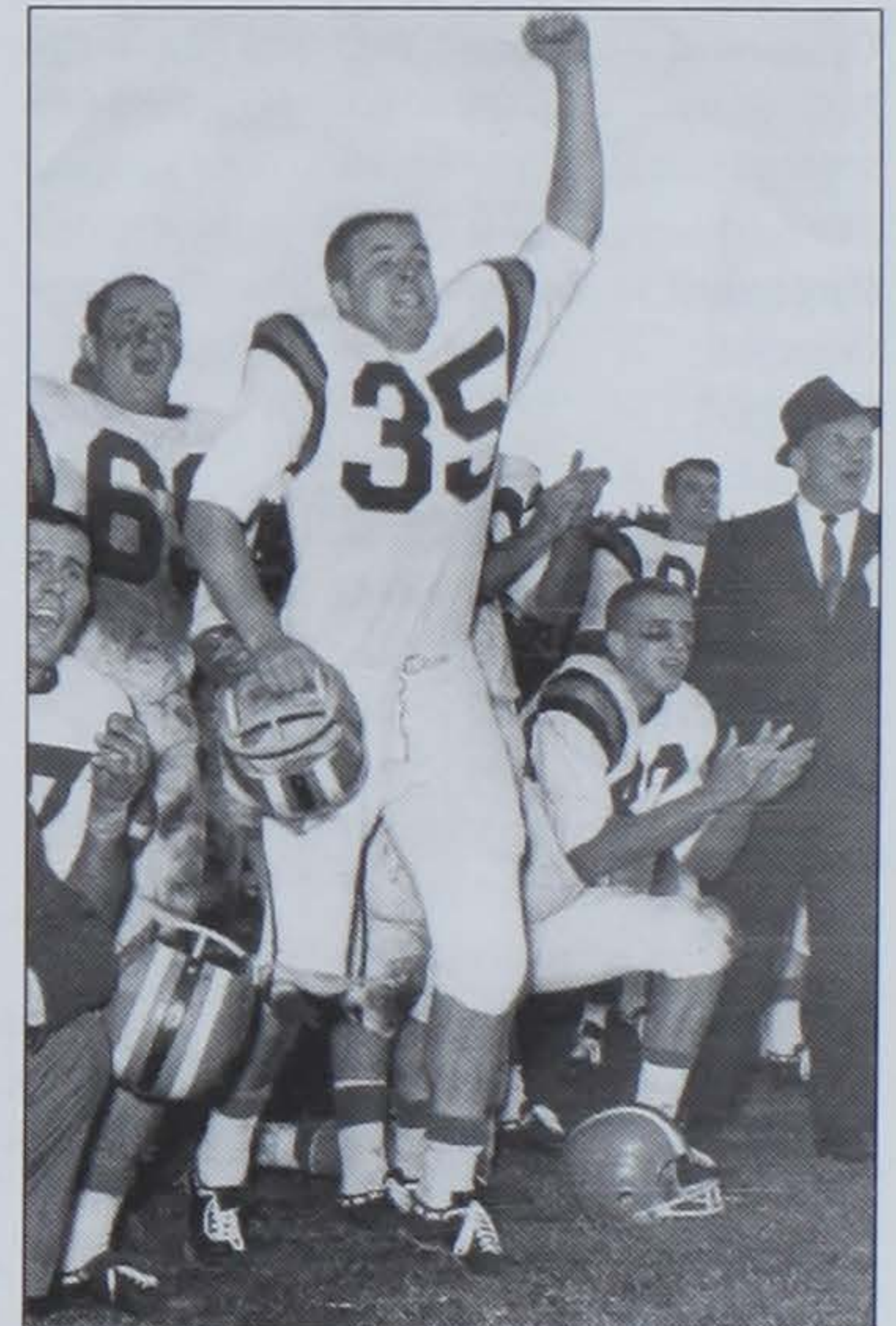

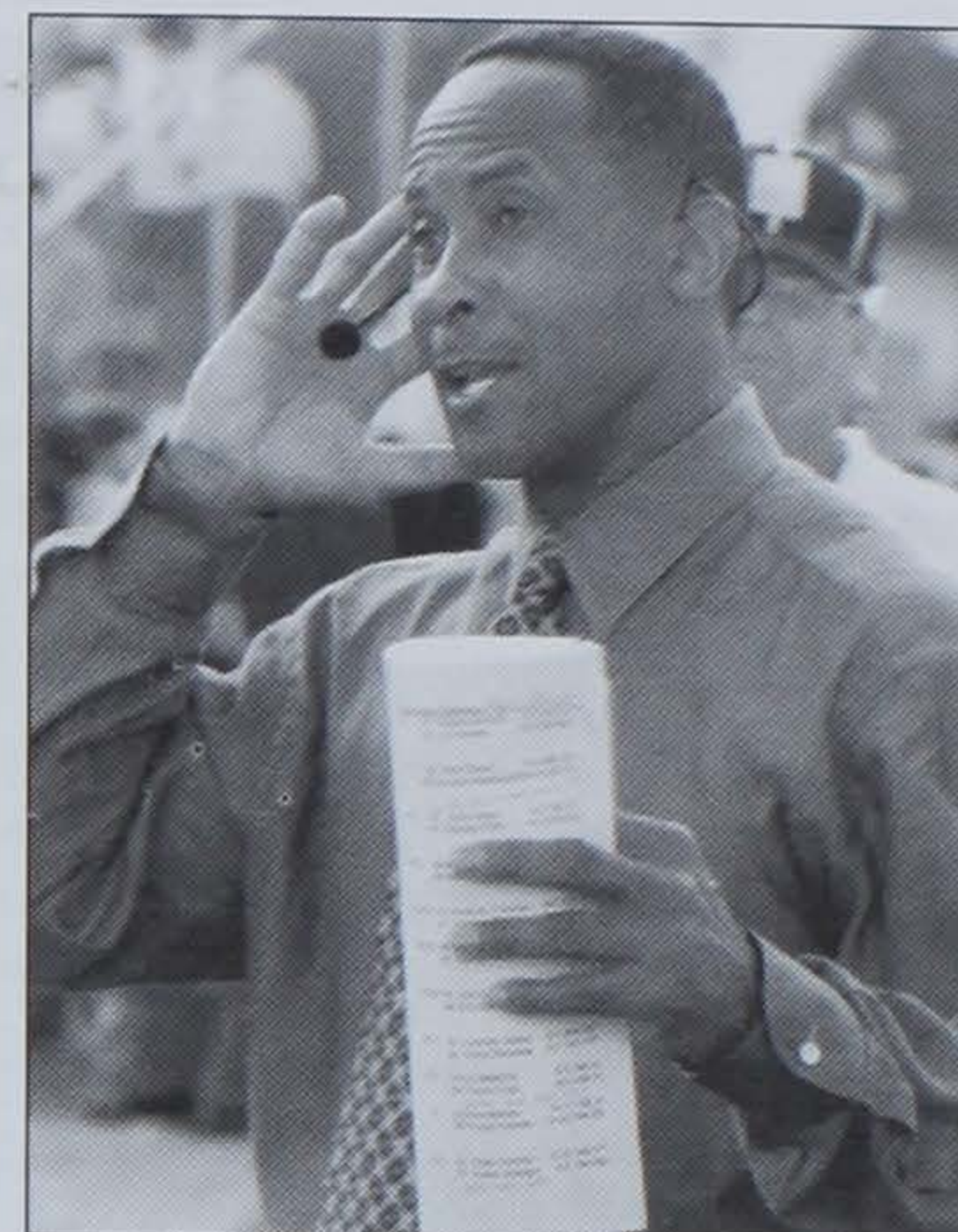

National Exposure

- Clemson appeared on ESPN's family of networks eight times in 2002, meaning Clemson football was televised nationally on ESPN more than Notre Dame was shown on NBC.
- Clemson has been shown on national television at least three times in each of the last seven years. That streak will be extended in 2003. The season opener is against Georgia and will be shown to half the country on ABC.
- The Clemson program has had at least eight games on television each of the last seven years and had an average of 9.8 television appearances during that time.
- Clemson has its own replay network, a media outlet that has been in place each of the last three years. Games are replayed the week following the game and throughout the summer on regional cable affiliates.
- In 2002, Clemson had 11 games broadcast over four different networks.
- Clemson has had 96 games televised over the last 12 years.
- The Clemson-Florida State game has become one of the top college football spectacles. Nine of the last 12 games of the series have been broadcast by ABC, CBS, or ESPN. Last year's game was shown as a part of the ESPN Thursday night prime-time lineup. The 1999 game, the first ever meeting of father and son head coaches in college football history, was one of the highest rated college events of the year for ESPN.
- Clemson has an all-time record of 119-83-5 in televised games, including a 60-30-3 record in games broadcast from Death Valley.
- Clemson benefits from the considerable contracts the ACC has with ABC, ESPN, and espn2. The regular-season

package is among the best in the nation and insures the Tigers will have at least eight games televised each season.

- The package brings exposure to national media representatives. When Clemson met Florida State in 2001, over

700 members of the media came to Clemson to cover the contest. When the schools met in 1999 at Death Valley, media from Chicago, Los Angeles, New York, Houston, Dallas, Washington DC, Boston, and Miami covered the game as well.



ESPN's Gameday made an appearance at Clemson for a Thursday evening game in 2002. Clemson made eight national appearances on ESPN's family of networks in 2002.

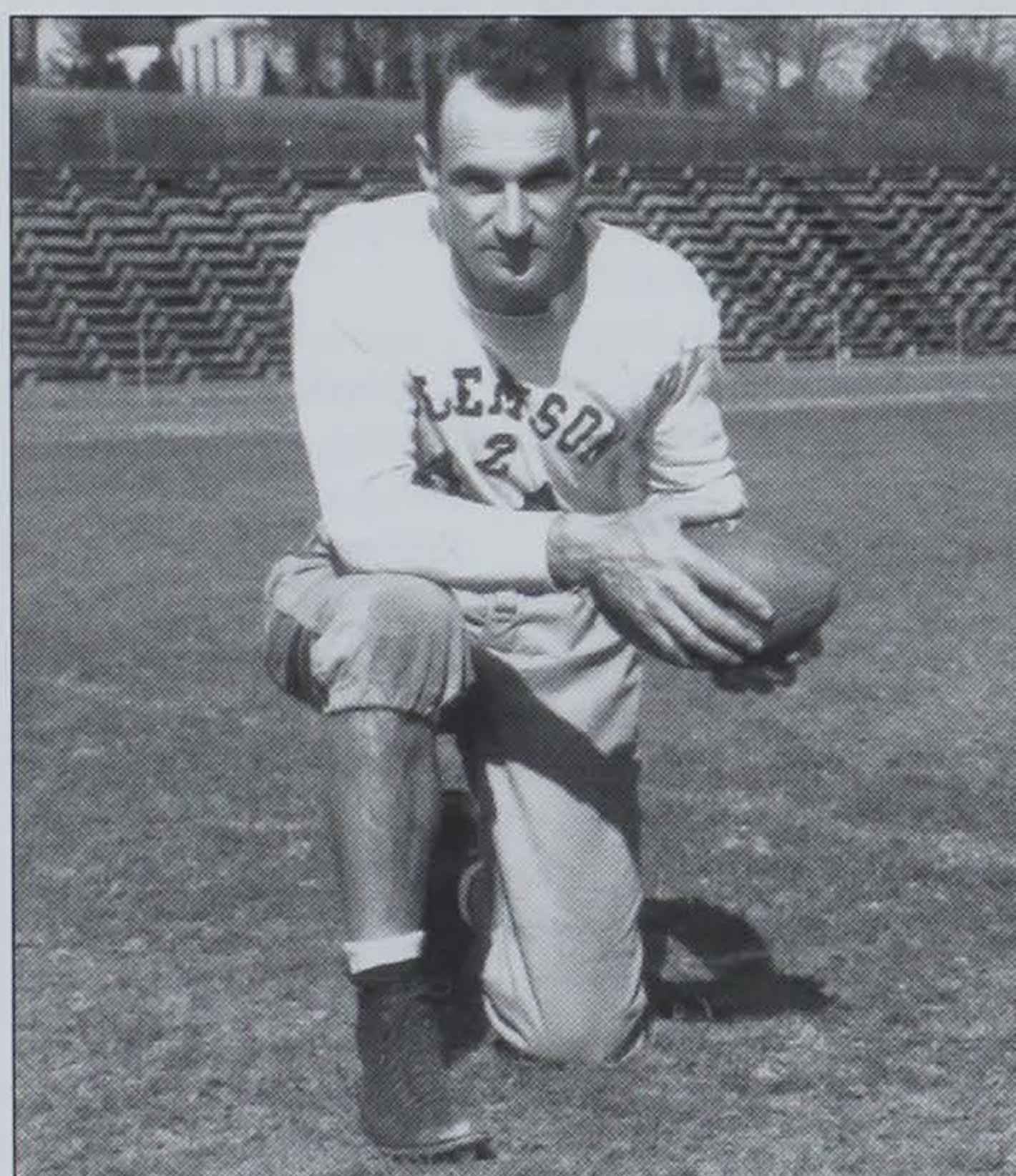

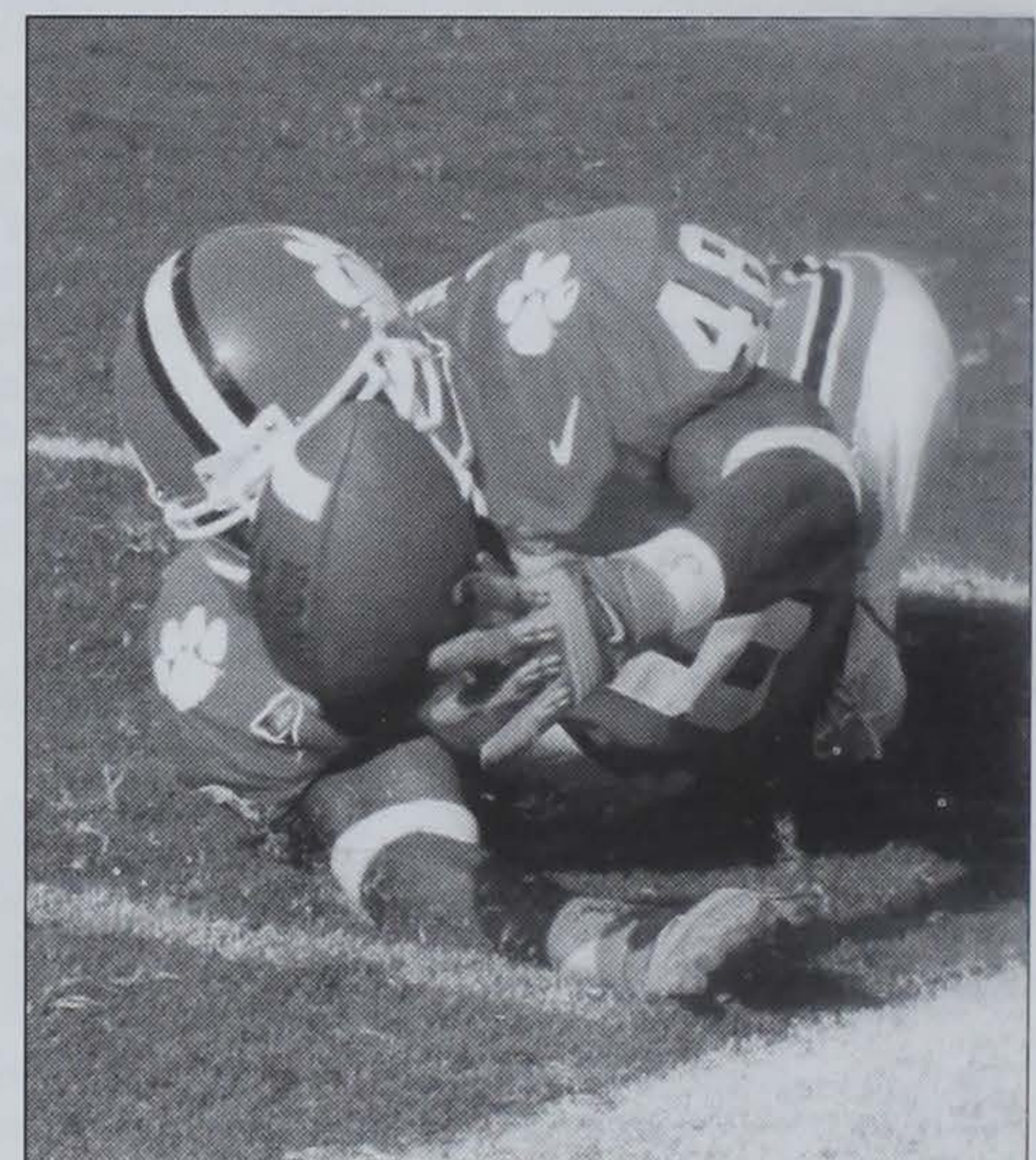

The Atlantic Coast Conference

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Having celebrated its 50th year of competition during the 2002-03 academic year, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture; the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 88 national championships, including 44 in women's competition and 44 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 114 times in men's competition and 51 times in women's action.

History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953 at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, NC with seven charter members (Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, N.C. State, South Carolina, and Wake Forest) drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, NC, where a set of by-laws was adopted and the name officially became the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were Blue-Gray, Colonial, Dixie, East Coast, Mid Atlantic, Mid South, Piedmont, Seaboard, Shoreline, Southern Seven, and Tobacco.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Con-

ference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first and only withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991 with the addition of Florida State. On July 1, 2003, Virginia Tech and Miami (FL) were accepted into the league and will begin competition in the 2004-05 academic year. This will give the ACC 11 members, its highest total at any time in its history.

2003-04 Institutions

Clemson University is nestled in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains near the Georgia and North Carolina borders, and the tiger paws painted on the roads make the return to I-85 easier. The school is built around Fort Hill, the plantation home of John C. Calhoun, vice president to Andrew Jackson. His son-in-law, Thomas Green Clemson, left the land to be used as an agricultural school; and in 1893, Clemson opened its doors as a land-grant school, thanks to the efforts of Ben Tillman.

Duke University was founded in 1924 by tobacco magnate James B. Duke as a memorial to his father, Washington Duke. Originally, the school was called Trinity College, a Methodist institution started in 1859. In 1892, Trinity moved to west Durham, where the east campus with its Georgian architecture now stands. Nearby are Sarah P. Duke Gardens, and further west the Gothic spires of Duke Chapel overlook the west campus.

Florida State University is one of 10 universities of the State University System of Florida. It was established as the Seminary West of the

Suwannee by an act of the Florida Legislature in 1851, and first offered instruction at the post-secondary level in 1857. Its Tallahassee campus has been the site of an institution of higher education longer than any other site in the state. In 1905, the Buckman Act reorganized higher education in the state and designated the Tallahassee school as the Florida Female College. In 1909, it was renamed Florida State College for Women. In 1947, the school returned to a co-educational status, and the name was changed to Florida State University.

Next to I-85 in downtown Atlanta stands **Georgia Institute of Technology**, founded in 1885. Its first students came to pursue a degree in mechanical engineering, the only one offered at the time. Georgia Tech's strength is not only the red clay of Georgia, but a restored gold and white 1930 model A Ford Cabriolet, the official mascot. The old Ford was first used in 1961, but a Ramblin' Wreck had been around for over three decades. The Ramblin' Wreck fight song appeared almost as soon as the school opened, and it is not only American boys that grow up singing its rollicking tune, for Richard Nixon and Nikita Krushchev sang it when they met in Moscow in 1959.

The **University of Maryland** opened in 1856 as an agricultural school nine miles north of Washington, DC on land belonging to Charles Calvert, a descendant of Lord Baltimore, the state's founding father. The school colors are the same as the state flag: black and gold for George Calvert (Lord Baltimore) and red and white for his mother, Alice Crossland. Maryland has been called the school that Curley Byrd built, for he was its quarterback, then football coach, athletic director, assistant to the president, vice-president, and finally its president. Byrd also designed the football stadium and the campus layout, and suggested the nickname Terrapin, a local turtle known for its bite, when students wanted to replace the nickname Old Liners with a new one for the school.

The **University of North Carolina**, located in Chapel Hill, has been called "the perfect college town," making its tree-lined streets and balmy atmosphere what a college should look and feel like. Its inception in 1795 makes it one of the oldest schools in the nation, and its nickname of Tar Heels stems from the tar pitch and turpentine that were the state's principal industry. The nickname is as old as the school, for it was born during the Revolutionary War when tar was dumped into the streams to impede the advance of British forces.

North Carolina State University is located in the state capital of Raleigh. It opened in 1889 as a land-grant agricultural and mechanical school and was known as A&M or Aggies or Farmers for over a quarter century. The school's colors of pink and blue were gone by 1895, brown and white were tried for a year, but the students finally chose red and white to represent the school. An unhappy fan in 1922 said N.C. State football players behaved like a pack of wolves, and the term that was coined in derision became a badge of honor.

The **University of Virginia** was founded in 1819 by Thomas Jefferson and is one of three things on his tombstone for which he wanted to be remembered. James Madison and James Monroe were

on the board of governors in the early years. The Rotunda, a half-scale version of the Pantheon which faces the Lawn, is the focal point of the grounds as the campus is called. Jefferson wanted his school to educate leaders in practical affairs and public service, not just to train teachers.

Wake Forest University was started on Calvin Jones' plantation amid the stately pine forest of Wake County in 1834. The Baptist seminary is still there, but the school was moved to Winston-Salem in 1956 on a site donated by Charles H. and Mary Reynolds Babcock. President Harry S. Truman attended the ground-breaking ceremonies that brought a picturesque campus of Georgian architecture and painted roofs. Wake Forest's colors have been black and gold since 1895, thanks to a badge designed by student John Heck, who died before he graduated.

2002-03 in Review

The 2002-03 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and nine individual NCAA crowns. The list included Clemson's first ever national championship in men's golf, the Wake Forest women's field hockey team, and the Virginia men's lacrosse team. In all, the ACC has won 45 national team titles over the last 13 years.

Overall, 95 ACC teams took part in postseason play in 2002-03, compiling a 84-64 (.568) record.

A total of 167 student-athletes from the ACC earned first-, second-, or third-team All-America honors last year. In addition, the ACC produced three national players-of-the-year, one national rookie-of-the-year and four national coach-of-the-year recipients. The national coach-of-the-year selections included Clemson Men's Golf Coach Larry Penley.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 16 of the 21 sports sponsored by



the league for which polls were available. Clemson contributed top-10 final finishes in golf and men's soccer. In all, 28 ACC teams finished their season with a top-10 ranking.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2003-2004 academic year, including 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling, or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field (indoor & outdoor), wrestling. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977, with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest.

Championships for women are currently conducted in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, lacrosse, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field (indoor & outdoor), and volleyball.

ACC Football

The Atlantic Coast Conference had an immediate impact on the national college football scene in the fall of 1953 when Maryland captured the first of what would eventually be five national football titles for the ACC within its first 50 years. Clemson laid claim to the league's second national title in 1981, while Georgia Tech followed suit in 1990. Florida State pocketed national titles #4 and #5 in 1993 and 1999.

The nine schools that take to the field this fall under the ACC banner have produced 386 first- or second-team gridiron All-Americans and 61 first-team academic All-Americans. ACC teams have had 1,520 players selected in the annual professional football draft, including 113 first-round selections. A year ago, the nine ACC member institutions had 145 former players on NFL rosters during the regular season or playoffs.

If success is best measured in terms of wins and losses, then the ACC over the years has proved itself to be among the elite in Division I-A football. The ACC is the nation's winningest bowl conference, as the nine current league teams are a combined 92-82-5 (.528) in postseason play.

A year ago, the ACC set an NCAA record when seven of its nine teams (78 percent) received bowl bids. Over the past two years, 13 of a possible 18

ACC teams (72 percent) have received bowl bids. Conference bowl participants posted a 4-3 mark and tied a league record, all having finished the regular season with winning records.

Two ACC teams (Georgia Tech and Florida State) rank among the nation's winningest bowl teams. Among teams with 20 or more bowl appearances, the Yellow Jackets stand third behind only Southern California and Penn State with a 20-11 (.645) postseason mark, while the Seminoles are fifth at 18-11-2 (.613).

This past season, the ACC had a consensus All-American, and over the past six years has produced 25 consensus All-Americans. For the third-straight year, the ACC set new attendance marks in football. Over 58 home games, ACC teams drew 2,944,936 fans, breaking the previous record of 2,776,724 set during the 2001 season. In addition, in its 50th season, the league eclipsed the 50,000-per-game mark for the first time, averaging 50,775 per game. That mark surpassed the previous single-season record of 49,673 established in 2001.

The ACC set an NCAA record for percentage of teams participating in bowl in 2002 when seven of its nine teams (78 percent) earned bowl bids. ACC teams who participated in bowls in 2002 were Clemson (Tangerine Bowl), Florida State (Sugar Bowl), Georgia Tech (Silicon Valley Classic), Maryland (Peach Bowl), N.C. State (Gator Bowl), Virginia (Continental Tire Bowl), and Wake Forest (Seattle Bowl).

Thirteen of the 18 possible teams have earned a postseason bid the last two years. The current nine ACC teams are a combined 92-82-5 (.519) in postseason play, the winningest conference mark with at least 50 bowl appearances.

ACC Football Facts

- The ACC set a conference attendance record, drawing 2,944,936 fans and averaging 50,775 per contest.
- For the second time overall, the ACC had four teams ranked in the final **Associated Press** and Coaches' polls.
- The ACC had 17 football All-Americans (first-team through honorable mention), including Clemson's Brian Mance.
- The ACC was 13-9 (.591) against BCS conference foes, the second-best record among the six BCS conferences.
- The ACC played 47 percent of non-conference games against BCS conference opponents, the best percentage among BCS conferences.
- The ACC had 20 first- or second-team All-ACC players return in 2003.
- Clemson sophomore cornerback Justin Miller led the ACC and tied for fifth in the nation in interceptions (8). He tied the ACC freshman record for interceptions and led the league in kickoff return average. He was the first ACC player since 1985 to lead the league in both categories in the same year, and the first freshman to do it.
- The ACC has two of the nation's top three returning tacklers for 2003, North Carolina safety Dexter Reid, and Clemson linebacker John Leake.
- The ACC has 141 starters from the 2002 season returning in 2003.

Virginia - Charter member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1894, charter member of the Southern Conference in 1921, resigned from Southern Conference in December, 1936, joined the ACC in December, 1953.

Wake Forest - Joined the Southern Conference in February, 1936, charter member of the ACC in 1953.

The date July 1, 2003 will go down as a significant day in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference. On that day, it was announced by league commissioner John Swofford that two universities would be joining the ACC. Miami (FL) and Virginia Tech, both of the Big East Conference, decided to accept the ACC's invitation to expand.

The ACC's desire to expand its rapidly-growing football prowess led to the courting of the two schools, who in recent years have boasted successful football programs. Miami and Virginia Tech have appeared in three of the last four National Championship games, with the Hurricanes taking the title in 2001. Miami has a total of five national championships, all within the last 20 years.

Despite the fact that Miami and Virginia Tech have never been in the same conference as Clemson, the history between the schools is not bare. In fact, Clemson has competed against Miami 119 times in nine different current sports and 123 times against Virginia Tech. In football, the Tigers have faced the Hurricanes five different times and the Hokies a total of 28 times.

The Virginia Tech series dates to 1900, the fifth year of Clemson football. The Tigers won that inaugural meeting by a score of 12-5. That Clemson squad was coached by college football legend John Heisman. The series was played off and on over the next several years. In 1945, Clemson gained its largest margin of victory over Virginia Tech after it defeated the Hokies 35-0 at home. Frank Howard coached Clemson during that time, and actually had a 5-1 record against Virginia Tech during his 29-year tenure as the Tigers' head coach.

The most significant era between Clemson and Virginia Tech was the period from 1977-89, as the two schools squared off 10 times. Clemson was victorious in nine of the 10 contests. Former Tiger Head Coach Danny Ford guided Clemson to a 7-1 record against the Hokies during his tenure.

The most publicized game of that era took place in 1984 at Clemson. The top two defensive linemen in college football that year were Virginia Tech's Bruce Smith and Clemson's William Perry. Both were finalists for the Lombardi Award and they faced off at Clemson in November. Clemson came away with a 17-10 victory, but it was another Perry who proved to be the key for Clemson. Freshman Michael Dean Perry, who would go on to a six-time NFL Pro Bowl career, had three tackles for loss and 10 total tackles to lead the Tiger defense. Smith had a terrific game for the Hokies, but the Tigers came away with the victory.

The only loss to Virginia Tech during that period came in the season opener of the 1986 season, a 20-14 Hokie victory. Clemson went on to an 8-2-2 season and won the ACC championship, while Virginia Tech finished 9-2-1 and captured a bowl victory in the Peach Bowl under Head Coach Bill Dooley.

The two teams did not meet again until the 1998 season. That year, the Hokies handed the Tigers a lopsided 37-0 defeat in Death Valley. Tommy Bowden, Clemson's current head coach, faced Virginia Tech in just his third game with the Tigers, a Thursday evening nationally televised contest in Blacksburg. However, Clemson trailed by a score



of only 17-11 and had the ball with seven minutes left, but All-American lineman Corey Moore recovered a fumble and raced for a touchdown. Virginia Tech and quarterback Michael Vick lost in the national championship game to Florida State in the Sugar Bowl to close that season.

Clemson and Virginia Tech met again at the end of the 2000 season, this time in the Toyota Gator Bowl. Clemson entered the game with a 9-2 record and top-15 ranking, while Virginia Tech was 10-1 and a top-five ranked team. The game featured opposing multi-talented quarterbacks in Michael Vick of Virginia Tech and Woodrow Dantzler of Clemson.

Vick, the #1 pick of the 2001 NFL Draft, accounted for two touchdowns in the contest. Dantzler, who was still a bit hampered by a nagging ankle injury, totaled 261 yards of offense to lead Clemson. The Hokies emerged victorious, winning by a score of 41-20. Rod Gardner, current wide receiver for the Washington Redskins, caught a touchdown pass in his final collegiate game and became Clemson's career reception leader.

Overall, Clemson holds a 17-10-1 lead over Virginia Tech. Frank Beamer, who has turned the Hokie program into a perennial top-20 team, is 3-3 against Clemson as Virginia Tech's head coach. He lost three in a row from 1987-89, but has since guided the Hokies to three straight wins over Clemson.

The history between Clemson and Miami is less significant in that there have been just five contests, none since 1956. However, two of the games have been New Year's Day bowl contests.

The first meeting between Clemson and Miami came in 1945, when the Hurricanes narrowly protected their home field with a 7-6 edge over the Tigers. The next meeting between the two came at the end of the 1950 season in the Orange Bowl, Miami's home stadium.

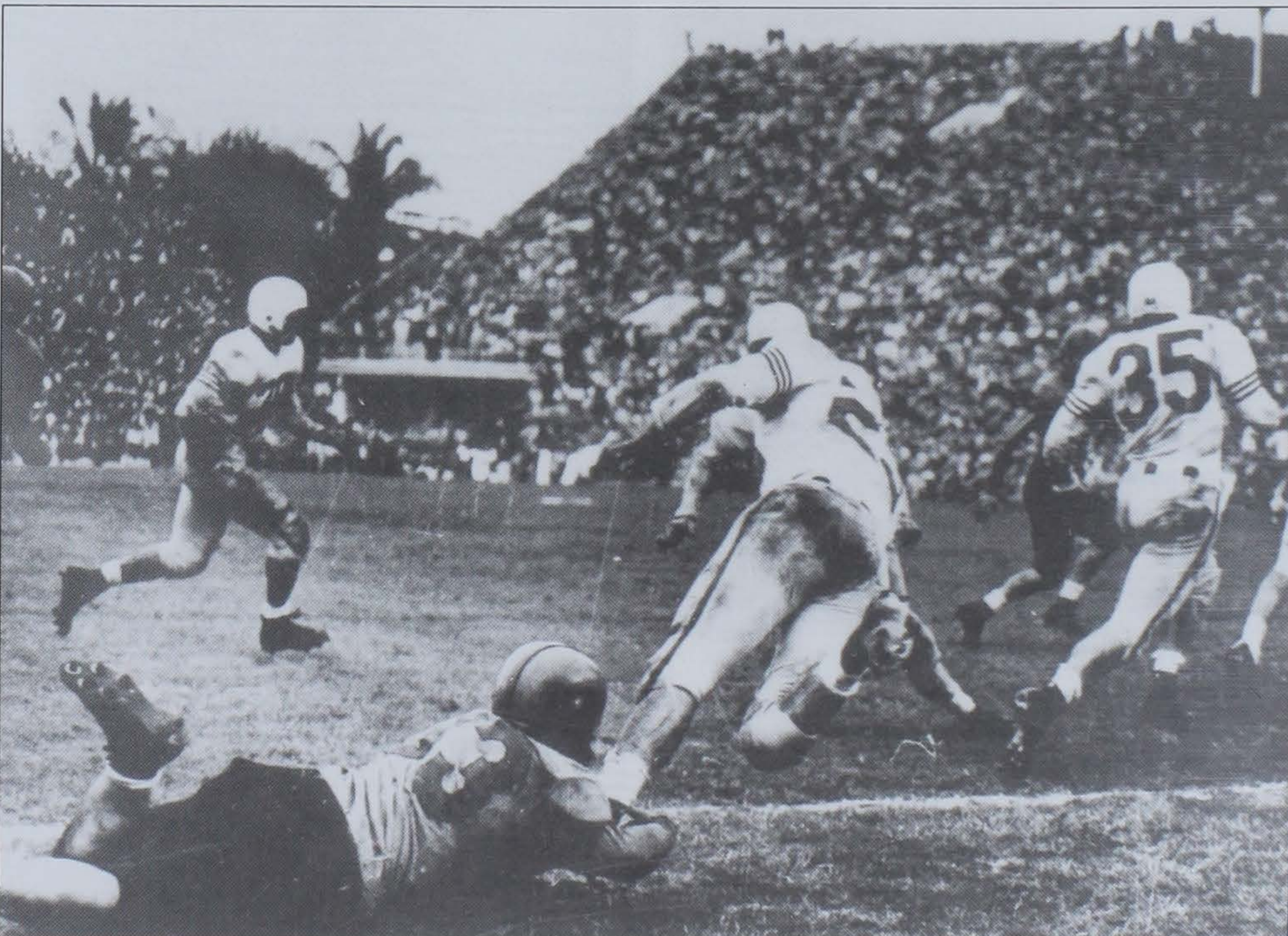
Clemson entered the game ranked #10 in the nation, while Miami was #15 according to the **Associated Press**. Clemson held a 7-0 lead at halftime, thanks to Billy Hair's long pass to Bob Hudson that set up the touchdown. Fred Cone, who carried the ball a still Clemson bowl record 31 times, plunged in from one yard out.

Miami put 14 points on the board in the third period and blocked an extra point attempt by Clemson, giving the Hurricanes a 14-13 lead heading into the final quarter. With four minutes left, Miami found itself in deep trouble after three penalties pushed the Hurricanes back toward their own endzone. Miami pitched the ball to Frank Smith, who was tripped in the endzone by Sterling Smith, giving Clemson a safety and a 15-14 Orange Bowl victory. It remains the latest game-winning safety in Clemson history.

The two squads met again the following year in the 1952 Gator Bowl. This time, Miami emerged victorious. The Hurricanes defeated the Tigers 14-0, despite being outgained in yardage by the Tigers. Clemson turned the ball over five times in the contest.

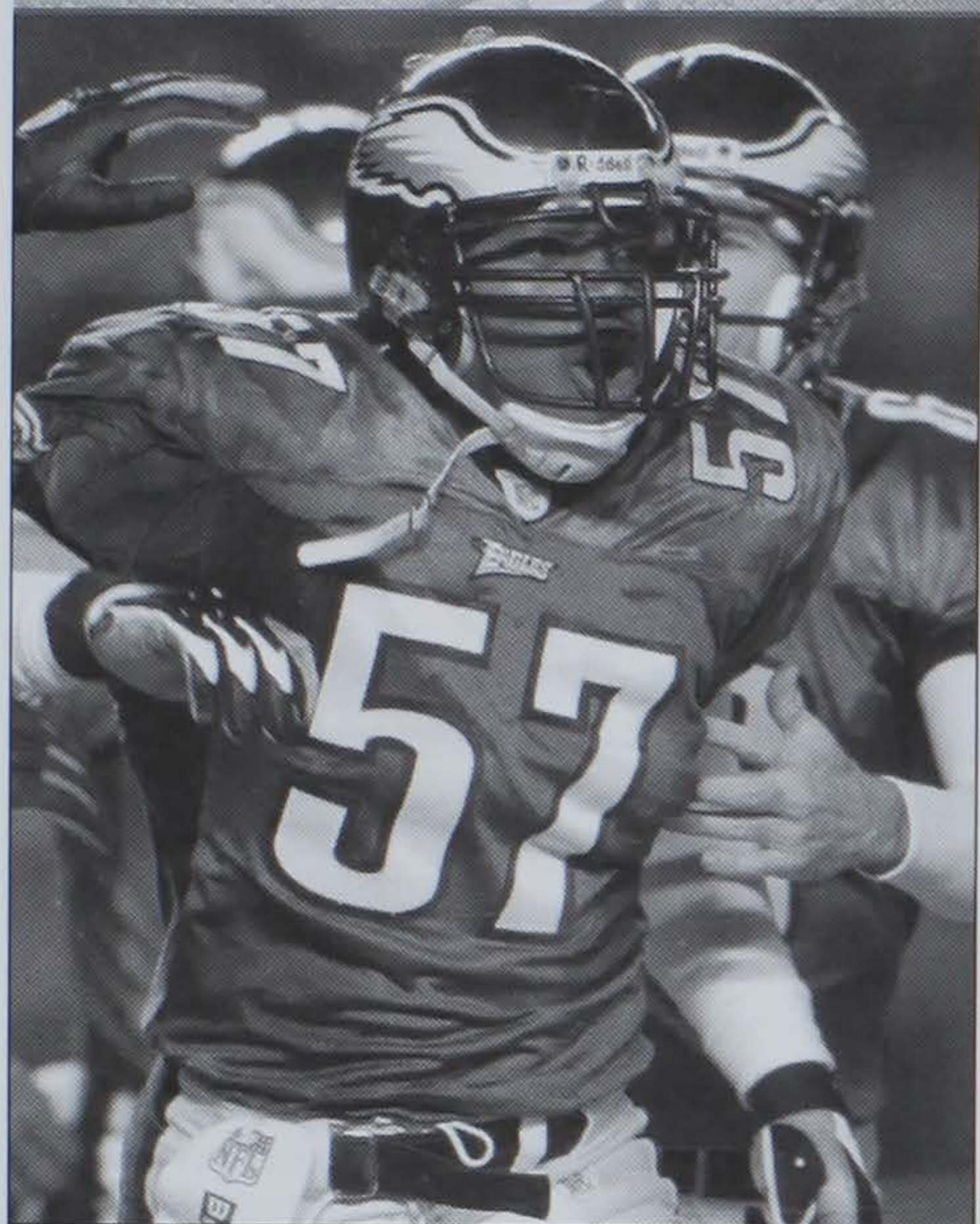
Clemson and Miami met again in 1953 and 1956, with the Hurricanes gaining victory both times. In 1956, Miami defeated the ACC Champion Tigers 21-0. Miami leads the series 4-1 over Clemson, with all five games coming during the Frank Howard era.

Clemson is certainly familiar with both programs and will be looking forward to renewing history with both the Miami Hurricanes and Virginia Tech Hokies.

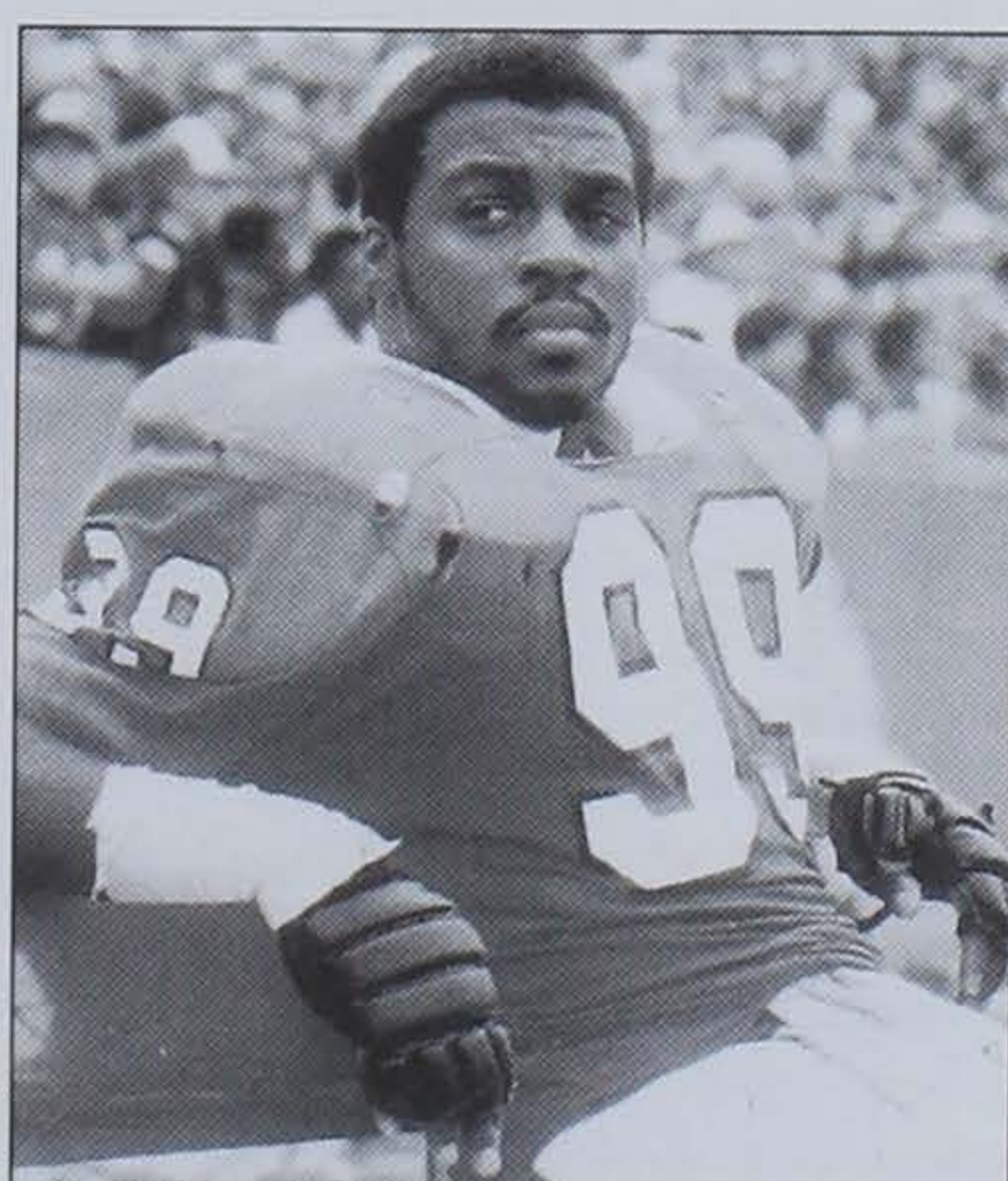

Clemson's athletic facilities have been undergoing major renovation in the last few years and that process will continue in 2003-04. The athletic department is in the process of raising over \$80 million to finance major facility renovations to bring Clemson's athletic facilities to among the finest in the nation.

Clemson Memorial stadium is in the middle of a multi-year project that includes a new brick facade at Death Valley. The renovations will continue after the 2003 football season when the WestZone construction begins.

Over the last year, Littlejohn Coliseum, Doug Kingsmore Stadium, and McHugh Natatorium have all had major renovations. All three facilities will be completely finished by the fall of 2003. A new indoor track, also opening in December of 2003, has been constructed that will greatly enhance Clemson's track program.

Clemson's National Championship golf program will have a new practice area adjacent to the Robinson Practice Facility in 2004. A new boathouse has been built at Lake Hartwell for the Clemson rowing program, while a new floor and seating area have changed the configuration of the Jervy Gym, the home of Clemson's volleyball program. The Hoke Sloan Tennis facility and Riggs Field are also in the process of improvements.



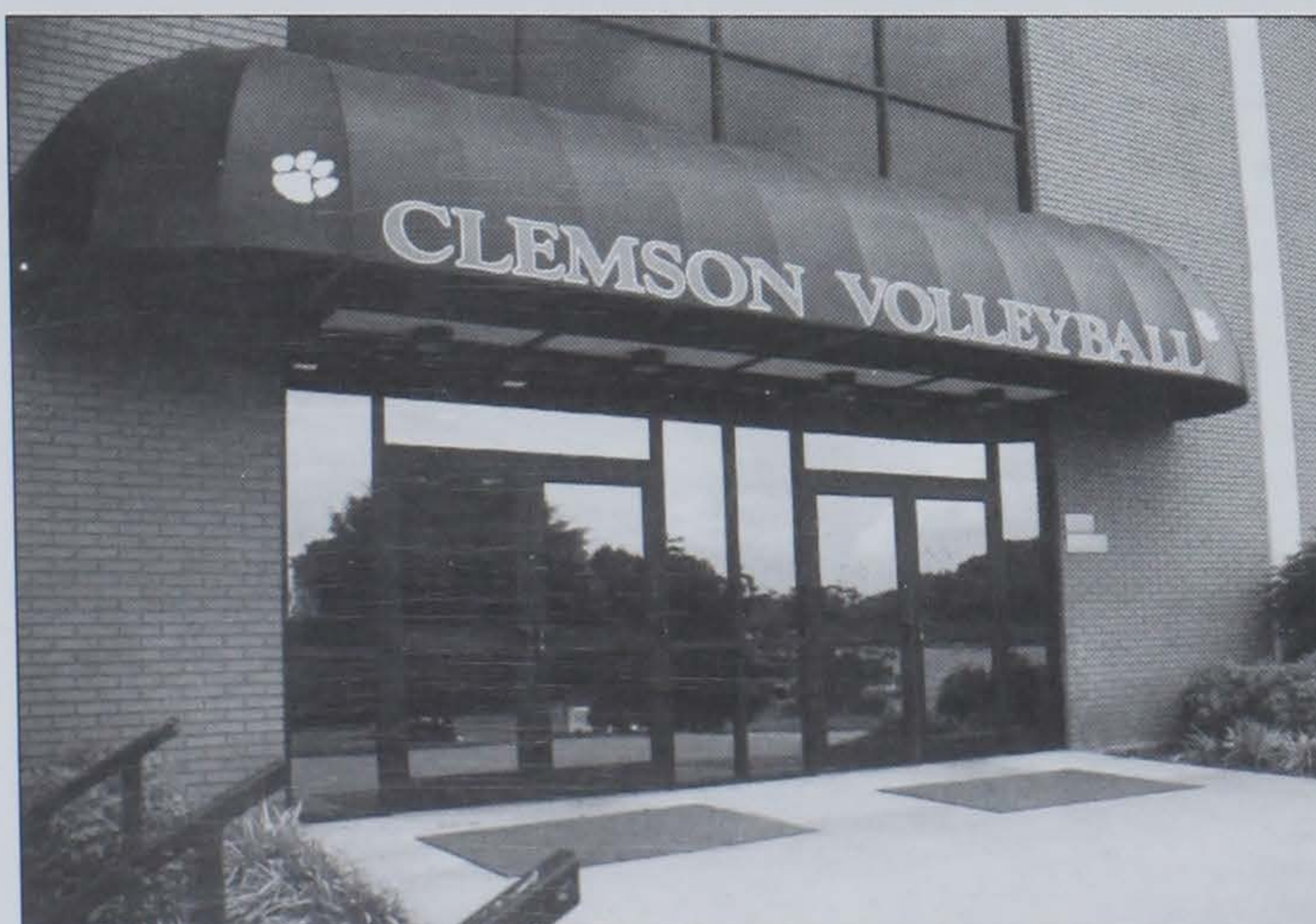

Doug Kingsmore Stadium just completed a \$4-million renovation in 2003. The stadium, which has a capacity of 5,000, is ranked among the best in the nation.



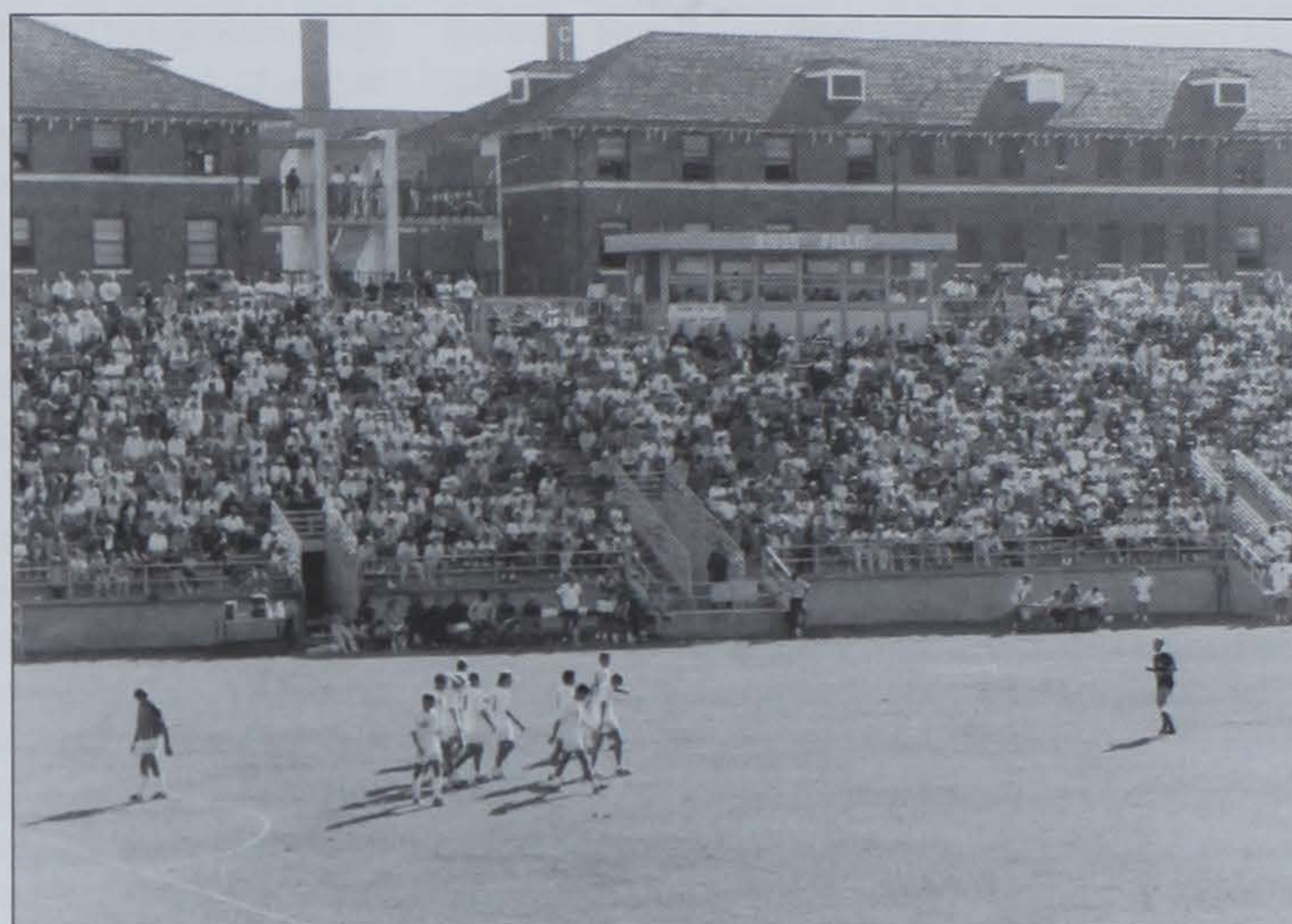

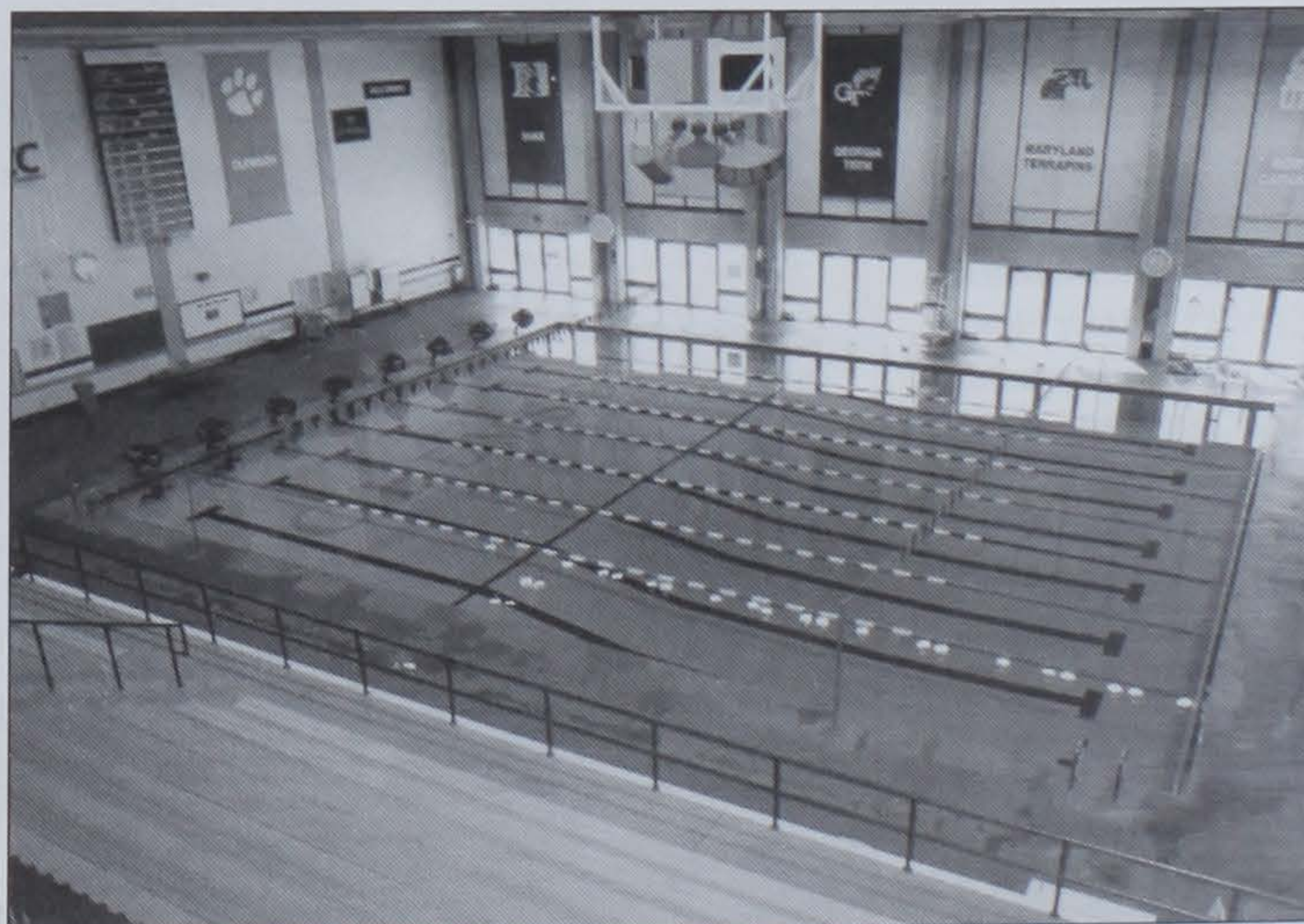
Rock Norman Outdoor Track added 1,500 seats in 2000 and has been the site of three ACC Track Championships.

The Walker Course is the home of Clemson's National Championship Golf program. The course opened in 1992 and features the signature 17th hole, whose green and bunkers form a Tiger Paw.



McHugh Natatorium is the home of Clemson's men's and women's swimming programs. It had a significant renovation in 2002 and will reopen as part of the Fike Fieldhouse complex in the fall.

Baseball

Clemson advanced to an NCAA Regionals for the 29th time and 17th straight year. The team had a 14-game winning streak, the longest winning streak since 1996. Eight times during the season Clemson defeated a top-25 team, including three straight wins over #4 Georgia Tech. Clemson also defeated South Carolina three of the four meetings. The entire infield earned All-ACC honors. **Michael Johnson** was named to the first-team. He finished his career with 58 homers, second in school history. Ten of those came against the Gamecocks. **David Slevin**, a Second-Team All-ACC selection, hit safely in 22 straight games during the season, which tied for the fifth-longest hitting streak in Clemson history. **Brad McCann** earned Second-Team All-ACC honors and had a 20-game hitting streak to end the season. **Russell Triplett** was named as the Second-Team All-ACC shortstop. Hurler **Robert Rohrbaugh** earned Freshman All-America honors.

Basketball (Men's)

The Tigers began the season with nine wins in a row, its best start since 1995-96. The streak included a win over eventual NCAA Tournament team Cincinnati. The 9-0 record tied for the sixth-best winning streak in school history. The 2002-03 squad improved in 14 areas from the previous year, including win percentage, RPI, and turnover margin. The team led the ACC in fewest turnovers, averaging only 13.5 a game. The Tigers defeated Virginia in Charlottesville for just their fourth road win over the Cavaliers in 25 years. Senior point guard **Edward Scott** was a First-Team All-ACC pick, the first Tiger point guard in 43 years and just the 10th player in Clemson history to achieve such honors. He was named the male athlete-of-the-year in the state by the South Carolina Hall of Fame. He became the ninth player in ACC history to record at least 1,000 points, 500 assists, and 400 rebounds in a career. **Oliver Purnell**, who had led Dayton to a #4 seed in the 2003 NCAA Tourney, was named head coach.

Basketball (Women's)

Clemson's women's basketball program recorded its 200th ACC win on January 26 against Wake Forest. The team won the Sun Splash Shootout title in the Bahamas, marking the second time Clemson won the tournament. Senior **Chrissy Floyd** set numerous records and earned many awards. She was named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Team as one of the top 50 ACC women's basketball players in history. She was also honored as South Carolina's Female Co-Amateur Athlete-of-the-Year. She was named First-Team All-

ACC, making her only the fourth person in history to be an All-ACC pick (first or second team) for four seasons. She also earned her third consecutive District II All-America honor. Her 1,937 career points rank her as Clemson's second all-time leading scorer, trailing only Lady Tiger Legend **Barbara Kennedy**, and placed her 15th on the ACC career scoring list. **Amanda White** was named to the First-Team Freshman All-ACC.

Football

When Clemson played in the 2002 Tangerine Bowl, **Tommy Bowden** became just the third ACC coach to take a program to a bowl game in each of his first four years. Cornerback **Justin Miller** was a unanimous freshman All-American and was second in the voting for ACC Rookie-of-the-Year. He led the ACC in interceptions (8) and was fifth in the nation. **Nick Eason** was named to the First-Team All-ACC and finished his career 15th on Clemson's career sack list. **John Leake** and **Rodney Thomas** ranked second and third, respectively, in the ACC in tackles per game and both were ranked in the top 10 in the nation. **The Sporting News** named **Brian Mance** a first-team All-ACC and fourth-team All-American. He finished his career tied for third in school history for career interceptions (12). **Derrick Hamilton** was the ACC leader in all-purpose yards and ranked 20th in the nation with an ACC sophomore-record 1,883 yards. Freshman quarterback **Charlie Whitehurst** broke 22 school records, including 14 freshman marks. He set single-game records for completions (34), passing yards (420), and pass efficiency (241.1). **Jackie Robinson** was a Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship winner. He was named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll each of his five years, the first Tiger gridder to do that since 1995.

Golf (Men's)

Larry Penley's golf team won its first ever NCAA Championship by defeating nine-time champion Oklahoma State on its home course by two strokes. It was the first national title for any Clemson program in 16 years. The team became the first golf team in college golf history to capture a conference title, a regional title, and the national title in the same year. Those three victories, along with three others, set a school record for most tournaments won during a season. Clemson ranked first in the final Sagarin/Golfweek ratings, a full computer point ahead of the #2 team. **Larry Penley** was honored by the Coaches' Association as the National Coach-of-the-Year. He also was named the District and the ACC Coach-of-the-Year. Three

golfers were All-Americans. **D.J. Trahan** earned first-team honors and became only the fifth Tiger golfer to be a two-time first-team All-American. Second-team All-American **Jack Ferguson** set the Tiger record for consecutive rounds shooting par or better (15) and made the winning putt at the ACC Tournament. **Matt Hendrix** was a third-team All-America selection. He was also named to the Men's At-Large Verizon Academic All-District III Second-Team. **Trahan, Ferguson, Hendrix, and Gregg Jones** all were named to the All-ACC team as well. For the first time in history, the team had three players rated in the top 10 in the nation. **Trahan** was second, **Ferguson** held the #5 rating, and **Hendrix** was ninth in the final Golfweek/Sagarin ranking.

Rowing (Women's)

The rowing team posted a third-place finish in the ACC Championships and finished fourth in the South Region. The novice 8+ boat was named ACC Crew-of-the-Week twice, and the Varsity 8+ earned ACC Crew-of-the-Week honors as well. **Kate Niebauer** and coxswain **Emily Kuivila** earned All-ACC honors, and **Niebauer** was named an NSCA Strength and Conditioning All-American. **Kuivila** was also selected to the first-team All-Region. Sophomore rower **Mary Nell Green** was named to the second-team All-Region. **Green, Kuivila, and Niebauer**, along with **Elizabeth Noll** and **Diana Ulrey**, were named 2003 National Scholar Athletes as well.

Soccer (Men's)

Trevor Adair's men's soccer team advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA tournament for the 11th time in Tiger history and the fourth time in six years. The team finished the year ranked #7 in the Coaches' Poll and #14 by **Soccer America**. Clemson held the #2 ranking in the Coaches' Poll for the week of September 9-15 and spent eight weeks ranked in the top 10. The win over top-ranked Wake Forest 2-1 in overtime was the soccer team's sixth overall win over a #1-ranked team and first since 1993. Goalkeeper **Doug Warren** was named a first-team All-American (NSCAA). His 261 career saves rank fourth in Tiger history. **Dimelon Westfield** scored 20 goals in 2002 and had five assists. He earned First-Team All-ACC and second-team All-America (NSCAA) honors. The senior forward scored goals in nine consecutive matches, which is tied for the second-longest scoring streak by a Clemson player.

Soccer (Women's)

Todd Bramble's women's soccer team advanced to the ACC Tourney finals and made its ninth straight appearance in the NCAA Tourney. The program has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in every year of its existence. The team finished #25 in the Coaches' Poll. **Deliah Arrington** was the first Clemson women's soccer player to be named the ACC Player-of-the-Year after leading the ACC with 18 goals and a 2.05 points-per-game average. She set school career records for total points (127) and goals (50). She earned second-team All-America and first-team All-South Region honors. **Heather Beem** finished her career tied for fifth in assists (23), tied for sixth in goals (28), and eighth in points (79). She was named First-Team All-ACC and third-team All-South

Region. Sophomore **Paige Ledford** earned Second-Team All-ACC honors, and **Allison Graham** was selected to the Freshman All-ACC team.

Swimming & Diving (Men's)

Two members of **Chris Ip's** men's swimming & diving team competed in the NCAA Championships. **Rob Kummer** finished 35th in the 100-yard fly, and **Eric Shulick** finished 32nd in the one-meter dive. **Kummer** was the ACC runner-up in both the 100-yard and 200-yard fly. **Mark Henly** won the ACC title in the 200-yard back. **Henly, Kummer, Shulick,** and **Craig Thomas** all earned All-ACC honors. **Thomas Rappold** was named to the Men's At-Large Verizon Academic All-District III second-team with a 4.0 GPA in computer information systems.

Swimming & Diving (Women's)

The women's swimming & diving team had two swimmers advance to the NCAA Championships. **Kim Routh** finished 22nd in the 1,650-yard free and 43rd in the 500-yard free. **Mandy Commons** recorded was 22nd in the 100-yard breast. The 200-yard medley relay team of **Commons, Lindsey Kroeger, Courtney Humes,** and **Elise Thieler** tied for first at the ACC's. All four were named All-ACC. Senior **Jenna Burtch** was an At-Large Verizon Academic All-America second-team honoree after graduating with a 4.0 GPA in psychology. She also earned one of the prestigious Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate scholarships.

Tennis (Men's)

Chuck Kriese's 28th Clemson men's tennis team finished with a 25-11 record, its high win total since 1989. It was a 14-win improvement over the previous year, the biggest one-season victory jump since 1962. One of the 25 was a win over #6 Georgia by a score of 4-3, Clemson's first win over the Bulldogs since 1988. Georgia eventually advanced to the Final Four of the NCAA Tourney. The team was 6-2 in the ACC for a second-place finish. Clemson made its 20th NCAA Tourney appearance and advanced to the Final 32. **Nathan Thompson** and **Jarmaine**

Jenkins competed in the NCAA Doubles Tourney. **John Boetsch, Damiisa Robinson, Sander Koning,** and **Ash Misquith** were tabbed All-ACC. **Boetsch** and **Robinson** won the ACC Flight #2 Doubles title and had a 5-1 mark in ACC play. **Robinson** won the ACC Flight #5 title, posting a 26-9 singles record. **Misquith** was the Flight #6 ACC Champ, going 7-0 in the ACC. **Koning** finished with a 27-9 overall record in singles play.

Tennis (Women's)

In its highest final ranking since 1996, the team rose to #19 in the final ITA poll. The team upset #12 North Carolina to clinch sole possession of second place in the ACC, its highest finish since 1994. The team advanced to the Final 32 of the NCAA Tourney. **Julie Coin** had a 31-6 record, earning All-ACC honors and a final singles ranking of #22. Matched with **Laurence Jayet**, the team ranked #25 in the ITA doubles poll and qualified for the NCAA Doubles Championship. **Jayet** earned All-ACC honors after winning the ACC Flight #5 Singles title. The doubles team of **Alix Lacelarie** and **Daniela Alvarez** finished ranked #23 in the final ITA poll after tallying an 18-2 overall record and winning the ACC Flight Championship at the #2 doubles slot. The duo won 18 consecutive matches at the #2 position at one point in the season. **Lacelarie** was also ranked #48 in the final ITA singles poll. She was the ACC #2 Singles Flight Champion and an All-ACC selection. She advanced to the second round of the NCAA Singles Championship for the second straight year.

Track & Field (Men's)

Bob Pollock's men's track and field team enjoyed another successful year, as the Tigers placed second at the ACC Indoor and Outdoor Championships and fourth at the inaugural East Region Championships. At the NCAA Indoor Championships, six Tigers earned All-America honors and the team finished with a #28 ranking. Juniors **Larry Griffin** and **Terrance McDaniel** earned All-America honors in the 60m dash and high jump, respectively, and the 4x400m relay team of **Jacey Harper, Michael**

Bolling, Roy Cheney, and **Otto Spain** earned All-America honors in the 1,600m. At the NCAA Outdoor Championships, two Tigers earned All-America honors. Freshman **Itay Magidi** placed eighth in the 3,000m steeplechase, and **George Kitchens** garnered the honor in the long jump. **Rick Hill** was named to the 2003 Verizon Academic All-American University Division Men's Track third-team, the sole ACC athlete represented.

Track & Field (Women's)

Gisele Oliveira's ACC and Clemson record-setting performance in the triple jump at the NCAA Outdoor Championships was the highlight of the Lady Tigers' NCAA trip. She earned All-America honors in the long jump and triple jump under the tutelage of **Marcia Noad**. She placed eighth in the long jump and third in the triple jump, becoming the first Clemson jumper to earn All-America honors in two events in the same season. She was also named to the 2003 CoSIDA Academic All-District III first-team, boasting a 3.90 GPA in marketing. Senior **Joana Costa** made Lady Tiger history as the first pole vaulter from Clemson to compete at the NCAA's, and senior **Lauren Nicholson** was the second heptathlete to advance to the national meet.

Volleyball

Jolene Jordan Hoover earned her 300th career win. Setter **Jessi Betcher** was named to the Second-Team All-ACC and recorded her 5,000th career assist. She ended the season with 5,307 career assists, giving her the school record by more than 1,000 assists. **Betcher** and sophomore **Lori Ashton** were named to the AVCA All-East Region First-Team. Also a First-Team All-ACC selection, **Ashton** had a team-leading 497 kills and .383 hitting percentage, which ranked 14th in the nation. She is Clemson's career hitting-percentage leader (.343) and ranks sixth in Clemson history with an average of 3.24 kills per game. **Kristen Swanson** earned ACC All-Freshman honors, while junior **Marija Zoric** was named a second-team Verizon Academic All-District III selection with a 3.91 GPA in marketing.

Overview: Semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award in 2002, he should be a strong candidate for that award again as a senior...has 34 career starts entering 2003, more than any other active Tiger...that includes a starting assignment in each of the last three bowl games, the only Tiger who can make that claim...has missed playing in just one game in his career, the 2002 N.C. State game when Clemson did not attempt a field goal or extra point...has scored in all 36 games he has played in his Clemson career...honorable mention All-American by **College Football News** in 2002...Honorable Mention All-ACC in 2002...ranked as the 15th-best placekicker in the nation by **The Sporting News** entering the 2003 season...has scored at least 74 points each of his first three years and currently ranks fifth in school history in total points (237)...appears destined to break Nelson Welch's all-time Clemson mark of 301, so he needs just 65 to break the Clemson and ACC kick scoring record...Clemson's career leader in extra points (126)...missed just one extra point in 2002 (the Ball State game at home)...has made 25 straight PATs entering 2003...second-straight year he has missed just one; he had a miss at South Carolina in final regular-season game of 2001...has made 37-50 field goals over his career, 74 percent...over the last two years, he has kicked the ball 117 times and it has gone through the uprights 108 times...has missed just two extra points and seven field goals during that time...kicked the game-winning field goal with just eight seconds left in the 34-31 win over Duke in 2002; it was the second time in his career he kicked a field goal with under 10 seconds left to win a game...also did it against South Carolina as a freshman when he kicked a 25-yarder with three seconds left to give Clemson a 16-14 victory...owns three of the top-seven extra-point seasons in Clemson history, including a record 45 made PATs in 2000...fifth in Clemson history in career field goals with 37...is 3-5 on field goals and 10-10 on extra points in bowl games in his career...fourth in Clemson history in career kick scoring points, he trails just Nelson Welch (1991-94), Obed Ariri (1977-80), and Chris Gardocki (1988-90)...has made a field goal in 24 of his 36 career games.

In 2002: Second in the ACC and 18th in the nation in field goals per game, he was fourth in the ACC in scoring with 7.3 points per game...had a very strong junior year, as he made 17-22 field goals and 37-38 extra points...that was after a season opener in which he was 0-2, so he made 17 of his last 20 attempts...made 12 in a row from September 21 through his second attempt of the South Carolina game...missed a 47-yarder against the Gamecocks that ended the streak, second longest in Clemson history (record is 14 in a row by Obed Ariri in 1980)...had two games (Louisiana Tech and Maryland) in which he made four field goals, the only ACC kicker to make four field goals in a game all year...named ACC Specialist-of-the-Week for his four field goals against Maryland; he scored all 12 of Clemson's points in that game...consistent kicker, especially inside 40 yards; he was 15-17 inside 40 yards as a junior and is 20-24 inside 40 yards the last two years...his 88 points in 2002 were a career high...his four field goals against Louisiana Tech were for a combined 144 yards, the seventh-highest figure in Clemson history...his 88 points scored are seventh in Clemson history in kick scoring points, one better than Obed Ariri's All-America season of 1980.

In 2001: Named the Clemson Special Teams Player-of-the-Year in a vote by the Clemson coaches...a model of consistency, as he kicked the ball 57 times and he was successful on 54 of the kicks...converted 10-12 field goals and 44-45 extra points...the only extra point miss was at South Carolina; it was a 35-yard attempt after a penalty was called on the Tigers on a touchdown play...that broke his streak of 44 consecutive made extra points...came back with a 7-7 PAT performance in the victory over Duke and was 7-7 against Louisiana Tech in the Humanitarian Bowl...he ranked third in the ACC in field-goal

season...team won the Region 2-AAAAA championship and reached the quarterfinals of the state playoffs...an outstanding student who was in Who's Who Among American High School Students...a member of Fellowship of Christian Athletes...born Aaron M. Hunt on 10-31-81, the day Clemson defeated Wake Forest 82-24 during its run to the national championship...majoring in marketing.

The Clemson defense forced four turnovers and yielded just two touchdowns and a field goal in the annual spring football game at Historic Riggs Field on April 5, 2003. Charlie Whitehurst led the offense by completing 14-20 passes for 160 yards and a touchdown. The scrimmage, played in front of 8,000 fans, concluded Clemson's 2003 spring practice.

Defensive backs Jamaal Fudge, Tavagh Monts, and Tye Hill each had interceptions and Monts also recovered a fumble during the afternoon. Gaines Adams led the defensive line with a pair of sacks for 12 negative yards. Travis Pugh led all tacklers with eight stops, including one for loss.

Head Coach Tommy Bowden emphasized the rushing game during the spring and that was evident in the Spring Game, as Clemson had 73 rushing plays to just 47 passing plays. Second-year running back Duane Coleman led the ball carriers with 42 yards in 15 attempts. In the March 29 scrimmage, Clemson ran 97 plays and 73 were running plays.

Red-shirt freshman quarterback Chansi Stuckey showed his all-around abilities in the game and he rushed for 35 yards in just seven attempts. He also completed 3-7 passes for 58 yards. Classmate Will Proctor was 4-7 for 44 yards as well.

Wide receiver Kevin Youngblood, Clemson's leading receiver in 2002, had five catches for 57 yards, while tight end Bobby Williamson had four catches for 61 yards. Red-shirt freshman Kelvin Grant had three catches, but for a game-high 72 yards. He had a 33-yard reception from Stuckey that was the long catch of the day.

Whitehurst led the offense on a 98-yard drive to close the scrimmage. He also provided the highlight play of the day. On one pass attempt, he stepped out of the pocket and threw the ball downfield. The ball was deflected at a high rate of speed by linebacker Leroy Hill. The deflection carried back to Whitehurst, who then caught the ball and ran for a 26-yard gain. On the last play of the game, Whitehurst threw a 20-yard scoring pass to Kyle Browning, who made some impressive moves over the last five yards to reach the corner of the endzone.

The only other scores on the day were registered by Cliff Harrell (a one-yard touchdown run that was set up by Grant's 33-yard reception) and a field goal by placekicker Aaron Hunt.

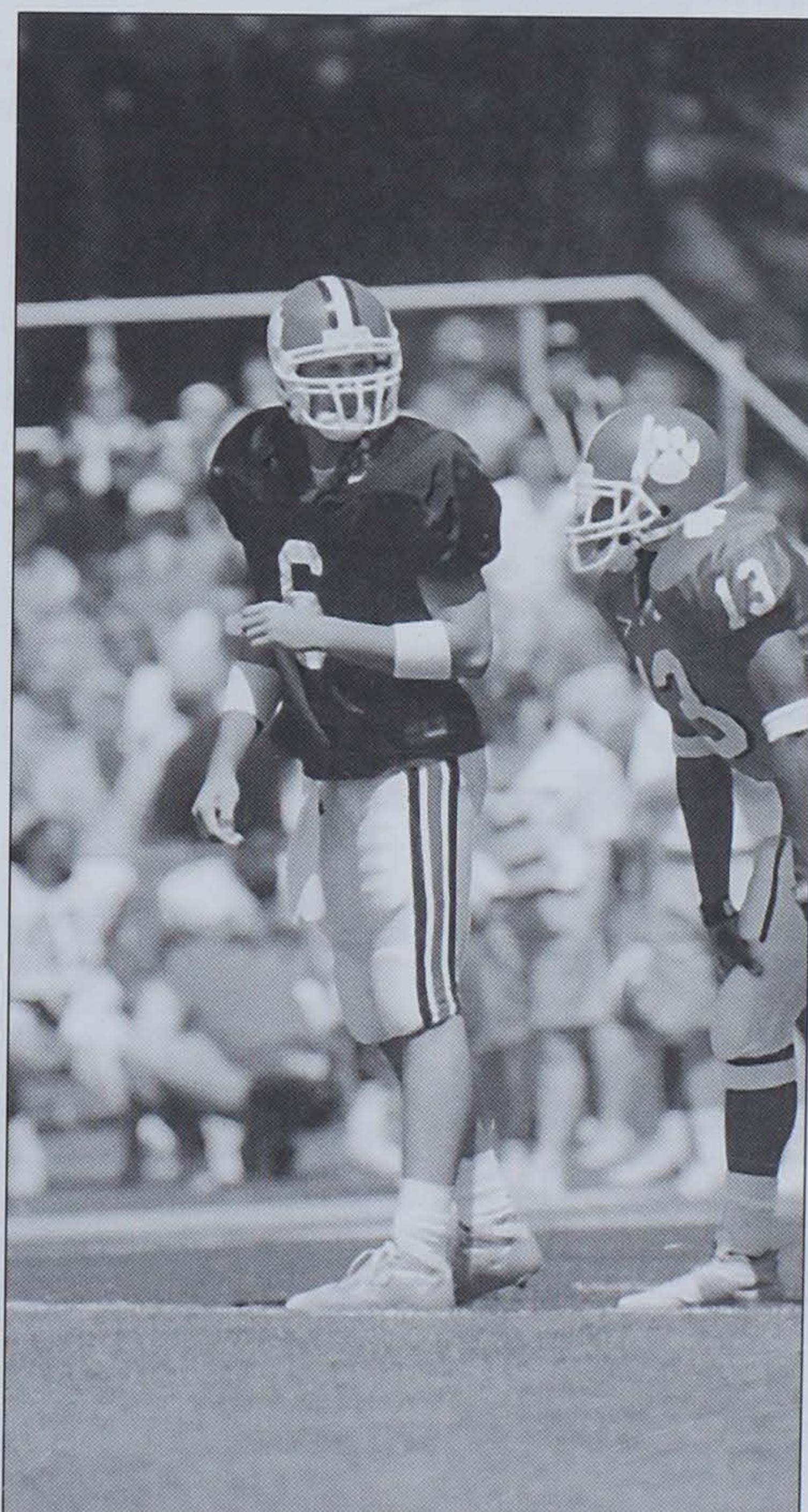
Bowden was pleased that the defense had the upper hand in the Spring Game. "Defense is going to win championships and that has always been my philosophy," said Bowden after the game. "The better you are defensively, the better chance you have. I'd rather see them dominate spring practice, two-a-days, and the season. I was glad to see this today because the defense had not had the upper hand during the previous spring practices."

"Gaines Adams was a defensive player who showed great progress in the spring. He led us in sacks through the spring scrimmages and was very active. I was also pleased with the way Vontrell Jamison progressed at defensive end. Both players have the size to help us next year."

"Offensively, I was pleased with the progress of some of the young offensive linemen. That was especially the case with Nathan Bennett, a red-shirt freshman who is a starter heading into the fall. Reggie Merriweather had an outstanding spring. He did not break a long run in the Spring Game, but it seemed like he did in every other scrimmage that we had. He had a pair of 75-yard runs during spring practices."

Bowden moved a few players to different positions during the spring. One was Tye Hill, who was Clemson's third-leading rusher last year and led the team in yards per carry. He moved to cornerback and is listed as the starter heading into the fall.

"Tye had a lot of learning to do in the spring, but really made progress," said Bowden. "He made a fine interception in the Spring Game. We purposely threw at him all spring to give him experi-

ence. He certainly has the speed to play that position."

Clemson got through spring practice with few injuries. Yusef Kelly suffered a sprained ankle during the Spring Game and missed the second half of the contest. Offensive lineman Tim DeBeer, one of the promising young players in that area of the team, suffered a dislocated ankle in the first half of the spring practice session in March and missed the game. Kelvin Morris suffered a knee injury during one of the spring scrimmages and will not play this year. He plans to return in 2004.

Touré Francis missed the entire spring from a contact standpoint due to the torn ACL he suffered in the season opener with Georgia in 2002. Ronny Delusme suffered the same injury in the Maryland game in November and also missed spring practice.

Quarterback Willie Simmons went through spring practice, but the graduate student decided to transfer to Florida A&M at the conclusion of the academic year. He was listed as the second-team quarterback heading into the fall after having started the first eight games of the 2002 season. Florida A&M is near his home in Quincy, FL. Because it is a Division I-AA school, he will be allowed to play immediately.

Bowden 4-for-4 in Going to Bowls At Clemson

Clemson Head Coach Tommy Bowden has now led Clemson to a bowl game in each of his first four years with the program. He is the first coach in Clemson history and just the third coach in ACC history to take a program to a bowl game in each of his first four seasons.

Bowden took Clemson to the Peach Bowl in 1999, the Gator Bowl in 2000, the Humanitarian Bowl in 2001, and the Tangerine Bowl in 2002. The only other coaches to take an ACC team to bowls in each of their first four years with a program are Bobby Ross and Lou Holtz. Ross took Maryland to the Aloha, Citrus, Sun, and Cherry Bowls from 1982-85, while Holtz took N.C. State to the Peach, Liberty, Bluebonnet, and Peach Bowls from 1972-75.

No coach in ACC history has taken a program to a bowl game in each of his first five years at a school, certainly a worthwhile goal for Bowden's program in 2003.

Bowden Offenses Among Best in Tiger History

Clemson Head Coach Tommy Bowden came to Clemson with the reputation of producing big numbers on offense. His Tulane team of 1998 averaged over 500 yards of total offense per game and was the only squad in the nation to average at least 300 yards passing and 200 rushing per game.

His offensive numbers have not been quite as striking at Clemson, but they have been noteworthy. Here is a list of the Bowden offensive stats as they relate to Clemson history in his four years at Clemson:

- four of the top five completion totals in Clemson history
- the top-four passing-yardage single-season figures
- the top-four seasons in terms of passing yards per game
- four of the top five completion-percentage figures
- two of the top three yards-per-play figures, and top two since 1950

- three of the top five total offense per game figures
- four of the top six first downs per game figures
- two of the top seven scoring teams in school history

Miller Fifth in the Nation in Interceptions

One could make a case that the best player on the Clemson team in 2002 was a first-year freshman. Justin Miller finished the season fifth in the nation in interceptions with eight in 13 games. That figure tied the Clemson single-season record of eight held by Robert O'Neal in 1989. Ironically, O'Neal was also a first-year freshman that year. Miller also led the ACC in kickoff return average with a 35.1 figure.

Miller had one of the best all-around games in Clemson history for a defensive back in the loss to Maryland. The first-year freshman from Owensboro, KY had two interceptions, a pass deflection, two caused fumbles, and five tackles. Both caused fumbles came on "bone-jarring" hits, including one that was replayed over and over on ESPN's SportsCenter.

Additionally, Miller returned four kickoffs for 152 yards, including a 76-yard return that led to a Clemson field goal. The kickoff return yardage total was sixth highest in Clemson history for a single game. It was one yard less than the 153 Derrick Hamilton had at Maryland in 2001.

Miller finished the 2002 season with nine pass breakups to go with those eight interceptions, giving him 17 passes defended for the year. That total also tied the Clemson freshman record of 17 set by O'Neal in the 1989 season. Miller finished the season second to Brian Mance in that category in 2002.

Miller was a unanimous freshman All-American according to various services, including the Football Writers of America. It was the first year that organization selected a freshman All-America team. Miller was also named by **The Sporting News** and was second in the voting (behind N.C. State's T.A. McLendon) for ACC Rookie-of-the-Year.

Clemson Averaged Over 77,000 in 2002

Clemson averaged over 77,000 fans in 2002, the fourth-straight year Clemson averaged at least that much, a first in school history. The final figures announced by Ticket Manager Van Hilderbrand show Clemson averaged 77,525 fans for its seven-game schedule. That is the ninth best overall home average in school history, the second best for a seven-game home schedule. The only average that is higher for a seven-game home season was in 2000 when Clemson averaged 78,378 fans per game.

The student attendance average of 10,352 was the third-largest student attendance in school history. Only the 11,050 average in 2000 and the 10,680 figure for 1999 were larger. Each of the four highest student attendance figures in Clemson history have taken place under Head Coach Tommy Bowden.

Clemson sold 56,808 season tickets in 2002, the sixth-highest single-season figure in Clemson history. Two of the top six season ticket sales figures in Clemson history have taken place during Bowden's tenure.

Clemson had two crowds of over 80,000 fans in 2002 and won both games. A crowd of 81,008 saw the Tigers defeat Wake Forest 31-23 on Homecoming. The South Carolina game drew a crowd of 83,909, which ranks as the ninth-largest crowd to ever watch a game in Death Valley.

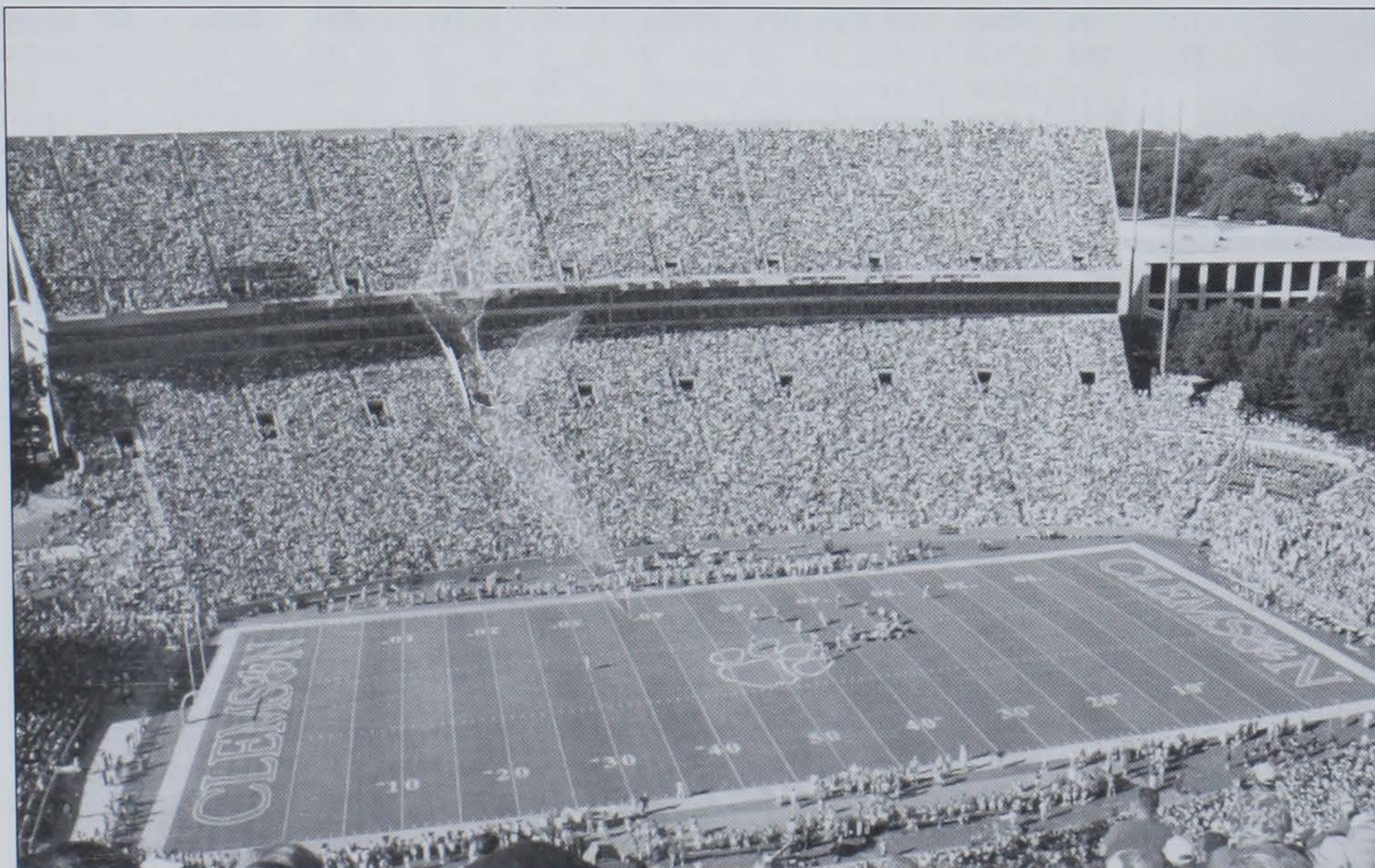

Hunt 18th in the Nation in Field Goals

Placekicker Aaron Hunt continued his outstanding career against South Carolina at the close of the 2002 regular season, as he made 2-3 field goals. He concluded the regular season by making 17 of his last 19 field goals. He was named ACC Player-of-the-Week for his performance against Maryland. Hunt made 4-4 field goals, hitting from 29, 35, 22, and 42 yards. He scored all 12 of Clemson's points. It marked the second time in 2002 he had a 4-4 day in terms of kicking field goals.

For the 2002 season, the Lou Groza Award semifinalist was 17-22, an outstanding 77.2

percentage. After missing his first two field goal attempts at Georgia in the season opener, he came back strong to have a solid year. He had made 12 in a row prior to a miss against South Carolina, the second-longest streak in Clemson history. The Clemson record for consecutive made field goals is 14, set by Obed Ariri in 1980.

Hunt finished the season 18th in the nation in field goals per game with 1.42 per game. He played in just 12 of the 13 games because he did not play against N.C. State. Hunt is now 37-50 for his career on field goals, a 74-percent mark. The Clemson career record on a percentage basis is held by Bob Paulling, who made 34-41 between 1979-83, an 82.9 percentage.

Hunt finished the year with 88 kicking points, a top-10 single-season figure. He has 237 points for his career, fifth in Clemson history. Hunt also has 126 extra points in his Clemson career, an all-time school record. He needs just 65 points in his senior year to break Nelson Welch's career scoring record of 301. Hunt has exceeded the 65-point mark each of his first three years at Clemson.

McKelvey, McNeal, Meekins Tie Tiger Record

Clemson defensive players Eric Meekins and Bryant McNeal and wide receiver J.J. McKelvey set the Clemson record for most games played in a career when they participated against Texas Tech in the Mazda Tangerine Bowl at the close of last season. Each played in every game the last four years, including bowl games against Mississippi State (1999 Peach Bowl), Virginia Tech (2001 Gator Bowl), Louisiana Tech (2001 Humanitarian Bowl), and Texas Tech (2002 Tangerine Bowl).

They broke the record of 48 games that had been held by the following: Rodney Williams (1985-88, QB), Mark Drag (1985-88, MG), Jeff Bak (1985-88, C), Otis Moore (1986-89, DT), Stacy Fields (1987-90, TE), Jerome Henderson (1987-90, CB), John Johnson (1987-90, OLB), Jeb Flesch (1988-91, OG), Levon Kirkland (1988-91, OLB), Ed McDaniel (1988-91, LB), and Justin Watts (1996-00, WR).

This year, a couple of Clemson defensive players are in line to break that record. Khaleed Vaughn and J.J. Howard have both played all 37 games over the last three years. Thus, they can reach the 50-game mark if they appear in all 12 regular-season games and a Clemson bowl game this year. That record could stand for a few years because NCAA rules will not allow teams to play a 12-game regular season schedule again until 2008.

Whitehurst Already Has Broken 22 Records

Charlie Whitehurst started just five games as a freshman, but he already has established 22

Clemson records on a game and season basis. Granted, 14 of them are freshman marks, but still, he is off to quite a start statistically and in the win column.

In his first start at Duke, Whitehurst completed 34-52 passes for 420 yards and four touchdowns. He was named ACC Offensive Back-of-the-Week for that performance. He threw for 215 yards in the fourth quarter alone, a Clemson record for one quarter. His 34 completions were a Clemson single-game record, as were his 420 passing yards. In fact, his 420 yards passing were the second best ever for an ACC quarterback in his first collegiate start. Dave Brown threw for 444 yards for Duke in his first start in 1989.

Against North Carolina the next weekend, Whitehurst completed 12-20 passes for 274 yards and four more touchdowns. His passing efficiency rating computed to 241.1, an all-time Clemson record for passing efficiency in a single game, given a minimum of 20 attempts. It is safe to say he enjoyed playing in "The Triangle" last season.

He continued the outstanding play in the win over South Carolina, completing 27-38 passes for 287 yards. He completed 71.1 percent of his passes in Clemson's 27-20 win over the intrastate rival. He directed Clemson on two fourth-quarter touchdown drives to win the game. The first score was an 11-yard scoring run by Whitehurst.

Whitehurst completed 123-214 passes for 1,554 yards and 10 touchdowns against six interceptions in 2002. He is the first Clemson freshman to throw for 1,500 yards in a season. He also had a streak of 108 consecutive passes without an interception snapped in the Maryland game. He broke the Clemson freshman record for touchdown passes, passing yards, and completions as well.

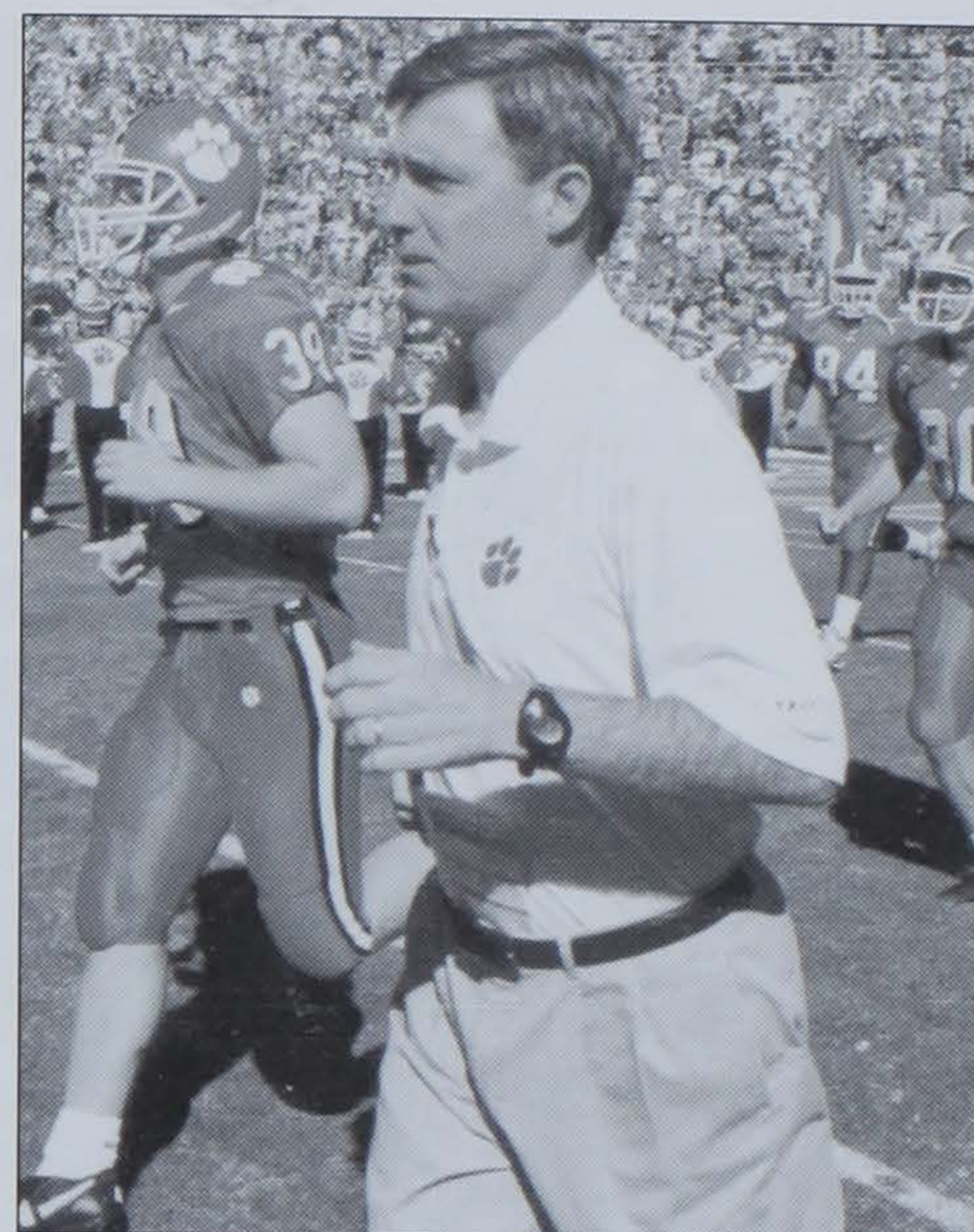

Running Game Key to Success Under Bowden

How important is the running game to Clemson under Tommy Bowden? The Tigers are 17-1 under Bowden when the Tigers rush for at least 200 yards. That stat was enhanced in the North Carolina game when the Tigers gained 256 rushing in the victory over the Tar Heels. Clemson was 8-8 on third-down conversions in the second half of that game thanks to the running game. Clemson has won 14 straight when rushing for at least 200 yards dating to the 1999 Georgia Tech game, when the Tigers rushed for 231 yards yet lost the contest by a 45-42 score.

Clemson is 27-5 under Bowden when the Tigers win the rushing-yardage stat. That includes a 4-1 record last year. Clemson is also 15-3 under Bowden when it has a 100-yard rusher. Clemson had a pair of 100-yard rushers at North Carolina, as Bernard Rambert had 19 carries for 106 yards, a career high in yardage, and freshman Tye Hill added 14 carries for 105 yards, also his career high.

That marked the first time since the 1996 Virginia game in Charlottesville that Clemson had two running backs in the same game gain over 100 yards. Kelton Dunnican and Raymond Priester accomplished that feat.

Clemson showed its ability to run the ball down the stretch against South Carolina. Clemson held the ball for the final 6:32 of that game to run out the clock and defeat South Carolina by a score of 27-20. Yusef Kelly had seven carries for 48 yards on that final drive.

With stats like that, it is easy to see why Tiger coaches wish to spend a lot of time on the running game, especially in short-yardage situations this fall.

200 of Each Means a Clemson "W"

Balance is obviously a hallmark of any successful offense. That has been the case for Clemson over the years and under Head Coach Tommy Bowden. Clemson gained 256 yards rushing and 274 passing in its victory at North Carolina, the second time in 2002 Clemson has had at least 200

of each in a game. In its 1,033-game history, Clemson has a 40-0-1 record when it has at least 200 yards passing and 200 yards rushing in the same game.

The win at North Carolina marked the 14th time in Tommy Bowden's 49 games as Clemson coach that the Tigers had at least 200 of each. Clemson did it just 27 times in 985 games prior to his arrival. The only time Clemson did not win when it gained at least 200 of each was at Georgia Tech in 1976 when the two teams played to a 24-24 tie.

Eason and McNeal Follow Similar Paths

Clemson named co-MVP's on defense for the 2002 season. Nick Eason and Bryant McNeal had outstanding seasons and were both honored by the ACC. Eason was a first-team selection, while McNeal was a second-team choice. Both figure to have outstanding professional careers. They were both chosen in the fourth round of the 2003 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos.

Both finished their respective careers in the top 15 in Clemson history in career sacks. McNeal had his ninth sack of the year against Texas Tech in the Tangerine Bowl and finished fourth in the ACC in that category on a per-game basis. It gave him 22 sacks for his career, tied with Brentson Buckner for fifth on the Clemson all-time list.

Eason finished the season with seven sacks, the most for a Clemson defensive tackle since Trevor Pryce had 7.5 sacks in 1996. Pryce is now an All-Pro defensive tackle with the Broncos. Eason finished the year ninth in the ACC in sacks.

For the season, McNeal finished the year with 67 total tackles, fifth on the team and first among defensive linemen. Eason finished the year with 64 tackles, seventh on the team. Eason was Clemson's defensive MVP in 2000 when he had seven sacks as a defensive end. He had an injury-plagued 2001

season, but came back strong in 2002. Thus, Eason finished his career as the team defensive MVP twice in his career.

Clemson Overcame Deficits

Clemson overcame a seven-point deficit or more in each of its last four victories of the 2002 season. Clemson trailed by nine points, 23-14, in the second half against Wake Forest on October 19, then overcame a 14-point deficit in the fourth quarter to win at Duke on November 2. Clemson trailed 9-0 after a safety and a touchdown by North Carolina before winning 42-12. The Tigers trailed South Carolina in the fourth quarter by seven, then went on a 14-0 run to finish the game and claim a 27-20 victory.

When Clemson overcame the 14-point deficit at Duke, it marked just the second time in school history that the Tigers have overcome a 14-point deficit in the fourth quarter to gain victory. It was just the seventh time in Clemson history that the Tigers have trailed at any point in a game by 14 points or more, then came back to gain victory.

The only other time Clemson has overcome a 14-point fourth-quarter deficit was in 1980 at Virginia. Ironically, Clemson trailed by the exact same score at Duke, 24-10, as the game entered the fourth period. But, Clemson scored the last 17 points of the game, all in the fourth quarter, to win the contest. Obed Ariri kicked a 52-yard field goal with just six seconds left to win. Bill Smith, now on Clemson's Board of Trustees, returned a blocked punt for a touchdown with just four minutes left to provide a key play during the comeback.

The Tigers trailed Duke 17-10 entering the fourth quarter in 2002, then Duke scored on a 54-yard touchdown pass to take a 24-10 lead with just 11:11 left. But Clemson scored three touchdowns in a 4:05 span to take a 31-24 lead before eventually

winning 34-31 on a 21-yard field goal by Aaron Hunt with eight seconds left.

Tommy Bowden-coached Tiger teams have shown an ability to come back. Clemson has now overcome a 12-point deficit to gain victory 10 times in history, and three of the comebacks have been coached by Bowden. The others took place at North Carolina in 2000 (down 17 in the first half) and at Georgia Tech in 2001 (down 12 in the first half).

The Clemson record for points overcome for victory is 28, set at Virginia in 1992. Clemson trailed 28-0 with 32 minutes left in that game, then won 29-28. Clemson trailed by only nine points heading into the fourth quarter of that game. That is also the ACC record for a comeback in a game involving two conference teams.

Leake and Thomas Over 160 Tackles Apiece

Clemson linebackers John Leake and Rodney Thomas were among the ACC leaders in tackles all season. In fact, they ranked two-three in the ACC in tackles per game. Leake led the way with 169 tackles, while Thomas had 167. Leake had a career-high 21 tackles in the loss to Maryland and added 16 in the Tangerine Bowl. Leake's 169 tackles stand as the fifth-best single-season total in Clemson history, while Thomas' was sixth. On a career basis, Thomas had 321, good enough for 10th place, while Leake has 312, 13th best in school history. Both players ranked in the top 10 in the nation in tackles per game in 2002.

At least one of those two players led the team in tackles in all 13 games in 2002. The only other player involved in tackle leadership was freshman cornerback Justin Miller, who tied Thomas for game honors against N.C. State with 12 tackles. Leake led the way seven times, while Thomas led six times. Leake had 11 double-figure tackle games, while Thomas had 10.

As you can see by the numbers above, both went over the 100-tackle mark for the season. They both reached triple digits in the win at Duke. That is the second season of at least 100 tackles for both players. They joined an exclusive club by reaching the century mark for the second time in their careers. Only 10 other Clemson players have had at least 100 tackles in at least two different seasons.

Chad Carson, Charles Hafley, Keith Adams, and Robert Carswell are recent Tigers to do it. Carson did it three times. Anthony Simmons is another three-time 100-tackle performer. Leake will have a chance to join Simmons, Carson, Jeff Davis, Bubba Brown, and Randy Scott as three-time 100-tackle players in 2003.

Miller and Hamilton Outstanding on Returns

Clemson has had just nine kickoff returns for a touchdown by eight different players in its history, but two of the eight players are on the 2003 Clemson team. On October 24, 2002, Justin Miller picked up a loose ball and raced 80 yards for a touchdown on a kickoff return in the second half against N.C. State. Ironically, it was Miller's first career kickoff return. That was the first time a Clemson player had gone all the way for a touchdown on a kickoff return since the 2001 Maryland game when Derrick Hamilton went 100 yards at Maryland for a score in a Tiger loss.

That was the first time in history that two Clemson players on the same team have had a kickoff return for a touchdown. The list below shows that no teammates have ever done it. Doug Thomas had two in one season (1990). Clemson once went 25 years (1962-87) without a kickoff return for a score.

Clemson finished the season fifth in the nation as a team in kickoff-return average with a 24.3 average. Clemson ranked 10th in the nation as a team in 2001 with a 25.7 average. Derrick Hamilton ranked third individually in 2001. Miller's 35.1 yard average in 2002 was the best mark in Clemson history and third in ACC history.

Hamilton an All-Purpose Performer

The all-purpose running statistic was made for Derrick Hamilton. The Dillon, SC native averaged 144.5 all-purpose running yards per game in 2002, the 20th-best figure in the nation and best in the ACC. He finished the year with 1,883 all-purpose yards, a Clemson single-season record. He had 231 all-purpose yards against Texas Tech in the Tangerine Bowl, a Clemson bowl game record.

Hamilton and Wake Forest's Fabian Davis were the only players in the country with at least 200 yards rushing, receiving, and on punt returns and kickoff returns. Hamilton had 256 all-purpose yard against Georgia Tech on September 14, the fifth-best single-season performance in Clemson history. He added 248 yards at Florida State and followed that with a 206-yard game at Virginia. That was three 200-yard games in a four-week period, a first in Clemson history. He finished the year with four 200-yard games, a first in Clemson history as well.

As one can see by the chart below, he had two of the top eight all-purpose running games in Clemson history during the 2002 season. Hamilton was very effective when it came to rushing. The sophomore had 21 rushes on reverses from his H-receiver position and had 209 yards, an 9.5 yard-per-carry figure.

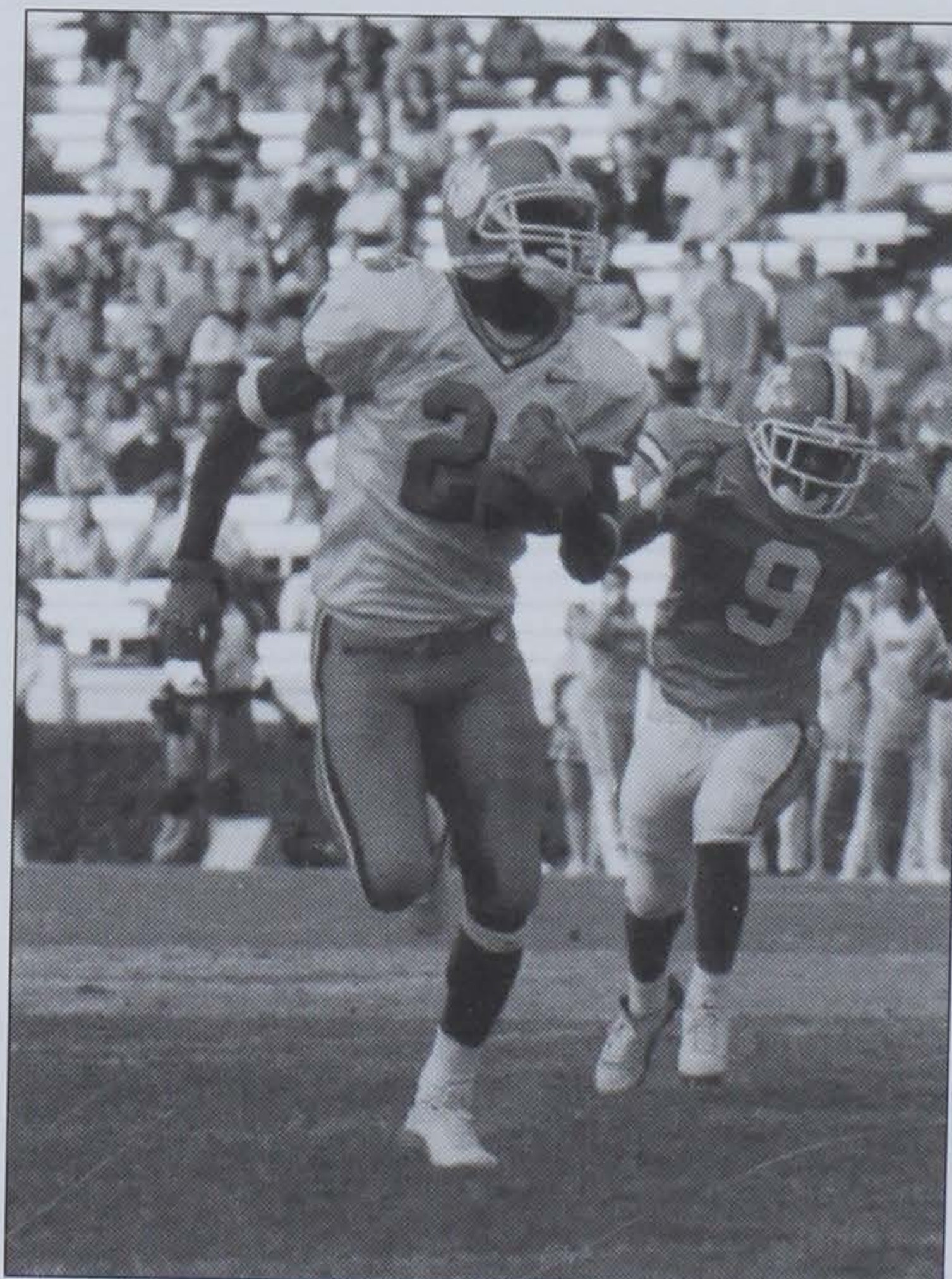

2003 Preseason Honors

Five different 2003 Tigers are ranked among the top 20 players in the nation at their respective positions according to various publications. The list includes wide receivers Derrick Hamilton and Kevin Youngblood, linebacker John Leake, placekicker Aaron Hunt, and cornerback Justin Miller. The presence of Hamilton and Youngblood, returning starter and All-America track athlete Airese Currie, and red-shirt freshman Kelvin Grant is a major reason Clemson's receiving corps is ranked among the best in the nation.

Miller is ranked as the #2 cornerback in the nation by **The Sporting News** and the #4 defensive back in the nation by CollegeFootballNews.com. That internet site also selects Miller as a first-team All-American and as the #1 rising star among the nation's defensive backs. It also ranks Miller as the 32nd-best college football player in the nation, regardless of position.

John Leake is ranked as the #17 outside linebacker in the nation by **Lindy's** and is 18th by **The Sporting News**. CollegeFootballNews.com ranks Leake 22nd among all linebackers nationally. **The Sporting News** also says that Leake is the hardest hitting linebacker in the ACC.

Hamilton is ranked #16 nationally among wide receivers by **The Sporting News**, while Youngblood is ranked 19th among receivers according to **Lindy's**. **Athlon** ranks Clemson's receiving corps fourth in the nation, while CollegeFootballNews.com lists it fifth best, **The Sporting News** ranks it eighth, and **Lindy's** sees it as the 10th-best group of receivers in the country.

Aaron Hunt is ranked as the 15th-best placekicker in the nation by **The Sporting News**, while CollegeFootballNews.com ranks Hunt 14th among all punters and placekickers in the nation. Charlie Whitehurst is listed as the #6 rising star among quarterbacks nationally as well.

Derrick Hamilton already ranks sixth in Clemson history in career all-purpose yards.

Few people realize what some members of Clemson University's football team are doing in their spare time. In addition to working hard in one of the university's most grueling sports and keeping up with their course load, many members of the team find time to organize activities in the community for their entire team to participate. LifeLine is an organization of Clemson football players selected to represent their team as Leaders In Football and Education. By reaching out to others on and off campus, LifeLine members enhance their personal leadership skills, develop career skills for the future, and spread these qualities to the rest of the team through peer leadership.

This program was started in 1996 with the intent to handle the squad's issues through peer leadership. Twelve players were chosen to be inaugural members of LifeLine. These players were already considered leaders of the team both on and off the field. Membership emphasized what strong assets they provided to the team. After selecting those initial members there still remained the task of getting the program up and running.

Current membership nominations come from within the group. The initiated participants nominate other members of the team that represent the values that they have established. When a member graduates from Clemson, the team votes in a new member to replace the departing member. If two are found to take his spot, so be it. That is how the membership grows. This program is not meant to be an exclusive one. There is no set number of the participants.

These values include self-discipline, dedication, responsibility, positive attitude, a good work ethic, honesty, and most important, leadership. Through these positive attributes, members give LifeLine a positive team image, well-developed goals

and objectives, team unity, and smart decision making. All of this enables LifeLine to achieve its mission of establishing a group of Clemson football players who enhance and encourage high academic, athletic, and social ideals within their team.

As members of LifeLine, individuals are required to meet once a month to discuss issues affecting the team and the surrounding community. During these "retreats," members reflect upon past community projects and plan future ones. They also discuss issues affecting team unity. These include issues that are discussed in the locker room as well as those issues that have not yet been brought to light. Through open discussion, current matters can be resolved and future problems avoided. To further assist individuals in conflict resolution and leadership growth, members are also required to attend a seminar taught by Dr. Steven Madden, a professor in speech and communication studies at Clemson. Dr. Madden offers the group skills in conflict resolution, and is able to facilitate the players in the areas of negotiation and persuasion. Clemson Mayor Larry Abernathy also has addressed the group about their responsibilities to the community.

Members of LifeLine are also required to be involved in the organization's community outreach projects, which run throughout the academic year. Throughout LifeLine's brief history, the organization has been affiliated with Helping Hands of Clemson. Every semester, the team again raises money for Helping Hands as part of Career Dress Day. For each participating player, sponsors donate a small sum of money to the organization. LifeLine participants have had to use their imaginations to come up with these innovative ways of raising funds within the parameters of NCAA regulations.

Although they will continue to try to find ways to donate money, LifeLine members would like to

For Eason, it was his fifth year as a Top Six Award winner, something no other ACC athlete could claim.

The group continues its affiliation with Habitat for Humanity. This is a program where they volunteer their time to help build homes for those who are less fortunate.

Goals for the future are to get the word out about the advantages of this program. Members of LifeLine have stated that they do not participate because they want recognition. They do it because they want to contribute. It is an honor to be a part of LifeLine, because it helps the team and the community. There is also a wish to spread this kind of program to other campuses. Members of the team have given presentations at recent Summer Leadership Institutes where they have offered peer leadership strategies for professionals around the country.

This outreach program was initiated to help build leadership and unity on a very large team, not as a public relations maneuver. If this is the first time you have heard about their group, that is probably why.

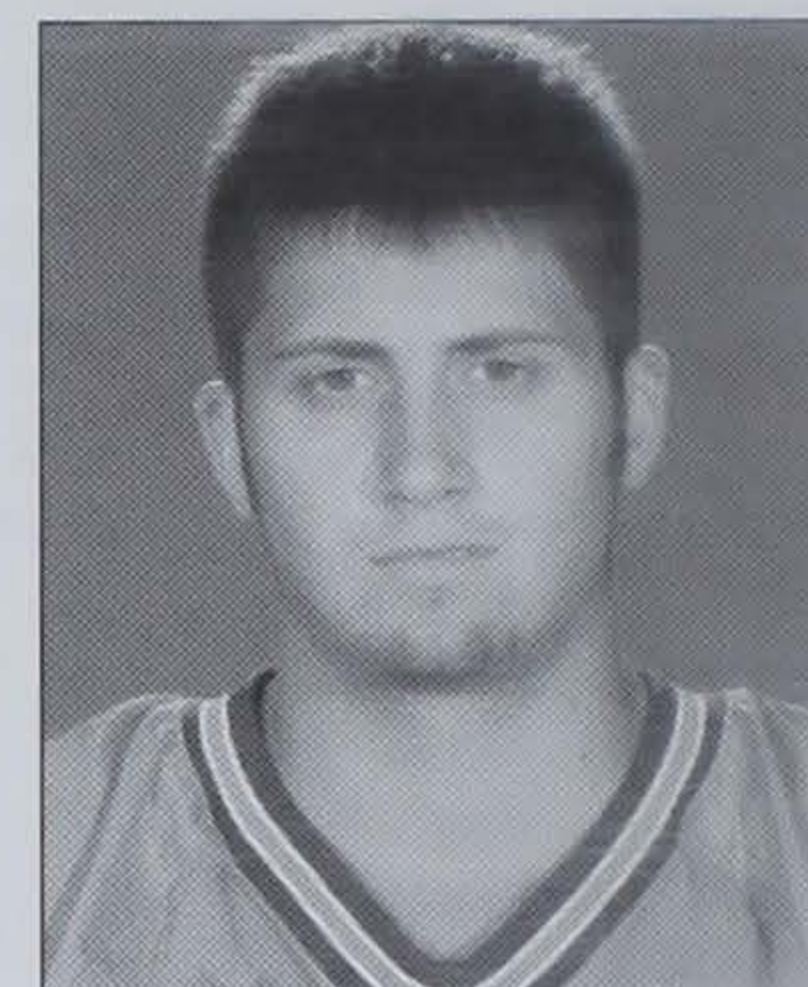

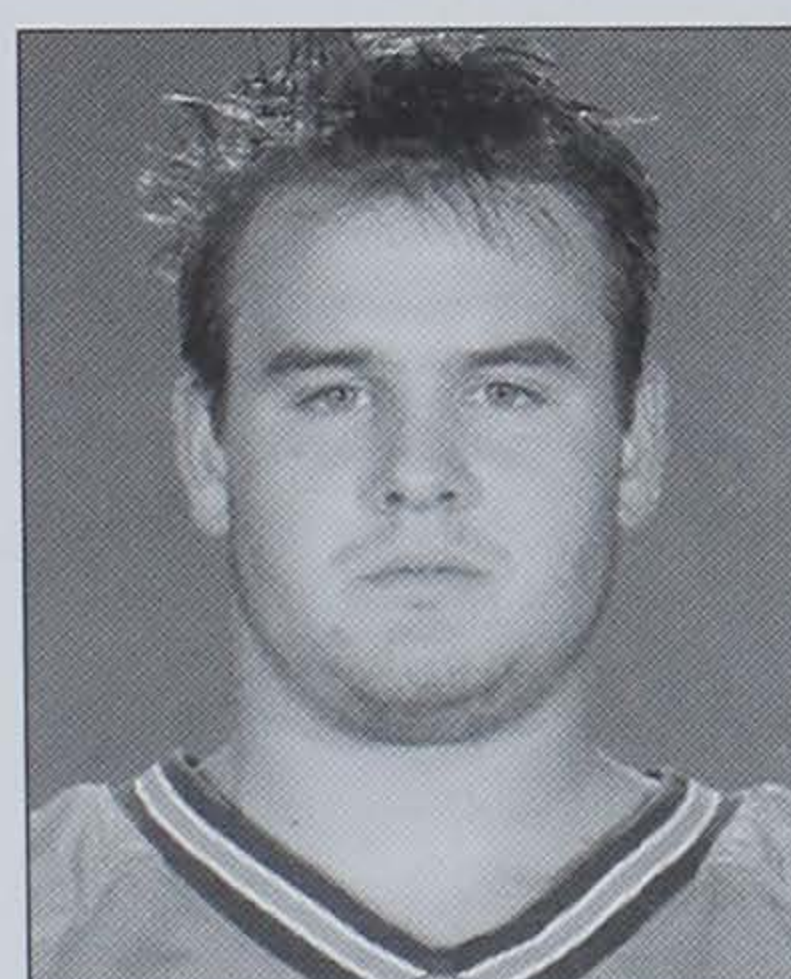

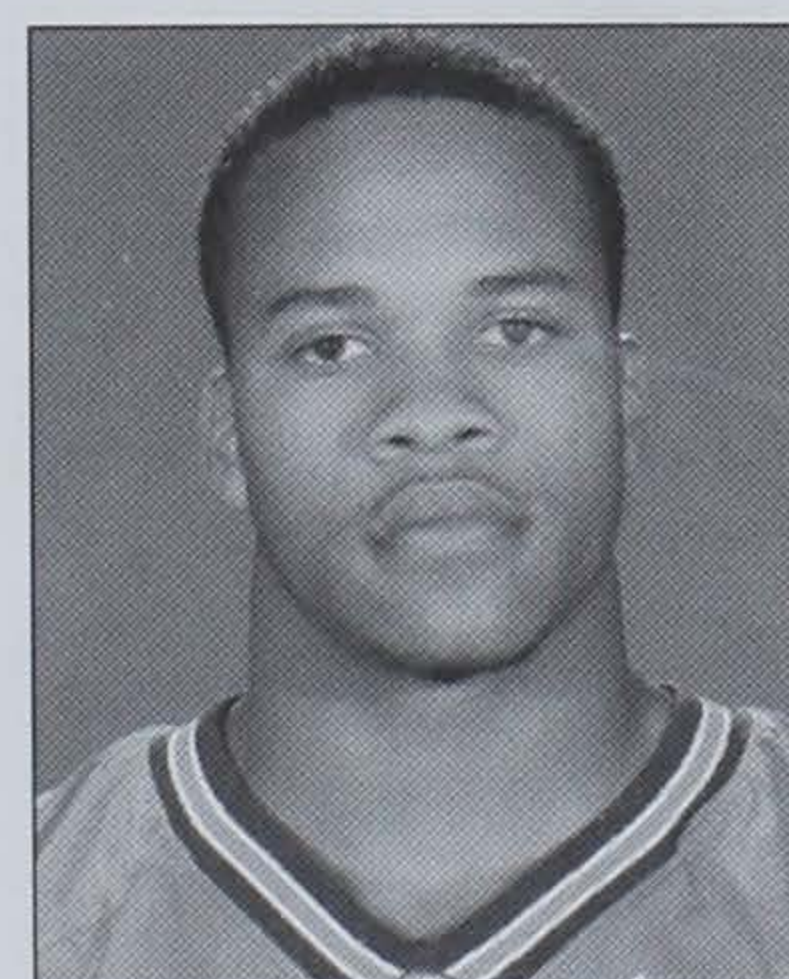

Clemson kicked off the 2002 football campaign by reviving one of the most intense rivalries in the South. The Tigers traveled to Athens to square off against #8 Georgia in an interstate, inter-conference rivalry that had been dormant since 1995. The renewal of the rivalry was highly anticipated; for it wasn't until Aaron Hunt's 46-yard field goal attempt fell short with 1:51 left in the game that Georgia was able to seal a 31-28 victory in front of 86,520 fans at Sanford Stadium.

The win marked the sixth-straight year Georgia opened its season with a victory. In addition, the Bulldogs have defeated Clemson four straight times and improved their record against the Tigers at Sanford Stadium to 20-2. Clemson's last victory against Georgia came in 1990 when the Tigers won 34-3 in Death Valley.

Clemson quarterback Willie Simmons made his first-career start in the hostile environment. He completed 17-37 passes for 165 yards while throwing a touchdown and an interception. He also found eight different targets, including Kevin Youngblood, who led the Tigers in his first game back from injury since the end of the 2000 season. Youngblood hauled in six receptions for 66 yards and caught a touchdown pass. Senior running back Bernard Rambert led Clemson's rushing game with 35 yards on 10 carries and one touchdown. Yusef Kelley, who red-shirted last season, jumpstarted his 2002 season with 17 rushing yards and a touchdown run.

Georgia scored first with 51 seconds remaining in the opening quarter, when quarterback David Greene completed a four-yard touchdown pass to Damien Gary. Gary's touchdown reception followed an interception by defensive back Decory Bryant in the Bulldogs' endzone, which had thwarted a serious Tiger scoring threat on the preceding drive.

Clemson responded early in the second quarter when Bernard Rambert capped off a four-play, 30-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run.

On the ensuing kickoff, following a procedure penalty, Fred Gibson returned the re-kick 91 yards for a touchdown and gave Georgia a 14-7 lead. Gibson became the first opponent to return a kickoff for a touchdown against Clemson since 1990. It was the first time a Tommy Bowden coached team had given up a kickoff or punt return for a score.

Georgia extended its lead just over two minutes later, when highly-touted freshman quarterback D.J. Shockley ran nine yards up the middle for six.

Clemson retaliated on its final drive of the first half. With 1:24 remaining before halftime, Simmons guided the Tiger offense 64 yards down the field and connected with Youngblood for a 21-yard touchdown reception with just eight seconds remaining in the half.

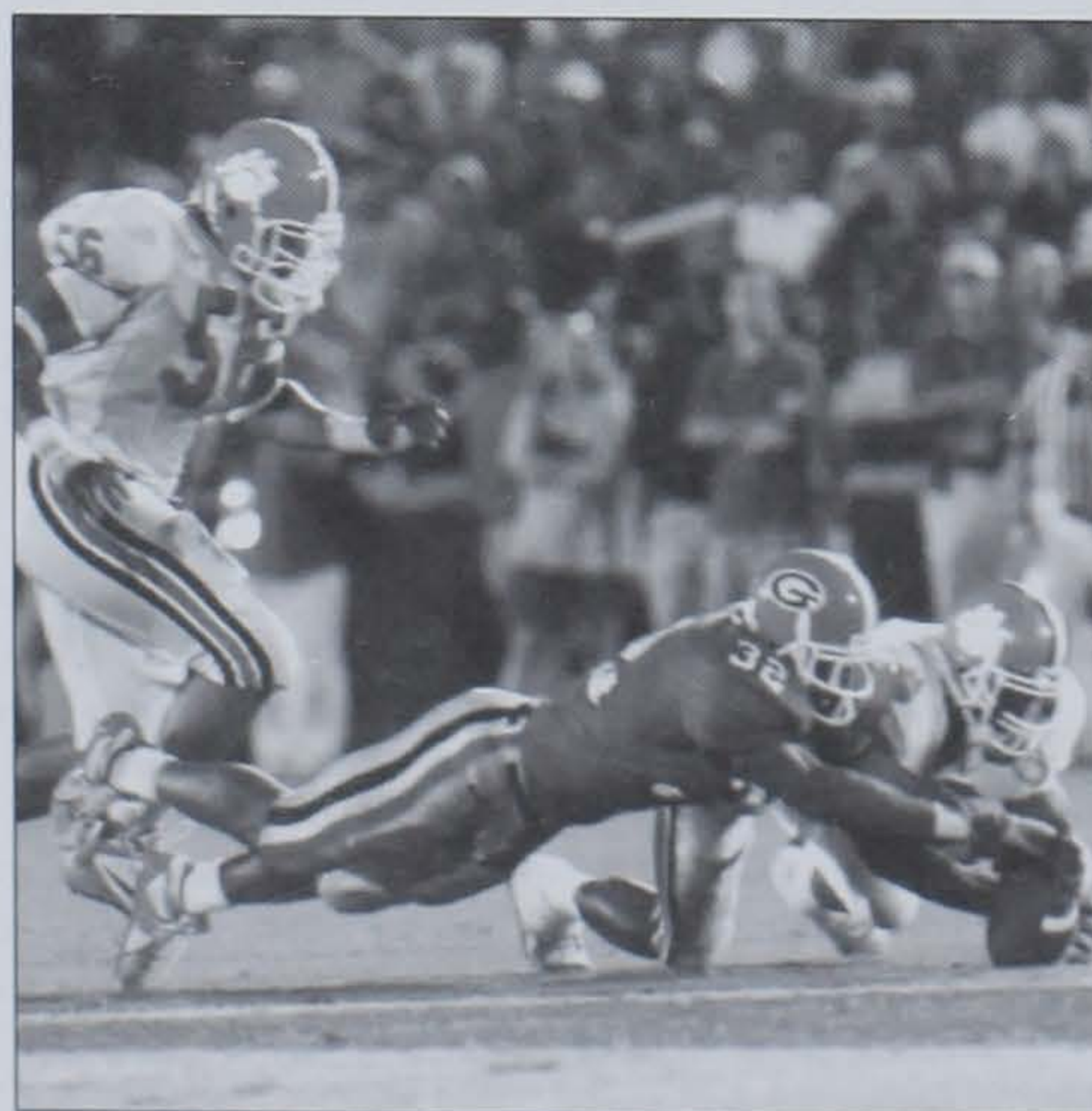
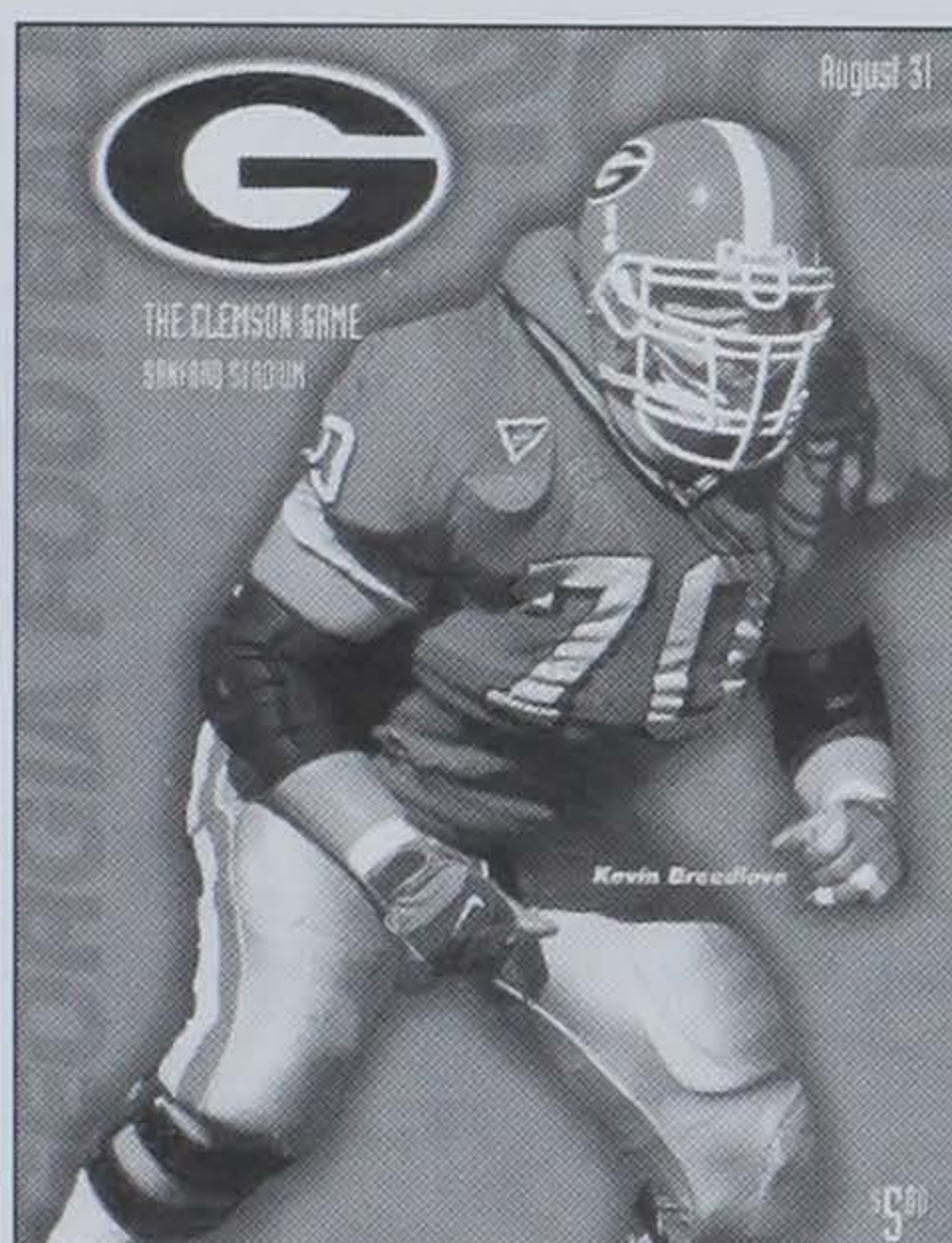
The Tiger defense carried the momentum from that drive into the second half. On Georgia's opening possession, Bryant McNeal recovered a fumbled pitch and rumbled 55 yards for a game-tying touchdown with 9:54 left in the third quarter.

The offense responded seven minutes later when Yusef Kelly scored on a two-yard touchdown run that gave Clemson its first lead of the game at 28-21. But, Georgia wide receiver Terrence Edwards tied the game for the

third time with 12:35 remaining in regulation, when Shockley connected with him on a 24-yard scoring effort. Bulldog kicker Billy Bennett's 43-yard field goal with just over five minutes remaining proved to be the difference.

Clemson mounted a final drive, but Aaron Hunt's 46-yard field goal attempt with under a minute left, was a yard short. Georgia ran out the clock to preserve the win and retain its #8 national ranking.

Khaleed Vaughn contributed seven tackles and a sack. Leading the list of tacklers were linebacker John Leake and roverback Altroy Bodrick, who recorded 11 and nine, respectively.



Clemson's defense held Georgia to 203 yards of total offense, a season-low for the Bulldog offense during its 13-1 season.

In a rematch of the 2001 Humanitarian Bowl, Clemson earned its first victory of the 2002 season with a 33-13 win over Louisiana Tech in front of 72,616 fans at Death Valley. The game marked the first time in school history the Tigers faced an opponent they had met the previous season in a bowl game.

Several Tigers had career-best days on offense. Quarterback Willie Simmons completed a career-high 25 passes for a career-high 242 yards. Simmons also set a Clemson record by throwing 43 passes in a single game without throwing an interception. Running back Yusef Kelly established a new career high for rushing yards (97) on 25 carries and also ran for three touchdowns. Wide receiver Kevin Youngblood improved on his performance against Georgia by catching 10 passes for 89 yards. His 10 catches marked his career-best effort and also marked the first time a Tiger receiver had caught 10 passes since Rod Gardner caught 10 against N.C. State in 2000.

On defense, Clemson forced four Louisiana Tech turnovers and held the Bulldogs scoreless in the second half. The Tigers also were able to contain highly-touted quarterback Luke McCown, who was held to just 213 yards while throwing three interceptions in 44 attempts and he failed to throw a touchdown pass. McCown threw at least one touchdown pass in every game in 2001 and had 53 career touchdown passes entering this game.

Following Mance's 31-yard kickoff return to open the game, Clemson's offense drove 55 yards in 10 plays capped off by Kelly's one-yard plunge that gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead. Two field goals by kicker Josh Scobee, including one from 51 yards, longest at Death Valley since 1998, brought Louisiana Tech within one by the end of the first quarter. Aaron Hunt's 47-yard field goal with 13:07 remaining in the first half extended Clemson's lead to 10-6. Hunt's field goal was the first of a career-best four field-goal performance.

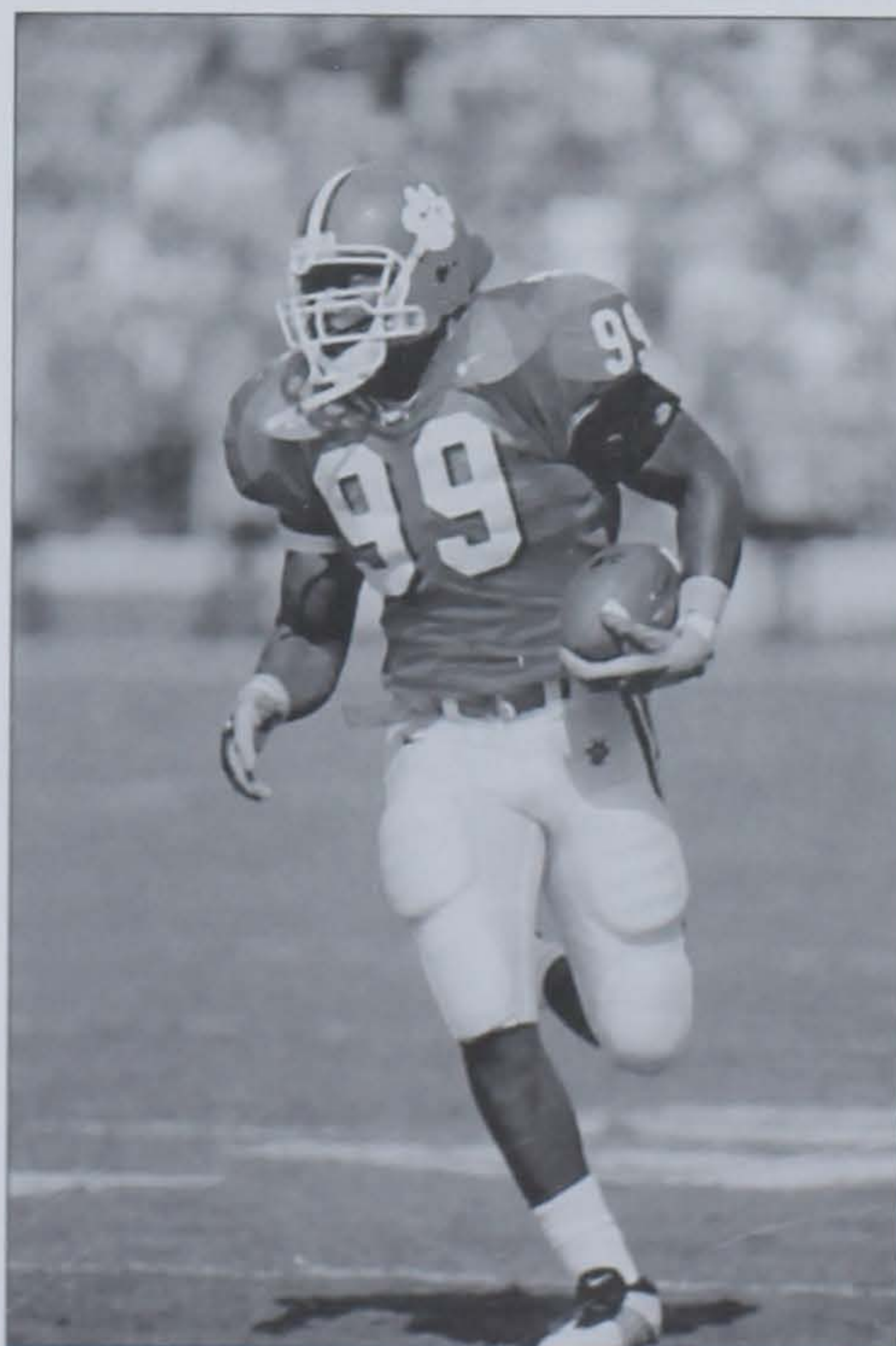
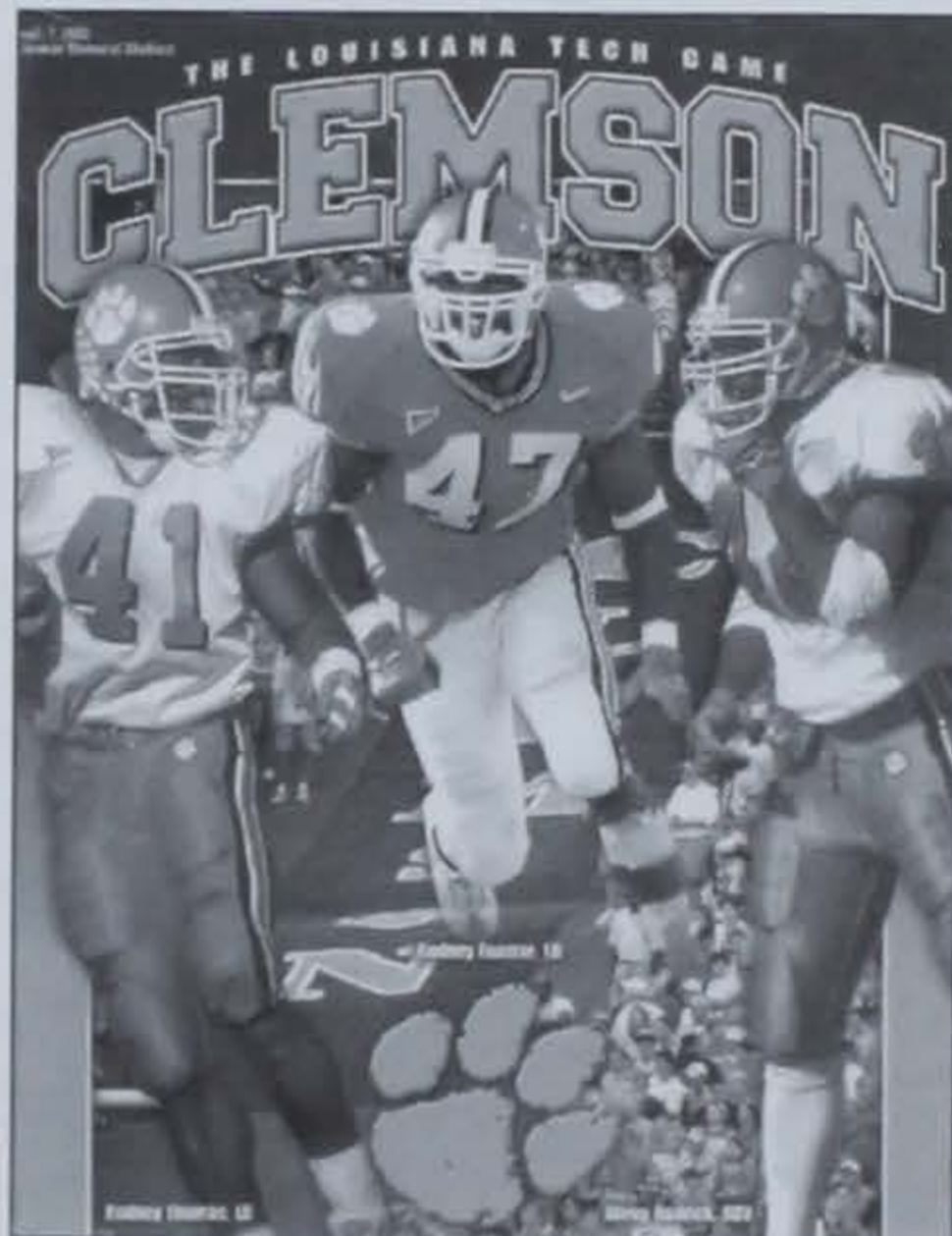
Bulldog receiver Erick Franklin fumbled the ensuing kickoff and Tony Elliott recovered the ball at the 19. Clemson failed to score on the possession, but did score on the following drive after Ronny Delusme blocked a punt. Kelly ran six yards off right tackle into the end zone, as his second touchdown run of the half made the score 17-6.

The Bulldogs retaliated right before halftime with their only touchdown-scoring drive of the game.

McCown guided the offense 61 yards down the field in 10 plays, and Joe Smith capped off the drive with a one-yard touchdown run with 55 seconds left.

Hunt's 22-yard field goal was the lone score of the third quarter. He followed up that effort with consecutive 38 and 37-yard field goals. After Hunt had established his career day, the patrons of Death Valley came to their feet again with 4:47 remaining in the game when Fountain intercepted McCown's pass near midfield and rumbled 43 yards down the left sideline to the six. Kelly's two-yard run two plays later gave the Tigers their biggest lead of the game and helped seal the victory.

John Leake and Rodney Thomas led the list of tacklers with 17 and 13, respectively. Brian Mance had an interception. Justin Miller also recorded an interception, the first of his career. He also recorded his first career reception, making him the first Tiger in the two-platoon era (since 1964) to record both an interception and a reception in the same game.

Eric Sampson's interception with under two minutes remaining thwarted a potential game-winning drive for the Georgia Tech offense and helped preserve a 24-19 victory for Clemson.

Before a crowd of 77,586 rain-soaked fans at Death Valley, Clemson earned both its second-straight win of the season and over the Yellow Jackets, a feat the team had failed to accomplish since 1995. Having snapped a four-game losing streak against Georgia Tech last season in Atlanta, Clemson not only continued its winning ways over the Yellow Jackets; the win also marked the first time in seven years that the winner of this season series was determined by more than three points.

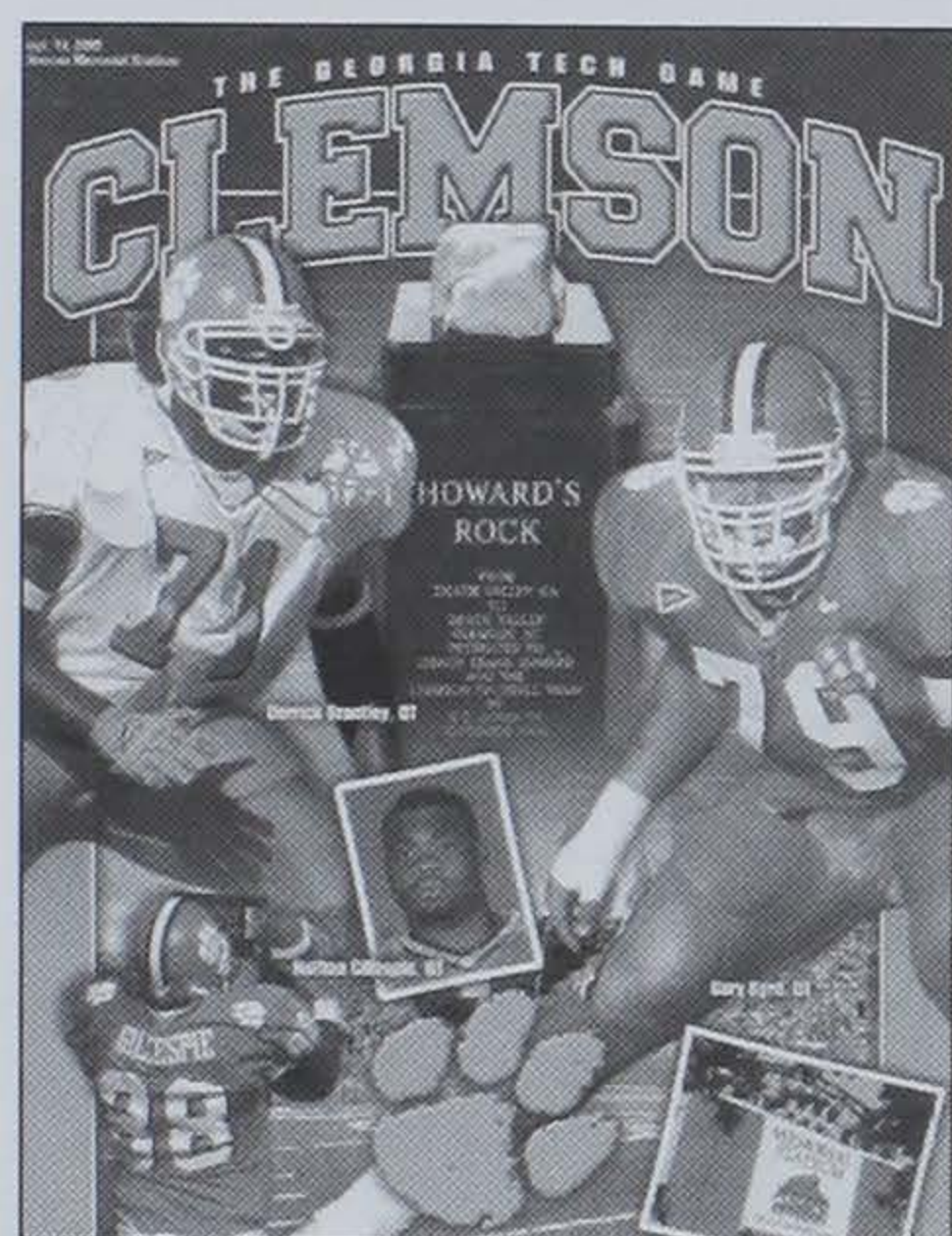
The Tigers improved their record to 3-1 in ACC season openers under Tommy Bowden; and no member of the team deserved more credit for the win than first-year Defensive Coordinator John Lovett. His gameplan held Georgia Tech to 303 yards. In addition to the defensive effort, a number of Tigers had stellar individual performances.

One of those Tigers was receiver Derrick Hamilton, who had one of the best all-around performances in school history. Hamilton had 256 all-purpose yards, marking the fifth-best single-game total in school history. He finished the game with 97 rushing yards, including a 77-yard touchdown run that was the longest scoring run by a Tiger since 1993, when Derrick Witherspoon raced 89 yards for a score against Maryland. He also had 96 yards on punt returns, including a 79-yard return deep into Georgia Tech territory that marked the longest punt return by a Tiger since Brian Mance returned a punt 88 yards against the Yellow Jackets in 2000.

Clemson scored on its opening drive for the second consecutive game. Willie Simmons completed 4-5 passes en route to a 15-play, 53-yard drive that resulted in a 34-yard field goal by Aaron Hunt. After the Yellow Jackets were forced to punt, Hamilton took the next play around the right end and then back across the field for a 77-yard touchdown run that extended the Tigers' lead to 10-0.

Following the ensuing kickoff by Stephen Furr, Georgia Tech's Tony Hollings ran up the middle, bounced off would-be tacklers and raced around the left end for 72 yards and a touchdown. Kicker Luke Manget was tackled in the backfield on the extra point attempt following a bad snap. Clemson's offense struck one more time in the first half.

Following Hamilton's 79-yard punt return to the Georgia Tech five, Simmons rolled to his left on fourth-and-goal and connected on a two-yard "push pass" with Bobby Williamson with 38 seconds left. The extra point gave the Tigers a 17-6 halftime lead.



After the Tiger defense forced another punt, Simmons connected with Tony Elliott on a 44-yard touchdown pass that gave Clemson its biggest lead of the game (24-6) with 10:40 left in the third quarter.

But, on the Yellow Jackets' following drive, quarterback A.J. Suggs completed five out of six passes for 64 yards and guided the offense 78 yards down the field. His seven-yard touchdown pass to tight end John Foschi cut the Tigers' lead to 24-13.

After several scoreless stands by both defenses, the Yellow Jackets finally scored again with 3:43 left in the game. Hollings capped off an eight-play drive with a one-yard touchdown run. Chan Gailey elected to go for two points, and on the conversion attempt, Suggs' completed pass to Foschi left him short of the goal line.

On the Tigers' next drive, a bad snap from center resulted in a fumble just inside Yellow Jacket territory that was recovered by defensive back Ricardo Wimbush. Four plays later, with the Yellow Jackets driving to the Clemson 29-yard-line, Eric Sampson made a heroic effort by leaping into the air and intercepting Suggs' pass at the 16-yard line. Sampson returned the ball close to midfield, and Clemson ran out the remaining 1:12 off the clock.

The Tigers continued their winning ways with a 30-7 victory over Ball State on September 21 at Death Valley. The win was Clemson's third straight and also marked the Tigers' seventh-consecutive win at home over a non-conference opponent. Clemson finished the month of September with a 3-0 record, doing so for just the third time since 1991.

The Tigers once again were paced by the consistent play of the offense and complemented by a strong effort by the defense. The offense racked up 200 yards both passing and rushing, doing so for the 13th time in the Tommy Bowden era and the 40th time in school history. Clemson is 13-0 under Bowden and 39-0-1 all-time when accomplishing that feat. The defense held Ball State to a mere 220 yards of total offense and held the Cardinals scoreless for the final three quarters of the game.

Individual efforts on both sides of the ball contributed to the Tigers' success in 2002, and this contest was no exception. Against Ball State, several players posted career highs and individual bests.

Receiver J.J. McKelvey had a career-high 10 catches for 123 yards and a touchdown. His performance followed that of fellow receiver Kevin Youngblood, who caught 10 passes against Louisiana Tech on September 7. Together they marked the first time in school history that two different Clemson players have caught 10 passes in a single game in the same season.

Running back Yusef Kelly also had a career day, rushing for a career-high 99 yards on 21 carries and adding a touchdown run in the process. Kelly's performance broke his previous career-best that he set earlier in the season against Louisiana Tech, when he rushed for 97 yards.

Willie Simmons established a new career-best for completion percentage in the game. He completed 68 percent of his passes (17 of 25) for 188 yards and totaled 203 yards of offense. Derrick Hamilton had 160 all-purpose yards and also scored on a nine-yard touchdown run. Quarterback Charlie Whitehurst saw the first action of his career, leading the Tigers downfield, as he completed all four of his passes and sneaked into the end zone on a one-yard touchdown plunge.

Ball State's opening drive yielded its only points of the game and gave the Cardinals a first-quarter lead. Quarterback Talmadge Hill completed six of seven passes for 60 yards and guided the offense

77 yards downfield on 13 plays. His three-yard touchdown pass to Ryan Hahaj capped off the drive.

Clemson did not retaliate until the next quarter; Kelly's one-yard touchdown run off the right tackle finished off a seven-play, 73-yard drive highlighted by a 51-yard reception by McKelvey. After the defense forced a punt, Aaron Hunt gave the Tigers their first lead of the game with a 24-yard field goal that made the score 10-7 with 6:01 left in the first half.

Clemson extended the lead on its next possession. After Altroy Bodrick recovered a fumble by Hill in Cardinal territory, the offense took just 63 seconds to find the end zone on Hamilton's nine-yard touchdown run. The Tigers did not score again until late in the third quarter. Following Justin Miller's interception, Simmons connected with McKelvey on a nine-yard touchdown reception that capped off an eight-play, 65-yard drive. McKelvey's touchdown catch gave Clemson a comfortable 23-7 lead they would not relinquish.

John Leake and Bryant McNeal led the effort on defense. Leake had 14 tackles and a sack. His performance marked the fifth consecutive game in which he reached double-digit tackles. Bryant McNeal, the ACC's returning sack leader, added to his career total with two sacks against the Cardinals. His total nearly matched his career-best effort from 2001, when he had three sacks against Duke.

Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden defeated his son for the fourth-consecutive time as the Seminoles rolled to a 48-31 win in front of a nationally-televised audience on ESPN on October 3, 2002. The #11 Seminoles handed the Tigers their second defeat of the season and also Clemson's second defeat against a nationally-ranked opponent.

Despite the loss, the Tigers made a significant improvement on their recent performances at Doak Campbell Stadium. Clemson had scored only one touchdown in five previous appearances in Tallahassee and averaged just two points per game in those contests. The Tigers dominated the game statistically in the first half and finished with 334 passing yards, more than two hundred yards greater than the total reached by the Seminoles (114). Clemson averaged 7.2 yards per play, highest average in history in a Clemson loss.

In the end, however, the play of Florida State running back Greg Jones proved to be the difference in the game. The South Carolina native gained 165 yards rushing on 22 carries and scored three times. He also had a 64-yard run just before half-time that swayed the momentum in favor of the Seminoles. The run set up a touchdown pass from Chris Rix with six seconds remaining that gave Florida State the lead, a margin it would not relinquish.

Willie Simmons had a tremendous performance, gaining 50 yards rushing while completing 17 of 27 passes for 293 yards and two touchdowns. It was his ability to run and pass in the first half that kept the Tigers in front for much of the first half. Derrick Hamilton had another stellar performance, as he had 248 all-purpose yards. J.J. McKelvey had over 100 yards receiving for the second-straight game, as he tallied 117 yards on five receptions.

Clemson suffered in the kicking game. The Tigers fumbled a kickoff return and a punt return, and dropped the snap from center in a punt situation that gave Florida State the ball at the Tiger 18. Florida State drove from its territory for a touchdown just one time in the game. The Seminoles had 170 kickoff return yards and won the turnover stat 4-0.

It was Rix who gave the Seminoles the lead on their first possession of the game. Following the fumbled punt snap by Wynn Kopp, Florida State took over at the Clemson 18. Three plays later, Rix took a one-yard plunge over the goal line that gave the Seminoles the lead. Two possessions later,

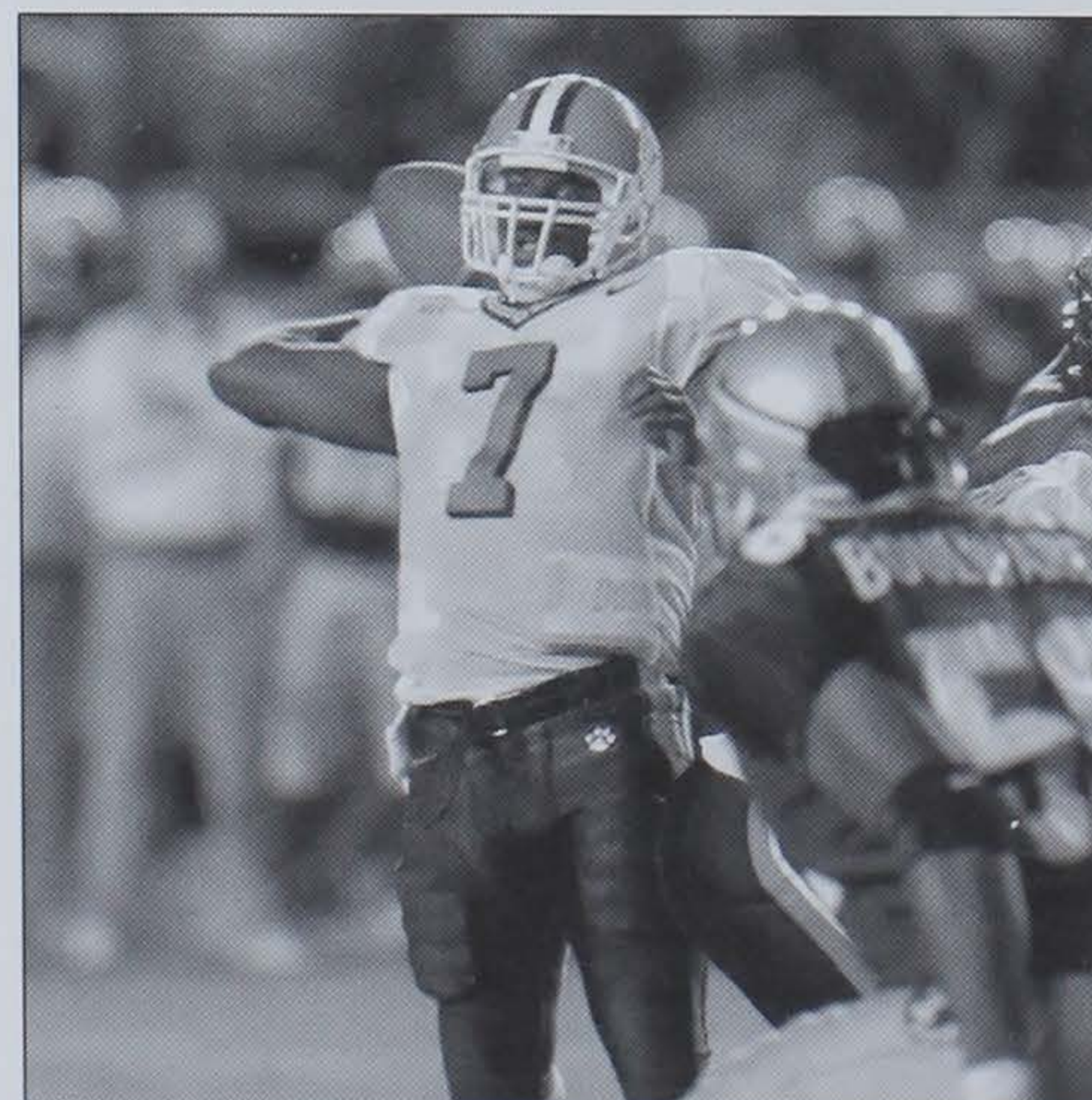
Simmons and the Tiger offense capitalized on a big play by special teams.

After Hamilton returned Chance Gwaltney's punt 46 yards to the Seminole 39-yard line, Simmons took just two plays to connect with Airese Currie for a 28-yard touchdown pass. Stephen Furr's ensuing onside kick was recovered by the Tigers, Clemson's first successful on-side kick in 23 years. Five plays later, Yusef Kelly found the endzone on a two-yard touchdown run that gave Clemson the lead.

Florida State retaliated early in the second quarter. Greg Jones rushed for a 20-yard score to tie the score 14-14. Clemson regained the lead on Aaron Hunt's 20-yard field goal, but immediately relinquished it when Leon Washington returned the ensuing kickoff 97 yards for six.

Following a 59-yard completion to McKelvey, Simmons capped off a six-play, 86-yard drive when he found Hamilton in the end zone for a nine-yard touchdown pass. On the Seminoles' first play of the ensuing possession, Jones took the handoff from Rix and rumbled 64 yards down the left sideline before being knocked out of bounds at the five-yard line. Rix's touchdown pass to Talman Gardner two plays later sealed the momentum-swinging effort.

Rodney Thomas led the team with 16 tackles, and he also recorded two tackles for loss and deflected a pass. Bryant McNeal recorded a career-high 10 tackles, two tackles for loss, and a sack.

Virginia scored 16 consecutive points in the fourth quarter and overcame a 10-6 halftime deficit to defeat Clemson 22-17 in front of over 54,000 fans at Scott Stadium in Charlottesville. The win was the Cavaliers' second straight over Clemson and followed up on their last-second victory over the Tigers in 2001.

Clemson outgained Virginia in virtually every offensive category, including total rushing yards, passing yards, and average yards per play, yet still lost. The Tigers had 412 yards of total offense, but also committed two turnovers and were forced to punt six times. The play of the Cavalier defense and its ability to prevent Clemson from scoring on big plays was the difference.

Although he did not score, Derrick Hamilton led the Clemson individual effort by totaling over 200 all-purpose yards and leading the team in receptions. It was the third time in four games that Hamilton had exceeded 200 yards in all-purpose running.

Backup quarterback Charlie Whitehurst also had an impressive showing during his late fourth-quarter appearance. While seeing his first significant action of the season, he completed all seven of his passes for 92 yards and a touchdown pass.

The Tigers scored first on their opening drive. After Hamilton was tackled inside the 10 on the kick-off return, the Tigers marched 93 yards down the field and took nearly seven minutes off the clock. The offense finally stalled at the two-yard line, and Aaron Hunt's 19-yard field goal capped off the 19-play drive. It was the longest drive by Clemson in terms of plays since 1979 when the Tigers had 19 plays against Georgia.

The Cavaliers countered early in the second quarter on Kurt Smith's 42-yard field goal, and Smith gave Virginia its first lead of the game with 5:18 left when he kicked a 28-yarder.

Clemson regained the lead just before halftime. After an outstanding effort by Mance to intercept a pass along the Tiger sideline, Tye Hill ran for 32 yards and a score on the next play to give the Tigers a 10-6 lead with a minute left before halftime. It was his first career touchdown and the fifth time in six games that Clemson has scored a touchdown inside the last 80 seconds of the first half.

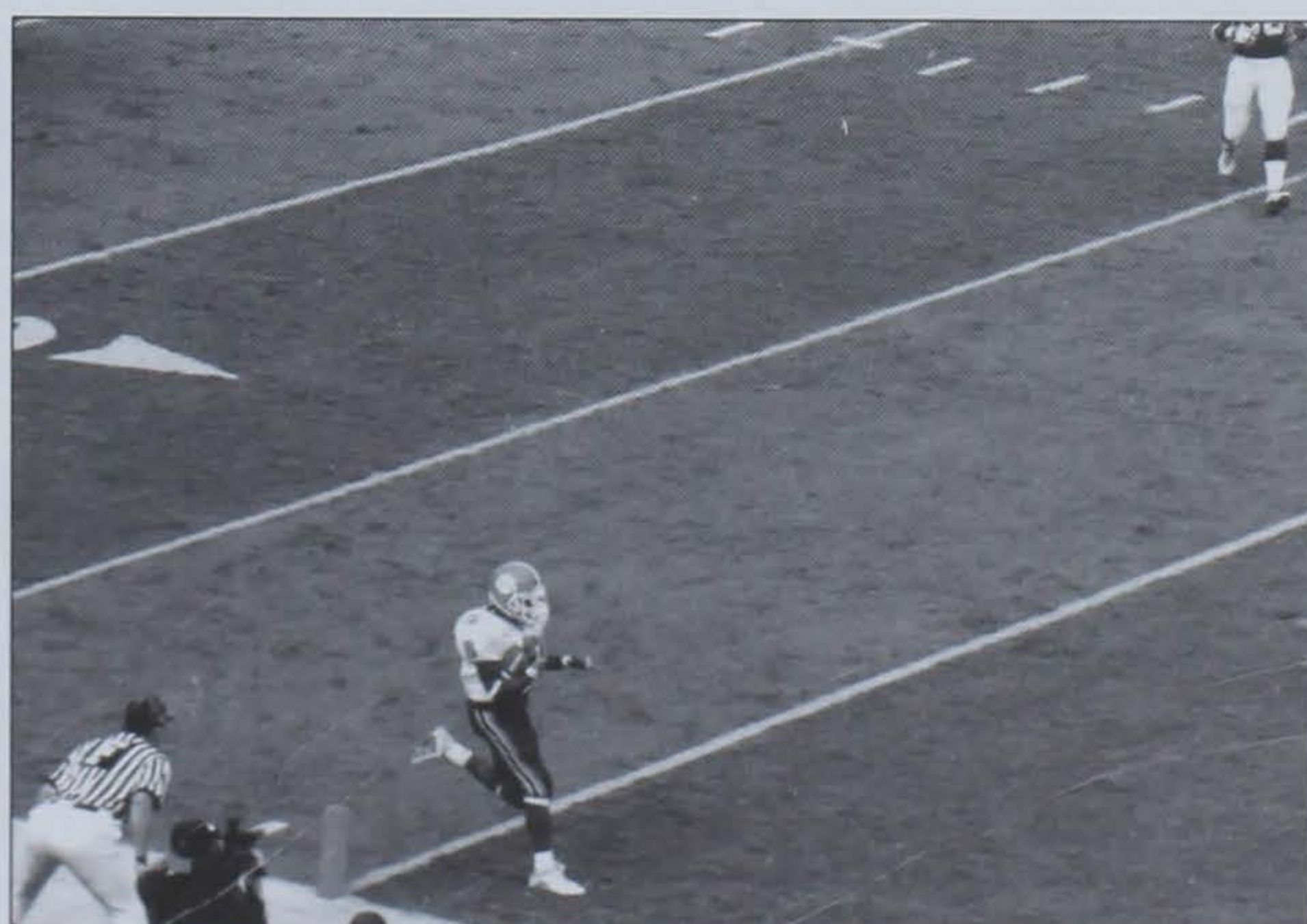
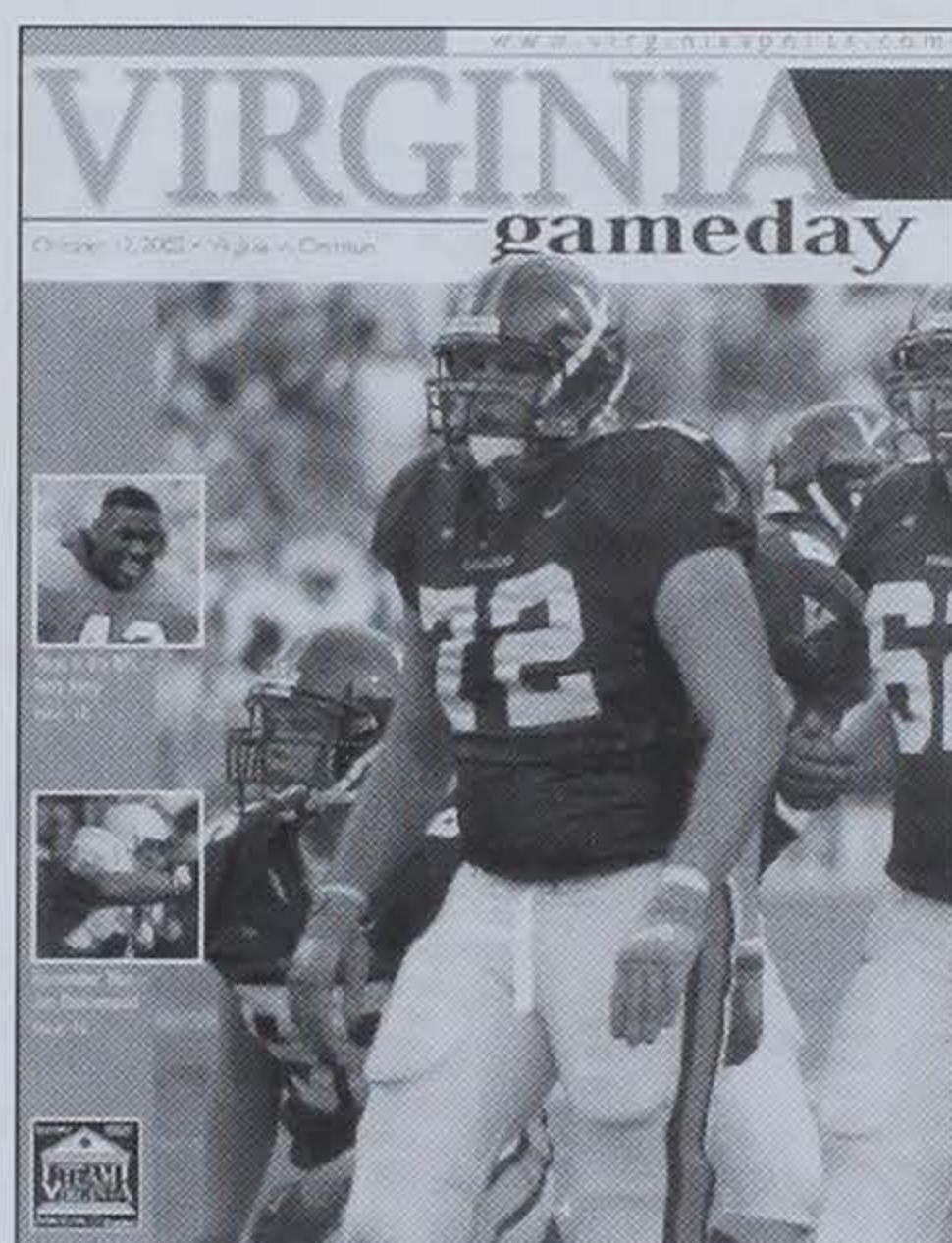
The Cavaliers began their comeback after a scoreless third quarter. On the second play of the fourth quarter, facing fourth-down-and-goal from the Clemson one-yard line, Virginia quarterback Matt Schaub handed the ball off to All-ACC receiver Billy McMullen on a reverse play; McMullen stumbled, but kept his balance and stretched across the goal line, giving the Cavaliers a 13-10 lead.

After the Cavalier defense forced Wynn Kopp to punt, the Virginia offense organized a 17-play, 85-yard drive that erased over six minutes off the clock. Smith booted his third field goal of the game when he nailed a 21-yarder that finished off the Cavaliers' drive.

Following the ensuing kickoff, Willie Simmons' pass was intercepted by Rich Bedesem and returned to the Clemson 17. Three plays later, Schaub found tight end Heath Miller in the endzone on a 15-yard touchdown catch.

Simmons entered the game once more and fumble the football, which was recovered by the Cavaliers. Whitehurst entered the game on the next possession and guided the Tigers' offense downfield on seven consecutive passes. His nine-yard touchdown pass to J.J. McKelvey with 1:31 remaining reduced the lead to five, but Clemson could not recover the on-side kick and Virginia came away with its fifth straight win.

Brian Mance, who recorded seven tackles and an interception, led Clemson's defense, which held Virginia to just 80 rushing yards.

Clemson snapped a two-game losing streak in upending Wake Forest 31-23 in front of 81,008 fans at Death Valley. The Tigers rallied from a nine-point deficit in the second half and also earned its first victory under Tommy Bowden when trailing heading into the fourth quarter.

The Tigers' win came in an uncanny manner. Clemson's defense yielded 523 yards, the highest total ever recorded by an opponent in a Clemson victory; however, the defense also forced a season-high five turnovers against a Wake Forest offense that had entered the game second in the nation in turnover margin. It was the most yards ever for Wake Forest against Clemson.

Although the Tigers totaled four rushing scores, the Wake Forest running game was the most prevalent offensive force. The Demon Deacons posted 365 rushing yards, led by Tarence Williams' 97 yards and a touchdown on 20 carries, while Chris Barclay had 89 yards on 14 carries. James MacPherson had 61 yards on just seven carries, but he also threw three interceptions in the second half, his first three of the year after going 160 straight attempts without throwing one.

Clemson scored on its first possession of the game. After forcing Wake Forest to punt, Simmons guided the offense 61 yards down the field on just six plays. In addition to completing two of three passes on the drive, Simmons capped it off with a 13-yard scamper for a touchdown. On their ensuing possession, the Demon Deacons reduced the lead to 7-3 behind a display of power running by Barclay and a short field goal.

Wake Forest took the lead for the first time on its next possession. On a drive that covered 92 yards and took nearly five minutes off the clock, Williams and fullback Ovie Mughelli combined for 10 carries, 27 yards and a one-yard touchdown run by Mughelli. Mughelli's run capped off the 16-play drive that gave the Demon Deacons a 10-7 lead.

After a pair of Wake Forest field goals, Clemson retaliated just before halftime. After taking over possession with 83 seconds remaining in the period, Simmons reeled off five consecutive completions before finally connecting with McKelvey on a 25-yard pass that put the Tigers in scoring position; Kelly made a one-yard touchdown plunge with just eight seconds remaining before the half. It was the sixth time in seven games that Clemson scored a touchdown with 90 seconds or less left in the first half.

After reducing Wake Forest's lead, the Tiger offense was stifled for most of the third quarter. After Wynn Kopp was forced to punt on Clemson's first possession, Williams and receiver Fabian Davis combined for 57 rushing yards on the next two plays.

Williams' 11-yard touchdown run gave Wake Forest a 23-14 lead.

Following Williams' touchdown, the Demon Deacons committed turnovers on their next three possessions and allowed Clemson to cut into the lead. After Travis Pugh recovered a fumble by Barclay, Rambert carried the ball two yards off tackle for a touchdown. On the Tigers' first possession of the fourth quarter, Aaron Hunt kicked a 34-yard field goal, which finished off an eight-play, 48-yard drive that gave Clemson the lead.

The Tigers completed their comeback victory on their next possession. After Altroy Bodrick intercepted MacPherson's pass near midfield, Clemson drove 58 yards and erased nearly five minutes off the clock. Clemson had a fourth-down play and lined up for a field goal, but holder Jeff Scott ran off tackle for four yards and a first down to keep the drive alive.

Rambert's second scoring run of the game from three yards out extended the Tigers' lead to 31-23. On Wake Forest's ensuing possession, the offense appeared ready to score once more with hopes of scoring a two-point conversion and sending the contest into overtime. But, Brian Mance stripped the ball away from Barclay inside Clemson's five-yard line, sending the ball through the back of the end zone, resulting in a touchback for the Tigers.

Playing in front of a nationally televised audience on ESPN and 78,904 energized fans at Death Valley, Clemson was defeated by #9 and undefeated N.C. State 38-6. The Wolfpack ended a two-game losing streak against the Tigers and earned their ninth consecutive victory of the season to remain ranked among the nation's elite teams.

The Wolfpack totaled 240 rushing yards and outgained the Tigers by 170. The Wolfpack special teams' unit held Clemson to an average of only 32 yards per punt and also blocked one of Wynn Kopp's punts in the first half, resulting in a touchdown by Terrence Holt, who made a career of blocking enemy punts. Jericho Cotchery also returned an onside kick attempt for a touchdown late in the fourth quarter.

Philip Rivers completed 60 percent of his passes and also had a scoring run, but averaged just 5.4 yards per attempt and threw for a season-low 129 yards. McLendon had 178 rushing yards and scored two touchdowns. It was the most yards rushing by an individual against a Tommy Bowden-coached team.

On defense, N.C. State forced five turnovers and frustrated both of Clemson's quarterbacks throughout the game. Starter Willie Simmons completed only seven of his 15 passes for 99 yards and backup Charlie Whitehurst completed just six of his 17 passes for 64 yards. The quarterbacks combined for all five of the team's turnovers. Clemson's running game was limited to 66 yards.

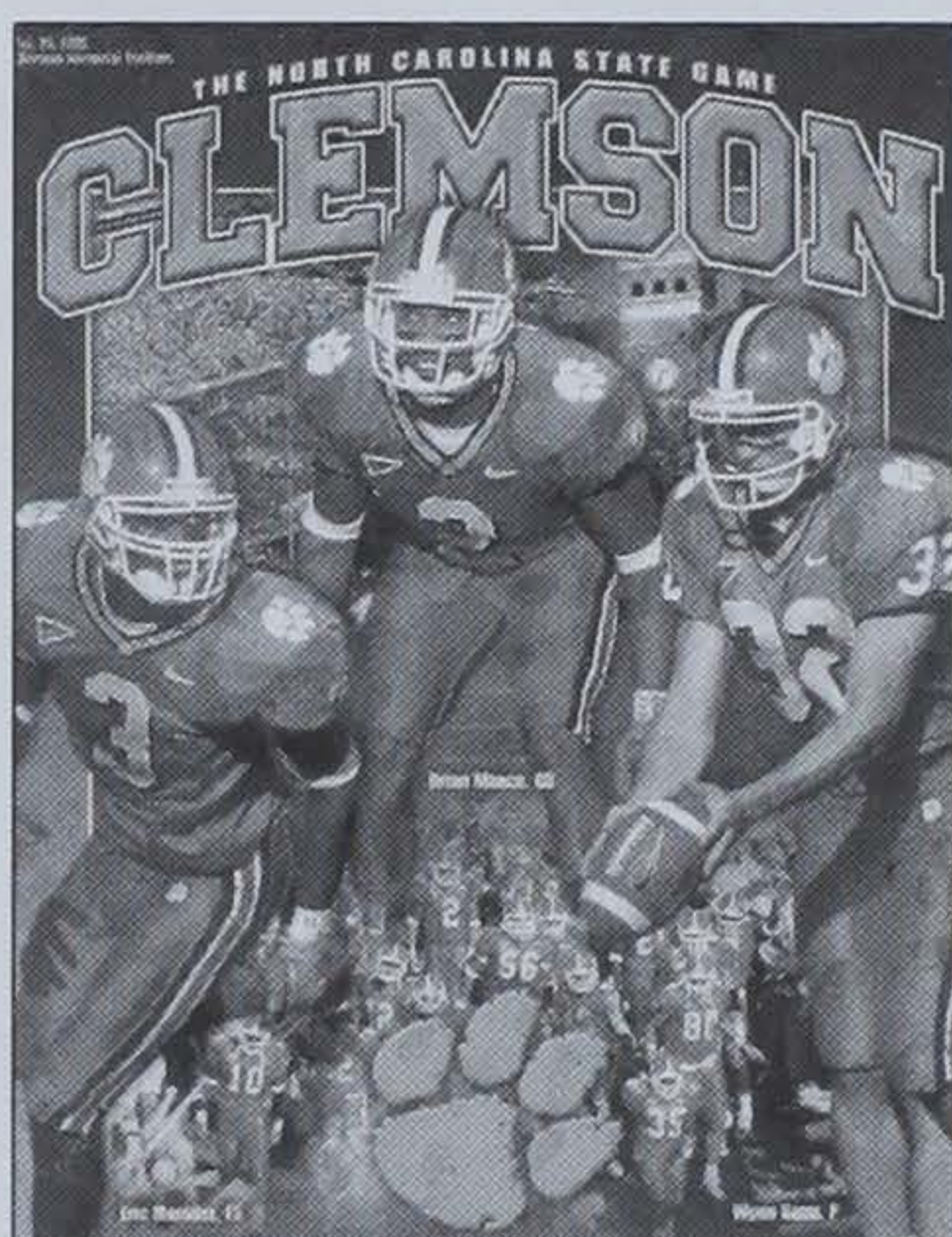
Kopp's blocked punt in the first quarter was recovered by defensive back Terrance Holt and returned 39 yards for a touchdown, yielding the first points of the game. On the extra point attempt, holder Chris Young took the snap and followed his blockers around the right end for a successful two-point conversion.

McLendon scored the first of his two touchdown runs early in the second period, when he burst through the Clemson line and rumbled 31 yards downfield to make the score 15-0. After Simmons fumbled three plays later, Rivers capped off the ensuing five-play, 15-yard drive with a one-yard leap into the end zone that gave the Wolfpack a commanding 22-0 lead at halftime.

Clemson's problems continued in the third period. After driving the offense inside the N.C. State red zone, Simmons failed to convert on fourth down when he was stopped by the NC State line. N.C. State's following drive resulted in a 26-yard field goal by Adam Kiker, and neither team scored again until McLendon added his second touchdown run of the game with 12:45 remaining in regulation.

The two teams then traded kickoff return touchdowns, meaning there was a touchdown scored on three consecutive plays, leading to the 38-6 N.C. State victory. It was Clemson's fourth straight loss on Thursday nights, the second this year.

The play of freshman Justin Miller was a standout performance for the Tigers. He had 12 tackles and broke up a pass on defense. He also scored all of Clemson's points when he returned a kickoff 80 yards for a touchdown in the final period, negating the Wolfpack's shutout. It was also his first career kickoff return. Brian Mance also had a solid performance with his fifth interception of the season and another pass deflection.

Aaron Hunt's 21-yard goal with eight seconds remaining in regulation sealed Clemson's 34-31 come-from-behind victory against Duke at Wallace Wade Stadium. Clemson defeated Duke for the fourth-consecutive time, and has also won 21 of the last 25 meetings between these schools. The Tigers' triumph marked the 23rd-consecutive loss for the Blue Devils in ACC play. Clemson improved its record to 5-4 on the season and improved its conference record to 3-3.

Trailing by as many as 14 points in the final period, the Tigers rallied behind the play of quarterback Charlie Whitehurst, and scored 24 points in the final 15 minutes. In his first career start, Whitehurst impressed players and fans alike as he set Clemson records in several offensive categories. He completed 34 of his 52 passes for 420 yards and four touchdowns, all Tiger highs. His passing-yardage total was the second most ever by an ACC quarterback in his first college start.

Although he was sacked six times, and also fumbled late in regulation to set up a Duke score, Whitehurst not only led the offense downfield in the final two minutes of regulation, but he also did not throw an interception in 52 attempts, a Tiger record.

Clemson's receiving corps had an outstanding collective performance. J.J. McKelvey led the individual efforts with 10 catches for 103 yards and a score. Kevin Youngblood and Derrick Hamilton combined for 15 catches, 162 yards, and two scores.

The Tigers drove 65 yards on their opening possession. Whitehurst completed all five of his passes, including a 14-yarder with Kevin Youngblood that made the score 7-0. Duke responded with an eight play, 82-yard drive that was capped off when receiver Darryl Scott connected with Chris Douglas on a 20-yard touchdown pass.

The score remained tied until midway through the second quarter when Duke took its first lead of the game. After re-gaining possession with just under 12 minutes remaining before halftime, the Blue Devils drove 68 yards down the field and consumed five and a half minutes off the clock. Adam Smith finished off the drive when he found Senterrio Landrum in the end zone for a 15-yard touchdown pass. Brent Garber's 28-yard field goal as time expired gave Duke a 17-7 halftime edge.

Aaron Hunt added a 34-yard field goal in the third period. Early in the fourth period, Smith tallied his second touchdown pass of the game when he

connected with Khary Sharpe on a 54-yard touchdown pass that gave Duke its largest lead at 24-10.

The Tigers came roaring back behind Whitehurst. His 47-yard touchdown pass to Airese Currie on fourth-and-10 cut the lead to seven. On the first play of the next possession, he connected with Hamilton on a 49-yard scoring effort that tied the score with 8:03 left. After Miller intercepted Smith's pass at Duke's 38-yard line, Whitehurst threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to McKelvey, giving Clemson its first lead since the first quarter.

After the Tigers regained possession, Whitehurst fumbled at Clemson's 24-yard line and the Blue Devils recovered. Smith threw a 24-yard touchdown pass to tight end Andy Roland two plays later, which tied the game

with just over two minutes to play. Like a true leader and veteran, Whitehurst led the offense downfield one more time; and with eight seconds remaining, Hunt's 21-yard field goal sealed the win.

It marked just the second time in Tiger history that Clemson overcame a 14-point deficit in the final quarter to gain victory and the first since 1980, when Clemson trailed at Virginia by the same 24-10 score.

Clemson's play on defense indicated a well-balanced effort. Justin Miller and Eric Meekins each had interceptions, while Rodney Thomas (19) and Eric Sampson (15) led all Tiger tacklers. Nick Eason recorded the defense's only two sacks as well.

Clemson scored over 30 points for the third time in its last four games as the Tigers routed North Carolina 42-12 at Kenan Memorial Stadium in Chapel Hill. Clemson's win avenged the Tigers' 38-3 loss to the Tar Heels in Death Valley in 2001, and marked the third time in the last four meetings between the two that Clemson emerged victorious.

Clemson scored 42 of the game's final 45 points after falling behind 9-0 in the first quarter. It marked the third straight victory in which Clemson trailed by as many as nine points early in the game. The Tigers' offensive play once again was led by the performance of Charlie Whitehurst, who threw four touchdown passes for the second consecutive week and tied his own school record.

Whitehurst's stellar performance followed a career-setting performance against Duke and helped Clemson's offense amass 530 yards of total offense. He completed 12 of his 20 passes for 274 yards and four touchdowns, including an 83-yard touchdown pass to Airese Currie in the first quarter. It was the third-longest completion in Tiger history and longest by any players in the history of Kenan Memorial Stadium.

Bernard Rambert and Tye Hill rushed for 106 and 105 yards, respectively; their performances marked the only times in 2002 that Clemson had a running back rush for at least 100 yards in a game. Chad Jasmin caught two of Whitehurst's touchdown passes, as he had his first scores of the season. It marked the first time since 1986 that a running back had two touchdown receptions in the same game.

After Miller intercepted C.J. Stephens' pass at Clemson's two-yard line, Whitehurst was sacked by a blitzing Kevin Knight in the endzone for a safety that gave the Tar Heels an unusual 2-0 lead. North Carolina retained possession after the safety and capitalized when Stephens completed a pass to Bobby Blizzard for 18 yards and a touchdown.

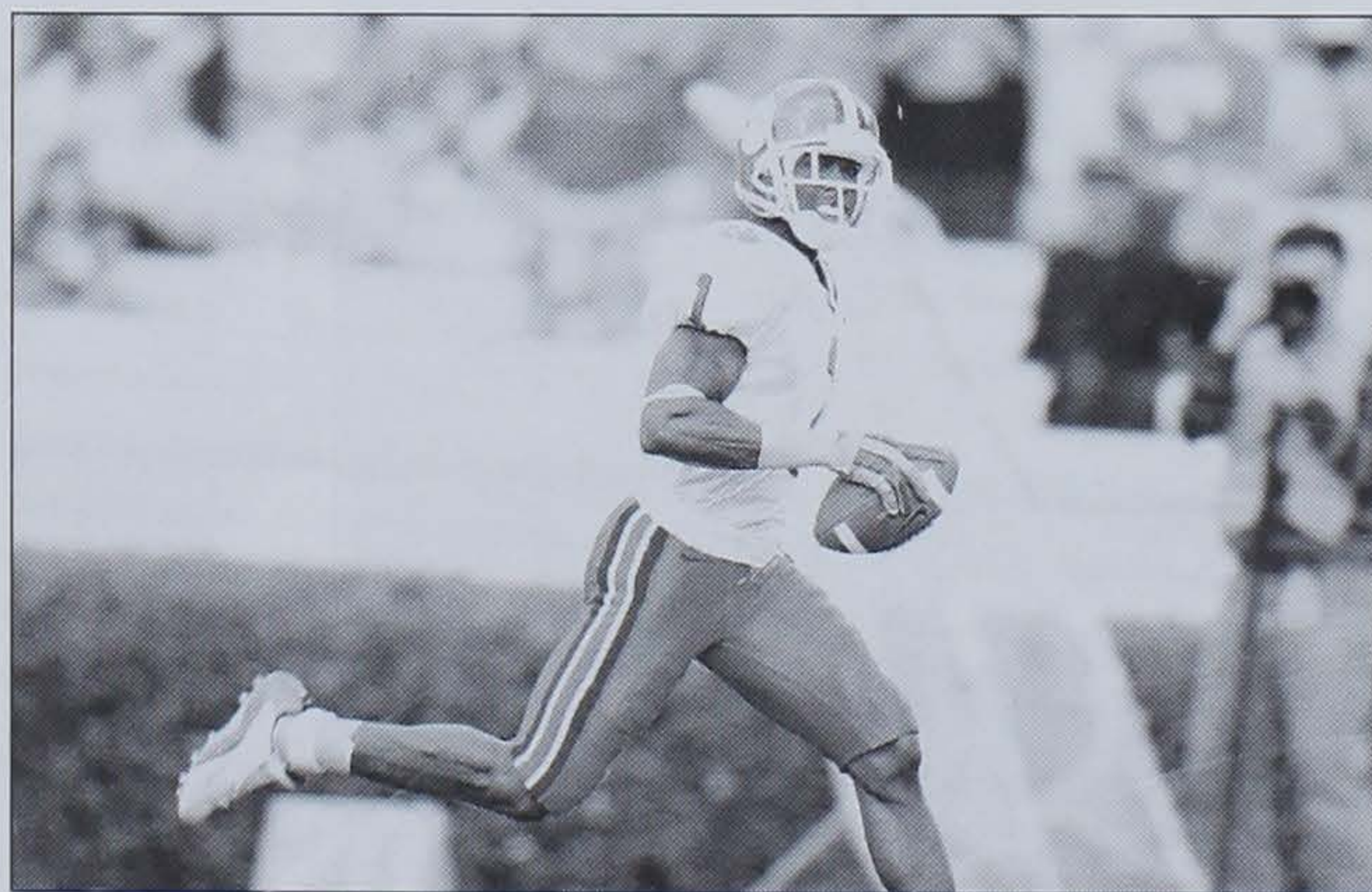
The Tigers quickly retaliated. Two plays after the ensuing kickoff, Whitehurst connected with Currie on a well-executed 83-yard touchdown pass. Clemson took its first lead on the opening possession of the second quarter; Bernard

Rambert rushed for 27 yards on four carries and capped off the drive with a three-yard touchdown run that gave Clemson its first lead of the game, 14-9. The Tigers struck again just before halftime when Whitehurst hooked up with J.J. McKelvey on a 58-yard touchdown reception that extended Clemson's lead to 12.

After the start of the second half, Whitehurst quickly led the offense downfield again. He helped finish off Clemson's seven-play, 85-yard drive when he found Jasmin in the endzone for a 14-yard touchdown pass. His touchdown pass was his third of the game and marked the Tigers' fourth-unanswered score of the game. North Carolina added a field goal on its next possession, but Clemson extended its lead on its next possession.

Whitehurst completed his scoring effort for the game when he connected with Jasmin again, this time on a two-yard touchdown pass, which gave the Tigers a commanding 35-12 lead with just over three minutes remaining in the third period. Clemson's scoring drive took over six minutes off the clock, lasted 14 plays and covered 80 yards. Tye Hill made the final offensive contribution to the game in the final quarter when he rushed for nine yards and a touchdown with 5:11 remaining in regulation.

John Leake and Rodney Thomas led the team in tackles with 13 and eight, respectively. The defense as a whole had one of its best games of the season, as six different players recorded sacks. Nick Eason led the line with six tackles, two tackles for loss, and one sack.

Maryland continued its quest for a second consecutive conference championship, as the Terrapins used a tough defensive scheme to defeat Clemson 30-12 at Death Valley. Maryland's defense held the Tigers to 81 yards rushing and 211 total yards, while limiting quarterback Charlie Whitehurst to just 12 completions and no touchdown passes. Whitehurst had thrown for 694 yards and eight touchdowns over the two previous games, both Clemson victories. The win was Maryland's second straight over Clemson and the first time since 1985 that the Terrapins defeated Clemson at Death Valley.

Despite throwing three interceptions, Scott McBrien led Maryland's offensive attack. He completed 13 of his 23 passes for 153 yards and three touchdown passes. He also ran for 67 yards on nine carries. Two of his touchdown passes came in the first half and helped the Terrapins sustain a lead they held on to for the entire game. He added a touchdown run in the fourth quarter to seal the win.

Chris Downs also had a remarkable performance to complement the play of McBrien. Downs, who replaced injured all-conference tailback Bruce Perry earlier in the season, ran for 101 yards on 20 carries. Perry had 69 yards on 17 carries.

Aaron Hunt's four field goals led the Clemson offense. It marked the second time this year he had been 4-4 on field goals and extended his consecutive made streak to 10 in succession. The Tigers drove inside Maryland's 20-yard line four times, yet failed to score a touchdown.

McBrien's one-yard touchdown pass to Derek Miller gave Maryland its opening lead with 6:15 remaining in the first period. McBrien helped set up the score earlier in the drive when he scrambled for 54 yards on third down before Miller tackled him at the five-yard line. After kicker Nick Novak missed his first extra point attempt in 73 consecutive tries, the Terrapins led 6-0.

After Hunt kicked a 29-yard field goal early in the second period, Maryland extended its lead on its ensuing drive. The offense marched 78 yards on 10 plays and took over five minutes off the game clock; McBrien completed the drive when he hooked up with Jafar Williams on a 34-yard touchdown pass with 7:55 remaining in the first half.

Hunt's 35-yard field goal on Clemson's next drive made the score 13-6; and after Novak countered with a 19-yard field goal, Hunt made a 22-yard

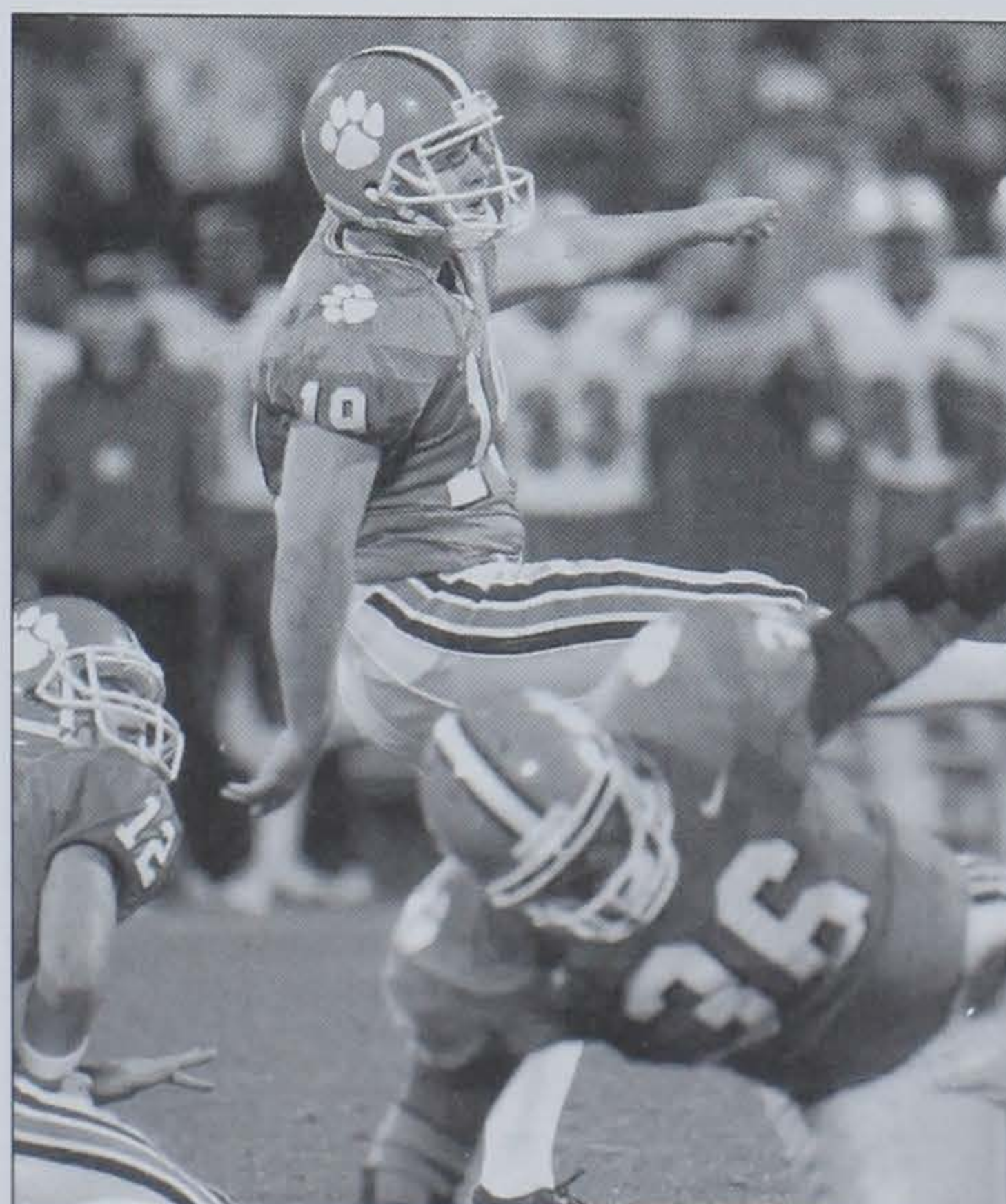
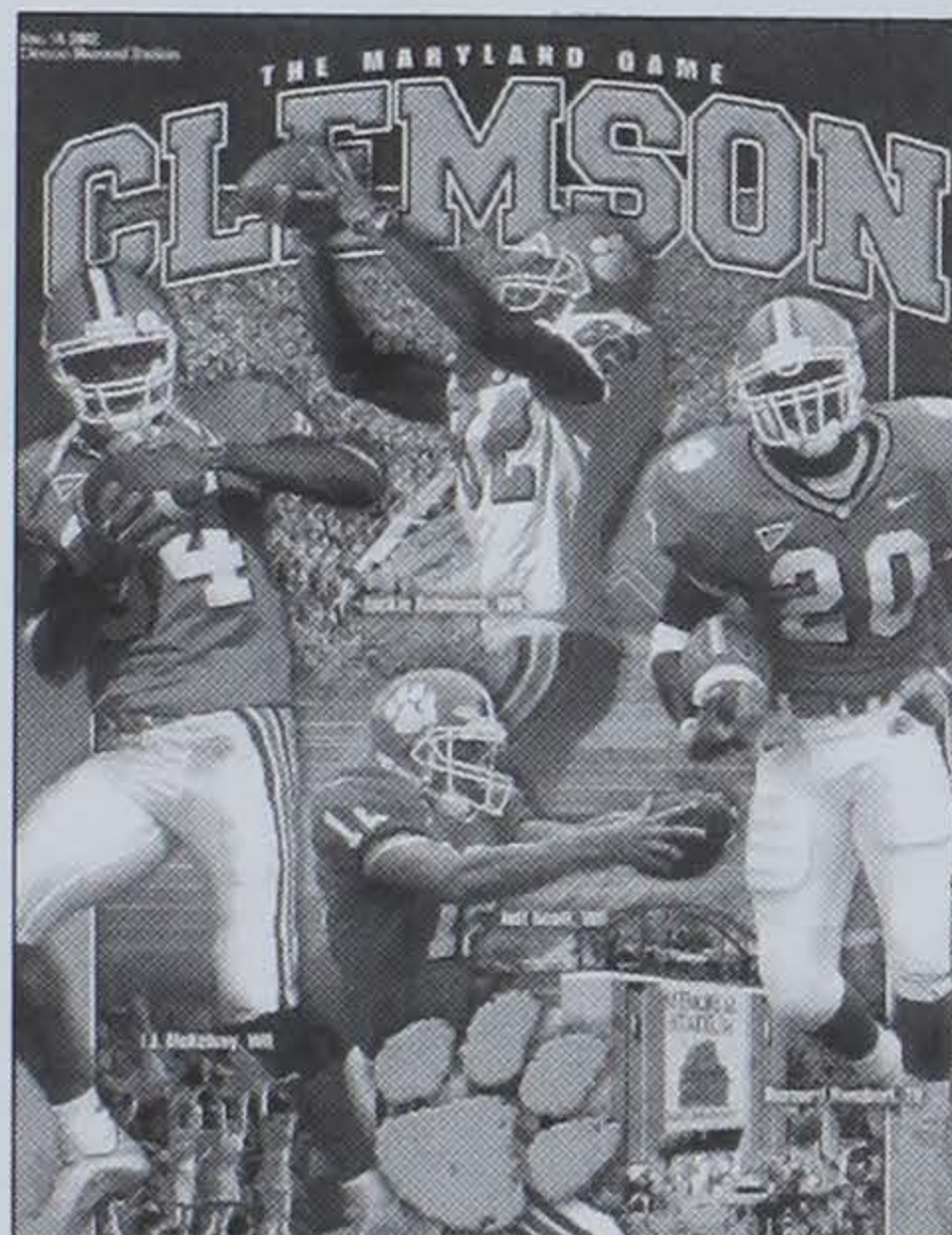
field goal as time expired that reduced Maryland's lead to 16-9 at halftime. It was the eighth time in 11 games that Clemson had scored inside the last 80 seconds of the first half.

Maryland assumed its largest lead of the game midway through the third quarter. The offense again utilized a large portion of the game clock by taking more than six minutes to move 82 yards on 13 plays. McBrien capped off the drive with a four-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jeff Dugan that gave the Terrapins a 23-9 lead.

Hunt's 42-yard field goal in the final minute of the third quarter marked the last time Clemson scored. McBrien's three-yard touchdown run with 8:23 left concluded a 12-play, 64-yard drive that took over five minutes.

While Clemson's offense was stifled, Justin Miller had a standout performance on defense. Miller intercepted two passes, which marked his sixth and seventh of the season. He also forced two fumbles and had 152 yards in kickoff returns, the sixth-highest single-game total in Clemson history.

The play of linebacker John Leake was also a highlight. The junior had a career-high 21 tackles to pace the defense, which was on the field for nearly 39 minutes.

Clemson concluded its 2002 regular-season campaign with a thrilling 27-20 victory over arch-rival South Carolina. The Tigers earned their seventh victory of the season in the 100th all-time meeting between these schools and avenged a 20-15 defeat to the Gamecocks in 2001. The Tigers won their first night game of the season and did so in front of almost 84,000 fans at Death Valley, Clemson's largest home crowd of the season.

Charlie Whitehurst improved his record to 3-1 as Clemson's starter and helped guide the offense to 432 total yards of offense, the highest total against South Carolina in the last 15 games. He completed 27 of his 38 passes for 287 yards, which marked the highest totals in school history for completions and passing yards against South Carolina. Clemson controlled the ball for over 33 minutes, its high total of the year and had a season-best 27 first downs to just 12 for the Gamecocks.

Whitehurst also made the key play of the game early in the fourth quarter, when he scampered down the sideline and into the endzone on an 11-yard touchdown run. That score tied the score 20-20 and gave Clemson the momentum it eventually carried to victory.

Bernard Rambert and Yusef Kelly provided a balanced rushing attack to compliment Whitehurst's performance. Rambert rushed for 66 yards on 15 carries and two touchdowns; and Kelly had 64 yards on 10 carries, which included 48 yards on seven carries on the game-clinching drive when Clemson ran out the last 6:32 off the clock.

After Daniel Weaver booted a 25-yard field goal, Clemson responded on its next drive and took its first lead. Whitehurst completed all four of his passes on the drive, which lasted 10 plays, covered 80 yards, and was capped off by a four-yard touchdown run by Rambert. Weaver added a 33-yard field goal early in the second quarter to cut Clemson's lead to one, but Aaron Hunt added field goals of 26 yards and 28 yards, including the latter with 32 seconds remaining before halftime. The kick, his 12th-consecutive made field goal, gave Clemson the lead 13-6 at halftime.

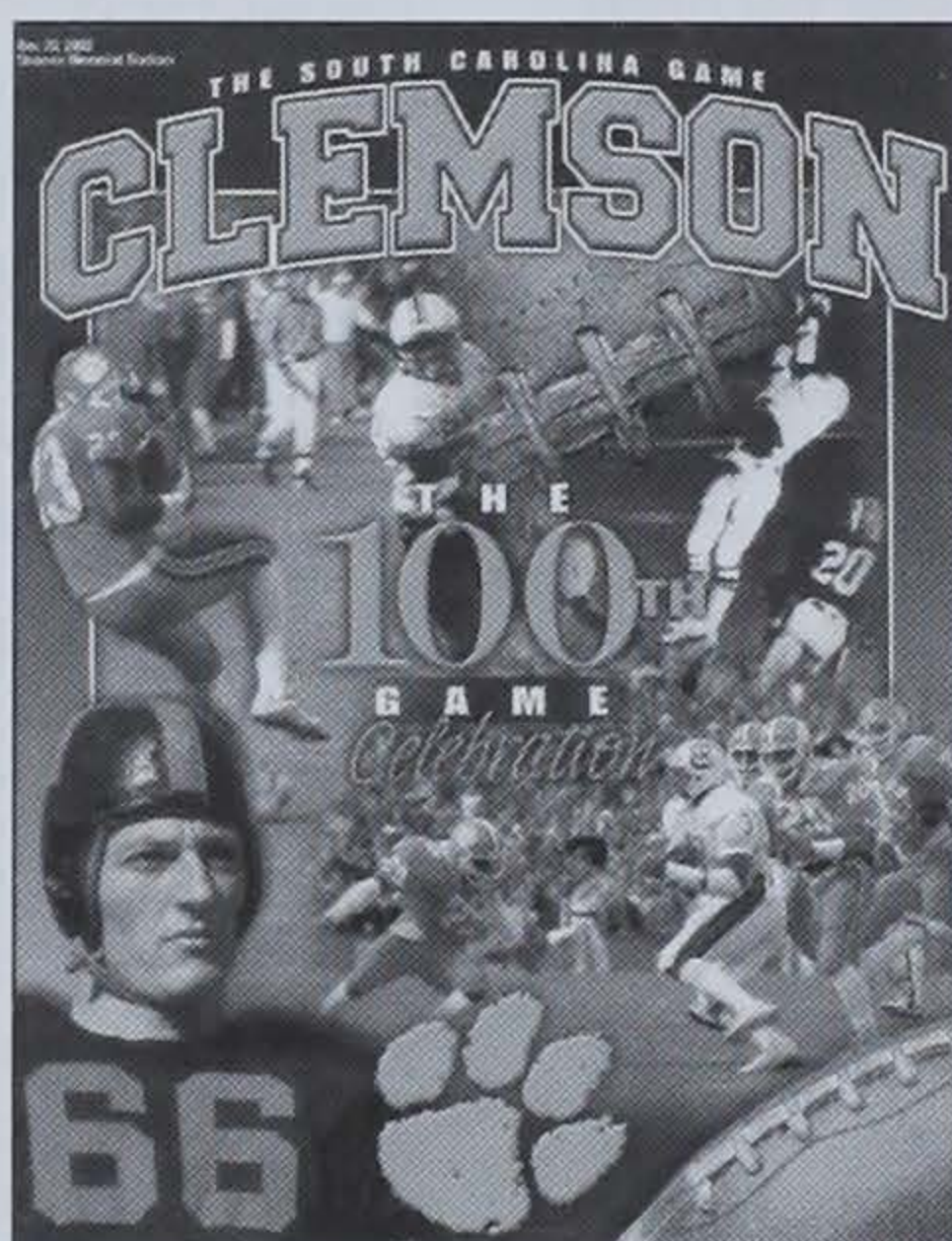
South Carolina's offense exploded early in the second half. On the second play, Dondrial Pinkins connected with Troy Williamson for a 70-yard touchdown catch that quickly tied the score 13-13. On Clemson's ensuing drive, the offense came up short after Hunt missed a 47-yard field goal.

South Carolina scored again on its next possession. During a nine-play, 70-yard drive that included a 43-yard completion from Pinkins to Williamson, the Gamecocks took the lead for the first time when Andrew Pinnock punched the ball across the goal line from two yards out. His run gave South Carolina a 20-13 lead with just over three minutes remaining in the third quarter.

Whitehurst's game-tying 11-yard touchdown run came on third down and capped a 10-play, 63-yard drive. After the defense forced South Carolina to punt, Rambert drove again for a score. A Whitehurst to Jackie Robinson 30-yard pass set up Rambert's score.

South Carolina's offense drove to Clemson's 30-yard line on its next possession, but failed to convert on fourth down when a fake field goal was broken up by linebacker Eric Sampson. Clemson's offense ran out the remainder of the game, thanks to the blocking of Clemson's offensive line and the running of Kelly.

The Tigers held South Carolina to 180 yards passing and did not allow the Gamecocks to score in the final quarter, which proved to be critical in Clemson's come-from-behind win. Brian Mance had his sixth interception of the season and helped lead Clemson's efforts on defense. Rodney Thomas led the team with 12 tackles.

Georgia Game Notes

This will be the first time Georgia has traveled to Clemson since 1995, a 19-17 Bulldog win on the night Clemson opened its centennial football celebration...Clemson last defeated Georgia in 1990, a 34-3 win at Death Valley...this game will have a noon kickoff and be televised by ABC...the August 30 date is the earliest start to a season in Tiger history and just the third August game in Tiger history...Georgia holds a 40-17-4 lead in the series and has won four in a row...Georgia holds a 20-2 lead in games played at Sanford Stadium, but the series is only 7-6-2 in favor of Georgia in Death Valley...the series dates to 1897 and the fourth game in Clemson history...Georgia won that first meeting 24-0 in Athens...that was the 25th game in Georgia's history...Clemson's first win in the series took place in 1900, a 39-5 win behind Head Coach John Heisman...Heisman was 4-0 as Clemson head

coach against Georgia...between 1977-87, the two had a 5-5-1 record against each other...each of the last two meetings and 11 of the last 16 meetings have been decided by seven points or less...last year, Georgia defeated Clemson in Athens 31-28 in the season opener for both teams...ironically, Clemson's last win in Athens was by a 31-28 score in 1986...thus each team's last win in Athens was by the same score...Clemson held Georgia to 203 yards of total offense, its low figure in a 13-1 2002 season...Mark Richt coached under Bobby Bowden at Florida State prior to becoming head coach of Georgia...Richt beat both Bowdens last year, as he defeated Florida State in the Sugar Bowl...Richt and Tiger Offensive Coordinator Brad Scott coached together at Florida State on the 1993 National Championship team...Richt succeeded Scott as Florida State's offensive coordinator in 1994 when Scott left

to become South Carolina's head coach...Georgia was ranked #8 in the nation by AP heading into last year's game and finished ranked #3...Clemson has won 15 of its last 19 season openers and is 79-20-8 all-time...Clemson is 78-16-8 in home openers.

The Rivalry

The Clemson vs. Georgia Series has been one of the best in college football, especially during the 1977-87 era. During that time, the two teams had a 5-5-1 record against each other. Nine of the 11 games were decided by a touchdown or less and four were decided on a play inside the last 20 seconds. Here is a rundown of the games during that era.

1977 • Athens, GA

Clemson scored an upset win over defending SEC champion Georgia 7-6 in Athens. It was Clemson's first win in Athens since 1914. A rain-soaked crowd of 55,000 watched as Jeff Pyburn's two-point conversion pass fell incomplete in the game's final minute.

Clemson broke a scoreless tie when Lester Brown scampered in from three yards out, giving the Tigers a 7-0 advantage. However, Georgia responded when Pyburn found Ulysses Norris in the endzone for a seven-yard touchdown to cut the deficit to one with six seconds left in the game. Georgia's bid for the win failed following the incomplete two-point conversion pass. The Bulldogs were plagued by four costly turnovers.

1978 • Athens, GA

Mistakes hurt Clemson throughout the entire game, and Georgia took advantage of it on its way to a 12-0 victory in Athens. The Tigers turned the ball over six times in the game, with two on interceptions and four coming on fumbles.

Georgia took a 6-0 lead into halftime behind two field goals from Rex Robinson. The Bulldogs added a touchdown in the second half after Jeff Pyburn hit Carmon Prince from 13 yards out. The Bulldogs rushed for 205 yards in the contest and only committed one turnover.

This would be Clemson's only loss of the season, as the Tigers finished the year 11-1 and ranked sixth in the nation. The Tigers had six players on this offense who went on to play at least eight years in the NFL. One of them, Dwight Clark, missed the game with a shoulder injury and took photos for the **Orange & White** during the game.

1979 • Clemson, SC

Clemson ran through the heart of Georgia's defense and pulled out a 12-7 victory in front of 62,000 at Death Valley. The Tiger offense gained 306 yards on the ground to control the line of scrimmage. The Bulldogs could only muster 247 yards of total offense, while throwing three interceptions.

Marvin Sims ran for a career-high 146 yards on 25 carries to cap his best performance as a Tiger. The Clemson defense was relentless. The Bulldogs did not get on the board until Buck Belue ran in from 21-yards out with just nine seconds left.

1980 • Athens, GA

Clemson outgained Georgia in total offense 351-157, but fell to the eventual national champions 20-16 in Athens. The first quarter belonged to Georgia, thanks to the heroics of Scott Woerner. Woerner opened the game's scoring with a 67-yard punt return for a touchdown. He then set up an-

other Bulldog score with a 97-yard interception return. Clemson ran 56 plays in the first half to 10 for Georgia, yet trailed at intermission 14-10.

Clemson fought back behind three Obed Ariri field goals and a touchdown run by backup quarterback Mike Gasque, but it was already too late. Freshman star Herschel Walker rushed for 121 yards, with most of them coming in the second half. Edgar Pickett, who played his final three years on defense, had 75 yards rushing to lead the Tigers.

1981 • Clemson, SC

Clemson forced a record nine turnovers and defeated the defending national champion Bulldogs 13-3 in Death Valley. An interception by Tim Childers set up the game's only touchdown, an eight-yard pass from Homer Jordan to Perry Tuttle. Donald Igwebuike added two field goals for the Tigers.

Georgia was ranked fourth in the nation coming into the game. It remains the highest ranked team ever defeated by a Clemson team in the history of Death Valley. Clemson allowed Herschel Walker to rush for 121 yards, but for the second straight year he failed to score a touchdown. It was the only regular season loss of Walker's Georgia career. Clemson eventually made it to the Orange Bowl and defeated Nebraska 22-15 to claim its only football national championship.

1982 • Athens, GA

Georgia defeated Clemson 13-7 in front of 82,000 fans at Sanford Stadium and a Monday Night Football National Television audience on ABC. Clemson jumped out to an early 7-0 lead after Georgia fumbled at its own 11-yard line. Clemson quarterback Homer Jordan ran in from six yards out to open the scoring.

Georgia responded with 10 points in the second quarter, sparked by a blocked Dale Hatcher punt that was run in for a touchdown by Stan Dooley. Kevin Butler added two field goals to give the Bulldogs the winning margin over Clemson. The game came down to a defensive struggle, with the Bulldogs prevailing. Herschel Walker was not suppose to play due to a thumb injury, but ended the game with more carries than any other player (10).

1983 • Clemson, SC

Georgia held a big edge in total offense, but was unable to defeat Clemson and the two teams played to a 16-16 tie in Death Valley. Clemson held a 16-6 lead going into the final quarter, but Georgia scored 10 unanswered points to even up the score.

Clemson led at halftime behind Kenny Flowers' 16-yard touchdown run late in the second quarter. Kevin Butler and Bob Paulling, kickers for Georgia and Clemson respectively, each booted three field goals in the contest. The game ended with Butler and Donald Igwebuike attempting game winning herculean field goals (66 and 68 yards, respectively) on the last two plays of the game.

1984 • Athens, GA

Georgia kicker Kevin Butler nailed a 60-yard field goal with 11 seconds remaining to give the Bulldogs a 26-23 comeback victory over Clemson. The field goal was Butler's fourth of the contest. The

game was a defensive struggle, as the two teams combined for 12 turnovers.

Clemson looked dominant in the first half, as the Tigers built a 20-6 lead before heading into the locker rooms. Quarterback Mike Eppley threw two touchdown passes to ignite the Tiger offense. However, Georgia fought back in the second half behind Butler and a stingy defense. The Bulldogs hit Eppley hard, shut down the Tiger running backs and held Clemson to only Donald Igwebuike's 48-yard field goal in the second half.

1985 • Clemson, SC

Georgia scored 17 points in the fourth quarter on its way to a 20-13 victory at Death Valley. The win marked Georgia's first at Clemson since 1976. Georgia rushed for 360 yards in the game, most ever against a Danny Ford coached Clemson team.

Clemson took an early lead in this one after tight end Jim Riggs found himself open for a 43-yard touchdown pass from Randy Anderson. Georgia once again came back in the final quarter behind the running of reserve quarterback James Jackson, who scored one touchdown on an option play.

Georgia took the lead for good in the fourth period after Peter Anderson jumped on a Keith Henderson fumble in the endzone to make the score 17-10. No opposing offensive lineman has scored a touchdown against the Tigers since.

1986 • Athens, GA

David Treadwell drilled a 46-yard field goal as time expired to lift Clemson to a 31-28 victory over 14th-ranked Georgia in Athens. Clemson rushed for 279 yards and gained 428 yards overall. The two teams combined for 42 points in the first half, the highest scoring first half in the series history.

Kenny Flowers rushed for 72 yards on just six carries and scored a touchdown in the first half, but had to leave the game with a sprained ankle. Terrence Flagler picked up the slack as he rushed for a team-best 90 yards and also had 58 yards receiving. Georgia took the lead in the third period on a 78-yard pass from James Jackson to Fred Lane.

The loss marked the first time in Georgia history it failed to win after scoring at least 28 points.

1987 • Clemson, SC

For the second consecutive year, David Treadwell kicked the game-winning field goal inside the last two seconds to lead Clemson to a 21-20 win over #18 Georgia. The win marked the first time Clemson had consecutive victories over Georgia since 1905-06.

After a touchdown run put Georgia ahead 20-16, Clemson scored the game's final five points. The first two points came when James Lott and Gene Beasley tackled quarterback James Jackson for a safety. That play was set up when Chinedu Ohan downed a Rusty Seyle punt at the one yard line.

Terry Allen, who rushed for a game-high 97 yards on 16 carries, ran for 35 yards on Clemson's final drive to set up Treadwell's heroics. His four field goals in the game tied Obed Ariri's school record. For the second straight year, Norman Haynes, a native of Athens, was Clemson's top tackler. He had 14 in the 1986 game and 12 in 1987.

Maryland Game Notes

This October 4 kickoff for the Clemson-Maryland game will be the earliest the two teams have faced each other on the calendar since 1994 when Clemson won at home on October 1...it will be Clemson's earliest trip to Maryland since 1990 when Clemson won at Baltimore on September 15...Maryland has won two in a row after the Tigers had won eight in a row, Clemson's longest winning streak in the series...Maryland scored just 56 points against Clemson in the eight games prior to Ralph Friedgen's arrival in College Park...Maryland has scored 67 points the last two years against Clemson...Clemson has won 13 of the last 17 meetings...Maryland won last year's game at Clemson 30-12, its first win at Clemson since 1985...Ralph Friedgen led the Terrapins to a 10-2 record in his first year (2001) and he joined former Clemson Head Coach Ken Hatfield as the only ACC coaches to win 10 games in their

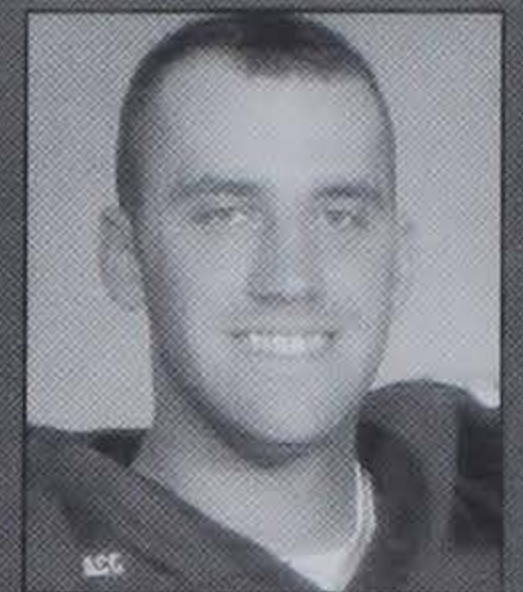

Clemson has 53 wins over Wake Forest, more than any other ACC team and second only to South Carolina (60) as far as most wins by Clemson over a single opponent...Wake Forest rushed for 365 yards (in 64 attempts) at Clemson last year, the most rushing yards ever for the Demon Deacons against Clemson and the most by an opponent all season...Wake Forest was assessed 14 penalties for 125 yards at Clemson last year, the highest figures against Clemson all season...Tommy Bowden has a 4-0 record against Wake Forest in his career, but three have been by nine points or less, including last year's 31-23 victory at Death Valley...Brian Mance was the hero of last year's Homecoming victory, as he forced a Chris Barclay fumble that he batted into the endzone where it was recovered by Altroy Bodrick for a touchback, icing the Clemson victory with under two minutes to play...Kevin

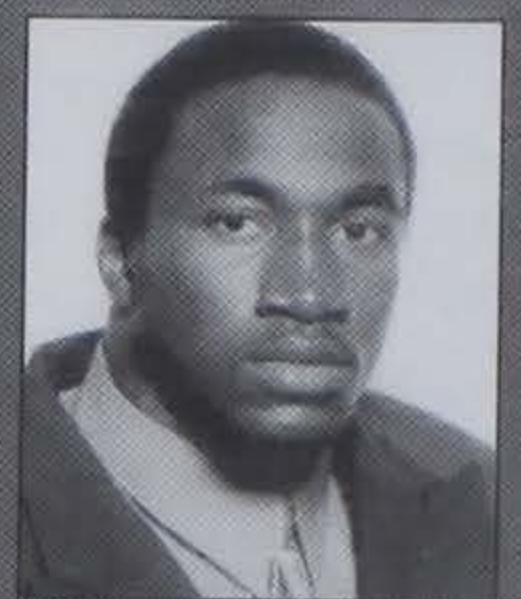

Clemson has won 18 of the last 21 meetings with Duke, including each of the last four, all victories under Tommy Bowden...Clemson has scored 203 points against the Blue Devils in four games under Bowden, an average of 50.8 points per game...Bowden-coached Clemson teams have 2,172 yards of total offense against the Blue Devils in four games, an average of 543 yards per game...that includes 1,231 yards passing, an average of 308 yards per game...when Clemson scored at least 50 points in three straight games against the Blue Devils from 1999-01, it marked the first time Clemson had gone for at least 50 points in three straight games against the same ACC opponent...the Tigers lead the series 31-15-1 overall...the Blue Devils have not won at Clemson since 1980, as the Tigers have won 11 in a row in Death Valley...Bowden served as an assistant coach at Duke from 1983-

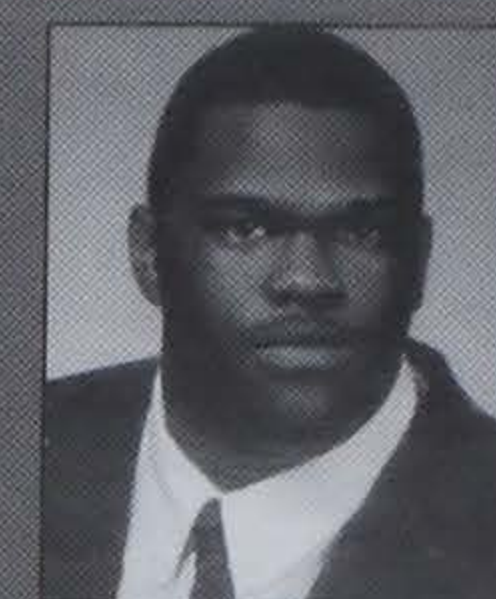

South Carolina Game Notes

Clemson has won six of the last eight and 10 of the last 14 against South Carolina...Tommy Bowden is 3-1 against Lou Holtz since the two coaches started at their respective programs in 1999...overall, Holtz is 5-3 against Clemson, including a 4-0 record as the N.C. State head coach in the 1970s...Clemson won the 100th meeting between the two last year at Clemson, 27-20, giving Clemson a 60-36-4 series lead that dates to 1896...this will be the 94th-straight year that the two have met on the gridiron, the third-longest-active series in college football...only the Kansas-Nebraska and Minnesota-Wisconsin series are longer...former Gamecock Head Coach Brad Scott (1994-98) is the Tiger offensive coordinator...Clemson is 3-1 against South Carolina since Scott has been a Tiger assistant...Scott and Holtz are the only two coaches in Gamecock history to win a bowl game...Scott is one of seven coaches

to serve both schools in the last 12 years...the visiting team won seven-straight games in this series from 1991-97...South Carolina won the last meeting between the two in Columbia, 20-15 in 2001, but that was South Carolina's first win in the series in Columbia since 1987...Gamecock Assistant Coach John Gutekunst coached against Clemson as Minnesota's head coach in the 1985 Independence Bowl...Clemson had a season-high 27 first downs and controlled the clock for a season-high 33:39 in the win over South Carolina last year...Troy Williamson led South Carolina with 140 receiving yards, most against Clemson in 2002...Charlie Whitehurst completed 27-38 passes for 287 yards against South Carolina in 2002, the high completion total and passing-yardage total in history by a Tiger quarterback against the Gamecocks...the team entering this game with a better record is 16-2-1

since 1981...that computes to an 88 percent winning percentage...Clemson is 38-14-3 in the series when it enters the game with the better record...Clemson is 7-2 when both teams enter the game with the same record.

1928

Injured All-American **O.K. Pressley** came off the bench in the second half to record a tackle for loss on four consecutive plays to thwart a South Carolina drive deep in Clemson territory. It is still the only time in history a Clemson player has made a tackle for loss on four consecutive plays. Clemson went on to a 32-0 victory in Columbia.

1948

With just 4:30 left in the game and South Carolina on its own 28, **Phil Prince** broke through the line to block a South Carolina punt. The ball rolled to the 11 where Oscar Thompson scooped it up and ran for a touchdown, giving Clemson a 13-7 lead, the eventual final score. Clemson went on to an undefeated season.

1959

Harvey White made the last Big Thursday game a success story for the Tigers. The gifted Clemson quarterback connected on 9-10 passes for 162 yards and two touchdowns, leading Clemson to a 27-0 victory. White's passing efficiency of 282 for that game is still the second best in Clemson history (given a minimum of 10 attempts).

1966

All-America offensive guard **Harry Olszewski** ran 12 yards for a touchdown with a fumbled snap from center to lead Clemson to a 35-10 victory that clinched the ACC championship for the Tigers. No Clemson offensive lineman has scored a touchdown since.

1967

Clemson clinched a third straight ACC title behind the rushing of ACC Player of the Year **Buddy Gore**. The Tiger running back gained 189 yards on 31 attempts, still the second most rushing yards by a Tiger against the Gamecocks. The performance allowed Gore to go over the 1000-yard rushing mark, a first in Clemson history, and to win the ACC rushing title.

1974

Two Tigers, one on each side of the ball, had a memorable performance in this Clemson victory. Running back **Ken Callicutt** rushed for 197 yards on 27 carries and added another 55 in pass receiving, leading Clemson to a 39-21 victory over the Gamecocks. The 197 yards rushing and 252 yards of all-purpose running are still high water marks for a Clemson player in the series. **Willie Anderson** dominated the defense, recording 21 tackles from his middle guard position, still a Tiger record for a lineman in one game. He was named National Defensive Player-of-the-Week by **Sports Illustrated**.

1977

Jerry Butler made a diving backwards reception of a 20-yard pass from Steve Fuller with 49 seconds remaining, giving the Tigers a 31-27 victory in Columbia. The play might be regarded as the most famous in Clemson history. The victory gave the Tigers an 8-2-1 record and a bid to the Gator Bowl, Clemson's first bowl bid in 18 years.



Senior defensive back **Willie Underwood** made his first career interceptions memorable ones against South Carolina in 1980. His two thefts for 101 yards earned him National Player-of-the-Week honors by **Sports Illustrated**.

1980

Defensive back **Willie Underwood** played 47 games for the Tigers, but never had an interception until his final contest. He made up for it in his last game as a Tiger when he had two thefts for a combined 101 yards in returns. His 37-yard interception return for a touchdown iced Clemson's 27-6 victory. It is still the most interception return yards in a single game by a Tiger. Underwood also had 17 tackles in the game and was named National Defensive Player-of-the-Week by **Sports Illustrated**.

1981

For the second time in history a blocked punt proved pivotal in the Tigers securing a perfect season. The key play in Clemson's 29-13 victory over South Carolina in Columbia was a blocked punt by **Rod McSwain**. The ball was recovered in the endzone by Johnny Rembert for a touchdown, giving Clemson a 7-6 lead. The play began at the 28-yard-line, just as the play in 1948 had. McSwain and Rembert went on to be NFL teammates for many years with the New England Patriots. McSwain's brother, Chuck had 151 yards rushing to lead the Clemson offense.

1988

Rodney Williams, playing in his final home game, led the Tigers to a 29-10 victory in Death Valley, avenging a 20-7 Clemson defeat the year before in which Williams, a native of Columbia, was taunted by the Gamecock faithful. Williams completed 13-26 passes for 192 yards and ran for 38 more and a touchdown, outplaying rival Todd Ellis, who completed 11 passes in 30 attempts. It was Williams 31st victory as Clemson's starting signal-caller.

1991

DeChane Cameron had the top all-around performance of his career in Clemson's 41-24 victory at South Carolina. The senior playing in his final

regular season game, rushed for 116 yards and passed for 206. The 322 yards of total offense is a series record for Clemson.

1995

Emory Smith gained 101 yards rushing in just 12 carries from his fullback slot, leading Clemson to a 38-17 victory and a berth in the Gator Bowl. Smith will be remembered for one particular run in the fourth quarter when he dragged a South Carolina tackler for nearly 20 yards at the end of a 54-yard romp. Smith scored two touchdowns on the day.

1997

Antwan Edwards had two interceptions in the third period alone, one a return of 42 yards for a touchdown, leading the Tigers to a 47-21 victory and a berth in the Peach Bowl. Edwards thefts led to a 27-point third period for the Tigers, Clemson's highest scoring period in history against the Gamecocks. Edwards was named ACC Player of the week for his performance.

1998

Howard Bartley will always be remembered for a 48-yard interception return for a touchdown in his final game as a Tiger. It was a key second-half play in Clemson's 28-19 victory, but especially rewarding for Bartley, who had overcome two torn ACL injuries in his five-year career.

1999 & 2000

Rod Gardner will be held in high esteem by Clemson fans for years to come for his accomplishments against South Carolina. In 1999 he had six catches for 138 yards and two scores, including a game-clinching 29-yard catch from Woodrow Dantzler on a fourth-down play with just 6:41 remaining in the game. The following year at Clemson, he had four catches for 107 yards, including a 50-yard grab from Dantzler that set up Aaron Hunt's game-winning field goal with three seconds remaining.

Bowl Championship Series

Starting in 1998, the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) has determined the Division I-A national champion in football. The BCS, which runs through the 2005 regular season and 2006 bowl season, consists of the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, FedEx Orange Bowl, Rose Bowl, and Nokia Sugar Bowl. Conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big XII, Pac 10, and the Southeastern Conferences. A year ago, Ohio State won the 2002 crown with a 31-24 double-overtime victory over Miami (FL) in the Fiesta Bowl. The Hurricanes captured the 2001 national title, defeating Nebraska 37-14 in the Rose Bowl. In the BCS's first season (1998), Tennessee defeated Florida State 23-16 in the Fiesta Bowl to claim the national title. A year later, it was Florida State's turn, as the Seminoles topped Virginia Tech 46-29 in the Sugar Bowl. Oklahoma claimed the 2000 national championship, defeating Florida State 13-2 in the FedEx Orange Bowl.

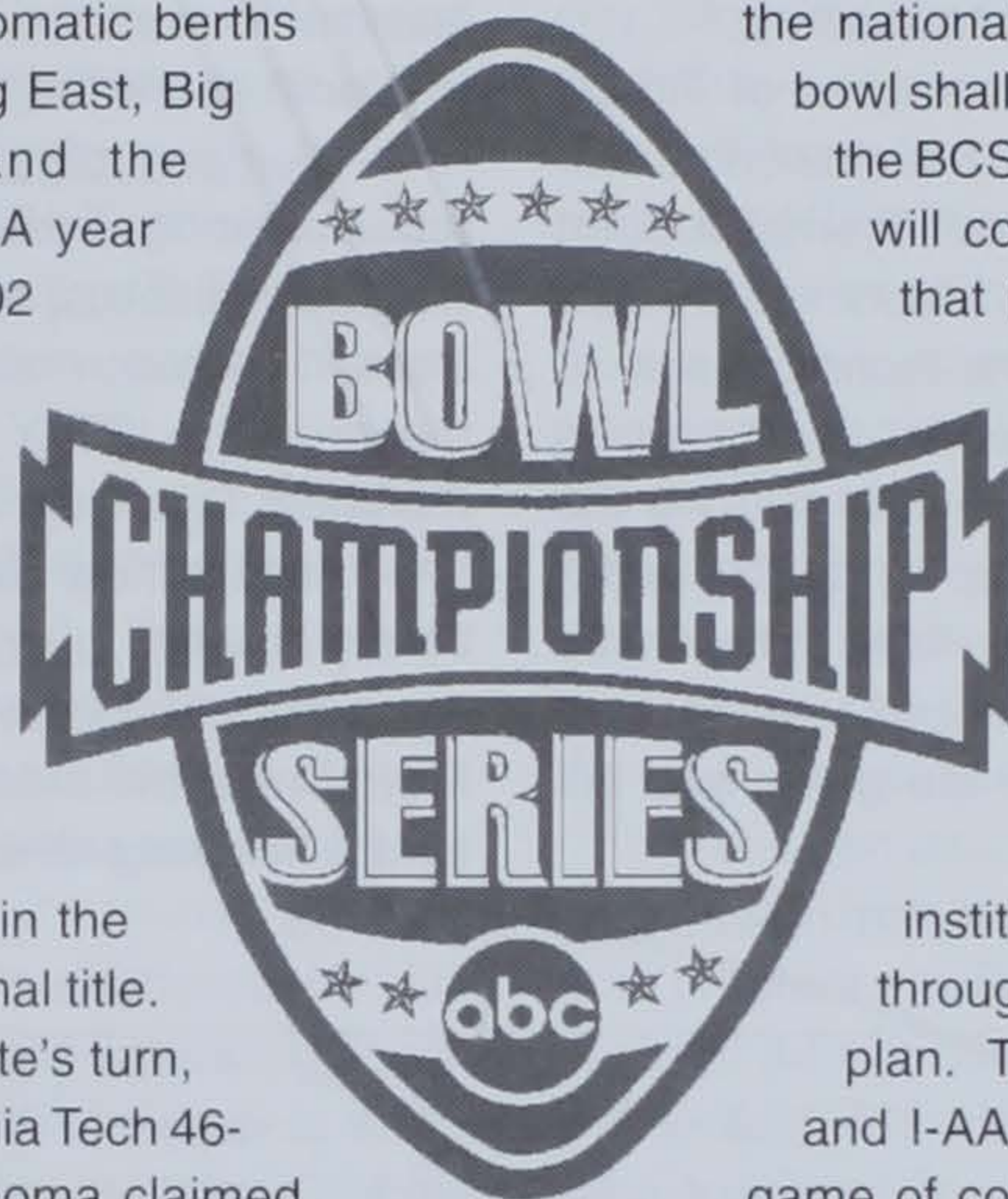
The BCS also notes the importance of regional consideration regarding team selection. Specifically, as participating members of the BCS, the four BCS Bowls will host the following conference champions in the years the national championship game is not played at their site. Regional consideration tie-ins include the ACC or Big East champion in the Orange Bowl, the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the Big

Ten and the Pac 10 champion in the Rose Bowl, and the Big XII champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Should a BCS Bowl's regional tie-in champion be ranked #1 or #2 in the final BCS standings, when such bowl is not hosting the national championship game, the #1- or #2-ranked team shall move to the national championship game and the bowl shall select a replacement team from the BCS pool of eligible teams. The pool will consist of any Division I-A team that is ranked among the top 12 in the final BCS standings and has achieved nine wins during the regular season (excluding NCAA-exempted contests).

The BCS group will distribute over \$40 million to non-participating BCS institutions during its eight-year term through a conference revenue sharing plan. Those monies go to Division I-A and I-AA conferences in support of the game of college football. Additionally, the BCS distributes \$200,000 per year to the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame.

This coming season, BCS participants will receive between \$13.87-17.05 million, depending on the conference affiliation of the at-large participants. Should both at-large participants come from outside the BCS conferences (ACC, Big East, Big Ten, Big XII, Pac 10, or SEC), those participants will receive \$13.87 million. If one or both at-large selections

come from within the original BCS group, the first conference participant shall receive \$13.87 million and the second participant from that same conference shall receive a minimum of \$4.5 million. The remaining dollars (the difference between \$13.87 million and \$4.5 million) will be split among the BCS conferences that have just one participant.

Clemson Tiger Sports Properties supplies Tiger fans with a full day of broadcast each football Saturday. Each broadcast day has three programs, "Tiger Tailgate Show," "Game Day Broadcast," and the "Fifth Quarter Show."

A Clemson tradition since the 1970s, the "Tiger Tailgate Show" is a two-hour entertainment and interactive program produced from the stadium. In years past, it has been done from the lawn at Littlejohn Coliseum in front of the Tiger statue. But due to renovations at that facility, the "Tailgate Show" will be produced at the coliseum corner nearest Death Valley.

The program begins two hours prior to kickoff. Popular Greenville personalities Joe Erwin and Duane Evans play host to the show that is attended by many Clemson fans. It is the gathering place on gameday. Interviews with former Clemson players, games, display items, and pre-game excitement are all part of the program.

The game broadcast is anchored by Jim Phillips, the longtime voice of the Tigers. The legendary voice and Clemson Hall of Famer is in his 36th year broadcasting Clemson athletics. His career dates to 1968 when he provided commentary on games coached by Frank Howard. He is one of the most respected announcers in the nation and is the dean of all ACC announcers.

Joining Phillips in the broadcast booth will be former Clemson offensive lineman Will Merritt, who played for the Tigers from 1998-01. He was a starter in 2000 and 2001 when he was named Second-Team All-ACC. He played on three bowl teams at Clemson, including the 2000 team that finished the season ranked #15 in the final AP poll with a 9-3 record. He also was named to the All-ACC Academic team each of those seasons and graduated from Clemson in December of 2000.

Merritt worked on the Clemson radio network pregame and postgame shows last season, his first fall out of school. He also provided color commentary on the television tape-delay broadcasts of selected 2002 Tiger games. The native of Easley, SC is the host of "The Morning Drive," a sports talk show that airs from 6:00 AM to 9:00 AM each morning on WCCP (104.9 FM) in Clemson.

Providing commentary and updates from the sideline will be Pete Yanity. The sports director at WSPA-TV in Spartanburg has been a member of the broadcast team the last two seasons providing score updates during the game and by playing host to the postgame show. Yanity is one

of the most knowledgeable broadcasters in the South and has covered Clemson football for over 15 years.

As has been the case in the past, the gameday broadcast will begin with the Tommy Bowden Pre-game Show. Bowden will meet with Jim Phillips to provide Clemson fans with the latest lineup and strategy information as his Tigers prepare for another competitive contest. Phillips, Merritt, and Yanity will also provide a last minute scene setter that will include the latest lineup and weather information.

After the game, fans can tune into the Fifth Quarter Show. Interviews with Coach Bowden and Assistant Coaches Brad Scott and John Lovett also will be included. An added feature will include lockerroom interviews with Clemson's top players that day. A rundown of the game stats and audio highlights will be provided. Scores and reports from the day's top games will also be provided.

Fans can also follow the Tigers by listening to "Tiger Calls" from area Ingles Grocery Stores, a one-hour program with Bowden and Phillips. This broadcast will air live each Thursday evening from 7:00 PM to 8:00 PM. It can be heard on most of the Clemson Tiger Sports Properties network affiliates. The show will begin Thursday evening, August 28.

Clemson Tiger Sports Properties also will produce the Tommy Bowden Show, a recap of the previous game's highlights. The program will give Clemson fans insight into the coaches decisions during the previous game and take an up close and personal look at some of your favorite players.

The Clemson Ring of Honor is in its 10th season of existence in Clemson Memorial Stadium. On September 3, 1994, during ceremonies prior to the Clemson-Furman football game, Frank Howard, Steve Fuller, and Banks McFadden were inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor. On September 2, 1995, Jeff Davis was added to the Clemson Ring of Honor, the first member of Clemson's National Championship team of 1981.

On September 6, 1997, Fred Cone was named along with former three-time All-America baseball player Rusty Adkins, the first non-football player to be named to the prestigious list. The class of 1999 included former All-America receiver Jerry Butler, and former basketball greats Dale Davis and Barbara Kennedy. Terry Kinard, who also was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2001, joined the Ring of Honor during the 2001 Florida State game.

The Ring of Honor is the highest honor a Clemson athlete can receive. A recipient must first be a member of the Clemson Hall of Fame, earn at least an undergraduate degree, and make a significant contribution to the heritage of Clemson athletics. Honorees will have their jersey retired. Each Clemson athletic facility will have an appropriate display that will honor the recipient. The facade on the North side upper deck of Memorial Stadium is the Ring of Honor display for football.

Here are some other facts about Clemson's Ring of Honor:

Committee

The Committee is composed of 11 members:

- Sports Information Director, Chair
- Athletic Director
- Director of Student-Athlete Enrichment
- Senior Associate Athletic Director
- Executive Secretary of IPTAY
- A member of the Board of Trustees
- A member of the Tiger Lettermen's Association
- A member of the Athletic Council
- NCAA Faculty Representative
- University President or designee
- Head Coach of a sport that has a nomination (i.e., Head Football Coach votes on football candidates, basketball coach votes on basketball candidates, etc.)

Conferring

In the sport of football, the honoree will have his name, number, years participated, and helmet enshrined in the Ring of Honor at Clemson Memo-

rial Stadium. In the sport of basketball, the honoree's jersey will be hung from the rafters of Littlejohn Coliseum. In the sport of baseball, a jersey replica will be hung from the fence of Doug Kingsmore Stadium. Other sports will establish appropriate sites at the home facility.

When a student-athlete is selected, the person's jersey is honored, but the jersey number may be worn in the future.

The nature and organization of the ceremony will be determined from a meeting between the honoree, the athletic director, the committee chair, and the head coach of the sport involved.

Eligibility

This committee will recognize individuals who have demonstrated consistent and unique national excellence in their sport during their Clemson career. Their accomplishments must be significant on an individual and team basis. Their statistical accomplishments must be noteworthy, but they should also have an outstanding record in terms of leadership. In general, they must have made a noteworthy contribution to the history of the Clemson athletic program.

Athletic accomplishments after their Clemson career are not a primary consideration in the nomi-

nation, but they must retain a commendable record of citizenship after they leave Clemson.

A candidate must be a member of the Clemson Hall of Fame and hold a baccalaureate degree from an accredited four-year University or college.

Financial contributions to the University will not be a consideration when evaluating the candidates.

For a coach to be nominated, he or she must be retired from coaching that sport at the college level.

Nominations

Nominations are made by any member of IPTAY, faculty or staff personnel, or relative of a worthy candidate, and are accepted 30 days prior to the committee meeting. The committee will meet once every two years in the spring to vote on the nominations. Nominations will be made in the form of a letter with a complete list of accomplishments, and submitted to the chair of the committee (Sports Information Director), who will retain an active file of nominations. Letters of support may also be submitted. All nominations will remain on file for a period of three voting committee meetings (five years). The chair of the committee will screen all nominations to make sure they meet eligibility requirements.

Purpose

The charge of the Ring of Honor Committee is to bestow the highest athletic award presented by the Clemson Athletic Department on deserving candidates. The committee will examine the careers of candidates in all Clemson sports.

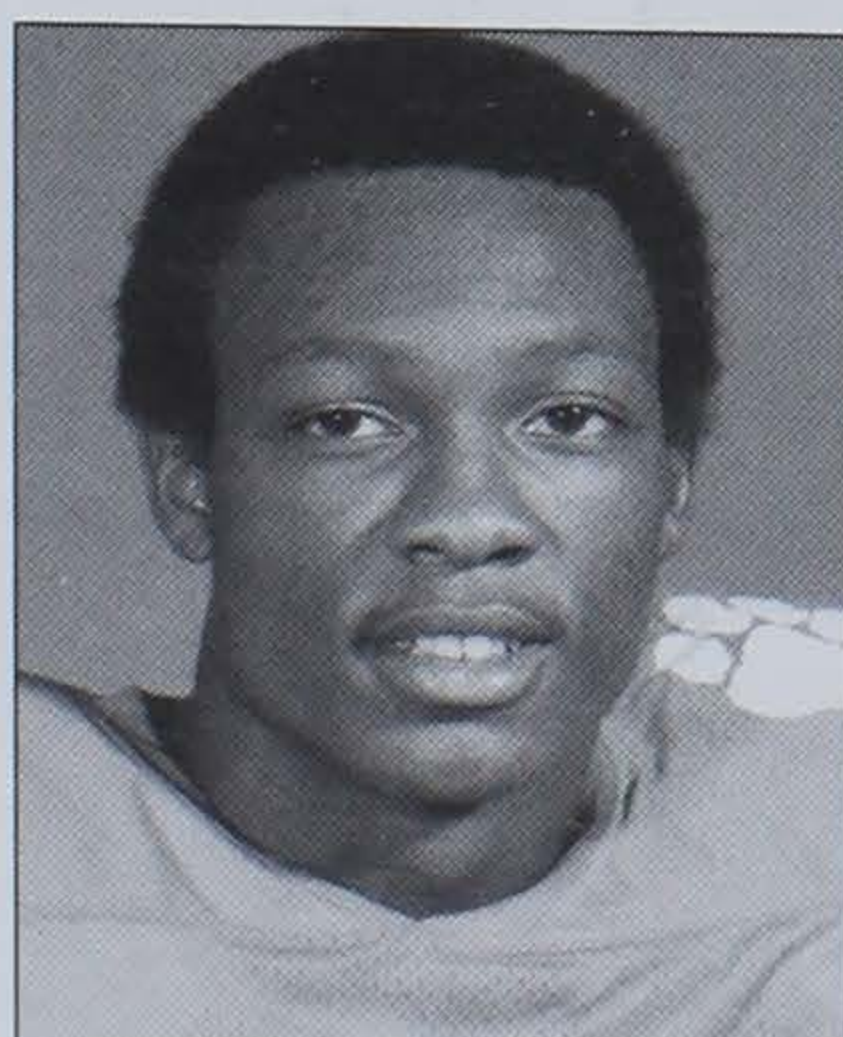
Ring of Honor Members

Rusty Adkins is the only three-time All-American in Clemson baseball history. He was selected in 1965, 1966, and 1967. A three-time first-team All-ACC player, Adkins hit a remarkable .444 in 1965, an average that remained a Clemson record for a season given a minimum of 100 at bats for 37 seasons. Adkins had a 41-game hitting streak that started in 1965 and ended in 1966, a mark that remains in the top 10 in the college baseball recordbook. He is also a member of the state of South Carolina Hall of Fame and was named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary team in 2002.

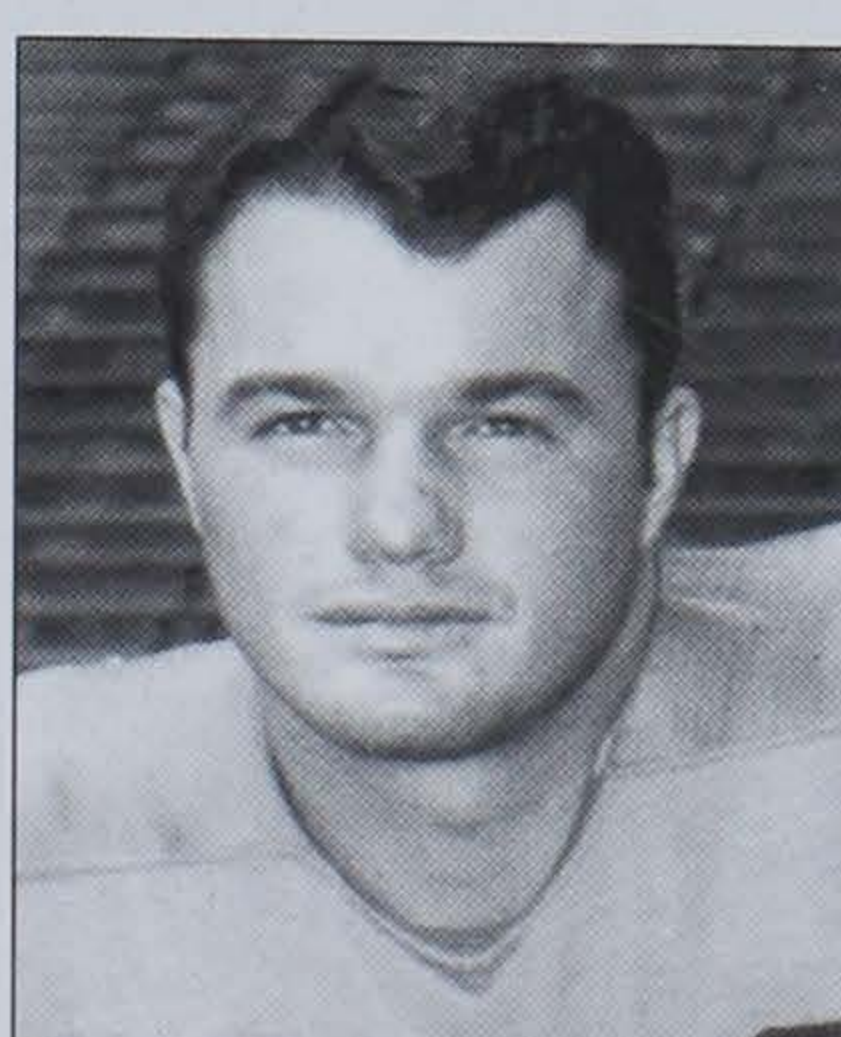
Jerry Butler was a first-team AP All-American in 1978 when he joined Steve Fuller in leading Clemson to a #6 national ranking and 11-1 record. He caught at least one pass in 36 consecutive games, a record that still stands today. In 1979, he was the #5 draft pick of the NFL Draft by the Buffalo



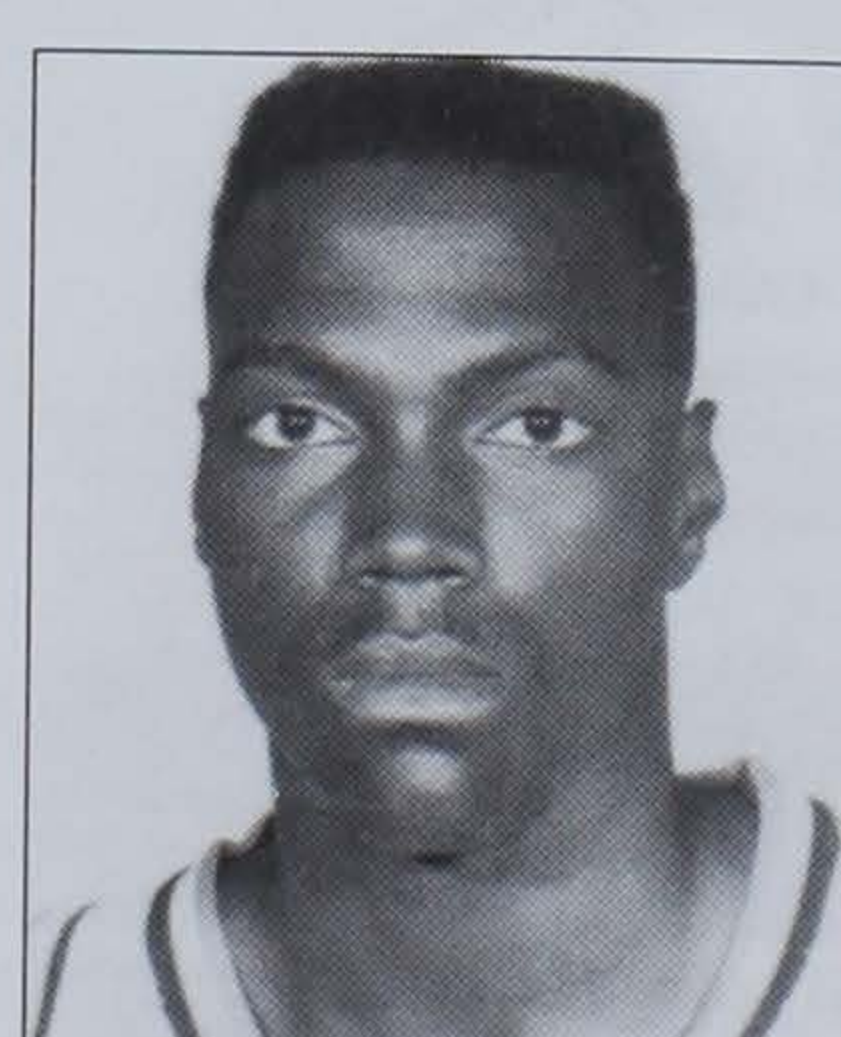

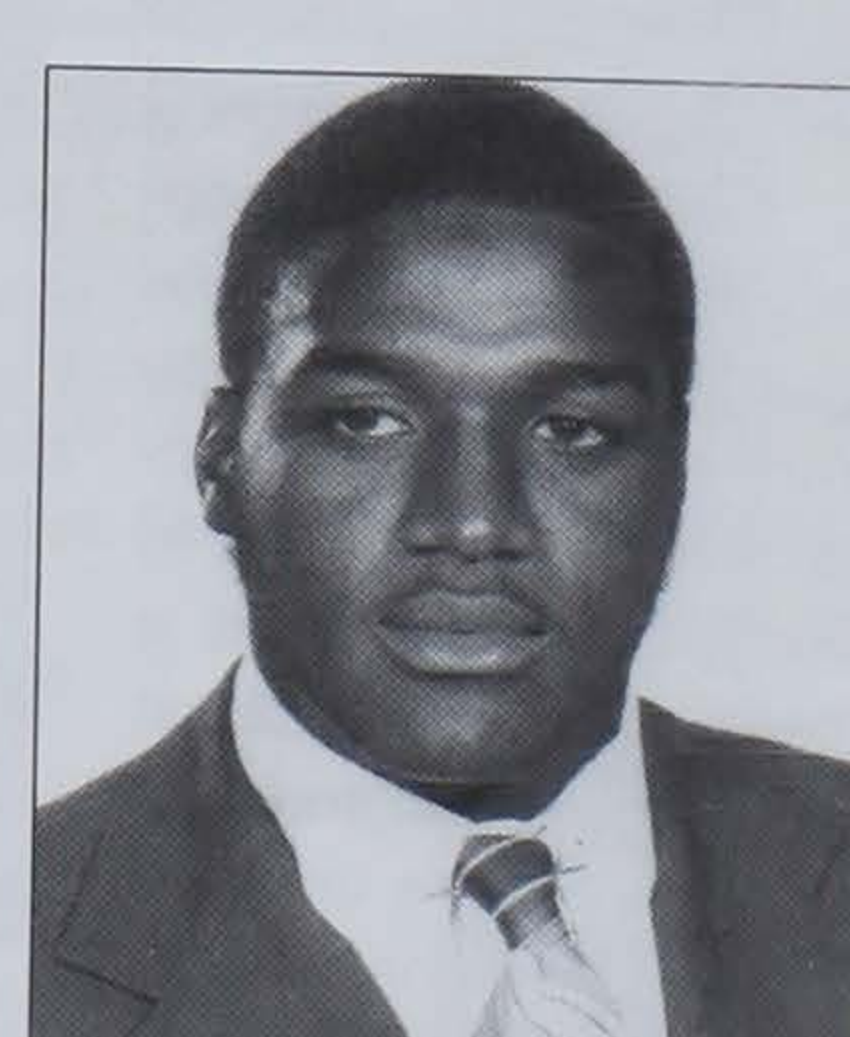

Bills, where he played at a Pro Bowl level for eight seasons. In 2002, he was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team.

Fred Cone was the first player in Clemson history to rush for at least 2,000 yards in a career. Cone played for the Tigers from 1948 to 1950. He still ranks fourth on the Clemson career list for touchdowns with 31. Cone was a starter on two undefeated Clemson teams, one of two players in Clemson history to do that. He went on to a lengthy professional career and is a member of the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame.

Dale Davis was a three-time All-ACC player for the Tigers from 1987-91. He was a first-team selection in 1990 when he joined Elden Campbell in leading Clemson to its first ACC regular-season championship. He still ranks among the ACC's top 10 in career field goal percentage. He was named an honorable mention All-American that year. A first-round draft choice of the Indiana Pacers, Davis is still active in the NBA with the Portland Trailblazers.

Jeff Davis, captain of Clemson's 1981 National Championship team, was a first-team All-American that year when he led the Tigers in tackles with 175, the second-highest total in Clemson history. Davis was also named the Most Valuable Player of the ACC and was the Defensive MVP of the Orange Bowl victory over Nebraska, the game that clinched the national championship for the Tigers, the first in Clemson history. He was named a first-team All-American and went on to an NFL career with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In 2002, he was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team.

Steve Fuller is one of three football players in Clemson history to be chosen an All-American on the field and in the classroom. Fuller was a first-team Academic All-American in 1977 and 1978 and was a third-team AP All-American in 1978. Fuller, who was ACC MVP on two occasions, was an NCAA Top-Five Award winner in 1979, the only Clemson athlete to win the award. He was also the recipient of a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete Award in 1978. In 2002, he was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team.

Frank Howard was Clemson's head football coach and athletic director from 1940-69. He guided Clemson to eight conference titles, six bowl games, and six top-25 seasons. He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1989 and is the second winningest coach in ACC history. He had 165 wins when he retired, the most in ACC history.

Barbara Kennedy is the greatest female athlete in Clemson athletic history. She was an All-

American for the Lady Tigers in 1980-81 and 1981-82. Kennedy led the nation in scoring with a 29-point average and is still the ACC's all-time leader in scoring and rebounding. She scored over 3,000 points in her four seasons at Clemson and averaged 24 points per game for her career. Kennedy has also been inducted into the state of South Carolina Hall of Fame and is currently the Assistant Athletic Director for Women's Basketball Operations at Clemson. In 2002, she was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team and was named one of the top-50 greatest female athletes in ACC history.

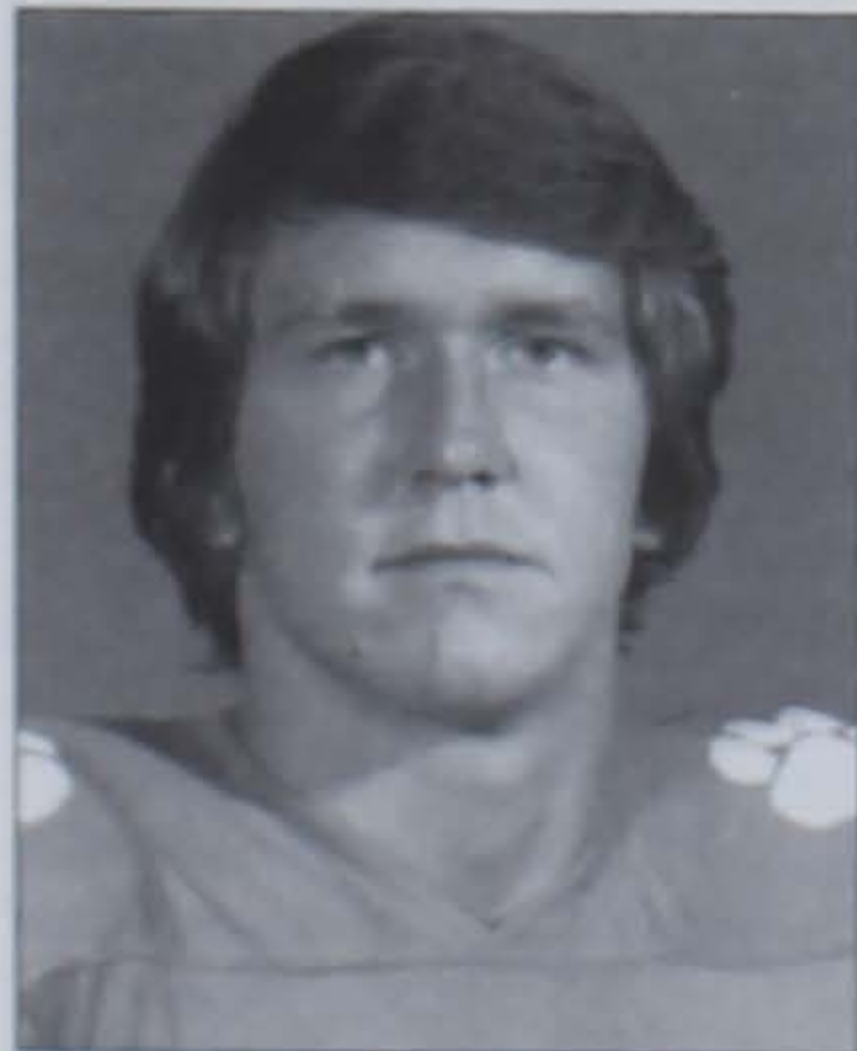
Terry Kinard was a two-time first-team AP All-American (1981-82). He was a unanimous All-American in 1982, the only unanimous All-American in Tiger history. The long-time member of the New York Giants still holds the Tiger record for career interceptions. As the years have gone on, he has continued to reap awards. In 1990, he was named to **USA Today's** All-Decade team for the 1980s. In 2000, he was named to **Sports Illustrated's** All-Century team of college football. In 2001, he became the first Tiger in 42 years to be

inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. He was also inducted into the state of South Carolina Hall of Fame in 2002. In 2002, he was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team and was ranked among the top-50 male athletes in ACC history.

Banks McFadden was named the nation's Most Versatile Athlete in 1939. He was an All-American in both football and basketball, the only Tiger in history to accomplish that feat. McFadden led the Tigers to their first bowl bid ever, a 6-3 win over Boston College in the 1940 Cotton Bowl. McFadden was the #4 overall pick of the 1940 NFL draft, the highest draft selection in Clemson football history.

Selection Process

Each committee member will cast one vote per sport. An honoree must obtain at least seven votes to be selected. There will be just one ballot. The committee does not have to select any honorees at its meeting. There shall be no more than one honoree in a sport for every two years. The committee then submits its recommendation to the President who makes the final decision.

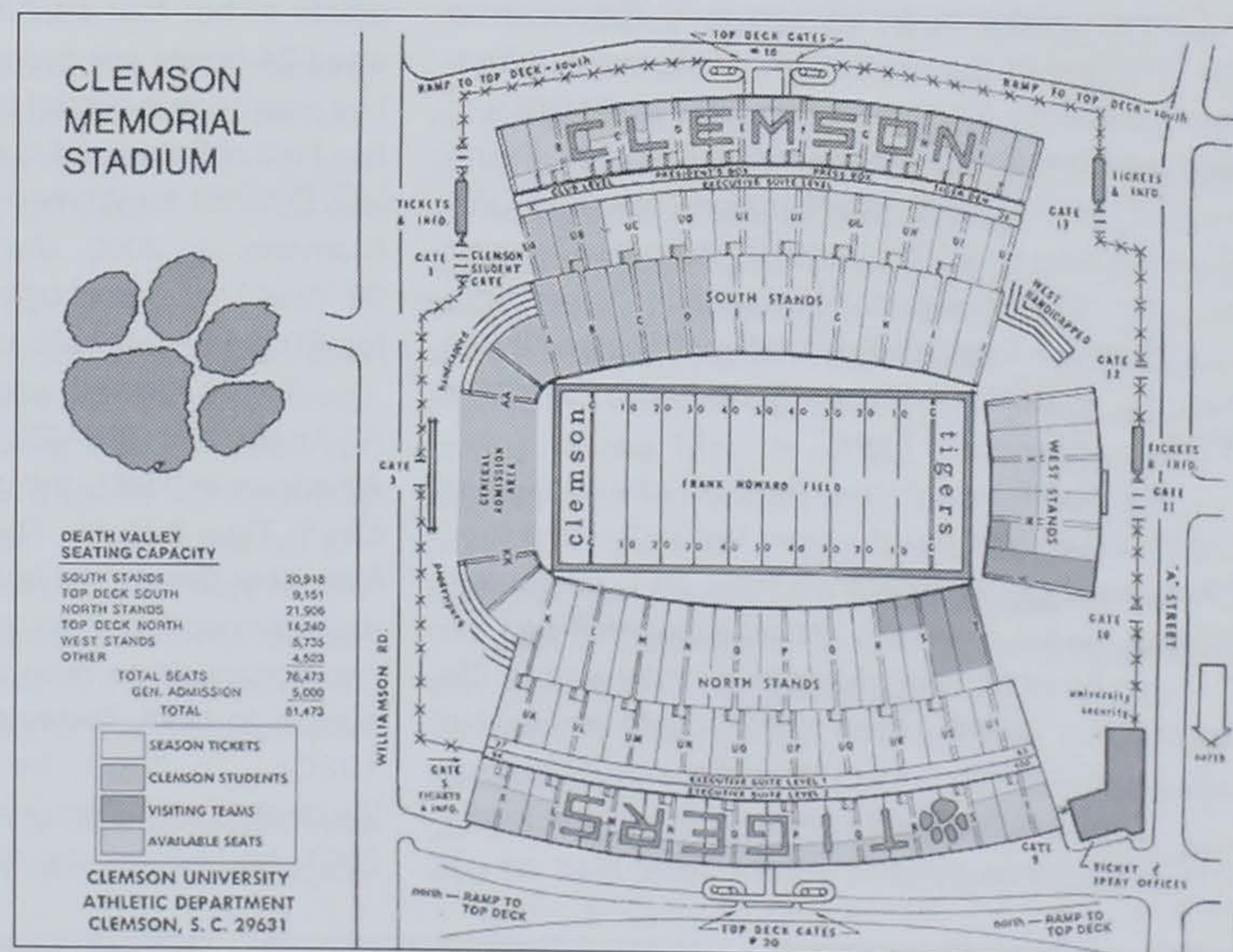

From Greenville, SC

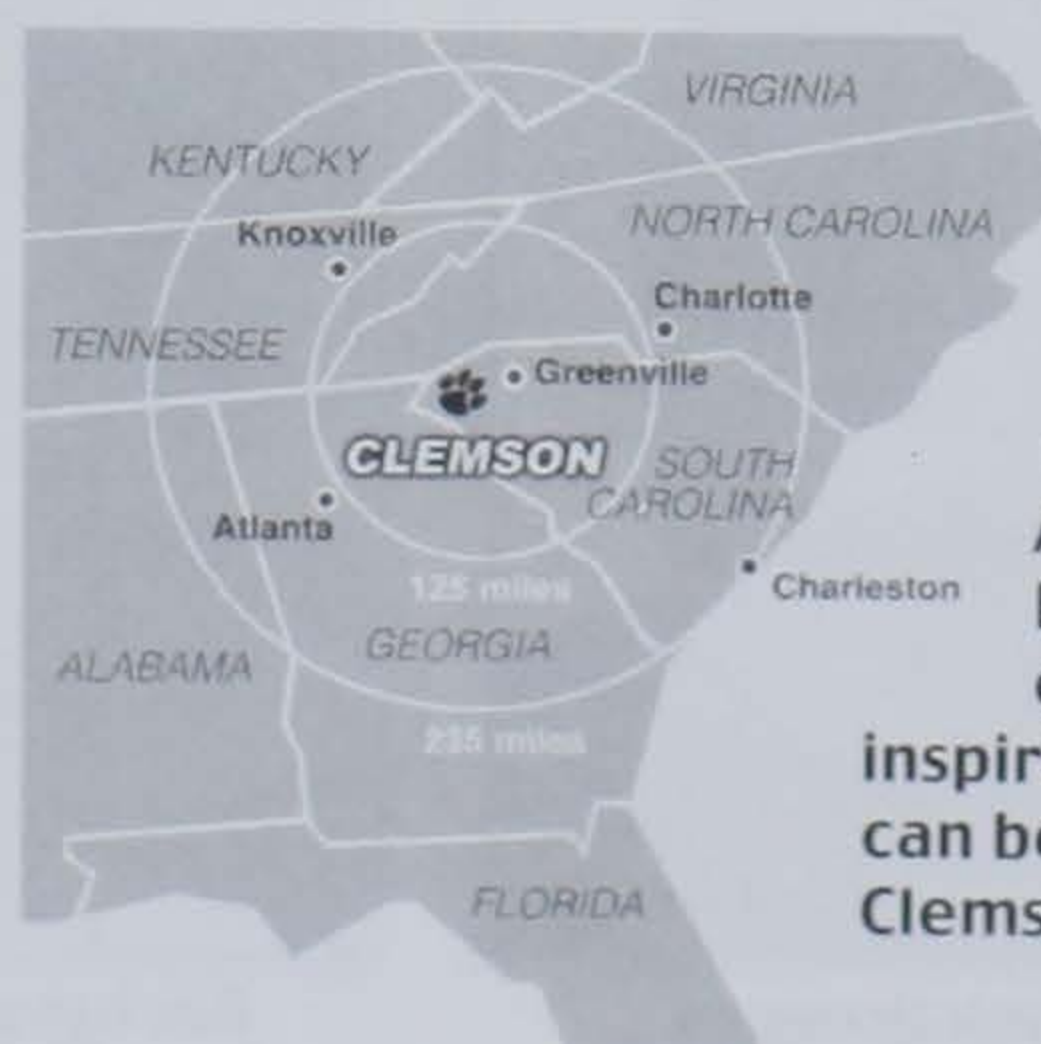

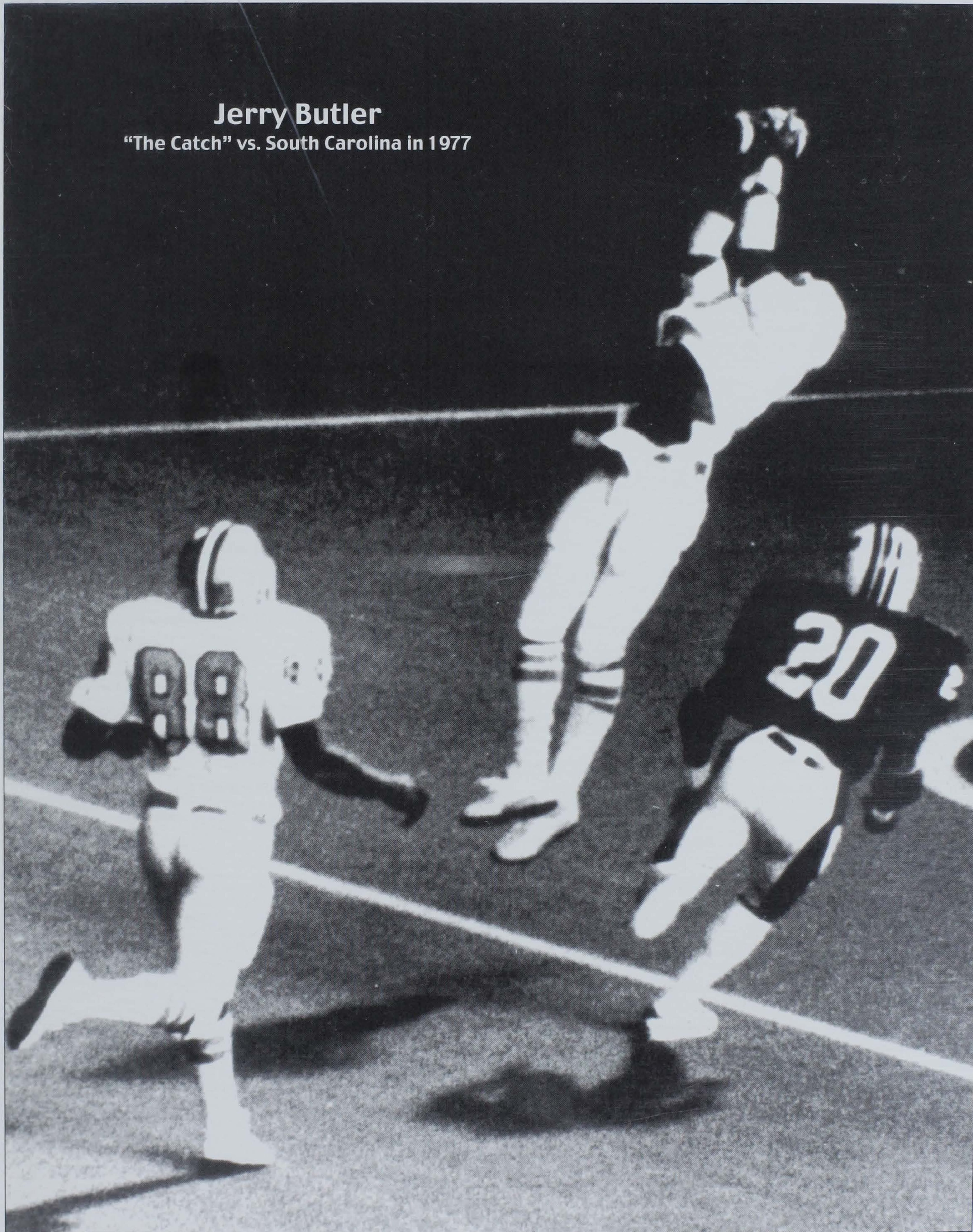

Notes: Dantzler's streak included Wofford (207), Virginia (251), Georgia Tech (254), and N.C. State (333) games of 2001.

Consecutive Games Scoring a Point (36)

Notes: Hunt, a senior in 2003, has scored in every game he has played in his three years. He did not play against N.C. State in 2002 when Clemson did not attempt a field goal or extra point. Ironically, the record he broke was a 35-game streak by David Treadwell from 1985-87. Treadwell missed playing in one game in that streak, when the Tigers did not attempt a field goal or extra point against N.C. State.

Consecutive Games Scoring a Touchdown (13)

by **Travis Zachery**, 2000,01
Notes: Zachery's streak covered the last nine games of 2000 and first four games of 2001. He scored 18 touchdowns during the 13-game streak.

Consecutive Plays Rushing the Ball (12)

by **Raymond Priester**, 1997
Notes: Priester ran 12 straight plays at Maryland in 1997.

Consecutive Games Catching a Touchdown Pass (4)

by **K.D. Dunn**, 1983
Notes: Ironical that a tight end holds this record, because Clemson has historically not been a team that throws to the tight end.

Consecutive Games Throwing a Touchdown Pass (6)

by **Mike Eppley**, 1984; **Woodrow Dantzler**, 2000
Notes: Even though Dunn's touchdown-reception streak took place in 1983, Eppley's touchdown pass streak was in 1984. Dantzler's streak took place over the first six games of 2000.

Consecutive Completions (17)

by **Nealon Greene**, 1997
Notes: Greene completed his last 13 passes against Virginia and the first four versus Maryland.

Consecutive Games Completing a Pass (46)

by **Rodney Williams**, 1985-88

Consecutive Passes Without an Interception (122)

by **Rodney Williams**, 1988
Notes: Current Tiger sophomore Charlie Whitehurst had a streak of 108 consecutive attempts without an interception in 2002. He also had 52 attempts without an interception at Duke in his first collegiate start.

Consecutive Passes W/O an Interception to Start a Career (92)

by **Nealon Greene**, 1994
Notes: Greene did not throw an interception until the South

Carolina game that year. In fact, that was the only turnover Clemson had with Greene under center all year.

Consecutive Games With 200 Total Offense Yards (7)

by **Woodrow Dantzler**, 2000; 2000,01
Notes: Shattered this record. The previous mark had been just three games. Dantzler had at least 236 yards of total offense over each of the first seven games of 2000. He then had another seven-game streak that covered the last two games of 2000 and the first five games of 2001.

Consecutive Games Catching a Pass (36)

by **Jerry Butler**, 1976-78

September 30, 1896 - A small crowd gathered in one of the barrack's rooms and discussed the advisability of organizing a football association and to devise some means of getting a coach. The organization, known as the Clemson College Football Association, was perfected and the following officers elected: President Frank Tompkins, Secretary & Treasurer Charlie Gentry, Manager T.R. Vogel, Temporary Captain R.G. Hamilton. A committee of three was appointed to consult Prof. Riggs as to management of a football team and to ask his aid as coach.

October 5, 1896 - Practice began on the Clemson College campus on a 50x200 foot field in front of the college.

October 28, 1896 - Clemson played its first intercollegiate football game, defeating Furman, 14-6, at Greenville, SC. This was the first time that many of the Clemson players had seen a full-sized football gridiron.

November 21, 1896 - Clemson defeated Wofford 16-0. When the team arrived back on campus that night, the cadet corp along with faculty members led the team around in a buggy led by a torchlight procession and proceeded to go all over the campus. With this win, Clemson claimed the state title.

November 10, 1897 - Clemson defeated South Carolina for the first time and won the school's second state championship. A total of 2,000 spectators witnessed the 18-6 victory. Clemson took an early 4-0 lead when South Carolina's Lee Hagood fumbled on the Gamecock's 31-yard line and Clemson's W. T. Brock caught the fumbled ball in the air and raced 30 yards for a touchdown.

November 10, 1899 - The football association stood on a very weak financial basis. The organization could not even afford to hire a coach. W.M. Riggs agreed to coach the Tigers for free.

December 8, 1899 - John Heisman was hired as head coach.

October 22, 1900 - The Tigers defeated Wofford, 21-0. Actually, Clemson scored many more points, but a pregame agreement between the two stated that every point Clemson scored after the first four touchdowns would not count. No one could keep an accurate count after Clemson scored its first 21 points after just six minutes elapsed. All touchdowns Clemson made were called back and the ball given to Wofford deep in Clemson territory on such penalties as running over a Wofford tackler.

November 29, 1900 - Clemson's 35-0 win over Alabama allowed Heisman's team to finish the season undefeated with a 6-0 record. This was Clemson's first undefeated team and was the only team to win all of the games in a season until the 1948 squad went 11-0.

October 5, 1901 - Clemson opened the season with a 122-0 win over Guilford, the most points scored in Clemson history. The Tigers averaged 30 yards per play and a touchdown every minute and 26 seconds. The first half lasted 20 minutes while the second half lasted only 10 minutes. Legend has it that every man on the Clemson team scored a touchdown in this game.

October 30, 1902 - Col. Charles S. Roller Jr., who was football coach of Furman, was the only referee for the Clemson-USC game. Bronco Armstrong, a famous Yale player and official, was to be the umpire but was in a railroad wreck on the way to Clemson and it was impossible for him to get to the game in time. Not a single penalty was called in the game. A riot between Clemson and USC fans broke out the night after the game. Officials at both colleges called off the football series between the two schools. Clemson and USC did not meet again in football until 1909.

November 27, 1902 - Clemson played in the snow for the first time in a game against Tennessee. The Tigers won the game, 11-0, and claimed the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association crown.

October 10, 1903 - Clemson 29, Georgia 0—First 10 minutes of the game, Clemson fumbled the ball three times. After the game, the Georgia team made a deal with the Clemson team. They would give the Clemson team a bushel of apples for every point Clemson would defeat Tech above the score Clemson made against Georgia. The score turned out to be Clemson 73, Georgia Tech 0. Apples were plentiful around Clemson that winter - 44 bushels.

October 17, 1903 - Clemson defeated Georgia Tech 73-0. Clemson rushed the ball 55 times for 615 yards, still a school record, while Tech ran the ball 35 times and collected 28 yards. The second half was shortened to 15 minutes.

October 28, 1903 - The Tigers defeated N.C. State 24-0 in Columbia, SC at the fairgrounds. One incident that delayed the game's start was the fact that the sideline spectators in their eagerness to see each play crowded in front of the grandstand and on the field. Twenty minute halves were played owing to the fact that the field had to be given to the racing association at 12:45 p.m. Even these short halves could not be played out and the time limit was up when 16 minutes of the second half had been played. Heisman married Evelyn Barksdale in Columbia after the game.

November 26, 1903 - One day after Tech's deadline for its offer had expired, Heisman wired Georgia Tech's president Lyman Hall, that he would accept the institute's offer of \$2,250 per year plus 30 percent of net receipts to coach its athletic teams.

September 30, 1904 - Clemson began practice under new Head Coach Shack Shealy, who was at one time a great football player. He played varsity ball six years, four at Clemson and two at Iowa State. He is still the only Clemson graduate to serve as head coach of the Tiger football team.

November 11, 1905 - The Clemson-Auburn game was called on account of darkness. Clemson won, 6-0.

November 29, 1906 - Clemson's first forward pass occurred in a 10-0 win over Georgia Tech. Powell Lykes dropped back to kick, but instead made a forward pass of 30 yards to George Warren.

September 28, 1907 - The cadets of Clemson College braved wind and rain at Bowman Field to witness the Tigers in their earliest season opener to date. Clemson met Gordon Military Academy from Georgia on a muddy field. Clemson was playing under new Coach Frank Shaughnessy, a former Notre Dame star who to this day holds the Notre Dame record for the longest run.

November 4-9, 1907 - Clemson played three games within a week's time. Clemson lost to Au-

burn 12-0 on November 4, and lost to Georgia in Augusta, GA on November 7. The Tigers barely made it back in time to play Davidson at Clemson on November 9, and lost 10-6.

April 1, 1908 - Tiger football hopes of the 1908 season were shattered on this day, not by what happened in spring practice, but what 300 students did as a college prank on April Fool's Day. The cadets were expelled for removing a Civil War cannon from the town square of Pendleton, four miles down the road from campus, and bringing the cannon back to Clemson. Many of the football stars, as well as many future stars, were among those who were expelled.

October 9, 1915 - The Tigers traveled to Knoxville, where they won fame by defeating the defending conference champion Tennessee, 3-0. Bill Harris drop-kicked a 20-yard field goal for the only score of the game in the fourth quarter. Tennessee was the defending champion of the S.I.A.A.

October 13, 1917 - Clemson downed Furman 38-0, as the Tigers' Stumpy Banks scored five touchdowns, a record that still stands today.

November 16, 1918 - The University of South Carolina athletic authorities provided the use of their stadium to Clemson and The Citadel for their annual game. South Carolina was playing at Furman that day and the field was not going to be used by the Gamecocks. The reason the game was played at Columbia instead of Charleston or Clemson was that the military officials from both Clemson and The Citadel would not allow players to be absent from any military duties due to athletic events. Since the game was played in Columbia both the Clemson and Citadel cadets and football teams would be able to make the trip to Columbia and return to duty on time. Clemson's John O'Dell scored for the game's only tally as the Tigers won, 7-0. Both teams made it back to their campuses before their passes expired.

December 27, 1926 - Josh Cody was named head football coach at Clemson.

September 19, 1928 - Clemson began this season with new uniforms. The Tigers wore a brilliant orange jersey for the first time, with black composition cloth stripes on the front with purple numbers.

December, 1928 - O.K. Pressley, a center, was named third-team All-American by the Newspaper Enterprise Association. He was Clemson's first All-American in any sport.

May 6, 1929 - Josh Cody, Clemson head coach, was presented with a new automobile that afternoon as a gift from alumni, faculty, students, and friends of the college. A special collection was taken up to purchase the new Buick. The presentation ceremony was staged in front of Tillman Hall.

October 17, 1930 - Maxcey Welch scored five touchdowns (all rushing) in Clemson's 75-0 win over Newberry. Welch and Stumpy Banks are the co-holders of that Clemson touchdown scoring record.

March 13, 1930 - Josh Cody signed a new contract to stay at Clemson through the 1932 season.

November 26, 1930 - Josh Cody announced that the Furman game the next day will be his final as head coach of the Tigers.

November 27, 1930 - Clemson defeated Furman 12-7 at Furman to conclude the Tigers third straight eight-win season, the only eight-win seasons in Clemson history between 1896-1930. The 1930 Tigers concluded the season with an 8-2 record and posted four shutouts. In fact, only Tennessee and Florida scored over a touchdown against the Tigers in this season.

November 29, 1930 - The Tiger student newspaper published an extra edition about Coach Cody, hoping to convince him to remain as coach. Cody had become a popular mentor because of his 29-11-1 record, including a perfect 4-0 record against South Carolina, the only coach in Clemson history to have a perfect ledger against the Gamecocks.

January 2, 1931 - After reconsidering his decision for over a month, Cody made his resignation final.

January 17, 1931 - Jess Neely was named head football coach at Clemson. He was the second consecutive Vanderbilt graduate to coach the Tigers. Cody was a 1917 graduate of Vandy and Neely graduated in 1923. In fact, eight of the nine Clemson head football coaches between 1931-98 were graduates of current SEC schools.

October 16, 1931 - Clemson suffered a surprising 6-0 loss against The Citadel in a game played in Florence. After the game, Neely, Captain Frank Jervy and others met in a car outside the stadium to discuss ways Clemson could help its football program get back on track. The meeting started the ball rolling towards the establishment of the IPTAY Foundation. Clemson would score just three touchdowns and win just one game during the 1931 season.

October 14, 1933 - Clemson played at George Washington in a 0-0 tie. This was the first time Clemson had ever played under the lights. Fans followed the game on a grid graph in Tillman Hall at the Clemson chapel. A grid graph was an electrical machine that was marked off like a football field. Lights were so arranged on the graph that every possible play was flashed on the board. The lineups of both teams were written on the sides and the man carrying the ball on each play had a light flashed by his name. Another light representing the runner moved along the board in the same direction and for the same distance as the runner.

August 20, 1934 - IPTAY, the nation's first scholarship fundraising organization, was founded. Dr. Rupert Fike, a cancer specialist from Atlanta and Clemson class of 1908, wrote Jess Neely a letter documenting the formation of the organization.

"Last night we had a little meeting out at my house and organized the IPTAY Club," Fike wrote. "The purpose (of IPTAY) shall be to provide finan-

cial support to the athletic department at Clemson and to assist in every other way possible to regain for Clemson the high athletic standing which rightfully belongs to her."

The organization was first established as a secret organization and initial membership dues were set at \$10 a year. Many had suggested that \$50 be the minimum donation, but Fike's foresight thought it would be best to get as many Clemson supporters involved as possible, so he established the \$10 minimum.

The excitement about the organization carried over into the 1934 season and the Tigers ran to their first winning season since 1930. Clemson had gone 0-5-1 against Furman and South Carolina in those years, then defeated both teams in 1934.

November 19, 1935 - Clemson held its first night football practice. Two powerful floodlights were installed at the practice fields. The Clemson coaches wanted more practice time with the players and that was the reason the lights were brought in. The extra practice did not pay off however, as Clemson lost its final game that year to Furman, 8-6.

November 17, 1937 - Clemson defeated Florida in Gainesville by a 10-9 score. Don Willis scored Clemson's only TD of the game on a one-yard run that culminated a 65-yard drive on Clemson's opening possession. Later Clemson gave up a safety and a touchdown, so Florida led 9-7 heading into the fourth period. But, the Tigers drove 60 yards late in the game and Ben Pearson booted a 27-yard field goal to win the game.

At the time, it gave Clemson a 4-4 record in 1937, but it proved to be a program builder, much as Clemson's win over South Carolina in 1980 did. The Tigers posted to a 22-2-2 record over a 26-game period that started with that win at Florida. Clemson's only losses in that 26-game period were to Tennessee in 1938 and Tulane in 1939. Tennessee ended the 1938 season with a 10-0 record and ranked second in the nation, while Tulane ended the 1939 season with an 8-0-1 mark and fifth in the country.

November 5, 1938 - Clemson scored with big plays in a win over George Washington, 27-0. The Tigers scored three touchdowns on plays of at least 65 yards, the only time in history Clemson has had scoring plays of that distance in the same game. Banks McFadden ran 70 yards for a score on the first Clemson play from scrimmage. Later, Shad Bryant scored on a 65-yard punt return and on a 65-yard run off a lateral. George Washington actually had more first downs, 15-13, yet lost by 27 points.

September 23, 1939 - Banks McFadden ran 90 yards for a touchdown in Clemson's 18-0 win over Presbyterian. It is still the longest run in Clemson history. McFadden had a career high 173 yards in 15 attempts on this day.

September 30, 1939 - Clemson suffered its only loss of the season to a revenge minded Tulane eleven. The Tigers had beaten the Green Wave the previous year by a 13-10 score. This season, however, Tulane defeated Clemson 7-6. Despite the loss,

it was a game that brought acclaim to Clemson for its ability to play so close with the team that would end the year ranked fifth in the nation. McFadden was all over the field on this day, throwing for Clemson's only touchdown and defending enemy passes from the secondary. His punting kept Tulane bottled up in their own territory. He had 12 punts for 504 yards, including a record six punts of at least 50 yards. Unfortunately he was involved in what proved to be the game's deciding, as his extra point attempt after Clemson's only touchdown was blocked.

October 19, 1939 - Clemson outgained South Carolina 402-90 in a 27-0 thrashing of the Gamecocks. Banks McFadden threw for 85 yards and rushed for 76 in just 14 attempts.

October 26, 1939 - Clemson showed it was a deep enough team to win without All-American Banks McFadden, who missed the Navy game with an injury. Shad Bryant had a 40-yard run for a score in Clemson's 15-7 win at Annapolis.

November 3, 1939 - Clemson won in the Washington, D.C. area for the second straight week, defeating George Washington, 13-6. Bryant had 127 yards rushing and scored Clemson's only touchdown. The game was played on a Friday evening.

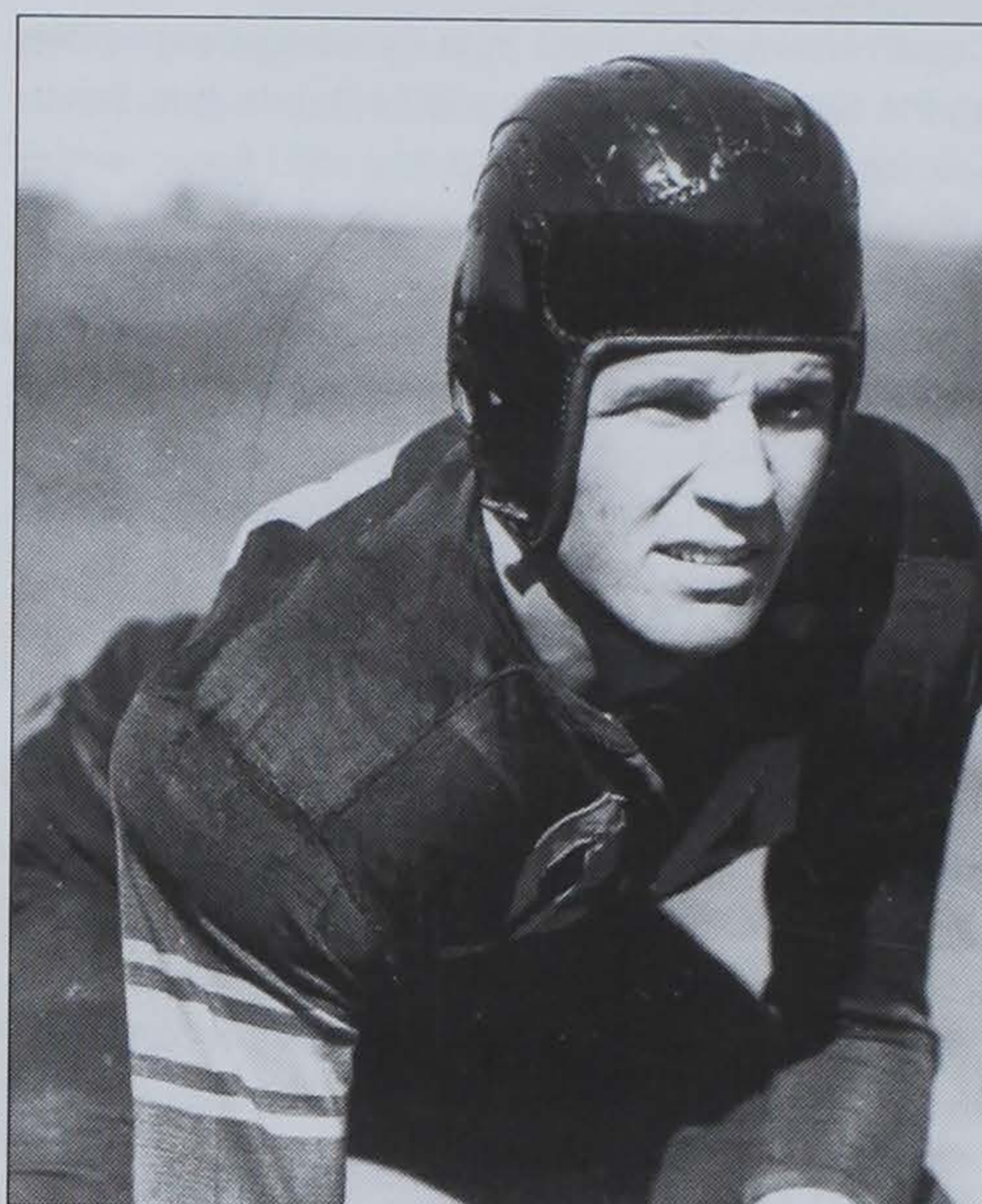
November 11, 1939 - McFadden completed just four passes against Wake Forest, but three were to Joe Blalock for 105 yards, the first 100-yard receiving game in Tiger history. It was the final home game for McFadden and the rest of the Tiger seniors.

November 13, 1939 - Clemson was ranked in the AP poll for the first time. The Tigers soundly defeated Wake Forest 20-7 to run their record to 6-1. Clemson had 33 poll points on that November 13 ranking and one first-place vote out of the 85 votes in the poll that week. Clemson remained ranked in the top 20 over the next three weeks and each week Clemson had exactly one first-place vote. However, in the final poll that year, even though Clemson had run the table to finish 8-1 in the regular season, that individual failed to vote Clemson #1, as the Tigers did not have a first-place vote in the December 11 poll, which was the final poll that year.

November 18, 1939 - Clemson won away from home for the fourth straight time, a 21-6 win over Southwestern. McFadden and George Floyd combined for 126 yards rushing on just 10 rushes.

November 25, 1939 - Clemson concluded its 8-1 regular season with a 14-3 victory over Furman. Shad Bryant ran for 94 yards and gained 75 more in punt returns. McFadden scored two touchdowns and had 10 punts for a 42-yard average, intercepted a pass and completed a pass.

December 8, 1939 - Clemson accepted a bid to play in the Cotton Bowl. It was Clemson's first postseason bowl game appearance. Clemson did meet Cumberland in a postseason "Championship of the South" game in 1903, but it was not considered an established bowl.

December 11, 1939 - Clemson ranked 12th in the final poll by the Associated Press, Clemson's first appearance in a final season AP poll. The Tigers had 112 poll points, just behind Boston College, who had 120.5 poll points for 11th place. Clemson would defeat Boston College in the Cotton Bowl, but the AP did not have a poll after the bowls. In fact, for whatever the reason, the AP did not have a final poll after the bowls until after the 1968 season. Thus, Clemson actually would have had a much higher ranking by today's standards if there would have been a poll in January of 1940.

December 15, 1939 - Banks McFadden was named a first-team All-American by Associated Press and a third-team selection by United Press International. He was the first Clemson player honored by the AP. Later that year he was named the Nation's Most Versatile Athlete for 1939. Earlier in the year he had led Clemson to the 1939 Southern Conference Championship in basketball, still the only postseason championship in Clemson history.

January 1, 1940 - In Clemson's first bowl appearance, it defeated Boston College 6-3. Charlie Timmons scored the game's lone touchdown from two yards out and rushed for 115 yards. Banks McFadden keyed the defense with four pass deflections of Boston College passes and he also averaged 43 yards per punt. Boston College drove to the Clemson eight with three minutes left, but Shad Bryant and McFadden knocked away third and fourth-down passes to save the day for the Tigers.

"Clemson is every bit as good as they were cracked up to be," said Boston College Coach Frank Leahy, still the second winningest coach in college football history on a percentage basis. "We lost to a great team, one of the best I have ever seen. I have the satisfaction of knowing that while we were beaten, the game wasn't lost on a fluke."

January 10, 1940 - Jess Neely resigned as athletic director and football coach to accept the head football coaching job at Rice. Neely had inherited a \$47,000 deficit when he arrived in 1931 and earned Clemson \$100,000 during his tenure, and left with \$57,000 in the treasury. His overall record at Clemson was 43-35-7. He would be inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1971.

January 11, 1940 - Frank Howard was named head football coach. At the Athletic Council meeting that day, Howard was nominated for the position by Professor Sam Rhodes, a council member. When a call for a second was asked, Howard, standing in the back of the room, said: "I second the nomination." It is perhaps the only recorded time in history a coach has seconded his own nomination for head coach.

July 25, 1940 - Banks McFadden accepted a bid to play in the College All-Star game against the Green Bay Packers on August 29. He scored one of the two touchdowns for the College All-Stars.

September 1, 1940 - Banks McFadden signed a one-year contract to play with the Brooklyn Dodgers professional football team. He led the NFL in yards per carry in 1940, but did not like the bright lights of New York and returned to Clemson.

September 21, 1940 - In Frank Howard's first game as head coach, Clemson scored on the first offensive play as George Floyd reversed around left end and raced 18 yards untouched for a touchdown. The Tigers went on to a 38-0 win over Presbyterian.

October 12, 1940 - Clemson shutout Wake Forest 39-0 in Clemson's second game of the season at Riggs Field. It was Clemson's third shutout in the first four games of the Howard era. It was the last home game of the season for the Tigers, who would go on to win the Southern Conference title even though seven of the nine games were on the road.

October 24, 1940 - Frank Howard won his first game as head coach in the rivalry with South Carolina. The Tigers were victorious 21-13 thanks to five interceptions by the Tiger defense. Howard coached in 30 Clemson-South Carolina games. Incredible as it may seem, both Clemson and South Carolina scored exactly 411 total points in those 30 games.

October 28, 1940 - It didn't take Howard long to get the Tigers into the nation's top 10. With the 5-0 start the Tigers earned 136 poll points and ranked #10 in the nation, Clemson's first top-10 ranking in the AP poll. Two writers ranked Clemson #1.

November 23, 1940 - Clemson won the Southern Conference football title with a 13-7 victory over Furman. Ed Maness led the way for the Tigers with 136 yards rushing in 18 attempts. It was the first of eight conference championships for the Tigers under Frank Howard.

October 6, 1941 - Work began on Memorial Stadium. The chore of cleaning, digging and leveling the site as well as cutting large trees and clearing

underbrush was supervised by Frank Howard. A pipe was also installed for drainage under the field.

October 11, 1941 - Clemson defeated Boston College at Fenway Park, 26-13. Joe Blalock scored two touchdowns as Clemson overcame a 6-0 deficit after the first period. BC outgained Clemson 363-281, but Clemson came away with the victory.

October 23, 1941 - Booty Payne became the first Clemson player to pass for over 200 yards in an 18-14 loss to South Carolina. He completed 9-16 passes for 202 yards in the contest. It was one of just three 200-yard passing games by a Tiger in the decade of the 1940s.

November 15, 1941 - Clemson defeated Wake Forest, 29-0, in the last game at Riggs Field.

November 22, 1941 - The Tigers put on the greatest rushing defense exhibition in the first 100 years of Clemson history, holding Furman to -21 yards rushing in a 34-6 victory in Greenville. Charlie Timmons scored three touchdowns and added four extra points in his final game as a Tiger. The 22 points scored rank sixth best in Clemson history for a single game by an individual. But, Timmons was not the leading rusher in the game as teammate Sid Tinsley picked up 127 yards on just seven attempts.

September 19, 1942 - Clemson Memorial Stadium opened, and the Tigers ran down the hill for the first time. Butch Butler gained 192 yards, as the Tigers opened the new stadium in front of 5,500 with a 32-13 win over Presbyterian. It was the most yards rushing by a Tiger in the decade of the 1940s. High school students were admitted for 25 cents, while servicemen were allowed in for 50 cents.

September 25, 1943 - World War II took virtually all of Clemson's veteran players and the Tigers started nine first-year freshmen at the 11 positions in a 13-12 loss to Presbyterian. Clemson had just a 2-6 record this season with no one older than a sophomore playing in a game as the armed services took Clemson's entire junior and senior classes.

October 19, 1944 - First rain at a Clemson-USC game since 1896. Despite the conditions, Sid Tinsley rushed for 146 yards in 22 carries to lead the Tigers to a 20-13 victory.

September 22, 1945 - Fourteen Clemson backs netted 516 yards in a 76-0 win over Presbyterian. Freshman Bobby Gage led the Tigers with 144 yards, including 88 on a touchdown run, the longest run from scrimmage by a Tiger in the decade of the 1940s. The Tigers had 11 rushing touchdowns in the game, still a Clemson record.

October 24, 1946 - The Clemson vs. South Carolina game was played under unusual circumstances. Counterfeit tickets had been printed and 10,000 more people than the capacity showed up for the game. Fans stormed the gates and stood on the sidelines, even on the field at the opposite end of the field when the game action was taking place.

Coach Howard recalled fans standing next to him on the sideline telling him what plays to run. South Carolina won on this bizarre day, 26-14.

September 24, 1947 - Clemson flew to Boston College on an Eastern Airline DC-4. It marked the first time that a state football team had flown to a football game. The quicker traveling did not help, however as Boston College defeated the Tigers, 32-22.

November 8, 1947 - Clemson began a 15-game winning streak, the longest in school history, with a win over Furman, 35-7.

November 22, 1947 - Bobby Gage ran for 141 yards and passed for 233 as he led Clemson to a 34-18 win over Auburn. Gage threw four touchdown passes and had 374 yards total offense, records that stood almost 50 years. Hank Walker was Gage's favorite receiver as he pulled in 10 passes for 148 yards. It is still the second most receptions in a single game in Clemson history and the yardage total is the sixth best. It was the first time in Clemson history that the Tigers had a 100-yard rusher, a 100-yard receiver and a 200-yard passer in the same game. The Clemson defense was also outstanding, holding Auburn to -9 yards rushing.

June 1, 1948 - Frank Gillespie was named the Southern Conference athlete of the year. Gillespie played football, basketball and baseball during the academic year and was the first Clemson athlete to be named a conference athlete of the year.

September 25, 1948 - Clemson defeated Presbyterian 53-0 in the first night game at Clemson. Clemson also defeated N.C. State, 6-0, in a home night game the following week.

October 2, 1948 - Gage continued his All-America triple-threat season by returning a punt 90 yards for a touchdown in Clemson's 6-0 win over N.C. State at Death Valley. To this day, it is the longest punt return in the history of the stadium by a Tiger.

October 21, 1948 - A 14th-ranked Clemson team defeated South Carolina 13-7 in Columbia. Captain Phil Prince was the hero for the Tigers as he blocked a South Carolina punt with just 4:15 left in the contest. Oscar Thompson recovered it at the 11 and ran it in for a touchdown, giving Clemson the 13-7 lead.

November 6, 1948 - Bobby Gage put on the most efficient passing exhibition in Clemson history in a 41-0 win over Furman. He completed 9-11 passes for 245 yards and two touchdowns. His efficiency rating of 310.7 is still a Clemson record for a minimum of 10 attempts. He averaged 22 yards per attempt, a record by far in Clemson history. The defense was just as effective, holding the Paladins to -12 yards in total offense, still the best total defense effort in Clemson history for a single game.

November 22, 1948 - The Tigers were ranked #9 in the AP poll, their highest ranking in history. Eight voters ranked Clemson #1 in the nation.

November 27, 1948 - Clemson accepted a bid to play in the Gator Bowl after it beat Auburn 7-6 in a hard fought game played in Mobile, AL. It was Clemson's first bowl bid since the 1939 season. Ray Mathews scored on a one-yard run with just 6:35 left to give Clemson its only lead of the game.

November 29, 1948 - Clemson ranked 11th in the final AP poll. Again Clemson suffered from not having a poll after the bowl games. Clemson won another regular season game, then defeated Missouri in the Gator Bowl to close a perfect season. But, these wins were not reflected in the final ranking. The AP did not have a post-bowl poll until 1968.

December 4, 1948 - Clemson closed out its perfect regular season with a 20-0 win over The Citadel in a game played in Charleston. The December 4 date is the second latest regular season game in Clemson history. The 10th ranked Tigers did not allow The Citadel to make a first down in the game, the only recorded time in Clemson history that the Tigers did not allow a first down. The Bulldogs also failed to complete a pass in the contest.

The victory was Clemson's sixth road win of the year, a record that still stands for road wins in a season. Only two Clemson teams have had a perfect road record since 1948 and that was the 1981 National Championship team and the 1995 Tigers.

December 6, 1948 - Frank Howard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year, his first of three Coach of the Year selections in his career.

January 1, 1949 - The Tigers won the Gator Bowl by a 24-23 score over Missouri. Fred Cone scored two first-quarter touchdowns as Clemson raced to a 14-0 lead. After Missouri tied the game, Gage threw a nine-yard scoring pass to John Poulos, a play that completed a 80-yard drive. Jack Miller's 32-yard field goal in the fourth quarter proved to be the winning margin. Missouri would score a late touchdown to come within 24-23. But that was the final score. You could not go for two points in those days, so Missouri did not have the opportunity to tie the score after their touchdown that took place with less than five minutes left. Both teams had exactly 298 yards of total offense in the game.

Clemson closed the season with a perfect 11-0 record, the only team in college football with 11 wins that year and one of just three with a perfect record. Notre Dame and Michigan were both 9-0-0 that season, but did not play in a bowl game.

November 26, 1949 - Clemson closed out the decade of the 1940s with a 20-20 tie against Auburn in Mobile, AL. Clemson had just a 4-4-2 record but closed 2-0-1 over the last three games, giving the program momentum heading into the 1950 season.

September 30, 1950 - Clemson defeated Missouri 34-0 in the second game of the season. The Tigers of Columbia, MO had been ranked in the preseason top 20. Three Clemson backs rushed for at least 100 yards, the second straight game Frank Howard had three 100-yard rushers in the same game. It has happened just four total times in Tiger history.



Tiger Timeline



October 7, 1950 - Clemson recorded its third-straight shutout to open the season with a 27-0 win over N.C. State in a home night game. Wyndie Windham again led the Clemson defense in tackles and according to legend knocked out N.C. State players on three consecutive plays in this game.

October 28, 1950 - Clemson defeated Wake Forest in Winston-Salem in a battle of top 20 teams, 13-12. Clemson lineman Bob Patton blocked the extra point in the final minute to preserve the victory for Clemson. It is the only time in Clemson history that a Tiger has blocked a kick on the last play of the game to give Clemson a victory.

November 28, 1950 - Clemson accepted a bid to play in the Orange Bowl.

January 1, 1951 - Clemson appeared in the Orange Bowl for the first time and squeaked out a 15-14 win over Miami (FL) to complete an undefeated season. Sterling Smith's tackle of Frank Smith in the endzone gave Clemson a safety with under six minutes left in the game and gave the Tigers the victory. Don Wade also had two interceptions in the game. It was Clemson's second undefeated season in the last three years for Howard's Tigers.

November 27, 1951 - Clemson accepted a bid to play in the Gator Bowl. This was done against the wishes of the Southern Conference, who had made a rule its members could not go to a bowl game. Clemson and Maryland, which both accepted bowl bids were given sanctions. The two teams were told they will not be allowed to play any other conference teams in 1952. This resulted in teams leaving the Southern Conference and forming the ACC.

November 8, 1952 - Don King, making his first and only career start at tailback, rushed for 234 yards on 33 carries in Clemson's 12-12 tie at Fordham. The performance is still a record for a Clemson freshman and still stands as the third-highest single-game total in Clemson history. King was substituting for an injured tailback and returned to quarterback the next week. He never played tailback again.

May 8, 1953 - Clemson joined the Atlantic Coast Conference.

October 31, 1953 - Clemson won its first ACC game in history, 18-0 over Wake Forest in a contest played at Clemson.

September 18, 1954 - Clemson Head Cheerleader George Bennett fired a cannon after each Tiger score. The cannon was purchased by Bennett's father and the tradition is still carried out today.

October 9, 1954 - Clemson upset 14th ranked Florida in Jacksonville, 14-7.

November 16, 1956 - Vice President Richard Nixon was in attendance at the Clemson-Miami football game on this date. Surrounded by security from various agencies, a loud explosion sounded and alarmed the body guard along with the Vice Presi-

dent. To everyone's relief, it was discovered that it was just the cannon fired off by a Clemson cheerleader when Clemson kicked off. The eighth-ranked Hurricanes defeated the Tigers 21-0 in the game played at Miami, FL.

November 24, 1956 - Clemson defeated Virginia 7-0 at Clemson to clinch the Tigers first ever ACC Championship.

December 1, 1956 - Clemson clinched an Orange Bowl berth with a 28-7 win over Furman at Clemson.

January 1, 1957 - Colorado defeated Clemson 27-21 in an exciting Orange Bowl in Miami. Clemson had trailed 20-0 at the half and Frank Howard threatened to resign at halftime. But, the Tigers came back to take a 21-20 lead in fourth period, only to see the Buffalos score late to win the game.

March 25, 1957 - It was announced that Clemson and South Carolina would play at Clemson on November 12, 1960 ending the 61-year-old state classic, Big Thursday.

September 20, 1958 - Clemson ran down the hill on a rug for the first time. The rug was officially given to Clemson on this date before the Clemson-Virginia game by W.W. Pate, Sr., president of Wunda Weave Company. It measured 104 feet long and was 13 feet wide. Also at this game, Clemson's first expansion of Memorial Stadium was used for the first time. Memorial Stadium was expanded from 20,000 to 38,000 seats.

September 27, 1958 - Clemson defeated North Carolina, 26-21, as Frank Howard picked up his 100th collegiate coaching win. Doug Cline scored on a two-yard run with 2:52 left to give Clemson the victory. It was one of four times in 1958 that Clemson scored a touchdown in the last quarter to win the game. Also the scoreboard at the east of the stadium was used for the first time. The scoreboard had an added feature, as the Tiger above the scoreboard still wags his tail after each Clemson touchdown.

October 6, 1958 - Clemson was ranked eighth in the country, the highest ranking in Clemson history, at that time.

October 11, 1958 - Clemson kept its top 10 ranking alive with a 12-7 win at Vanderbilt. Harvey White scored the game winner on a three-yard run with three seconds left to win the game. It is the latest game-winning touchdown in Clemson history.

November 19, 1958 - Clemson defeated N.C. State 13-6 and won its second ACC title in three years.

November 29, 1958 - Clemson accepted a Sugar Bowl bid to face top-ranked Louisiana State.

December 24, 1958 - It was announced that Clemson would take the rug the Tigers used to run down the hill with them to the Sugar Bowl. The rug weighed 527 pounds.

December 27, 1958 - Clemson announced it would wear navy blue jerseys with wide numerals front and back. Orange helmets with a white stripe from back to front in the center would also be worn to give a contrasting color for the nationwide television coverage of the game.

January 1, 1959 - Top-ranked Louisiana State and Heisman Trophy winner Billy Cannon defeated Clemson 7-0 in the Sugar Bowl. Cannon, a half-back, threw a touchdown pass to give Louisiana and Paul Dietzel the national championship clinching victory. It was the first time Clemson had ever played the #1 team.

September 19, 1959 - Clemson defeated North Carolina in Chapel Hill, 20-18 in a battle of top 20 teams. The Tar Heels were ranked 12th in the pre-season poll.

October 22, 1959 - Clemson won the last Big Thursday game by defeating South Carolina, 27-0. Harvey White was on target all day, hitting 9-10 passes for 162 yards and two scores. Clemson fans tore down the steel goal posts, which were set in concrete, following the game.

November 21, 1959 - Clemson defeated Wake Forest 33-31 for Clemson's second ACC title in a row. George Usry scored on a one-yard run with 4:24 to go to give Clemson the triumph.

December 19, 1959 - Clemson defeated TCU in the Bluebonnet Bowl, 23-7. The Horned Frogs, led by All-American and future Dallas Cowboy Bob Lilly, were ranked seventh in the nation entering the game. The victory is also the 300th in Clemson history.

October 1, 1960 - The west stands were used for the first time, as Clemson beat Virginia Tech, 13-7.

October 8, 1960 - Clemson defeated Virginia 21-7 and used special pants for rain protection in this game. After the contest Clemson sent the pants to Greenville and allowed Furman to use the pants for a game that night against William and Mary. Furman Head Coach Bob King said, "after those big Clemson boys got out of them some of our guys had a hard time making them stay up and we had to tape the legs of the pants for several players." The pants beat two teams from Virginia on the same day.

November 12, 1960 - Clemson defeated South Carolina, 12-2, in the first ever appearance for South Carolina at Clemson.

November 11, 1961 - A team resembling Clemson entered the field prior to the meeting with South Carolina. They did a few serious calisthenics and then started dancing to band music. The team was actually members of the Sigma Nu Fraternity of South Carolina. Clemson students entered the field and worked some of the imposters over. Finally state police brought order to the field.

October 13, 1962 - Hal Davis raced 98 yards with a kickoff return for a touchdown against Georgia,



the last time a Tiger would return a kickoff for a score for 25 years.

November 17, 1962 - Clemson upset Maryland as Rodney Rogers kicked a 23-yard field goal with 84 seconds left in the game.

November 24, 1962 - Clemson defeated South Carolina seven days later as Rogers kicked a 24-yard field goal with 1:31 left. The Clemson Tigers wore blue jerseys in this game, the ones that were used in the Sugar Bowl game. Clemson claimed the 20-17 victory when South Carolina quarterback Dan Reeves was sacked deep in South Carolina territory on the last play of the game.

October 12, 1963 - Clemson and Georgia tied 7-7, but the main item of interest was the strange weather. A hail storm hit at 2:50 p.m. and caused temperatures to plummet from 84 degrees to 57 degrees in 45 minutes. Almost an inch of hail poured in a 20-minute period and the game was delayed. Clemson blocked two field goal attempts to preserve the tie.

November 23, 1963 - The South Carolina-Clemson game was postponed due to the death of President John F. Kennedy.

November 28, 1963 - Clemson defeated South Carolina on Thanksgiving Day, 24-20. It was the fifth win in a row for the Tigers to close the season.

November 6, 1965 - Two Clemson single-game records were established in a 17-13 loss at North Carolina. Thomas Ray became the first Tiger to throw for 300 yards in a game when he completed 21-43 passes for 323 yards. His star receiver, Phil Rogers, caught 11 passes for 129 yards to set the single-game reception record.

September 24, 1966 - First game in which Howard's Rock was present at Death Valley. Clemson downed Virginia, 40-35 in one of the most

exciting games in the history of the facility and adding to the legend of Howard's Rock. Clemson trailed 35-17 with just over a quarter remaining in the game, but rode the passing of Jimmy Addison to keep its perfect record alive against Virginia. Addison was 12-19 for 283 yards and three touchdowns, including a 74-yarder to Jackie Jackson with 3:49 remaining that proved to be the game-winner.

October 22, 1966 - Clemson traveled to Los Angeles to play Southern Cal for the first time. This was the longest trip for a Clemson football team at the time. The Trojans won the Pac-Eight that year, won the Rose Bowl and defeated Clemson 30-0. Clemson visited Universal Studios prior to the game and had their photos taken with many of the television stars of the era.

November 12, 1966 - Frank Howard won his 150th game and clinched at least a tie for the ACC championship with a 14-10 victory over Maryland. Clemson won the ACC outright the next week with a 6-1 record. Clemson was 0-3 outside the league in 1966, and all three of the games were against top 10 teams (Georgia Tech, Alabama, and Southern California).

November 26, 1966 - Clemson downed South Carolina to win the ACC, 35-10. A key touchdown in the game was scored by Tiger offensive lineman Harry Olszewski, who picked up a mid-air fumble and ran 12 yards for a touchdown. No Clemson offensive lineman has scored since.

September 23, 1967 - Clemson started the tradition of rubbing Howard's Rock when running down the hill. Clemson responded with a 23-6 win over Wake Forest.

October 28, 1967 - Alabama and Bear Bryant came to Clemson to face Frank Howard's Tigers before a sellout crowd at Clemson. Bryant's team won the close game, 13-10.

November 18, 1967 - Clemson painted its shoes orange for the N.C. State game and the Tigers upset the 10th-ranked Wolfpack, 14-6. Clemson clinched a tie for the ACC championship with the victory, the sixth and final ACC title of Frank Howard's celebrated career. The Tigers had to get the orange paint from eight stores in the area. N.C. State's defense had worn white shoes all season and that was the reason for the play.

November 25, 1967 - Clemson beat South Carolina 23-12 to claim the ACC Championship. Buddy Gore broke the ACC single-season rushing record with 1,045 yards and finished the season eighth in the nation in rushing.

September 28, 1968 - Richie Luzzi returned a missed Georgia field goal try 108 yards (100 officially) for a Clemson touchdown, the longest play in Clemson history.

October 25, 1969 - Danny Ford was one of the Alabama captains for the Clemson-Alabama game

at Clemson. Bob Hope was in town for a homecoming show that night. Bear Bryant's team defeated Clemson, 38-13. Clemson lost by a sizeable margin, but moved the ball consistently. In fact, Clemson had a 200-yard passer, 100-yard rusher, and 100-yard receiver for just the fourth time.

November 1, 1969 - Frank Howard won his last game as a Clemson coach in Death Valley with a 40-0 win over Maryland. It is still Clemson's largest margin of victory against the Terrapins.

December 10, 1969 - Frank Howard resigned from football coaching duties, but remained in the capacity of athletic director. Howard had first come to Clemson in 1931 as an assistant under Jess Neely.

December 17, 1969 - Hootie Ingram was named head football coach.

July 21, 1970 - Clemson announced the use of a new logo...the Tiger Paw. With the aid of Henderson Advertising Agency, the Tiger paw became the new trademark of Clemson athletics.

October 31, 1970 - Don Kelley had the greatest return game in ACC history when he gained 223 yards on interception and punt returns in a 24-11 win over Maryland. He had a record 167 yards in punt returns, including an 85-yarder for a touchdown, and also had a 56-yard interception return.

October 9, 1971 - Hootie Ingram gained his only win over a ranked team as Clemson coach when the Tigers defeat Duke 3-0 in a defensive struggle at the Oyster Bowl in Norfolk, VA. Duke was ranked 14th in the nation entering the contest.

November 27, 1971 - Eddie Seigler became the first Clemson kicker in history to boot a field goal of at least 50 yards. His 52-yarder was important in the 17-7 Clemson win over South Carolina.

December 5, 1972 - Hootie Ingram resigned as Clemson football coach, and Red Parker was named as his replacement.

September 28, 1974 - Georgia Tech made its first appearance in history at Clemson. For years Clemson had always gone to Atlanta for the series. Clemson won the contest, 21-17.

October 5, 1974 - Clemson defeated Georgia in Death Valley, 28-24, giving Clemson wins over Georgia and Georgia Tech in the same season for the first time since 1914.

November 16, 1974 - The playing surface of Memorial Stadium was named Frank Howard Field. This day also featured the longest play in Clemson history, a 97-yard touchdown pass from Mark Fellers to Craig Brantley. Clemson defeated Virginia, 28-9.

November 23, 1974 - Clemson defeated South Carolina, 39-21 to close a perfect 6-0 season in Death Valley. Ken Callicutt had 197 yards rushing and 55 more receiving to key the Clemson attack. It

was a Clemson record for all-purpose rushing at the time. South Carolina players wore two different color helmets in the game as the Gamecock seniors wore black helmets and the rest of the team wore white. Willie Anderson had 21 tackles from his middle guard position, still a Clemson record for an interior lineman. He was named **Sports Illustrated** National Player-of-the-Week.

November 21, 1976 - Clemson scrimmaged at an adjacent field and warmed up there until game time before a 28-9 upset of South Carolina.

December 1, 1976 - Charley Pell was named head football coach.

September 17, 1977 - Clemson defeated Georgia 7-6 and this marked the first time that Clemson had won in Athens since 1914.

November 12, 1977 - Fifth-ranked Notre Dame, led by quarterback Joe Montana and 25 other players who would eventually play in the NFL, defeated Clemson in Death Valley, 21-17. It was the closest game for the Irish in the last nine games of the season. Notre Dame won the national championship that year. A total of 38 players who participated in this game went on to play in the NFL. The list included both quarterbacks, Montana and Steve Fuller, who both won Super Bowl Championships.

November 19, 1977 - A 20-yard pass from Steve Fuller to Jerry Butler with just 49 seconds to play enabled Clemson to squeeze past South Carolina 31-27. The Tigers had led 24-0, then South Carolina came back to take a 27-24 lead prior to the final Clemson drive. The win earned the Tigers a trip to the Gator Bowl.

September 16, 1978 - Clemson won its 100th game in Death Valley with a 58-3 win over the Citadel. Steve Fuller was a perfect 9-9 passing in the contest, an all-time Clemson record for consecutive completions at the time. Clemson was a record 15-17 passing in the contest and set a school record for team passing efficiency.

November 18, 1978 - Clemson clinched the ACC championship with a thrilling victory over Maryland in College Park. Steve Fuller hit touchdown passes of 87 yards to Jerry Butler and 62 yards to Dwight Clark. The game also included a 98-yard run by Maryland's Steve Atkins, the longest run in history against the Tigers.

November 25, 1978 - Clemson fans used the south upper deck for the first time in Clemson's 41-23 win over South Carolina. At the time it was the largest crowd ever to see a game from Philadelphia to Birmingham. Clemson had three backs gain over 100 yards rushing in the game for the first time since 1950. The victory also clinched Clemson's first 10-win season since 1948.

November 28, 1978 - Steve Fuller was tied for sixth place in the Heisman Trophy voting with Ted Brown of N.C. State, and received 19 first-place votes.



Clemson's 13-3 win over #4 and defending national champion Georgia was the key victory in its drive to the 1981 title. The Tigers forced nine turnovers in the game and kept future Heisman Trophy winner Herschel Walker out of the endzone.

December 4, 1978 - Charley Pell resigned as Clemson coach.

December 5, 1978 - Danny Ford, offensive line coach for the Tigers, was named as Pell's replacement. He became the head coach at age 30, the youngest Division I head coach in the nation.

December 10, 1978 - It was announced that Danny Ford would be the Tigers' coach in the Gator Bowl.

December 29, 1978 - Clemson defeated Ohio State 17-15 at the Gator Bowl in Danny Ford's first game as head coach, and Woody Hayes' final game at Ohio State. The winning touchdown was scored by freshman Cliff Austin. He would score another important touchdown three years later against Nebraska. Charlie Bauman made the key play with an interception of an Art Schlichter pass at the Clemson 24 with just two minutes left. He ran the return out of bounds on the Ohio State sideline and was punched by Hayes.

May 3, 1979 - All-American Jerry Butler became the fifth pick of the 1979 NFL draft when he was chosen by the Buffalo Bills. This was the highest selection of a Clemson player since the 1939 season when Banks McFadden was the #4 selection of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

September 22, 1979 - Clemson won its 400th game in history with a 12-7 victory over Georgia.

November 16, 1979 - Clemson won at Notre Dame 16-10 behind Obed Ariri's three field goals. The Irish had taken a 10-0 lead in the first half, but Ariri's field goals and a 26-yard touchdown run by quarterback Billy Lott proved to be the difference. It was just the third time in the last 40 years that Notre Dame's seniors lost their final home game. The next day Ariri kicked the only goal for the Clemson soccer team in an NCAA tournament victory over South Carolina.

October 11, 1980 - Obed Ariri booted a 52-yard field goal with six seconds left to give Clemson a 27-24 victory at Virginia. Clemson had trailed by two

touchdowns entering the fourth quarter and this was the greatest fourth-quarter comeback in Clemson history. Ariri's boot is also the longest field goal to win a game in Clemson history.

November 8, 1980 - Jeff Davis had a then school record 24 tackles vs. North Carolina in a head-to-head battle with Lawrence Taylor. The Tigers had the ball inside the North Carolina five with a chance to win, but Taylor sacked quarterback Homer Jordan on third down. Obed Ariri, who led the nation in field goals in 1980 with 23, booted a 27-yarder in the first half to become the NCAA's career field goal leader. The Tar Heels were victorious 24-19, Clemson's last home loss for four seasons.

November 22, 1980 - Clemson defeated 14th ranked South Carolina 27-6 in a contest that gave the Tigers momentum heading into the 1981 season. Willie Underwood played the game of his life with two interceptions for 101 yards, including one for a 37-yard touchdown. Underwood entered the game, the 47th of his career, without an interception. He was named **Sports Illustrated** National Defensive Player-of-the-Week. Clemson kept South Carolina Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers out of the endzone.

September 19, 1981 - Clemson forced nine Georgia turnovers, most ever by a Clemson opponent, in handing Herschel Walker his only regular season loss as a Bulldog, 13-3. The Bulldogs were the defending national champions and ranked fourth in the nation entering the contest. It is the highest ranked win for the Tigers in the history of Death Valley.

October 31, 1981 - Clemson had 756 total offensive yards against Wake Forest in an 82-24 win. The Tigers set 21 school, stadium, and conference records in the game that remains the highest scoring game in ACC history. The Tigers scored 49 points in the first half, then scored on the first possession of the second half. Clemson's final touchdown was scored on a 72-yard run by Craig Crawford, his first carry as a Tiger and the longest touchdown play in Clemson history for a player on his first play.

Clemson was 12-12 on third-downs and scored 12 touchdowns on the day. The Tigers had a record 536 yards rushing and averaged 8.7 yards per play.

November 7, 1981 - Clemson stopped North Carolina, 10-8, in Chapel Hill in the first battle of top 10 teams in ACC football history. Jeff Bryant recovered a fumble in the last two minutes of the game on a North Carolina lateral. Bryant was the only player who realized the play was a lateral.

November 14, 1981 - Clemson claimed the ACC championship with a 21-7 win over Maryland. Homer Jordan completed 20-29 passes for 270 yards in the contest. At the time it was the most completions in a game for a Tiger quarterback in a Clemson victory.

November 21, 1981 - Clemson finished the regular season with a perfect 11-0 record with 29-13 win over South Carolina. It was Clemson's first perfect regular season since 1948.

November 30, 1981 - Clemson was ranked #1 by AP, for the first time. Clemson moved to the #1 ranking when Penn State whipped Pittsburgh and quarterback Dan Marino, 48-14.

January 1, 1982 - Clemson claimed its first National Championship with a 22-15 win over Nebraska in the 48th annual Orange Bowl Classic. One of the Clemson touchdowns was scored by Cliff Austin, who had been trapped in an elevator for two hours at the Clemson hotel earlier in the day.

January 4, 1982 - The issue of *Sports Illustrated* featured Clemson receiver Perry Tuttle celebrating after his touchdown catch in the Orange Bowl. It was the first time and still only time a Clemson athlete has appeared on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* while a Clemson student.

October 16, 1982 - Cliff Austin broke the Clemson record for most rushing yards in a game with 260 in a rout of Duke.

November 27, 1982 - Clemson defeated Wake Forest, 21-17 at the Mirage Bowl, in Tokyo, Japan, and also sewed up its second straight ACC title.

January 1, 1983 - Terry Kinard was named National Defensive Player of the Year by CBS Sports. He was presented the award during halftime of the Cotton Bowl by CBS announcer Lindsey Nelson. Kinard had led Clemson to a 9-1-1 record, led the team in tackles and interceptions.

April 26, 1983 - A record 10 Clemson players were chosen in the NFL draft. The group was led by Terry Kinard, who was the #10 pick of the entire draft by the New York Giants.

September 3, 1983 - The north upper deck was used for the first time in a victory over Western Carolina, bringing the capacity to over 80,000.

November 12, 1983 - 3,000 Clemson students arrived at Death Valley at 7:00 AM to blow up 363,729

balloons. The 80,000 fans released the balloons as the team ran down the hill. On the field, Mike Eppley was outstanding with three touchdown passes, and Kevin Mack rushed for 186 yards in his final game in Death Valley. He scored his final touchdown with just one shoe on, as he had lost it during his 56-yard run for a score. Clemson downed the Top 20 Maryland team and Boomer Esiason, 52-27.

November 19, 1983 - Clemson closed the 1983 season with a 22-13 win over South Carolina in Columbia. The game gave the Tigers a 30-2-2 record for over the last three years, the top record in college football.

September 8, 1984 - Clemson defeated Virginia in Charlottesville, 55-0. Virginia ended the year 8-4 and went to a bowl game. It is the largest margin of victory in Clemson history over a team that went to a bowl game. Mike Eppley led the way, hitting 8-14 passes for 172 yards and a pair of scores. The Tigers advanced to #2 in the nation with the win.

September 22, 1984 - Georgia defeated Clemson in Athens, 26-23 on a 60-yard field goal by Kevin Butler with 11 seconds left. Clemson, who had a 20-6 lead at halftime, ran the ensuing kickoff back to Georgia territory and a personal foul was thrown against the Bulldogs after the tackle. But, after a long debate, officials ruled the game had ended when the foul was committed and Donald Igwebuike, who led the nation in field goal percentage in 1984 (17-18) was denied an opportunity to tie the game from 42 yards away.

November 10, 1984 - Clemson defeated Virginia Tech 17-10 in the greatest matchup of defensive linemen in Death Valley history. Clemson featured All-American William Perry and Virginia Tech featured Outland Trophy winner and future All-Pro Bruce Smith. Clemson also had freshman Michael Dean Perry, who went on to earn six Pro Bowl selections.

September 14, 1985 - David Treadwell showed a foreshadowing of things to come with a 36-yard field goal on the last play of the game to give Clemson a 20-17 victory at Virginia Tech in the season opener. Perry Williams had a Clemson record five pass deflections in this game.

September 21, 1985 - Clemson and Georgia met in the first nationally-televised (CBS) football game from Clemson. Georgia won the game 20-13 thanks to a fourth-quarter fumble recovery by offensive lineman Peter Anderson. No opposing offensive lineman has scored a touchdown in a game since.

November 23, 1985 - Clemson defeated South Carolina 24-17, and accepted a bid to the Independence Bowl.

September 20, 1986 - Clemson defeated Georgia 31-28, as David Treadwell kicked a 46-yard field goal with no time left on the clock. Athens, GA native Norman Haynes led Clemson in tackles with 14, while Terrance Flagler led the offense with nearly 200 all-purpose running yards.

November 1, 1986 - Terrance Flagler scored four touchdowns, two receiving and two rushing, and gained 274 all-purpose yards in Clemson's 28-20 win at Wake Forest. He had an 88-yard run in the contest, the longest of his career. The all-purpose yard total is still a Clemson record for an individual.

November 15, 1986 - Clemson tied Maryland 17-17 to win the ACC championship, as Treadwell kicked a 20-yard field goal with two seconds left. Both Clemson coach Danny Ford and Maryland coach Bobby Ross, coached the game from the press box due to suspensions imposed by the ACC.

December 27, 1986 - Clemson won the Gator Bowl championship with a 27-21 win over Stanford. Clemson scored all 27 points in the first half, then held on as Brad Muster led a furious comeback.

January 3, 1987 - Clemson was ranked #17 in the nation in the final AP poll, its first final top-20 ranking since 1983.

September 19, 1987 - David Treadwell booted a 21-yard field goal with two seconds left to beat Georgia on national TV, 21-20.

September 26, 1987 - Clemson had not returned a punt or kickoff for a touchdown in 17 years, then had one of each in a 33-12 win over Georgia Tech. Donnell Woolford scored on a 78-yard punt return and Joe Henderson on a 95-yard kickoff return. Clemson had gone 999 punt and kickoff returns without a touchdown prior to Joe Henderson's score.

January 1, 1988 - Clemson gained 499 yards in handing Penn State its worst bowl-game defeat, 35-10, in the Citrus Bowl. Rodney Williams was named the player-of-the-game as he threw for 214 yards. Terry Allen rushed for 105 yards and Keith Jennings caught seven passes for 110 yards, giving Clemson a 200-yard passer, 100-yard rusher, and 100-yard receiver in the same game for the first time since 1969. Clemson was ranked #10 in the final UPI poll.

September 17, 1988 - Florida State defeated Clemson 24-21 in the "Puntrookie Game" at Death Valley. It was the first battle of top 10 teams in the history of Death Valley. Clemson had Florida State deep in its own territory late in the fourth quarter with the score tied at 21 when Florida State coach Bobby Bowden ran an intricate fake punt play that resulted in Leroy Butler streaking 78 yards to the Clemson three. Florida State booted a field goal to win the game.

November 12, 1988 - Clemson clinched an ACC record-tying third straight ACC title with a 49-25 win at Maryland. Clemson scored 28 points in the fourth period on just nine offensive plays.

November 19, 1988 - Clemson gained revenge for a loss at South Carolina in 1987 with a 29-10 win over the Gamecocks at Clemson. Rodney Williams was masterful in running the Tiger offense in his final home game. He would end his career with 32 wins, still a record for a Tiger quarterback.

January 2, 1989 - Clemson became the first ACC team to defeat Oklahoma in a 13-6 Florida Citrus Bowl victory. Clemson held the Oklahoma offense without a touchdown for just the second time in the decade of the eighties. Clemson closed the season with a #9 ranking and became the only school in the nation to win a conference title, a bowl game and rank in the final Top 20 for three straight years.

September 9, 1989 - Clemson earned a landmark victory at Florida State, 34-23. The Tigers jumped out to a 21-0 lead behind a 73-yard interception return by Wayne Simmons and a 73-yard touchdown run by Terry Allen. The victory moved Clemson to #7 in the AP poll and it was the last loss of the season for Florida State, who eventually ended the season ranked third in the nation.

November 18, 1989 - Clemson slaughtered South Carolina 45-0, the largest margin of victory for Clemson in the series in 89 years. Clemson outgained the Gamecocks 466-155, and picked up 355 yards rushing. Clemson's fifth-ranked defense forced five turnovers. Terry Allen rushed for 89 yards in the first half, then suffered a knee injury just before halftime and never carried the ball for the Tigers again.

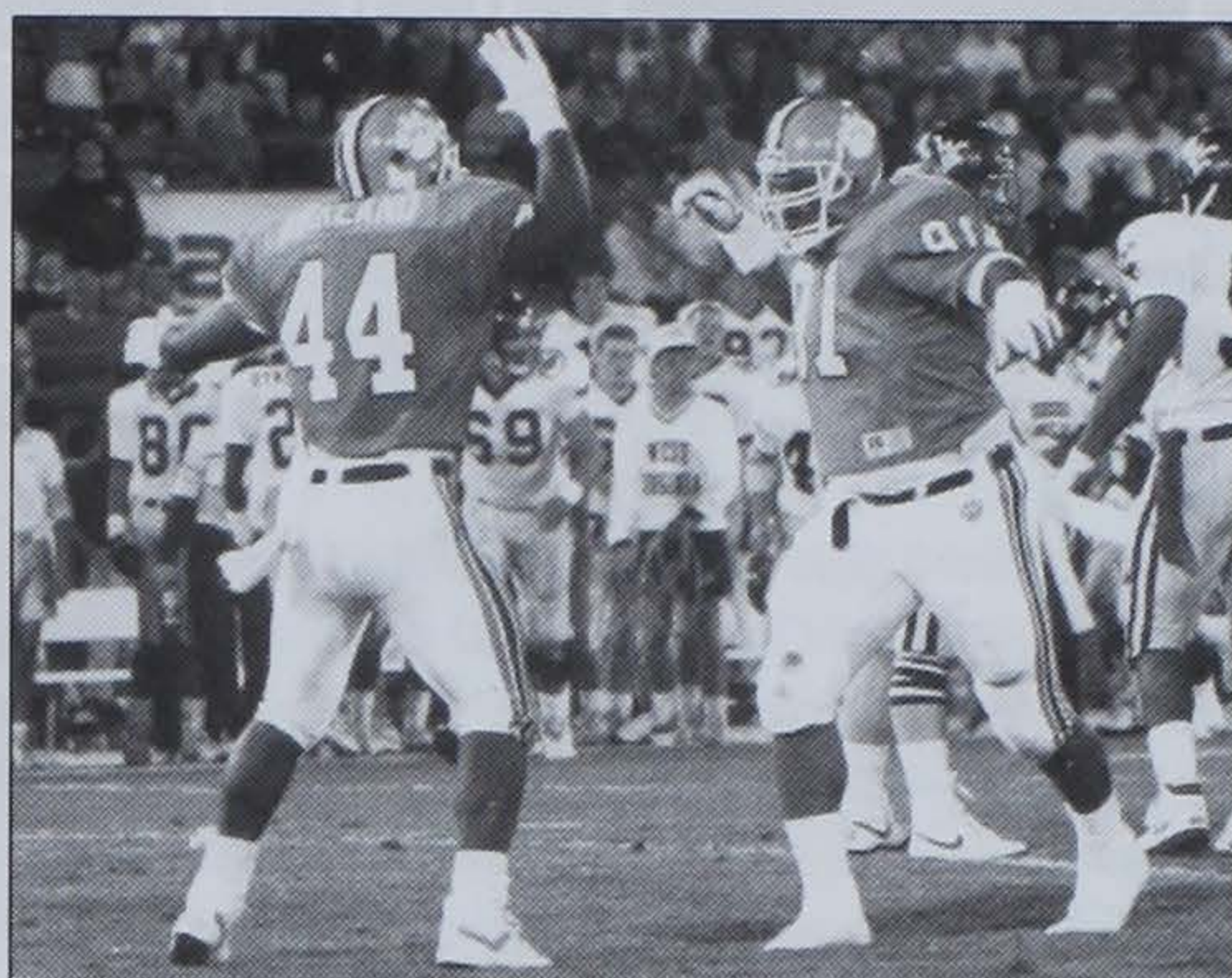
December 30, 1989 - The Tigers defeated West Virginia 27-7 in the Gator Bowl. It was Clemson's fourth straight bowl victory and the fourth straight year Clemson concluded the season ranked in the national top 20. The Tigers held West Virginia to just 119 yards passing and forced Heisman Trophy runner up Major Harris into three fumbles. Chester McGlockton sacked Harris in the endzone and recovered the ball for a touchdown.

January 18, 1990 - Danny Ford resigned as head coach after 11 full seasons. He finished his career tied for first in ACC history in career victories with 96 and he was second in winning percentage. He had a 96-29-4 overall record and 76 percent winning mark. He was the third winningest active coach in the nation at the time of his resignation.

January 21, 1990 - Ken Hatfield became Clemson's 22nd head coach. Hatfield had been the head coach at Arkansas since 1984 and took his alma mater to bowl games each of his six seasons.

September 1, 1990 - Clemson defeated Long Beach State 59-0 in the first game of the Ken Hatfield era. Clemson scored two touchdowns via return, one on an interception return by Arlington Nunn and one on a kickoff return by Doug Thomas. The 49ers were coached by NFL legend George Allen, who was making a comeback as a coach. Unfortunately, the venerable coach who led that team to a 6-5 record, died at the end of the season from pneumonia.

October 13, 1990 - Eventual national champion Georgia Tech defeated Clemson 21-19 in Atlanta. Clemson rushed for over 300 yards in the game, yet lost to Bobby Ross's team. Chris Gardocki's 60-yard field goal attempt to win the game was just a couple of yards short.



Clemson's defense of the early 1990s featured future professional stars Levon Kirkland and Chester McGlockton. The Tigers led the nation in total defense in 1990 and in rushing defense in 1991.

January 1, 1991 - Clemson shut out Illinois 30-0 in its first Hall of Fame Bowl appearance. It was Clemson's largest margin of victory in a bowl game. The win elevated Clemson to #9 in the final AP poll and gave Clemson a Top 10 ranking in Ken Hatfield's first year. He was the first ACC coach ever to take a team to a Top 10 ranking in his first year. It was a record 40th win for Clemson's seniors.

October 26, 1991 - Clemson wore purple jerseys for the first time since the 1920s in a 29-19 victory over 10th-ranked (USA Today) N.C. State. The 18th-ranked (AP) Tigers were led by freshman Nelson Welch, who kicked a Clemson record five field goals. Clemson scored its first touchdown on a fake field goal as Rudy Harris ran three yards for a score.

November 16, 1991 - The Tigers clinched their 12th ACC Championship, first under Ken Hatfield, with a 40-7 win over Maryland at Death Valley. DeChane Cameron was 13-23 for 213 yards in leading Clemson to victory in his final home game.

November 23, 1991 - DeChane Cameron gained 322 yards of total offense, 206 passing and 116 rushing to lead Clemson to a 41-23 win at South Carolina. Clemson also had a 100-yard receiver in the game, giving Clemson a 200-yard passer, 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver (Terry Smith) in the same game for just the fifth time in Clemson history.

November 30, 1991 - Clemson ran its overseas record to 2-0 with a 33-21 win over Duke in the Coca Cola Bowl in Tokyo, Japan. Clemson had to score 26 points in the fourth period to register the victory. It was Ken Hatfield's 100th win as a college coach.

September 12, 1992 - Florida State defeated Clemson 24-20 in the first night game at Clemson since 1956. The contest was televised by ESPN. Clemson had taken a 20-17 lead in the fourth period on a touchdown pass to Terry Smith. The Seminoles led by quarterback Charlie Ward, scored the winning TD in the two final minutes.

October 10, 1992 - Clemson overcame a 28-0 deficit to defeat Virginia in Charlottesville 29-28. Nelson

Welch kicked a 32-yard field goal with 52 seconds left to cap the comeback. Quarterback Louis Solomon came off the bench with the score 28-0 and led the comeback. His 64-yard scoring run just before the half changed the course of the game. The win over the #10 Cavaliers was just the third in Clemson history over a top-10 team on the road.

November 7, 1992 - Clemson soundly defeated #18 North Carolina 40-7 at Death Valley, the largest margin of victory for the Tigers over a top 20 team in history. Freshman Patrick Sapp hit 13-23 passes for 205 yards, while Rodney Blunt scored three TDs in leading the Clemson offense. The Tigers controlled the clock for a record 42:58.

November 24, 1993 - Ken Hatfield and Clemson University announced a separation, ending Hatfield's four-year career as head coach. Hatfield was 32-13-1 at Clemson and his .707 winning percentage was third in ACC history when he departed.

November 29, 1993 - Tommy West was named Clemson's 23rd head coach and took over the team heading for the Peach Bowl. West, who spent the 1993 regular season as head coach at UT Chattanooga, became the sixth coach in Division I history to make his head coaching debut for a school in a bowl game and the second coach to ever become head coach for a bowl game after not serving as an assistant at that school during the regular season.

December 31, 1993 - Clemson scored the latest touchdown to gain victory in a game since 1958, as Patrick Sapp connected with Terry Smith with 0:20 left to defeat Kentucky, 14-13, in the Peach Bowl. West experienced his fifth consecutive bowl victory with Clemson, as the Tigers won four straight bowl games during his years as an assistant (1986-89).

September 3, 1994 - For the first time ever, Clemson faced a team coached by a Clemson graduate. Bobby Johnson, an academic All-ACC defensive back for the Tigers and a 1973 Clemson graduate, brought his Furman Paladins to Death Valley. Clemson came away with a 27-6 win. Clemson inducted Frank Howard, Steve Fuller, and Banks McFadden into the Ring of Honor prior to the game.

September 17, 1994 - Clemson and Virginia met in the 1,000th ACC football game in history. Virginia won 9-6. Clemson's Andre Carter had three takeaways in the game, just the fourth Tiger in history to do that.

October 15, 1994 - Nelson Welch became the ACC's career field goal leader with a 47-yarder in the third quarter at Duke. It gave Welch 61 career field goals, breaking the record of 60 held by Jess Atkinson, Scott Sisson, and Obed Ariri.

November 5, 1994 - Nelson Welch became Clemson's career scoring leader with five field goals and a PAT in Clemson's 28-17 upset of 12th-ranked North Carolina in Chapel Hill. Clemson's defense held the Tar Heels to 11 yards rushing. Clemson started an all first-year freshman backfield.

May 15, 1995 - The Banks McFadden building was dedicated. The facility is the home of Clemson football administration and with all the top of the line in facilities for players and coaches.

August 12, 1995 - The Carolina Panthers and the Denver Broncos played the first professional game in the history of Death Valley. The Panthers won the exhibition game over the John Elway led Broncos.

September 17, 1995 - The Carolina Panthers met the St. Louis Rams in the first regular season NFL game in Death Valley. It was the first of eight regular season games for the expansion Panthers at Clemson Memorial Stadium.

October 7, 1995 - Clemson wore "turn back the clock" uniforms for the Clemson-Georgia game at Death Valley. The uniforms were replicas of those worn by the 1939 Clemson team that went to the Cotton Bowl, the first bowl appearance in Clemson history. Georgia won the thrilling game, 19-17, but that would be Clemson's final regular season loss of 1995. Leomont Evans had 18 tackles in the contest, most ever by a Clemson defensive back.

November 11, 1995 - Two all-time Clemson records were set on the same day in Clemson's 34-17 win over Duke. Raymond Priester gained 263 yards rushing to break Cliff Austin's Clemson single-game mark. All-American Brian Dawkins had three interceptions in the first quarter to set a quarter record and tie the single-game mark for interceptions. The game was played in a driving rainstorm in the first half and brilliant sunshine in the second.

November 18, 1995 - Clemson outscored South Carolina 21-0 in the fourth period to defeat South Carolina in Columbia, 38-17. It was Clemson's fourth straight win in Columbia. The victory clinched a bid to the Gator Bowl for the Tigers.

December 10, 1995 - The defending Super Bowl Champion San Francisco 49ers defeated the Carolina Panthers at Death Valley. Jerry Rice caught one touchdown pass from Steve Young in the contest that attracted over 75,000 fans.

December 15, 1995 - Linebacker Anthony Simmons was named UPI National Freshman-of-the-Year, the first defensive player in the history of the award. Simmons led Clemson in tackles (150), 46 more than any other freshman in school history.

January 28, 1996 - Clemson legend Frank Howard, the school's head football coach between 1940-69 passed away at his home in Clemson. Howard, who still had come to his office in the Jervy Athletic Center a month prior to his death, died on the same day as his former teammate and Alabama legend Bear Bryant, 14 years later.

September 7, 1996 - Clemson's Centennial team was honored at halftime of the Clemson vs. Furman game. The Tigers wore their "Turn back the Clock" uniforms for this game, a 19-3 Clemson victory. Clemson had a school record 12 sacks in the win.

November 2, 1996 - Clemson held Maryland without a touchdown for the fourth straight year in a 35-3 Tiger victory. Anthony Simmons keyed the Clemson defense that had eight sacks with 15 tackles for loss. Maryland has not scored a touchdown against Clemson since 1992.

November 9, 1996 - The Tigers upset 15th ranked Virginia 24-16 in Charlottesville. Clemson had two players rush for over 120 yards in the contest as Kelton Dunnican had a career high 123 yards and Raymond Priester had 122. It was the second time in four years that Clemson had defeated a ranked Virginia team on the road.

December 28, 1996 - Raymond Priester became Clemson's career and single-season rushing leader in a 10-7 loss to Louisiana State in the Peach Bowl. Priester gained 151 yards rushing in 25 attempts, giving him 1,345 yards for the season and 3,010 for his career. He broke his own single-season record and broke Kenny Flowers' career record in the game.

September 13, 1997 - Matt Padgett kicked a 20-yard field goal with 19 seconds left to give Clemson a 19-17 win at N.C. State. Nealon Greene became the first quarterback in school history to have consecutive 250-yard passing games. The senior also had 76 yards rushing and the 336 yards total offense were the second most in Clemson history.

September 20, 1997 - Tony Horne and Florida State's Peter Warrick put on the greatest individual all-purpose running show in the history of Death Valley. Horne had 10 receptions for 131 yards and had 267 yards of all-purpose running, while Warrick had a 90-yard punt return and an 80-yard touchdown reception in gaining 372 yards of all-purpose running as Florida State defeated Clemson 35-28.

October 4, 1997 - Nealon Greene tied a Clemson record for touchdown passes with four in a 39-7 rout of UTEP. He completed three of the scores to Tony Horne, and that also tied a Tiger single-game record.

November 8, 1997 - Rahim Abdullah returned an interception 63 yards for a touchdown, clinching a 29-20 Clemson victory in overtime over Duke. It was the first overtime game in Clemson history, the first in ACC history involving two league teams.

November 22, 1997 - Clemson earned its third straight bowl bid with a 47-21 victory over South Carolina in Columbia. It was Clemson's fifth straight victory in Columbia over the Gamecocks. Antwan Edwards was the star for Clemson with two interceptions, including one that he returned for a touchdown. The 47 points were the most by the Tigers against South Carolina since 1900.

December 8, 1997 - Anthony Simmons was named first-team AP All-American, his third straight year on one of the top three teams. He became Clemson's second three-time All-American in history.

September 19, 1998 - Antwan Edwards became the first Clemson player in history to have two runs

of at least 80 yards in the same game. The All-America defensive back had a 93-yard fumble return for a touchdown, longest in Clemson history, and an 85-yard kickoff return in a 20-18 loss at Virginia. It was Clemson's first ever loss on September 19th after eight straight wins.

October 31, 1998 - In a 46-39 loss to N.C. State, quarterback Brandon Streeter set the Clemson single-game passing yardage (329) and completion (27) record. He threw three touchdown passes in the fourth quarter. For the first time ever, Clemson had two 100-yard receivers in the same game. Brian Wofford had 9-128 and a touchdown, while classmate Mal Lawyer had 8-100 and two touchdown receptions. Clemson could not overcome the performance of Tory Holt, who had 11-225 and four touchdown catches.

November 12, 1998 - Clemson played host to its first ever ESPN home Thursday night game, a 24-21 loss to a top-25 Georgia Tech team. Georgia Tech scored the winning touchdown with just one minute remaining.

November 18, 1998 - It was announced that the South Carolina game of November 21 would be Tommy West's final game as Clemson Head Coach.

November 21, 1998 - Clemson defeated South Carolina 28-19 in Tommy West's final game as Clemson coach. The victory, played before a crowd of 84,423, ended a seven game winning streak for the road team in the series, tied for the longest streak of its kind in NCAA history. A highlight of the contest was a 48-yard interception return for a touchdown by Clemson outside linebacker Howard Bartley, who came back to letter as a senior after two torn ACL operations. Clemson fans tore down the goalpost after the game, just the second time in the history of Death Valley that the goalposts came down after a Tiger victory. Coach West, his wife Lindsey and son Turner were carried off the field at the conclusion of the game.

December 2, 1998 - Tommy Bowden was named Clemson Head Football Coach.

December 5, 1999 - Former South Carolina Head Coach Brad Scott was hired as Clemson's assistant head coach under Tommy Bowden. Scott was also hired to coach the tight ends.

September 11, 1999 - Tommy Bowden recorded his first win as Clemson head coach, a 33-14 victory over 19th ranked Virginia. Quarterback Brandon Streeter threw for a school record 343 yards and was named National Player-of-the-Week by USA Today.

October 16, 1999 - Woodrow Dantzler broke a 52-year old Clemson standard for total offense in Clemson's 42-30 victory at Maryland. Dantzler gained 435 yards of total offense, including 183 yards on the ground, a Clemson record for yards rushing by a Tiger signal-caller. Travis Zachery rushed for three touchdowns as well.

October 23, 1999 - In the first meeting of father and son head coaches in Division I college football history, Bobby Bowden and Florida State defeated Tommy Bowden and Clemson, 17-14. The game was played before a record crowd of 86,092 and was televised nationally by ESPN. Clemson had a chance to tie the eventual national champs, but Tony Lazzara's 41-yard field goal attempt with 1:57 left, was tipped by Tay Cody.

November 6, 1999 - Keith Adams set a school record with four sacks and six total tackles for loss, leading Clemson to a 58-7 win over Duke in the final home game of the season. He was named National Defensive Player-of-the-Week by the Bronko Nagurski Committee. Brandon Streeter completed 22-30 for 279 yards in his final home game as well.

November 20, 1999 - Clemson defeated South Carolina 31-21 in Columbia to clinch a bid to play Mississippi State in the Peach Bowl in Tommy Bowden's first season. Keith Adams had a school record 27 tackles in the contest. Rod Gardner's 29-yard touchdown reception from Woodrow Dantzler on a fourth-down play iced the game for the Tigers.

December 1, 1999 - Tommy Bowden was named ACC Coach of the Year, Clemson's first selection for that honor since 1981.

September 9, 2000 - Clemson defeated Missouri 62-9 at home, the school's highest point total since the 1981 season. Sophomore Brian Mance had three takeaways in just 16 scrimmage plays on defense.

September 23, 2000 - Woodrow Dantzler rushed for 220 yards, an ACC record for a quarterback, in Clemson's 31-10 win over Virginia. Dantzler also passed for 154 yards, bringing Clemson to a 4-0 record and a #7 AP ranking.

September 30, 2000 - Bob Bradley worked his 500th consecutive Clemson football game on this day, a 52-22 win at Duke. Bradley served as Clemson SID or SID emeritus for 45 years.



October 21, 2000 - Clemson improved to 8-0 with a 38-24 victory at North Carolina. Reserve quarterback Willie Simmons threw four touchdown passes, three to Rod Gardner, in the win. Clemson overcame a 17-point deficit, the third largest deficit overcome to gain victory in Clemson history.

October 22, 2000 - Clemson was ranked third in the nation in the **USA Today** poll, Clemson's highest ranking in any poll since the 1984 season.

October 30, 2000 - Legendary Clemson sports figure Bob Bradley passed away at the age of 74. He had been presented the Order of the Palmetto by the Governor's office two days prior to his passing.

November 18, 2000 - Rod Gardner made a spectacular 50-yard catch with 10 seconds remaining to set up Aaron Hunt's 25-yard game winning field goal with just three seconds remaining in Clemson's 16-14 win over South Carolina in Death Valley.

December 5, 2000 - Kyle Young and Chad Carson were both named first-team Academic All-Americans, the only year in history Clemson has had two first-team Academic All-Americans.

January 5, 2001 - Clemson was ranked 16th in the final AP poll and 14th in the final **USA Today** poll. It was Clemson's first final top 25 ranking since 1993, its highest final ranking since 1991.

April 24, 2001 - Rod Gardner was selected in the first round, the 15th pick overall, by the Redskins.

September 15, 2001 - The Clemson vs. Duke football game scheduled this day was postponed until December 1 due to the terrorist attacks in New York City on September 11, 2001.

September 29, 2001 - Clemson defeated Georgia Tech in Atlanta, 47-44 in overtime. Woodrow Dantzler scored on an 11-yard run in the extra period to give Clemson the win. Dantzler rushed for 164 yards and passed for 254 in the all-around performance that brought him National Player-of-the-Week honors by USAToday.com. Georgia Tech was ranked #9 entering the game. It was the highest ranked road win for the Tiger program since 1981.

October 13, 2001 - Two weeks and one game after gaining 418 yards of total offense at Georgia Tech, Woodrow Dantzler trumped that performance with a 517-yard day at N.C. State. Dantzler broke numerous Clemson records in completing 23-27 passes for 333 yards and four scores. He also rushed 23 times for 184 yards and two scores. The six touchdowns and 517 yards were Clemson single-game marks. Dantzler went over 4000 yards passing and 2000 yards rushing in the game, the first player in ACC history to do both.

Woodrow Dantzler became the first Division I quarterback to pass for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 in the same season (2001).

December 1, 2001 - Woodrow Dantzler became the first player in NCAA Division I history to pass for 2000 yards and rush for 1000 yards in the same season. Dantzler reached the plateau with an 18-yard run for a touchdown against Duke in Death Valley. Dantzler completed the regular season with 2360 yards passing and 1004 yards rushing.

December 11, 2001 - Clemson was the only school in the nation with a Hall of Fame inductee and a National Football Foundation scholar at enshrinement ceremonies in New York City. Terry Kinard became just the second Clemson player inducted into the college football Hall of Fame, joining the legendary Banks McFadden. Kyle Young was named a National Football Foundation Scholar Athlete. Earlier in the week, Young became just the second offensive lineman in college football history to be named a first-team Academic All-American three times.

December 31, 2001 - Clemson gained its first bowl win since 1993 with a 49-24 victory over Louisiana Tech in the Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, ID. Clemson scored 28 points in the third period to blow the game open. Woodrow Dantzler, playing in his final game at Clemson, captured game MVP honors by completing 15-23 passes for 218 yards and four touchdowns. Bernard Rambert rushed for 101 yards and had 77 yards receiving to support a Clemson offense that gained 548 yards of total offense. Four different freshmen, Derrick Hamilton, Airese Currie, Roscoe Crosby and Ben Hall, scored touchdowns for the Tigers.

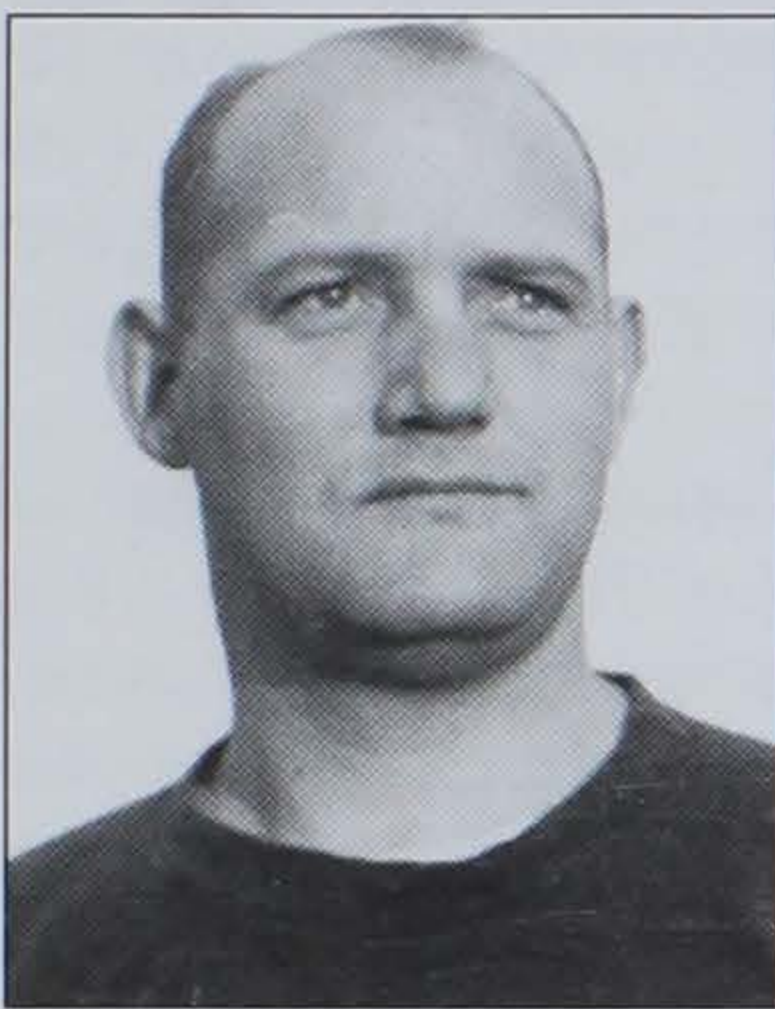
September 14, 2002 - Derrick Hamilton gained 256 all-purpose rushing yards in Clemson's 24-19 win over Georgia Tech in Death Valley. Hamilton gained 97 yards rushing, 97 in punt returns, 41 in kickoff returns and 22 receiving in accumulating the fifth highest all-purpose running total in a single game in Clemson history. He had a 77 yard scoring run and a 79 yard punt return.

November 2, 2002 - Clemson scored 24 points in the fourth quarter and overcame a 14-point fourth-quarter deficit for just the second time in Clemson history in a 34-31 win at Duke. Aaron Hunt kicked a 21-yard field goal with eight seconds left to give the Tigers the victory. Freshman Charlie Whitehurst completed a Clemson single-game record 34 passes and threw for a school record 420 yards in the victory in his first college start. He also tied the Clemson record for touchdown passes in a game with four.

November 9, 2002 - For the second straight game, Charlie Whitehurst tied the Clemson single-game touchdown pass record with four at North Carolina in a 42-12 Clemson win in Chapel Hill. His passing efficiency rating of 241 for the game was a Clemson single-game record given a minimum of 20 attempts.

November 23, 2002 - Clemson outscored South Carolina 14-0 in the final quarter to defeat its state rival 27-20 at Death Valley in the 100th meeting between the two schools. Charlie Whitehurst completed 27-38 passes for 287 yards in the contest.

An era at Clemson University ended June 30, 1974, when Frank Howard officially retired from the payroll.

Another era ended January 28, 1996, when Howard died at the age of 86 and forever silenced a voice that had been synonymous with Clemson for nearly 65 years. He was the school's best known ambassador.

Although he retired from all official duties in 1974, he never quit coming to the office and he never stopped representing Clemson in a manner which continued to win friends for the place that was so dear to his heart.

Howard retired from coaching December 10, 1969, after 39 years on the Clemson coaching staff, 30 of which were as head coach. He was also athletic director during this time and he kept this position until February 4, 1971, when he was named assistant to the vice president at the university, the post he held when the mandatory retirement age of 65 rolled around.

Shortly after his retirement the Clemson Board of Trustees named the playing surface of Memorial Stadium as "Frank Howard Field" in honor of his long service to the university. It was only the third time that a building or installation had been named by the trustees for a living person. Over the years, Howard was inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame and the Clemson Hall of Fame (charter member in both), as well as the Helms Athletic Hall of Fame and the State of Alabama Hall of Fame. On December 5, 1989 he joined an elite group in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. The ceremonies took place in the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. He joined former Clemson mentors John Heisman and Jess Neely in the membership.

Howard was also honored in December, 1981, when he was inducted into the Orange Bowl Hall of Honor, along with former Alabama coach, Paul "Bear" Bryant, and Tommy McDonald, a former Oklahoma star. In the summer of 1990 he was inducted into the Gator Bowl Hall of Fame.

Howard stepped onto the rolling hills of Clemson in 1931 fresh from the varsity football ranks at the University of Alabama where he was a first stringer on Wallace Wade's 1930 team that drubbed Washington State, 24-0, in the 1931 Rose Bowl. Howard was known as the "Little Giant" of the Tide's "Herd of Red Elephants."

The bald veteran came to his first coaching post under Jess Neely as a line tutor. "At least that was my title," Howard recalls. "Actually, I also coached track, was ticket manager, recruited players and had charge of football equipment. In my spare time I cut grass, lined tennis courts and operated the canteen while the regular man was out to lunch." Howard was not only track coach from 1931-39, but served as baseball coach in 1943 and his 12-3 record that year

is still among the best percentages for a season in Clemson history.

Howard held the line coaching post until Neely went to Rice University as head coach in 1940. When the Clemson Athletic Council met to name a successor to Neely, Professor Sam Rhodes, a council member, nominated Howard to be the new head coach. Howard, standing in the back of the room listening to the discussion, said: "I second the nomination." He got the job and never left. When he retired as head coach following the 1969 season, he was the nation's dean of coaches, having been a head football coach at a major institution longer than anyone else in the United States. When he retired, he was one of five active coaches with 150 or more victories.

While line coach in 1939, the Tigers' record (8-1) was good enough to merit a trip to Dallas where Clemson met undefeated Boston College under the late Frank Leahy in the 1940 Cotton Bowl. The 1948 mark of 10-0 carried Clemson to the 1949 Gator

Bowl and two years later, a 9-0-1 record sent the Tigers to Miami's Orange Bowl (1950). The Country Gentlemen were champions on their first three bowl ventures. Boston College fell, 6-3, Missouri was nipped in the Gator, 24-23 (Howard said this is the best football game he ever witnessed), and Miami felt the Tiger claws, 15-14. The total point spread in these three bowl wins was five points.

The Gator Bowl beckoned the Tigers again in January, 1952, and by being conference champions in 1956, Clemson played in the '57 Orange Bowl classic again. Miami downed Clemson, 14-0 in the second Gator Bowl trip and Colorado led Clemson, 20-0, then trailed 21-20, before finally defeating the Tigers, 27-21, in the second Orange Bowl. The Tigers then played in the 1959 Sugar Bowl and held No. 1-ranked Louisiana State to a standstill before losing, 7-0.

The invitation to play in the first Bluebonnet Bowl in Houston, TX in December, 1959, was the eighth bowl that Howard had been a part of either as a player, assistant coach or head coach. It was the seventh bowl trip for a Clemson team and the sixth in 12 years. Howard says that Clemson's 23-7

triumph over seventh-ranked Texas Christian in the Bluebonnet Bowl was the best performance he had ever witnessed by a Clemson team. Clemson was the first school to play in two bowls in the same calendar year.

The Tigers' victory over Texas Christian was their fourth success in seven post-season appearances. In all seven Clemson was the established underdog.

Howard served on the coaching staff of the Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, AL, in 1941, 1952, 1959, and 1966; was on the East staff of the annual East-West Game in San Francisco, CA, in December, 1960, and again in December, 1962; and was named coach of the South squad in Miami's 1961 and 1969 North-South game. He coached in the 1970 Hula Bowl, which was his ninth postseason all-star game. While still in active coaching Howard served as one of the rules committee members for a period of three years.

A single wing expert for 22 seasons (including nine as a line coach), Howard changed to the T-formation and its many variations in 1953. Still another major change in the offense was installed in 1965 with the "I" and pro-type set. In his 13 seasons as head coach using the single wing, Clemson won 69, lost 47 and tied 7. In 12 years of "T" teams, the Tigers won 71, lost 47 and tied 4. While using the "I" in his last five years of coaching, Clemson recorded a 25-24-1 record.

In his 30 years of coaching, Howard won 165 games, lost 118 games and tied 12. That victory total is still among the top 40 coaches in the history of the game.

In addition to heading up the Clemson football program, Howard also had the job of directing Clemson's entire athletic program, and at the same time raising all the required scholarship funds. The Clemson athletic department was always on a sound financial footing under the guidance of Howard.

The year 1958 was a red-letter one for Howard. During halftime of the Spring Game, Howard, his staff, and secretaries were given an appreciation day. Howard received a 1958 car while other staff members were presented gifts. That summer, Howard and three members of his staff were given a trip to Europe by the United State Department of Defense to conduct clinics for the Armed Forces in Germany.

Then came the football season and the Tigers presented Howard with an 8-2 season, which led to the Sugar Bowl invitation. One of these 1958 wins was the 100th of Howard's head coaching career. That came against the late Jim Tatum of North Carolina, a coach Howard had never beaten. And, the Tigers had to come from behind three times to win, 26-21.

Howard was named Southern Conference Coach-of-the-Year in 1948. In 1959 he was named Atlantic Coast Conference Coach-of-the-Year and was accorded the honor again in 1966. His teams won ACC championships six times (1956-58-59-65-66-67) in the first 15 years of the conference. The Tigers were co-champions in 1965. He guided Clemson to the Southern Conference crown in 1940 and 1948.

Howard was born at Barlow Bend, AL (three

wagon greasin's from Mobile), March 25, 1909. He spent his early days on the farm playing mostly cow pasture baseball because there were not enough boys around the community for a football team. Howard says he left Barlow Bend walking barefoot on a barbed wire fence with a wildcat under each arm.

He graduated from Murphy High School in Mobile where he played football, baseball and basketball and served as president of both the junior and senior classes.

After finishing at Murphy, Howard entered the University of Alabama on an academic scholarship provided by the **Birmingham News** in the fall of 1927, and the 185 pounder played reserve guard his sophomore year. During his junior year he started every game but two, as an ankle injury sidelined him for the two games he missed. Again his senior year he was a regular.

Howard was president of the freshman class at Alabama, was member of Blue Key and president of the "A" Club.

After coming to Clemson, he married the former Anna Tribble of Anderson, SC, (who died May 15, 1996) on August 23, 1933. They were the parents of a daughter, Alice (Mrs. Robert McClure of Gastonia, NC) and a son, Jimmy, of Pendleton. The Howards had three grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Jimmy followed in his dad's footsteps as a football player, only at a different position. The son was regular fullback on the local high school (Daniel High) team for three years and was a halfback-fullback for three years on the Clemson varsity squad. Jimmy gained over 1,400 yards his senior season in high school and scored over 100 points.

He graduated from Clemson in June, 1964 with honors, and earned his masters degree in horticulture from Clemson in 1967. He retired as district entomologist with the Plant Pest Regulatory Service at Clemson.

For over three decades Howard was in great demand both as a banquet speaker and a clinic lecturer. Few states have escaped his homespun oratory, which brought the house down on many occasions.

After his retirement, Howard was active in other endeavors. He served as state chairman of the South Carolina Heart Fund drive, was roasted several times on behalf of the Multiple Sclerosis Society, and was active in selling the Kickoff Publication out of Knoxville, TN.

Howard kept his hands in football as he served as the chief recruiter for the Gray squad in the annual Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, AL. The Blue squad recruiter was Don Faurot, who opposed Howard in the 1949 Gator Bowl.

Howard has also been inducted into the Helms Foundation Hall of Fame in San Francisco, CA, is an honorary member of the National Athletic Trainers Association, and is a member of the Hall of Fame of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. Clemson University also honored Howard once more with the presentation of the Clemson Medallion, which is the highest public honor bestowed by the Clemson University to a living person who exemplifies the dedication and foresight of its founders. Howard was a charter member of Clemson's Ring of Honor at Memorial Stadium in 1994 as well.

Neely's influence and inspiration is still present today as the IPTAY Scholarship Club was founded during his coaching tenure. IPTAY is the lifeblood of the

Clemson Athletic Department. It provides funds for athletic scholarships and capital improvements.

Thousands of athletes have benefited through the IPTAY Scholarship fund since its inception in 1934. That first year of IPTAY, Neely and his staff convinced 160 people to pay \$10.00 a year to Clemson, for a grand total of \$1,600 (not bad during the middle of the great depression).

Neely was head coach at Clemson from 1931 through 1939 and spent the next 26 years at Rice University in Houston.

Neely coached Clemson to its first bowl game, the 1940 Cotton Bowl, where the Tigers capped a 9-1-0 season by beating Boston College, 6-3.

Clemson ended the season ranked 12th in the final Associated Press poll, its first top 20 season in history. Boston College was ranked 11th going into the game and it was Clemson's first win over a top 20 team in its history. The team featured the play of Banks McFadden Clemson's first Associated Press All-American. Clemson had a 43-35-7 record during Neely's tenure.

Neely coached Rice to four Southwest Conference Championships and six bowl appearances, the last being a trip to the Bluebonnet Bowl in 1961.

During 40 years of college coaching he compiled a record of 207-99-14. Neely is still 12th in

college football history in victories by a Division I-A coach heading into the 2003 season. For his accomplishments, he was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1971.

Neely graduated from Vanderbilt in 1924, after lettering three years in football and serving as captain of the 1922 football team. He coached a year of high school football before returning to his alma mater to obtain a law degree. But he never practiced law.

He coached four years at Southwestern College in Clarksville, TN and then went to the University of Alabama in 1928. It was there that he met Frank Howard. Neely brought Howard to Clemson as line coach in 1931. Howard replaced him in 1940 and remained as head coach for 30 years. In 1967,

Neely returned to his alma mater as athletic director. He officially retired in 1971, but continued to coach golf at Vanderbilt until 1981, when he moved back to Texas.

"If I didn't look in the mirror every day, I wouldn't know how old I am," Neely once said. "Working with the boys makes you feel young, I feel that in athletics the boys learn a sense of loyalty and sacrifice and values they don't learn anywhere else.

"They learn to compete and that is what life is all about—it's competition.

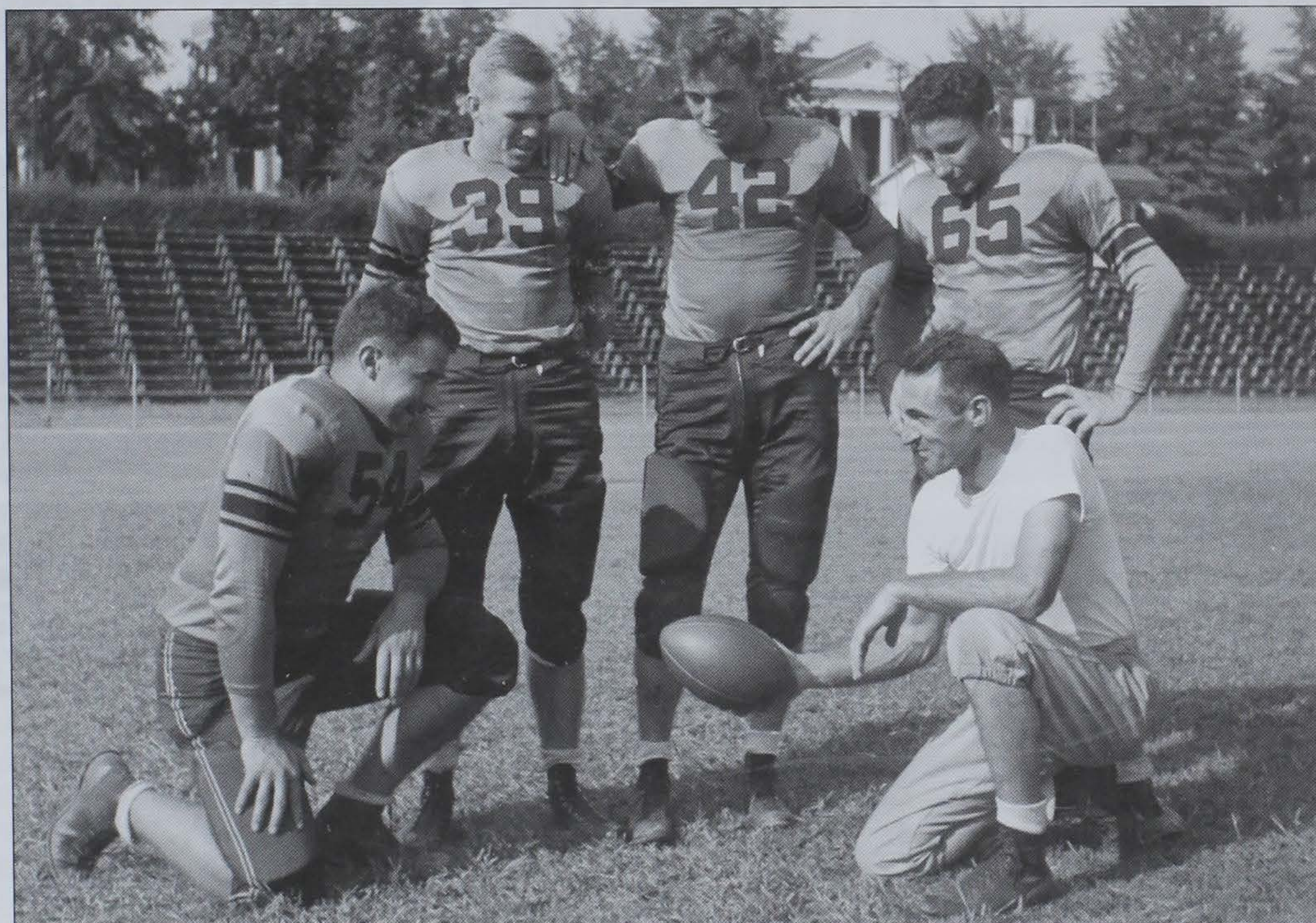
"If they make good in football, chances are they'll be successful elsewhere. I like to see that those boys make something of themselves. That is my reward.

"The boys go to college to study and get that degree. Playing football is a side activity. When fellows go to a school first to play football they get an entirely wrong sense of values.

"And when you start them off with the wrong sense, it isn't difficult for them to go astray."

"He was a cool, southern gentlemen, but he worked us like dogs. The workouts were always twice as hard as the games," said Dick Maegle. "There were no superstars, no victory that was better than all the other victories. To him football was a team game and we were all team players." Maegle was the player tackled in a famous episode in the 1954 Cotton Bowl, when frustrated Tommy Lewis of Alabama came off the bench to stop a certain touchdown. Rice won that game, 28-6.

Neely died at the age of 85 in 1983, but his landmark accomplishments in the 1930s at Clemson contributed significantly to Clemson's outstanding football tradition.

A name synonymous with not only the early years of Clemson football but the collegiate game is John Heisman.

A stern disciplinarian, he expected his players to be of high character and performance both on the football field and in

the classroom.

Heisman coached the Tigers in 1900-1903 and was responsible for putting the Clemson name among the annals of the great early collegiate teams.

Heisman was brought to Clemson by a professor and later University President, Walter Riggs. In the spring of 1894, Riggs was a graduate manager for the Auburn football team, and he was responsible for finding a coach for the 1895 season. Riggs wrote to Carl Williams of Pennsylvania, captain of the 1894 football team, asking him to suggest a suitable coach. He replied recommending J.W. Heisman, an ex-Penn player, and his coach at Oberlin a few years earlier.

After several weeks, Riggs finally found Heisman in Texas, where he was engaged in raising tomatoes. Having sunk about all of his capital into the tomato venture, he was glad to go back to his old love of football and he readily went to coach at Auburn for \$500.00 a year. Riggs later was hired as a professor at Clemson and he hired Heisman at Clemson in 1900. (Riggs started the Clemson football program in 1896 and was head coach in 1896 and 1899).

Heisman began his coaching career at Oberlin in 1892 and lasted 36 years in the profession. His career included positions at Akron, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson, and Rice University. He had an overall career record of 185 wins, 70 losses, and 17 ties.

He invented the hidden ball trick, the handoff, the double lateral, and the "flea flicker." He pioneered the forward pass, and originated the center snap and the word "hike" (previously the center used to roll the ball on the ground to the quarterback).

Heisman took Clemson to a 19-3-2 record in his four seasons. His .833 winning percentage is still the best in Clemson history. He was also the Clemson baseball coach between 1901-1904.

Clemson was a powerhouse during his tenure and was a most feared opponent. His secret was that he depended on smart, quick players rather than large size and brawn.

William Heisman, a nephew of John Heisman, often told a story on how his famous uncle stressed academics.

"I remember a story Coach Heisman used to tell me about this famous football player he confronted in the locker room before a big game. My uncle came busting through the door and went over to this guy and said, 'You can't play today because you haven't got your grades up to par.' The player looked up at my uncle and said, 'Coach, don't you know that the sportswriters call this toe on my right foot the million-dollar toe?' My uncle snapped back right quick and said, 'What good is it if you only have a fifteen-cent head?'"

Another favorite Heisman story was the speech he used to make before a season began. Heisman would face his recruits holding a football. "What is it?" he would sharply ask. Then he would tell his players, "a football is a prolate spheroid, an elongated sphere - in which the outer leather casing is drawn up tightly over a somewhat smaller rubber tubing." Then after a long pause he would say, "better to have died as a small boy than to fumble this football."

Heisman broke down football into these percentages: talent 25 percent; mentality 20 percent;

aggressiveness 20 percent; speed 20 percent; and weight 15 percent. He considered coaching as being a master-commanding, even dictatorial. "He has no time to say 'please' or 'mister', and he must be occasionally severe, arbitrary, and something of a czar."

On Nov. 29, 1900, Clemson defeated Alabama 35-0, which allowed Heisman's team to finish the season undefeated with a 6-0 record. This was Clemson's first undefeated team and was the only team to win all of its games in a season until the 1948 squad went 11-0. The Tigers only allowed two touchdowns the entire 1900 season.

Clemson opened the 1901 season with a 122-0 win over Guilford. The Tigers averaged 30 yards per play and a touchdown every minute and 26 seconds. The first half lasted 20 minutes, while the second half lasted only 10 minutes. Legend has it that every man on the Clemson team scored a touchdown in this game.

In his third season, on November 27, 1902, Clemson played in the snow for the first time in a game against Tennessee. The Tigers won the game, 11-0, and claimed the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association crown. (This early conference had several southern colleges and universities as members).

In his final season in 1903, Clemson defeated Georgia Tech 73-0 on October 17. Clemson rushed the ball 55 times for 615 yards, while Tech ran the ball 35 times and collected 28 yards. The second half was shortened to 15 minutes.

On November 24, 1903 Clemson participated in its "First Bowl Game." Clemson and Cumberland met on this date for the Championship of the South. The contract for the game was drawn up two weeks before the game was to be played. Cumberland who had earlier defeated Auburn, Alabama, and Vanderbilt was considered to be champion of the southern states of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, and Kentucky. Clemson was considered to be the best team in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. The game was played on a neutral site, Montgomery, AL. Cumberland and Clemson fought to an 11-11 tie. John Maxwell scored as a result of a 100-yard kickoff return. After the news came back to Clemson that the game ended in a tie, the students and the local townspeople built a bonfire and paraded around the campus.

John Heisman's 19-3-2 record is still the best in Clemson history on a percentage basis. The man who is honored each year with the awarding of the Heisman Trophy holds the distinction of building the early foundation of Clemson's football tradition.

A play documenting his career at Clemson will be performed on the Clemson campus this fall.

Usually when one gets out of the spotlight, his accomplishments soon fade and gather dust in some far off corner in the basement or attic. But not Banks McFadden.

Now in his 80s and living in retirement, Banks looks back with

many fond memories and Clemson fans remember him as probably the greatest natural athlete ever to play for the Tigers.

Although he brought great pride to Clemson with his athletic ability, and later with his coaching, McFadden says, "working with the athletes and working for the people whom we had here at Clemson...it's been a tremendous life. It's something I'll never regret and I couldn't have asked for things to be better."

For some of you in the 'Pepsi Generation' who might not have read your Clemson athletic history too well, let us do a little refreshing on the one called "Bonnie Banks."

- Was named All-American in both basketball (1938-39) and football (1939) the same calendar year.
- Was voted the nation's most versatile athlete (1938-39).
- Led Clemson to its first conference basketball championship (1939).
- Led Clemson to its first bowl game and victory (1940 Cotton).
- Won three events in the State Track Meet in one afternoon, setting records in all three of them. Earlier in the same year placed first in five events in a dual meet, scoring 25 points while the opposing team's total score was 28 points.
- Was Clemson's first 1st round draft choice (1939 Brooklyn Dodgers).
- Tied for the longest rushing play in Clemson history (90 yards vs. Presbyterian, 1939).
- Has the most punts for over 50 yards in a game (six vs. Tulane, 1939) and in a season (22 on 65 punts in 1939).
- Held Clemson punting record (43.5) for 40 years (1939 to 1979).
- First Clemson player invited to participate in the College All-Star game in Chicago.
- Charter member in the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame and Clemson Ring of Honor.
- Charter member in the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame.
- First Clemson player ever chosen for the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.
- Highest NFL draft pick in Clemson history (#4 in entire 1940 draft).

That's 14 of his more noteworthy accomplishments, and it would not take too long to dig out twice that many more. But those listed should be more than enough for the average sports enthusiast to be impressed.

Banks played one year (1940) of pro football with the old Brooklyn Dodgers and led the NFL in yards per carry, but he didn't care at all for the big city life. Grass felt better under his feet than pavement so he returned 'home' and joined the coaching staff of Coach Frank Howard.

Banks coached the defensive backs for one year (1941) before joining the Army Air Corps and spending four years in North Africa and Italy. He was discharged as a colonel. He recalls that "after the war, everything began to blossom out" as far as college football was concerned.

One thing that 'blossomed out' was his marriage to "Aggie" Rigsby of Manning. As it appears sometimes with former athletes, former backs produce girls and he and "Aggie" had four of them - Patsy, Lil, Marcia, and Jan. And the grand kids - there are nine of them - five boys and four girls. The McFaddens were married more than 50 years before she passed away in 2001.

McFadden came back to Clemson after his service and was again the secondary coach, this time for four seasons (1946-49), and then took over as head freshman football coach for five years before returning to coach defensive backs in 1955, a spot he held until Howard retired following the '69 season.

Besides his football coaching years, McFadden also put in a stint as varsity track coach, freshman basketball coach and was for 10 years the varsity basketball coach. Then after Howard resigned as

football coach in 1969, McFadden took over the university's intramural department, which he directed for 15 years.

Asked if he had any favorites, McFadden said: "Fred Cone was a very steady player. But I'm not so sure that Joel Wells wasn't the best all around football player that I had the opportunity to work with as a varsity coach. He was one of the best defensive players we had and a mighty fine offensive player. For somebody who could go both ways, Wells stood out.

"When I was in high school, colleges could do almost anything they wanted to as far as recruiting went," McFadden remembers. "Schools didn't have much (scholarship) money to give away, but they did go out and look at people and try to talk them into coming (to Clemson), paying their own way (or what is called a walk-on today.) But there wasn't very much recruiting until '35 or '36. But I believe there were 25 or 30 on my freshman team (1936) who were getting aid." (Note: The Clemson IPTAY Club was founded in 1934).

The Great Falls, SC native came to Clemson in a 6-3 frame and a skinny 165 pounds. Howard, an assistant coach at the time, said that if McFadden drank a can of tomato juice, they could have used him as a thermometer.

"I can remember the first time I saw him on the practice field," Howard recalled. "He looked like one of those whooping cranes. I thought sure as the devil that Coach Neely had made a mistake by giving this boy a scholarship. But he proved me wrong."

Clemson had required military when McFadden was playing, but he believes that was a plus. "We were so much a team then, and that is still there. But now the rules allow two different teams (offense and defense) and it causes so much more work. Our people were so close, as are the alumni of Clemson. Our team was just like the student body was then - a very close-knit bunch of people."

McFadden believes he, "came to Clemson at the right time. I was blessed to have some athletic ability," he recalled. "We had great coaches, had great individuals playing (with me), but we were all playing as a team."

Of all of the honors he received as an athlete, being voted the most valuable player of the 1939 football team was his highest. "To me, when your teammates vote you something," he beams, "then you feel pretty good. That award meant more than anything else (to me)."

This is one athlete where a one-page story in a football guide does not do that person justice...just about enough room for the tip of the iceberg. But if one could use just one word to describe 'Great' (as Howard called him), it would have to be 'competitor,' for he was just that.

McFadden is the only Clemson athlete to have both his football jersey and basketball jersey numbers retired. In 1995, the Banks McFadden Building at Jervay Athletic Center was dedicated in his honor.

There hasn't been another like him down the pike.

Fred Cone is living proof that recruiting services and all their accompanying hype aren't what they are cracked up to be. Cone was inducted into Clemson's Football Ring of Honor in the Fall of 1997, just the fourth Clemson football player in his-

tory to receive the honor.

But, he came to Clemson without having played a down of high school football. It is perhaps the most unusual story concerning an athlete's journey to Clemson. Cone was visiting his sister at Biloxi, MS, far from the haunts of his hometown, an obscure place called Pineapple, AL.

Unbeknown to Clemson Head Coach Frank Howard, Cone's sister lived next door to Howard's sister, Hazel, in Biloxi. On years when Clemson would play Tulane in New Orleans, Howard would send Hazel a pair of tickets. "One year she sent the two tickets back," Howard remembered, "and said she'd like to have four tickets because she wanted to take the next-door neighbor to the game."

That was in 1946, Cone's senior year in high school. After Cone graduated, Hazel wrote him a letter. "Brother, I have you a good football player, but he's never played football."

Howard recalled that he had told the Clemson registrar to save him 40 beds in the barracks and that Howard would turn in that many names on September 1.

"When Hazel wrote me about Fred Cone, I had 39 names on that list. So I just wrote 'Fred Cone' in as the 40th name. And that's how I got probably the best, if not the best, football player I ever had."

Cone graduated from Moore Academy in Pineapple and came to Clemson in 1947 as a freshman, but first-year players were not eligible to play then. It was probably best for Cone because he had not played high school football. He needed a year to get acclimated. When Cone became eligible for the varsity in '48, the football program took on a different air.

In the second game of his career, against N.C. State, Cone had the first of his eight 100-yard career rushing games, leading Clemson to an important victory. He was Clemson's top rusher (635 yards and seven TDs) that season, a regular season that saw

Clemson compile a perfect 10-0 record and an invitation to the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, FL against the Missouri Tigers.

Clemson ended up on the long end of a 24-23 game. Cone rushed for 72 yards and scored twice in the first quarter, but it was his effort on a fourth-down play that was the difference in the game.

Clemson held a one-point lead and faced a fourth-and-three at the Mizzou 45. It was either gamble for a first down, or punt and give Missouri another chance to score. As Howard would say later: "We hadn't stopped them all day so I took my chance with a running play."

Cone hit a stone wall at left tackle, but kept digging and slid off a little more to the outside, found a little wiggling room and mustered six yards and a first down at the Missouri 35. Clemson retained possession those few remaining minutes and ran out the clock. Years later Howard said it was the most memorable play of his 30-year career.

Despite a down year in '49, Cone gained more yards (703) rushing and scored more touchdowns (9) than his sophomore year. But, 1950 was to bring about another, undefeated season.

After the expected win over Presbyterian to start the season, Clemson faced preseason No. 17 Missouri on the road. Cone gained 111 yards in 21 attempts, one of three Tigers over the 100-yard mark that day.

In '50, Clemson scored 50 points in three games, but Cone saved his best until his last regular season game against Auburn.

Rumor had it that if Clemson scored over a certain number of points on Auburn that the Orange Bowl bid was in its pocket. The South Carolina Tigers took the Alabama Tigers, 41-0. Cone gained 163 yards, two shy of a five-yard average, and scored three touchdowns on the ground, and one on a 28-yard reception.

Icing on the cake this time came against Miami in the Orange Bowl. Although Sterling Smith's tackle of Frank Smith in the end zone for a safety brought a 15-14 victory Clemson's way, Cone gained 81 yards on the ground, scored once, punted four times and returned one kickoff. It put a great climax on Cone's career.

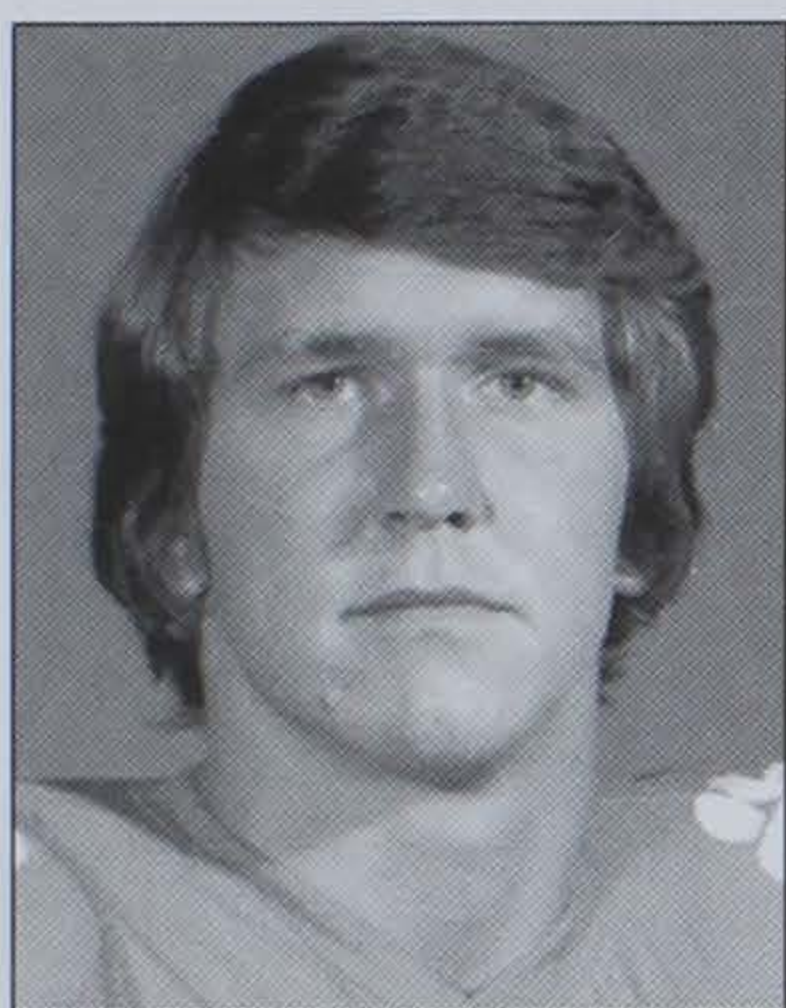
The 1948-50 era is the only time in Clemson history that has seen the Tiger football program record two undefeated seasons in a three-year period. Cone and Ray Mathews were the only common denominators in the starting lineup on those two teams.

Cone's senior season numbers, 845 yards rushing and 15 touchdowns, were school records at the time. He also set career records for rushing yards (2,183) and touchdowns (31).

A seven-year hitch with the Packers was so impressive that he was inducted into their Hall of Fame in 1974. One year he led the NFL in field goals. He was also a member of the Dallas Cowboys in their first year of existence in 1960. Later he returned to Clemson as its chief recruiter for 10 years beginning in 1961.

After Cone completed his Clemson career, Howard was still stumped as to how his sister could predict that her neighbor's brother would be such an outstanding football player. "He just looked so athletic jumping off of that diving board," Hazel said without skipping a beat.

Every once in awhile a truly well-rounded individual comes along.

Steve Fuller was a scholar, an athlete, and a fine representative of his community. That combination made him one of the most decorated athletes in Clemson

history and the reason he was inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor in 1994. He was also the first Clemson football player in history to have his jersey number (#4) retired.

Fuller, a native of nearby Spartanburg, South Carolina, graduated high school with a perfect 4.0 grade point average in a class of more than 800, crowning him class valedictorian. He had offers to play professional baseball out of high school and had basketball scholarship offers from Division I schools as well.

Right away Fuller produced a preview of what Clemson fans should expect from him over the course of the next four seasons. He was named ACC Rookie-of-the-Week in his first collegiate game, gaining 194 yards of total offense against the Tulane Green Wave. During his sophomore season, Fuller gained further recognition by being named ACC Back-of-the-Week after the Tennessee game. He was also named to the All-ACC Academic Team in 1976. •

Fuller demonstrated exceptional leadership during his junior and senior years, both on and off the field. Highlights on the field include leading the Atlantic Coast Conference in total offense for both

years and being selected twice as the ACC Player-of-the-Year, the only two-time selection in Clemson history.

Equally impressive were the team accomplishments, as Fuller quarterbacked Clemson to two consecutive Gator Bowls, Clemson's first bowl appearances in 18 seasons. In 1978 Clemson posted an 11-1 record and ranked sixth in the final AP poll, then the highest final national ranking in Clemson history.

Fuller earned the Gator Bowl Most Valuable Player Award during his senior season (1978). He was the South Carolina Amateur Athlete-of-the-Year during his junior season. The Atlanta Touchdown Club named Fuller the Back-of-the-Year in the South in 1978, and he was also named the South Carolina Player-of-the-Year during his junior and senior seasons.

At the conclusion of his senior season he was also an AP third-team All-American. Another great athletic feat for Steve Fuller included finishing sixth in the Heisman Trophy balloting, the highest finish for a Clemson athlete in history. Likewise, he set several Clemson records. It's no wonder he was a first round draft pick (23rd selection) by the Kansas City Chiefs.

He played 10 years in the National Football League and won a Super Bowl Championship ring with the Chicago Bears in 1985.

Off the field, Fuller illustrated his joint dedication to academics and community service. He was named to the All-ACC Academic Team for three years and twice named an Academic All-American, including a first-team selection during his senior season.

Fuller is one of just three football players in Clemson history to be named an on-field All-American

and Academic All-American in the same season. He majored in history (pre-law), which was not an easy route to take, and maintained a 3.93 grade point average. Fuller's constant push for excellence earned him an NCAA postgraduate scholarship, the Jim Weaver Award from the ACC, and one of the NCAA's Top Five Awards. Fuller delivered the acceptance response for himself and the four other winners.

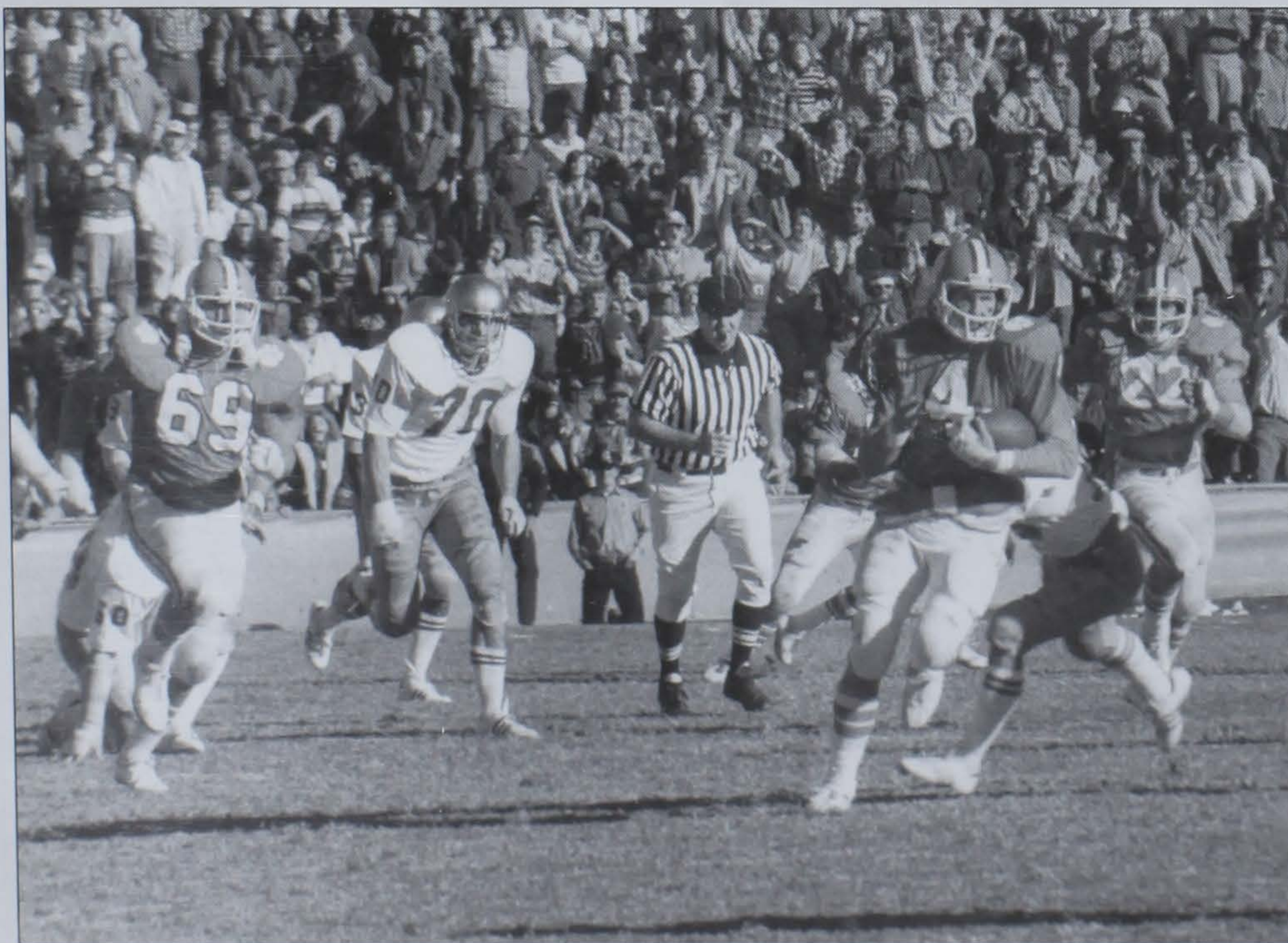
Fuller was also presented with the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Scholar Athlete Award, a double that only Kyle Young has accomplished since. His extracurricular activities included being a member of the Blue Key, Mortor Board, Tiger Brotherhood, Block "C" Club, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Phi Eta Sigma, Phi Beta Kappa, and Phi Kappa Phi.

Steve Fuller's honors may have collected dust once he left Clemson, but his fame did not. In 1979, he became the first football player and the second athlete in Clemson history to have his jersey (#4) retired. He also became a member of the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame and the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame. In September, 1994, Fuller was inducted into Clemson's Ring of Honor along with legendary coach Frank Howard and all-purpose back Banks McFadden.

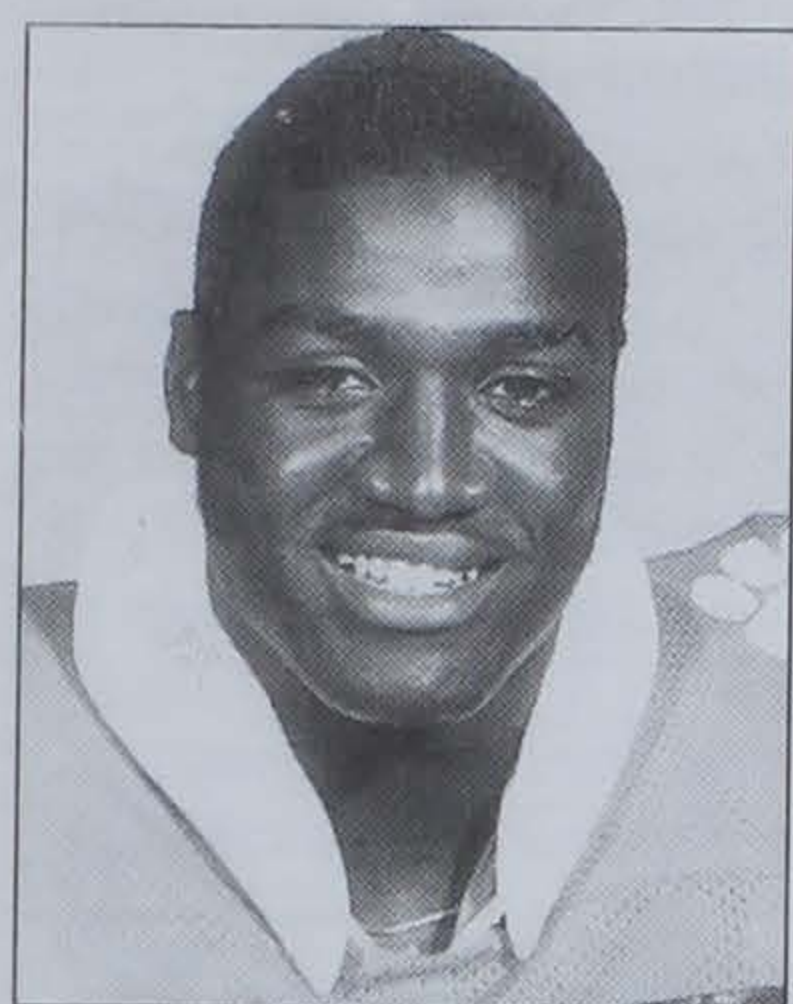
Now, Clemson has bestowed another honor upon the former Tiger quarterback great. On April 6, 1996, the Clemson Centennial Team was announced and Fuller was the starting quarterback for this team. In 2002 he was named one of the 50 greatest players of the ACC's first 50 years.

He left behind a legacy that few can dare to touch. No doubt, Steve Fuller remains one of the greatest student-athletes in Clemson history, regardless of sport.

Fuller became the first football player in Clemson history to have his jersey retired. He was also inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor in 1994.

Even though Clemson's football heritage is over 100 years old, it does not take long to determine the most significant accomplishment in the program's history - the 1981 National Championship. And, along the same lines, it does not take long

to single out the most significant team leader of that great accomplishment - Jeff Davis.

When examining Davis' contributions to Clemson athletics in terms of leadership, citizenship, and athletic records and awards, it is no surprise that he became just the fourth member of Clemson's prestigious Ring of Honor prior to the opener of the 1995 season.

The native of Greensboro, NC registered a then Clemson record 175 tackles in leading the Tigers' 1981 defense that set a school record for turnovers forced (41) in a single season. He still holds the Clemson career record for caused fumbles (10) and recovered fumbles (8), and his 24 tackles against North Carolina in 1980 rank second in school history.

He played 40 games for Clemson between 1978-81 and had 469 career tackles, 16 passes broken up, 18 tackles for loss, four sacks and four interceptions. He started all 35 games for the Tigers between 1979-81. He was a model of consistency, having registered at least double figures in tackles in 22 of his last 23 games. Overall, he had 30 double figure tackle games in his 40-game career and led the Clemson team in tackles 25 times.

"It is hard to express my feelings on being inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor," said Davis. "This honor should be spread among my coaches and teammates and all of Clemson who had an impact on my life during my career. No one receives an honor like this without help. I want to thank the good Lord for giving me the ability and the opportunity to come to Clemson."

For his accomplishments in 1981, Davis was named the MVP of the ACC, just the third defensive player in league history to win the award. He concluded the season in grand style with a 14-tackle performance in the 22-15 Orange Bowl win over Nebraska that clinched the National Championship for the Tigers, Clemson's first national championship in any sport. Davis was named the Defensive MVP of the contest.

At the conclusion of the sea-

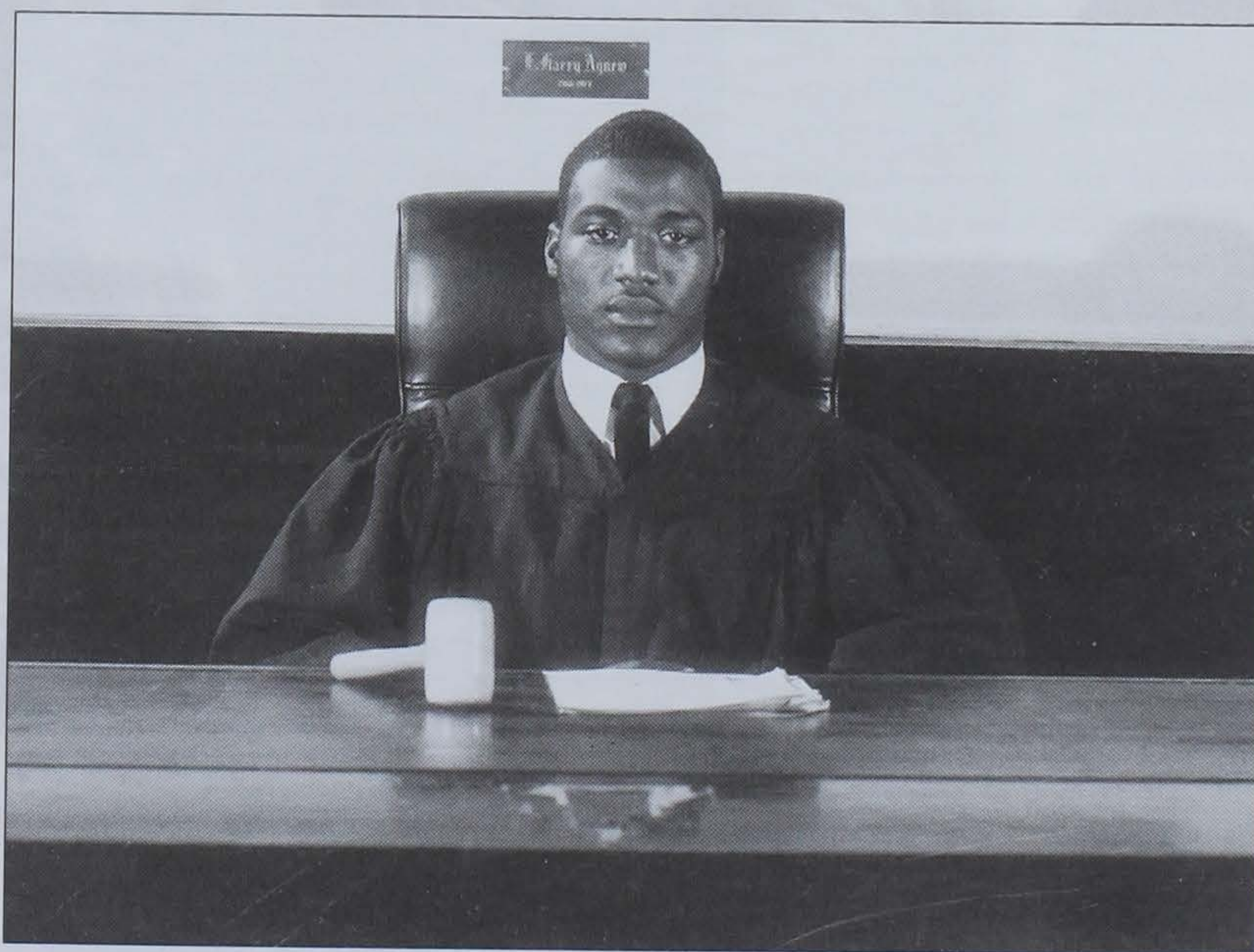
son, Davis was named a first-team All-American by United Press, the Football Coaches Association, the Football Writers Association, the Walter Camp Foundation and the Football News. He was named the Lineman-of-the-Year by the Atlanta Touchdown Club.

"We had purpose. We took everything one game at a time and did not get caught up in the chase for the National Championship. When we started the season, the championship was not a (realistic) goal. We were just coming off a 6-5 season in 1980 in which we all thought we could have done much better."

After clinching the ACC title with a win over Maryland and the state championship with a convincing victory against South Carolina in Columbia, Davis and his Clemson teammates prepared to meet fourth-ranked Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl, a game that would determine the National Championship.

"We just knew we were going to win that night," reflects Davis, who was nicknamed "The Judge" by then Assistant Sports Information Director Kim Kelly. "I think the first possession of the game was the key because they fumbled and William Devane recovered the ball. That led to a score and that was something we had been doing all year, forcing turnovers and taking over the game. That just told us that this game was not going to be any different than any of the others."

Perry Tuttle, Davis' roommate for four seasons and also an All-American on Clemson's 1981 National Championship team, recalls that season and Davis' passion for the game. "When we were in the room at night he would talk about the defense and what it was going to do until I fell asleep," remembers Tuttle. "As the season went on we just started dreaming about what could happen with this team and as we went along everything started to come true."

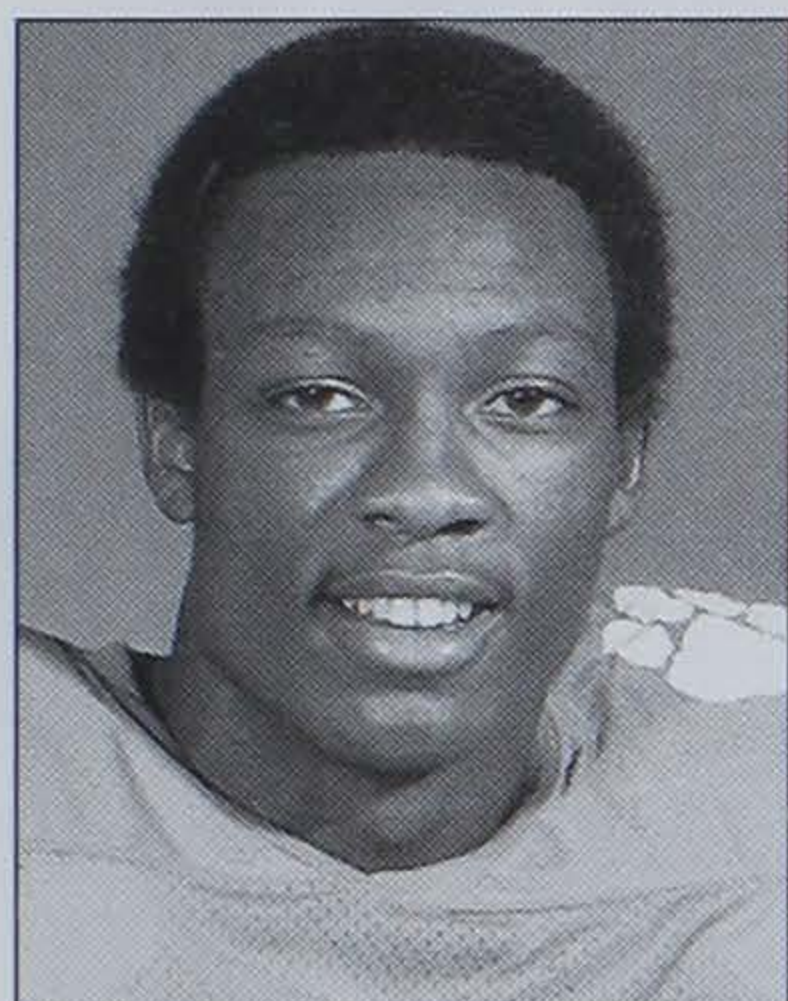
Davis was a fifth-round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1982, but proved the NFL scouts wrong by posting impressive numbers during his six-year NFL career. The inside linebacker played in 83 games, 72 as a starter between 1982-87. He led the Buccaneers in tackles in three of the six years, including a career-high 165 stops in 1984. Davis served as the team captain for four seasons as well.

Davis has been just as successful in life after football. In the Spring of 1999 he returned to Clemson as field director of the Call Me Mister Program within the Department of Education, Health and Human Development. In April of 2001, he received the "Use Your Life Award" from Oprah Winfrey's Angel Network for his work in the Call Me Mister Program. He and his wife Joni graduated from Clemson on the same day in 1984 and they are the parents of four daughters and twin boys, who were born in June of 1995.

Today, Davis works at Clemson in a dual role. He still represents the Call Me Mister program as a spokesman, and also works in the athletic department as an assistant athletic director in fundraising. He will have a key role in raising the funds for the West Endzone Project.

"One of my main goals in life is to touch the lives of other people and touch them in a positive way. Any time you receive an award like this it means you've been surrounded by great people. I want to thank all the people at Clemson, because no one receives an honor like this without help. I am proud to say I am a Clemson graduate and that I represented the University. Hopefully, I have had as positive an impact on them as they have had on me."

Coaches from all over the ACC area gathered for the North-South All-Star game in Columbia, SC in late July of 1975. The game, which is now played at Myrtle Beach in December, was the final high school event of the year and a final

showcase for soon-to-be first-year freshmen.

Ninety percent of the participants were highly recruited signees from the previous February who were ready to join Division I schools from all over the Southeast. But, at one juncture of the game a wide receiver who had not signed a football scholarship with any school took over the game.

Jimmy Kiser, a future ACC assistant football coach, threw a pass over the middle to a wide receiver named Jerry Butler of Ware Shoals High School. Butler turned on the speed and raced untouched 70 yards for a score. The college coaches, who were not familiar with the track star, took notice and collectively asked, "Who is that guy?"

That included the Clemson coaches. Much to their glee, they discovered by the end of the evening, that Jerry Odel Butler was in fact coming to Clemson....on a track scholarship.

Butler went on to star at Clemson, earning first-team AP All-America honors, and leading Clemson to uncharted team accomplishments. In 1999, Butler became the sixth member of the Clemson Football Ring of Honor, the highest honor accorded a Tiger gridder. He was named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary team in the fall of 2002.

Whatever the means of his sojourn to Clemson, the school has certainly been a better place because of Butler's attendance. A diligent student who earned his degree in 1980, Butler is a standard for wide receivers and Clemson players regardless of position.

Statistically, Butler's accomplishments are countless. He was a model of consistency, as shown by his 36-game streak of making at least one reception, a streak he set between 1976-78, a record that is still in tact today. He concluded his career with 139 receptions for 2,223 yards and 11 touchdowns, a 16-yards per catch rate. All those figures are still in the top five in Clemson history. Butler set the Clemson single game reception yardage record with 163 against Georgia Tech in 1977. His 58 catches in 1978 stood as a record until 1997.

The honors certainly followed, especially after his senior year. Butler appeared on the Bob Hope Christmas Special in 1978 thanks to his selection to the Associated Press All-America team, the only first-team AP All-America receiver in Clemson history.

While Clemson fans will always remember his considerable statistics and honors, one play stands out. At South Carolina in 1977, Clemson trailed the Gamecocks 27-24 in the final minutes. The Tigers

needed a victory to clinch a Gator Bowl berth, a selection that would be Clemson's first bowl invitation since 1959.

Steve Fuller, also a member of Clemson's Football Ring of Honor, quarterbacked Clemson to the South Carolina 20 yard-line. With just 49 seconds left, Fuller lofted a ball to the right corner of the endzone toward Butler. Using every ounce of his exceptional athletic ability, Butler made a leaping backwards diving reception, giving Clemson a 31-27 victory.

That season, that game, that catch, launched the Clemson program on a 20-year run that saw Clemson return to the national rankings, bowl selections, ACC Championships and a National Championship. Many Tiger supporters wonder how fate would have dealt the Clemson program had Butler not made that catch.

Given these heroics at Clemson, Butler was taken as the #5 selection of the entire 1979 NFL draft by the Buffalo Bills franchise. That is still the second highest draft choice by a Clemson football player in history, only a #4 selection of former Tiger great Banks McFadden in 1939 is higher.

Unlike his first season at Clemson, Butler did not sneak up on anyone. He had dreamed of playing in the NFL and wasted little time, signing a pro contract just six days after the draft, the first first-round draft pick to sign that year.

Butler made Buffalo's front office look smart, as he set NFL rookie records for touchdown receptions (4) and reception yardage (255) in a 1979 contest against the New York Jets. "That was the best single game performance I've ever seen from a wide receiver," said NBC broadcaster and former NFL quarterback John Brodie. "I played the game for 16 years, but I've never seen anything like that."

Butler ended his rookie year with 48 receptions for 834 yards and four scores and was named the AFC Rookie of the Year by the **The Sporting News**. The following year he increased his reception total to 57 for 832 yards and was named

to the Pro Bowl. By the end of his nine-year career with Buffalo, Butler had 278 catches for 4,301 yards and 29 touchdowns. He missed two seasons due to knee injuries, 32 games that certainly could have enhanced his career numbers.

After his years at Clemson, Butler took community service to another level at the professional level. In 1981 and 1982 he was named the Bills NFL Man of the Year. He was one of five finalists for the award nationally in 1981. In 1983 he was honored with the "Jackie Robinson Award" for community service by the YMCA of Greater Buffalo. In 1986 he was a finalist for the Byron "Whizzer" White Award for outstanding community service from the NFL Players Association.

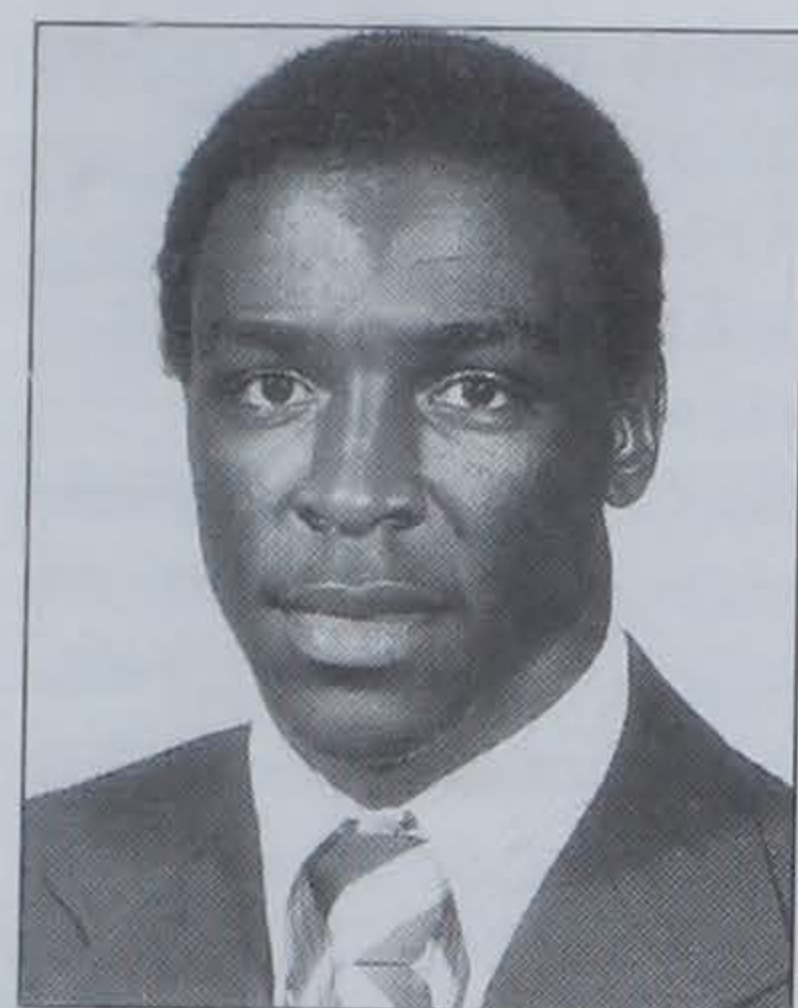
In 1987 he received the "Salute to Young Leaders Award" from the YMCA of Greater Buffalo Area. Two years after he retired, he was honored with the Ralph C. Wilson Distinguished Service Award.

Upon completion of his career in 1987, Butler became Director of Player/Alumni Relations for the Buffalo Bills, a position he held until 1999 when he became assistant coach with the Cleveland Browns. He is currently working in the front office for the Browns.

Terry Kinard is the most decorated football player in Clemson history. Those honors grew in 2001 when he is inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame and the Clemson Ring of Honor.

Kinard was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in December of 2001 at the annual National Football Foundation ceremonies in New York City. He was also honored at the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, IN in August of 2002.

Kinard, who played for the Tigers from 1978-82 and was named National Defensive Player-of-the-Year by CBS Sports as a senior, was just the second Clemson player in history to be honored by the College Football Hall of Fame, the first since Banks McFadden in 1959.

Ironically, Kinard burst on the national scene in South Bend against Notre Dame in 1979. Starting as a freshman, Kinard had two fourth-quarter interceptions and seven tackles overall to lead Clemson to a 16-10 victory over the Irish. Twenty-two years later, he was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame, which is located just two miles from Notre Dame Stadium.

"This is a dream come true," stated Kinard. "It is something you don't expect, but when it does happen you are thrilled. It is a great honor when you consider that only one other Clemson player has been named to the Hall of Fame. To be alongside a

legend like Banks McFadden means a great deal to me."

"Clemson gave me the opportunity. I was very fortunate, I could not have picked a better place to go to school. I played with a lot of great players at Clemson, especially guys on our defense like Jeff Davis, Jeff Bryant and many others. I certainly could not have made it to the Hall of Fame without the great players we had at Clemson at that time."

"I also have to thank Coach (Danny) Ford and the other coaches. I especially have to thank Coach Willie Anderson, who recruited me. Years later he gave me the opportunity to go to Oklahoma and serve on his (high school) coaching staff. He impressed upon me the importance of finishing my degree, which I did (from Langston University in Oklahoma). It has made a world of difference. I am sure it made a difference in me getting into the Hall of Fame. He cared about me many years after I left Clemson and it says a lot about him and the people at Clemson."

A native of Sumter, SC, Kinard was a first-team Associated Press All-American in 1981 and 1982, the only two-time first-team AP All-American in school history. He was in fact a unanimous selection in 1982, the only unanimous first-team All-American in Clemson history.

Kinard recorded 17 interceptions during his Clemson career, still the high mark in school history and second in ACC history. He ranked in the top 15 in the nation in interceptions in 1981 and 1982 and was a major reason Clemson had a combined record of 21-1-1 over those two years. Clemson's defense ranked in the top 10 in the nation in scoring defense each year. He was Clemson's second leading tackler on the 1981 National Championship team

and led the 1982 squad that finished eighth in the final Associated Press poll.

At the conclusion of his Clemson career in 1982, Kinard was chosen in the first round of the NFL draft by the New York Giants, and was the 10th overall pick of the draft. He played seven years for the Giants, including in the team's 1986 Super Bowl Championship season. Kinard was named to the NFL All-Rookie team in 1983 and the Pro Bowl in 1988.

Since his retirement from football, Kinard was named to **Sports Illustrated's** All-Century team of college football. In 2000, he was named Clemson's top player of the 20th Century by **CNN.com**. He was also chosen to the **USA Today** All-Decade team for the 1980s. In 1996, he was named to Clemson's Centennial Team and received more votes than any other defensive player. In 2003, he was named one of the 50 greatest male athletes in ACC history and was named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary team.

"Terry Kinard was a dominating player because he was a great tackler who also could break on the ball and make the interception," said Danny Ford, who was Kinard's Head Coach his entire career at Clemson. "I haven't seen a player who could dominate a game from the secondary like he could. He covered a lot of ground, he made a coach feel secure about the secondary."

"He had the ability to be a dominant player from the time he was a freshman. You don't see a lot of freshmen safeties take over a game in Notre Dame Stadium, but he did that when we defeated Notre Dame in 1979."

"When you look at what Terry Kinard accomplished individually at Clemson and what Clemson did as a team during his career, you can see that he is most qualified to be in the College Football Hall of Fame."



Kinard was inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor in November, 2002 and the College Football Hall of Fame in December, 2001.

Back • 1956

Clemson quarterback 1954-56...captain of the 1956 team that won the ACC title and played Colorado in the 1957 Orange Bowl...Academic All-ACC in 1955 and 1956...third-team

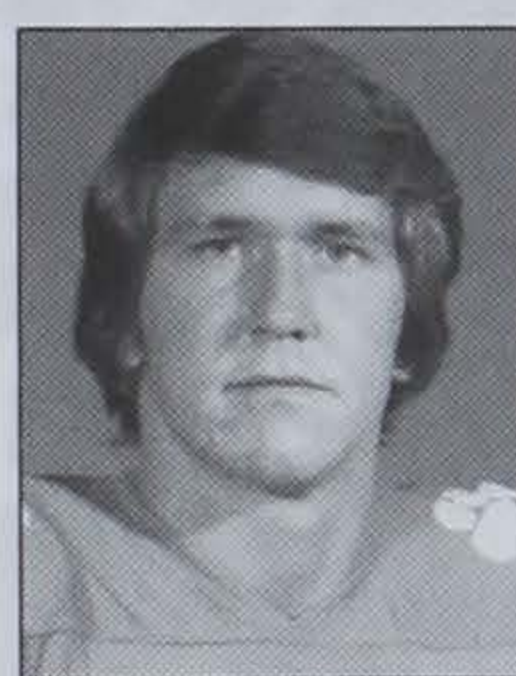

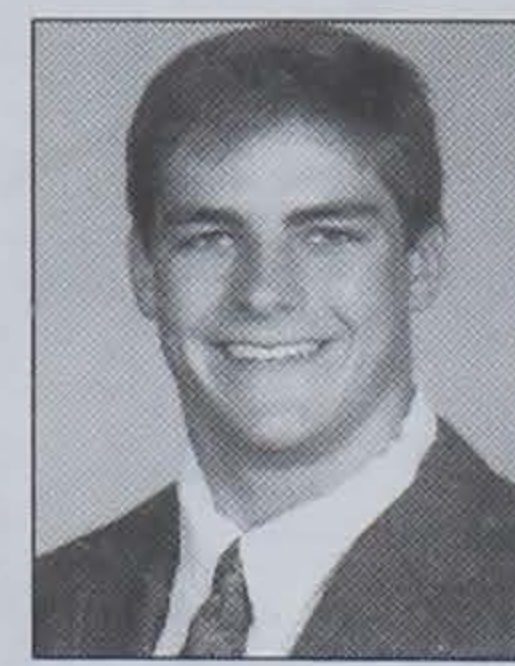

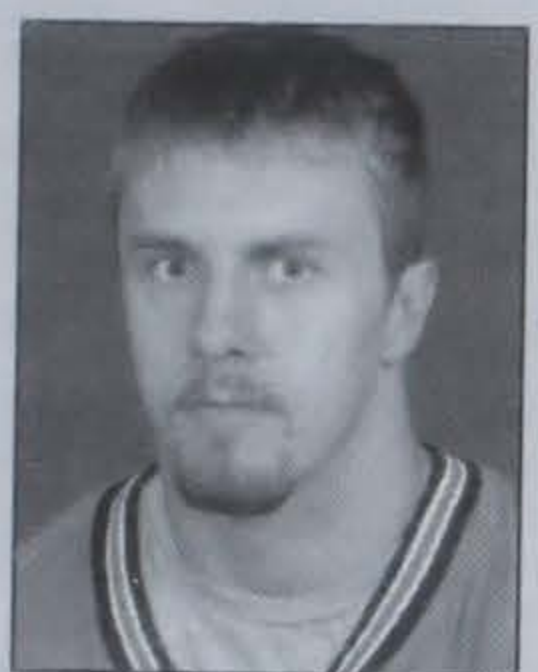

Wayne Mass Offensive Tackle • 1966

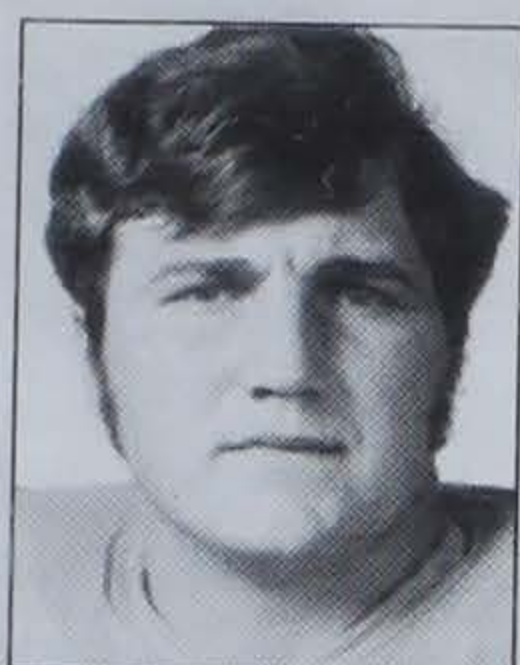

Walter Riggs • 1896-99

Walter Riggs could easily be called the father of Clemson Football. He coached the football program at Clemson, not only because he had football experience, but he was also one of only two people on the Clemson campus to have ever seen a football game when the sport started in 1896. (The other person was Frank Thompkins who played in the backfield on Clemson's first team in 1896).

On September 30, 1896, a small crowd gathered in one of the barrack's rooms and the group discussed the feasibility of organizing a football association. A committee of three was appointed to consult Professor Riggs as to management of a football team and to ask his aid as coach.

When the Tigers traveled to Furman for their first game on October 31, 1896, it was the first time that many of the players had ever seen a full-sized regulation football field.

Riggs stepped down as football coach after the first season because the players wanted him to devote all of his time to being a professor in the engineering department.

Clemson athletics and Riggs, however, could not be split. Although not given the title, Riggs also was the equivalent of an athletic director, managing money and making contracts with other teams.

Riggs could easily be called a loyal man, as he answered the need of the Clemson football team again in 1899. The Clemson Athletic Association was low on money and could not afford to hire a coach. So Riggs once again answered the call of the school and became the coach in 1899 for free.

Riggs originally came to Clemson from Auburn. He graduated with top honors in 1892 with a B.S. degree in electrical and mechanical engineering. At Auburn, he was captain and catcher of the baseball team as well as the manager and left end of the football team. He also served as class president and was the director of the Glee Club.

Upon his graduation at Auburn, he was assistant to the president of the college until 1896, then he made his trek to Clemson.

Riggs later became president of Clemson on March 7, 1911 and in 1915, a new football stadium with other athletic facilities was named in his honor as Riggs Field. It is currently the home of the Tiger soccer team. In two years of coaching, Riggs guided the Tigers to a career record of 6-3.

W. M. Williams • 1897

Clemson's second coach, W.M. Williams, was a native of West Point, GA. He played at Auburn on the teams of '94, '95, and '96, under the coaching of John Heisman. He was considered the best blocking halfback in the south.

Williams led Clemson to the state championship and to a 2-2 season. During his time as coach, Clemson played two games in three days. Clemson was victorious over the Charlotte Y on October 23, but lost to North Carolina 28-0, on October 25.

John Penton • 1898

The Tigers' third coach, J.A. Penton of Alabama, was captain and starting guard on the University of Virginia teams of '93, '94, and '95. Penton also played fullback at Auburn in '97 under John Heisman's coaching. Under Penton, Clemson won 55-0 over Bingham in its first home game, as W.C. Forsythe kicked every point after touchdown (11). In his only season at Clemson, Penton guided Clemson to a 3-1 record and the state championship.

John Heisman • 1900-03

Probably one of the most famous football coaches in America, John Heisman, coached at Clemson from 1900 to 1903. Heisman turned Clemson from virtually an unknown college to a southern powerhouse at the turn of the century.

Heisman attended Brown University, taking the two-year law course offered at that time, and was a center on the football team. In the fall of 1889, he transferred to the University of Pennsylvania. He lettered in football at both schools and graduated from Pennsylvania in 1893.

In the spring of 1894, Walter Riggs was a graduate manager for the football team at Auburn. It fell on his shoulders to find a coach for the season of 1895. Riggs wrote to Carl Williams, the Pennsylvania captain of 1894, asking him to suggest a suitable coach. He replied recommending J.W. Heisman, an ex-Penn player, and his coach at Oberlin.

After several weeks, Riggs finally found Heisman in Texas, where he was engaged in raising tomatoes. Having sunk all of his capital into the tomato venture, he was glad to return to his old love. He readily went to coach at Auburn for \$500 a year.

His coaching career began at Oberlin in 1892 and lasted 36 years. It included positions at Akron, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington

& Jefferson, and Rice University. He had an overall career record of 185 wins, 70 losses, and 17 ties.

John Heisman invented the hidden ball trick, the handoff, the double lateral, and the "flea flicker." He pioneered the forward pass, arguing that it would scatter the mob. Heisman also originated the center snap and the word hike (previously the center used to roll the ball on the ground to the quarterback).

Heisman guided Clemson to its first "bowl game" in 1903, when Clemson and Cumberland met on November 26 for the championship of the South. Cumberland, who had earlier defeated Auburn, Alabama, and Vanderbilt, was considered to be champion of the southern states of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, and Kentucky. The game was played on a neutral site, Montgomery, AL. Cumberland and Clemson fought to an 11-11 tie. After the news got back to Clemson that the game was a tie, the students and the local townspeople built a bonfire and paraded around the campus.

Overall, Heisman took Clemson to a 19-3-2 record in his four seasons. His .833 winning percentage is still the best in Clemson history. He was also the Clemson baseball coach in 1901-1904.

Shack Shealy • 1904

Shack Shealy holds the distinction of being the only Clemson player to have coached his alma mater. Shealy lettered at Clemson from 1896-99, and later played two years at Iowa State. Shealy was a four-year starter playing right guard, end, and in his senior year, he played in the backfield. Shealy only coached Clemson one year in 1904, and guided the Tigers to a 3-3-1 record overall, which included wins over Alabama, Georgia, and Tennessee.

Eddie Cochems • 1905

Ed Cochems lettered at the University of Wisconsin in 1899, 1900, and 1901. Cochems was described as a great halfback or end on the strong Wisconsin teams at the turn of the century, including the undefeated team of 1901. During his playing career, he had a 100-yard kickoff return in a 35-0 win over Chicago in 1901, and had four touchdowns in a game against Notre Dame in 1900. After his playing days, he immediately went into coaching. He was the head coach of North Dakota in 1902 and 1903 and served briefly as an assistant with former teammate, Art Curtis at Wisconsin in 1904.

Cochems led Clemson to a 3-2-1 record over-

all, including wins over Georgia and Auburn. After his Clemson career, he was head coach and athletic director at Saint Louis University in 1906. After the forward pass was legalized in 1906, Cochems did something with the pass at once in his first year at Saint Louis, while other coaches stuck with the running game. He taught his players not to throw the ball end-over-end, but instead like a projectile - a spiral. He called this new weapon a projectile pass.

In 1906, Saint Louis went undefeated rolling up 407 points while allowing its opponents only 11.

Historians credit Cochems as being the first coach to use and perfect the first legal pass in a game. The first studied refinements in throwing the ball, which led to the spiral, occurred in 1906 under Cochems. Brad Robinson of Saint Louis University threw the first forward pass to Jack Schneider in a game played September 5, 1906 in Waukensha against Carroll College.

Bob Williams • 1906,09,13-15

Bob Williams is probably the only coach in the country to have coached football at two schools that are involved in rivalry. Williams coached football at both Clemson and South Carolina. Before coming to Clemson, he coached at Davidson in 1905. He coached at South Carolina for two years and guided the Gamecocks to a 6-1 record in 1902 and an 8-2 slate in 1903.

During his South Carolina career, he administered the most unexpected defeat of Clemson, as he beat a heavily favored Heisman team, 12-6 in 1902.

Williams served the Tigers as head coach a total of three terms 1906, 1909, and 1913-15. Between the years of 1915 and 1926, Williams practiced law in Roanoke, VA, and was the city's mayor.

One of the highlights of his career included leading the 1906 team to an unbeaten season (4-0-3), which included wins over Georgia, Auburn, Tennessee, and a Heisman-coached Georgia Tech team.

Frank Shaughnessy • 1907

Frank Shaughnessy was known for his ability as an administrator in sports, as he served many positions, from a pro hockey coach to the commissioner of the International Baseball (Triple A) League.

A graduate in law at Notre Dame, he was captain of the baseball and football teams his junior and senior seasons. After his graduation in 1905, he

coached baseball at Notre Dame. The summer before coming to Clemson he played for Ottawa of the Eastern League. That summer, he played left field and had a .352 batting average. He also played with Washington and the Philadelphia A's.

At Clemson he coached the baseball teams in 1907 and 1908, and was head football mentor in 1907, posting a 4-4 record.

During his lifetime, Shaughnessy made his name in baseball, but he took part in many other sports. Besides being a sports legend at Notre Dame, he managed the Ottawa Senators of a professional hockey league and coached football teams at Clemson, Washington and Lee and McGill University. He retired as the president of the International Baseball league.

During his playing days, in a game against Kansas, Shaughnessy ran 107 yards for the only Irish score as Kansas won the game, 24-5. Football fields were 110 yards back then and touchdowns were five points. This is still a Notre Dame record.

John Stone • 1908

John Stone is one of three coaches to have graduated from Vanderbilt and later become a Clemson head football coach. At Vanderbilt, he was a member of the All-Southern Football team for four years. He was a big man for his time, standing 6'2". Clemson was 1-6 in 1908, but the Tigers lost many of their star players and substitutes from 1907 due to a college prank that saw 306 students expelled from school.

Frank Dobson • 1910-12

Frank Dobson was a professional baseball player before coming to Clemson as he was the property of the Pittsburgh Nationals. Walter Riggs, President of the Clemson Athletic Association, thought it was unfair to keep shuffling coaches year after year. Riggs offered Dobson a three-year contract, which was the first contract offered and signed by a Clemson coach.

At Clemson, he coached football, basketball and baseball. He was Clemson's first basketball coach, leading Clemson to its only undefeated season (4-0) in history in the inaugural season (1911-12). In 1912-13, Clemson finished the basketball season with a 9-5 record. He was head baseball coach in 1911-1913.

Wayne Hart • 1916

Wayne Hart coached Clemson in 1916 and led Clemson to a 3-6 finish. Under Hart, the Tigers defeated state rivals Furman and South Carolina.

Hart played three years at tackle for Georgetown. He also played one year at George Washington. He was a member of the All-South Atlantic team for four years. He was also an assistant coach at Georgetown. In 1913, he coached the Washington Vigilants, a professional football team, and did not lose a game. The last two seasons before arriving at Clemson, he coached various sports at Technical High School in Washington, D. C.

Edward Donahue • 1917-20

Edward Donahue had to be one of the most organized men in the country. During the 1918-19 school year, Donahue was head coach of four Clemson sports: football, basketball, baseball, and track. During his four-year career at Clemson, he was basketball and baseball coach for two seasons, and head track coach for one season.

Donahue was an outstanding athlete at Washington & Lee, as he played in the backfield on the football team and played catcher on the diamond. Upon graduation, he was an assistant in football and was the head baseball and basketball coach.

E.J. Stewart • 1921,22

E.J. Stewart was head football coach for two years at Clemson, 1921-22. However, he coached more than one sport during his stay at Tigertown. In the spring of 1921, Stewart coached the baseball and track teams while conducting spring football practice. In the fall, Stewart's football team went 1-6-2, but he improved to a 5-4 slate in 1922. He went on to coach the track teams in 1922 and 1923.

Stewart played football, baseball, basketball and ran track at Western Reserve University in Ohio. Upon his graduation, he played, organized and served as head coach in Ohio of the Massillon, Ohio Professional football team.

He also coached at Nebraska and the University of Texas. At Nebraska, he led the Cornhuskers to a combined record of 11-4 in 1916-1917. They also won the Missouri Valley Conference title both seasons. After leaving the University of Nebraska, he entered the automobile business as President and Treasurer of the Stewart Motor Co. Because of

the economic conditions at the time, he decided to go back into coaching.

Bud Saunders • 1923-26

Bud Saunders graduated from Missouri in 1911, with a bachelors degree in Law. At Missouri, he played football and basketball. He wanted to play two other sports, but a conference rule forbid an athlete from participating in more than two sports.

Saunders was football coach at Knox College before coming to Clemson. In football, Saunders coached for four seasons, 1923-1926. He also coached the basketball teams in 1924 and 1925. His best season in football came in 1923, as he led the Tigers to a 5-2-1 slate.

Josh Cody • 1927-30

Josh Cody, fondly known as "big man," will always be a favorite to Clemson fans. Cody, a big man in stature at 6-2, 220 pounds, led Clemson to victories over South Carolina for four straight years. He is the only coach in Clemson history who has been around more than two years who never lost a football game to South Carolina. He also defeated Furman three straight years. Cody had a 13-0-1 record in home games and had a 72 percent winning mark overall, fourth best in Clemson history.

After a 5-3-1 start in 1927, Cody guided Clemson to two 8-3 seasons in 1928 and 1929. On May 6, 1929, to show appreciation, he was presented with a new buick by the alumni, student body and faculty. This presentation took place in front of Tillman Hall.

In his final season, 1930, the Tigers finished with an 8-2 record. Cody also coached basketball at Clemson for five years and guided Clemson to a 16-9 slate in 1930. During the 1928-30 seasons, he guided Clemson to a 22-4 mark at home.

Jess Neely • 1931-39

Clemson played in its first bowl game under Jess Neely in the 1940 Cotton Bowl. The Tigers, unknown at the time, became a household word after beating heavily-favored Boston College 6-3 in the Cotton Bowl Classic. Neely came to Clemson in 1931 and his recruitment of Banks McFadden brought Clemson to another level of competition. In 1938, Neely had Clemson at second place in the Southern Conference with a 7-1-1 record. In 1939, Banks McFadden became Clemson's second All-Ameri-

can, and the team concluded the season with a trip to Dallas for the Cotton Bowl. Neely left Clemson that spring and moved on to Rice, where he took that school to new heights. Neely is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame.

Frank Howard • 1940-69

Frank Howard succeeded Jess Neely in 1940 when Neely moved on to Rice. He got the job when he seconded his own nomination during a meeting of the president and athletic council. He signed a one-year contract, then lost the document, and never had another in his 30 years as head coach.

Howard graduated from Alabama in 1931, where he was a star lineman. He played in the 1930 Rose Bowl, then started his coaching career under Neely at Clemson in 1931, and was a part of a rebirth of Clemson football in the late 1930s. He was an assistant coach on Clemson's 1939 team that posted a 9-1 mark and beat Boston College 6-3 in the Tigers' first bowl game.

In 1940, he began his head coaching career with a bang as he won the Southern Conference championship, the first of eight conference titles Howard won in his coaching career.

Howard had his most successful season in 1948 when he took Clemson to an 11-0 record, the Tigers' first perfect season since 1900. The campaign included a Southern Conference championship, a Gator Bowl win over Missouri, and a number-11 final ranking. He nearly duplicated the feat in 1950 when he guided Clemson to a number-10 AP final ranking, a 9-0-1 finish and a 15-14 win over Miami (FL) in the Orange Bowl.

When he retired in 1969, Howard was the fifth winningest coach in the nation with 165 victories. He had 96 wins as an ACC coach, now second in conference history, and he captured six (five outright and one co-championship) ACC titles, a record Bobby Bowden broke in 1998. His teams appeared in six bowl games, 63 of his players were drafted by the NFL and 37 played in the league.

Howard, a native of Barlow Bend, AL, had six Top 20 seasons, won eight conference titles (two Southern and six ACC), won an even 100 conference games and was a two-time ACC Coach-of-the-Year. He coached 25 academic All-ACC selections and five Academic All-Americans. Eleven of his players were chosen on-the-field All-Americans.

Howard was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1989.

Hootie Ingram • 1970-72

Hootie Ingram will be best remembered as the coach who made the Tiger Paw famous. Before his first year as head coach in the summer of 1970, Clemson introduced the Tiger Paw as the official logo of Clemson University's Athletic teams.

Ingram graduated from the University of Alabama in 1955. He also received his master's in school administration from Alabama and later became Crimson Tide athletic director.

The native of Tuscaloosa, AL was an All-Southeastern Conference defensive back for the Crimson Tide his senior year.

Ingram had his best year at Clemson during 1971, with a 5-6 overall record. He also finished second in the ACC with a 4-2 league mark in 1971.

Red Parker • 1973-76

Red Parker coached at Clemson for four years. His 1974 team lived up to the theme "Excitement Galore, Clemson Football '74." It finished the season with a 7-4 record (6-0 at home), with wins over Georgia, Georgia Tech and South Carolina.

Before arriving at Clemson, Parker spent seven years at The Citadel from 1966-72. During this time, he guided the Bulldogs to a fine 8-3 finish in 1971.

Parker earned a BA degree in Physical Education from Arkansas A&M in 1953. Prior to his graduation, he earned three letters each in football, basketball and track, as a running back-defensive back, second baseman-shortstop, and sprinter.

Charley Pell • 1977,78

Charley Pell authored college football's Cinderella story in 1977.

The Albertville, AL product took a Clemson team that was 3-6-2 in 1976, and led the '77 Tigers to an 8-2-1 regular-season mark and a berth in the Gator Bowl. It was Clemson's first final top-20 season since 1959. He coached Clemson to a 10-1 regular season in 1978 before he left to become head coach at Florida. Clemson's 1978 team beat Ohio State in the Gator Bowl and finished sixth in the AP poll in his second year as Clemson's head coach.

He was a near unanimous choice as ACC Coach-of-the-Year in 1977 and 1978, the first coach,

regardless of sport, to win ACC Coach-of-the-Year honors in each of his first two years. A two-way starter and three-year letterwinner at Alabama, Pell was a member of the Crimson Tide's 1961 National Championship team.

He came to Clemson in 1976 and served as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. Pell passed away in June, 2001 after battling cancer.

Danny Ford • 1978-89

Danny Ford had an auspicious beginning to his head coaching career. He gained a 17-15 win over Ohio State in the 1978 Gator Bowl in a game shown on national television. The 30-year-old coach, youngest in Division I at the time, also defeated a college football legend in a contest that truly put Clemson football on the map as he beat Woody Hayes in the latter's last game. Ford had taken over the coaching reigns on December 10, 1978 when Charley Pell resigned to become head coach at Florida.

Ford kept things going in 1979 with wins over Georgia and Notre Dame and another trip to a bowl, this time the Peach Bowl. In 1981, he helped Clemson reach the summit of college football by winning the National Championship. His Tigers downed three top 10 teams during the course of the 12-0 season that concluded with a 22-15 victory over Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. Ford was named National Coach-of-the-Year.

The wins continued in 1982 and 1983, as Clemson had consecutive 9-1-1 years. Clemson finished in the top 12 in both years, and had a 30-2-2 record over a three-year period, best in the nation.

Clemson won three straight ACC titles under his guidance between 1986-88. In 1989, Clemson registered a 10-2 season and top 12 national ranking, the fourth straight season Clemson finished in the final AP top 20. He closed his career with a 27-7 win over West Virginia in the Gator Bowl, his sixth bowl win in eight tries and his fourth in succession.

Ford was the third winningest active coach in the nation on a percentage basis at the end of the 1989 season. He finished with a 96-29-4 career ledger at Clemson and remains one of only two coaches in ACC history with over a 75 percent winning mark (min. four years). He finished with a 76 percent winning percentage and five ACC titles, second only to Frank Howard's six crowns.

The 1969 Alabama graduate is still the youngest coach to win the national title, as he was just 33-

years-old when the Tigers shocked the college football world in 1981. He coached 71 first-team All ACC selections and 26 All-Americans. Forty-two of his former Tigers were drafted by the NFL, and he earned 18 wins over Associated Press top 20 teams during his career, more than any other ACC coach. Additionally, 11 of his former players won Super Bowl Championship rings. At one stretch his teams were ranked in the AP top 20 for 41 consecutive polls, a Clemson record.

Ford was an All-SEC selection and was also an All-SEC Academic choice at Alabama. He attended Alabama initially on a basketball/football scholarship but played only football after his freshman year. He played in three bowl games for Alabama. He served as head coach at Arkansas from 1994-97. He is now retired and living in Pendleton, SC.

Ken Hatfield • 1990-93

Ken Hatfield led the Tigers to a 32-13-1 record over his four year tenure, led the squad to three bowl appearances and an ACC Championship. With a victory over Illinois in the 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl, Hatfield became the first Clemson coach to win 10 games in his first year and his .833 winning percentage was the best for a first-year Clemson coach since 1900, when John Heisman was 6-0. That season included six wins over teams with winning records, more than any other team that year with the exception of National Champion Georgia Tech.

Hatfield was also just the eighth coach in the previous 13 years to take a team to a Top 10 AP final ranking in his first year with the program, as the Tigers finished the season ranked ninth in the AP poll. The Helena, AR, native would also lead the 1991 and 1993 teams to top 25-rankings. Clemson became the third school that Hatfield had coached to a Top-20 ranking, as his 1983 Air Force team ranked 15th and he led four Arkansas teams to top-20 rankings. Only six coaches in NCAA history have accomplished that feat.

Hatfield played for three years at Arkansas (1962-64) and was a starter on the 1964 National Championship team. The defensive back earned his fame as the nation's top punt returner in 1963 and 1964. He still ranks as the only college football player ever to finish in the top two in the nation in punt returns three straight years, as he finished second in 1962. He is now the head coach at Rice, where he took the Owls to an eight-win season in 2001.

Tommy West • 1993-98

Tommy West's five-year resumé as Clemson head coach included four bowl appearances, 12 road wins, 86 school records, and unparalleled academic excellence. West took Clemson to three straight bowl games between 1995-97, just the second Clemson coach in history to take the Tigers to bowl games in three straight seasons.

Academically, 61 Clemson football players made the ACC academic honor roll in his last four years, twice as many as the best previous four-year total in Clemson history. Each of the three highest single year totals took place under West's watch and the team had a 20-year team best cumulative GPA entering the 1998 season.

West took over the Clemson program on November 29, 1993 and less than a month later had a bowl victory on his ledger. The former Tennessee tight end, succeeded Ken Hatfield, who left the school four days after a victory over South Carolina to end the 1993 season.

It was West's second tour of duty with Clemson. He had been a linebackers coach under Danny Ford between 1982-89. Clemson was 69-20-4 and had six AP top 20 finishes in that eight-year era.

West coached the Tigers in the 1993 Peach Bowl, a thrilling 14-13 victory over Kentucky. He became the first coach in college history to gain victory in a bowl game in his first game without having coached the team in any capacity earlier in the year.

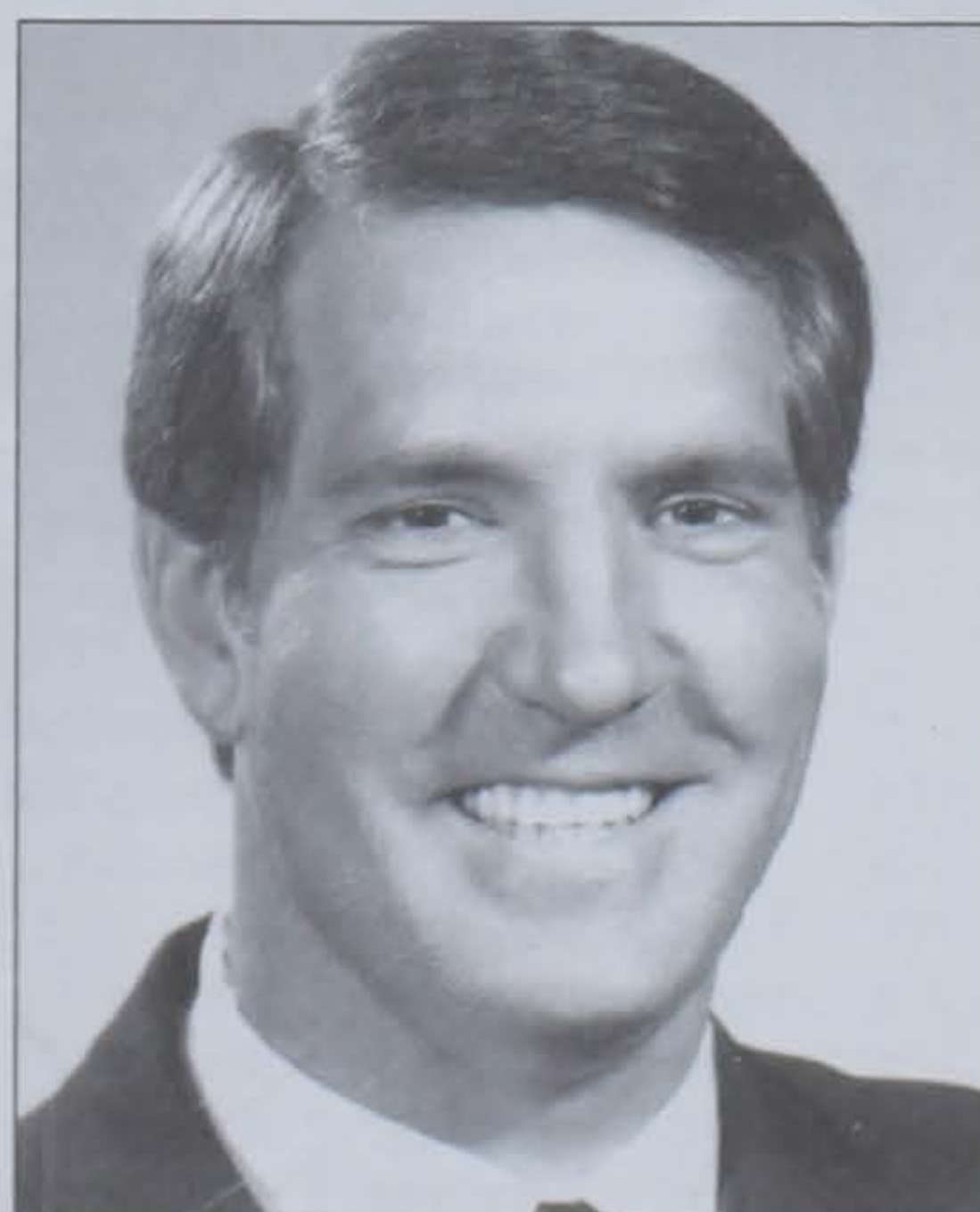
West's best season was 1995, as Clemson finished the regular season with five straight wins by 17 points or more, and was invited to the Gator Bowl. Clemson was ranked in the top 25 of every poll at the end of the 1995 regular season. That Clemson team was fourth in the nation in rushing.

West recruited some of the top players in Clemson history. The school ranked in the top 10 in the nation in NFL draftees in the 1998 and 1999 selection process and all 11 players were recruited by West. The list included three first-round defensive picks (Trevor Pryce, Anthony Simmons and Antwan Edwards). Clemson was the only school in the nation to have six defensive players drafted in 1999 and the only school to have a first-round defensive choice in 1997, 1998 and 1999.

The native of Gainesville, GA finished his career with a 31-28 record, and had four wins over top-25 teams. He is now the head coach at Memphis.

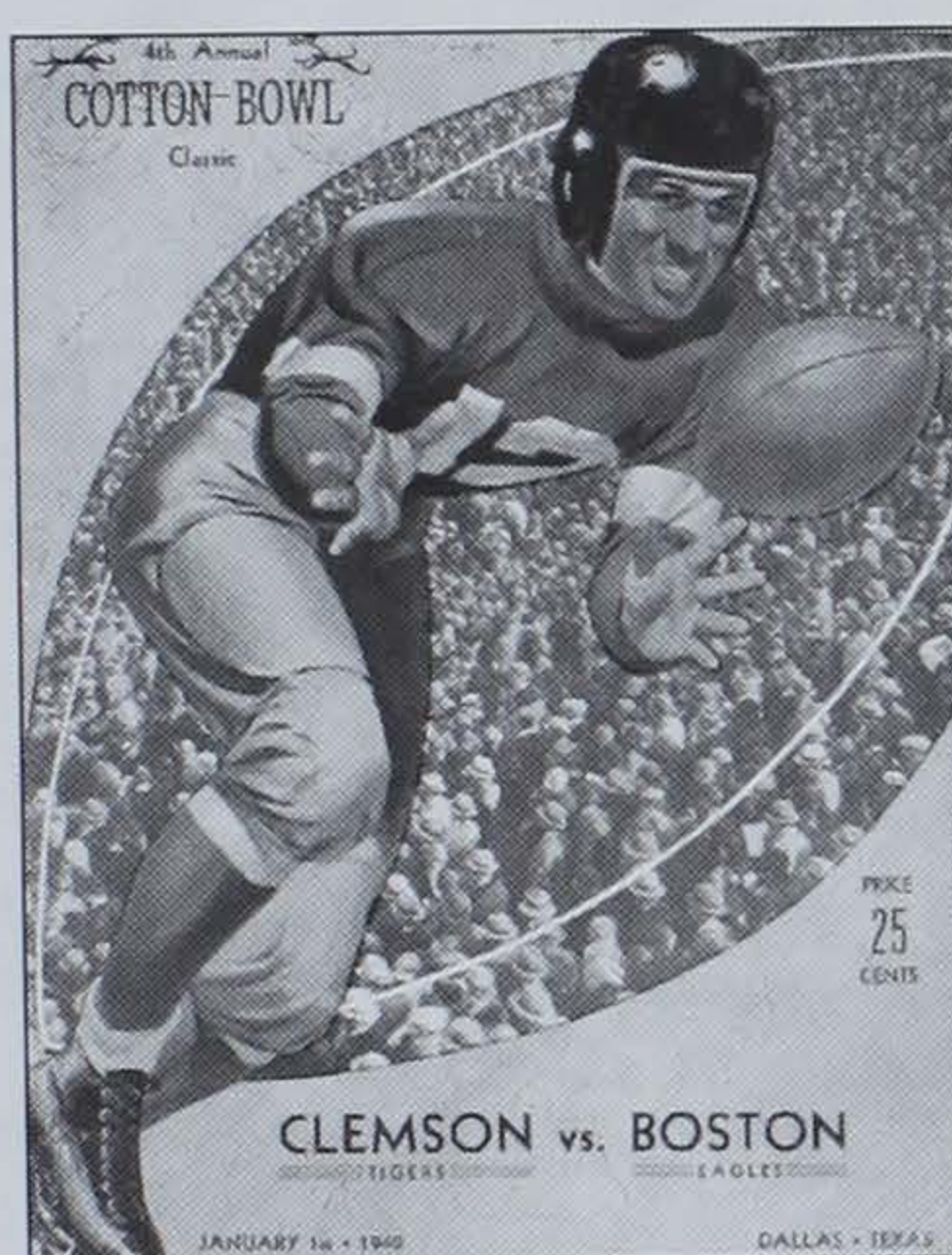
Jess Neely's last Clemson team won eight games in the regular season with just one loss to Tulane. The 8-1 Tigers were rewarded with an invitation to play Boston College in the fourth Cotton Bowl, but Clemson first had to get permission from the Southern Conference, which they immediately granted. The 1939 season not only resulted in Clemson's first bowl appearance, but also the Tigers' first first-team Associated Press All-American, Banks McFadden.

On the last play of the first quarter, Bru Trexler punted to Boston College's Charlie O'Rourke, who fielded the punt on the Clemson 40 and returned it to the 13. Two running plays lost 10 yards, but on third down Frank Davis gained six. Alex Lukachik then kicked a 34-yard field goal to put the Eagles up, 3-0.

Clemson's scoring drive began when McFadden returned a punt to the 33. Charlie Timmons rushed for 15 yards in two plays, and two plays after that, McFadden hit Wister Jackson with a 16-yard pass to the Eagle 20. Timmons ran the final 20 yards in three carries, but Shad Bryant missed the extra

point.

Later in the period, a 51-yard punt by McFadden started Boston College at its 20. The Eagles fumbled on first down and Clemson's George Fritts recovered at the 24. The Tigers could do nothing with the gift, however, as Joe Blalock fumbled after a short pass.



The game turned into a defensive struggle in the second half, although Boston College did penetrate deep into Clemson territory on two occasions. The Eagles took the opening kickoff to the Clemson 19, but a holding penalty and an incomplete pass ended the threat and BC was forced to punt.

Late in the game, the Eagles drove to the Clemson 11 yard line, but Bryant and McFadden each broke up two passes and

Clemson took over possession on downs.

McFadden effectively bottled up the Eagles other than those drives with his punting. His 44-yard average on 11 kicks, including two boots for 51 and 55 yards in the second half, prevented Boston College from getting good field position, and the Clemson defense made the 6-3 score stand.

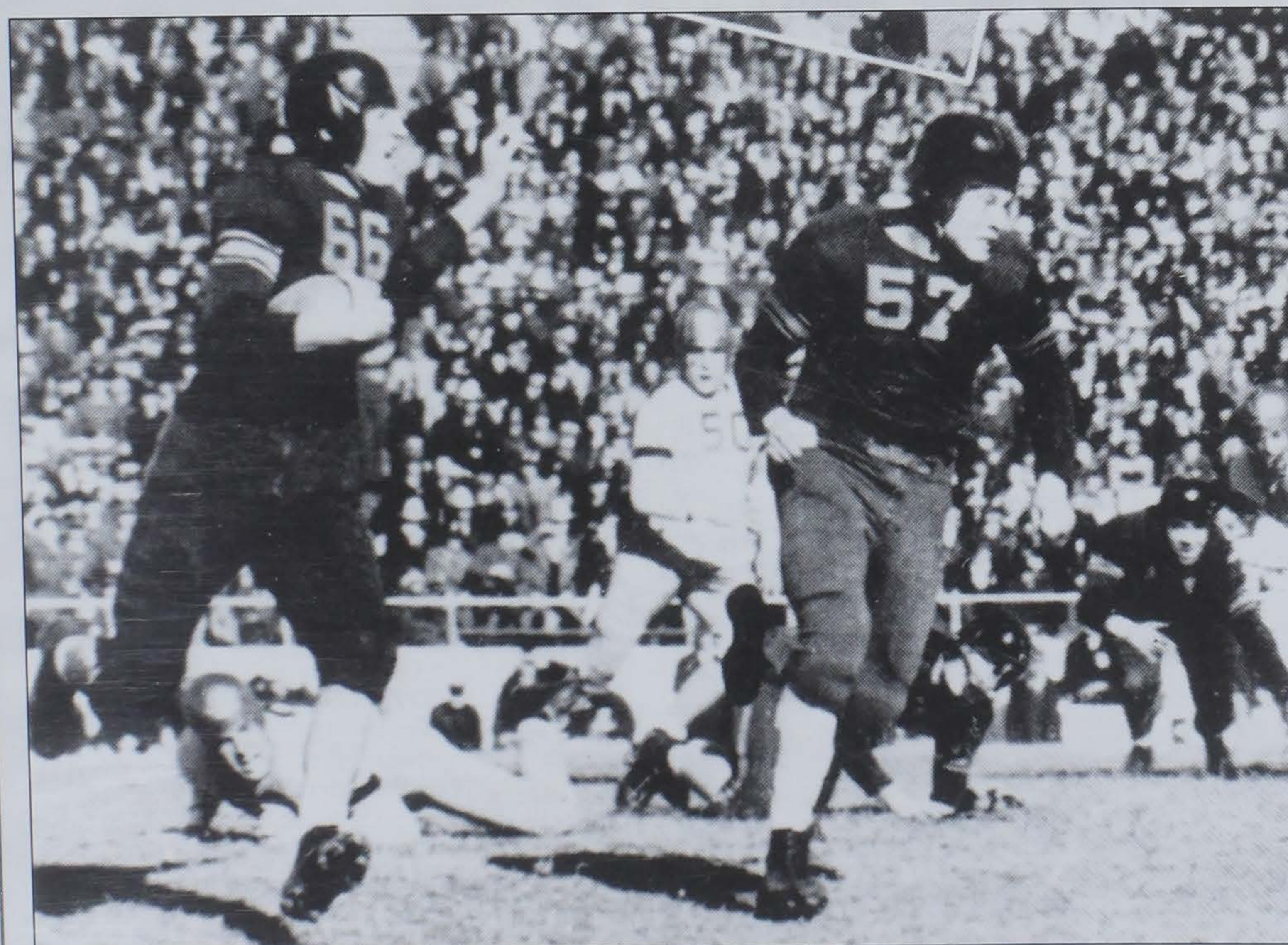

Clemson opened the 1948 season with a 53-0 shutout of Presbyterian in the Tigers' first-ever night home game and they closed the regular season with a 20-0 blanking of The Citadel in the first game played at the Bulldogs' Johnson Hagood Stadium.

In between, the Tigers shut out three more opponents and beat five others on the way to a 10-0 record, a ninth-place ranking in the polls, and an invitation to play Missouri in the fourth Gator Bowl.

Clemson kicked off, but three plays later Missouri fumbled and Clemson's Bob Martin recovered at the 19. A pass interference call gave the Tigers the ball at the one, and Fred Cone scored from there. Jack Miller added the point after and Clemson led, 7-0.

Ray Mathews recovered a Missouri fumble later in the quarter to give Clemson the ball at its 35. Mathews took the next play for 26 yards and five plays later Bobby Gage passed to Martin for 19 more. Cone scored for the second time from the one, and Miller's conversion gave the Southern Conference champs a 14-0 lead.

After a kickoff, Missouri launched an 80-yard drive to score its first touchdown. Harold Entsminger capped the 13-play march with a quarterback sneak from the two. Robertson Dawson added the seventh point.

Gage was intercepted on the next Clemson drive and Wilbur Volz returned the theft to the Mis-

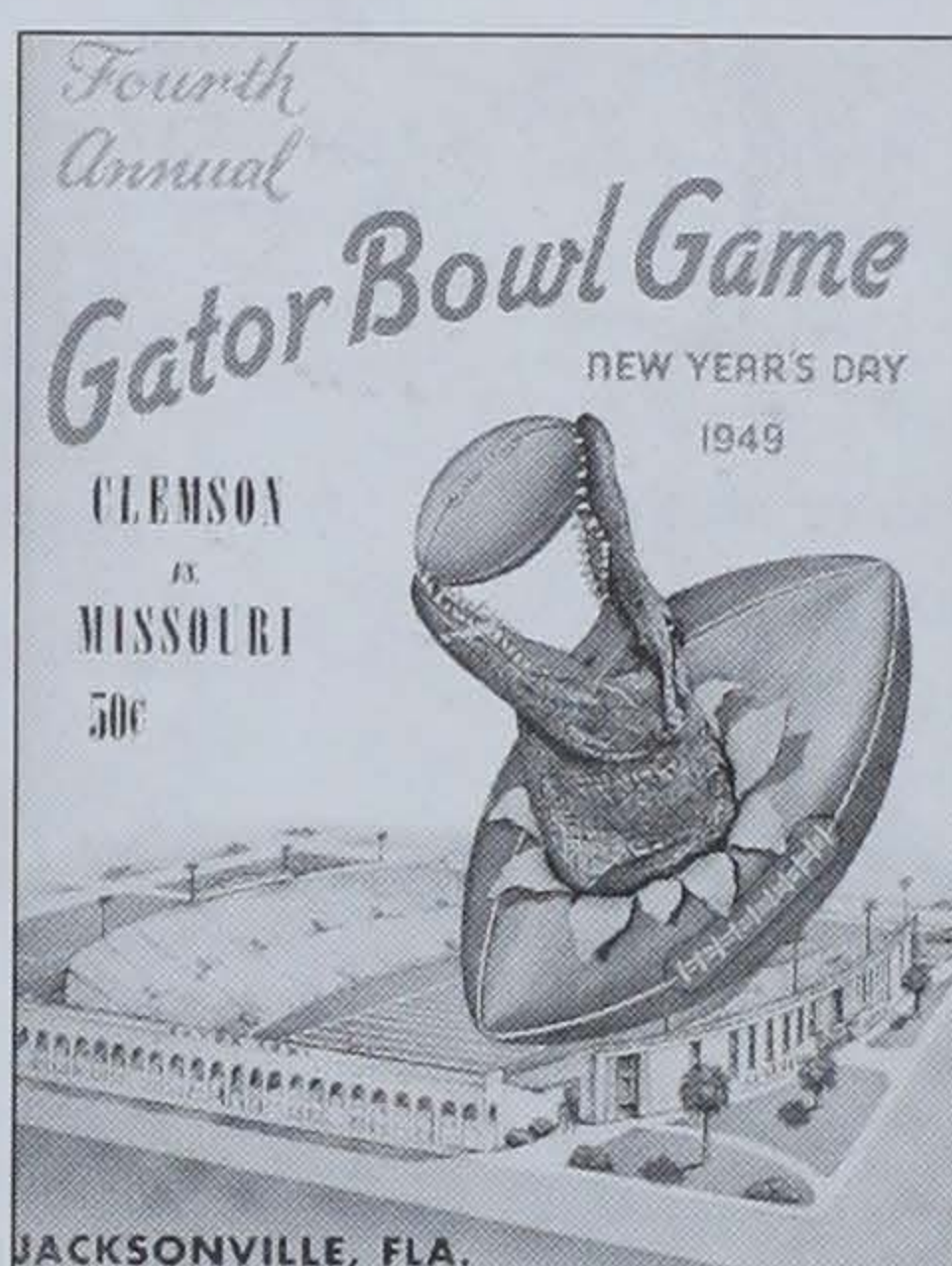
souri 46. Missouri kept the ball on the ground and Entsminger carried over from the one for the score. Dawson added his second point after and the game was tied up at 14.

Clemson took the second-half kickoff and used up six minutes of clock on the way to its third touchdown. Gage ran and passed for 19 yards on two separate plays and the Tigers scored on a flea-flicker pass from Cone to Gage to John Poulos in the end zone. Miller completed the 80-yard drive with his third PAT.

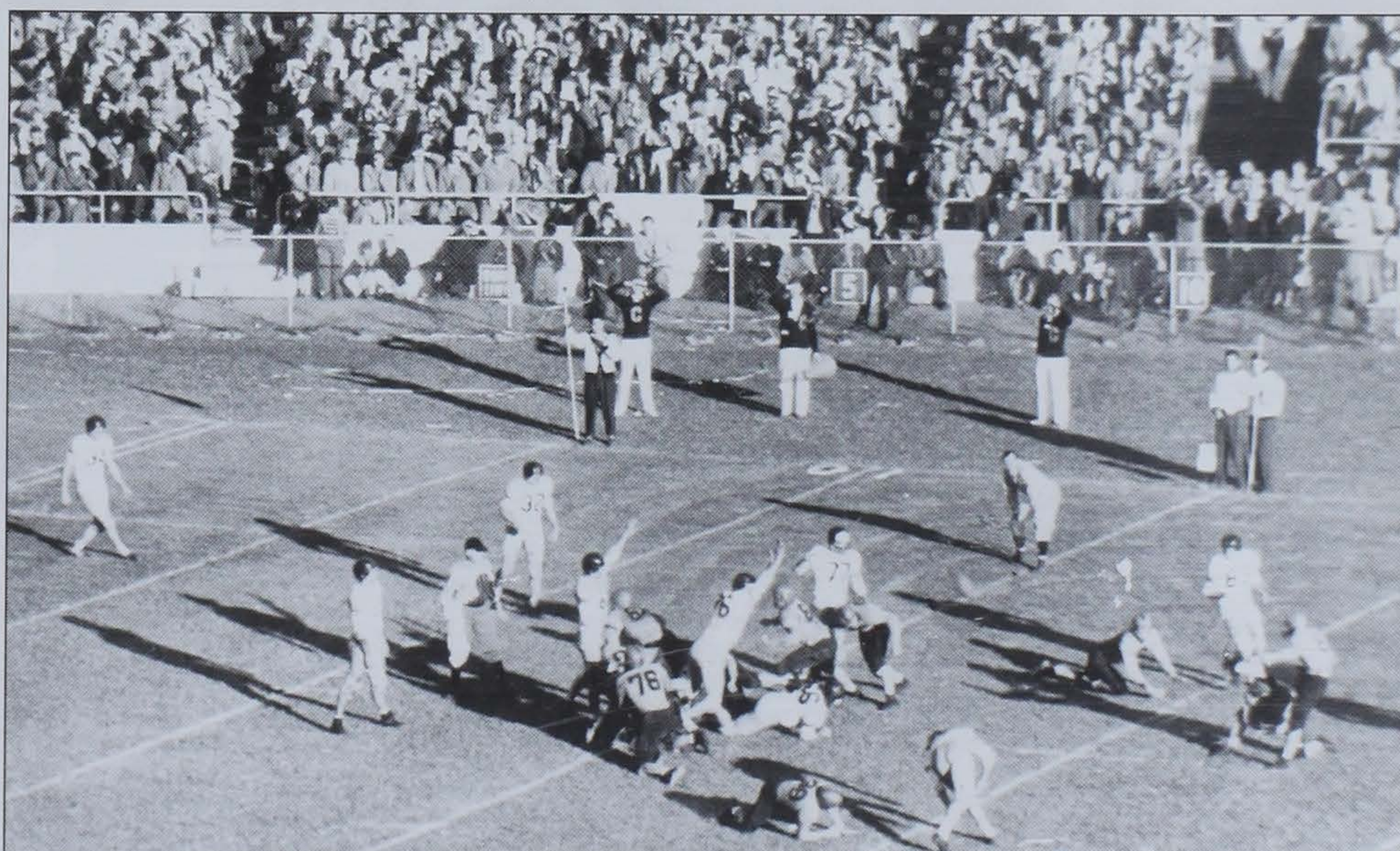
A Missouri punt rolled dead at the Clemson one, and after an incomplete pass, Gage threw a pass that hit the ground in the end zone and was ruled a safety. Clemson's lead was then cut to 21-16.

Clemson then launched an 11-play surge to the Missouri 12. With fourth-and-10, Miller kicked a 32-yard field goal that would prove to be the winning points.

Dave Ashley returned the kickoff to the Missouri 40, and seven plays later, halfback Richard Braznell passed to Kenneth Bounds for a 20-yard touchdown. Dawson added the point to bring Missouri within one point with five minutes left. (Two-point conversions were not a part of the game yet). Clemson took the kickoff and ran out the clock to preserve the win.



Jack Miller, with Jim Miller (no relation) holding, gave Clemson a 24-23 victory over Missouri in the 1949 Gator Bowl. It was Clemson's only field goal of the season and gave the Tigers a perfect 11-0 record.

Clemson's bid for a repeat of the 1948 perfect season ended when the Tigers had to rely on the toe of Charlie Radcliff to tie South Carolina after three season-opening shutouts. Clemson regrouped, however, with a 13-12 win at Wake Forest and then won the remaining four games by convincing margins. The Tigers' 8-0-1 mark and second-place finish in the Southern Conference earned them a bid to play Miami, who was also undefeated at 9-0-1, in the 17th Orange Bowl.

After a scoreless first quarter, Clemson got on track with a 45-yard pass from Billy Hair to Bob Hudson that put the Tigers at the Miami one. Fred Cone capped the 76-yard drive on third down with a sweep for the score and Radcliff tackled on the extra point.

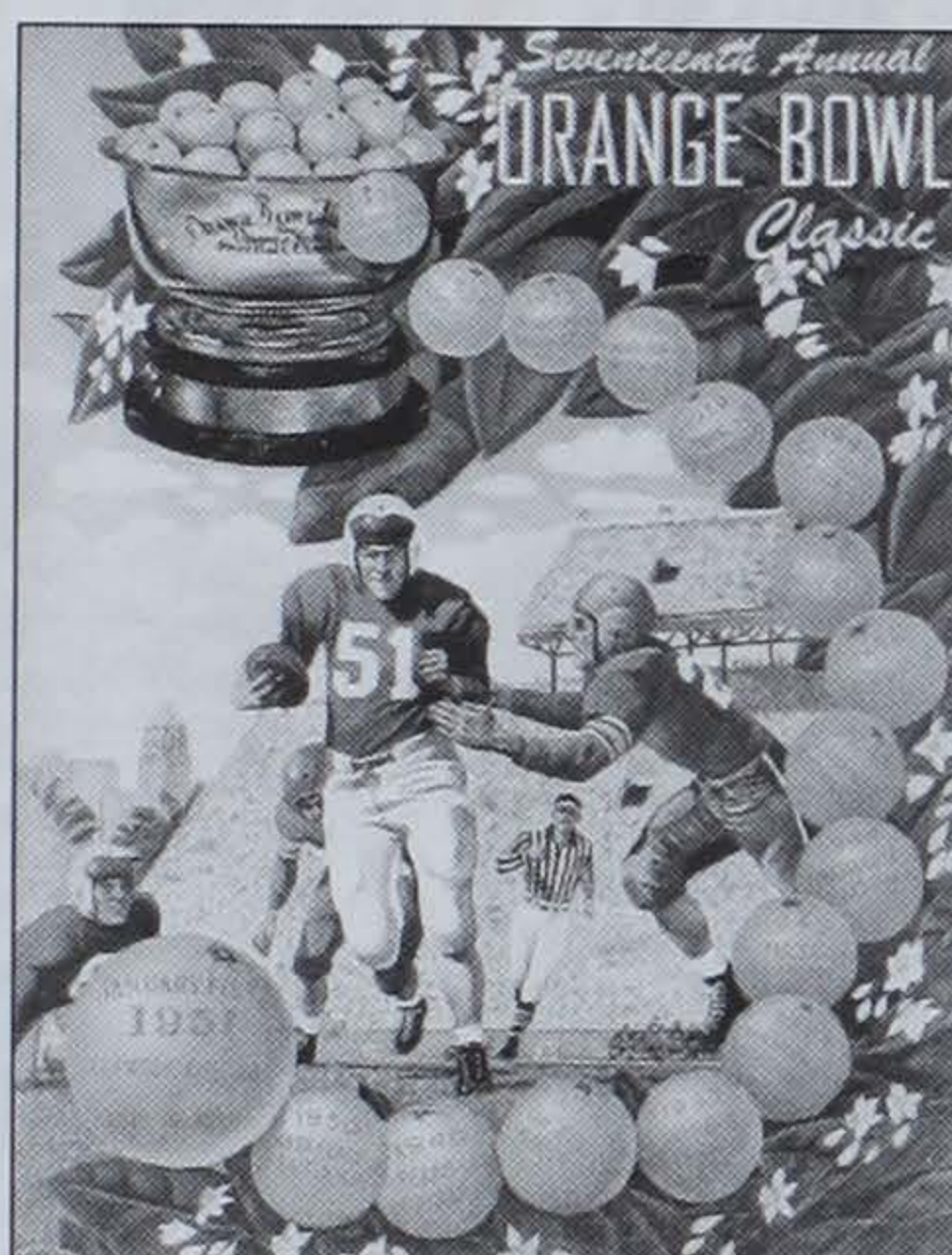
Clemson mounted a six-play, 70-yard drive in the third quarter for its second touchdown. Hair threw a 31-yard pass to Ray Mathews, who, as the papers said, "made a circus catch with two men on his back," to move the Tigers to the Miami 28. Hair tossed a pass to Glenn Smith at the Miami seven and Smith scrambled in for the score. Radcliff's extra point try was blocked.

Miami caught fire two minutes later when Jack

Delbello intercepted a pass in the Clemson end zone and returned it to the 40, and then a 10-yard penalty was assessed the Tigers for unnecessary roughness. On the next play, Frank Smith ran a reverse for 45 yards to move to the Clemson five. Harry Mallios took a pitch from quarterback Bob Schneidenbach in for the score and Gordon Watson added the conversion.

Miami went 95 yards in five plays for its second score. Ed Lutes caught a pass at midfield and rambled down to the Clemson 17 before he was stopped. On fourth down, Jack Hackett threw to Frank Smith for the score and Watson's point put Miami in the lead for the first time, 14-13.

Mallios' 80-yard punt return was called back and two clipping infractions and one unnecessary roughness penalty put Miami in a deep hole with six minutes left in the game. Frank Smith took a pitch-out from Hackett, but before Smith could get out of the end zone, Sterling Smith, a second-team defensive guard for Clemson, tripped him up for a safety, and Clemson led 15-14. Don Wade ended the last Miami threat with an interception, his second of the game, and Clemson ran out the clock for the win.

Clemson won the first three games of the 1951 season as well as the last four. In between, however, the Tigers dropped games to Pacific and South Carolina on the road. The Gator Bowl Committee invited Clemson with its 7-2 record to play Miami (FL) in a rematch of the 1951 Orange Bowl, but the Southern Conference had decided to ban its teams from any bowl competition that season. Clemson and Maryland accepted bowl bids anyway, and were prohibited from playing any other conference team except each other the next year.

The Tigers opened the game with a bang as Billy Hair took Elmer Tremont's kickoff and returned it 72 yards to the Miami 26, but Clemson could only make six yards in four downs and the Tigers turned the ball over.

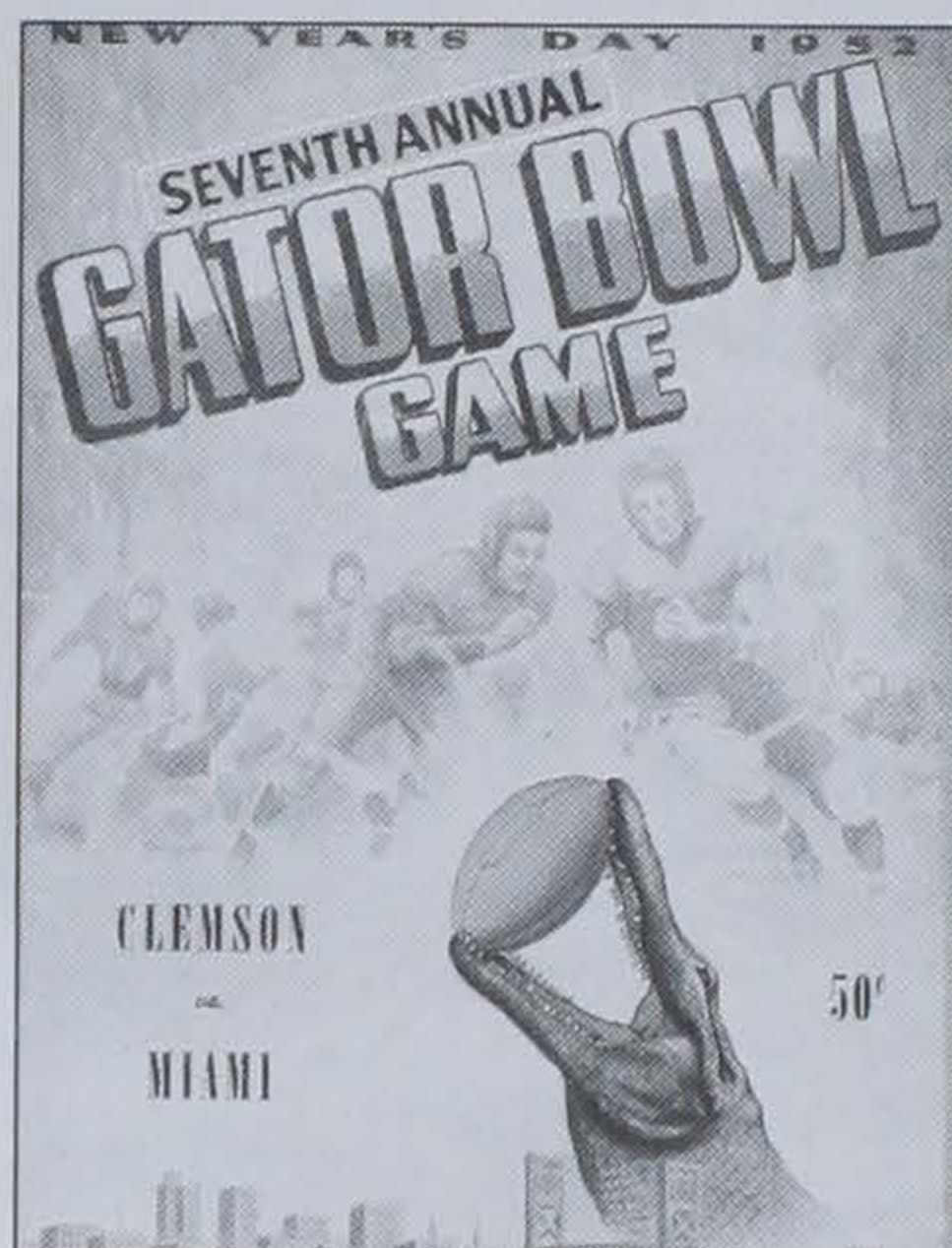
After an exchange of punts, Miami mounted an 82-yard drive to score the game's first touchdown. The drive was highlighted by quarterback Jack Hackett's only two passes of the game - a 15-yarder to Frank McDonald and a 40-yard throw to Ed Lutes.

Two plays later, fullback Harry Mallios took the pitch and ran 11 yards for the score. Tremont added the extra point and Miami led, 7-0.

Miami defensive back Jim Dooley intercepted the first of four passes to kill the Clemson drive at the Miami 15. Clemson got the ball back after a punt, but on fourth down, defensive end Leo Martin blocked Hair's punt at the Clemson 32. Mallios converted twice on fourth down to keep the drive going, and he scored from two yards out. Tremont converted again and Miami had all the points it needed.

The Clemson defense turned stingy in the second half, as the Tigers did not allow Miami to penetrate their 35 and the Hurricanes did not gain another first down. The Clemson offense moved well,

but a fumble at the Miami 18 and three Dooley interceptions inside the 20 kept Clemson off the scoreboard as Miami handed the Tigers their first bowl loss in history.

Clemson claimed its first Atlantic Coast Conference championship in 1956 on the strength of a 4-0-1 league mark. The Tigers were 7-1-2 overall and were a surprise choice to participate in the 22nd Orange Bowl, as only three weeks before their selection, the Tigers had been shut out by Miami, 21-0, in the same stadium. Colorado, which was 7-2-1 and the Big-Seven runnerup, was chosen as Clemson's opponent.

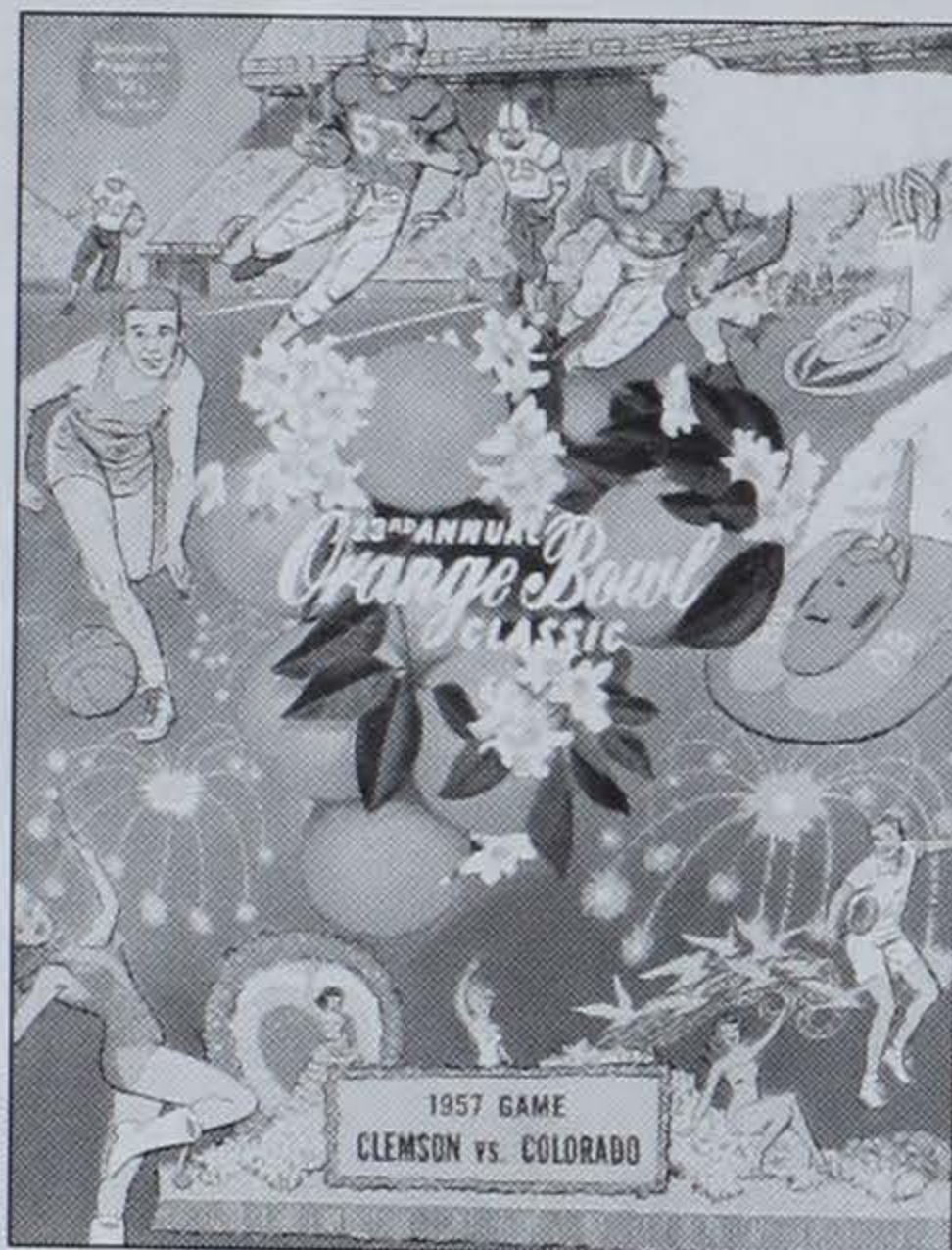
After a scoreless first quarter, Colorado got on track with a seven-play, 75-yard drive. The Buffaloes' catalyst was a 26-yard run by Bob Stransky that moved the ball to the Clemson 23. Four plays later, John "The Beast" Bayuk scored from the two. Ellwin Indorf added the point after.

Stransky intercepted an errant Charlie Bussey pass at the Clemson 46 and returned it to the 10 to spark Colorado's second score. Boyd Dowler, who later starred with the Packers, scored from six yards out two plays later. Howard Cook added the conversion and Colorado led 14-0.

Colorado's Frank Clarke partially blocked Horace Turbeville's punt on the next Clemson drive and the Buffaloes recovered on the Clemson 26. Cook then went wide right and scored on the next

play, but he missed the extra point.

Clemson came out of the locker room and marched 69 yards in 15 plays to score on Joel Wells's three-yard run. Bussey's extra point try was good.



After a Colorado punt, Clemson moved to the 29 on Bob Spooner's two runs. Three plays later, Wells ran 58 yards on a counter trap off the belly series for the Tigers' second score. Bussey's point after made the score 20-14 Colorado.

Clemson recovered the ensuing onside kick, but the Tigers were forced to punt four plays later. Colorado then fumbled at its 11 and Tommy Sease recovered for the Tigers at the 10. Spooner, who had been the workhorse on the first scoring drive,

carried the ball over from the one, and with Bussey's third extra point, Clemson led for the first time at 21-20, with 11:22 to go.

Although leading, Bussey attempted a second onside kick. Colorado recovered and marched 53 yards in eight plays to go ahead for good on Bayuk's one-yard plunge. Indorf kicked the extra point and the Buffaloes led, 27-21. The two teams traded turnovers, and Colorado ran out the clock.

"I told them I was going to resign if they didn't play better in the second half. I told them I didn't want to be associated with any team that played like they did in the first half."

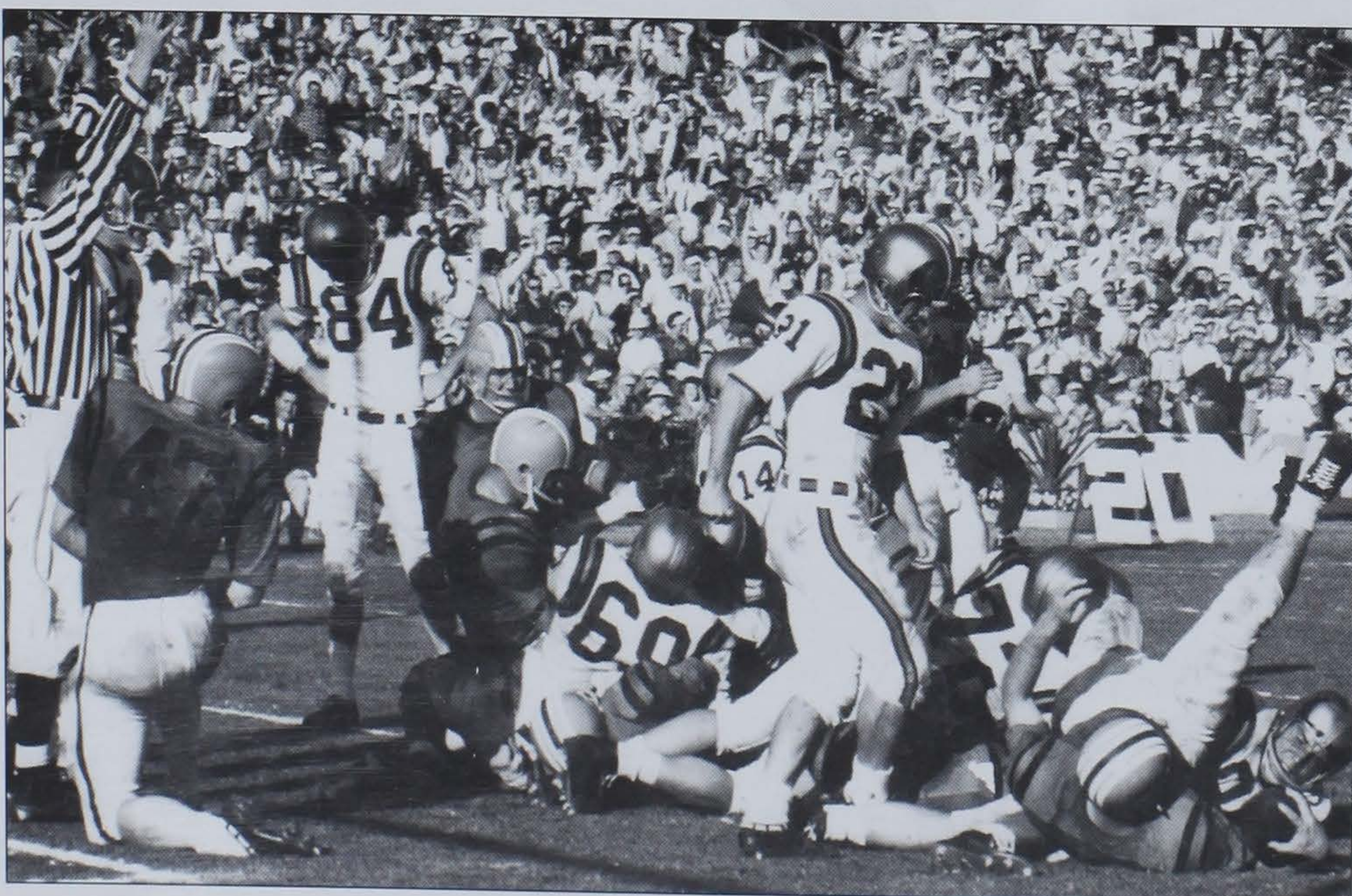
When Howard met Dal Ward, Colorado's Head Coach, at midfield, Ward asked him what was the matter with his team. Howard replied "I just don't know."

January, 1959 • Tulane-Sugar Bowl Stadium • New Orleans, LA

South Carolina, who had been shut out by Clemson the previous two years, scored 20 second half points to take a 26-6 win over Frank Howard's 1958 team. The only other blemish on the ACC Champions' 8-2 regular season record was a 13-0 loss at Georgia Tech. For their efforts, the Tigers were invited to play the nation's number-one team, Louisiana State, in the 25th Sugar Bowl.

Louisiana State drove deep into Clemson territory three times in the first half, but two fumbles and a thwarted fake field goal killed the drives. Clemson could do no better, though, as none of its first six drives went past midfield.

Clemson moved to the Louisiana State 27 yard line on its first drive of the second half, but a fumble gave the ball back to the other set of Tigers. On Clemson's next possession, Louisiana State got the break it had been looking for. On fourth down, the ball slipped out of snapper Paul Snyder's hands and hit up-man Doug Cline in the leg and Duane Leopard recovered for Louisiana State at the Clemson 11.

Louisiana State picked up two yards on its first three tries, but on fourth down halfback Billy Cannon hit tight end Mickey Mangham in the corner of the end zone for the only score of the game. Cannon

kicked the extra point and Louisiana State led 7-0.

Clemson had one last chance late in the fourth quarter. The Tigers started at their 17 and 17 plays later were on the Louisiana State 28, but Harvey White's fourth-down pass to George Usry was incomplete. Louisiana State took over on downs and ran out the clock.

In his usual relaxed way, Coach Frank Howard of Clemson said he was pleased with his team.

"Hell! I think we'd have beat them if that boy had held onto that little screen pass," Howard said. "I was going for those two points and beat them."

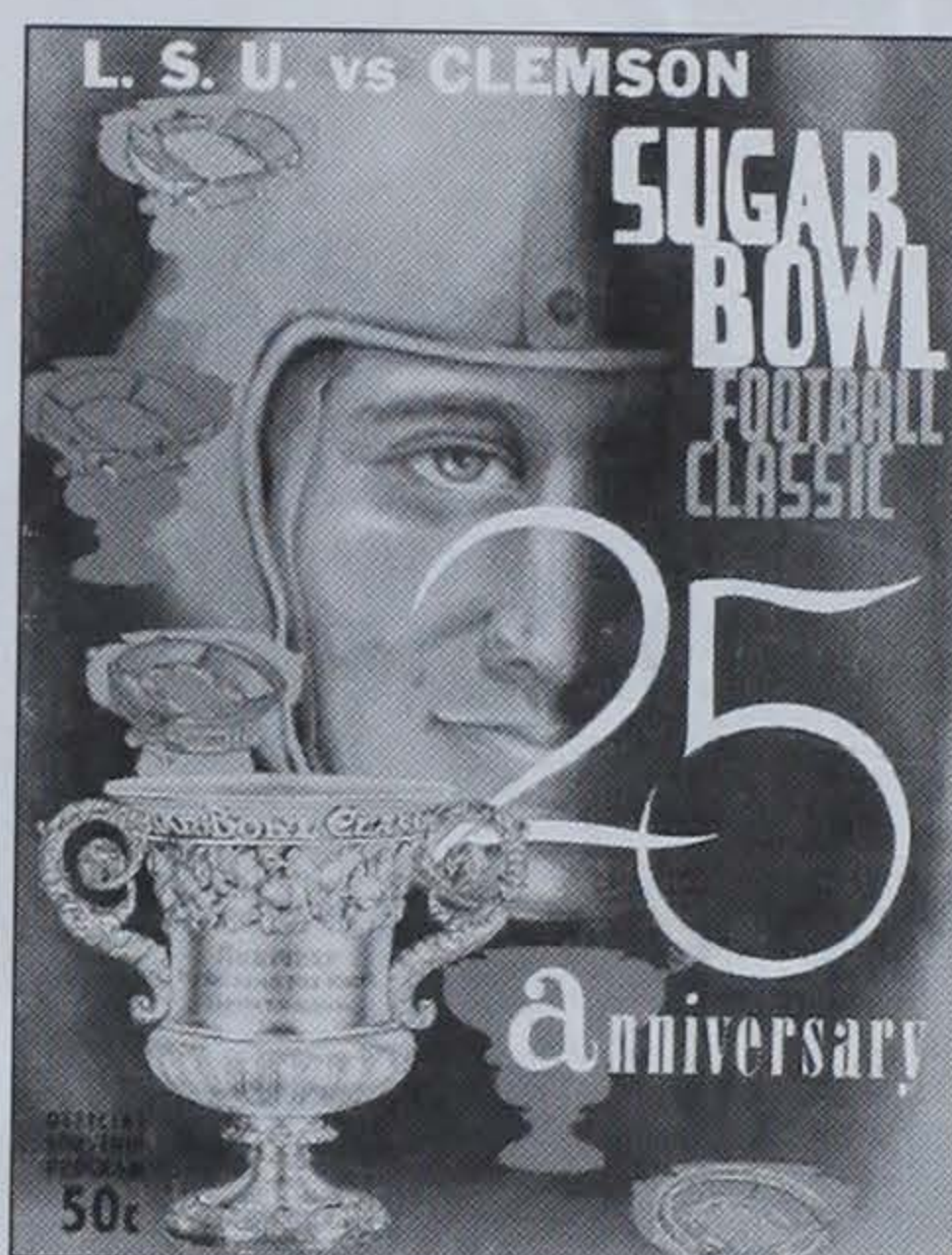
"I didn't think we would hold them to one touchdown, but I didn't think they would shut us out, either."

"Louisiana State has a good team, they rate the No. 1 spot in the nation.

"Cannon is quite a boy. Deserves his All-American rating."

"It was a wonderful victory. They're just as fine when you win 'em, 7-0 as 30-0. I'm very happy that we won," said Louisiana State Coach Paul Dietzel, who won the national championship at age 34.

"Clemson proved tougher than most people figured. But we knew we would have to play at our top peak to beat them. They were a good team."

The 1959 season was one of firsts, lasts, and other milestones. Clemson won the last "Big Thursday" game with archrival South Carolina, 27-0, one of five opponents the Tigers would whitewash, the second-highest shutout total in a Clemson season.

The 9-2 team was Clemson's third ACC Championship unit, and Frank Howard's last bowl team. After the season-ending win over Furman, Clemson was invited to play Texas Christian in the inaugural Bluebonnet Bowl, which would be the Tigers' second post-season appearance in the calendar year of 1959. The 23-7 win over the Horned Frogs was Clemson's 300th football victory.

Alternate quarterback Lowndes Shingler guided Clemson on a 12-play, 63-yard drive to the Texas Christian five yard line, but the Tigers stalled. Lon Armstrong hit on a 22-yard field goal as the second quarter started, to put Clemson up, 3-0.

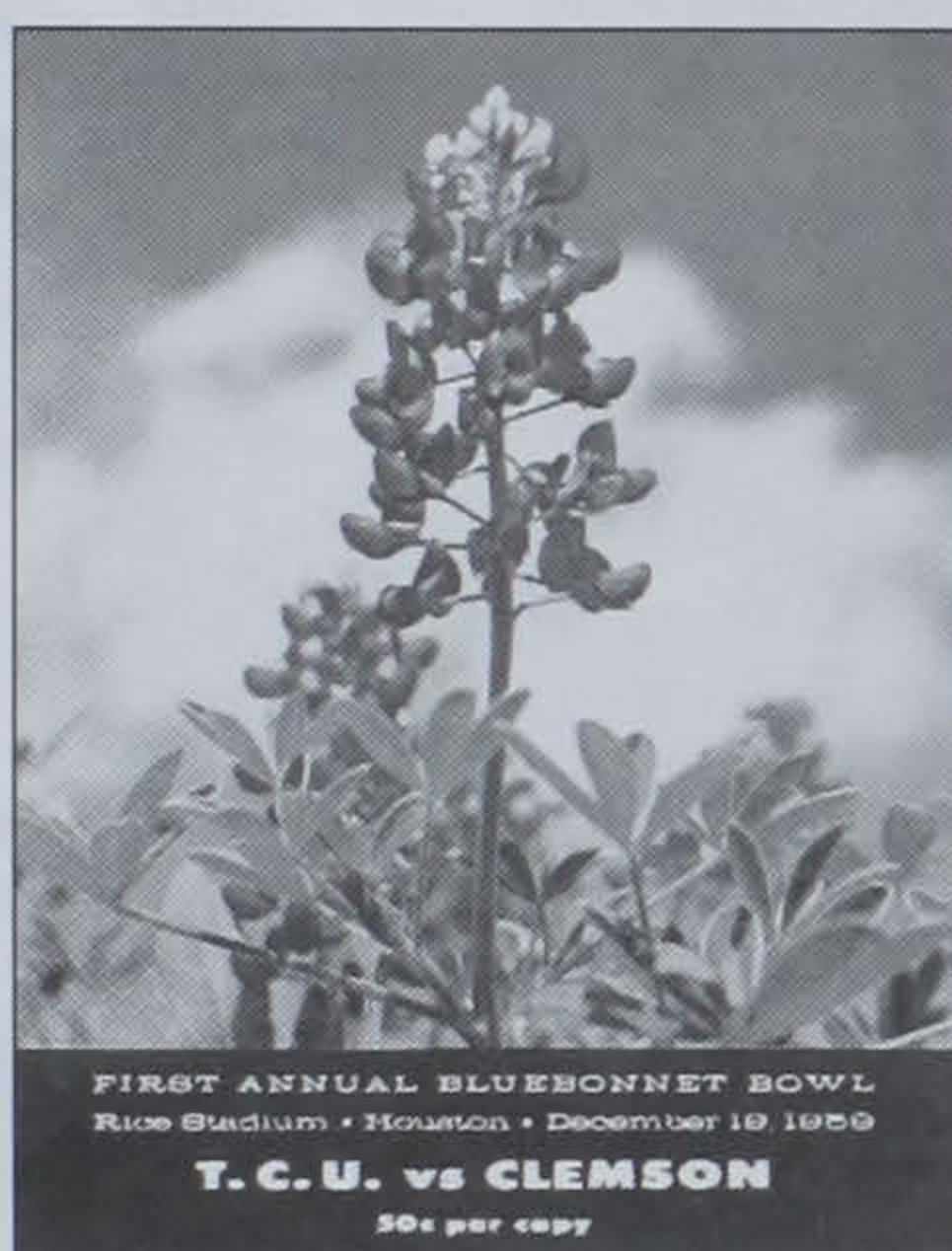
Not to be outdone, Texas Christian second-stringer Donald George moved his team on a 12-play, 63-yard drive to the Clemson end zone. The Horned Frogs scored the go-ahead touchdown on a

19-yard halfback pass from Jack Reding to Harry Moreland.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but Clemson did drive to the Texas Christian 29 midway through the period. Harvey White's fourth-down pass to George Usry was just one yard short of the needed first down and Texas Christian took over.

Clemson got pass-happy in the final 15 minutes and scored two touchdowns for a comfortable lead. With a third-and-18 situation at the Clemson 32, White threw to end Gary Barnes who caught the ball at midfield and sprinted in for a score. After an interception, Shingler threw to Tommy King coming across the middle for a 23-yard touchdown, but Shingler's point after was wide, and Clemson led, 16-7.

Clemson returned to its running game for its final scoring drive late in the quarter. Shingler, Doug Daigneault, and Ron Scrudato moved the Tigers from their 37 to the Texas Christian one and Scrudato ran off right tackle for six. Armstrong's kick put the game out of Texas Christian's reach and it capped a 20-point fourth quarter for the Tigers.

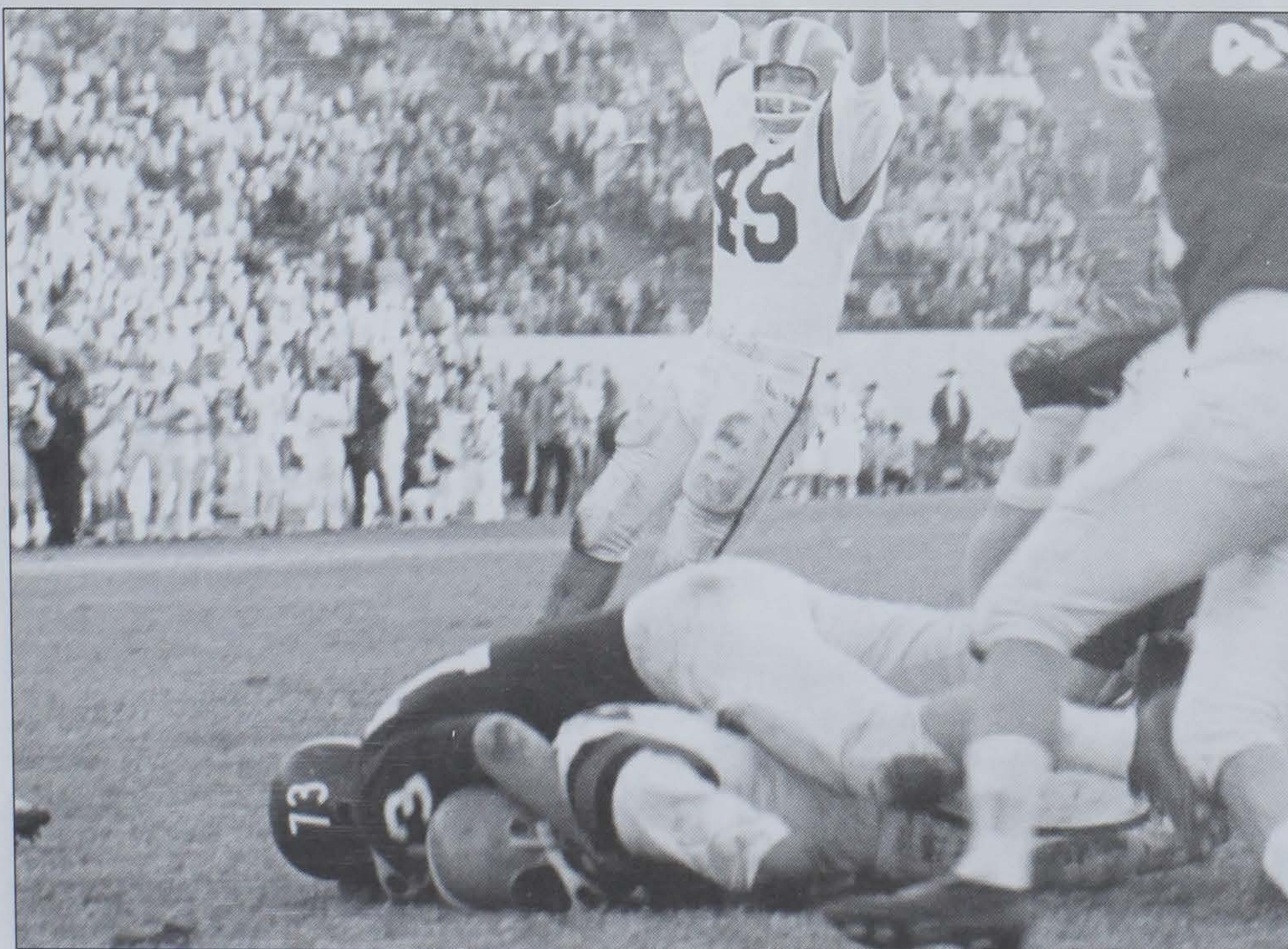

Clemson resurfaced in the national spotlight in 1977 after winning eight games and making its first bowl appearance in 18 years. First-year coach Charley Pell guided his team to a 7-6 win at Georgia, a near-upset of eventual National Champion Notre Dame at home, and had come within an extra point of claiming the ACC Championship. After Jerry Butler's twisting, diving catch in the end zone beat South Carolina, Clemson accepted the invitation to play defending National Champion Pittsburgh in the 33rd annual Gator Bowl.

Clemson won the opening coin toss, but that was to be the only thing the Tigers would win that night as the Matt Cavanaugh-led Panthers scored six of the 12 times they had the ball, set seven Gator Bowl records, and handed the Tigers one of their 25 worst defeats in history with a 34-3 score.

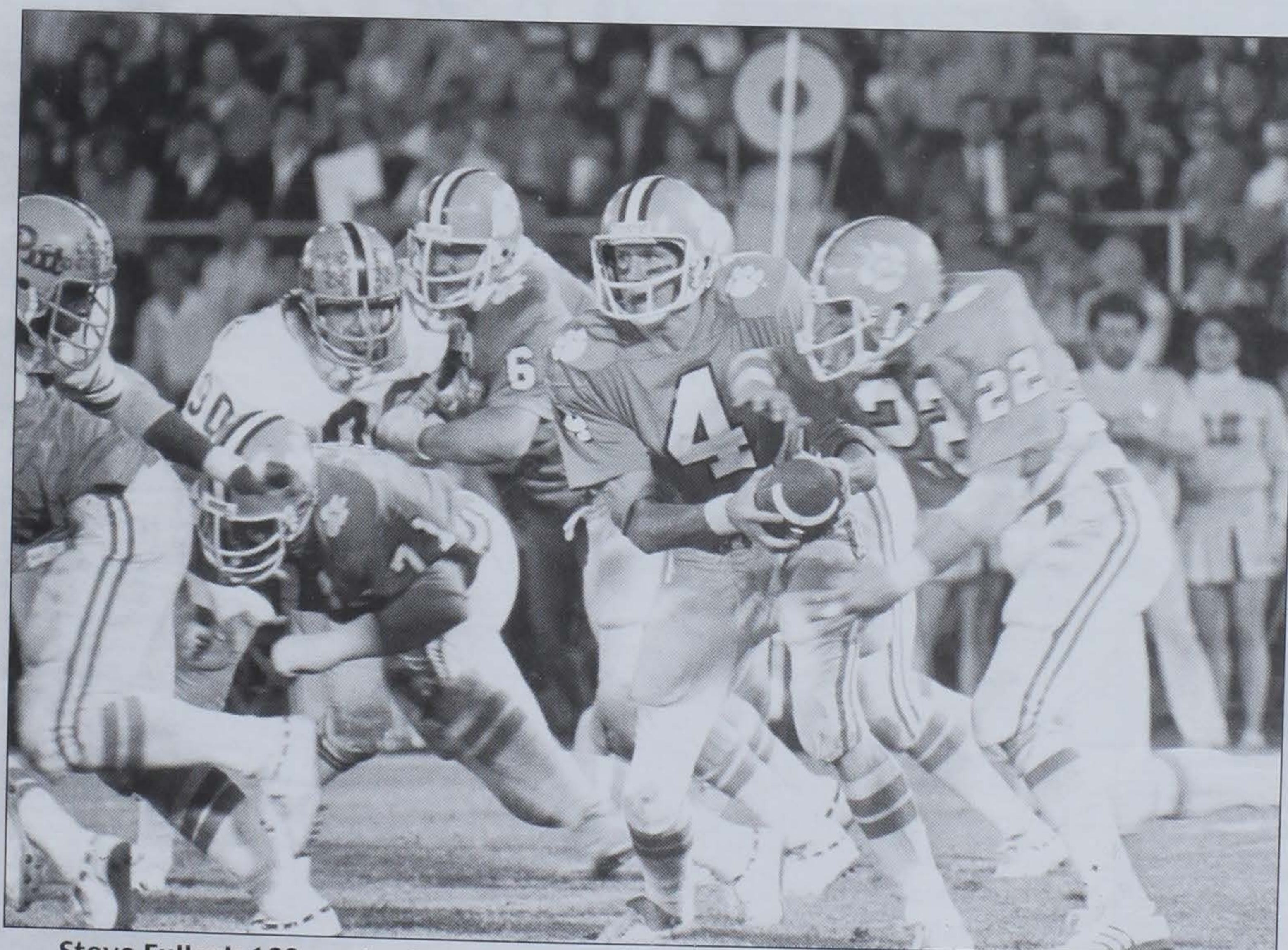
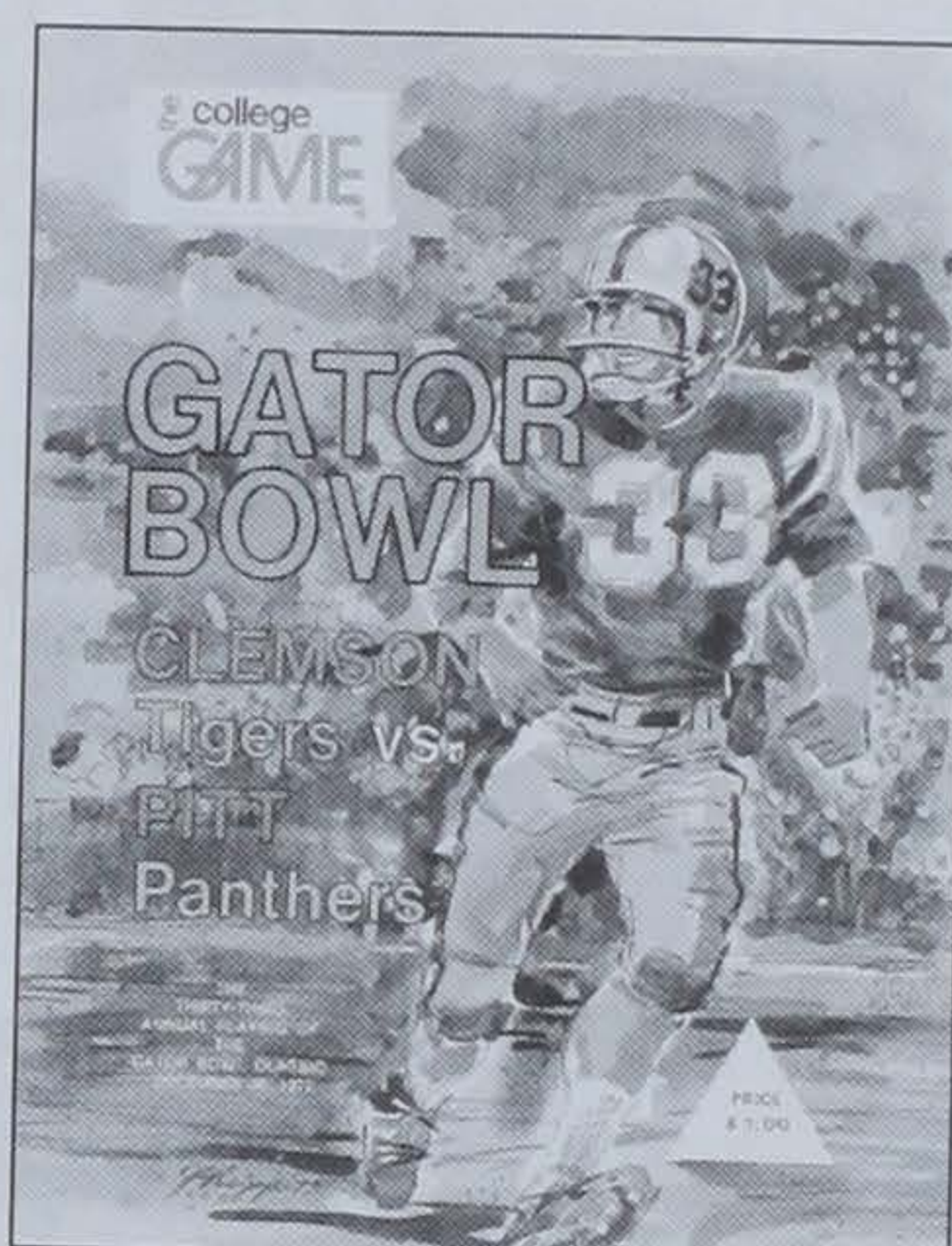
Cavanaugh threw four touchdown passes (three to fullback Elliott Walker), passed for a Clemson opponent record 387 yards and accounted for 402 yards in total offense. Pitt set a Gator Bowl team

record for passing yards and first downs, while Cavanaugh set the individual mark for passing yardage. If that was not enough, the Pittsburgh defense stymied the Clemson offense all night by keeping Steve Fuller & Company bottled up or causing turnovers when the Tigers' offense did get on track.

Pittsburgh was leading 17-0 when the Tigers began their only scoring drive early in the second quarter. Fuller mixed passes to Anthony King and Butler with runs by Ken Callicutt to move to the Pittsburgh 32. The drive bogged down and Obed Ariri hit on a 49-yard field goal which set the Gator Bowl record for distance.

Fuller led Clemson on offense with 192 yards. He had been named ACC Player-of-the-Year as a junior. Randy Scott (13), Mark Heniford (13), and Bubba Brown led the Tiger defense with double-figure tackle totals.

Although the Tigers were out-classed by Pittsburgh, the 1977 appearance in the Gator Bowl was the start of a new era of football pride for Clemson.

Steve Fuller was a coach on the field for the Tigers as he either passed or ran with the ball on 37 of Clemson's 80 plays. He gained 161 yards of total offense and scored one of Clemson's two touchdowns.

Charlie Bauman provided the key defensive play of the game with an interception at the Clemson 24 with just two minutes left. Ohio State never got the ball back. It was the only interception of Bauman's four-year career.

December 29, 1978 • Gator Bowl • Jacksonville, FL

The Clemson team of 1978 was notable for many reasons, and not the least of which was a 17-15 victory over Ohio State in the Gator Bowl. The '78 team won 11 games (eight by convincing margins), had the nation's longest winning streak after the bowl game, changed head coaches 19 days before the Gator Bowl, and ended the coaching career of Woody Hayes.

The first quarter of new Clemson head coach Danny Ford's first game was scoreless, although Ohio State had been stopped at the Clemson one-yard line on a fourth-down play.

The second quarter was unusual in that there were four possessions in the stanza and each team scored twice. Ohio State drove to the Clemson nine on the passing of Art Schlichter, but the Buckeyes had to settle for Bob Atha's 27-yard field goal.

Clemson quarterback Steve Fuller engineered

an impressive 80-yard, 15-play drive after the kick-off. Staying mostly on the ground, Fuller himself ran around left end from four yards out to give Clemson the lead. Obed Ariri's point after made the score 7-3.



Schlichter duplicated Fuller's feat nine plays later, but Clemson right end Steve Gibbs blocked Vlade Janakiewski's extra point try, leaving Ohio State in the lead, 9-7.

Clemson got the ball back with 1:15 remaining in the quarter and Fuller passed his way to the Buckeye 30. With only five seconds left, Ariri hit a 47-yard field goal that gave the Tigers a 10-9 lead at halftime.

Clemson scored the only points of the third quarter as the running combination of Fuller, Marvin Sims, and Warren Ratchford ground out 83 yards in 18 plays. Cliff Austin went the final yard for the score, and Ariri's conversion gave Clemson a 17-9 cushion.

With 8:11 left in the game, Schlichter scored his second touchdown to bring Ohio State within two points. Jim Stuckey tackled Schlichter on a sweep to prevent the two-point play, and Clemson still led at 17-15.

Ohio State mounted one final drive. Faced with third-and-five at the Clemson 24, an interception by second-team middle guard Charlie Bauman (the only theft of his four-year career) killed the drive. Bauman was run out-of-bounds on the Ohio State sideline, and Buckeye coach Woody Hayes swung at the Clemson player. Consecutive unsportsmanlike conduct penalties gave Clemson excellent field position, and Fuller was able to run out the clock, giving Clemson its first win over a Big Ten team.

Bubba Brown led the Clemson defense with 22 tackles, still a school record for tackles in a bowl game. Brown remains Clemson's career tackle leader. Future first-round draft choice Jim Stuckey added 10 tackles to lead the interior lineman.

Billy Lott threw for 213 yards, the high total of his career in leading the Clemson offense. He completed 17 passes, setting a Clemson record for a quarterback in a bowl game.

Jim Stuckey had 14 tackles from his defensive line position, a prime reason Baylor gained just 62 yards on the ground, less than 1.5 yards per rush.

Lester Brown scored the game's first touchdown, his 32nd as a Tiger, eclipsing Fred Cone's career record of 31.

Clemson made its third consecutive bowl appearance in 1979 after an 8-3 season. The year included a 19-10 win over Gator Bowl-bound North Carolina and a dramatic, come-from-behind 16-10 victory at Notre Dame. The 1979 season was also Danny Ford's first full campaign as head coach.

The Tigers got on the board first with an eight-play, 66-yard drive highlighted by Billy Lott's 27-yard pass to Lester Brown. Brown scored two plays later on a one-yard dive over the middle and Obed Ariri's point after made the score 7-0 midway through the first period.

Baylor took the lead on two second-quarter touchdown passes from Mike Brannon to Bo Taylor and Robert Holt. Robert Bledsoe converted after both scores and the Southwest Conference representatives led 14-7 at intermission.

Clemson took the second half kickoff and a combination of runs by Lott, Brown, and Tracy Perry took the Tigers to the Baylor 22. The drive stalled

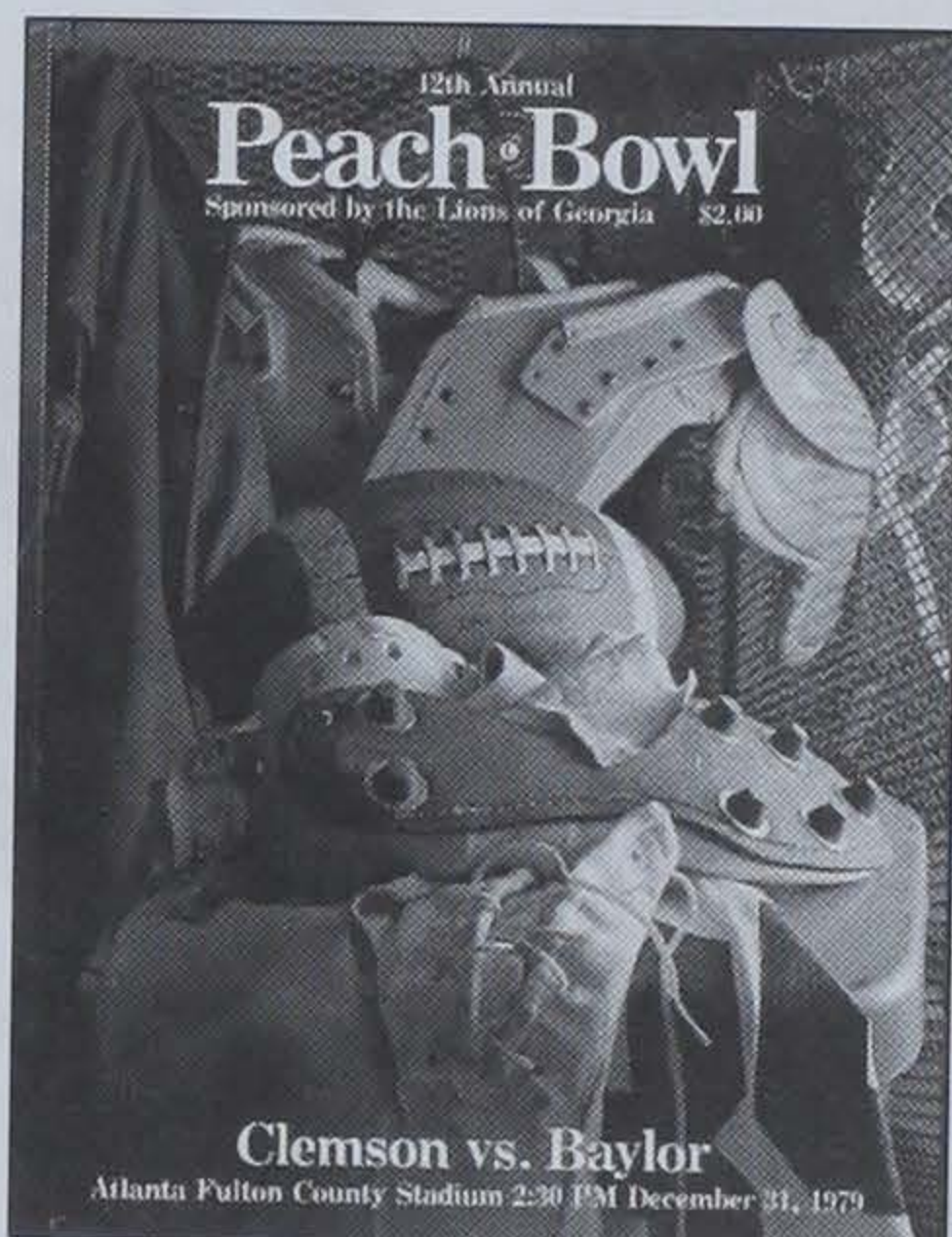
there and Ariri's 40-yard field goal narrowed the margin to 14-10.

Quarterback Mickey Elam led Baylor on a 64-yard field goal drive after the kickoff, and he later threw a seven-yard touchdown to Raymond Cockrell to push the Bears' lead to 24-10.

Mike Singletary (future All-Pro with the Chicago Bears), led the Baylor defense with 20 tackles. He was a major reason Clemson gained a season low 67 yards rushing in 51 attempts.

Andy Headen began Clemson's furious comeback with a blocked punt that was recovered by James Robinson at the Baylor one. Chuck McSwain scored with 20 seconds left in the game and Lott passed to Jeff McCall for the two-point conversion. Headen recovered the ensuing

onside kick, and Lott completed a 30-yard pass to Perry Tuttle to move the Tigers to the Baylor 33. An interception killed the winning touchdown drive, however, and Baylor ran out the remaining seconds for the win.

After 86 years of playing football, Clemson claimed its first National Championship with a 22-15 win over perennial Big Eight power Nebraska in the 48th Orange Bowl. After a 13-3 win over 1980 National Champion Georgia at home, the Tigers worked their way to the number-one ranking in both wire service polls by season's end. The win over the Cornhuskers gave Clemson the national title and its third perfect season in history.

Nebraska took the kickoff, but three plays later, Tiger middle guard William Devane recovered a Mark Mauer fumble at the Nebraska 33. Quarterback Homer Jordan drove Clemson to the Nebraska 24 before the drive stalled, and Donald Igwebuike drilled a 41-yard field goal to put the ACC Champions up, 3-0.

Nebraska came right back, however, as the Big Eight title holder drove 69 yards in eight plays to score on a 25-yard halfback pass from Mike Rozier to Anthony Steels. Kevin Seibel's extra point gave Nebraska the lead at 7-3 with 6:43 to go in the first quarter

After an exchange of punts, the Clemson offense moved from the Nebraska 42 yard line to the 21 to set up Igwebuike's second field goal. The 37-yard boot narrowed the score to 7-6.

A second-quarter Phil Bates fumble gave Clemson the ball at the Nebraska 27, and the running combination of Jordan, Kevin Mack, and Cliff Austin moved the ball to the Cornhusker two. Austin, who had been stuck in the hotel elevator for two hours earlier in the day, scampered in for the score that gave Clemson a lead it would not relinquish.

On its second possession of the second half, Clemson drove 75 yards in 12 plays to score its final touchdown of the night, a 13-yard pass from Jordan to All-American receiver Perry Tuttle in

the corner of the end zone. For Tuttle, it was his eighth touchdown grab of the season, which set a school record. Bob Paulling's extra point put the Tigers ahead, 19-7.

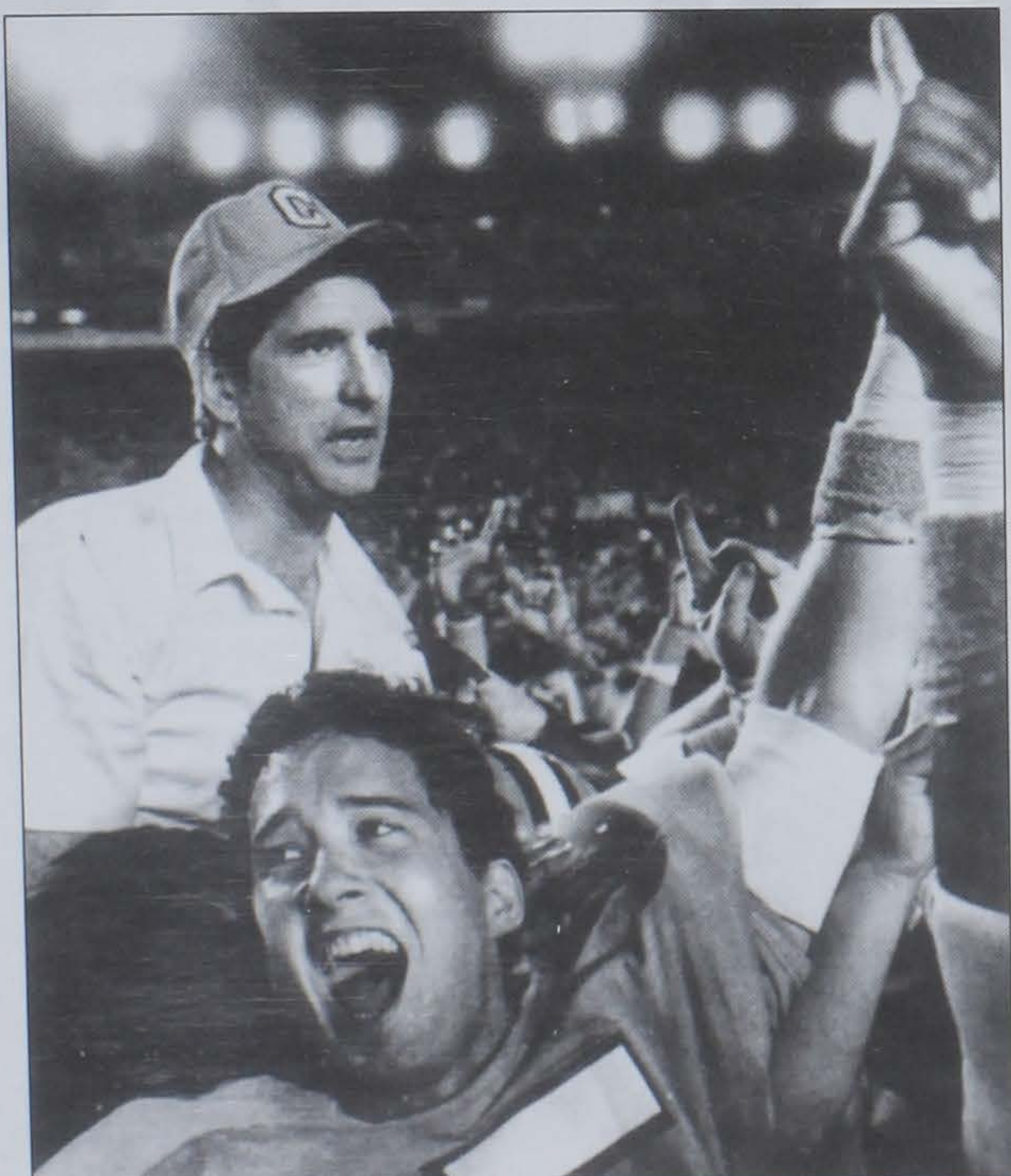
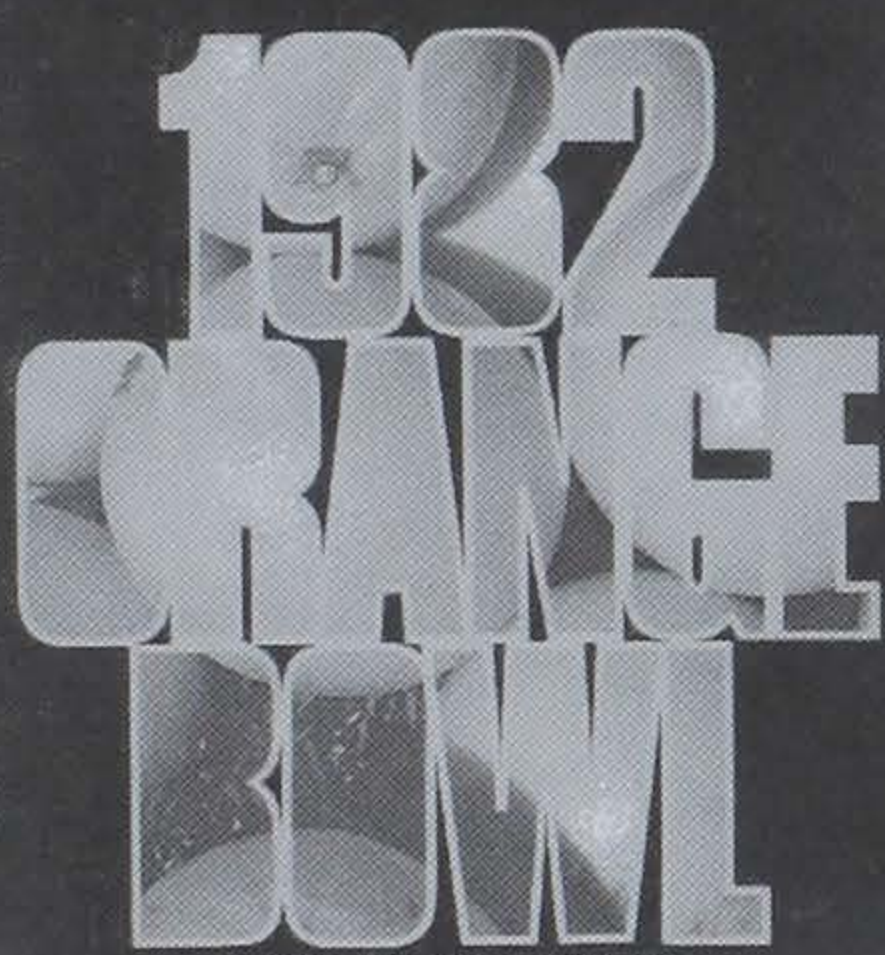
After Billy Davis's 47-yard punt return, Jordan moved the Tigers to the Nebraska 20, where Igwebuike kicked a 36-yard field goal, his third of the evening, to put Clemson ahead 22-7 with two-and-a-half minutes left in the third stanza.

Nebraska was down but not out, though. After a near-interception by Johnny Rembert, Mauer engineered an eight-play, 69-yard drive that was capped by a 26-yard run by Roger Craig. After a penalty, Craig ran in the two-point conversion from eight yards out to close the gap to 22-15 with nine minutes to play.

The Clemson defense shut down the Big Red on their final extended drive, then the offense held on to the ball for nearly five-and-a-half minutes to run down the clock to six seconds. Andy Headen deflected Mauer's desperation pass to preserve the win and the championship for Clemson.

Jeff Davis led the Tiger defense with 14 tackles in his final game. He also recovered a fumble, giving him a school-record eight for his career. Bill Smith added a career-high 10 tackles from his defensive end position.

Clemson met a Big Ten school for only the second time in history when it faced Minnesota in the Independence Bowl. It was an interesting matchup of teams that enjoyed moving the ball on the ground, as both clubs gained over 200 rushing yards in the contest. The team with the higher rushing total prevailed, a fact that was easily predictable, as the Gophers churned out 257 yards rushing in a 20-13 Minnesota win.

Minnesota was coached by John Gutekunst, who had taken over for Lou Holtz at the end of the regular season. Holtz had resigned in December to become head coach at Notre Dame.

Clemson held a 13-10 lead heading into the fourth quarter, but for the fifth time in the last 13 games the Tigers could not hold the fourth-period lead. Valdez Baylor scored on a one-yard run with 4:56 left to give Minnesota a final ledger of 7-5. Clemson mounted a final drive in the last few minutes and advanced to the Minnesota 31, but a fourth-down pass for Ray

Williams was overthrown.

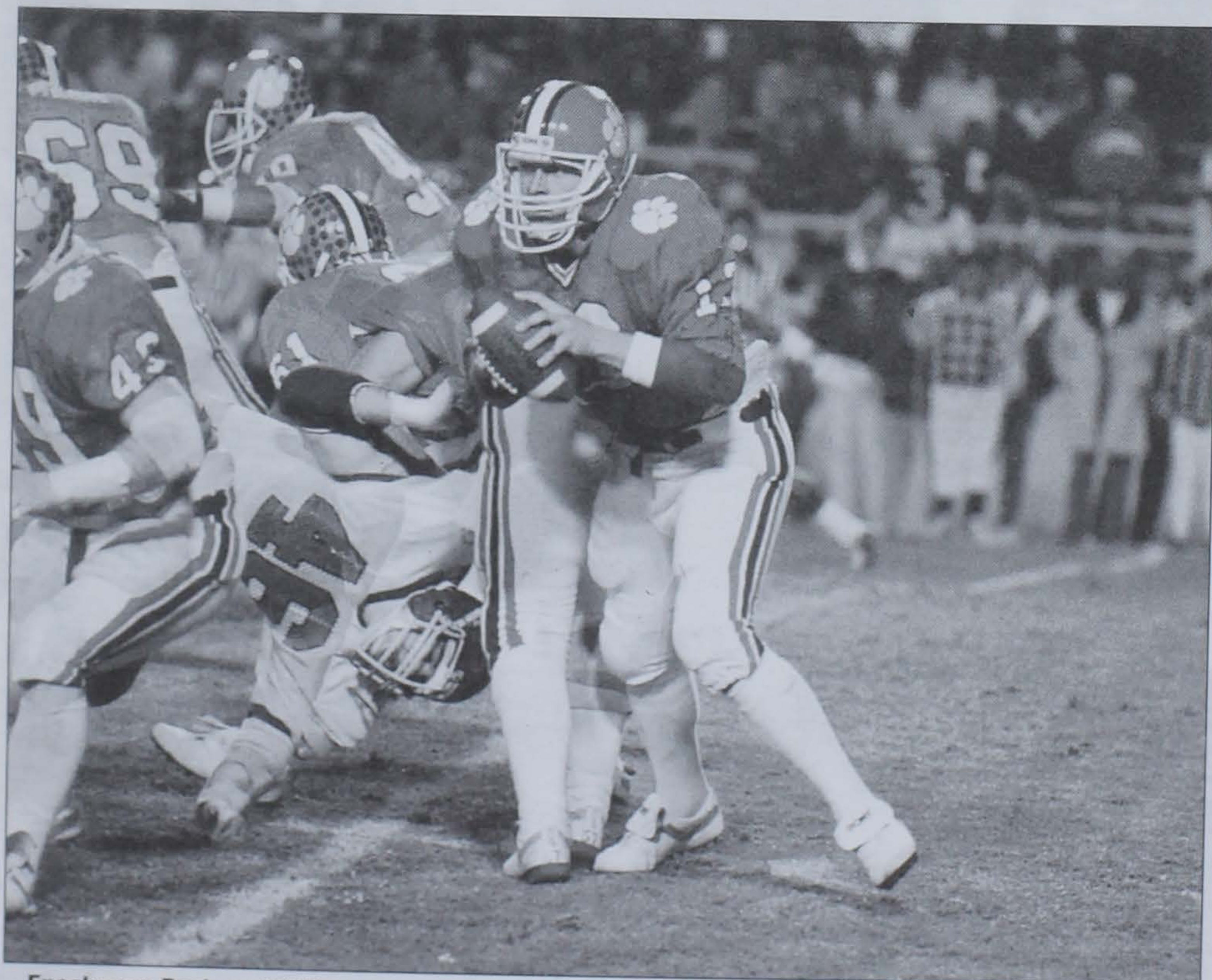
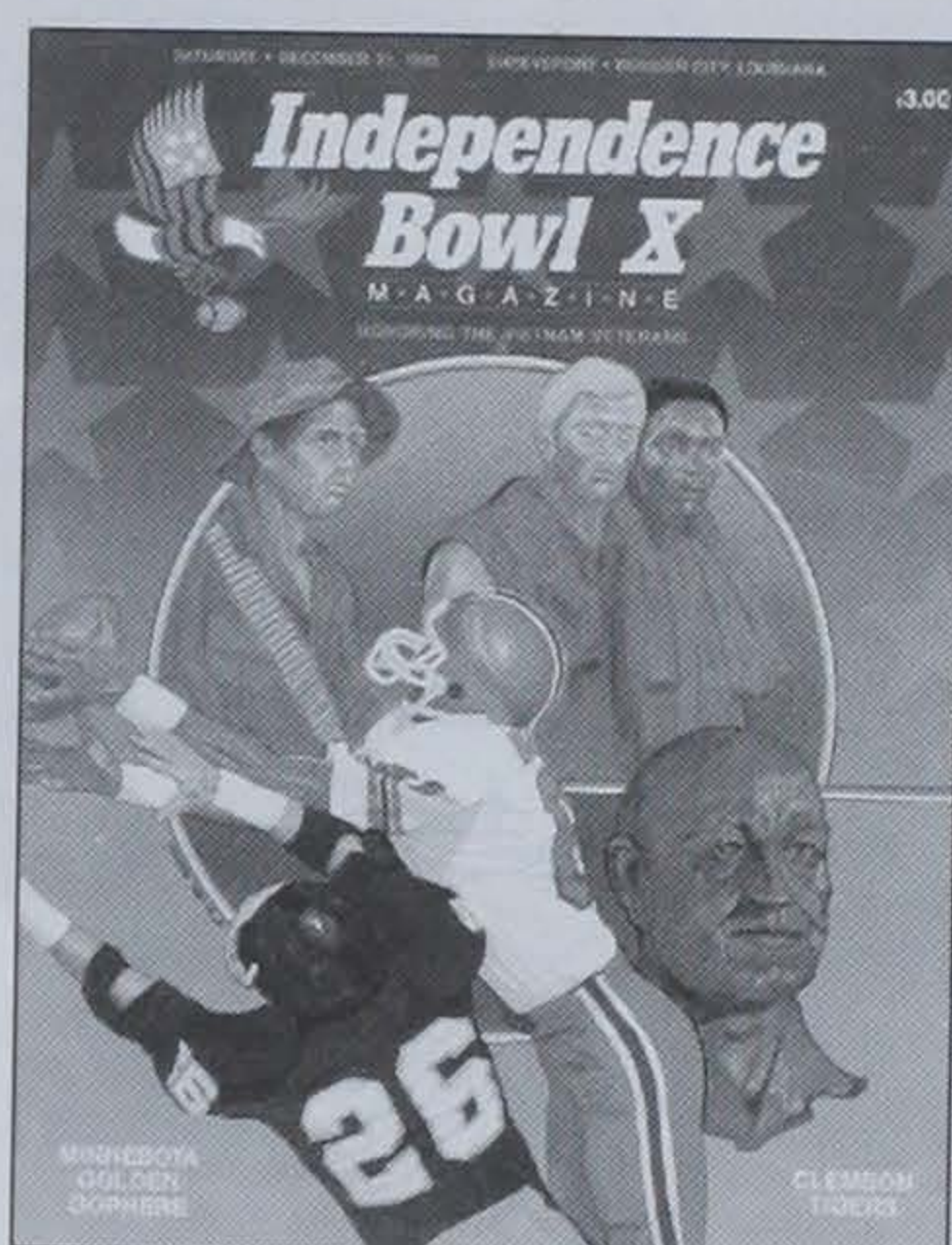
Ricky Foggie, a native of South Carolina, led the Golden Gophers with 183 yards of total offense.

Kenny Flowers had another outstanding day for the Tigers with a career high 148 yards, including a 32-yard run. It was his seventh 100-yard day of the year, his sixth century game in the last seven contests.

Ray Williams caught five passes for 58 yards, while Terrance Roulhac had 63 yards in receptions and 90 yards in kickoff returns. Another wide receiver, Keith Jennings, scored Clemson's only touchdown when he caught a three-yard pass from running back Stacey Driver in the third period.

Henry Carter, a converted fullback, had a career high 13 tackles to pace the Clemson defense. His defense against Stanford's inside rushing and All-America fullback Brad Muster was a key for the Tigers.

Rodney Williams was named MVP of the 1986 Gator Bowl, his first of two bowl MVP awards as a Tiger.

Christmas came two days late for the Tigers as they won their first bowl since the 1982 Orange Bowl. After a brilliant first half display of offense and defense, Clemson managed to hold off a second-half Stanford rally and go on to defeat the 17th-ranked Cardinal, 27-21. Before a Gator Bowl crowd of 80,104, the Tigers scored 27 unanswered points in the first half and appeared to be on the way to a rout. But the second half was a different ball game as Stanford came out strong and put up 21 unanswered points of its own.

Gator Bowl MVP Rodney Williams completed 8-11 passes in the first half, but it was his execution of the option that helped Clemson gain a 27-0 halftime lead. After punting on their first possession, the Tigers scored on their next five. With the score 17-0 in the second quarter, Reggie Harris knocked the ball loose on a Stanford kickoff return and the Tigers recovered on Stanford's 16-yard line. Two plays later, Ray Williams took a reverse in for a 14 yard touchdown, his first of the season. David Treadwell added his longest field goal of the year (46) on Clemson's next possession, putting the Tigers up 27-0 at the intermission.

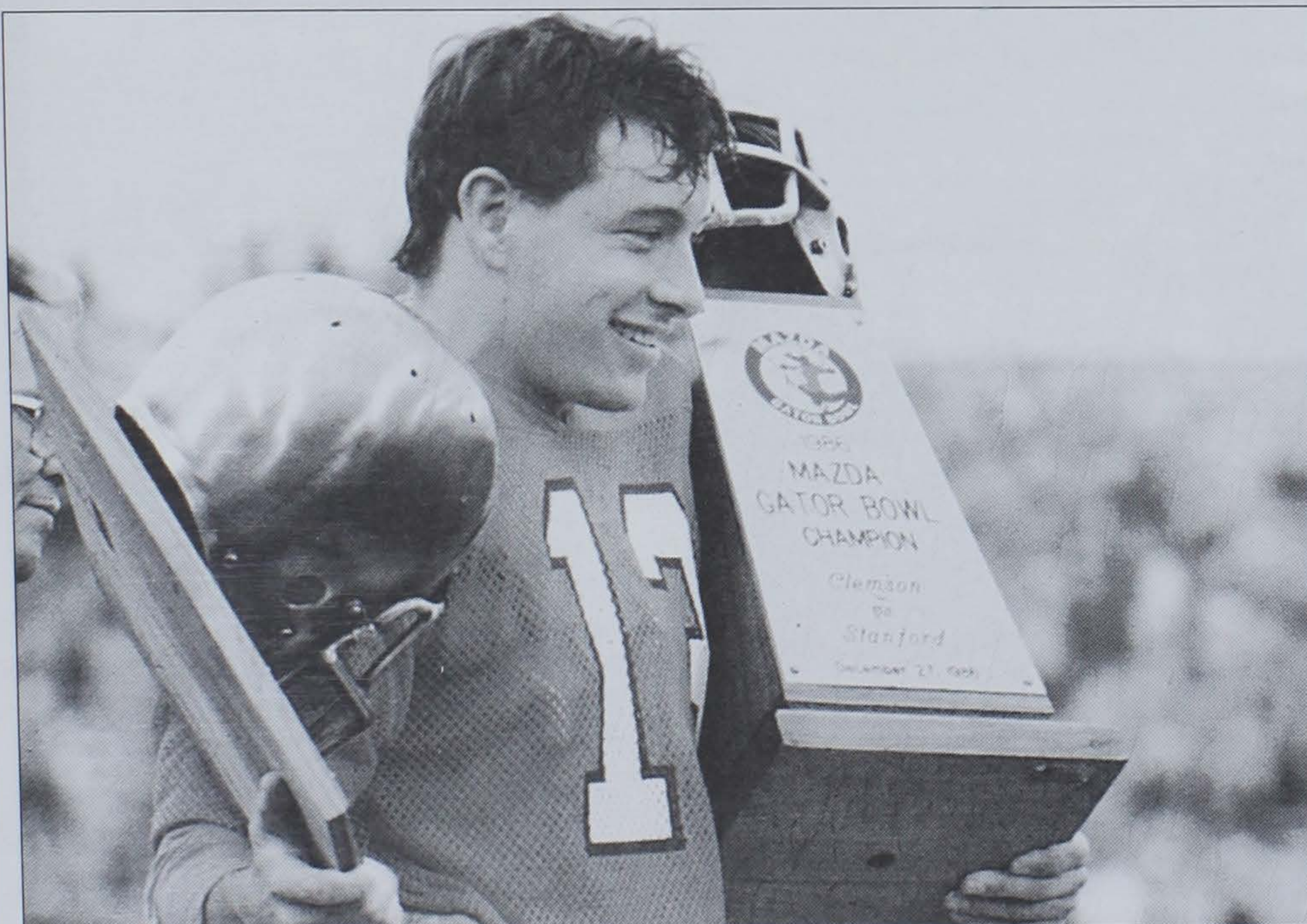
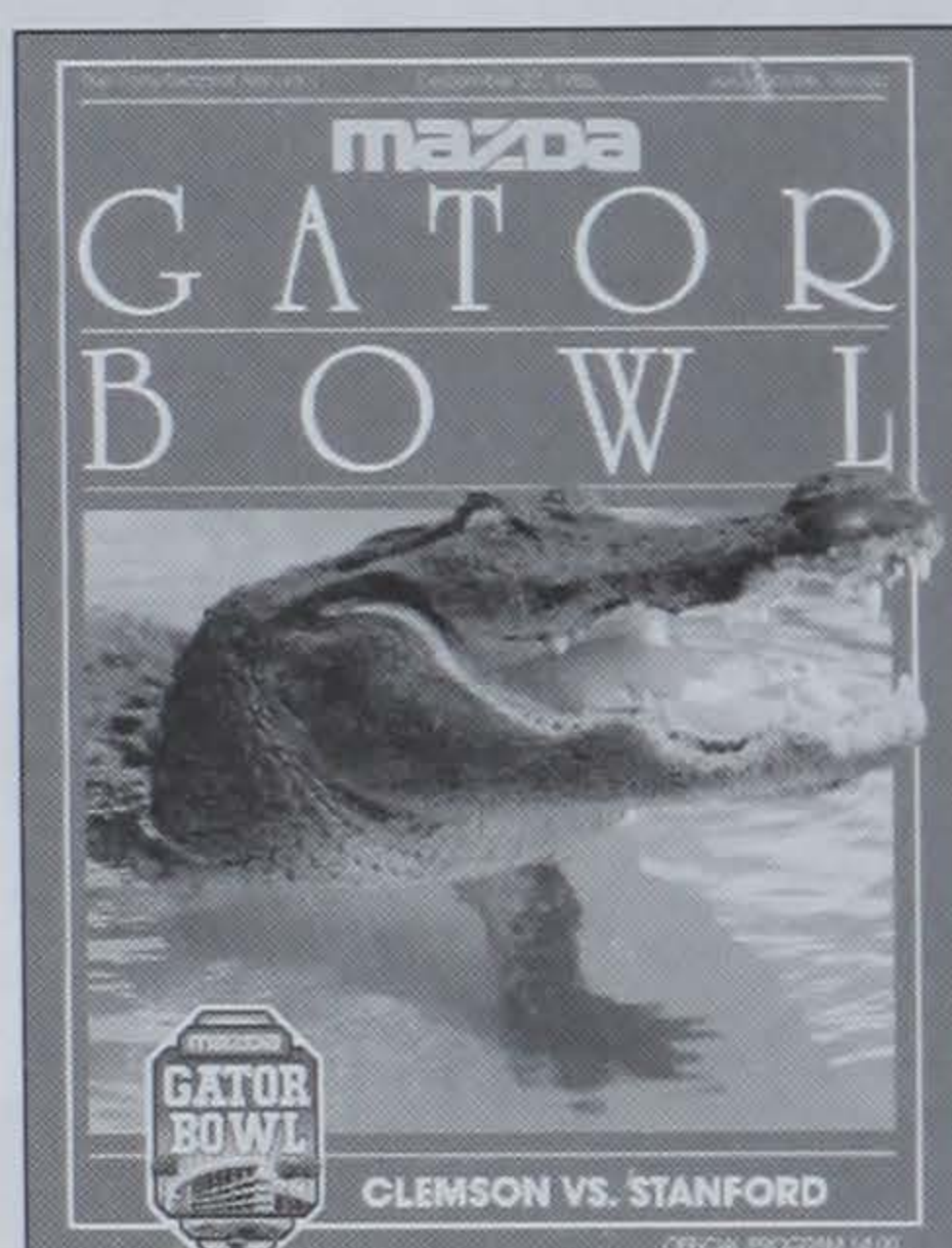
But the Cardinal came back from halftime a different team. Kodak All-American tailback Brad Muster rushed for a touchdown and caught two scoring passes while the Clemson offense came to a standstill. With 1:43 left to play in the game

Clemson was forced to punt to the Cardinal with only a touchdown's lead. But the Tiger defense rose to the occasion, as Stanford gained only six yards on the next four downs. The offense fell on the ball to run the clock out and the Tigers emerged victorious.

Tailbacks Terrence Flagler and Kenny Flowers combined for 149 yards. Sophomore Ricardo Hooper led the receiving corps with two catches for 44 yards. Terrance Roulhac and Flagler each had three catches with 22 and 23 yards, respectively.

Rodney Williams rushed 16 times for 18 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, the Tigers were led by linebacker Henry Carter who recorded a career-high 13 tackles. Gene Beasley added seven tackles and broke up two passes. The game also marked Michael Dean Perry's offensive debut, as he was put in as a blocking back on a goal-line situation in the first half.

Everything went the Tigers way in sunny Florida as Clemson soundly defeated Joe Paterno's Penn State team, 35-10. Rodney Williams was selected the Citrus Bowl's Most Valuable Player as he led the Tigers in a brilliant air attack that took the Nittany Lions by complete surprise, and complemented it with a solid ground game.

The win was Danny Ford's fourth bowl victory in only nine seasons as Clemson's head coach. It also marked Rodney Williams' second bowl victory in his three-year playing career at Clemson and the second consecutive year that he was named the MVP of a postseason bowl. In 1986, Williams won the honor as the Tigers defeated Stanford in the Gator Bowl.

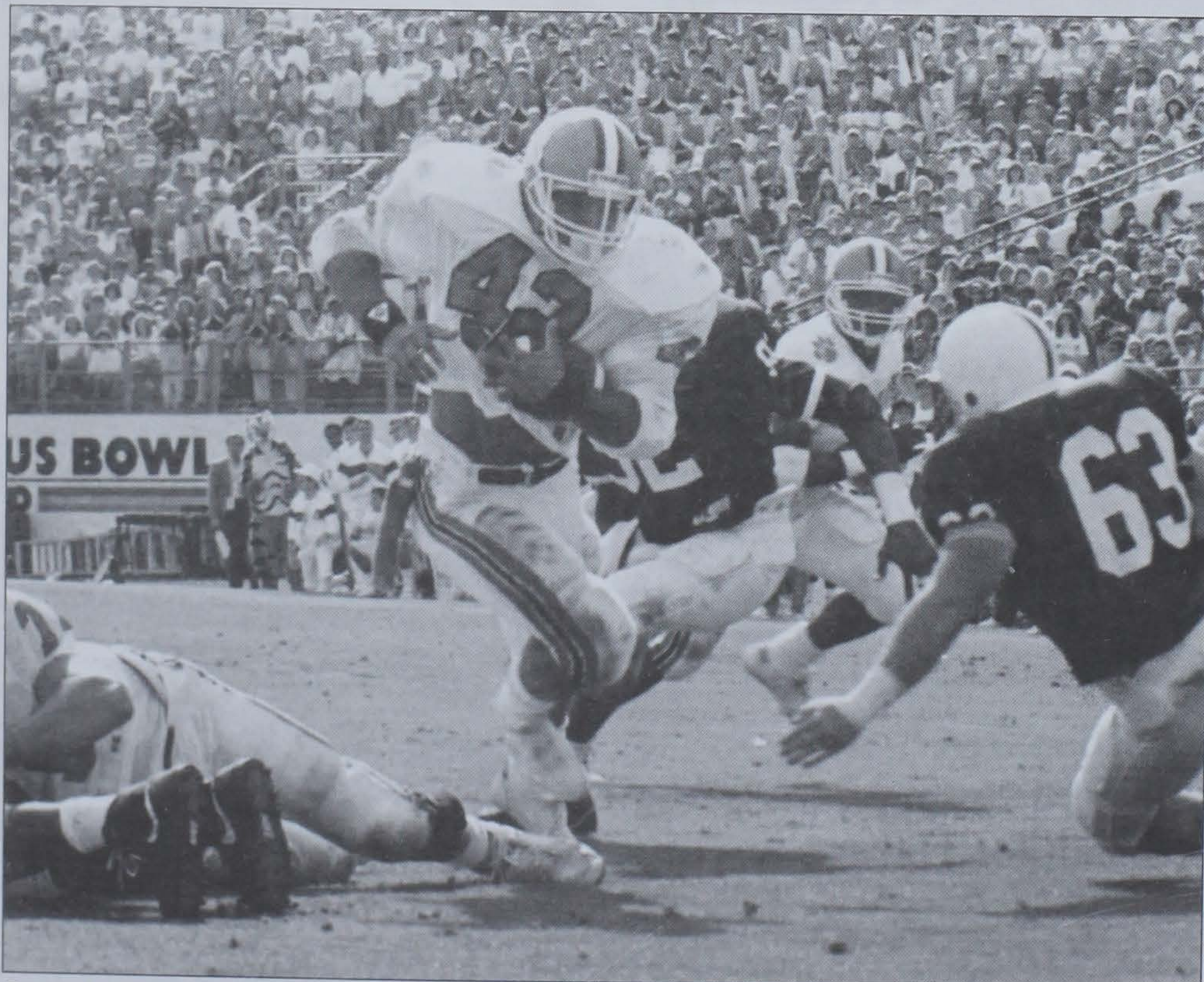
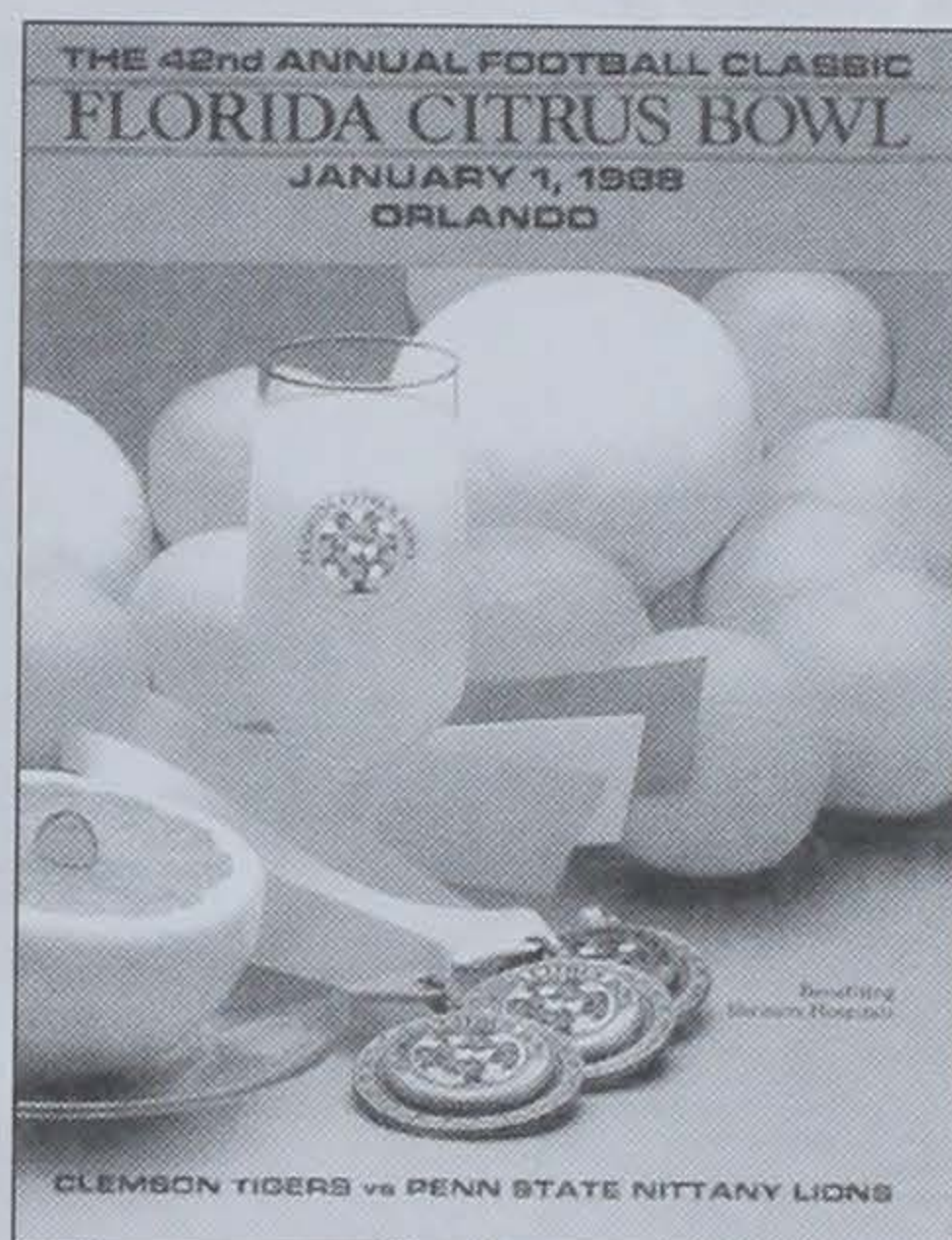
Williams, who was also named the Offensive Player-of-the-Game, completed 14 of 24 passes for 214 yards. His primary target was wide receiver Keith Jennings, who hauled in

seven passes for 110 yards, his best career performance. Wideout Gary Cooper also added four receptions for 56 yards against Penn State.

The Tigers rushed for 285 yards against Penn State. Terry Allen was the leading rusher with 105 yards and one touchdown. Full-back Tracy Johnson ran for 88 yards and three touchdowns. Joe Henderson added 54 yards on the ground and another touchdown.

Defensively, Clemson was led by cornerback James Lott's eight tackles. Safety Richard Smith also had seven tackles and one pass broken up. Strong safety Gene Beasley and linebacker Doug Brewster both had six tackles. Linebacker Dorian Marable was selected the Citrus Bowl's Defensive Player-of-the-Game

with his five tackles, including one for a loss. He also intercepted a pass in the endzone and returned it 46 yards in the third quarter.

The Tigers rang in the New Year in fine fashion with a 13-6 victory over the Oklahoma Sooners, moving into the top-10 of the final AP poll for the first time since 1982 with a ninth-place ranking. The victory also gave Danny Ford a victory over the winningest active coach in Division I, Barry Switzer. Ford defeated the top-three winningest active coaches this decade with wins over Switzer, Tom Osborne of Nebraska and Joe Paterno of Penn State.

Although the Tigers faced a wishbone offense for the first time since Ford became head coach, the Clemson defense came through with flying colors, holding the Sooners to only 116 yards, and no touchdowns on the ground.

The game was a defensive struggle as the two teams failed to combine for 500 yards of total offense.

The first five series of the first quarter ended in punts for both teams. Late in the period, the Sooners drove down to the Clemson one-yardline, and the Tigers defense faced a first-and-goal situation. Outside linebacker Levon Kirkland stopped the ballcarrier for no gain on first down. On second down Jesse Hatcher sacked Jamelle Holieway at the 19. After an incomplete pass, the Sooners were forced to settle on a field goal to take a 3-0 lead.

Doug Brewster intercepted a Holieway pass early in the second quarter to set up the Tigers' first score, a 20-yard field goal by Chris Gardocki. With time running out in the first half, Gardocki put the Tigers up with another kick, this time a 46-yarder.

A Clemson fumble in the third quarter gave the Sooners the opportunity to take the lead, but the Clemson defense held and R.D. Lashar hit again from 30 yards. The Tigers responded on the next series, driving 80 yards in 15 plays for the game's only touchdown, as Terry Allen scored on a four-yard run. Allen, the game's Most Valuable Player, rushed

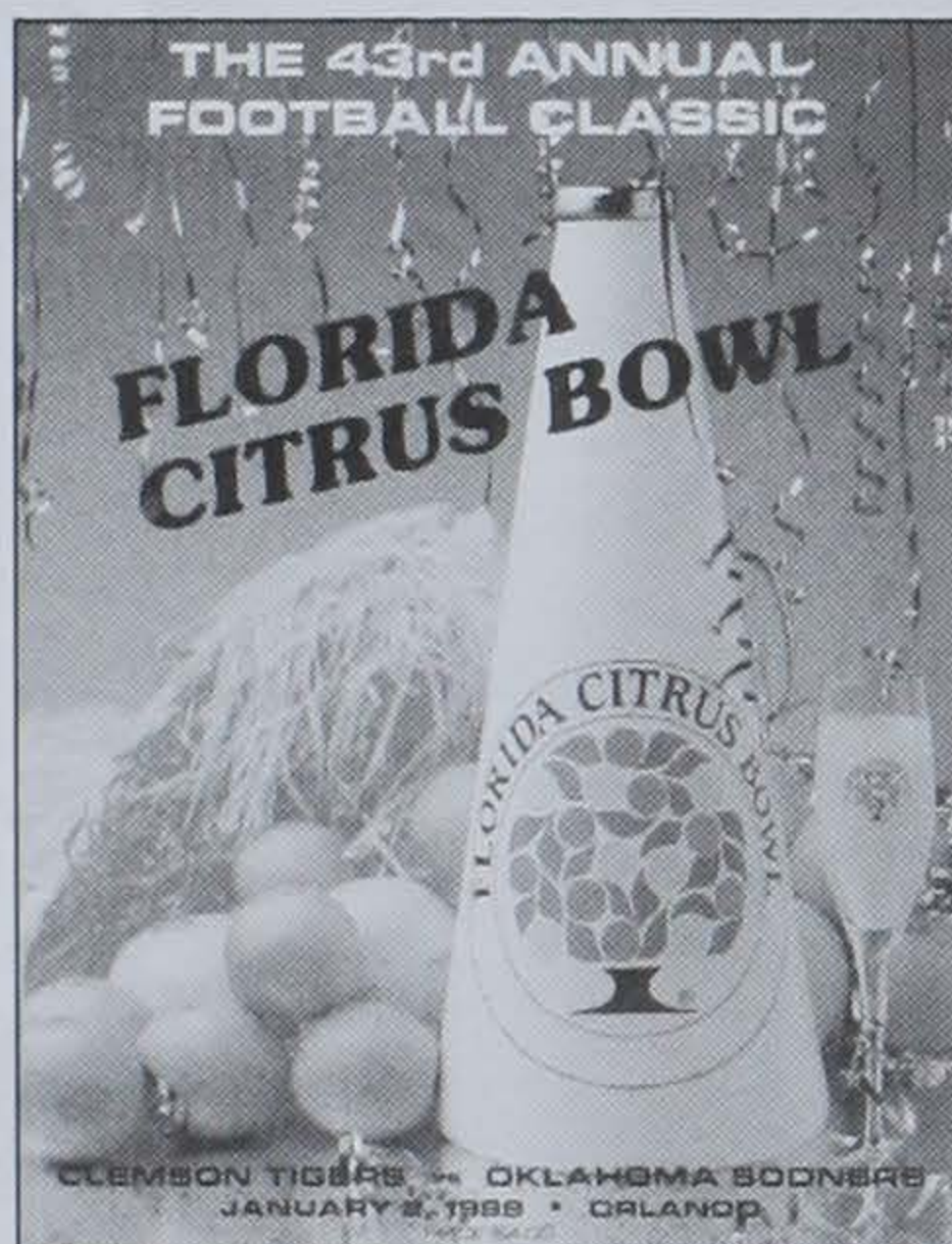
for 25 yards and caught two passes for 17 yards on the drive.

Defensive MVP Jesse Hatcher caused and recovered a fumble on the Sooners' next drive, but the Sooners would have one more opportunity to score before the final horn sounded. After the Tigers punted, Oklahoma drove from its own 20 to the Clemson 14, as Holieway put the Tiger secondary to the test by putting the ball in the air. On the last play of the game, freshman Dexter Davis knocked down a pass in the endzone to seal the Tiger victory.

Terry Allen was named the Citrus Bowl MVP for his performance. Allen rushed for only 53 yards, his season low, but scored the game's only touchdown and caught four passes for 47 yards to

lead all Clemson receivers.

Bandit end Jesse Hatcher was named Defensive Most Valuable Player for what was his best career performance as he racked up nine tackles, had two tackles for a loss of 33 yards, including an 18-yard sack, broke up two passes, caused and recovered a fumble, and had four quarterback pressures.

Terry Allen was the offensive MVP with 53 yards rushing and a career-high 47 yards receiving for 100 all-purpose yards in the defensive struggle. His four-yard touchdown run proved to be the game winner.

The Tigers closed out the 1989 season with a stylish victory over West Virginia and Heisman Trophy finalist Major Harris, as a dominant Clemson defense held the high-powered Mountaineer offense to only 237 yards in total offense. The win gave Clemson's senior class the ACC record for victories as they became the first class in conference history to record 38 wins and the first Clemson team ever to win four straight bowl games.

West Virginia quarterback Major Harris came into the game ranked eighth nationally in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency but the Clemson defense, led by outside linebacker Levon Kirkland, enabled the shifty Harris to gain only 17 yards on the ground and 119 yards in the air on an 11-21 passing effort. Kirkland was named MVP for his efforts, as he had nine tackles, a five-yard sack, caused a key fumble, broke up a Mountaineer pass, and recorded three quarterback pressures.

The fourth quarter was all Clemson, as the Tigers moved the ball 47 yards on the ground to set up a four-yard Joe Henderson touchdown. Vince Taylor recovered a second Harris fumble and after a Clemson punt, freshman defensive tackle Chester McGlockton, the ACC sack leader, knocked the ball loose from Harris once again and fell on it in the endzone for a Tiger touchdown, upping the score to 24-7 in favor of Clemson. As the final seconds ticked off the clock, DeChane Cameron came in at quarter-

back for the Tigers and hit Rodney Fletcher over the middle for a 34-yard gain to set up a 24-yard Chris Gardocki field goal, putting the final score at 27-7.

Senior tailback Joe Henderson led the Tigers in rushing with 92 yards on 22 carries and one touchdown, while Chris Morocco, who was shaken up late in the game, gained 65 yards on the ground on 11 carries. Rodney Fletcher was the leading receiver as he pulled down three catches for 66 yards.

Chris Gardocki kept the Tigers in good field position, as he had a 46-yard average on four punts, including a long kick of 63.

Defensively, linebacker Doug Brewster led the team in tackles with 10, followed by Kirkland's nine and strong safety Arlington Nunn and inside linebacker Ed

McDaniel, who had seven stops each.

Chris Morocco was his normal efficient self at quarterback, hitting 5-9 passes for 57 yards and rushing for 65 yards in 11 attempts. He left the final drive of the game with a concussion. Clemson gained 21 first downs and had just one turnover in the performance.

Sophomore **Levon Kirkland** had nine tackles, caused a fumble, registered a sack, and a pass deflection as he continually harrassed Major Harris and the West Virginia defense. He was named the game's MVP.

After a separation of 22 years, two coaches found themselves once again on the same football field. This time, however, they were on opposite sidelines. Ken Hatfield and John Mackovic, who had been graduate assistants together at Army in the 1960's, were reunited in the 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl.

The Clemson defense dominated the line by holding Illinois to 247 yards, 150 yards under their season average. The Clemson offense surprised the Illini defense with an unexpected aerial assault. Tiger quarterback and game MVP DeChane Cameron, who was less than a 50 percent passer in the regular season, completed 14 of 19 passes for a Hall of Fame Bowl record 73 percent.

Cameron's passing yardage totalled 141 yards and he completed TD passes to Doug Thomas and Howard Hall. It was the first TD reception for both players in their respective careers. Thomas caught five passes on the day for 57 yards, career highs for both categories for the senior in his last game.

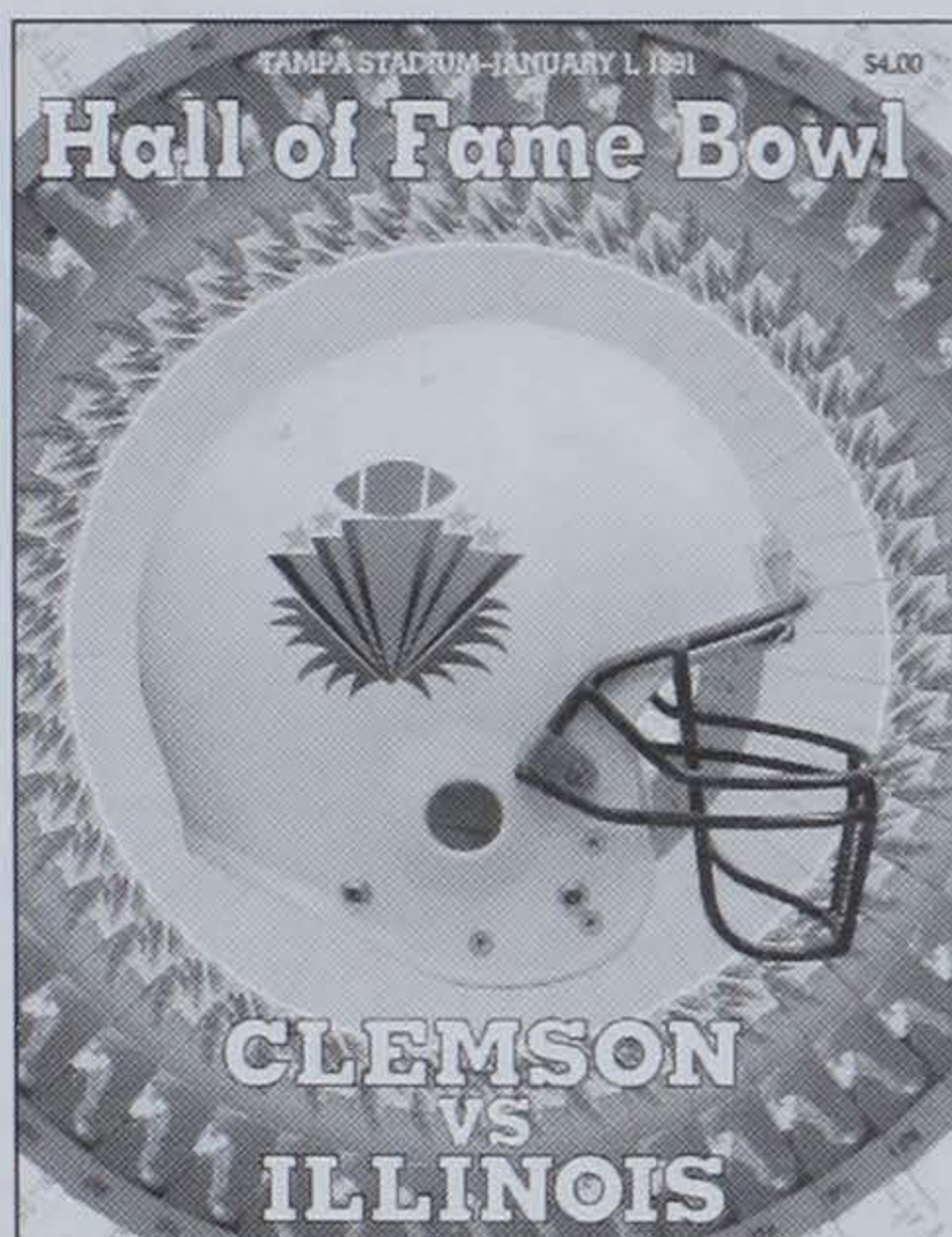
Clemson took its opening possession 71 yards to the Illinois two where Chris Gardocki tapped in any easy three. After Illinois fumbled on its first offensive play of the game, Clemson scored a touchdown with a 14-yard pass from Cameron to Thomas. Clemson had not scored a passing touchdown in any of its four previous bowl victories.

In the second quarter, the Tigers would score two more touchdowns. The first was the result of a 17-yard Cameron pass to fullback Howard Hall. It

was just the third TD pass to a Clemson fullback in the last 18 years. Clemson then put the contest out of reach just three plays later when Arlington Nunn scored on a 34-yard interception return. It was the senior's third interception returned for a TD in 1990, a Clemson record.

The Clemson defense continued to hold Illinois throughout the remainder of the game. John Johnson led the Tiger pass defense as he picked up two sacks to lead a Clemson point prevention unit that had six sacks on the day. Illinois reached the Clemson eight-yard line in the fourth quarter, but the Tiger defense forced a fumble and Ed McDaniel picked up the ball. Illinois had the ball in Tiger territory just three times.

The Tiger defense earned its third shutout of the year. It was the first shutout at a Hall of Fame Bowl and Clemson's first bowl shutout in 17 bowls. The 30-0 triumph was a Tiger record for victory margin in a bowl game.

John Johnson had seven tackles, including a pair of sacks to lead a Clemson defense that shutout Illinois and held John Mackovic's team to just 247 yards of total offense, 59 on the ground.

Clemson's bowl game victory streak ended at five as the Tigers left the state of Florida with their first bowl loss since 1985, and their worst defeat since 1986, when the 14th-ranked Golden Bears of California defeated 13th-ranked Clemson 37-13 in the Florida Citrus Bowl.

For the first time since the 1988 season, the Clemson defense, which led the nation in rushing defense in 1991, allowed an opposing running back to rush for over 100 yards, as California's Russell White crossed the century mark with 103 yards.

The Golden Bears scored early and often in the first half, taking the opening kickoff 76 yards for a touchdown and adding a 31 yard field goal on their third possession.

The Tigers were unable to gain a first down after the ensuing kickoff and were forced to punt. Although Chuck Lynch hit a 49-yard boot, California's Brian Treggs eluded the Tiger special forces unit and went the distance for a 72-yard touchdown.

Treggs had 124 punt return yards on the day, most ever against Clemson in a bowl game and one of the top opponent performances in any game against Clemson.

Clemson got on the board for the first time with time running out in the first quarter as Nelson Welch connected on a 32-yard field goal on a drive highlighted by a 43-yard run by fullback Rudy Harris.

The highlight of the game for the Tigers came with just under five minutes remaining in the first half as quarterback DeChane Cameron broke loose for a 62-yard scoring romp. That play marked the longest run from scrimmage for a Clemson quarterback in 13

years, but also marked the only touchdown that Clemson would score that afternoon.

The only score for Clemson in the second half was a 36-yard field goal by Welch in the third period, while the Golden Bears would add a field goal and a touchdown on a 23-yard pass hookup.

The Tiger defense managed to hold California scoreless through the fourth quarter, but Clemson could not put up any points, as it turned the ball over three times on interceptions and once more on downs.

Two Tigers who were playing in their last game in a Clemson uniform were named team Most Valuable Players in the loss. Defensive tackle Chester McGlockton, who had six tackles for the game, including three tack-

les for loss and one-and-a-half sacks, was named the Tigers' defensive MVP, while quarterback DeChane Cameron was named Clemson's Most Valuable Offensive Performer, after he scored Clemson's only touchdown and had 189 yards in total offense.

Heading into the Peach Bowl with Kentucky, Clemson owned the seventh-best bowl winning percentage in college football history with a .611 mark. The Tigers upped that percentage in an exciting way, with a 14-13 victory over Kentucky, putting Clemson's overall bowl record at 12-7. Tommy West also became the first coach in NCAA history to win his first game for a school in a bowl game without serving as a coach in that program during the regular season.

West's first game as Tiger head coach did not lack for excitement, as Clemson sealed the victory with a 21-yard touchdown pass from Patrick Sapp to Terry Smith with 20-seconds remaining in the fourth quarter to give the Tigers a one-point victory. Smith led all Clemson receivers with four grabs for 56 yards for the contest.

A tandem of running backs who hailed from Pensacola, FL, led the Clemson rushing attack, as starting tailback Rodney Blunt rushed for a season-high 58 yards on 15 carries to lead the team. But, it was red-shirt freshman Emory Smith who was named the Tigers' Offensive MVP, as he rambled for 45 yards from his fullback position, including a two-yard touchdown run. Smith also helped set up the winning score on a 57-yard pass reception late in the fourth quarter.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and drove 79-yards to the Clemson one, before linebacker Mike Barber forced a fumble that was recovered by

LB Tim Jones. Clemson took over at the two, and starting QB Dexter McCleon engineered a 98-yard scoring drive that culminated in a one-yard run by Emory Smith.

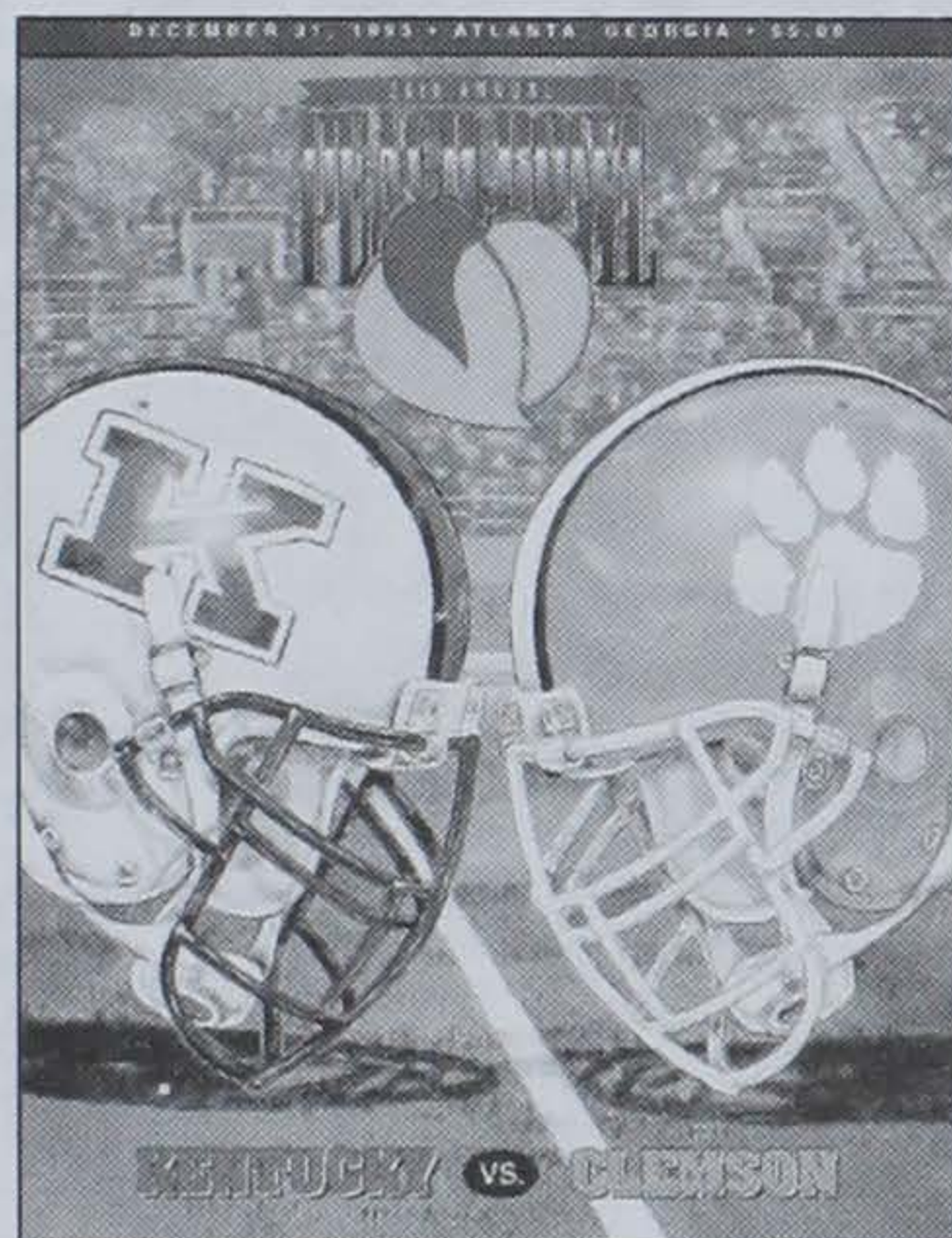
The Wildcats drove back down the field on their next possession, this time reaching the Clemson one again, where they decided to go for it on fourth down. The Clemson defense held once again, as defensive tackle Brentson Buckner stopped the UK ball carrier for no gain. Buckner was named the game's Defensive MVP after tallying a dozen tackles, including three tackles for loss, and pressured the Wildcat quarterback three times. Buckner became just the fourth Tiger defensive lineman in the last eight years to record at least a dozen tackles in a game.

The Tigers were forced to punt after taking over at the one and Kentucky got on the scoreboard with a 17-yard field goal by Nicky Nickles. The score heading into the half stood at 7-3.

Neither squad scored in the third quarter, and barely into the fourth period, Kentucky took the lead with a 46-yard touchdown drive. On Clemson's next possession, McCleon was intercepted by Kentucky's Willie Cannon, and the Wilcats upped their lead to 13-7 on a 43 yard scoring drive, culminating in another Nickles field goal, this one from 26 yards.

With time running down in the fourth quarter, quarterback Patrick Sapp came off the bench after playing sparingly in the first half. The two teams

exchanged punts before the Tigers got the ball at their own 18 with 3:50 left. On the first play of the drive, Sapp threw a screen to Emory Smith for 57 yards. With under a minute left, Kentucky linebacker Marty Moore intercepted a Sapp pass. But, on the return, Stacy Seegars jarred the ball loose and Brent LeJeune recovered. With 20 seconds left in the game, Sapp connected with Terry Smith on a 21-yard TD and Nelson Welch hit the PAT to give the Tigers a one-point victory.

Chris Jones and the Clemson defense had 13 tackles for loss against Syracuse.

Clemson entered the 1996 Gator Bowl fresh off of five consecutive victories, including an emotional 38-17 win over arch-rival South Carolina. The Tigers had won six consecutive games away from Death Valley; but the streak ended there at the hands of Syracuse. The Orangemen handed Clemson its worst bowl defeat in its 20-game bowl history, 41-0.

In front of a rain-soaked crowd of mostly Tiger fans, freshman quarterback and future NFL star Donovan McNabb ran, passed and beat the Tiger defense. McNabb, the MVP of the Gator Bowl, was unstoppable, as he threw three touchdown passes and ran for another. He completed 13 of 23 passes for 309 yards. Wide receiver Marvin Harrison was on the other end of many McNabb passes as he grabbed seven for 173 yards.

Malcolm Thomas scored less than two minutes into the contest on a one-yard run. On Syracuse's next possession, McNabb led a 12-play, 62-yard drive that culminated in a McNabb five-yard keeper for a touchdown. After Kevin Abrams intercepted a pass late in the opening quarter, McNabb found Harrison wide open for a 38-yard touchdown reception.

In the second quarter, the Orangemen defense thwarted Clemson's best scoring chance of the afternoon. After the Tigers had gone 53 yards down the field on 11 plays to Syracuse's six-yard-line, Clemson faced a crucial fourth-and-two situation. Down by 20 points on the scoreboard, Clemson called a play-action pass that was just out of the diving hands of tight end Lamont Hall, ending the drive on downs.

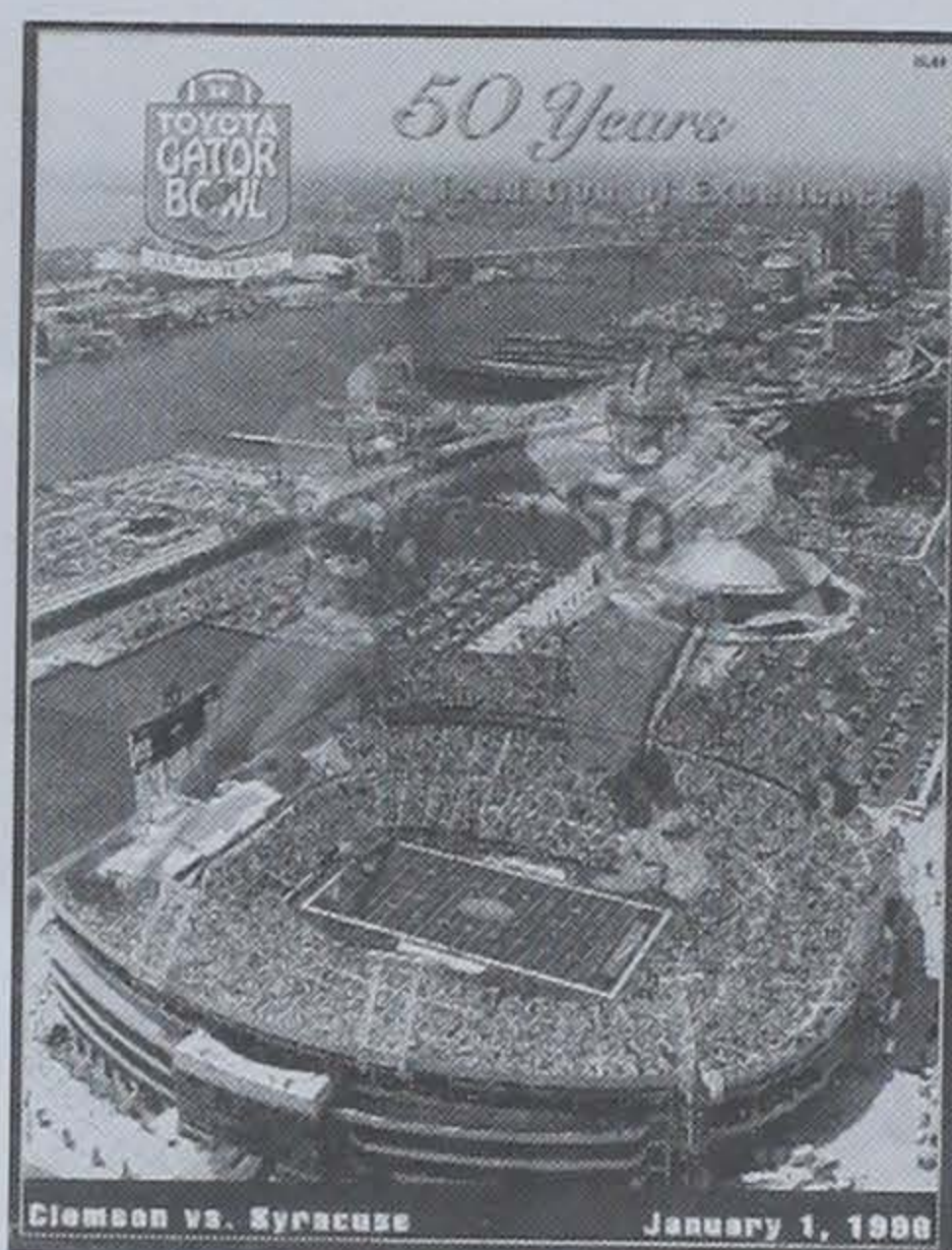
The homecoming for Jacksonville natives and childhood teammates Brian Dawkins and Patrick Sapp was a bitter-sweet one, although Sapp did register a sack for a nine-yard loss. The Tigers, who entered the game with the nation's fourth best rush-

ing attack could only manage 90 yards on 34 attempts. The Orangemen held Raymond Priester, the ACC's leading rusher, to just 36 yards on 15 carries.

Syracuse added two more touchdowns in the third quarter to put the game well out of reach. After a 57-yard pass to Sir Mawn Wilson, Thomas ran two yards to the right for his second touchdown of the afternoon. Thomas, a Jacksonville native, rushed for 71 yards on 14 carries. Each team traded prodigious third period punts, including a 73-yard effort by Sean Reali. The two bright spots for Clemson were senior punter Chris McNally, who averaged 49.3 yards on six punts, and Brian Dawkins, who had a team-high 10 tackles. The Orangemen had their second

one-play drive when McNabb connected with Harrison over the middle for a 56-yard touchdown play.

In the fourth quarter, Syracuse put the finishing touches on a brilliant performance, as McNabb hit Kaseem Sinceno on a third-down play in the right side of the endzone for a 15-yard touchdown reception. The Orangemen ended the day 12 of 19 on third downs and held the ball 10 minutes longer than the Tigers.

Raymond Priester set a Clemson Bowl record for rushing yardage with 151 yards gained during the 1996 Peach Bowl. On the defensive side of the ball, defensive lineman Trevor Pryce had three tackles for loss and one sack in addition to a caused fumble.

Even with these fine accomplishments, Clemson still fell to the Louisiana State Tigers by a three-point margin, 10-7 at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta, GA.

Nealon Greene opened the scoring for Clemson on a three-yard run for a touchdown.

In addition to Priester's outstanding game, contributions to the running attack were also made by Emory Smith, who had nine carries for 40 yards. Smith, brother of NFL star Emmitt Smith, was playing in his second Peach Bowl, as he was vital in Clemson's victory over Kentucky in the 1993 Peach Bowl.

Clemson's sole touchdown drive was 1:29 minutes long and consisted of only three runs. The outstanding field position was achieved on a fumble recovery by Harold Means following a sack and caused fumble by Trevor Pryce.

Defensively, Clemson had five players contribute to a combined nine tackles for losses. These tackles for losses combined for a total loss of fifty-three yards of Louisiana State's offense.

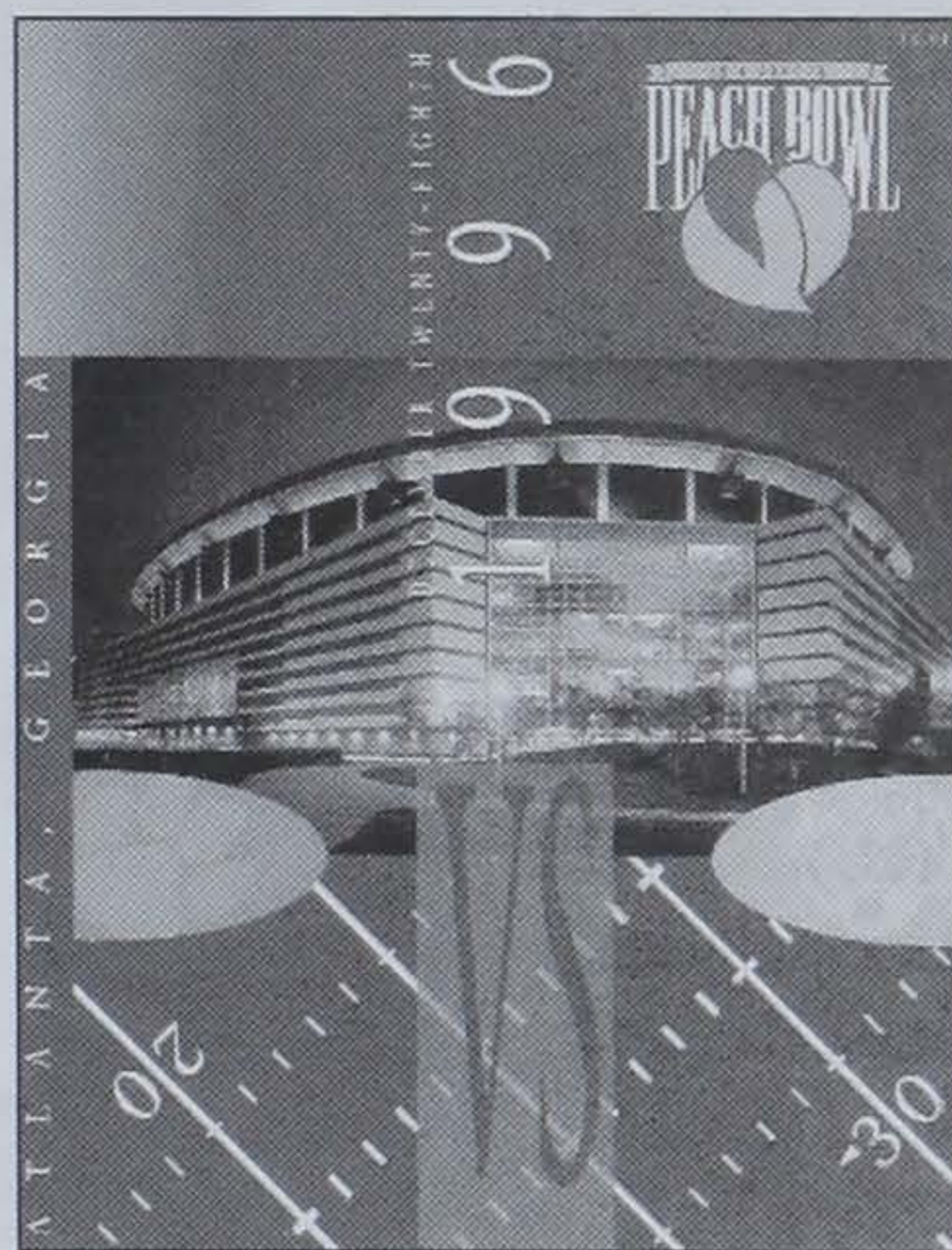
Louisiana State scored its only touchdown of the game during the second quarter when Kevin Faulk ran three yards to a touchdown. The extra point by Richey was good and the game was tied 7-7. Louisi-

ana State scored again during this quarter, with a 22-yard field goal by Richey to take the lead for good. Neither team scored in the second half, as both defenses dominated.

Clemson got the ball back with 2:29 remaining, but a 52-yard field goal attempt by Matt Padgett with 1:02 remaining in the game was blocked by Adam Roman and Louisiana State hung on for its second bowl victory over Clemson. The SEC Tigers also defeated Clemson 7-0 in the 1959 Sugar Bowl.

Time of possession was fairly even throughout the game, as Louisiana State led with 30:15 minutes versus Clemson's 29:45 minutes. Not only was time of possession even in this game, but also the total net yards gained (Clemson 258 - Louisiana State

287) and the average gain per play (4.2-4.5) were close as well.

Anthony Simmons finished the contest with a game high 14 tackles. Four of those tackles were for loss and included two sacks.

Rahim Abdullah came up with Clemson's second punt block of the game against Auburn's Jaret Holmes in the third quarter. The ball was recovered on the Auburn two-yard line by Mal Lawyer and led to a Clemson touchdown.

Behind the strength of the Auburn defense, Dameyune Craig was able to rally his offense in the fourth quarter enroute to a come from behind 21-17 victory over the Clemson Tigers at the Georgia Dome. Auburn's offense managed to score 15 points on three consecutive scoring drives to overcome an 11-point deficit in the fourth quarter.

Clemson got on the board midway through the second quarter with the help of the first of many great special teams plays. Jaret Holmes' punt was blocked by Rod Gardner and returned 18 yards by Chad Speck for a touchdown. It was the only blocked kick of Gardner's career.

Auburn would answer the Clemson scoring strike on its very next drive. Peach Bowl Offensive MVP Dameyune Craig led Auburn on a seven-play, 67-yard drive, that ended when Jaret Holmes converted on his second field goal of the first half from 24 yards out. The score reduced Clemson's lead to 7-6 with only four minutes left in the first half.

With 5:18 remaining in the third quarter, Clemson's special teams stepped up big again when Rahim Abdullah blocked Holmes' punt and Mal Lawyer recovered the ball on the two-yard line. From there, Clemson's Terry Witherspoon ran the ball in from two yards out on first and goal to give the Tigers a 14-6 lead.

Auburn was forced to punt from inside its own 10-yard line the following possession. Clemson's Tony Horne returned the punt 20 yards to the Auburn 26-yard line, giving the Tigers great field position. However, the Clemson offense failed to gain a first down. David Richardson connected on a 48-yard field goal, which gave Clemson a 17-6 advantage with 2:10 left in the third quarter.

Down 11 points, Auburn's Dameyune Craig began to rally his team. He led the Tigers on a 9-play, 72-yard drive on their very next possession. The Auburn drive was capped off with a miraculous 22-yard touchdown run by Craig on a fourth-down play.

Despite failing to convert the two-point conversion, Craig's run was a turning point for the Auburn offense and reduced Clemson's lead to 17-12.

Clemson was forced to punt on its next possession, giving the ball back to an Auburn offense that was finally clicking. Craig and his Tigers drove 49 yards in two minutes and 22 seconds, resulting in a Rusty Williams 7-yard touchdown run. Once again, Auburn missed the two-point conversion attempt but held on to the narrow lead at 18-17.

Following an interception of a Nealon Greene pass, Auburn drove down to the Clemson 5-yard line and Holmes converted on a 22 yard field goal, giving the Auburn Tigers a 21-17 lead. Clemson's offense, which was held to only four first downs the entire game, turned the ball over to Auburn on its next possession when Greene's fourth-and-10 pass sailed over the head of wide receiver Mal Lawyer. Auburn would run the remaining 2:30 off the clock.

Wayne Madkin ran for a touchdown and threw for another in the fourth quarter to lead #15 Mississippi State past Clemson 17-7 in the Peach Bowl and a record crowd of 73,315 in Atlanta, GA. Clemson outgained the Bulldogs 391-265 in total offense, but many Tiger drives stalled in Bulldog territory, as Mississippi State's defense, ranked #1 in the country in yards allowed per game, thwarted the Tigers and forced six turnovers.

Despite the loss, Clemson's defense played one of its best games of the season, holding the Bulldogs (10-2) to just 3.7 yards per play. The defense also had to begin many drives after Tiger turnovers in Clemson's own territory. Eleven of Mississippi State's first 12 possessions ended without a score, with the lone points coming on a field goal.

Individually, Clemson was led on offense by Brian Wofford, who had six catches for a team season-high 147 yards, including four catches of 20 yards or more. Quarterback Brandon Streeter threw for 301 yards on 24-50 passing. Freshman Bernard Rambert, who played most of the game after starting tailback Travis Zachery left the game early in the first quarter with a dislocated elbow, had 70 yards rushing on 18 carries.

Clemson looked to be in business when Streeter connected with Rod Gardner, who had seven catches for 75 yards, for 37 yards on the game's first play. But Fred Smoot intercepted Streeter's fourth-down pass. Clemson had another golden opportunity later in the opening quarter. Thanks in part to Wofford's 32-yard catch and run, Clemson drove 64 yards in 15 plays before Tony Lazzara's 25-yard field goal was blocked and returned into Tiger territory. The Clemson defense continually came up with stands, however. The teams went into halftime 0-0, the first scoreless tie at halftime for Clemson since the 1988 Virginia

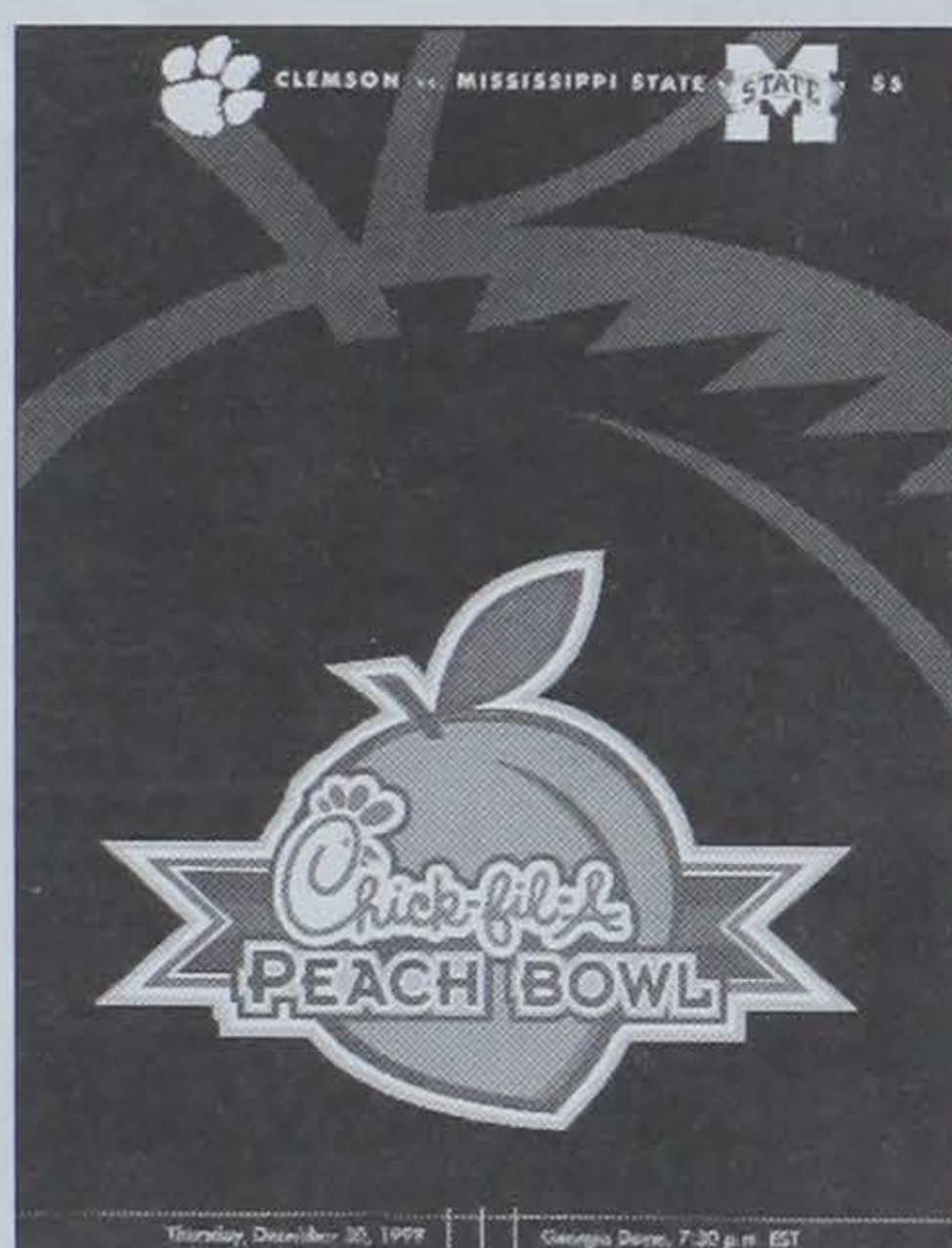
game.

Scott Westerfield put the Bulldogs ahead 3-0 on the opening drive of the second half. After two screen passes that netted a total of 30 yards, Westerfield split the uprights from 39 yards.

The Bulldogs reached the endzone for the first time on their first possession of the fourth quarter. Madkin avoided would-be tacklers and out-ran Keith Adams for a two-yard touchdown. The Bulldogs' drive was twice extended on third-down plays in the red-zone by pass interference calls.

Clemson responded with an eight-play, 70-yard drive capped by Streeter's one-yard plunge to make the score 10-7. But Mississippi State came right back with a clinching touchdown-scoring drive, capped by Dontae Walker's 15-yard catch on a screen pass. Madkin's 21-yard completion to Matt Butler on third-and-seven was the critical play of the drive.

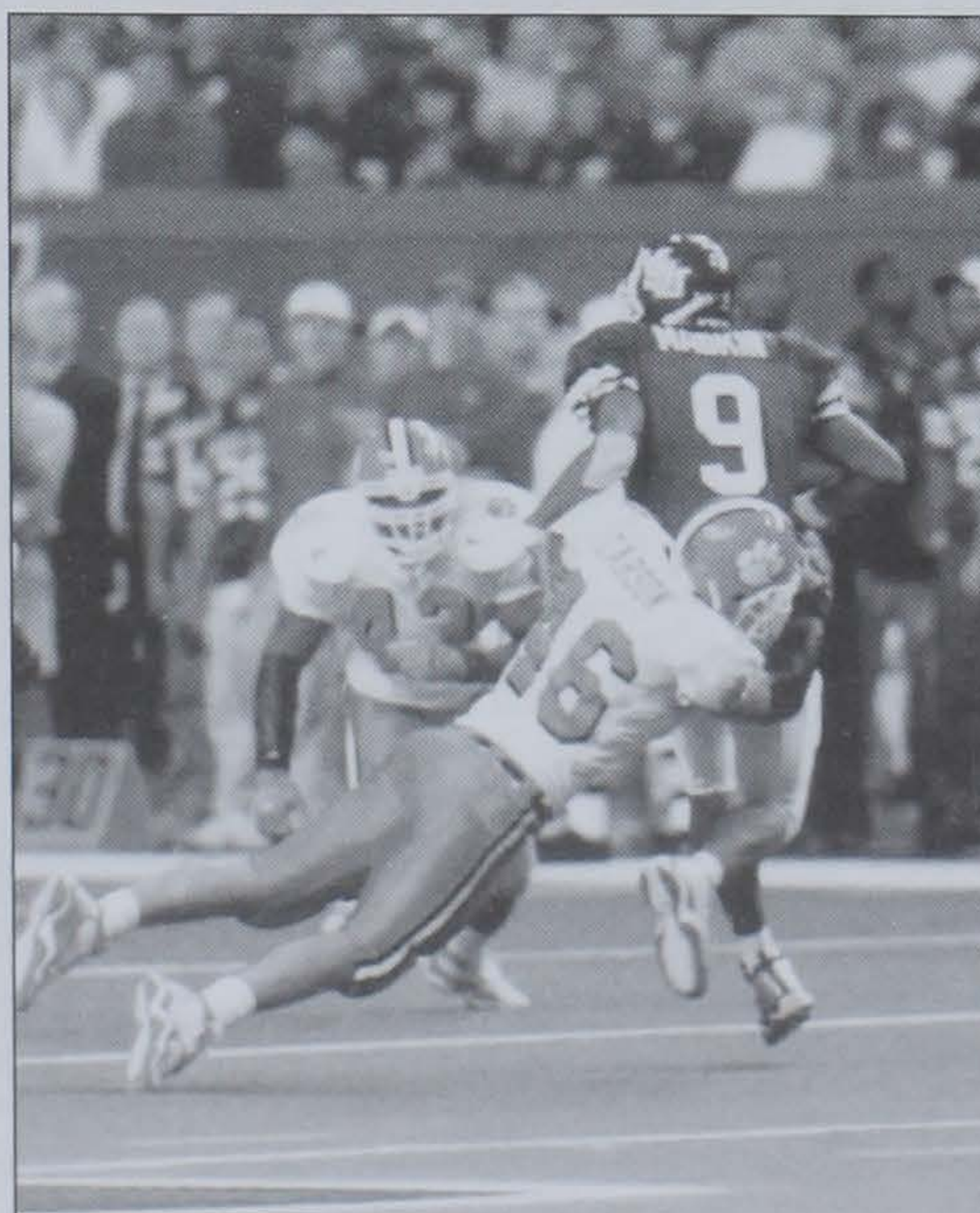
Defensively, the Tigers were led by Atlanta-area native Chad Carson, who had 16 tackles, including two for loss, a sack, a pass breakup, and four quarterback pressures. DoMarco Fox and Atlanta-area native, Adams, each added 10 stops, including two for loss and seven quarterback pressures by Adams. Adams was named Defensive Player-of-the-Game.

NFL #1 draft pick Michael Vick rebounded from an ankle-injury to lead Virginia Tech to a victory in his final college game, a 41-20 win over the Tigers. The junior quarterback finished with two touchdowns while completing 10 of 18 passes for 205 yards. The contest was a battle of mobile quarterbacks, as Clemson's Woodrow Dantzler gained 261 yards of total offense for the afternoon.

The Hokies capitalized on early costly Clemson mistakes. The uncharacteristic play began on the first drive when long snapper Henry Owen bounced his delivery to punter Jaime Somaini, who was tackled for an eight-yard loss by Lee Suggs. Tech scored on its first offensive play of the game when Vick threw to Jarrett Ferguson on a 23-yard touchdown play.

Later in the quarter, Terry Jolly jumped off-side to preserve an 11-play, 59-yard drive that ended in a six-yard touchdown run for Vick.

Clemson got back into the game, but at a heavy cost. Dantzler found Travis Zachery for a 23-yard touchdown early in the second quarter. However, Zachery's missed the rest of the game due to a broken foot that occurred as the tailback leaped into the endzone. On the play, Zachery also snapped Lester Brown's single-season Clemson record of 17 touchdowns in a season.

Two possessions later, Keith Adams sacked Vick for 18 yards, forcing a fumble that Terry Bryant recovered on the Hokie 13. Clemson had to settle for an Aaron Hunt field goal, bringing the Tigers to within 14-10. But, that was as close as Clemson could get. Suggs scored his first touchdown of the day on a three-yard rush on the next possession to give the Hokies a 21-10 lead at intermission.

Hopes of a second half Clemson rally were shattered when Vick found Andre Davis for a 55-yard

touchdown completion on the first drive of the second half. Willie Simmons relieved Dantzler in the final period. On his first possession Simmons led the offense on an 11-play, 71-yard drive that ended in a 23-yard touchdown pass to Rod Gardner. With seven catches on the day Gardner, surpassed Terry Smith's Clemson record for career receptions, finishing his career with 166.

Both quarterbacks shined in the much-anticipated match-up between Vick and Dantzler, although the Hokie quarterback left with both a Gator Bowl and a MVP trophy. Vick had the advantage in the passing game, his numbers slightly besting Dantzler's 15-32 for 180 yards. Dantzler did the most damage on the ground, amassing 81 of Clemson's 88 rushing yards. Vick rushed for 19

yards.

Charles Hafley concluded a breakout season with 14 tackles. Robert Carswell and Keith Adams played well in their final appearances in a Clemson uniform. Carswell finished with 12 tackles and Adams registered 10 stops. Carswell's third-quarter interception was the eighth of his career. Of Vick's 12 career interceptions, three landed in Carswell's hands.



Rod Gardner became Clemson's career leader in receptions against Virginia Tech in the 2001 Gator Bowl. His seven receptions included a 23-yard touchdown catch.

Tiger Leaders

Rod Gardner, playing in his final game, had seven receptions for 94 yards and a touchdown. He became Clemson's career leader in receptions in the process, finishing with 166 total receptions.

Robert Carswell, also playing in his final game at Clemson, had 12 tackles and an interception. The 12 tackles were a season high and the interception was the third of his career against Virginia Tech's noted quarterback Michael Vick.

In front of a nationally televised audience on New Year's Eve, Clemson concluded its 2001 season with a 49-24 win over Louisiana Tech in the Crucial.com Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, ID. The Tigers managed to win despite snowy conditions and freezing temperatures that set new records for a Clemson football game.

Clemson won by putting together one of its best all-around performances of the season. The offense racked up 548 yards of total offense and set a school record for most touchdown passes in a game with five. The Tigers scored four touchdowns in the third quarter, setting a new team record for most points scored in one quarter in a bowl game. Four touchdowns were scored by freshmen, marking the first time in school history that has happened. The defense held the Bulldogs to just 49 total yards rushing while intercepting three of quarterback Luke McCown's passes and sacking him six times.

After falling behind 10-7, Clemson took the lead 14-10 with 6:54 remaining before halftime when quarterback Woodrow Dantzler connected with Roscoe Crosby on a 53-yard touchdown reception. Dantzler helped extend the lead on the first drive of the second half by finding Ben Hall in the end zone and igniting the record-setting third quarter scoring effort. Dantzler recorded his third touchdown pass of the game two minutes later when he hooked up with Bernard Rambert for a 62-yard score.

Following an interception by Brian Mance, the offense capitalized seven plays later when Rambert scampered down the left sideline for 21 yards and a

score. Charles Hafley intercepted Luke McCown's pass on the Bulldogs' first play of the ensuing drive, and Airese Currie's 19-yard fumble-rookie play less than two minutes later marked the fourth touchdown of the quarter and gave Clemson a 42-10 lead with 4:34 remaining in the period.

Backup quarterback Willie Simmons entered the game in the final period and helped contribute to Clemson's final score of the game, completing his only pass of the contest to Derrick Hamilton for a 57-yard touchdown with just over nine minutes remaining. Despite two late scores by Louisiana Tech, the Tigers' impressive team effort left fans excited about the potential of the 2002 campaign.

Dantzler ended his remarkable career with a fitting performance. He completed 15-23 passes for 218 yards, and his four touchdown passes tied his own team record. Rambert posted game-breaker numbers with 101 yards and a touchdown on 16 carries. Center Kyle Young was named to **Sports Illustrated's** All-Bowl team, as he had 18 knockdown blocks in the contest.



Tiger Leaders

Woodrow Dantzler, playing in his final game, capped his collegiate career with an MVP performance. The quarterback completed 15 of 23 passes for 218 yards and four touchdowns with no interceptions. The multipurpose threat also rushed 15 times for 57 yards.

John Leake led the Tigers on defense with 13 tackles, including a nine-yard sack.

The Texas Tech Red Raiders defeated Clemson 55-15 in the 2003 Mazda Tangerine Bowl at Florida Citrus Bowl Stadium in Orlando, FL. Making their fourth consecutive bowl appearance, the Tigers were unable to contain quarterback Kliff Kingsbury, who threw for 375 yards and three touchdowns. Earning game MVP honors, Kingsbury completed 32 of his 43 passes and finished the season with 5,017 passing yards. Although Kingsbury left the game in the third quarter with a leg injury, he returned to play in the final quarter and became just the third player in Division I-A history to eclipse the 5,000-yard passing mark in a single season.

The performance of Kingsbury and the Texas Tech offense led the team to its first

postseason win since 1995 and gave Head Coach Mike Leach his first career postseason win. The Red Raiders compiled 555 yards of total offense and handed the Tigers their worst loss of the season.

Charlie Whitehurst, who completed 20 of his 48 passes for 263 yards, led Clemson. His favorite target was Kevin Youngblood, who had a game-high 134 yards receiving on seven catches. However, Clemson's running game managed just 41 yards.

Kingsbury established the tone for the Red Raider offense by completing six of his first eight passes and leading the Red Raiders to a 29-yard field goal. Less than six minutes later, Kingsbury's 46-yard touchdown pass to Nehemiah Glover gave the Red Raiders a 10-0 lead. The onslaught continued in the first quarter when Kingsbury connected with Mickey Peters on a 19-yard touchdown pass that gave Texas Tech a 17-0 lead entering the second quarter.

Taurean Henderson's 10-yard run gave the Red Raiders a 24-0 lead with 12:09 remaining in the first half. Midway through the second quarter, Clemson finally mustered some points when Tye Hill blocked a punt that resulted in a safety when the

ball went through the end zone. After the Tigers' ensuing possession, Wes Welker returned Wynn Kopp's punt 59 yards for a touchdown and increased Texas Tech's lead to 29 points.

Vincent Meeks intercepted Whitehurst at the goal line when Whitehurst's well-thrown pass bounced off the shoulder pads of Airese Currie. Three quick completions from Kingsbury moved the Texas Tech offense into field-goal range, and Robert Treece's successful 40-yard attempt as time expired gave Texas Tech a 34-2 advantage at halftime.

Clemson's opening drive of the second half resulted in the team's first offensive score, when Whitehurst connected with tight end Ben Hall on a 10-yard touchdown pass. Kingsbury left the

game on the next possession after Khaleed Vaughn rolled over his leg; B.J. Symons replaced Kingsbury and guided the Red Raiders to a score on his opening drive. Symons' two-yard touchdown pass to Carlos Francis made the score 41-9 Texas Tech. Chad Jasmin's two-yard run with 12:29 remaining in regulation signaled the Tigers' final score of the contest.

Linebackers John Leake (16) and Rodney Thomas (15) led the Tigers defensively in tackles, as each had a sack as well.



Kevin Youngblood had seven receptions for 134 yards in the 2002 Tangerine Bowl. It was the second-highest reception yardage total in a bowl game in Clemson history.

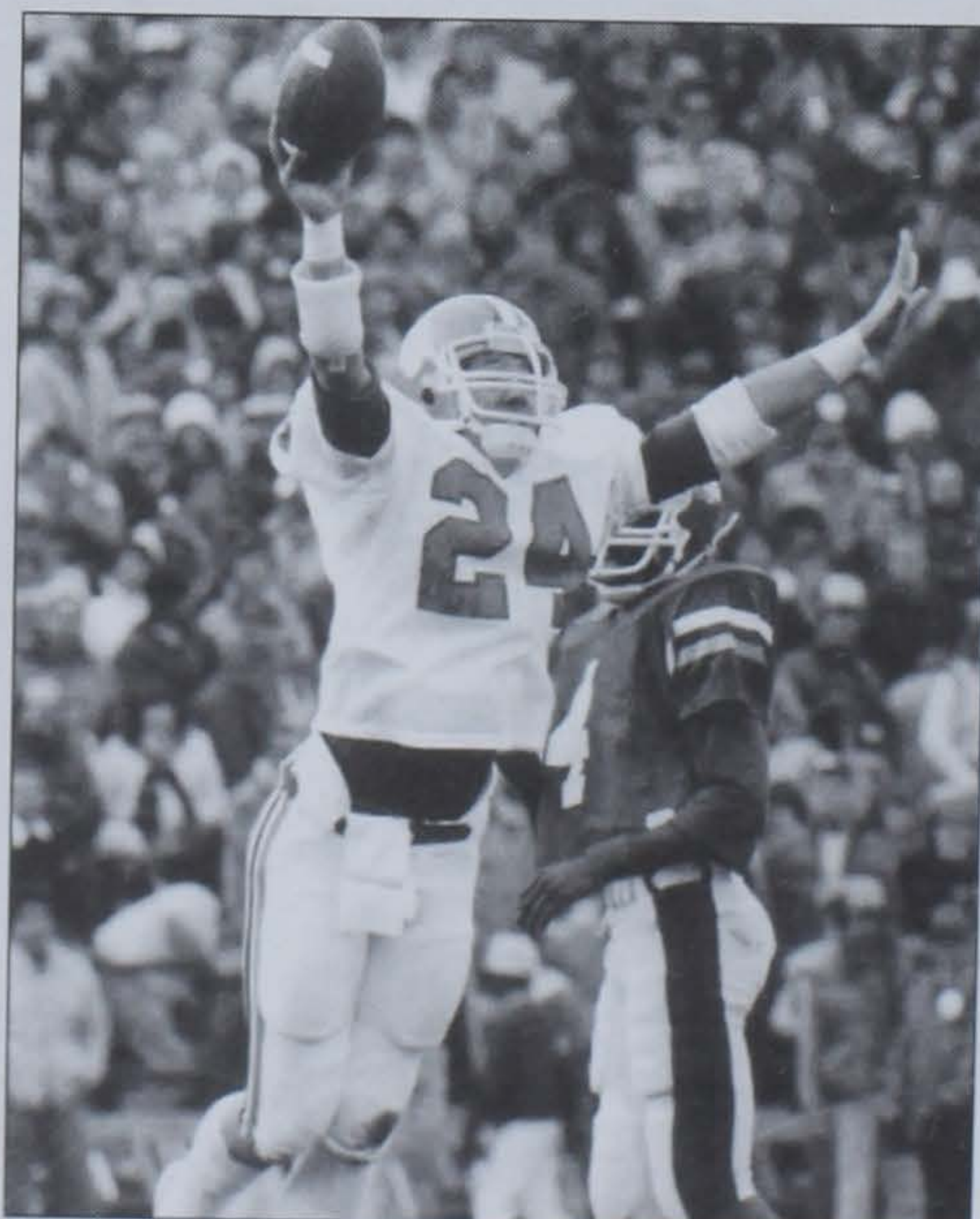

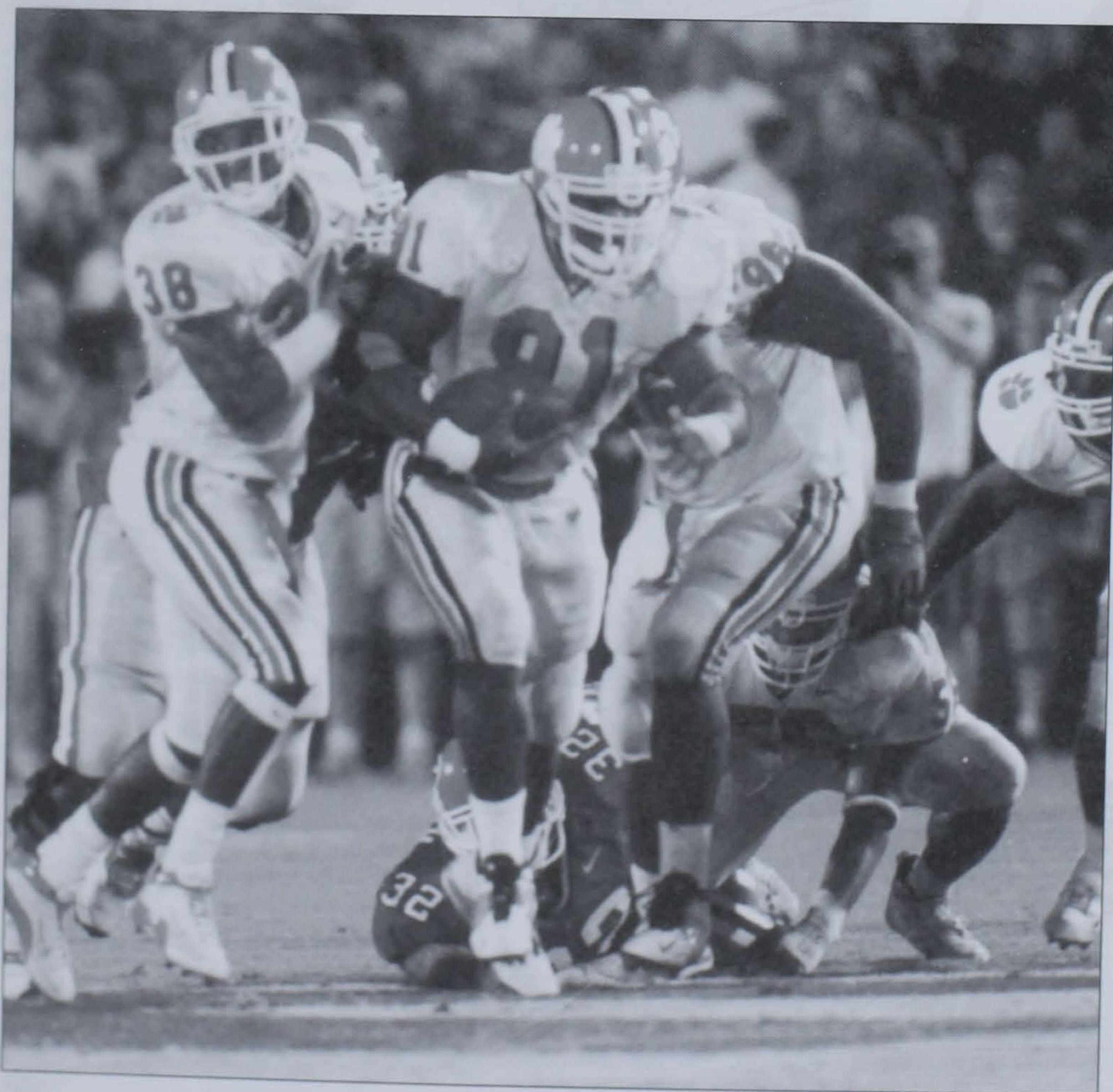
