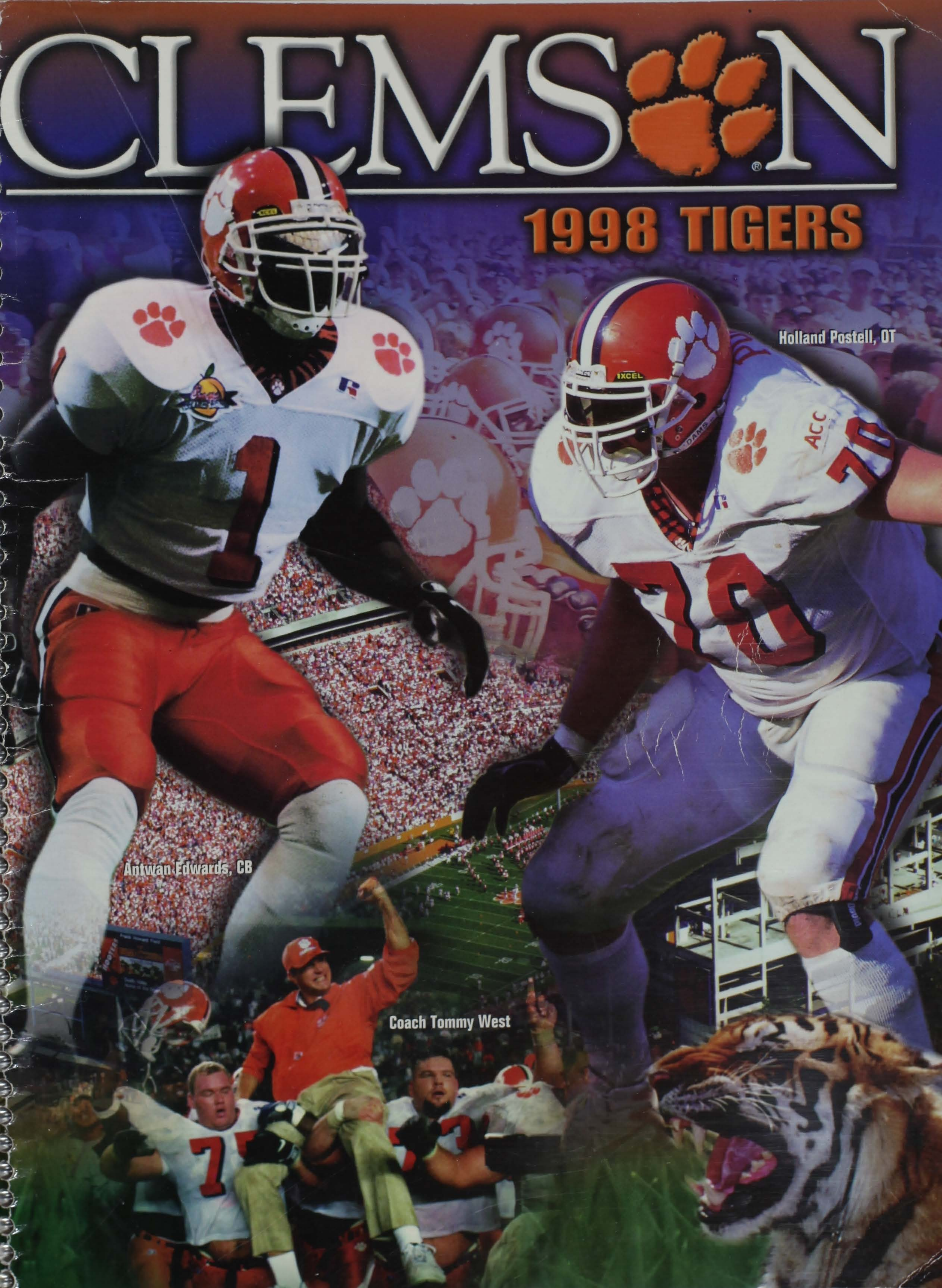

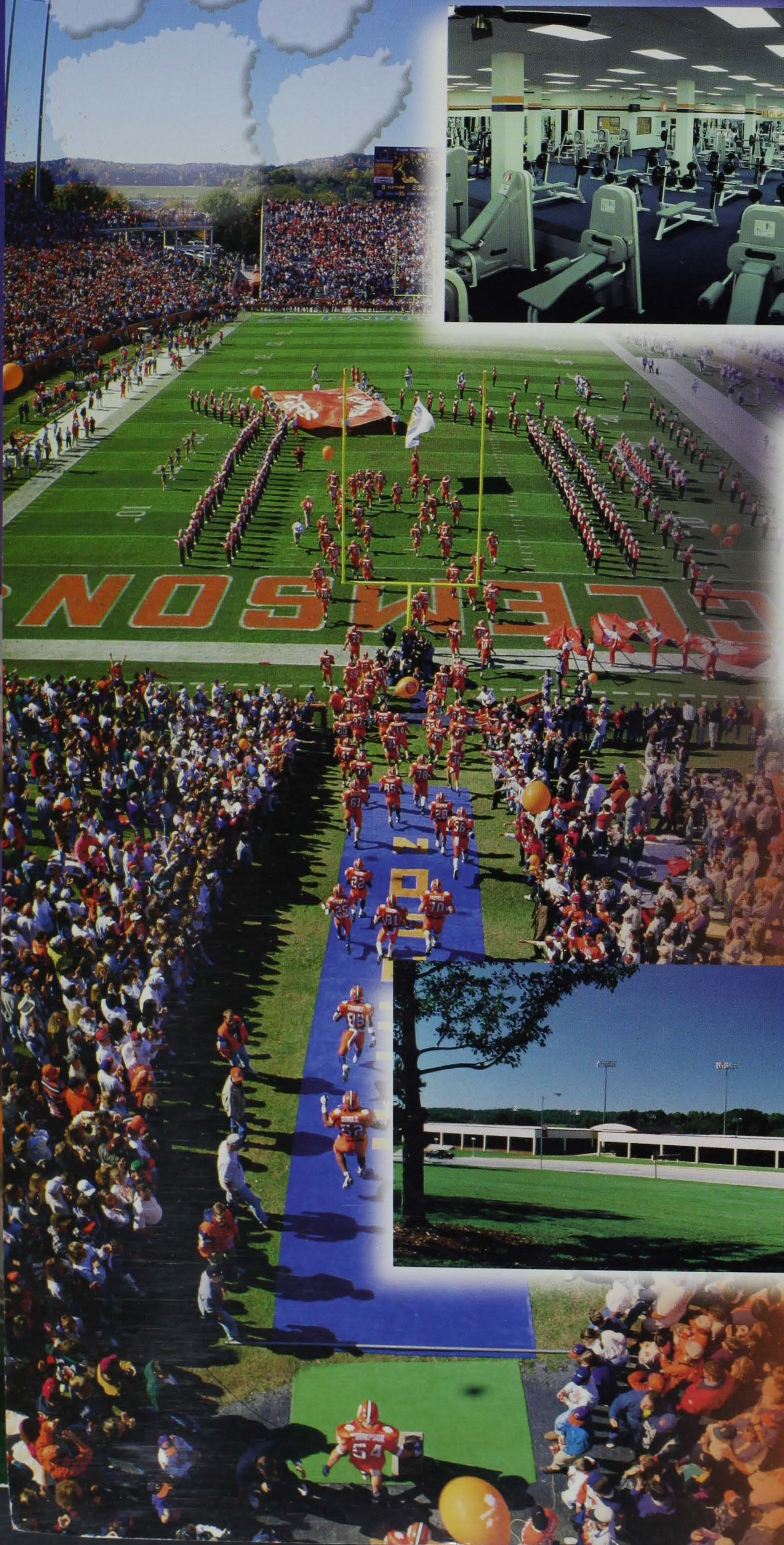

Clemson's 103rd Season

Here are some facts about the first 102 years of Clemson football:

- 1981 Unanimous National Champions.
- The Peach Bowl was Clemson's 22nd bowl appearances, including 11 of the last 13 years.
- 12 Bowl Wins, 17th highest total in College Football History.
- The 15th best bowl winning percentage in college history.
- One of 17 teams nationally to play in a bowl game each of the last three years.
- One of 11 teams nationally to go to at least 11 bowl games in last 13 years.
- 12 outright ACC Championships, twice as many as any other team.
- Has more ACC wins (177) than any other ACC team.
- 160 first-team All-ACC selections, more than any other school.
- 19 Top 25 Seasons, including seven in the last 12 years.
- 18 First-round Draft Choices, more than any ACC school.
- Has had 168 total players drafted, and 118 have played in the NFL.
- Had five players drafted in 1998, and four others signed free agent contracts. Draft total tied for seventh highest total in the nation.
- Has had 37 wins over ranked teams since ACC was founded in 1953, more than any other ACC team.
- 17 Different Players who have won a total of 24 Super Bowl Championship Rings.
- At Least 18 former Players (including 21 in 1997) on NFL Rosters in each of the last 15 years.
- 32 Pro Bowl Selections for 18 different players, including a national best five in 1996.
- 51 All-Americans, including at least one in 21 of the last 22 years.
- 10 Academic All-Americans.
- Has won 553 games in its history, including 176 over the last 21 seasons, an average of 8.4 per year.

Press Information

Covering the Tigers

ENTRANCE TO MEMORIAL STADIUM

Enter through Gate 11 which is located on the press box (South) side of the field at the southeast corner. If you need to pick up tickets at our press will-call, they will be at Gate 13. Come through Gate 13, and go straight ahead to the elevator, which will take you to the press box.

PRESS BOX

There are two levels to Clemson's pressbox, located in the center of the club level of the South stands. The first level contains the photo deck, a dark room, the outside PA, stadium operations & security, along with booths for field telephones, radio networks, and athletic officials for Clemson. The second level is for the print media, with seating accommodations for 124 members of the working press. This level houses Clemson's famous buffet, and the work room.

CREDENTIALS

We appreciate getting these as early as you know your assignment. Requests for working press and photo passes are honored from SPORTS EDITORS of DAILY newspapers and RADIO & TV SPORTS DIRECTORS ONLY. Make request directly to Sam Blackman, Clemson Sports Information Department. There is not room for individual radio stations in the press box, only the two networks of the participating schools. Spouses, dates, non-workers, and anyone 16 years of age or younger, are not permitted in the press box.

TELEPHONE INSTALLATION

Our press box is equipped with eight outside phone lines. It is the responsibility of each paper or radio network to make arrangements for telephone lines. Call Zelda Kleister at (864) 656-2601 to order phone lines. There are three phones available at the back of the press box for sending voice reports or for newspapers to transmit photos. There is a dark room on the second level available on a reservation basis.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

The team dressing rooms are located beneath the west end zone stands, to your left from the press box. The two SIDs will escort writers wishing postgame interviews to this area with about three minutes showing on the scoreboard clock. The Clemson dressing room is closed to all media, but Coach Tommy West will be in his interview room (Tiger Lettermen's room) and players chosen by media members will be in their interview area (underneath west stands) for postgame comments following a short team meeting.

WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE

Tommy West's weekly press conference will be held on Tuesdays throughout the season. The first session will be Tuesday, September 1st and will be held in the Auditorium of Clemson's McFadden Building, the facility that is adjacent to the Jervy Athletic Center.

The media will interview Coach West between 11:00 AM and 12:00 PM, then meet with Tiger players from 12:00 PM to 12:45 PM. The conference can be accessed by phone. Just call Tim Bourret to access the teleconference.

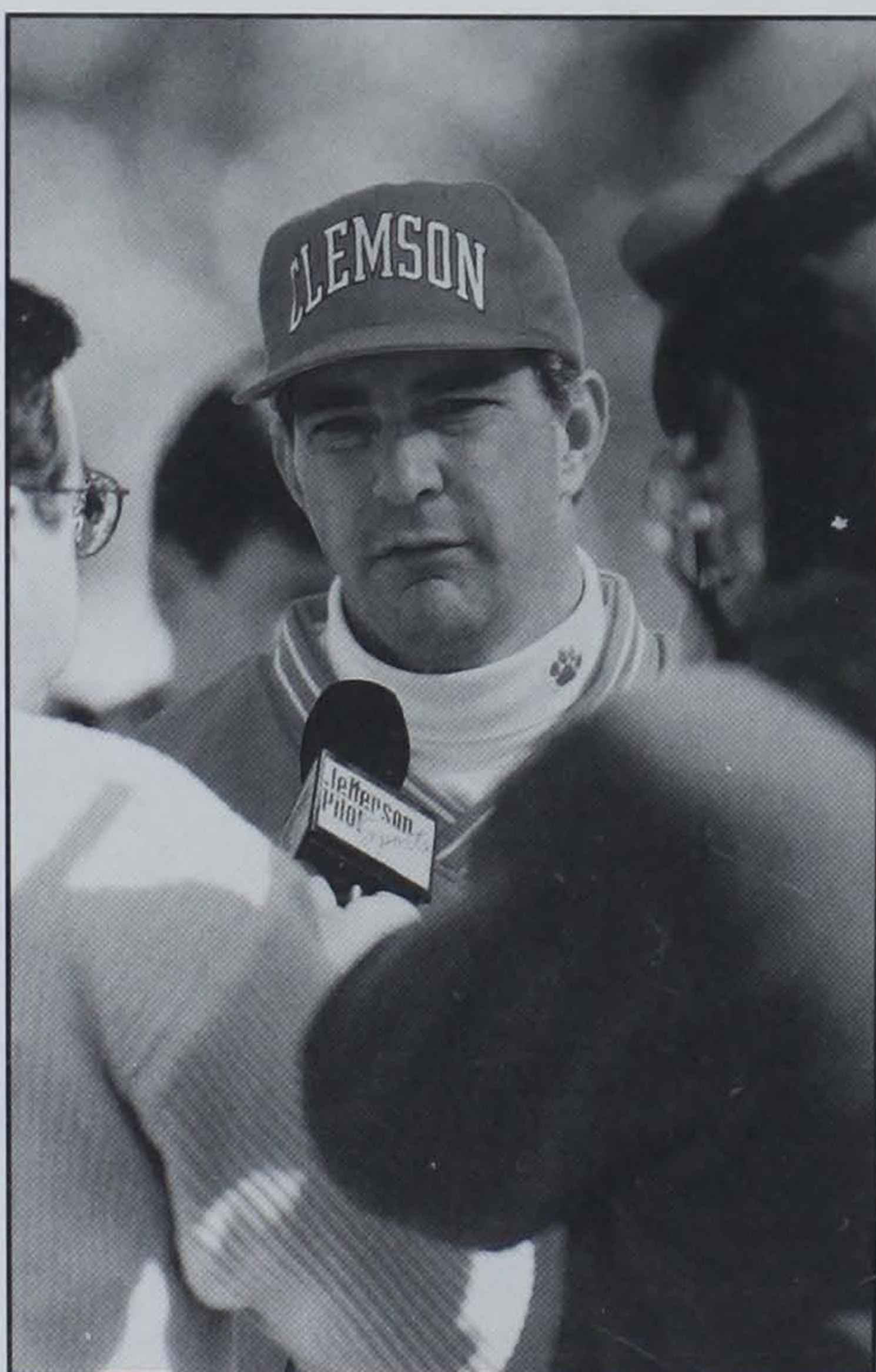

How to Get to Clemson From...

Atlanta, GA: Take I-85 North to Exit 14 in South Carolina. Take a left and cross a bridge over interstate on SC Highway 187 until the road runs into U.S. Highway 76 and 28. Make a left at this traffic light. Stay on this road until the Highway 93 exit. Go under bridge and take a right onto route 93 and the route runs into Clemson.

Greenville, SC: Take I-85 South to Exit 40. Make a right on S.C. Highway 153. Follow this road until it runs into S.C. 123. Take 123 south and it will run into Clemson. Take a left at College Avenue and follow to Highway 93. Turn right and stadium is on left.

Columbia, SC: Take I-26 west and exit onto I-385 west. From 385, take I-85 south and exit at exit 40. Make a right on SC highway 153. Follow this road until it runs into 123. Take 123 south and it will run into Clemson. Take a left at College Avenue and follow to Highway 93. Turn right and stadium is on left.

1998 Schedule

Schedule includes 7 games in Death Valley

The first Thursday evening home night game in Clemson history is one of the highlights of the 1998 Tiger football schedule. Clemson will play host to Georgia Tech on Thursday evening, November 12th at 8:00 PM in a game that will be televised nationally by ESPN. Every other ACC school had been a part of the ESPN Thursday night package over the last five years.

The Clemson vs. Georgia Tech game will be Clemson's first Thursday game since 1963 when the Tigers played South Carolina on Thanksgiving Day. That game had been moved from the previous Saturday due to the death of President John Kennedy. The November 12th game with the Yellow Jackets will be Clemson's first regular season game not on a Saturday since 1982 when Clemson played at Georgia on a Monday evening, September 6th.

Clemson will play seven home games for the first time since 1993. All three of Clemson's non-conference games, contests against Furman, Virginia Tech and South Carolina, will be played at Death Valley.

As usual, Clemson will have four conference games at home and four on the road. The road schedule includes games at North Carolina and Florida State within 15 days. Both teams ranked in the top five of the final **ESPN/USA Today** coach's poll.

Virginia Tech will be on the Clemson schedule for the first time since 1989. The contest will be played in the second week of the season and will feature two of the 17 Division I teams that have been to a bowl game each of the last three seasons. Clemson has won three in a row and five out of six contests between the two teams that were played in the 1980s.

Clemson opens the season on September 5 against the Tigers oldest football rival, Furman. The two teams met in the first game in Clemson football history in 1896. The Tigers play just four road games, but all four are in a six-week period between September 19 to October 24th. Clemson will not have a road game after October 24th.

The season concludes with the annual contest against South Carolina, on November 21 at Death Valley.

"I think this is an excellent, competitive schedule," said Head Coach Tommy West. "We are excited about playing seven games at Death Valley. The Virginia Tech game is an excellent addition to the schedule. They have been making a habit of going to bowl games in recent years.

"Obviously, the road schedule will be challenging, especially with two games against top five teams within three weeks. With the Virginia Tech and Virginia games in the first three weeks of the season we will have to play at a high level early in the season."

Clemson does not have an open date the first nine weeks of the season, then will play on just one of the four Saturdays in November. The Tigers have an open Saturday (November 7) prior to the Georgia Tech game, then will have nine days to prepare for the South Carolina game on November 21st.

Clemson has also announced the school's non-conference football games through the year 2005. The Tigers non-ACC schedule between 1998 and 2005 will include games with Virginia Tech, Texas A&M, Missouri, Georgia, Auburn, Tulane and of course state rival South Carolina over the next eight seasons.

The 1999 schedule will see the Tigers travel to Virginia Tech and South Carolina, meaning the Tigers will have just five home games that season. Each year the Tigers have four ACC home games and four ACC road games.

Clemson is slated to play Furman to open the 1998 season. At present, that is Clemson's only game with a Division I-AA opponent over the next eight seasons.

Clemson will open the 2002 and 2003 seasons against Georgia, then open the 2005 through the 2008 seasons against Auburn.

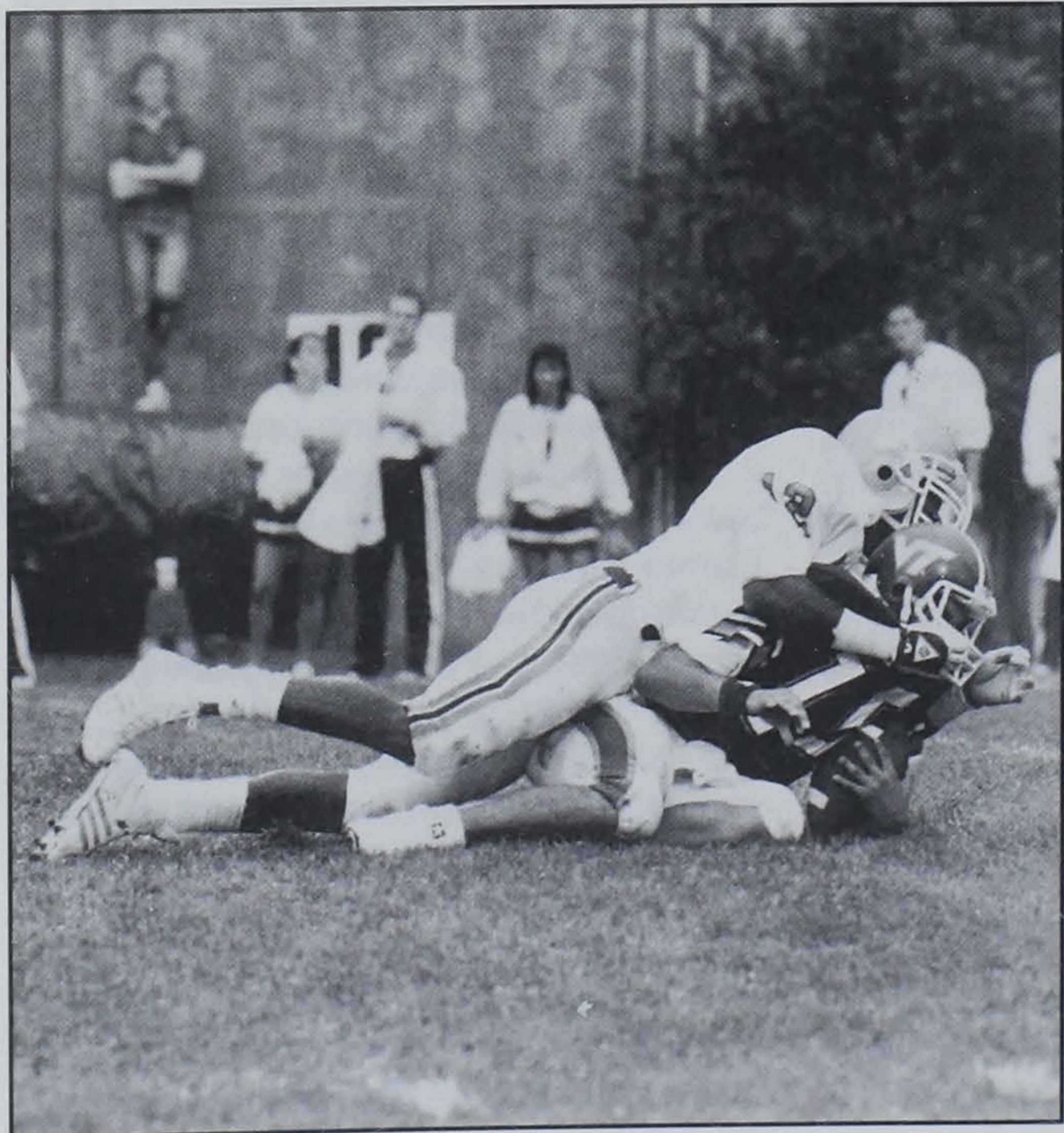

That means Clemson will meet two SEC teams in six of the seven seasons between 2002 and 2008. The Tigers face South Carolina as the season finale every season.

Clemson will open the 1999 football season with Marshall on Sept. 4, 1999. The Tigers originally were to open the season with Western Carolina. Marshall had a 10-3 record and won the Mid American Conference title in its first year. The Thundering Herd played in the Ford Motor City Bowl in Detroit, where it lost to Mississippi, 34-31.

1998 Outlook

Previewing the 1998 Season

OVERALL

Clemson Head Football Coach Tommy West faces a task no other coach in the ACC and very few in the country must accept. The fifth-year mentor must find replacements for his school's all-time leading passer (Nealon Greene), all-time leading rusher (Raymond Priester), second-ranked tackler (Anthony Simmons) and record-setting single season receiver (Tony Horne). That does not even take into consideration the loss of two of the school's best offensive linemen in the 1990s, All-America tackle Jim Bundren and All-ACC guard Glenn Rountree, and the school's best tight end in over a decade, Lamont Hall. All-ACC tackle Raymond White and Miami Dolphins draft choice Lorenzo Bromell have also moved on.

That is quite a list of celebrated players, the corps group that has taken Clemson to three straight bowl games, something only 16 other teams in the country can state. Overall, West (28-20) has lost 24 lettermen and 11 starters from a 7-5 Tiger team that lost three games by a touchdown or less to teams who finished among the top dozen teams in the nation in the final Associated Press Poll.

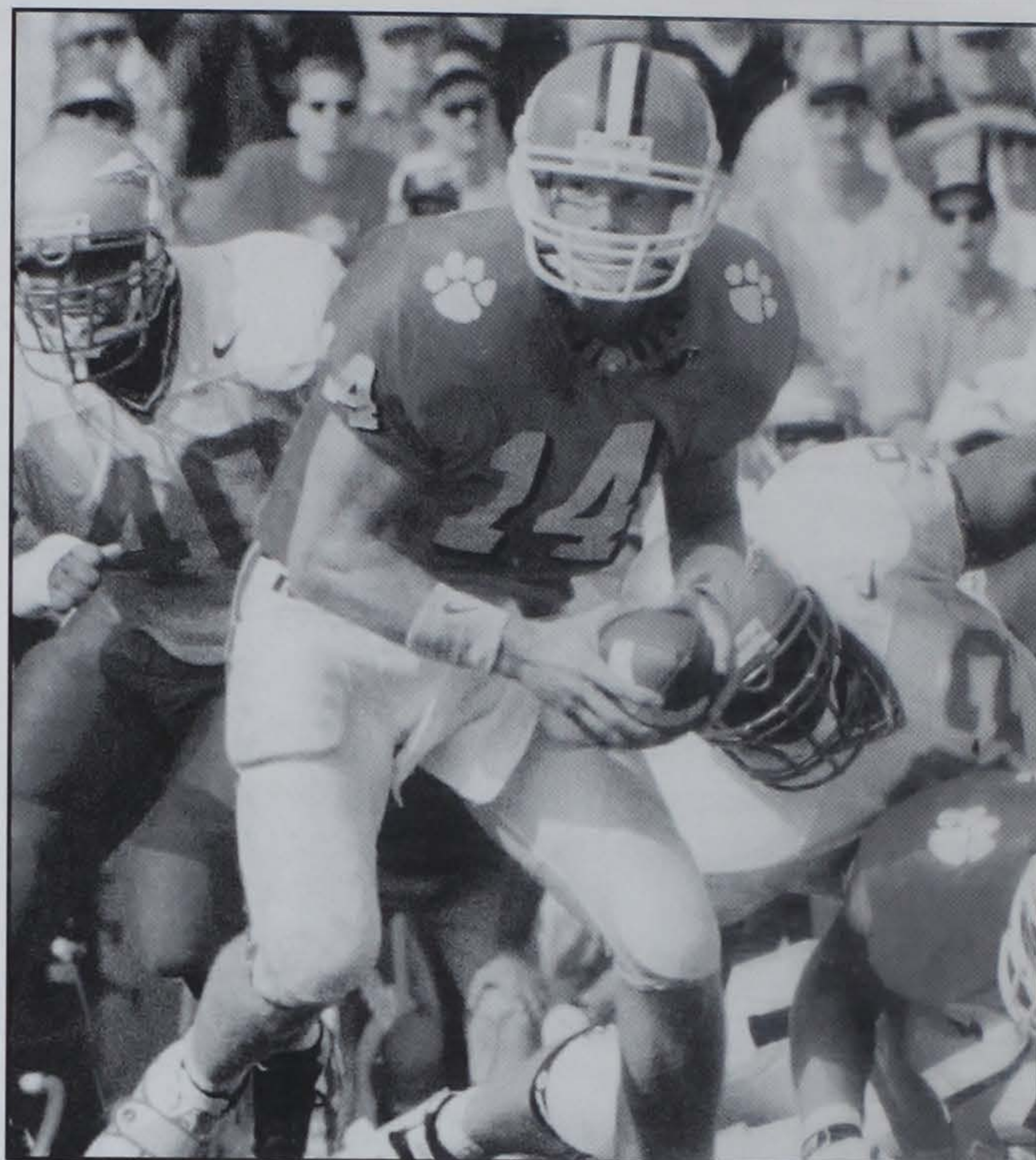
The hopes for this season rest with the return of 41 lettermen and 11 starters, plus the eligibility of 15 freshmen who spent last year as red-shirts. West also will bring along many of a 25-man signing class that was ranked among the top 20 in the nation by many services.

"We have certainly lost some of Clemson's top players of the last decade," said West of his 19-member senior class of 1997. And, that class did not include Anthony Simmons, the most decorated Clemson football player in 15 years and perhaps the school's greatest linebacker, who decided to turn pro after his junior year.

"We will have to count on some new players, especially offensively, who have not had to carry the load. But, we do have talented players returning, including some very good athletes from the class we red-shirted a year ago. I don't think there will be a drop off in talent, but there will be a drop off in experience. We as a staff, must find who will be our big play people."

The offense must replace players who now hold 60 Clemson records. But, West will welcome back wide receivers Brian Wofford and Mal Lawyer, who both had 28 receptions for nearly the same yardage total (388 for Wofford and 384 for Lawyer). Jarvis Austin and Terry Witherspoon each had over 220 yards last year, while the offensive line will be paced by two-year starting tackle Holland Postell and center

For the first time in four years, Clemson will have a new signal caller. Brandon Streeter is the only player on the roster with experience at that position, but he will be challenged by Woody Dantzler and Slade Nagle. "Offensively, the big question will be at quarterback," said West, who has started Nealon Greene at the position for 40 of his 47 games as head coach.

"Heading into the spring everyone was involved. Brandon Streeter had an outstanding spring until he suffered the foot injury and certainly is the number-one quarterback. He is in his third year in the system and looks more mature and stronger. His arm strength has improved.

"Slade and Woody don't have as much experience so we are building a package for each of them. Even if Brandon was 100 percent at the end of the spring we would have done this."

West does have 23 returning lettermen on defense, including six from a secondary that was playing its best football at the conclusion of the 1997 season. All four players who started in the secondary in each of the last two games return. That includes second-team All-ACC defensive back Antwan Edwards, who started six games at safety and five at cornerback in 1997. Rahim Abdullah continues the Clemson linebacker tradition, while two-year starter Adrian Dingle will be the leader of the defensive linemen.

"From a defensive standpoint, I'd like to continue exactly where we left off last year. In the last three games we played defense

like we are used to watching around here. We want to build off those last three games." Clemson held North Carolina to 67 yards rushing, had timely interceptions in the 26-point win over rival South Carolina, and held Auburn to 107 yards rushing and a 34 percent completion percentage, all over the last three games of the season.

OFFENSE

(16 returning lettermen, 5 returning starters)

Clemson established school records for passing yards, completions and completion percentage in 1997, Steve Ensminger's first year as offensive coordinator. Those records will be tough to match as he must replace Nealon Greene (180-290 for 2212 yards, 16 TDs) and star wide receiver Tony Horne (70-907), who established a single season mark for receptions and tied the record for touchdown receptions (8).

The only quarterback in camp with any game experience is junior Brandon Streeter. The native of Gettysburg, PA completed 8-21 for 87 yards last season in his four games of action. He does have experience in "Big Game" situations, however, as he took the Tigers down the field for a touchdown against Florida State on the opening drive of last year's 35-28 game in Death Valley. A separated shoulder in the first half of the contest shelved him for the next four games, but he has proven that he can perform against one of the top defenses in the nation.

Then, this past spring, he suffered a broken ankle while running an option play on the unlucky seventh play of a March 28th



scrimmage. He had surgery that day and was in a cast for six weeks. On June 15 he began jogging and was hopeful of being ready for the beginning of fall practice on August 11th. "We will obviously protect him in the August practices," said West in the summer. "But, we usually do that with our first-team quarterback in August anyway."

Also involved in the quarterback derby are Woody Dantzler, Slade Nagle and Jason Flanders. All three red-shirted the 1997 season and will be given a strong look this fall.

"Brandon should understand this offense better than anyone because he was preparing each week last year as the backup. Slade, Woody and Jason were scout team quarterbacks last year and really did not have that experience."

With Streeter's injury the Saturday before the spring game, Nagle and Dantler got all the snaps in the spring contest. Nagle threw two touchdown passes, and Dantler fired one, but they collectively connected on just 9-31 passes.

Despite the loss of Horne, one of 10 semifinalists for the Biletnikoff Award, Clemson does have some depth and talent returning at wide receiver. There are six returning lettermen who collectively caught 76 passes. The list includes Brian Wofford, a first-team Academic All-ACC pass catcher last year, who had 28 receptions for 388 yards and four scores. He caught at least one pass in every game last year and has a streak of 15 straight games heading into 1998. He had a high of six catches at Georgia Tech.

Mal Lawyer had 28 catches for just four yards less than Wofford's accumulation. The native of Charleston and Berkeley High School was one of the most improved players on the Clemson team last year. He started five games and had three touchdown receptions, including one against South Carolina. He had at least one catch in 11 of the 12 games of 1998.

The sophomore class also has some talented returnees. Rod Gardner had 8-101, including a spectacular 41-yard touchdown catch in the victory at Wake Forest. His 6-4 size will make him a factor this season. Mike Seth and Justin Watts are two more returning lettermen. Seth had one catch in limited action, while Watts had five receptions for 71 yards within the first three games of the season, then suffered a knee injury against Florida State that ended his season.

In addition to these experienced players, Matt Bailey and Waymon White are two talented performers who red-shirted last season. Both are in the 6-3 to 6-4 range and

will give the young quarterbacks large targets. Bailey had an outstanding spring, including two catches for 63 yards and two scores in the spring game.

For the first time in four years, Clemson will not give the ball to Raymond Priester 20 times a game. The school's all-time leading rusher graduated with 18 Clemson records last fall, including the standards for rushing yards on a game, season and career basis.

But, West does have two young running backs returning, who should help to keep Clemson's land attack among the best in the ACC. Terry Witherspoon and Jarvis Austin (like Wofford and Lawyer) were just four yards apart in their production last season. Witherspoon, a junior who started four games at fullback last season, had 58-224 yards and three scores. Austin, a sophomore from Clemson, had 59-220 and two scores, and is listed as the first-team fullback heading into the fall.

Both players had big games toward the end of the season when Priester was limited by injury. Witherspoon had 11-76 in the win over Wake Forest, while Austin had 19-90 and a touchdown in the victory at South Carolina. Two other backs were outstanding in the spring game and will be factors in the ground attack this year.

Travis Zachery is listed as the number-one tailback coming out of spring practice. The freshman, who suffered a broken ankle last year and missed the entire season, had 25-111 in the spring game, plus a touch-

down. He is also a capable receiver out of the backfield. Dymon Adams, a junior college transfer who entered Clemson this past January, was the top offensive producer in the spring game with 26-141. Both have speed Clemson has been missing in recent years.

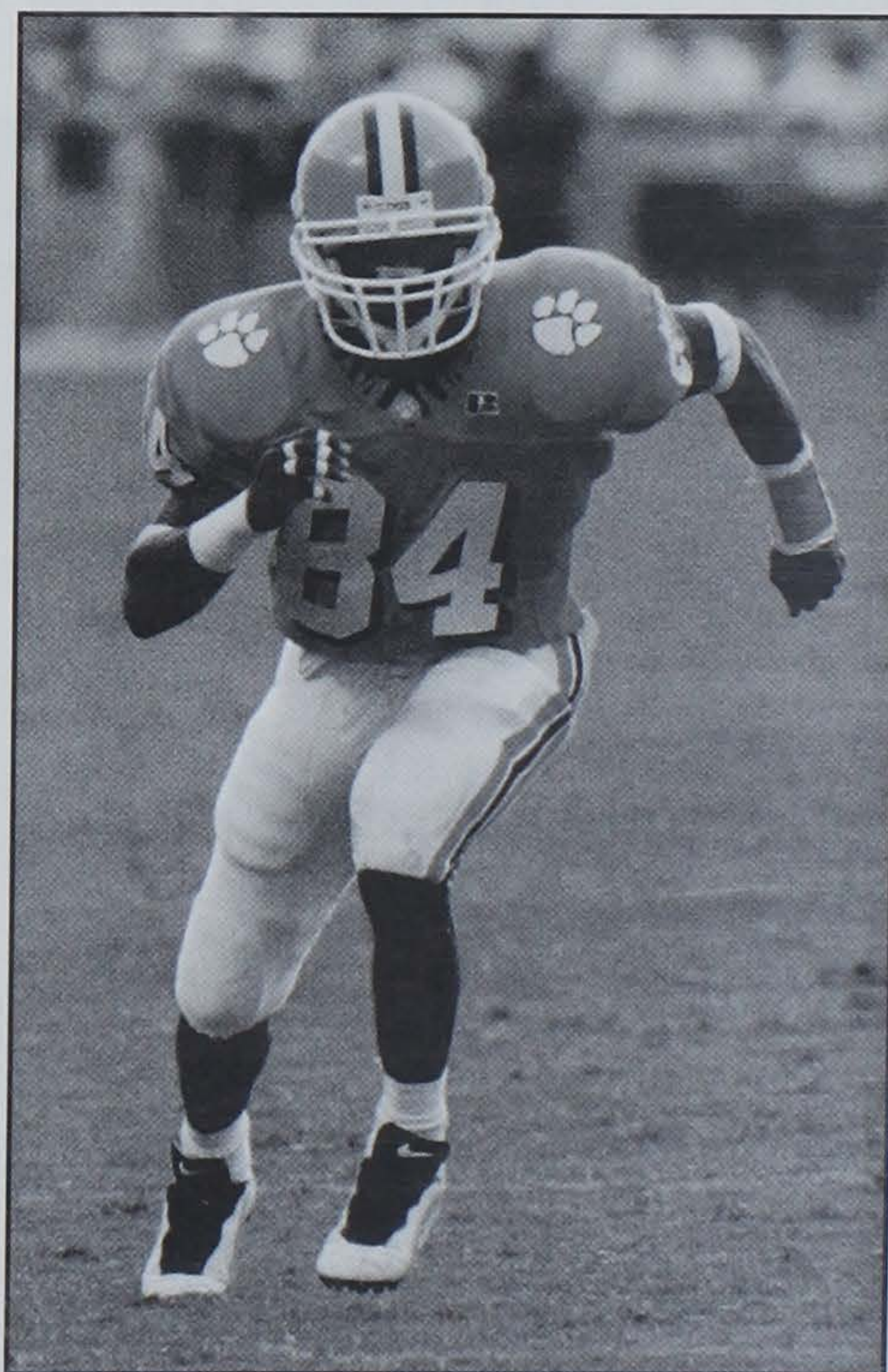
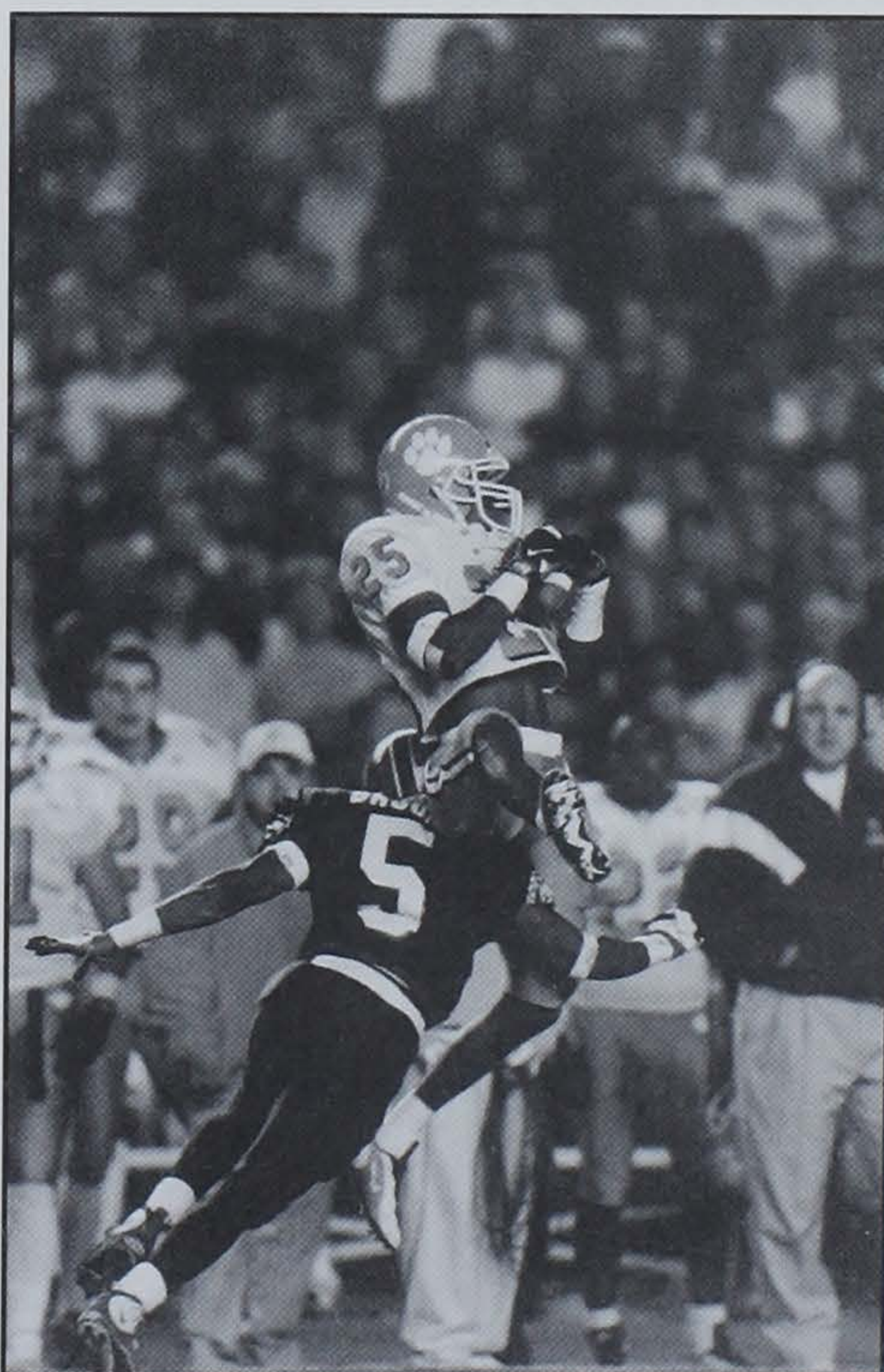
"We are going to be different in the backfield this year in that we should be much quicker. I think both positions will be quicker. I expect Terry Witherspoon to pick up where he left off last year. He improved over the season and was a highlight for us on offense in the bowl game. His blocking improved at the end of the season.

"Jarvis Austin has experience at both positions. Travis Zachery showed a lot of speed and versatility in the spring, as did Dymon Adams. All three should have a significant impact on our running game this year."

Clemson has ranked among the top two in the ACC in rushing each of the last three years and the play of the offensive line has certainly been a key to that statistic. West welcomes back three of the five interior line starters for this season, but only five total returning lettermen at the five positions.

"We have to replace two outstanding linemen in Bundren and Rountree. They started 47 straight games for us. We have lost a lot of leadership there and I am a coach who likes to have his team leaders on the offensive line.

"Even though we have lost outstanding

backs, my biggest concern is in the offensive line. We must have some people step up. It is time for Matt Butler, and Brent Banasciewicz to have a great senior year and we need some of the younger players like Kyle Young, Neely Page, John McDermott and Will Merritt to come through. They will have an opportunity and I hope they make the most of it.

"While the offensive line is a big concern, it is not as big a concern as it has been in previous years. We do have three solid returning starters in Holland Postell, Jason Gamble and Corey Hulseley. Holland has started 24 straight games for us and can be an all-conference player. I think Gamble and Hulseley will have very good years for us."

Gamble was ranked as the top senior center in the nation according to one NFL Scouting Service this past summer. Holland has made a number of preseason All-ACC clubs and Hulseley is considered a rising star and personality at 6-7 and 335 pounds.

The tight end position must also replace Lamont Hall, a two-year starter who many think is destined for a solid pro career. Hall caught 17 passes last year, most by a Clemson tight end since Jim Riggs in 1986. "I will tell you a guy we will miss as much as anyone is Lamont Hall," said West. "He was a team leader and a terrific blocker."

West will count on Wesley Ellis and T.J. Watkins to fill Hall's shoes. Ellis has never caught a pass, but has been a solid blocker

as a backup to Hall. Ellis started and played 50 snaps in the win over Duke when Hall played at fullback. Watkins is a red-shirt freshman who showed an ability to catch the ball during workouts last fall. "T.J. Watkins might be our biggest surprise of the winter workout program. He has gained close to 40 pounds since he got here and has improved his vertical jump by two inches. He has really worked hard."

DEFENSE

(23 returning lettermen, 6 returning starters)

While Clemson must find six new starters on defense, the Tigers do return 23 lettermen, including all-conference candidates Antwan Edwards, Rahim Abdullah, Adrian Dingle and Robert Carswell. The biggest hole is at inside linebacker where West must replace the irreplaceable Anthony Simmons, a prime ingredient to a Tiger defense that ranked 16th in the country in total defense, 18th in scoring defense.

"You can't replace Anthony Simmons," said West of the Clemson linebacker who had 486 tackles in just three years. Simmons could have become just the second player in the history of college football to earn AP All-America honors (first, second or third team) four times, but opted for the NFL where he was the first round draft pick of the Seattle Seahawks.

"Anthony did so much for our football team over the last three years, I would never put a tag on a player that he was the person to replace Anthony Simmons. But I think we have some linebackers who are ready to step up and play the position and play it well. Harold Means got some experience at the end of the year when Mond Wilson was hurt. Chris Jones has been waiting four years to be a starter. Kenzi Ross and Raj Mitchell are talented players who played well this past spring and we signed some outstanding linebackers who will be joining the program in the fall."

Means ranked sixth on the team in tackles last year with 56. He had 15 in the narrow loss to North Carolina when Clemson held the Tar Heels to just 17 points and just 67 yards rushing. Jones had 38 tackles in 142 snaps last year, a tackle every 5.7 plays, fourth best on the team. Ross had four tackles as a reserve last year and was the top tackler in the spring game with 13 stops, while Mitchell red-shirted the season.

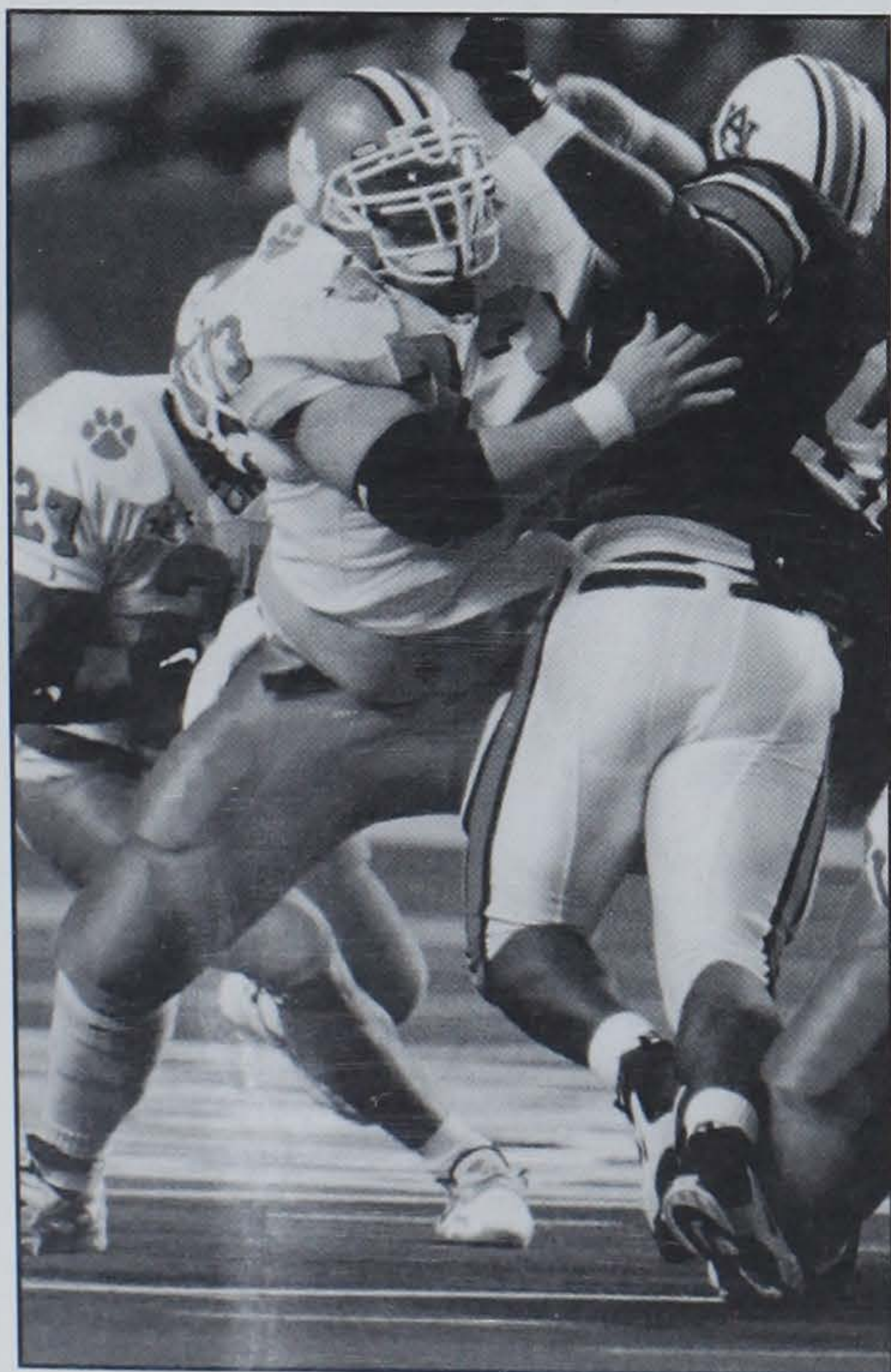
The outside linebacker and rush end positions should be strong this year with the return of starters Rahim Abdullah and Adrian Dingle. Abdullah had 73 tackles for the season and was Clemson's MVP in the Peach Bowl. He blocked two punts in that

game and had a sack.

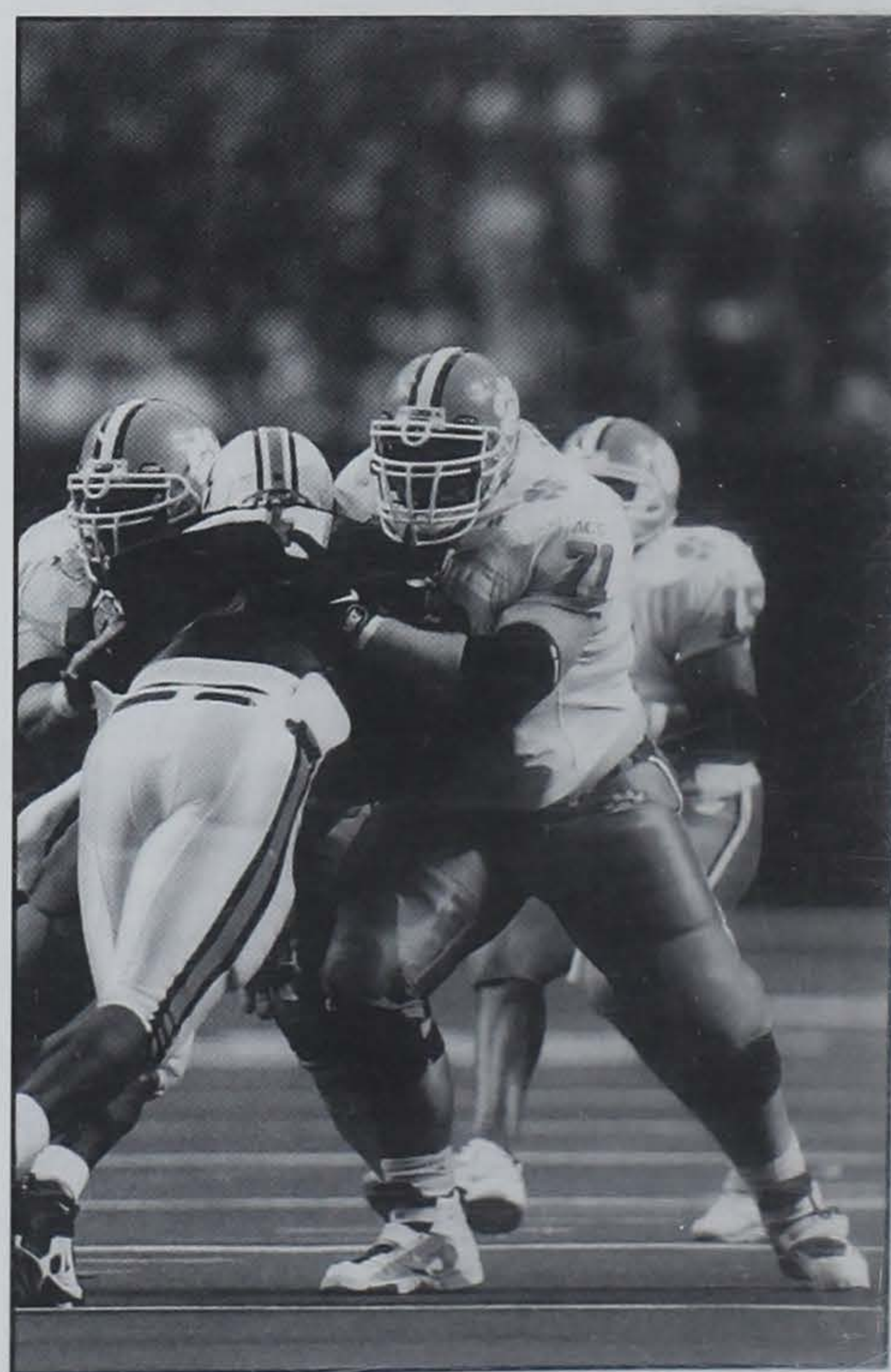
"Rahim has made a lot of big plays in the last two years," said West of his gifted 6-6 230-pound outside linebacker who has already scored three touchdowns on returns in just two seasons. "He made the big play at NC State with a fumble return for a touchdown and ended the Duke game in overtime with an interception return for a score." Abdullah is ranked among the top 15 outside linebackers in the nation according to many preseason services.

Dingle had 48 tackles last year, including 10 tackles for loss. He has 30 tackles for loss and 12.5 sacks for his career, more than any other Tiger. "Adrian played in all but one game last year, but really had an injury plagued season. If we can just keep him healthy, he will have a great year for us." The senior, who played high school football with current Clemson basketball forward Harold Jamison, tied a school single game record with three sacks at Maryland last year. This summer he was ranked as the number-one senior outside linebacker in the nation by the National Scouting Services.

O.J. Childress is a senior who has been a demon on special teams for three years who will backup Abdullah, while Terry Bryant, now 260 pounds, will backup Dingle. Bryant had a solid freshman year with 25 tackles in 175 plays, while Childress had 18 stops. Howard Bartley, a starter in 1996, who played in only seven games in 1997 due to a knee injury, sat out spring practice, but

should rejoin the team in the fall.

The defensive line must replace starters Raymond White, Tony Plantin and Lorenzo Bromell, key contributors to a defense that ranked sixth in the country against the run. But, as usual, West and defensive line coach Les Herrin played plenty of people a year ago, so there are experienced players up front.

"We have always played a lot of people up front and that was the case last season. Certainly losing players the caliber of Raymond White, Tony Plantin and Lorenzo Bromell will hurt, but we have some young players ready to take a leading role in our defense."

A sophomore, a junior and a senior look to hold down the three interior spots on the Clemson defense. Donald Broomfield might be the most improved player on the Clemson defense according to West, and that includes from a leadership standpoint. The senior had 27 tackles in 12 games as a reserve a year ago.

Damonte McKenzie played 233 snaps and had one start a year ago when he had 26 tackles, while Terry Jolly had 19 tackles in eight games, including two as a starter. Jolly was to be red-shirted, but by the fourth game of the season, he was in the starting lineup. Theo Mougros, Jason Holloman and Gary Childress are three more returning lettermen up front who will see time for the Tigers.

This time a year ago the secondary was the most inexperienced and most questionable aspect of the Clemson defense. West

started five different cornerbacks last year. But, by the end of the season he had found the right combination and the foursome returns in tact for 1998.

Now, the secondary is ranked among the best in the nation by many of the preseason publications and services. "The secondary should be one of the strengths of our football team. We had to do a lot of moving around last year, but they were a cohesive group by the end of the season. We now have some quality depth in the secondary."

Antwan Edwards is among the top defensive backs in the nation. A safety for much of his career, he was moved to cornerback for the last two games of 1997 and will remain at corner this season. Against South Carolina he had two interceptions, including one that he returned for a 42-yard touchdown. Also capable as a return man, Edwards was a second-team All-ACC defensive back last year and has made some preseason All-America teams for 1998. He ranked 36th in the nation in interceptions and 42nd in kickoff returns. Edwards had 15 passes broken up last year to rank second in the ACC and the figure tied a Clemson single season record.

Clemson's leading returning tackler comes from the secondary. DoMarco Fox had 74 stops in his 12 games as a starter, 10 as a safety and two at cornerback. He also finished the season strong with big plays, including a blocked punt against North Carolina in the final moments, a play that gave Clemson a chance to defeat the fifth ranked Tar Heels. Fox had seven passes broken

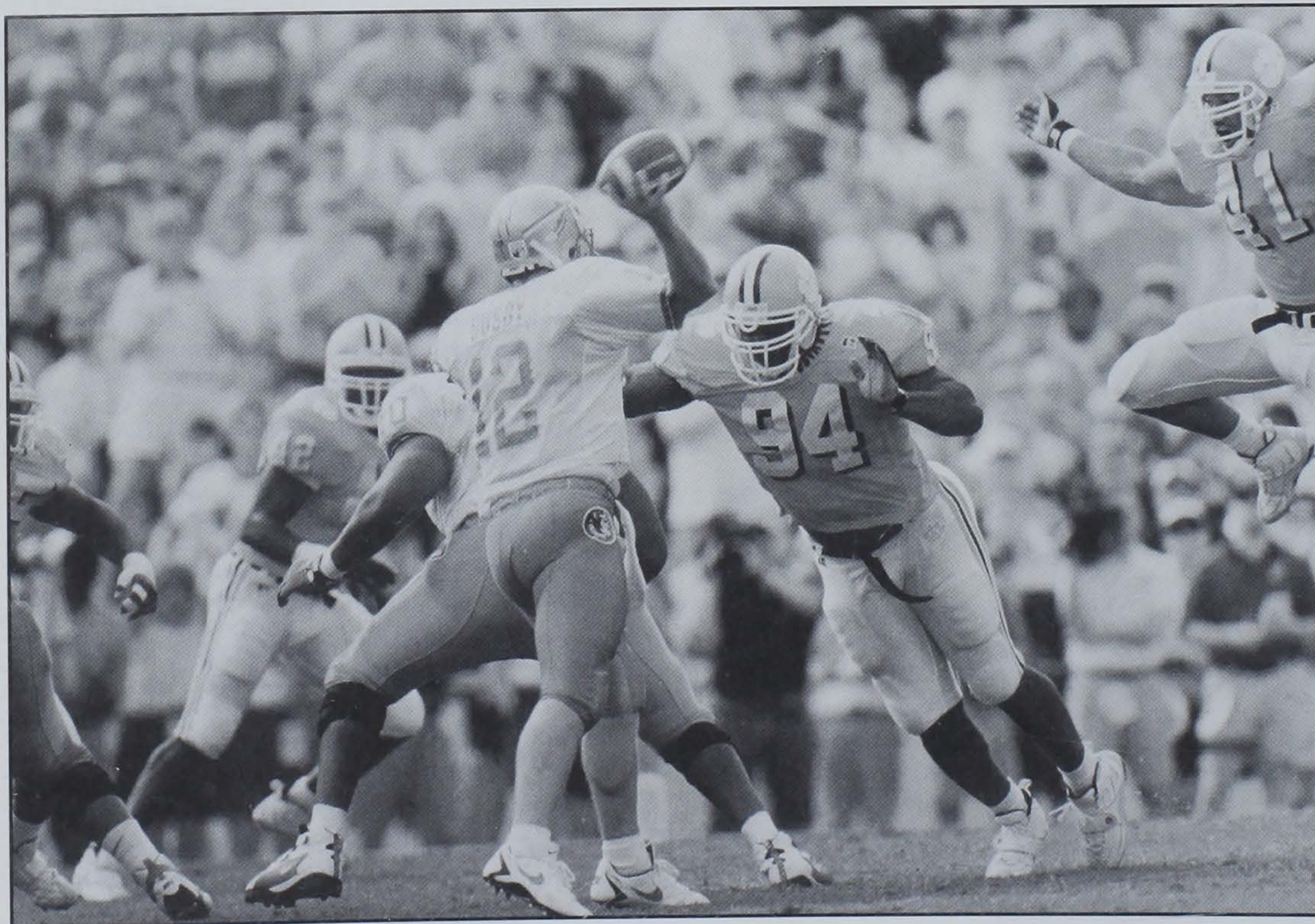


Jones finally gets his chance after three years behind Anthony Simmons.

up for the season and is regarded as the hardest hitter on the Clemson team.

"We started the spring with DoMarco at cornerback, but moved him back to safety for the last two weeks and he will stay at safety this year. He just wasn't comfortable at cornerback. He is more suited for safety because he is the most vicious hitter on our team."

Robert Carswell is a precocious safety who started the last six games of 1997. He

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had 51 tackles for the season, including 11 stops and three passes broken up against Maryland in his first start. He played 405 snaps last year, more than any other Clemson freshman.

Darrel Crutchfield, played in just seven games, but started the last two. He was moved to cornerback for the second half of spring practice and will play that position entering the fall. He had 20 tackles for the season, including five in the win at South Carolina and six in the Peach Bowl against Auburn. Chad Speck will see much time at the safety positions. The 4.0 student scored a touchdown for the Tigers in the Peach Bowl on a blocked punt return. He had 15 tackles for the season.

Two more lettermen return at cornerback. Michael Allen is a returning starter at corner after starting eight games a year ago. He had 11 passes broken up, second on the team. David Evans, who had three starts last year, had 21 tackles in 245 plays, including nine in the win over Maryland. Dextra Polite, a junior college transfer with two years of eligibility remaining, is also in the cornerback picture.

Despite the list of returning veterans, a red-shirt freshman could be in the starting lineup on opening day. Alex Ardley had a standout performance in the spring, as did classmate Charles Hafley. Both had interceptions in the spring game.

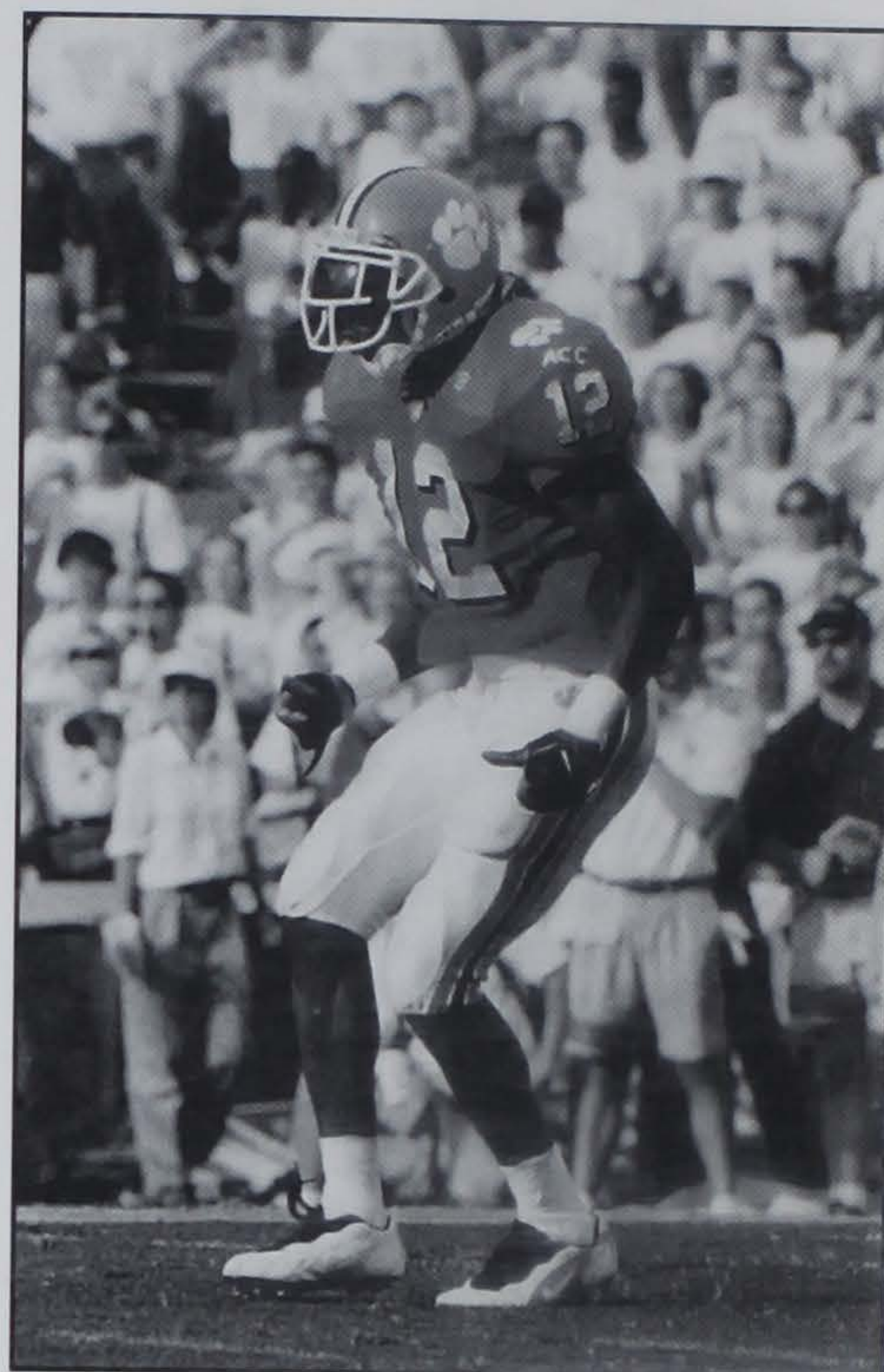
SPECIAL TEAMS

Clemson's strongest area might be on the special teams. The Tigers return a punter and a placekicker who ranked in the top 40 in the nation in their respective areas, the only ACC team that can make that statement. Clemson also has one of the top 45 kickoff return men in the nation back, as well as the top eight special teams tacklers from 1997.

David Richardson missed just two field goals all season, both from 47 yards out. The senior from Clemson, who concluded the season 26th in the nation in field goals per game, did not move into the starting lineup until the Maryland game at midseason and promptly made his first six attempts. His four field goals at Wake Forest, including a career long 52-yarder, were keys to that victory that put the Tigers one win from a bowl game.

In addition to making 13-15 field goals for the season and team best 56 total points, Richardson had a landmark season in terms of kickoffs. Forty-two percent of his kickoffs resulted in touchbacks and 60 percent of the time the opposition started at its own 20 or worse. Those are the top percentages for a Clemson kicker since the NCAA moved the kickoff back to the 35-yard-line in 1986.

Kevin Laird has made great progress as a punter over his career, and now is an All-ACC candidate. Laird finished the season with a 42.8 average and had 16 punts inside the 20 to go with 15 punts of 50 yards or more. He had just seven touchbacks all



Domarco Fox is the team's top returning tackler.

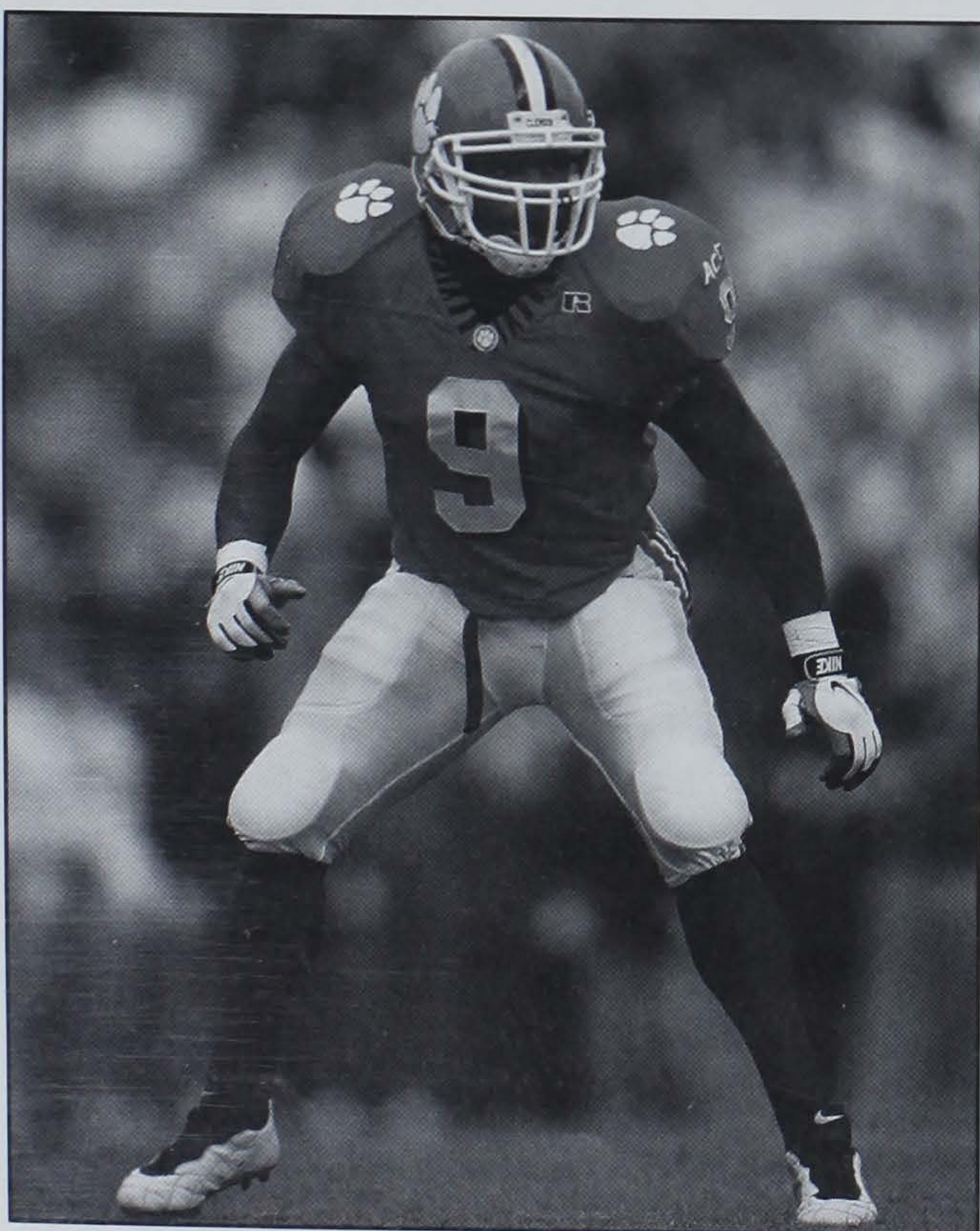
season. The native of Mississippi ranked 33rd in the country in punting last season, an improvement of five yards a punt over his sophomore season.

Tommy West really likes Laird's level of consistency and his ability to keep the opposition pinned with field position punts. Laird averaged at least 42 yards a punt over each of his last eight games, including a 43.7 average in the Peach Bowl against Auburn when he had three punts of at least 50 yards and two punts inside the 20. He had a 46.7 average in Clemson's win at Maryland and had a season high 47.6 average against Florida State.

Clemson should also be outstanding in the return game and the defending of returns. Antwan Edwards, Clemson's most experienced defensive back, averaged 23.3 yards a return on 12 attempts last year, 42nd best in the nation. He also has some experience as a punt returner in his career. Brian Wofford is also a capable return man.

Rahim Abdullah was Clemson's MVP in the Peach Bowl against Auburn and one of the reasons was his ability to make big plays on special teams. Abdullah blocked two punts against Auburn to tie a Clemson single game mark. Clemson blocked six kicks last year, second best single season total in Clemson history.

The Tigers also return Chris Jones (13), DoMarco Fox (11) and O.J. Childress (10), and the trio were Clemson's top special teams tacklers last season. This was an area of concern in the first half of the season and an area of strength by the conclusion of the season.

Clemson Football Notes

An Inside Look At Clemson Tiger Football

CLEMSON IN THIRD STRAIGHT BOWL

Clemson is one of 17 teams nationally to make an appearance in three straight bowl games. The list includes three ACC teams, Clemson, Florida State and North Carolina. The other teams who have been to a bowl game three straight years are Auburn, Florida, Iowa, Kansas State, LSU, Michigan, Michigan State, Nebraska, Ohio State, Penn State, Syracuse, Tennessee, Virginia Tech and Washington. Obviously, three of the 17 teams will be on Clemson's 1998 schedule, Florida State, North Carolina and Virginia Tech.

With Clemson's appearance in the 1998 NCAA men's basketball tournament, the Tigers join North Carolina as the only schools in the country who have been to the NCAA men's basketball tournament and a bowl game each of the last three years. The 18 teams who have been to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three straight years are Clemson, Arizona, Cincinnati, Duke, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, UMASS, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Purdue, Stanford, Temple, UCLA, Utah and Valparaiso.

CLEMSON ASSISTANT COACHES HAVE BOWL EXPERIENCE

Clemson's nine assistant coaches have coached in a combined 54 bowl games, including 31 bowl games Clemson has participated. The list includes only seasons in which the coaches were full-time assistants.

Les Herrin has the most bowl experience with the Tigers among the active assistants with eight, while Rick Stockstill has been to seven. Defensive coordinator Reggie Herring has the most bowl game experiences on the current staff. Herring has been to four with Clemson, but to 13 overall.

CLEMSON BOWL EXPERIENCE

Clemson has now appeared in a bowl game three consecutive years and four of the last five. Due to that streak of excellence, Clemson has 37 players on its roster who have played in at least one bowl game. The list includes 17 who have played in at

least two bowls and eight who have played in three bowl games. Fifteen different players are on the roster who have started at least one bowl, including four who have started two bowls.

The four players on the 1998 roster who have two bowl starts under their belt are Holland Postell (OT), Kevin Laird (P), Adrian Dingle (DE) and Antwan Edwards (CB). The eight active players who have participated in three bowls are Postell, Edwards, Dingle, Matt Butler (OG), O.J. Childress (LB), Michael Allen (CB), Chris Jones (LB), and Donald Broomfield (DT).

Two current Clemson players did not play in the 1998 Peach Bowl, but did play against LSU in the Peach Bowl game at the conclusion of the 1996 season. Those players are Howard Bartley (OLB) and Brent Banasiewicz (OG).

Clemson did lose an outstanding senior class, one that included Jim Bundren, Glenn Rountree, Nealon Greene, Raymond Priester, Raymond White, and Anthony Simmons. All six started three bowl games for the Tigers.

TIGERS IN NCAA STATISTICS

Six different Clemson players ranked in the top 40 in the nation in 11 different statistical categories in 1997. Tony Horne led the way, as the Clemson receiver was ranked in the top 40 in five different areas, including the top 15 in three categories. He was the first player in Clemson history to rank in the top 40 in five different categories, the first non-kicker to rank in the top 15 in three areas.

Nealon Greene ranked 19th in passing efficiency and 33rd in total offense. Greene's #19 ranking in passing efficiency of 145.1 was the best since 1983 when Mike Eppley ranked third in the nation with a 146.0 figure. That figure shows the increase in passing figures over the last 15 years. Eppley's 146 was third in 1983, but Greene's 145 ranked only 19th in 1997. Greene's number 33 ranking in total offense is the first top 40 ranking for a Clemson player in that category since 1978 when Steve Fuller was 21st (182).

Tony Horne's #15 ranking in all-purpose running is the first top 25 ranking for a Clemson player in that category in history. With Raymond Priester's #40 ranking in rushing, this was the first Clemson team in history to have a rusher and receiver in the top 40 in the nation. Tony Horne's #14 ranking in receptions per game was the best for a Clemson player since 1980 when Perry Tuttle was 13th in that category.

As a team, Clemson was in the top 20 in four areas, three that dealt with defense.

Clemson's top ranking was in rushing defense, where Clemson stood sixth in the nation, allowing just 88.3 yards per game.

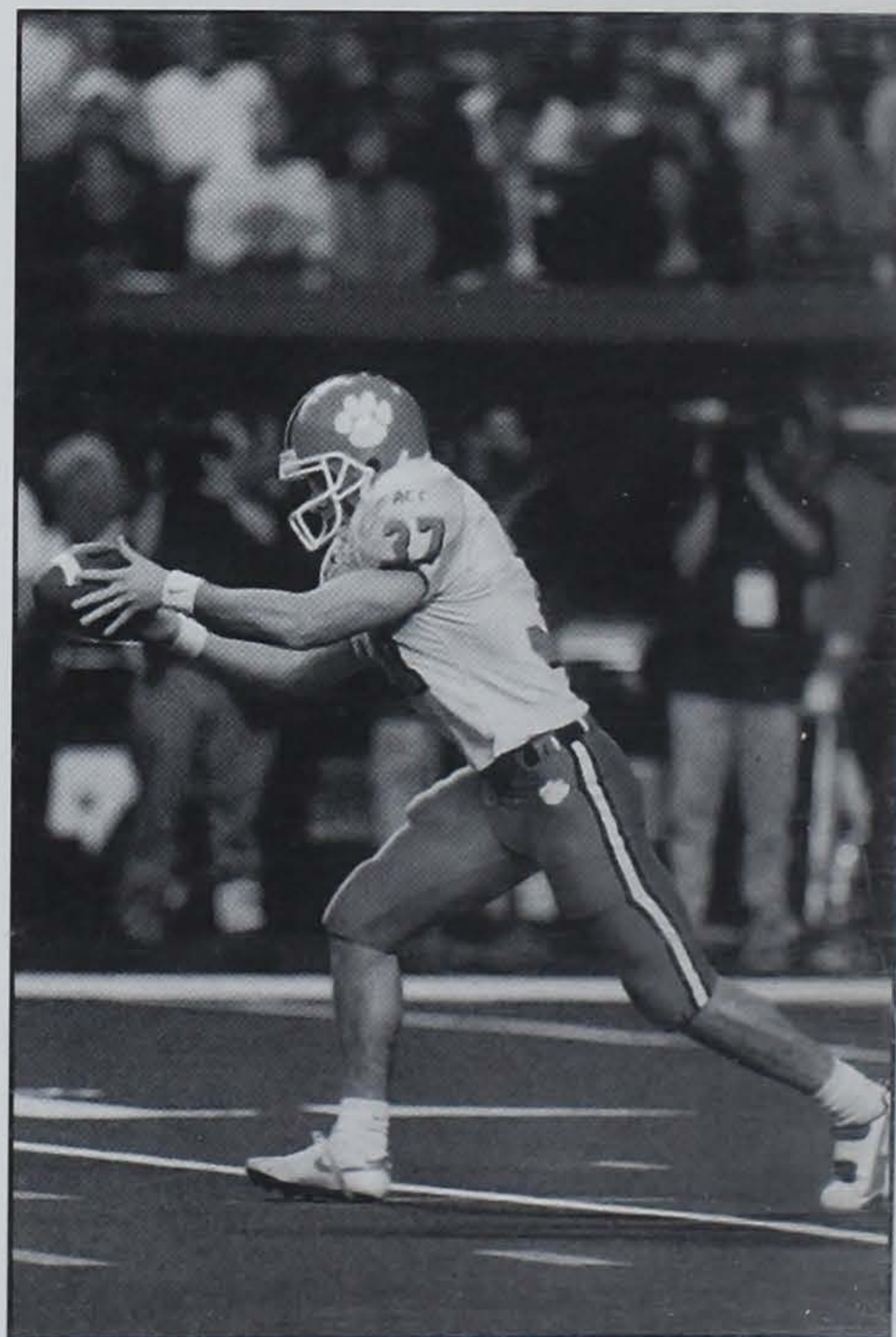

CLEMSON LEADERS IN ACC STATS

Clemson had two players lead the ACC in three different individual categories in 1997. Tony Horne led the ACC in all-purpose running yards with 153.9 yards per game, far ahead of second place Jonathon Linton of North Carolina, who had a 117.3 average. Horne also led the conference in kickoff returns with 27.3 yards per return on 18 returns.

Anthony Simmons led the league in tackles per game for the second straight year. He had 144 tackles for the regular season, 13.1 per game. He also paced the conference in tackles for loss with 21 for 88 yards, two more than Andre Wadsworth had at Florida State.

Clemson also had some players rank in the top three in various areas. Raymond Priester ranked third in rushing with 89.4 yards per game. Tony Horne was second in receptions per game with a 6.18 figure. Horne was also third in punt returns with a 10.3 average. Antwan Edwards was tied for third in interceptions per game with 0.4 per game, and was second in pass broken up with 14. Punter Kevin Laird was second in punting average with a 42.6 yards per boot.

Note that final ACC stats do not include bowl games.

CLEMSON ALL-AMERICANS

Clemson linebacker Anthony Simmons was named a first-team All-American by Associated Press and **The Sporting News** for the 1997 season. The junior from

Spartanburg, SC was the first Clemson defensive player to make first-team AP All-American since Terry Kinard in 1982.

Clemson senior offensive tackle Jim Bundren was a third-team All-America selection by Associated Press and **Sporting News** and second team choice by **Football News**.

Simmons led the ACC in tackles and tackles for loss. He had 158 tackles for the season and 25 tackles for loss and eight sacks. He was a prime reason Clemson's defense ranked sixth in the country in rushing defense, 18th in scoring defense and 16th in total defense. He was Clemson's top tackler in 10 of the 12 games last year.

Simmons ranks second in Clemson history in total tackles with 486. He passed former Clemson All-American Jeff Davis in the South Carolina game and trails only all-time leading tackler Bubba Brown, who had 515 in his four years (1976-79). He was named a first-team All-ACC player for the third straight year, just the third three-time first-team selection in Clemson history. Levon Kirkland and William Perry are the others.

Simmons is also just the second player in Clemson and ACC history to be chosen to an AP All-America team three straight years. The other is William Perry, who was a third-team selection in 1982-83 and 1984. Other ACC teams have had three-time All-Americans, but not while they were members of the ACC. Charley Justice of North Carolina was a four-time AP All-American from 1946-49, but the ACC was not formed yet. Ron

Simmons, Deion Sanders and Marvin Jones were all three-time All-Americans at Florida State, but all played before Florida State joined the ACC in 1992.

Bundren started 47 straight games at offensive tackle for the Tigers. He was named first-team All-ACC for the second straight season. He graded at least 80 percent in every game this year and was a big reason Clemson set many school records in passing offense. He was a two-time ACC Offensive Lineman of the Week.

FIVE TIGERS FIRST-TEAM ALL-ACC

Clemson had five players chosen first-team All-ACC and four players earned a second-team selection in 1997. The five first-team choices were the most for Clemson



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since the 1991 season when the Tigers had nine first-team selections. The 1991 season was Clemson's last ACC championship season.

Earning first-team All-ACC honors were linebacker Anthony Simmons, tailback Raymond Priester, offensive guard Glenn Rountree, offensive tackle Jim Bundren and all-purpose player Tony Horne. Second-team selections were Antwan Edwards at cornerback, Raymond White at middle guard and Lorenzo Bromell at defensive tackle. Horne was named a second-team wide receiver, the second Clemson player in history honored at two positions in the same year.

Simmons is the first player in Clemson history to make first-team All-ACC as a freshman, sophomore and junior. For Bundren, it was his second straight year on the first team, while Priester had made second-team All-ACC each of his last two seasons. Rountree was a second-team choice as a junior. It was the first appearance on any All-ACC team for Edwards, Horne, Bromell and White. Edwards is the only returnee for 1998.

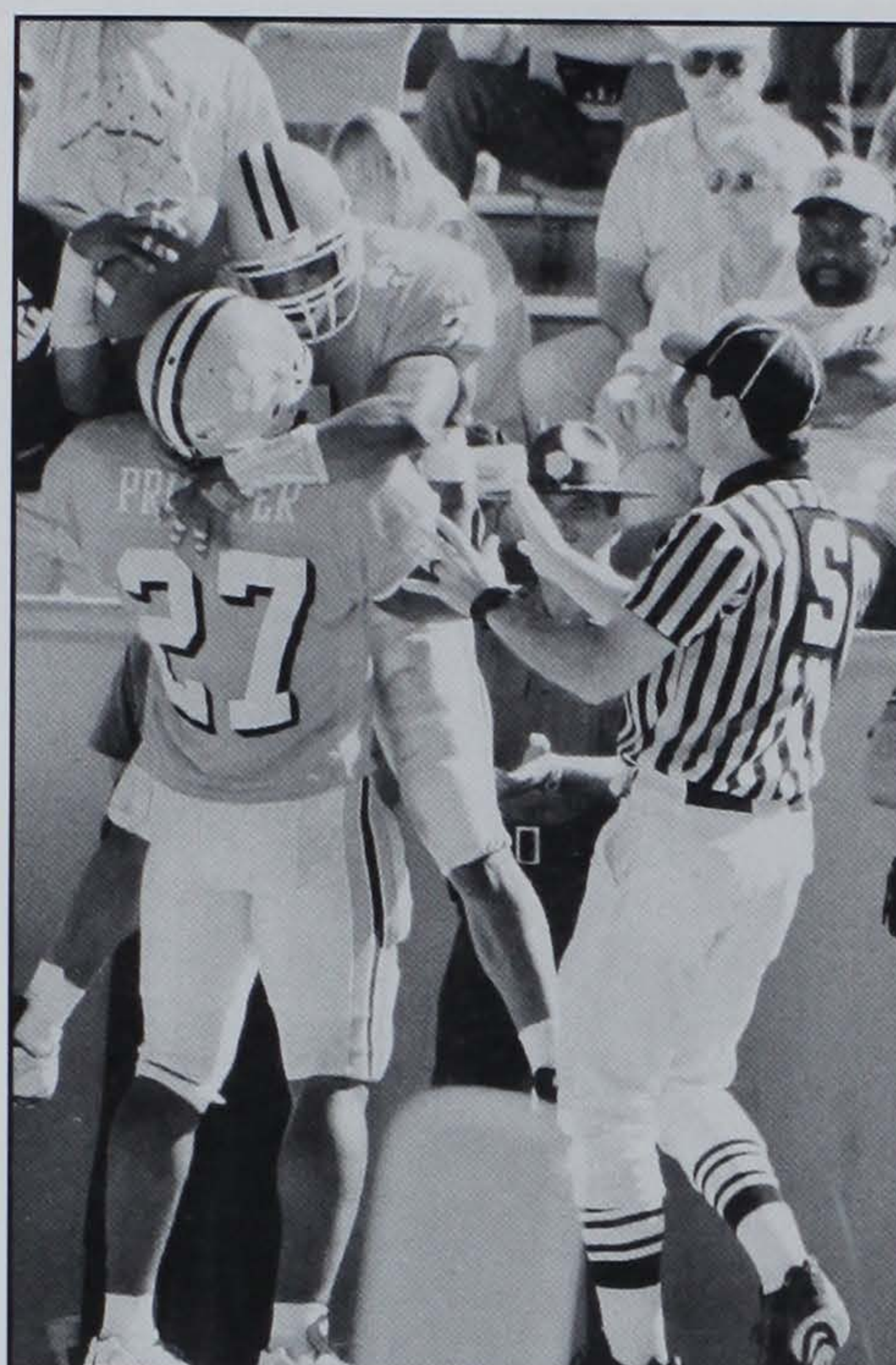
EDWARDS LEADS THE SECONDARY

Antwan Edwards was the leader of a Clemson secondary that came on strong at the end of the season to rank 33rd in the nation in pass efficiency defense, third best in the ACC. Edwards had his best game in the regular season finale when he had two interceptions, one he returned for a touchdown. He also had three passes broken up and seven tackles and was named ACC Defensive Back of the Week for his performance against South Carolina.

Edwards started the first six games at safety, then moved to cornerback for the last five contests. He made the move when freshman Robert Carswell was inserted into the starting lineup. For the year, Edwards had 52 tackles, 15 passes broken up and four interceptions. He led the team in interceptions and ranked second in the ACC in passes broken up. The pass deflection total tied a Clemson single season record.

CLEMSON VS. RANKED TEAMS

Clemson has four wins over ranked teams in Tommy West's four seasons as head coach of the Tigers, including a victory at 25th ranked NC State in 1997. Clemson had three narrow losses to top 10 teams last year, a 35-28 loss to Florida State, a 17-10 defeat to North Carolina, and a 21-17 loss to Auburn in the Peach Bowl. Clemson has had 18 wins over Top 25 teams in the last 11 years and has had at least one ranked win



Priester and Horne had record setting careers and were both All-ACC.

in 10 of the last 11 years. Clemson had a streak of nine straight years with at least one ranked win broken in 1995. At the time, only Miami (FL) had a streak as long.

CLEMSON SPECIAL TEAMS A STRENGTH IN 1997

Clemson had a standout season when it comes to special teams. The Tigers blocked six kicks, including a record three punts in the Peach Bowl against Auburn. Two Tigers ranked in the top 50 in the nation in kickoff returns, another Tiger was in the top 35 in punting and still another was among the best in the nation in field goals. Here is a rundown of Clemson's special teams performance in 1997.

Field Goals—Clemson led the ACC in field goals with 20 (in 27 attempts). David Richardson was 12-13 on field goals in the regular season (only miss from 47 yards) and he ranked 26th in the nation in field goals/game.

Kickoffs—David Richardson had 22 touchbacks in 56 kickoffs, 40 percent, the best percentage of touchbacks on kickoffs since college football moved the kickoff from the 40 to the 35 in 1986. Opponents started inside the 21 yardline 34 of the 56 kickoffs (61 percent).

Kickoff Returns—Team ranked 14th in the nation and second in the ACC in kickoff returns with 23.34 average. Two Tigers ranked in top 50 in the nation, Tony Horne was 8th with 27.28 average and Antwan Edwards was 42nd with 23.33 average. This is the first time in Clemson history

Tigers have had two of the top 50 kickoff return men in the same season. Horne's kickoff return yardage was sixth best in Clemson history for a single season.

Punting—Kevin Laird was second in the ACC and 33rd in the nation in punting average with a 42.6 average. Laird closed the season with a streak of eight straight games with at least a 42-yard average, longest streak by a Clemson punter in 14 years (Dale Hatcher). Laird's punting average was eighth best in Clemson history for a single season.

Punt Returns—Tony Horne ranked 39th in the nation and the team was 40th in the nation in punt returns. Team was third in the ACC. Horne's punt return yardage total was fifth highest in Clemson history.

Blocked Kicks—Rahim Abdullah tied single game record for blocked punts in a game with two against Auburn. Clemson blocked six kicks for the season, second highest total in Clemson history.

BUNDREN, WOFFORD NAMED TO ACADEMIC ALL-ACC TEAM

Clemson offensive starters Jim Bundren and Brian Wofford were named first-team Academic All-ACC for 1997. To be eligible, a player must earn a 3.0 GPA for the Fall semester or have maintained a 3.00 cumulative average during academic career.

It was the second straight year that Bundren was named first-team All-ACC on the field and in the classroom. He joins former Clemson quarterback Steve Fuller (1977-78) as the only two-time first-team all-conference selection on both teams.

Bundren was a second-team All-American this past season according to **Football News** and a third-team selection according to Associated Press and **Sporting News**. Bundren started every game in his four years, 47 consecutive games, an all-time record for an offensive tackle.

He is a native of Wilmington, DE who has earned his degree in parks and recreation.

Wofford was the second leading receiver on the Clemson team last year with 28 receptions for 388 yards and four touchdowns. He started 11 of the 12 games. He caught at least one pass in every game, including a season high six receptions at Georgia Tech. He scored touchdowns against Appalachian State, Florida State, Duke and South Carolina last season. He is a native of Spartanburg, SC, and the junior is a marketing major at Clemson.

FOX TOP RETURNING TACKLER

Clemson safety DoMarco Fox is the top returning tackler from Clemson's 1997 de-



fense that ranked sixth in the country in rushing defense and 16th in total defense. He finished the season with 74 tackles, including 48 first hits. Fox started all 12 games and played 653 snaps. He also had five pass deflections.

He had his best all-around game as a Tiger in the loss to North Carolina. The native of Philadelphia, MS, had nine tackles, including seven first hits, tying his high tackle total of the season. Fox was active in all phases of the North Carolina game. He had his first career interception, had a punt return and two kickoff returns in the contest. He also deflected a pass and blocked a punt. The blocked punt gave Clemson possession at the North Carolina 14 with 1:32 left, but Clemson could not convert the break.

LAIRD PUNTING OUTSTANDING

Clemson punter Kevin Laird finished the 1997 season on a hot streak, averaging at least 40 yards a boot in eight straight games. This is the longest streak by a Clemson punter since Dale Hatcher had a record 12 straight games with a 40-yard punting average in 1983-84.

Laird averaged 46.1 yards a punt against North Carolina, including a 69-yarder that was the longest punt by a Clemson player since Nelson Welch had a 69-yarder against NC State in 1992. He finished the season with a 43.7 average in the Peach Bowl,

including a 57 yarder, one of three punts over 50 yards for Laird in the contest. He also had two punts inside the 20.

Laird concluded the season with a 42.8 average for the season, 33rd best in the nation. His best game of the year in terms of average was against Florida State when he averaged 47.6 yards a punt. His streak is actually eight straight games of at least 42 yards a punt.

Laird has averaged 44.4 yards a punt over his eight-game streak. He has 12 punts over 50 yards in the streak and 10 punts inside the 20. He had just seven touchbacks all season.

CLEMSON'S 1997 SENIORS SET 60 RECORDS

Clemson lost one of its top senior classes in history this past season. The group led the Tigers to three straight bowl games, something only 16 other senior classes in the country could claim. The class had a perfect road season (5-0 in 1995), just the second perfect road team since 1948, and a 5-1 home record in 1996. The group experienced four wins over top 25 teams and a road win at every ACC school with the exception of Florida State. Overall, the group won 27 games in four seasons, including 20 wins in ACC play.

Clemson's seniors of 1997 included some of the school's great players in history, especially on offense, where five players

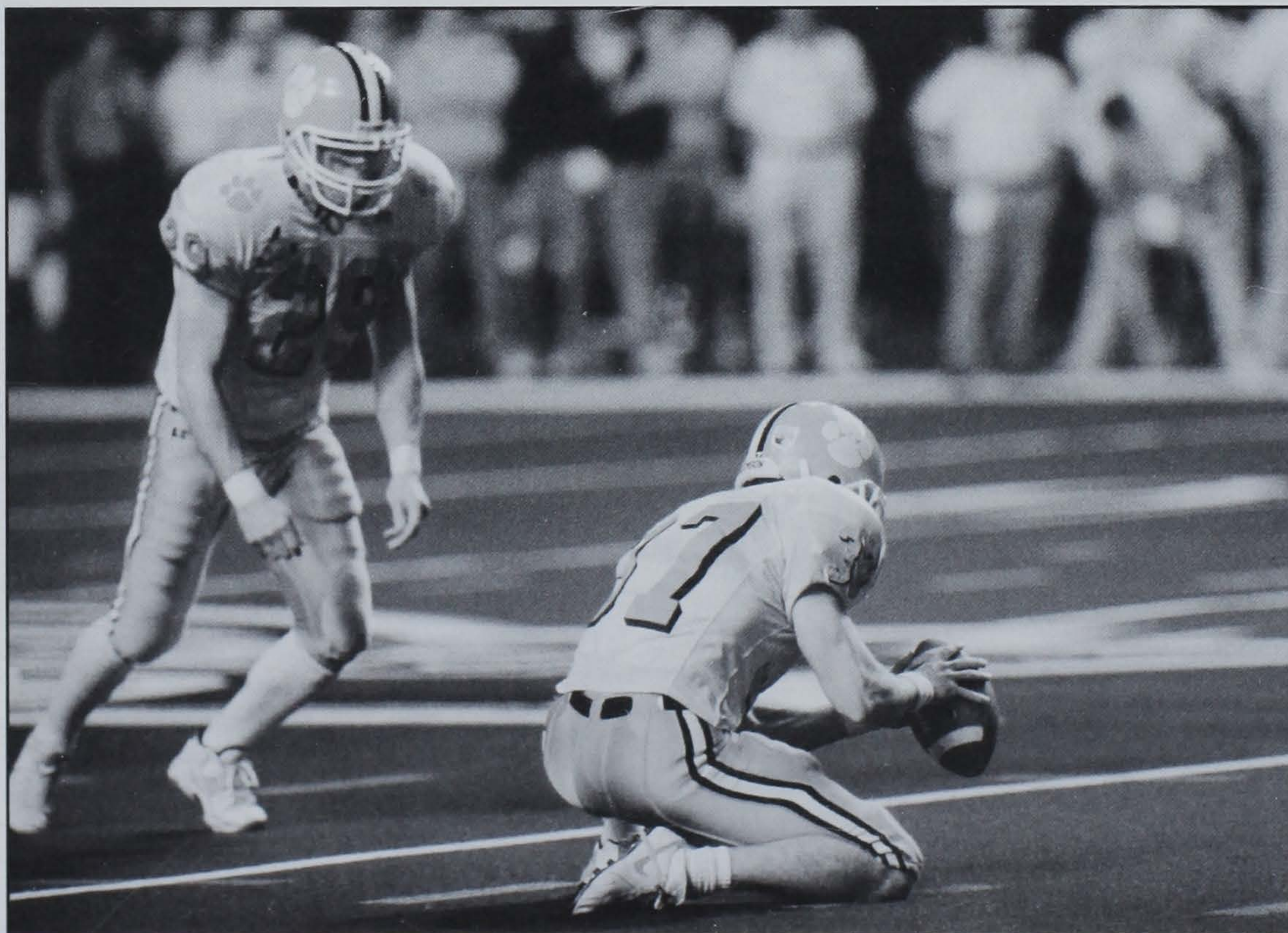
hold a combined 60 school records. The class includes Raymond Priester, Clemson's career rushing leader, Nealon Greene, the school's career passing leader and total offense leader, and Tony Horne, Clemson's single season record holder for receptions and all-purpose running.

Jim Bundren and Glenn Rountree were also record setters as offensive linemen. They started each of the last 47 games, every game of their respective careers. They are certainly common denominators in the Clemson offense over the last four years. Bundren has the record for total starts by a Clemson offensive tackle and they combine to hold the record for consecutive starts by an offensive lineman.

CLEMSON WINS IN OVERTIME

Clemson defeated Duke 29-20 in overtime on November 8, 1997. It was the first overtime game in either of the school's history and just the second overtime game involving an ACC team. Earlier in 1997 NC State defeated Syracuse in overtime. Clemson's win over Duke was the first overtime game involving two ACC teams.

Clemson won the game by nine points, an unusual margin of victory in overtime. The Tigers kicked a field goal on its possession, then Rahim Abdullah intercepted a pass and raced 63 yards for a score to clinch the victory.

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ABDULLAH CLEMSON MVP OF PEACH BOWL

Big plays have been a part of the resume of Clemson outside linebacker Rahim Abdullah and they are reasons he should be one of the best in the country at his position in 1998. The sophomore from Jacksonville had 11 tackles, a sack, and interception return for a touchdown, and a key stop on a fake punt in Clemson's win over Duke. The 11 tackles were his career high.

With his 63-yard interception return for a score against Duke, he became just the third player in Clemson history to have three touchdowns via return in a career. And, Abdullah still has two full seasons to play. The 6-5 outside linebacker had a nine-yard fumble return for a score against NC State as a freshman and a 74-yard fumble return for a touchdown against the Pack in 1997.

Abdullah joins Arlington Nunn, who had three interception returns for touchdown in 1990, and Don Kelley, who had two punt returns and one interception return for a touchdown in 1970. Abdullah had five tackles against South Carolina and had 70 for the season, fifth on the team.

He continued his fine play in the 1998 Peach Bowl against Auburn. Twice in the contest he blocked punts and he also had a

quarterback sack and defended a pair of passes. He was named Clemson's MVP of the contest.

CLEMSON STRONG NOVEMBER TEAM

Clemson has been a good team down the stretch under Tommy West. The 1997 season was the third year in a row Clemson started out with a 3-3 record and it is the third year in a row Clemson went on to win at least four of its last five to qualify for a bowl.

In 1995 and 1996, Clemson had a five-game winning streak at mid-season to make a charge to a bowl bid. The Tigers won their last five in 1995 to finish 8-3 and qualify for the Gator Bowl, and the Tigers won five of their last six in 1996 to finish 7-4 and earn a Peach Bowl bid. Even in West's first year the Tigers were 2-5 at the start, then won three of their last four games. Clemson won four of their final five games last season to qualify for a bowl.

Clemson started the drive on the road in 1997, winning at Maryland, 20-9, and then at Wake Forest, 33-16. The drive for a bowl then came to Death Valley and continued with a 29-20 overtime thriller against Duke. The final notch came against South Caro-

lina to make it four of five, including three of four in November. Clemson's only loss over the last month and a half was to fifth-ranked North Carolina by seven points.

The Tigers are 11-3 under West in games played in November and the Tigers are 22-6 in November in the decade of the 1990s. Actually, October 17 seems to be the magic change day for Clemson football. Since 1988, Clemson is 46-13 in games played after October 17, a .793 winning percentage. Clemson is 35-23-1 in games played before October 17 since 1988, a .602 winning percentage.

Unfortunately, Clemson has just two games in November this year, Georgia Tech on November 12th and South Carolina on November 21st. Both are at Death Valley.

CLEMSON IN TOP SIX IN RUSHING DEFENSE

Clemson gave up just 88.2 rushing yards per game in the regular season and ranked sixth in the nation in rushing defense. Seven times opponents failed to gain 100 yards rushing against Clemson and only South Carolina (182) was able to gain over 127 yards on the ground against the Tigers. Top 10 teams Florida State and North Carolina had a combined 99 yards rushing against the Clemson defense last year.

The Tigers gave up just 10 rushing touchdowns all season. Opponents had just five rushes over 20 yards for the regular season. In fact, Clemson's defense gave up just 19 total touchdowns in 11 regular season games.

Clemson held Florida State to just 31 yards rushing, the fewest rushing yards by a Florida State team in the decade of the 1990s. You have to go back to the Memphis State game of 1989 to find the last time Florida State had fewer than 31 yards rushing. Bobby Bowden's team had just 25 yards rushing in that 57-20 victory over Memphis State.

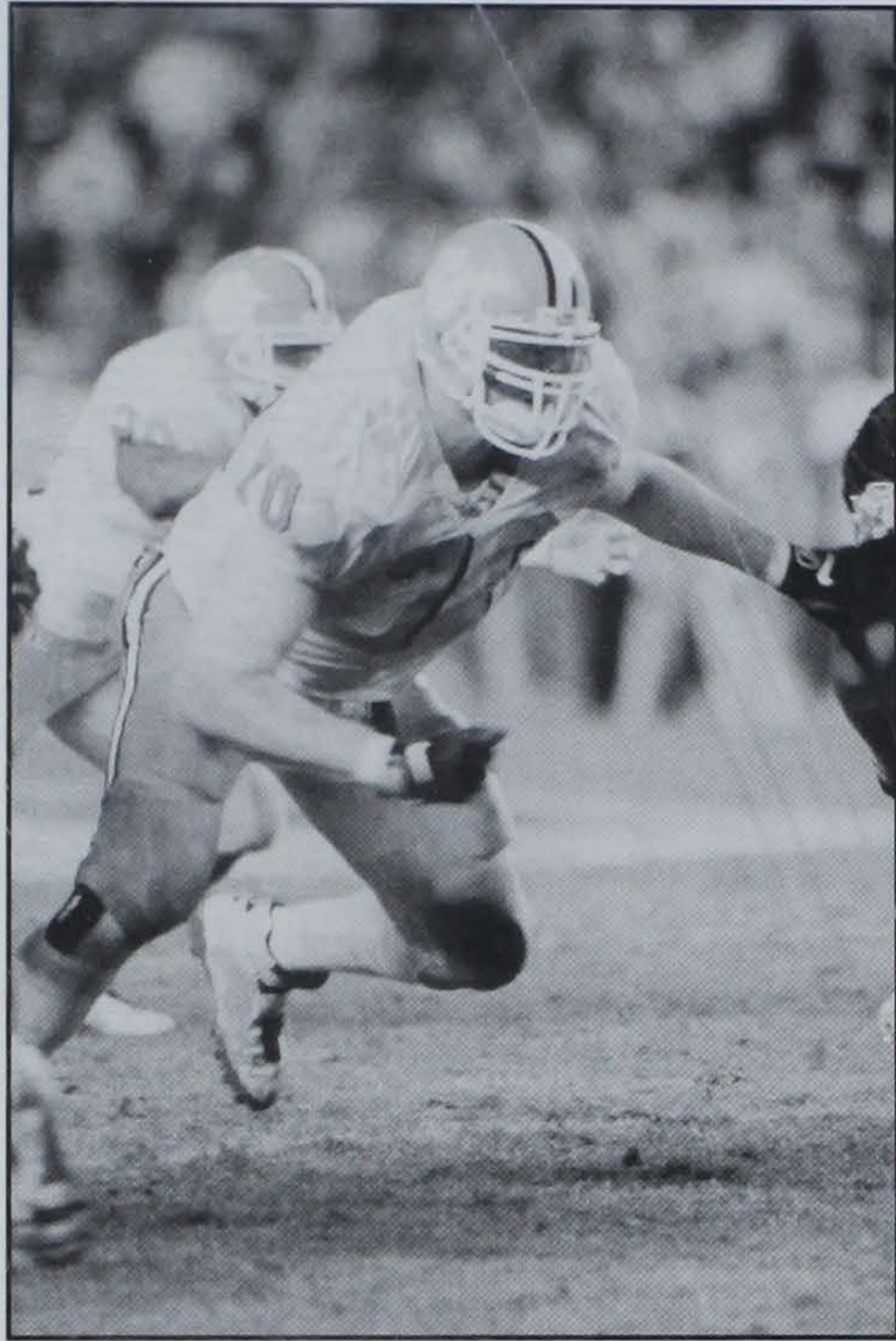
RICHARDSON 13-15 ON FIELD GOALS

Clemson placekicker David Richardson was 13-15 on field goals last year, and would have to be considered a preseason All-ACC candidate for 1998. His 1997 performance included 4-4 in the Wake Forest game and 3-4 against Duke. His only misses were from 47 yards, against Duke and in the bowl game against Auburn.

He also had four touchbacks in the Wake Forest contest and three in the Duke game, contributing to a field position advantage for the Tigers throughout the game. He had a 52-yarder against Wake Forest, longest by a Clemson player in five years and the

second longest in the ACC last year.

Richardson had an unusual stat line last year in that he was 13-15 on field goals and 17-20 on extra points. He was outstanding in kickoffs, with 22 touchbacks in 56 kickoffs. **In fact, that 40 percent touchback rate is the best by a Clemson kicker since the NCAA moved kickoffs back to the 35 yard line in 1986.** Yes, even better than Chris Gardocki, who now handles that chore for the Indianapolis Colts.

Gardocki's best season as far as kickoffs were concerned, took place in 1990 when he had 24 touchbacks on 66 kickoffs, .364. The record for touchback percentage by a Clemson kicker is held by Donald Igwebuike, who had 47 of his 66 kickoffs in 1983 that resulted in touchbacks. Of course, he was kicking off from the 40 yard line.

It should be noted that Richardson and Matt Padgett were a combined 16-17 in field goal attempts inside the 40 last year. **That percentage is the best ever by a Clemson team.** That breaks the previous record from 1983 when Igwebuike and Bob Paulling were a combined 14-15 inside the 40.

CLEMSON OUTSTANDING ON THE ROAD

Clemson won on the road at Wake Forest on November 1, the Tigers 10th road win in its last 13 ACC road games. The stretch started with a 28-17 victory at 12th ranked North Carolina in 1994. Clemson was 3-1

last year on the road in the ACC and now 10-6 under Tommy West. With the win over South Carolina, Clemson finished the 1997 season with a 4-1 road record.

Clemson has been an outstanding road team for many years. In fact, Clemson has had a losing record in ACC road play just four of the last 21 seasons. Three of those years were consecutive, 1-4 in 1992, 1-2 in 1993 and 1-3 in 1994. Clemson had a 16-2-1 ACC road record between 1977-83. West posted a 4-0 ACC road record in 1995, his second year at Clemson. Overall, Tommy West is 28-20 as Clemson coach, 15-9 at Death Valley, 12-8 on the road and 1-3 at neutral site.

CLEMSON OFFENSE SETS PASSING RECORDS

Clemson set nine records in terms of passing offense on an individual and team basis in 1997. Clemson averaged 191.6 passing yards per game, ahead of the Clemson record of 175.5 per game set in 1969, Frank Howard's final season as head coach. Clemson also established records in terms of pass attempts, completion percentage, total completions and completions per game.

Individually, Nealon Greene averaged 184.3 passing yards per game, ahead of the individual record of 149.1 yards per game by Jimmy Addison in 1966. Greene's 15 completions per game were far ahead of Tommy Kendrick's 12.1 completions per game in 1970. Greene averaged 213 yards per game in total offense, ahead of the previous record of 180.3 yards per game by Steve Fuller in 1978.

In terms of receiving, Tony Horne averaged 6.2 receptions per game, far ahead of the previous record of 4.9 per game by Charlie Waters in 1969. Horne was also 25 yards per game ahead of the all-purpose running record.

CARSWELL OUTSTANDING IN SECONDARY

Robert Carswell made his first career start against Maryland and the rookie from Stone Mountain, GA responded with 11 tackles and three passes broken up. It was the most tackles in a game by a Clemson defensive back last year and the most tackles by a Clemson first-year freshman in his first start since 1992 when Derek Burnette

had 11 tackles against Ball State. The Clemson record for tackles by a first-year freshman in his first game is 14 by Randy Scott against Florida State in 1976.

Carswell continued his fine play against Wake Forest with 11 more tackles and two passes broken up, giving him 22 tackles and five PBUs in those two games. He added six tackles and another pass deflection against Duke. Carswell had 51 tackles for the season, 35 in a four-game stretch. He had just one tackle against South Carolina because he left the game five plays in with a sprained ankle, but he bounced back with seven in the Peach Bowl.

Carswell's three passes broken up in his first game also tied for the most by a Clemson player in a game last year and were the most ever by a freshman in his first game. Carswell had played just 33 snaps prior to the Maryland game, but looked like a veteran in his 68 snaps at Maryland and he played 65 at Wake Forest.

Carswell, who turned 19 the day after the Maryland game, was a **Parade** All-American in 1996 and was ranked as one of the best defensive backs in the nation. He had seven caused fumbles and four interceptions his senior year at Stone Mountain High School. He is the first player from Stone Mountain, GA to come to Clemson since Chris Gardocki in 1988-90. Gardocki went on to an All-America career at Clemson and is now an All-Pro player with the Indianapolis Colts.

TURNOVERS, RUSHING MARGIN THE KEY

A statistical oddity took place in Clemson's loss to North Carolina in 1997. It was just the seventh time in the last 20 years that Clemson lost a game in which it won the turnover margin and the rushing margin. Clemson is now 20-2 under Tommy West when it wins the turnover margin and rushing margin in the same game. The only other loss in this situation took place at Duke in 1994, a contest in which Clemson had a +1 turnover margin and won the rushing game, 127-60. Duke still won 19-13.

Since 1977, or 20 years, Clemson has an incredible 109-7-2 record in games in which it wins the turnover margin and the rushing margin in the same game. That is a 93 percent winning percentage.

ANTONIO, JOHN

This man holds a special place in the hearts of Tiger fans and in the pocketbooks of sports marketing entrepreneurs. Antonio invented the Tiger paw, the distinctive logo of the Clemson athletic teams that has become synonymous with this University's athletic success. Antonio was an innovative account executive with Henderson Advertising in Greenville, and prior to the 1970 season, unveiled the Paw as Clemson's new logo. It has shown up all over the country on items owned by Clemson fans. Many institutions with a feline as mascot have used the logo, or an impression of it.

Antonio also came up with the phrase, "Fly the friendly skies of United," when he worked for the Leo Burnette Agency in Chicago. "I've never had a logo or an emblem copied as much as the Tiger Paw," said Antonio, now 68 and living in Greenville.

Antonio still remembers the day he made the presentation of the Tiger Paw to Frank Howard, then the Clemson Athletic Director. "He wasn't saying much at all," recalled Antonio in an article in the **Greenville News** by Alyce Atkinson on Feb. 16, 1997. "I kind of thought I was losing this fight." At this point Antonio pulled out an orange football helmet with a tiger paw painted on the side.

"Coach Howard's eyes got as big as saucers and he smiled. From there it was downhill. Coach Howard wanted that helmet." Those Tiger paws are still on the Clemson helmets today.

ATHLETICS AND ACADEMICS

The Clemson athletic department provided almost \$1.8 million in financial support to University programs and operations during the 1997-98 fiscal year. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Fund was the recipient of over \$326,000 during the year. An additional \$210,000 was contributed to the university for the recruitment of academically gifted students. The fund was created to help meet the need for more non-athletic academic scholarships to the university.

The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Fund, one of the largest academic endowments at Clemson, surpassed the \$3.8 million mark during the 1998 Spring semester. More than 35 students who are not athletes, are benefitting from the fund. The money for the fund comes from several different sources, but it is all raised by activities of the athletic department, including player-of-the-game contributions, as well as matching gift contributions.

The athletic department made a \$100,000 gift for computer equipment in the New Student Center in 1996. Additionally, the athletic department contributed \$200,000 towards an innovation in teaching Award that is sponsored by the student government. Over the last nine years, athletics has contributed more than \$12 million in financial support to Clemson University.

AUBURN SERIES

Clemson and Auburn, two Southern Football powers who met in the 1998 Peach Bowl, will play a four-year series starting in 2005. The contract will feature two games at Clemson and two at Auburn. The 2005 and 2007 games will be held at Clemson, and the 2006 and 2008 contests will be played at Auburn. All four games will take place on the first Saturday in September and are currently slated to be the season opener for each school in each season.

The teams last met in the regular season in 1971 when a fifth-ranked Auburn team led by Heisman Trophy winner Pat Sullivan, handed Clemson a 35-13 defeat. Auburn has won the last 12 meetings between the teams.

Clemson's last victory over the War Eagles took place in 1951, a 34-0 Clemson triumph. It gave Clemson five wins in six outings against Auburn between 1946 and 1951. The 34-18 Clemson win in 1947 over Auburn featured the greatest quarterback performance in Clemson history. Bobby Gage threw for four touchdowns and gained 374 yards in total offense, both Clemson single game records, in the Tiger triumph. The following year Clemson won 7-6 in Mobile, a key victory in Clemson's drive to a perfect season in 1948.

The first three coaches in Clemson football history were Auburn graduates. Walter Riggs, Clemson's first head coach and later University President, was Clemson's coach in 1896 and 1899 and was an 1893 Auburn graduate. William Williams, Clemson's mentor in 1897, was an 1896 Auburn grad, while John Penton, Clemson's head coach in the fall of 1898, had graduated from Auburn the previous spring.

BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bowl Coalition is no longer....at least in name. This year starts a new series, the Bowl Championship Series. The difference lies in the inclusion of the Big Ten and Pac-10 Champions and the Rose Bowl in the National Championship mix.

Last season, Nebraska and Michigan were both undefeated at the end of the regular season, yet could not face each other in a bowl because the Big Ten had an automatic tie-in with the Rose Bowl. This year if Nebraska and Michigan are ranked one-two at the end of the season, they can now face each other.

ABC television has the contract for the BCS (Bowl Championship Series) for the next four years.

CALHOUN, JOHN

This Senator from the state of South Carolina proposed a bill in the house in 1955 making it a state law that Clemson and South Carolina had to meet in football once a year.

CLARK, DWIGHT

One of the great pro football success stories belongs to Dwight Clark. A Clemson Tiger between 1975-78, the wide receiver was a starter in 1977 and 1978, but still caught only 33 passes for his entire career. Tony Horne more than doubled that figure last year alone.

Clark was a key contributor on the 1978 ACC Championship team that was 11-1 and ranked sixth in the final poll, but he was never even second-team All-ACC.

The San Francisco 49ers drafted him in the 10th round in 1979 and he was a surprise squad member in that season. Then Clark and Joe Montana started working together and before you knew it Clark was leading the league in receptions and was a pro bowl starter. He concluded his career as the 49ers all-time leader in receptions with 506, reception yards (6750) and touchdowns (48), marks Jerry Rice has since broken.

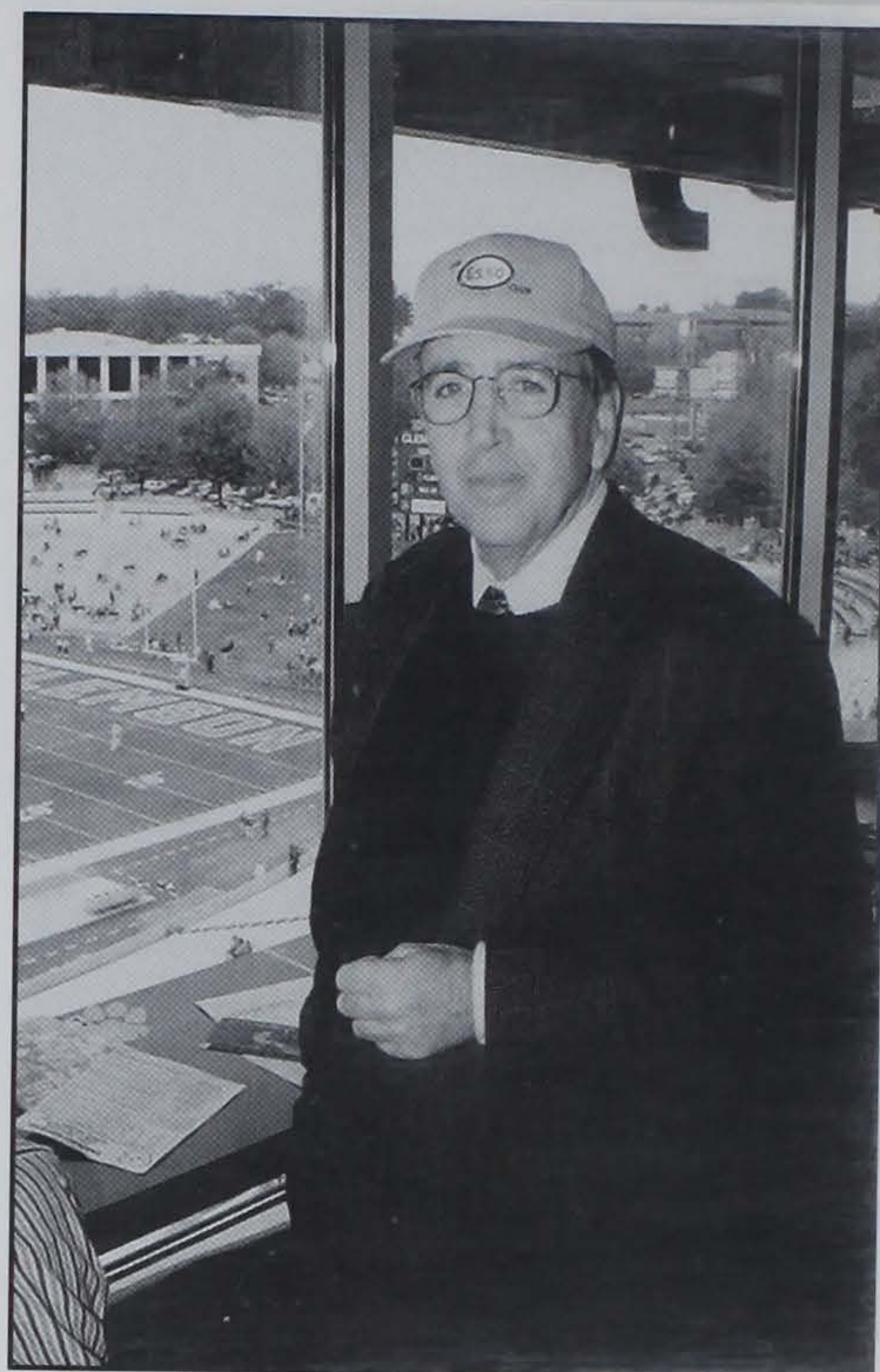
Today, Clark is the 49ers' coordinator of football operations/player personnel. Some of his touchdown receptions weren't as long as that title, but his job does allow him to travel to Clemson now and then to scout the talent level of his beloved Tigers.

Clark is one of three former Tiger gridders now serving an NFL team. Mark Richardson, a letterman outside linebacker for the 1981 National Championship Tigers, is a vice president with the Carolina Panthers. Jerry Butler is employed by the front office of the Buffalo Bills.

CLEMSON, SC

The city of Clemson has a population of about 11,000 fulltime residents. But, on Saturday afternoons in the fall, when over 80,000 fans are in the stands, that population increases significantly. In fact, Clemson moves all the way to the second largest city in the state on home football Saturdays when over 80,500 fans are in the stands.

On those days, only Columbia is larger. Charleston's latest population reading was 80,414 in the most recent census, so that is why we have to list the qualifier at 80,500. So, depending on the size of the crowd, Clemson

becomes either the second or third largest city in South Carolina on home football Saturdays.

COLORS

Clemson's official colors are Northwestern purple (PMS 541) and burnt orange (PMS 165), but many of Clemson's athletic uniforms are predominantly orange and white. Clemson has worn all orange for special games, and in 1991 wore purple jerseys with white pants and orange helmets for the N.C. State and California games.

According to legend Clemson used to have a pale purple and gold as the official colors. But, Jess Neely changed that because he wanted uniforms that were more colorfast. It seems that the weather and constant washings were causing the uniforms to fade. So Neely worked with the Clemson school of textiles and developed deeper colors for uniforms, colors that held up under the rays of the sun and the workings of the washing machines.

CONFERENCE

Clemson is a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Tigers were charter members in 1953. Prior to that, Clemson was in the Southern Conference from 1921 to 1952. Clemson was in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association before that, and has been a charter member of every conference with which it has been affiliated.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Clemson has more ACC titles than any other school, as the Tigers won or shared the ACC title in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1965, 1966, 1967, 1978, 1981, 1982, 1986, 1987, 1988 and 1991. Clemson won the Southern Conference in 1940 and 1948. Clemson tied for the ACC title in 1965 so Clemson has 12 outright and one tied ACC titles.

COUNTRY GENTLEMAN

Clemson is famous for its Tiger mascot and pushups after each score. But, the school used to have two mascots. In addition to the Tiger, the school used to have the Country Gentleman, a student dressed in purple tails



and top hat, carrying a cane. The Country Gentleman concept came about as a result of references to Clemson made by **Greenville News** sportswriter Carter Scoop Latimer as the Country Gentlemen. Clemson had the two-mascot system between 1954 and 1972.

DEATH VALLEY

Name synonymous with Clemson Memorial Stadium. The Stadium was dubbed this affectionate title by the late Lonnie McMillian, a former coach at Presbyterian. He used to take his teams to play at Clemson, and they rarely scored, never mind gained a victory. Once he told the writers he was going to play Clemson up at Death Valley because his teams always got killed. It stuck somewhat, but when Frank Howard started calling it that in the fifties, the term really caught on. It is now in its 56th year.

Many people think the name is derived from the fact that there rests a cemetery outside the fence on the pressbox site of the stadium. But, although it would make sense, the name was first coined by Lonnie McMillian.

EIGHT

Years that end in eight have been memorable for Clemson football and Tommy West hopes that trend continues as we head into the 1998 season. A look to the records shows us that eight different years that end in eight, Clemson has had a .700 winning percentage or better. The last two years that ended in eight, Clemson was 10-2 (1988) and 11-1 (1978). The list is actually led by the 1948 team, which had a perfect 11-0 record.

Clemson won conference championships in 1948, 1958, 1978 and 1988 and also went to a bowl game all four of those seasons that end in eight.

EMERGENCY PHONE

In case of emergency at Clemson Memorial Stadium, call (864) 656-2999. The Clemson University police number is (864) 656-2222. For health care at the stadium first aid is available at Gates 9, 13, 16 and 20 in the upper decks.

ENDOWED POSITIONS

Through the IPTAY Office, Clemson has established an endowment of positions program. The program began in April of 1994 when members of IPTAY attended the 85th birthday of legendary head coach Frank Howard. Contributions were made at the festive event and by others who could not attend, thereby endowing the Clemson Head Coaching position.

Since then many generous IPTAY members have endowed various positions in all sports. The first to do it was the Bill Hudson Family, which endowed the Clemson offensive tackle position. Bill Hudson was a stalwart tackle at Clemson in the late 1950s and went on to a pro career with the San Diego Chargers, Boston Patriots and Montreal Alouettes. He played in the 1962 AFL Pro Bowl.

The program is now up to 56 endowments counting all sports. A list of the endowments is on page 41 of this press guide.

ESSO CLUB

When you want to cover a Clemson football weekend and capture the true flavor of the entire proceedings you have to make a pit stop at the Esso Club. If this sounds like a combination bar and gas station, well, you're right. They don't sell gas there anymore, but Clemson fans for many years have frequented this famous weekend watering hole.

It is a favorite establishment for Brent Musberger, regardless of the network he represents. He made two visits there last year, once during the football season when he broadcast the Clemson-North Carolina football game and once during basketball season when he brought the one and only Dick Vitale with him in conjunction with ABC's coverage of the Clemson vs. Georgia Tech basketball game.

EUROPEAN CHAMPION

The Rhein Fire won the NFL Europe championship this past June and the team had a distinct Clemson flavor. Two former Tigers, Wardell Rouse and Larry Ryans, were starters on the team and played key roles throughout the season. Both hope their championship experience will springboard them back to the NFL.

The offensive coordinator of the team was former longtime Tiger coach and administrator Whitey Jordan. He had retired in February as an assistant athletic director with the Clemson program after a career of service at Clemson and many other prominent programs for 40 years. He coached such greats as Eric Dickerson at SMU and Emmitt Smith at Florida.

FAVORITE PLAY

It doesn't take Tommy West long to tell you his favorite play since he has been involved in coaching at Clemson. In 1987 the Tigers were facing Georgia in Death Valley and it was classic close game in the final moments.

The Tigers trailed 20-16, but had pinned the Bulldogs deep in their own territory thanks to a punt by Rusty Seyle. On a third-down play, Georgia quarterback James Jackson rolled to his left, attempting an end run to get Georgia some breathing room. But, the Tiger defense chased him down for a safety in the corner of the endzone.

The play brought the Tigers within 20-18 and Clemson eventually drove for a winning field goal by David Treadwell with just two seconds remaining and a 21-20 victory.

FORTY-EIGHT TEAM

Clemson's greatest team is widely recognized as the 1981 National Championship team. But, 50 years ago this season, Frank Howard's team put together a perfect season. In their day, they didn't take a back seat to anyone.

This year's season opener against Furman, the 1948 team will be honored during halftime ceremonies. The accomplishments of this team were many:

- Perfect 11-0 season, including 5-0 record and Southern Conference Championship.
- Ranked 11th in the final AP Poll, highest in Clemson history until 1978.

- Outscored the opposition 274-76.
- Won seven games away from home, the only team in Clemson history to do that.
- Excelled in terms of special teams, averaged still a Clemson record 17.1 yards per punt return. Also averaged 42.7 yards per punt, still fifth best in Clemson history.
- Excelled in terms of defense, allowing just 6.9 points per game and picking off 21 interceptions, fifth highest figure in Clemson history. Clemson held The Citadel without a first down, the only recorded game in Clemson history the Tigers have held the opposition without a first down.
- Bobby Gage put on the most efficient passing performance in Clemson history when he was 9-11 for 245 yards and two touchdowns in a victory over Furman. He averaged by far a record 22 yards per attempt.

GOALPOSTS

NCAA regulations stipulate the pipe must be 4" in diameter, must have posts that are 20' or more in height and 18-6 apart. This is the same width as the pros and closer than the 23-4 of previous college years. The crossbar is 10' high. The Clemson student body tore down the goalposts in the end zone with the grass bank after Clemson's emotional 52-27 win over Maryland in 1983, the only time the goalposts have come down at Clemson.

GRAVEYARD

Clemson has 45 wins over Associated Press ranked teams over the years, but some wins stand out. Winning over a ranked team in Death Valley is one thing, but gaining victory over a ranked team on an opponent's home field is an extraordinary accomplishment.

To document these victories Clemson has constructed a "Graveyard" at the entrance to the Clemson practice fields behind the Jervy Athletic Center. This is an appropriate place because hard work in preparation for these games is essential. Current Head Coach Tommy West already has three of these victories to his credit, at 12th ranked North Carolina in 1994, at 15th ranked Virginia in 1996 and at 25th ranked NC State last year.

HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

Clemson has an impressive class of 1998 Hall of Fame Inductees. Ceremonies will take place on September 12 at halftime of the Clemson vs. Virginia Tech game. This year's group has a multiple sport theme to it.

This year's class includes Eddis Freeman, one of just 15 athletes in Clemson history to letter in three different sports, and Chip Clark, also a three-sport letterman, who was captain of three different sports in his Clemson career.

Former Tiger football All-American and soccer star Obed Ariri will also be inducted. He won the Frank Howard Award in the Spring of 1981 and led the nation in field goals in 1980 with 23. Current Houston Astros third baseman Bill Spiers, a first-round draft pick in baseball out of Clemson in 1987 and Clemson's starting punter in 1986, also will be inducted, but his current job



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will keep him from attending.

Former PGA golfer and three-time Clemson All-American Dillard Pruitt is also a member of the class, as is five-time women's track All-American Kim Graham, who won an Olympic gold Medal at the 1996 Games in Atlanta.

HASH MARKS

The old hashmarks were 53' 4" from each sideline. In 1993 they were moved to an even 60' from each sideline, meaning there is 6' 8" more area for the running backs to turn the corner and put that much more pressure on the outside linebackers to cover them than there was prior to 1993.

In 1938, the hash marks were moved from 30 feet away from the sidelines to 45 feet. Then in 1947, they were moved to one-third of the field, or 53' 4". And, that was the distance until the 1993 season.

HEISMAN, JOHN

Yes, the same guy they named the trophy after used to coach at Clemson. You have to go back to the 1900-03 era to find him, but he brought Clemson its first unbeaten season in 1900, a 6-0 ledger. Heisman coached at Clemson for four seasons making an astronomical \$1800 a year, the same amount PGA events pay for a last place finish.

In 1904 Georgia Tech offered him \$2250 plus a percentage of the gate, and he was gone to Atlanta. Clemson should have scraped up the extra money to keep him. With John Heisman as head coach, Clemson beat Georgia Tech 73-0 in 1903, but two years later, with Heisman at Georgia Tech, the Yellow Jackets downed the Tigers, 17-10. Coaching does make a difference.

HOMECOMING

Clemson will face Maryland on Homecoming on October 10 this year. The Tigers are 23-2-2 since 1970 on Homecoming with the only losses coming to Georgia Tech in 1989 and to Virginia in 1997.

The first homecoming game played at Clemson took place on September 30, 1922 when Centre defeated Clemson at Riggs Field, 21-0. Clemson has celebrated Homecoming every year since 1922 with the exception of the 1930 and 1938 seasons.

Clemson has a 53-18-3 record on Homecoming games over the years, a .745 winning percentage and has outscored the opposition 1555-976 in those previous 74 games. The average margin of victory is 21 to 12.

HOOVER, DOC

Assistant Athletic Director and Head Trainer Fred Hoover has quite a streak going. He doesn't let us talk about it that much, but it is worth noting. The 1953 Florida State graduate has now worked 434 consecutive Clemson football games. Ironically, his 400th consecutive game worked on the Clemson sideline was against Florida State, his alma mater, in 1995.

Someone needs to monitor his eating habits because you would certainly think a trainer, who hangs around sick people all the time, would have gotten ill at least once over the last 39 years. Well, he has been sick at times, but never on Saturday afternoons in the fall. Hoover is number one in the Clemson athletic department in terms of longevity of service.

HUNTER, BILL

Dr. Bill Hunter is the man to call if you are doing a story on "Running Down the Hill", the most celebrated entrance in all of sport. Dr. Hunter is still a Clemson resident and was a starter on Clemson's 1942 team, and he was one of the first Tiger players to run down the hill. He still follows the Tigers avidly and rarely misses a home sporting event.

INFLATION I

A ticket to the Clemson-South Carolina game in 1896 cost 25 cents. Two thousand people attended the game. This year's ticket for the game in Clemson is \$25.

INFLATION II

When Clemson first built Memorial Stadium in 1942 the construction cost of the 20,000 seat stadium computed to \$7.20 a seat. When Clemson added 15,000 seats with an upper deck over the north stands in 1983 the average cost was \$866 a seat.

IPTAY

IPTAY, Clemson's athletic scholarship fund-raising foundation is one of the cornerstones of the Clemson Athletic Department. The foundation provides the funds for all athletic scholarships and has also been responsible for the funding of many facilities, including Vickery Hall, Clemson's athletic academic advising building that is featured on the inside front cover of this book. That facility and thus IPTAY have a lot to do with the football team reaching a 2.31 GPA for last year, the highest it has been over the course of the a year on record.

IPTAY stands for "I Pay Ten a Year", the original name

with a meaning derived from the minimum contribution of its donors when the organization began in 1934. It changed to "I Pay Twenty a Year" then "I Pay Thirty a Year." Four years ago the minimum donation was increased to \$100 a year. There are currently nearly 20,000 members of IPTAY and the organization raised a record \$9.1 million in 1997-98.

IPTAY does a lot more for Clemson and its students than pay tuition for athletes. IPTAY also funds band travel, contributes to the improvement of athletic facilities, both varsity and non-varsity, and has established the IPTAY Academic Scholarship Endowment.

LEGEND I

Frank Howard was known as Legend I around Clemson and he will always be known as the legend. Clemson lost one of the rocks of its tradition when he passed away at the age of 85 last January 28, 1996. Incredibly, he died 13 years to the day after the passing of his former teammate Bear Bryant.

Howard was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame on December 5, 1989. He was a member of nine Halls of Fame, posted 165 wins in his 30 years as Clemson head coach and had 96 victories, tied for the second highest total in ACC history. He captured eight conference titles, took the Tigers to six bowl games and six Top 20 seasons.

Even with these accomplishments, we will remember his incredible wit, to his final days, his positive influence on young people, many of whom went on to be successful in fields outside of athletics.

LEGEND II

SID at Clemson between 1955-88 football seasons, Bob Bradley has officially retired from his SID slot. He has seen 474 consecutive Clemson football games so he is considered the Cal Ripken (used to be Lou Gerig) of football SIDs in America. He has been President of CoSIDA, has been in the Clemson and SID Hall of Fame forever, and is a former Recipient of the Arch Ward Award as CoSIDA Man-of-the-Year.

In November of 1988 the press box at Memorial Stadium was named The Bob Bradley Press Box. At his retirement banquet in the summer of 1989 he was presented with an automobile by the Athletic Department (complete with bow at midfield at Memorial Stadium) and the financing for a pontoon boat from his former student workers, the ACC Sportswriters Association, SIDs from around the country and the ACC office.



Clemson's 1948 team won seven games away from home, more than any team in Clemson history. Frank Howard's team finished a perfect 11-0.



Mr. B had some health problems since the end of the last football season. He suffered a heart attack on March 10 and had quadruple by-pass surgery on April 1. He spent 85 days in the hospital and rehab centers, but was coming back strong in July as he prepared for his 44th football season in the Clemson press box. Bradley is known around the United States. During his recovery he received an incredible 550 get-well cards.

LOST & FOUND

At Memorial Stadium, if you can't find it go to the Gate 1 information booth. Hopefully someone else did and it will be there.

MEDICAL FACILITIES

Available during football games under Section J on the South Side, under Section T on the North Side and Section E under South Top Deck of the stadium. There also is one under the North Top Deck.

MEMORIAL STADIUM

Here are some height measurements in Memorial Stadium that were determined by Mark Kistler in a survey he performed for a class in 1991:

Height above the middle of the 50-yard-line to:

Top of the South Upper Deck:	159 Feet
Camera Deck on South Side:	92 Feet
Top of the Hill:	27 Feet
Mounted Rock on the Hill:	26 Feet
Top of West End Zone:	47 Feet
Top of Upper Deck, North Side:	177 Feet

It is also interesting to note that the distance from the Rock to the bottom of the hill, or the path the team takes when it runs down the hill is exactly 100 feet. The middle of the field is a foot higher than the back of the end zone at the bottom of the hill. That explains why Death Valley drains well.

MISS SOUTH CAROLINA

For the fourth time in recent history, a Clemson co-ed or graduate will compete in the Miss America Pageant. This past summer, 1996 Clemson graduate Wendy Willis was named Miss South Carolina and will compete in the Miss America Pageant in September.

Willis has more than a passing interest in athletics. She has sung the National Anthem at Clemson baseball and basketball games, something she will do this year as her busy schedule permits.

In 1985, former Clemson cheerleader Sherry Thrift was Miss South Carolina and runnerup for the Miss America honors. That same year, Clemson basketball cheerleader Kate Kenny was named Miss North Carolina, meaning Clemson had the Carolinas covered that year when it came to beauty.

The highest honor for a Clemson co-ed in this field goes to Shawn Weatherly, who won the Super Bowl of pageants. She won Miss Universe in 1980 after winning Miss America earlier in the year. Weatherly, like the other three ladies listed, had a tie to athletics. She was a member of the Clemson women's fencing team in 1977.

NICKNAME

Clemson's nickname derivation goes back to the turn of the century. In those days many of the players wore long hair due to lack of helmet strength for more head protection. These long manes might have gained Clemson the name lions had it not been for the orange and purple striped jerseys and stockings the players wore. The stripes resembled Tigers.

John Heisman's 1900 team was called the Tigers and Clemson used an insignia of a Tigers head with bared fangs with the motto 'Eat Em Up Clemson. Another theory on the nickname concerns Clemson's first coach. Walter Merritt Riggs came to Clemson to coach the football team in 1896. His previous school was Auburn, which is also known as the Tigers.

NIGHT GAMES

Clemson has not had many home night games over the years. There have been just 18 overall dating back to a September 25, 1948 win over Presbyterian. The Tigers are 12-5-1 at night over the years.

But, for most of the history of Clemson football the school's fan base has reached a circumference of over 300 miles. Realizing this fact, Clemson administrators have attempted to schedule the time of home games to allow fans to make it to the game and back home in the same day.

Clemson did not have a home night game between 1956 and 1991. In 1992 tradition was broken when the Florida State game was televised by ESPN. The novelty of the night game in Death Valley, against a Top 10 opponent, certainly did not hurt attendance. Clemson fans gave a positive response to that night game (even though Clemson lost 24-20). In 1995, Clemson kicked off its centennial celebration of football with a 6:39 PM start for the Georgia game.

This season, Clemson will play host to its first ever Thursday night game, as Georgia Tech will come to Death Valley for an 8:00 PM start that will be shown on ESPN.

ORANGE PANTS

Clemson has won nine of its last 12 games when wearing orange pants...In games Tommy West has been involved in as a Clemson coach, the Tigers are 16-5 in orange pants...Clemson has lost just four games at home in orange pants, all to top 10 ranked teams (South Carolina in 1984, Florida State in 1988, Florida State in 1992 and North Carolina in 1997)...Clemson has defeated a top 20 team when wearing orange pants nine times...each of Clemson's two highest ranked wins in history (Georgia and Nebraska in 1981) have been achieved while wearing orange pants...Clemson won each of its first 10 games in orange pants...Clemson won the national championship in orange pants, 22-15 against Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl...the greatest comeback in Clemson history, a 1992 29-28 win over Virginia after trailing 28-0, was achieved in orange pants...Clemson has clinched the ACC Championship four times in orange pants...Clemson's average margin of victory is +11 points in orange pants...Clemson is 18-2 in orange pants in the month of November.

ORANGE & WHITE

Publication founded by former Clemson Assistant SID Al Adams that is in its 21st season of issue. Al is no longer with the paper, but it is still going strong. To contact the publisher, Phil Batson, call (864) 260-1230. It is now the official publication of IPTAY and replaced the IPTAY report, which dated back to 1952.

OVERTIME

Clemson and Duke played the first conference overtime game in history in 1997. The Tigers won the thriller 29-20, thanks to a David Richardson field goal and a 63-yard interception return for a touchdown by Rahim Abdullah. It is one of the few games in the two-year history of the rule that has been decided by over seven points.

In 1996, there were 49 overtime games in Division I and Division I-AA combined. The average number of overtime periods, or possessions was 1.62 in Division I-A and 1.83 in Division I-AA. Eight of the 49 overtime games lasted three or more periods.

After the 1996 season, in an attempt to cut the number of overtimes, going for two-point conversions after a touchdown became mandatory starting with the second overtime period.

PANTHERS, CAROLINA

Clemson was the home of the Carolina Panthers in their inaugural season, 1995. It was a busy year to say the least, but the benefits to the University will be far reaching. The University realized about \$2 million to be used toward scholarships and other fiscal benefits that will help Clemson students for many years to come.

Clemson Memorial Stadium was busy that fall. The field took a beating as 16 games were on played Frank Howard Field between August 3 and December 17. A total of 975,534 fans attended the 16 games in Death Valley. That breaks down to 427,776 for six Clemson



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home games, 441,625 for eight Panther regular season games and 106,131 for two Panther exhibition games. Clemson averaged 71,296 for its six home games and Carolina averaged 54,776 for its 10 games in the facility.

PAW VISION

In 1997, Clemson added PAWVISION, a \$1 million dollar instant replay video board atop the west end zone scoreboard of Memorial Stadium.

The board provides fans with up-to-the-minute game statistics and scores from around the country.

The video board uses four cameras located in various spots throughout Memorial Stadium and has a workforce of 20 university students and staff.

PENN'S THIN NATURAL LEAF

Type of chewing tobacco Frank Howard chewed in the forties. When they were pouring the concrete for the stadium in 1942 Howard put a plug in each corner of the stadium, giving it his form of an artistic signature.

PHILLIPS, JIM

"Voice of the Tigers" in his 31st year providing commentary on Clemson football. Phillips won the Brian Piccolo Award of broadcasting in 1982 when he gave the play-by-play account of the Western Carolina game only five days after back surgery. He recreated most of that game while standing up with a walker. He is also the voice of Clemson basketball and baseball. His voice is in the minds of nearly all contemporary Clemson fans when they recall a memorable Clemson moment. During his Silver Anniversary season (1992-93) Phillips was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame.

PROPOSAL

There have been many noteworthy events in Death Valley surrounding football games over the past 56 years. Most have involved a football. But, last November 8, a noteworthy event involved a ring.

On this date, Jane Robelot became the first person in the history of the venerable stadium to be extended a marriage proposal in front of 75,000 people. It had everyone's attention because the proposal was made through Clemson's new PAWVISION video scoreboard.

Robelot, the host of **CBS This Morning** and 1982 Clemson graduate, was brought to the center of the field during the pregame to "dot the I in Tigers". At the conclusion of the event, she was asked to face the replay board for a special announcement.

Much to her surprise (and it was amazing that it was kept a secret from this news woman) the message, "Will You Marry Me? — Mario," was over video of Jane standing on the field. As you can see by the photo in this section, she was very surprised.

The element of doubt lasted until she reached the sidelines to accept the proposal from Mario (who also works for CBS) who was waiting with a large smile on his face.

The couple was married in Greenville in January and is expecting their first child the day before Thanksgiving...or just four days after the Clemson vs. South Carolina football game. Jane usually attends that game, but she will have to watch it on a competing network.

PRO PROSPECTS

Clemson had five players drafted into the NFL last year, seventh highest total in the nation. The list featured first-round pick Anthony Simmons, who was the 15th pick of the entire draft.

This year Clemson should also have some draft choices. According to the National Scouting Group, a company that ranks pro prospects, the Tigers have two of the top seniors at their position in the country. The organization ranked Clemson center Jason Gamble and Tiger outside linebacker Adrian Dingle as best in the senior class at those positions.

RIGGS FIELD

Currently the home of Clemson's national championship soccer program (1984 and 1987), but it was the home of Clemson football prior to Memorial Stadium. The field is named after Walter Merritt Riggs, Clemson's first football coach. He coached Clemson in 1896 and 1899. He had an 8-5 record for those two seasons, but ironically, he never coached a game at Clemson. All of his 13 contests as head coach were played on the road.

RINGS

A total of 17 former Clemson players have picked up 24 Super Bowl rings over the years. Jeff Bostic leads the way with three Super Bowl Championship rings. Clemson has had a Super Bowl Champion two years in a row. Trevor Pryce was on the Denver Broncos in 1997 and Wayne Simmons was a starter for the Green Bay Packers in 1996.

Terrence Flagler, Dwight Clark, Bennie Cunningham, Jim Stuckey, and Charlie Waters are the former Tigers with two Super Bowl championship rings. Nine of the last 12 years Clemson has had at least one representative on the Super Bowl Championship team. Clemson has had



at least one representative play in the Super Bowl 12 of the last 13 years, including Jerome Henderson, now a defensive back with the New York Jets, who has played in recent Super Bowls with Buffalo and New England.

ROCK, HOWARD'S

When the Clemson team gathers to Run Down the Hill (see Running Down the Hill) the players rub Howard's Rock because of the mystical powers it is supposed to give Clemson players. The rock is mounted on a pedestal at the top of the hill and was given to Coach Frank Howard by a friend (S.C. Jones' 19) who picked it up in Death Valley, CA. The Rock was first placed on the pedestal at the top of the hill on September 24, 1966, a game Clemson won 40-35 over Virginia. The team started rubbing the rock for the first game of 1967, a 23-6 win over Wake Forest on September 23, 1967.

ROWING

Clemson is adding a 19th sport to its athletic landscape for the 1998-99 academic year. Women's rowing will begin its schedule in the spring of 1999. Clemson has had an outstanding club team in recent years and the sport is a natural in light of the close proximity of Lake Hartwell to the Clemson campus.



The team is coached by Suzzie Lueck, a University of Washington graduate who had many Coach of the Year honors during her tenure at Gonzaga.

RUNNING DOWN THE HILL

One of the most exciting 25 seconds (about 35 seconds when Clemson dresses 120 players for homecoming) in college football from a color and pageantry standpoint. After Clemson's last warmup the team retreats to the home dressing room located under the West Stands. At about 12:50 (for normal 1:00 P.M. game), the team boards two buses and drives around the periphery of the stadium to the east side of the field.

After everyone is properly collected, the cannon sounds, Tiger Rag is played and Clemson charges down the hill (exactly 100 feet top to bottom) and onto the field. It is one of the most celebrated entrances in sport. The Tigers have done it for every game since 1942, except for 1970, 1971 and four games of the 1972 season. In all, the Tigers have run down the hill 261 times heading into 1998.

How in the world did the tradition of running down the hill start? There is no long involved explanation, it used to be the quickest way to get to the field. When the stadium was built in 1942 the football lockerrooms were up the street in Fike Fieldhouse.

When the players were finished getting dressed they used to walk out the front door and walk down the street to "The Hill". Coach Howard continued the tradition when lockerrooms were finally built inside the stadium because Clemson fans used to get so fired up when they gathered at the top of the hill. That's when the buses came into use to spend the trip from the lockerroom to the other side of the stadium. Clemson now has a record of 189-65-7, a 73 percentage winning mark, when they run down the hill. Clemson is 6-9 (40 percent) when it doesn't use the hill as its entrance. Coach Tommy West did not want to change the tradition with stats like that.

SECONDARY

Clemson's secondary has gone from being inexperienced in 1996 to a team strength in 1998. This year's group is ranked among the best in the nation thanks to the presence of returning All-ACC player Antwan Edwards, returning tackle leader DoMarco Fox and rising star Robert Carswell.

Here is how the **Sporting News** ranks the top secondaries in college football heading into 1998: 1. Ohio State, 2. Michigan, 3. Washington, 4. Southern California, 5. **Clemson**, 6. Auburn, 7. Florida State, 8. Nebraska, 9. Kansas State, 10. Michigan State.

SECTION GG

This is the green grass section of the hill, which is located in the East Stands. (See Running Down the Hill.)

SKYBOXES

The prime location to watch a Clemson football game. Memorial Stadium is one of just a handful of on-campus college stadiums to have private executive suites. Clemson has more executive suites than any other on-campus stadium in America (108 total, with 74 available for sale to individuals and corporations) and the average cost, including an average of 22 tickets, is \$18,000 a year.

The suite is completely furnished with 22 theater seats, has a stereo system, kitchenette, closed circuit TV, maid service, meals, program and is completely temperature controlled. Fans have their choice of piping in crowd noise, the PA system or the Clemson radio network.

TIE BREAKER

Teams that have played 60 minutes without determining a winner will flip a coin after regulation and alternate possessions from the 25-yard-line at the same end of the field. The team that is ahead after an equal number of possessions from 25 yards out wins. If a team doesn't score in four downs, it can retain possession by getting a first down.

A defensive player can win the game by returning a fumble, interception or blocked kick the length of the field to the other end zone. But, if the player is tackled inside the 25-yard-line, the ball reverts to the 25, where his team's offense starts its possession.

Clemson has had 45 ties in its 102-year history, with the last taking place in 1991, a 20-20 deadlock with Virginia.

TIGERAMA

World's largest pep rally, this is one of the best examples of Clemson spirit. The Friday night before Homecoming about 35,000 people come to Memorial Stadium for a combination pep rally, beauty pageant, fireworks display and skit presentation. It was the brainchild of former Clemson legend Gator Farr, who was the master of pep rallies in the 1940s and 1950s. This is not to be confused with Barnyard Burn, which is something special for South Carolina home games. It involves a bon-fire that torches a chicken coop. It is held the Friday night prior to the South Carolina game and takes place in the parking lot outside the stadium.

WEATHER

Every one of our major audiences for this press guide (fans, the media, recruits, coaches and administrators) has interest in the weather. We get a lot of calls from people making their first trip to Clemson for a football game and they want to be prepared. Well, if you are playing the percentages, prepare for a sunny day, about 70 degrees.

Over the last 20 years the average temperature for a Clemson home game has been 68 degrees. Of the 122 home games played during this time, the weather has been predominantly sunny 78 times. It has rained just 11 of the last 122 games at Death Valley, over the last 20 years.

The 1992 season was probably the worst weather year at Clemson in some time as it was predominantly cloudy for five of the six games and the average temperature was just 62.83 degrees, the coolest since 1981 (62.67).

It has not snowed for a Clemson game since 1936 when the Tigers played Furman. That is also the last time Furman beat Clemson. The most unusual weather for a Clemson game took place at the Georgia game in 1962. The temperature dropped 30 degrees between the beginning of the game and halftime and during intermission a hailstorm sent fans to cover. The second half was delayed 30 minutes to get the ice off the field.

WILL CALL

Located at Gate 13 at Clemson Memorial Stadium, Tim Bourret usually drops the passes off by 10:00 A.M. for a 1:00 P.M. game.

WILLIAMS, RONALD

Ronald Williams had perhaps the most auspicious start to a football career in Clemson history. He gained over 900 yards as a first-year freshman in 1990 and became the only running back in Clemson history to make first-team All-ACC as a first-year freshman.

The native of Ninety-Six Mile, SC had 585 yards in the first five games of 1991, bringing him into the top 20 in Clemson history in rushing in just 14 games. In fact, he reached 1000 yards faster than any other back in Clemson history.

But, during pregame warmups for the October 26 NC State game, Williams tore his ACL. He played just a couple of snaps the rest of the season and was a shadow of himself in 1992. Despite the injury, he went pro after the 1992 season.

A couple of tryouts with the Cincinnati Bengals failed, but he has resurfaced with a vengeance in the CFL. Last year, Williams was third in the league in rushing with 1,120 yards and scored a league best 16 touchdowns while playing for the Winnipeg Bluebombers.

Tommy West's Clemson resume as a head coach includes four bowl appearances, a top 25 ranking in every season, 12 road wins and four wins over AP Top 25 teams. The 1998 Peach Bowl was Clemson's third straight year in a bowl game, something only 16 other programs can claim. This is the first time since the 1985-91 era, that Clemson has been to a bowl game three straight years and he is just the second Clemson coach in history to take the Tigers to three consecutive bowl games.

Each of his first four seasons has seen the Tigers make a late season run. In 1994, with the youngest offense in Clemson history, one that started seven freshmen at times, the Tigers won three of their last four games, including a victory at 12th ranked North Carolina.

The run of success at the end of the 1995 season had the Tigers in the top 25 of every poll. Clemson won its last five regu-

lar season games, including four wins by at least 17 points. West's Tigers were picked fifth in the ACC preseason poll that year, but, thanks to the third best offense in Clemson history and a defense that ranked 10th in the nation in scoring, Clemson finished third in the ACC standings with a 6-2 record, its best league finish since the Tigers won the ACC title in 1991.

The 1995 campaign was one in which Clemson excelled in every area. The Tigers ranked fourth in the country in rushing, yet also led the ACC in yards per pass attempt. Defensively, Clemson rated in the top 20 in the nation in rushing defense, passing efficiency defense and turnover margin. In terms of special teams, Clemson was the only school in the nation to have an individual ranked in the top 25 in punting, placekicking, punt returns and kickoff returns.

The 1996 season saw Clemson win five of its last six regular season games, includ-

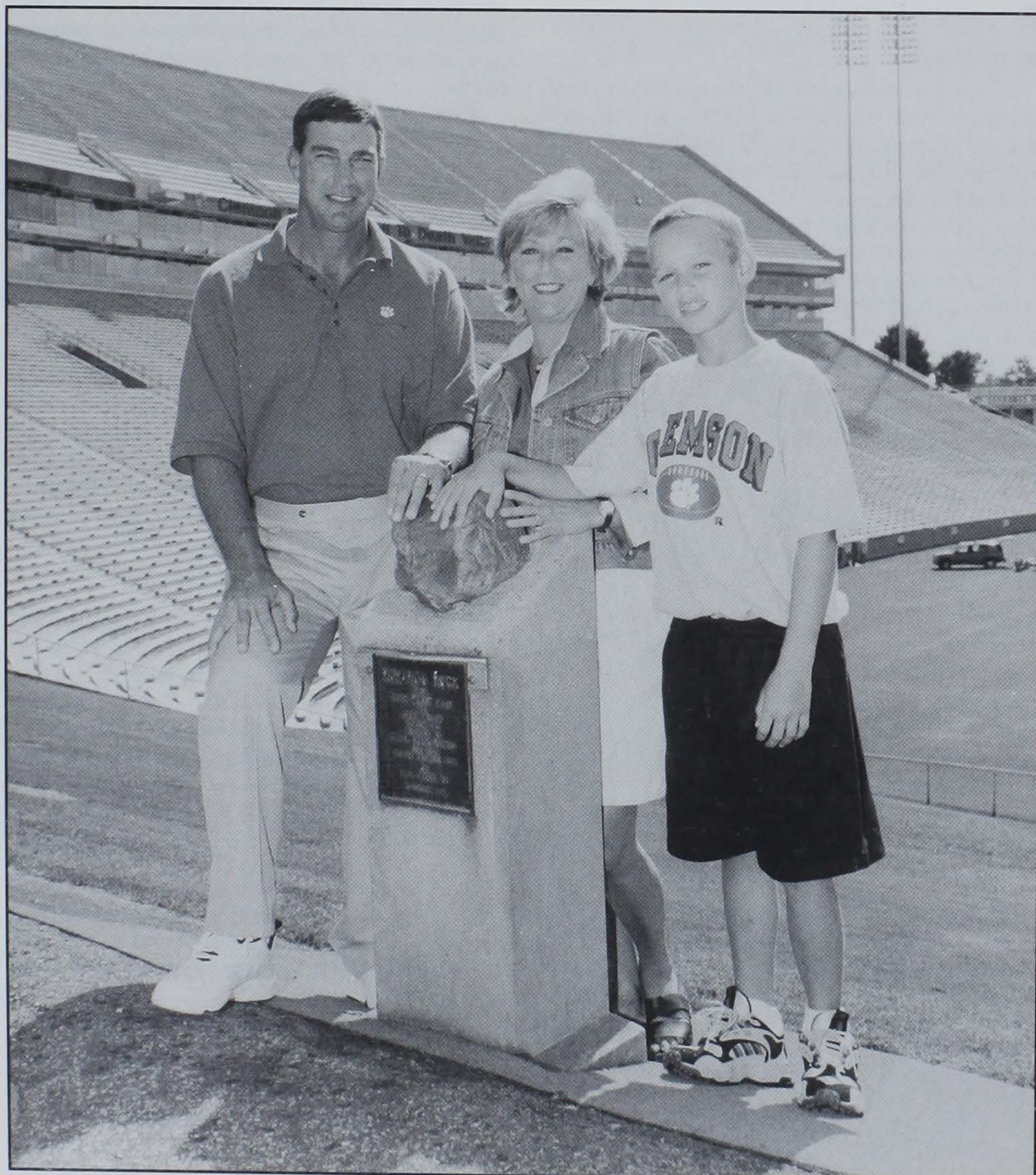
ing a victory at 15th ranked Virginia, just the third road win over a ranked team in the decade of the 1990s for the Tigers. For the second straight year Clemson won the ACC rushing title and reached a top 25 ranking. Again, Clemson won 75 percent of its ACC games, this time finishing tied for second in the league standings with North Carolina. The Tigers were extended a bid to the Peach Bowl to face LSU.

Last season the Tigers won four of their last five regular season games, including a 47-21 victory over South Carolina in the season finale that clinched a bowl bid. It was the most points scored by Clemson against South Carolina since 1900.

The season featured a record setting passing attack, led by Nealon Greene, who set season records for pass completions, passing yards and completion percentage. The defense followed suit, led by first-team AP All-American Anthony Simmons, who led the conference in tackles and tackles for loss. Clemson's defense ranked in the top 20 in the nation in rushing defense, total defense and scoring defense and ranked third in the ACC in pass defense.

Clemson's improvement on the field is matched with its improvement in the classroom during the West era. In 1996-97, 20 Clemson football players made the ACC academic honor roll, the highest on record. In fact, each of the three highest totals in that area in Clemson history have taken place under West and the team's cumulative GPA entering 1998 is a 20-year high.

West took over the head coaching position on November 29, 1993. Less than a month later he already had a bowl victory on his ledger, a 14-13 triumph over Kentucky in the Peach Bowl, Clemson's sixth bowl win in an eight-year period. With his debut in the Peach Bowl, West became the sixth coach in NCAA history to make his

debut with a program in a bowl game. However, he was just the second coach in history to make his debut in a bowl game without previously coaching his new team as an assistant coach earlier in the season.

West was a mainstay of a Clemson coaching staff that led the Tigers to a 69-20-4 record and six Associated Press Top 20 finishes between 1982-89. During

West's first tour of duty with the Tigers as an outside linebacker coach, Clemson played in five bowl games (winning four) and claimed four ACC Championships, including three in a row from 1986-88.

Clemson had a 44-10-1 record against ACC competition during his era on the Tiger staff, an 81 percent winning mark. Additionally, five of those Clemson teams

ranked in the top 15 in the nation in rushing defense and scoring defense, and three ranked in the top 12 in the nation in total defense.

Clemson's 1989 defense ranked fifth in the nation in total defense, rushing defense and scoring defense and West's outside linebackers had a lot to do with that success. His top four outside linebackers that year all played in the NFL in 1994. The list of former West players in the NFL includes Levon Kirkland and Wayne Simmons, both of whom have played in the Super Bowl in recent years.

West began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Tennessee (his alma mater) in 1977. He coached one year of high school football at White County High in Sparta, TN in 1978, then became an assistant at Mississippi in 1979. For the 1980 and 1981 seasons he served as an assistant coach at Appalachian State.

After his career at Clemson (1982-89), West became the running backs coach at Tennessee. During that 1990 season Tennessee won the Southeastern Conference and captured the Sugar Bowl with a win over Virginia. The Volunteers scored a school record 442 points that year and averaged over 410 yards a game in total offense, 205.7 rushing and 205.4 passing. He served as Co-Defensive Coordinator at South Carolina in 1991 and 1992.

In 1993 West took over a UT-Chattanooga team that had won just two games in 1992. He doubled that total in 1993 and

West and Clemson Agree on Four-Year Contract

PACT RUNS THROUGH 2001 AND INCLUDES SALARY INCREASE

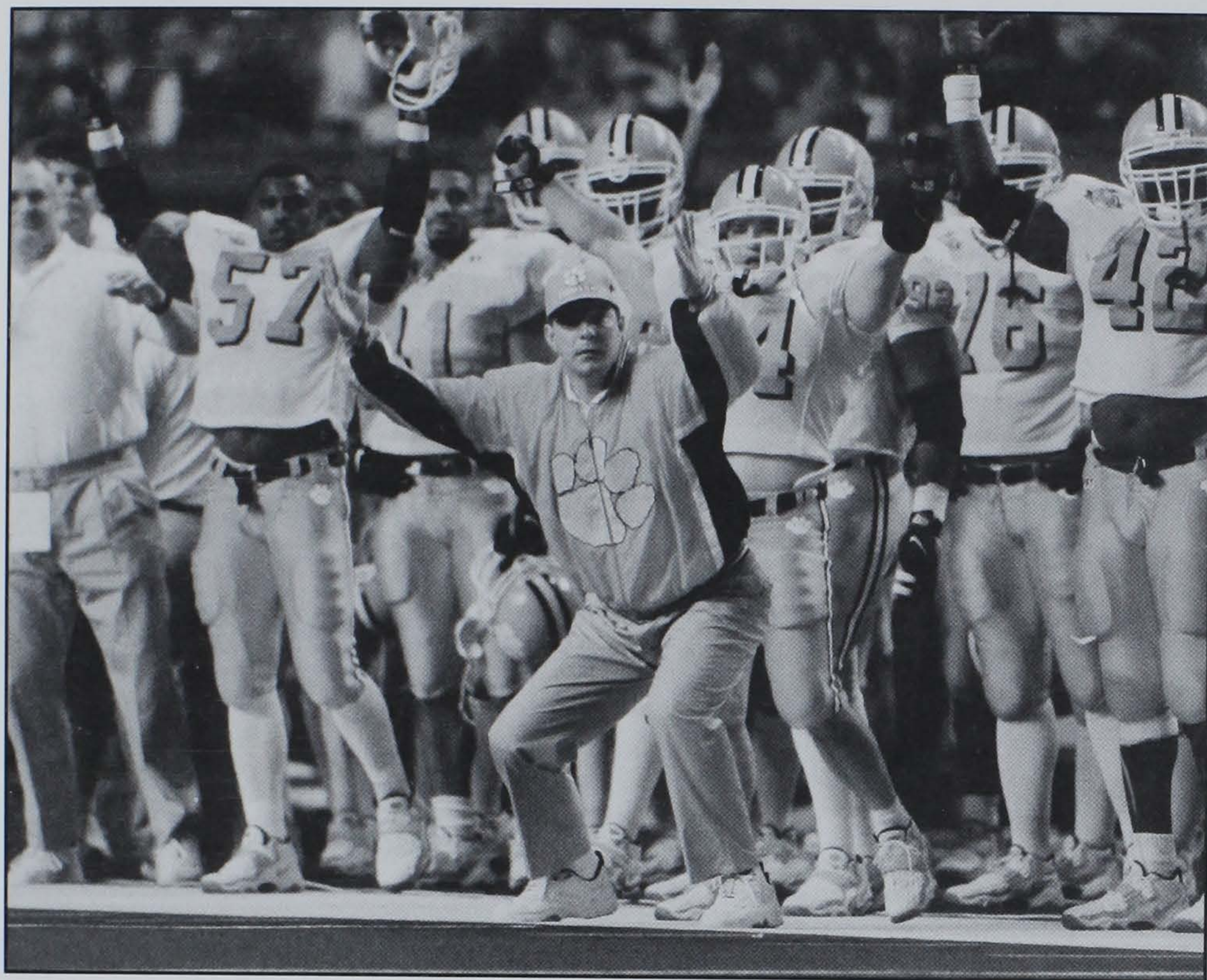
Clemson Athletic Director Bobby Robinson announced July 14, 1998 that Head Coach Tommy West was given a new four-year contract. The agreement, which runs through the 2001 season, also included a \$5,000 base salary increase.

West has taken Clemson to bowl games each of the last three years, something only 16 other programs at the Division I level have accomplished. This past year he became just the second coach in school history to lead the Tigers to a third consecutive bowl game. Clemson has four wins over top 25 teams and has shown an ability to win on the road. The Tigers have won 10 of their last 13 ACC games away from home, and three top 25 victories.

The program has reached new heights in all phases of the game. Last year's team set nine school records for passing offense, while the defense ranked sixth in the nation in rushing defense and 16th in total defense. The 1995 Clemson team ranked fourth in the nation in rushing.

Individually, players have made significant progress in West's program. Last year's senior class combined to established over 60 Clemson records on a game, season, and career basis. The Tigers have had 29 All-ACC selections and in his four years as coach and four players have earned All-American honors, including Anthony Simmons, the second three-time All-American in Clemson history.

Academically, the program has seen 62 players chosen to the ACC Academic honor roll, more than double any previous four-year period in Clemson history. The cumulative GPA of the current team is the highest on record.

guided the Mocs to one of the landmark wins in school history, a 33-31 win over #1 ranked Marshall. He concluded the regular season with a 45-42 victory over Furman. Ironically, his first regular season game as Clemson coach was a victory over Furman.

West earned three letters in his four-year career at Tennessee (1972-75). The Vols played in three bowl games and were ranked in a final Top 20 in three seasons. He was the co-captain of Tennessee's 1975 football team and played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game that same year.

He began his college career as a running back, but saw most of his playing time as a tight end. He caught 37 passes for 575 yards in his career with the Vols, including 16 passes for 233 yards as a senior. As a junior he caught an 81-yard pass from Condredge Holloway, still the longest non-scoring play in Tennessee history. He earned a bachelor's degree from Tennessee in 1976 and was drafted by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers that same year.

West played two years (1974-75) of baseball at Tennessee and had a career batting average of .305. He hit .367 in 1975 and was named All-SEC Eastern Division.

West was a multi-sport standout in high school. He was an outfielder in baseball, a guard in basketball and a running back in football. In 1972 he was named a High School All-American in football and was a second-round draft choice in baseball by the Chicago Cubs. Willie Randolph, who went on to an All-Star career with the New York Yankees, was one of 77 future Major League players drafted after West in the regular phase of the June 1972 draft. He played his prep football at Gainesville High in Gainesville, GA for Coach Bobby Gruhn. He was an all-state back as a junior and was also named to the All-Southern team.

Born Thomas Cleveland West on July 31, 1954, he is married to the former Lindsay Watkins of Forest City, NC. The couple has one son, Turner.

Coaches Who Made Their Debut in Bowl Games

What are the selling points of the Clemson program?

"The Clemson people are the number-one selling point of our program. That includes everyone from the school president to athletic director Bobby Robinson through our supporters and the student body.

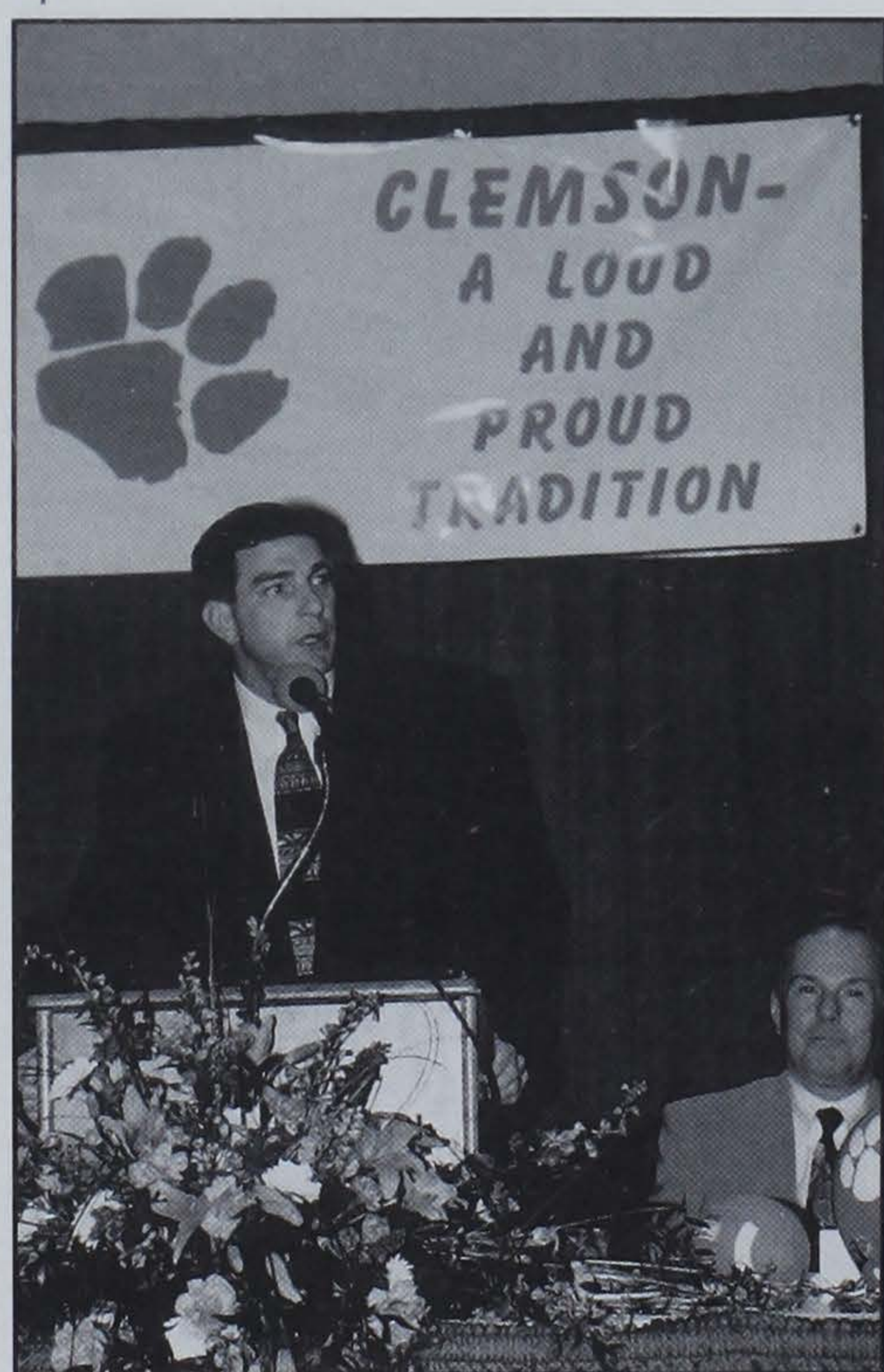
"Bobby Robinson certainly gives us the opportunity to be a first-class organization. Financially, we have the money to do what is necessary for our student-athletes to be successful in every phase athletically and academically.

"We have a great winning tradition and we have great traditions at Clemson. We have won a national championship, have more league championships and top 25 seasons than any program in our league. We also have the great traditions of running down the hill, Howard's Rock, Tigerama etc. Gameday at Clemson typifies the color and pageantry of college football."

What are your views on players leaving early for the NFL?

"I think it has taken away from the quality of play, but you really can't blame either side. I don't think you can blame the NFL and you can't blame the player. The economics of the situation are just too great.

"Some people complain about players leaving college. But, if your son was a mechanical engineering major and he was offered \$500,000 to work for a firm after his junior year I think it would be hard to pass up."



Comment on your new contract with Clemson University.

"I am excited about the commitment and confidence the administration has shown in our program. This four-year contract is a reflection of the hard work and accomplishment of our staff over the last four years.

"I love Clemson and I love coaching here. This is where I want to be, it is where I have always wanted to coach.

"Our goal remains to move the Clemson program to the top of the ACC."

What are the long term goals of this program?

"We would like to be a program that plays on New Year's Day consistently. We don't want to be a real good team one out of five years, we want to be considered a team that will be playing on New Year's Day every year. The key to doing that is playing consistently throughout the season."

What coaches had a big influence on you in your youth?

"I've learned from every coach I've played and worked for. I probably had the greatest Little League baseball coach ever in a guy named Ted Ivey. I was blessed to have grown up in Gainesville, GA, it was a great community where we had good coaches. There was a lot of emphasis on sports in Gainesville, but they had things in perspective. I also had a lot of respect for Coach Bobby Grohn (high school football coach). He has been a big influence on me."

Did it take you a long time to decide to come back to Clemson?

"Not at all! Clemson is certainly a special place to me. Lindsay and I started our married life here, our first eight years together were spent in Clemson. There couldn't be a better place for me. There was no decision involved. When you work at a place for eight years and you really enjoy the people and the environment, it makes an impression on you. There is just something special about Clemson."

When did you first think about being a coach?

"The first time I thought about going into coaching was when I was being recruited. No one really asked me about what I wanted to do after I finished playing until the recruiting process. When you are in high school you think you will play forever. I love the competition, I love the college atmosphere. I can't see myself in any other field right now."

Does your experience as a Division I player at Tennessee help you coach Division I players today?

"I don't think you have to play at a major college to be a good coach. Having played at a major college allowed me to associate with outstanding coaches, but my personal opinion is that there are more outstanding high school coaches than there are college coaches. We spend a lot of time with high school coaches in the recruiting process and we run into some outstanding people. I have a lot of respect for high school coaches, especially the ones in this area."

Would you be in favor of a college football playoff?

"I'm not totally against a playoff, but I love the bowl games and the bowl system. There are some problems with the bowl structure right now. I don't think we should have 15 games in three days or six games going on at the same time.

"The big question is what is best for college football. Is a playoff best for college football, or is it best for the top four or five programs? I am not for an eight-team playoff at the end of the year and everyone else stay home.

"I like the bowl structure, even though there are some controversies at the end of the year. Basketball is different because they can play four times in 11 days. But, at the end of the year, there is just one winner."

Who are some athletes you admire?

"The guy I have a lot of respect for is Nolan Ryan. He stood the test of time. I admire people who can be successful for more than one or two years. Jack Nicklaus was 46 when he won the Masters, Arnold Palmer was competitive for 30 years and Muhammed Ali was a great champion for many years.

"The thing about Nolan Ryan was his work ethic. He thought about baseball 365 days a year, he had to pitch that long at that level."

Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Line

Les Herrin is the dean of football coaches at Clemson. The assistant head coach is in his 14th season with the Tigers. In addition to his administrative duties as assistant head coach, he is the Clemson defensive line coach. Herrin has been a defensive coach at Clemson for all but one of his seasons and has coached such notable players as Chester McGlockton, Brentson Buckner, Jeff Davis and Trevor Pryce.

The 50-year old native of Waycross, GA, has coached under three different head coaches (Danny Ford, Ken Hatfield, Tommy West) at Clemson, one of just three assistants in Clemson history to do that. He is the only member of the current staff who was on Clemson's 1981 National Championship coaching staff.

Herrin's leadership ability was evident at a young age when he was named captain of the football team in his playing days at Western Carolina. Herrin was also the team MVP as a senior and Defensive MVP as a junior. Herrin earned his B.A. degree in Education from Western Carolina in 1971 and his Master's degree in Health and Physical Education the following year.

After serving as defensive coordinator at Appalachian State in 1980, Herrin joined the Tiger staff in 1981. In the national championship season (1981), he coached inside linebackers. One of those linebackers, Jeff Davis, was the ACC MVP that year and went on to be captain of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Davis was honored in 1995 by his induction into the Clemson Ring of Honor. Herrin also coached 1989 All-Pro linebacker Johnny Rembert of



the New England Patriots in his first tour of duty at Clemson. In his first two seasons at Clemson, the defense ranked in the top 10 in the nation in rushing and scoring defense.

After brief stints at East Carolina and North Carolina, Herrin returned to Tigertown as defensive line coach where he continued to produce nationally renowned defenses. In 1989, Clemson ranked fifth in the nation in rushing, scoring, and total defense. In 1990, the Tiger defense led the nation in total defense and was second in rushing and scoring defense.

In 1991 Clemson won the ACC championship and Herrin's talented group had a lot to do with that. The players he coached on an everyday basis included Chester McGlockton, current three-time All-Pro with the Oakland Raiders. Brentson Buckner, 1993 All-ACC tackle who played with the Pittsburgh Steelers in the Super Bowl in 1996, and first-team All-American Rob Bodine, who led the nation in tackles for loss, were all members of that team.

In 1996, Herrin's defensive line produced 20 sacks and the number 28 pick in the 1997 NFL draft, defensive end Trevor Pryce by the Denver Broncos. Pryce won a Super Bowl Championship ring in his rookie season.

Through the 13 years he has been at Clemson, the Tigers have won four ACC titles, played in eight bowl games, had six top 20 seasons and seven seasons of at least eight wins.

Clemson's defense has been a strength since Herrin has been on the staff. Every year he has been at Clemson the Tigers have had at least one All-ACC player, including last year when Lorenzo Bromell and Raymond White were named.

Clemson ranked sixth in the nation in rushing defense and 16th in total defense in 1997. Clemson has ranked in the top-15 in rushing defense eight times in his 13 years as a Clemson defensive coach.

Herrin and his wife Shirley have a son, Deke, who is currently a student at Clemson.

Steve Ensminger

Assistant Coach • Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

Clemson had a record setting passing attack in Steve Ensminger's first year as offensive coordinator. Clemson established 15 school single season records in the passing game on a team and individual basis; included in the marks were school bests for passing yardage, completion percentage, and completions.

Nealon Greene established 30 individual marks for passing and total offense for a game, season, and career. Greene ranked 19th in the nation in passing efficiency, highest ranking by a Clemson player in 14 years.

Ensminger came to Clemson after a three-year stint at Texas A&M and is now in his 11th year as an offensive coordinator.

While at Texas A&M, his Aggie offense averaged 404 yards per game in 1996 and it featured a balanced attack of 230 yards rushing and 174 passing. The Aggies averaged 29 points per game for a 12-game schedule that included games against five ranked teams (BYU, Colorado, Kansas State, Texas Tech, and Texas). The Aggies threw for over 2000 yards and had over 2700 yards rushing that season. Additionally, the Texas A&M offense had four rushers with over 600 yards and a receiver with 57 receptions for 872 yards.

Ensminger is a native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, home of another group of Tigers, Louisiana State University. Ensminger played for LSU from 1976-79 and lettered at quarterback all four years. He was the MVP of the LSU team in 1979 and still holds two LSU



passing records: most touchdowns in a game (4) and longest touchdown pass play (82 yards).

He also participated in the 1977 Tangerine Bowl, 1978 Liberty Bowl, and 1979 Tangerine Bowl with LSU. When he finished his career, he ranked second in LSU history in passing yardage, just behind Bert Jones and ahead of Y.A. Tittle.

Ensminger then moved on to play in the Canadian Football League with the Hamilton TigerCats in 1980. He played one year in the CFL before moving on into coaching.

The 39-year-old has coached at Nicholls State (Wide Receivers, 1981-83), McNeese State (Quarterbacks/Wide Receivers, 1984-87), Louisiana Tech (Offensive Coordinator, 1988-90), Georgia (passing game Coordinator/Quarterbacks, 1991-93), and Texas A&M (Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks, 1994-96).

Ensminger was a significant reason Georgia quarterback Eric Zeier set 61 school and

11 SEC passing records between 1991-93. Georgia ranked ninth in the nation in total offense in 1992 with a 450.4 yards per game average. The team was 10th in the country in scoring with 32 points per game.

Georgia went to the 1991 Independence Bowl and the 1992 Citrus Bowl with Ensminger in charge of the passing game.

Ensminger is married to the former Amy Marie Gonzales and they have three children: Krystalin (13), Steve (11), and Brittany Rose (7).

Reggie Herring

Assistant Coach • Defensive Coordinator/Inside Linebackers

Reggie Herring enters the 1998 season, his fifth at Clemson, as the inside linebackers coach and is in his second year performing the duties of defensive coordinator. He was the defensive coordinator at Texas Christian in 1992 and 1993. So this is his fourth year as a division I coordinator.

In his first year as Clemson defensive coordinator the Tigers ranked 16th in the nation in total defense, sixth in rushing defense and 18th in scoring defense. Herring coached Clemson three-time All-American Anthony Simmons each of the last three seasons.

Herring graduated from Florida State with a B.S. in criminology in 1981. He was a three-year starter for the Seminoles at linebacker, the position he has played or coached for the last 21 years. Florida State posted a 38-6 record in his four years and made three bowl trips, two to Miami for the Orange Bowl and once to Orlando for the Tangerine Bowl.

In the 1980 season he was voted an AP All-American. He was also inducted into the Florida State Hall of Fame in 1989. He combined with current Clemson wide receivers coach Rick Stockstill to lead the Seminoles to the 1981 Orange Bowl, a narrow defeat against Oklahoma. Herring also was a team leader, as he served as the team captain in 1980. He played on three Florida State teams that finished the season with a top 15 AP ranking, including a number-six finish in 1979 and number-five finish in 1980. Those were the first two top 10 finishes in the Bobby Bowden era at FSU.



Herring started his coaching career in 1981 as a linebackers coach at Oklahoma State. He became a full time coach his first year out of college. He served as a Cowboy coach for five years. The program went to the 1981 Independence Bowl, the 1983 Bluebonnet Bowl and the 1984 and 1985 Gator Bowls.

For six years starting in 1986, he was a linebacker coach at Auburn where he worked under Pat Dye. The Tigers went to the 1987 Citrus, the 1988 Sugar, the 1989 Sugar, the 1989 Hall of Fame and the 1990 Peach Bowls during his career with Auburn.

In 1992, he was named defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Texas Christian, where he served for two seasons. Herring seized the opportunity to come to Clemson in December of 1993 when he was named the inside linebackers coach.

Overall, Herring has been a part of 16 bowl teams in his career, three as a player and 13 as a coach, including four bowl games for the Tigers, the 1993 Peach, the 1996 Gator, the

1996 and 1998 Peach. In his first full season at Clemson, 1994, he coached Tim Jones and Mike Barber. Jones was a first-team All-ACC pick and Barber made the Seattle Seahawks roster.

In 1995, Herring coached a successful crop of inside linebackers led by third-team AP All-American and UPI National Freshman of the year Anthony Simmons. Herring's other inside linebacker, Andye McCrorey, was no slouch either as he was finished fourth on the team in tackles with 83 tackles and was named first-team CFA Academic All-American.

In 1996, Herring's pack of inside linebackers led the team in tackles with **The Sporting News'** first team All-American Anthony Simmons ranking first with a record of 178 and Mond Wilson second with 130.

Herring is married to the former Lisa Ward of Griffin, Georgia. The couple has one daughter, Caroline, and one son, Adam.

David Bibee

Assistant Coach • Defensive Backs

David Bibee enters his 19th year of coaching college football, and his second at Clemson. He has 11 years experience as an assistant head coach.

Bibee is in his second year at Clemson, and is coaching his second different position. Last year he coached the outside linebackers, a group that helped Clemson rank sixth in the nation in rushing defense and 16th in total defense.

This year Bibee takes over the secondary, perhaps the most talented area on the Clemson team. Clemson's secondary is ranked sixth best in the nation by one publication and includes preseason All-American Antwan Edwards.

Bibee played football at Tennessee and was a member of the 1973 Gator Bowl and 1974 Liberty Bowl teams. During two of his playing seasons he was a teammate of Tiger Head Coach Tommy West. He earned a B.S. in Health Education from Tennessee in 1977.

He began his coaching career with the Volunteers as a graduate assistant coach in 1976. He then spent the 1977 season at his prep alma mater, Bristol's Tennessee High School, before moving on to Mississippi for one campaign as co-head coach of the junior varsity squad in 1978.

Bibee then moved east and spent time as the secondary coach and recruiting coordinator for North Alabama in 1979. Then Bibee moved on to two Ohio Valley Conference schools. He was the secondary coach and



recruiting coordinator for Middle Tennessee State in 1980 and served in the same capacities for Austin Peay in 1981 and 1982.

Then it was onto the Southern Conference and Appalachian State. Bibee served as assistant head coach, secondary coach, and recruiting coordinator at Appalachian State from 1983 through 1988. During his stint at Appalachian State, the Mountaineers won two Southern Conference Championships, twice led the nation in turnover margin, and annually ranked among the nation's best in scoring defense.

Bibee headed to Columbia and the SEC as he began a five-year stint at South Carolina. Bibee served as assistant head coach and secondary coach for the Gamecocks from 1989 through 1993.

While at South Carolina, Bibee coached Ernest Dixon, the 1992 and 1993 George Terry Best Attitude Award winner and currently a member of the New Orleans Saints.

He also coached Gerald Dixon, a former Cleveland Brown and current member of the Cincinnati Bengals.

After coaching at South Carolina, Bibee spent two years in private business. He then made his way back into the Ohio Valley Conference in 1996, as he became the defensive secondary coach and recruiting coordinator for the Golden Eagles of Tennessee Tech.

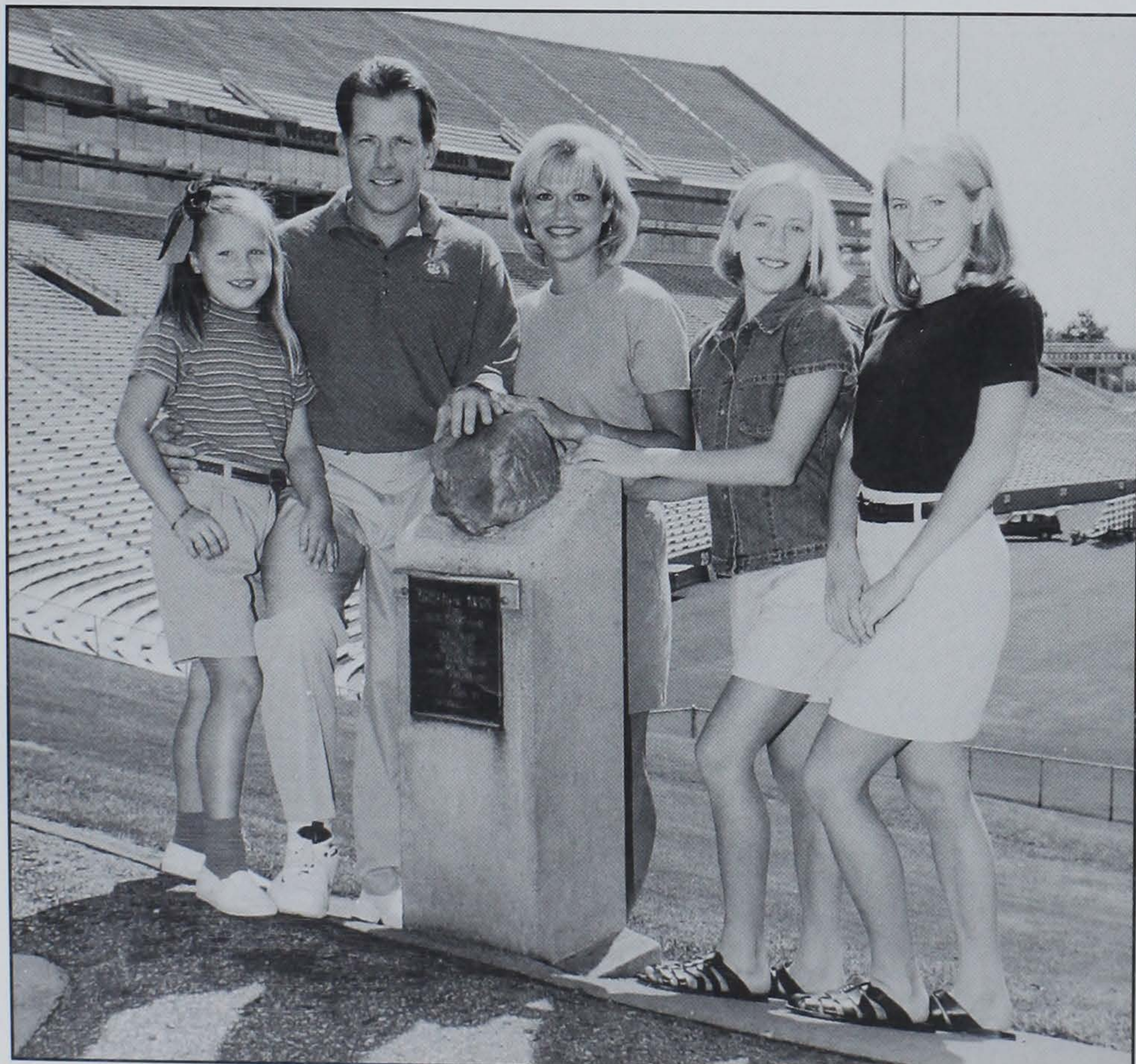

Richard Bisaccia

Assistant Coach • Running Backs/Special Teams

Clemson has been on a record pace in terms of rushing offense since Rich Bisaccia came to Clemson in December of 1993. Each of the last three years Clemson has finished first or second in the ACC in rushing, including a number-four national finish in 1995 when Clemson averaged 260 yards per game.

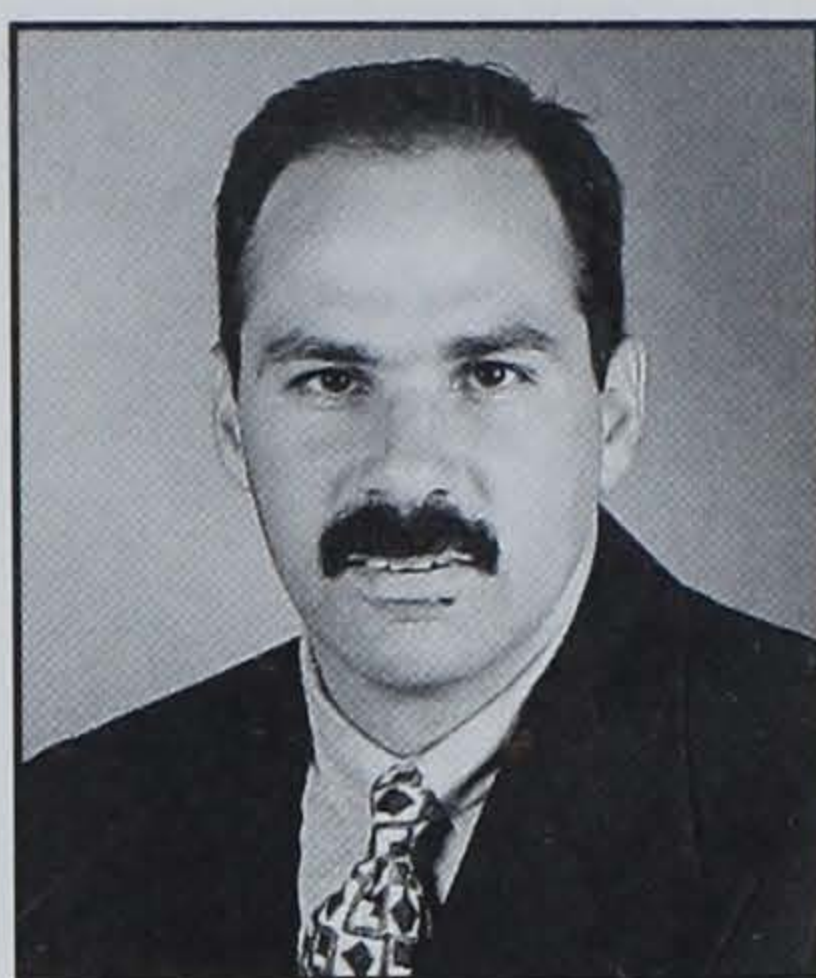
Under Bisaccia, tailback Raymond Priester set the Clemson All-time records for single game rushing yards, 263, rushing yards in a season, 1,345, and most rushing yards in a career with 3,966. He was the ACC rushing champion in 1995. In all, Priester established 18 Clemson rushing records during his career under Bisaccia.

In 1995, Priester and fullback Emory Smith combined for 2,034 yards, most ever by a starting Clemson backfield.

Bisaccia wears many hats at Clemson as he also handles the special teams and serves as the recruiting coordinator. His special teams unit was the only one in the nation to have an individual rank in the top 25 in field goals, punting, punt returns, and kickoff returns in 1995.

A year ago Clemson ranked 15th in the nation in kickoff returns and 39th in punt returns. The Tigers had three blocked punts in the Peach Bowl to set a school record. Clemson also led the ACC in field goals (20-27) in 1997.

Bisaccia graduated from New Fairfield High School in New Fairfield, CT. He earned his degree in health and physical education from Yankton College in 1983. While at Yankton



College, Bisaccia was a four-year starter and the team captain from 1979-82. The Philadelphia Stars of the USFL signed him as a free agent in 1983.

Bisaccia's first coaching job was as the offensive coordinator at Wayne State (NE) in 1983. After five years at Wayne State, he moved to South Carolina for a six-year career. In 1989, Bisaccia became the volunteer assistant coach for defensive ends at South Carolina. In 1991, he was named the tight ends coach, then was promoted to running backs coach and special teams coach at South Carolina in 1992. He held that role for the 1992 and 1993 seasons. Clemson came calling in December of 1993 and named Bisaccia as its running backs coach, and in charge of special teams and the recruiting process.

In his young coaching career, Bisaccia has coached in five bowl games, four with Clemson. In 1988, he helped the Gamecocks to the Liberty Bowl. In his debut as a Tiger assistant,

he coached in the 1993 Peach Bowl victory over Kentucky. One of his players, Emory Smith, caught a 57-yard pass reception to set up the game winning touchdown in the final minute and was named MVP. Bisaccia also coached in the 1996 Gator Bowl, the 1996 Peach Bowl against LSU, and the 1998 Peach Bowl versus Auburn.

Bisaccia is an outstanding teacher, especially when it comes to holding on to the football. Clemson has just 13 lost fumbles by running backs in four seasons, including a national low and NCAA record of two lost fumbles in 1994.

The 38-year old native of Yonkers, NY, is married to the former Jeanne Jons of Sioux City, Iowa. Bisaccia holds the distinction of having the most children among the Clemson coaches. The couple has three daughters: Michele (14), Elizabeth (9), and Madeline (5); and one son: Richard Oakley (4).

Andrea "Brick" Haley takes over the outside linebacker coaching duties in 1998. Haley, will be coaching preseason All-American Rahim Abdullah, who adds star potential to a promising Tiger defense.

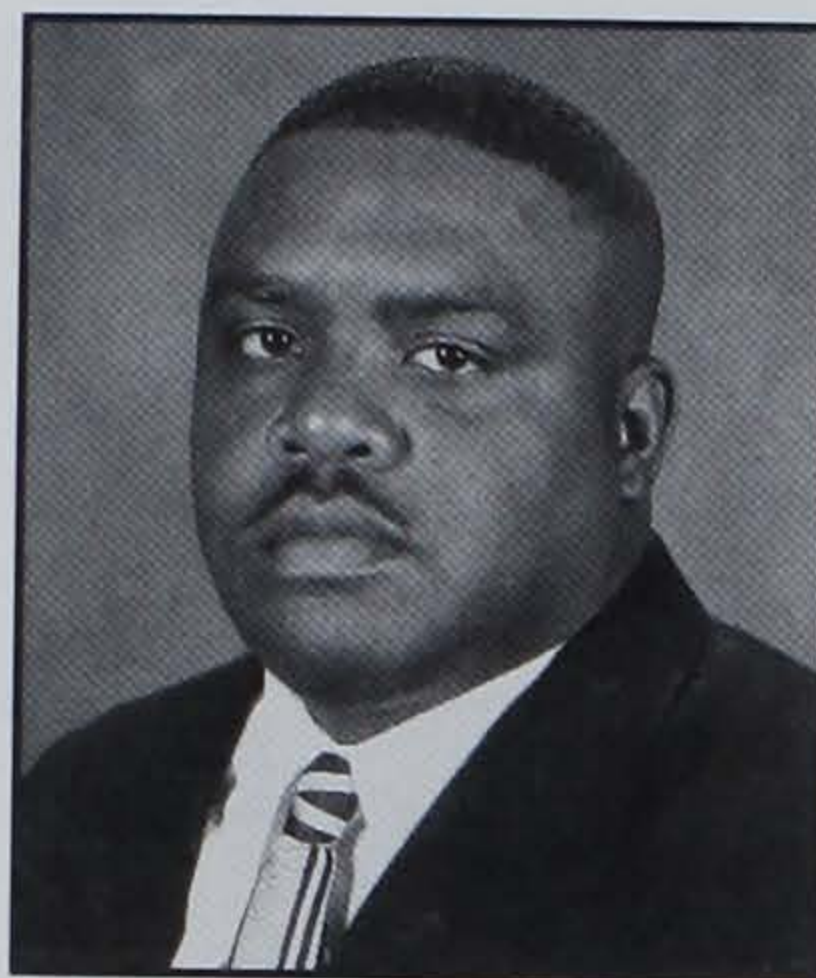
Haley takes over perhaps the most famous position in contemporary Clemson football history. The Tigers have had many outside linebackers move on to the NFL in the decade of the 1990s, including Levon Kirkland, the All-Pro with the Pittsburgh Steelers and Wayne Simmons, a starter for the Green Bay Packers 1996 Super Bowl Champions.

Tommy West has chosen a coach who knows all about sending players to the NFL. In the last six years Haley has coached or recruited six players who have gone on to the NFL.

The list of players Haley has coached include Jeff Gooch, a starter with the Tampa Bay Bucs in 1997, and Pratt Lyons, a starter with the Nashville Oilers. Haley coached Gooch at Austin Peay and coached Lyons during his tenure at Troy State.

Reggie Lowe, who signed with the Seattle Seahawks out of Troy State, and Donnell Gilyard, who played with the New York Giants are two more Haley proteges. Michael Swift of the Carolina Panthers, and Kurt Pointer of the Pittsburgh Steelers were both recruited to Austin Peay by Haley.

"We are very fortunate to have Brick Haley join our staff," said Tommy West. "He has



considerable experience in coaching linebackers. He played the game at linebacker and certainly relates well to his players, we saw that in the spring. He has obviously had positive impact on the players he has coached at his previous schools and we know he will do the same at Clemson."

Haley graduated from Emma Sanson High School in Gadsden, AL and attended Alabama A&M. He graduated from A&M in 1989 after playing for the Bulldogs for four seasons. There he was a Division II All-America inside linebacker in 1987 and 1988. The 1987 team had an 8-3 season. In his senior season, he was the team captain, MVP, and Player-of-the-Year. Haley earned a bachelor of science in health and physical education and also minored in telecommunications.

His coaching career began in 1989 when he was a student assistant coach at Alabama A&M where he coached inside and outside

linebackers. The next year, he coached tight ends and coordinated the punt and punt return teams at Enterprise High School in Enterprise, AL.

Haley moved back to the NCAA ranks in 1991 at Arkansas, coaching inside linebackers as a graduate assistant coach. In that year, he earned 24 hours towards a masters degree in educational administration. Austin Peay State, located in Clarksville, TN, was Haley's next stop for the 1992 and 1993 football seasons. He coached the defensive line as the assistant head coach for the Governors.

He moved back to the state of Alabama for the 1994 through 1996 seasons, this time at Troy State in Troy, AL. There he coached the defensive line. One season, the defense allowed just 115 rushing yards per game and compiled 39 sacks. He was also the defensive coordinator for the '96 season. Haley's last stop before Tigertown was Houston, where he coached outside linebackers.

The 33-year old native of Gadsden, AL is married to the former Tina Delaine of Clayton, NC.

John Latina

Assistant Coach • Centers/Guards

John Latina enters the 1998 season, his fifth at Clemson, as the offensive centers and guards coach.

Latina's group of offensive linemen were ranked third best in the nation prior to 1997 by **Sporting News**. The group helped Clemson establish six team records in offensive categories in 1997.

Among his proteges was guard Glenn Rountree, who started 47 straight games at Clemson and was a first-team All-ACC performer.

The recent performance of the line is a testimony to the efforts of Latina, who took over the most inexperienced offensive line in Clemson history in 1994. Each of the last three years Clemson has been first or second in the ACC in rushing. His line is a big reason Raymond Priester set the Clemson career rushing record in just three seasons.

Latina, a former Virginia Tech offensive lineman who once played in Death Valley, joined the Tiger staff after a successful career at Kansas State.

Latina received four letters at Virginia Tech as an offensive lineman from 1975-78. He earned his bachelor's degree in 1979. "We have one of the top offensive line coaches in the nation in John Latina," said Tommy West. "I have known him and respected his coaching abilities for a long time."

Latina's coaching career began immediately after his playing days were over. In 1979,



he was an assistant coach at his alma mater in Blacksburg, and he coached the Gobblers in the 1981 Peach Bowl. He then moved to Pittsburgh for the 1982 season where he worked with an outstanding Panther team quarterbacked by Dan Marino. The team amassed a 9-3 record and played in the Cotton Bowl.

In 1983, Latina was named as the offensive line coach at Temple. There, he coached the offensive line that blocked for first-team All-American Paul Palmer, who was the nation's leading rusher. After six years in Philadelphia, Latina went out west to Manhattan, KS, to coach Kansas State. For five years he was the running game coordinator and offensive line coach. His offensive line helped to lead the Wildcats in 1993 to the Big Eight lead in passing, averaging 245 yards per game. In 1991, Kansas State set a school record with 4,231 yards in total offense, including 1,756

yards rushing, the most by a Kansas State team in 10 years. The 1992 Kansas State team played in the Copper Bowl, just the second bowl appearance in Wildcat history.

Latina arrived at Clemson as the offensive line coach in December of 1993 when Tommy West was named Clemson coach. He has already coached the Tigers in four bowl games, the 1993 Peach, the 1996 Gator, the 1996 Peach, and the 1998 Peach Bowl.

The 1996 Clemson team, in particular the running game, was a direct product of Latina's coaching. Glenn Rountree and Jamie Trimble were both named to the All-ACC second-team. His offensive line opened up the holes that allowed Raymond Priester, Kelton Dunnican, and Emory Smith to amass over 2,000 yards on the ground and 16 touchdowns. Clemson's line allowed just 23 sacks in 12 games for the 7-5 season.

Latina should receive much credit for the Clemson improvement in terms of total offense since his arrival. He inherited an offensive line devoid of returning starters in 1994. The team made nearly a 1000-yard rushing improvement from 1994 to 1995 and doubled its rushing touchdown total.

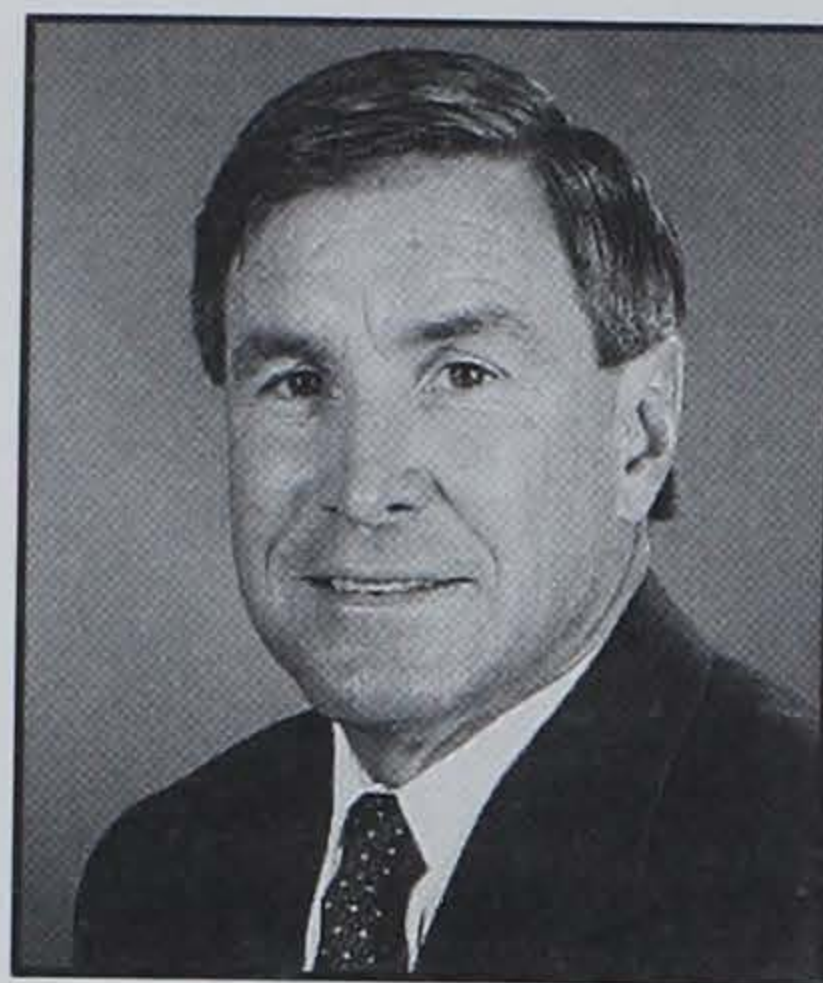
Mac McWhorter

Assistant Coach • Offensive Tackles/Tight Ends

Mac McWhorter enters his third year at Clemson as the offensive tackles and tight ends coach. McWhorter, 48, and a native of Atlanta, GA, shares the duties of the offensive line with coach John Latina. McWhorter deserves much of the credit for Jim Bundren's 1997 All-America season. Bundren was a two-time All-ACC choice on the field and in the classroom under McWhorter. The Tigers led the ACC in rushing in 1996 and ranked second in 1997 and McWhorter's work with the line had much to do with an offense that showed steady improvement.

During McWhorter's five years at Georgia, three of which were shared with offensive coordinator Steve Ensminger, the Bulldogs set school records in many categories. The 1992 team established a Bulldog record for yards per rush in a season with an average of 5.6 yards per carry. The 1993 team completed 63 percent of its passes, a school record. The 1994 team completed a record 25 touchdown passes and set a school mark for total offense with 5135 yards, an average of 467 yards per game.

McWhorter graduated from Therrell High School in Atlanta, GA in 1969, where he played football and ran track. McWhorter attended Georgia and received a bachelor's degree in education in 1974. He was a three-year letter-winner at Georgia as an offensive player, and was an All-Academic Southeastern Conference performer in 1972 and 1973.



In 1973, he was an AP All-Southeastern Conference offensive guard and Honorable Mention All-American in '73 as the permanent offensive captain of the Bulldogs. In 1973, he also had the highest grade point average on the football team. Georgia played in the 1971 Gator Bowl and the 1973 Peach Bowl during his career.

McWhorter began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Duluth High School in 1974 and went on to become an assistant coach at Douglas County High between 1975-78. He was the head coach at Villa Rica High in Georgia in 1979, where he was named Carroll County Coach of the Year.

McWhorter jumped to the college ranks in 1980, when he was named to the Georgia Tech coaching staff. From 1980-81, he coached receivers and was the special teams coordinator. From 1981-82, he was an assistant coach who handled the offensive line and

the special teams. In 1982, he became head recruiter at Georgia Tech and still handled the offensive line. From 1983-85, McWhorter, was an offensive line coach for the Yellow Jackets. In 1985, he was named the Assistant Head Coach, and handled football operations and the offensive line. The Yellow Jackets played in one bowl when he was in Atlanta, the 1985 All-American Bowl.

He then moved across the border to coach at Alabama in 1987, where he was the Assistant Head Coach and coached the offensive line under Bill Curry. That team was ranked in the top 20 and played in the Sun Bowl. In 1988, McWhorter became the Administrative Assistant to the Head Coach and was the offensive line coach.

In 1989, McWhorter took his first head coaching position at the college level when he was named the Head Coach at West Georgia College. McWhorter joined the Duke coaching staff in 1990 as an offensive line coach and director of football operations.

After one season in Durham, he returned to his alma mater, Georgia, in 1991 to coach the offensive line and tight ends. He was also director of football operations in Athens. He remained with the Bulldogs and Ray Goff for five seasons, three of which ended in bowl games.

Rick Stockstill

Assistant Coach • Wide Receivers

Rick Stockstill enters his 10th consecutive season at Clemson as an assistant coach. He has experience as a wide receivers and quarterbacks coach at Clemson. His contributions in terms of on-field coaching and recruiting are significant reasons Clemson has been to bowl games in seven of his nine seasons with the program.

Stockstill has had a positive effect on the Clemson passing game over the years. In 1997, his receiving corps set school records for receptions and reception yardage. Leading the way was Biletnikoff Award semifinalist Tony Horne, who had a record 70 receptions and record tying eight touchdowns.

Stockstill graduated from Fernandina Beach High School in Fernandina Beach, FL, in 1977. After graduating from Florida State in 1982 with a B.S. degree in physical education, he immediately went into coaching. "I was always interested in coaching," Stockstill states. "By the time I got to high school I had decided that I wanted to go into coaching. I think any athlete who grows up in a coaching family has a head start on the field." Stockstill played for his dad at Fernandina Beach High School.

As a member of Bobby Bowden's first recruiting class, Stockstill earned three letters, made three bowl trips, and was selected to play in two all-star games after his senior season. In 1981, Stockstill, the team captain, was named an Honorable Mention All-American by the **Sporting News**. He helped Florida State to two Top 10 final AP rankings



and wins over perennial powers in Notre Dame, Pittsburgh, Ohio State, and Nebraska in his career.

He teamed with current Clemson linebacker coach Reggie Herring to lead the Seminoles to the first two top 10 rankings of the Bobby Bowden era. Although Stockstill never played a game in Death Valley, his brother, Jeff, played for the Tigers from 1979-82 and was a key reserve on the national championship team.

Rick's first coaching job was at Bethune-Cookman where he was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 1983 to 1984. In 1985, he moved to Central Florida to become the Assistant Head Coach and wide receivers coach. During his time at the Orlando, FL school he coached Shawn Jefferson, who played a decade with the New England Patriots.

After four years at Central Florida, Stockstill came to Tigertown in 1989, as the quarter-

backs coach, a position he had for four years. In 1992, he was the passing game coordinator and in 1993, he was the co-offensive coordinator and the wide receivers coach.

As a player, Stockstill was a part of the 1977 Tangerine Bowl, 1980 Orange Bowl, and 1981 Orange Bowl with Florida State. He also participated in the 1982 East-West Shrine Bowl and the 1982 Japan Bowl All-Star games. As a coach, he has been on seven bowl staffs including victories over West Virginia in the 1989 Gator Bowl, Illinois in the 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl, and Kentucky in the 1993 Peach Bowl.

In his first year (1989) as quarterbacks coach at Clemson, he helped lead Clemson to a single-season record for completion percentage (60%). In 1991, the offense led by DeChane Cameron, the all-time winningest quarterback in Clemson history in terms of percentage, led the Atlantic Coast Conference in total offense. He also co-coordinated the #6 offense in Clemson history in 1995.

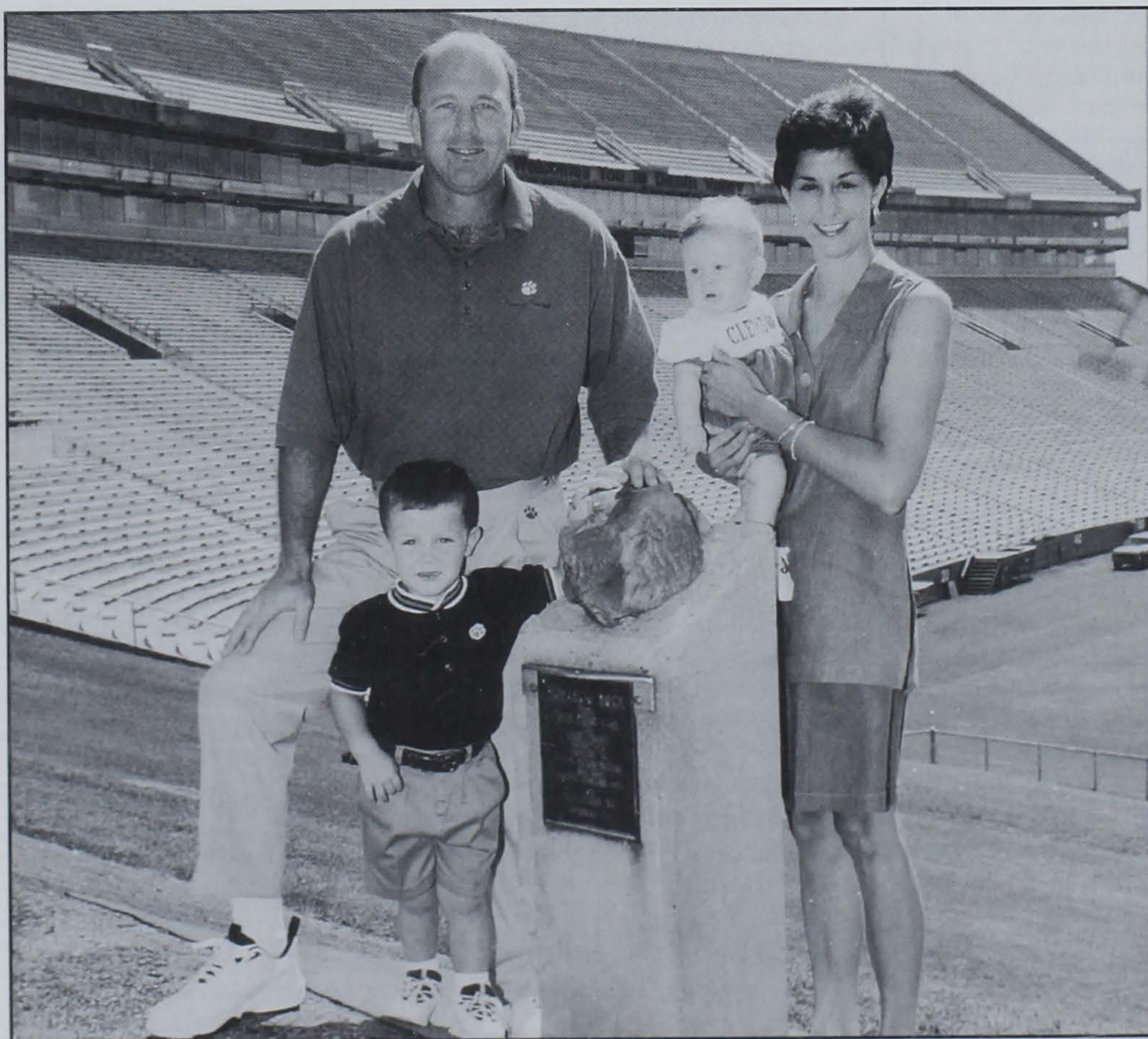

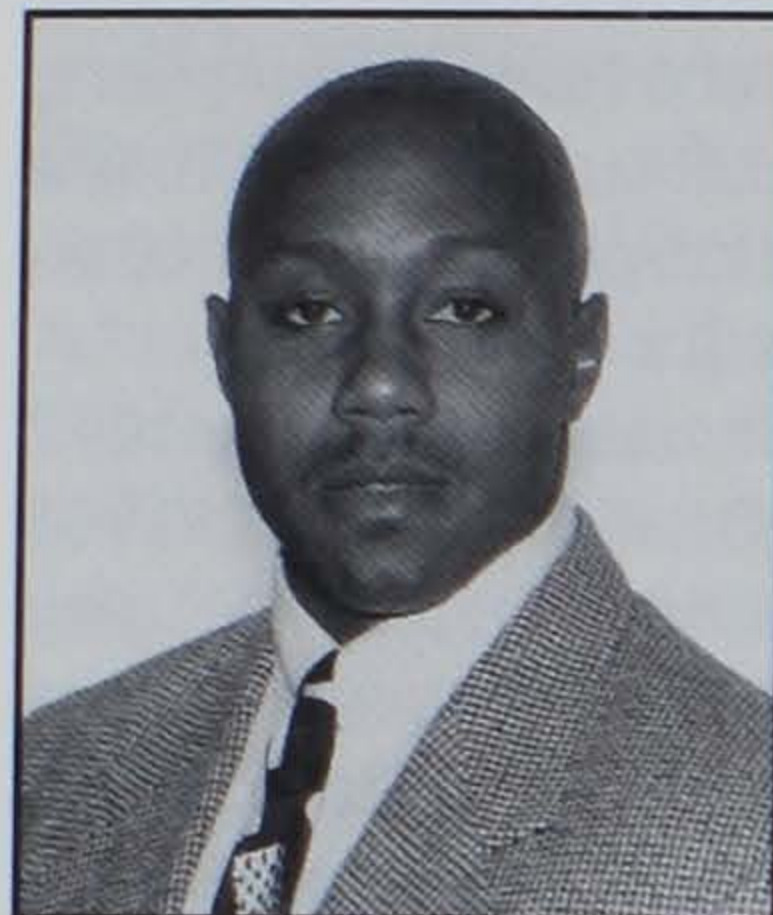

Johnson Hunter *Assistant AD for Football Relations*

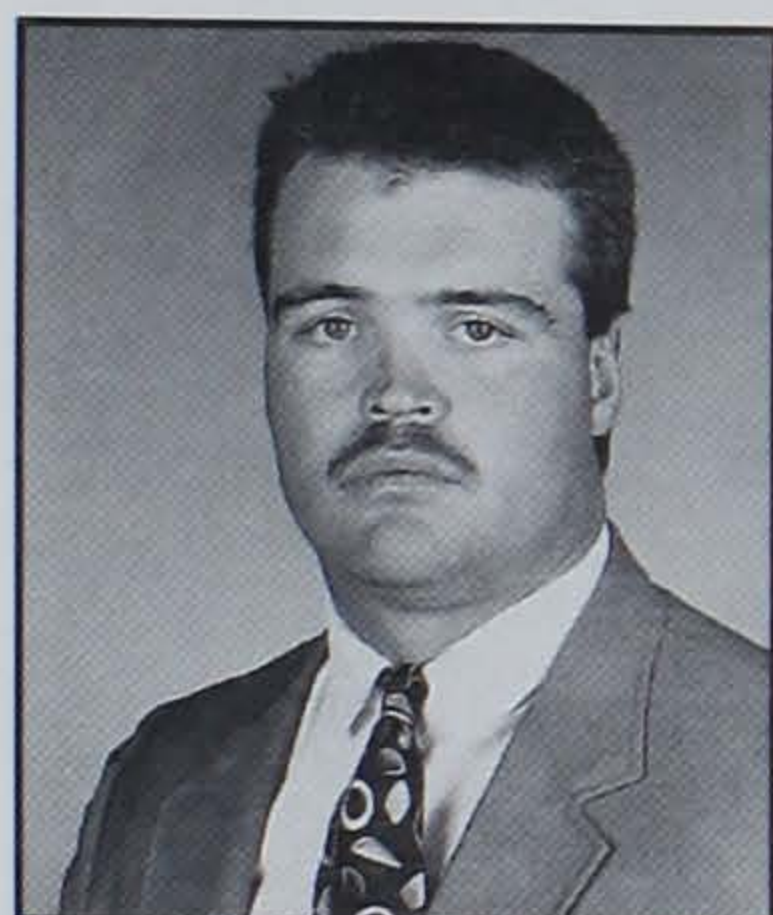

Andy Johnston *Assistant AD for Football Management*

Andy Johnston enters his second year as the Assistant Athletic Director for Football Management. His responsibilities with the Tiger football team include: managing the day-to-day operations of the Clemson football program.

Although this is Johnston's second year with the football program, he has been involved with the Clemson Athletic Department for over 20 years. Between 1983-97, he was the most successful women's tennis coach in Clemson history.

In those 15 years, Johnston guided his squads to five consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference Championships (1983-87), 12 top-25 finishes, and six NCAA Tournaments. Johnston was named ACC Coach-of-the-Year for the fourth time and Southeast Region Coach-of-the-Year for the second time in 1993.

Johnston had a record of 254-160 at Clemson and had a career mark of 263-167. He was the coach at Furman in 1982 before coming to Clemson. His best season at Clemson was his rookie year when the Lady Tigers had a 30-5 record and finished seventh in the final national ranking. That team won all nine flights of the ACC Tournament, the only tennis team in Clemson history to do that.

Johnston played for Clemson's men's tennis team from 1975 until 1979 when he earned his degree in administrative management. He then served as the assistant men's tennis coach for the 1980 season before moving onto Furman.

Johnston, 41 and a native of Summerville, SC, is married to the former Peggy Haas of Mascoutah, Illinois. They have two daughters, Caylynn (11) and Kiera (8).

George Bennett

Executive Director

George Bennett says the wheels are off and that he has thoroughly enjoyed being back at Clemson. Bennett returned to Clemson on February 14, 1993, and as he says, "The second time around is definitely better." Last year,

under his direction IPTAY raised a record \$9.1 million dollars, and increased membership to over 19,000.

A 1955 Clemson graduate, Bennett was an Assistant Athletic Director for Business at Clemson for eight years (1971-79), and his final two years, he was the Executive Secretary of IPTAY. Under his leadership, annual contributions to IPTAY doubled to more than 2.3 million and memberships increased from 9,800 to 15,000.

In 1979, Bennett left Clemson to become the Associate Athletic Director for Financial Development at Vanderbilt University. Bennett initiated programs for the Commodore Club that resulted in memberships going from 650 members to more than 6,000 and contributions increased from \$275,000 in 1979 to over \$2.2 million in 1986. Bennett also was instrumental in raising funds to rebuild the Vanderbilt Football Stadium. In 1984, Bennett was named the National Athletic Fundraiser of the Year at the National Conference of Athletic Fundraisers.

In April, 1986, Bennett was named the Athletic Director at Furman University. During his time at Furman, the football team won the National I-AA Championship. Bennett returned to Nashville, TN, in 1989, where he served as the Vice-President for Development at Baptist Hospital.

Bennett has twice been honored by Clemson. He is a member of Clemson's Athletic Hall of Fame and, in 1986, he received the Alumni Association's Distinguished Service Award.

Bennett's civic responsibilities have been numerous. In Clemson, he has served as President of the Chamber of Commerce and has been President of the Clemson Sertoma Club. He was a member of the Board of Governors of the Chamber in Nashville. He held a similar position in Greenville. He and his wife, Nancy, served as co-chairs on two United Way Campaign Cabinets in Nashville. The Bennetts have also been active in the churches in their communities and have worked mainly with college students. Bennett is a member of the Greenville Executive Sertoma Club.

Bennett's ties to athletics at Clemson date to his undergraduate days. As a varsity cheerleader for three years and head cheerleader his senior year in 1954, he asked his father to buy a small cannon and thus began the tradition of firing the cannon after a touchdown was scored. During his college years, Bennett was President of Blue Key, The CDA, and served as a class officer. He has continued his association with Tiger Brotherhood.

Bennett's current projects with IPTAY are the expansion of endowments to name positions on athletic teams and the proposed "Avenue of Champions."

A native of Columbia, SC, he and his wife, Nancy (who has a Master's degree from Clemson and was elected to the City Council in Clemson in November 1996) have been married 38 years. They enjoy activities with their two children, Jeff and Bonnie and their families in addition to attending as many Clemson athletic events as their schedules will allow. Their grandchildren are Tiger Cubs--Megan (11), Bennett (7), Brooks (6), Augusta (4), and Austin (1).



Bert Henderson

Associate Executive Director

Bert Henderson is in his 13th year with IPTAY. His diverse background with Clemson University dates to 1978 when he began his career as a trainer with the Athletic Department.

He began full-time employment under Fred Hoover in 1980 and served as basketball trainer from 1982-84. He handled all travel arrangements and a majority of the administrative duties for Clemson basketball.

In 1984, he joined the Clemson Alumni Association where he was instrumental in establishing Clemson clubs and also coordinating away game headquarters. In April, 1985, he rejoined the Athletic Department as IPTAY's first Associate Executive Secretary.

Henderson demands excellence and his record shows that he does not settle for less in fund raising. He has been instrumental in IPTAY's 340 Life members as well as working with a number of donors in establishing endowments, trusts, and wills. As Clemson begins a new Capital Campaign, he is working as the Development Director for Clemson Athletics through IPTAY. The success so far has been the establishment of 56 endowments for Athletics positions and scholarship aid. Other major gifts and trusts will help IPTAY secure the future for scholarships.

Henderson's duties also include working with the staff of the **Orange and White**. He is also the advisor for the IPTAY Student Advisory Board (ISAB). This 30 member group serves as a liaison between students and the Athletic Department. He has been the driving force behind the newly created Collegiate Level of the Tiger Cub Club program. Henderson is also involved with the Clemson Clubs and has numerous other duties in the administration of IPTAY.

Henderson is a 1978 graduate of Mars Hill College. He earned a master's degree from Clemson in administration and supervision. He is married to the former Lee Ann Hudson, and the couple has two children, Amy Lee (9/23/86) and Kimberly Ann (6/13/89).



Bob Mahony

Associate Executive Director

Bob Mahony started with IPTAY as an associate executive director in February of 1989. He is a 1976 graduate of Clemson with a bachelor of science degree in building construction. He had been involved in commercial and residential construction in Columbia and the upstate since graduation.

In the summer of 1977, he began a career in construction with Bagnal Builders, a residential builder in Columbia. From 1981-1985 he was employed by McCrory Construction, also in Columbia, where he gained experience in commercial construction. Following a return to Bagnal Builders from 1985-87, he moved to the upstate where he worked with Trehel Corp. of Clemson and Hudson Construction of Seneca.

Mahony lettered in baseball at Clemson from 1974-76. He was a walk-on pitcher for coach Bill Wilhelm's baseball team in 1974. He later earned a full scholarship and was co-captain of the 1976 team that participated in the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska. That team also won the ACC regular season and tournament. Following his career at Clemson, Mahony spent a short time with the Baltimore Orioles organization. For the past nine seasons, he has provided the color commentary for Clemson Baseball on the Clemson Sports Network.

In addition to his everyday responsibilities of soliciting new IPTAY members at every level and servicing the requests of current donors, his duties with IPTAY include the coordination of the IPTAY Representative and County/Regional Chairperson appointment and awards program. There are approximately 750 IPTAY Representatives throughout the country who solicit new IPTAY donors and monitor the activities of current donors in his or her particular area. Mahony also plans and coordinates special activities and meetings for the Representatives throughout the year.

Mahony is also responsible for planning and coordinating the Clemson Club Spring Meetings. Approximately 25 meetings are planned each year highlighting the athletic accomplishments and forecasts for each of the 19 varsity sports at Clemson.

Mahony is married to the former Robin Ann Lawrimore, a 1976 graduate of Clemson. The couple has two children, Robin Allison (9-1-80) and Marion Leigh (9-3-85). Bob has two brothers, Glenn and David, who are also graduates of Clemson, his father received his Doctorate Degree from Clemson after retiring from the Navy and his mother was Clemson's Tiger Brotherhood Mother of the Year in 1981.



IPTAY is widely regarded nationally as the father of Athletic Fundraising. It all started in 1934 and from a private meeting of a small group of Clemson supporters has sprung into an organization that raised a record \$9,143,045 last year. The organization plays a major role in ensuring that all 19 of the varsity sports at Clemson are given the maximum amount of scholarships offered by the NCAA.

The organization also has helped finance facilities that contribute to the well-being of student-athletes on and off the field. Vickery Hall is a 27,000 square foot facility that houses the tutoring and advising programs for student-athletes. It is a major reason Clemson student-athletes have had their highest cumulative GPA on record for five consecutive semesters.

While IPTAY is primarily concerned with athletic fundraising, the mission of Clemson University has not been overlooked. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Endowment was created to help meet the need for more academic scholarships for non-athletes who are highly qualified academically. The IPTAY Academic Scholarship Fund is presently the largest scholarship endowment of its kind at Clemson, currently helping over 30 students at Clemson.

IPTAY Executive Director George Bennett has continued to keep Clemson among the best in the nation in terms of fund-raising by the establishment of the IPTAY Endowment Program. In April of 1994, he kicked off the beginning of the endowment of positions program at the 85th birthday celebration for former Clemson Coach Frank Howard. The endowments are secure with a \$100,000 donation paid over a five-year period.

"This is a chance to broaden the horizons of IPTAY," said Bennett. "It gives an individual or a group of people an opportunity to endow a position that meant something during their college days, or to honor a person at a position. The money being endowed is going to secure our future as the interest is used to carry on our program forever."

The first endowment was for the head football coach position to honor the legendary Frank Howard. Howard coached football at Clemson 39 years, 30 as the head coach. During his tenure the Tigers won 165 games, 100 of which were against conference foes.



The Hudson family was the first of now over 50 individuals and families to participate in the IPTAY Endowment Program.

"Former players and friends of Coach Howard made donations over the cost of attending the celebration program and that was enough for the endowment. Their gifts were a way of permanently thanking Coach Howard for all that he did for Clemson.

"Following Coach Howard's birthday party we began to look for an individual to help us support and promote the program and Bill Hudson's name came up. He was an outstanding player at Clemson who has been equally successful in the business world. We went to him and explained the program and its goals and that we were looking for his leadership to help get the program going, and he accepted."

Hudson, a 1956 graduate, was a three-year letter winner at tackle who played professionally for the Montreal Alouettes, the San Diego Chargers, and the Boston Patriots. He earned Pro Bowl honors in 1962. Mr. Hudson sees this program growing into a large part of Clemson's athletic funding. "When other people see information on the endowment program and learn what it is about this program will grow. Success builds on success. People who are looking to honor a friend or family member now have a great means to do that."

Besides the Hudson's family endowment four other football endowments were made and one managers position in the first year. Now there are over 50 positions endowed. The goal of the program is to get every position endowed. "From the free safety to the number-three player in women's tennis, we hope to have every position endowed," said Bennett.

"We will likely use the Avenue of Champions as a physical place to honor these people further for the positions they have endowed. That will have plenty of space, so we will be working to have as many endowments across all of our sports.

"The personal satisfaction that they helped Clemson University, specifically the Athletic department, and that they are securing its future are the main reasons for becoming involved."

And with more involvement Clemson will have a very secure future for generations to come.

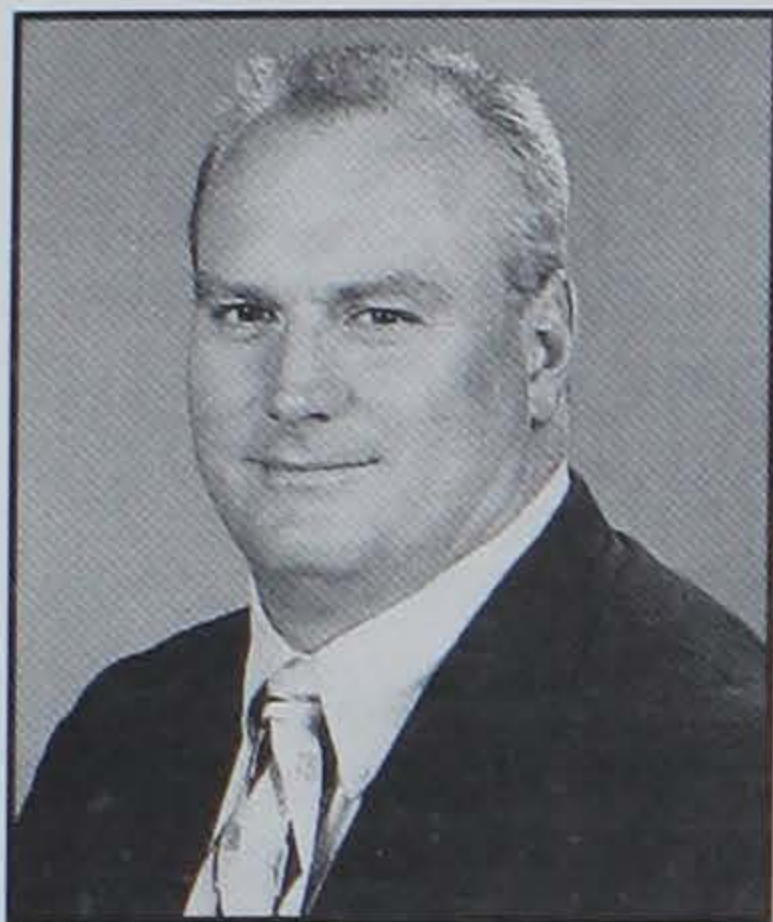

In the course of his professional career, Batson has pioneered many training techniques in the strength, speed and conditioning fields. Referred to by Batson as "Not So Basic Strength Training," the collection of innovative techniques has led to impressive results by many Tiger players over the last year.

Prior to his return to Clemson, Batson served as the first full-time director of Strength Training at Furman University in Greenville. In 1996, he was named Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year in the Southern Conference by the National Strength and Conditioning Coaches Association. In addition to his four years at Furman, he also worked as the Director of Strength/Conditioning at Bowling Green and served a year at the University of South Carolina as assistant director of strength and conditioning.

Not only does Batson bring professional experience to the position, but he also brings experience as a player at the collegiate level. The Greenville native was a tight end at The Citadel in 1979 before transferring to Newberry College where he was a three-year letterman and team co-captain as a senior. He earned his B.A. in Physical Education from Newberry and his masters in Education at Clemson in 1988.

Batson is a member of several professional groups which include the National Strength and Conditioning Association, United States Weight Lifting Federation and American Drug Free Powerlifting Association. He has completed the Club Coach Certification program by the United States Weight Lifting Federation. Batson is a regular speaker and instructor on the strength training circuit.

Batson, who started his employment as director on June 2, 1997, is married to the former Susan Malone of Berea. They have one child, Michael who was born June 5, 1996.



Tim Bourret Assistant AD/Sports Information & Public Relations

Tim Bourret is in his 10th year supervising the SID office, his sixth as an Assistant Athletic Director, and his 21st with the Clemson Athletic Department. He first came to Clemson as assistant SID under Bob Bradley in September of 1978 and was elevated to an associate SID position in July of 1980.

The 42-year old Bourret has edited 84 award-winning brochures in his career, including 26 that have dealt with Clemson football. The 1995 Clemson football program series was voted fifth in the nation by CoSIDA. The 1997 football series ranked in the top 15 in the nation for the sixth straight year.

Bourret also has considerable radio experience, play-by-play and color. He has been the color voice of Clemson basketball since the 1980-81 season and served in the same capacity for Clemson football between 1982 and 1988. He gave up his football radio work to supervise the Clemson pressbox when Bob Bradley retired in 1989. He was also the play-by-play voice of Clemson postseason baseball between 1980-89.

Bourret is a native of West Hartford, CT and 1973 graduate of Northwest Catholic High School. He was an all-conference baseball player in high school and played in the 1973 American Legion World Series.

Following in his father's footsteps, Bourret earned his undergraduate degree from the University of Notre Dame in business administration in 1977. He also earned his master's degree in communication arts from Notre Dame in August of 1978.

Bourret worked as an undergraduate and graduate assistant under Roger Valdiserri in Notre Dame's office for three years, where he was assistant editor of Notre Dame's 1977 football programs. The program series won Best in the Nation that year. He also served as commissioner of the school's famed "Bookstore Basketball Tournament" for three years, including the year it was featured in **Sports Illustrated**.

He joined former Notre Dame basketball coach Digger Phelps and Sport's Illustrated's John Walters as co-authors of the book "Basketball for Dummies." It was released by IDG Books in October, 1997.



Rebecca Bowman Assistant AD/Compliance Services

Rebecca Bowman enters her first year at Clemson as the assistant athletic director for compliance services.

Bowman, a native of Columbia, SC and a 1976 graduate of Winthrop College, comes to Clemson from the NCAA where she served as a senior membership services representative since 1991. She also has coaching experience as the head coach of volleyball and softball at UNC-Charlotte.

"We feel fortunate to have a person with ties to this area who has such a wide scope of experience in this field," said Athletic Director Bobby Robinson. "Becky certainly has familiarity with this position from both sides of the equation through her experience as a coach and as an administrator with the NCAA."

With the NCAA, Bowman coordinated certification activities, administered institutional compliance reviews, provided rules interpretations to NCAA member institutions, and served as a liaison to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools/Commission on Colleges.

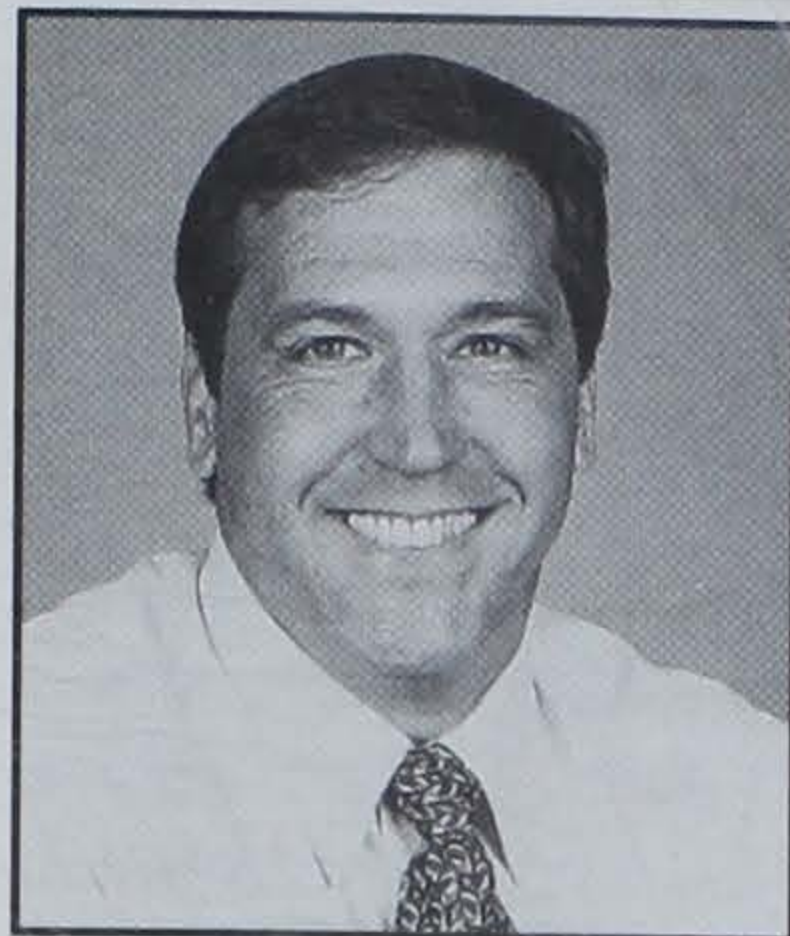
At Clemson, she will implement rules education programs for coaches, student-athletes and boosters. Bowman served UNC-Charlotte as a coach and teacher from 1983-91. She was the head softball coach from 1983-85. She also served as head volleyball coach during her career.

Bill D'Andrea

Associate AD/Director of Student-Athlete Enrichment

Bill D'Andrea is in his eighth year as the Director of Student-Athlete Enrichment, but has been a part of the Clemson family for much longer.

Prior to being named as the Director of Student-Athlete Enrichment D'Andrea, 46, served as the Tiger offensive tackles coach from 1986 to 1989. He also served as the Clemson football recruiting coordinator in the spring of 1991. D'Andrea's ties to Clemson go back even further as he served as a graduate assistant for the Tiger football program in 1982 and 1983.

As Director of Student-Athlete Enrichment, D'Andrea oversees the day to day operations of Vickery Hall, Clemson's student-athlete enrichment program. This position covers three areas: academic progress of the student athlete, personal growth of the student athlete, and student-athlete career assistance. It would be hard to argue with the success of Vickery Hall under D'Andrea. In the spring semester of 1998, Clemson athletes enjoyed tremendous semester in the classroom with 175 athletes, managers and trainers earning a 3.0 or better. Clemson student-athletes had a 2.69 GPA in the Spring of 1998, a Clemson record. The general student body GPA was 2.74 and the .05 difference between the overall student body and Clemson student-athletes was the smallest on record. The GPA of Clemson student-athletes has increased seven consecutive semesters.

D'Andrea, a Morgan, PA native, received his undergraduate degree in criminal justice from Indiana St. in 1973, and earned a master's degree in education from East Carolina in 1975.

Associate AD/Ticket Manager

Any Tiger fan who has ever needed tickets or parking for a Clemson athletic event will recognize the name of Van Hilderbrand. He has served the Clemson athletic department for 21 years and is in his 12th year as

an associate/assistant athletic director. He is in charge of the ticket office and supervises all parking administration and also works with game day operations.

Hilderbrand is certainly familiar with the athletic department. He started his association there as a student employee in the office during his college career, 1970-74. In 1976 he filled the newly created position of assistant ticket manager, and in 1980 he was named Athletic Department Ticket Manager. In 1985 he was made an assistant athletic director.

It is Hilderbrand's responsibility to distribute the tickets to the thousands who attend all Clemson athletic events. Hilderbrand and his staff sell more football season tickets than any other school in the ACC. Clemson has been in the top 20 in the nation in attendance every year since 1983.

In the 18 years since Hilderbrand took the job as ticket manager, he has distributed more season tickets than ever before for football and basketball. He has met the challenge by keeping up with the technology of the profession.

Hilderbrand worked as athletic supervisor for the Greenwood Recreation Department for two years after graduation, and in 1976,

he returned to Clemson.

Hilderbrand graduated from Clover (SC) High School in 1970. He was the school's all-time leading scorer in basketball until 1993, when former Tiger gridder Lamont Hall broke his mark. Hilderbrand earned his degree in parks and recreation administration from Clemson in 1974. The 46-year old is married to the former Diane Harris of Clover and they have two children, Van Jr., a Clemson freshman who was born December 31, 1979, the day Clemson met Baylor in the Peach Bowl, and Lee Elizabeth, who was born October 2, 1985.

In his spare time, Hilderbrand enjoys golf and working with the Boy Scouts.



Fred Hoover

Assistant AD/Head Trainer

Much of the credit for getting the Tigers on the field should go to Fred Hoover, who has completed 38 years as head trainer for the Tigers. The 67-year-old Hoover is responsible for the prevention, treatment and

rehabilitation of injuries to Clemson's athletes. In addition, Hoover, who was named assistant athletic director in the summer of 1983, is a consultant for purchasing athletic equipment, supervising the medical staff, making travel arrangements, supervising the athletic training room and directing the training table.

A native of Jacksonville, FL, Hoover graduated with a BS degree in physical education from Florida State in 1953. He served as trainer at his alma mater for two stints, 1952-53 and 1957-58, before coming to Clemson in 1959. He has never missed a Clemson football game, working 434 in a row heading into this year.

Professionally, "Doc" Hoover has held just about every administrative post with the National Athletic Trainers Association, including national president, and he is an affiliate member of the American Orthopedic Society for Sports Medicine.

In 1981, Hoover was enshrined in the Citizens Savings-Helms Athletic Foundation Hall of Fame for his work.

In the spring of 1982, he was named a consultant to the South Carolina Medical Association—Medical Aspects of Sports Committee. He is also past chairman of the NATA National Symposium Committee and is currently chairman of the South Carolina Board of Certification for Athletic Trainers. Hoover is also a member of the Clemson Hall of Fame and is past president of the South Carolina Trainers Association. In October of 1990, Hoover was named an Honorary Member of the Clemson Alumni Physicians society.

In 1983, Hoover was the recipient of the Distinguished Service to Sports Medicine Award given by the American Orthopedic Society for Sports Medicine. In 1987, he was awarded the South Carolina Hall of Fame Distinguished Service to Sports Award. In 1994, the South Carolina Trainers Association created the Fred Hoover Award. It is presented for excellence in athletic training.

Hoover is married to the former Elva Cook of Mt. Vernon, IL, and the Hoovers have two children, Catherine, a 1980 Clemson graduate who is married, and Bryan who also graduated from Clemson. The Hoover's have one grandchild, Andrew Cole.



Dr. Cecil Huey

Faculty Representative

Dr. Cecil Huey was named the Clemson Faculty Athletics Representative in December of 1992. As such, he is the University representative to the NCAA and the ACC. During the 1997-98 year, Dr. Huey served as President of the ACC. He also serves as the ACC Representative of Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet of the NCAA.

The professor of Mechanical Engineering on Clemson's campus is a member of the university's Athletic Council and was its chair at one time, was a faculty senator, and was a member of Clemson's self-study committee on intercollegiate athletics for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. He is involved in the selection of coaches, certifications of athletic eligibility, other on campus athletic affairs, and continues his full-time faculty position.

Huey won the university's Class of '39 award for excellence, one of the top faculty awards offered at Clemson. The award recognizes distinguished faculty representing the highest achievement of service to students, the university, and the community.

Huey's association with Clemson is not solely in an academic light, although he earned his bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees in mechanical engineering from the university. Huey was an athlete during his undergraduate years with the Tigers. He was a member of the ACC champion mile relay team that posted a time of 3:14.2 in 1964. The outdoor track team finished second in the conference championship that year.

Huey is a member of the American Society for Engineering Education, the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, the Society for the History of Technology, and the Society for Industrial Archaeology.



Tim Match

Associate AD/Marketing & Public Affairs

Tim Match was named Associate Athletic Director for Marketing and Public Affairs in 1996. Match, a native of Arlington, Ohio, is responsible for implementing the athletic department's sports marketing, sponsorship and licensing program. He also handles all football and men's basketball scheduling, as well as oversees the video, strength and conditioning and equipment areas of the Clemson athletic department.

The 1985 graduate of Bowling Green State University is also responsible for all post season football games and is the liaison for the athletic department with the Clemson Radio Network and the Clemson Coaches Television Show Network. He also serves as game manager for the Clemson football and men's basketball games as well as oversees the Memorial Stadium Executive suite program.

Prior to his return to Clemson, Match participated in an internship at the University of West Florida in the athletic department. He then moved on to Clemson where he worked in the sports information office as a graduate assistant.

After receiving his master's degree in PRTM with an emphasis in micro-computer management, he became the assistant sports information director at the University of Virginia. He returned to Clemson in 1989 as an associate sports information director, working directly with the men's basketball program, as well as editing the football and men's basketball programs for three seasons.



Brenda Rabon

Director of Sales

Although Brenda Rabon is in her first year as director of sales at Clemson, she is no stranger to Tigertown. Rabon served almost five years in the sports information office, four as a student and under one year as assistant sports information director. She began her current position in March, 1998.

Rabon is responsible for coordinating sales activities, as well as developing a strategic advertising and marketing plan to increase executive suites, corporate, and group ticket sales.

"We are extremely excited about Brenda Rabon accepting this new, and innovative position within the Clemson University Athletic Department," states Robert Ricketts. "Brenda's primary focus will be to take Clemson athletic ticket sales into the corporate board rooms. She brings a tremendous amount of excitement and a strong work ethic to this position."

Rabon, a native of Aynor, SC, graduated from Clemson in May 1996 with a bachelor of arts in english. She received her Masters of Science in sports administration from Tennessee in August 1997. She worked in the sports information office at Tennessee as a graduate assistant under Bud Ford.



Dwight Rainey

Senior Associate
Athletic Director

When there is success in college athletics, experience is almost always a key factor. Senior Associate Athletic Director Dwight

Rainey is an example of success gained from a wide variety of experience.

Rainey is in his 24th academic year with the Clemson University Athletic Department. Rainey oversees the activities of all Olympic Sports at Clemson, one of the most high profile programs in the nation. This year the program will continue to grow as women's rowing is added to the varsity sport lineup.

While football and basketball may be the two highest profile sports at Clemson, the 17 Olympic sports have also enjoyed enormous success. In 1997-98, Clemson had its most successful overall sports program in history when it comes to gaining postseason recognition. Ten of a possible 12 Clemson teams received team bids to NCAA Tournaments and 16 of the 18 took part in postseason play. Seven Clemson teams finished in their respective top-25 rankings.

The success was constant through the entire academic year. In the fall, Clemson had both its soccer teams in the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament and the volleyball program won its first ever ACC Championship. In the winter, the men's Indoor Track & Field team finished third at the NAAs, the women's basketball team recorded a school record 25 victories and the women's swim team finished 23rd in the nation. In the spring, the Clemson golf team finished second at the NCAA National Tournament, while the baseball and track teams also had top 20 finishes.

Clemson won four ACC titles in 1997-98, giving Clemson nine titles in two years. The program finished 25th in the Sear Director's Cup Standings.



The success of the 1997-98 academic year should come as no surprise. In his 15 years overseeing the Clemson Olympic sports program, Clemson has been in the top-25 in the nation in the All-Sports Poll eight times.

Prior to moving into administration at Clemson, Rainey served as Bill Foster's top assistant in the men's basketball program for 13 years, five at UNC Charlotte and eight at Clemson. One of Rainey's coaching highlights was the 1979-80 team that finished with 23-9 mark. That squad advanced to the Final 8 of the NCAA tournament, the furthest a Clemson men's basketball team has advanced in the NCAA tournament.

Rainey has also had experience outside of college athletics. Between 1967 and August of 1970, he worked with a division of the Chrysler Corporation in Atlanta, GA. Rainey earned a B.A. in business administration from Shorter College in 1967 and a Master's degree from UNC Charlotte in 1972.



Robert Ricketts

Associate AD/Chief Financial Officer

Keeping the expense and revenue books of such a vast operation as the Clemson athletic department in order is no easy task,

but Associate Athletic Director Robert Ricketts is well-qualified for the job. Ricketts is in his 13th year with the department and his 22nd with the university.

As associate athletic director in charge of business operations, Ricketts handles all purchasing and expense accounts. This job is old hat to Ricketts who spent nine years working for Clemson in auditing and accounting departments. During these nine years, one of his main duties was the audit for the athletic department. He worked in the University's financial management division in accounting control and payroll benefits between 1976 and 1977, then worked in the internal auditing division and as an auditor between 1977 and 1980. In 1980, he was named an audit supervisor, a position he held until February of 1985. Thus, he has seen all sides of his job.

Ricketts earned an associate arts degree from Anderson College in 1969, and a business administration degree from Erskine College in 1971. He is also a 1967 graduate of T. L. Hanna High School in Anderson. After his graduation from Erskine, he entered merchandise management with the J.C. Penney Company of Greenville and Anderson. He worked for that company between 1972 and 1976, until he began his career with the University on May 28, 1976.

The native of Anderson has also completed the College Business Management Institute at the University of Kentucky. He is a member of the College Athletic Business Managers' Association and the Institute of Internal Auditors. Ricketts has previously served as secretary of the Clemson Recreation Advisory Committee for six years.

Ricketts and his wife, Kathey, have two children, Chesley (19) and Lindsey (15). His wife is employed in the Payroll/ Benefits Office at Clemson University.



Bobby Robinson

Athletic Director

The Clemson athletic program's commitment to excellence begins with Athletic Director Bobby Robinson. The program has been on the rise in just about all forms of athletics in recent years. Robinson's commitment to success in competition, academics and facilities has been the key to the level of distinction that the program has maintained during his 13 years as the director.

Clemson had another successful season on the field in 1997-98. Seven different teams were ranked in their sport's final top 25. Clemson joined North Carolina and Washington as the only schools in the nation to have a team in a bowl game, the NCAA men's and women's basketball tournaments, and the NCAA Baseball Tournament.

It was also a landmark year academically. Clemson had a record number of student-athletes earn a spot on the ACC Academic Honor Roll. Nine of the 14 programs had a GPA higher than the student body average. The teams combined for a 2.69 GPA for the spring of 1998, highest on record.

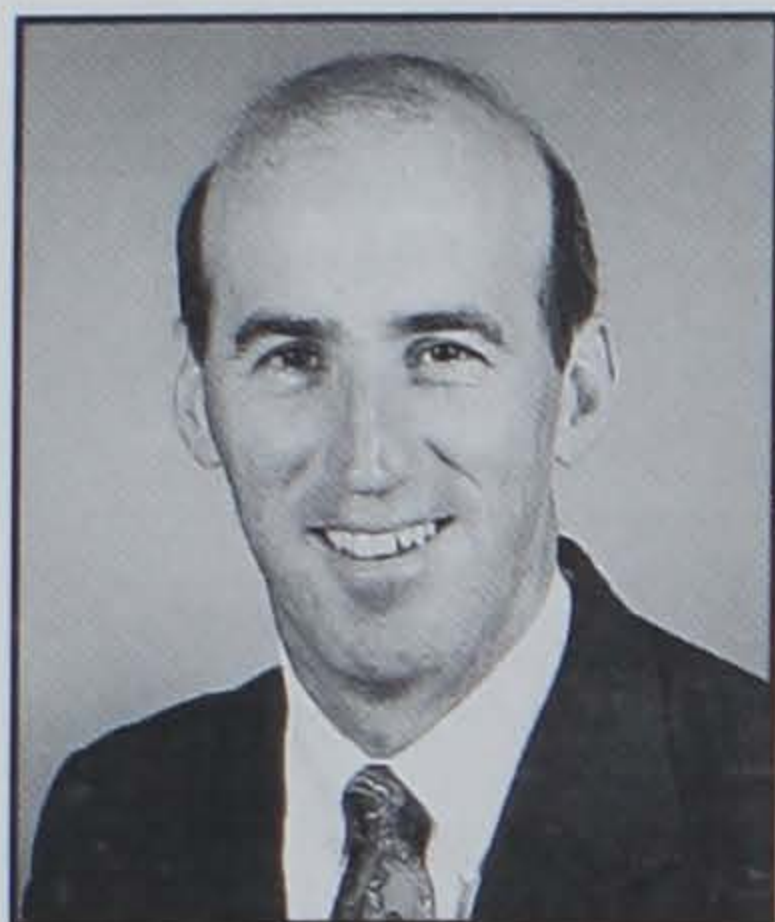
Under the direction of Robinson, the athletic department continues to support the university. Nearly \$4.0 million has been contributed to the athletic academic scholarship fund; and band travel equipment, uniforms, and many other projects are funded by the department for the overall benefit of the student body.

Robinson graduated from Furman with a B.S. degree in business and political science in 1968. He was the president of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity chapter at Furman. Robinson came to Clemson in 1970 to work in the housing office and after three years, he moved across campus to serve as an administrative assistant in the athletic department.

After serving the athletic department in various capacities, he became business manager in 1975. Two years later he was named assistant athletic director, and in 1980 he became associate AD. He held that title for six years, and his area of responsibility moved to primarily football and basketball. The native of Columbia became Athletic Director in March of 1985.

While serving his administrative duties, Robinson found time to coach the Clemson golf team between 1975 and 1983. During his time as the head coach, Clemson won its first ACC title in golf and three times the Tigers participated in the NCAA Tournament. In 1983, his final season as the head coach, he guided Clemson to a number-five finish.

Robinson has served on the NCAA golf committee, the CFA Board of Directors, the Division I-A Certification Committee, ACC Long Range Planning Committee, ACC Booking Office Committee, ACC Committee on Infractions and Penalties, ACC Gender Equity Committee, ACC Golf Committee, and ACC Committee to Study Football in the 1990's. He currently serves on the NCAA Championships and Competition Cabinet and is a member of the NCAA Bowl Certification and Football Issues Committee.



John Seketa

Assistant AD/Promotions

The first 11 years at Clemson have seen John Seketa do just about everything in the area of promotions. From promoting the 1987 NCAA Soccer Final Four, ACC Championships, Barnyard Burn, LateNight with

Rick Barnes, Director of the Centennial Football Celebration, to being a Sector Coordinator for baseball at the 1996 Atlanta Summer Olympics, Seketa has significant varied experience. However, 1997 added another task, as he was given the additional responsibility of being the Director for PAWVISION.

Thanks to the support of the Clemson Sports Network, who purchased the new video screen, Clemson became one of the first college campuses east of the Mississippi to have an instant replay board in its football stadium. Built by Daktronics, PAWVISION is operated by a staff of 20 Clemson students and staff. Using four television camera and two Venus 7000 computers, the giant screen can show live action, replays, animation, out-of-town scores and updated statistics.

PAWVISION provided numerous highlights during 1997 for the players and fans. One such highlight received national recognition on The CBS Morning News, Hard Copy and several other television stations when it was able to surprise Clemson alum, Jane Robelot with her engagement announcement. This past Spring, PAWVISION again received national attention when it played host to a wrestling viewing party, an activity organized by the Clemson Resident Hall Association. Highlights from this party were shown on TNT's WCW Monday Night Nitro television show.

Prior to arriving in Clemson, Seketa was the promotions director at Eastern Illinois University where he promoted all sports. In 1985, he staged a Make-Believe TV Football Game between Eastern Illinois and Western Illinois with ESPN, which was cited in the **New York Times**. After one year at Eastern Illinois, Seketa headed to the sunny south and Clemson for the 1986-87 academic year.

Seketa is a March 1981 graduate of Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville. After receiving his Bachelor's degree in business administration, Seketa worked as a computer operator for three years for the Shell Oil Company in Wood River, Illinois. His work in athletics began at Western Illinois where he attended graduate school followed by an internship at the University of Illinois.



Alphonso Smith

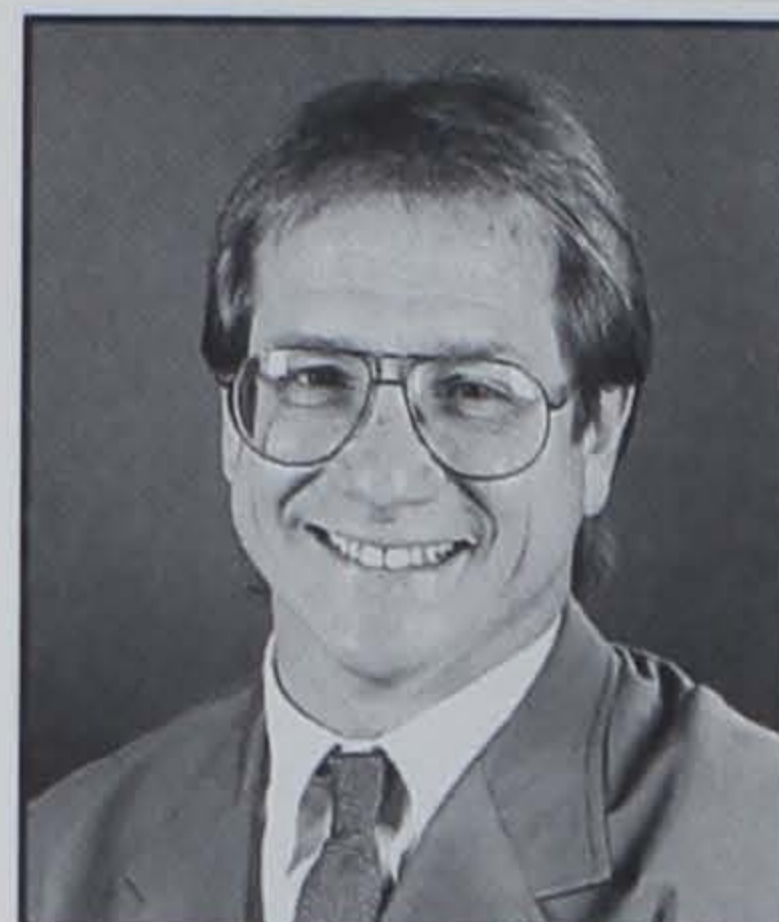
Head Equipment Manager/Football

Working with Boyd Epley, Director of Nebraska's Husker Power Program, and the Nebraska Strength Training Staff, Wade became one of the founding members of the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA).

In 1980, at age 24, he became the Detroit Lions' first strength and conditioning coach. During his five seasons in the NFL, the Lions went to the playoffs twice and won the NFC Central in 1983. He received much credit for the Lions' immediate improvement as Head Coach Monte Clark took pride in Wade's work and results on the field.

In his 12 seasons in strength training at Clemson, 11 of Wade's assistants have become head strength and conditioning coaches at the collegiate or NFL level.

Wade, who was born in Nebraska City, NE, earned 10 varsity letters at Weeping Water HS. He was all-conference in football for three seasons and was second-team all-state his senior year. Wade is married to the former Andree' Langlais.



Linda White

Associate AD/Senior
Women's Administrator

On July 9, 1992, the Clemson Athletic Department lost a fine coach, but gained an outstanding administrator when Linda White, the winningest volleyball coach in

Clemson history with a 138-81 career mark, assumed the position of Assistant Director of Compliance/Senior Woman's Administrator. In 1993, White was promoted to Associate AD and retained her title as Senior Women's Administrator.

White represents Clemson at all university, conference and NCAA functions in the role of Senior Women's Administrator. She serves as the Chair of the ACC Track committee, and vice-chair of ACC Volleyball committee, the chair of the ACC Gender Equity Committee.

White represents the athletic department at NCAA events, submits bids to host NCAA events and coordinates the events if Clemson is awarded the bid. She has managed 11 NCAA events in her career and five ACC Championships. White serves as the recruiting coordinator for the department, schedules athletic facilities, coordinates clinics and summer camps, and oversees the Courtesy Vehicle Program. White also coordinates the publication of the Student-Athlete Handbook, oversees the Sports Information Department and Promotions Department and the Director of Game Management.

White came to Clemson in 1986 as the head volleyball coach. She led the Clemson squad to six consecutive 20-win seasons. White coached at least one All-ACC player five of her six years at the helm of the Clemson program, while two of her former players were named Academic All-Americans.

Prior to her stint as volleyball coach at Clemson, White was a



successful basketball and volleyball coach at Wando High School in Mount Pleasant, SC for 14 years. In 1982, she was named National Volleyball Coach-of-the-Year by the National High School Coaches Association.

White earned her undergraduate degree from Winthrop College.

She earned a M Ed in Administration and Supervision from Clemson in August of 1988. She is married to Roger White. They have one child, Slater Martin White, who is a one year old. Their daughter Lucia lost her life in an auto accident in 1995.

Constantine W. "Deno" Curris began his fourth year at the helm of Clemson University with a heightened sense of optimism and determination — and for good reason. Not only had he won a personal battle against cancer; he also had succeeded in building consensus among faculty, staff, students, and trustees about the University's direction for the future.

That direction is spelled out in a new mission statement and a set of implementing concepts adopted by the Board of Trustees at Curris' request earlier this year. The president's personal contribution was a statement of Clemson's vision: To be the nation's premier land-grant university.

No small order, but Curris believes the faculty, staff, students, alumni, and friends are up to the task. Speaking at the spring general faculty meeting, Curris outlined areas where Clemson needs to excel in

order to achieve its potential. He challenged the University to:

- Increase access to Clemson without compromising academic standards, working to raise achievement at the middle and high school levels;

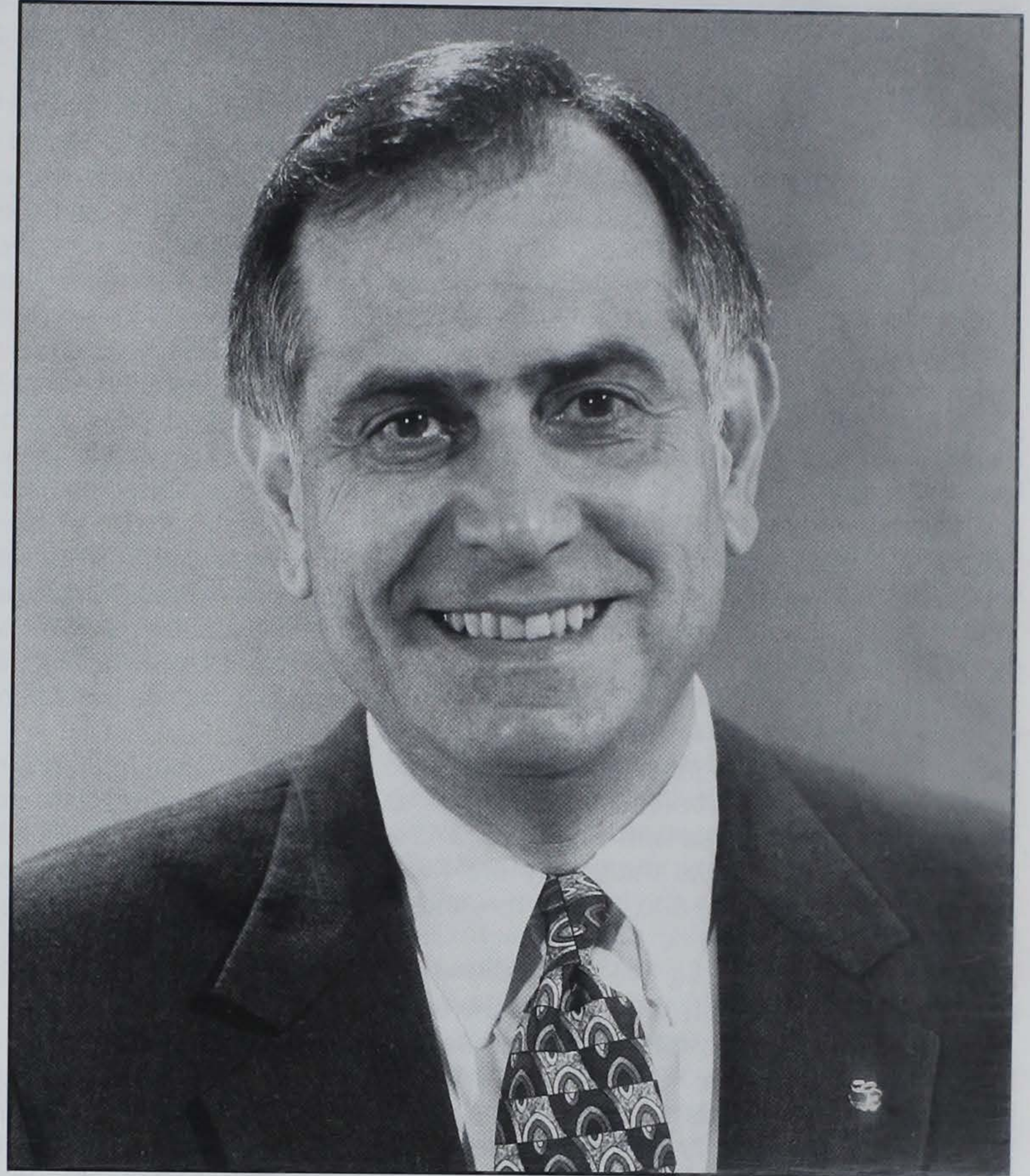
- Provide an educational experience second to none, bridging the gap between research and teaching;

- Create a distinctive core curriculum built around liberal arts and sciences, and emphasizing communication ability, critical thinking, ethical judgment, global awareness, scientific knowledge, and technological understanding;

- Expand research activity, particularly in areas where the University can achieve national and international distinction.

"Clemson's size and its rich tradition of faculty-student interaction give us decided advantage to become the nation's premier land-grant university," he said. "We have never embraced the concept of feedlot education, and we have benefited from a physical setting that permits the reinforcement of the curricular by the co-curricular. If there is a will to be the best, we can be."

Curris is not one to shrink from difficult challenges. After successful tenures as president at two other universities — Murray State in Kentucky and Northern Iowa — Curris quickly began to make his mark at Clemson. Progress has been made during his administration on a number of fronts: Expanding the University's information technology infrastructure, enhancing the sense of community and appreciation for traditions that add to the Clemson experience, and involving more alumni and friends in the life of the University through initiatives such as the Commission on the Future of Clemson University — a compre-



hensive advisory group involving more than 200 leaders in business and the professions.

A native of Lexington, Kentucky, Curris received a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Kentucky, a master's in political science and public administration from the University of Illinois, and a doctorate in higher education from the University of Kentucky.

Curris is also a national leader in higher education. He is a past Chairman of the Board of Directors of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and was a featured participant in a 1997 national video teleconference on "The New Public University: How Do We Compete in a Changing Environment?" Curris is also one of 25 presidents currently serving on the national Kellogg Commission on the Future of Land-Grant Universities and is South Carolina's representative on the Commission on the Future of the South.

When his schedule permits, Curris enjoys gardening, fishing, and reading. He is married to Jo Hern Curris, a tax attorney and author, and they have a son, Robert Alexander, and a daughter, Elena Diane.

Whether it's walking to the Agriculture Sales Center to have a milkshake or taking a stroll through the Botanical Gardens or even taking part in a pick-up basketball game at Fike Recreation Center, there are plenty of activities for Clemson students when they are not in the classroom.

The campus is in a picturesque setting in upstate South Carolina. It is surrounded by mountains and Lake Hartwell, which borders the west side of campus and is in walking distance of Littlejohn Coliseum. The beach area on campus provides a relaxing setting for study, recreation, and reflection.

Clemson has more than 230 student organizations that are active on campus, including 23 social fraternities and 14 social sororities. There are organizations related to every course of study. For students who enjoy writing or photography, the Tiger, the campus newspaper, TAPS, the university yearbook; or the Chronicle, the student variety magazine, are available. For those who are interested in broadcasting there is a student-operated radio station, WSBF-FM, broadcasting news, information, and music 24 hours a day.



Located in the University Union are the offices of the student government. Student government gives students the opportunity to influence campus policy. Also in the University Union is the campus entertainment center. There are lounges, bowling alleys, video games, billiard tables, and Edgar's all located at the campus entertainment center. A new student union is currently under construction and should be completed in 1999.

Fike Recreation Center has a host of opportunities for students to let off steam through physical activity. Inside Fike is an eight-lane swimming pool, a diving tank, two gyms used for basketball and other activities, various weight lifting facilities, and room for aerobics. Outside Fike are several spacious fields used for the extensive intramural program and for student enjoyment. There are indoor and lighted outdoor tennis courts across the street from Fike at the Hoke A. Sloan Tennis Center.

Mick Jagger, Elton John, Billy Joel, The Eagles, and U2 have all performed at Death Valley in recent years.



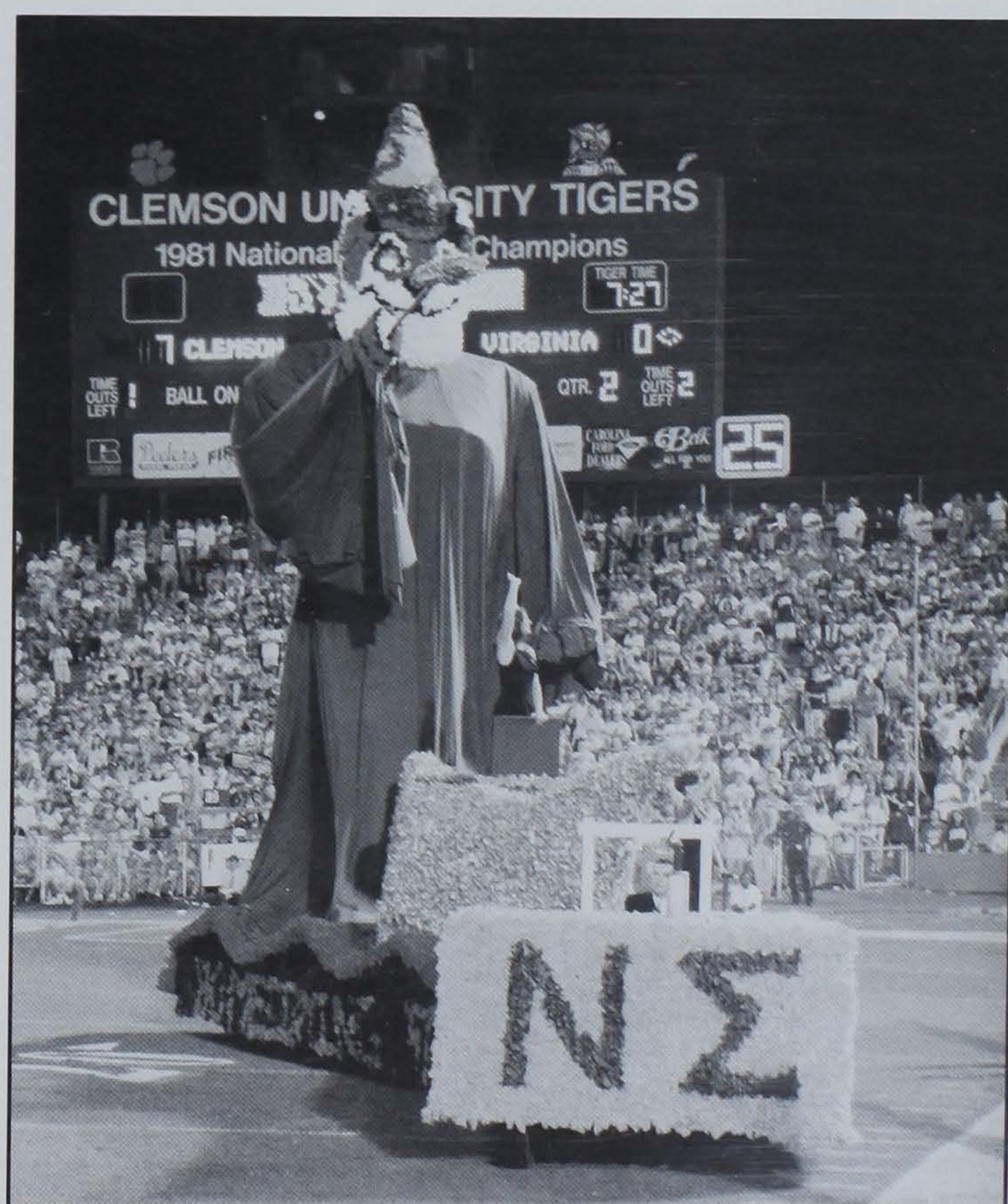

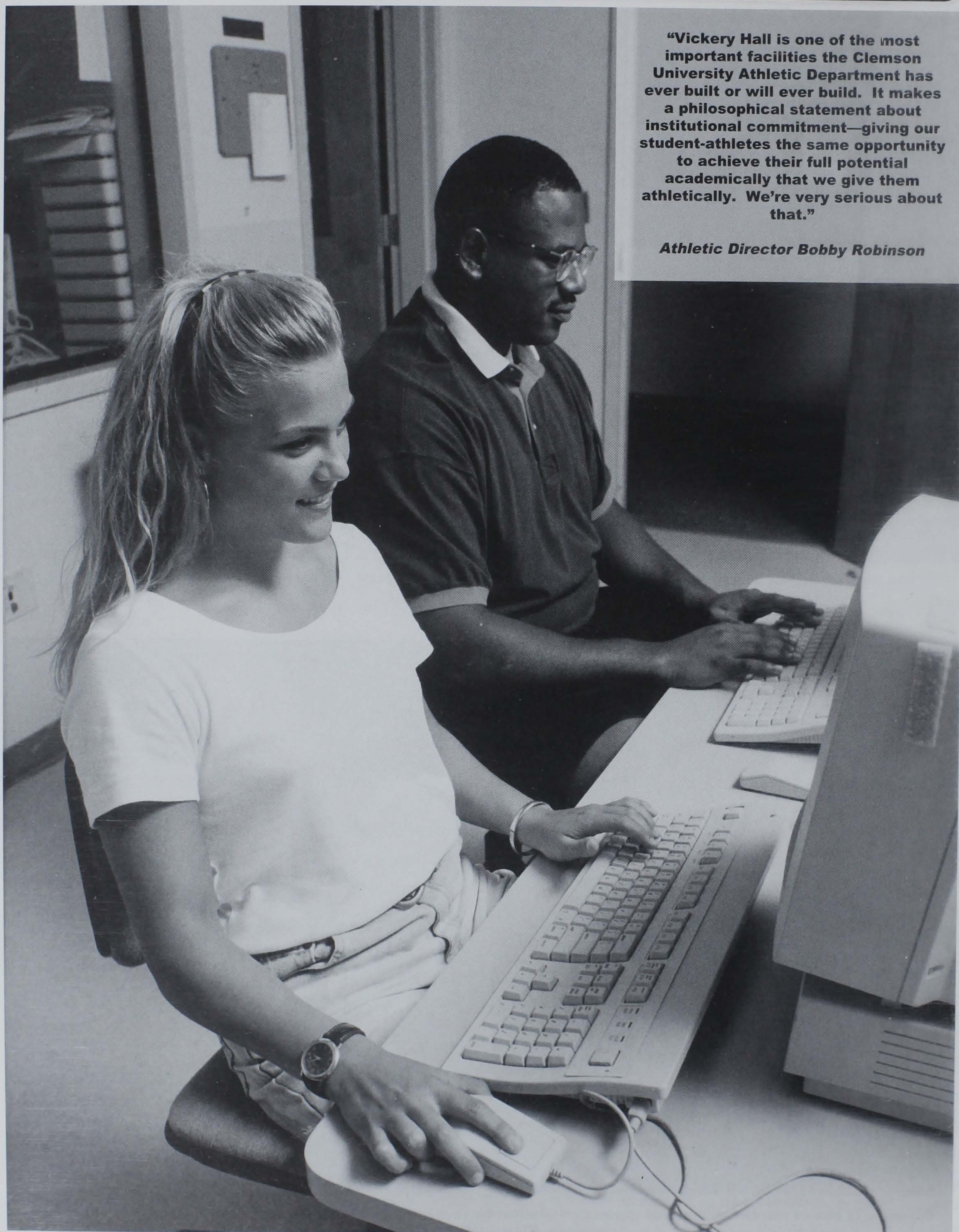

Clemson University's commitment to provide its student-athletes with the very best of facilities is evident in many ways. From the soaring upper decks of Memorial Stadium, to the state-of-the-art strength training facility, young men and women from all 19 of Clemson's varsity sports have the very best in facilities for training and competition. Vickery Hall is no exception, as the \$3 million structure is as impressive aesthetically as any of the other facilities. But the importance of Vickery Hall to the Clemson University Athletic Department is not found in the structure itself, but in the many programs that the building houses.

Vickery Hall opened in the spring of 1991 and was the first in the country built solely for the all-around education of student-athletes. The two-story, 27,000 square-foot building is open throughout the day and into the evening to accommodate the extended schedules of student-athletes.

The mission of the Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs is to monitor, guide, and encourage student-athletes to fulfill their long term goal, and to achieve their academic and career potential.

Vickery Hall focuses on three primary areas to meet the student-athlete's needs.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Clemson's Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs have provided one of the best academic support and advising programs in the nation.

The proof is in the statistics. A record number of Clemson student-athletes made the academic honor roll in 1997. The student athletes had a record 2.69 GPA in the spring of 1998, just .05 from the overall student body GPA of 2.74. That is the closest gap on record.

Twenty Clemson football players were on the ACC academic honor roll for the 1996-97 academic year, an all-time record. The Tiger football team had an all-time record GPA for the entire year in 1997-98. The Academic Counselor performs a variety of duties to track academic progress. Their duties include providing assistance in registration and priority scheduling, contacting faculty, personally checking classes, recording information, counseling sessions with student-athletes, providing diagnostic testing, and directing career aspirations.

One of the most prestigious programs that has received recognition essential to the growth of Vickery Hall is the tutorial program.

The Student-Athlete Enrichment Program has been granted a Level 1 certification from the College of Reading and Learning Association, International Tutor Certification Program. Of the 160 programs certified by CRLA, the Clemson Student-Athlete Enrichment Program is one of three student-athlete programs in the country to achieve this distinction.

Having tutor certification enables student-athletes to be provided the highest quality of academic assistance possible. Approximately 80 tutors are hired to provide academic support in the many subject areas offered.

The Department of Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs has recognized the need for students to have access to high-quality computing equipment and has made a commitment to provide the student-athletes at Clemson with the largest computer lab in the country. Located on the first floor of Vickery Hall is the Department of Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs' Microcomputer Laboratory. The lab is open seven days a week, for 16 hours on Monday through Thursday, and

limited time on Saturday and Sunday. During exam periods the lab hours are extended.

The lab staff has a full-time computer manager in Steve Coleman, and also graduate students, many of whom are pursuing advanced degrees in computer science. Lab staff members are available for tutoring of any Computer Science course, as well as the many management, engineering and business courses that deal with personal computers.

The Student-Athlete Enrichment Program is committed to providing state-of-the-art computing facilities. New computers have recently been purchased bringing the lab to a state of the art facility. Over 40 computers are available for student-athletes.

All computers are fully connected to the internet allowing for access of computers throughout the world for research and communication.

PERSONAL GROWTH PROGRAM

One of the most important programs that helps student-athletes reach their full potential and engage successfully in this college experience is the Personal Growth and Development Program.

The purpose of this program is to assist the student-athlete in making a successful transition into his/her university and athletic life. These programs will provide the student-athlete the opportunity to examine and explore issues and topics pertaining to his/her values, personal health and wellness, behavior, and goals. The specific topics will encompass both general transition issues and specific athletic issues as well.

CAREER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

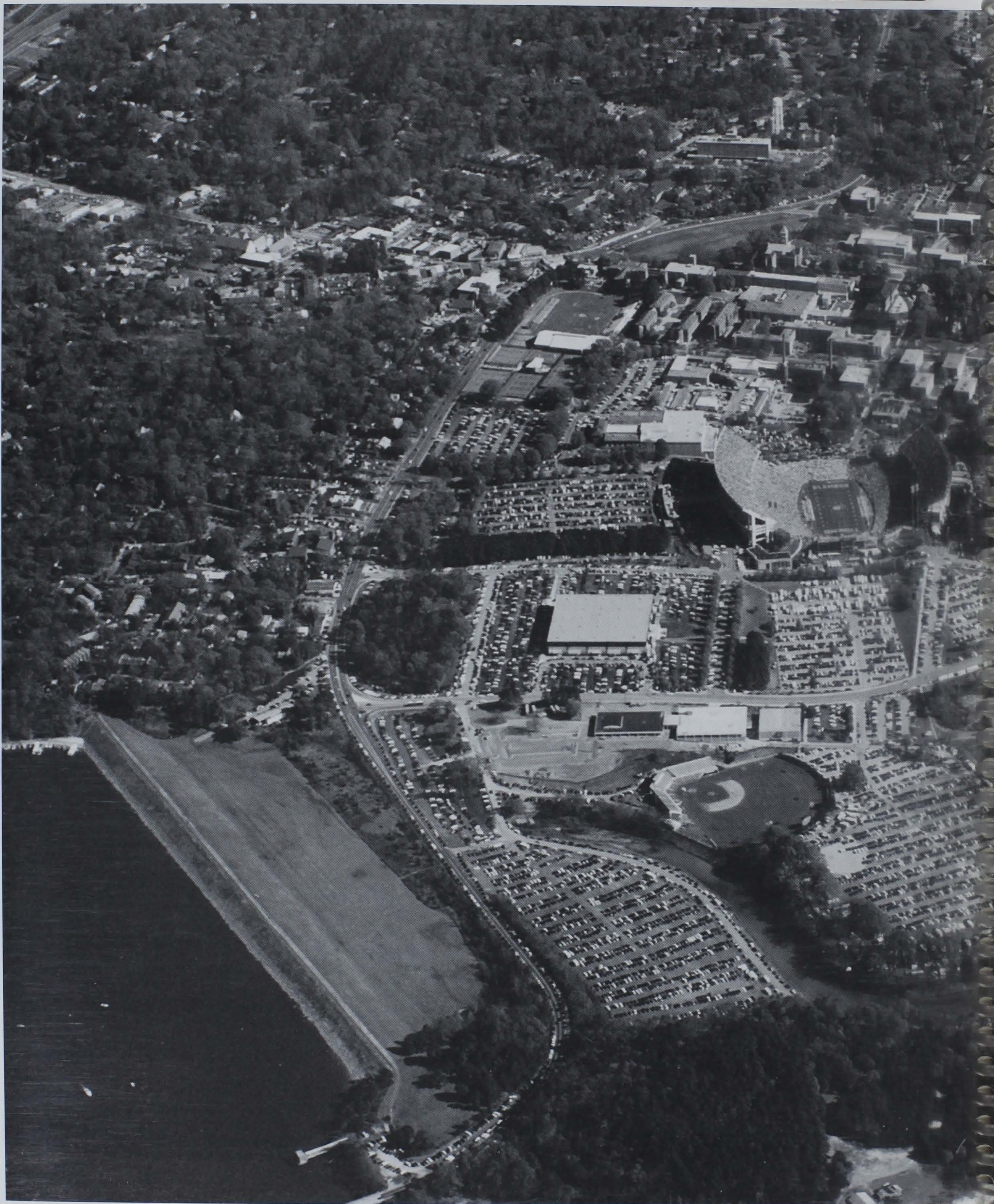
The Career Assistance Program provides student-athletes an opportunity to fulfill career aspirations by participating in various career seminars offered by the staff at Vickery Hall. The philosophy of this program is to provide student-athletes with job searching skills and strategies, internships, practicum experience as well as summer employment. These programs are designed to address specific career opportunities through a program that uses each year to gain information on the student-athletes.

By using the resources available to the University, Alumni Center and the Athletic Department, the staff is working to establish a network of businesses, companies, and executives who will help assist with The Summer Employment Assistance Program. The program's main goal is to provide the student-athlete with job experience and a work history, which he or she can apply to his or her academic discipline.

The Career Assistance Program is coordinated from the academic colleges, the Placement Center, and through the Athletic Department contacts. This program is designed to better prepare the student-athlete for full-time employment and focuses on resume writing and interview techniques.

The signs on the side of the highway as you enter the Clemson city limits say "Clemson: In Season Every Season." From the point of view of most Clemson graduates, the seasons this slogan speaks of are football, basketball, baseball, etc. But a drive through town in the middle of spring, when the azaleas and dogwoods are in full bloom, or a walk through campus in October, when the trees are blazing in the brilliant colors of autumn, will leave little doubt that Clemson is indeed in season, every season.

Nestled in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains and caressed by the shores of the beautiful Lake Hartwell, Clemson is located in the northwestern corner of South Carolina, two hours north of Atlanta, GA, and two hours southwest of Charlotte, NC. The town may not be one of the state's largest most days of the week, but on many autumn Saturdays, it becomes the second-largest city, as 81,000 fans come from all directions to watch the Tigers play football, but the friendly residents of Clemson and the surrounding towns welcome the visitors home each year with a true dose of southern hospitality.

The area boasts a great variety of restaurants, ranging from the downtown barbeque and hamburger spots, to the historic Liberty Hall Inn. Any palate or budget can find something to his or her liking, as over 50 eating establishments are located in the Clemson/Pendleton/Central area. The area adopts Clemson Fever, as Tiger Paws are omnipresent on local billboards and entrances.

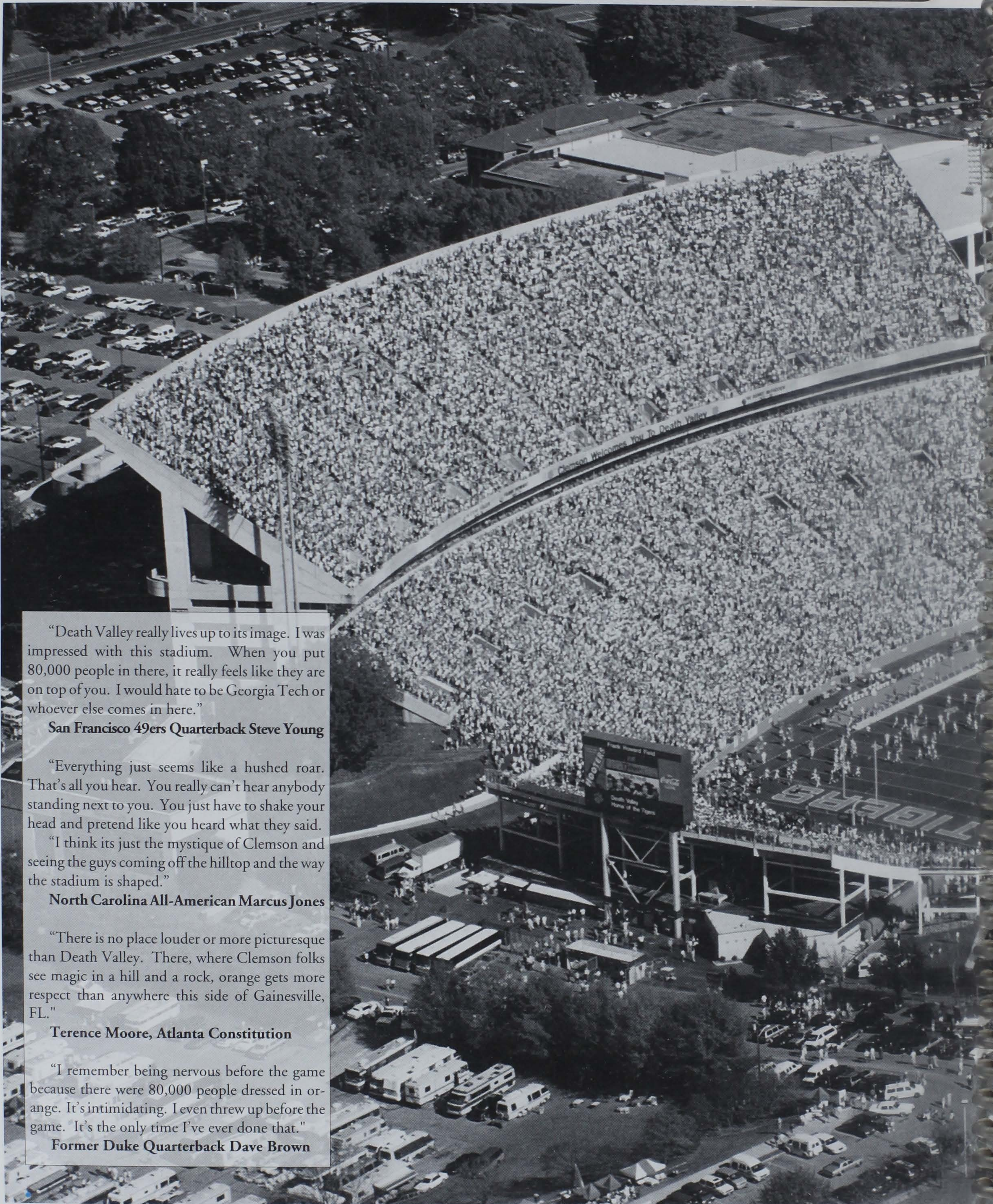
The mild climate of the foothills lends itself to many outdoor activities throughout the year. Clemson has excellent and ample facilities for tennis and golf, fishing, swimming or hiking, white water rafting, and various other pursuits.

And, when one wants to leave Clemson, they don't have far to go to find whatever they are looking for. Professional sports are only a couple of hours away in Atlanta and Charlotte. Clemson was the home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers for eight regular season and two exhibition games in 1995.

For sun and fun, it's an easy interstate drive to the coast of South Carolina, to Hilton Head Island, Myrtle Beach, or even historic Charleston. All kinds of water sports are right at the campus' back door, as a 926-mile shoreline borders the edge of campus. And for those who enjoy cooler climates, the mountains of North Carolina are only an hour's drive away.

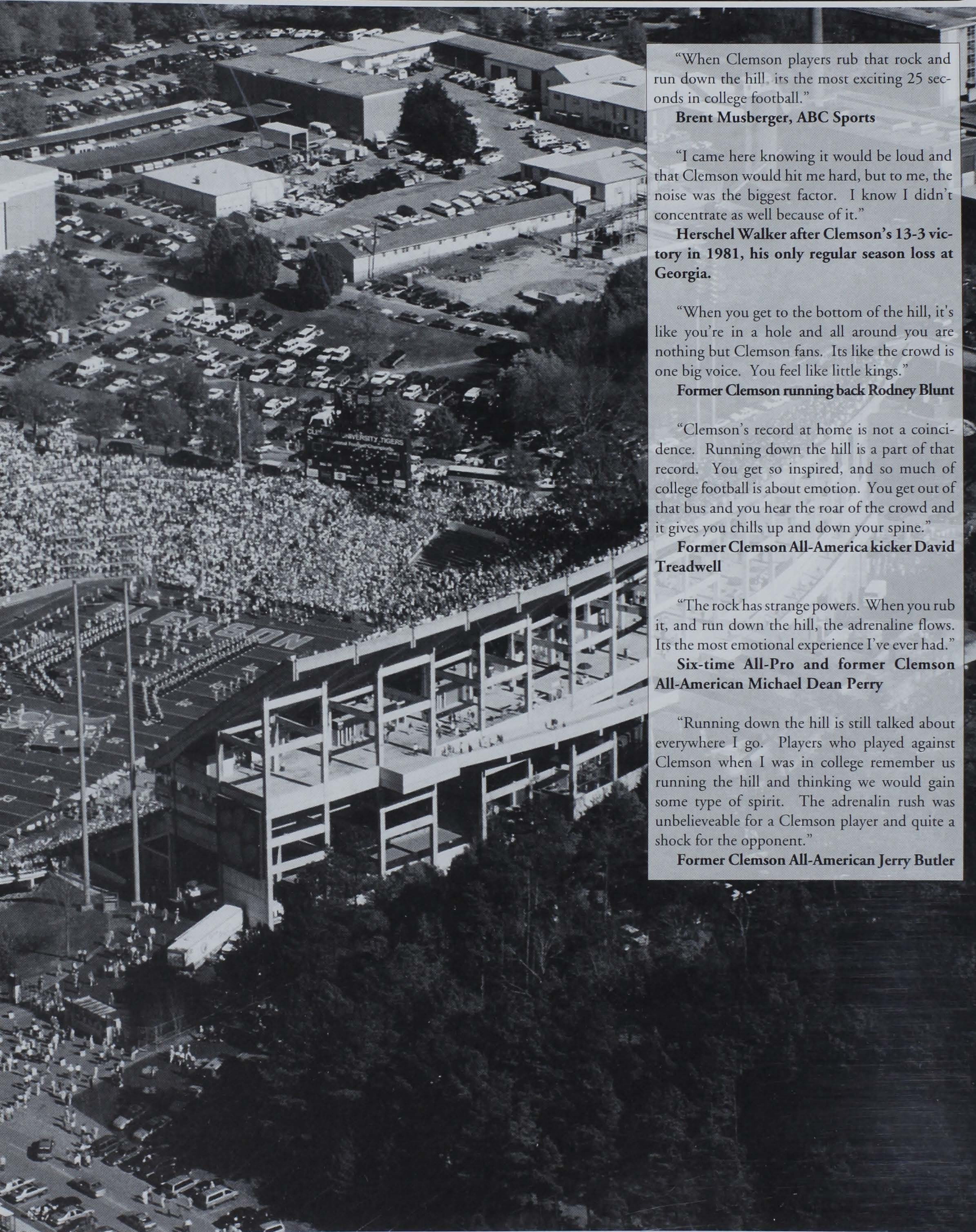

Memorial Stadium

In 1991, two very special anniversaries in the Clemson football tradition were observed. Not only did the 1991 season mark the 10th anniversary of Clemson's National Championship season, but it also marked the 50th birthday of the place where the Tigers won six games that season: Memorial Stadium.

In the first 56 years of Memorial Stadium, Clemson has a record of 197-74-7, including a 32-11-1 ledger over the last seven seasons. Clemson had a 16-game unbeaten streak at home between 1990-92 and has a career winning ratio of 72.0 percent.

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers who call it home, but the stadium was constructed against the advice of at least one Clemson coach. Just before head coach Jess Neely left for Rice University after the 1939 season, he gave Clemson a message. "Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the Y.M.C.A. That's all you'll ever need".

Instead of following Coach Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The place would take some clearing-there were many trees, but luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work: clearing, cutting, pouring, and forming. Finally, on September 19, 1942, Clemson Memorial Stadium opened with the Tiger football team thrashing Presbyterian College, 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for Opening Day would soon grow; and grow and grow. This year Clemson celebrates its 57th year in this outstanding facility.

When the original part of the stadium was built in the early 40's, much of the work was done by scholarship athletes, including many football players. The first staking out of the stadium was done by two members of the football team, A.N. Cameron and Hugh Webb. Webb returned to Clemson years later to be an architecture professor, and Cameron went on to become a civil engineer in Louisiana.

The building of the stadium did not proceed without a few problems. One day during the clearing of the land, one young football player proudly announced that he was not allergic to poison oak. He then commenced to attack the poison oak with a swing blade, throwing the plants to and fro. The next day, however, the boy was swollen twice his size and had to be put in the hospital.

There are many other stories about the

stadium including one stating that Frank Howard put a chew of tobacco in each corner of the stadium as the concrete poured.

Howard says that the seeding of the grass caused a few problems. "About 40 people and I laid sod on the field," he says. "After three weeks, on July 15, we had only gotten halfway through.

"I told them that it had taken us three weeks to get that far, and I would give them three more week's pay for however long it took. I also told them we would have 50 gallons of ice cream when we got through. After that it took them three days to do the rest of the field. Then we sat down in the middle of the field and ate up that whole 50 gallons."

Howard says that on the day of the first game in the stadium, "the gates were hung at 1:00 pm and we played at 2:00 pm." But that would be all of the construction for a while. Then in 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added and, in 1960, a total of 5,658 West end zone seats were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large end zone, "Green Grass" section, this expansion increased capacity to about 53,000.

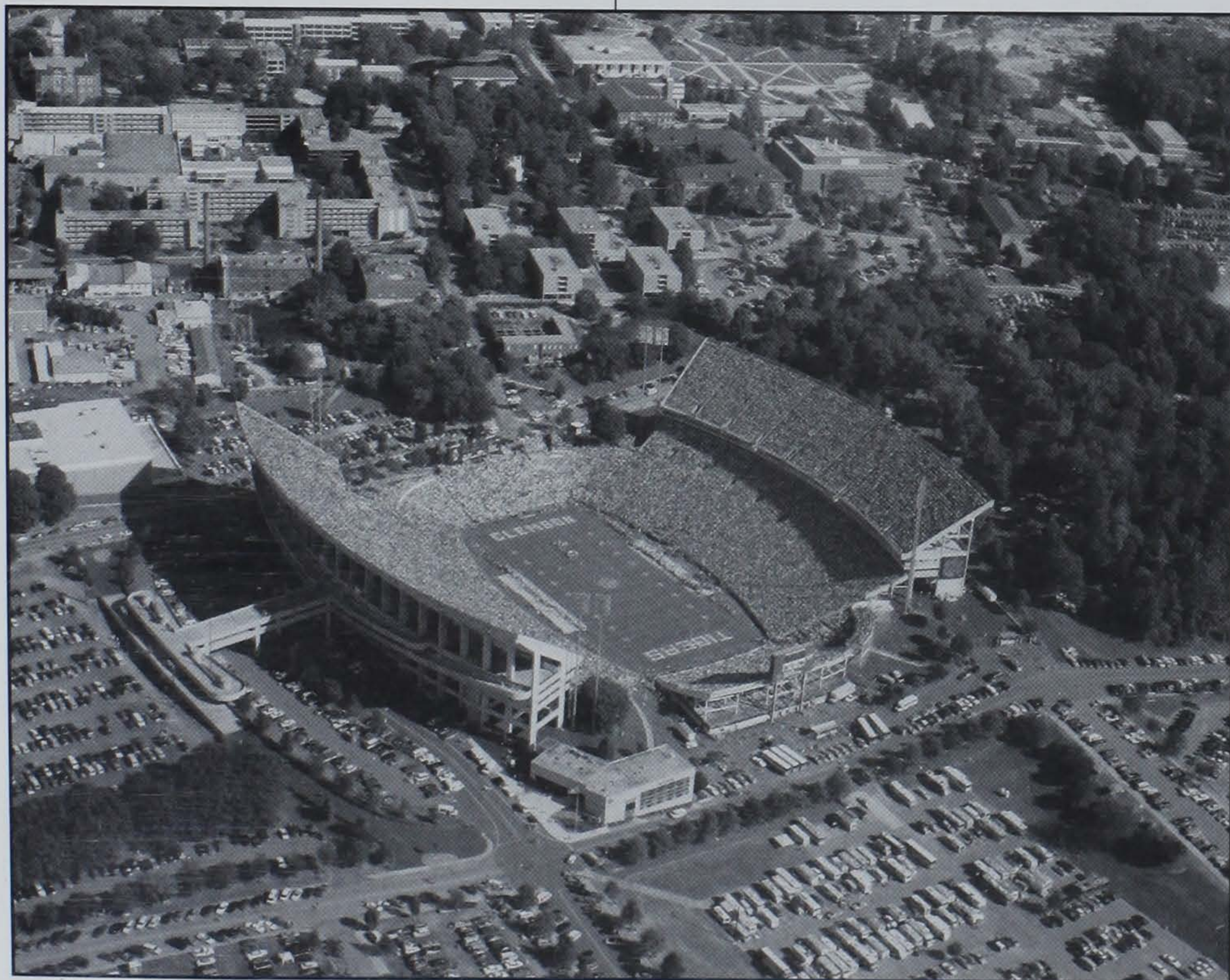
Later, upper decks were added to each side of the stadium as crowds swelled-the first one in 1978 and the second in 1983. This increased capacity to over 80,000 which makes it one of the 10 largest on-campus stadiums in the country.

The effect spiraling inflation has had in this century can be dramatically seen in the differences in stadium construction. The original part of the stadium was built at a cost of \$125,000 or at \$6.25 a seat. The newest upper deck was finished in 1983 at a cost of \$13.5 million, or \$866 a seat.

Through the years, Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death Valley." It was tagged this by the late Presbyterian coach, Lonnie McMillan. After bringing his P.C. teams to Clemson for years and getting whipped, McMillan said the place was like Death Valley. A few years later the name stuck.

On November 16, 1974 the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach because of his long service and dedication to the University.

Luckily, the stadium wasn't built behind the Y.



Clemson has had 27 crowds over 80,000 in Death Valley, including the 1995 Georgia game that kicked off the Centennial of Clemson football.

Running Down the Hill



The most exciting 25 seconds in college football



What has been described as, "the most exciting 25 seconds in college football from a color and pageantry standpoint," actually started out as a matter-of-fact entrance, mainly because of necessity.

The first 20,000 seats in Clemson Memorial Stadium were built and ready for use before the 1942 season. Less than a year before Pearl Harbor was bombed and the United States was at war.

The shortest entry into the stadium was a walk down Williamson Road from Fike Field House's dressing rooms to a gate at the top of the hill behind the east end zone. There were no dressing facilities in the west end zone—only a big clock where the hands turned, and a scoreboard, which was operated by hand.

The team would dress at Fike, walk down Williamson Road, come in the gate underneath where the big scoreboard now stands and jog down the hill for its warmup exercises. There was no fanfare, no cannon shot fired, no tiger paw flag, no Tiger Rag played...just the team making its entrance and lining up to do the side straddle hop.

That's pretty much the way things went for the next 25 years.

Either in 1964 or 1965, S.C. Jones, a member of the Clemson class of 1919, made a trip to California. He stopped at a spot in Death Valley, CA, and picked up this white flint rock. He presented it to Coach Frank Howard as being from Death Valley, CA, to Death Valley, South Carolina."

The rock laid on the floor in Howard's office in Fike for a year or more. One day Howard was cleaning up his office and he told Gene Willimon, who was the executive secretary of IPTAY, to, "take this rock and throw it over the fence, or out in the ditch...do something with it, but get it out of my office."

Willimon didn't think that was the way a rock should be treated. After all, it had been brought 3000 miles by a very sincere Tiger fan.

By the mid-sixties, Memorial Stadium was pretty well living up to its moniker, Death Valley, because of

the number of victories that had been recorded there. Actually, the name was first used by the late Lonnie McMillian, head coach at Presbyterian College in Clinton in the 1940s.

McMillian and the other Blue Hose coaches before him used to open the season each year by coming to Clemson. Seldom scoring (24 shut outs in 39 games) and with only three wins and four ties to show for it, his teams were getting killed by the Tigers regularly. In 1948 McMillian made the comment to the press that he was taking his team to

play Clemson in Death Valley.

An occasional reference to Memorial stadium by that name could be heard for the next three or four years, but when Howard started calling it 'Death Valley' in the 1950's, the name took off like wildfire. The Tigers celebrated the 50th season in the 'valley' in 1991.

But getting back to Howard's rock.

The rock was mounted on a pedestal at the top of the hill. It was unveiled September 24, 1966, on a day when Clemson played Virginia. The Tigers were down 18 points with 17 minutes to play and came

back to win (40-35) on a 65-yard pass play from Jimmy Addison to Jacky Jackson in the fourth period. That was quite a spectacular debut for that rock.

The team members started rubbing the rock prior to running down the hill September 23, 1967, a day when Clemson defeated Wake Forest, 23-6. Prior to running down the hill that day, Howard told his players: "If you're going to give me 110 percent, you can rub that rock. If you're not, keep your filthy hands off it." Howard told of the incident the next day on his Sunday television show

and the story became legend.

When Hootie Ingram succeeded Howard as head coach prior to the 1970 season, Ingram decided that the team would make its final entrance on the field out of the dressing room in the west end zone. In all home games in 1970 and 1971 and the first four of 1972 when the Tigers did not run down the hill, their record was 6-9. The team decided it wanted to come down the hill once prior to the South Carolina game in 1972. The result, in a cold, freezing rain, was a 7-6 victory when Jimmy Williamson knocked down a two-point conversion attempt which preserved the win.

The Tigers have made the entrance for every home game since 1942, except for the seasons mentioned above—261 times heading into the 1998 season.

After Clemson's final warm-up, the team goes back into its dressing room under the west end zone stands for final game instructions. About 10 minutes before kickoff the team boards two buses, rides around behind the north stands to the east end zone and debarks to the top of the hill behind Howard's Rock.

At the appointed time, the cannon booms and led by a high-flying tiger paw flag, the band forms two lines for the team to run between and strikes up 'Tiger Rag'...The frenzy starts in all sincerity...and usually lasts two and a half to three hours.

It is a tradition that has inspired Clemson players for many years.



Clemson fans look forward to seeing tough, hard-nosed football when they come to Death Valley or travel to other schools to watch their Tigers in action. But some of the Tigers' most intense competition and action doesn't take place on autumn Saturday's and it doesn't take place on a field. Take a peek into the Clemson Strength Training Room at almost any time of day, almost any day of the week, at any time of the year, and you will see the Tigers building the foundation for their pursuit of a championship.

Perhaps the most impressive characteristic of the facility is its size. Several years ago, it was enlarged to an astounding 11,000 square feet, making it one of the largest in the nation. Two years ago, it was expanded to 14,000 square feet. The facility boasts two full lines of Nautilus machines and over 12 tons of weights. The large number of machines and free weights allows the weight room to be used by athletes from several other different sports at the same time, without anyone having to wait in line at a particular station.

Within the last year the dumbbell area and leg strength area were expanded and the facility saw the addition of the Austin Leg Drive Machine.

The plush atmosphere provides an interesting contrast to the physical exertion that takes place in the facility. When an athlete enters the etched glass doors, he is greeted by plush, wall-to-wall carpeting, walls lined with mirrors, ceiling fans, and music from a 26-speaker sound system - a worthy backdrop for well over \$500,000 worth of state-of-the-art equipment.


Four color television monitors are also positioned throughout the facility. These monitors are used for training and instruction, as Tiger strength coaches film the athletes and work with them on form correction.

The strength training staff spends long hours working around the various schedules of each sport and even takes the facility on the road when the Tiger football team plays in a bowl game.

Recently, the operation of the strength training facility was enhanced by the addition of a new computerized program. Tiger strength coaches are now able to enter all the current strength data on an athlete, and the computer will generate a 10-week conditioning program that will help the athlete reach optimum results.

Among the Best in the Nation

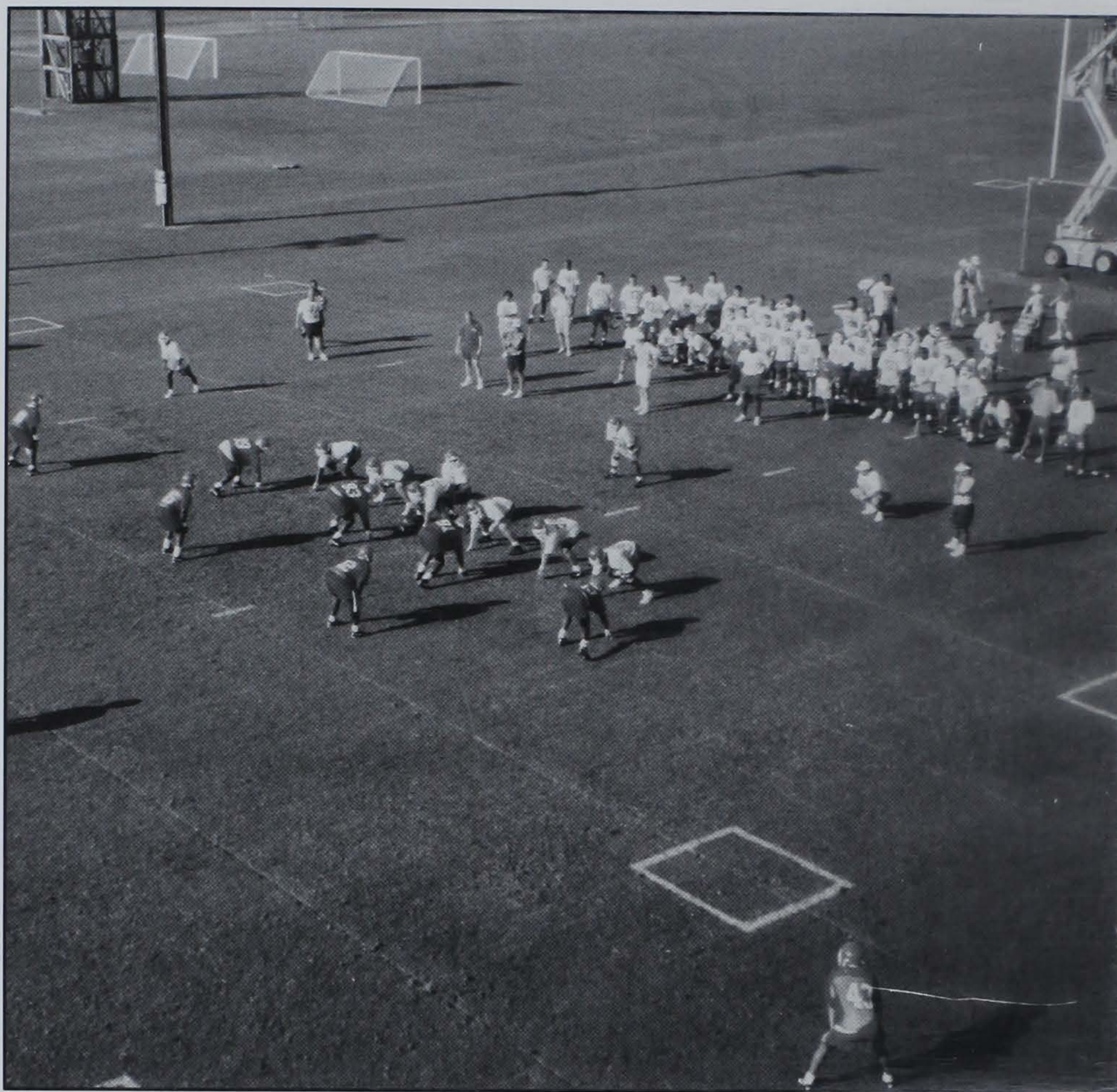


Athletes at Clemson have the opportunity to be the best they can be because few universities have better facilities. The dedicated athlete can excel at Clemson because the facilities make him a better player.

The Jervy Athletic Center and the Banks McFadden Building serve as the focal point of Clemson athletics as it houses the strength training room, the varsity locker rooms and all administrative offices. Everything is within walking distance and easily accessible from all other facilities.

The training room is one of the fine facilities in the Jervy Athletic Center. It is run by Fred Hoover, a national Hall of Fame trainer, and it houses all of the latest training equipment. Hoover heads up a staff of four full-time individuals with over 50 years of experience. This professional staff and 17 student and graduate student trainers give an athlete the best possible care.

The training room has six whirlpools, a cybex machine, numerous stationary bikes, an upper-body exerciser, a Stairmaster, and all the latest devices for all kinds of treatment. The large sauna and steam bath are also welcome sites after a tough practice. A doctor has an office in the training room itself. He is in the training room from 2:00 p.m. until closing and is of course available at all hours for special situations.

The Clemson Athletic Department continued its commitment to provide its student-athletes with the best facilities when it completed the Banks McFadden Building at the Jervy Athletic Center in 1995. The dedication of this 20,000-square-foot facility was the cornerstone of the Jervy Athletic Center renovation project that was completed in 1996. It is designed to give all Clemson gridgers the most modern and comfortable facilities in the nation.

The McFadden Building houses all the coaching offices and meeting rooms for Clemson's football team. The facility has meeting rooms for all nine position areas, so players are no longer forced to view film and discuss key strategy in a coach's cramped office. Each meeting room is equipped with "state of the art" video equipment.

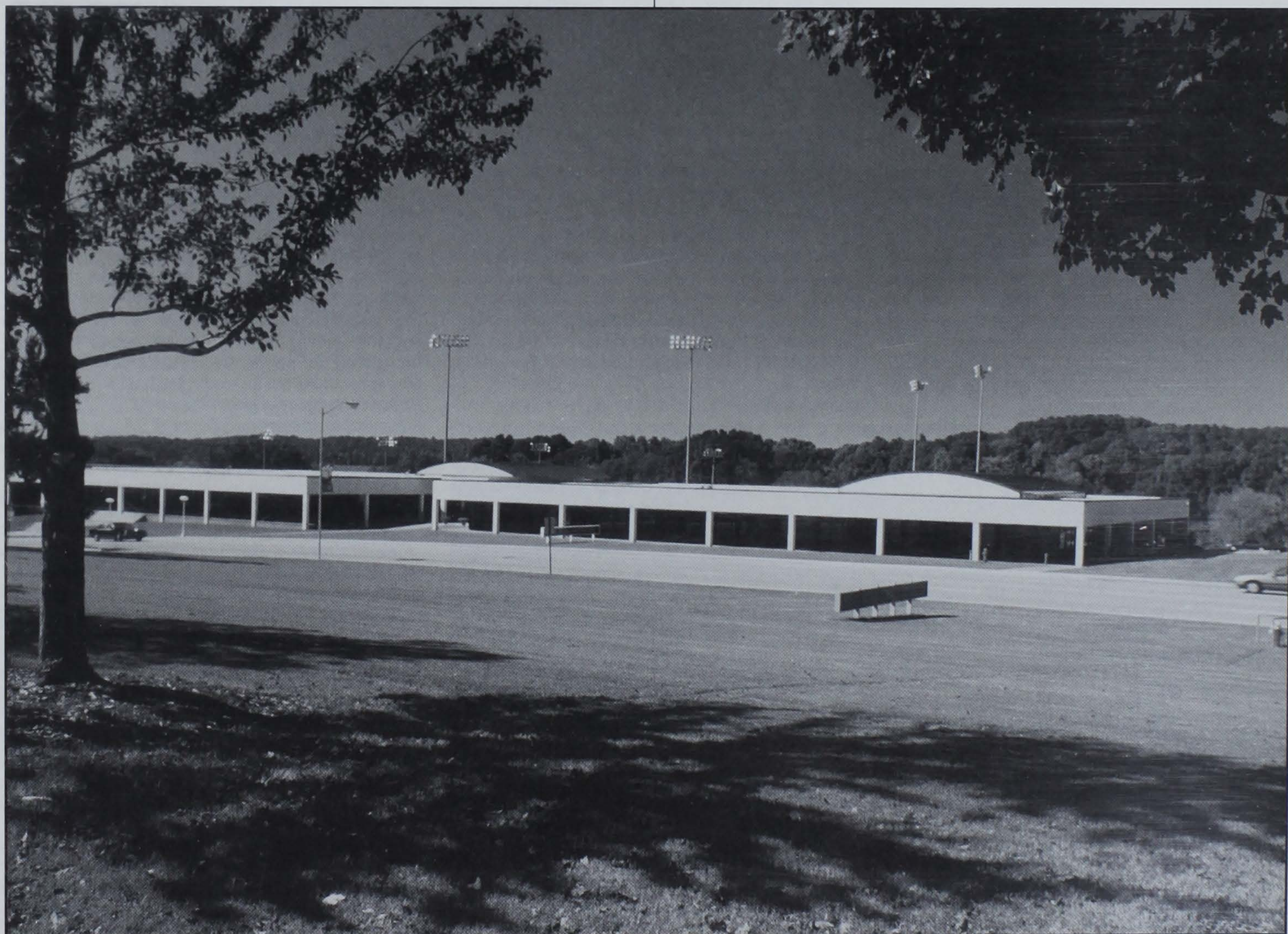
There is also an auditorium that holds as many as 180 people and is used for team meetings and press conferences. Additionally, there are private rooms for interviews with the media, a lounge, and even a pro scout facility that allows NFL representatives to view film of current Tigers in air-conditioned comfort.

The facility also houses a trophy and memorabilia area at

its entrance. Much of the area is devoted to Banks McFadden, the former Clemson All-American and coach who perhaps had as much an impact on Clemson athletic history as anyone.

The construction of the McFadden building was one of the final stages of the overall renovation of the Jervy Athletic Center. In 1995, the Tiger football team came back to a new and expanded locker room with fresh paint, new carpeting, new lockers, and more space. The training room was also expanded and a player lounge area, complete with video games and televisions, was constructed. The weight room below the Jervy Athletic Center has increased in size to an incredible 14,000 square feet.

"The completion of the McFadden building gives us outstanding facilities in every area," said Head Coach Tommy West. "We now have a stadium that is second to none as far as its appearance, tradition and ability to accommodate large crowds in a pleasant and unique setting. We have a new, modern and spacious locker room, team area and training facilities. And, the meeting and office areas are comfortable places to learn and work."

Remembering the 1981 season



THE SEASON

Sept. 5 Clemson 45, Wofford 10

Wofford, an NAIA school at the time, was a late addition to the schedule when Villanova dropped football in March, 1981. At the end of the first quarter the score was tied at 3-3. Think of the odds you could have gotten against Clemson winning the national championship at the end of that first period. Homer Jordan hit Perry Tuttle with an 80-yard touchdown pass for Clemson's first touchdown of the season and Jordan added a 14-yard run by halftime to give Clemson a 17-3 lead at intermission. Clemson won the second half 28-7, but the Terriers wingbone offense gained 165 yards on the ground. Only Nebraska had more yards rushing against Clemson that season.

Sept. 12 Clemson 13, Tulane 5

Clemson played its first ever game indoors, defeating Tulane in a defensive struggle. All five Clemson defensive backs had at least one interception and the Clemson defense forced seven turnovers overall. Tulane scored on a field goal and a safety to take a 5-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. But, Clemson's defense allowed just 40 yards rushing in the game and just 177 yards of total offense altogether. Jeff Davis had 20 tackles, while Terry Kinard had 12 tackles and an interception.

Sept. 19 Clemson 13, Georgia 3

Clemson forced the defending national champion Georgia Bulldogs into nine turnovers, still the most in history by a Clemson opponent, in defeating the fourth-ranked Vince Dooley coached team. The win is the highest ranked triumph in the history of the Death Valley. The 13-3 victory was the only regular season defeat for Georgia during the Herschel Walker era (1980-82). Clemson held a 10-0 lead at intermission in front of a frenzied Death Valley crowd on an eight-yard touchdown pass from Homer Jordan to Perry Tuttle and a 39-yard Donald Igwebuike field goal. The two teams traded field goals in the second half. Walker rushed for 111 yards in 28 attempts, but never crossed the Clemson goalline. Jordan, a native of Athens, GA, had 59 yards rushing and hit 11-18 passes for 135 yards. Clemson wore orange pants for the first time in 1981.

Oct. 3 Clemson 21, Kentucky 3

For the fourth straight game, Clemson did not lead at the end of the first period. In fact, the Wildcats had a 3-0 lead at intermission. But, Clemson took the second-half kickoff and drove 83 yards in 13 plays, as Kevin Mack went 11 yards for the touchdown. Clemson scored on its next possession after a Kentucky fumble. The Tigers drove 94 yards for a touchdown on its final scoring drive in the fourth period to win going away. Chuck McSwain, who had 107 yards rushing on 20 attempts, scored on a three-yard run to culminate the drive. Clemson outgained Kentucky 213-97 in the second half and moved to number-9 in the nation after the victory.

Oct. 10 Clemson 27, Virginia 0

Clemson opened its ACC schedule with a 27-point thrashing of Virginia, its 21st straight victory over the Cavaliers. Clemson finally took a lead at the end of the first period on a field goal by Igwebuike. Cliff Austin scored two touchdowns and Jeff McCall scored once as the Tigers gained 265 yards on the ground. Jordan connected on 9-16 passes for 161 yards.

Oct. 17 Clemson 38, Duke 10

Clemson's offense continued its improvement, especially from a balanced standpoint, and the Tiger defense held its incredible dominance in a 28-point win at Duke. Clemson gained 323 yards rushing and 240 passing. Jordan was 13-19 for 198 yards passing and added 47 on the ground. Cliff Austin had the top rushing game of the season by a Tiger with 178 yards in 19 attempts, including a non-scoring 77-yard run. Duke had 23 first downs in the game, but scored just one touchdown. The Blue Devils ran six plays from the one during one drive, yet failed to score a touchdown on the possession.

Oct. 24 Clemson 17, NC State 7

NC State scored the first rushing touchdown of the season against the Clemson defense on a 13-yard run by Larmount Lawson on the Pack's second drive of the game. But, Jeff Davis and company took control in the second half and allowed the Pack just 87 yards rushing for the entire game. Homer Jordan had just 43 yards passing, but gained 104 yards rushing in 21 attempts. Jeff

McCall locked up the game with a 15-yard touchdown run with 8:30 left. Clemson moved up to number-three in the AP poll after the game, the highest ranking in Clemson history.

Oct. 31 Clemson 82, Wake Forest 24

The Clemson offense exploded on this Halloween day game. The Tigers set 21 school, stadium and conference records, including 536 yards rushing and 756 yards of total offense. Eleven different Clemson players had rushing yardage and nine different players scored. When Craig Crawford scored on a 72-yard run, no one in the press box, nor the stadium knew who he was because he was not even on the pregame roster. Clemson was a perfect 12-12 on third-down conversions. Jordan passed for 180 yards, including 7-161 to Perry Tuttle, whose 75-yard touchdown reception on the first play of the third period gave Clemson a 55-14 lead.

Nov. 7 Clemson 10, North Carolina 8

The showdown for ACC supremacy took place in Chapel Hill. It was ninth-ranked North Carolina against second-ranked Clemson, the first meeting of top 10 ACC teams in league history. Clemson led 7-5 at halftime thanks to an 81-yard drive that ended with a seven-yard run by Jeff McCall. The two teams traded field goals in the third period, making the score 10-8 heading into the fourth period. Dale Hatcher hit a 47-yard punt out of bounds at the Tar Heel two. But, North Carolina drove to their 40. With 57 seconds left, Jeff Bryant recovered an errant lateral to preserve the win. Bryant seemed to be the only player on either team who thought it was a backwards pass and his hustle play allowed Clemson to keep its perfect record.

Nov. 14 Clemson 21, Maryland 7

Clemson clinched its seventh ACC title in history with a 21-7 victory over Maryland, Clemson's most bitter rival of the era. Homer Jordan was masterful, completing 20-29 passes (including 15-18 in the first half) for 270 yards and three touchdowns as he picked apart Maryland's wide-tackle six defense. Perry Tuttle caught 10 passes for 151 yards to become Clemson's all-time reception leader. Classmate Jerry Gailard had his first touchdown reception of his four year career in his final home game. Clemson outgained Maryland 469-236 and had 28 first downs on offense. Boomer Esiason was the sophomore quarterback for Maryland and he had just 15-38 for 167 passing on the day.

Nov. 21 Clemson 29, South Carolina 13

The Tigers concluded their first perfect season since 1948 with a 29-13 win in Columbia. South Carolina had a 7-6 lead after the first period behind a Johnnie Wright one-yard run. But, Clemson turned the game on a blocked punt by Rod McSwain. The ball was recovered in the endzone by Johnny Rembert. Both players would go on to be teammates with the New England Patriots. A Jordan touchdown run of 11 yards and a Bob Paulling field goal gave Clemson a 15-7 lead at intermission. While Rod McSwain provided the big play of the first half, Chuck McSwain took over in the second and ended the game with 151 yards rushing.

Jan. 1 Clemson 22, Nebraska 15

Clemson claimed its first National Championship by defeating Nebraska 22-15 in the Orange Bowl. It was Clemson's first Orange Bowl appearance in 25 years. Homer Jordan completed 11-22 passes and had 180 yards total offense in leading the Clemson offense. Jeff Davis had 14 tackles, while Bill Smith, now on the Clemson Board of Trustees, had a career high 10 tackles to lead the

linemen. Clemson allowed just one pass completion in the second half. Cliff Austin, who had scored the deciding touchdown in the Gator Bowl win over Ohio State in 1978, had a key touchdown in the third period in this victory.

NOTES OF INTEREST ON 1981

- Clemson won its first national championship in any sport and the first national title for the ACC in football in 28 years.
- Clemson had five different players earn All-America honors, still more than any other team in Clemson history.
- There was no controversy concerning the voting of the National Champion in 1981. Clemson ended the season as the only undefeated, untied team in Division I after the bowl games and was the only team in the nation with three victories over top 10 teams.
- Coach Danny Ford, at age 33 at the time, remains the youngest coach in history of college football to win the National Championship.
- Clemson forced 41 turnovers in the 12 games, still a Clemson record for turnovers forced in a season.
- During one stretch in the season the Clemson defense held the opposition without a touchdown for 18 straight quarters and no team had a rushing touchdown against Clemson the first seven games of the season.
- Clemson won the national championship in 1981 after going 6-5 the previous season. The Tigers were unranked in every preseason poll for 1981.
- Clemson's improvement of 5.5 games from 1980 to 1981 was the largest improvement in the nation that year.
- Only one team had more time of possession than Clemson all season: Wofford.
- Clemson had the lead at the end of the first period in just four of the 12 games.
- When Clemson defeated Wake Forest 82-24, Tiger mascot Ricky Capps did 465 pushups over the course of the game. He lost 10 pounds by

game's end. The Demon Deacon mascot did the pushups after Clemson scored a touchdown to give it 76 points.

•Clemson scored 316 points in the regular season of 1981, the exact same total Georgia scored in its 11-game regular season of 1980, the year the Bulldogs won the national championship.

•Good health was a big reason for Clemson's success in 1981. Only five different starters missed any games all season and no one missed more than two games. A collective total of only eight games were missed by five starters all season.

•The headline in the *Greenville News* the Sunday after Clemson defeated

North Carolina 10-8 in Chapel Hill was "Tigers are 10-8cious"

•No opponent had a run longer than 26 yards and no opponent had a play over 30 yards all season. The longest touchdown play against Clemson was 25 yards, on a halfback option pass from Mike Rozier to Jerry Steels of Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

•During pregame practice for the Tulane game in the Superdome, freshman punter Dale Hatcher hit the giant television screen that hangs over the center of the field. The screen is 155 feet above the playing surface.

•During offseason conditioning in the summer of 1981 strength coach George Dostal constructed a simple sign for his strength training facility: 1982 Orange Bowl, Clemson vs. Nebraska.

•Over the course of the season, counting game-week practices, pep rallies, pregame practice and games, the Clemson marching band played Tiger Rag 455 times in the 1981 season. That included 202 times during games and 55 times during pep rallies.

•The Clemson senior student who was in charge of pep rallies for the 1981 season was current CBS This Morning Anchor Jane Robelot.

•The day after Clemson defeated North Carolina in Chapel Hill, placekicker Donald Igwebuike flew to Maryland where Clemson's third-ranked soccer team defeated Maryland 4-0 to clinch the ACC. Igwebuike played on two ACC championship teams that fall that finished in the top 10 in the nation.

•Three Clemson players, Cary Massaro, Dan Benish and Steve Berlin, attended the Pittsburgh vs. Penn State game at Pittsburgh on November 28th. The game, the Saturday after Thanksgiving, resulted in a 48-14 Penn State victory and elevated Clemson to number-one in the polls for the first time in history.

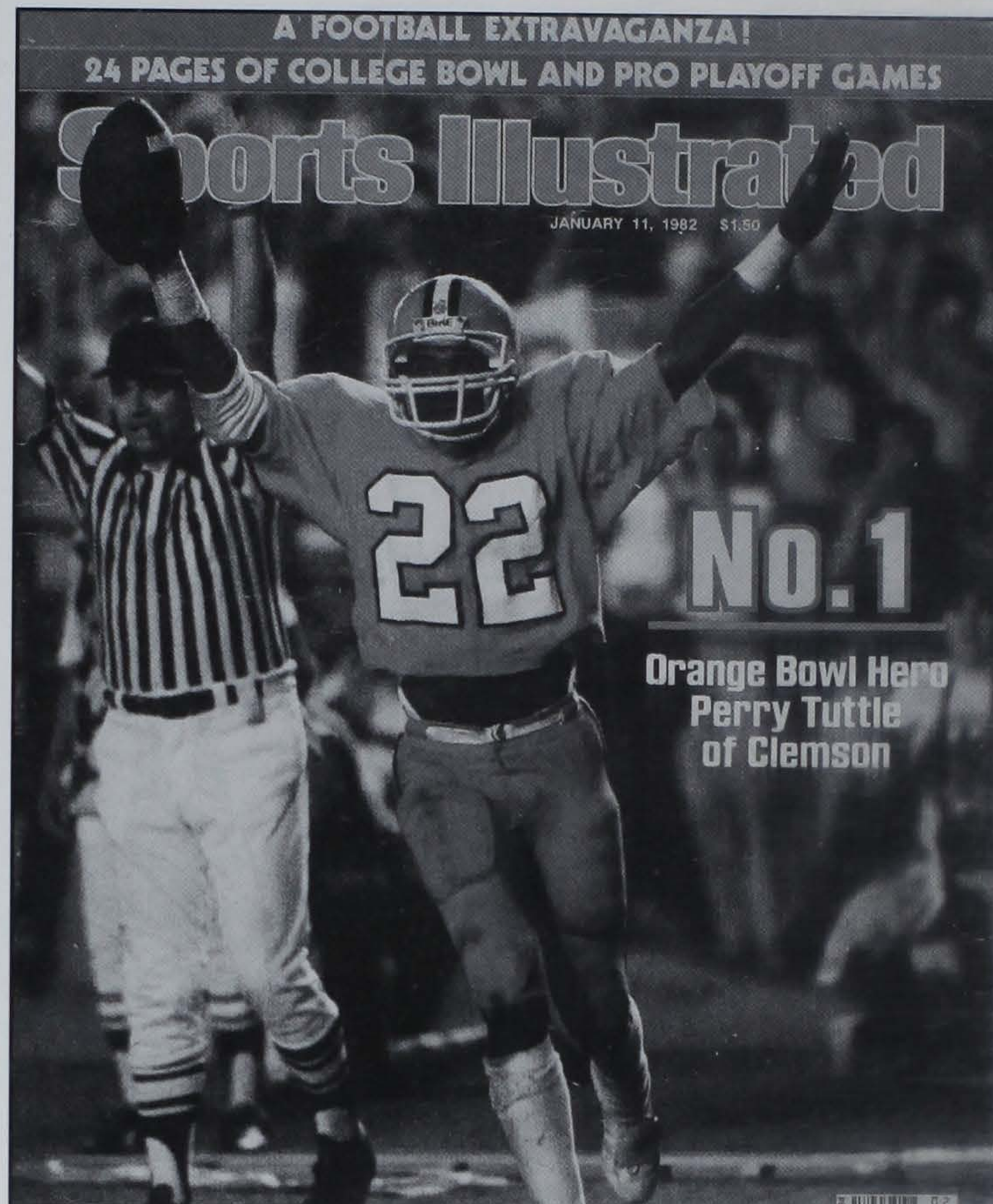

•The ACC had five of the first 15 players and seven of the first 19 taken in the 1998 NFL draft. The seven first-round selections were the second most in league history.

•The ACC has had 15 first-round draft choices in the last two years, the most in a two-year period in Clemson history, and more than any other conference. The SEC is second to the ACC in first-round picks the last two years with 14, while the Big 12 is third with eight.

•The ACC had 29 players drafted overall in 1998, third highest among conferences. Eight of the nine schools had at least one pick and they went to 23 different NFL teams.

•The ACC has long been a conference with a strong tradition when it comes to linebackers. Four of the ACC's first eight selections were linebackers in 1998 and overall, six ACC linebackers were chosen, including Clemson's Anthony Simmons, who was the 15th pick of the entire draft by the Seattle Seahawks.

•Over the last two years, 11 ACC linebackers have been selected, including seven within the first three rounds.

•The ACC has had at least one first-round selection in 10 consecutive NFL drafts and in 19 of the last 20. Florida State leads in first-round selections with 21, while Clemson is second with 18. The Tigers have had 168 players drafted in history, including five in 1998.

•There were only 13 teams nationally who had at least five selections and the ACC had three of those teams. Florida State, North Carolina and Clemson all had at least five

draft choices in 1998.

•For each of the last two years, the ACC placed 11 former players in the NFL Pro Bowl. Only the Pac-10 with 17 selections had more Pro Bowl selections than the ACC in 1997. Clemson has had seven of those 22 ACC Pro Bowl selections over the last two years, including Levon Kirkland and Chester McGlockton, who have gone each of the last two seasons.

•The ACC had a conference record six consensus All-Americans in 1997, tied with the Big 12 for the most consensus All-Americans. The list included Clemson's Anthony Simmons, who was a first-team selection by Associated Press, the Football Coaches Association and **Sporting News**. The ACC has had 10 consensus first-team All-America selections over the last two seasons.

•Overall, the ACC had 16 different players earn, first, second or third-team All-America honors in 1997.

•A total of 154 former players from the nine ACC schools played in the 1997 NFL during the regular season or postseason.

•The ACC is the nation's second winningest conference in bowl games over the years. The league has a combined .540 winning percentage (79-67-5) in bowl games. Over the last eight years the ACC is the only conference in the country to have each of its member schools play in a bowl game.

•Georgia Tech, Clemson and Florida State all rank among the top 15 schools in the history of the game in bowl winning percentage (given a minimum of 15 appearances).

•In the decade of the 1990s, ACC teams

have posted the nation's second best non-conference winning percentage. The ACC is 176-92-4 against non-league foes since 1990.

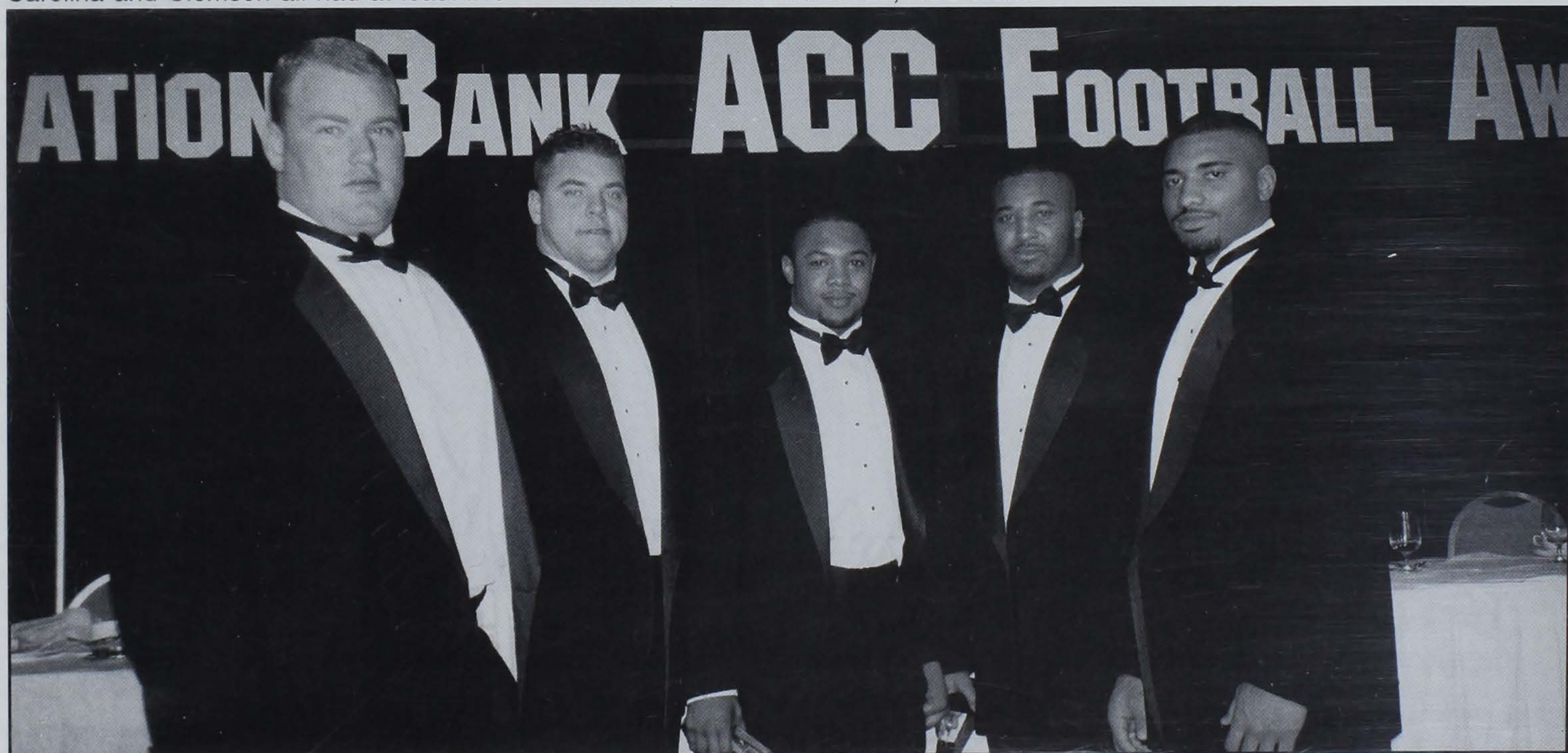
•The ACC is one of only two conferences to capture three or more national football championships since 1980. Clemson won the title in 1981, while Georgia Tech took the crown in 1990 and Florida State was number-one in 1993. Maryland also won the National Championship in 1953, giving the ACC four different schools who have been number-one at the end of a season.

•The 1997 season marked the ninth straight year that the ACC has had at least four teams participate in bowl games.

•ACC Football has drawn at least 2.2 million fans for seven straight years. ACC teams played to 85 percent of their stadium capacity in 1997.

•Twelve times in the last 18 years an ACC member school has claimed the CFA Academic Achievement Award, which is awarded to the CFA institution with the highest graduation rate among members of its football team.

•Eighty percent of ACC football games involving conference teams are on television. Clemson has averaged 10 televised games per year the last three years to rank among the national leaders in that category. That should be the case again this year. As many as 10 games are expected to be seen on national or regional TV this year, including the Georgia Tech game on ESPN on Thursday, November 12th.

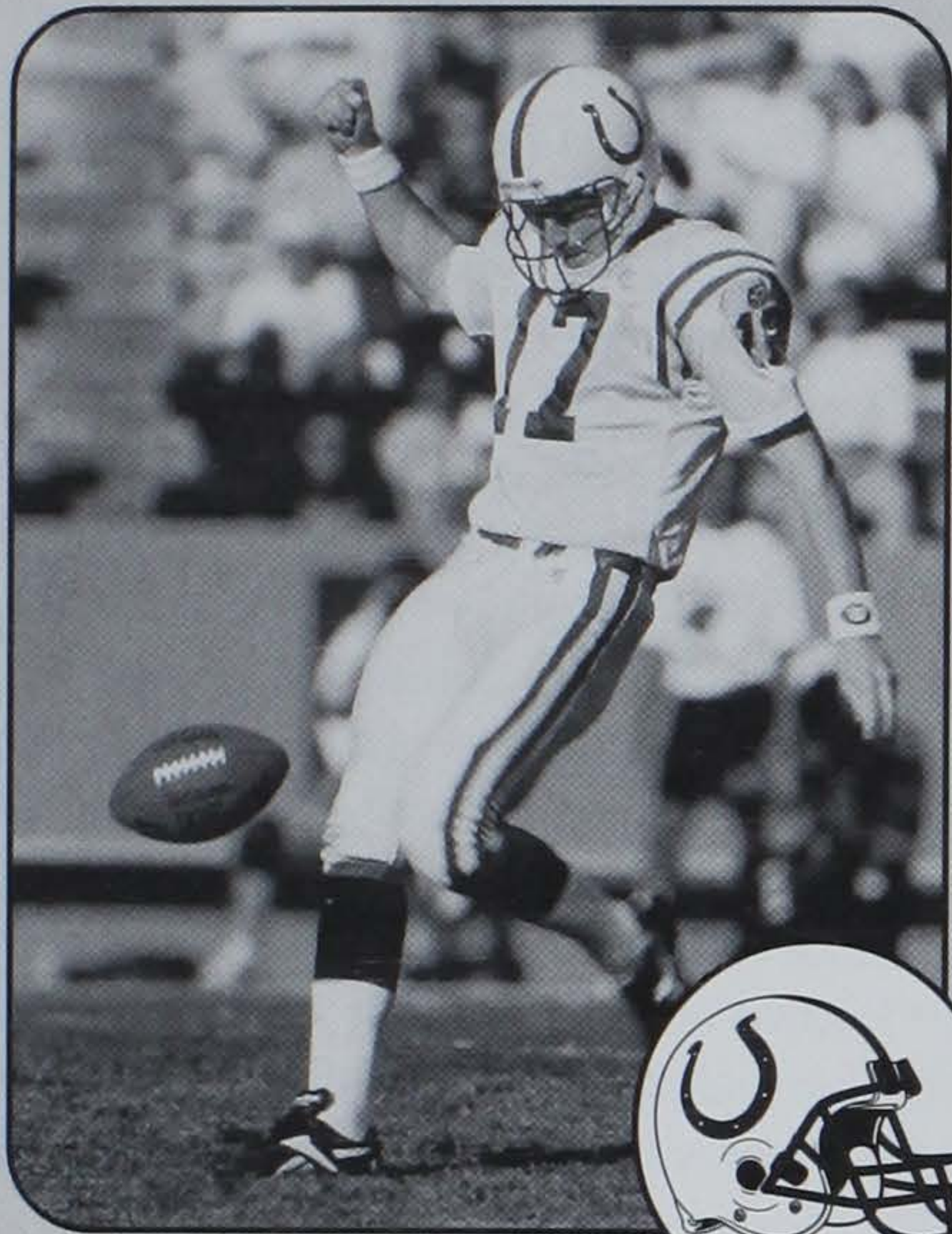

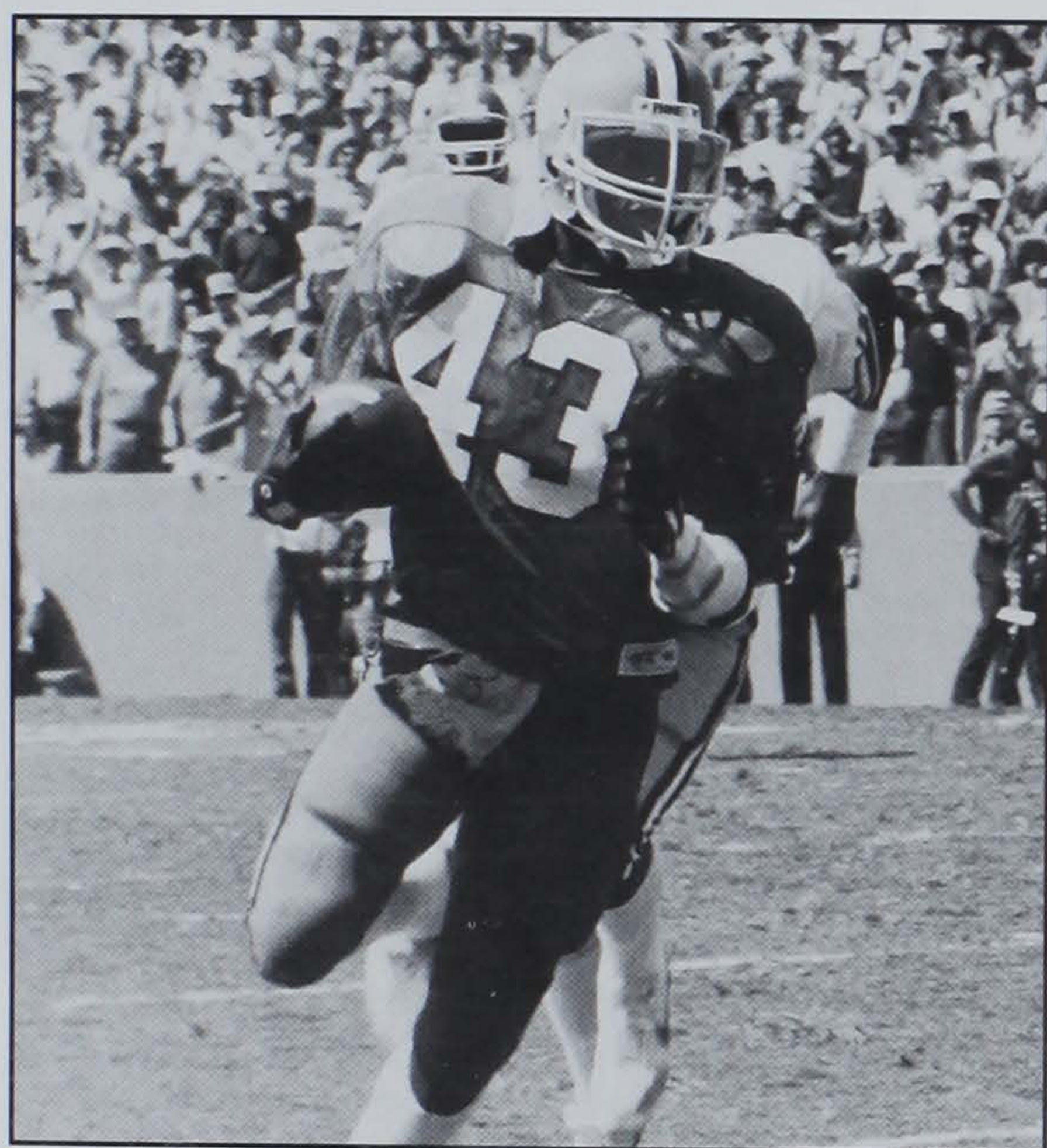

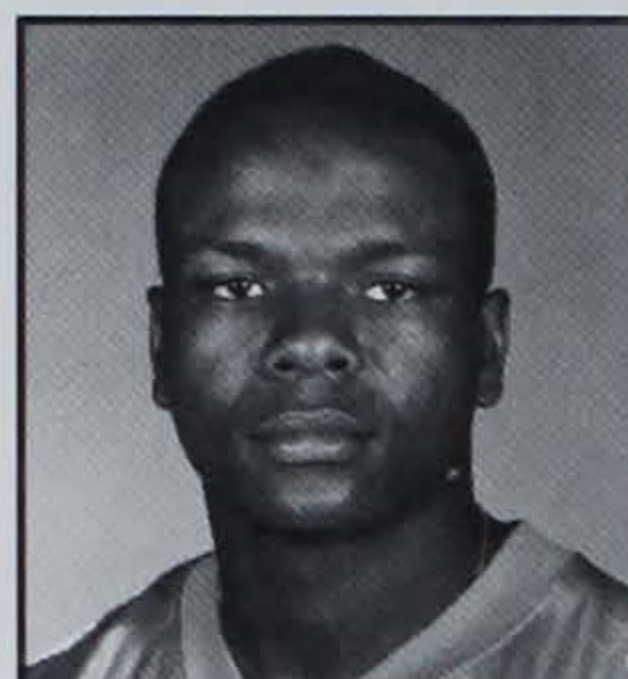

Overview: Finally will get his shot at starting inside linebacker with the graduation of Anthony Simmons and Mond Wilson...spent the last three years as reliable backup to both players...averaged a tackle for every 5.7 snaps he was on the field in 1997, third best on the team to All-American Anthony Simmons and Harold Means...for his career, averages a tackle every 4.26 plays, best among active Tigers....only Anthony Simmons has had a better figure than that over the last three years...has played 35 of the last 36 Clemson games, missing only the Georgia Tech game in 1996...veteran of 427 plays in his career, an average of 12 per game over the three years...top special teams tackler with 13 in 1997 season...has played well in three bowl games, he had four tackles against Syracuse in 1996 Gator Bowl and two tackles in each of the last two Peach Bowls...has played 44 career snaps in the three bowl games, over his regular season average in terms of playing time...one of five active Clemson defensive players to play in the last three bowl games...had his first career solo sack against Wake Forest in 1997...had 38 tackles for the season, 12th highest total on the team, even though he never started a game...had season high seven tackles in 24 snaps against Virginia...also had fine game at NC State with five tackles, including a half sack against the Pack...had at least one tackle in all but the UNC and Florida State games, he had at least one special teams tackles in seven of the 12 games...had a very good spring, including the spring game when he had 12 tackles, including eight first hits...that was the second highest figure among tacklers in the contest...has worked hard in the weight room in the offseason, he has a 422 pound bench press, sixth best on the team...his total weight lifted in the three areas is 1244, 10th best on the team...has second best power index on the team with 5.52 figure...overall, the fifth most improved Tiger in the weight room this year...has had a career high seven tackles in each of the last three seasons...had his seven against Virginia in 1997, posted seven against North Carolina and seven against Western Carolina in 1995...has 22 career special teams tackles entering 1998...**In 1996:** Saw action in 11 games and 101 plays...15th on the team in total tackles with 29, he had 25 tackles during scrimmage plays and four special team tackles...first on the team in plays per tackle with a 4.0 average...20 of his 29 tackles were first hits...jolted Florida State's Dee Feaster for a caused fumble on a punt return and gave Feaster a concussion...made six tackles in only nine plays in the win over Maryland, none of the stops were special teams tackles...it might be the fewest plays ever recorded to reach six tackles in a Clemson football game...played 12 snaps in the Peach Bowl against LSU and had two stops, it was his first double figure game in terms of plays since the Wake Forest game in the fourth game of the season...played season high 26 snaps at North Carolina...**In 1995:** Had an impressive outing versus Syracuse in the Gator Bowl, posted four tackles in 20 plays and one tackle for loss in the game...second on the Clemson team in plays per tackle, he had a tackle for every 3.68 plays in 1995...only classmate Anthony Simmons was better...one of five first-year freshmen to appear in every game and one of just three to play on scrimmage plays in every game...did not start a game, but averaged 15 plays per game...played at least nine plays in every game and a high of 25 in the opener against Western Carolina when he had a season high seven tackles...seventh on the Clemson team that year in total tackles with 50, five of which were on special teams...had six tackles at Maryland in just 21 plays...had most productive game against Virginia with six tackles in 16 games...had at least one tackle in every game, he and Simmons were only freshmen

to do that...had four tackles for loss for the season and one pass deflection...had five tackles in just 11 plays in win over North Carolina...**In High School:** Better known as a running back in high school, he had 1400 yards rushing his senior year at Monroe Area High School in Georgia...had 329 yards rushing on 15 attempts vs. Loganville High in 1994...four-year high school starter for Mark Whitley...majoring in parks, recreation and tourism management...born Christopher Jones on 9-30-76.

Overview: His 42.6 punting average was best by a Clemson punter since Chris Gardocki played for the Tigers and had a 44.5 average in 1990..Gardocki is now an All-Pro punter with the Indianapolis Colts...Laird was 33rd in the nation in punting, second best in the ACC in 1997...had 15 punts of at least 50 yards and 16 punts inside the 20, which shows his abilities in both important areas of punting...has the ability to hit the long boot to get good field position and to kill the ball inside the 20...had only seven touchbacks all season...one of the most improved punters in the country in 1997, he increased his average by 5.5 yards per punt since 1996...had a long boot of 69 yards against North Carolina, longest punt by a Tiger since 1992 when Nelson Welch had a 70-yarder...finished his season strong with 43.7 average in the Peach Bowl against Auburn, he had three punts of at least 50 yards and two that he dropped inside the 20...had three punts over 50 yards in that North Carolina game, he also had three over 50 yards against Florida State...has streak of eight straight games averaging over 42 yards a punt heading into the 1998 season...the Clemson record in that area is 12 straight games by Dale Hatcher in 1983-84...Laird's streak includes North Carolina game when he had nine punts for a 46.1 average...has a 44-yard average over the eight-game streak...had his top game of the year in terms of average against Florida State when he had seven punts for 47.6 average...averaged at least 42 yards a punt in nine of the 12 games last year...hit a strong stretch at midseason with three straight games with a NET average of over 40 yards...had 42.0 net against Wake Forest, 41.8 net against Duke and 42.8 net against North Carolina, a game in which he punted nine times...had three punts over 60 yards in 1997, a 64-yarder against Florida State, 63-yarder against Duke and 69-yarder against North Carolina...had 57-yarder in the Georgia Dome against Auburn...has punted very well in the last two Peach Bowls...had the 43.7 average in 1998 game and set Clemson record with seven punts inside the 20 in the 1996 Peach Bowl against LSU...also had a 63-yard punt in that game...has 43 punts inside the 20 in his career, the Clemson record is 69 by Dale Hatcher...**In 1996:** Punted the ball in every game for Clemson that season...delivered the longest punt of the season and a Peach Bowl record 63 yarder versus the LSU Tigers...tied Clemson single season record with 24 punts inside the 20, including single game record seven against LSU...killed four inside the 20 in the win over Virginia, Clemson's biggest win of the season...his longest punt of the day against the Cavs was 50 yards...also killed four inside the 20 versus N.C. State, so he had 16 punts inside the 20 in the last four games of the season...had three punts of 50 yards or more in the last four games of the season...he didn't record any in the previous eight games...punted the ball nine times in the season opener versus North Carolina, he had had nine punts in all of 1995...his career high for attempts is 10 versus Florida State...his best game in terms of average came against Missouri, 43.5 average for two punts...had three games in 1996 in which he averaged 40 yards a punt, but his primary concern was field position and he was among the best in the league in that area...had 40-yard net average against South Carolina and Furman in 1996...**In 1995:** Pooch punter for the Tigers in 1995, he played in six of the 12 games in that capacity...had three of his nine punts killed inside the 20, one each against Maryland, Georgia Tech and South Carolina...had 38-yard punt killed inside the 20 against Maryland in his first ACC action...had at least one punt in the last five regular season games after not punting for five consecutive weeks...did not play against Syracuse in the Gator Bowl...has

a 7.67 power ratio (total weight lifted divided by body weight), most by a Clemson kicker in 11 years...**In 1994:** Red-shirted the 1994 season and gained valuable knowledge of the kicking game from teammates Jeff Sauve and Nelson Welch...only scholarship punter on the Clemson team for 1995...**In High School:** The 24th and last signee for Tommy West's first recruiting class, he was the only kicker... originally committed to Notre Dame...two-year starter as a punter and placekicker at Brandon High for coach Wally Bumpas...Brandon had an 8-4 record and reached the state playoffs where it was eliminated in the first round by the eventual state champion his final season...Laird was an All-Metro selection in 1993 when he averaged 40 yards a punt...played in just seven games due to a pulled quad muscle...converted 4-6 field goals, the leg injury curtailed his ability to kick field goals...during a healthy junior season, Laird averaged 42.4 yards a punt...also was a three-year starter as a back on the Brandon High School soccer team...majoring in agronomy...fine student who is a two-time member of the ACC academic honor roll (1996-97 and 1997-98)...born Kevin Russell Laird on 6/14/76 in Hattiesburg, MS.

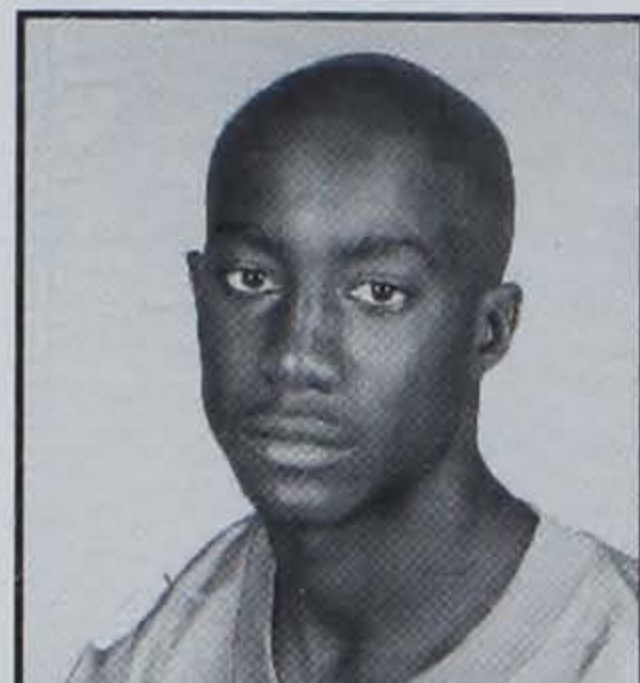

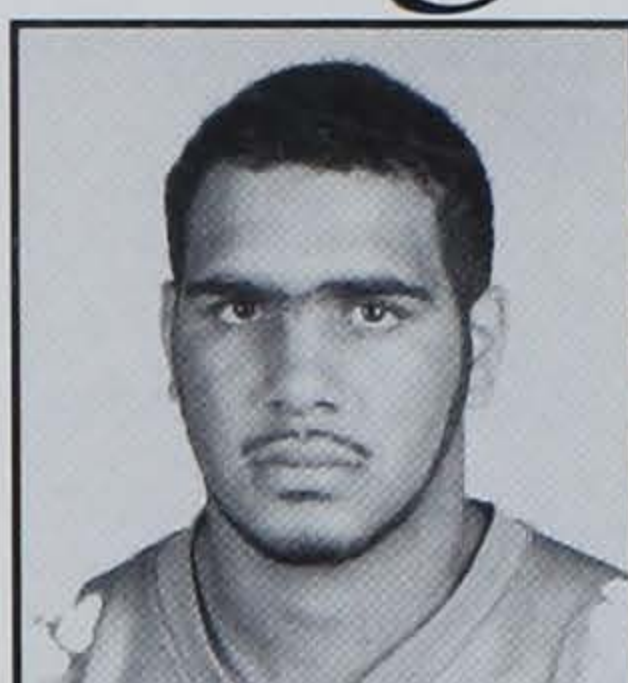
Overview: Virtually came out of nowhere to tie as Clemson's second leading receiver in 1997...had just one reception as a freshman, then had 28 as a sophomore...his 28 catches were same as classmate Brian Wofford...his 384 receiving yards ranked third on the team, just four yards behind Wofford's second place total....started five of the 12 games and scored three touchdowns...had his best game against Georgia Tech when he caught four for 79 yards and a touchdown...followed that with 4-59 and a touchdown against UTEP...had his third TD reception of the year against South Carolina when he caught a 15-yarder from Nealon Greene...had four catches in four games, NC State, Georgia Tech, UTEP, Virginia...had 3-40 against Florida State in the third week of the season...had a solid spring and has moved into starting wide receiver slot...had two receptions for 36 yards in the spring game...that included a 24-yard touchdown reception from Woody Dantzler...had a strong first half of the season, he had 22 of his 28 receptions in the first six games of the season...longest career reception was 43-yarder against Duke...saw his most action of the season against Virginia when he was in for 58 snaps...also went for over 50 against Florida State (53)...needs just five receiving yards to hit 400 for his career and one catch to reach the 30 mark...**In 1996:** Played in every game as a wide receiver for the Tigers except the Florida State game...made his only catch of the season in the Missouri game...played a season high 36 snaps in the South Carolina game...played 21 snaps against LSU in the Peach Bowl...had a very improved Spring of 1997, he had a 12-yard touchdown reception from Brandon Streeter...leading receiver in the 1997 Spring game with 4-47 and that score...**In High School:** The #13 ranked player in South Carolina by **SuperPrep**...had 35 catches for 350 yards and three scores in senior year, 47-600 yards and eight touchdowns as a junior...also had two touchdowns on kick returns in 1995...named second-team all-south by *SportSouth*...played in the Shrine Bowl for the South Carolina team as a wide receiver...an All-Low Country choice his last year, he was All-Region and All-County as a senior...member of the mile relay team that placed 2nd in the South Carolina state meet...a track all-region selection...played for Jerry Brown at Berkeley High in Moncks Corner, SC...majoring in marketing....born Samuel Kamal Lawyer on 3-8-78.

Where are they now?

Dr. Randy Smith

"Player gives up final year of eligibility to turn pro."

That is the headline we often see today in the current sports world of big money and instant fame. Randy Smith, a center for the Tigers from 1963-65, gave up his last year of college eligibility to turn pro; not as a football player in the NFL, but to provide a service far more reaching and meaningful to others.

Randy Smith went from Tiger gridder to plastic and reconstructive surgeon. He is currently an assistant clinical professor of plastic surgery at the Medical College of Georgia in Augusta, GA. Not only does he help those in need in his Augusta operating room, he travels to all parts of the world to help the less fortunate, particularly in under-developed countries.

Smith, 54, came to Clemson from Richmond Academy in Augusta, GA and was immediately impressed by not only the football aspect, but the off the field teachings of then Clemson College.

"The thing that stood out the most was the friendliness of the students and the school spirit," recalls Smith. "My parents (Maxine and Lester) were always steadfast about me going to Clemson; as a student and as an athlete. There, I met some of my best friends, who are still my best friends to this day."

At Clemson, Smith starred as a center under Coach Frank Howard. After playing three seasons (four school years) for the Orange and White, Smith graduated with a degree in pre-medicine. Even though he had an other year of eligibility, he was drafted in the seventh round by the New York Jets of the AFL and was also drafted by the Atlanta Falcons of the NFL.

"After the 1965 season, Randy Mahaffey, one of my closest friends, and I traveled to Europe with my life savings," says Smith. "That was something I had never done before. Since I was on scholarship, I had saved enough money to travel."

"When I came back I found out I had been accepted to medical school. I felt that my medical career was important to me. So I talked to Coach Howard in the summer and told him that I had a higher calling in life. Of course his feelings were hurt. He told me no first-string player had ever not come back for his last season. I felt this opportunity was so important in my life that I couldn't pass it up."

Prior to 1988, no college football player could turn pro a year early, but that was for the NFL. No rule covered becoming a doctor.

Smith earned his Doctor of Medicine degree in 1970 from the Medical College of Georgia. For the next eight years, he served as a major in the United States Army Reserve Medical Corps. During that time, he spent a year's internship at Wake Forest's Bowman Gray School of Medicine and a four-year residency at Duke as an Otolaryngology-Head and Neck surgeon.

At Duke, he followed one of his closest friends and fellow Tiger football player Joe

Waldrep. Waldrep and Smith left Clemson at the same time, with Smith going to the Medical College of Georgia and Waldrep going to Duke Law School. Smith recollects Coach Howard joking about their aptitude. "Coach Howard said he had problems with not staying in school due to poor grades, but he had never had two players smart enough to leave school before their eligibility was finished."

In 1975, Smith returned to the Medical College of Georgia for his plastic surgery training. He began practicing in Augusta, GA in 1978 and is currently a member of countless national and regional medical societies, including the American College of Surgeons.

Not only has he sought to help patients in the Southeast, Smith has traveled to all corners of the globe as a volunteer surgeon and lecturer in plastic and hand surgery in undeveloped countries since 1982. "In the early 80s, although what I was doing was satisfying, I felt like something was missing in my life," says Smith. "I decided to do what I do in Augusta in other places where the type of service I provide is not available."

"I decided to volunteer my plastic surgery skills to those in developing countries where that type of service was not available. The first place I went was China in 1982 with seven other surgeons. We traveled from town to town, giving lectures on reconstructive plastic surgical problems, such as gunshot wounds and burns of the lower extremities. Once we arrived in Beijing, we had to modify some of our lectures to accommodate the problems that we weren't prepared for."

"When I finished a lecture on breast reconstruction and lower extremity reconstruction, the chief of Plastic Surgery in the Chinese capital, a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania prior to the 1949 Revolution, told me

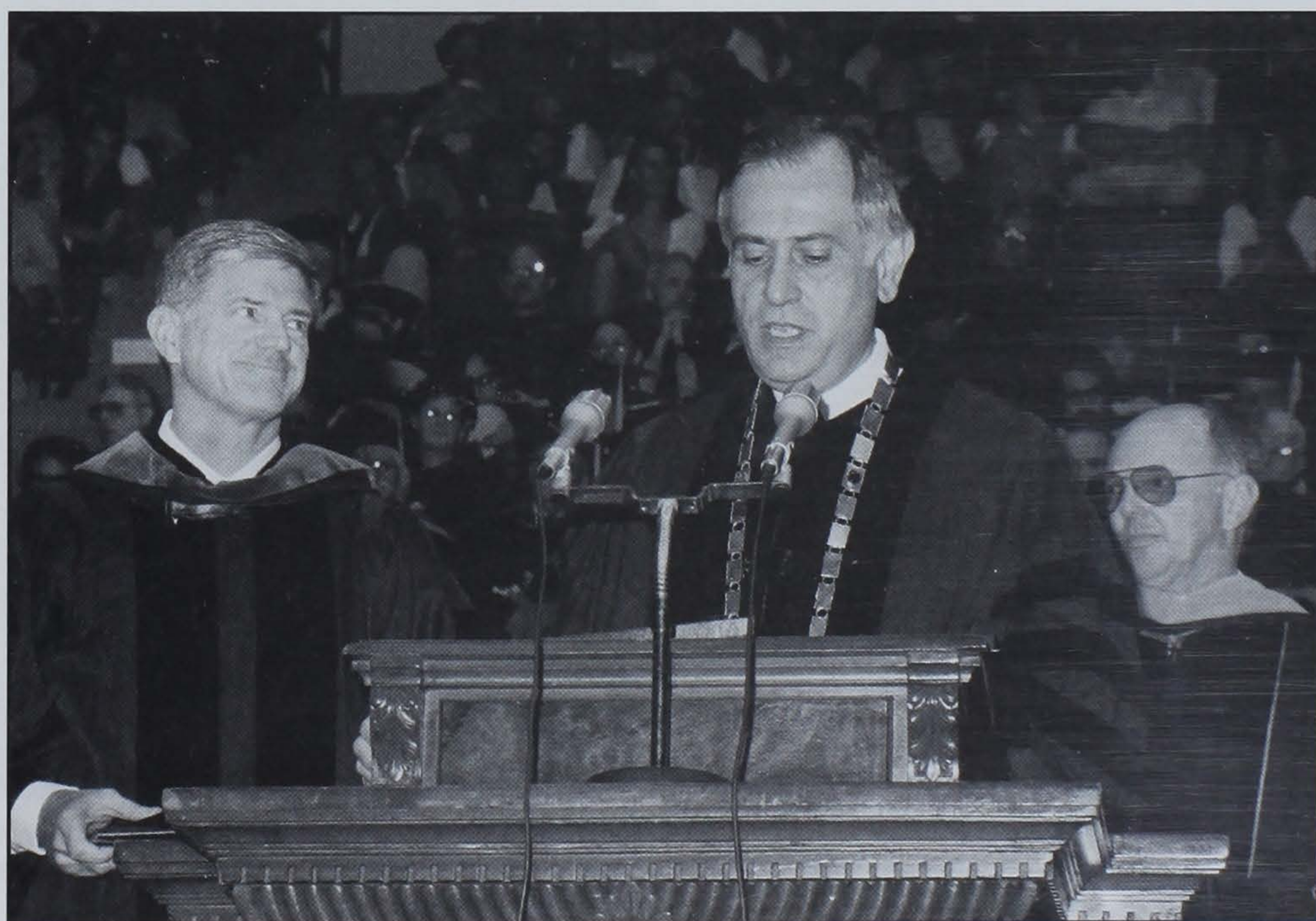
that the presentation was good, but what we really need is for us to operate with them. That discussion with Dr. Song led me on an odyssey that would dramatically affect my life as well as some of the lives of the patients and doctors in those third world nations."

Since that trip to China, Smith has traveled to Nigeria, Kenya, Egypt, Venezuela, El Salvador, South Korea, and Poland. "My legacy was not only to operate on the patients, but to teach the doctors some of the techniques," says Smith. "Invitations come from all over the world today, mostly by word of mouth. I usually go to the worst imaginable places where I can make the most impact."

"The most fulfilling part of what I do is working with the patients. I have operated on the lepers in West Africa as well as women in Poland who needed breast reconstruction following mastectomy for cancer. But it doesn't matter where I go. All the patients are the same. They are wonderful and warm, and that is why I keep making these trips."

The service Smith has provided was recognized by Clemson on May 7, 1997, at the May graduation exercises. There, he was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Laws degree by the University. His achievements have also earned him recognition in Who's Who in America and Who's Who in Medicine and Health Care.

Smith's wife, Becky, is fittingly a nurse. "She sometimes travels with me, but most of the time stays home with our children," states Smith. Today Smith's dreams have helped many others fulfill their own dreams. He has realized his dreams, not because of luck or coincidence, but due to sheer determination, vision, and hard work as a young adult in his scholar-athletic days at Clemson. Let us hope that more Clemson student-athletes will follow in his footsteps.



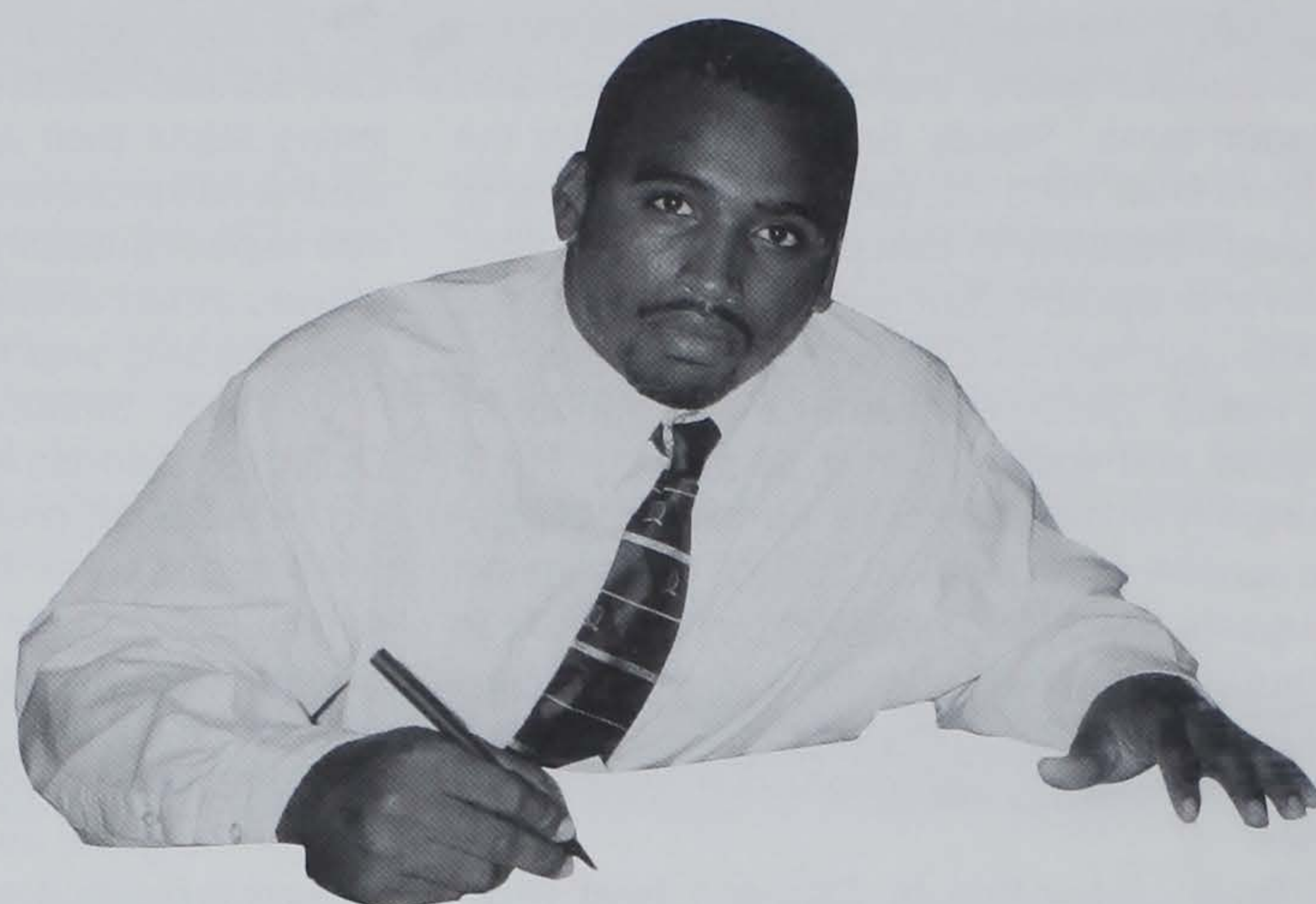
Randy Smith (left) was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Laws degree by Clemson University on May 7, 1997.

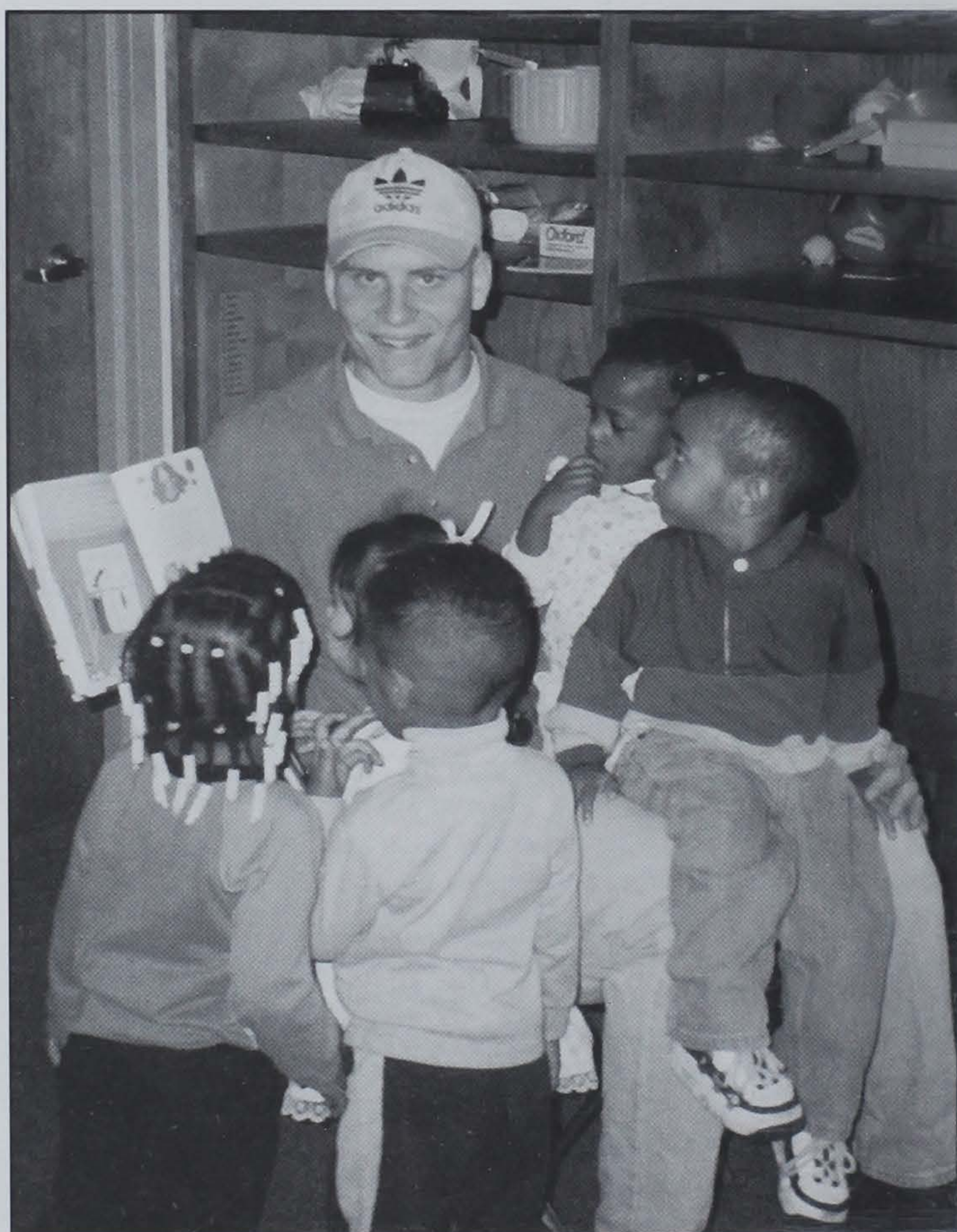
🏈 **Homework Bound** — Members of the Clemson team went to Littlejohn Community Center in Clemson to help grade school children with their homework.

LIFE Line is an organization that serves as a leadership group for the Clemson football program. The LIFE in the organization's name stands for Leaders in Football and Education. The group is composed of 15 Clemson football players and they provide a peer leadership group for the entire team.

LIFE Line's members are committed to creating a positive team image, well developed goals and objectives, sound values and smart decision making. The group's goals are striving to enhance academic and athletic excellence, develop personal leadership skills and promote leadership qualities in other team members, promote career development on the team and encourage teammates to volunteer in community projects.

The members of the LIFE Line group for 1998-99 are led by the organization's president, Michael Allen, and vice president, Holland Postell. Both are in their third years in the group. The other members include Charles Hafley, Neely Page, T.J. Watkins, Brian Wofford, Gary Childress, Chad Speck, Corey Hulsey, Justin Watts, Robert Carswell, Adonis Bristow, Kevin Laird, Brandon Streeter and Harold Means.

The 15 players who lead the group are involved in retreats, hear from speakers and presentations, and sponsor freshmen in an effort to aid their transition to college academics and athletics.

"Being a good leader involves no mysterious methods nor profound philosophical approaches," said Bill D'Andrea, the Director of Clemson's Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs. "It is all quite a simple and reasonable because people want to do the right thing. Improper behavior generally springs from poor decisions. If a player does something wrong, a good leader simply tells him or shows him how to do it right."

Last July, Michael Allen, and Holland Postell presented a paper on building self-esteem through service learning. The presentation was made to the Clemson Leadership Institute in conjunction with the seminar entitled, "What's Right with Kids: Developing Tomorrow's Leaders."

"Our programs are designed to give each student-athlete every opportunity to reach his or her academic potential," said D'Andrea. "Tying in all three focus areas, academics, personal growth and career enhancement, help prepare them for the time they spend at Clemson as well as for successful careers."

SEPT. 5 • FURMAN AT CLEMSON Series: Clemson leads 38-10-4

This game will be the 53rd meeting between Clemson and its oldest football rival, Furman...the two teams met in 1896 in the first game in Clemson football history...Clemson won the game 14-6 in Greenville...Clemson has won 26 straight games against Furman dating to a 12-0 Paladin win at Clemson in 1936...the two teams have met just five times since 1964...Clemson has outscored the Paladins 227-21 in the last eight meetings...Furman has not scored a touchdown against Clemson since 1961...Clemson has won 33 in a row over Southern Conference teams since a 6-0 loss to South Carolina in 1952...Clemson has won 42 games in a row over teams currently in the Southern Conference...ten of the last 12 Southern Conference teams to play the Tigers have failed to score a touchdown...Tommy West is 3-0 against Furman in his coaching career, 2-0 at Clemson and 1-0 in his season at UT-Chattanooga when his club won a 45-42 thriller in the season finale...Furman is coached by former Clemson player Bobby Johnson and he is 0-2 vs. the Tigers...Johnson played for the Tigers between 1970-72 and was academic All-ACC as a junior and senior...he had seven takeaways in 1972, most by a Clemson player between the 1953-81 era...Johnson was Clemson defensive coordinator in 1993 under Ken Hatfield...Furman had just 99 yards total offense against Clemson in 1994, best defensive game by the Tigers since West has been head coach...the Paladins had -29 yards rushing against Clemson in the Tigers 19-3 victory in 1996, the fewest rushing yards by a Tiger opponent in history...current Clemson kicker David Richardson had two field goals, including a 40-yarder, in Clemson's last victory over Furman in 1996...current Clemson outside linebacker Rahim Abdullah had three quarterback sacks in the 1996 game, the only freshman in Clemson history to have three sacks in one game...the Clemson defense had 12 quarterback sacks in the game, highest total in Clemson history...Clemson has a 76-18-8 record in season openers over the years and has won 13 of its last 15...Clemson is 3-0 on this date in history.

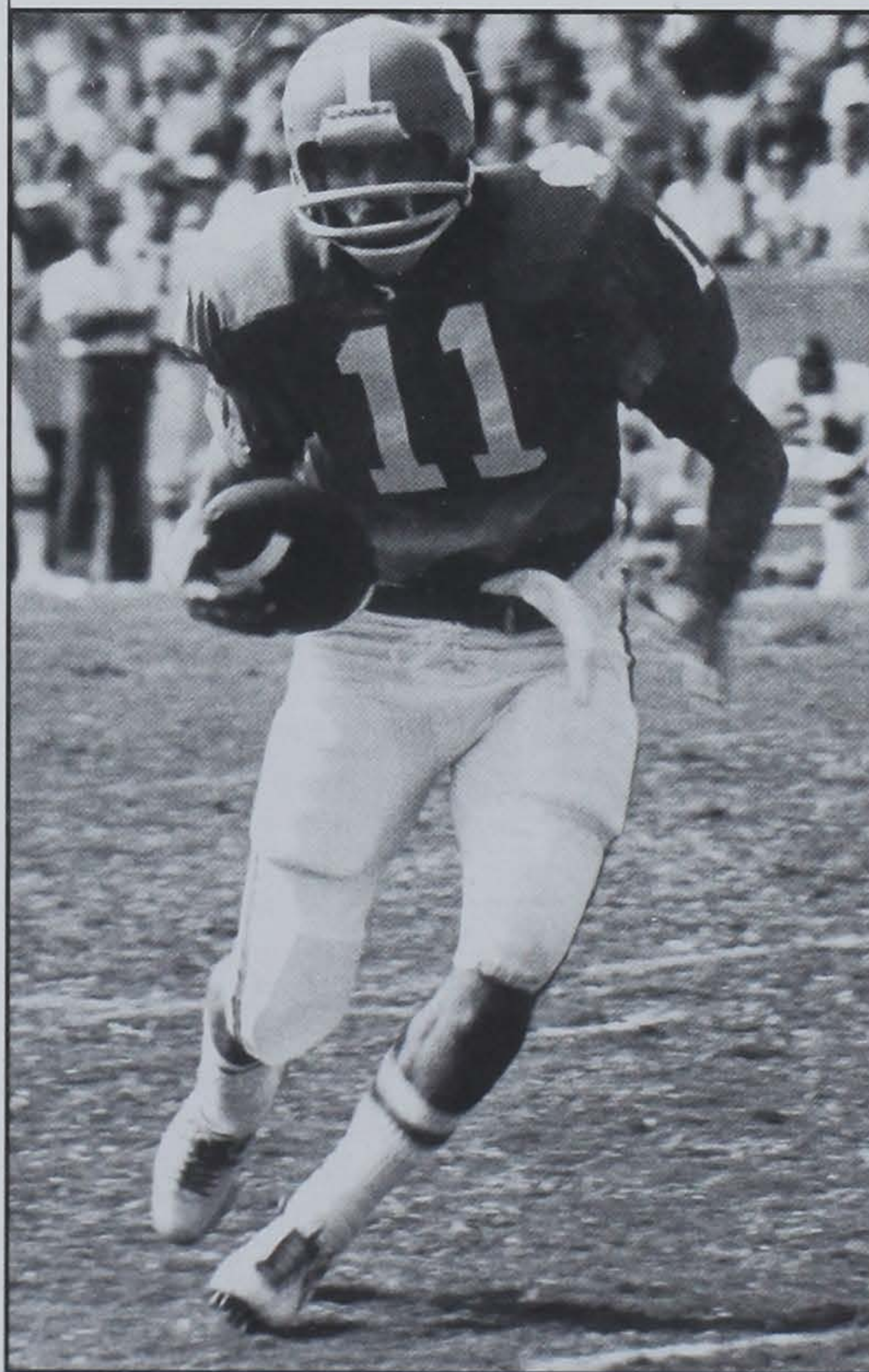
SEPT. 12 • VIRGINIA TECH AT CLEMSON Series: Clemson leads 17-7-1

Clemson and Virginia Tech meet on Hall of Fame Day at Death Valley on Sept. 12...this will be a meeting between two of the 17 teams across the country who have been to a bowl game at least three consecutive years...Virginia Tech lost to North Carolina in the Gator Bowl last season...both teams were 7-5 in 1997...this is the first meeting between Clemson and Virginia Tech since the 1989 season...one of Virginia Tech's top running backs is Lamont Pegues, who was Clemson's top rusher in 1994 with 390 yards in 92 attempts...Pegues also played at Clemson in 1995 before transferring...Pegues will be the only player on the field who has had a 100-yard rushing game in Death Valley, he had 136 in a victory over Georgia Tech in 1994...current Clemson offensive line coach John Latina is a

Virginia Tech graduate and played against Clemson in 1978 in Death Valley...Virginia Tech head coach Frank Beamer is 0-3 against Clemson, losses in consecutive years to Danny Ford's coached Tigers in 1987 (22-10), 1988 (40-7) and 1989 (27-7)...in Beamer's first meeting against Clemson in 1987, Wesley McFadden rushed for 226 yards in 32 attempts...Tommy West was an outside linebacker coach at Clemson for all three of those games...Clemson and Virginia Tech met on the gridiron in six consecutive years (1984-89) and the Tigers won five of the six...the Hokies last win was by a 20-14 margin in the season opener of 1986 in Death Valley...Virginia Tech offensive coordinator Ricky Bustle played for the Tigers 1973-76, he earned letters in his final three seasons...Clemson has 60 wins in the decade of the 1990s and Virginia Tech has 57...while the two teams have played just 25 times in history, the series does date to 1900, a 17-5 Clemson victory...Clemson is 7-2 lifetime against Virginia Tech in Death Valley with the VPI wins coming in 1986 and 1954...Clemson is 3-1 lifetime on Sept. 12.

SEPT. 19 • CLEMSON AT VIRGINIA Series: Clemson leads 32-4-1

This game will be played on September 19th, the only perfect day in Clemson history given a minimum of four games played...Clemson has a perfect 8-0 record on this date, including a 13-3 win over a fourth-ranked Georgia team in 1981...the Tigers won the first 29 games of the series, but Virginia has a 4-3-1 advantage in the eight meetings in the decade of the 1990s...Virginia won last year, 21-7 at Clemson

on the Tigers Homecoming, one of just two Homecoming losses for Clemson since 1970...Clemson won the last meeting between the two teams in Charlottesville, 24-16 over a 15th-ranked Wahoo team...Clemson had a pair of 100-yard rushers in the contest, Raymond Priester and Kelton Dunnican, something Clemson has not done since...current Clemson OLB Howard Bartley had career high tying 8 tackles in the contest...linebacker Chris Jones had a season high seven tackles against Virginia in 1997...Adrian Dingle had then career high 7 tackles, including three tackles for loss...Antwan Edwards had 11 tackles vs. Virginia in 1996...Kevin Laird had three punts inside the 20 and a 43.6 average against Virginia in 1997...Virginia offensive coordinator Sparky Woods coached against Clemson for South Carolina between 1988-90.

SEPT. 26 • WAKE FOREST AT CLEMSON Series: Clemson leads 49-13-1

The Tigers have won 19 of the last 21, including 4-0 under Tommy West...the Deacs' victory at Death Valley in 1993 is their only triumph at Clemson since 1961...Clemson has held Wake Forest under 21 points nine games in a row including last year's 33-16 Clemson victory in Winston-Salem...Antwan Edwards had 11 tackles in the Clemson win in 1996 at Tigertown...Clemson will strive for its 50th win in history over Wake Forest...Robert Carswell had 11 tackles and two passes broken up in his second college start at Wake Forest in 1997...David Richardson had four field goals, including a career best 52-yarder in the win at Wake Forest...Terry Witherspoon had a season high 76 yards on 11 rushes in Clemson's win at Wake Forest in 1997...South Carolina is the only other team Clemson has beaten at least 50 times...Clemson is 4-5-2 on Sept. 26th in history.

OCT. 3 • CLEMSON AT NORTH CAROLINA Series: Clemson leads 29-16-1

Clemson Assistant Head coach Les Herrin was a North Carolina assistant in 1988...the Tigers have won nine of the last 12, and 13 of the last 17 in the series...current Tiger Rahim Abdullah was Clemson's MVP in 1996 game in Chapel Hill...DoMarco Fox had a blocked punt late in the fourth period for Clemson, a play that put the Tigers on the Tar Heel 10-yard line in the final minute...Fox also had nine tackles and an 11-yard interception return in that game...Kevin Laird had three punts over 50 yards and a 46.1 average on nine punts against North Carolina in 1997...Harold Means had a career high 15 tackles against North Carolina in 1997...Clemson's 1996 offensive coordinator, Darrell Moody, is an assistant coach at North Carolina...Clemson won at North Carolina in Tommy West's first year, 1994, in a big upset...North Carolina was ranked 12th heading into the game and Clemson ended that year with a 5-6 record, but the Tigers came away with a 28-17 victory thanks to five field goals by Nelson Welsh...Clemson is 4-8-1 on October 3rd in history.

Clemson has lost six in a row to Florida State with the last win coming in Tallahassee in 1989..in fact, both of Clemson's wins in the series have taken place at Florida State...Clemson and Florida State have both been ranked in the top 20 in the nation in the AP poll heading into six of the last eight games...Clemson has eight veteran players on its roster from the state of Florida (Rahim Abdullah, Jacksonville; Alex Ardley, Tallahassee; Darrel Crutchfield, Jacksonville; Brent Banasiewicz, Monticello; Donald Broomfield, Olustee; John Thompson, Jacksonville; Rod Gardner, Jacksonville; Theo Mougros, Tarpon Springs; Ryan Romano, West Palm Beach)Clemson wide receivers coach Rick Stockstill and inside linebackers coach Reggie Herring, are both Florida State graduates...Herring is in the Seminoles Hall of Fame and Stockstill was a two-year starter at quarterback...Fred Hoover, another FSU grad, worked his 400th consecutive game as Clemson's head trainer when the Tigers met the Seminoles in 1995 at Clemson...Hoover's streak is now at 434 heading into the season...Florida State defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews used to be a secondary coach at Clemson...punter Kevin Laird had a career high 47.6 average on seven punts against Florida State in 1997...Brandon Streeter made his first college start against Florida State last year and was 6-12 for 72 yards and had a 32-yard touchdown run against the Seminoles...Clemson is 6-4-0 on October 17th in history.

This will be a matchup of the top two rushing teams in the ACC in 1997....Wolfpack head coach Mike O'Cain is a 1977 Clemson graduate and was a quarterback for the Tigers between 1973-76...he defeated Clemson in Death Valley in 1994, as he became the first Clemson graduate to beat Clemson....he has not beaten the Tigers since...O'Cain is the first Clemson graduate to serve as a Division I head coach since 1904 when Shack Shealy, Clemson class of '00, became the head coach of the Tigers...this is the 18th annual Textile Bowl, Clemson has a 12-5 lead in the series since it was named the Textile Bowl in 1981...Clemson was 5-3 against N.C. State when Tommy West was an assistant coach with the Tigers (1982-89)...Clemson outside linebacker Rahim Abdullah has scored a touchdown on a fumble return against NC State each of the last two seasons...Antwan Edwards had a season high nine tackles at NC State in 1997...this game starts a stretch of three straight home games to end the season for the Tigers....Clemson has a 12-6 record on Halloween, including the 82-24 win over Wake Forest in 1981.

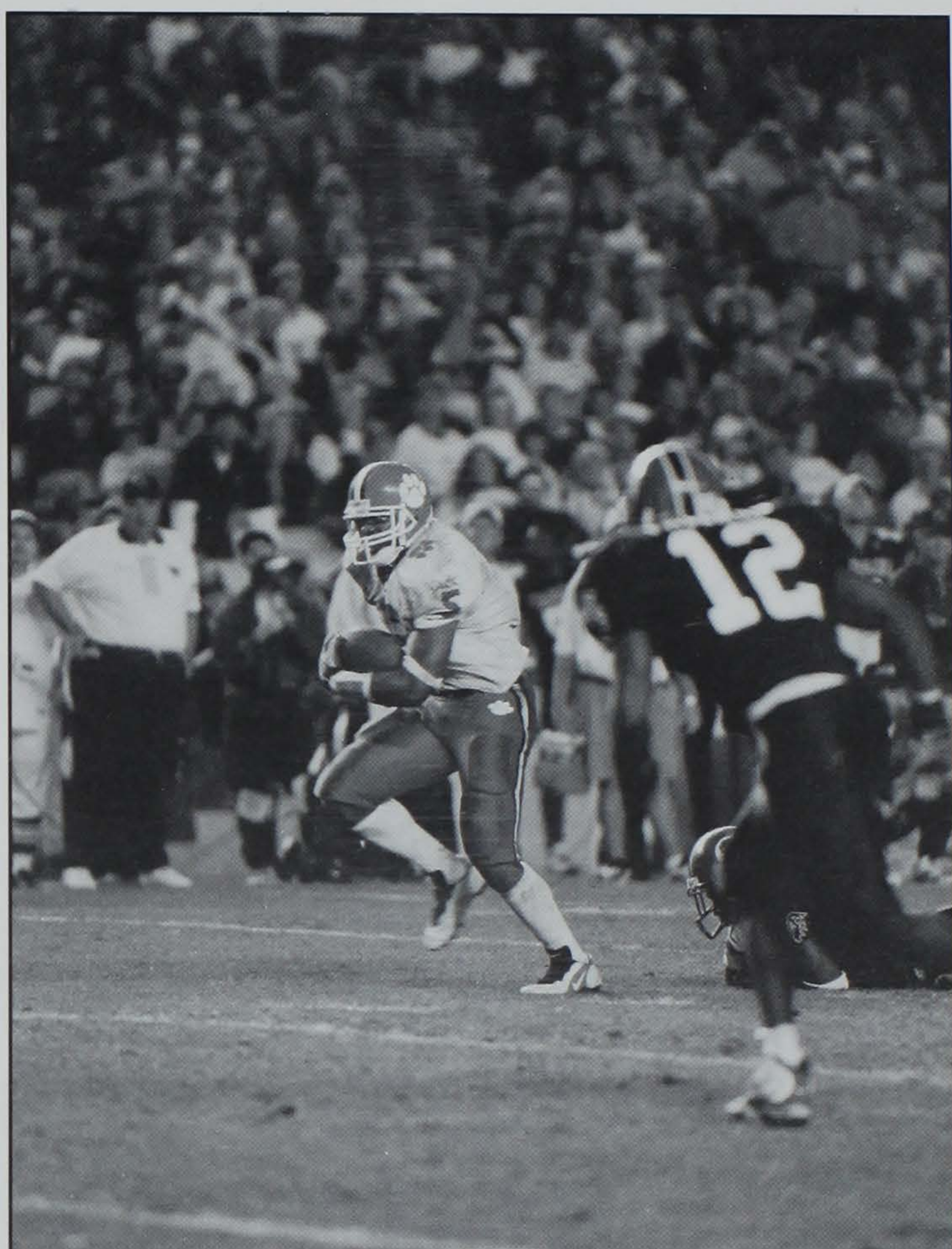
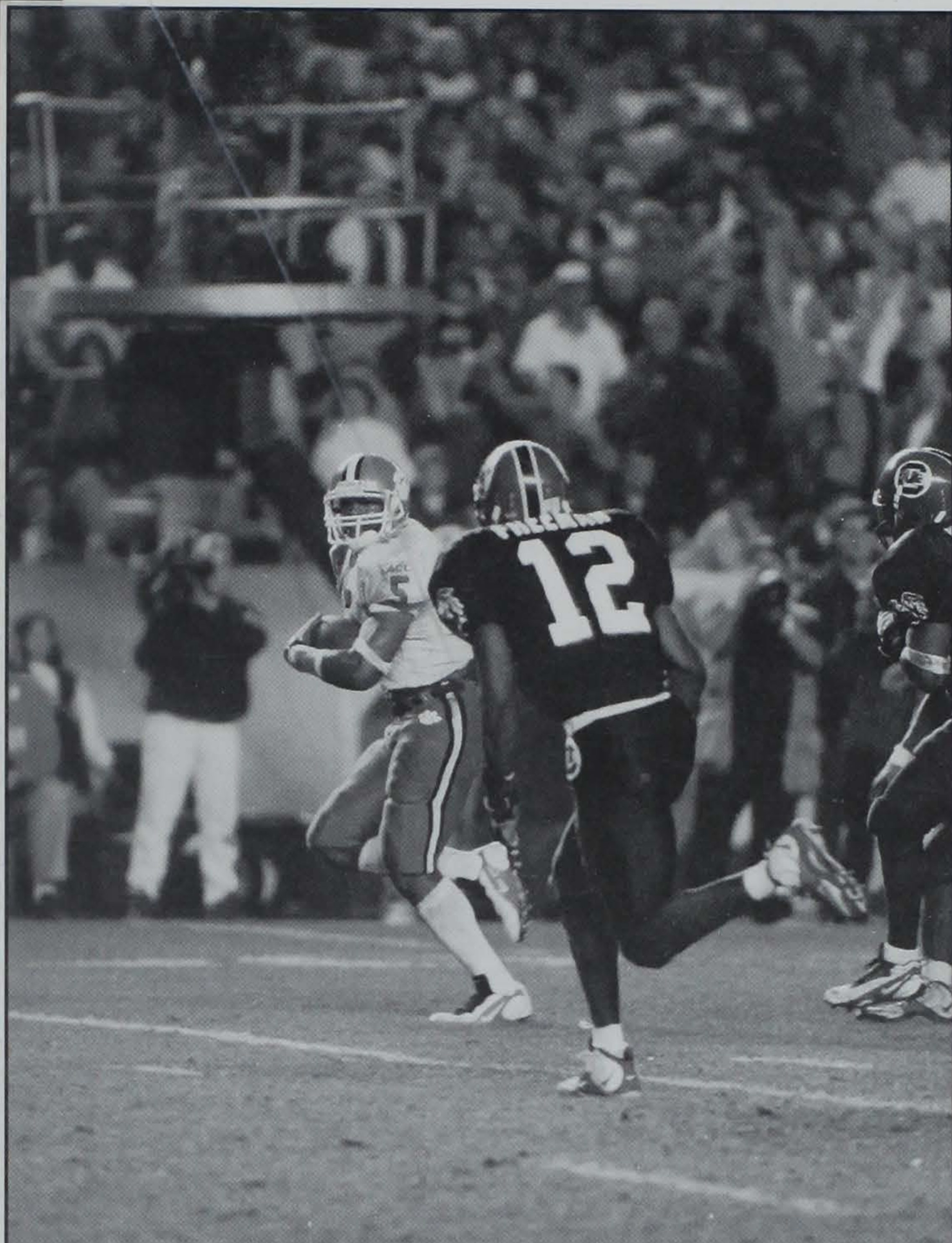
NOV. 12 • GEORGIA TECH AT CLEMSON **Series: Georgia Tech leads 40-20-2**

This will be Clemson's first home Thursday night game in history...the contest will be televised on ESPN with an 8:00 PM start...it is Clemson's first game on a Thursday since the 1963 season when Clemson and South Carolina played on Thanksgiving Day due to the death of President Kennedy...when Clemson won over the Yellow Jackets in 1994 it was the coaching debut of George O'Leary....Tech's hasn't won at Death Valley since 1989 when they handed Clemson its first homecoming defeat since 1970....Georgia Tech has a 38-10-2 advantage over Clemson in games played at Georgia Tech over the years, including 30-6-1 in Bobby Dodd

Stadium, but Clemson has a 7-2 advantage in games at Clemson...Georgia Tech never played at Clemson until 1974 and the 36 games played between the two teams between 1908 and 1973 were contested in Atlanta....Mal Lawyer had a career high 79 yards on four receptions and a touchdown at Georgia Tech in 1997...Brian Wofford had a career high six catches for 52 yards in the game against Georgia Tech in 1997...Terry Witherspoon had 12-61 rushing against Georgia Tech in 1997...DoMarco Fox had six tackles and a career high three passes broken up at Georgia Tech in 1997...Clemson offensive line coach Mac McWhorter was an assistant coach at Georgia Tech between 1980-87, his first full-time assistant coaching job...Howard Bartley had career high eight tackles against Georgia Tech in 1996...Clemson is 8-4 on Nov. 12th in history.

NOV. 21 • SOUTH CAROLINA AT CLEMSON **Series: Clemson leads 56-35-4**

The visiting team has won this game seven straight years, the first time that has happened since the two teams began playing a home and home series in 1960...a South Carolina victory would break the all-time NCAA record for road wins in a series in consecutive years...the Kansas and Kansas State series also had seven straight road wins in the 1920 and early 1930s...Clemson has had .500 or better record entering the South Carolina game, 21 straight years, South Carolina has had .500 or better record entering the game 14 of the last 21 years...West coached in eight games in this series as an assistant between 1982-89, and Clemson had a 5-2-1 advantage in those games...West was 1-1 as an assistant coach for South Carolina against Clemson in 1991 and 1992....the first 57 games of this series were played in Columbia...Clemson running backs coach Rich Bisaccia was an assistant coach at South Carolina between 1989-93, while Tiger outside linebackers coach David Bibee was the secondary coach with the Gamecocks during the same time periodformer Clemson assistant coaches Chuck Reedy and Woody McCorvey are now assistant coaches at South Carolina...Clemson has won seven of the last 10 in the series, including each of the last five games in Columbia...Antwan Edwards had a 58-yard interception return against South Carolina in 1996 and was named ACC Defensive Back of the Week....in 1997 Edwards had two interceptions, including one he returned for a score, and was again named ACC Defensive Back of the Week...Edwards has six career interceptions, half are against South Carolina...Rahim Abdullah had a season high 8 tackles, including two tackles for loss, against South Carolina in 1996...David Richardson was 2-2 on field goals and scored 11 points in win over South Carolina in 1997...Javis Austin had 19-90 rushing against South Carolina in 1997, his top game as a freshman...Clemson is 8-1 in Columbia since 1980...17 years ago to the day, Clemson clinched its 11-0 perfect season with a 29-13 victory over South Carolina in Columbia...Braxton Williams was member of that team, his son is on this year's Clemson team...Clemson is 5-5-1 on Nov. 21st in history.

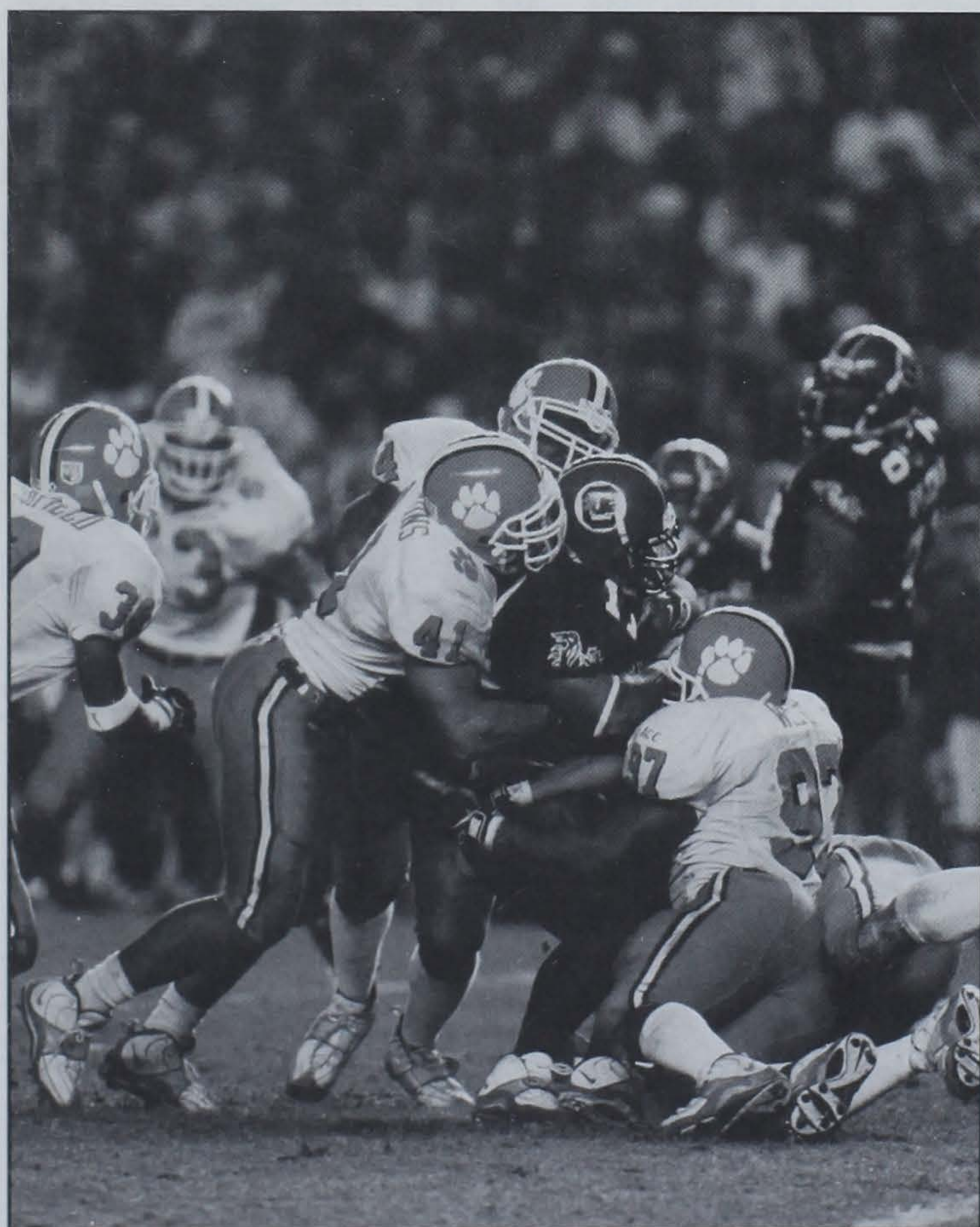

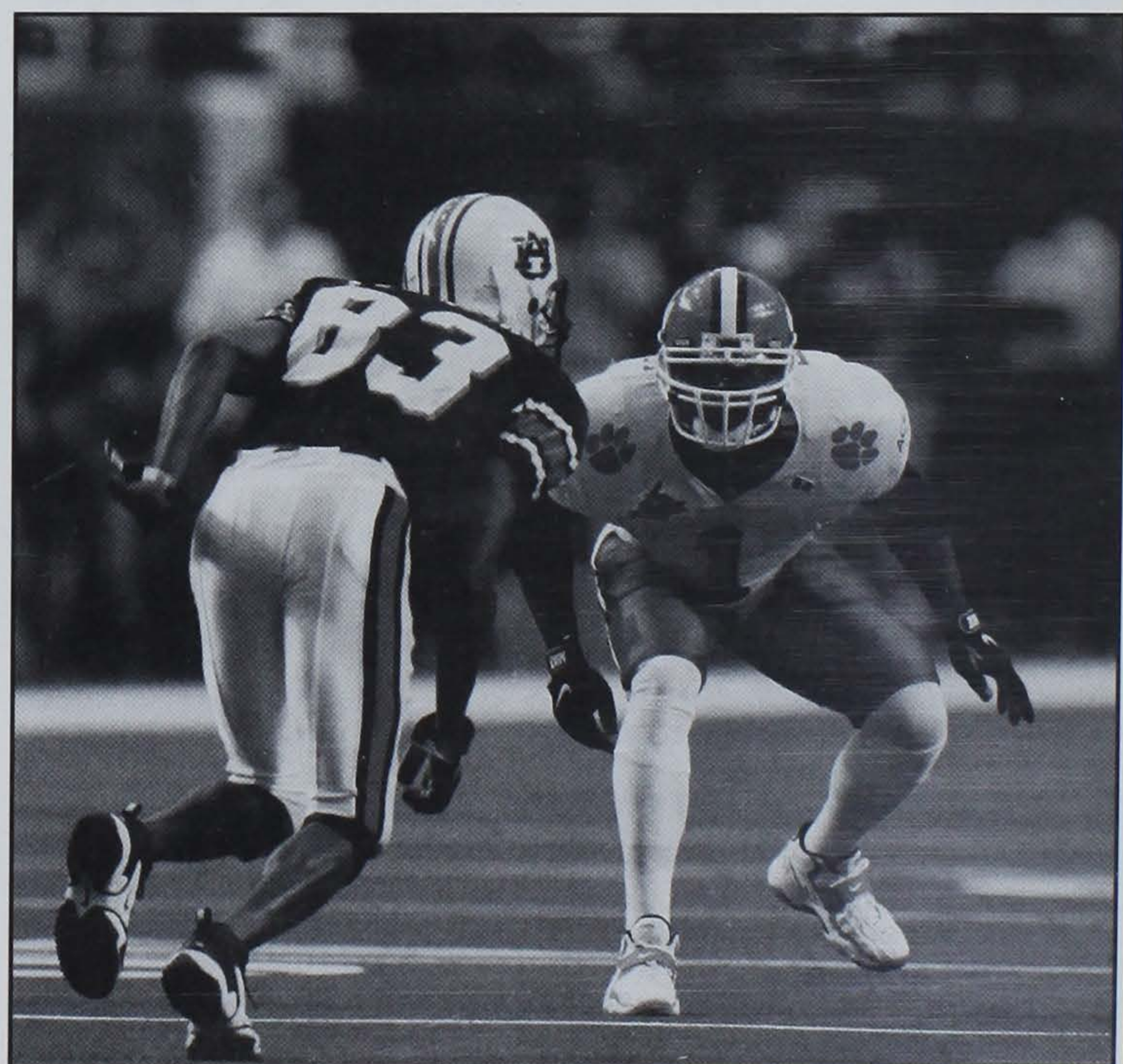

Nealon Greene threw for a career-high 250 yards on 20-31 passing, including two touchdowns, in leading Clemson past a pesky Appalachian State team 23-12. Clemson finished the day with a 200-yard passer, 100-yard rusher, and 100-yard receiver for only the sixth time in school history. Raymond Priester tallied 138 yards on 23 carries while Tony Horne chipped in 110 yards receiving on 10 catches. The win marked the Tigers 33rd in a row over a Southern Conference team.

Appalachian State showed the Tigers that they came to play by forcing Priester to fumble on the first play of the game. Earl Hunter picked up the Priester mistake and the Mountaineers were in business at the Clemson 21. After gaining only seven yards on three plays, Chris Barden nailed a 31-yard field goal to put Appalachian State up 3-0 only 1:41 into the game.

After two punts by each team, the Tigers embarked on their first scoring drive of the season. Highlighted by an 11-yard run by Greene and a 16-yard scamper by Priester, Matt Padgett finished the drive off with a 37-yard field goal. The drive covered 29 yards in nine plays and 2:57 off the clock.

The Mountaineers did not roll over and play dead, however. Steve Carson blocked a Padgett field goal attempt with 5:29 remaining in the opening half, and the Appalachian State offense responded. Led by the passing and running of quarterback Bake Baker, the Mounties went 23 yards in seven plays. Barden connected on his second field goal of the day, this one from 37 yards, and Appalachian State led 6-3 with 1:45 to go in the half.

Clemson then took control of the game with a well executed two-minute offense drive. Greene found Mal Lawyer three separate times for 34 yards and was a perfect 6-6 on the drive. The

final strike went 23 yards to Brian Wofford to give Clemson a 10-6 lead at the break. Greene's 20 completions on the afternoon were the second highest total ever by a Clemson passer in a Tiger victory.

The Tigers opened the lead in the second half with a six-play, 82-yard scoring drive late in the third quarter. Greene hit Horne with passes of seven and 19 yards and Priester carried the ball three times for 48 yards, including the touchdown carry of 38. Padgett's PAT failed and Clemson led 16-6 with 2:04 to go in the third.

On Appalachian State's ensuing drive, Antwan Edwards intercepted a fake punt attempt on the goal line and returned it 35 yards to set up the final Tiger scoring drive of the day. Greene connected with Tony Horne from three yards to finish a nine play, 4:07 drive that put Clemson ahead 23-6.

Appalachian State added a touchdown with 6:39 to go, but the two-point conversion try failed, providing the final score of 23-12. The Tiger offense finished the day with over 200 yards both rushing and passing for the 26th time in school history. In those 26 games, the Tigers are 25-0-1.

Mainstay Anthony Simmons led the Tiger "D" with eight tackles, including two for loss and two passes broken up. Edwards had seven tackles and a pass broken to go along with his interception. Mond Wilson also had seven tackles, with two going for a loss, as Clemson relinquished only 28 yards rushing on 23 Mountaineer carries.

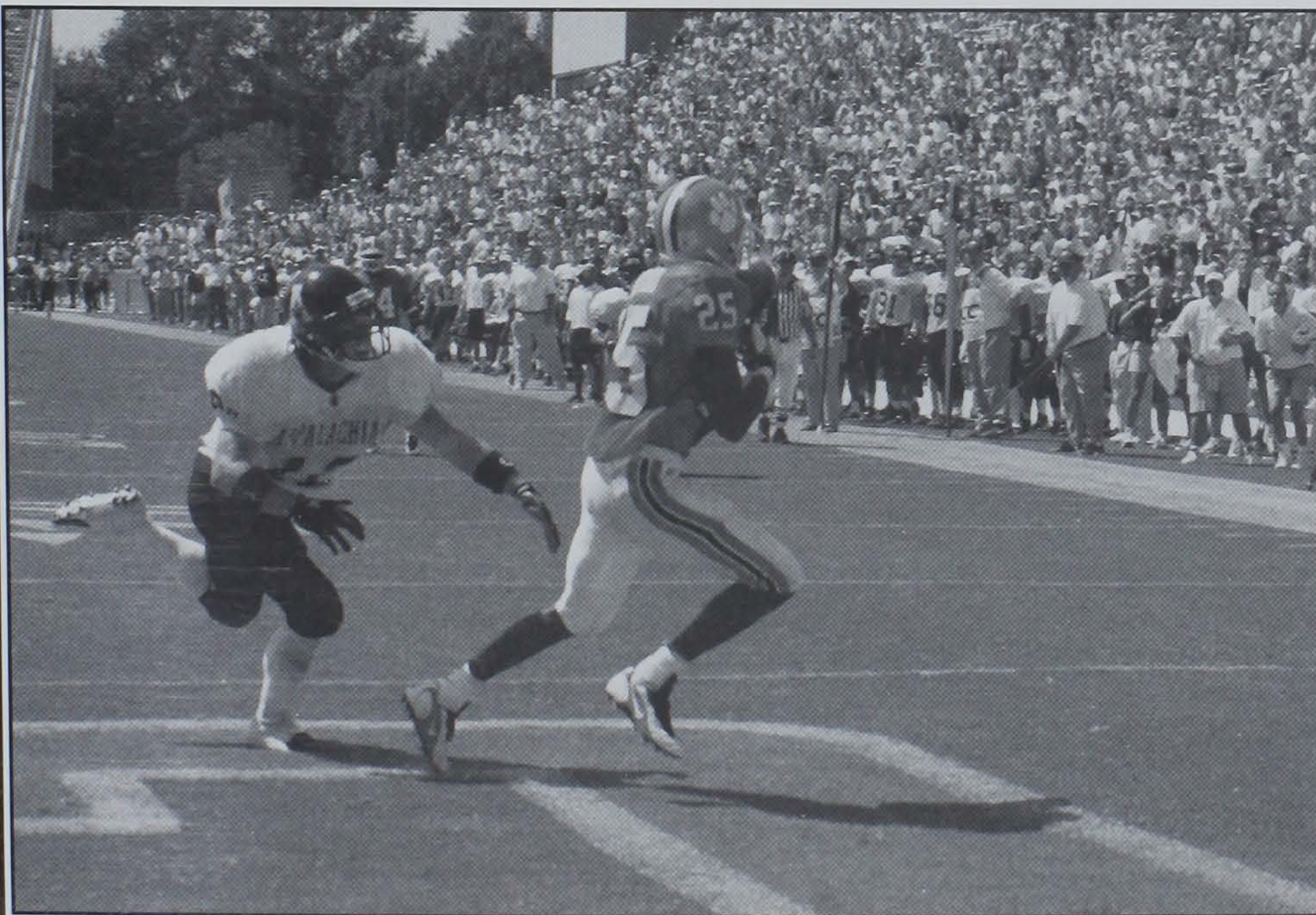

Nealon Greene guided the Clemson offense to three fourth-quarter scores, including the game-winning 20-yard field goal by Matt Padgett with 19 seconds remaining, as the Tigers defeated #25-ranked N.C. State 19-17 in Raleigh. The win marked the first time since 1991 that Clemson won its conference opener and the first 2-0 start in the Tommy West era. The win also was the 15th in the last 16 regular season day games dating back to 1995.

Greene was 20-32 passing for 250 yards, becoming the first Tiger quarterback to throw for 250 yards in not only consecutive games, but separate games. Senior receiver Tony Horne also led the Tigers with eight catches for 112 yards, giving the Rockingham, NC native two straight 100-yard receiving games to start the season. Padgett added 13 points, 12 of which came on a career-high four field goals.

N.C. State marched 67 yards in 10 plays on the opening drive of the game to jump out to a 7-0 lead. The 'Pack converted 3-3 on third down conversions on the 4:35 drive. Tremayne Stephens carried the ball in from five yards for the TD.

The score remained 7-0 until Padgett booted a 25-yard field goal with 24 seconds remaining in the opening half. The kick capped a 13-play, 5:15 drive that featured six Raymond Priester carries for 26 yards. Greene was 2-3 passing on the drive for 29 yards including an 18-yarder to Horne.

The scoring picked up in the second half, with the Tiger defense striking first. The 'Pack drove to the Clemson 12 on their first possession of the third quarter, but a third down blitz by the Tiger "D" resulted in Tony Plantin knocking the ball free from quarterback Jamie Barnette. Rahim Abdullah picked up the fumble and raced 74 yards for the only Clemson touchdown of the day. It marked the second year in a row that Abdullah scored a touchdown against State, as he returned a fumbled punt return nine yards to paydirt in the 1996 contest.

After trading early fourth quarter field goals, the Tigers led 13-10. The lead was short-lived, however, as State struck for a two-play, 72-yard touchdown drive. Barnette passed to Stephens for 34 yards on the first play and then to Holt for 38 and the score. The 29-second drive put State up 17-13 with 9:08 remaining in the contest.

Refusing to die, the Clemson offense bounced right back with a 10-play, 69-yard drive, again culminating in a Padgett field goal. This one came from 30 yards out and cut the deficit to one with 6:09 remaining.

Stopping the 'Pack on their next drive, the Clemson "D" gave the offense one last hope with 4:35 to go. The offense answered, driving 78 yards in 14 plays. Greene connected with receiver Mal Lawyer on a crucial third-and-15 from the Clemson 15. Two plays later, Greene, who was 3-6 passing on the drive, scrambled for 28 to the Wolfpack 41 yard-line. Another third-down conversion gave Clemson a first down at the N.C. State 30. On second-and-10 from there, Greene hit Brian Wofford over the middle for 25 yards to the State five yard-line. After three running plays used to run time off the clock, Padgett came on to nail the game-winner from 20 yards out with 19 seconds left.

Tony Horne finished the day with 267 all-purpose yards and one touchdown, but Clemson could not overcome fifth-ranked Florida State's big plays in the 35-28 loss at Death Valley. Horne hauled in 10 catches for 131 yards, returned two kickoffs for 77 yards, and three punt returns for 27 yards.

Sophomore quarterback Brandon Streeter, subbing for the injured Nealon Greene, made his first career start. The red-shirt sophomore promptly guided the Tigers to a touchdown on their first possession of the day. The drive covered 80 yards in eight plays and ended when Streeter kept the ball on an option play and raced 32 yards to paydirt.

After trading punts and then turnovers, FSU found themselves with the ball at their own 49. A 26-yard pass from Thad Busby to Peter Warrick on the first play of the drive put the 'Noles at the Clemson 25. The Seminoles had to settle for a 34-yard Bill Gramatica field goal and a 7-3 deficit.

Disaster struck on Clemson's next possession. Facing third-and-12 from the Tiger 33, the snap to Streeter in shotgun formation sailed over his hands. The ball wound up in the endzone where Seminole linebacker Sam Cowart fell on it for a touchdown. The score put Florida State up 10-7 with 2:47 remaining in the opening quarter. Streeter was then knocked out of the game in the second quarter with a dislocated shoulder, forcing Greene to step in and play the rest of the day despite a toe injury.

Clemson was forced to punt on their first possession of the second half, but received its

first big break on the play. After returning a punt 21 yards, Warrick fumbled the ball and Lamont Hall fell on it, giving the Tigers control at the FSU 28. On the first play of the ensuing drive, Greene found Horne a few yards down field. From there, Horne gave an unbelievable individual effort, spinning past one defender and diving away from another into the front corner of the end zone to give the Tigers a 14-10 Clemson lead with 11:53 to go in the third quarter.

Florida State answered back with 11 points on its next two possessions. A 22-yard field goal from Sebastian Janikowski, following a six-play 68-yard drive, cut the Clemson lead to 14-13. After a Clemson punt, Busby connected with Warrick twice, the first for 11 yards and the second time for 48 yards and a touchdown. The two-point conversion pass to Laveranues Coles gave the 'Noles a 21-14 lead.

Matt Padgett hit a 36-yard field goal to trim the lead to 21-17 before Florida State struck back with another big play. Warrick grabbed a punt and raced for 90 of his 372 all-purpose yards on the day and another touchdown, stretching the Seminole lead to 28-17.

The Tigers answered back with a six-play, 80-yard drive, and two-point conversion of their own, cutting the deficit to 28-25. Another FSU big play, this one an 80-yard Busby to Warrick pass, put FSU ahead 35-25 with 9:46 to go in the game. Clemson threatened late, but two promising drives netted only three points, providing the final 35-28 margin.

All-American Anthony Simmons led the Tiger defense with 12 tackles. Florida State gained only nine first downs, one third-down conversion and 31 yards rushing. The rushing total marked the lowest by the 'Noles in the decade of the nineties.

Backup kicker Brad Chambers hit two fourth quarter field goals, including the game-winner with 1:54 remaining, to lead Georgia Tech past Clemson 23-20 in Atlanta. Chambers was forced into action when starter Dave Frakes was injured making a tackle on special teams. The Tech win snapped Clemson's four-game winning streak in the series.

The Yellow Jackets stung the Tigers with 10 points on their first two possessions in the nationally televised ESPN game. Frakes opened the scoring when he hit a 37-yard field goal, ending an eight-play, 37-yard drive. The Jackets were limited to negative-two yards on three rushes during the drive, but quarterback Joe Hamilton connected with tight end Mike Lillie for 15 yards and split end Harvey Middleton for 24 to set up the score.

Following a Clemson punt that reached the endzone, Tech went 80 yards in eight plays for the game's first touchdown. Hamilton hit Middleton twice on the drive, the first going for 11 and the second for 13 and the score. Charles Wiley carried the ball four times for 27 yards on the march.

The Tigers showed signs of life with an extended drive of their own late in the first half. Clemson reached the endzone by driving the ball 84 yards in 14 plays, 13 of which were rushes. Tailback Raymond Priester carried the ball eight times for 37 yards on the 7:24 drive that ended with only 32 seconds remaining in the half. The score cut the deficit to 10-7. Priester finished the night with 99 yards on 25 carries.

Clemson was forced to punt on its opening possession of the second half when it failed to

convert a third-and-three play from its own 46-yard-line. Jason Bostic slipped through the Tiger defenders to block the Kevin Laird punt, and Travares Tillman grabbed it out of mid-air and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown. The score gave Tech a 17-7 lead with 11:14 to go in the third.

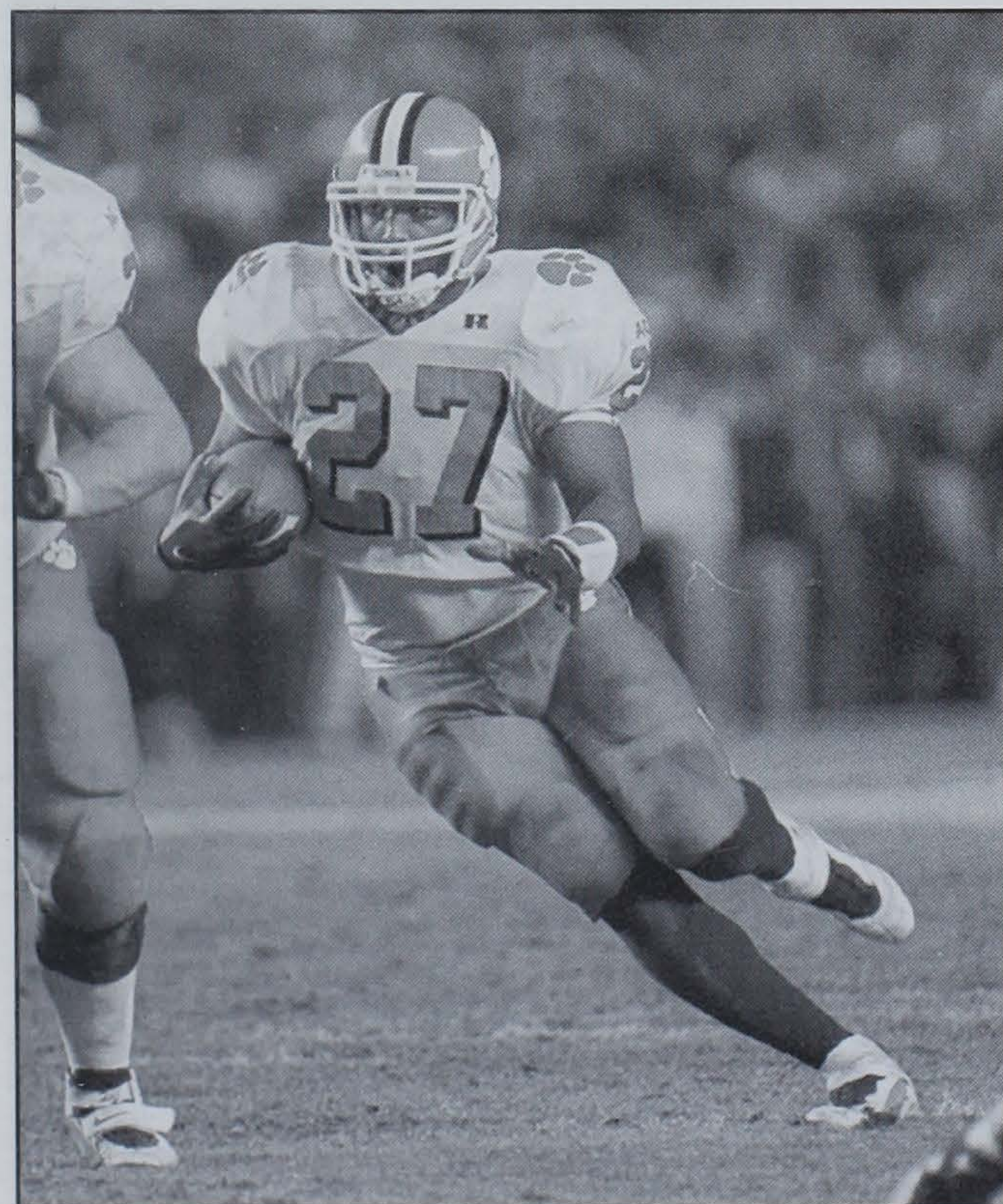
The Tigers struck back with a touchdown on their ensuing possession, driving 73 yards in six plays. Nealon Greene completed four of five passes on the drive for 72 yards and the touchdown to Mal Lawyer. The sophomore made the catch, spun around a defender, his knee missing the turf by inches, and then sprinted in for the score, which cut the deficit to 17-14. Greene finished the night 17 of 25 for 185 yards.

Antwan Edwards intercepted a tipped pass on the first play of the Jacket's next drive, setting the offense up at the Tech 33. Unable to gain a first down, the offense settled for a 45-yard Padgett field goal attempt, which missed wide right.

Chambers' first fourth-quarter field goal stretched the Tech lead to 20-14 with 11:24 remaining in the game. The Tigers tied the game on their next possession with an eight-play, 63-yard drive. Priester carried the ball over from six yards with 8:17 to go in the game, but the point after try failed, leaving the score tied at 20.

Georgia Tech took over at the Clemson 44 with 3:19 to go in the game, following a 21-yard punt return by Middleton. Then, the South Carolina native made a diving 39-yard catch on the ensuing play, putting the ball at the Tiger five. Tech gained only three more yards, but the damage was done when Chambers drilled the game-winner from 20 yards.

Anthony Simmons again led the team in tackles with 15, including two for loss. His linebacking battery mate Mond Wilson chipped in 11, while DoMarco Fox and Edwards added three and two passes-broken-up, respectively.

Quarterback Nealon Greene and receiver Tony Horne tied Clemson single-game records in leading the Tigers to a 39-7 win over Texas-El Paso. Greene tossed four touchdowns, tying Bobby Gage's record for the most touchdown passes in one game, while hitting on 18 of 28 passes for 241 yards. Horne made his way into the record book as well by hauling in three of those four touchdown passes, tying Dreher Gaskin's record for most touchdown receptions in a single game. The Biletnikoff award candidate finished the day with eight catches for 119 yards.

Terry Witherspoon put the Tigers on the board first when he bulled his way over from two yards out with 2:03 remaining in the first quarter. Greene went 4-5 for 45 yards on the 11-play, 62-yard scoring drive. Horne and Greene started making big-play connections in the second quarter on a five-play, 51-yard drive. Horne took a pass 40 yards up the left sideline on the third play of the drive, then two plays later pulled down Greene's first TD pass of the afternoon from 15 yards out. The Tigers missed the extra point following the first touchdown, then failed on a two-point conversion attempt while trying to make up the difference after the second score, making the lead 12-0 with 6:33 left in the opening half.

The Miners answered back on the ensuing possession, driving 80 yards in eight plays for their only score of the day. The big play of the drive came when Craig Strickland found Jimmy Carpenter wide open for a 42-yard pick-up. Elzie Johnson carried the ball in from six yards out, and the extra point provided the halftime margin of 12-7.

Clemson started to open the game up with touchdowns on consecutive drives in the third quarter. Tiger freshman Terry Jolly stripped Johnson of the ball and Lorenzo Bromell recovered, giving the offense possession at the Miner 42. Five plays later, Greene connected with Mal Lawyer for 29 yards and a touchdown. After another failed two-point conversion attempt, the Tiger lead stood at 18-7 with 8:34 to go in the

third.

Horne sparked the next scoring drive by returning a punt 45 yards to the UTEP 48. Greene passed for 13 yards to freshman Marcus Martin and scrambled for 13 more to get the Tigers a first-and-goal at the Miner four. After two running plays netted one yard, Greene tossed a perfectly timed pass to Horne in the corner of the endzone. David Richardson hit the extra point, giving Clemson a 25-7 lead with 4:10 to go in the third quarter.

Greene also guided Clemson to two fourth-quarter touchdowns. On the first, he completed four of six passes for 54 yards. The last 32 came on a third down and three pass over the middle to a wide open Horne who raced in for his third and final touchdown of the day. Richardson tacked on the extra point for a 32-7 Clemson lead with 9:14 left in the game.

The Tigers last drive of the day covered 66 yards in seven plays and 2:58. Greene scrambled for 34 on the second play of the drive, and Raymond Priester finished the drive by carrying the ball in from a yard out. Priester finished with 82 yards on 20 carries. The Tigers were also perfect in the red zone, scoring touchdowns in each of their four possessions.

Clemson's defense turned in their best performance of the year, giving up only 238 total yards. Lorenzo Bromell, starting at rush linebacker in place of the injured Adrian Dingle, turned in a career-high eight tackles, including two tackles-for-loss. Butkus Award candidate Anthony Simmons led the team with 14 tackles. Safety Antwan Edwards led the Tiger pass "D" with three passes broken up.

Four second-half Clemson turnovers led to 14 Virginia points as the Cavaliers escaped Death Valley with only their second victory ever, 21-7. The Cavs scored all of their points in a 5:17 span over the end of the third and beginning of the fourth quarters. The win tied Coach George Welsh with Clemson legend Frank Howard for the most ACC victories with 66.

Clemson scored with 24 seconds to play in the first half to stake a 7-0 lead at the intermission. Clemson took over at their own 40 with 2:07 to play in the half and broke into their hurry-up offense. Nealon Greene scrambled for 16 yards on the first play of the drive. Following a running play, Greene hit Brian Wofford moving over the middle for 20 yards. After an incomplection, Horne hauled in an 11-yarder to the nine. On first-and-goal, Greene went around right end for six and then spiked the ball on second-and-goal to kill the clock. Freshman Jarvis Austin then rushed up the middle for three yards and his first collegiate touchdown.

Trailing 7-0 midway through the third quarter, cornerback Dwayne Stukes fell on an errant option pitch to give Virginia possession at midfield. Seven plays later, quarterback Aaron Brooks found fullback Charles Kirby out of the backfield for 25 yards and a touchdown. Brooks finished the day 14 of 26 for 212 yards, two touchdowns, and no interceptions. The score tied the game at seven.

Clemson's ensuing possession again ended in a turnover. This time safety Anthony Poindexter picked off a Greene pass and returned it 22 yards to the Tiger 31. On the first play of the Cavs' drive, Brooks found tailback Thomas Jones for 24 yards to the seven. After an incomplection, Jones carried the ball the final seven yards to paydirt. Jones carried the ball 27 times for 100 yards on the evening.

The Virginia defense held Clemson three-and-out on its next possession, giving the Wahoo offense the ball at their own 47. Brooks hit receiver Germane Crowell on two of the three plays of the ensuing drive. The first was good for 15 yards, while the second went for 28 and the final score of the night. Crowell had six catches for 100 yards in the game.

The Tigers' comeback attempt was thwarted by two more turnovers. After getting down 21-7 with 14:16 to play, Clemson marched 55 yards to first-and-goal at the Virginia 5. Tony Horne, who operated some at tailback, was then thrown for a five-yard loss. On second-and-goal, Greene threw over the middle for Horne, but the ball was tipped into the air and into the hands of defensive back Adrian Burnim.

Clemson's defense then held, giving the offense another opportunity with 7:25 to go. Three first downs later, the Tigers were at the Cavs' 36. Disaster struck again, when Greene completed a pass to Horne who was then hit in the back, causing him to cough up the football. The fumble was recovered by linebacker Wali Rainer and ended the Tigers hopes of a comeback. During the comeback attempt, Greene completed his last 13 passes, which set a Tiger record.

The inside linebacker duo of Anthony Simmons and Mond Wilson led the Tiger defense with 10 and eight tackles, respectively. Simmons also chipped in a tackle-for-loss. Rush end Adrian Dingle and middle guard Raymond White added a sack each.

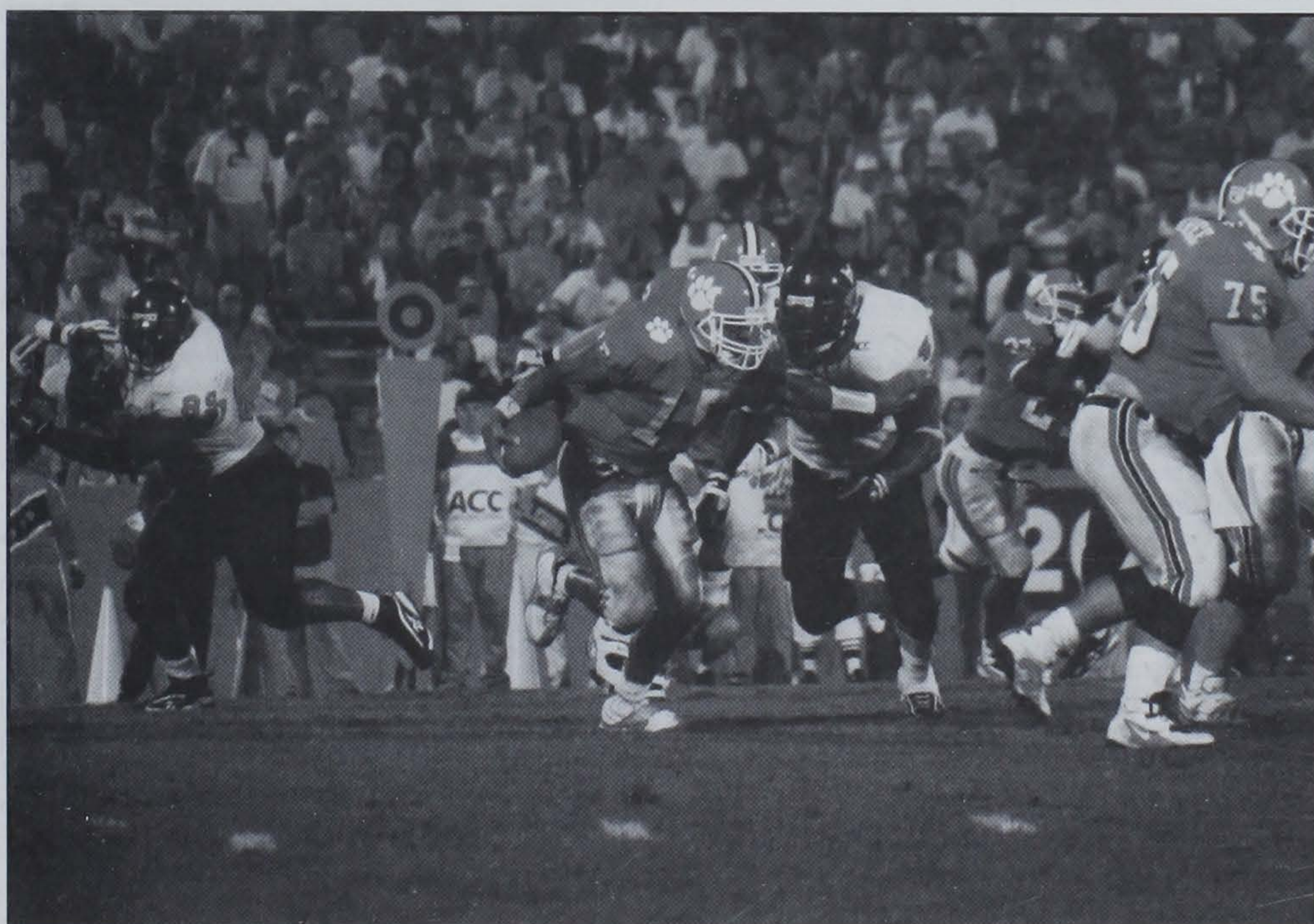

Tailback Raymond Priester helped Clemson re-establish its potent running game by carrying the ball 36 times for 204 yards and two touchdowns in the Tigers' 20-9 win against Maryland in College Park. The durable senior was at his best in the fourth quarter, when he carried the ball 13 times for 92 yards and a score. The win marked the Tigers' fifth straight and 10th in the last 11 tries against the Terps.

Clemson opened the scoring with a touchdown on its first possession of the game. The versatile Tony Horne took the opening kickoff 35 yards to the Tiger 37 and then caught a 13-yard pass from Nealon Greene on the first play of the game. The rest of the drive belonged to Priester. The Allendale, SC native carried the ball for the next seven plays, including the final 11 yards for the score. David Richardson tacked on the extra point to give Clemson a 7-0 lead with 11:34 remaining in the opening quarter.

The two teams traded punts for the rest of the first quarter before Maryland received the first big break of the game early in the second quarter. Cornerback Paul Jackson intercepted a Greene pass, giving the Terrapin offense possession at the Clemson 28. The Terps' promptly drove to a first-and-goal at the Tiger 8 before the defense stiffened. Aided by a crushing Anthony Simmons blow to running back Buddy Rodgers, Clemson forced Maryland to settle for a 19-yard Brian Kopka, field goal, which cut the Tiger lead to 7-3.

Following the same storyline, the teams again traded punts before a Greene interception. Linebacker Ken Ogle stepped in front of Greene's errant pass and returned it 12 yards to the Tiger 25. The Terp offense would not settle for a field goal this time, however, as freshman running

back LaMont Jordan carried the ball into the endzone from four yards out. The drive took four plays and 1:22, and marked the first time since 1992 that Maryland scored a touchdown against Clemson. Grad-student Raymond White made sure that the celebration was short lived, as he busted through the line to block the point after try, leaving the score 9-7 in favor of the Terrapins at the half.

Clemson relied on the running game and defense in the second half, as the offense threw only one pass and the defense did not give up any points after the break. Richardson's leg provided all of the third quarter scoring, as the junior connected on field goals of 27 and 42 yards, his first field goal attempts of the season. The first field goal came at the 4:07 mark of the third quarter and culminated a 10-play, 41-yard drive that gave Clemson the lead back, 10-9.

Linebacker Mond Wilson recovered a Brian Cummings' handoff on Maryland's next possession to set the offense up deep in Terrapin territory. Three plays could get the offense no closer to the goal-line, but Richardson extended the lead, nevertheless, to 13-9 with 1:47 to go in the third period.

Maryland punter Russell Edwards killed a punt at the Clemson six early in the fourth quarter, providing the starting point for a back-breaking Tiger drive. After a Priester gain of two, Greene scrambled 11 yards to the 19. The next 81 yards belonged to Clemson's all-time leading rusher, as he carried a school record nine consecutive times on the way to the endzone. The PAT put the Tigers up 20-9 with 7:30 left in the game. The Terps only serious threat the rest of the way ended with a 32-yard missed field goal at the two-minute mark.

Anthony Simmons led the team in tackles with 19, an effort that gained him the ACC Defensive Lineman-of-the-Week award. True-freshman Robert Carswell responded to his first career start by making 11 tackles and breaking up three passes. The tackle total marked the most by a member of the Clemson secondary this season, and the most by a first-year freshman in his first start since Derek Burnette had 11 at Wake Forest in 1992.

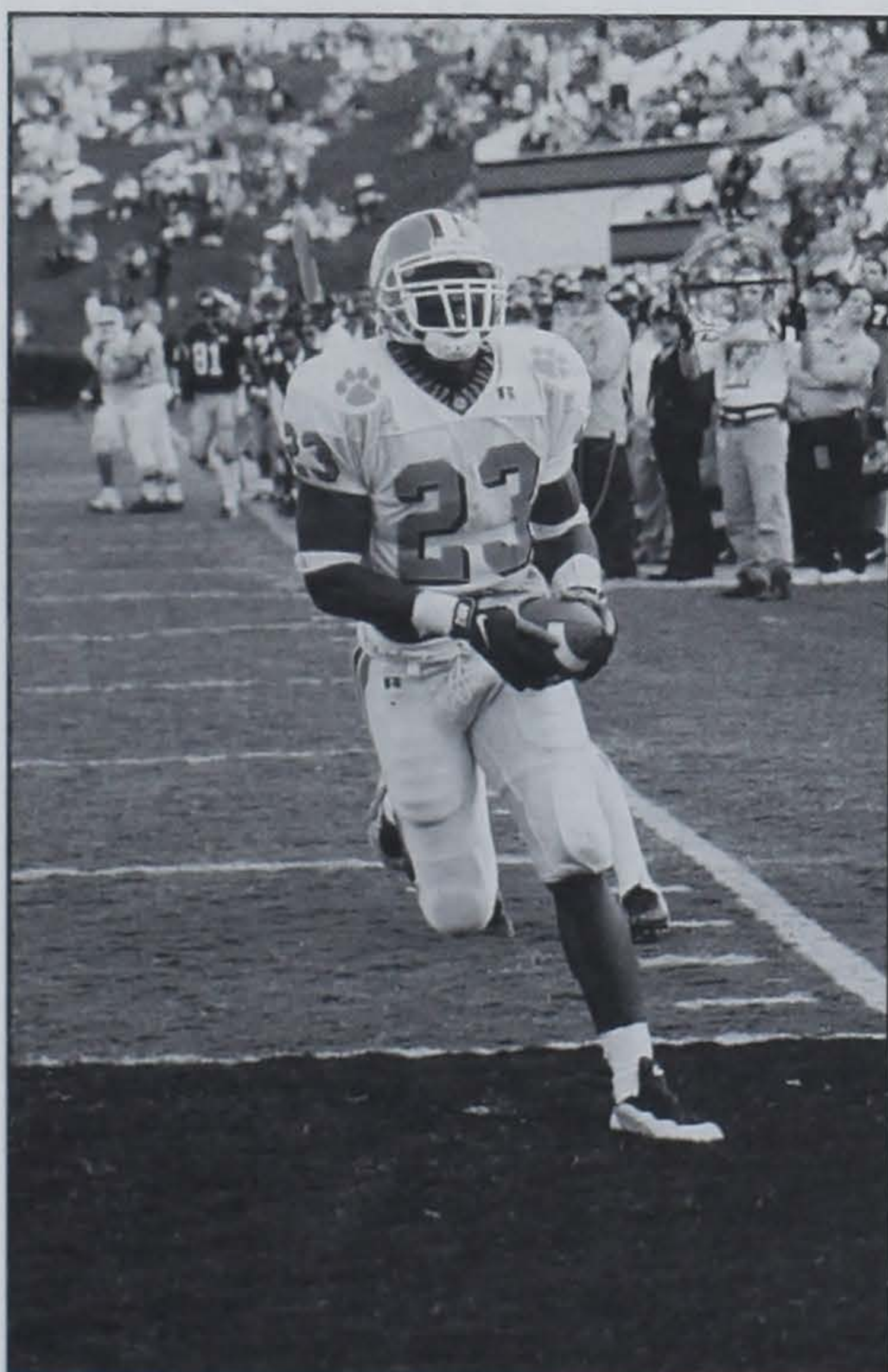
The Clemson offense scored on five consecutive possessions to turn a 10-9 deficit into a 33-16 victory at Wake Forest. Nealon Greene, who set six school records on the day, hit on 18 of 25 passes for a career-high 286 yards and two touchdowns. The senior quarterback also added 51 yards rushing, giving him 337 yards of total offense for the game.

Clemson scored on its opening drive for the second straight week when tailback Raymond Priester barreled over from the two yard-line with 9:35 to go in the first quarter. Greene connected with Brian Wofford over the middle for 20 yards to the Deacs' 13 to highlight the 10-play, 68-yard drive. Placekicker David Richardson's extra point attempt missed, and the Clemson lead stood at 6-0.

Wake answered back by driving 63 yards in 14 plays on the ensuing possession for a touchdown of its own. Quarterback Brian Kuklick found Thabiti Davis in the corner of the end zone on third-and-goal from the five for six. Matthew Burdick hit the PAT to give Wake a 7-6 lead with 3:55 remaining in the opening quarter.

The see-saw affair continued on the next Clemson possession, as Richardson closed out a stalled drive with a career-long 52-yard field goal. The field goal was the first of four on the day for Richardson, and gave the Tigers a 9-7 lead.

Backup quarterback Ben Sankey, replacing the injured Kuklick, would not let the Deacs' die, however. Sankey completed three of five passes for 37 yards to guide Wake to the Clemson 21 early in the second quarter. The Tiger 'D' held, and Burdick hit a 38-yard field goal to put Wake back on top, 10-9.

A missed 37-yard field goal attempt by Burdick with 4:30 remaining in the first half signaled the beginning of the end for the Demon Deacons as the Tigers would score points on their next five possessions. Richardson added his second field goal of the day, this one from 34 yards away with 27 seconds left in the half, giving Clemson a 12-10 lead that would not be relinquished.

A 43 yard kickoff return by Antwan Edwards to open the second half set the Tiger offense up at their own 46. Following two plays that netted two yards, Greene hit Biletnikoff Award candidate Tony Horne over the middle for 52 yards and the score. Horne finished the day with seven catches for 152 yards, tying for the third most receiving yards ever in a game by a Tiger. The extra point attempt failed, and the Clemson lead stood at 18-10.

Functioning without star tailback Raymond Priester, who went down with a sprained ankle, Clemson again turned to the passing game on its next possession. On third-and-12 from the Wake 41, Greene scrambled and lofted a pass to 6-4 red-shirt freshman Rod Gardner. Gardner reached over the defensive back to make the grab and walked into the end zone to end the 85-yard march. The PAT upped the margin to 25-10 with 6:34 left in the third quarter.

Two more Richardson field goals, from 30 and 35 yards, were sandwiched around a safety to give the Tigers a 33-10 lead. Wake drove 65 yards to a touchdown with 1:29 left in the game to close out the scoring.

Anthony Simmons claimed his second consecutive ACC Defensive Lineman-of-the-Week award by racking up 15 tackles, including two for loss and one sack to lead the Tigers. True-freshman Robert Carswell, starting for only the second time, turned in another solid performance as he tallied 11 tackles and two passes-broken-up. As a team, the Tigers only allowed 50 yards rushing and 279 total yards in one of their best performances of the year.

Rahim Abdullah intercepted a desperation pass from Duke quarterback Bobby Campbell and sprinted 63 yards for a TD to seal a 29-20 Clemson victory in the first overtime game between two ACC teams in conference history. The touchdown was the third of the red-shirt sophomore's career and capped a stellar day for the Jacksonville, FL native. In addition to the touchdown, Abdullah racked up a career high 11 tackles, one sack, and added a crucial stop on a fake punt by the Devils.

The contest was a battle of field goals early. David Richardson connected on a 19-yard field goal to cap the Tiger's initial drive, which had stalled at the Duke two. The Blue Devils answered with field goals on their next two possessions. The first Sims Lenhardt effort was good from 35 yards and tied the score at 3-3. Antwan Edwards returned the ensuing kickoff 32 yards before fumbling to give Duke possession at the 43. The Devils could get no closer than the Clemson 12, and were forced to call on Lenhardt again. This time the Charleston native hit from 30 yards to put Duke ahead, 6-3.

Playing without the school's all-time leading rusher, Raymond Priester, Clemson's offense began to turn to the air attack. Nealon Greene found Tony Horne for a 46-yard completion on the second play of its next possession, setting the Tigers up with a first-and-goal at the Duke 9. Greene finished with 12 completions in 21 attempts for 273 yards, giving him two straight games with a pass efficiency rating of at least 194.5. The Devil defense again held on the goal-line, and the Tigers were forced to call on Richardson for another 19-yard boot. The kick was good and re-tied the score at 6-6 with 12:41 remaining in the second quarter.

Clemson's 'D' held Duke to three-and-out on the ensuing possession and Horne returned the punt for 14 of his 229 all-purpose yards to the Devil 49. On the following play, Greene hit Brian Wofford streaking up the right sideline for 49 yards and the games' first TD. Wofford hauled in three catches for 95 yards on the day.

With the Tigers now leading 13-6, the teams punted back-and-forth until Duke's defense struck it big. Outside linebacker Kevin Lewis came around the left end untouched on a blitz to blind-side Greene at the Clemson five-yard-line and knock the ball free. Safety Darius Clark picked up the free ball and carried it in for a touchdown. The extra point provided the halftime score of 13-13.

The score remained tied until Lay Marshall bolted 17 yards up the middle for a Duke touchdown and 20-13 lead with 14:46 to go in the game. A Clemson fumble at the Blue Devil 11 cost the Tigers an excellent scoring opportunity in the final period.

Clemson would not be denied on its next drive, however. After an incompleteness on the first play, Greene reeled off three straight completions, including a middle screen that Horne took 34 yards for the game-tying score. Lenhardt missed a 47-yard field goal attempt wide right with 2:23 to go, forcing the game to overtime.

The Tigers lost the coin toss and were forced to take the ball first in overtime. Richardson nailed a 36-yard field goal after the offense moved

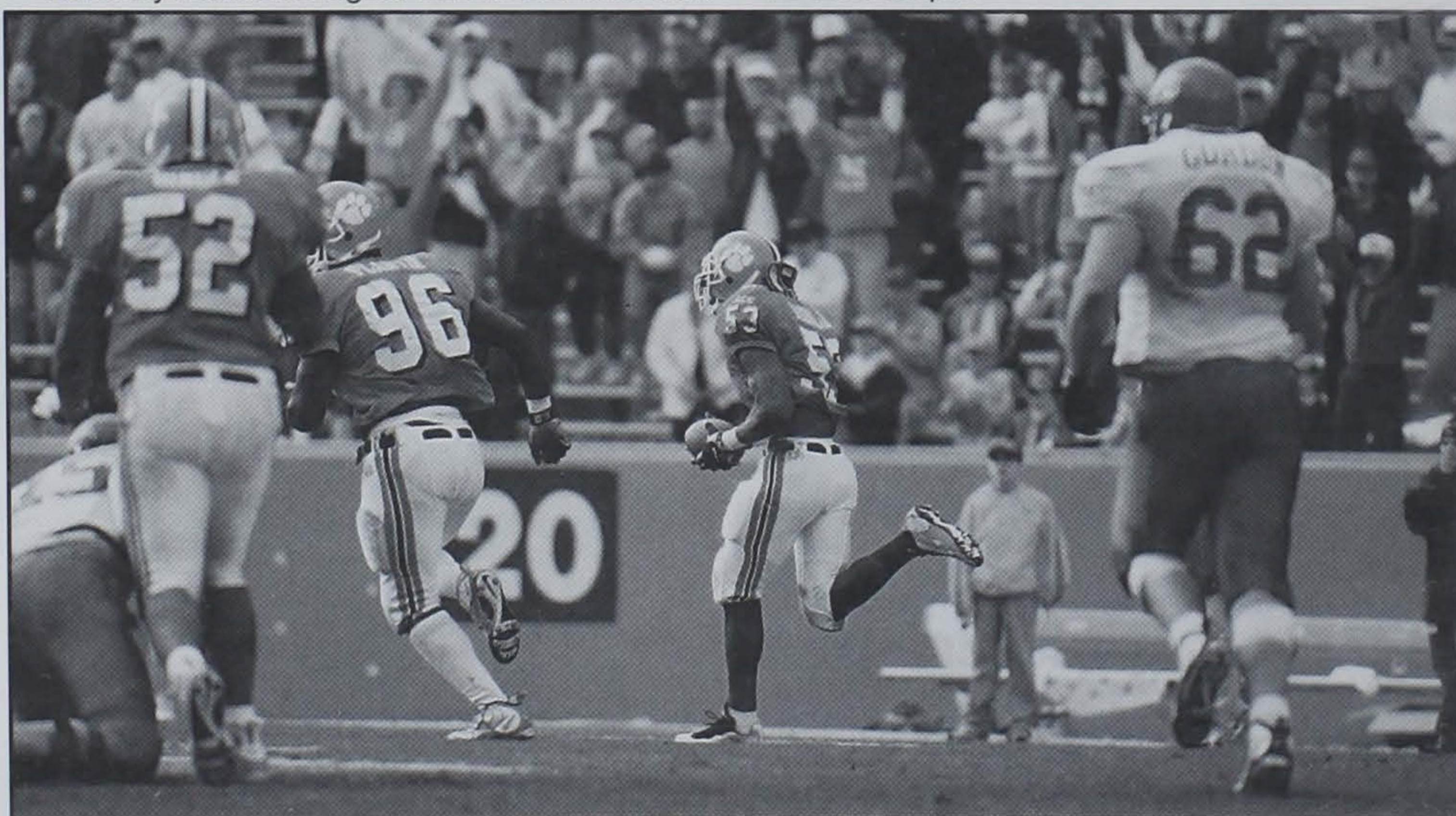

For the second time this season, Clemson played a top-10 team to the wire before falling by a touchdown as eighth-ranked North Carolina defeated the Tigers 17-10 in Death Valley. Stingy defense by the Tar Heels prevented Clemson from taking full advantage of four turnovers and two blocked kicks in limiting the Tigers to 132 yards of total offense.

Both defenses opened the game impressively, as each offense went three-and-out to start the game. Following a 60-yard boot by the Tigers' Kevin Laird, North Carolina took over at its own 20. On third-and-eight, quarterback Chris Keldorf tossed to receiver Jason Peace for a gain of two before freshman Robert Carswell stripped the ball free and rush end Adrian Dingle fell on it to give Clemson possession at the North Carolina 24. Three plays later on second-and-goal from the eight, Nealon Greene ran off guard on a designed sneak out of the gun to the three where he was hit. The senior, who was playing in his last game at Death Valley, managed to lay the ball over the goal-line for the first points of the afternoon. David Richardson's extra point gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead that would stand until late in the second quarter.

With 10:58 to go in the first half, the Tar Heels began their first scoring march of the day from their own 29. On third-and-18 from the Clemson 45, Keldorf found receiver L.C. Stevens deep over the middle for 44 yards to the Clemson one. Three plays later, North Carolina struck for their first points when Keldorf hit Na Brown slanting over the middle for the touchdown. The drive covered 71 yards in 12 plays and 5:18, and evened the score at 7-7 with 5:40 remaining in the first half.

Momentum seemed to be swinging to North Carolina when they blocked a Laird punt on the ensuing possession to gain possession at the Clemson 18. Clemson's defense only gave up three yards, however, and placekicker Josh McGee's 32-yard field goal attempt hit the right upright to leave the score knotted.

With 30 seconds left in the half, the Tar Heels

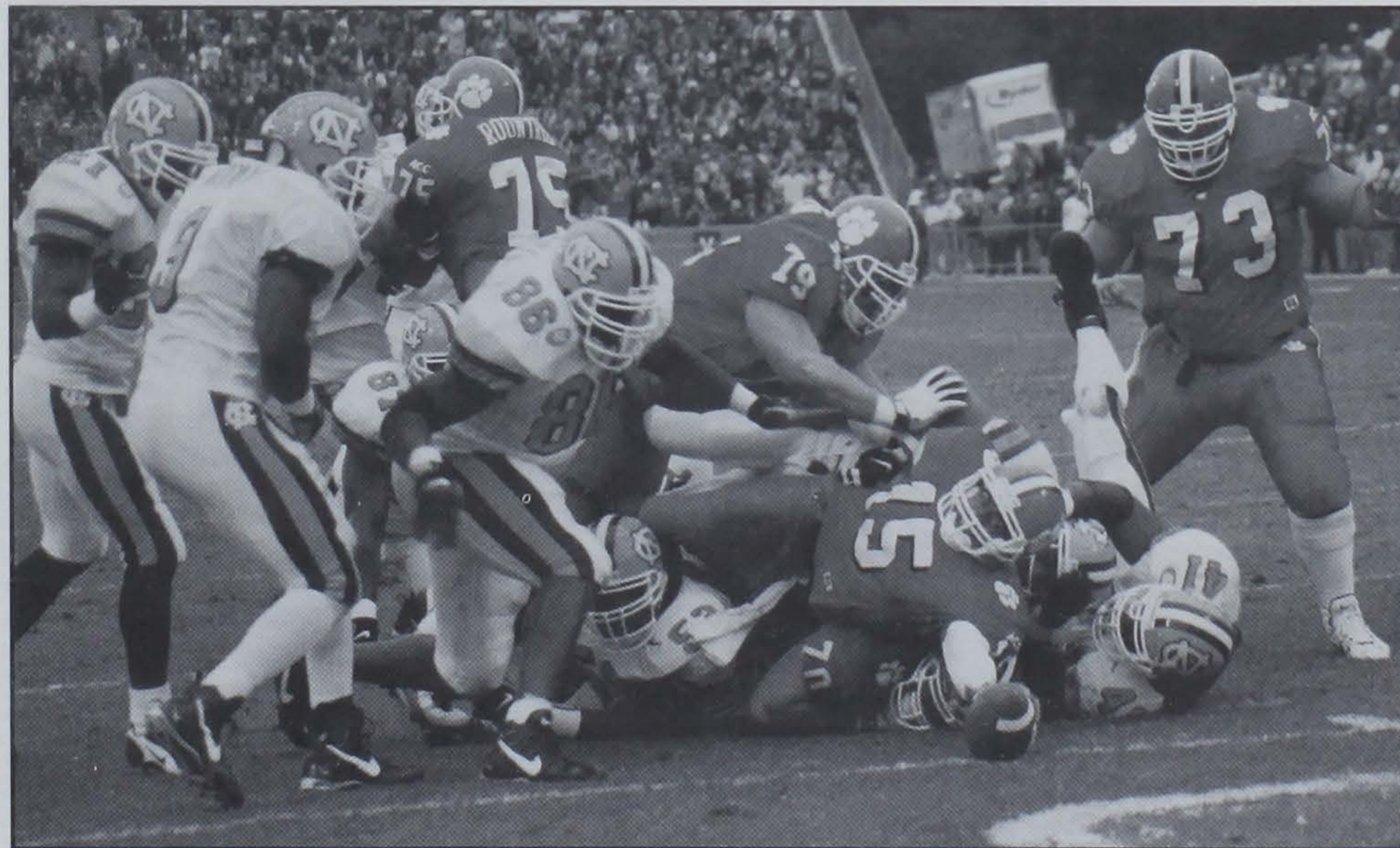
took over at their own 29. On the first play of this drive, Keldorf connected with Stevens for 67 yards to the Tiger four on what looked like an instant replay of their hook-up on the touchdown drive. Limited by time, UNC settled for a 19-yard field-goal and a 10-7 halftime lead.

Clemson gained three of their six first downs of the afternoon on a 36-yard drive late in the third quarter. The drive started at the UNC 42 and was set-up by a DoMarco Fox interception. The Tigers ran the ball nine straight plays before throwing incomplete on third-and-goal from the six. Richardson then came on to nail a 23-yard field goal which retied the game, 10-10.

UNC returned to the well on its next possession, as Keldorf again found Stevens open over the middle this time for 58 yards to the Tiger 5. Tailback Jonathan Linton raced the final five yards on the next play, as the Heels regained the lead, 17-10.

While the scoring was finished for the day, the excitement was not. Antwan Edwards blocked an 18-yard field goal attempt by McGee to keep the game in reach for the Tigers with 3:30 left. Clemson gained a first down under the guidance of back-up quarterback Brandon Streeter, who was subbing for the injured Greene, before punting with 2:21 remaining. The Tiger defense did not allow a first down, and the Tar Heels were forced to punt with 1:22 to go. Fox came through with a big play, busting straight up the middle to block the punt and give Clemson's offense one more chance from the 14-yard line of North Carolina. But after two incompletions and three-yard scramble by Streeter, Dre' Bly intercepted Streeter's fourth down pass in the endzone with 32 seconds remaining to end Clemson's upset bid.

Defensively, linebacker Anthony Simmons turned in a season-high tying 19 tackles, including three-for-loss and two sacks. Simmons also chipped in a pass-broken-up and three quarterback pressures in his ACC Defensive Lineman-of-the-Week performance. Middle guard Raymond White added a career-high 18 tackles to help the Tiger 'D' hold UNC to just 67 rushing yards on 40 carries. Senior Lorenzo Bromell added eight tackles, including three-for-loss and two sacks in his final home game. Harold Means, playing for the injured Mond Wilson, collected a career-high 15 tackles.

Clemson exploded for 44 unanswered points to turn a 14-3 deficit into a commanding 47-14 lead early in the fourth quarter as the Tigers cruised to a 47-21 victory over arch-rival South Carolina in Columbia. Senior Nealon Greene completed 12 of 15 passes for 157 yards and three touchdowns and Tony Horne became the first player in Clemson history to score a touchdown on a punt return and a reception in the same game. The win marked the seventh consecutive victory by the road team in the series and the 47 points were the most by a Clemson team against South Carolina since 1900.

Raymond Priester put to rest questions about the health of his ankle on the Tigers' opening drive. Clemson's career rushing leader carried for 13 yards on the 12-play, 64-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard field-goal by David Richardson. Priester had missed most of the three previous games with an ankle injury.

South Carolina bounced back with a 14-point explosion on touchdown runs of 54 and 35-yards by Troy Hambrick on consecutive possessions. The scores gave the Gamecocks a 14-3 lead at the end of the first quarter.

After a 32-yard Richardson field goal cut the Carolina lead to 14-6, South Carolina appeared to be driving for a third score late in the second quarter, when a single play seemed to turn the entire game around. Troy Hambrick tossed a bad pitch on a reverse and freshman safety Chad Speck fell on it at the Clemson 26 with 1:48 remaining in the first half. The Gamecocks would not cross into Clemson territory again until the Tigers' were up 47-14.

Greene rushed for 23 yards on two carries and was four-for-four passing for 41 yards in guiding the Tiger offense to the endzone in only 1:15. The touchdown drive cut the halftime deficit to 14-13 and marked the first of six straight possessions in which Clemson scored touchdowns.

Antwan Edwards, who was moved from safety to cornerback in week seven, and Tony Horne turned the third quarter into their personal showcase. Edwards intercepted South Carolina quarterback Victor Penn on the third play of the second half to give Clemson possession at the Gamecock 44. Six plays later, Greene found Tony Horne in the endzone for a 15-yard touchdown. The two-point conversion failed, but the Tigers had taken the lead for good at 19-14.

South Carolina was forced to punt on its next possession. Horne allowed the punt to take a high hop before fielding it on the run, then eluded several would-be tacklers and raced 39 yards for his second touchdown of the night. Edwards intercepted another Penn pass on USC's next possession and raced 42 yards for a touchdown of his own to up the score to 33-14.

South Carolina punted on its next possession, giving Clemson possession at its own 37 and the offense a chance to flex its muscle. Priester carried five times for 19 yards and Greene connected with tight end Lamont Hall on a middle screen for 23 yards. Greene then connected on a wide receiver screen to Mal Lawyer for 15 yards and a touchdown to increase the Tiger lead to 40-14.

South Carolina punted into the endzone on its next possession and Clemson's ball control offense took over. Priester carried twice for a total of 31 yards. Freshman Jarvis Austin then carried the ball four of the next five plays including the 19-yard scoring run that finished the Tiger scoring for the night with 10:00 remaining.

South Carolina answered with their own 80-yard drive, but it proved to be too little, too late; as Clemson won for the fifth straight time in Columbia.

Edwards was named the ACC Defensive Player-of-the-Week for his seven tackle performance. Senior middle guard Raymond White added nine tackles and senior Tony Plantin chipped in seven, including three for loss.

Dymon Adams and Travis Zachery combined for 252 yards rushing and Matt Bailey caught two touchdown passes to highlight play in Clemson's Spring Game on April 4th in Death Valley. The Orange (the offense) defeated the White (the defense) 27-0 in the scrimmage before 7,000 fans at Clemson Memorial Stadium.

Linebacker Kenzi Ross had a game high 13 tackles, while middle guard Terry Jolley had three tackles for loss to pace the defense. The scrimmage between the Clemson offense and defense concluded spring practice for Tommy West's Tigers.

Adams, who will be a junior in 1998, had 26 carries for 141 yards, while Zachery, who will be a red-shirt freshman, had 25-111. Zachery scored the game's only rushing touchdown, a one-yard run.

Three quarterbacks worked the scrimmage, all were freshmen. Junior Brandon Streeter was the first-team quarterback until he suffered a dislocated fractured ankle in the March 28 scrimmage. He obviously missed the spring game.

Slade Nagle threw two touchdown passes to lead the quarterbacks. He was 8-24 for 116 yards, but threw three interceptions. He had six rushes for 12 yards and directed three of the four touchdown drives, all in the first half. Woodrow Dantzler was 1-7 for 24 yards, but it was a 24-yard scoring pass to junior receiver Brian Wofford.

Nagle threw three interceptions in the first half, but he also threw two touchdown passes and led the offense on three scoring drives. Bailey caught the first of his two scoring passes with 4:24 to go in the first quarter on a 45-yard bomb from Slade Nagle. It culminated an 8-play 85-yard scoring drive.

Nagle led the offense to two touchdowns in the second period. Travis Zachery scored on a one-yard run with 3:26 to go, then Bailey caught his second scoring pass of the half on an 18-yard crossing pattern in the back of the endzone with just 13 seconds left in the half. The scoring pass came at the end of an 87-yard drive that took just 1:48.

The fourth touchdown of the scrimmage took place with 3:14 to go when Mal Lawyer caught a 24-yard scoring pass from Woodrow Dantzler. Brian Wofford had the most receptions on the day with 3-28, while Bailey had 2-63 and the two scores. Mal Lawyer had 2-36 and John Thompson caught 2-13.

Ross was the top tackler on a defense that had three interceptions, four sacks, two fumble recoveries and eight passes broken up. He had 13 total tackles, six hits and seven assists. Senior Chris Jones was also outstanding from inside linebacker with 12 tackles, while Harold Means had 10

tackles.

Alex Ardley had six tackles, a pass broken up and an interception, while Terry Jolley had six tackles, including three for losses. He also had a fumble recovery. DoMarco Fox had a 10-yard fumble return. Charles Hafley had a 20-yard interception return in the first period, while Chad Speck had a 10-yard interception return. Sacks were turned in by DaMonte McKenzie, Theo Mougros, Adrian Dingle and Gary Childress.

Kevin Laird's punting was a highlight of the spring game, as he had 11 punts for a 41.7 average, including a long punt of 74 yards.

"We wanted to play hard and see them get after each other in front of a crowd to see how they reacted, and we accomplished that," said Clemson Head Coach Tommy West. "Both sides of the ball played well, I was very pleased with this game and this spring overall. The only negative we have had this spring was the injury to Brandon Streeter.

"We are a lot quicker at running back, but we don't have the experience we have had. We are certainly a different team in terms of style of running the ball. Dymon Adams has some speed, he is still learning how to find the hole. Travis has outstanding quickness and good hands. We didn't throw the ball his way today, but he has the ability to catch the ball out of the backfield. Jarvis Austin did not play today because of a pulled hamstring.

"Matt Bailey played well today. We worked hard on the deep ball this spring and he made the play on a deep ball in the first half. Alex Ardley had a good day in the secondary. He made some big plays."

•**Howard Bartley**—Suffered a torn ACL against Wake Forest last November 1 and had surgery on November 21st. It is the second torn ACL of his career, one on each knee. He has missed all of spring practice and is looking to return in the fall.

•**Aaron Boone**—Was permanently dismissed from the Clemson football program for a violation of team rules on March 25th. Boone played for two snaps in one game (NC State) as a freshman before suffering a torn ACL, which forced him to miss the remainder of the season.

•**Michael Brice**—Placekicker who lettered in 1996 and played in 1997. Has left the program due to a leg injury.

•**Adonis Bristow**—Reserve running back who lettered in 1996. Suffered a torn ACL on August 29, 1997 and had surgery on September 19, 1997. Sat out spring and should return to team in the fall.

•**Darrel Crutchfield**—Starter at safety for the last two games of 1997. Moved to cornerback last spring.

•**Antwan Edwards**—Clemson's only returning All-ACC player (2nd team DB) from last year, he started six at safety and five at cornerback. Remained at cornerback in spring. Left the team on March 26 due to the death of his mother. Funeral was on March 31. Edwards missed the spring game.

•**DoMarco Fox**—Started all 12 games last year, first 10 at safety and last two at cornerback. Returned to free safety last spring.

•**Robert Goodson**—Reserve defensive back who lettered in 1996 and participated in 1997. Decided to leave the program last spring.

•**Brandon Streeter**—Starting quarterback who suffered a fractured dislocation of an ankle in March 28 scrimmage in Death Valley. Had surgery that same day and remained in the Oconee Memorial Hospital until March 30. Began jogging on June 15 and was expected to be ready for August practice.

•**Joedy Mitchell**—Reserve offensive lineman who suffered a broken leg during practice on March 6. Had surgery that same day and his status for the fall is unknown at this time.

Bowl Championship Series



1998 Postseason



Following the 1998 regular season, the Bowl Championship series (BCS) will determine the National Championship.

The BCS will consist of the Rose Bowl, Sugar Bowl, Orange Bowl and the Fiesta Bowl. The conferences with automatic berths include the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10 and Southeastern Conferences.

The Bowl Championship differs from the original Bowl Alliance in that, for the first time, it will guarantee a matchup between college football's top two teams in a true national championship game.

Any division I-A independent team or champion of the Western Atlantic Conference or Conference USA that is ranked sixth or higher in the BCS standings will also be eligible for the Bowl Championship Series.

Otherwise, any Division I-A team can qualify for the BCS if they meet one of the following requirements:

- *Has won at least 8 college football games during the most recently concluded season excluding victories in exempted games.*
- *Is ranked among the Top 12 teams in the BCS final regular season standings.*
- *Is ranked in the final BCS regular season standings no lower than the lowest ranked team selected by a Bowl from the Conference Champions.*

At the end of the 1998 regular season, the Fiesta Bowl will host the National Cham-

pionship contest. The game will be played on Jan. 4 at 8 pm ET in Tempe, Ariz. The Fiesta Bowl shall select the two top ranked teams in the BCS final regular season standings.

The BCS will also mark the return of regional consideration regarding the team selection. Specifically, as a member of the BCS, the Rose Bowl will host the Big Ten and Pac-10 champions in those years in which either the Rose Bowl does not have the national championship game or the Big Ten or Pac-10 champion is not ranked No. 1 or No. 2. Other "regional consideration" tie-ins include the SEC champion in the Sugar Bowl, the ACC or the Big East champion in the Orange Bowl and the Big12 champion in the Fiesta Bowl.

Other BCS bowl games following the 1998 season include the Orange Bowl on Jan. 2 at 8 pm ET, the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 at 8:30 pm ET and the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1 at 5 pm ET.

ABC-TV has the broadcast rights to each of the four bowl games during the four-year contract.

1997-98 Sports Review

OVERALL SPORTS NOTES

•Clemson was one of just three schools nationally to have a team in a bowl game, the NCAA men's and women's basketball tournaments and the NCAA baseball tournament in 1997-98. North Carolina, and Washington were the only other schools to pull off the major sport quadruple.

•This was the third straight year Clemson achieved the major sport quadruple, the only school in the nation that can make that claim.

•Both of Clemson's soccer teams advanced to the Final Eight of their respective NCAA Tournaments, something only UCLA could also claim.

•Ten of a possible 12 sports received team bids to NCAA postseason events. Sixteen of the 18 Clemson athletic teams had representation in postseason play.

•Clemson had an All-ACC athlete in 17 of its 18 sports.

•Seven Clemson teams were ranked in the final top 20 of their respective sports rankings.

•Clemson finished 25th in the final Sears Director's Cup rankings, Clemson's highest finish since 1993-94 when the Tigers were 16th in the national all-sports poll.

•The Clemson sports program won four ACC championships, including two by the men's track program (indoor and outdoor). Volleyball won its first ACC championship in history, while golf won the conference tournament for the second straight year.

•Clemson had a very successful season against state rival South Carolina. Clemson posted an overall mark of 9-4 versus the Gamecocks, including a perfect 5-0 record in fall sports, and a combined 3-0 in men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball. Clemson defeated South Carolina in men's basketball for the fourth straight year and the football victory in Columbia gave Clemson five straight wins in the capital city.

TEAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

•The Clemson **football** team advanced to a bowl game for the third consecutive year, one of 17 schools nationally who can make that claim. The Tigers set six team records in terms passing offense and individuals set 60 records on a season, game and career basis in 1997. The regular season concluded with a bowl clinching victory at South Carolina, 47-21, the highest point total scored by the Tigers against the Gamecocks in 98 seasons.

•The Lady Tiger **volleyball** team won its first ever ACC Championship. Jolene Hoover's team had perhaps the most impressive victory by any Clemson team this year when it defeated Maryland in four games in the second round of the ACC Tournament. Maryland entered the match having won 35 consecutive matches against ACC teams, was undefeated for the season and ranked 15th in the nation. It was the highest ranked win in Clemson volleyball history. The Lady Tigers went on to win the ACC Tournament with a victory over rival Georgia Tech.

•The **men's soccer** team advanced to the Final Eight of the NCAA Tournament and finished 12th in the final poll. Along the way Clemson defeated archrival South Carolina twice, including 1-0 in the second round of the NCAA Tournament in Columbia. South Carolina was ranked in the top 10 heading into both games. Thanks to the play of Matt Jordan, Clemson led the ACC in shutouts and saves.

•The Clemson **women's soccer** team advanced to the Final Eight of the NCAA Tournament, the highest finish in the short history of the program. Tracey Leone's team defeated eight top 25 teams over the course of the season, the first time in history any Clemson team in any sport had registered over 50 percent of its wins over ranked teams. Leone's team was 15-7 overall and finished the season ranked 10th in the nation.

•The **Lady Tiger basketball team** established a school record for victories in a season with a 25-8 overall record. Jim Davis's team also set a school mark for conferences wins in a season (12-4). The team advanced to the ACC Tournament finals for the third straight season. Included in the triumphs were victories over every other ACC team and a perfect 13-0 record at home, the first perfect home season in school history. Clemson defeated ACC rivals North Carolina, Virginia and NC State when all three were ranked in the top 10. Clemson, ranked 14th in the country in the final AP poll, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 10th time in 11 years under Jim Davis.

•Clemson's **men's basketball team** advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the third straight year, a first in school history. Along the way

Clemson defeated four top 25 teams, including a sixth ranked South Carolina team, the fourth straight year Clemson has beaten the Gamecocks. The Tigers were led by Greg Buckner, who became just the sixth player in ACC history to lead his team in scoring four straight years. The senior finished his career third in Clemson history in scoring.

•The Clemson **women's swimming** program had a #23 ranking in the final regular season poll and had a 9-4 regular season record. That was the highest victory total among ACC teams. Among the victories against a challenging schedule was a 64-point victory at South Carolina and a first-place finish at the Auburn Invitational. Auburn was ranked in the top five in the nation all season. The **men's swimming** program was paced by the performance of Razvan Petcu, who won the ACC championship in the 100 meters freestyle and qualified for the NCAA meet.

•The Clemson **golf** team was the highest ranked team on the Tiger athletic landscape in 1997-98. Larry Penley's Tigers finished second at the NCAA tournament in Albuquerque, NM, behind National Champion UNLV by just three strokes. It was the closest a Clemson team has come to winning the NCAA golf tournament in terms of ranking and stroke differential. All five Clemson starters had stroke averages under 72.7 a first in Clemson history. The Tigers won the ACC Tournament for the second consecutive year. The NCAA national Tournament was Clemson's 17th in a row, the second longest streak of its kind in the country.

•Clemson's **baseball** team advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 12th consecutive year. Jack Leggett's Tigers played host to a regional for the fourth time in five years and finished in the final top 25 for the 11th time in 12 years, the fifth in a row under Leggett. The Tigers won two out of three games from Florida State in April, elevating their record to 40-7 and a top three national ranking. Those were two of Clemson's eight wins over top 25 teams in 1998. Matt Padgett was the team's top player with a .376 batting average and he was drafted in the fifth round by the Florida Marlins at season's end. Patrick Boyd won ACC Rookie-of-the-Year honors.

•The Clemson **men's track** program had two top 11 finishes at the NCAA meets in 1997-98. In March, Clemson finished in a tie for third at the NCAA Indoor championships, while the men were tied for 11th outdoors. Shawn Crawford won the national championship in the 200 meters at the indoor championships. Clemson had nine All-America place finishers at the NCAA outdoor meet, led by Crawford, who was an All-American in three events. Bob Pollock was named ACC Coach-of-the-Year indoors and outdoors and was the District Coach-of-the-Year for the outdoor season.

•The **women's track** program changed coaches, but continued a strong success rate. Ron Garner's team finished second at the ACC Indoor meet and second at the ACC Outdoor competition. Four different Lady Tigers earned All-America honors at the NCAA Indoors, helping Clemson to a #33 final national ranking. Clemson had 13 All-ACC performances between the indoor and outdoor seasons.



Shawn Crawford was the 200 meter NCAA Indoor Track Champion and was a four-time All-American in 1997-98.

•Both Clemson **tennis** teams advanced to the NCAA regionals. The men were led by All-ACC player Bruce Li, while the Lady Tigers were paced by All-ACC performer Catherine Galvin. It was the 17th NCAA Tournament appearance for Chuck Kriese's men's program, while Nancy Harris's team advanced to NCAA Tournament play in her first year at Clemson.

INDIVIDUAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

•**Anthony Simmons** became just the second three-time All-American and third three-time All-ACC football player in Clemson history. The native of Spartanburg, SC led the ACC in tackles and tackles for loss in leading a Clemson defense that ranked sixth in the nation in rushing defense, 18th in scoring defense. Simmons was a first-team Associated Press All-American, the first AP All-America defensive player from Clemson in 15 years.

•**Cindy Stern** was first-team All-ACC and All-District III as a sophomore in a record setting 1997-98 season. The middle hitter ranked eighth in the nation in blocks per game and paced the ACC in that category. She established a Clemson single season mark for block assists. This past summer she was chosen for the USA National Team.

•**Sara Burkett** led Clemson's women's soccer team to its highest finish in history, a 10th-place final ranking and berth in the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament. The junior from Florissant, MO was a second-team All-America midfielder and a Hermann Award finalist. She was named first-team All-ACC for the third straight year, the first Lady Tiger in history to do that and she moved up to second place on Clemson's career points list.

•**Matt Jordan** was the top goalkeeper in college soccer in 1997-98. He led the ACC in save percentage and shutouts. He was a finalist for the Herman Award (Heisman Trophy of college soccer) and the Missouri Athletic Club Player of the Year. He concluded his career as Clemson's all-time leader in saves.

•**Charles Warren** was the recipient of the Dave Williams Award, given each year to the top senior player in college golf. Warren established 17 Clemson records in 1997-98, including the season mark for stroke average (71.28). The Clemson graduate also set marks for rounds in the 60s and rounds under par in a season. He won the ACC Championship for the second straight year and finished tied for second at the NCAA National Tournament. He was individual national champion in 1997.

•**Shawn Crawford** pulled in more hardware than any other Clemson athlete in 1997-98. Foremost among his accomplishments was his national championship in the 200 meters at the NCAA Indoor meet with a time of 20.69. He was an All-American in three events (100m, 200m and 4X100m relay) at the NCAA outdoor competition. He became the first Clemson track

athlete since James Trapp in 1992 to earn All-America honors in three different events in one NCAA track meet. The sophomore was third in the outdoor 200 meters and eighth in the outdoor 100 meters. At the conference level, he captured four championships, including the 200 meters both indoors and outdoors. He was named co-MVP of the ACC outdoor meet.

ACADEMIC NOTES

•Clemson student-athletes posted a 2.69 cumulative GPA for the spring semester of 1997-98, the highest combined GPA on record. The student-athletes were just .05 points away from the Clemson general student body average of 2.74, the closest differential on record. Every Clemson athletic team had at least a 2.3 GPA also a first.

•All-America offensive tackle **Jim Bundren** became just the second football player in Clemson history to be first-team All-ACC on the field and first-team Academic All-ACC, twice. Bundren, who started all 47 games at left tackle in his Clemson career, graduated in December, and was a draft choice of the Miami Dolphins.

•**Angela Brames** won the Marie James Award as a top student-athlete in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Brames was a key player on the Clemson women's soccer team and had another 4.0 year in the classroom.

•Clemson Lady Tiger swimmers **Jennifer Mihalik**, and **Erin Schatz** were both honorable mention All-Americans in the pool and first-team academic All-Americans in the classroom as chosen by the Collegiate Swimming Coaches Association.

•Basketball center **Tom Wideman** was named first-team All-District III on the CoSIDA Academic team for this season. He started the majority of Clemson's games at center for the third straight year, and was on the dean's list in both semesters.

•The Clemson **swimming** program had another outstanding academic year. Seven of the 17 Clemson student athletes in the Spring Semester who were on the President's List (4.0) were swimmers. The women's swimming team actually led the entire department with 25 on the academic honor roll and had a department best 3.21 GPA for the spring semester.

•Clemson's **football** and **men's basketball** teams each posted their second highest semesters in the last 14 years with their academic numbers for the Spring semester. Tommy West's football team had its highest team GPA in 10 semesters. The Clemson men's basketball team was the most improved, jumping half a point from the fall to 2.42. Only a 2.77 in the spring of 1997 is better since 1984.

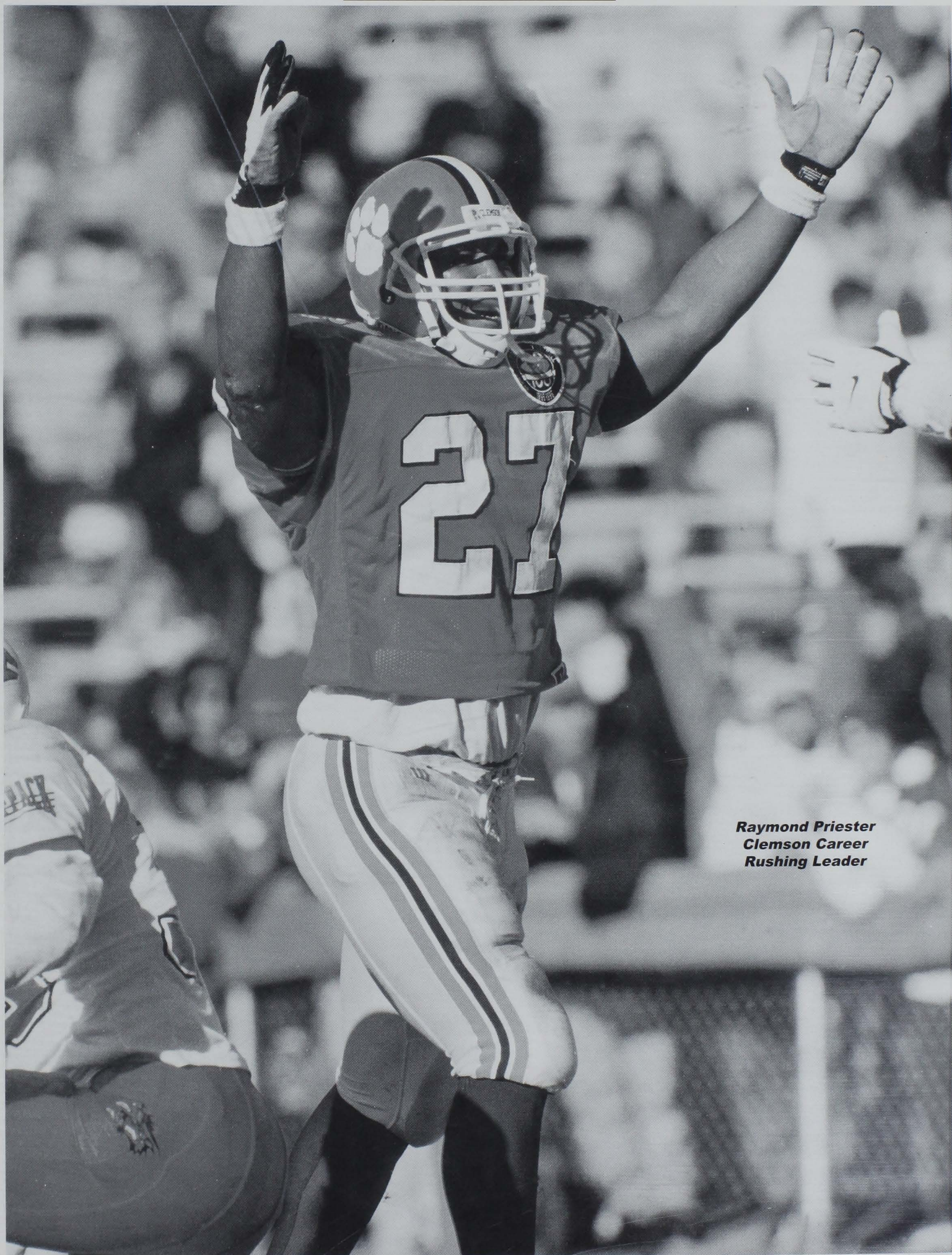

Clemson Radio Network

The Clemson Sports Network is regarded as one of the most innovative radio networks in the country and keeps Clemson fans informed with over 8 1/2 hours of programming on gamedays... featuring a tailgate show, the game broadcast and a post-game scoreboard show, all of which can be heard throughout South Carolina by radio and around the world via the Internet or pay-to-listen telephone dial-up.

The game broadcast features Clemson Hall of Famer Jim Phillips, who is in his 31st year as the "Voice-of-the-Tigers." Synonymous with Clemson athletics since the late 1960's, Phillips is one of the most respected play-by-play men in the country and a main reason for the networks popularity. A native of Youngstown, Ohio, Phillips has described 348 Clemson football games and 882 men's basketball games in his career and is now the dean of all broadcasters in the ACC. Phillips also provides the play-by-play for baseball and women's basketball in addition to his work on football and men's basketball.

He has been chosen South Carolina Sportscaster-of-the-Year five times and in 1992 was honored with the "Master's Award," the highest award offered by the South Carolina Broadcaster's Association. The "Master's Award" recognizes lifetime achievement and had only been bestowed twice prior to Jim's presentation. He was also inducted into the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame in 1992, his 25th year as the Voice-of-the-Tigers. In addition to his accuracy and flair in broadcasting, Phillips induction was also a result of his dedication, reliability and consistency.

Joining Phillips on the broadcast team is another Clemson Athletic Hall of Famer, Mike Eppley, who is entering his ninth year as the Clemson Sports Network's football color analyst. A native of Charlotte, N.C., Mike is Clemson's number three ranked passer in terms of efficiency rating. He guided Clemson to 21 victories as the starting quarterback between 1982 and 1984, and also set the career record for TD passes with 28.

Rodney Williams, another Clemson football great, is the third member of the broadcast team. Williams led Clemson to 32 wins as the starting quarterback between 1985-88, an all-time Clemson record. Williams provides color commentary during the game from the sideline and anchors the post-game show from the locker room after the game with interviews from Clemson players and coaches.

One of the most popular aspects of the Clemson Sports Network is the *Tiger Tailgate Show*, a program that gets Clemson fans ready for the action beginning three hours prior to kickoff. Hosted by Bill Love, Howard Hudson and Joe Erwin, the *Tiger Tailgate Show* also features former Clemson All-American Perry Tuttle and Whitney Walters.

Concluding each broadcast Saturday for the 19th season is the *The Fifth Quarter Show*, an

award-winning two-hour college scoreboard show hosted by Don Munson and Chris Scott. *The Fifth Quarter Show* provides a rundown of games from across the nation with up-to-the-minute "live" reports and scores from eyewitness reporters. *The Fifth Quarter Show* continues the Clemson Sports Network's tradition of providing complete coverage of college football each Clemson Saturday.

Clemson University fans who do not have radio or television coverage of Tiger game broadcasts in their area will be able to hear every Clemson Sports Network radio broadcast this fall by listening over the telephone. By dialing 1-800-846-4700 from any phone in the United States and entering the Clemson University team code (0665) fans with a VISA or Mastercard account can be connected directly to the live radio play-by-play of the game broadcast! When using a speakerphone, game broadcasts sound similar to listening to an AM radio.

In addition to the radio network TEAMLINE service, the Clemson Sports Network will also have the entire schedule of broadcasts available worldwide on the Internet, live and in real time. Computer users who have a sound card and Internet access can now listen to a Clemson University sporting event anywhere in the world! 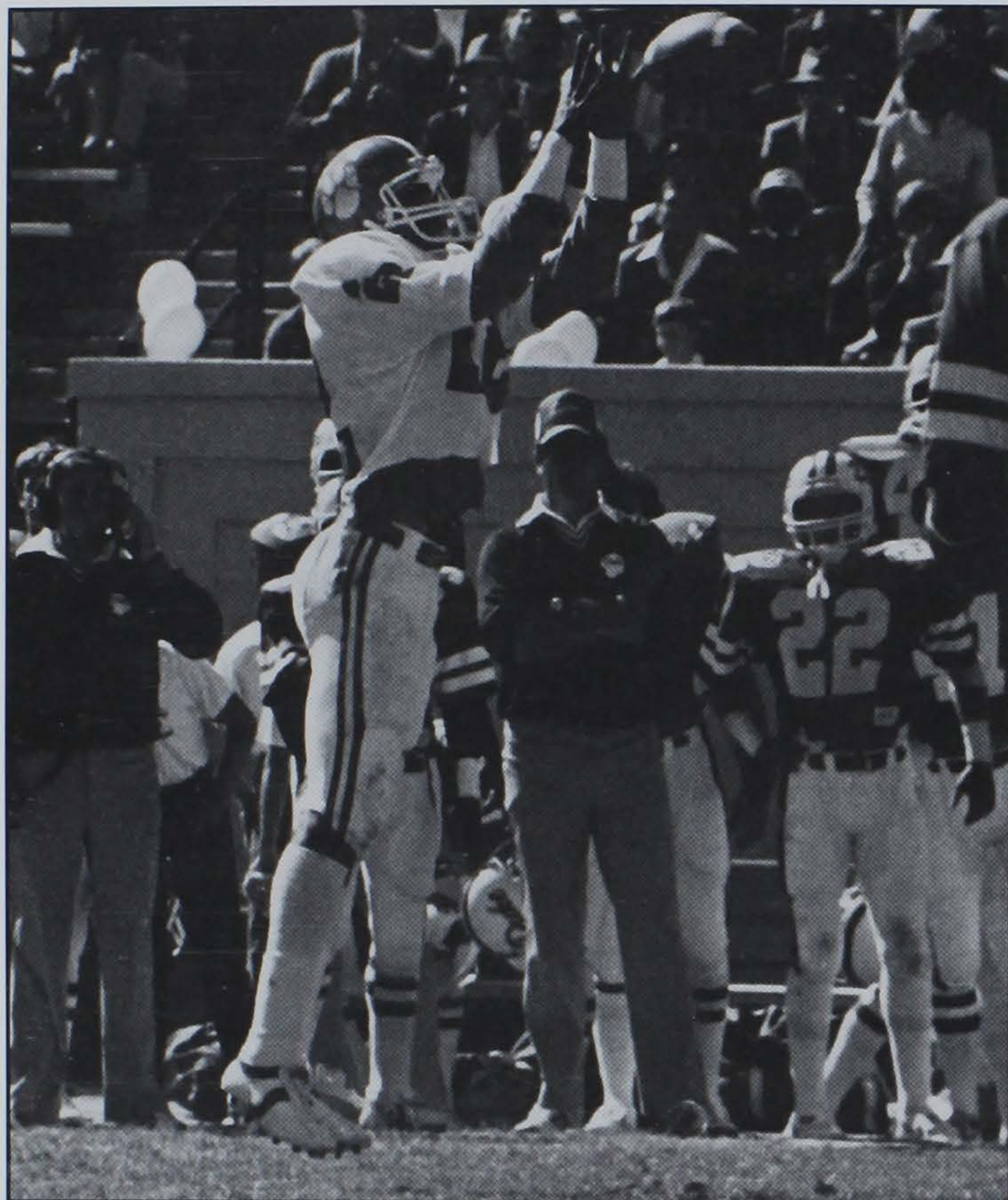

Clemson History Clemson Ring of Honor

The Clemson Ring of Honor is in its fifth season of existence in Clemson Memorial Stadium. On September 3, 1994, during ceremonies prior to the Clemson vs. Furman football game, Frank Howard, Steve Fuller and Banks McFadden were inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor. On September 2, 1995, Jeff Davis was added to the Clemson Ring of Honor. On September 6, 1997, Fred Cone was added.

The Ring of Honor is the highest honor a Clemson football player can receive. A recipient must first be a member of the Clemson Hall of Fame, earn at least an undergraduate degree, and make a significant contribution to the heritage of Clemson athletics. Honorees will have their jersey retired.

Howard was Clemson's head coach between 1940-69 and he guided Clemson to eight conference championships, six bowl games and six Top 25 seasons. He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1989 and is the second winningest coach in ACC history. He had 165 wins when he retired, the most in ACC history.

McFadden was named the nation's most versatile athlete in 1939. He was an All-American in football and basketball, the only Clemson athlete in history to do that. McFadden led Clemson to its first bowl bid ever, a 6-3 win over Boston College in the 1940 Cotton Bowl. He was the number-three pick of the 1940 NFL draft, the highest draft selection in Clemson history.

Fuller is the only football player in Clemson history to be chosen an All-American on the field and in the classroom. Fuller was a first-team Academic All-American in 1977 and 1978 and was a third-team AP All-American in 1978. Fuller, who was ACC MVP on two occasions, is still Clemson's all-time leader in touchdown responsibility. He was an NCAA Top Five Award winner in 1979, the only Clemson athlete to win the award.

Davis, captain of Clemson's 1981 National Championship team was a first-team All-American that year when he led the Tigers in tackles with 175, the second highest total in Clemson history. Davis was also named the MVP of the ACC and was the Defensive MVP of the Orange Bowl victory over Nebraska, the game that clinched the national championship for the Tigers.

Cone, was the first player in Clemson history to rush for at least 2,000 yards in a career. Cone played for the Tigers from 1948 to 1950. He still ranks second on the Clemson career list for touchdowns with 31. Cone was a starter on two undefeated Clemson teams, one of two players in Clemson history to do that.

CLEMSON UNIVERSITY RING OF HONOR GUIDELINES

Purpose: The charge of this committee is to bestow the highest athletic award presented by the Clemson Athletic Department on deserving candidates. The committee will examine the careers of candidates in all Clemson sports.

Nominations: Nominations are made by any member of IPTAY, faculty or staff personnel, or relative of a worthy candidate, and are accepted 30 days prior to the committee meeting. The committee will meet once every two years in the month of April to vote on the nominations. Nominations will be made in the form of a letter with a complete list of accomplishments, and submitted to the chair of the committee, who will retain an active file of nominations. Letters of support may also be submitted. All nominations will remain on file for a period of three voting committee meetings (five years). The Chair of the Committee will screen all nominations to make sure they meet eligibility requirements.

- (i.e. Head Football Coach votes on football candidates, basketball coach votes on basketball candidates, etc.)

Eligibility: This committee will recognize individuals who have demonstrated consistent and unique national excellence in their sport during their Clemson career. Their accomplishments must be significant on an individual and team basis. Their statistical accomplishments must be noteworthy, but they should also have an outstanding record in terms of leadership. In general, they must have made a noteworthy contribution to the history of the Clemson Athletic Program.

Athletic accomplishments after their Clemson career are not a primary consideration in the nomination, but they must retain an unblemished record of citizenship after they leave Clemson.

A candidate must be a member of the Clemson Hall of Fame and must hold a baccalaureate degree from an accredited four-year University or college.

Financial contributions to Clemson University will not be a consideration when evaluating the candidates.

For a coach to be nominated he or she must be retired from coaching that sport at the college level.

Selection Process: Each committee member will cast one vote per sport. An honoree must obtain at least seven votes to be selected. There will be just one ballot. The committee does not have to select any honorees at its meeting. There shall be no more than one honoree in a sport for every two years.

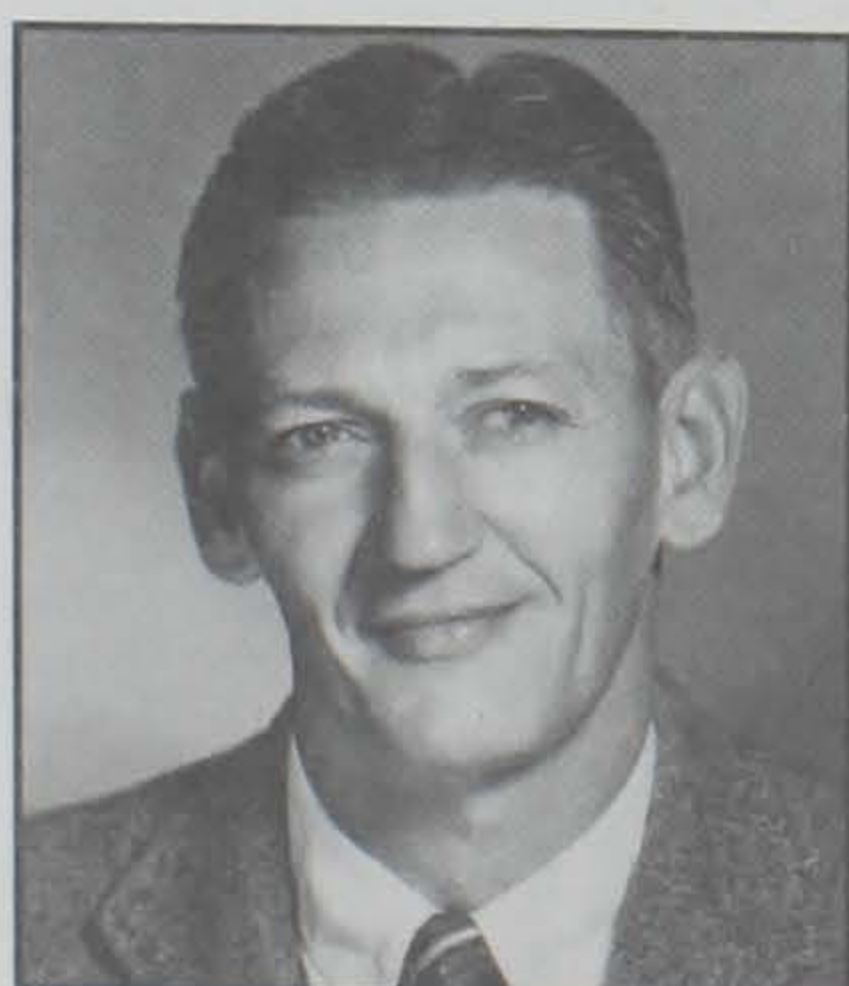
Conferring: In the sport of football, the honoree will have his name, number, years participated and helmet enshrined in the Ring of Honor at Clemson Memorial Stadium. In the sport of basketball, the honoree's jersey will be hung from the rafters of Littlejohn Coliseum. In the sport of baseball a jersey replica will be hung from the fence of Tiger Field. Other sports will establish appropriate sites at the home facility.

When a student-athlete is selected the person's jersey is honored, but the jersey number may be worn in the future.

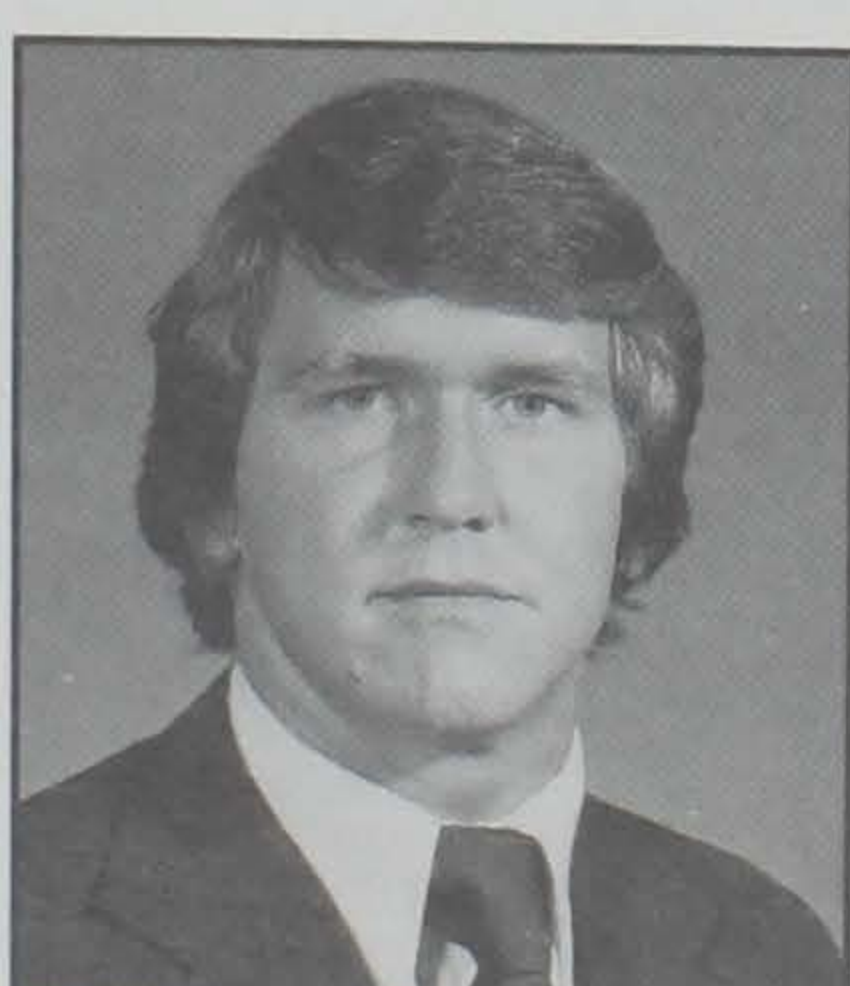
The nature and organization of the ceremony will be determined from a meeting between the honoree, the athletic director, the committee chair and the head coach of the sport involved.



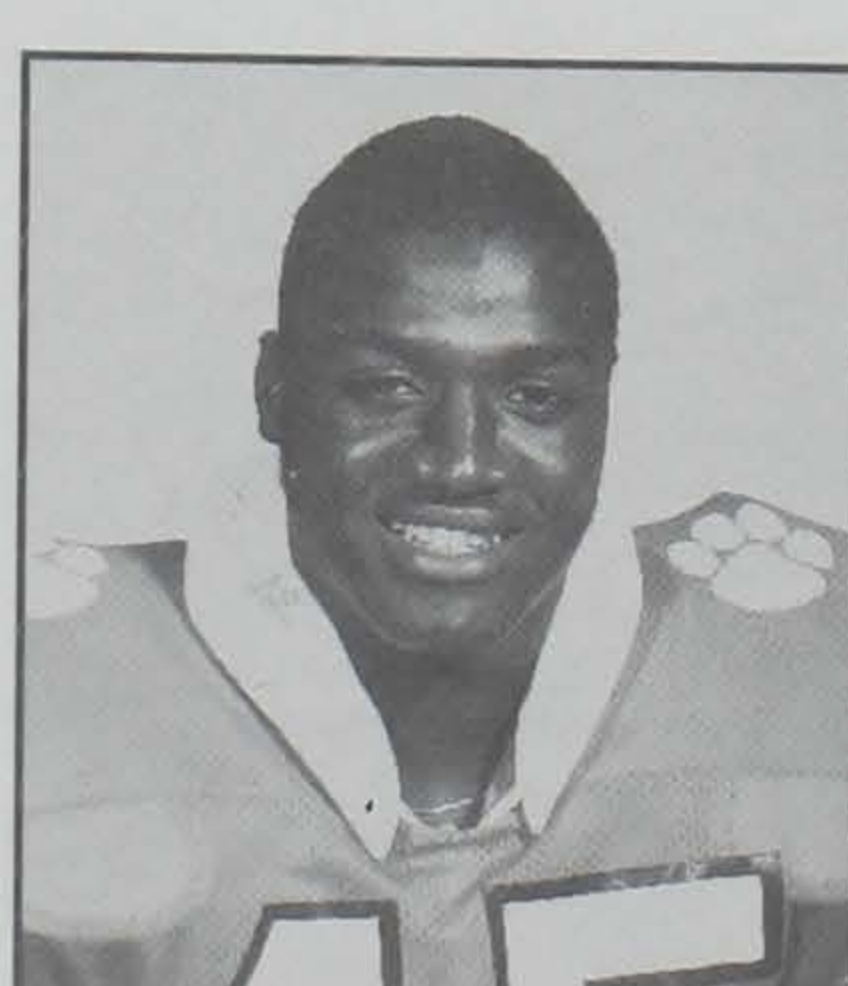

Clemson History *Tiger Timeline*

September 30, 1896—A small crowd gathered in one of the barrack's rooms and discussed the advisability of organizing a football association and to devise some means of getting a coach. The organization known as the Clemson College Football Association was perfected and the following officers elected: President F.G. Tompkins, Secretary and Treasurer C.W. Gentry, Manager T.R. Vogel, Temporary Captain R.G. Hamilton. A committee of three was appointed to consult professor Riggs as to management of a football team and to ask his aid as coach.

October 5, 1896—Practice began on the Clemson College campus on a 50x200 foot field in front of the college.

October 28, 1896—Clemson played its first intercollegiate football game, defeating Furman, 14-6, at Greenville, SC. This was the first time that many of the Clemson players had seen a full-sized football gridiron.

November 21, 1896—Clemson defeated Wofford by the score of 16-0. When the team arrived back on campus that night, the cadet corp along with faculty members led the team around in a buggy led by a torchlight procession and proceeded to go all over the campus. With this win, Clemson claimed the state championship.

November 10, 1897—Clemson defeated South Carolina for the first time and won the school's second state championship. A total of 2,000 spectators witnessed the 18-6 victory. Clemson, took an early 4-0 lead when South Carolina's Lee Hagood fumbled on the Gamecock's 31-yard line and Clemson's W. T. Brock caught the fumbled ball in the air and raced 30 yards for a touchdown.

November 10, 1899—The football association stood on a very weak financial basis. The organization could not even afford to hire a coach. W.M. Riggs agreed to coach the Tigers for free.

December 8, 1899—John Heisman was hired as head coach.

October 22, 1900—The Tigers defeated Wofford, 21-0. Actually, Clemson scored many more points, but a pre-game agreement between the teams stated that every point Clemson scored after the first four touchdowns would not count. No one could keep an accurate count after Clemson scored its first 21 points after six minutes into the game elapsed. All touchdowns Clemson made were called back and the ball given to Wofford deep in Clemson territory on such penalties as running over a Wofford tackler.

November 29, 1900—Clemson's 35-0 win over Alabama allowed Heisman's team to finish the season undefeated with a 6-0 record. This was Clemson's first undefeated team and was the only team to win all of the games in a season until the 1948 squad went 11-0.

October 5, 1901—Clemson opened the season with a 122-0 win over Guilford, the most points scored in Clemson history. The Tigers averaged 30 yards per play and a touchdown every minute and 26 seconds. The first half lasted 20 minutes while the second half lasted only 10 minutes. Legend has it that every man on the Clemson team scored a touchdown in this game.

October 30, 1902—Col. Charles S. Roller Jr., who was football coach of Furman, was the only referee for the Clemson-USC game. Bronco Armstrong, a famous Yale player and official, was to be the umpire but was in a railroad wreck on the way down and it was impossible for him to get to the game in time. Not a single penalty was called in the game. A riot between Clemson and USC fans broke out the night after the game. Officials at both colleges called off the football series between the two schools. Clemson and USC did not meet again in football until 1909.

November 27, 1902—Clemson played in the snow for the first time in a game against Tennessee. The Tigers won the game, 11-0, and claimed the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association crown.

October 10, 1903—Clemson 29, Georgia 0—First 10 minutes of the game, Clemson fumbled the ball

three times. After the game, the Georgia team made a deal with the Clemson team. They would give the Clemson team a bushel of apples for every point Clemson would defeat Tech above the score Clemson made against Georgia. The score turned out to be Clemson 73, Georgia Tech 0. Apples were plentiful around Clemson that winter—44 bushels.

October 17, 1903—Clemson defeated Georgia Tech 73-0. Clemson rushed the ball 55 times for 615 yards, still a school record, while Tech ran the ball 35 times and collected 28 yards. The second half was shortened to 15 minutes.

October 28, 1903—The Tigers defeated N.C. State 24-0 in Columbia, SC at the fairgrounds. One incident that delayed the game's start was the fact that the sideline spectators in their eagerness to see each play crowded in front of the grandstand and on the field. Twenty minute halves were played owing to the fact that the field had to be given to the racing association at 12:45 p.m. Even these short halves could not be played out and the time limit was up when 16 minutes of the second half had been played. Heisman married Evelyn Barksdale in Columbia after the game.

November 26, 1903—One day after Tech's deadline for its offer had expired, Heisman wired Georgia Tech's president Lyman Hall, that he would accept the institute's offer of \$2,250 per year plus 30 percent of net receipts to coach its athletic teams.

September 30, 1904—Clemson began practice under new Head Coach Shack Shealy, who was at one time a great football player. He played varsity ball six years, four at Clemson and two at Iowa State. He is still the only Clemson graduate to coach the Tiger football team.

November 11, 1905—The Clemson-Auburn game was called on account of darkness. Clemson won, 6-0.

November 29, 1906—Clemson's first forward pass occurred in a 10-0 win over Georgia Tech. Powell Lykes dropped back to kick, but instead made a forward pass of 30 yards to George Warren.

September 28, 1907—The cadets of Clemson College braved wind and rain at Bowman Field to witness the Tigers in their earliest season opener to date. Clemson met Gordon Military Academy from Georgia on a muddy field. Clemson was playing under new Coach Frank Shaughnessy, a former Notre Dame star who to this day holds the Notre Dame record for the longest run.

November 4-9, 1907—Clemson played three games within a week's time. Clemson lost to Auburn 12-0 on November 4, and lost to Georgia in Augusta, GA on November 7. The Tigers barely made it back in time to play Davidson at Clemson on November 9, and lost 10-6.



Clemson posted a 19-8-2 mark on Bowman Field between 1898-1914.

April 1, 1908—Tiger football hopes of the 1908 season were shattered on this day, not by what happened in spring practice, but what 300 students did as a college prank on April Fool's Day. The cadets were expelled for removing a Civil War cannon from the town square of Pendleton, four miles down the road from campus, and bringing the cannon back to Clemson. Many of the football stars, as well as many future star players, were among those who were expelled.

Oct. 9, 1915—The Tigers traveled to Knoxville, where they won fame by defeating the defending conference champion Tennessee, 3-0. Bill Harris drop-kicked a 20-yard field goal for the only score of the game in the fourth quarter. Tennessee was the defending champion of the S.I.A.A.

October 13, 1917—Clemson downed Furman 38-0, as the Tigers' Stumpy Banks scored five touchdowns, a record that still stands today.

November 16, 1918—The University of South Carolina athletic authorities provided the use of their stadium to Clemson and the Citadel for their annual game. South Carolina was playing at Furman that day and the field was not going to be used by the Gamecocks. The reason the game was played at Columbia instead of Charleston or Clemson was that the military officials from both Clemson and The Citadel would not allow players to be absent from any military duties due to athletic events. Since the game was played in Columbia both the Clemson and Citadel cadets and football teams would be able to make the trip to Columbia and return to duty on time. Clemson's John O'Dell scored for the game's only tally as the Tigers won the game, 7-0. Both teams made it back to their campuses before their passes expired.

December 27, 1926—Josh Cody was named head football coach at Clemson.

September 19, 1928—Clemson began this season with new uniforms. The Tigers wore a brilliant orange jersey for the first time, with black composition cloth stripes on the front with purple numbers.

December, 1928—O.K. Pressley, a center, is named third-team All-American by the Newspaper Enterprise Association. He is Clemson's first All-American in any sport.

May 6, 1929—Josh Cody, Clemson head coach, was presented with a new automobile that afternoon as a gift from alumni, faculty, students, and friends of the college. A special collection was taken up to purchase the new Buick. The presentation ceremony was staged in front of Tillman Hall.

October 17, 1930—Maxcey Welch scored five touchdowns (all rushing) in Clemson's 75-0 win over Newberry. Welch and Stumpy Banks are the co-holders of that Clemson touchdown scoring record.

March 13, 1930—Josh Cody signed a new contract to stay at Clemson through the 1932 season.

November 26, 1930—Josh Cody announced that the Furman game the next day will be his final as head coach of the Tigers.

November 27, 1930—Clemson defeated Furman 12-7 at Furman to conclude the Tigers third straight eight-win season, the only eight-win seasons in Clemson history between 1896-1930. The 1930 Tigers concluded the season with an 8-2 record and posted four shutouts. In fact, only Tennessee and Florida scored over a touchdown against the Tigers in this season.

November 29, 1930—The Tiger student newspaper published an extra edition about Coach Cody, hoping to convince him to remain as head coach. Cody had become a popular mentor because of his overall record 29-11-1 record, including a perfect 4-0 record against South Carolina, the only coach in Clemson history to have a perfect ledger against the Gamecocks.

January 2, 1931—After reconsidering his decision for over a month, Cody made his resignation final.

January 17, 1931—Jess Neely was named head football coach at Clemson. He is the second consecutive Vanderbilt graduate to coach the Tigers. Cody had been a 1917 graduate of Vandy and Neely was a member of the class of 1923. In fact, eight of the last nine Clemson head football coaches were graduates of current SEC schools.

October 16, 1931—Clemson suffered a surprising 6-0 loss against The Citadel in a game played in Florence. After the game, Neely, Captain Frank Jervy and others met in a car outside the stadium to discuss ways Clemson could help its football program get back on track. The meeting started the ball rolling towards the establishment of the IPTAY Foundation. Clemson would score just three touchdowns and win just one game during the 1931 season.

October 14, 1933—Clemson played at George Washington in a 0-0 tie. This was the first time Clemson had ever played under the lights. Fans followed the game on a grid graph in Tillman Hall at the Clemson chapel. A grid graph was an electrical machine that was marked off like a football field. Lights were so arranged on the graph that every possible play was flashed on the board. The lineups of both teams were written on the sides and the man carrying the ball on each play had a light flashed by his name. Another light

representing the runner moved along the board in the same direction and for the same distance as the runner.

August 20, 1934—IPTAY, the nation's first scholarship fundraising organization, was founded. Dr. Rupert Fike, a cancer specialist from Atlanta and Clemson class of 1908, wrote Jess Neely a letter documenting the formation of the organization.

"Last night we had a little meeting out at my house and organized the IPTAY Club," Fike wrote. "The purpose (of IPTAY) shall be to provide financial support to the athletic department at Clemson and to assist in every other way possible to regain for Clemson the high athletic standing which rightfully belongs to her."

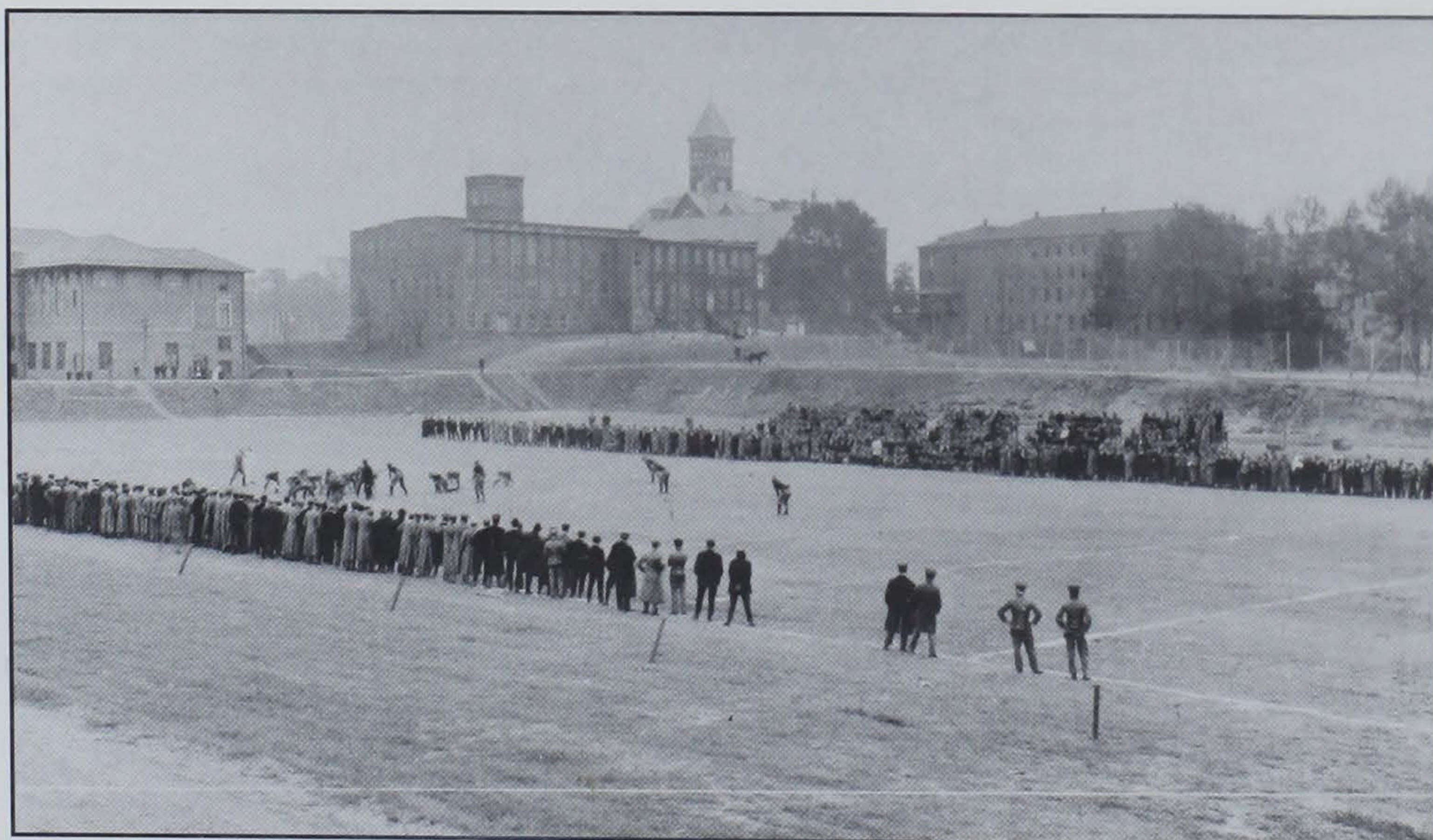
The organization was first established as a secret organization and initial membership dues were set at \$10 a year. Many had suggested that \$50 be the minimum donation, but Fike's foresight thought it would be best to get as many Clemson supporters involved as possible, so he established the \$10 minimum.

The excitement about the organization carried over into the 1934 season and the Tigers ran to their first winning season since 1930. Clemson had gone 0-5-1 against Furman and South Carolina in those years, then defeated both teams in 1934.

November 19, 1935—Clemson held its first night football practice. Two powerful floodlights were installed at the practice fields. The Clemson coaches wanted more practice time with the players and that was the reason the lights were brought in. The extra practice did not pay off however, as Clemson lost its final game that year to Furman, 8-6.

November 17, 1937—Clemson defeated Florida in Gainesville by a 10-9 score. Don Willis scored Clemson's only TD of the game on a one-yard run that culminated a 65-yard drive on Clemson's opening possession. Later Clemson gave up a safety and a touchdown, so Florida led 9-7 heading into the fourth period. But, the Tigers drove 60 yards late in the game and Ben Pearson booted a 27-yard field goal to win the game.

At the time, it gave Clemson a 4-4 record in 1937, but it proved to be a program builder, much

as Clemson's win over South Carolina in 1980 did. The Tigers posted to a 22-2-2 record over a 26-game period that started with that win at Florida. Clemson's only losses in that 26-game period were to Tennessee in 1938 and Tulane in 1939. Tennessee ended the 1938 season with a 10-0 record and ranked second in the nation, while Tulane ended the 1939 season with an 8-0-1 mark and fifth in the country.

November 5, 1938—Clemson scored with big plays in a win over George Washington, 27-0. The Tigers scored three touchdowns on plays of at least 65 yards, the only time in history Clemson has had scoring plays of that distance in the same game. Banks McFadden ran 70 yards for a score on the first Clemson play from scrimmage. Later, Shad Bryant scored on a 65-yard punt return and on a 65-yard run off a lateral. Georgia Washington actually had more first downs, 15-13, yet lost by 27 points.

September 23, 1939—Banks McFadden ran 90 yards for a touchdown in Clemson's 18-0 win over Presbyterian. It is still the longest run in Clemson history. McFadden had a career high 173 yards in 15 attempts on this day.

September 30, 1939—Clemson suffered its only loss of the season to a revenge minded Tulane eleven. The Tigers had beaten the Green Wave the previous year by a 13-10 score. This season, however, Tulane defeated Clemson 7-6. Despite the loss, it was a game that brought acclaim to Clemson for its ability to play so close with the team that would end the year ranked fifth in the nation. McFadden was all over the field on this day, throwing for Clemson's only touchdown and defending enemy passes from the secondary. His punting kept Tulane bottled up in their own territory. He had 12 punts for 504 yards, including a record six punts of at least 50 yards. Unfortunately he was involved in what proved to be the deciding play of the game as his extra point attempt after Clemson's only touchdown was blocked.

October 19, 1939—Clemson outgained South Carolina 402-90 in a 27-0 thrashing of the Gamecocks. Banks McFadden threw for 85 yards and rushed for 76 in just 14 attempts.

October 26, 1939—Clemson showed it was a deep enough team to win without All-American Banks McFadden, who missed the Navy game with an injury. Shad Bryant had a 40-yard run for a score in Clemson's 15-7 win at Annapolis.

November 3, 1939—Clemson won in the Washington DC area for the second straight week, defeating George Washington on the road, 13-6. Bryant had 127 yards on the ground and scored Clemson's only touchdown. The game was played on a Friday evening.

November 11, 1939—McFadden completed just four passes against Wake Forest, but three were to Joe Blalock for 105 yards, the first 100-yard receiving game in Clemson history. It was the final home game for McFadden and the rest of the Tiger seniors.

November 13, 1939—Clemson was ranked in the Associated Press poll for the first time. The Tigers soundly defeated Wake Forest 20-7 to run their record to 6-1 and that led to the ranking. Clemson

had 33 poll points on that November 13 ranking and one first-place vote out of the 85 votes in the poll that week. Clemson remained ranked in the top 20 over the next three weeks and each week Clemson had exactly one first-place vote. However, in the final poll that year, even though Clemson had run the table to finish 8-1 in the regular season, that individual failed to vote Clemson number-one, as the Tigers did not have a first-place vote in the December 11 poll, which was the final poll that year.

November 18, 1939—Clemson won away from home for the fourth straight time, a 21-6 win over Southwestern University, which is now Memphis State. McFadden and George Floyd combined for 126 yards rushing on just 10 rushes.

November 25, 1939—Clemson concluded its 8-1 regular season with a 14-3 victory over Furman. Shad Bryant ran for 94 yards and gained 75 more in punt returns. McFadden scored two touchdowns and had 10 punts for a 42-yard average, intercepted a pass and completed a pass.

December 8, 1939—Clemson accepted a bid to play in the Cotton Bowl. It is Clemson's first postseason bowl game appearance. Clemson did meet Cumberland in a postseason "Championship of the South" game in 1903, but it was not considered an established bowl.

December 11, 1939—Clemson ranked 12th in the final poll by the Associated Press, Clemson's first appearance in a final season AP poll. The Tigers had 112 poll points, just behind Boston College, who had 120.5 poll points for 11th place. Clemson would defeat Boston College in the Cotton Bowl, but the AP did not have a poll after the bowls. In fact, for whatever the reason, the AP did not have a final poll after the bowls until after the 1968 season. Thus, Clemson actually would have had a much higher ranking by today's standards if there would have been a poll in January of 1940.

December 15, 1939—Banks McFadden was named a first-team All-American by Associated Press and a third-team selection by United Press International. He was the first Clemson player honored by the AP. Later that year he was named the Nation's Most Versatile Athlete for 1939. Earlier in the year he had led Clemson to the 1939 Southern Conference Championship in basketball, still the only postseason championship in Clemson history.

January 1, 1940—In Clemson's first bowl appearance, it defeated Boston College 6-3. Charlie Timmons scored the game's lone touchdown from two yards out and rushed for 115 yards. Banks McFadden keyed the defense with four pass deflection of Boston College passes and he also averaged 43 yards punt. Boston College drove to the Clemson eight with three minutes left, but Shad Bryant and McFadden knocked away third and fourth-down passes to save the day for the Tigers.

"Clemson is every bit as good as they were cracked up to be," said Boston College Coach Frank Leahy, still the second winningest coach in college football history on a percentage basis. "We lost to a great team, one of the best I have ever seen. I have the satisfaction of knowing that while we were beaten, the game wasn't lost on a fluke."

January 10, 1940—Jess Neely resigned as athletic director and football coach to accept the head football coaching job at Rice University. Neely had inherited a \$47,000 deficit when he arrived in 1931 and earned Clemson \$100,000 during his tenure and left Clemson with \$57,000 in the treasury. His overall record at Clemson was 43-35-7. He would be inducted into the college football Hall of Fame in 1971.

January 11, 1940—Frank Howard was named head football coach. At the Athletic Council meeting that day, Howard was nominated for the position by Professor Sam Rhodes, a council member. When a call for a second was asked, Howard, standing in the back of the room, said: "I second the nomination." It is perhaps the only recorded time in history a coach has seconded his own nomination for head coach.

July 25, 1940—Banks McFadden accepted a bid to play in the College All-Star game against the Green Bay Packers on August 29. He scored one of the two touchdowns for the College All-Stars.

September 1, 1940—Banks McFadden signed a one-year contract to play with the Brooklyn Dodgers professional football team. He led the NFL in yards per carry in that 1940 season, but did not like the bright lights of New York and returned to Clemson.

September 21, 1940—In Frank Howard's first game as head coach, Clemson scored on the first offensive play as George Floyd reversed around left end and raced 18 yards untouched for a Clemson touchdown. The Tigers went on to a 38-0 win over Presbyterian.

October 12, 1940—Clemson shutout Wake Forest 39-0 in Clemson's second game of the season at Riggs Field. It was Clemson's third shutout in the first four games of the Howard era. It was the last home game of the season for the Tigers, who would go on to win the Southern Conference title even though seven of the nine games were on the road.

October 24, 1940—Frank Howard won his first game as head coach in the rivalry with South Carolina. The Tigers were victorious 21-13 thanks to five interceptions by the Clemson defense. Howard coached in 30 Clemson-South Carolina games. Incredible as it may seem, both Clemson and South Carolina scored exactly 411 total points in those 30 games.

October 28, 1940—It didn't take Howard long to get the Tigers into the nation's top 10. With the 5-0 start the Tigers earned 136 poll points and ranked number-10 in the nation, Clemson's first top 10 ranking in the AP poll. Two writers ranked Clemson number-one.

November 23, 1940—Clemson won the Southern Conference football title with a 13-7 victory over Furman. Ed Manness led the way for the Tigers with 136 yards rushing in 18 attempts. It was the first of eight conference championships for the Tigers under Frank Howard.

October 6, 1941—Work began on Memorial Stadium. The chore of cleaning, digging and leveling the site as well as cutting large trees and clearing underbrush was supervised by Frank Howard. A pipe was also installed for drainage under the field.

October 11, 1941—Clemson defeated Boston College at Fenway Park, 26-13. Joe Blalock scored two touchdowns as Clemson overcame a 6-0 deficit after the first period. BC outgained Clemson 363-281, but Clemson came away with the victory.

October 23, 1941—Booty Payne became the first Clemson player to pass for over 200 yards in an 18-14 loss to South Carolina. He completed 9-16 passes for 202 yards in the contest. It was one of just three 200-yard passing games by a Tiger in the decade of the 1940s.

November 15, 1941—Clemson defeated Wake Forest, 29-0, in the last game at Riggs Field.

November 22, 1941—The Tigers put on the greatest rushing defense exhibition in the first 100 years of Clemson history, holding Furman to -21 yards rushing in a 34-6 victory in Greenville. Charlie Timmons scored three touchdowns and added four extra points in his final game as a Tiger. The 22 points scored rank sixth best in Clemson history for a single game by an individual. But, Timmons was not the leading rusher in the game as teammate Sid Tinsley picked up 127 yards on just seven attempts.

September 19, 1942—Clemson Memorial Stadium opened, and the Tigers ran down the hill for the first time. Butch Butler gained 192 yards, as the Tigers opened the new stadium in front of 5,500 with a 32-13 win over Presbyterian. It was the most yards rushing by a Tiger in the decade of the 1940s. High school students were admitted for 25 cents, while servicemen were allowed in for 50 cents.

September 25, 1943—World War II took virtually all of Clemson's veteran players and the Tigers started nine first-year freshmen at the 11 positions in a 13-12 loss to Presbyterian. Clemson had just a 2-6 record this season with no one older than a sophomore playing in a game as the armed services took Clemson's entire junior and senior classes.

October 19, 1944—First rain at a Clemson-USC game since 1896. Despite the conditions, Sid Tinsley rushed for 146 yards in 22 carries to lead the Tigers to a 20-13 victory.

September 22, 1945—Fourteen Clemson backs netted 516 yards in a 76-0 win over Presbyterian. Freshman Bobby Gage led the Tigers with 144 yards, including 88 on a touchdown run, the longest run from scrimmage by a Tiger in the decade of the 1940s. The Tigers had 11 rushing touchdowns in the game, still a Clemson record.

October 24, 1946—The Clemson vs. South Carolina game was played under unusual circumstances. Counterfeit tickets had been printed and 10,000 more people than the capacity showed up for the game. Fans stormed the gates and stood on the sidelines, even on the field at the opposite end of the field when the game action was taking place. Coach Howard recalls fans standing next to him on the sideline telling him what plays to run. South Carolina won on this bizarre day, 26-14.

September 24, 1947—Clemson flew to Boston College on an Eastern Airline DC-4. This marked the first time that a state football team had flown to a football game. The quicker traveling did not help, however as Boston College defeated the Tigers, 32-22.

November 8, 1947—Clemson began a 15-game winning streak, the longest in school history, with a win over Furman, 35-7.

November 22, 1947—Bobby Gage ran for 141 yards and passed for 233 as he led Clemson to a 34-18 win over Auburn. Gage threw four touchdown passes and had 374 yards total offense to his credit, then Clemson records. Hank Walker was Gage's favorite receiver as he pulled in 10 passes for 148 yards. It is still the second most receptions in a single game in Clemson history and the yardage total is the seventh best. It was the first time in Clemson history and one of just six times overall that the Tigers have had a 100-yard rusher, a 100-yard receiver and a 200-yard passer in the same game. The Clemson defense was also outstanding, holding Auburn to -9 yards rushing.

June 1, 1948—Frank Gillespie was named the Southern Conference athlete of the year. Gillespie played football, basketball and baseball during the academic year and was the first Clemson athlete to be named a conference athlete of the year.

September 25, 1948—Clemson defeated Presbyterian 53-0 in the first night game at Clemson. Clemson also defeated N.C. State, 6-0, in a home night game the following week.

October 2, 1948—Gage continued his All-America triple threat season by returning a punt 90 yards for a touchdown in Clemson's 6-0 win over N.C. State at Death Valley. To this day it is still the longest punt return in the history of the stadium by a Clemson player.

October 21, 1948—A 14th-ranked Clemson team defeated South Carolina 13-7 in Columbia. Captain Phil Prince was the hero for the Tigers as he blocked a South Carolina punt with just 4:15 left in the contest. Oscar Thompson recovered it at the 11 and ran it in for a touchdown, giving Clemson the 13-7 lead.

November 6, 1948—Bobby Gage put on the most efficient exhibition in Clemson history in a 41-0 win over Furman. He completed 9-11 passes for 245 yards and two touchdowns. His efficiency rating of 310.7 is still a Clemson record for a minimum of 10 attempts. He averaged an incredible 22 yards per attempt, a record by far in Clemson history. The defense was just as effective, holding the Paladins to -12 yards in total offense, still the best total defense effort in Clemson history for a single game.

November 22, 1948—The Tigers were ranked number-nine in the AP poll, their highest ranking in history. Eight voters ranked Clemson number-one in the nation.

November 27, 1948—Clemson accepted a bid to play in the Gator Bowl after it beat Auburn 7-6 in a hard fought game played in Mobile, AL. It was Clemson's first bowl bid since the 1939 season. Ray Mathews scored on a one-yard run with just 6:35 left to give Clemson its only lead of the game.

November 29, 1948—Clemson ranked 11th in the final AP poll. Again Clemson suffered from not having a poll after the bowl games. Clemson won another regular season game, then defeated Missouri in the Gator Bowl to close a perfect season. But, these wins were not reflected in the final ranking. The AP did not have a post-bowl poll until 1968.

December 4, 1948—Clemson closed out its perfect regular season with a 20-0 win over The Citadel in a game played in Charleston. The December 4 date is the second latest regular season game in Clemson history. The 11th ranked Tigers did not allow The Citadel to make a first down in the game, the only recorded time in Clemson history that the Tigers did not allow a first down. The Bulldogs also failed to complete a pass in the contest.

The victory was Clemson's sixth road win of the year, a record that still stands for road wins in a season. Only two Clemson teams have had a perfect road record since 1948 and that was the 1981 National Championship team and the 1995 Tigers.



Banks McFadden led Clemson to the 1940 Cotton Bowl and a #11 final ranking.

December 6, 1948—Frank Howard was named Southern Conference Coach of the Year, his first of three Coach of the Year selections in his career.

January 1, 1949—The Tigers won the Gator Bowl by a 24-23 score over Missouri. Fred Cone scored two first-quarter touchdowns for the Tigers as Clemson raced to a 14-0 lead. After Missouri tied the game, Gage threw a nine-yard scoring pass to John Poulos, a play that completed a 80-yard drive. Jack Miller's 32-yard field goal in the fourth quarter proved to be the winning margin. Missouri would score a late touchdown to come within 24-23. But that was the final score. You could not go for two points in those days, so Missouri did not have the opportunity to tie the score after their touchdown that took place with less than five minutes left. Both teams had exactly 298 yards of total offense in the game.

Clemson closed the season with a perfect 11-0 record, the only team in college football with 11 wins that year and one of just three with a perfect record. Notre Dame and Michigan were both 9-0-0 that season, but did not play in a bowl game.

November 26, 1949—Clemson closed out the decade of the 1940s with a 20-20 tie against Auburn in Mobile, AL. Clemson had just a 4-4-2 record but closed 2-0-1 over the last three games, giving the program momentum heading into the 1950 season.

September 30, 1950—Clemson defeated Missouri 34-0 in the second game of the season. The Tigers of Columbia, MO had been ranked in the preseason top 20. Three Tigers rushed for at least 100 yards for the Tigers, the second straight game Frank Howard had three 100-yard rushers in the same game. It has happened just four total times in Clemson history.

October 7, 1950—Clemson recorded its third straight shutout to open the season with a 27-0 win over N.C. State in a home night game. Wyndie Windham again led the Clemson defense in tackles in this game and according to legend knocked out N.C. State players on three consecutive plays in this game.

October 28, 1950—Clemson defeated Wake Forest in Winston-Salem in a battle of top 20 teams, 13-12. Clemson lineman Bob Patton blocked the extra point in the final minute to preserve the victory for Clemson. It is the only time in Clemson history that a Tiger has blocked a kick on the last play of the game to give Clemson a victory.

November 28, 1950—Clemson accepted a bid to play in the Orange Bowl.

January 1, 1951—Clemson appeared in the Orange Bowl for the first time and squeaked out a 15-14 win over Miami to complete an undefeated season. Sterling Smith's tackle of Frank Smith in the end zone gave Clemson a safety with under six minutes left in the game and the Tigers the victory. Don Wade also had two interceptions in the contest for the Tigers. It is Clemson's second undefeated season in the last three years for Frank Howard's Tigers.

November 27, 1951—Clemson accepted a bid to play in the Gator Bowl. This was done against the wishes of the Southern Conference, who had made a rule its members could not go to a bowl game. Clemson and Maryland (who also accepted a bowl bid) were given sanctions. The two teams are told they will not be allowed to play any other conference teams in 1952. This resulted in teams leaving the Southern Conference and forming the ACC.

November 8, 1952—Don King, making his first and only career start at tailback, rushed for 234 yards on 33 carries in Clemson's 12-12 tie at Fordham. The performance is still a record for a Clemson freshman and still stands as the third highest single game total in Clemson history. King was substituting for an injured Clemson tailback and returned to quarterback the next week. He never played tailback again.

May 8, 1953—Clemson joined the Atlantic Coast Conference.

October 31, 1953—Clemson won its first ACC game in history, 18-0 over Wake Forest in a contest played at Clemson.

October 9, 1954—Clemson upset 14th ranked Florida in Jacksonville, 14-7.

November 16, 1956—Vice President Richard Nixon was in attendance at the Clemson-Miami football game on this date. Surrounded by security from various agencies, a loud explosion sounded and alarmed the body guard along with the Vice President. To everyone's relief, it was discovered that it was just the cannon fired off by a Clemson cheerleader when Clemson kicked off. The eighth-ranked Hurricanes defeated the Tigers 21-0 in the game played at Miami, FL.

November 24, 1956—Clemson defeated Virginia 7-0 at Clemson to clinch the Tigers first ever ACC Championship.

December 1, 1956—Clemson clinched an Orange Bowl berth with a 28-7 win over Furman at Clemson.

January 1, 1957—Colorado defeated Clemson 27-21 in an exciting Orange Bowl in Miami. Clemson had trailed 20-0 at the half and Frank Howard threatened to resign at halftime. But, the Tigers came back to take a 21-20 lead in fourth period, only to see the Buffalos score late to win the game.

March 25, 1957—It was announced that Clemson and South Carolina would play at Clemson on November 12, 1960 ending the 61-year-old state classic, Big Thursday.

September 20, 1958—Clemson ran down the hill on a rug for the first time. The rug was officially given to Clemson on this date before the Clemson-Virginia game by W.W.Pate, Sr., president of Wunda Weave Company. It measured 104 feet long and was 13 feet wide. Also at this game, Clemson's first expansion of Memorial Stadium was used for the first time. Memorial Stadium was expanded from 20,000 to 38,000 seats.

September 27, 1958—Clemson defeated North Carolina, 26-21, as Frank Howard picked up his 100th collegiate coaching win. Doug Cline scored on a two-yard run with 2:52 left to give Clemson the victory. It was one of four times in 1958 that Clemson scored a touchdown in the last quarter to win the game. Also the scoreboard at the east of the stadium was used for the first time. The scoreboard had an added feature, as the Tiger above the scoreboard still wags his tail after each Clemson touchdown.

October 6, 1958—Clemson was ranked eighth in the country, the highest ranking in Clemson history, at that time.

October 11, 1958—Clemson kept its top 10 ranking alive with a 12-7 win at Vanderbilt. Harvey White scored the game winner on a three-yard run with three seconds left to win the game. It is the latest game-winning touchdown in Clemson history.

November 19, 1958—Clemson defeated N.C. State 13-6 and won its second ACC title in three years.

November 29, 1958—Clemson accepted a Sugar Bowl bid to face the number-one team in the nation, LSU.

December 24, 1958—It was announced that Clemson would take the rug the Tigers used to run down the hill with them to the Sugar Bowl. The rug weighed 527 pounds.

December 27, 1958—Clemson announced it would wear navy blue jerseys with wide numerals front and back. Orange helmets with a white stripe from back to front in the center would also be worn to give a contrasting color for the nationwide television coverage of the game.

January 1, 1959—Number-one ranked LSU and Heisman Trophy winner Billy Cannon defeated Clemson 7-0 in the Sugar Bowl. Cannon, a halfback, threw a touchdown pass to give LSU and Paul Dietzel the national championship clinching victory. It was the first time Clemson had ever played the number-one team.

September 19, 1959—Clemson defeated North Carolina in Chapel Hill, 20-18 in a battle of top 20 teams. The Tar Heels were ranked 12th in the preseason poll.

October 22, 1959—Clemson won the last Big Thursday game by defeating South Carolina, 27-0. Harvey White was on target all day, hitting 9-10 passes for 162 yards and two scores. Clemson fans tore down the steel goal posts which were set in concrete following the game.

November 21, 1959—Clemson defeated Wake Forest 33-31 for Clemson's second ACC title in a row. George Usry scored on a one-yard run with 4:24 to go to give Clemson the triumph.

December 19, 1959—Clemson defeated TCU in the Bluebonnet Bowl, 23-7. The Horned Frogs, led by All-American and future Dallas Cowboy Bob Lilly, were ranked seventh in the nation entering the game. The victory is also the 300th in Clemson history.

October 1, 1960—The west stands were used for the first time, as Clemson defeated Virginia Tech, 13-7.

October 8, 1960—Clemson defeated Virginia 21-7 and used special pants for rain protection in this game. After the contest Clemson sent the pants to Greenville and allowed Furman to use the pants for a game that night against William and Mary. Furman Head Coach Bob King said, "after those big Clemson boys got out of them some of our guys had a hard time making them stay up and we had to tape the legs of the pants for several players." The pants beat two teams from Virginia on the same day.

November 12, 1960—Clemson defeated South Carolina, 12-2, in the first ever appearance for South Carolina at Clemson.

November 11, 1961—A team resembling Clemson entered the field prior to the meeting with South Carolina. They did a few serious calisthenics and then started dancing to band music. The team was actually members of the Sigma Nu Fraternity of South Carolina. Clemson students entered the field and worked some of the imposters over. Finally state police brought order to the field.

October 13, 1962—Hal Davis raced 98 yards with a kickoff return for a touchdown against Georgia, the last time a Tiger would return a kickoff for a score for 25 years.

November 17, 1962—Clemson upset Maryland as Rodney Rogers kicked a 23-yard field goal with 84 seconds left in the game.

November 24, 1962—Clemson defeated South Carolina seven days later as Rogers kicked a 24-yard field goal with 1:31 left. The Clemson Tigers wore blue jerseys in this game, the ones that were used in the Sugar Bowl game. Clemson claims the 20-17 victory when South Carolina quarterback Dan Reeves was sacked deep in Clemson territory on the last play of the game.

October 12, 1963—Clemson and Georgia tied 7-7, but the main item of interest was the strange weather. A hail storm hit at 2:50 p.m. and caused temperatures to plummet from 84 degrees to 57 degrees in 45 minutes. Almost an inch of hail poured in a 20-minute period and the game was delayed. Clemson blocked two field goal attempts to preserve the tie.

November 23, 1963—The South Carolina-Clemson game was postponed due to the death of President John F. Kennedy.

November 28, 1963—Clemson defeated South Carolina on Thanksgiving Day, 24-20. It is the fifth win in a row for the Tigers to close the season.

November 6, 1965—Two Clemson single game records were established in a 17-13 loss at North Carolina. Thomas Ray became the first and still only Tiger to throw for 300 yards in a game when he completed 21-43 passes for 323 yards. His star receiver, Phil Rogers, caught 11-129 to set the single game reception record.

September 24, 1966—First game in which Howard's Rock was present at Death Valley. Clemson downed Virginia, 40-35 in one of the most exciting games in the history of the facility and adding to the legend of Howard's Rock. Clemson trailed 35-17 with just over a quarter remaining in the game, but rode the passing of Jimmy Addison to keep its perfect record alive against Virginia. Addison was 12-19 for 283 yards and three touchdowns, including a 74-yarder to Jackie Jackson with 3:49 remaining that proved to be the game-winner. His passing efficiency in that game is still a Clemson standard, for a minimum of 15 attempts.

October 22, 1966—Clemson traveled to Los Angeles to play Southern Cal for the first time. This was the longest trip for a Clemson football team at the time. The Trojans, who won the PAC-Eight that year, won the Rose Bowl and defeated Clemson 30-0. Clemson visited Universal Studios prior to the game and had their photos taken with many of the television stars of the era.

November 12, 1966—Frank Howard won his 150th game and clinched at least a tie for the ACC title with a 14-10 win over Maryland. Clemson won the ACC outright the next week with a 6-1 record. Clemson was 0-3 outside the league in 1966, and all three of the games were against top 10 teams (Georgia Tech, Alabama and Southern Cal).

November 26, 1966—Clemson downed South Carolina to win the ACC, 35-10. A key touchdown in the game was scored by Tiger offensive lineman Harry Olszewski, who picked up a mid-air fumble and ran 12 yards for a touchdown. No Clemson offensive lineman has scored since.

September 23, 1967—Clemson started the tradition of rubbing Howard's Rock when running down the hill. Clemson responded with a 23-6 win over Wake Forest.

October 28, 1967—Alabama and Bear Bryant came to Clemson to face Frank Howard's Tigers before a sellout crowd at Clemson. Bryant's team won the close game, 13-10.

November 18, 1967—Clemson painted its shoes orange for the N.C.State game and the Tigers upset the 10th-ranked Wolfpack, 14-6. Clemson clinched a tie for the ACC championship with the victory, the sixth and final ACC title of Frank Howard's celebrated career. The Tigers had to get the orange paint from eight stores in the area. N.C. State's defense had worn white shoes all season and that was the reason for the ploy.

November 25, 1967—Clemson beat South Carolina 23-12 to claim the ACC Championship. Buddy Gore broke the ACC single season rushing record with 1,045 yards and finished the season eighth in the nation in rushing.

September 28, 1968—Richie Luzzi returned a missed Georgia field goal try 108 yards (100 officially) for a Clemson touchdown, the longest play in Clemson history.

October 25, 1969—Danny Ford was one of the Alabama captains for the Clemson-Alabama game at Clemson. Bob Hope was in town for a homecoming show that night. Bear Bryant's team defeated Clemson, 38-13. Clemson lost by a sizeable margin, but moved the ball consistently. In fact, Clemson had a 200-yard passer, 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver for just the fourth time in its history, yet lost by 25 points.

November 1, 1969—Frank Howard won his last game as a Clemson coach in Death Valley with a 40-0 win over Maryland. It is still Clemson's largest margin of victory against the Terps.

December 10, 1969—Coach Frank Howard resigned from football coaching duties, but remained in the capacity of athletic director. Howard had first come to Clemson in 1931 as an assistant under Jess Neely.

December 17, 1969—Hootie Ingram was named head football coach.

July 21, 1970—Clemson announced the use of a new logo - THE TIGER PAW. With the aid of Henderson Advertising Agency, the Tiger paw became the new trademark of Clemson athletics.

October 31, 1970—Don Kelley had the greatest return game in ACC history when he gained 223 yards on interception and punt returns in a 23-11 Clemson victory. He had a record 167 yards in punt returns, including an 85-yarder for a touchdown, and also had a 56-yard interception return.

October 9, 1971—Hootie Ingram gained his only win over a ranked team as Clemson coach when the Tigers defeat Duke 3-0 in a defensive struggle at the Oyster Bowl in Norfolk, VA. Duke was ranked 14th in the nation entering the contest.

November 27, 1971—Eddie Seigler became the first Clemson kicker in history to boot a field goal of at least 50 yards. His 52-yarder was important in the 17-7 Clemson win over South Carolina.

December 5, 1972—Hootie Ingram resigned as Clemson football coach, and Red Parker was named as his replacement.

September 28, 1974—Georgia Tech made its first appearance in history at Clemson. For years Clemson had always gone to Atlanta for the series. Clemson won the contest, 21-17.

October 5, 1974—Clemson defeated Georgia in Death Valley, 28-24, giving Clemson wins over Georgia and Georgia Tech in the same season for the first time since 1914.

November 16, 1974—The Playing surface of Memorial Stadium was named Frank Howard Field. This day also featured the longest play in Clemson history, a 97-yard touchdown pass from Mark Fellers to Craig Brantley. Clemson defeated Virginia, 28-9.



November 23, 1974—Clemson defeated South Carolina, 39-21 to close a perfect 6-0 season in Death Valley. Ken Callicutt had 197 yards rushing and 55 more receiving to key the Clemson attack. It was a Clemson record for all-purpose rushing at the time. South Carolina players wore two different color helmets in the game as the Gamecock seniors wore black helmets and the rest of the team wore white. Willie Anderson had 21 tackles from his middle guard position, still a Clemson record for an interior lineman. He was named **Sports Illustrated** National Player of the Week.

November 21, 1976—Clemson scrimmaged before the game at an adjacent practice field and warmed up there until game time before a 28-9 upset of South Carolina.

December 1, 1976—Charlie Pell was named head football coach.

November 18, 1978—Clemson clinched the ACC championship with a thrilling victory over Maryland in College Park. Steve Fuller hit touchdown passes of 87 yards to Jerry Butler and 62 yards to Dwight Clark. The game also included a 98-yard run by Maryland's Steve Atkins, the longest run in history against the Tigers.

November 25, 1978—Clemson fans used the south upper deck for the first time in Clemson's 41-23 win over South Carolina. At the time it was the largest crowd ever to see a game from Philadelphia to Birmingham. Clemson had three backs gain over 100 yards rushing in the game for the first time since 1950. The victory also clinched Clemson's first 10-win season since 1948.

November 28, 1978—Steve Fuller finished tied for sixth place in the Heisman Trophy voting with Ted Brown of N.C. State, and he received 19 first-place votes.

September 22, 1979—Clemson won its 400th game in history with a 12-7 victory over Georgia.

November 16, 1979—Clemson won at Notre Dame behind Obed Ariri's three field goals, 16-10. The Irish had taken a 10-0 lead in the first half, but Ariri's field goals and a 26-yard touchdown run by quarterback Billy Lott proved to be the difference. It was just the third time in the last 40 years that Notre Dame's seniors lost their final home game. The next day Ariri kicked the only goal for the Clemson soccer team in an NCAA tournament victory over South Carolina.

October 11, 1980—Obed Ariri booted a 52-yard field goal with six seconds left to give Clemson a 27-24 victory at Virginia. Clemson had trailed by two touchdowns entering the fourth quarter and this is the greatest fourth-quarter comeback in Clemson history. Ariri's boot is also the longest field goal to win a game in Clemson history.

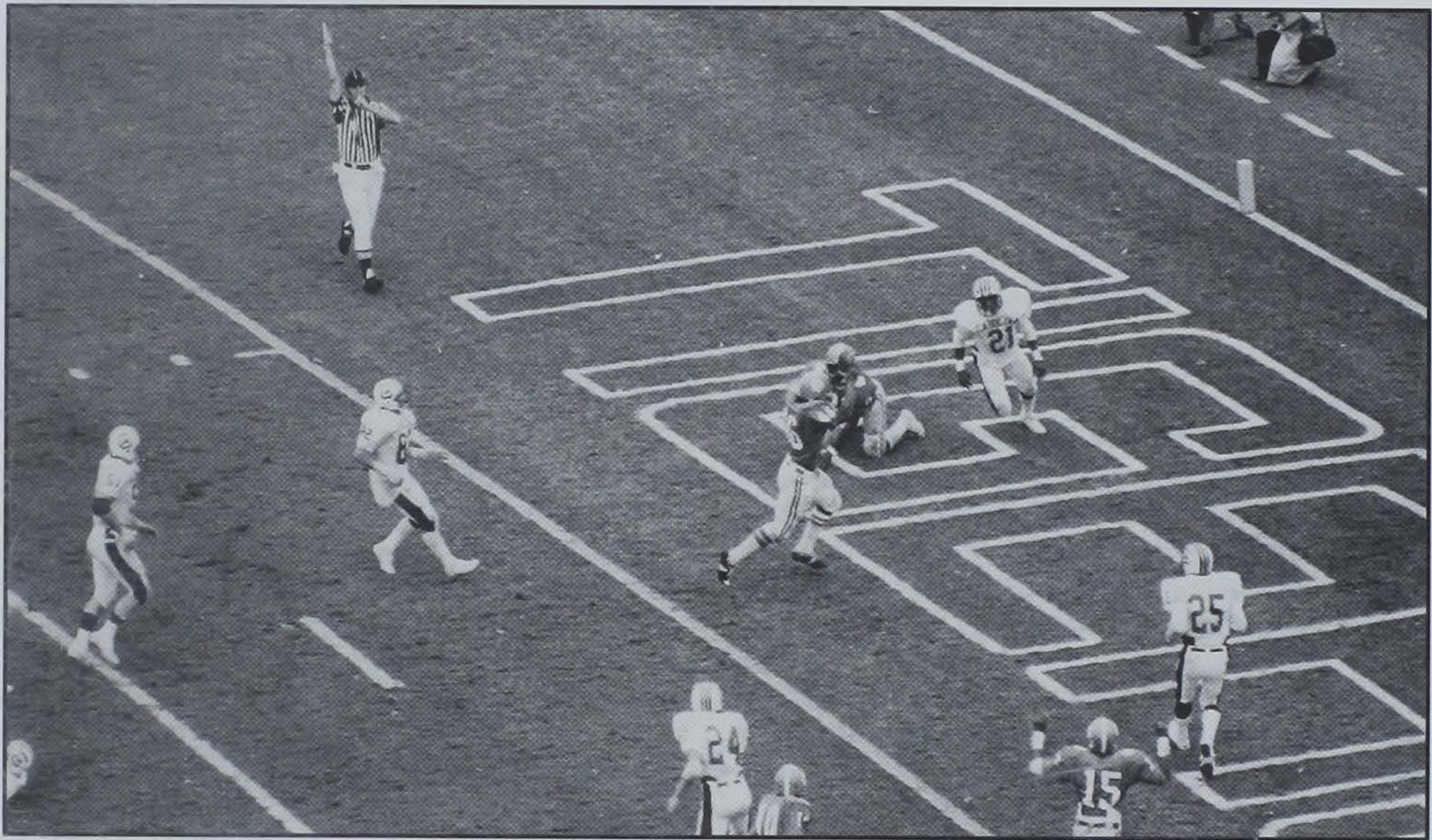
November 8, 1980—Jeff Davis had a school record 24 tackles vs. North Carolina in a head-to-head battle with Lawrence Taylor. The Tigers had the ball inside the North Carolina five with a chance to win, but Taylor sacked quarterback Homer Jordan on third down. Obed Ariri, who led the nation in field goals in 1980 with 23, booted a 27-yarder in the first half to become the NCAA's career field goal leader. The Tar Heels were victorious 24-19, Clemson's last home loss for four seasons.

November 22, 1980—Clemson defeated 14th ranked South Carolina 27-6 in a contest that gave the Tigers momentum heading into the 1981 season. Willie Underwood played the game of his life with two interceptions for 101 yards, including one for a 37-yard touchdown. Underwood entered the game, the 47th of his career, without an interception. He was named **Sports Illustrated** National Defensive Player of the Week. Clemson kept South Carolina Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers out of the endzone.

September 19, 1981—Clemson forced nine Georgia turnovers, most ever by a Clemson opponent, in handing Herschel Walker his only regular season loss as a Bulldog, 13-3. The Bulldogs were the defending national champions and ranked fourth in the nation entering the contest. It is the highest ranked win for the Tigers in the history of Death Valley.

October 31, 1981—Clemson had 756 total offensive yards against Wake Forest in an 82-24 win. The Tigers set 21 school, stadium and conference records in the contest that remains the highest scoring game in ACC history. The Tigers scored 49 points in the first half, then scored on the first possession of the second half. Clemson's final touchdown was scored on a 72-yard run by Craig Crawford, his first carry as a Tiger and the longest touchdown play in Clemson history for a player on his first play. Clemson was 12-12 on third-down conversions and scored 12 touchdowns on the day. The Tigers had a record 536 yards rushing and averaged 8.7 yards per play.

November 7, 1981—Clemson stopped North Carolina, 10-8, in Chapel Hill in the only battle of top 10 teams in ACC football history. Jeff Bryant recovered a fumble in the last two minutes of the game on a North Carolina lateral. Bryant was the only player who realized the play was a lateral.

September 17, 1977—Clemson defeated Georgia 7-6 and this marked the first time that Clemson had won in Athens since 1914.

November 12, 1977—Fifth ranked Notre Dame, led by quarterback Joe Montana and 25 other players who would eventually play in the NFL, defeated Clemson in Death Valley 21-17. It was the closest game for the Irish in the last nine games of the season. Notre Dame won the national championship that year. A total of 38 players who participated in this game went on to play in the National Football League. The list included both quarterbacks, Montana and Steve Fuller, who both won Super Bowl Championships.

November 19, 1977—A 20-yard pass from Steve Fuller to Jerry Butler with just 49 seconds to play enabled Clemson to squeeze past South Carolina 31-27. The Tigers had led 24-0, then South Carolina came back to take a 27-24 lead prior to the final Clemson drive. The win earned the Tigers a trip to the Gator Bowl.

September 16, 1978—Clemson won its 100th game in Death Valley with a 58-3 win over the Citadel. Steve Fuller was a perfect 9-9 passing in the contest, an all-time Clemson record for consecutive completions at the time. Clemson was a record 15-17 passing in the contest and set a school record for team passing efficiency.

December 4, 1978—Charlie Pell resigned as Clemson coach.

December 5, 1978—Danny Ford, offensive line coach for the Tigers, was named as Pell's replacement. He became the head coach at age 30, the youngest Division I head coach in the nation.

December 10, 1978—It was announced that Danny Ford would be the Tigers' coach in the Gator Bowl game.

December 29, 1978—Clemson defeated Ohio State 17-15 at the Gator Bowl in Danny Ford's first game as head coach, and Woody Hayes' final game at Ohio State. The winning touchdown was scored by freshman Cliff Austin. He would score another important touchdown three years later against Nebraska. Charlie Bauman made the key play with an interception of an Art Schlichter pass at the Clemson 24 with just two minutes left. He ran the return out of bounds on the Ohio State sideline and was punched by Hayes.

May 3, 1979—All-American Jerry Butler became the fifth pick of the 1979 NFL draft when he was chosen by the Buffalo Bills. This was the highest selection of a Clemson player since the 1939 season when Banks McFadden was the #3 selection of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

November 14, 1981—Clemson claimed the ACC championship with a 21-7 win over Maryland. Homer Jordan completed 20-29 passes for 270 yards in the contest. At the time it was the most completions in a game for a Tiger quarterback in a Clemson victory.

November 21, 1981—Clemson finished the regular season with a perfect 11-0 record with 29-13 win over South Carolina. It was Clemson's first perfect regular season since 1948.

November 30, 1981—Clemson was ranked No. 1 by AP, for the first time. Clemson moved to the number-one ranking when Penn State whipped Pittsburgh and quarterback Dan Marino, 48-14.

January 1, 1982—Clemson claimed its first National Championship with a 22-15 win over Nebraska in the 48th annual Orange Bowl Classic. One of the Clemson touchdowns was scored by Cliff Austin, who had been trapped in an elevator for two hours at the Clemson hotel earlier in the day.

January 4, 1982—The issue of *Sports Illustrated* featured Clemson receiver Perry Tuttle celebrating after his touchdown catch in the Orange Bowl. It was the first time and still only time a Clemson athlete has appeared on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* while a Clemson student.

October 16, 1982—Cliff Austin broke the Clemson record for most rushing yards in a game with 260 in a rout of Duke.

November 27, 1982—Clemson defeated Wake Forest, 21-17 at the Mirage Bowl, in Tokyo, Japan, and also sewed up its second straight ACC title.

January 1, 1983—Terry Kinard was named National Defensive Player of the Year by CBS Sports. He was presented the award during halftime of the Cotton Bowl by CBS announcer Lindsey Nelson. Kinard had led Clemson to a 9-1-1 record, led the team in tackles and interceptions.

April 26, 1983—A record 10 Clemson players were chosen in the NFL draft. The group was led by Terry Kinard, who was the #10 pick of the entire draft by the New York Giants.

September 3, 1983—The north upper deck was used for the first time in a victory over Western Carolina, bringing the capacity to over 80,000.

November 12, 1983—3,000 Clemson students arrived at Death Valley at 7:00 a.m. to blow up 363,729 balloons. The 80,000 fans released the balloons as the team ran down the hill. On the field, Mike Eppley was outstanding with three touchdown passes, and Kevin Mack rushed for 186 yards in his final game in Death Valley. He scored his final touchdown with just one shoe on, as he had lost it during his 56-yard run for a score. Clemson downed the Top 20 Maryland team and Boomer Esiason, 52-27.

November 19, 1983—Clemson closed the 1983 season with a 22-13 win over South Carolina in Columbia. The game gave the Tigers a 30-2-2 record for over the last three years, the top record in college football.

September 8, 1984—Clemson defeated Virginia in Charlottesville 55-0. Virginia ended the year 8-4 and went to a bowl game. It is the largest margin of victory in Clemson history over a team that went to a bowl game. Mike Eppley led the way, hitting 8-14 passes for 172 yards and a pair of scores. The Tigers advanced to number-two in the nation with the victory.

September 22, 1984—Georgia defeated Clemson in Athens, 26-23 on a 60-yard field goal by Kevin Butler with 11 seconds left. Clemson, who had a 20-6 lead at halftime, ran the ensuing kickoff back to Georgia territory and a personal foul was thrown against the Bulldogs after the tackle. But, after a long debate, officials ruled the game had ended when the foul was committed and Donald Igwebuike, who led the nation in field goal percentage in 1984 (17-18) was denied an opportunity to tie the game from 42 yards away.

November 10, 1984—Clemson defeated Virginia Tech 17-10 in the greatest matchup of defensive linemen in Death Valley history. Clemson featured All-American William Perry and Virginia Tech featured Outland Trophy winner and future All-Pro Bruce Smith. Clemson also had freshman Michael Dean Perry, who went on to earn six Pro Bowl selections.

September 14, 1985—David Treadwell showed a forshadowing of things to come with a 36-yard field goal on the last play of the game to give Clemson a 20-17 victory at Virginia Tech in the season opener. Perry Williams had a Clemson record five pass deflections in this game.

September 21, 1985—Clemson and Georgia met in the first nationally televised (CBS) football game from Clemson. The Bulldogs won the game 20-13 thanks to a fourth quarter fumble recovery by offensive lineman Peter Anderson. No offensive lineman has scored a touchdown in a game since.

November 23, 1985—Clemson defeated South Carolina 24-17, and accepted a bid to the Independence Bowl.

September 20, 1986—Clemson defeated Georgia, 31-28, as David Treadwell kicked a 46-yard field goal with no time left on the clock. Athens, GA native Norman Haynes led Clemson in tackles with 14, while Terrance Flagler led the offense with nearly 200 all-purpose running yards.

November 1, 1986—Terrance Flagler scored four touchdowns, two receiving and two rushing and gained 274 all-purpose running yards in Clemson's 28-20 win at Wake Forest. He had an 88-yard run in the contest, the longest of his career. The all-purpose running total is still a Clemson record for an individual.

November 15, 1986—Clemson tied Maryland 17-17 to win the ACC championship, as Treadwell kicked a 20-yard field goal with two seconds left. Both Clemson coach Danny Ford and Maryland coach Bobby Ross, coached the game from the press box due to suspensions imposed by the ACC.

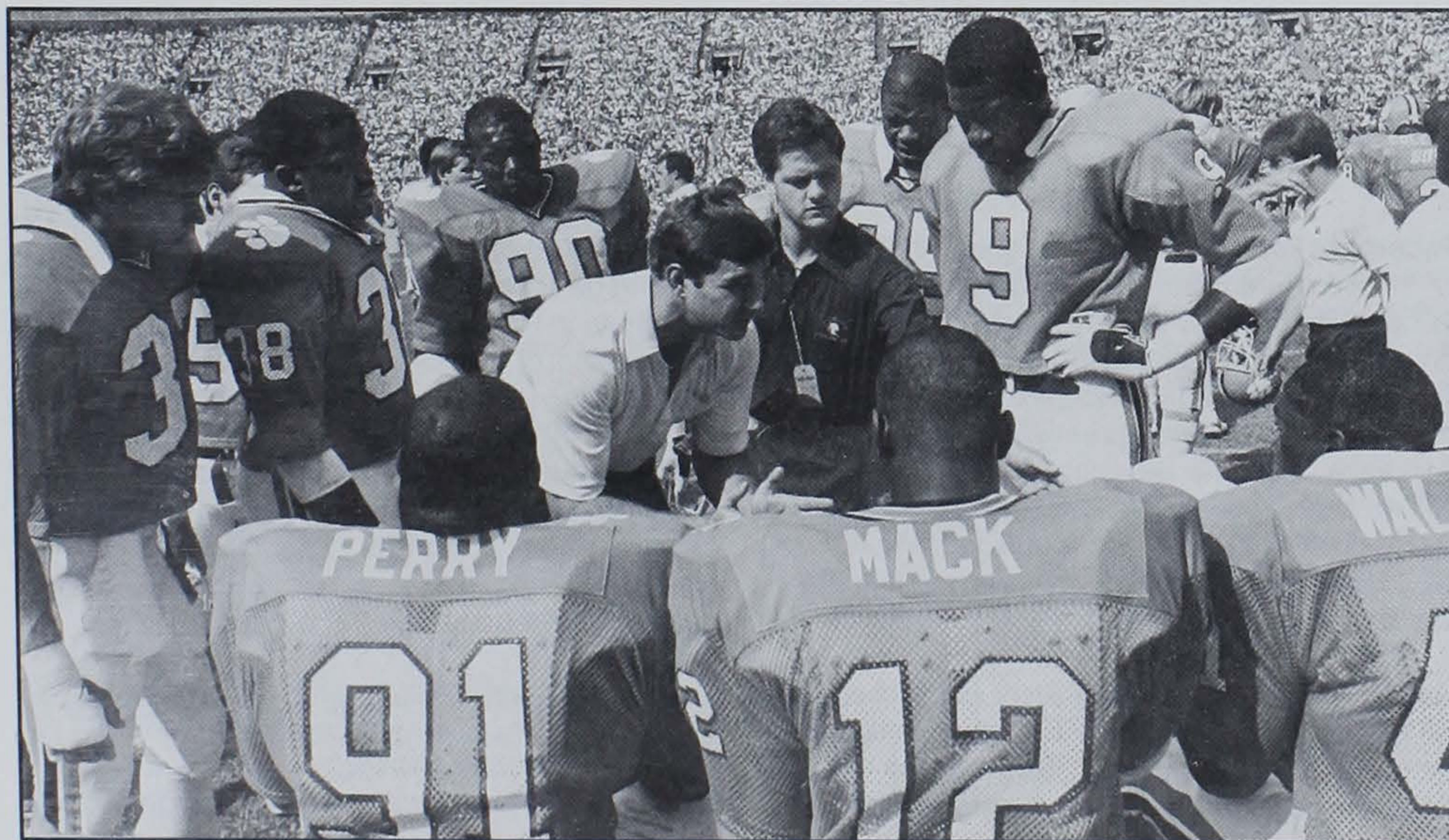
December 27, 1986—Clemson won the Gator Bowl championship with a 27-21 decision over Stanford. Clemson scored all 27 points in the first half, then held on as Brad Muster led a furious Stanford comeback.

January 3, 1987—Clemson was ranked 17th in the nation in the final AP poll, its first final Top 20 ranking since 1983.

September 19, 1987—David Treadwell booted a 21-yard field goal with two seconds left to beat Georgia on national TV, 21-20.

September 26, 1987—Clemson had not returned a punt or kickoff for a touchdown in 17 years, then had one of each in a 33-12 win over Georgia Tech. Donnell Woolford scored on a 78-yard punt return and Joe Henderson on a 95-yard kickoff return. Clemson had gone 999 punt and kickoff returns without a touchdown prior to Joe Henderson's score.

January 1, 1988—Clemson gained 499 yards total offense in handing Penn State its worst Bowl game defeat, 35-10, in the Florida Citrus Bowl. Rodney Williams was named the player of the game as he threw for 214 yards. Terry Allen rushed for 105 and Keith Jennings caught seven passes for 110, giving Clemson a 200-yard passer, 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver in the same game for the first time since 1969. Clemson was ranked 10th in the final UPI poll after the victory.



Tommy West was a top defensive coach for Clemson in the 1980's, helping the Tigers to four bowl victories and three straight 10-win seasons.

September 17, 1988—Florida State defeated Clemson 24-21 in the "Puntrookie Game" at Death Valley. It was the first battle of top 10 teams in the history of Death Valley. Clemson had Florida State deep in its own territory late in the fourth quarter with the score tied at 21 when Florida State coach Bobby Bowden ran an intricate fake punt play that resulted in Leroy Butler streaking 78 yards to the Clemson three. FSU booted a field goal to win the game.

November 12, 1988—Clemson clinched an ACC record-tying third straight ACC title with a 49-25 win at Maryland. Clemson scored 28 points in the fourth period on just nine offensive plays.

November 19, 1988—Clemson gained revenge for a loss at South Carolina in 1987 with a 29-10 victory over the Gamecocks at Clemson. Rodney Williams was masterful in running the Clemson offensive in his final home game. Williams would end his career with 32 wins as the starting quarterback, still a record for a Tiger quarterback.

January 2, 1989—Clemson became the first ACC team to defeat Oklahoma in a 13-6 Florida Citrus Bowl victory. Clemson held the Oklahoma offense without a touchdown for just the second time in the decade of the eighties. Clemson closed the season with a #9 ranking and became the only school in the nation to win a conference title, a bowl game and rank in the final Top 20 for three straight years.

September 9, 1989—Clemson earned a landmark victory at Florida State, 34-23. The Tigers jumped out to a 21-0 lead behind a 73-yard interception return by Wayne Simmons and a 73-yard touchdown run by Terry Allen. The victory moved Clemson to number-seven in the AP poll and it was the last loss of the season for Florida State, who eventually ended the season ranked third in the nation.

November 18, 1989—Clemson slaughtered South Carolina 45-0, the largest margin of victory for Clemson in the series in 89 years. Clemson outgained the Gamecocks 466-155, and picked up 355 yards rushing. Clemson's fifth-ranked defense forced five turnovers. Terry Allen rushed for 89 yards in the first half, then suffered a knee injury just before halftime and never carried the ball for the Tigers again.

December 30, 1989—The Tigers defeated West Virginia 27-7 in the Gator Bowl. It was Clemson's fourth straight bowl victory and the fourth straight year Clemson concluded the season ranked in the national top 20. The Tigers held West Virginia to just 119 yards passing and forced Heisman Trophy runner up Major Harris into three fumbles. Chester McGlockton sacked Harris in the endzone and recovered the ball for a touchdown. It is the last time a defensive lineman has scored a touchdown for the Tigers.

January 18, 1990—Danny Ford resigned as head coach after 11 full seasons. He finished his career tied for first in ACC history in career victories with 96 and he was second in winning percentage. He had a 96-29-4 overall record and 76 percent winning mark. He was the third winningest active coach in the nation at the time of his resignation.

January 21, 1990—Ken Hatfield became Clemson's 22nd head coach. Hatfield had been the head coach at Arkansas since 1984 and took

his alma mater to bowl games each of his six seasons.

September 1, 1990—Clemson defeated Long Beach State 59-0 in the first game of the Ken Hatfield era. Clemson scored two touchdowns via return, one on an interception return by Arlington Nunn and one on a kickoff return by Doug Thomas. The 49ers were coached by NFL legend George Allen, who was making a comeback as a coach. Unfortunately, the venerable coach who led that team to a 6-5 record, died at the end of the season from pneumonia.

October 13, 1990—Eventual national champion Georgia Tech defeated Clemson 21-19 in Atlanta. Clemson rushed for over 300 yards in the game, yet lost to Bobby Ross's team. Chris Gardocki's 60-yard field goal attempt to win the game was just a couple of yards short.

January 1, 1991—Clemson shut out Illinois 30-0 in its first Hall of Fame Bowl appearance. It was Clemson's largest margin of victory in a bowl game. The win elevated Clemson to #9 in the final AP poll and gave Clemson a Top 10 ranking in Ken Hatfield's first year. He was the first ACC coach ever to take a team to a Top 10 ranking in his first year. It was a record 40th win for Clemson's seniors.

October 26, 1991—Clemson wore purple jerseys for the first time since the 1930s in a 29-19 victory over 10th-ranked (USA Today) N.C. State. The 18th-ranked (AP) Tigers were led by freshman Nelson Welch, who kicked a Clemson record five field goals. Clemson scored its first touchdown on a fake field goal as Rudy Harris ran three yards for a score.

November 16, 1991—The Tigers clinched their 12th ACC Championship, first under Ken Hatfield, with a 40-7 win over Maryland at Death Valley. DeChane Cameron was 13-23 for 213 yards in leading Clemson to victory in his final home game.

November 23, 1991—DeChane Cameron gained 322 yards of total offense, 206 passing and 116 rushing to lead Clemson to a 41-23 win at South Carolina. Clemson also had a 100-yard receiver in the game, giving Clemson a 200-yard passer, 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiver (Terry Smith) in the same game for just the fifth time in Clemson history.

November 30, 1991—Clemson ran its overseas record to 2-0 with a 33-21 win over Duke in the Coca Cola Bowl in Tokyo, Japan. Clemson had to score 26 points in the fourth period to register the victory. It was Ken Hatfield's 100th win as a college coach.

September 12, 1992—Florida State defeated Clemson 24-20 in the first night game at Clemson since 1956. The contest was televised by ESPN. Clemson had taken a 20-17 lead in the fourth period on a touchdown pass to Terry Smith. The Seminoles led by quarterback Charlie Ward, scored the winning TD in the two final minutes.

October 10, 1992—Clemson overcame a 28-0 deficit to defeat Virginia in Charlottesville 29-28. Nelson Welch kicked a 32-yard field goal with 52 seconds left to cap the comeback. Quarterback Louis Solomon came off the bench with the score 28-0 and led the comeback. His 64-yard

scoring run just before the half changed the course of the game. The victory over the 10th-ranked Cavaliers was just the third in Clemson history over a top-10 team on the road.

November 7, 1992—Clemson soundly defeated #18 North Carolina 40-7 at Death Valley, the largest margin of victory for the Tigers over a top 20 team in history. Freshman Patrick Sapp hit 13-23 passes for 205 yards, while Rodney Blunt scored three TDs in leading the Clemson offense. The Tigers controlled the clock for a record 42:58.

September 4, 1993—Clemson opened the 1993 season with a defeat of UNLV in the first meeting between the two teams. Sophomore quarterback Patrick Sapp posted the sixth-highest passing efficiency mark in Clemson history (235.0) in the game, throwing two touchdown strikes in the 24-14 Tiger victory. But most of the strikes were coming from above, as the game was delayed 17 minutes in the fourth quarter due to lightning. Both teams and most fans cleared the field.

November 24, 1993—Coach Ken Hatfield and Clemson University announced a separation, ending Hatfield's four-year career as head coach. Hatfield was 32-13-1 at Clemson and his .707 winning percentage was third in ACC history when he departed.

November 29, 1993—Tommy West was named Clemson's 23rd head coach and took over the Clemson team heading for the Peach Bowl. West, who spent the 1993 regular season as head coach at UT Chattanooga, became the sixth coach in Division I history to make his head coaching debut for a school in a bowl game and the second coach to ever become head coach for a bowl game after not serving as an assistant at that school during the regular season.

December 31, 1993—The Tigers scored the latest touchdown to gain victory in a game since 1958, as Patrick Sapp connected with Terry Smith with 0:20 remaining to defeat Kentucky, 14-13, in the Peach Bowl. West experienced his fifth consecutive bowl victory with Clemson, as the Tigers won four straight bowl games during his years as an assistant (1986-89).

September 3, 1994—For the first time ever, Clemson faced a team coached by a Clemson graduate. Bobby Johnson, an academic All-ACC defensive back for the Tigers and a 1973 Clemson graduate, brought his Furman Paladins to Death Valley. Clemson came away with a 27-6 win. Clemson inducted Frank Howard, Steve Fuller, and Banks McFadden into the Ring of Honor prior to the game.

September 17, 1994—Clemson and Virginia met in the 1,000th ACC football game in history. Virginia won 9-6. Clemson's Andre Carter had three takeaways in the game, just the fourth Tiger in history to do that.

October 15, 1994—Nelson Welch became the ACC's career field goal leader with a 47-yarder in the third quarter at Duke. It gave Welch 61 career field goals, breaking the record of 60 held by Jess Atkinson, Scott Sisson, and Obed Ariiri.

Clemson History

October 29, 1994—Louis Solomon set an all-time Clemson quarterback rushing record with 159 yards rushing to lead Clemson to a 24-8 win over Wake Forest at Death Valley. He broke Mike O'Cain's record of 140 yards rushing from the QB position against N.C. State in 1976.

November 5, 1994—Nelson Welch became Clemson's career scoring leader with five field goals and a PAT in Clemson's 28-17 upset of 12th-ranked North Carolina in Chapel Hill. Clemson's defense held UNC to 11 yards rushing. Clemson started an all first-year freshman backfield.

May 15, 1995—The Banks McFadden building was dedicated. The facility is the home of Clemson football administration and with all the top of the line in facilities for players and coaches.

August 12, 1995—The Carolina Panthers and the Denver Broncos played the first professional game in the history of Death Valley. The Panthers won the exhibition game over the John Elway led Broncos.

September 17, 1995—The Carolina Panthers met the St. Louis Rams in the first regular season NFL game in Death Valley. It was the first of eight regular season games for the expansion Panthers at Clemson Memorial Stadium.

October 7, 1995—Clemson wore "turn back the clock" uniforms for the Clemson-Georgia game at Death Valley. The uniforms were replicas of those worn by the 1939 Clemson team that went to the Cotton Bowl, the first bowl appearance in Clemson history. Georgia won the thrilling game, 19-17, but that would be Clemson's final regular season loss of 1995. Leomont Evans had 18 tackles in the contest, most ever by a Clemson defensive back.

October 21, 1995—For the first time in Clemson history the Tigers executed a "Hail Mary Pass" on the last play of a half. Louis Solomon's heave into the endzone from 33 yards out was tipped by Tony Horne and caught by Antwuan Wyatt as the horn sounded ending the first half. Clemson went on to a 17-0 victory, its third straight shutout of the Maryland Terps.

November 4, 1995—Clemson raised its record in orange pants to 29-6 with a pivotal 17-10 victory over North Carolina in Death Valley. Twin brothers Peter and Andy Ford both had interceptions for the Tigers, the first time in ACC history that twin brothers had interceptions in the same game.

November 11, 1995—Two all-time Clemson records were set on the same day in Clemson's 34-17 victory over Duke. Raymond Priester gained 263 yards rushing to break Cliff Austin's Clemson single game rushing mark. All-American Brian Dawkins had three interceptions in the first quarter to set a quarter record and tie the single game mark for interceptions. The game was played in a driving rainstorm in the first half and brilliant sunshine in the second half.

November 18, 1995—Clemson outscored South Carolina 21-0 in the fourth period to defeat South Carolina in Columbia, 38-17. It was Clemson's fourth straight win in Columbia. The victory clinched a bid to the Gator Bowl for the Tigers.

December 10, 1995—The defending Super Bowl Champion San Francisco 49ers defeated the Carolina Panthers at Death Valley. Jerry Rice caught one touchdown pass from Steve Young in the contest that attracted over 75,000 fans.

December 15, 1995—Tiger linebacker Anthony Simmons was named UPI National Freshman of the Year, the first defensive player in the history of the award. Simmons led Clemson in tackles in 1995 with 150, 46 more than any other freshman in school history.

January 28, 1996—Clemson legend Frank Howard, the school's head football coach between 1940-69 passed away at his home in Clemson. Howard, who still had come to his office in the Jervy Athletic Center a month prior to his death, died on the same day as his former teammate and Alabama legend Bear Bryant, 14 years later.

September 7, 1996—Clemson's Centennial team was honored at halftime of the Clemson vs. Furman game. The Tigers wore their "Turn back the Clock" uniforms for this game, a 19-3 Clemson victory. Clemson had a school record 12 sacks in the win.

November 2, 1996—Clemson held Maryland without a touchdown for the fourth straight year in a 35-3 Tiger victory. Anthony Simmons keyed the Clemson defense that had eight sacks with 15 tackles for loss. Maryland has not scored a touchdown against Clemson since 1992.

November 9, 1996—The Tigers upset 15th ranked Virginia 24-16 in Charlottesville. Clemson had two players rush for over 120 yards in the contest as Kelton Dunnican had a career high 123 yards and Raymond Priester had 122. It was the second time in four years that Clemson had defeated a ranked Virginia team on the road.

December 28, 1996—Raymond Priester became Clemson's career and single season rushing leader in a 10-7 loss to LSU in the Peach Bowl. Priester gained 151 yards rushing in 25 attempts, giving him 1,345 yards for the season and 3010 for his career. He broke his own single season record

and broke Kenny Flowers career record in the performance.

September 13, 1997—Matt Padgett kicked a 20-yard field goal with 19 seconds left to give Clemson a 19-17 victory over NC State in Raleigh. Nealon Greene became the first quarterback in school history to have consecutive 250-yard passing games. The senior also had 76 yards rushing and the 336 yards total offense were the second most in Clemson history.

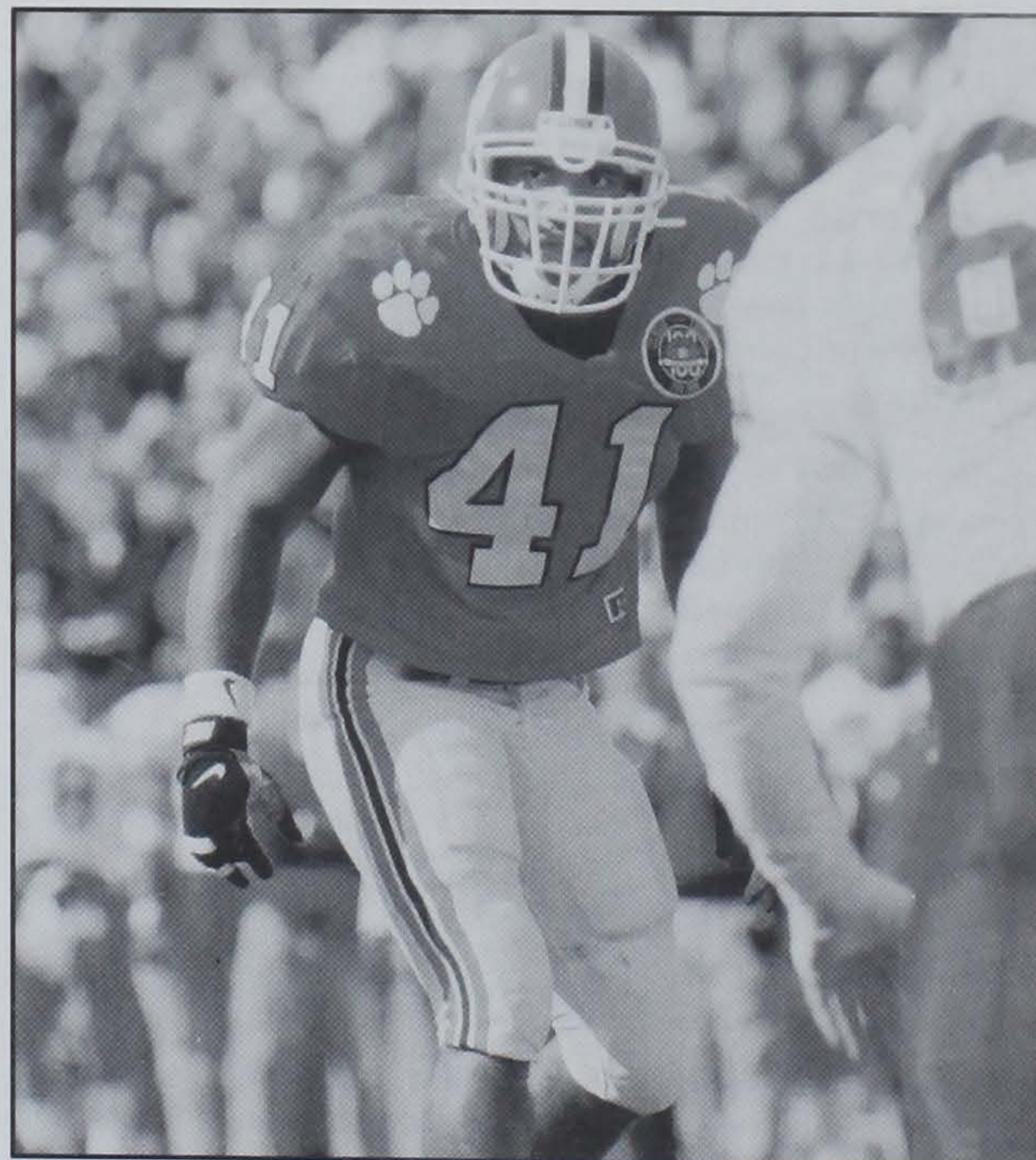
September 20, 1997—Clemson's Tony Horne and Florida State's Peter Warrick put on the greatest individual all-purpose running show in the history of Death Valley. Horne had 10 receptions for 131 yards and had 267 yards of all-purpose running, while Warrick had a 90-yard punt return and an 80-yard touchdown reception in gaining 372 yards of all-purpose running as Florida State defeated Clemson 35-28.

October 4, 1997—Nealon Greene tied a Clemson record for touchdown passes with four, in a 39-7 rout of UTEP. He completed three of the scoring passes to Tony Horne, and that also tied a Clemson single game record.

November 8, 1997—Rahim Abdullah returned an interception 63 yards for a touchdown, clinching a 29-20 Clemson victory in overtime over Duke. It was the first overtime game in Clemson history, the first in ACC history involving two league teams.

November 22, 1997—Clemson earned its third straight bowl bid with a 47-21 victory over South Carolina in Columbia. It was Clemson's fifth straight victory in Columbia over the Gamecocks. Antwan Edwards was the star for Clemson with two interceptions, including one that he returned for a touchdown. The 47 points were the most by the Tigers against South Carolina since 1900.

December 8, 1997—Anthony Simmons was named first-team AP All-American, his third straight year on one of the top three teams. He became Clemson's second three-time All-American in history with the selection.

College Football Hall of Fame

John Heisman

A name synonymous with not only the early years of Clemson football but the collegiate game is John Heisman.

A stern disciplinarian, he expected his players to be of high character and performance both on the football field and in the classroom.

Heisman coached the Tigers in 1900-1903 and was responsible for putting the Clemson name among the annals of the great early collegiate teams.

Heisman was brought to Clemson by a professor and later University President, Walter Riggs. In the spring of 1894, Riggs was a graduate manager for the Auburn football team, and he was responsible for finding a coach for the 1895 season. Riggs wrote to Carl Williams of Pennsylvania, captain of the 1894 team, asking him to suggest a suitable coach. He replied recommending J.W. Heisman, an ex-Penn player, and his coach at Oberlin a few years earlier.

After several weeks, Riggs finally found Heisman in Texas, where he was engaged in raising tomatoes. Having sunk about all of his capital into the tomato venture, he was glad to go back to his old love of football and he readily went to coach at Auburn for \$500.00 a year. Riggs later was hired as a professor at Clemson and he hired Heisman at Clemson in 1900. (Riggs started the Clemson football program in 1896 and was head coach in 1896 and 1899).

Heisman began his coaching career at Oberlin in 1892 and lasted 36 years in the profession. His career included positions at Akron, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson, and Rice University. He had an overall career record of 185 wins, 70 losses, and 17 ties.

He invented the hidden ball trick, the handoff, the double lateral, and the "flea flicker." He pioneered the forward pass, and originated the center snap and the word "hike" (previously the center used to roll the ball on the ground to the quarterback).

Heisman took Clemson to a 19-3-2 record in his four seasons. His .833 winning percentage is still the best in Clemson history. He was also the Clemson baseball coach between 1901-1904.

Clemson was a powerhouse during his tenure and was a most feared opponent. His secret was that he depended on smart, quick players rather than large size and brawn.

William Heisman, a nephew of John Heisman, often told a story on how his famous uncle stressed academics.

"I remember a story Coach Heisman used to tell me about this famous football player he confronted in the locker room before a big

game. My uncle came busting through the door and went over to this guy and said, "You can't play today because you haven't got your grades up to par." The player looked up at my uncle and said, "Coach, don't you know that the sportswriters call this toe on my right foot the million-dollar toe?" My uncle snapped back right quick and said, "What good is it if you only have a fifteen-cent head?"

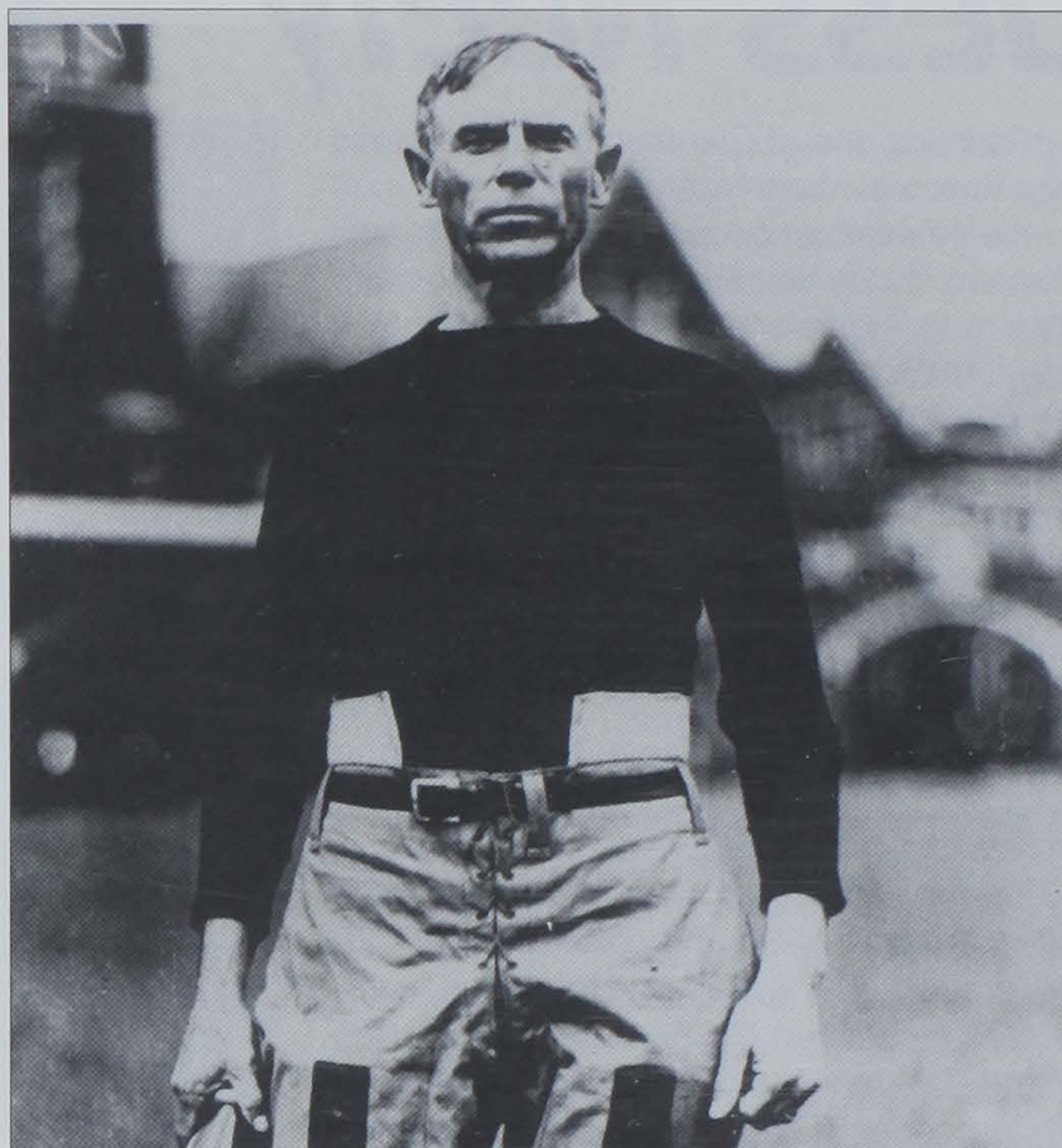
Another favorite Heisman story was the speech he used to make before a season began. Heisman would face his recruits holding a football. "What is it?" he would sharply ask. Then he would tell his players, "a football was a prolate spheroid, an elongated sphere—in which the outer leather casing is drawn up tightly over a somewhat smaller rubber tubing." Then after a long pause he would say, "better to have died as a small boy than to fumble this football."

Heisman broke down football into these percentages: talent 25%; mentality 20%; aggressiveness 20%; speed 20%; and weight 15%. He considered coaching as being a master-commanding, even dictatorial. "He has no time to say 'please' or 'mister', and he must be occasionally severe, arbitrary, and something of a czar."

On November 29, 1900, Clemson defeated Alabama 35-0, which allowed Heisman's team to finish the season undefeated with a 6-0 record. This was Clemson's first undefeated team and was the only team to win all of its games in a season until the 1948 squad went 11-0. The Tigers only allowed two touchdowns the entire 1900 season.

Clemson opened the 1901 season with a 122-0 win over Guilford. The Tigers averaged 30 yards per play and a touchdown every minute and 26 seconds. The first half lasted 20 minutes, while the second half lasted only 10 minutes. Legend has it that every man on the Clemson team scored a touchdown in this game.

In his third season, on November 27, 1902, Clemson played in the snow for the first time in a game against Tennessee. The Tigers won the game, 11-0, and claimed the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association crown. (This early conference that had sev-

eral southern colleges and universities as members).

In his final season in 1903, Clemson defeated Georgia Tech 73-0 on October 17. Clemson rushed the ball 55 times for 615 yards, while Tech ran the ball 35 times and collected 28 yards. The second half was shortened to 15 minutes.

On November 24, 1903 Clemson participated in its "First Bowl Game". Clemson and Cumberland met on this date for the Championship of the South. The contract for the game was drawn up just two weeks before the game was to be played. Cumberland who had earlier defeated Auburn, Alabama, and Vanderbilt was considered to be champion of the southern states of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, and Kentucky. Clemson was considered to be the best team in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. The game was played on a neutral site, Montgomery, AL. Cumberland and Clemson fought to an 11-11 tie. In this game, John Maxwell scored as a result of a 100-yard kickoff return. After the news came back to Clemson that the game ended in a tie, the students and the local townspeople built a bonfire and paraded around the campus.

John Heisman's 19-3-2 record is still the best in Clemson history on a percentage basis. The man who is honored each year with the awarding of the Heisman Trophy holds the distinction of building the early foundation of Clemson's football tradition.

College Football Hall of Fame

Jess Neely

Perhaps one of Clemson's most beloved coaches was Jess Neely.

Neely's influence and inspiration is still present today as the IPTAY Scholarship Club was founded during his coaching tenure. IPTAY is the lifeblood of the Clemson Athletic Department. It provides funds for athletic scholarships and capital improvements.

Thousands of athletes have benefitted through the IPTAY Scholarship fund since its inception in 1934. That first year of IPTAY, Neely and his staff convinced 160 people to pay \$10.00 a year to Clemson, for a grand total of \$1,600 the first year (not bad during the middle of the great depression.)

Neely was head coach at Clemson from 1931 through 1939 and spent the next 26 years at Rice University in Houston.

Neely coached Clemson to its first bowl game, the 1940 Cotton Bowl, where the Tigers capped a 9-1-0 season by beating Boston College 6-3. Clemson ended the season ranked 12th in the final Associated Press poll, its first top 20 season in history. Boston College was ranked 11th going into the game and it was Clemson's first win over a top 20 team in its history. The team featured the play of Banks McFadden, Clemson's first Associated Press All-American. Clemson had a 43-35-7 record during Neely's tenure.

Neely coached Rice to four Southwest Conference Championships and six bowl appearances, the last being a trip to the Bluebonnet Bowl in 1961.

During 40 years of college coaching he compiled a record of 207-99-14. Neely is 12th in college football history in victories by a Division I-A coach heading into the 1998 season. For his accomplishments, he was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1971.

Neely graduated from Vanderbilt in 1924, after lettering three years in football and serving as captain of the 1922 team. He coached a year of high school football before returning to his alma mater to obtain a law degree. But he never practiced.

He coached four years at Southwestern College in Clarksville, TN and then went to the University of Alabama in 1928. It was there that he met Frank Howard. Neely brought Howard to Clemson as line coach in 1931. Howard replaced him in 1940 and remained as head coach for 30 years. In 1967, Neely returned to his alma mater as athletic director. He officially retired in 1971, but continued to coach golf at Vanderbilt until 1981, when he moved back to Texas.



Neely is 12th in college football history in total victories. He coached Clemson to its first bowl game and first top-20 season.

"If I didn't look in the mirror every day, I wouldn't know how old I am," Neely once said. "Working with the boys makes you feel young, I feel that in athletics the boys learn a sense of loyalty and sacrifice and values they don't learn anywhere else.

"They learn to compete and that is what life is all about—it's competition.

"If they make good in football, chances are they'll be successful elsewhere. I like to see that those boys make something of themselves. That is my reward.

"The boys go to college to study and get that degree. Playing football is a side activity. When fellows go to a school first to play football they get an entirely wrong sense of values.

"And when you start them off with the

wrong sense, it isn't difficult for them to go astray."

"He was a cool, southern gentlemen, but he worked us like dogs. The workouts were always twice as hard as the games," said Dick Maegle. "There were no superstars, no victory that was better than all the other victories. To him football was a team game and we were all team players." Maegle was the player tackled in a famous episode in the 1954 Cotton Bowl, when frustrated Tommy Lewis of Alabama came off the bench to stop a certain touchdown. Rice won that game, 28-6.

Neely died at the age of 85 in 1983, but his landmark accomplishments in the 1930s at Clemson contributed significantly to Clemson's outstanding football tradition.

Banks McFadden

Usually when one gets out of the spotlight, his accomplishments soon fade and gather dust in some far off corner in the basement or attic.

But not Banks McFadden.

Now 79 and living in retirement in Clemson, Banks looks back with many fond memories and Clemson fans remember him as probably the greatest natural athlete ever to play for the Tigers.

Although he brought great pride to Clemson with his athletic ability, and later with his coaching, McFadden says, "working with the athletes and working for the people whom we had here at Clemson...it's been a tremendous life. It's something I'll never regret and I couldn't have asked for things to be better."

For some of you in the 'Pepsi Generation' who might not have read your Clemson athletic history too well, let us do a little refreshing on the one called "Bonnie Banks."

☆ Was named All-American in both basketball (1938-39) and football (1939) the same calendar year.

☆ Was voted the nation's most versatile athlete (1938-39).

☆ Led Clemson to its first conference basketball championship (1939).

☆ Led Clemson to its first bowl game and victory (1940 Cotton).

☆ Won three events in the State Track Meet in one afternoon, setting records in all three of them. Earlier in the same year placed first in five events in a dual meet, scoring 25 points while the opposing team's total score was 28 points.

☆ Was Clemson's first 1st round draft choice (1939 Brooklyn Dodgers).

☆ Tied for the longest rushing play in Clemson history (90 yards vs. Presbyterian, 1939).

☆ Has the most punts for over 50 yards in a game (six vs. Tulane, 1939) and in a season (22 on 65 punts in 1939).

☆ Held Clemson punting record (43.5) for 40 years (1939 to 1979).

☆ First Clemson player invited to participate in the College All-Star game in Chicago.

☆ Charter member in the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame.

☆ Charter member in the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame.

☆ Only Clemson player ever chosen for the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

☆ Highest NFL draft pick in Clemson history (#3 in entire 1940 draft).

That's 15 of his more noteworthy accomplishments, and it wouldn't take too long to dig out twice that many more. But those listed should be enough for the average sports buff to be impressed.

Banks played one year (1940) of pro football with the old Brooklyn Dodgers and led the NFL in yards per carry, but he didn't care at all for the big city life. Grass felt better under his feet than pavement so he returned 'home' and

joined the coaching staff of Coach Frank Howard.

Banks coached the defensive backs for one year (1941) before joining the Army Air Corps and spending four years in North Africa and Italy. He was discharged as a colonel. He recalls that "after the war, everything began to blossom out" as far as college football was concerned.

One thing that 'blossomed out' was his marriage to "Aggie" Rigsby of Manning. As it appears sometimes with former athletes, former backs produce girls and he and "Aggie" had four of them—Patsy, Lil, Marcia and Jan. And the grand kids—there are nine of them—five boys and four girls. The McFaddens celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary recently.

McFadden came back to Clemson after his service and was again the secondary coach, this time for four years (1946-49), and then took over as head freshman football coach for five years before returning to coach defensive backs in 1955, a spot he held until Howard retired following the '69 season.

Besides his football coaching years, McFadden also put in a stint as varsity track coach, freshman basketball coach and was for 10 years the varsity basketball coach. Then after Howard resigned as football coach in 1969, McFadden took over the university's intramural department, which he directed for 15 years.

Asked if he had any favorites, McFadden said: "Fred Cone was a very steady player. But I'm not so sure that Joel Wells wasn't the

best all around football player that I had the opportunity to work with as a varsity coach. He was one of the best defensive players we had and a mighty fine offensive player. For somebody who could go both ways, Wells stood out.

"When I was in high school, colleges could do almost anything they wanted to as far as recruiting went," McFadden remembers. "Schools didn't have much (scholarship) money to give away, but they did go out and look at people and try to talk them into coming (to Clemson), paying their own way (or what is called a walk-on today.) But there wasn't very much recruiting until '35 or '36. But I believe there were 25 or 30 on my freshman team (1936) who were getting aid." (Note: The Clemson IPTAY Club was founded in 1934).

The Great Falls, SC native came to Clemson in a 6-3 frame and a skinny 165 pounds. Howard, an assistant coach at the time, said that if McFadden had drank a can of tomato juice, they could have used him as a thermometer.

"I can remember the first time I saw him on the practice field," Howard recalled. "He looked like one of those whooping cranes. I thought sure as the devil that Coach (Jess) Neely had made a mistake giving this boy a scholarship. But he proved me wrong."

Clemson had required military when McFadden was playing, but he believes that was a plus. "We were so much a team then, and that's still there. But now the rules allow two different teams (offense and defense) and it causes so much more work. Our people were so close, as are the alumni of Clemson. Our team was just like the student body was then—a very close-knit bunch of people.

McFadden believes he, "came to Clemson at the right time. I was blessed to have some athletic ability," he recalled. "We had great coaches, had great individuals playing (with me), but we were all playing as a team."

Of all of the honors he received as an athlete, being voted the most valuable player of the 1939 football team was his highest. "To me, when your teammates vote you something," he beams, "then you feel pretty good. That award meant more than anything else (to me)."

This is one athlete where a one-page story in a football guide does not do that person justice...just about enough room for the tip of the iceberg. But if one could use just one word to describe 'Great' (as Howard called him), it would have to be 'competitor,' for he was just that.

And one more thing that the 'Pepsi Generation' can soak in—McFadden is the only Clemson athlete to have both his football jersey and basketball jersey numbers retired. In 1995, the Banks McFadden Building at Jervay Athletic Center was dedicated in his honor.

There hasn't been another like him down the pike.

College Football Hall of Fame

Frank Howard

An era at Clemson University ended June 30, 1974, when Frank Howard officially retired from the payroll.

Another era ended January 28, 1996, when Howard died at the age of 86 and forever silenced a voice that had been synonymous with Clemson for nearly 65 years. He was the school's best known ambassador.

Although he retired from all official duties in 1974, he never quit coming to the office and he never stopped representing Clemson in a manner which continued to win friends for the place that was so dear to his heart.

Howard retired from coaching December 10, 1969, after 39 years on the Clemson coaching staff, 30 of which were as head coach. He was also athletic director during this time and he kept this position until February 4, 1971, when he was named assistant to the vice president at the university, the post he held when the mandatory retirement age of 65 rolled around.

Shortly after his retirement the Clemson Board of Trustees named the playing surface of Memorial Stadium as "Frank Howard Field" in honor of his long service to the university. It was only the third time that a building or installation had been named by the trustees for a living person. Over the years, Howard was inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame and the Clemson Hall of Fame (charter member in both), as well as the Helms Athletic Hall of Fame and the State of Alabama Hall of Fame. On December 5, 1989 he joined an elite group in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame. The ceremonies took place in the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. He joined former Clemson mentors John Heisman and Jess Neely in the membership.

Howard was also honored in December, 1981, when he was inducted into the Orange Bowl Hall of Honor, along with former Alabama coach, Paul "Bear" Bryant, and Tommy McDonald, a former Oklahoma star. In the summer of 1990 he was inducted into the Gator Bowl Hall of Fame.

Howard stepped onto the rolling hills of Clemson in 1931 fresh from the varsity football ranks at the University of Alabama where he was a first stringer on Wallace Wade's 1930 team that drubbed Washington State, 24-0, in the 1931 Rose Bowl. Howard was known as the "Little Giant" of the Tide's "Herd of Red Elephants."

The bald veteran came to his first coaching post under Jess Neely as a line tutor. "At least that was my title," Howard recalls. "Actually, I also coached track, was ticket manager, recruited players and had charge of football equipment. In my spare time I cut grass, lined tennis courts and operated the

canteen while the regular man was out to lunch." Howard was not only track coach from 1931-39, but served as baseball coach in 1943 and his 12-3 record that year is still among the best percentages for a season in Clemson history.

Howard held the line coaching post until Neely went to Rice University as head coach in 1940. When the Clemson Athletic Council met to name a successor to Neely, Prof. Sam Rhodes, a council member, nominated Howard to be the new head coach. Howard, standing in the back of the room listening to the discussion, said: "I second the nomination." He got the job and never left. When he retired as head coach following the 1969 season, he was the nation's dean of coaches, having been a head football coach at a major institution longer than anyone else in the United States. When he retired, he was one of five active coaches with 150 or more victories.

While line coach in 1939, the Tigers' record (8-1) was good enough to merit a trip to Dallas where Clemson met undefeated Boston College under the late Frank Leahy in the 1940 Cotton Bowl. The 1948 mark of 10-0 carried Clemson to the 1949 Gator Bowl and two years later, a 9-0-1 record sent the Tigers to Miami's Orange Bowl (1950). The

Country Gentlemen were champions on their first three bowl ventures. Boston College fell, 6-3, Missouri was nipped in the Gator, 24-23 (Howard said this is the best football game he ever witnessed), and Miami felt the Tiger claws, 15-14. The total point spread in these three bowl wins was five points.

The Gator Bowl beckoned the Tigers again in January, 1952, and by being conference champions in 1956, Clemson played in the '57 Orange Bowl classic again. Miami downed Clemson, 14-0 in the second Gator Bowl trip and Colorado led Clemson, 20-0, then trailed 21-20, before finally defeating the Tigers, 27-21, in the second Orange Bowl. The Tigers then played in the 1959 Sugar Bowl and held No. 1-ranked Louisiana State to a standstill before losing, 7-0.

The invitation to play in the first Bluebonnet Bowl in Houston in December, 1959, was the eighth bowl that Howard had been a part of either as a player, assistant coach or head coach. It was the seventh bowl trip for a Clemson team and the sixth in 12 years. Howard says that Clemson's 23-7 triumph over seventh-ranked Texas Christian in the Bluebonnet Bowl was the best performance he had ever witnessed by a Clemson team. Clemson was the first school

to play in two bowls in the same calendar year.

The Tigers' victory over TCU was their fourth success in seven post-season appearances. In all seven Clemson was the established underdog.

Howard served on the coaching staff of the Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, AL, in 1941, 1952, 1959, and 1966; was on the East staff of the annual East-West Game in San Francisco, CA, in December, 1960, and again in December, 1962; and was named coach of the South squad in Miami's 1961 and 1969 North-South game. He coached in the 1970 Hula Bowl, which was his ninth postseason all-star game. While still in active coaching Howard served as one of the rules committee members for a period of three years.

A single wing expert for 22 seasons (including nine as a line coach), Howard changed to the T-formation and its many variations in 1953. Still another major change in the offense was installed in 1965 with the "I" and pro-type set. In his 13 seasons as head coach using the single wing, Clemson won 69, lost 47 and tied 7. In 12 years of "T" teams, the Tigers won 71, lost 47 and tied 4. While using the "I" in his last five years of coaching, Clemson recorded a 25-24-1 record.

In his 30 years of coaching Howard won 165, lost 118 and tied 12. That victory total is still among the top 40 coaches in the history of the game.

In addition to heading up the Clemson football program, Howard also had the job of directing Clemson's entire athletic program, and at the same time, raising all the required scholarship funds. The athletic department was always on a sound financial footing under the guidance of Howard.

The year 1958 was a red letter one for Howard. During halftime of the Spring Game, Howard, his staff and secretaries were given an appreciation day. Howard received a 1958 car while other staff members were presented gifts. That summer Howard and three members of his staff were given a trip to Europe by the Department of Defense to conduct clinics for the Armed Forces in Germany.

Then came the football season and the Tigers presented Howard an 8-2 season, which led to the Sugar Bowl invitation. One of these 1958 wins was the 100th of Howard's coaching career. That came against the late Jim Tatum of North Carolina, a coach Howard had never beaten. And, the Tigers had to come from behind three times to win, 26-21.

Howard was named Southern Conference Coach-of-the-Year in 1948. In 1959 he was named Atlantic Coast Conference Coach-of-the-Year and was accorded the honor again

in 1966. His teams won ACC championships six times (1956-58-59-65-66-67) in the first 15 years of the conference. The Tigers were co-champions in 1965. He guided Clemson to the Southern Conference crown in 1940 and 1948.

Howard was born at Barlow Bend, AL (three wagon greasin's from Mobile), March 25, 1909. He spent his early days on the farm playing mostly cow pasture baseball because there were not enough boys around the community for a football team. Howard says he left Barlow Bend walking barefoot on a barbed wire fence with a wild-cat under each arm.

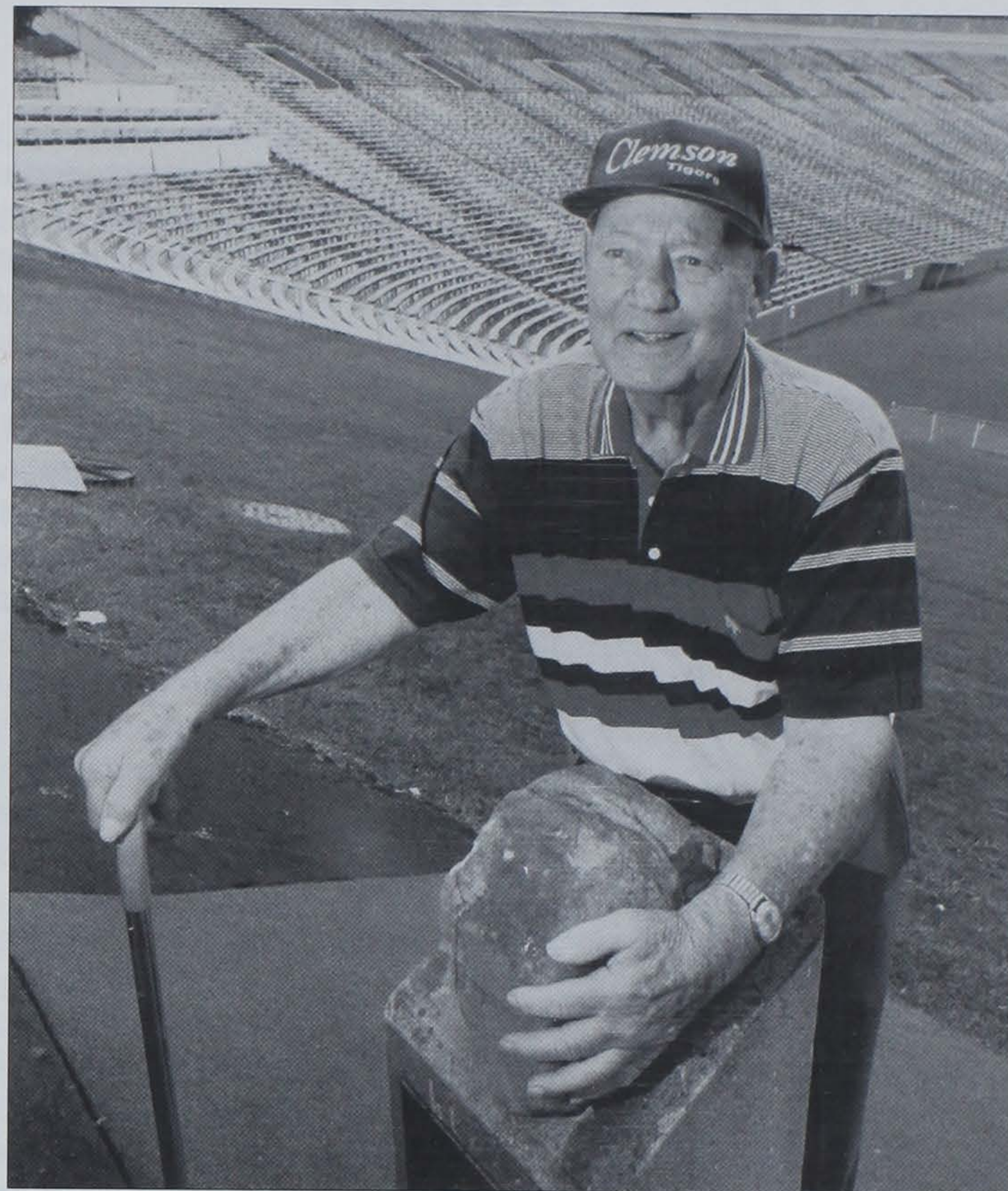
He graduated from Murphy High School in Mobile where he played football, baseball and basketball and served as president of both the junior and senior classes.

After finishing at Murphy, Howard entered the University of Alabama on an academic scholarship provided by the **Birmingham News** in the fall of 1927, and the 185 pounder played reserve guard his sophomore year. During his junior year he started every game but two, as an ankle injury sidelined him for the two games he missed. Again his senior year he was a regular.

Howard was president of the freshman class at Alabama, was member of Blue Key and president of the "A" Club.

After coming to Clemson, he married the former Anna Tribble of Anderson, SC, (who died May 15, 1996) on August 23, 1933. They were the parents of a daughter, Alice (Mrs. Robert McClure of Gastonia, NC) and a son, Jimmy, of Pendleton. The Howards had three grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Jimmy followed in his dad's footsteps as a football player, only at a different position. The son was regular fullback on the local high school (Daniel) team for three years and was a halfback-fullback for three years on the Clemson varsity. Jimmy gained over 1,400 yards his senior year in high school and scored over 100 points. He graduated from Clemson in June, 1964 with honors, and earned his masters degree in horticulture from Clemson in 1967. He retired as

district entomologist with the Plant Pest Regulatory Service at Clemson.

For over three decades Howard was in great demand both as a banquet speaker and a clinic lecturer. Few states have escaped his homespun oratory, which brought the house down on many occasions.

After his retirement, Howard was active in other endeavors. He served as state chairman of the South Carolina Heart Fund drive, was roasted several times on behalf of the Multiple Sclerosis Society, and was active in selling the Kickoff Publication out of Knoxville, TN.

Howard kept his hands in football as he served as the chief recruiter for the Gray squad in the annual Blue-Gray game in Montgomery, AL. The Blue squad recruiter was Don Faurot, who opposed Howard in the 1949 Gator Bowl.

Howard has also been inducted into the Helms Foundation Hall of Fame in San Francisco, CA., is an honorary member of the National Athletic Trainers Association, and is a member of the Hall of Fame of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics. Clemson University also honored Howard once more with the presentation of the Clemson Medallion, which is the highest public honor bestowed by the university to a living person who exemplifies the dedication and foresight of its founders. He was a charter member of Clemson's Ring of Honor at Memorial Stadium in 1994.

Fred Cone

Ring of Honor

Fred Cone is living proof that recruiting services and all their accompanying hype aren't what they are cracked up to be. Cone was inducted into Clemson's Football Ring of Honor in the Fall of 1997, just the fourth Clemson football player in history to receive the honor.

But, he came to Clemson without having played a down of high school football. It is perhaps the most unusual story concerning an athlete's journey to Clemson. Cone was visiting his sister at Biloxi, MS, far from the haunts of his hometown, an obscure place called Pineapple, AL.

Unbeknown to Clemson Head Coach Frank Howard, Cone's sister lived next door to Howard's sister, Hazel, in Biloxi. On years when Clemson would play Tulane in New Orleans, Howard would send Hazel a pair of tickets. "One year she sent the two tickets back," Howard remembered, "and said she'd like to have four tickets because she wanted to take the next door neighbor to the game."

That was in 1946, Cone's senior year in high school. After Cone graduated, Hazel wrote him a letter. "Brother, I have you a good football player, but he's never played football."

Howard recalled that he had told the Clemson registrar to save him 40 beds in the barracks and that he would turn in that many names on September 1st.

"When Hazel wrote me about Fred Cone, I had 39 names on that list. So I just wrote 'Fred Cone' in as the 40th name. And that's how I got probably the best, if not the best, football player I ever had."

Cone graduated from Moore Academy in Pineapple and came to Clemson in 1947 as a freshman, but first-year players were not eligible to play then. It was probably best for Cone because he had not played high school football. He needed a year to get acclimated. When Cone became eligible for the varsity in '48, the football program took on a different air.

In the second game of his career, against N.C. State, Cone had the first of his eight 100-yard career rushing games, leading Clemson to an important victory. He was Clemson's top rusher (635 yards and seven TDs) that season, a regular season that saw Clemson compile a perfect 10-0 record and an invitation to the Gator Bowl against Missouri.

Clemson ended up on the long end of a 24-23 game. Cone rushed for 72 yards and scored twice in the first quarter, but it was his effort on a fourth-down play that was the difference in the game.

Clemson held a one-point lead and faced

a fourth-and-three at the Mizzou 45. It was either gamble for a first down, or punt and give Missouri another chance to score. As Howard would say later: "We hadn't stopped them all day so I took my chance with a running play."

Cone hit a stone wall at left tackle, but kept digging and slid off a little more to the outside, found a little wiggling room and mustered six yards and a first down at the Missouri 35. Clemson retained possession those few remaining minutes and ran out the clock. Years later Howard said it was the most memorable play of his 30-year career.

Despite a down year in '49, Cone gained more yards (703) rushing and scored more touchdowns (9) than his sophomore year. But, 1950 was to bring about another, undefeated season.

After the expected win over Presbyterian to start the season, Clemson faced pre-season No. 17 Missouri on the road. Cone gained 111 yards in 21 attempts, one of three Tigers over the 100-yard mark that day.

In '50, Clemson scored 50 points in three games, but Cone saved his best until his last regular season game against Auburn.

Rumor had it that if Clemson scored over a certain number of points on Auburn that the Orange Bowl bid was in its pocket. The South Carolina Tigers took the Alabama Tigers, 41-0. Cone gained 163 yards, two shy of a five-yard average, and scored three touchdowns on the ground, and one on a 28-yard reception.

Icing on the cake this time came against Miami in the Orange Bowl. Although Sterling Smith's tackle of Fred Smith in the end zone for a safety brought a 15-14 victory Clemson's way, Cone gained 81 yards on the ground, scored once, punted four times and returned one kickoff. It put a great climax on Cone's career.

The 1948-50 era is the only time in Clemson history that has seen the Tigers record two undefeated seasons in a three-year period. Cone and Ray Mathews were the only common denominators in the starting lineup on those two teams.

Cone's senior season numbers, 845 yards rushing and 15 touchdowns, were school records at the time. He also set career records for rushing yards (2183) and touchdowns (31).

A seven-year hitch with the Green Bay Packers was so impressive that he was inducted into their Hall of Fame in 1974. One year he led the NFL in field goals. He was also a member of the Dallas Cowboys in their first year of existence in 1960. Later he returned to Clemson as its chief recruiter for 10 years beginning in 1961.

After Cone completed his Clemson career, Howard was still stumped as to how his sister could predict that her neighbor's brother would be such an outstanding football player. "He just looked so athletic jumping off of that diving board," Hazel said without skipping a beat.

Clemson Ring of Honor

Steve Fuller

Every once in awhile a truly well-rounded individual comes along. Steve Fuller was a scholar, an athlete, and a fine representative of his community. That combination made him one of the most decorated athletes in Clemson history and the reason he was inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor in 1994. He was also the first Clemson football player in history to have his jersey number (4) retired.

Fuller, a native of Spartanburg, South Carolina, graduated high school with a perfect 4.0 grade point average in a class of more than 800, crowning him class valedictorian. He had offers to go pro in baseball out of high school and had a basketball scholarship offer at North Carolina.

Right away Steve produced a preview of what Clemson fans should expect from him over the course of the next four years. He was named ACC Rookie-of-the-Week in his first collegiate game, gaining 194 yards of total offense against Tulane. During his sophomore year, Steve gained further recognition by being named ACC Back-of-the-Week after the Tennessee game and by being named to the All-ACC Academic Team.

Fuller demonstrated exceptional leadership during his junior and senior years, both on and off the field. Highlights on the field

include leading the ACC in total offense for both years and being selected twice as the ACC Player-of-the-Year, the only two-time selection in Clemson history.

Equally impressive were the team accomplishments, as Fuller quarterbacked Clemson to two consecutive Gator Bowls, Clemson's first bowl appearances in 18 years. In 1978 Clemson posted an 11-1 record and ranked sixth in the final AP poll, then the highest final national ranking in Clemson history.

Fuller earned the Gator Bowl MVP Award his senior year (1978). He was the South Carolina Amateur Athlete-of-the-Year during his junior season. The Atlanta Touchdown Club named Fuller the Back-of-the-Year in the South in 1978 and he was also named the South Carolina Player-of-the-Year his junior and senior years.

At the conclusion of his senior season he was also an AP third-team All-American. Another great athletic feat for Steve Fuller included finishing sixth in the Heisman Trophy balloting, the highest finish for a Clemson athlete in history. Likewise, he set several Clemson records. It's no wonder he was a first round draft pick (23rd selection) by the Kansas City Chiefs.

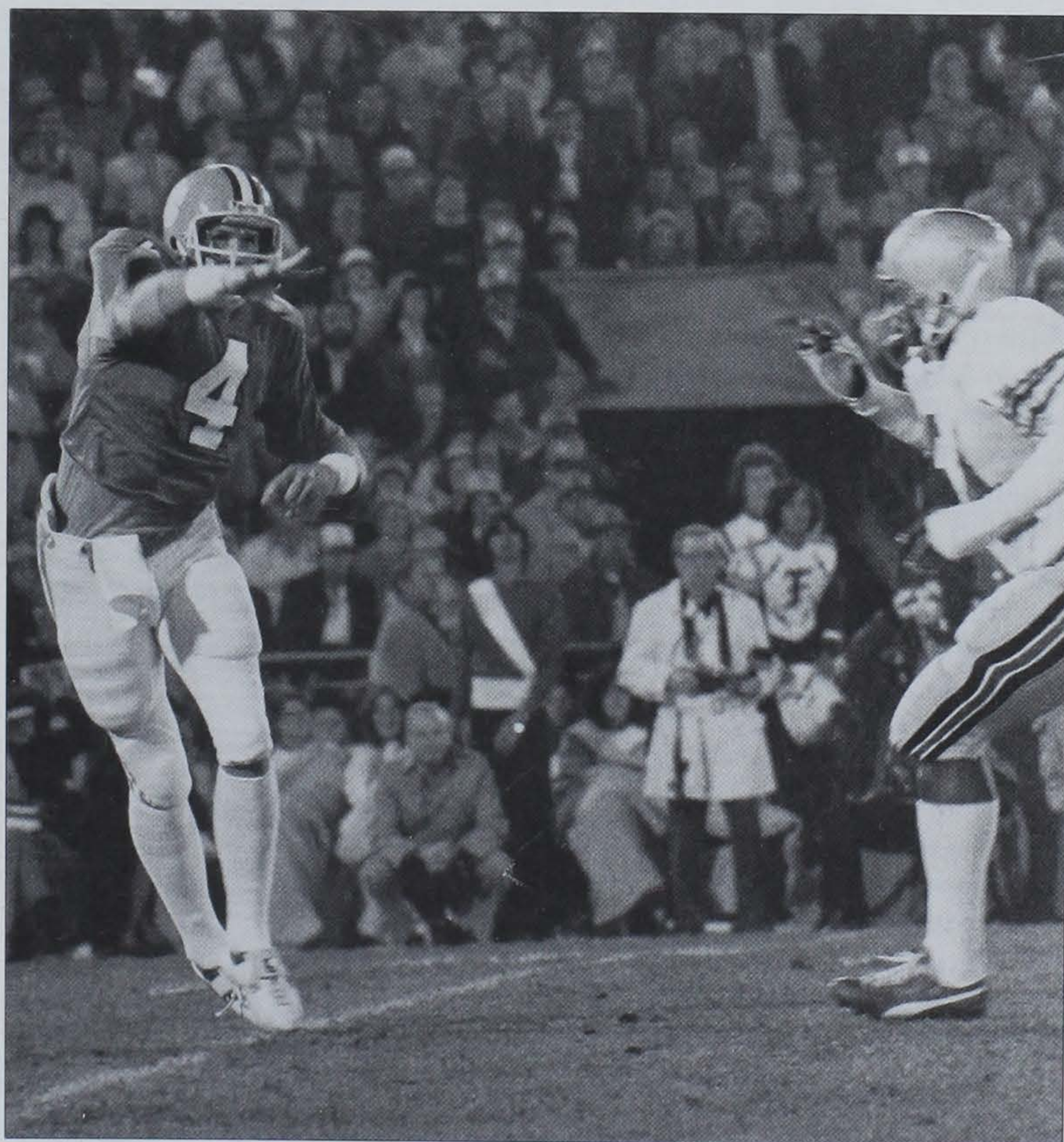
Off the field, Fuller illustrated his joint dedication to academics and community service. He was named to the All-ACC Academic Team for three years and twice named Academic All-American, including a first-team selection his senior year.

Fuller is one of just two football players in Clemson history to be named an on-field All-American and Academic All-American in the same year. He majored in history (pre-law), which was not an easy route to take, and maintained a 3.93 grade point average. His push for excellence earned him an NCAA postgraduate scholarship, the Jim Weaver Award from the ACC, and one of the NCAA's Top Five Awards. He delivered the acceptance response for himself and the four other winners.

He was also presented the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Scholar Athlete Award, a double that no Clemson player has duplicated since. Extracurricular activities included being a member of the Blue Key, Mortar Board, Tiger Brotherhood, Block "C" Club, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Phi Eta Sigma, Phi Beta Kappa, and Phi Kappa Phi.

Steve Fuller's honors may have collected dust once he left Clemson, but his fame did not. In 1979, he became the first football player and the second athlete in Clemson history to have his jersey (#4) retired. He also became a member of the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame and the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame. In September 1994, Fuller was inducted into Clemson's Ring of Honor along with coach Frank Howard and all-purpose back Banks McFadden.

Now, Clemson has bestowed another honor upon Steve Fuller. On April 6, 1996, the Clemson Centennial Team was announced and Fuller was the starting quarterback for this team. He left behind a legacy that few can dare to touch. No doubt, Steve Fuller remains one of the greatest student-athletes in Clemson history, regardless of sport.

Jeff Davis

Even though Clemson's football heritage is 100-years-old, it does not take long to determine the most significant accomplishment in the program's history—the 1981 National Championship. And, along the same lines, it does not take long to single out the most significant team leader of that great accomplishment—Jeff Davis.

When examining Davis's contributions to Clemson athletics in terms of leadership, citizenship and athletic records and awards, it is no surprise that he became the fourth member of the Clemson Ring of Honor prior to the opener of the 1995 season.

The native of Greensboro, NC registered a then Clemson record 175 tackles in leading a 1981 defense that set a school record for turnovers forced (41) in a season. He still holds the Clemson career record for caused fumbles (10) and recovered fumbles (8), and the single game record for tackles (24) against North Carolina in 1980.

He played 40 games for Clemson between 1978-81 and had 469 career tackles, 16 passes broken up, 18 tackles for loss, four sacks and four interceptions. He started all 35 games for the Tigers between 1979-81. He was a model of consistency, having registered at least double figures in tackles in 22 of his last 23 games. Overall, he had 30 double figure tackle games in his 40-game career and led the Clemson team in tackles 25 times.

"It is hard to express my feelings on being inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor," said Davis. "This honor should be spread among my coaches and teammates and all of Clemson who had an impact on my life during my career. No one receives an honor like this without help. I want to thank the good Lord for giving me the ability and the opportunity to come to Clemson."

For his accomplishments in 1981, Davis was named the MVP of the ACC, just the third defensive player in league history to win the award. He concluded the season in grand style with a 14-tackle performance in the 22-15 Orange Bowl win over Nebraska that clinched the National Championship for the Tigers, Clemson's first national championship in any sport. Davis was named the Defensive MVP of the contest.

At the conclusion of the season, Davis was named a first-team All-American by United Press, the Football Coaches Association, the Football Writers Association, the Walter Camp Foundation and the **Football News**. He was named the Lineman-of-the-Year by the Atlanta Touchdown Club.

"We had purpose. We took everything one game at a time and did not get caught up in the chase for the National Championship. When we started the season, the championship was not a (realistic) goal. We were just coming off a 6-5 season in 1980 in which we all thought we could have done much better."

After clinching the ACC title with a win over

Maryland and the state championship with a convincing victory at South Carolina, Davis and his Clemson teammates prepared to meet fourth-ranked Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl, a game that would determine the National Championship.

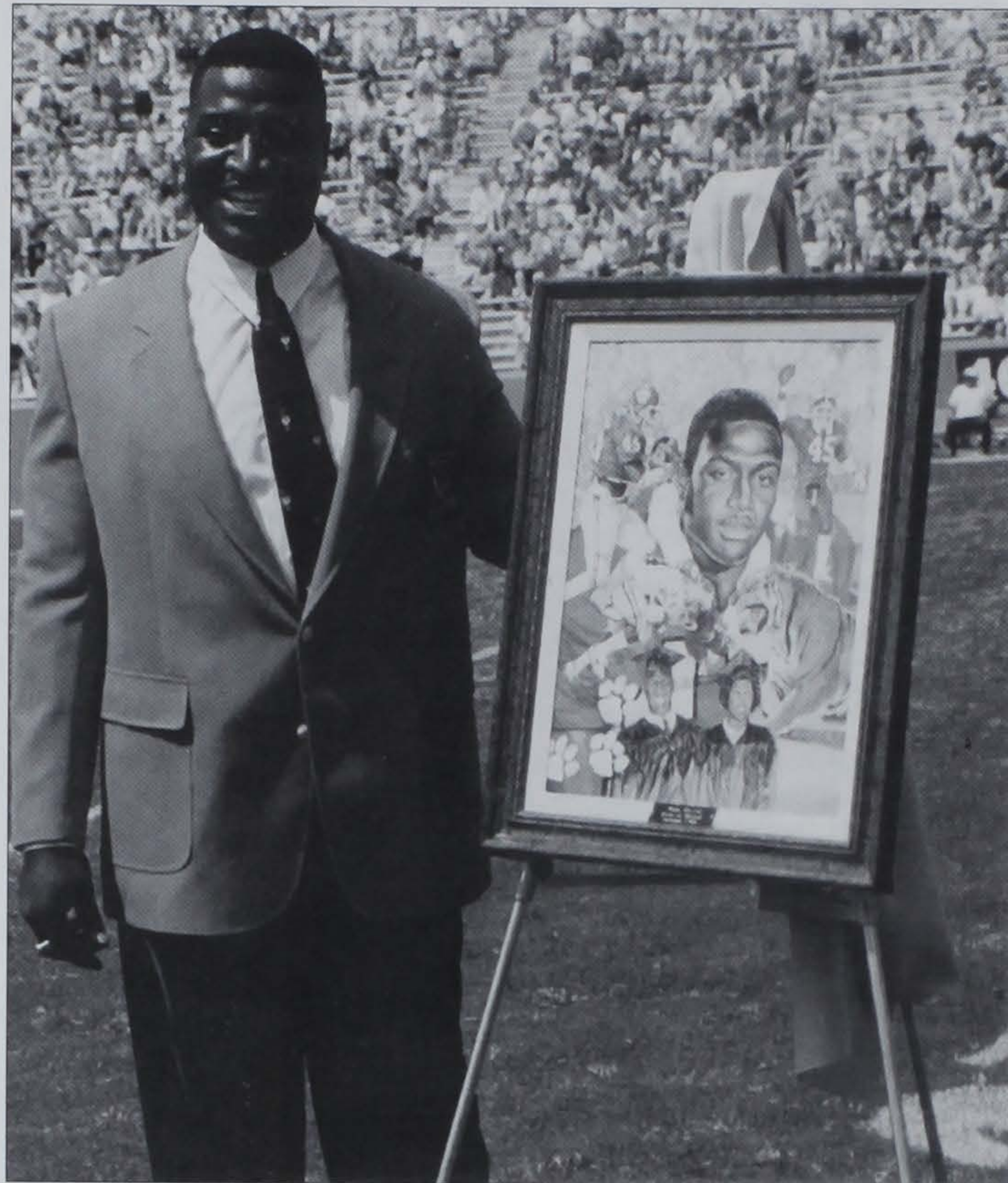
"We just knew we were going to win that night," reflects Davis, who was nicknamed The Judge by then assistant sports information director Kim Kelly. "I think the first possession of the game was the key because they fumbled and William Devane recovered. That led to a score and that was something we had been doing all year, forcing turnovers and taking over the game. That just told us that this game was not going to be any different than any of the others."

Perry Tuttle, Davis's roommate for four years and also an All-American on Clemson's 1981 National Championship team, recalls that season and Davis's passion for the game. "When we were in the room at night he would talk about the defense and what it was going to do until I fell asleep," said Tuttle. "As the season went on we just started dreaming about what could happen with this team and as we went along everything started to come true."

Davis was a fifth-round draft choice of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1982, but proved the NFL scouts wrong by posting impressive numbers in a six-year NFL career. The inside linebacker played in 83 games, 72 as a starter between 1982-87. He led Tampa Bay in tackles three of the six years, including a career high 165 stops in 1984, and served as the team captain for four seasons. He still ranks third in Bucs history in career tackles with 662 and is fourth in caused fumbles with 11.

Davis has been just as successful in life after football. In addition to his employment as the used car manager of Reeves Import Motor Cars in Tampa, FL, he is also in his fourth year as pastor of Covenant Worship Church in Tampa. He and his wife Joni graduated from Clemson on the same day in 1984 and they are the parents of four daughters and twin boys, who were born in June of 1995.

"One of my main goals in life is to touch the lives of other people and touch them in a positive way. Any time you receive an award

like this it means you've been surrounded by great people. I want to thank all the people at Clemson, because no one receives an honor like this without help. I am proud to say I am a Clemson graduate and that I represented the University. Hopefully I have had as positive an impact on them as they have had on me."

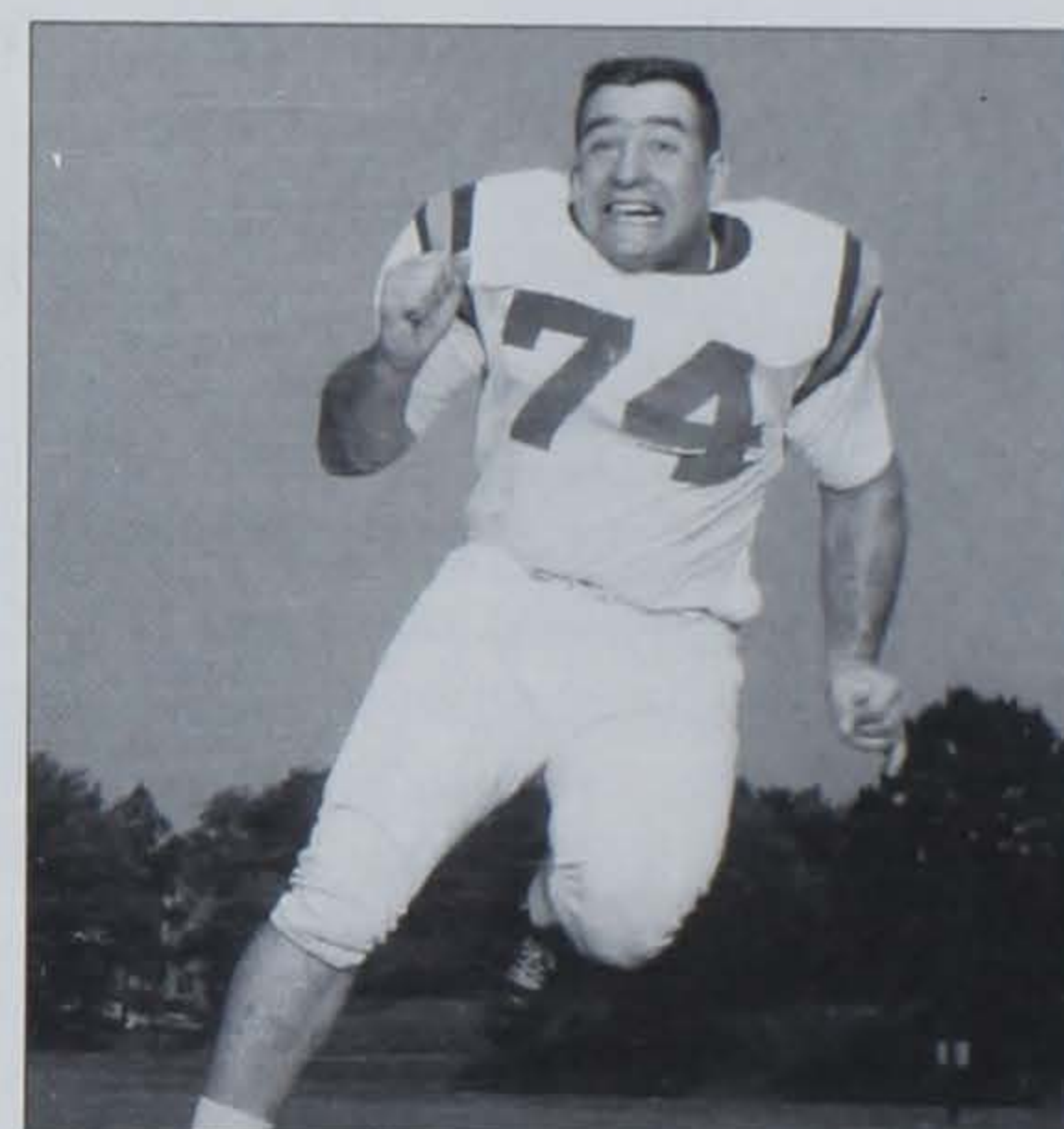

We decided to select a one-platoon and a two-platoon team because we wanted to have a representation dating back many years. The team has 21 All-Americans. Everyone on this team made a significant contribution to the heritage of Clemson football."

Centennial Team ballots were first distributed to fans at the 1995 Clemson-North Carolina game. They were also available through the **Orange & White** and at Coca Cola displays at area BiLo food stores.

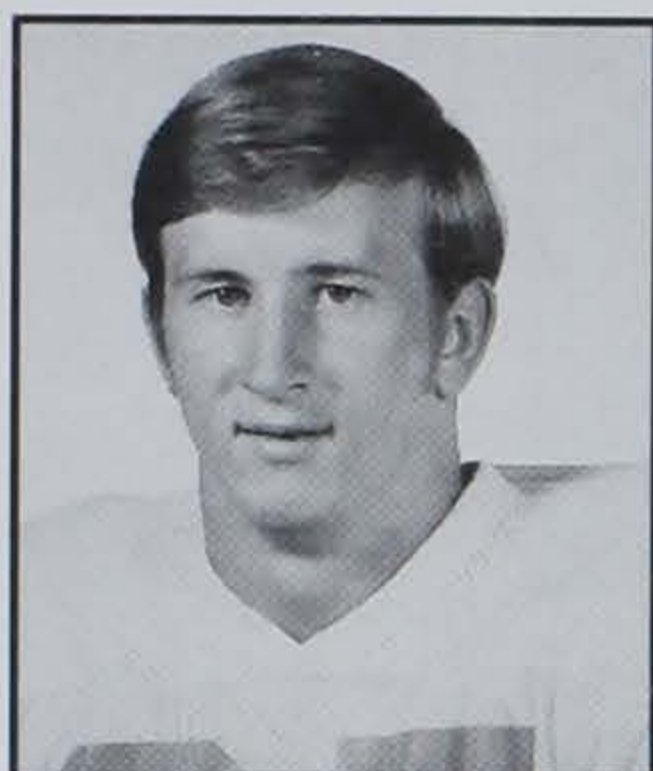

Former Head Coaches



Walter Riggs

WALTER RIGGS, 1896, 1899

Walter Riggs could easily be called the father of Clemson Football. He coached the football program at Clemson, not only because he had football experience, but he was also one of only two people on the Clemson campus to have ever seen a football game when the sport started in 1896. (The other person was Frank Thompkins who played in the backfield on Clemson's first team in 1896).

On September 30, 1896, a small crowd gathered in one of the barrack's rooms and the group discussed the feasibility of organizing a football association. A committee of three was appointed to consult Professor Riggs as to management of a football team and to ask his aid as coach.

When the Tigers traveled to Furman for their first game on October 31, 1896, it was the first time that many of the players had ever seen a full-sized regulation football field.

Riggs stepped down as football coach after the first season because the players wanted him to devote all of his time to being a professor in the engineering department.

Clemson athletics and Riggs, however, could not be split. Although not given the title, Riggs also was the equivalent of an athletic director, managing money and making contracts with other teams.

Riggs could easily be called a loyal man, as he answered the need of the Clemson football team again in 1899. The Clemson Athletic Association was low on money and could not afford to hire a coach. So Riggs once again answered the call of the school and became the coach of the 1899 team for free.

Riggs originally came to Clemson from Auburn. He graduated with top honors in 1892 with a B.S. degree in electrical and mechanical engineering. At Auburn, he was captain and catcher of the baseball team as well as the manager and left end of the football team. He also served as class president and was the director of the Glee Club.

Upon his graduation at Auburn, he was assistant to the president of the college until 1896, then he made his trek to Clemson.

Riggs later became president of Clemson

on March 7, 1911 and in 1915, a new football stadium with other athletic facilities was named in his honor as Riggs Field. It is currently the home of the Tiger soccer team. In two years of coaching, Riggs guided the Tigers to a career record of 6-3.

W. M. WILLIAMS, 1897

Clemson's second coach, W.M. Williams, was a native of West Point, GA. He played at Auburn on the teams of '94, '95, and '96, under the coaching of John Heisman. He was considered the best blocking halfback in the south.

Williams led Clemson to the state championship and to a 2-2 season. During his time as coach, Clemson played two games in a matter of three days. Clemson was victorious over the Charlotte Y on October 23, but lost to North Carolina 28-0, on October 25.

JOHN PENTON, 1898

The Tigers' third coach, J.A. Penton of Alabama, was captain and starting guard on the University of Virginia teams of '93, '94, and '95. Penton also played fullback at Auburn in '97 under John Heisman's coaching. Under Penton, Clemson won 55-0 over Bingham in its first home game, as W.C. Forsythe kicked every point after touchdown (11). In his only season at Clemson, Penton guided Clemson to a 3-1 record and the state championship.

JOHN HEISMAN, 1900-1903

Probably one of the most famous football coaches in America, John Heisman, coached at Clemson from 1900 to 1903. Heisman turned Clemson from virtually an unknown college to a southern powerhouse at the turn of the century.

Heisman attended Brown University, taking the two-year law course offered at that time, and was a center on the football team. In the fall of 1889, he transferred to the University of Pennsylvania. He lettered in football at both schools and graduated from Pennsylvania in 1893.

In the spring of 1894, Walter Riggs was a graduate manager for the football team at Auburn. It fell on his shoulders to find a coach for the season of 1895. Riggs wrote to Carl Williams, the Pennsylvania captain of 1894, asking him to suggest a suitable coach. He replied recommending J.W. Heisman, an ex-Penn player, and his coach at Oberlin.

After several weeks, Riggs finally found Heisman in Texas, where he was engaged in raising tomatoes. Having sunk about all of his capital into the tomato venture, he was glad to go back to his old love and he readily went to coach at Auburn for \$500.00 a year.

His coaching career began at Oberlin in 1892 and lasted 36 years. It included positions at Akron, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson, and Rice University. He had an overall career record of

185 wins, 70 losses, and 17 ties.

John Heisman invented the hidden ball trick, the handoff, the double lateral, and the "flea flicker." He pioneered the forward pass, arguing that it would scatter the mob. Coach Heisman also originated the center snap and the word hike (previously the center used to roll the ball on the ground to the quarterback).

Heisman guided Clemson to its first "bowl game" in 1903, when Clemson and Cumberland met on November 26, for the championship of the South. Cumberland, who had earlier defeated Auburn, Alabama, and Vanderbilt, was considered to be champion of the southern states of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, and Kentucky. The game was played on a neutral site, Montgomery, Al. Cumberland and Clemson fought to an 11-11 tie. After the news got back to Clemson that the game ended in a tie, the students and the local townspeople built a bonfire and paraded around the campus.

Overall, Heisman took Clemson to a 19-3-2 record in his four seasons. His .833 winning percentage is still the best in Clemson history. He was also the Clemson baseball coach in 1901-1904.

SHACK SHEALY, 1904

Shack Shealy holds the distinction of being the only Clemson player to have coached his alma mater. Shealy lettered at Clemson in 1896, 97, 98, and 99 and later played two years at Iowa State. Shealy was a four-year starter playing right guard, end, and in his senior year, he played in the backfield. Shealy only coached Clemson one year in 1904, and guided the Tigers to a 3-3-1 record overall, which included wins over Alabama, Georgia, and Tennessee.

Former Head Coaches

ED COCHEMS, 1905

Ed Cochems lettered at the University of Wisconsin in 1899, 1900, and 1901. Cochems was described as a great halfback or end on the strong Wisconsin teams at the turn of the century, including the undefeated team of 1901. During his playing career, he had a 100-yard kickoff return in a 35-0 win over Chicago in 1901, and had four touchdowns in a game against Notre Dame in 1900. After his playing days, he immediately went into coaching. He was the head coach of North Dakota in 1902 and 1903 and served briefly as an assistant with former teammate, Art Curtis at Wisconsin in 1904.

Cochems led Clemson to a 3-2-1 record overall, including wins over Georgia and Auburn. After his Clemson career, he was head coach and athletic director at St. Louis University in 1906. After the forward pass was legalized in 1906, Cochems did something with the pass at once in his first year at St. Louis, while other coaches stuck with the running game. He taught his players not to throw the ball end-over-end, but instead like a projectile - a spiral. He called this new weapon a projectile pass.

In 1906, St. Louis went undefeated rolling up 407 points while allowing its opponents only 11.

Historians credit Cochems as being the first coach to use and perfect the first legal pass in a game. The first studied refinements in throwing the ball, which led to the spiral, occurred in 1906 under Cochems. Brad Robinson of St. Louis University threw the first forward pass to Jack Schneider in a game played Sept. 5, 1906 in Waukensha against Carroll College.

BOB WILLIAMS, 1906, 1909, 1913-1915

Bob Williams is probably the only coach in the country to have coached football at two schools that are involved in rivalry. Williams coached football at both Clemson and South Carolina. Before coming to Clemson, he coached at Davidson in 1905. He coached at South Carolina for two years and guided the Gamecocks to a 6-1 record in 1902 and an 8-2 slate in 1903.

During his South Carolina career, he admin-

istered the most unexpected defeat of Clemson, as he beat a heavily favored John Heisman team, 12-6 in 1902.

Williams served the Tigers as head coach a total of three terms 1906, 1909, and 1913-15. Between the years of 1915 and 1926, Williams practiced law in Roanoke, VA, and was the city's mayor.

One of the highlights of his Clemson career included leading the 1906 Tigers to an undefeated season (4-0-3), which included wins over Georgia, Auburn, Tennessee, and a Heisman-coached Georgia Tech team.

FRANK SHAUGHNESSY, 1907

Frank Shaughnessy was known for his ability as an administrator in sports as he served many positions, from a professional hockey coach to the commissioner of the International Baseball (Triple A) League.

A graduate in law at Notre Dame, he was captain of the baseball and football teams his junior and senior seasons. After his graduation in 1905, he coached baseball at Notre Dame. The summer before coming to Clemson he played for Ottawa of the Eastern League. That summer, he played left field and had a .352 batting average. He also played with Washington and the Philadelphia A's.

At Clemson he coached the baseball teams in 1907 and 1908, and was head football mentor in 1907, posting a 4-4 record.

During his lifetime, Shaughnessy made his name in baseball, but he took part in many other sports. Besides being a sports legend at Notre Dame, he managed the Ottawa Senators of a professional hockey league and coached football teams at Clemson, Washington and Lee and McGill University. He retired as the president of the International Baseball league.

During his football playing days, in a game against Kansas, Shaughnessy raced 107 yards for the only Irish touchdown as Kansas won, 24-5. Football fields were 110 yards back then and touchdowns were five points. This is still a Notre Dame record.

JOHN STONE, 1908

John Stone is one of three coaches to have graduated from Vanderbilt and later become a Clemson head football coach. At Vanderbilt, he was a member of the All-Southern Football team for four seasons. He was a big man for his time, standing 6'2". Clemson was 1-6 in 1908, but the Tigers lost many of their star players and substitutes from 1907 due to a college prank that saw 306 students expelled from school.

FRANK DOBSON, 1910-12

Frank Dobson was a professional baseball player before coming to Clemson as he was the property of the Pittsburgh Nationals. Walter Riggs, President of the Clemson Athletic Association, thought it was unfair to keep shuffling coaches year after year. Riggs offered Dobson a three-year contract, which was the first contract offered and signed by a Clemson coach.

At Clemson, he coached football, basketball and baseball. He was Clemson's first basketball coach, leading Clemson to its only undefeated season in history in the inaugural season 1911-12, (4-0). In 1912-13, Clemson finished the basketball season with a 9-5 record. He was head baseball coach in 1911-1913.

WAYNE HART, 1916

Wayne Hart coached Clemson in 1916 and led Clemson to a 3-6 finish. Under Hart, the Tigers defeated state rivals Furman and South Carolina.

Hart played three years at tackle for Georgetown. He also played one year at George Washington. He was a member of the All-South Atlantic team for four years. He was also an assistant coach at Georgetown. In 1913, he coached the Washington Vigilants, a professional football team, and did not lose a game. The last two seasons before arriving at Clemson, he coached various sports at Technical High School in Washington, D. C.

Former Head Coaches

EDWARD DONAHUE, 1917-20

Edward Donahue had to be one of the most organized men in the country. During the 1918-19 school year, Donahue was head coach of four Clemson sports: football, basketball, baseball, and track. During his four-year career at Clemson, he was basketball and baseball coach for two seasons, and head track coach for one season.

Donahue was an outstanding athlete at Washington and Lee as he played in the backfield on the football team and played catcher on the baseball team. Upon graduation, Donahue was an assistant coach in football and was the head coach in baseball and basketball.

E. J. STEWART, 1921-22

E. J. Stewart was head football coach for two years at Clemson, 1921-22. However, he coached more than one sport during his stay at Tigertown. In the spring of 1921, Stewart coached the baseball and track teams while conducting spring football practice. In the fall, Stewart's football team went 1-6-2, but he improved to a 5-4 slate in 1922. He went on to coach the track teams in 1922 and 1923.

Stewart played football, baseball, basketball and ran track at Western Reserve University in Ohio. Upon his graduation, he played, organized and served as head coach in Ohio of the Massillon, Ohio Professional football team.

He also coached at Nebraska and the University of Texas. At Nebraska, he led the Cornhuskers to a combined record of 11-4 in 1916-1917. They also won the Missouri Valley Conference title both seasons. After leaving the University of Nebraska, he entered the automobile business as President and Treasurer of the Stewart Motor Co. Because of the economic conditions at the time, he decided to go back into coaching.

BUD SAUNDERS, 1923-26

Bud Saunders graduated from Missouri in 1911, with a bachelors degree in Law. At Missouri, he played football and basketball. He wanted to play two other sports, but a conference rule at the time forbid an athlete from participating in more than two sports.

Saunders was football coach at Knox College before coming to Clemson. In football, Saunders coached for four seasons, 1923-1926. He also coached the basketball teams in

1924 and 1925. His best season in football came in 1923, as he led the Tigers to a 5-2-1 slate.

JOSH CODY, 1927-1930

Josh Cody, fondly known as "big man," will always be a favorite to Clemson fans. Cody, a big man in stature at 6-2, 220 pounds, led Clemson to victories over South Carolina for four straight years. He is the only coach in Clemson history who has been around more than two years who never lost a football game to South Carolina. He also defeated Furman three straight years. Cody had a 13-0-1 record in home games and had a 72 percent winning mark overall, fourth best in Clemson history.

After a 5-3-1 start in 1927, Cody guided Clemson to two 8-3 seasons in 1928 and 1929. On May 6, 1929, to show appreciation to Cody, he was presented with a new buick by the alumni, student body and faculty. This presentation took place in front of Tillman Hall.

In his final season, 1930, the Tigers finished with an 8-2 record. Cody also coached basketball at Clemson for five years and guided Clemson to a 16-9 slate in 1930. During the 1928-30 seasons, he guided Clemson to a 22-4 mark at home.

JESS NEELY, 1931-39

Clemson played in its first bowl game under Jess Neely in the 1940 Cotton Bowl. The Tigers, unknown at the time, became a household word after beating heavily-favored Boston College 6-3 in the Cotton Bowl Classic. Neely came to Clemson in 1931 and his recruitment of Banks McFadden brought Clemson to another level of competition. In 1938, Neely had Clemson at second place in the Southern Conference with a 7-1-1 record. In 1939, Banks McFadden became Clemson's first All-American, and the team concluded the season with a trip to Dallas for the Cotton Bowl. Neely left Clemson that spring and moved on to Rice, where he took that school to new heights. Neely is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame.

FRANK HOWARD, 1940-69

Frank Howard succeeded Jess Neely in 1940 when Neely moved on to Rice. Howard got the job when he seconded his own nomination during a meeting of the president and athletic council. Howard signed a one-year

contract, then lost the document, and never had another in his 30 years as head coach.

Howard graduated from Alabama in 1931 where he was a football star lineman. He played in the 1930 Rose Bowl, then started his coaching career under Neely at Clemson in 1931, and was a part of a rebirth of Clemson football in the late 1930s. He was an assistant coach on Clemson's 1939 team that posted a 9-1 mark and beat Boston College 6-3 in the Tigers' first bowl game.

In 1940, he began his head coaching career with a bang as he won the Southern Conference championship, the first of eight conference titles Howard won in his coaching career.

Howard had his most successful season in 1948 when he took Clemson to an 11-0 record, the Tigers' first perfect season since 1900. The campaign included a Southern Conference championship, a Gator Bowl win over Missouri, and a number-11 final ranking. He nearly duplicated the feat in 1950 when he guided Clemson to a number-10 AP final ranking, a 9-0-1 finish and a 15-14 win over Miami (FL) in the Orange Bowl.

When he retired in 1969, Howard was the fifth winningest coach in the nation with 165 victories. He had 96 wins as an ACC coach, now third in conference history, and he captured six (five outright and one co-championship) ACC titles, a record Bobby Bowden tied in 1997. His teams appeared in six bowl games, 63 of his players were drafted by the NFL and 37 played in the league.

Howard, a native of Barlow Bend, AL, had six Top 20 seasons, won eight conference titles (two Southern and six ACC), won an even 100 conference games and was a two-time ACC Coach-of-the-Year. He coached 25 academic All-ACC selections and five Academic All-Americans. Eleven of his players were chosen on-the-field All-Americans. Howard was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1989.

HOOTIE INGRAM, 1970-1972

Hootie Ingram will be best remembered as the coach who made the Tiger Paw famous. Before his first year as head coach in the summer of 1970, Clemson introduced the Tiger Paw as the official logo of Clemson University's Athletic teams.

Ingram graduated from the University of Alabama in 1955. He also received his master's



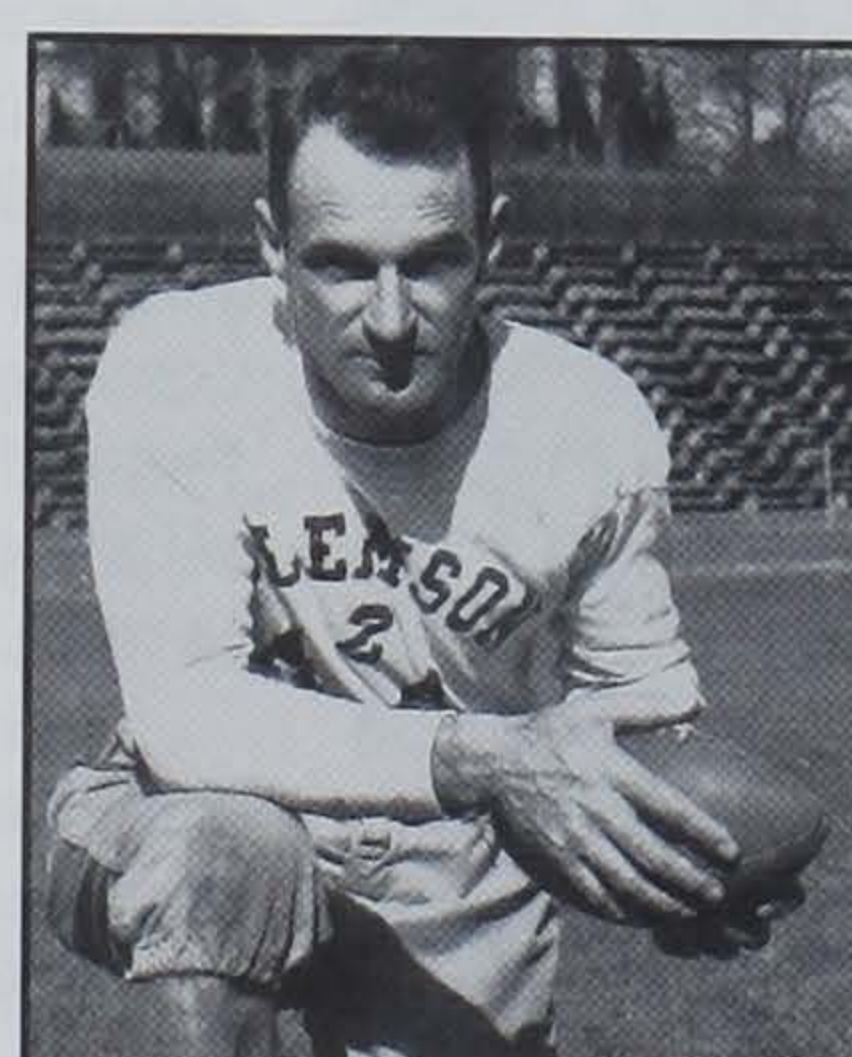

in school administration from Alabama and later became Crimson Tide athletic director.

The native of Tuscaloosa, AL was an All-Southeastern Conference defensive back for the Crimson Tide his senior year.

Ingram had his best year at Clemson during the 1971 campaign with a 5-6 overall record. He also finished second in the ACC with a 4-2 league mark in 1971.

RED PARKER, 1973-76

Red Parker coached at Clemson for four years. His 1974 team lived up to the theme "Excitement Galore, Clemson Football '74." It finished the season with a 7-4 record (6-0 at home), with wins over Georgia, Georgia Tech and South Carolina.

Before arriving at Clemson, Red Parker spent seven years at The Citadel from 1966 through 1972. During this time, he guided the Bulldogs to a fine 8-3 finish in 1971.

Parker earned a BA degree in Physical Education from Arkansas A&M in 1953. Prior to his graduation, he earned three letters each in football, basketball and track, as a running back-defensive back, second baseman-short-stop, and sprinter.

CHARLEY PELL, 1977-78

Charley Pell authored college football's Cinderella story in 1977.

The Albertville, AL product took a Clemson team that was 3-6-2 in 1976, and led the '77 Tigers to a sparkling 8-2-1 regular season mark and a berth in the Gator Bowl. It was Clemson's first final Top 20 season since 1959. He coached Clemson to a 10-1 regular season in 1978 before he left to become head coach at Florida. Clemson's 1978 team beat Ohio State in the Gator Bowl and finished sixth in the final AP poll in only his second year as head coach of Clemson.

He was a near unanimous choice as ACC Coach-of-the-Year in 1977 and 1978, the first coach, regardless of sport, to win ACC Coach-of-the-Year honors in each of his first two years. A two-way starter and three-year letterwinner at Alabama, Pell was a member of the Crimson Tide's 1961 National Championship team.

He came to Clemson in 1976 and served as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator that year.

DANNY FORD, 1979-89

Danny Ford had an auspicious beginning to his head coaching career. He gained a 17-15 win over Ohio State in the 1978 Gator Bowl in a game shown on national television. The 30-year-old coach, youngest in Division I at the time, also defeated a college football legend in a contest that truly put Clemson football on the map as he beat Woody Hayes in the latter's last game. Ford had taken over the coaching reigns on December 10, 1978 when Charley Pell resigned to become head coach at Florida.

Ford kept things going in 1979 with wins over Georgia and Notre Dame and another trip to a bowl, this time the Peach Bowl. In 1981, he helped Clemson reach the summit of college football by winning the National Championship. His Tigers downed three top 10 teams during the course of the 12-0 season that concluded with a 22-15 victory over Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. Ford was named National Coach-of-the-Year.

The victories continued in 1982 and 1983 as Clemson had consecutive 9-1-1 seasons. The Tigers finished in the top 12 in both seasons, and thus had a 30-2-2 record over a three-year period, best in the nation.

Clemson won three straight ACC titles under his guidance between 1986 and 1988. In 1989, Clemson registered a 10-2 season and top 12 national ranking, the fourth straight season Clemson finished in the final AP top 20. He closed his career with a 27-7 win over West Virginia in the Gator Bowl, his sixth bowl win in eight tries and his fourth in succession.

Ford was the third winningest active coach in the nation on a percentage basis at the end of the 1989 season. He finished with a 96-29-4 career ledger at Clemson and remains one of only two coaches in ACC history with over a 75 percent winning mark (min. four years). He finished with a 76 percent winning percentage and five ACC titles, second only to Frank Howard's six crowns.

The 1969 Alabama graduate is still the youngest coach to win the national title, as he was just 33-years-old when the Tigers shocked the college football world in 1981. He coached 71 first-team All ACC selections and 26 All-Americans. Forty-two of his former Tigers were drafted by the NFL, and he earned 18 wins over Associated Press top 20 teams during his career, more than any other ACC coach. Additionally, nine of his former players won Super Bowl Championship rings. At one stretch his

teams were ranked in the AP top 20 for 41 consecutive polls, a Clemson record.

Ford was an All-SEC selection and was also an All-SEC Academic choice at Alabama. He attended Alabama initially on a basketball/football scholarship but played only football after his freshman year. He played in three bowl games for Alabama. He served as head coach at Arkansas from 1994-97.

KEN HATFIELD, 1990-93

Ken Hatfield led the Tigers to a 32-13-1 record over his four year tenure, led the squad to three bowl appearances and an ACC Championship. With a victory over Illinois in the 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl, Hatfield became the first Clemson coach to win 10 games in his first year and his .833 winning percentage was the best for a first-year Clemson coach since 1900, when John Heisman was 6-0. That season included six wins over teams with winning records, more than any other team that year with the exception of National Champion Georgia Tech.

Hatfield was also just the eighth coach in the previous 13 years to take a team to a Top 10 AP final ranking in his first year with the program, as the Tigers finished the season ranked ninth in the AP poll. The Helena, AR, native would also lead the 1991 and 1993 teams to top 25-rankings. Clemson became the third school that Hatfield had coached to a Top-20 ranking, as his 1983 Air Force team ranked 15th and he led four Arkansas teams to top-20 rankings. Only six coaches in NCAA history have accomplished that feat.

Arkansas won back-to-back conference championships in 1988 and 1989 under Hatfield's guidance. He was named the Southwest Conference Coach-of-the-Decade by the **Houston Post**.

Hatfield played for three years at Arkansas (1962-64) and was a starter on the National Championship team of 1964. A defensive back, he earned his fame as the nation's top punt returner in 1963 and 1964. He still ranks as the only college football player ever to finish in the top two in the nation in punt returns three straight seasons, as he finished second nationally in 1962. He is now the head coach at Rice University.

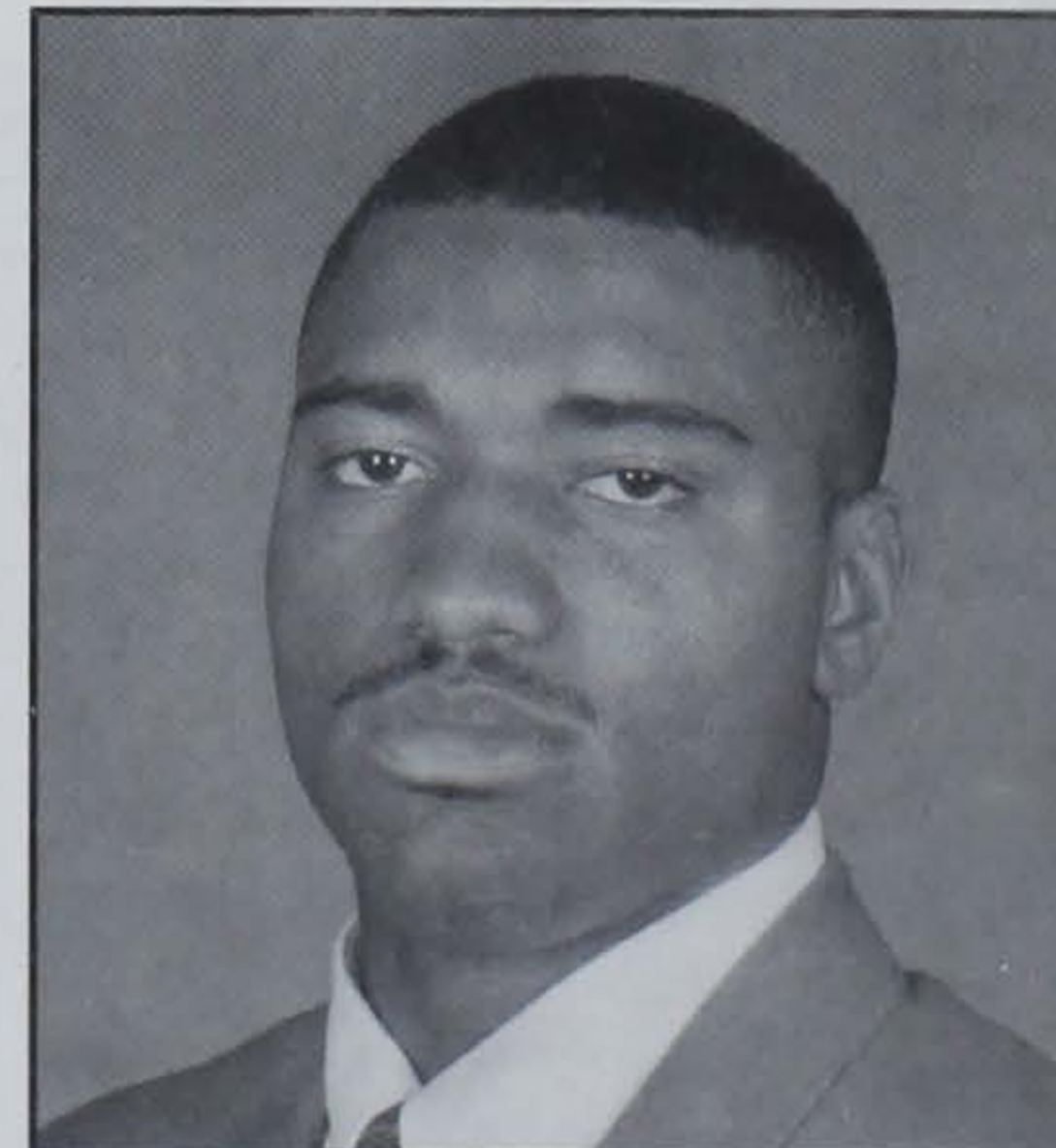

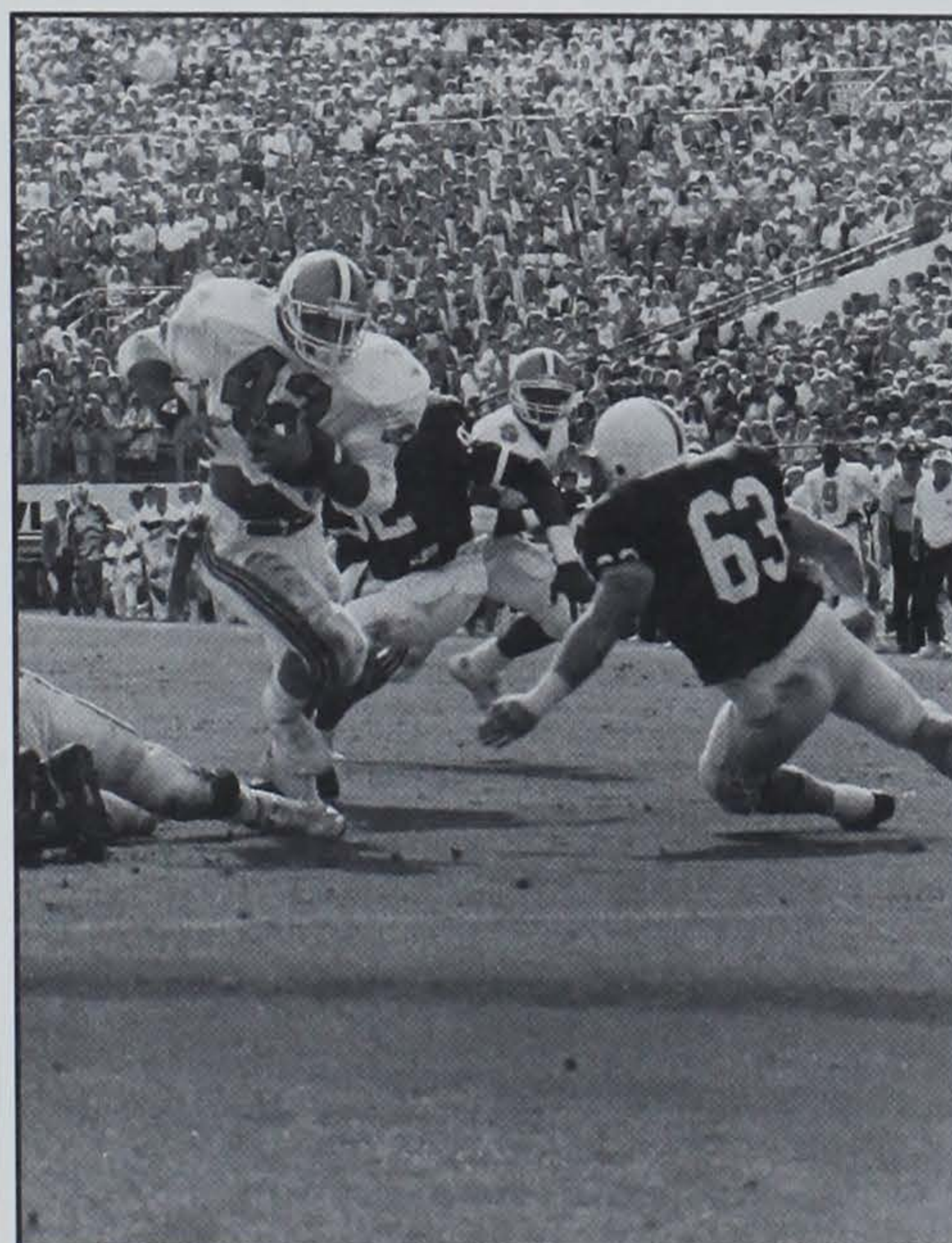

1940 Cotton Bowl

Jess Neely's last Clemson team won eight games in the regular season with just one loss to Tulane. The 8-1 Tigers were rewarded with an invitation to play Boston College in the fourth Cotton Bowl, but Clemson first had to get permission from the Southern Conference, which they immediately granted. The 1939 season not only resulted in Clemson's first bowl appearance, but also the Tigers' first first-team All-American, Banks McFadden.

On the last play of the first quarter, Bru Trexler punted to BC's Charlie O'Rourke, who fielded the punt on the Clemson 40 and returned it to the 13. Two running plays lost 10 yards, but on third down Frank Davis gained six. Alex Lukachik then kicked a 34-yard field goal to put the Eagles up, 3-0.

Clemson's scoring drive began when McFadden returned an Eagle punt to the 33. Charlie Timmons rushed for 15 yards in two plays, and two plays after that, McFadden hit Wister Jackson with a 16-yard pass to the Eagle 20. Timmons ran the final 20 yards in three carries, but Shad Bryant missed the extra point.

Later in the period, a 51-yard punt by McFadden started Boston College at its 20. The Eagles fumbled on first down and Clemson's George Fritts recovered at the 24. The Tigers could do nothing with the gift, however, as Joe Blalock fumbled after a short pass.

The game turned into a defensive struggle in the second half, although Boston College did penetrate deep into Clemson territory on two occasions. The Eagles took the opening kickoff to the Clemson 19, but a holding penalty and an incomplete pass ended the threat and BC was forced to punt.

Late in the game, the Eagles drove to the Clemson 11, but Bryant and McFadden each broke up two passes and Clemson took over on downs.

McFadden effectively bottled up the Eagles other than those drives with his punting. His 44-yard average on nine kicks, including two boots for 51 and 55 yards in the second half, prevented Boston College from getting good field position, and the Clemson defense made the 6-3 score stand.

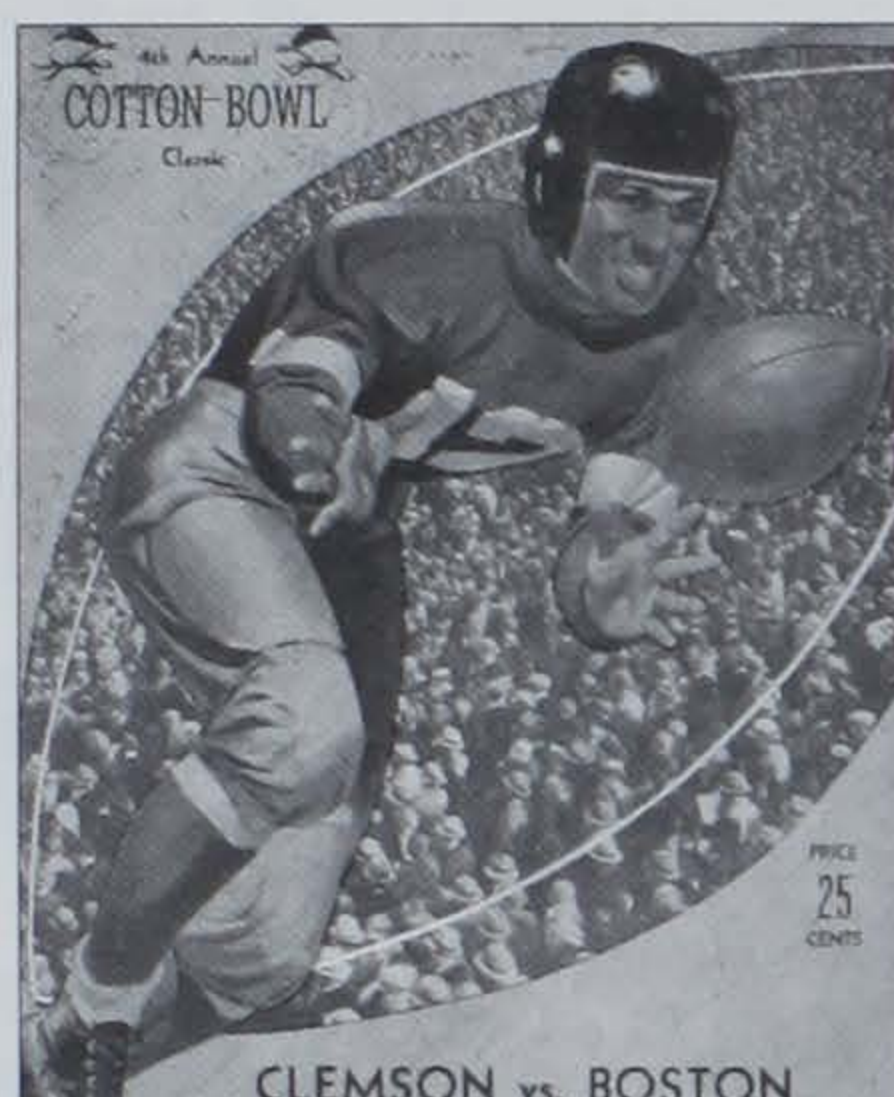

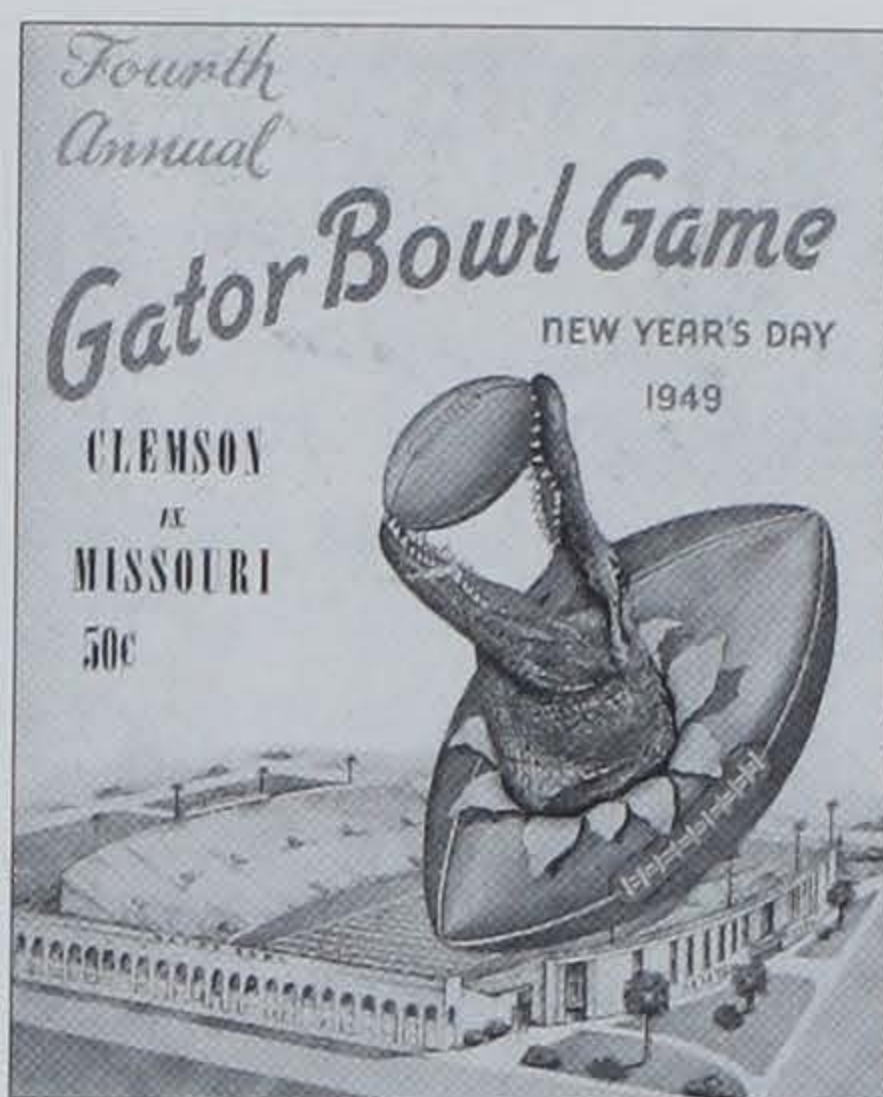
Clemson opened the 1948 season with a 53-0 shutout of Presbyterian in the Tigers' first-ever night home game and they closed the regular season with a 20-0 blanking of The Citadel in the first game played at the Bulldogs' Johnson Hagood Stadium. In between, the Tigers shut out three more opponents and beat five others on the way to a 10-0 record, a ninth-place ranking in the polls, and an invitation to play Missouri in the fourth Gator Bowl.

Clemson kicked off, but three plays later Missouri fumbled and Clemson's Bob Martin recovered at the 19. A pass interference call gave the Tigers the ball at the one, and Fred Cone scored from there. Jack Miller added the point after and Clemson led, 7-0.

Ray Mathews recovered a Missouri fumble later in the quarter to give Clemson the ball at its 35. Mathews took the next play for 26 yards and five plays later Bobby Gage passed to Martin for 19 more. Cone scored for the second time from the one, and Miller's conversion gave the Southern Conference champs a 14-0 lead.

After a kickoff, Missouri launched an 80-yard drive to score its first touchdown. Harold Entsminger capped the 13-play march with a quarterback sneak from the two. Robertson Dawson added the seventh point.

Gage was intercepted on the next Clemson drive and Wilbur Volz returned the theft to the Missouri 46. Missouri kept the ball on the ground and Entsminger carried over from the one for the score. Dawson added his second



separate plays and the Tigers scored on a flea-flicker pass from Cone to Gage to John Poulos in the end zone. Miller completed the 80-yard drive with his third PAT.

A Missouri punt rolled dead at the Clemson one, and after an incomplete pass, Gage threw a pass that hit the ground in the end zone and was ruled a safety. Clemson's lead was then cut to 21-16.

Clemson then launched an 11-play surge to the Missouri 12. With fourth-and-10, Miller kicked a 32-yard field goal that would prove to be the winning points.

Dave Ashley returned the kickoff to the Missouri 40, and seven plays later, halfback Richard Braznell passed to Kenneth Bounds for a 20-yard touchdown. Dawson added the point to bring Missouri within one point with five minutes left. (Two-point conversions were not a part of the game yet). Clemson took the kickoff and ran out the clock to preserve the win.

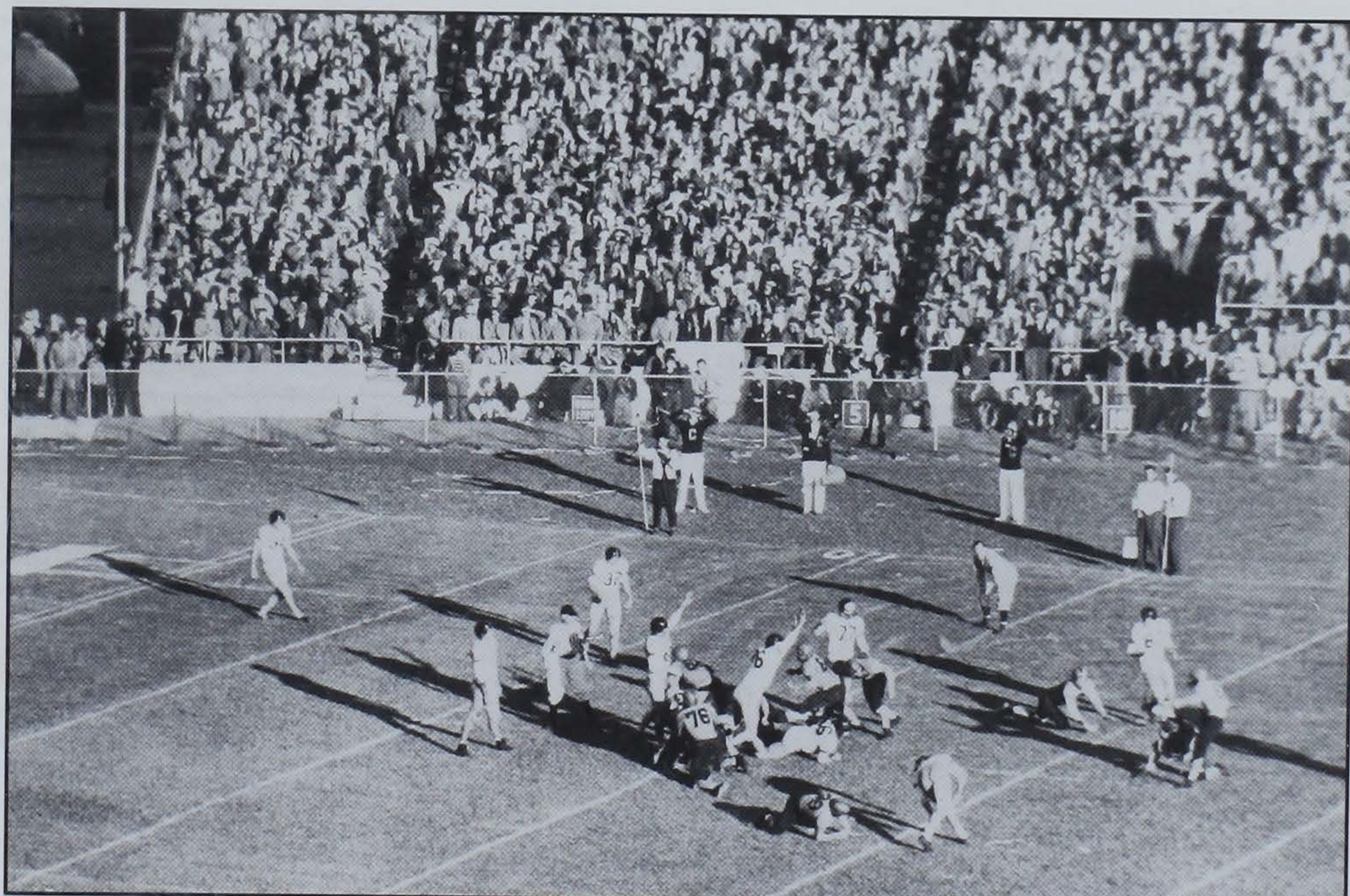

Bowl History 1951 Orange Bowl

Clemson's bid for a repeat of the 1948 perfect season ended when the Tigers had to rely on the toe of Charlie Radcliff to tie South Carolina after three season-opening shutouts. Clemson regrouped, however, with a 13-12 win at Wake Forest and then won the remaining four games by convincing margins. The Tigers' 8-0-1 mark and second-place finish in the Southern Conference earned them a bid to play Miami, who was also undefeated at 9-0-1, in the 17th Orange Bowl.

After a scoreless first quarter, Clemson got on track with a 45-yard pass from Billy Hair to Bob Hudson that put the Tigers at the Miami one. Fred Cone capped the 76-yard drive on third down with a sweep for the score and Radcliff tacked on the extra point.

Clemson mounted a six-play, 70-yard drive in the third quarter for its second touchdown. Hair threw a 31-yard pass to Ray Mathews, who, as the papers said, "made a circus catch with two men on his back," to move the Tigers to the Miami 28. Hair tossed a pass to Glenn Smith at the Miami seven and Smith scrambled in for the score. Radcliff's extra point try was blocked.

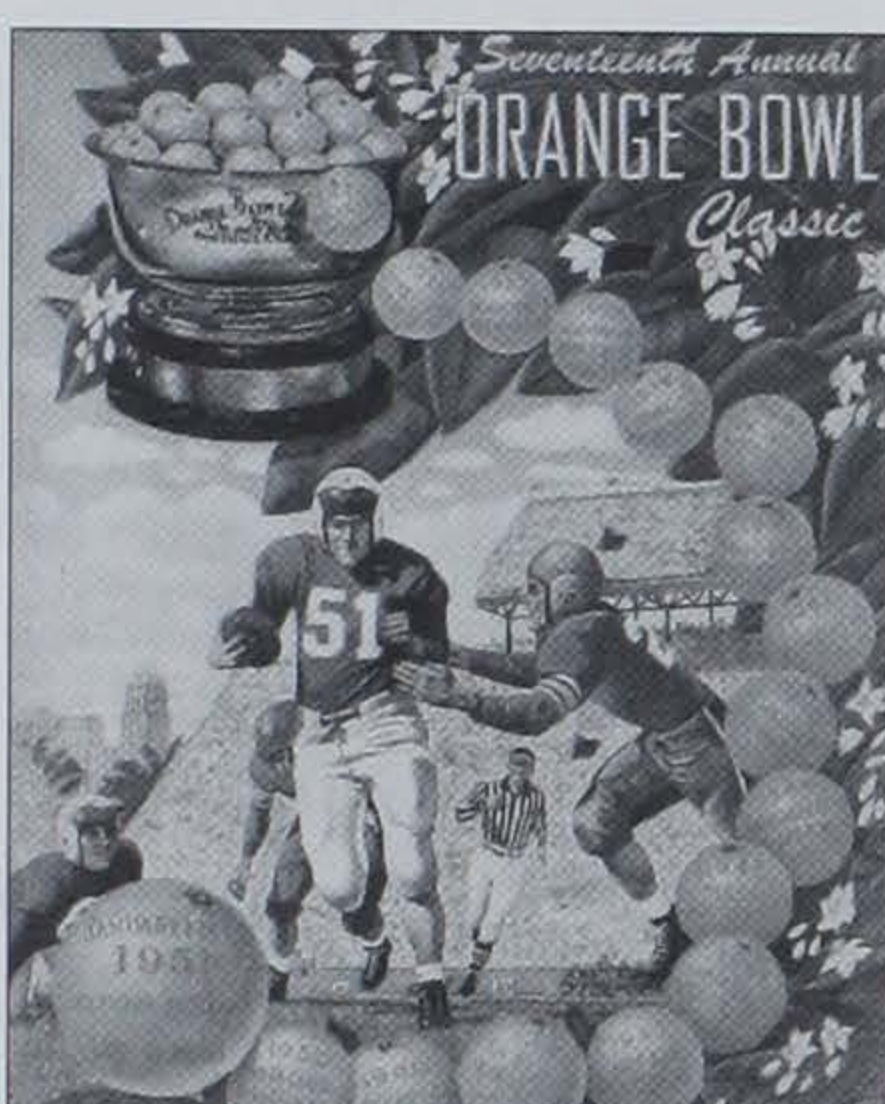
Miami caught fire two minutes later when Jack Delbello intercepted a pass in the Clemson end zone and returned it to the 40, and then a 10-yard penalty was assessed the Tigers for unnecessary roughness. On the next play, Frank Smith ran a reverse for 45 yards to move to the Clemson five. Harry Mallios took a pitch from quarterback Bob

Mallios' 80-yard punt return was called back and two clipping infractions and one unnecessary roughness penalty put Miami in a deep hole with six minutes left in the game. Frank Smith took a pitch-out from Hackett, but before Smith could get out of the end zone, Sterling Smith, a second-team defensive guard for Clemson, tripped him up for a safety, and Clemson led 15-14. Don Wade ended the last Miami threat with an interception, his second of the game, and Clemson ran out the clock for the win.

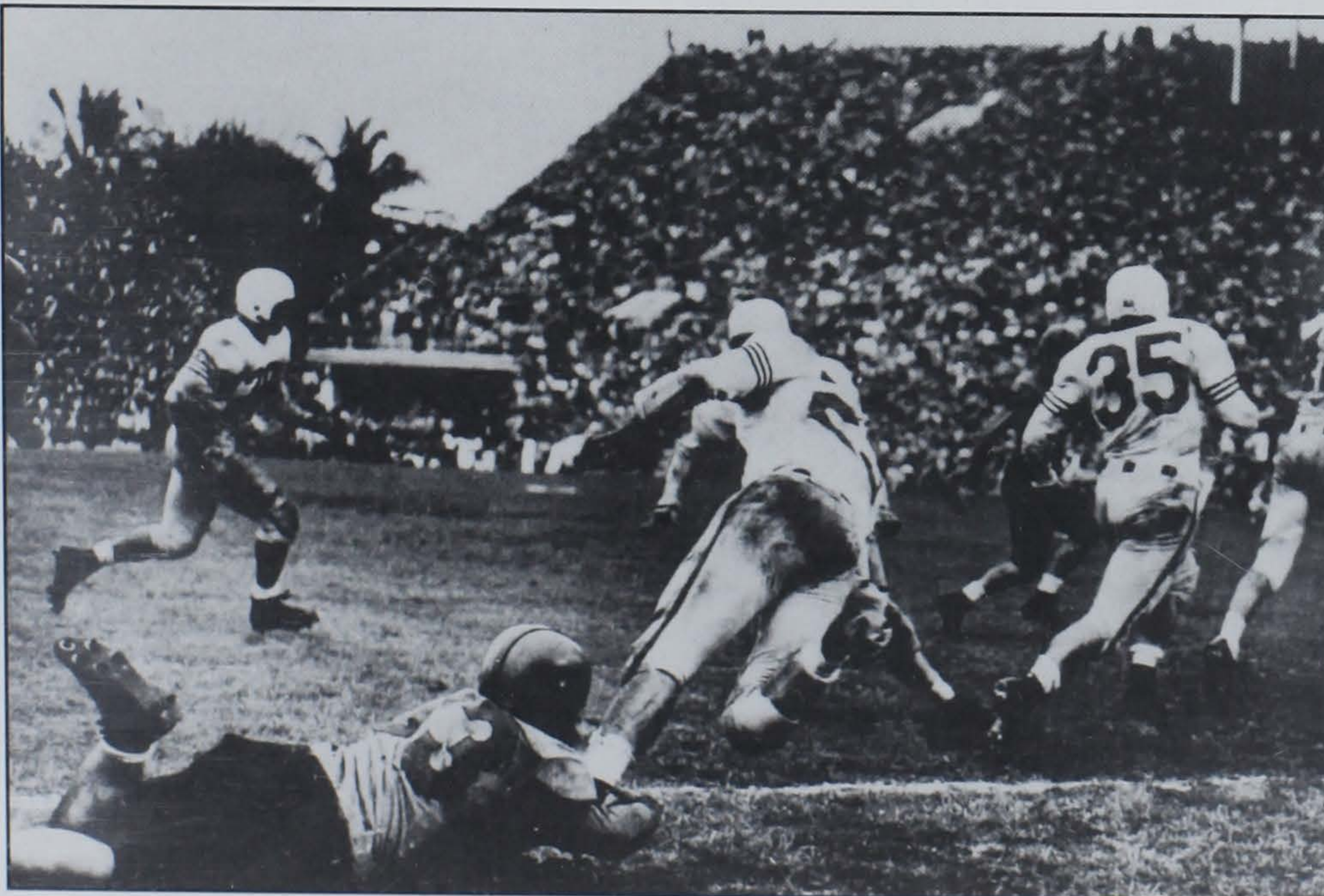

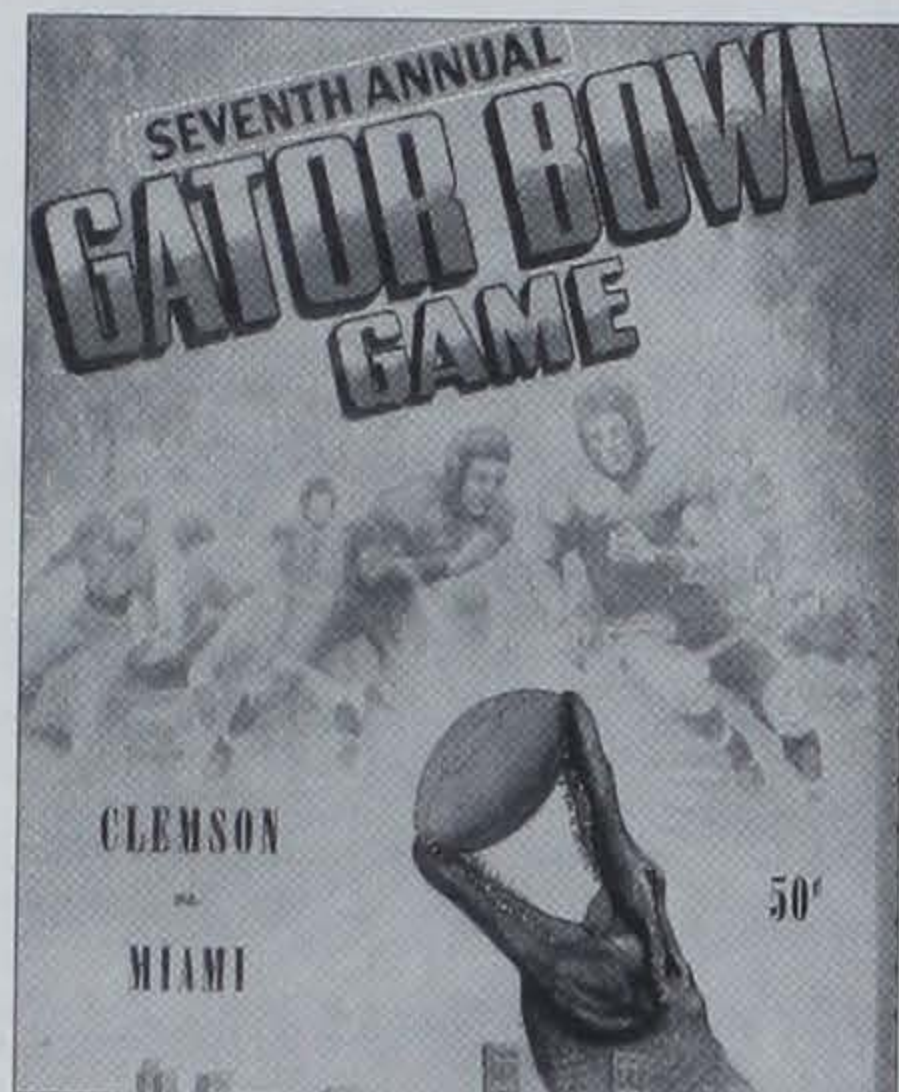

Bowl History 1952 Gator Bowl

Clemson won the first three games of the 1951 season as well as the last four. In between, however, the Tigers dropped games to Pacific and South Carolina on the road. The Gator Bowl Committee invited Clemson with its 7-2 record to play Miami (FL) in a rematch of the 1951 Orange Bowl, but the Southern Conference had decided to ban its



teams from any bowl competition that season. Clemson and Maryland accepted bowl bids anyway, and were prohibited from playing any other conference team except each other the next year.

The Tigers opened the game with a bang as Billy Hair took Elmer Tremont's kickoff and returned it 72 yards to the Miami 26, but Clemson could only make six yards in four downs and the Tigers turned the ball over.

After an exchange of punts, Miami mounted

an 82-yard drive to score the game's first touchdown. The drive was highlighted by quarterback Jack Hackett's only two passes of the game - a 15-yarder to Frank McDonald and a 40-yard throw to Ed Lutes. Two plays later, fullback Harry Mallios took the pitch and ran 11 yards for the score. Tremont added the extra point and Miami led, 7-0.

Miami defensive back Jim Dooley intercepted the first of four passes to kill the Clemson drive at the Miami 15. Clemson got the ball back after a punt, but on fourth down, defensive end Leo Martin blocked Hair's punt at the Clemson 32. Mallios converted twice on fourth down to keep the drive going, and he scored from two yards out. Tremont converted again and Miami had all the points it needed.

The Clemson defense turned stingy in the second half, as the Tigers did not allow Miami to penetrate their 35 and the Hurricanes did not gain another first down. The Clemson offense moved well, but a fumble at the Miami 18 and three Dooley interceptions inside the 20 kept Clemson off the scoreboard as Miami handed the Tigers their first bowl loss in history.

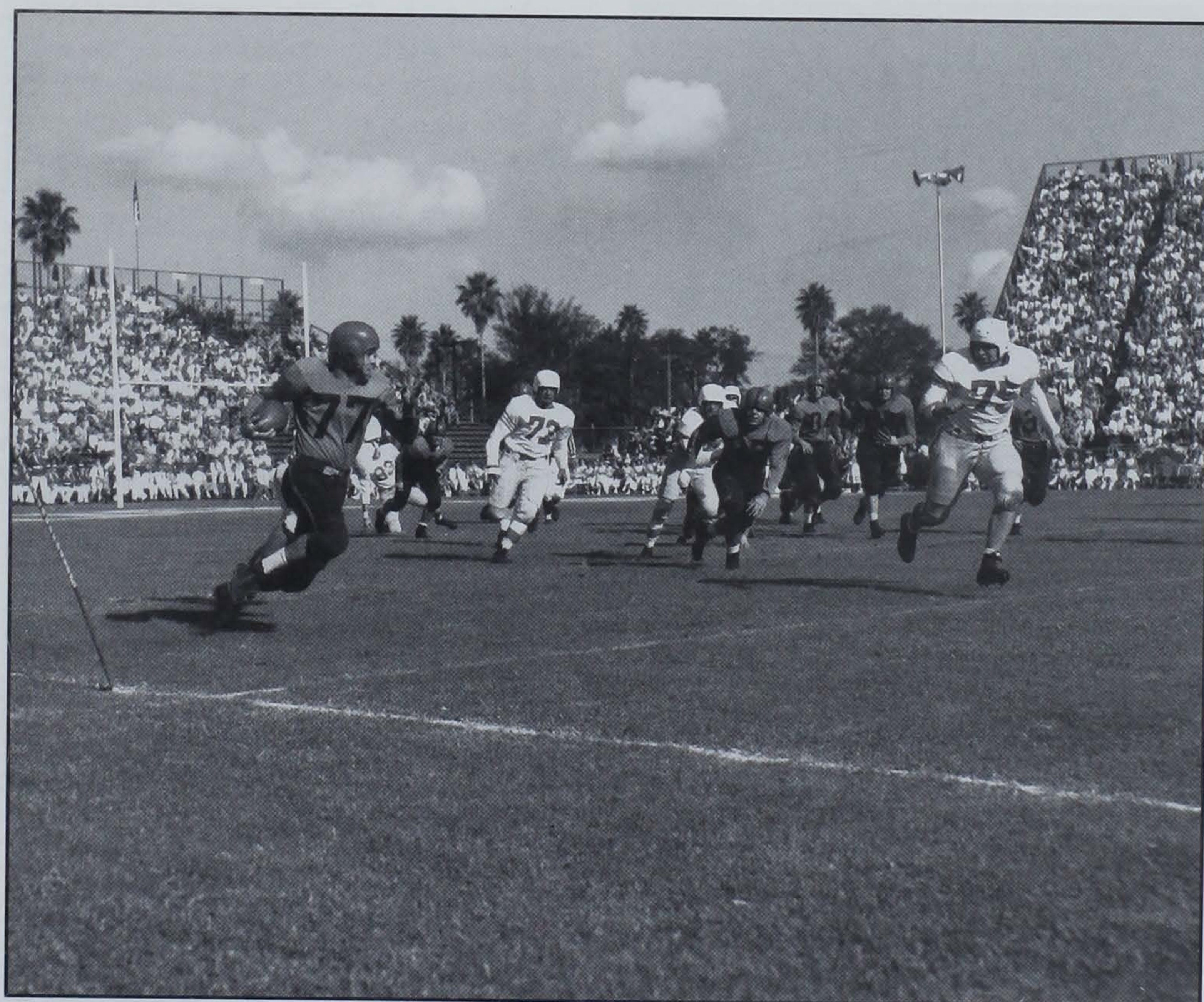

Bowl History 1957 Orange Bowl

Clemson claimed its first Atlantic Coast Conference championship in 1956 on the strength of a 4-0-1 league mark. The Tigers were 7-1-2 overall and were a surprise choice to participate in the 22nd Orange Bowl, as only three weeks before their selection, the Tigers had been shut out by Miami, 21-0, in the same stadium. Colorado, which was 7-2-1 and the Big-Seven runnerup, was chosen as Clemson's opponent.



After a scoreless first quarter, Colorado got on track with a seven-play, 75-yard drive. The Buffaloes' catalyst was a 26-yard run by Bob Stransky that moved the ball to the Clemson 23.

Four plays later, John "The Beast" Bayuk scored from the two. Ellwin Indorf added the point after.

Stransky intercepted an errant Charlie Bussey pass at the Clemson 46 and returned it to the 10 to spark Colorado's second score. Boyd Dowler, who later starred with the Packers, scored from six yards out two plays later. Howard Cook added the conversion and Colorado led 14-0.

Colorado's Frank Clarke partially blocked Horace Turbeville's punt on the next Clemson drive and the Buffaloes recovered on the Clemson 26. Cook then went wide right and scored on the next play, but he missed the extra point.

Clemson came out of the locker room and marched 69 yards in 15 plays to score on Joel Wells's three-yard run. Bussey's extra point try was good.

After a Colorado punt, Clemson moved to the 29 on Bob Spooner's two runs. Three plays later, Wells ran 58 yards on a counter trap off the belly series for the Tigers' second score. Bussey's point after made the score 20-14 Colorado.

Clemson recovered the ensuing onside kick, but the Tigers were forced to punt four plays later. Colorado then fumbled at its 11 and Tommy Sease recovered for the Tigers at the 10. Spooner, who had been the workhorse on the first scoring drive, carried the ball over from the one, and with Bussey's third extra point, Clemson led for the first time at 21-20, with 11:22 to go.

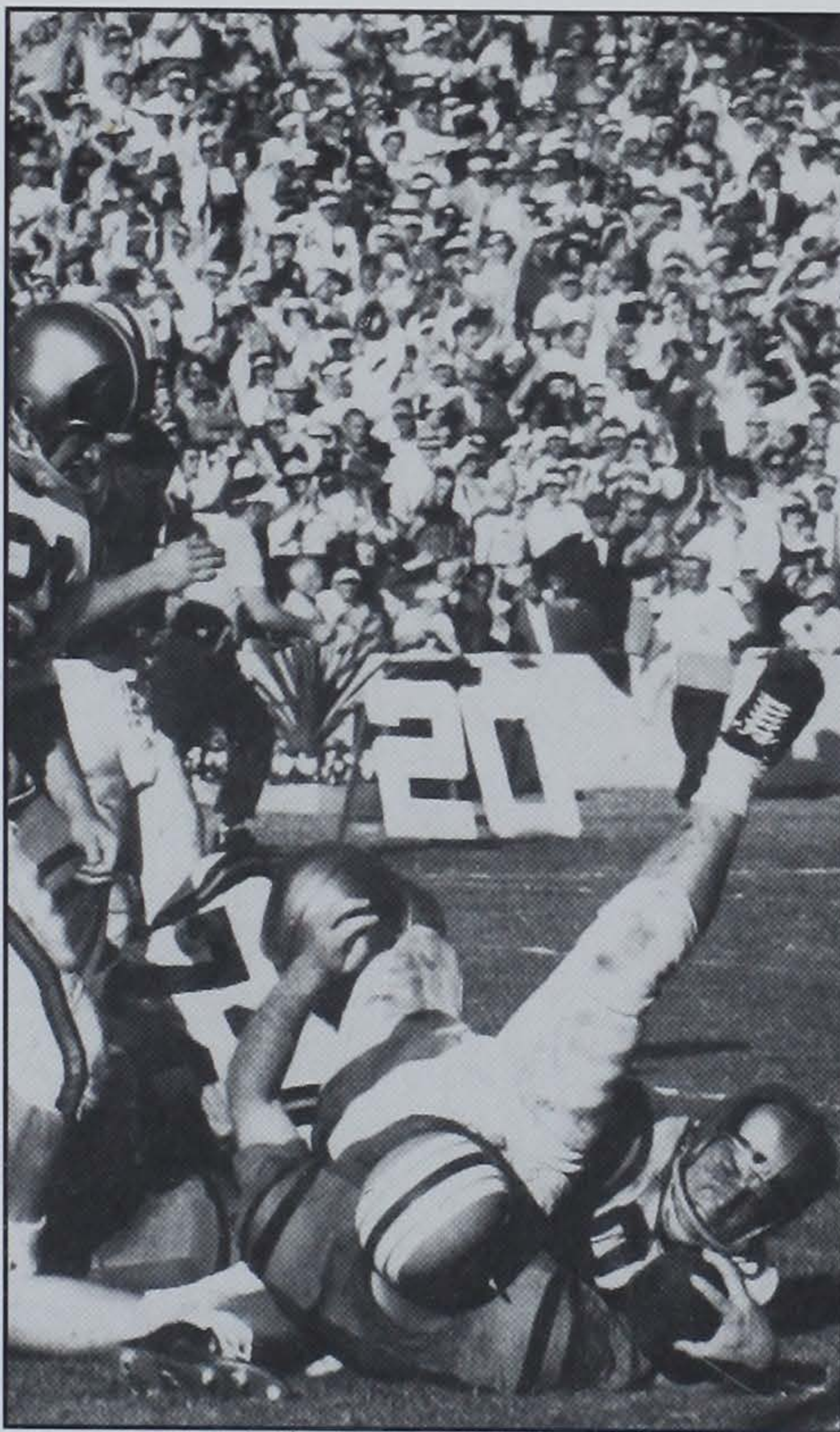
Although leading, Bussey attempted a second onside kick. Colorado recovered and marched 53 yards in eight plays to go ahead for good on Bayuk's one-yard plunge. Indorf kicked the extra point and the Buffaloes led, 27-21. The two teams traded turnovers, and Colorado ran out the clock.

Frank Howard's threatened resignation during intermission inspired Clemson's comeback in the second half.

"I told them I was going to resign if they didn't play better in the second half. I told them I didn't want to be associated with any team that played like they did in the first half."

When Howard met Dal Ward, Colorado's Head Coach, at midfield, Ward asked him what was the matter with his team. Howard replied "I just don't know."

Later Howard explained that the Tigers just refused to block in the first half, but in the second half they got down to business. He had words of praise for John Bayuk, Colorado's big fullback, and said he was as good as any fullback that Clemson had faced all year.

Bowl History 1959 Sugar Bowl

South Carolina, who had been shut out by Clemson the previous two years, scored 20 second half points to take a 26-6 win over Frank Howard's 1958 team. The only other blemish on the ACC Champions' 8-2 regular season record was a 13-0 loss at Georgia Tech. For their efforts, the Tigers were invited to play the nation's number-one team, Louisiana State, in the 25th Sugar Bowl.

LSU drove deep into Clemson territory three times in the first half, but two fumbles and a thwarted fake field goal killed the drives. Clemson could do no better, though, as none of its first six drives went past midfield.

Clemson moved to the LSU 27 on its first drive of the second half, but a fumble gave the ball back to the other set of Tigers. On Clemson's next possession, however, LSU got the break it had been looking for. On fourth down, the ball slipped out of snapper Paul Snyder's hands and hit up-man Doug Cline in the leg and Duane Leopard recovered for LSU at the Clemson 11.

LSU picked up two yards on its first three tries, but on fourth down halfback Billy Cannon hit tight end Mickey Mangham in the corner of the end zone for the only score of the game. Cannon kicked the extra point and LSU led 7-0.

Clemson had one last chance late in the fourth quarter. The Tigers started at their 17 and 17 plays later were on the LSU 28, but Harvey White's fourth-down pass to George Usry was incomplete. LSU took over on downs and ran out the clock.

In his usual relaxed way, Coach Frank Howard of Clemson said he was pleased with his team.

"Hell! I think we'd have beat them if that boy had held onto that little screen pass," Howard said. "I was going for those two points and beat them."

"I didn't think we would hold them to one touchdown, but I didn't think they would shut us out, either."

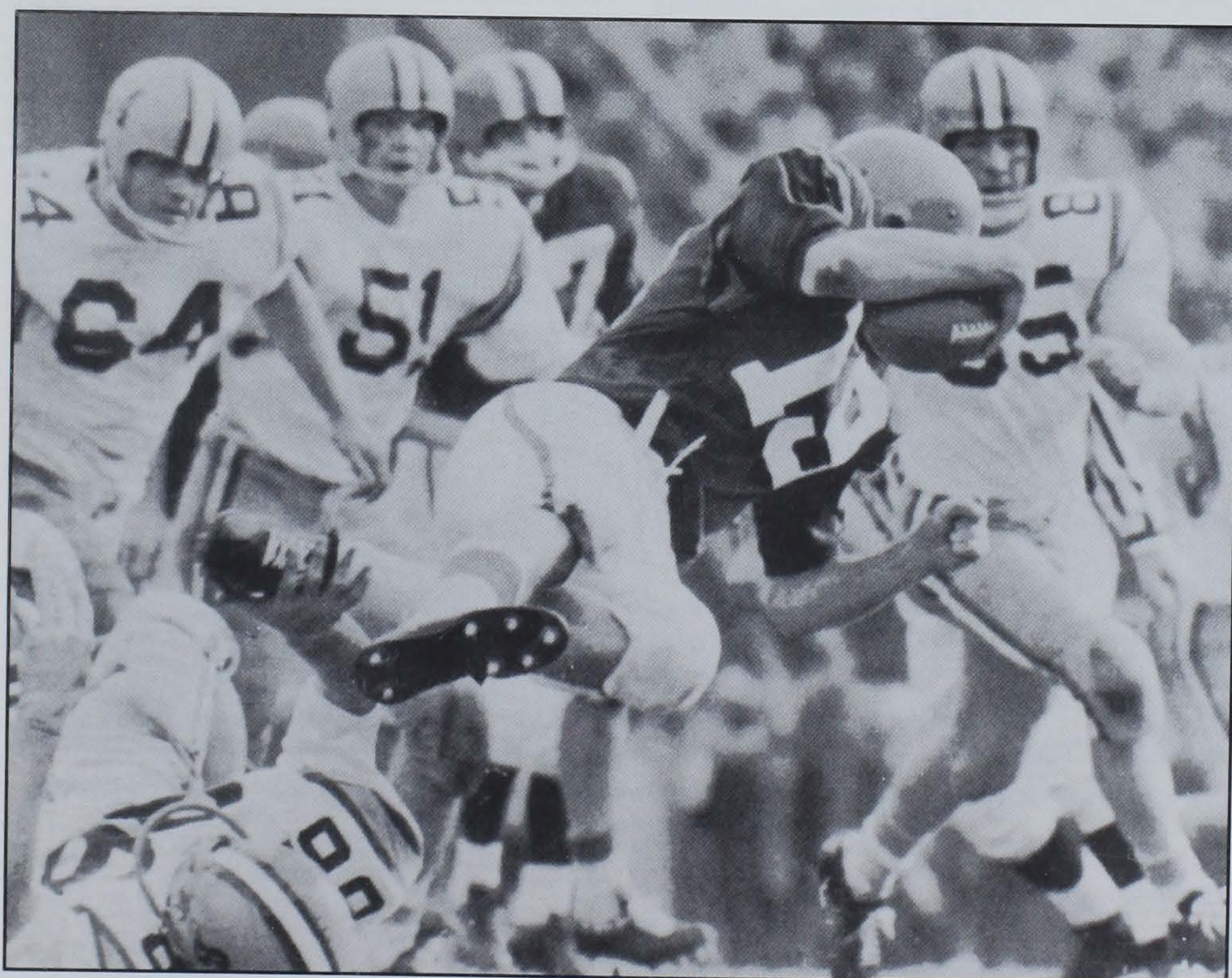
"LSU has a good team, they rate the No. 1 spot in the nation."

"Cannon is quite a boy. Deserves his All-American rating."

"It was a wonderful victory."

They're just as fine when you win 'em, 7-0 as 30-0. I'm very happy that we won," said LSU Coach Paul Dietzel, who won the national championship at age 34.

"Clemson proved tougher than most people figured. But we knew we would have to play at our top peak to beat them. They were a good team."

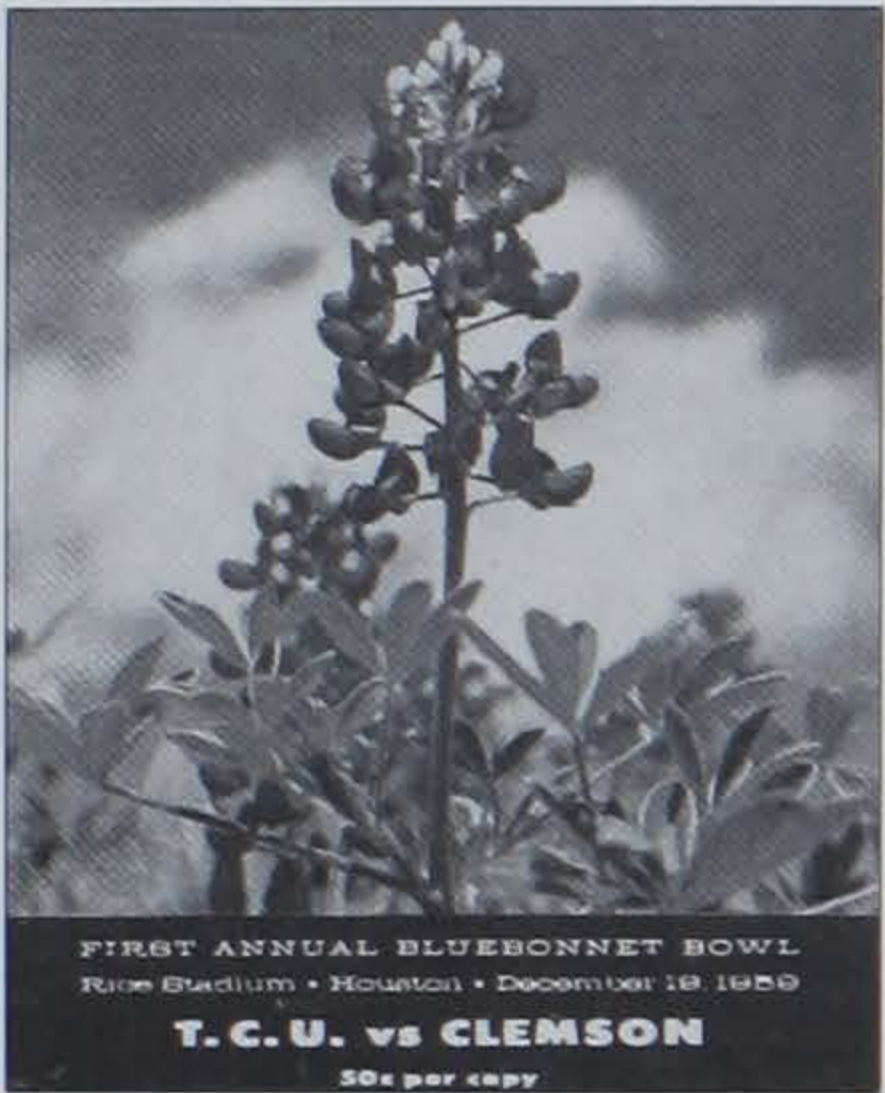

1959 Bluebonnet Bowl

Clemson 23

The 1959 season was one of firsts, lasts, and other milestones. Clemson won the last "Big Thursday" game with archrival South Carolina, 27-0, one of five opponents the Tigers would whitewash, the second-highest shutout total in a Clemson season. The 9-2 team was Clemson's third ACC Championship unit, and Frank Howard's last bowl team.



After the season-ending win over Furman, Clemson was invited to play Texas Christian in the inaugural Bluebonnet Bowl, which would be the Tigers' second post-season appearance in the calendar year of 1959. The 23-7 win over the Horned Frogs was Clemson's 300th football victory.

Alternate quarterback Lowndes Shingler guided Clemson on a 12-play, 63-yard drive to the TCU five, but the Tigers stalled. Lon Armstrong hit on a 22-yard field goal as the second quarter started, to put Clemson up, 3-0.

Not to be outdone, TCU second-stringer Donald George moved his team on a 12-play, 63-yard drive to the Clemson end zone. The Horned Frogs scored the go-ahead touchdown on a 19-yard halfback pass from Jack Reding to Harry Moreland.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but Clemson did drive to the TCU 29 midway through the period. Harvey White's fourth-down pass to George Usry was just one yard short of the needed first down and TCU took over.

Clemson got pass-happy in the final 15 minutes and scored two touchdowns for a comfortable lead. With a third-and-18 situation at the Clemson 32, White threw to end Gary Barnes who caught the ball at midfield and sprinted in for a score. After an interception, Shingler threw to Tommy King coming across the middle for a 23-yard touchdown, but Shingler's point after was wide, and Clemson led, 16-7.

Clemson returned to its running game for its final scoring drive late in the quarter. Shingler, Doug Daigneault, and Ron Scrudato moved the Tigers from their 37 to the TCU one and Scrudato ran off right tackle for the score. Armstrong's kick put the game out of TCU's reach and it capped a 20-point fourth quarter for the Tigers.

☛ **Lowndes Shingler** was named the game's MVP for his all-around performance that included three rushes for 65 yards and 34 yards passing on 2-4 attempts. He had 51 yards in total offense over the last 12 minutes of the game and directed the Tigers to two scores.

☛ **Harvey White** and **Gary Barnes** connected on the key play of the game, a 68-yard scoring pass with 10:22 to go that gave Clemson the lead for good in the fourth period.

Bowl History 1977 Gator Bowl

Clemson resurfaced in the national spotlight in 1977 after winning eight games and making its first bowl appearance in 18 years. First-year coach Charley Pell guided his team to a 7-6 win at Georgia, a near-upset of eventual National Champion Notre Dame at home, and had come within an extra point of claiming the ACC Championship. After Jerry Butler's twisting, diving catch in the end zone beat South Carolina, Clemson accepted the invitation to play defending National Champion Pittsburgh in the 33rd annual Gator Bowl.

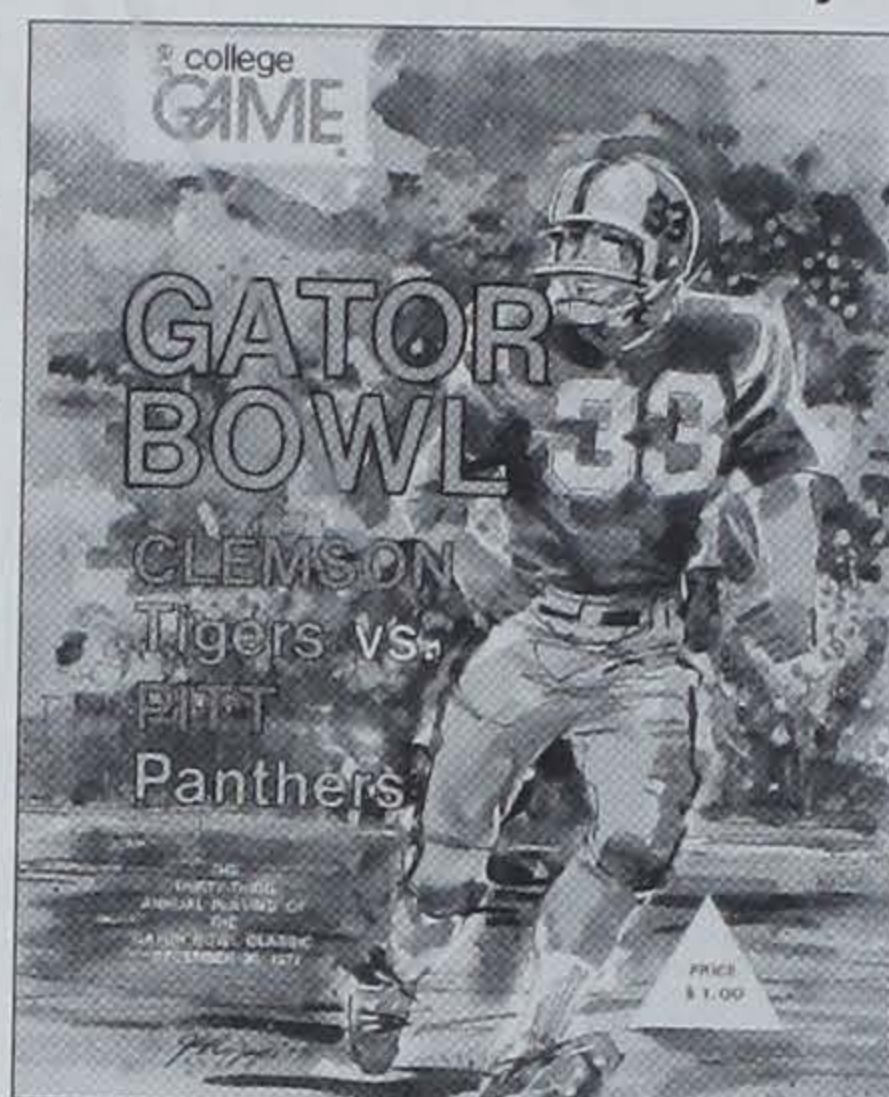
Clemson won the opening coin toss, but that was to be the only thing the Tigers would win that night as the Matt Cavanaugh-led Panthers scored six of the 12 times they had the ball, set seven Gator Bowl records, and handed the Tigers one of their 25 worst defeats in history with a 34-3 score.

Cavanaugh threw four touchdown passes (three to fullback Elliott Walker), passed for a Clemson opponent record 387 yards and accounted for 402 yards in total offense. Pitt set a Gator Bowl team record for passing yards and first downs, while Cavanaugh set the individual mark for passing yardage. If that was not enough, the Pitt defense stymied the Clemson offense all night by keep-

ing Steve Fuller & Company bottled up or causing turnovers when the Tigers' offense did get on track.

Pitt was leading 17-0 when the Tigers began their only scoring drive early in the second quarter. Fuller mixed passes to Anthony King and Butler with runs by Ken Callicutt to move to the Pitt 32. The drive bogged down and Obed Ariri hit on a 49-yard field goal which set the Gator Bowl record for distance.

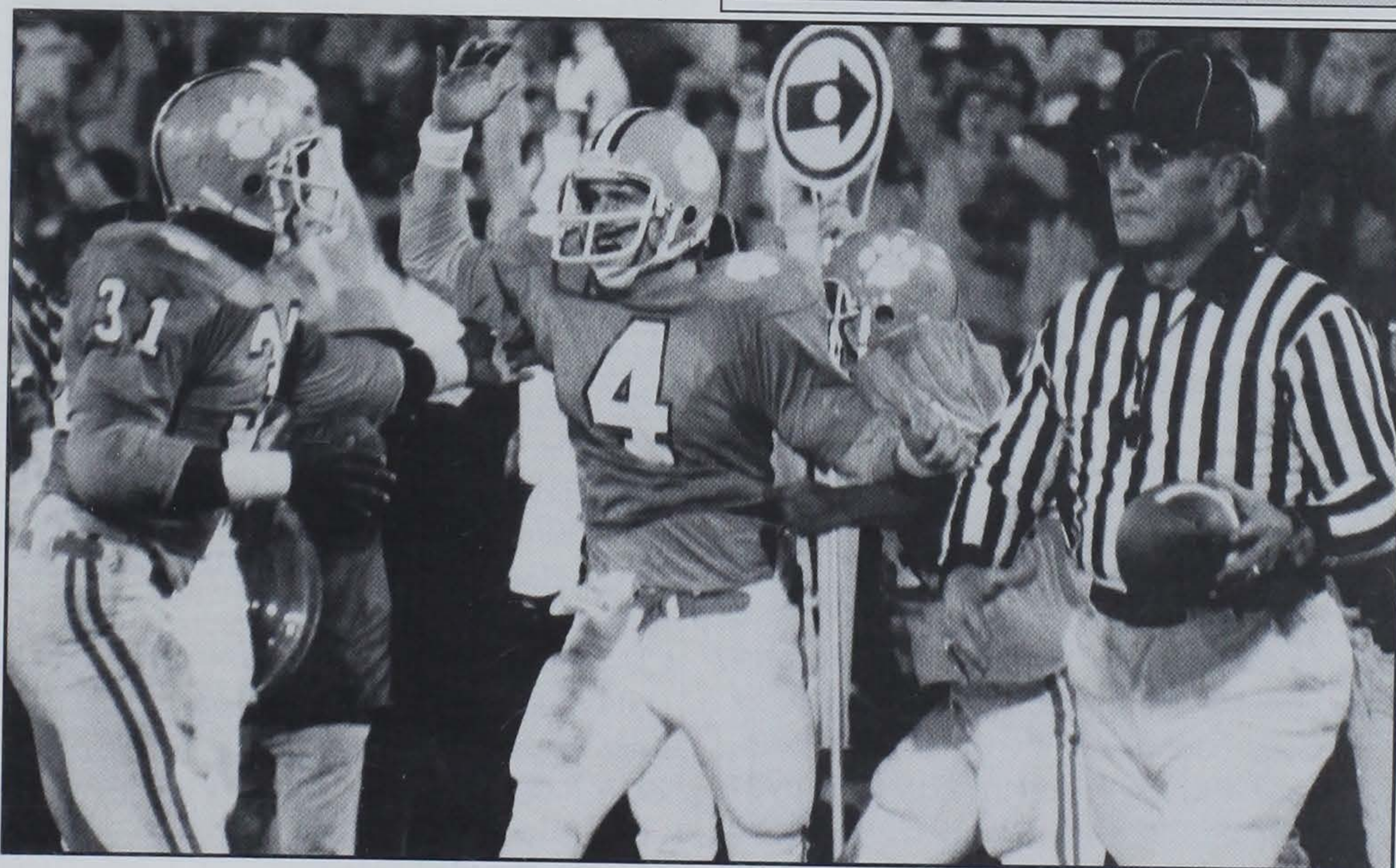
Although the Tigers were outclassed by Pittsburgh, the 1977 appearance in the Gator Bowl was the start of a new era of football pride for Clemson.

Bowl History

1978 Gator Bowl

The Clemson team of 1978 was notable for many reasons, and not the least of which was a 17-15 victory over Ohio State in the Gator Bowl. The '78 team won 11 games (eight by convincing margins), had the nation's longest winning streak after the bowl game, changed head coaches 19 days before the Gator Bowl, and ended the coaching career of Woody Hayes.

The first quarter of new Clemson coach Danny Ford's first game was scoreless, although Ohio State had been stopped at the Clemson one-yard line on a fourth-down play.

The second quarter was unusual in that there were four possessions in the stanza and each team scored twice. Ohio State drove to the Clemson nine on the passing of Art Schlichter, but the Buckeyes had to settle for Bob Atha's 27-yard field goal.

Clemson quarterback Steve Fuller engineered an impressive 80-yard, 15-play drive after the kickoff. Staying mostly on the ground, Fuller himself ran around left end from four yards out to give Clemson the lead. Obed Ariri's point after made the score 7-3.

Schlichter duplicated Fuller's feat nine plays later, but Clemson right end Steve Gibbs blocked Vlade Janakiewski's extra point try, leaving Ohio State in the lead, 9-7.

Clemson got the ball back with 1:15 remaining in the quarter and Fuller passed his way to the Buckeye 30. With only five seconds left, Ariri hit a 47-yard field goal that gave the Tigers a 10-9 lead at halftime.

Clemson scored the only points of the third quarter as the running combination of Fuller, Marvin Sims, and Warren Ratchford ground out 83 yards in 18 plays. Cliff Austin went the final yard for the score, and Ariri's conversion gave Clemson a 17-9 cushion.

With 8:11 left in the game, Schlichter scored his second touchdown to bring Ohio State within two points. Jim Stuckey tackled Schlichter on a sweep to prevent the two-point play, and Clemson still led at 17-15.

Ohio State mounted one final drive. Faced with third-and-five at the Clemson 24, an

☛ **Charlie Bauman** provided the key defensive play of the game with an interception at the Clemson 24 with just two minutes left. Ohio State never got the ball back. It was the only interception of Bauman's four-year career.

interception by second-team middle guard Charlie Bauman (the only theft of his four-year career) killed the drive. Bauman was run out-of-bounds on the Ohio State sideline, and Buckeye coach Woody Hayes swung at the Clemson player. Consecutive unsportsmanlike conduct penalties gave Clemson excellent field position, and Fuller was able to run out the clock, giving Clemson its first win over a Big Ten team.

1979 Peach Bowl

Clemson made its third consecutive bowl appearance in 1979 after an 8-3 season. The year included a 19-10 win over Gator Bowl-bound North Carolina and a dramatic, come-from-behind 16-10 victory at Notre Dame. The 1979 season was also Danny Ford's first full campaign as head coach.

The Tigers got on the board first with an eight-play, 66-yard drive highlighted by Billy Lott's 27-yard pass to Lester Brown. Brown scored two plays later on a one-yard dive over the middle and Obed Ariri's point after made the score 7-0 midway through the first period.

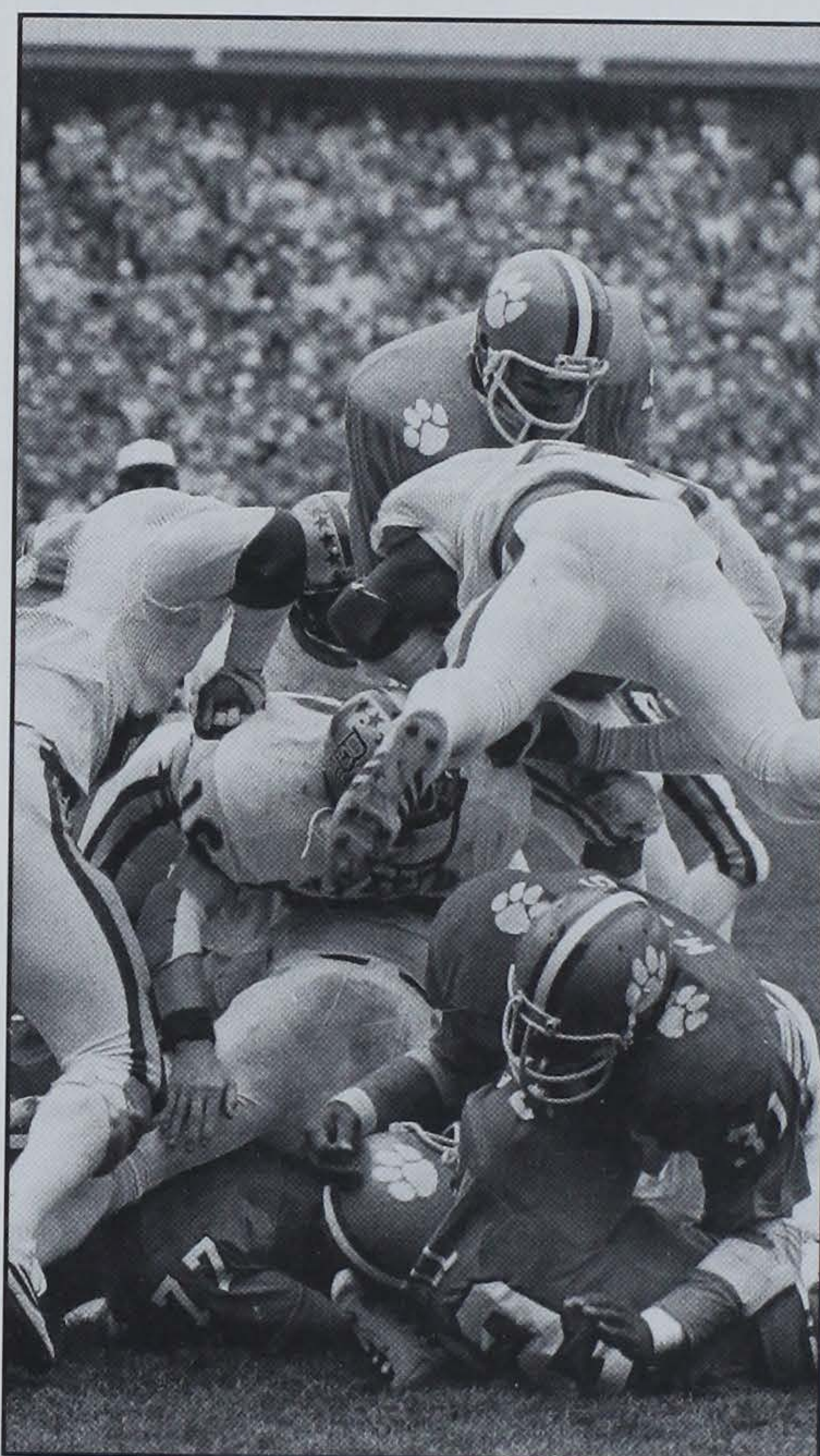
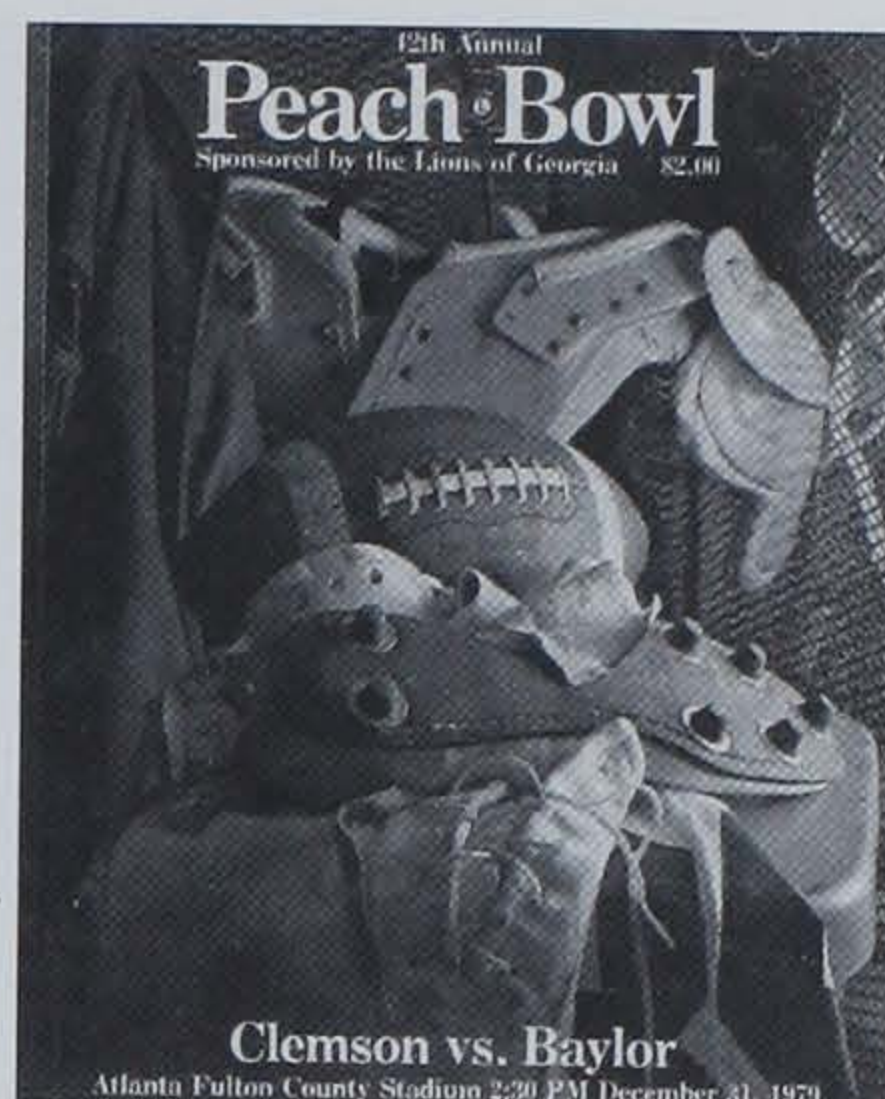
Baylor took the lead on two second-quarter touchdown passes from Mike Brannon to Bo Taylor and Robert Holt. Robert Bledsoe converted after both scores and the Southwest Conference representatives led 14-7 at intermission.

Clemson took the second half kickoff and a combination of runs by Lott, Brown, and Tracy Perry took the Tigers to the Baylor 22. The drive stalled there and Ariri's 40-yard field goal narrowed the margin to 14-10.

Quarterback Mickey Elam led Baylor on a 64-yard field goal drive after the kickoff, and he later threw a seven-yard touchdown to Raymond Cockrell to push the Bears' lead to 24-10.

Mike Singletary (future All-Pro with the Chicago Bears), led the Baylor defense with 20 tackles. He was a major reason Clemson gained a season low 67 yards rushing in 51 attempts.

Andy Headen began Clemson's furious comeback with a blocked punt that was recovered by James Robinson at the Baylor one. Chuck McSwain scored with 20 seconds left in the game and Lott passed to Jeff McCall for the two-point conversion. Headen recovered the ensuing onside kick, and Lott completed a 30-yard pass to Perry Tuttle to move the Tigers to the Baylor 33. An interception killed the winning touchdown drive, however, and Baylor ran out the remaining seconds for the win.

1982 Orange Bowl

After 86 years of playing football, Clemson claimed its first National Championship with a 22-15 win over perennial Big Eight power Nebraska in the 48th Orange Bowl. After a 13-3 win over 1980 National Champion Georgia at home, the Tigers worked their way to the number-one ranking in both wire service polls by season's end. The win over the Cornhuskers gave Clemson the national title and its third perfect season in history.



Nebraska took the kickoff, but three plays later, Tiger middle guard William Devane recovered a Mark Mauer fumble at the Nebraska 33. Quarterback Homer Jordan drove Clemson to the Nebraska 24 before the drive stalled, and Donald Igwebuike drilled a 41-yard field goal to put the ACC Champions up, 3-0.

Nebraska came right back, however, as the Big Eight title holder drove 69 yards in eight plays to score on a 25-yard halfback pass from Mike Rozier to Anthony Steels. Kevin Seibel's extra point gave Nebraska the lead at 7-3 with 6:43 to go in the first quarter.

After an exchange of punts, the Clemson offense moved from the Nebraska 42 to the 21 to set up Igwebuike's second field goal. The 37-yard boot narrowed the score to 7-6.

A second-quarter Phil Bates fumble gave Clemson the ball at the Nebraska 27, and the running combination of Jordan, Kevin Mack, and Cliff Austin moved the ball to the Cornhusker two. Austin, who had been stuck in the hotel elevator for two hours earlier in the day, scampered in for the score that gave Clemson a lead it would not relinquish.

On its second possession of the second half, Clemson drove 75 yards in 12 plays to score its final touchdown of the night, a 13-yard pass from Jordan to All-American receiver Perry Tuttle in the corner of the end zone. For Tuttle, it was his eighth touchdown grab of the season, which set a school record. Bob Paulling's extra point put the Tigers ahead, 19-7.

After Billy Davis's 47-yard punt return, Jordan moved the Tigers to the Nebraska 20, where Igwebuike kicked a 36-yard field goal, his third of the evening, to put Clemson

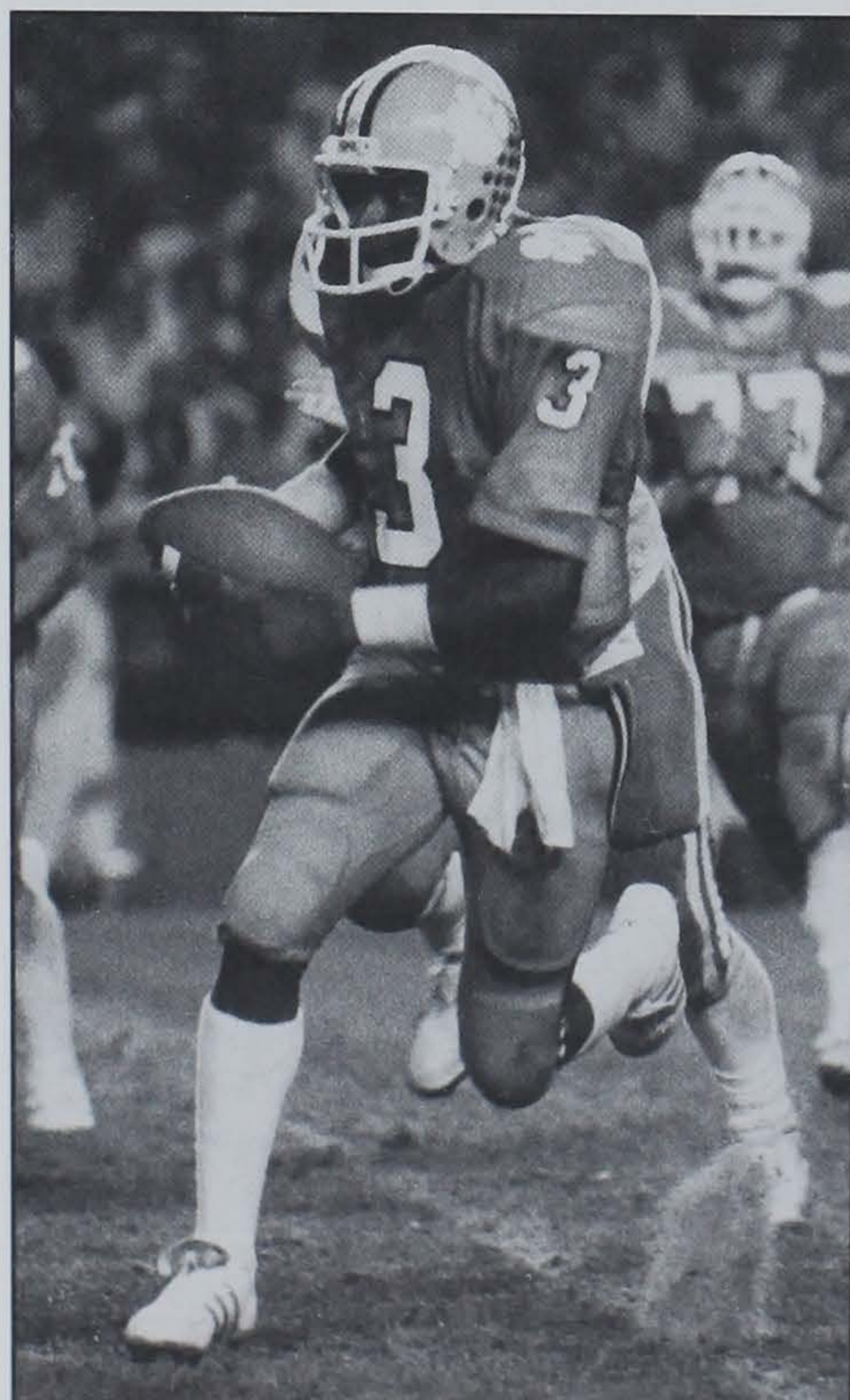

ahead 22-7 with two-and-a-half minutes left in the third stanza.

Nebraska was down but not out, though. After a near-interception by Johnny Rembert, Mauer engineered an eight-play, 69-yard drive that was capped by a 26-yard run by Roger Craig. After a penalty, Craig ran in the two-point conversion from eight yards out to close the gap to 22-15 with nine minutes to play.

The Clemson defense shut down the Big Red on their final extended drive, then the offense held on to the ball for nearly five-and-a-half minutes to run down the clock to six seconds. Andy Headen deflected Mauer's desperation pass to preserve the win and the championship for Clemson.

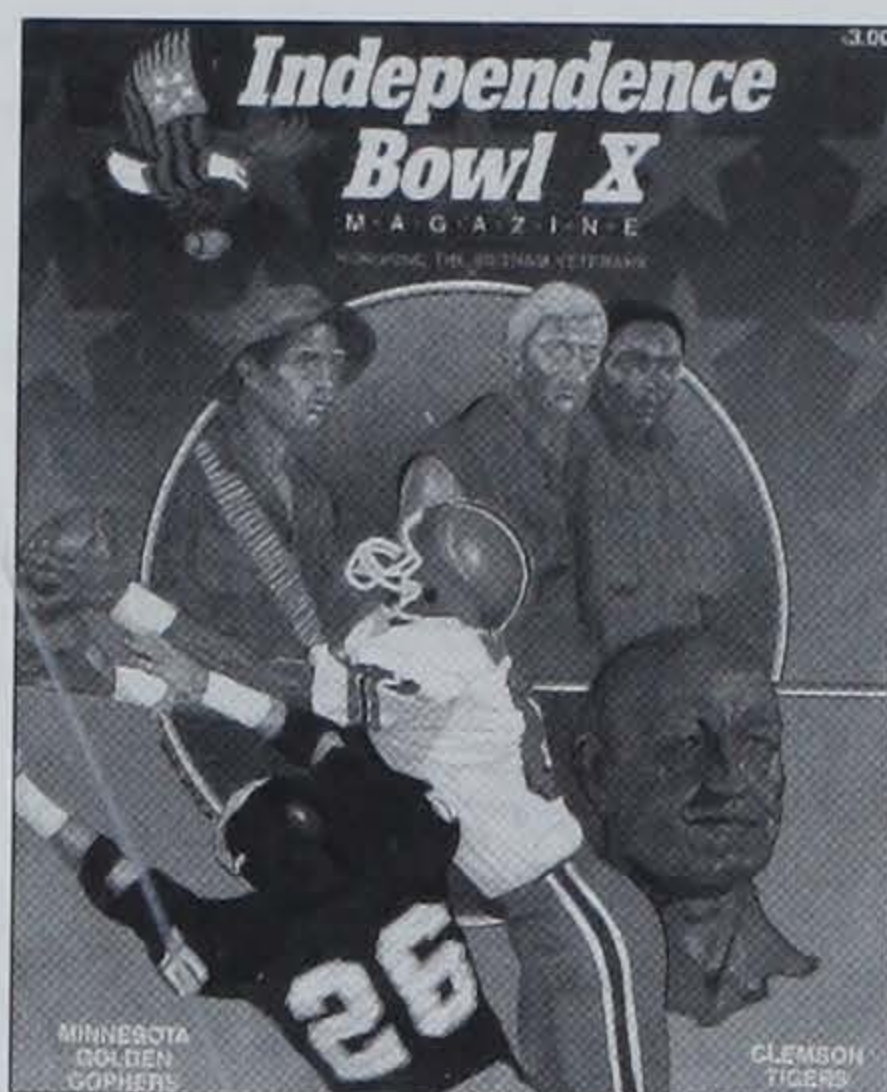

The team with the higher rushing total prevailed, a fact that was easily predictable, as the Gophers churned out 257 yards rushing in a 20-13 Minnesota win.

Bowl History 1986 Gator Bowl

Christmas came two days late for the Tigers as they won their first bowl since the 1982 Orange Bowl. After a brilliant first half display of offense and defense, Clemson managed to hold off a second-half Stanford rally and go on to defeat the 17th-ranked Cardinal, 27-21. Before a Gator Bowl crowd of 80,104, the Tigers scored 27 unanswered points in the first half and appeared to be on the way to a rout. But the second half was a different ball game as Stanford came out strong and put up 21 unanswered points of its own.

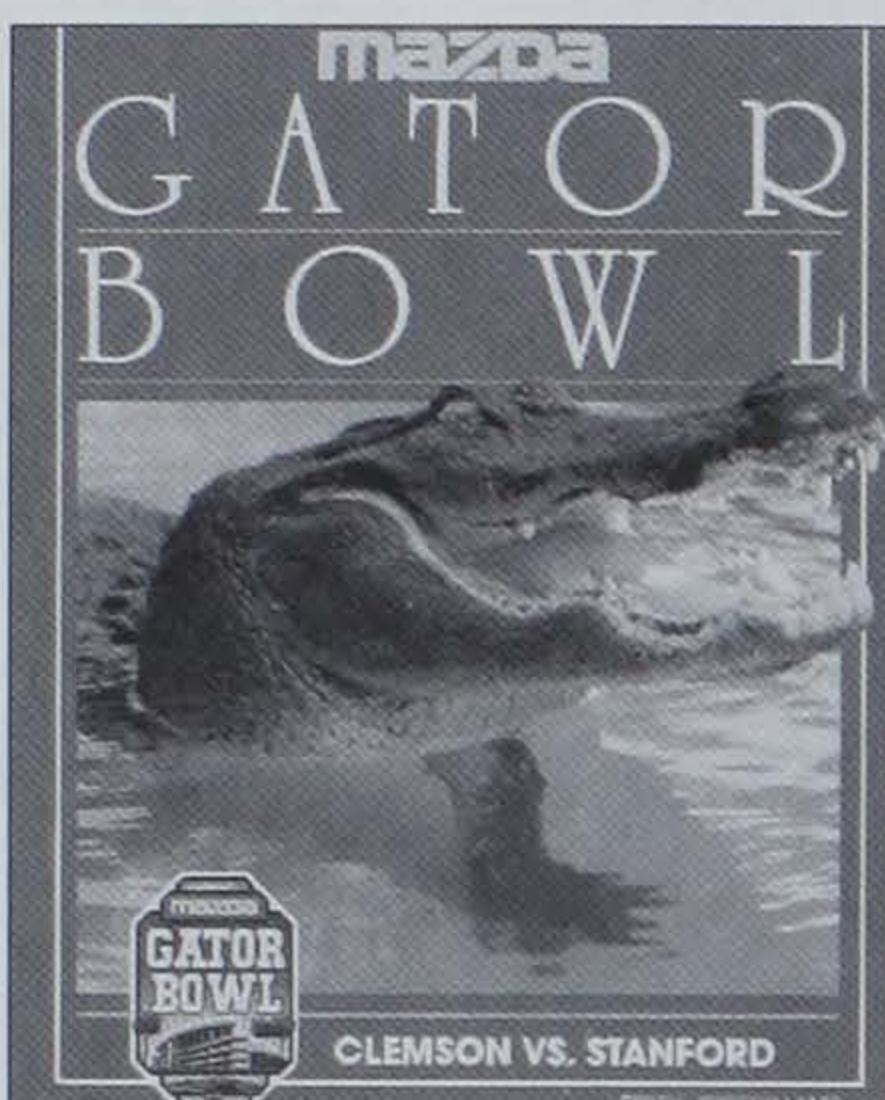
Gator Bowl MVP Rodney Williams completed 8 of 11 passes in the first half for the Tigers, but it was his execution of the option that helped Clemson gain a 27-0 halftime lead. After punting on their first possession, the Tigers scored on their next five. With the score 17-0 in the second quarter, Reggie Harris knocked the ball loose on a Stanford kickoff return and the Tigers recovered on Stanford's 16-yard line. Two plays later, Ray Williams took a reverse in for a 14 yard touchdown, his first of the season. David Treadwell added his longest field goal

of the year (46) on Clemson's next possession, putting the Tigers up 27-0 at the intermission.

But the Cardinal came back from halftime a different team. Kodak All-American tailback Brad Muster rushed for a touchdown and caught two scoring passes while the Clemson offense came to a standstill. With 1:43 left to play in the game Clemson was forced to punt to the Cardinal with only a touchdown's lead. But the Tiger defense rose to the occasion, as Stanford gained only six yards on the next four downs. The offense fell on the ball to run the clock out and the Tigers emerged victorious.

Tailbacks Terrence Flagler and Kenny Flowers combined for 149 yards. Sophomore Ricardo Hooper led the receiving corps with two catches for 44 yards. Terrance Roulhac and Flagler each had three catches with 22 and 23 yards, respectively. Rodney Williams rushed 16 times for 18 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, the Tigers were led by line-backer Henry Carter who recorded a career high 13 tackles. Gene Beasley added seven tackles and broke up two passes. The game also marked Michael Dean Perry's offensive debut, as he was put in as a blocking back on a goal-line situation in the first half.

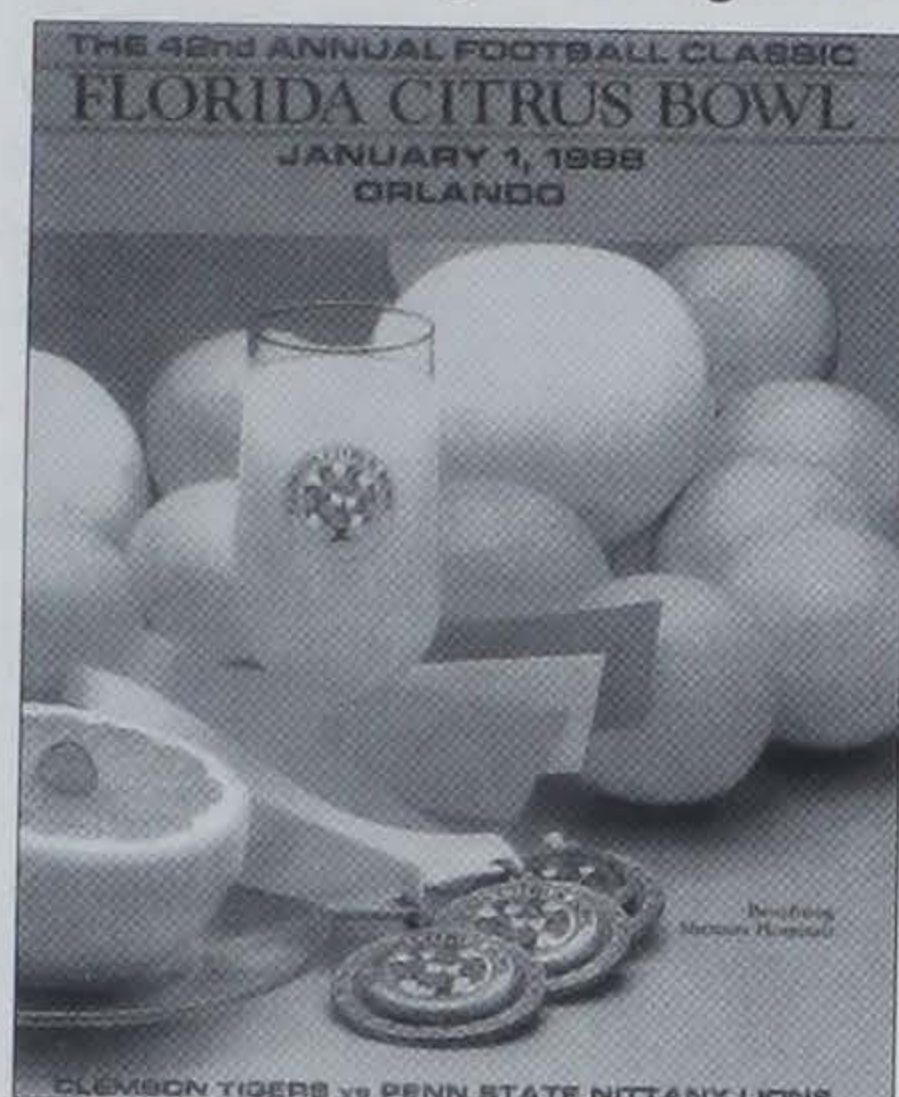

Bowl History 1988 Citrus Bowl

Everything went the Tigers way in sunny Florida as Clemson soundly defeated Joe Paterno's Penn State team, 35-10. Rodney Williams was selected the Citrus Bowl's Most Valuable Player as he led the Tigers in a brilliant air attack that took the Nittany Lions by complete surprise, and complemented it with a solid ground game.



The win was Danny Ford's fourth bowl victory in only nine seasons as Clemson's head coach. It also marked Rodney Williams' second bowl victory in his three-year playing career at

Clemson and the second consecutive year that he was named the MVP of a postseason bowl. In 1986, Williams won the honor as the Tigers defeated Stanford in the Gator Bowl.

Williams, who was also named the Offensive Player-of-the-Game, completed 15 of 24 passes for 214 yards. His primary target was wide receiver Keith Jennings who hauled

in seven passes for 110 yards, his best career performance. Gary Cooper also had four receptions for 56 yards against Penn State.

The Tigers rushed for 285 yards against Penn State. Terry Allen was the leading rusher with 105 yards and one touchdown. Fullback Tracy Johnson ran for 88 yards and three touchdowns. Joe Henderson added 54 yards and another touchdown.

Defensively, Clemson was led by cornerback James Lott's eight tackles. Safety Richard Smith also had seven tackles and one pass broken up. Strong safety Gene Beasley and linebacker Doug Brewster both had six tackles. Linebacker Dorian Mariable was selected the Citrus Bowl's Defensive Player-of-the-Game with his five tackles, including one for a loss. He also intercepted a pass in the endzone and returned it 46 yards in the third quarter.

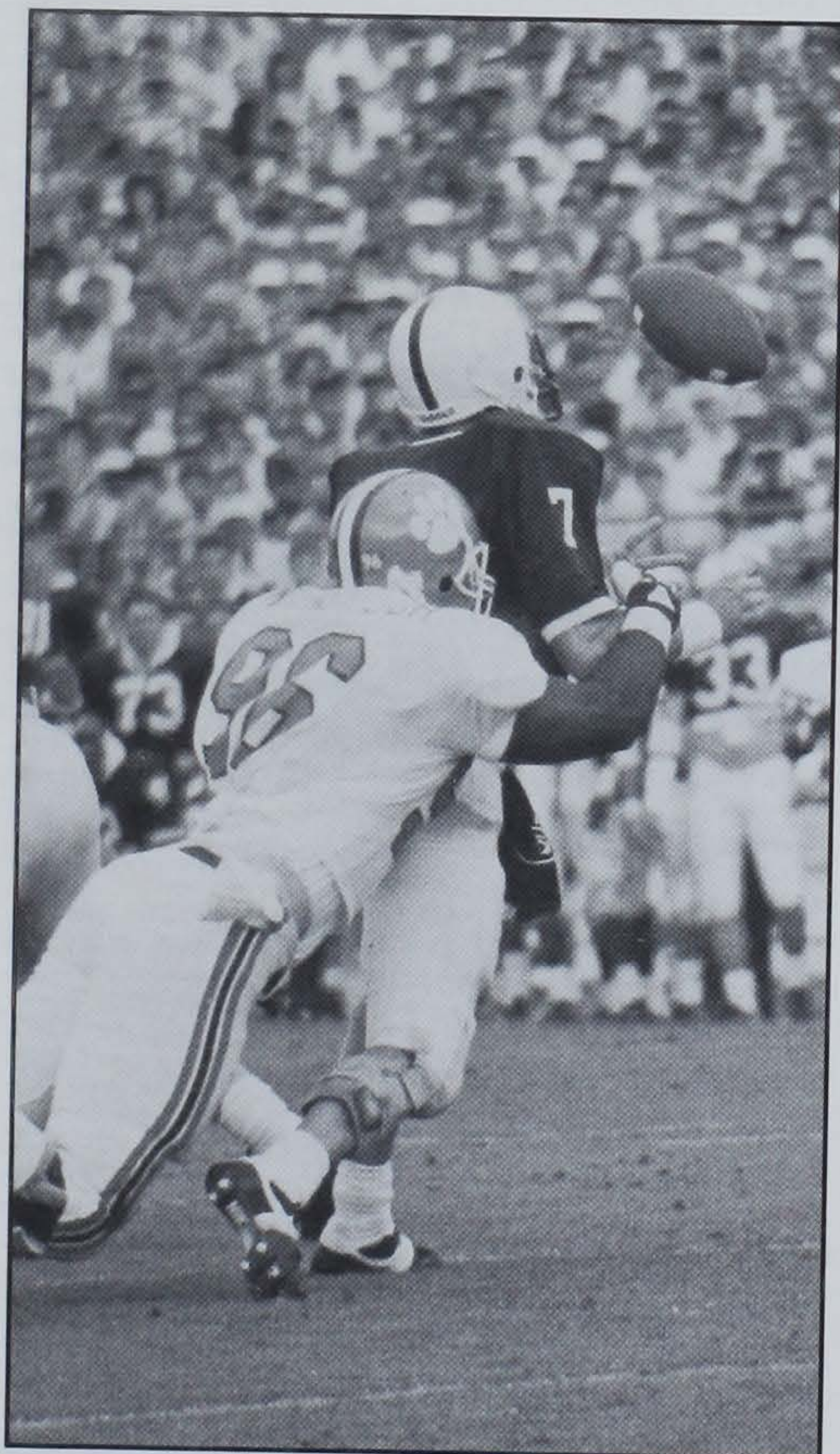

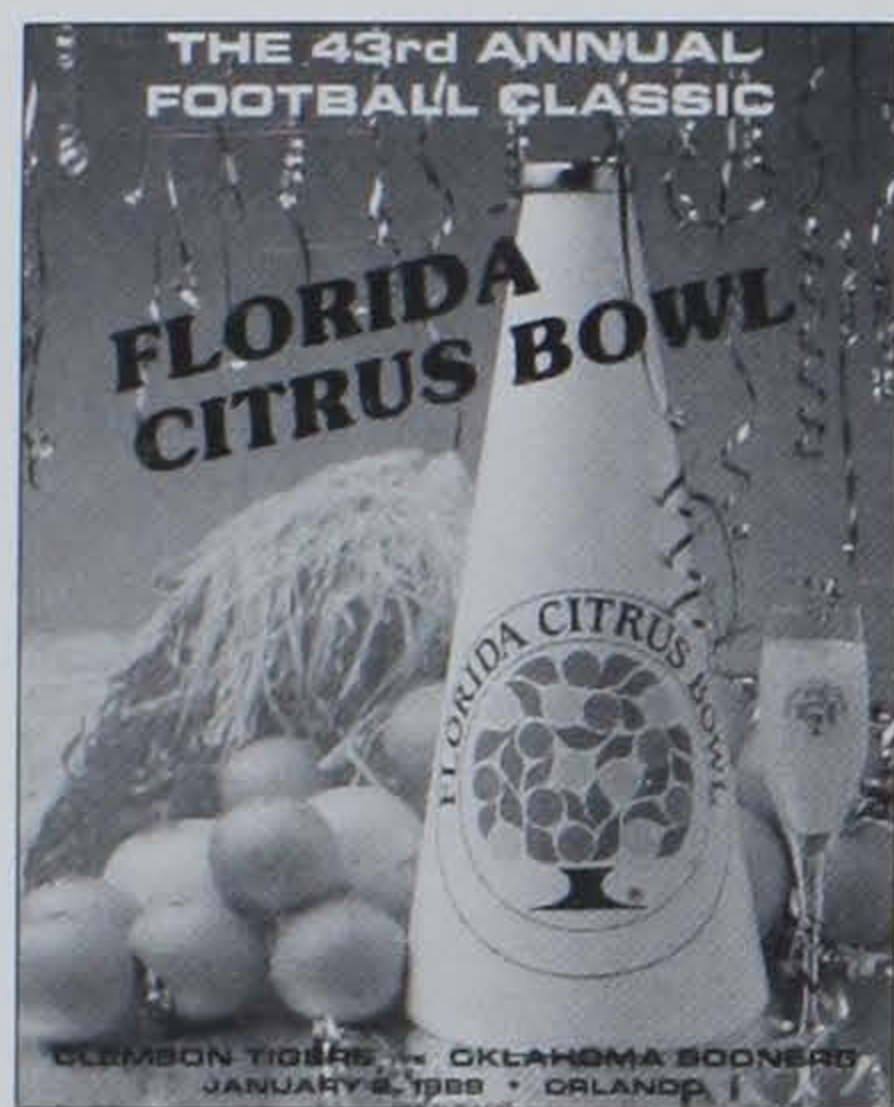

Bowl History 1989 Citrus Bowl



The Tigers rang in the New Year in fine fashion with a 13-6 victory over the Oklahoma Sooners, moving into the top-10 of the final AP poll for the first time since 1982 with

a ninth-place ranking. The victory also gave Danny Ford a victory over the winningest active coach in Division I, Barry Switzer. Ford defeated the top-three winningest active coaches this decade with wins over Switzer, Tom Osborne of Nebraska and Joe Paterno of Penn State.

Although the Tigers faced a wishbone offense for the first time since Ford became head coach, the Clemson defense came through with flying colors, holding the Sooners to only 116 yards, and zero touchdowns.

The first five series of the first quarter ended in punts for both teams. Late in the period, the Sooners drove down to the Clemson one-yardline, and the Tigers defense faced a first-and-goal situation. Outside linebacker Levon Kirkland stopped the ballcarrier for no gain on first down. On second down Jesse Hatcher sacked Jamelle Holieway at the 19. After an incomplete pass, the Sooners were forced to settle on a field goal and moved up 3-0.

Doug Brewster intercepted a Holieway pass early in the second quarter to set up the Tigers' first score, a 20-yard field goal by Chris Gardocki. With time running out in the first half, Gardocki put the Tigers up with another kick, this time a 46-yarder.

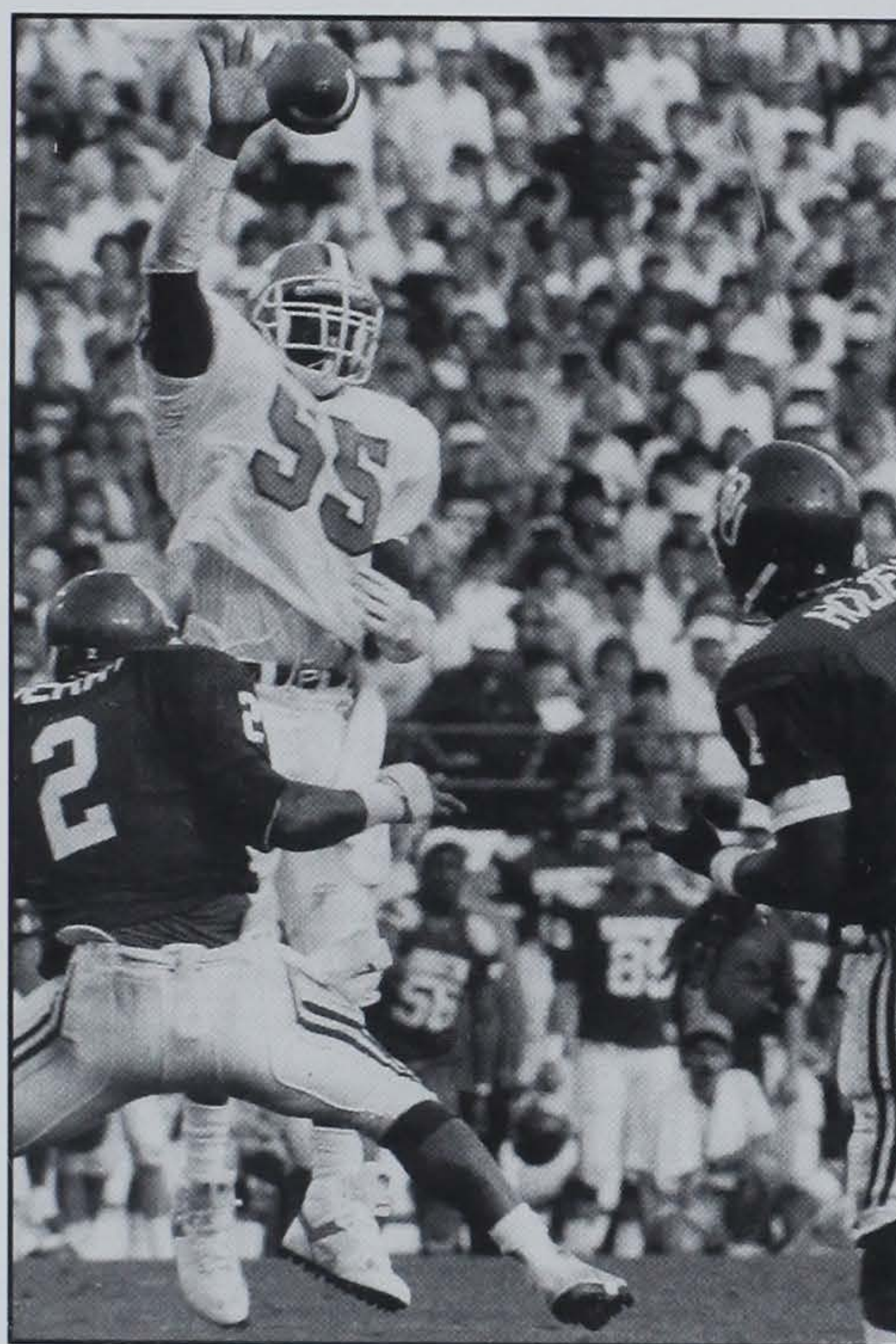
A Clemson fumble in the third quarter gave the Sooners the opportunity to take the lead, but the Clemson defense held and R.D. Lashar hit again from 30 yards. The Tigers responded on the next series, driving 80 yards in 15 plays for the game's only touchdown, as Terry Allen scored on a four-yard run. Allen, the game's Most Valuable Player, rushed for 25 yards and caught two passes for 17 yards on the drive.

Defensive MVP Jesse Hatcher caused and recovered a fumble on the Sooners' next drive, but the Sooners would have one more opportunity to score before the final horn sounded. After the Tigers punted, Oklahoma drove from its own 20 to the Clemson 14, as Holieway put the Tiger secondary to the test by putting the ball in the air. On the

Allen rushed for only 53 yards, his season low, but scored the game's only touchdown and caught four passes to lead all Clemson receivers. Bandit end Jesse Hatcher was named Defensive MVP for what was his best career performance as he racked up nine tackles, had two tackles for a loss of 33 yards, including an 18-yard sack, broke up two passes, caused and recovered a fumble, and had four quarterback pressures.

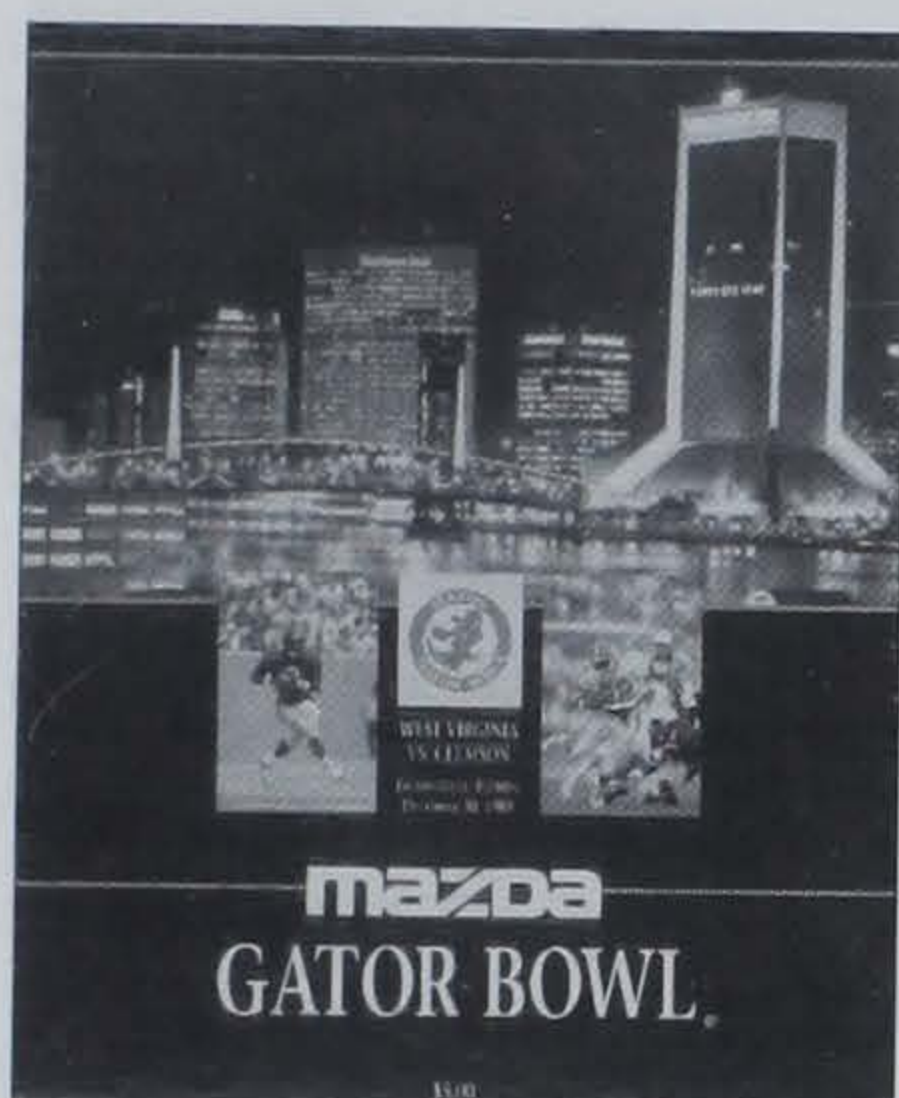

Bowl History 1989 Gator Bowl

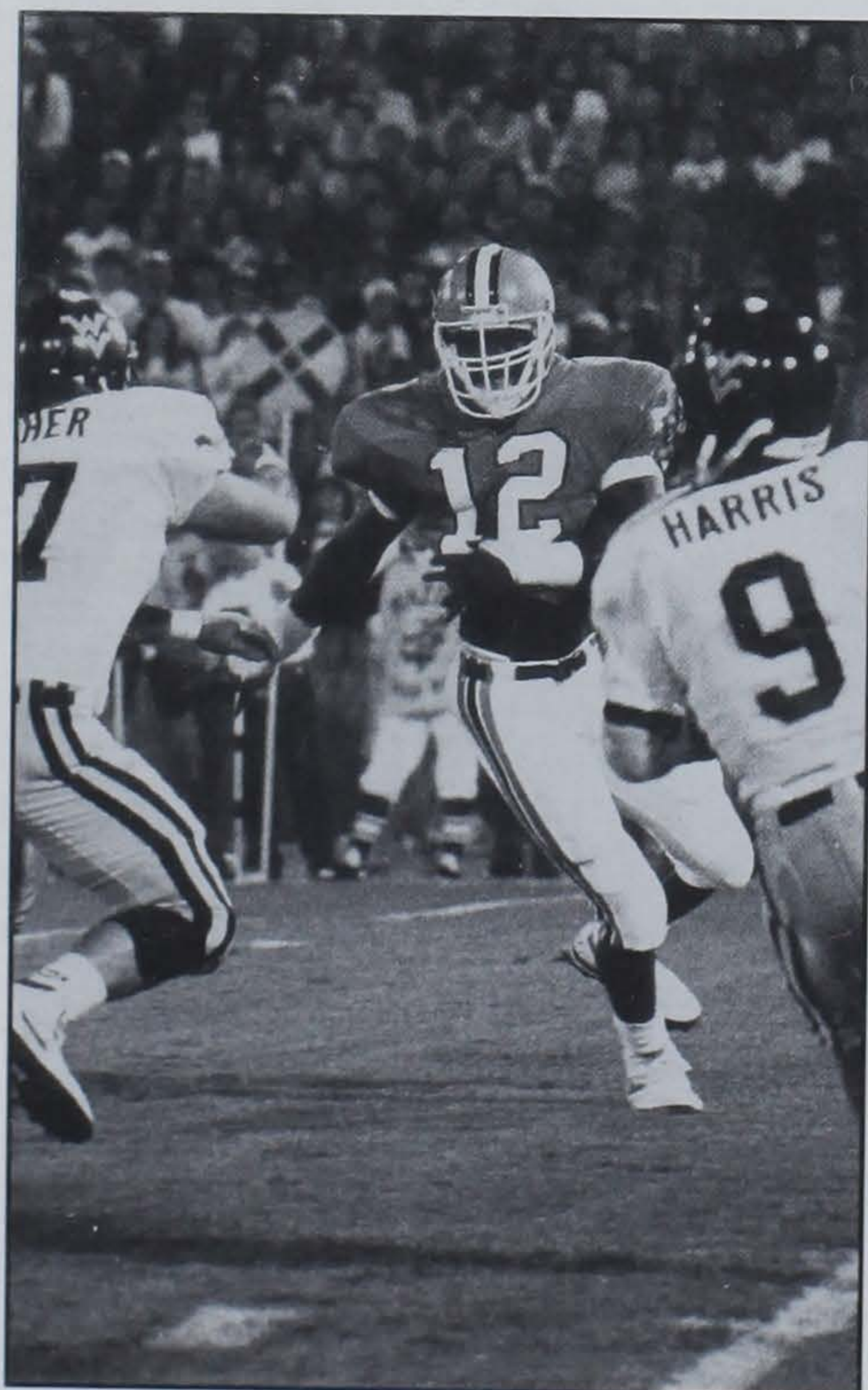
The Tigers closed out the 1989 season with a stylish victory over West Virginia and Heisman Trophy finalist Major Harris, as a dominant Clemson defense held the high-powered Mountaineer offense to only 237 yards in total offense. The win gave Clemson's senior class the ACC record for victories as they became the first class in conference history to record 38 wins and the first Clemson team ever to win four straight bowl games.



WVU quarterback Major Harris came into the game ranked eighth nationally in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency but the Clemson defense, led by outside linebacker Levon Kirkland,

enabled the shifty Harris to gain only 17 yards on the ground and 119 yards in the air on an 11-21 passing effort. Kirkland was named MVP for his efforts, as he had nine tackles, a five-yard sack, caused a key fumble, broke up a Mountaineer pass, and recorded three quarterback pressures.

The fourth quarter was all Clemson, as the Tigers moved the ball 47 yards on the ground to set up a four-yard Joe Henderson touchdown. Vince Taylor recovered a second Harris fumble and after a Clemson punt, freshman defensive tackle Chester



McGlockton, the ACC sack leader, knocked the ball loose from Harris once again and fell on it in the endzone for a Tiger touchdown, upping the score to 24-7 in favor of Clemson. As the final seconds ticked off the clock, DeChane Cameron came in at quarterback for the Tigers and hit Rodney Fletcher over the middle for a 34-yard gain to set up a 24-yard Chris Gardocki field goal, putting the final score at 27-7.

Senior tailback Joe Henderson led the Tigers in rushing with 92 yards on 22 carries and one touchdown, while Chris Morocco, who was shaken up late in the game, gained 65 yards on 11 carries. Rodney Fletcher was the leading receiver as he pulled down three catches for 66 yards.

Chris Gardocki kept the Tigers in excellent field position as he posted a 46-yard average on four punts, including a long kick of 63 yards. Defensively, inside linebacker Doug

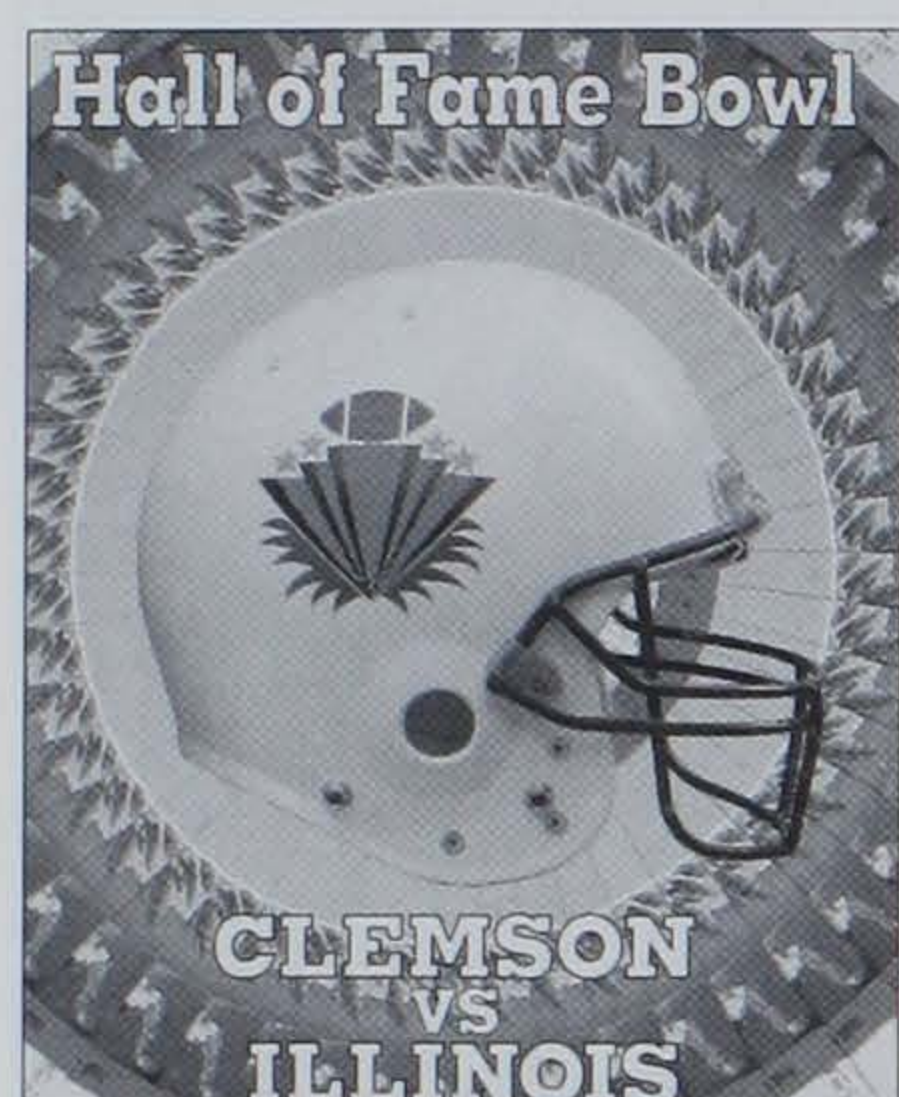

After a separation of 22 years, two coaches found themselves once again on the same football field. This time, however, they were on opposite sidelines. Ken Hatfield and John

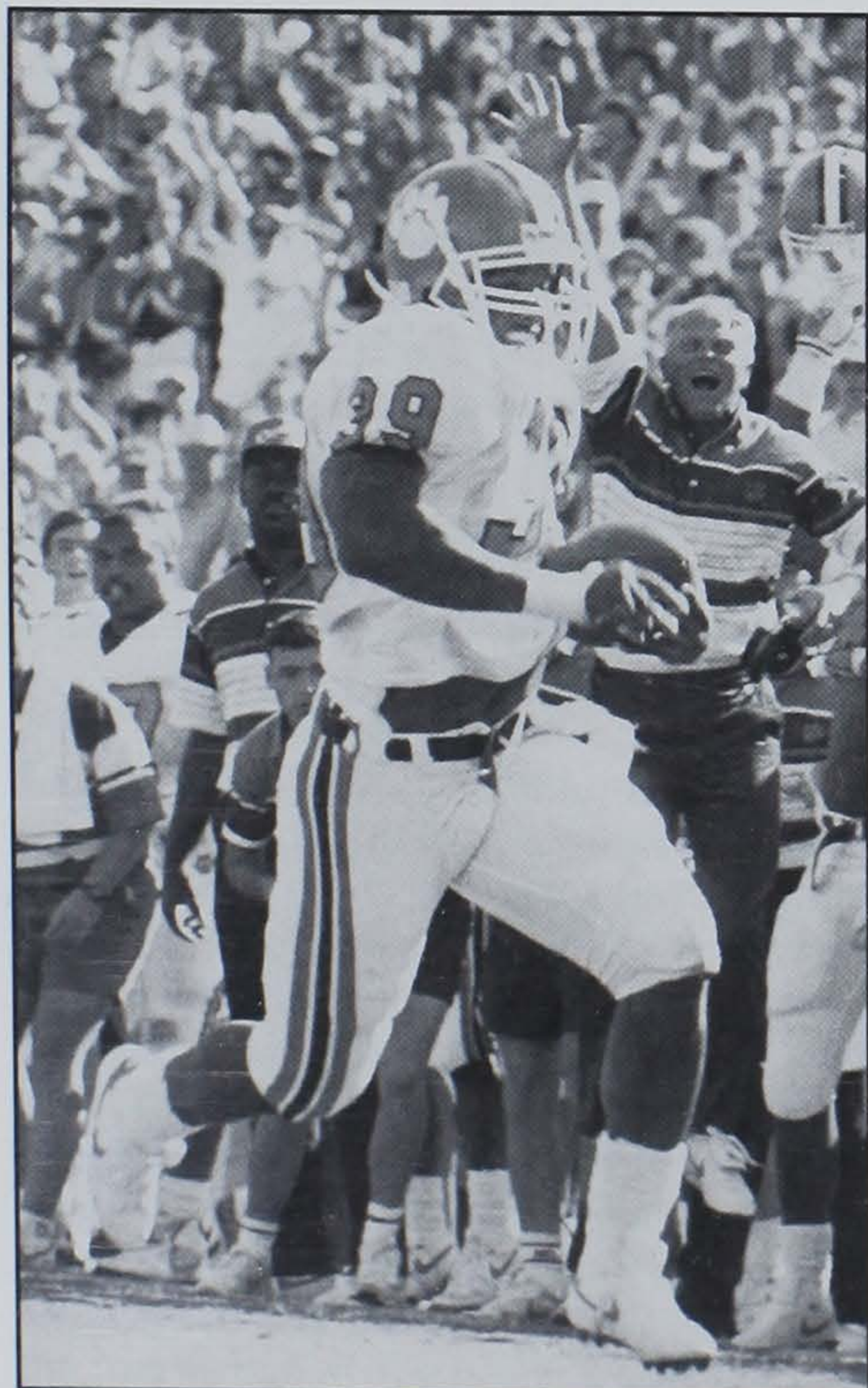


Mackovic, who had been graduate assistants together at Army in the 1960's, were reunited in the 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl.

The Clemson defense dominated the line by holding Illinois to 247 yards, 150

yards under their season average. The Clemson offense surprised the Illini defense with an unexpected aerial assault. Tiger quarterback and game MVP DeChane Cameron, who was less than a 50 percent passer in the regular season, completed 14 of 19 passes for a Hall of Fame Bowl record 73 percent.

Cameron's passing yardage totalled 141 yards and he completed TD passes to Doug Thomas and Howard Hall. It was the first TD reception for both players in their respective careers. Thomas caught five passes on the day for 57 yards, career highs for both categories for the senior in his last game as a Tiger.



Arlington Nunn's interception return for a touchdown iced the victory for Clemson's #1 ranked defense.

Clemson took its opening possession 71 yards to the Illinois two where Chris Gardocki tapped in any easy three. After Illinois fumbled on its first offensive play of the game, Clemson scored a touchdown with a 14-yard pass from Cameron to Thomas. Clemson had not scored a passing touchdown in any of its four previous bowl victories.

In the second quarter, the Tigers would score two more touchdowns. The first was the result of a 17-yard Cameron pass to fullback Howard Hall. It was just the third TD pass to a Clemson fullback in the last 18 years. Clemson then put the contest out of reach just three plays later when Arlington Nunn scored on a 34-yard interception return. It was the senior's third TD on an interception return in 1990, a Clemson record.

The Clemson defense continued to hold Illinois throughout the remainder of the game. John Johnson led the Tiger pass defense as he picked up two sacks to lead a Clemson point prevention unit that had six sacks on the day. Illinois reached the Clemson eight-

yard line in the fourth quarter, but the Tiger defense forced a fumble and Ed McDaniel picked up the ball. Illinois had the ball in Clemson territory just three times all day.

The Clemson defense earned its third shutout of the year. This was the first shutout at a Hall of Fame Bowl game and Clemson's third bowl shutout in 17 bowl appearances. The 30-0 triumph was a Tiger record for victory margin in a bowl game.

DeChane Cameron was named game MVP as he connected on 14-19 passes for 141 yards and two scores. His performance set a record for completion percentage in the Hall of Fame Bowl.

John Johnson had seven tackles, including a pair of sacks to lead a Clemson defense that shutout Illinois and held John Mackovic's team to just 247 yards of total offense, 59 on the ground.

Bowl History 1992 Citrus Bowl



Clemson's bowl game victory streak ended at five as the Tigers left the state of Florida with their first bowl loss since 1985, and their worst defeat since 1986, when the 14th-ranked Golden Bears of

California defeated 13th-ranked Clemson 37-13 in the Florida Citrus Bowl. Also, for the first time since the 1988 season, the Clemson defense, which led the nation in rushing defense in 1991, allowed an opposing running back to rush for over 100 yards, as Cal's Russell White crossed the century mark with 103 yards.

The Golden Bears scored early and often in the first half, taking the opening kickoff 76 yards for a touchdown and adding a 31 yard field goal on their third possession. The Tigers were unable to gain a first down after the ensuing kickoff and were forced to punt. Although Chuck Lynch hit a 49-yard boot, California's Brian Treggs eluded the Tiger

special forces unit and went the distance for a 72-yard touchdown. Clemson got on the boards for the first time with time running out in the first quarter as Nelson Welch connected on a 32-yard field goal on a drive highlighted by a 43-yard run by fullback Rudy Harris.

The highlight of the game for the Tigers came with just under five minutes remaining in the first half as quarterback DeChane Cameron broke loose for a 62-yard scoring romp. That play marked the longest run from scrimmage for a Clemson quarterback in 13 years, but also marked the only touchdown that Clemson would score that afternoon.

The only score for Clemson in the second half was a 36-yard field goal by Welch in the third period, while the Golden Bears would add a field goal and a touchdown on a 23-yard pass play. The Tiger defense managed to hold Cal scoreless through the fourth quarter, but Clemson could not put up any points, as they turned the ball over three times on interceptions and once on downs.

Two Tigers who were playing in their last game in Clemson uniform were named team MVPs in the loss. Defensive tackle Chester McGlockton, who had six tackles for the game, including three tackles for loss and one-and-a-half sacks, was named the Tigers' defensive MVP, while quarterback DeChane Cameron was named Clemson's Most Valuable Offensive Performer, after he scored Clemson's only touchdown and had 189 yards in total offense.

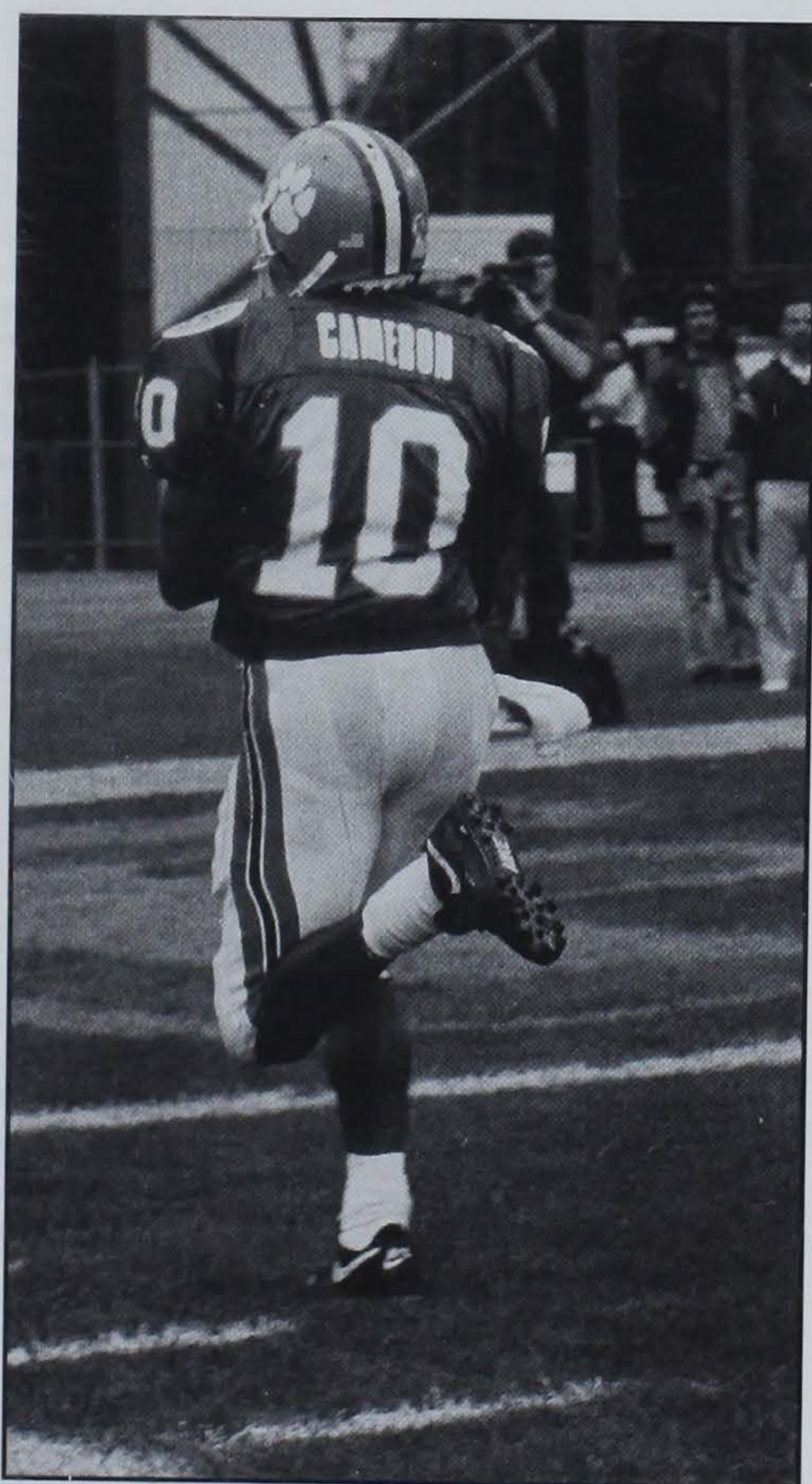

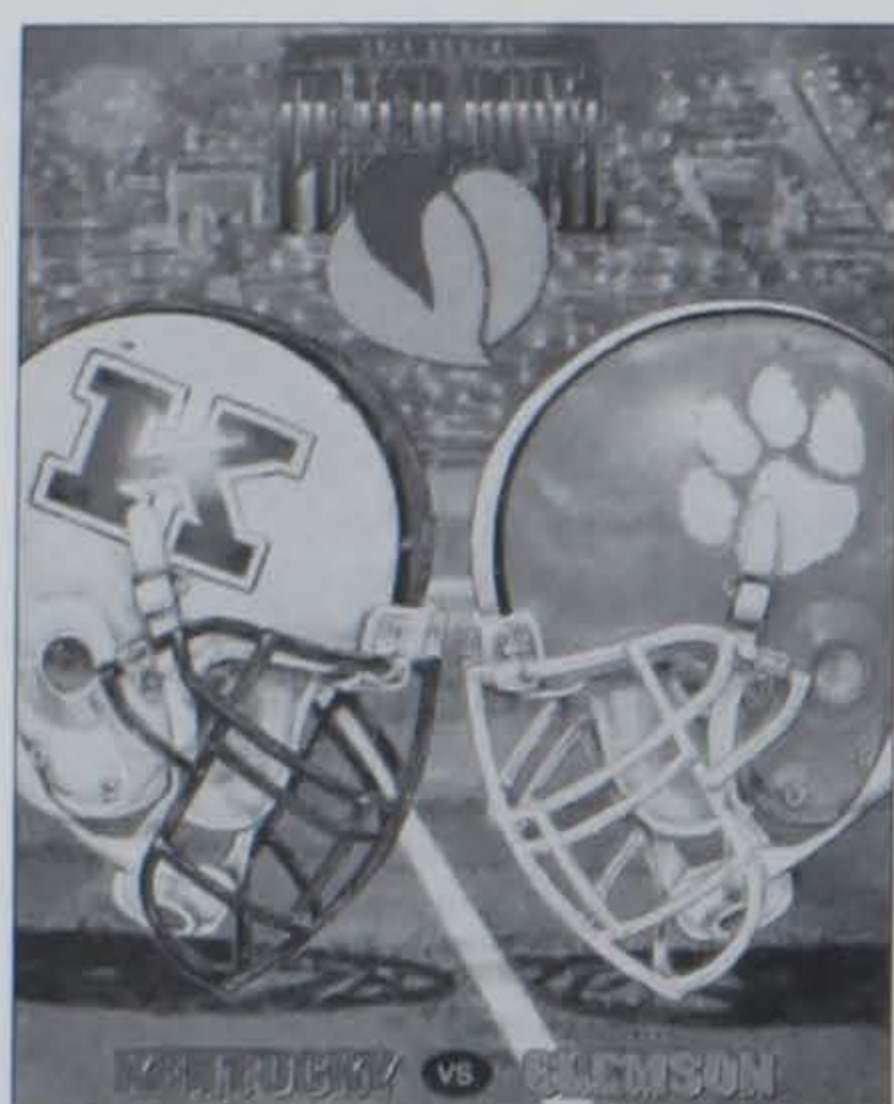

Bowl History 1993 Peach Bowl



Heading into the Peach Bowl contest with Kentucky, Clemson owned the seventh-best bowl winning percentage in college football history with a .611 mark. The Tigers upped that percentage in an exciting way

with a 14-13 victory over Kentucky, putting Clemson's overall bowl record at 12-7. On the way to the victory, Tommy West became the first coach in NCAA history to win his first game for a school in a bowl game without serving as a coach in that program during the regular season.

West's first game as Tiger head coach did not lack for excitement, as Clemson sealed the victory with a 21-yard touchdown pass from Patrick Sapp to Terry Smith with 20-seconds remaining in the fourth quarter to give the Tigers a one-point victory. Smith led all Clemson receivers with four grabs for 56 yards for the contest.

A tandem of running backs who hailed from Pensacola, FL, led the Clemson rushing attack, as starting tailback Rodney Blunt rushed for a season-high 58 yards on 15 carries to lead the team. But, it was red-shirt freshman Emory Smith who was named the Tigers' Offensive MVP, as he rambled for 45 yards from his fullback position, including a two-yard touchdown run. Smith also helped set up the winning score on a 57-yard pass reception late in the fourth quarter.

Kentucky took the opening kickoff and drove 79-yards to the Clemson one, before

linebacker Mike Barber forced a fumble that was recovered by LB Tim Jones. Clemson took over at the two, and starting QB Dexter McCleon engineered a 98-yard scoring drive that culminated in a one-yard run by Emory Smith.

The Wildcats drove back down the field on their next possession, this time reaching the Clemson one again, where they decided to go for it on fourth down. The Clemson defense held once again, as defensive tackle Brentson Buckner stopped the UK ball carrier for no gain. Buckner was named the game's Defensive MVP after tallying a dozen tackles, including three tackles for loss, and pressured the Wildcat quarterback three times. Buckner became just the fourth Tiger defensive lineman in the last eight years to record at least a dozen tackles in a game.

The Tigers were forced to punt after taking over at the one and Kentucky got on the scoreboard with a 17-yard field goal by Nicky Nickles. The score heading into the half stood at 7-3.

Neither squad scored in the third quarter, and barely into the fourth period, Kentucky took the lead with a 46-yard touchdown drive. On Clemson's next possession, McCleon was intercepted by Kentucky's Willie Cannon, and the Wilcats upped their lead to 13-7 on a 43 yard scoring drive, culminating in

another Nickles field goal, this one from 26-yards.

With time running down in the fourth quarter, QB Patrick Sapp came off the bench after playing sparingly in the first half. The two teams exchanged punts before the Tigers got the ball at their own 18 with 3:50 left. On the first play of the drive, Sapp threw a screen to Emory Smith for 57 yards. 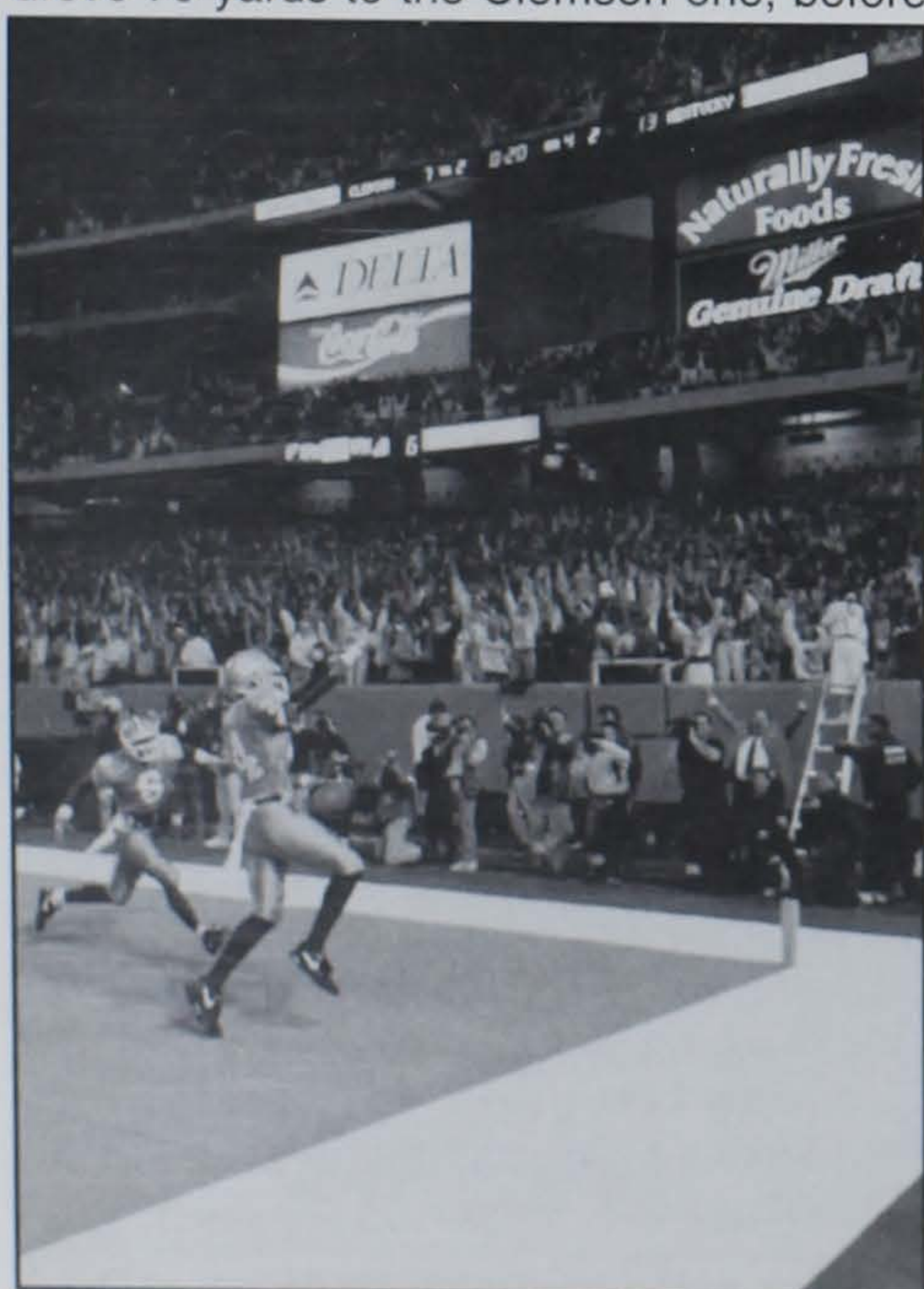

Bowl History 1996 Gator Bowl

Clemson entered the 1996 Gator Bowl fresh off of five consecutive victories, including an emotional 38-17 win over arch-rival South Carolina. The Tigers had won six consecutive games away from Death Valley; but the streak ended there at the hands of Syracuse. The Orangemen handed Clemson its worst bowl defeat in its 20-game bowl history, 41-0.

In front of a rain-soaked crowd of mostly Tiger fans, freshman quarterback Donovan McNabb ran, passed, and beat the Tiger defense. McNabb, the MVP of the Gator Bowl, was unstoppable, as he threw three touchdowns and ran for another. He completed 13 of 23 passes for 309 yards. Wide receiver Marvin Harrison was on the other end of many McNabb passes as he grabbed seven for 173 yards.

Malcolm Thomas scored less than two minutes into the contest on a one-yard run. On their next possession, McNabb led a 12-play, 62-yard drive that ended in a McNabb five-yard keeper for six. After a Kevin Abrams interception late in the first quarter, McNabb found Harrison wide open for a 38-yard touchdown reception.

In the second quarter, the Orangemen

defense thwarted Clemson's best drive of the day. After Clemson had gone 53 yards on 11 plays down to Syracuse's six-yard-line, Clemson faced a crucial fourth-and-two situation. Down by 20 points, Clemson called a play action pass that was just out of the diving hands of tight end Lamont Hall.

The homecoming for Jacksonville natives and childhood teammates Brian Dawkins and Patrick Sapp was a bitter-sweet one, although Sapp did register a sack for a nine-yard loss. The Tigers, who entered the game with the nation's fourth best rushing attack could only manage 90 yards on 34 attempts. The Orangemen held Raymond Priester, the ACC's leading rusher, to just 36 yards on 15 carries.

Syracuse added two more touchdowns in the third quarter to put the game out of reach. After a 57 yard pass to Sir Mawn Wilson, Thomas ran two yards to the right for his second touchdown of the game. Thomas, a Jacksonville native, rushed for 71 yards on 14 carries. Each team traded prodigious third period punts, including a 73-yard effort

by Sean Reali. The one bright spot for Clemson was senior punter Chris McNally, who averaged 49.3 yards on six punts. The Orangemen had their second one-play drive as McNabb hit Harrison over the middle for a 56-yard touchdown.

In the fourth quarter, Syracuse put the finishing touches on a brilliant performance as McNabb hit Kaseem Sinceno on third down in the right side of the end zone for a 15-yard touchdown reception. Syracuse ended the day 12 of 19 on third down and held the ball 10 minutes longer than the Tigers.

Bowl History 1996 Peach Bowl



Raymond Priester set a Clemson Bowl record for rushing yardage with 151 yards gained during the 1996 Peach Bowl. On the defensive side of the ball, Trevor Pryce had three tackles for

loss and one sack in addition to a caused fumble. Even with these fine accomplishments, Clemson still fell to the LSU Tigers by a three-point margin, 10-7.

Nealon Greene opened the Peach Bowl scoring for Clemson on a three-yard run for a touchdown. Clemson attempted to tie the ball game with under two minutes left on the clock, but failed to do so when Matt Padgett's 52-yard field goal attempt was blocked. LSU ran out the clock.

In addition to Priester's outstanding game, contributions to the running attack were also made by Emory Smith, Kelton Dunnican, Brian Wofford and Nealon Greene. Smith had 9-40 rushing day.

Clemson's sole touchdown drive was 1:29 minutes long and consisted of only three runs. The outstanding field position was achieved on a fumble recovery by Harold Means following a sack and caused fumble by Trevor Pryce.

Defensively, Clemson had five players contribute to a combined nine tackles for

losses. These tackles for losses combined for a total loss of fifty-three yards of LSU's offense.

LSU scored its only touchdown of the game during the second quarter when Kevin Faulk scored a three-yard rush to take the ball into the end zone. The extra point by Richey was good and the game was tied at seven all. LSU scored again during this quarter with a 22-yard field goal by Richey to gain the lead for good. There was no scoring in the second half as both defenses dominated.

Time of possession was fairly even throughout the game as LSU led with 30:15 minutes versus Clemson's 29:45 minutes. Not only was time of possession even in this game but also the total net yards gained (CU 258 - 287 LSU) and the average gain per play (4.2-4.5).

Bowl History 1998 Peach Bowl

Behind the strength of the Auburn defense, Dameyune Craig was able to rally his offense in the fourth quarter enroute to a come from behind 21-17 victory over the Clemson Tigers at the Georgia Dome. Auburn's offense managed to score 15 points on three consecutive scoring drives to overcome an 11-point deficit in the fourth quarter.

Clemson got on the board midway through the second quarter with the help of the first of many great special teams plays. Jaret Holmes' punt was blocked by Rod Gardner and returned 18 yards by Chad Speck for a touchdown.



Auburn would answer the Clemson scoring strike on its very next drive. Peach Bowl Offensive MVP Dameyune Craig led Auburn on a seven-play, 67-yard drive, which ended when

Jaret Holmes converted on his second field goal of the first half from 24 yards out. The score reduced Clemson's lead to 7-6 with only four minutes left in the first half.

With 5:18 remaining in the third quarter, Clemson's special teams stepped up big again when Rahim Abdullah blocked Holmes' punt and Mal Lawyer recovered the ball on the two-yard line. From there, Clemson's Terry Witherspoon ran the ball in from two yards out on first and goal to give the Tigers a 14-6 lead.

Auburn was forced to punt from inside its own 10-yard line the following possession. Clemson's Tony Horne returned the punt 20 yards to the Auburn 26-yard line, giving the Tigers great field position. However, the Clemson offense failed to gain a first down and David Richardson connected on a 48-yard field goal which gave Clemson a 17-6 lead with 2:10 left in the third quarter.

Down 11 points, Auburn's Dameyune Craig began to rally his team. He led the Tigers on a 9-play, 72-yard drive on their very next possession. The Auburn drive was capped off with a miraculous 22-yard touchdown run by Craig. Despite failing to convert the two-point conversion, Craig's run was a turning point for the Auburn offense and reduced Clemson's lead to 17-12.

Clemson was forced to punt on its next possession, giving the ball back to an Auburn offense that was finally clicking. Craig and his Tigers drove 49 yards in two minutes and 22 seconds, resulting in a Rusty Will-

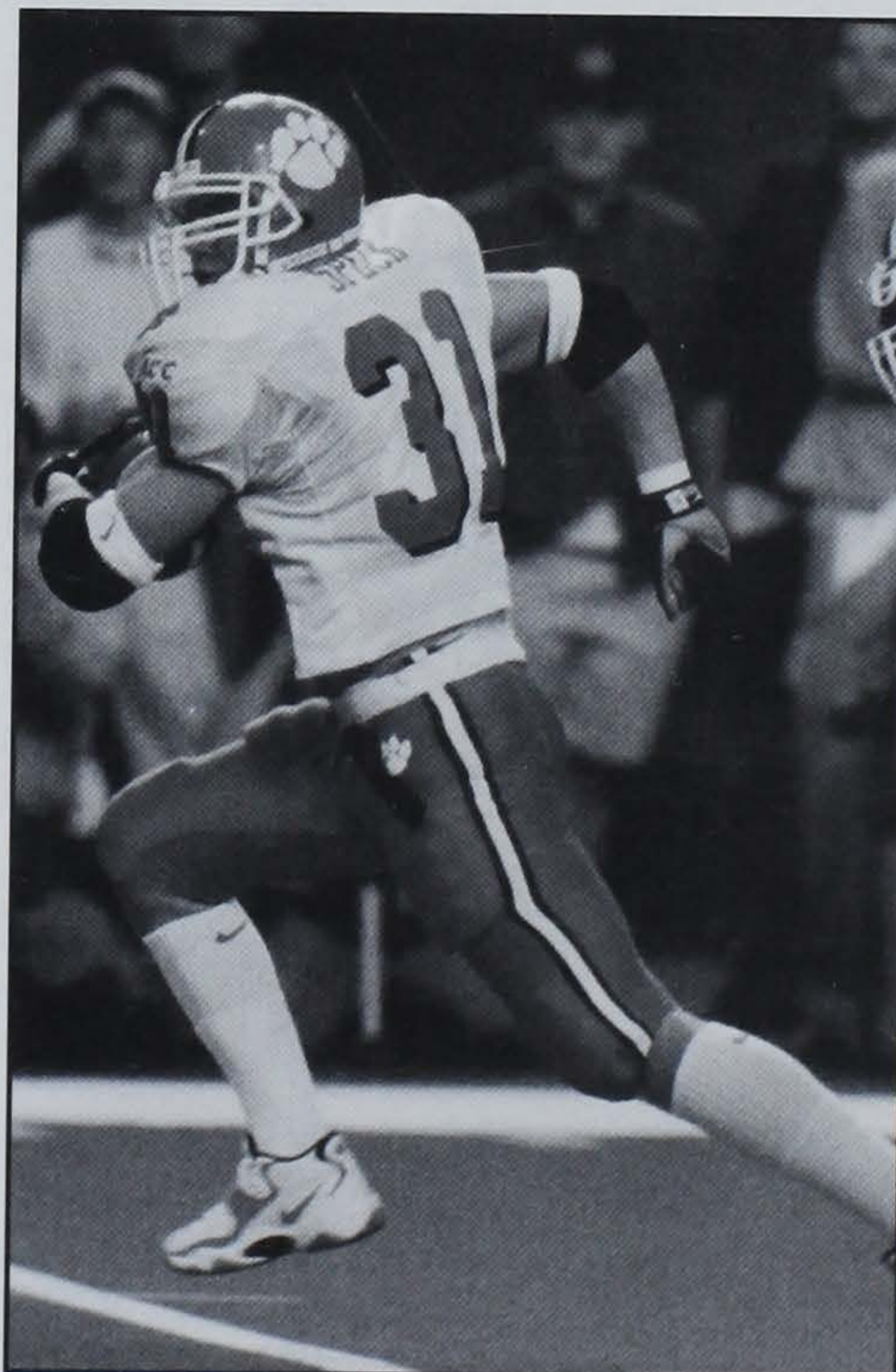
iams 7-yard touchdown run. Once again, Auburn missed the two-point attempt but held the lead at 18-17.

Following an interception of a Nealon Greene pass, Auburn drove down to the Clemson 5-yard line and Holmes converted on a 22 yard field goal, giving the Auburn Tigers a 21-17 lead. Clemson's offense, which was held to only four first downs the entire game, turned the ball over to Auburn on their next possession when Greene's fourth and ten pass sailed over the head of wide receiver Mal Lawyer. Auburn would run the remaining 2:30 off the clock.
