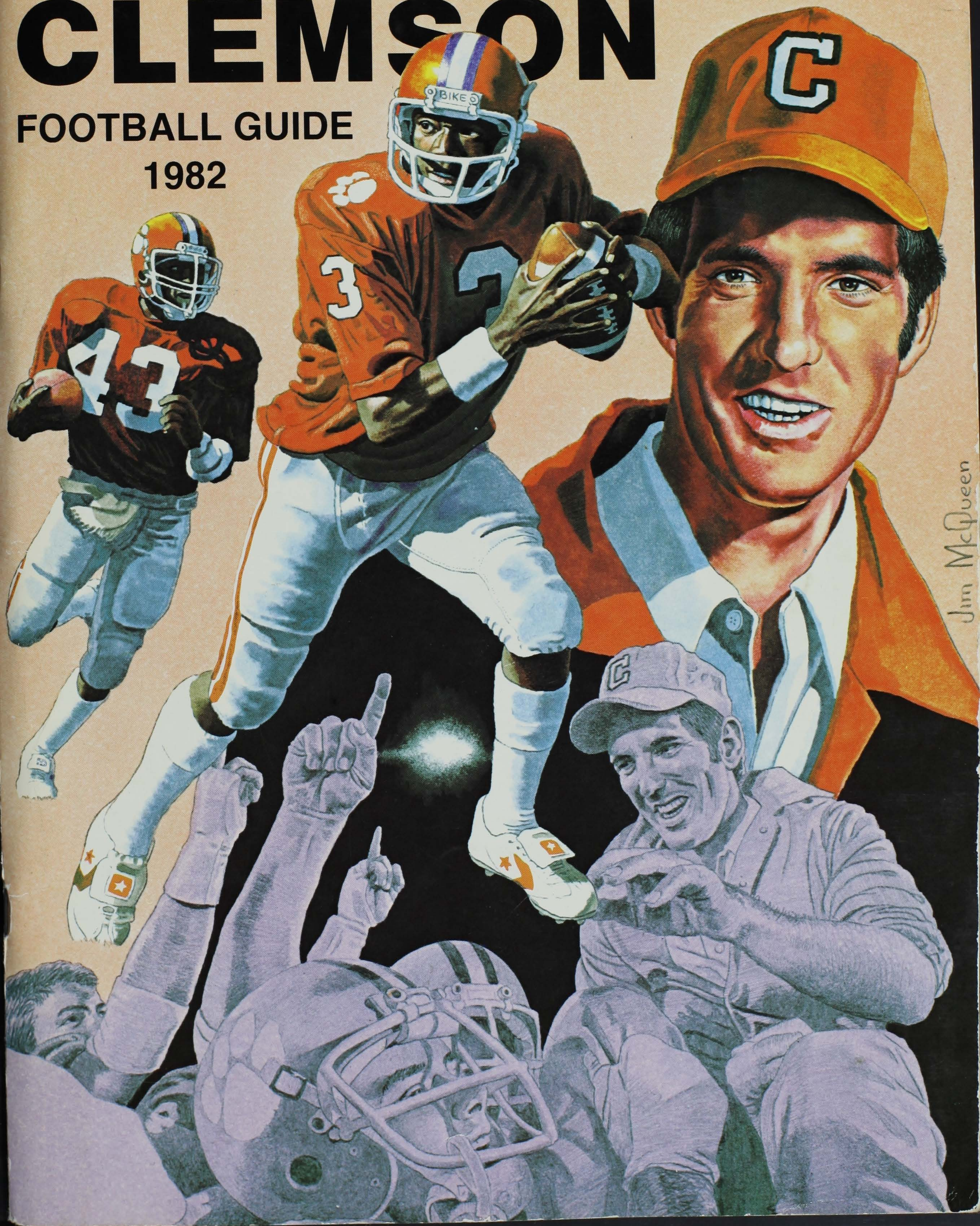

# Press Information

If you're assigned to cover a game in Clemson's Memorial Stadium this fall, the following hints will be helpful:

## ENTRANCE TO STADIUM/PRESS BOX

Enter through Gate 13 which is located on the press box (South) side of the field at the south-east corner. Should you have need to pick up tickets at our press will call gate, they will be at Gate 13. Come through Gate 13, and go straight ahead to the elevator which will take you to the press box.

## PRESS BOX

There are two levels to Clemson's new press box, located in the center of the club level of the South stands. The first level contains the photo deck, the outside PA, stadium operations & security, along with booths for field telephones, radio networks and athletic directors for Clemson and the visiting team. The second level will be for the print media, with seating accommodations for 104 members of the working press. This level will also house Clemson's famous buffet, and the telecopier room. There is a dark room on the photo level.

## WORKING CREDENTIALS

We'll appreciate getting these as early as you know your assignment. Requests for working press and photo passes are honored from SPORTS EDITORS of DAILY newspapers and RADIO & TV SPORTS DIRECTORS **ONLY**. Make request directly to BOB BRADLEY. There is not room for individual radio stations in the press box, only the two networks of the participating schools. Spouses, dates, non-workers, and anyone 16 years of age or younger, are not permitted in the press box.

## PARKING PASSES AND COMPLIMENTARY TICKETS

There are a limited number of these available for use by the members of the working press, and the sooner we know of your need, the closer we will come to filling your request. Your request should be made directly to BOB BRADLEY.

## TELECOPIER AND ELECTRONIC SERVICES

Our press box is equipped with eight (8) outside lines and outlets for your telecopiers, and at no charge to your paper. We will have three telecopiers at the game which can be used on a first-come, first-serve basis, and we also have press box assistants who are available to send your copy as necessary. **THERE IS NO CHARGE FOR ANY OF THESE SERVICES.** It is the responsibility of each writer to make prior arrangements with any other electronic transmission. Electrical and telephone outlets are at each seat for other equipment.

We furnish a typed play-by-play, individual and team stats, and coaches' quotes. Also, our communications center staff furnishes a packet of first half action shots - six 8 x 10 black and white prints free upon request.

## LOCKER ROOM INTERVIEWS

Bob Bradley will escort those writers wishing to go to the Clemson dressing room, whereas the visiting SID will make the trip to the opponent's dressing area. This usually takes place with about three minutes showing on the scoreboard clock. The dressing rooms are located beneath the West end zone stands to your left from the press box.

## DANNY FORD'S WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE

Every Tuesday during the football season, Danny Ford will hold his weekly press conference.

The first gathering is scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 31, prior to the season opener with Georgia, and the 11th and final regular season session is planned for Tuesday, Nov. 23, prior to the Wake Forest game.

## DAILY SPORTS REPORT

The Clemson Sports Information Office tapes a 3-minutes daily sports report each morning, Monday through Friday, with emphasis on the sports during their respective seasons. Interviews are conducted with the various coaches, as well as players. To get an up-to-date report on the Tigers, call 803-654-4402.

This was 116 percent of capacity and was 1,382 more fans than the old mark of 369,770 set in 1980. That record broke 1979's mark of 353,576, which in turn, broke the old standard of 321,763 set in 1978.

# Defending The Title

An examination of the final AP and UPI polls over the past 30 years tells Danny Ford and his players that it could be difficult to defend the national championship. Since the 1952 season (the first year AP and UPI both had football polls) only one team, Oklahoma in 1956, has been able to defend its national championship in both polls. Teams have repeated in one of the polls, but only the Bud Wilkinson-coached Sooners of 1955-56 won back-to-back titles in both polls.

While history does not give Clemson much reason for optimism, a look at Clemson's personnel chart for 1982 might not send chills up and down the spine of the Tiger faithful either. Gone are four All-Americans in Perry Tuttle, Jeff Davis, Lee Nanney and Jeff Bryant. Eleven starters in all have departed the gridiron off the greatest team in Clemson history, but there are some talented performers returning.

## THE OFFENSE: (22 returning lettermen, 6 starters returning, 6 starters lost)

Clemson lost 80 percent of its starters in the offensive line to graduation so Danny Ford obviously must find some horses to block for his most

experienced corps of backs ever. Gone are Nanney, center Tony Berryhill, who was All-ACC, tackle Brad Fisher and guard Brian Clark. This foursome helped move the Tigers for nearly 4700 yards on the ground last year at a 5.2 yards per attempt rate and even more importantly allowed enemy defenses to sack Homer Jordan only 14 times.

James Farr, a starting guard as a sophomore, is the only returning starter in the offensive line among the down linemen. He started every game at guard a year ago and he will be an all-conference candidate in 1982. Bob Mayberry should start at one of the tackle slots. The 240-pounder from Sharon, PA, started two games last year in an injury-plagued season at guard. His experience should help the younger players.

Alex Hudson, a red-shirted junior from Spartanburg, SC, might join Mayberry at tackle this season, while Brian Butcher, formerly a tight end, should take one of the guard slots. Hudson had knee problems in the spring and missed the workouts. Jeff Cruce, another red-shirt in 1981, will battle for the front line left tackle slot. Butcher is a bulky 255-pounds for a guard, but he has the

quickness to have a great senior year. Cary Mas-saro has the most experience of the centers.

While the line is inexperienced, the guys who carry the ball have been down the road before. Seven backs return with a collective total of 16 letters giving the Tiger offense a mature look. In all, 99 percent of the rushing yardage, and 95 percent of the passing offense return from last year's 12-0 team that averaged nearly 30 points per game.

The leader of the offense is All-America candidate Homer Jordan, a senior from Athens, GA. Jordan hit 107 of 196 attempts last year for 1630 yards in leading the ACC in passing. The 6-0, 180 pounder hit 54.6 percent of his passes, the fourth best single season percentage in Clemson history. Entering his third season as the starting quarterback, Jordan needs to average only 126 yards per game passing and 202 yards per game in total offense to break career figures in both categories held by Steve Fuller. The offensive MVP of the Orange Bowl was ranked 12th in the nation in passing efficiency last year and was second in the voting for ACC MVP honors.

Danny Ford, the youngest coach ever to take a team to the national title, is blessed with the return of some old running backs. Cliff Austin, the Tigers' leading rusher in 1981 with 824 yards, goes back to the 1978 Gator Bowl when he scored what proved to be the winning touchdown against Ohio State. His other tailback, Chuck McSwain, has been a star since his freshman season in 1979 when he was Clemson's first-ever ACC Rookie-of-the-Year. McSwain gained 692 yards on the ground and scored seven touchdowns, giving Clemson 1,516 yards and 16 touchdowns from the tailback in 1981. McSwain missed spring practice this year because he was a top sprinter for the Clemson track team. He needs only 892 yards to become Clemson's all-time rushing leader.

Jeff McCall, a third back looking for his fourth letter at Clemson, returns at fullback. Clemson's leading rusher in the Orange Bowl triumph over Nebraska averaged 4.8 yards per rush a year ago when he had 457 yards. Kevin Mack, a junior with two letters, gained 287 yards as the reserve fullback last year and he should again return in that capacity in 1982.

Two players who red-shirted last season return in '82 to give Clemson much more depth this season. Braxton Williams, one of the finest JUCO players in the nation two years ago, and Wilbur Bullard, a tailback who came on at the end of the 1980 season, will both see action this season. And, the Tigers have signed three excellent prep backs in David Barnett (Charleston, SC), Steve Griffin (Charlotte, NC), and Terrence Flagler (Fernandina Beach, FL).

Perry Tuttle, Clemson's all-time leading receiver, and starter Jerry Gaillard, himself in the top 10 in Clemson history, have both graduated. But three solid letterwinners do return to catch Jordan's accurate aerials. Frank Magwood, Clemson's third leading receiver in receptions with 17 a year ago, and the top player in 1981 in yards per reception (20.3), returns for his senior season. Jeff Stockstill and Kendall Alley are reliable performers who will be looked to for fine seasons.

As many as four lettermen could return for the starting tight end fight. Bubba Diggs, who has started some games in each of the last two seasons, is the incumbent, but he will get pressure from Jim Wurst and K.D. Dunn.

Dunn was the frontline player after spring practice. He was the most improved player on the team in spring practice and showed it in the Orange & White game when he bulled his way on a 66-yard TD score after a short pass. He has the top 40 time on the team among non-backs. Jeff Wells, who started more than half the games at that position in 1980, should return to Clemson after sitting out last year with an illness.

#### **THE DEFENSE (28 returning lettermen, 7 returning starters and 5 starters lost)**

Terry Kinard, a first-team All-American as a junior at the free safety slot, is the leader of the Clemson defense. He was a major reason Clemson had 23 interceptions last season, the second best total in Clemson history. Kinard was the third defensive back to earn All-America honors in Clemson history and only the third junior in the

last 15 years to be so selected.

The Sumter, SC, native set a Clemson record for tackles by a defensive back with 95 last year and he also found time to lead the team in interceptions with six. He was chosen to the 1982 *Playboy* All-America team last summer. He will be backed up by Billy Davis, Clemson's outstanding punt returner with a 6.5 yard average.

Clemson is in good shape at the safety positions as starting strong safety Tim Childers also returns. The junior made 41 tackles last year, including a big sack in the Orange Bowl that helped sway the momentum of Clemson's most important athletic win in history.

Clemson is not as experienced at the corners. Hollis Hall and Anthony Rose started every game there last season and they will be missed. Rod McSwain, Chuck's junior brother, was a big-play man last year and not the least of which was his blocked punt that turned into a touchdown against South Carolina. Vandell Arrington, a junior who played in every game last season on the corner, also has a good chance of starting. Ronald Watson, a sophomore, will also see action on the corner as Ford cited him as the most improved defender in the spring.

The Tigers have lost ACC MVP Jeff Davis at linebacker, but Danny Triplett, Clemson's fourth-ranked tackler, returns to supervise the second line of defense. Triplett had 86 tackles last season, 54 of which were first hits. Johnny Rembert, a senior in his second year at Clemson, appears to have the inside track to Davis' slot. He made 22 tackles, intercepted two passes and recovered a blocked punt for a touchdown as the third

linebacker last season.

The front five might be Clemson's best all-around area on defense. Dan Benish is the top returning player. Clemson's second leading tackler in the Orange Bowl was fifth on the team in stops last year on the way to All-ACC honors. The "Bruise Brothers" return to stop up the middle of the line. William Perry (6-3, 310) and William Devane (6-2, 265) will once again alternate at middle guard. The duo combined to make 80 tackles with 13 quarterback sacks last year. Jim Scott, Ray Brown and James Robinson, who is returning after knee surgery, should battle for the other starting tackle position.

Andy Headen is the top defensive end and he may be the best at that position in the ACC. The "Bandit" made 53 tackles last season and broke up eight passes. He roams all over the field. Joe Glenn, a starter in five games last year, should be the other defensive end. He was second on the club in sacks last season although he saw only part-time action.

#### **THE KICKING GAME**

Clemson has the best sophomore kicking combination in the nation in Dale Hatcher and Donald Igwebuike. Hatcher led the ACC in punting last year with a 43.4 average, the 19th best figure in the nation. Igwebuike, who handles field goals and kickoffs, had three field goals in the Orange Bowl and hit 10-17 for the season. Only 48 percent of his kickoffs were returned. Bob Paulling, who also plays baseball at Clemson and set a Clemson record for consecutive extra points last year, handles the PATs and short field goals.





# Coach Ford Comments...

## Defending the National Championship:

"There have been only eight repeat national champions in the AP poll since they have been doing it (1936), so it is obviously difficult to win it a second time in a row. And it took us from the time this program was born until 1981 to win it. But, I can't say it is impossible. Everyone thought it was impossible for us to win it a first time, but we did."

## Motivational Aspects of the 1982 Season:

"Last season's team was a great team, they proved it in every way and deserved everything they got. But this 1982 team must forget what happened last year because that is in the past. It was nice, but we have to start it again. Being up at the top every year, not necessarily winning the title, but being in the vicinity is important. We are still not in the upper echelon when it comes to tradition. We made great strides last year and we have to continue in that direction.

"As a result of what happened last year, this team will be fighting to find an identity, especially early in the season. We must replace 18 good senior leaders. In fact, that was the best senior class as a leadership group that I have ever been associated with. This 1982 team will be compared to last year's team, in fact every good Clemson team down the road will be compared to the 1981 club.

"It will be important for us to be good early in the season, so this team can get the confidence and realize its identity. These guys who have been with us for a couple of years know what it takes to win the championship and know what can happen if you don't work hard, finish 6-5."

## The Offense:

"We have lost a lot in the offensive line and in many ways that is the most important part of your offense because they start everything for you. We lost an All-America tackle, an All-ACC center, starting tackle and a starting guard so we obviously worked hard on that this past spring. We do have James Farr back at guard and Bob Mayberry who started some in the line last year. I hope some of the young people will help us immediately. We will take the five best linemen we have and let them play.

"At tight end we have experience with four lettermen back if Jeff Wells gets healthy. He missed all of last year with an illness and we hope he can return for 1982. Bubba Diggs also returns and we want to get the tight ends the ball more than in past years. Since I have been here, tight ends have not caught more than 15 passes in a season. We have good people there and we will use them more often. K.D. Dunn was very impressive in spring practice as a receiver.

"As far as the wide outs go we have receivers with good hands but we need more speed. We

need a (Perry) Tuttle who can outrun people and give you the big play. Frank Magwood returns here and he will have to give us senior leadership along with Jeff Stockstill.

"Obviously we should be better than ever when it comes to the backfield. Everyone is back including Homer Jordan at quarterback, who should be an All-America candidate this year. He did everything we asked last year and made such a drastic improvement in the mental aspects of the game. Cliff Austin and Chuck McSwain give us two quality tailbacks, while Jeff McCall and Kevin Mack are excellent fullbacks. In addition, we have two backs in Braxton Williams and Wilbur Bullard returning after red-shirt years. And, we signed some fine backfield talent for our in-coming freshman group.

## The Defense:

"We did not lose a lot of people in one general area, but the people lost from last year were quality athletes and quality people. In losing All-Americans Jeff Bryant and Jeff Davis, we have lost two of the best defensive players Clemson has ever had. Bill Smith, Anthony Rose and Hollis Hall were also fine senior players for us last year.

"We are probably weakest in the defensive backfield on the corners. Hall and Rose started every game for us on the corners so we need to get some experience there. Rod McSwain played quite a bit there last season and he will have to do well for us.

"As shallow as we are in the cornerback situation, we are that deep when it comes to safeties. Terry Kinard might be the finest defensive player in the country. He will be our leader on defense and he will have to play like a two-time All-American all season for us. Billy Davis backs him up and he is an excellent athlete. We have to find some time for him. At strong safety we have Tim Childers and Jeff Suttle back.

"Danny Triplett is getting better and better at linebacker for us and he will have to provide a leadership role this year. Johnny Rembert probably will take Davis' spot and he is a very good player. I wish we had him for more than just one more season.

"Right now we plan to stay with our double middle guard situation. We will continue to rotate William Perry and William Devane. They must be the best middle guard tandem in America. Dan Benish is a player at defensive tackle and we expect a big senior year with him. We have turned James Robinson loose and his return could be a key to the season.

"On the end, we will miss Bill Smith, but Andy Headen and Mark Richardson are back at the bandit and Joe Glenn and Edgar Pickett return at the other end. Dave Noelte is back after a year

off because of surgery."

## The Kicking Game:

"Our kicking should be very solid with four experienced kickers returning. There could not have been a better freshman kicking combination in the nation than Dale Hatcher (punter) and Donald Igwebuike (field goals and kickoffs) last year. We are excited about our kicking game."

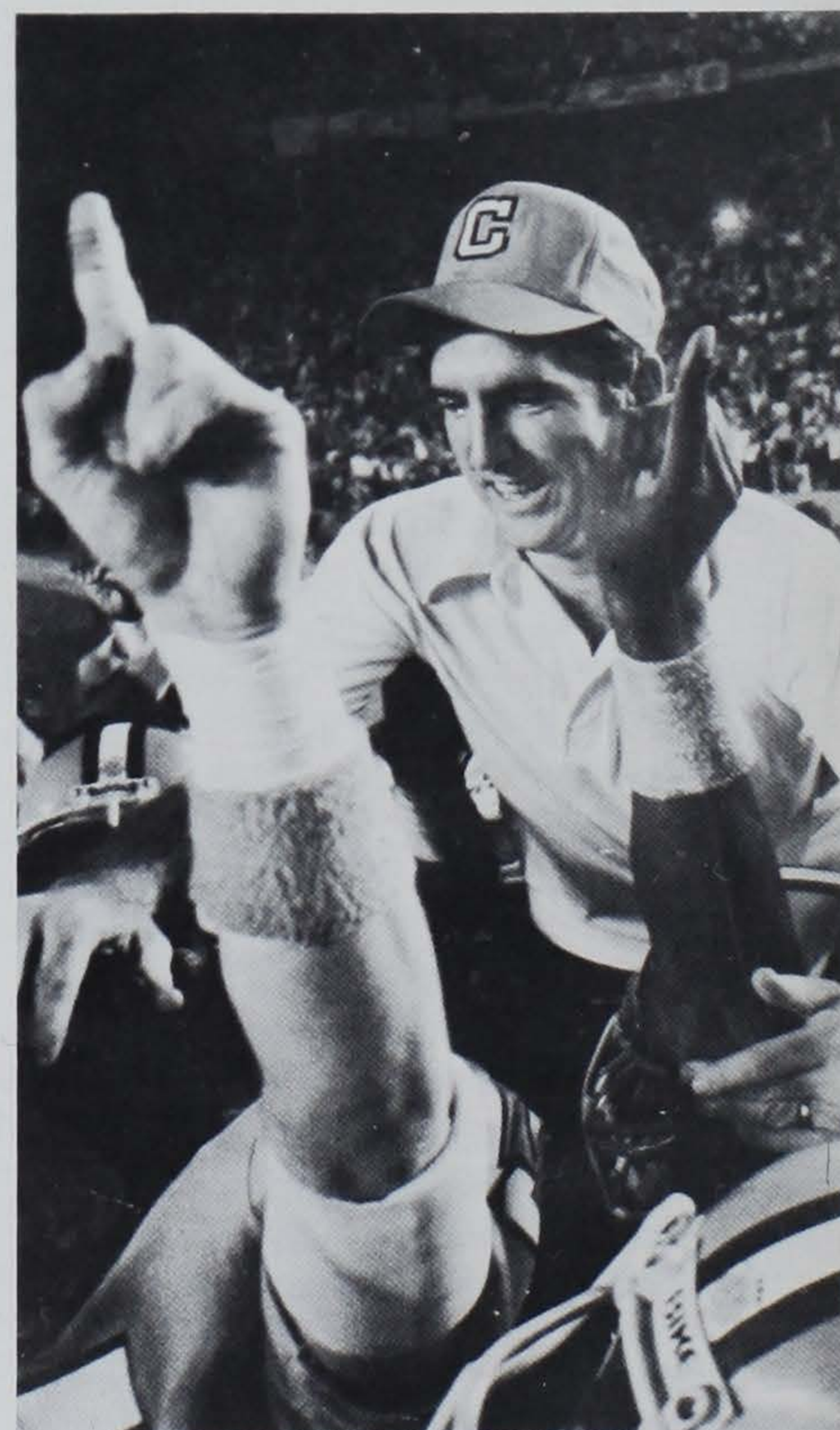
## Overall Team Weaknesses:

"Inexperience in the offensive line has to be one weakness. We have good athletes there, but they need game experience. Our cornerback situation needs to get better from an experience level also. You have to be solid at the corners because you can be beaten there faster than any place on the field."

## Overall Team Strengths:

"We are very deep in the backfield, as deep as any team Clemson has ever been. Homer Jordan coming back as a two-year starter certainly helps because he has the savvy of an experienced quarterback. Also we have an All-American free safety in Terry Kinard who should patrol the defense for us. Both Jordan and Kinard are like coaches on the field.

"Another strength is that the returning players have been in so many big games before. They know what it takes to win a championship."

# Tiger Sports Program

For the third time in the last four years the Clemson sports program has been ranked in the top five in the nation. The survey conducted by the **Knoxville Journal** takes into account national rankings in many selected sports and the Tigers have been with the elite five in 1979, 1980 and 1982. The Tigers have been in the top 30 in the last seven years so it is evident that Clemson athletics is on firm ground.

During this past season the football team's national championship was of course the highlight of the year. It was Clemson's first national championship of any sport and the first time Clemson had ever been ranked number-one during a season in football. Five Tigers received All-America mention, while Jeff Davis was named ACC Player-of-the-Year and Head Coach Danny Ford was named national Coach-of-the-Year.

But football was not the only game in town at Clemson in 1981-82. Nine teams finished in the top 20 in the nation in their respective sports' final

polls. The men's fencing team finished second, the women's cross country team, only in its third year of existence, finished sixth, the men's cross country team was ninth, men's tennis concluded the year rated seventh and the soccer team finished eighth. In addition to the six Top 10 teams, golf, women's swimming, and men's outdoor track all finished in the Top 20 in the country.

On an individual level, the Clemson program also set records. Clemson had 26 athletes receive All-America status in 1981-82, shattering the record of 18 set during the 1979-80 academic year. Additionally, more athletes than ever were chosen to All-conference teams as 62 achieved that level of distinction.

Five Clemson athletes were MVPs or individual champions of the Atlantic Coast Conference and two others chosen as the national senior Player-of-the-Year. Jeff Davis was ACC MVP in football, while the wrestling team's Todd

Sterr became the first freshman in the history of the league to be named MVP of the ACC wrestling tournament. Barbara Kennedy was MVP of the women's basketball tournament in Raleigh, NC in March, Julius Ogaro was the men's cross country champion of the ACC and teammate Hans Koeleman was named MVP of the outdoor track championships in April. Men's tennis player Mark Dickson was the ITCA Senior Player-of-the-Year for 1982, while woman's basketball player Barbara Kennedy was named Player-of-the-Year by the American Woman's Sports Foundation.

And the coaching staffs received notoriety. In the last year three head coaches, Danny Ford (football), Chuck Kriese (men's tennis) and Charlie Poteat (men's fencing) have all been chosen national Coach-of-the-Year by their peers. Additionally, Strength Training Director George Dostal was selected national Coach-of-the-Year by his peers last May.

# Head Coach Danny Ford

In just three full seasons as head coach, Danny Ford has made quite an impact on Clemson University. He has brought the Tigers to the pinnacle of college football and put Clemson in the limelight with the 1981 National Championship. Last year he was the major reason Clemson was the most improved team in the nation.

Ford deservedly was named National Coach-of-the-Year by United Press International, the American Football Coaches' Association, the Football Writers of America, and the Washington Touchdown Club, in addition to many other local football clubs. Ford is also the youngest head coach (33) ever to take a team to a national championship.

Ford is also the youngest fourth-year coach in Division I of the NCAA, but the now 34-year-old Gadsden, Alabama native has been associated with more winning teams and programs than most coaches come in contact with in a lifetime. Including his years as a player at Alabama under Bear Bryant, Ford has been associated with college football for the last 15 years. Fourteen of those clubs have had winning records and 11 have gone to bowl games. Additionally, the 15 teams have had a record of 123-47-3, a .720 winning percentage.

Ford has brought his winning attitude to Clemson University. Now in his fourth full season as a head coach, Ford has led the Tigers to a 27-9 record and three bowl games since taking over on December 10, 1978. That was a fine day in Clemson athletics because the University announced that Charley Pell had relinquished the head coaching duties of the 1978 Gator Bowl to Ford. Nearly 40 years after hiring 31-year-old Frank Howard, Clemson had hired a gifted 30-year-old to lead the Tiger forces on the gridiron.

Ford conquered all kinds of adversity in leading the Tigers to a nationally televised 17-15 triumph over perennial power Ohio State in the Gator Bowl in his very first game as head coach. Few mentors in NCAA history have made such a celebrated and successful beginning.

With this list of accomplishments, it is little wonder that the Student Affairs Committee of the Clemson Board of Trustees only considered one name as Charley Pell's successor. Danny Ford not only had the backing of Pell, but also from the members of the Clemson football team. He was then assistant head coach and offensive line coach for the Tigers. After two meetings between Ford and the committee on the morning of December 5, 1978, it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that Ford should be named Clemson's 21st head coach.

Ford began his association with college football in 1967 when he started for Bear Bryant at Alabama as Ken Stabler's sophomore tight end. He played three years for Bryant, (including three wins against Clemson) and was an All-Southeastern Conference choice, All-SEC academic selection and team captain during his senior season.

After receiving his B.S. degree in industrial arts in 1970, Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. Upon earning a master's degree in special education in 1971, he was made a full time assistant under Bryant for the 1972 and 1973 seasons. The Tide went to four more post-season games while Ford was on Bryant's staff.

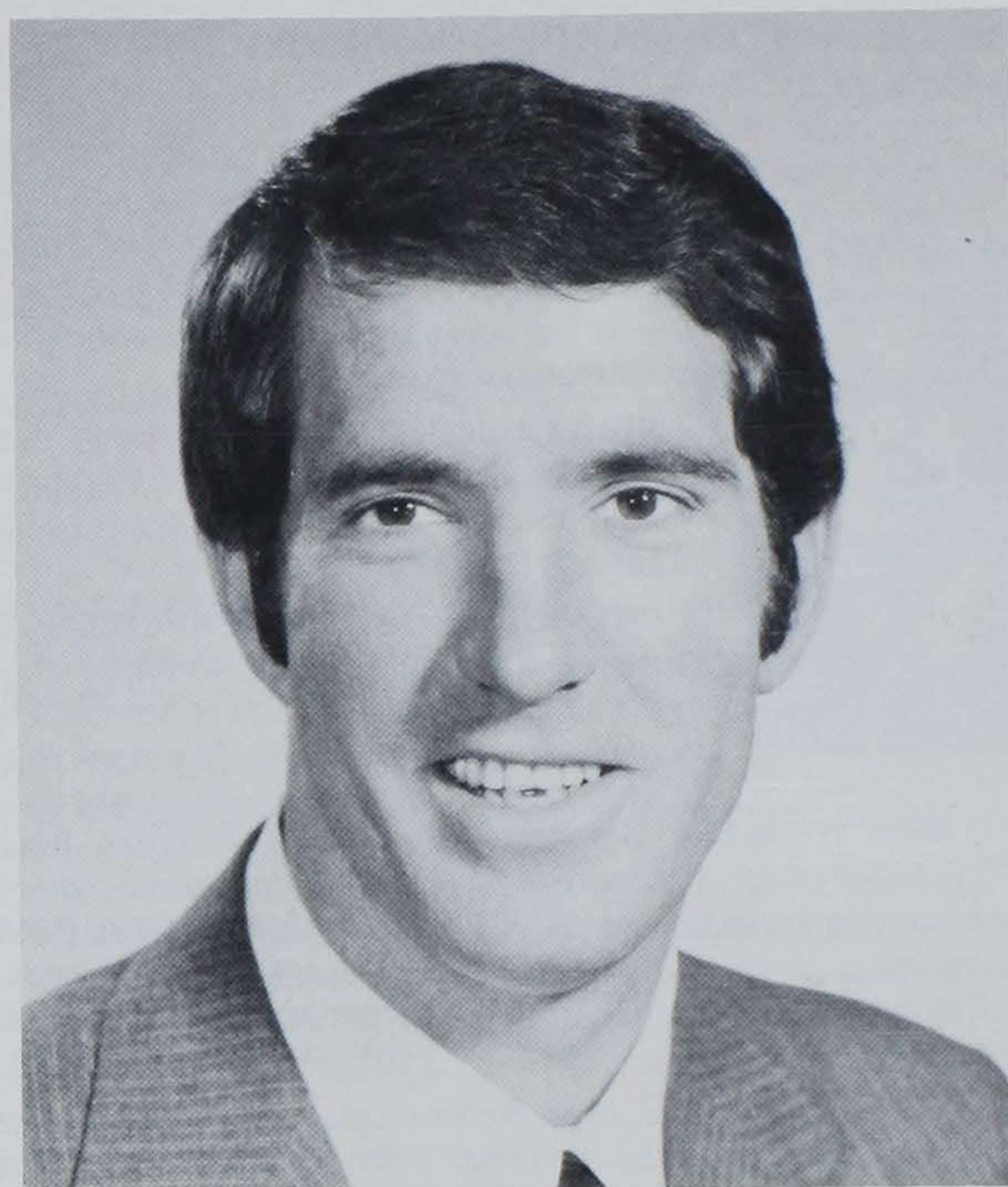
Clemson's current head man then accepted a position as an assistant coach on Jimmy Sharpe's staff at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974 to 1976), before he was beckoned to Clemson by Charley Pell, who had just been named the Tiger's head coach. Pell and Ford had served together on the VPI staff for two seasons.

And only 23 games later, Ford became head coach of the Tigers at age 30, the youngest Division I head coach in the country.

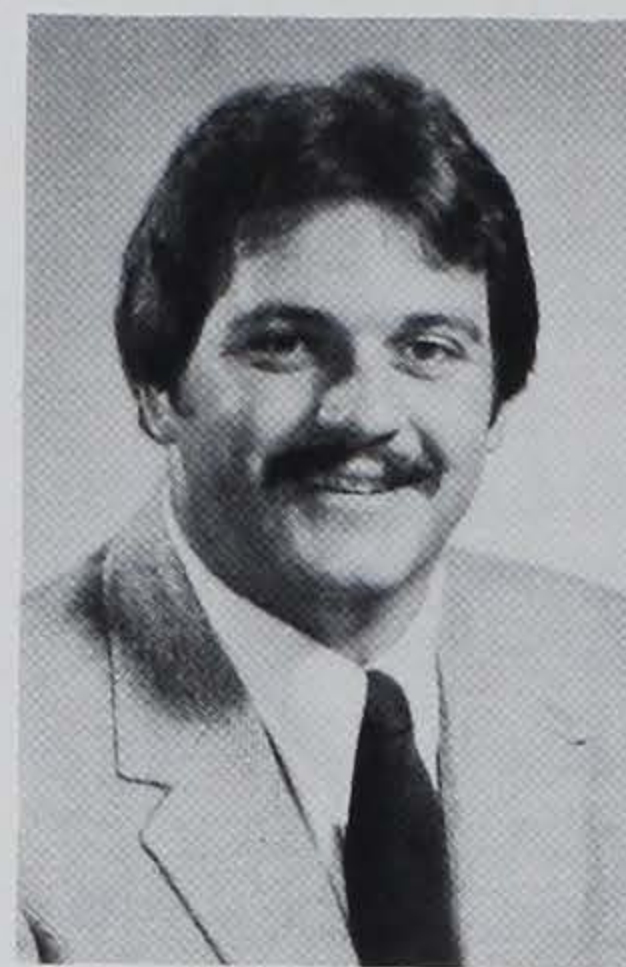

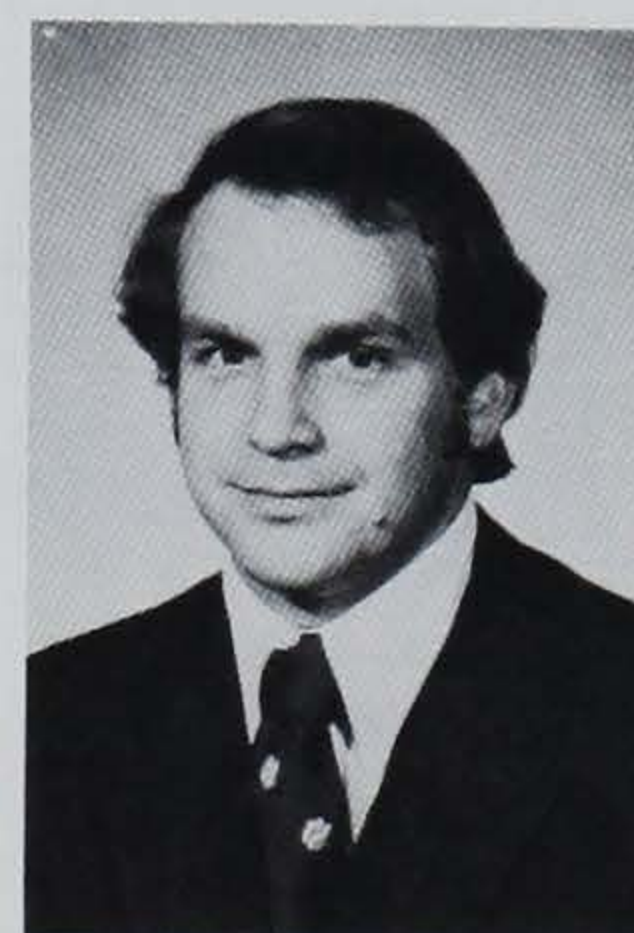

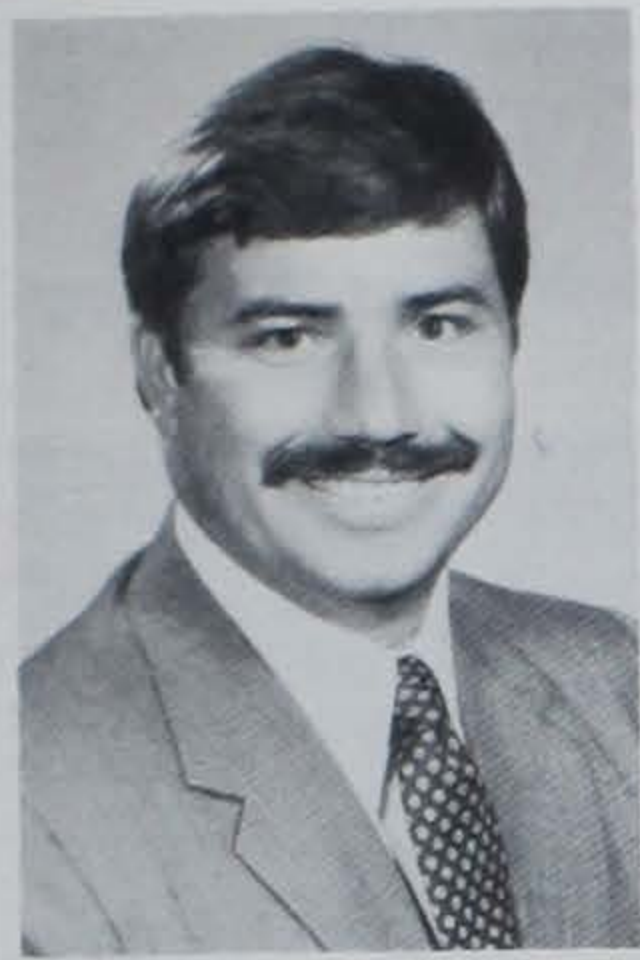

# Strength Training

When Clemson set out to build a strength training facility seven years ago they had two objectives in mind - to get the best and the most complete facility possible. They have reached the pinnacle in both phases.

Since George Dostal's arrival on the Clemson campus in 1975, the Tigers' have grown from the few machines and dead weights, to perhaps the most comprehensive strength development room in the country.

The strength training room is located in the Jervy Athletic Center under the Jervy gym and adjacent to the baseball batting tunnel. It consists of a complete set of CAM II machines for quickness, Nautilus machines for strength and flexibility and the dead weights used also for strength. The air-conditioned facility's walls are lined with pictures of present and former athletes that have reached certain strength training marks in their careers.

The facility was designed not only for the football team's training, but all of Clemson's 17 varsity sports. Additionally, Clemson's cheerleading squads use the complex to aid their stunts and strength in performing.

Dostal and his five graduate assistants-Don Telle, Jim Batey, Jim Speros, Robert Egley, and Mark Reiman-design specific programs for each athlete, taking into account their sport and position. They have estimated some 32,000 workouts take place each year in the room.

It appears as each year passes, strides are made in every sport the Tigers play. This spring, it was concluded after training tests that the 1982 edition of the Clemson football team is the strongest ever.

Thirty-two Tigers hit the 600-pound mark in total leg strength, an increase of 24 from 1980's eight players who reached that mark. Bench press totals have dropped due to emphasis placed on leg strength this year, but nonetheless 14 players were able to bench 400 pounds and six others benched 375 or better.

In total strength results, which combines leg strength with the bench press, 14 players made the 1000-pound club including William Perry, Alex Hudson, Darrin McNeely, William Devane, Dale Swing, Dan Benish, James Farr, Bob Mayberry, Cliff Austin, Rick Bailey, Jeff Cruce, Richard Hendley, Jeff McCall and Dave Noelte.

In addition to attaining one of the most complete strength training complexes in the country, Clemson's director George Dostal was named the national Coach of the Year by a vote of his peers. Three Tigers were named to the All-American Strength team last season, more than any other squad in the country. Truly, Clemson has reached its original objectives-to have the most complete and the best in strength training.

# University President



**DR. BILL LEE ATCHLEY**  
Clemson President

When Clemson went searching for a new president to replace Robert C. Edwards, who retired in the summer of 1979 after 22 years at the University's helm, the selection committee found one candidate that stood above the crowd. Dr. Bill Lee Atchley possesses a list of credentials that is impressive and noteworthy. He boasts a history of involvement that not only includes his professional career but also extends beyond the campus.

Dr. Atchley came to Clemson from West Virginia University where he was dean of the College of Engineering beginning in 1975. Under his direction, the engineering department achieved its highest enrollment in the history of the school, and became the largest research department at West Virginia. The engineering department received several grants from the federal government in the fields of energy research, occupational health and safety research, and personal rapid transit research due to Atchley's guidance.

While at West Virginia, President Atchley used his knowledge in the engineering field to work on some of the problems facing our country today. He served as the chairman of Governor's Commission on Energy, Economy, and Environment as well as acting as the science and technology advisor for the West Virginia House of Representatives and Senate. Atchley also served in a similar capacity for West Virginia Governors Rockefeller and Moore. Another committee that Atchley chaired was the state environmental committee.

President Atchley has received many honors stemming from his work in engineering. He was named to the list of Who's Who in Engineering Education and is a member of the Academy of Sciences and the Outstanding Educators of America.

He even found the time to serve as the chairman of the American Society for Engineering Education in the Midwest, became a member of the American Society for Civil Engineers, and sat on the West Virginia Board of Registration for Professional Engineers. Presently, Atchley is a member of the board of directors of the American Federal Savings and Loan Association.

Prior to his tenure at West Virginia, Atchley taught at the University of Missouri at Rolla from 1957-1975. He earned his undergraduate degree in civil engineering at Missouri in 1957 and finished his masters work in the same field in 1959 at Missouri. President Atchley then received his doctorate at Texas A&M in 1965.

A very active sports enthusiast, Atchley has a superior knowledge of athletics. His expertise is especially proficient in baseball, a sport he played professionally in the fifties with the New York Giants organization.

President Atchley and his wife, the former Pat Limbaugh, have three children. Julia is a 24-year-old who recently graduated from Southeast Mississippi University with a major in special education. Pam is a 20-year-old senior at Clemson, while David is a 16-year-old junior at nearby Daniel High School.

# Athletic Director

Intercollegiate athletics have undergone many changes in the last few years, and under Athletic Director Bill McLellan's guidance, Clemson has become a leader on the national sports scene.

In the last five years Clemson's sports program has made a meteoric rise on the national scene. McLellan's administration is the major reason Clemson's sports program has been ranked in the top 30 in the nation the last six years, and three times in the last four years the Tigers have been

ranked in the top five.

Only the third man to own the title of athletic director at Clemson over the last 48 years, McLellan was elevated to his present position February 4, 1971, following what had been more than a decade of service to the University's athletic organization.

A native of Hamer, S.C. the 49-year old McLellan graduated from Dillon High School and entered Clemson where he earned a pair of football letters, and was a member of the Tigers' 1952 Gator Bowl team.

He joined the athletic staff May 1, 1958 from Clemson's Department of Agricultural Economics and Seed Certification where he had spent one year as assistant agronomist and two years as assistant economist.

Although carrying the title of assistant business manager, McLellan has been credited with handling the majority of the department's athletic business and operation long before his appointment into his present role.

In 1966, McLellan was named assistant athletic director and two years later was appointed associated athletic director.

During his reign as athletic director, Clemson's athletic program has experienced a major upheaval.

The Tigers can boast of the finest athletic facilities in not only the Atlantic Coast Conference, but in the South as well.

The modern and spacious Jervy Athletic Center is one of the most complete facilities in America, and this complex serves as the home for Clemson's 17 sports - 11 men's and six women's.

The basketball Tigers play before packed crowds in attractive Littlejohn Coliseum, and many of the Clemson games are telecast on either regional or national networks.

And the football Tigers, after averaging better than 61,000 at home last fall, play in a remodeled Memorial Stadium this year that will hold some 57,307 people.

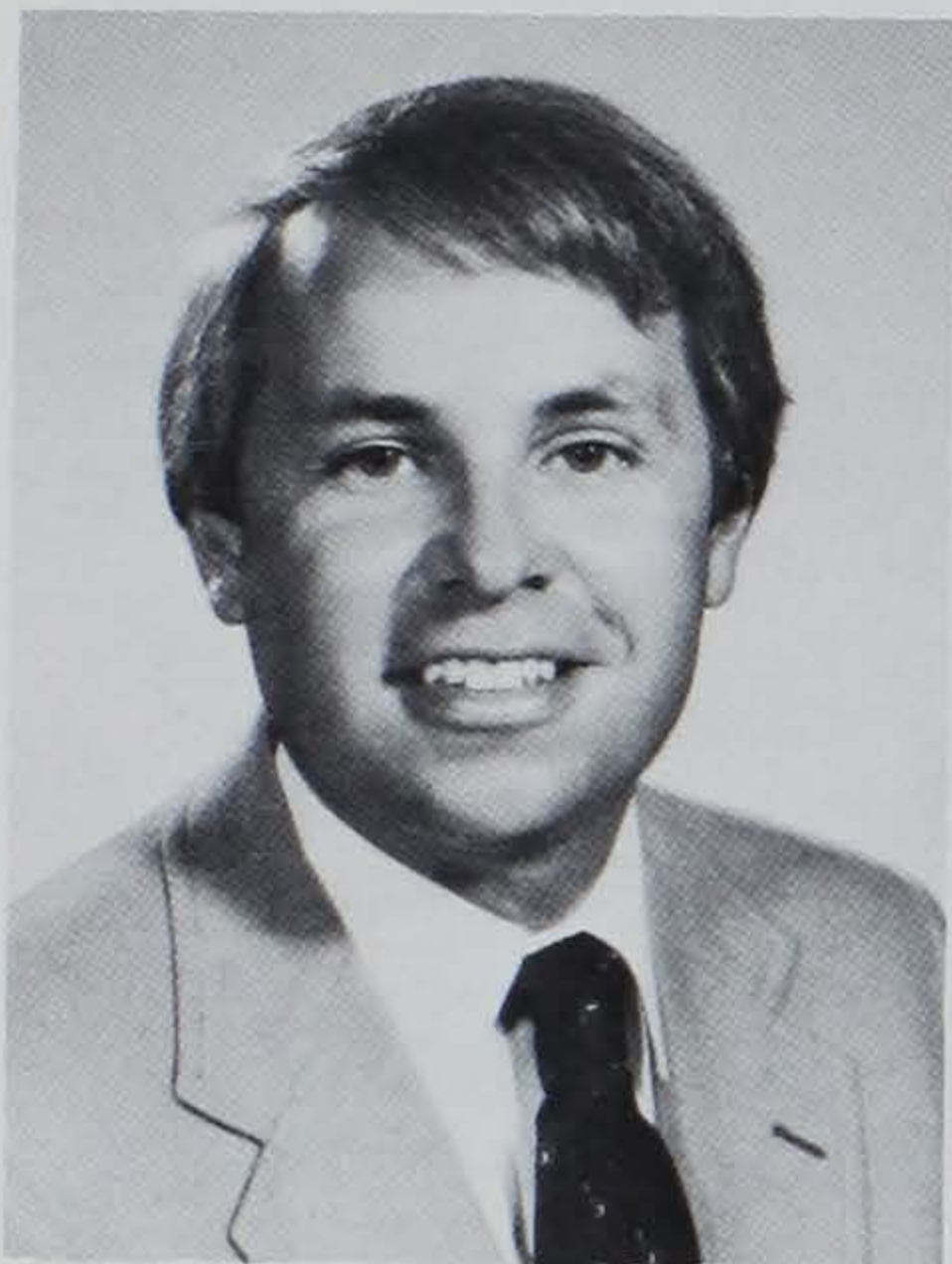

Clemson's athletic department has a multi-million dollar budget, and the person in charge of the purse strings is Associate Athletic Director Bobby Robinson. Robinson, who came to the athletic department in 1973, has done an outstanding job as Clemson's financial success has occurred under his guidance.

Robinson's responsibilities include budgeting Clemson's 17 varsity sports, making travel arrangements for the various teams, administering the grant-in-aid program, hiring athletic department personnel, arranging contracts for the department, and handling all purchases.

Robinson is also the golf coach for the Tigers, in addition to his duties as associate athletic director. This past spring, he led the golf team to its first Atlantic Coast Conference team title and a number-16 ranking in the NCAA championships. Robinson graduated from Furman University in 1968 with a BS degree in business and political science. He was a member of the varsity golf team and the president of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity chapter at Furman.

Robinson worked in his family's business in Columbia after graduation, and in 1970, was hired to work in the Office of Student Affairs at Clemson. In 1973, he moved to the athletic department and was named assistant to the athletic director in charge of business operations. In 1980, he was elevated to his present position.

Robinson was born in Columbia, SC, and graduated from A.C. Flora High School in 1964. While in high school, Robinson lettered in golf, football, basketball and baseball. He was also a member of the National Honor Society and the Key Club.

The 33-year-old Robinson is single.

## **EARLE AMBROSE, Assistant to the Athletic Director**



Earle Ambrose is a man of many talents for the athletic department. In his role as assistant to the athletic director, Ambrose is responsible for negotiating various contracts for the department, assisting the athletic director in administrative functions, and overseeing the ticket operations for all Clemson sports. Additionally, Ambrose ferries teams to athletic events and coaches on recruiting trips as the pilot for the Tigers.

Ambrose came to Clemson in 1973 to assume direction of the ticket office. He was promoted to the position of assistant to the athletic director in 1979 after serving as ticket manager for six years. During

Clemson's IPTAY club has been recognized as the number-one scholarship fund-raising organization in America the last few years and executive secretary Joe Turner has been one of the reasons behind IPTAY's phenomenal growth.

IPTAY received a record 2.9 million dollars in 1979-80, Turner's first year as executive director, and last year the success continued as the organization hit four million for the first time ever.

Turner graduated from Clemson with a BS degree in industrial management in 1971, and while he was an undergraduate, he was a Dean's List student. He was a member of the Blue Key and Tiger Brotherhood honorary fraternities and he was named to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. Turner was president of the Pi Kappa Alpha chapter at Clemson during 1970-71 and after graduation he was named to the national executive board of that fraternity.

Turner's professional service to Clemson began in 1971 when he took the position of associate director of alumni relations. During his tenure with the Alumni Association, Turner completed work on his master's degree in management. He was named executive secretary of IPTAY in 1979.

Bradley was elected president of CoSIDA, the national organization of sports information directors, during 1974-75. He received the Arch Ward award as CoSIDA Man-of-the-Year in 1976 and he also

was elected by his peers to the organization's Hall of Fame. Under his direction, the Clemson Sports Information Department won nine awards for their brochures and press guides during 1979-80. That figure was the second highest total among Division I schools in the country that year. The SID office won six more awards during 1980-81 and garnered an additional nine awards this past year. Included in the nine awards were six national award-winning press guides, more than any school in the country.

During his college days at Clemson, Bradley was the editor of The Tiger, the student newspaper. As well as being editor and sports editor of that weekly publication, Bradley also worked for the Greenville News-Piedmont on both a full and part-time basis. Bradley graduated from Clemson in 1951 with a BS degree in textile manufacturing. He served in the Air Force for four years.

**FRED HOOVER, Head Trainer**

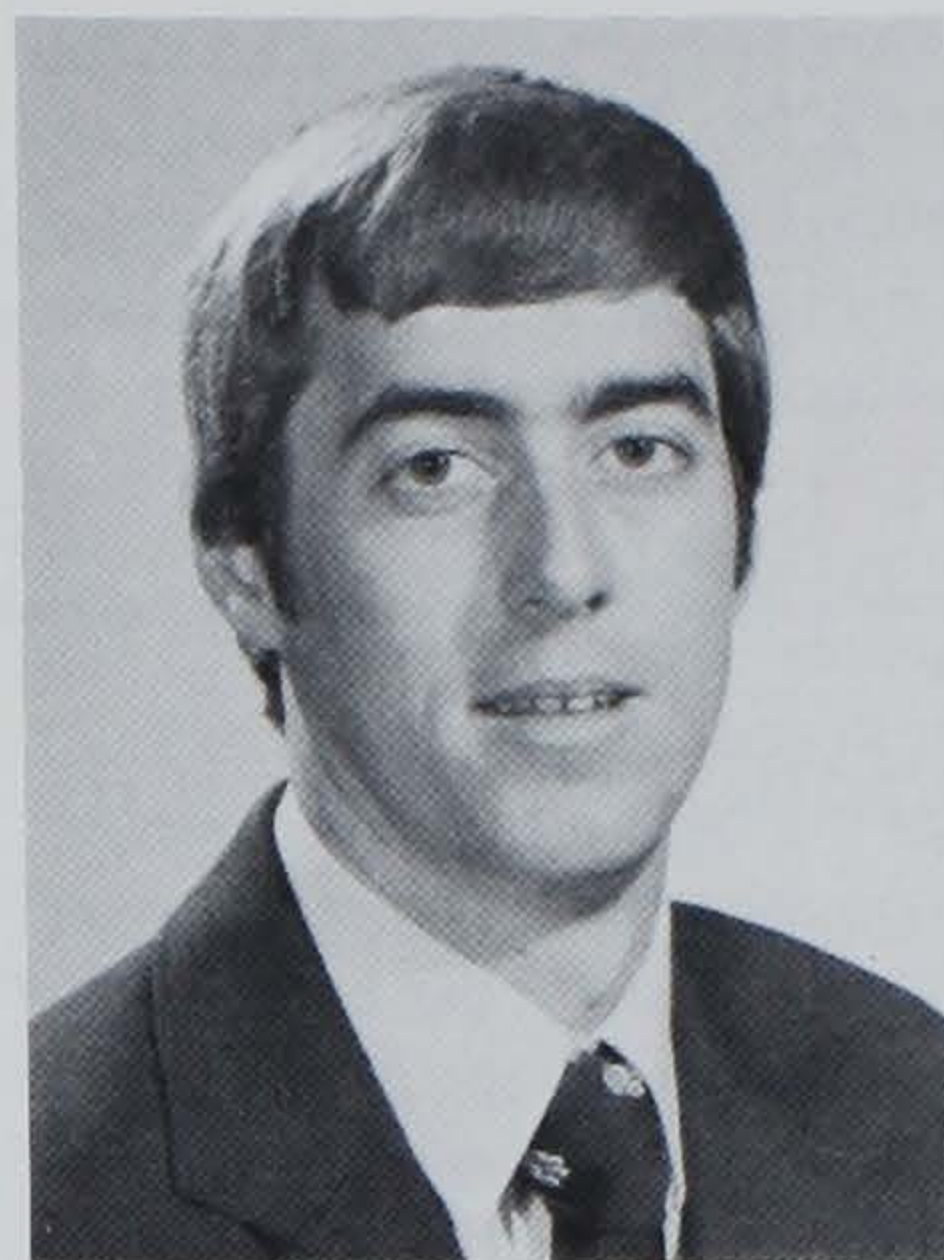

**VAN HILDERBRAND, Ticket Manager**

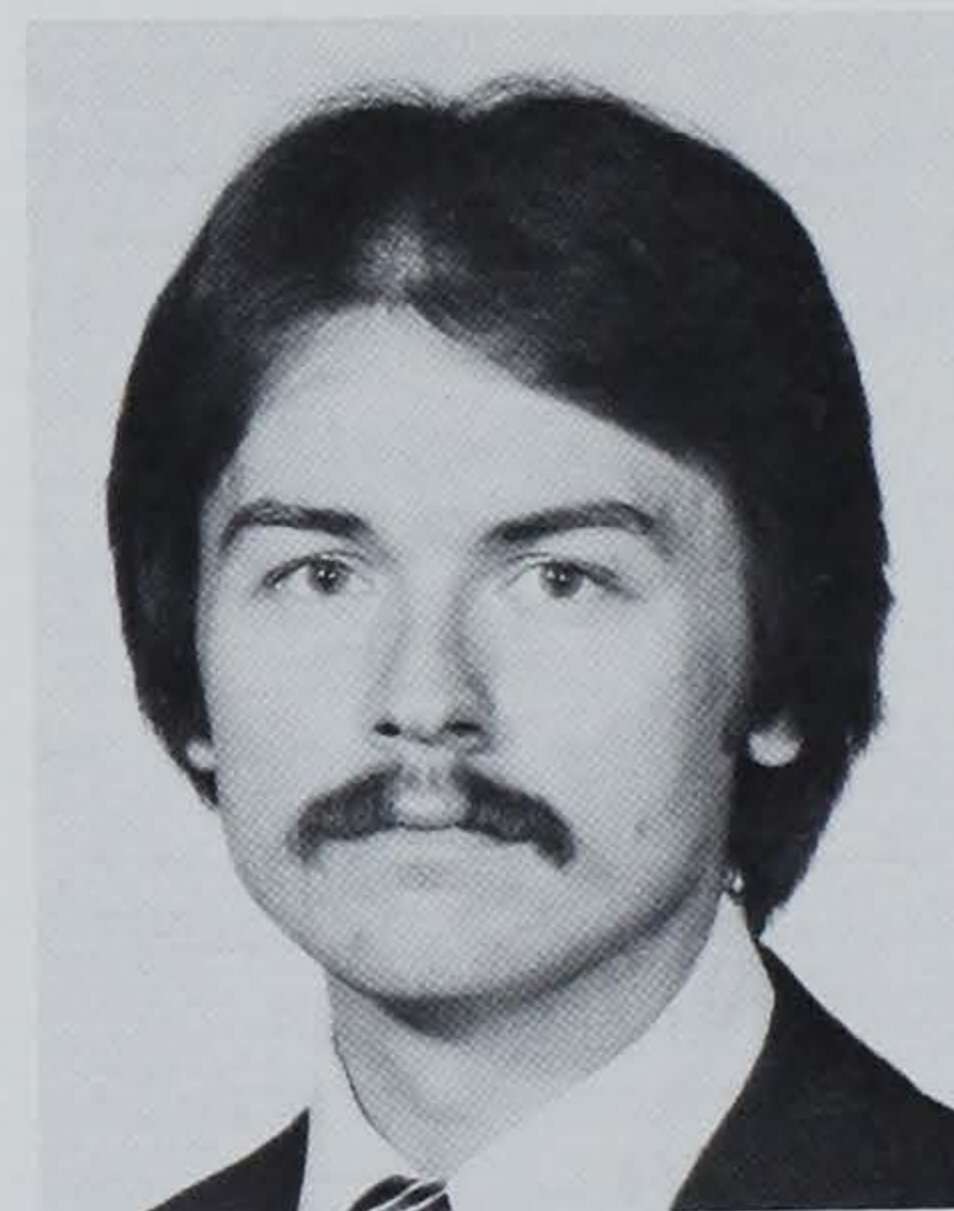

Packing for extended road trips is becoming one of Gough's specialties, as the Tigers have gone to four bowl games in the last five years and the basketball team regularly travels to Christmas tournaments. For each of these one-week or longer trips, Gough overcomes a multitude of problems in moving the playing and support equipment from Clemson to Miami, FL, or to Portland, OR, and back again.

Gough comes from a Clemson family as his father, Samuel, is a graduate and his brothers--Sammy and Jim--were student managers while they were undergraduates. Gough, himself, graduated in December '74 with a Bachelor's degree in textile technology.

## GEORGE DOSTAL, Strength Training Director



Clemson has been ranked in the nation's Top 5 in overall sports excellence three of the last four years and a great deal of the credit for that accomplishment should go to Strength Training Director George Dostal.

Dostal, who is entering his seventh year at Clemson, has built one of the best strength programs and possibly the finest weight training facilities in the nation during his tenure. For his accomplishments, Dostal was named District II strength training Coach-of-the-

Year in 1981 and he was named National Strength and Conditioning Coach-of-the-Year by the National Strength Coaches Association in 1982.

Born in Cleveland, OH, Dostal was a National Honor Society student and standout athlete at East Cleveland Shaw High School, and he went on to earn 12 varsity letters in football, baseball, track, and swimming at Kent State, where he was named All-Mid America Conference in three sports.

The 48-year-old Dostal then served as a Naval intelligence officer and UDT Specialist. As a star player with his Navy baseball team, Dostal was sought by the New York Giants, but could not get a military release to play professionally.

Dostal received a BS in education from Kent State in '62, and his master's in education in '67. Dostal is married to the former Mary Anne Addis, who is the Clemson athletic director's secretary. The Dostals are the parents of four sons, Steve, Stan, T.D., and Jay J.

## JOE WHITE, Academic Advisor



Joe White is the "brain coach" for all 17 of Clemson's sports. As the academic advisor, White's job is to ensure the achievements of the nearly 400 Clemson athletes in the classroom equals or surpasses those of the playing field.

The 36-year-old White is entering his second year as academic advisor. He came to Clemson in the spring of 1981 from Virginia Tech where he had served in a similar capacity for five years.

A native of Elizabeth City, NC, White received his BS degree in physical education from Campbell College in 1968. After graduation, he taught physical education and coached in the public school system in Fayetteville, NC, until 1971.

White joined the VPI coaching staff as JV secondary coach in 1972, and was promoted to head JV coach in 1975. He was named academic advisor in 1976.

In addition to his duties as academic advisor at Virginia Tech, White was in charge of the football program for the Hokie all-sports camp for three summers. He also worked as a counselor for the school's basketball camp in 1980.

White is married to the former Joyce Davies of Gastonia, NC. They met in college while he was playing baseball and she was a cheerleader for the Camels. The Whites are the parents of two children, Michelle (7/28/73) and Chris (5/25/77).

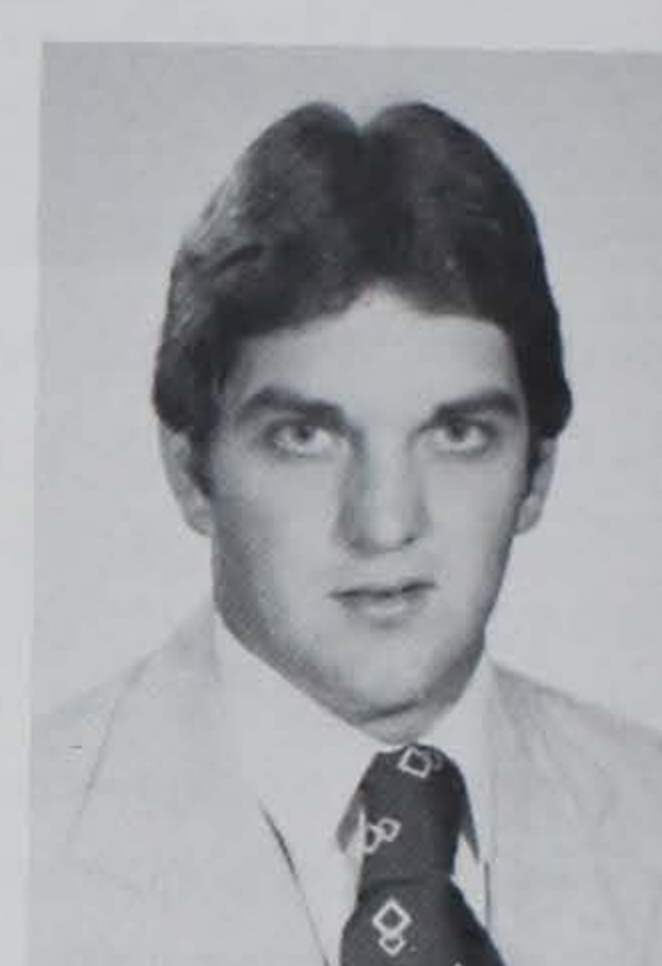

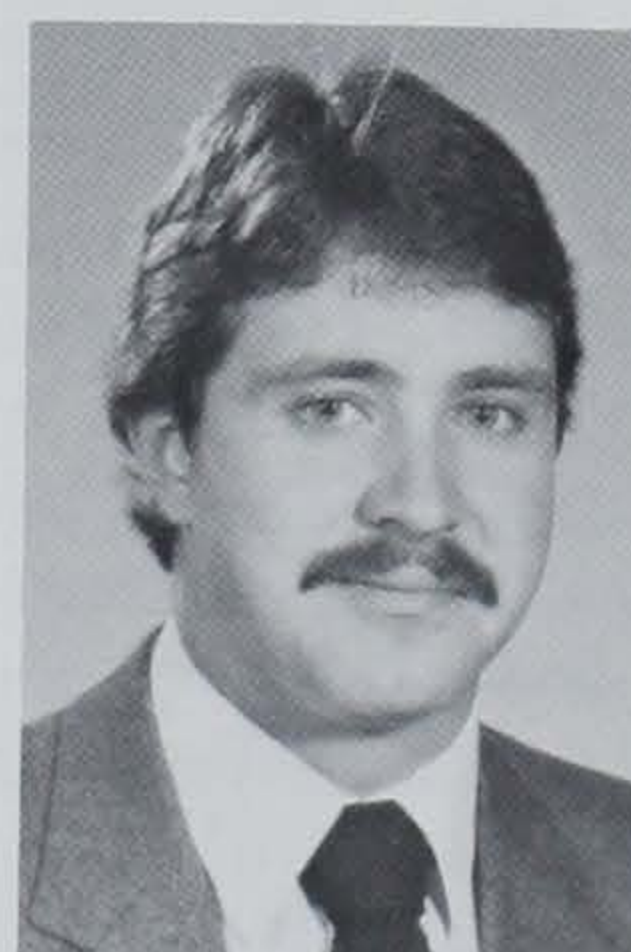

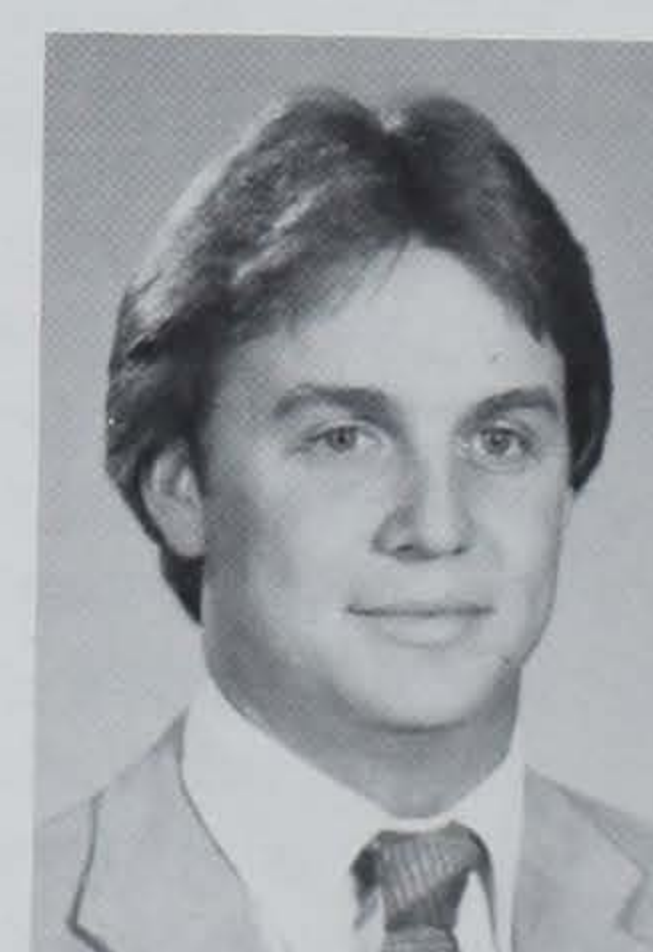

# Clemson Memorial Stadium

For the past several years, the old problem of supply and demand has been causing headaches for the Clemson ticket office. With ticket demands going through the roof and only a limited amount of seats, something had to be done.

After two years of work, and eight million dollars of capital investment, the new addition was finished. The upper deck, which makes "Death Valley" look even more ominous to visiting opponents, seats an additional 9,855 Tiger faithful. The upper deck, plus the new 4,000 additional end zone seats brings the total permanent seating capacity of Memorial Stadium to 57,307.

## Tiger Radio Network

Since 1968, Clemson fans have heard Jim Phillips describing all of the play-by-play action of Tiger football and basketball games, and 1982 will be no different as Phillips enters his 15th season as the "Voice of the Tigers."

Phillips is now a veteran of over 170 Clemson football games and has never missed broadcasting a Tiger basketball game. That streak covers an incredible 386 consecutive games.

The former President of the Atlantic Coast Conference Sportswriter Association also serves as host of Clemson football and basketball coaches shows on radio and television. He was also a veteran of a dozen years as Sports Director at WFBC-TV.

Phillips has been named sportscaster-of-the-year for the State of South Carolina five times and he is regarded as the top play-by-play man in the state and one of the best in the South.

A native of Youngstown, OH, Phillips is also the sports director of WFBC-radio in Greenville, SC, where he hosts a successful sports talk show that airs five nights a week.

Prior to coming to Greenville, Phillips did play-by-play for Kent State University in both football and basketball for two years. During that period, he was the sports and program

director for WFAH radio in Alliance, OH. He also free-lanced a late night sports show on WJAN-TV in Canton, OH.

Tim Bourret will handle the color commentary for the Tiger football network. Clemson's associate sports information director has worked with Phillips on Tiger basketball games the last three years, but this will be his first year on football broadcasts. Bourret, a 1977 Notre Dame graduate, was recently named as an Outstanding Young Man of America.

WFBC AM/FM, headed by general manager Bruce Buchanan, will again be the flagship station for the Clemson Network, with as many as 70 stations to air the Clemson games for 1982. The network will be handled through the office of Greg Anderson at WFBC in Greenville. ### The Clemson IPTAY Club

IPTAY, organized in 1934 by the late Dr. Rupert H. (Rube) Fike, completed its 48th year this past June 30th. And for the 16th consecutive year, contributions exceeded those of the previous 12 months.

IPTAY stood for "I Pay Ten A Year" in the early days, and the first club's membership list included 185 members.

Today, more than 17,000 members form IPTAY, which because of inflation, now means "I Pay Thirty A Year."

Sometimes called "the finest collegiate scholarship club in America," IPTAY funds are used for the sole purpose of educating student-athletes. Not one single penny has ever been used for any other purpose.

# That Record-Breaking Tiger

For approximately 30 years, Tiger fans have been amused and entertained by a furry funny-man. The Tiger has prowled the sidelines performing his comical antics delighting both young and old. But, in 1978, Tiger mascot Zack Mills, started a new tradition by performing pushups after each Tiger tally.

At first though, this task does not appear too difficult, but the catch is that the pushups are done cumulatively. When the Tigers scored to bring their point total to 17, the Tiger would do 17 pushups. Then, if the Tigers managed another score, the mascot would perform 24 pushups. During the 1978 season, Zack Mills established a NCAA single season record for school mascots while he accounted for 1334 pushups.

Mills, who served as the Tiger for two seasons, relinquished his Tiger suit to Ricky Capps for the 1980 season. Capps picked right up where Zack left off. Under the direction of second-year head coach Danny Ford, the Tigers accumulated 217 points, while Ricky performed 600 pushups. During the Wake Forest game, Capps amassed 163 pushups, his greatest output of the 1980 campaign. In fact, the Tigers 35-33 victory over the Deacons gave Ricky his only output over the century mark.

However, in 1981, Homer Jordan and his entourage managed to put 338 points on the board in 12 games. Because of the efforts of the 1981 National Champion Clemson Tigers, Capps concluded his senior season with 1155 pushups, which almost doubled his 1980 efforts, and 1755 career pushups.

By far, the most exhausting and most productive day for Ricky Capps came on Halloween Day 1981. The 60,000 fans not only witnessed the setting of 11 Clemson records and the tying of three others, but also saw the breaking of four conference records, and the setting of three new stadium marks.

But in addition, they watched as Ricky Capps set a new record for the most pushups in a single game. During the encounter with the Demon Deacons of Wake Forest, Capps successfully completed 465 pushups, while Danny Ford's Tigers placed a remarkable 82 points on the scoreboard of Death Valley.

The mascot from Wake Forest showed how spirited he was when the Tigers scored their 76th point. Capps was near the point of exhaustion when the Deacon came over to aid his fellow ACC adversary. The Deacon did 76 pushups for the Tiger, as the fans counted in cadence. After the Tigers scored again making their point total 82, Capps managed to complete the final 82 pushups. At the conclusion of the Wake Forest game, Capps had lost 10 pounds and retreated to his "Tiger Den" for a well-deserved nap.

In addition to doing pushups, Ricky has been seen parading around the field as a game official, while on other occasions, Capps could be spotted watching TV in the end zone during halftime. Although Ricky has experienced many thrilling moments as the Tiger, the highlight of his Tiger mascot career occurred in the 1982 Orange Bowl. The Tiger was asked to dot the "I" in the Tiger Band's pregame formation of "TIGERS". The dotting of the "I" is an honor that in the past had been reserved for state governors, U.S. Senators, IPTAY directors and other prominent South Carolinians.

Ricky Capps will turn over the duties of being the Tiger to Randy Faile, a former JV cheerleader, just as Capps was two years earlier, for the 1982 gridiron season. Ricky graduated last spring. We can only hope that Faile spends his summer months practicing his pushups for the fall season as the 1981 national champions prepare to defend their title, and attempt to break more scoring (and pushup) records.

# Clemson University

## ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

### Brief History

Clemson University has been a land-grant, state-assisted institution since its founding in 1889. It was then that the General Assembly of South Carolina accepted the bequest of Thomas Green Clemson, which set aside the bulk of the Clemson estate for the founding of a technical and scientific institution. Clemson College formally opened in July 1893 with an enrollment of 446 students.

In 1955 the college changed from "military" to "civilian" status for students and became coeducational. Clemson awarded its first Doctor of Philosophy degree in 1960 to a student in plant pathology. In 1964, in recognition of expanded academic offerings and research pursuits, the legislature formally changed the college's name to Clemson University.

### Administration

The University is governed by a board of 13 members, including six elected by the state legislature and seven self-perpetuating life members, in accord with the will of Thomas G. Clemson. The board is primarily responsible for setting policy and approving budgets and expenditures. The University's day-to-day operations are administered by its president; vice presidents for academic affairs, business and finance, and student affairs; and the president's executive staff.

### Campus

The University campus, located on the former plantation of statesman John C. Calhoun, consists of 600 acres and represents an investment of approximately \$270 million in academic and administrative buildings, student, staff and faculty housing, service facilities and equipment - 77 percent of which have been constructed since 1950. While offering these excellent modern facilities, the University retains its air of tradition through such landmarks as Fort Hill, the home of the Calhouns and Clemsons; Tillman Hall with its clock tower, the statue of Thomas Clemson, and the Outdoor Theater.

The campus is surrounded by 20,860 acres of University farms and woodlands devoted to research in forestry, agriculture, and agricultural engineering. In addition, 9,698 acres throughout the state are devoted to Agricultural Experiment Station research and 4-H Club work, for a total of 31,195 real estate acres.

## School Colors and Nickname

The late William J. Latimer, a 1906 graduate of Clemson College, did some extensive research on the football program at his alma mater, and offered the following in regard to the school's nickname and colors:

Professor Walter Merritt Riggs, who coached Clemson's first varsity football team in 1896, and who also served as head coach again in 1899, is said to have "planted the seed" for the school's grid program.

In referring to the players from that first team, Latimer said, "Due to the lack of helmets and head protection they (the players) wore long hair. These long manes might have gained them the name the Lions had it not been for the orange and purple striped jerseys and stockings that resembled tigers. The latter nickname seemed to stick."

Latimer then observed about John Heisman's 1900 Clemson team: "They had been called Tigers early in their career. And Clemson used the insignia of a Tiger's head with bared fangs, with the motto 'Eat 'Em Up Clemson' before Heisman's day."

Latimer's findings are substantiated by the fact that Riggs had played football at Auburn (nicknamed Tigers) and that its colors were orange and blue.

The official colors of the school are Northwest Purple and Burnt Orange, with the predominant colors on today's athletic uniforms being orange and white.

Joe Sherman '34, former Clemson sports publicist, news bureau director, and director of Clemson's alumni relations, offered the following in his book, **The Clemson Tigers**, which was published in 1976:

"It is extremely doubtful that anyone can tell you with certainty how the Clemson colors swung from purple (and a rather pale purple, at that) and gold to what for several years was described as 'Northwestern purple and burnt orange.'"

"But that the colors have changed, unofficially if not officially, is a fact and there is a story about it that is probably as good as any other explanation."

"It says that in the early years of Jess Neely's tenure, he found it almost impossible to get uniforms in purple and gold that would be 'color fast.' In other words, between constant exposure to both the weather and the washing machines, the purple and gold faded markedly and became difficult, if not impossible, to recognize for what they were supposed to be."

"So, working with professional color people in the school of textiles and with sporting goods manufacturers, Neely finally arrived at deeper

colors (a slightly deeper purple and a gold that became orange) that were more color fast in that they held up better under the rays of the sun, the agitations of the washing machine and the carry-over from season to season."

Still, most people believe that the purple and orange are the true colors.

The Clemson Tiger was modified somewhat in the summer of 1970, and to separate him from the other tigers at other schools, the university adopted the tiger paw. The paw did not replace the Tiger, but the two go hand-in-hand, or should we say foot-in-foot.

Clemson had the best freshman kicking combination in the country in Donald Igwebuike and Dale Hatcher. Igwebuike, also a Clemson soccer player, kicked three field goals in the Orange Bowl and Hatcher led the ACC in punting.

Tigermania begins at an early age at Clemson.

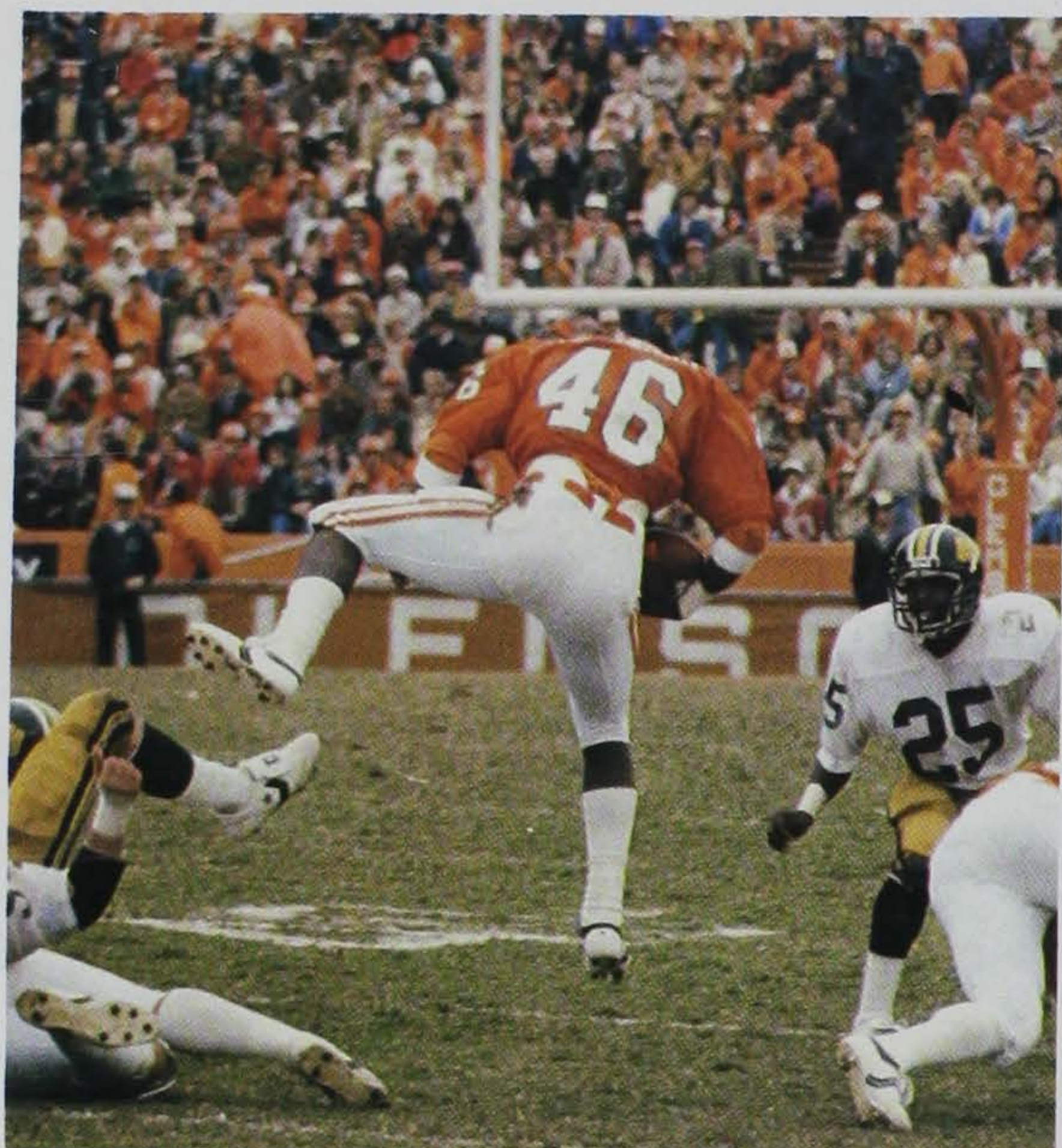


Clemson began attracting attention at mid-season and played to some sort of TV audience in seven of the 12 games in the championship season.



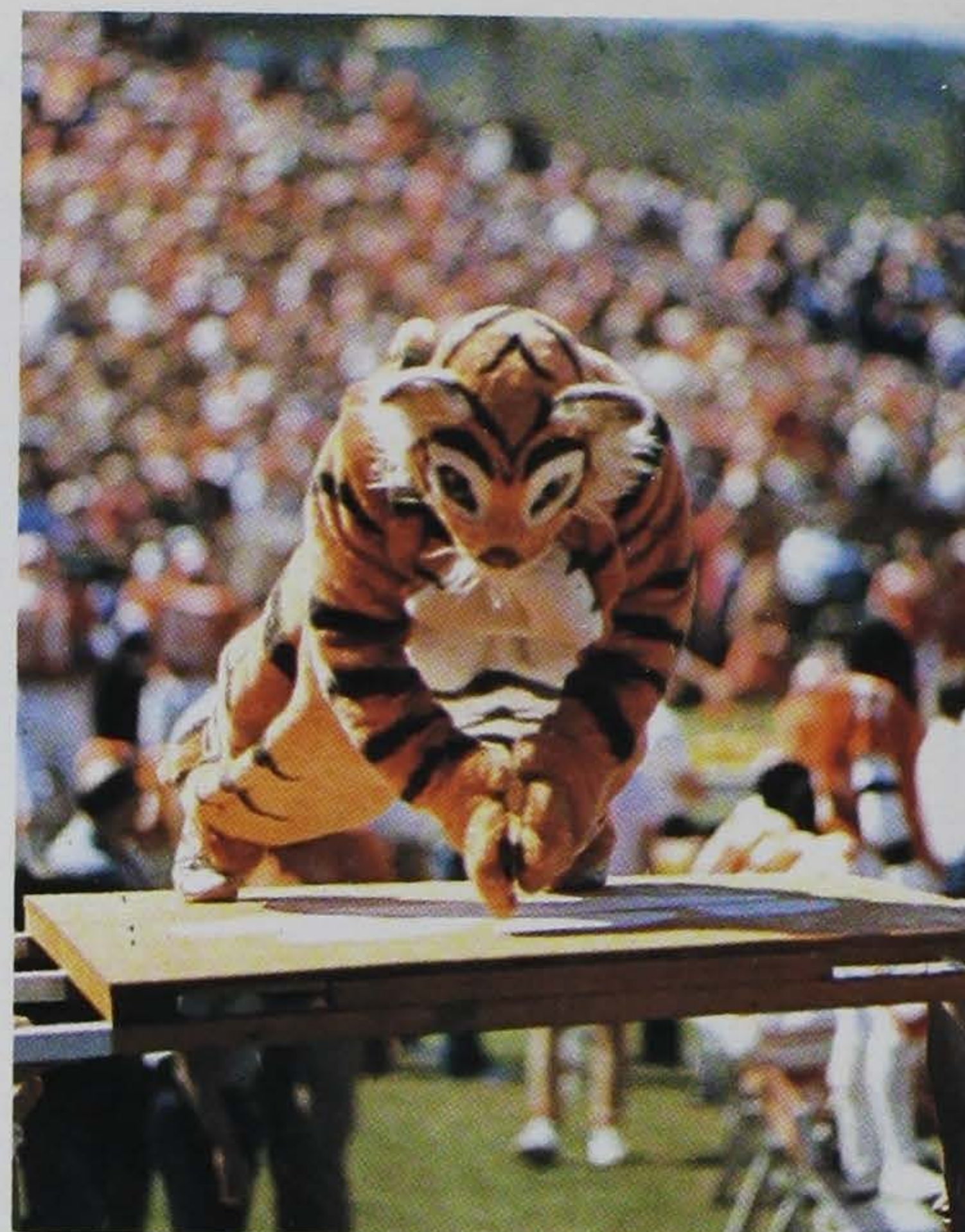

Halloween in Death Valley was a nightmare for Wake Forest as the Clemson offensive line formed gaping holes in the Deacon defense. The Tigers ground out 536 yards rushing and gained 756 yards in total offense, both all-time Clemson marks. And there were many other marks established as the Tigers set or tied 21 school, conference or stadium records in an 82-24 win that had the nation buzzing.

Even the Tiger set some records on this day as mascot Ricky Capps set the single game pushup record with 465. He had lost 10 pounds by the game's end, more than the starting players, who were relaxing on the bench by the third quarter.



Clemson spirit reached an all-time high by November as the Tigers reached the top five after the win at Duke.

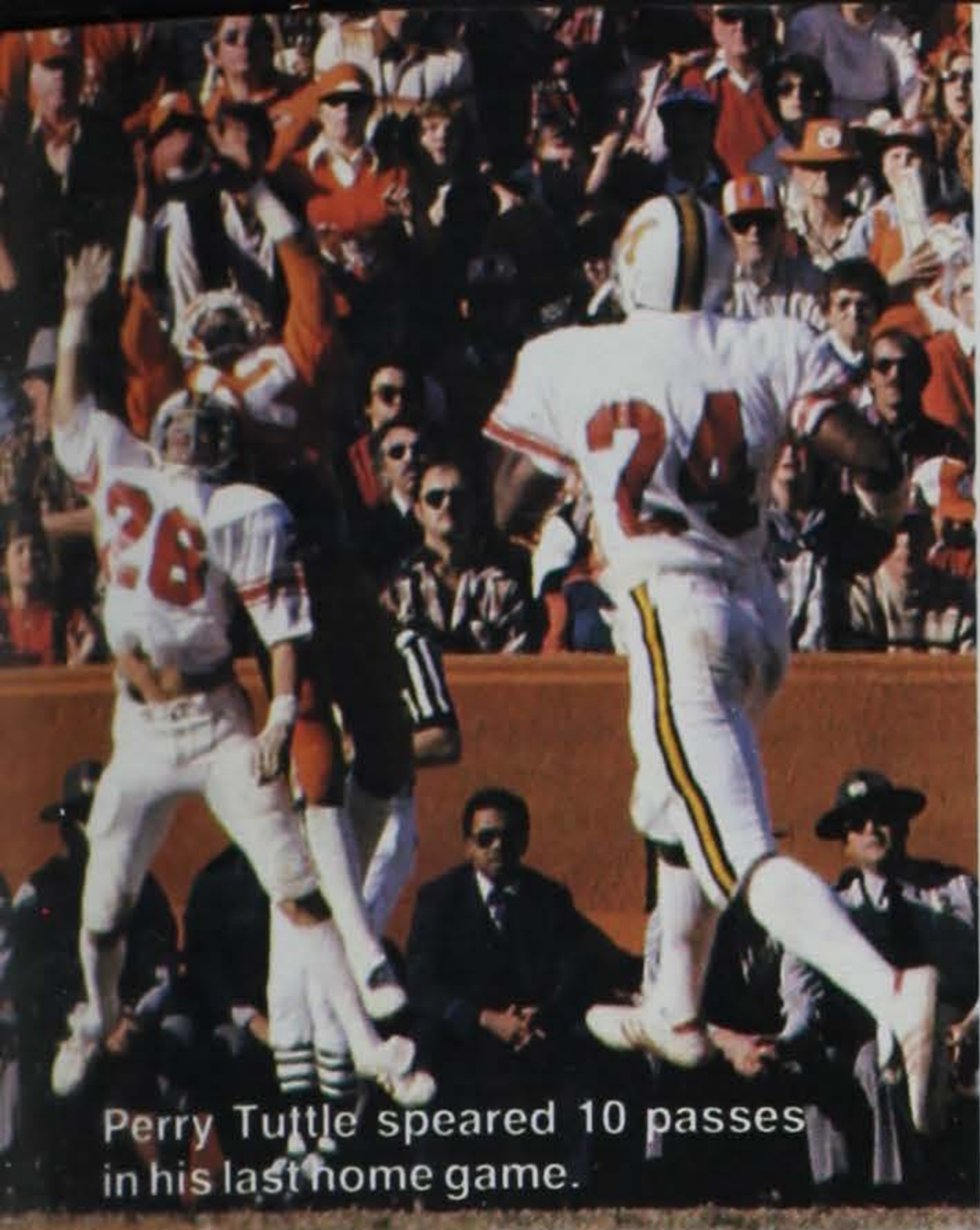
The ACC Game-of-the-Century took place in Chapel Hill on a regional TV audience that went to over 60 percent of the nation. Never before had two top 10 teams from the ACC met in the regular season.

The power struggle turned out to be a defensive battle, as shown by the picture at the right. Dan Benish, Joe Glenn and the rest of the Tiger front held the vaunted North Carolina ground game to 84 yards in 42 carries and forced four fumbles.

Homer Jordan hit 7-10 passes and Jeff McCall rushed for 84 yards and the game's only touchdown, but in the end it was the defense that made the difference. Jeff Bryant's alert recovery of a North Carolina lateral sealed Clemson's 10-8 victory and number-two national ranking.



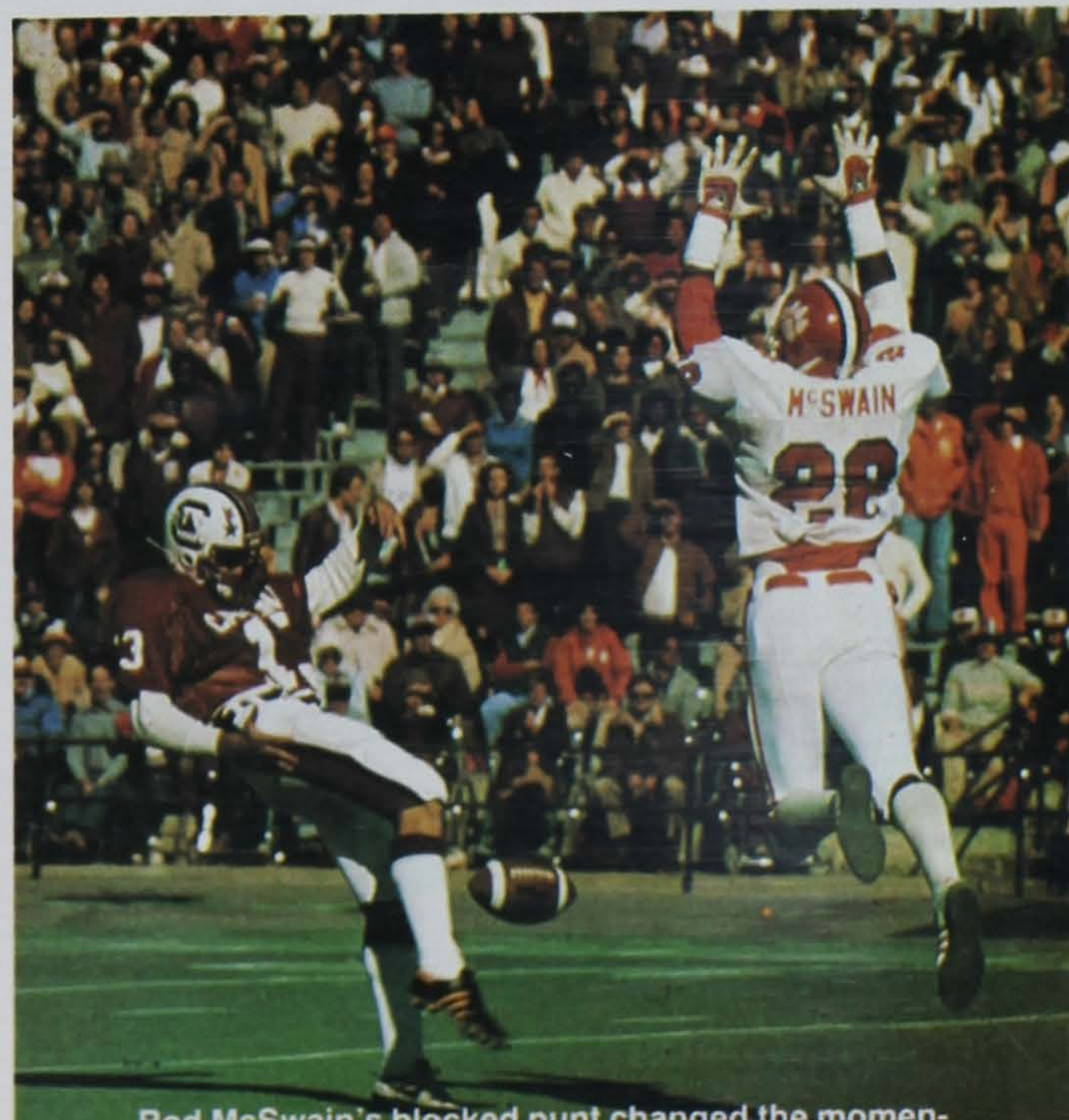

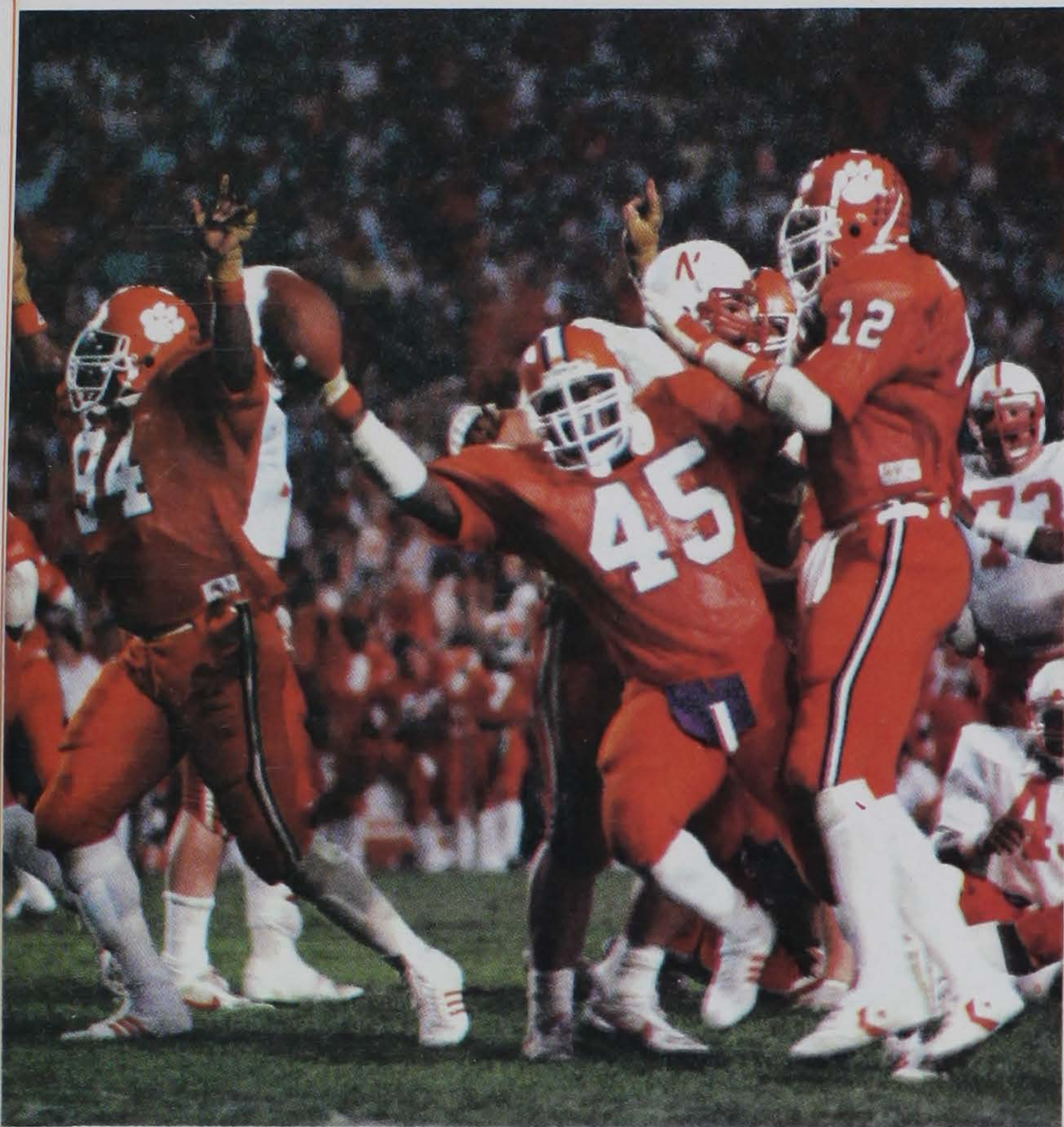

Rod McSwain's blocked punt changed the momentum at South Carolina.

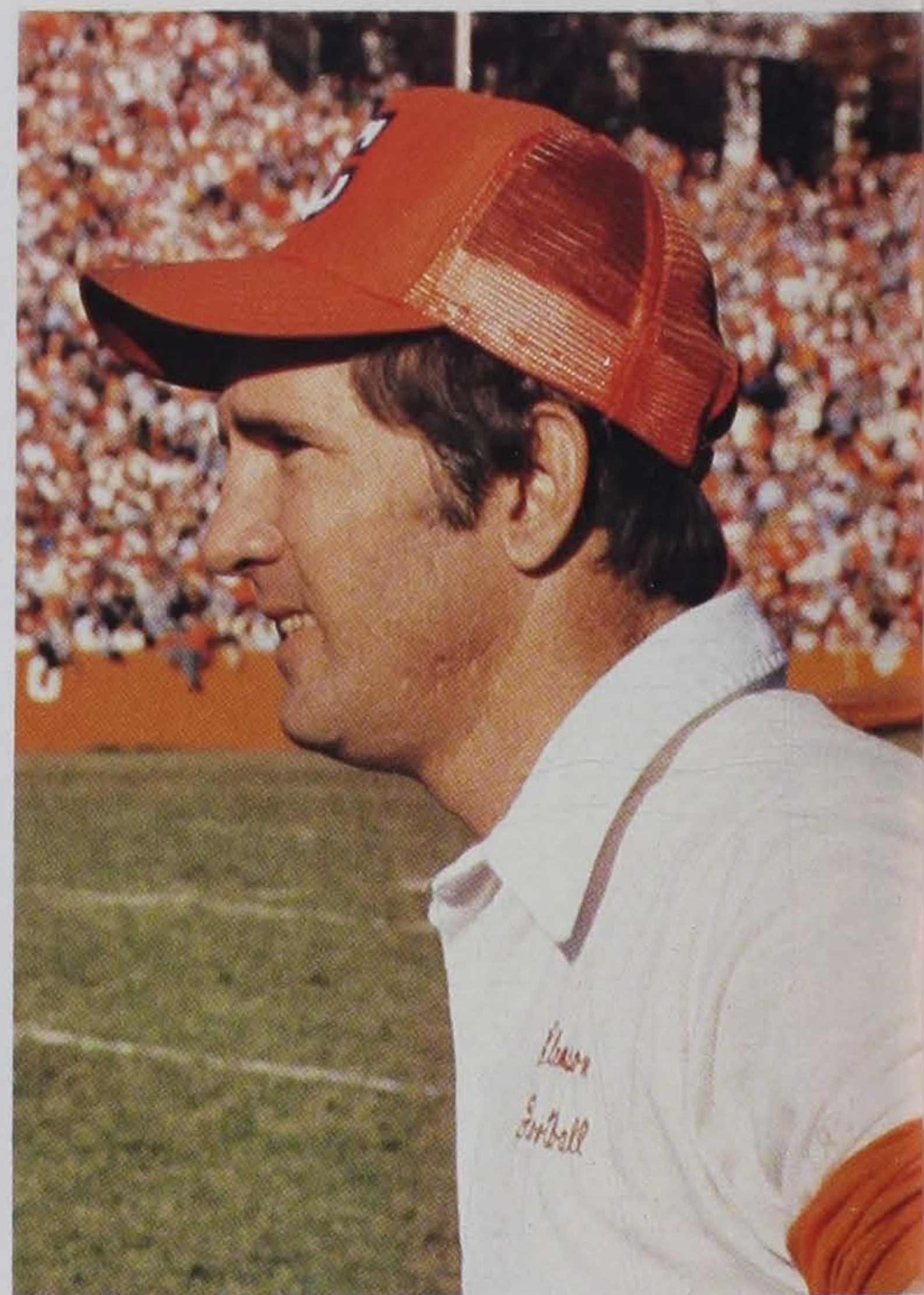

Believe it or not, a team that was 6-5 and unranked the previous season, had risen above all kinds of odds to the apex of the college football world. The fairy tale had become a reality.



Head Coach Danny Ford was named consensus national Coach-of-the-Year, a richly deserved honor. The 33-year-old had become the youngest coach in history to lead a team to the national championship.

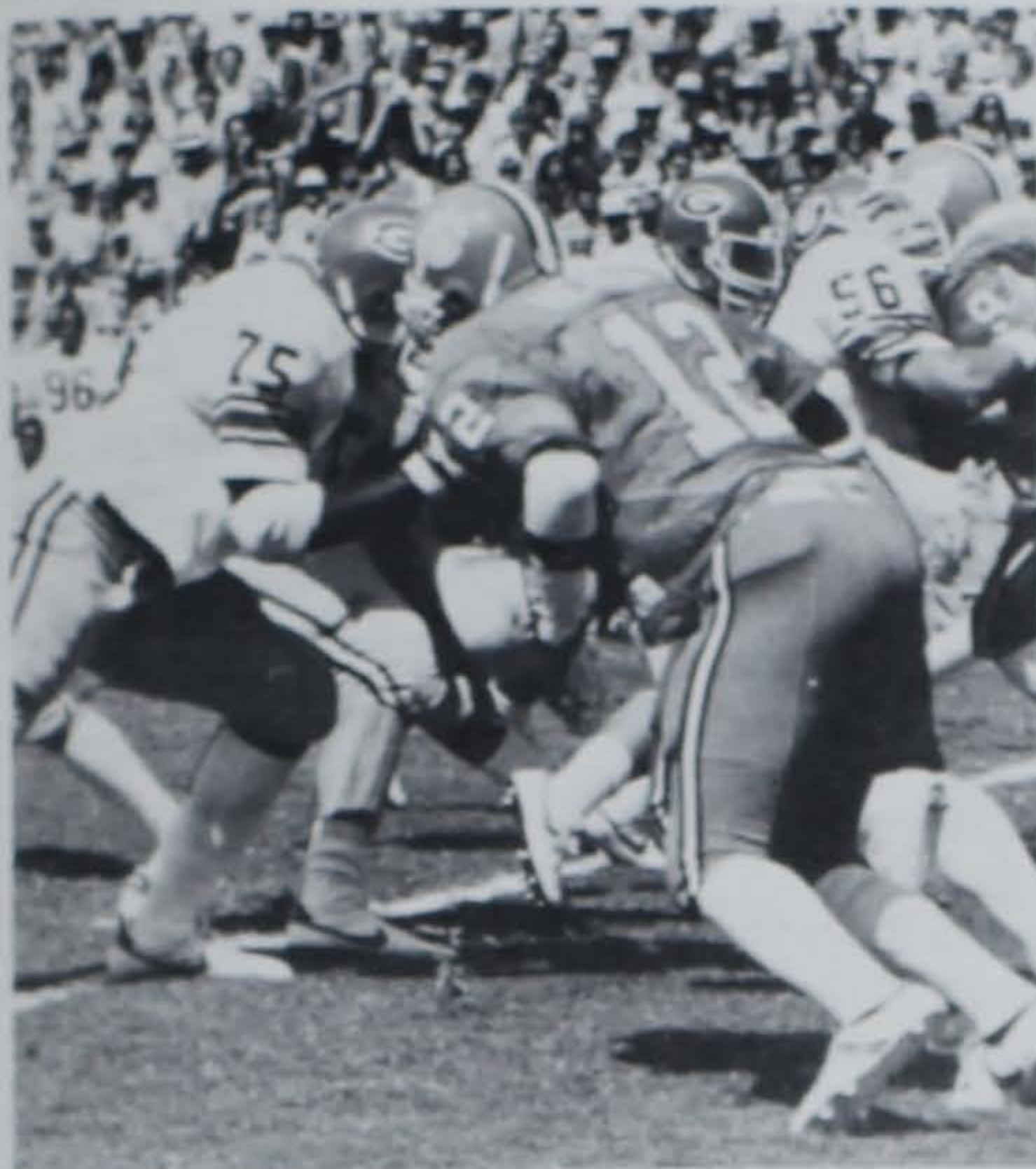

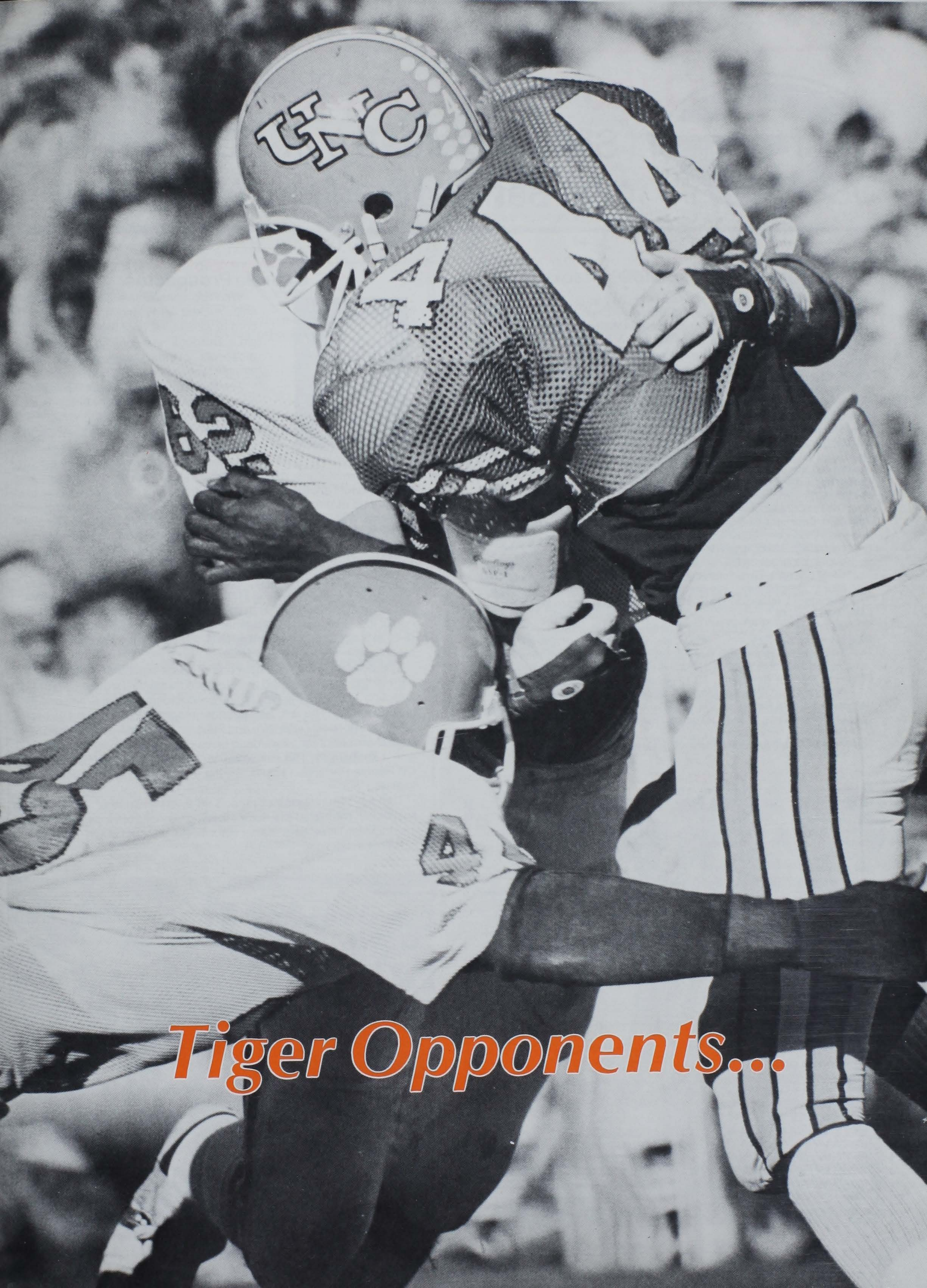

With two consecutive SEC championships tucked away and a combined record of 22-2 in the past two years, Georgia's Bulldogs are looking toward the prospects of an unprecedented third straight league title in 1982.

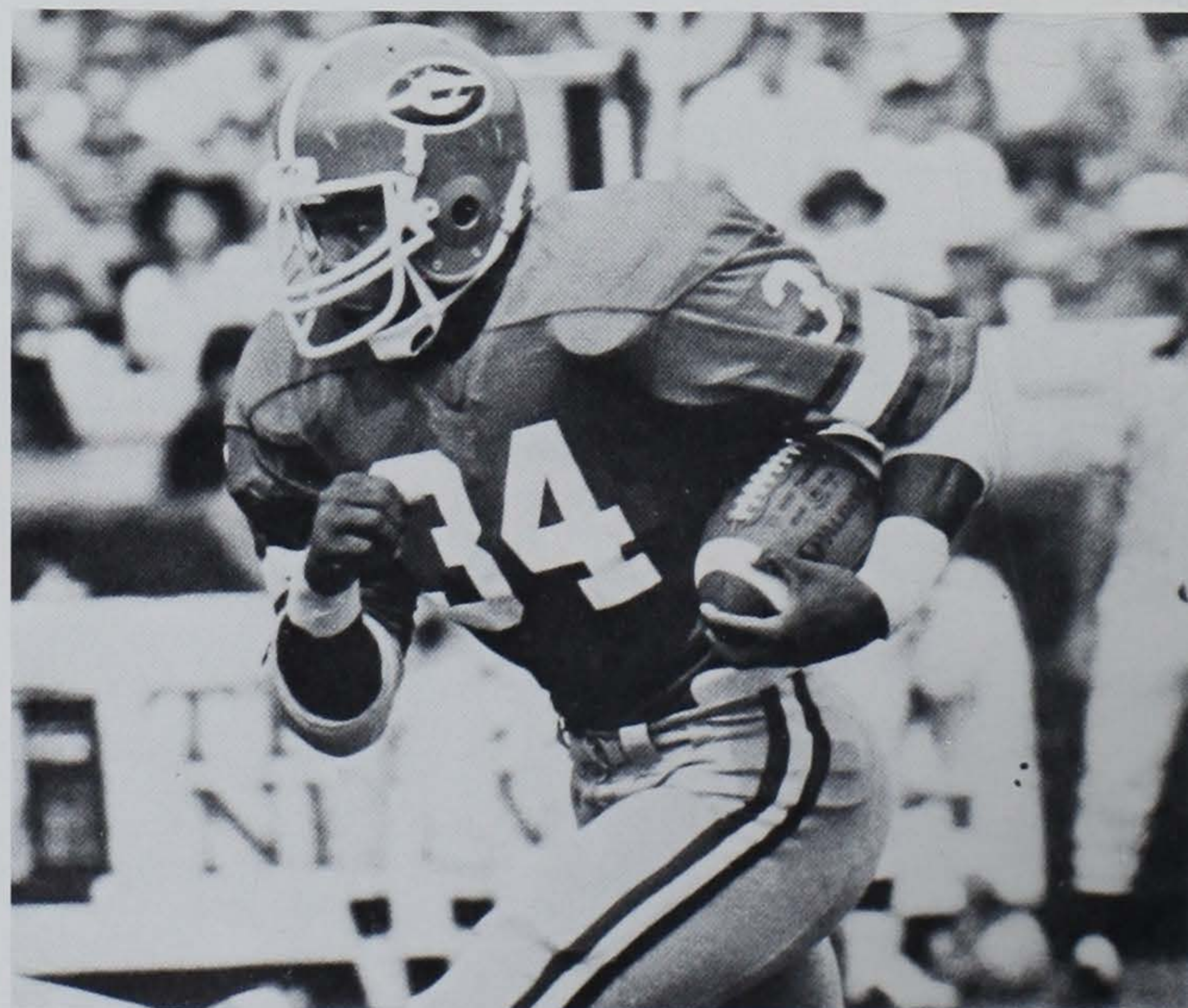
The Bulldogs will be without the experience of their three-year starter Buck Belue at quarterback and premier receiver Lindsay Scott, who has been lost to graduation. Despite the critical losses, the Dogs' outlook is optimistic as they return six offensive starters, eight defensive starters and both kickers in an effort to mount another championship drive.

The hub of the new offensive team will be two-time All-American Herschel Walker, holder of 15 school records, eight SEC records and six NCAA marks. The junior tailback finished third in the Heisman Trophy balloting his freshman year, second as a sophomore and hopes are high his third year will be the charm.

The offensive line is as experienced as it is deep. Leading the way will be senior center Wayne Radloff (6-5, 215) and junior offensive tackle Jimmy "Mountain" Harper (6-5, 270). The tight end position is one of the strongest on the team with returning regulars Norris Brown (6-3, 215, Sr) and Clarence Kay (6-3, 225, Jr). They accumulated 18 receptions in 1981.

The defense will be led by a pair of pass-rushing executioners, a hard-hitting linebacker and a speedy cornerback. Two-time All-SEC selection Jimmy Payne was a high school teammate of Clemson QB Homer Jordan. The 6-4, 245-pounder recorded 12 sacks in 1981 for 80 yards in losses. Defensive end Freddie "The Destroyer" Gilbert recorded six sacks for 52 yards in losses, despite missing five games with a knee injury. The secondary will be headed up by speedy left CB Ronnie Harris (5-11, 180, Sr) the team's leading interceptor last year with four.

Tommy "Thunderbolt" Thurson (6-2, 215, Jr) the hard-hitting linebacker, returns as the team's leading tackler from a year ago with 132 tackles. Three-year starter Nate Taylor will hold down the weak-side linebacker spot.

Deep in the backfield, but shallow in the kicking game is how the Boston College waters will run this season. BC returns its' three top rushers who collectively gained 977 net yards and combined for seven touchdowns. However, all-purpose booter John Cooper who handled both punting and placekicking chores for the Eagles, has graduated.

Gone from the offensive line is UPI (third team) All-American Gerry Raymond to the NFL, but senior center Jack Belcher should take up any slack. Veterans Steve Lively (6-4, 280) and Roger Cattelan (6-5, 266) add experience to sophomore quarterback Doug Flutie's line. Flutie was the nation's ninth-ranked passer a year ago completing 105 of 192 passes for 1652 yards and 10 TD's in just eight games. His favorite targets are wide receiver Brian Brennan who caught 37 passes for 726 yards and 3 TD's and tight end Scott Nizolek, who snatched 3 catches for 406 yards and 4 TD's.

On the other side of the field, senior tackle Junior Poles, a 6-5, 286 pounder is at the helm of the Eagles' defensive line. Joining Poles is junior tackle Ron Swanke (6-2½, 255) to help anchor the line. Talented Steve DeOssie (6-2, 235), with 122 team-leading tackles last year, is back at the linebacker spot. While defensive back George Radachowsky, who runs a 4.5 in the 40, returns with seven interceptions and 48 tackles to his credit.

It looks like smooth waters for the BC team that has 40 lettermen coming back, with 14 seniors. But a challenging schedule with six opponents including National Champion Clemson and foes like Penn State and a Jackie Sherrill edition of Texas A&M, the waters may get a little choppy.

The Catamounts, like Clemson, have some rebuilding to do in their offensive line, and the key to their success will be the quick development of several offensive linemen. Sophomore center Steve Taylor and senior guard Kurt Jollif are the only Catamounts with starting experience and only two others have played enough to earn a letter. Other than that though, the Catamounts have the makings of an explosive offense.

Senior quarterback Ronnie Mixon has the nod for starting his third consecutive season after passing for over 3,000 yards the past two seasons. The Charleston, SC, native completed 55% of his passes, for 1820 yards last season, including a 322-yard passing performance against powerhouse Florida State.

However, Mixon's favorite receiver last season, Jeff Dean, the Southern Conference's leading pass-catcher, has graduated. Kristy Kiser, who played in nine games to catch 19 passes for 316 yards, does return. In the backfield, Melvin Dorsey, a 6-0, 200-pound tailback, was the team's leading rusher last season with 911 net yards on 223 carries, including a 69-yard run against VMI for a touchdown.

Another area of concern for the Catamounts is the defensive line where only one starter and one other letterman return to the three down positions. Two-year starter Johnny Williams (6-1, 230) is an all-conference candidate at tackle. He was second in tackles last fall with 91 and accounted for 12 tackles in the opponents backfield for 68 yards in losses. Last year's starting linebackers, senior Alan Johnson and sophomore Ricky Pate return. They combined for 143 tackles. Three starters and seven lettermen will man the cornerback and safety positions. Steve Marshall and Richard Dukes are in the secondary, while Walter Smith and Manny Dewberry take care of the cornerback slot.

The kicking game will belong to junior Dean Biasucci, who connected on 22 of 35 field goal attempts, including a school record 51 yarder.

The 1982 Kentucky Wildcats under the new leadership of head coach Jerry Claiborne will feature 40 returning lettermen and 16 starters (seven on offense, nine on defense) in its nucleus, but a lack of depth may plague the Wildcats if injuries arise.

Hardest hit by graduation was the offensive line which lost three starters. Senior Gerald Smyth (6-4½, 250) and sophomore Doug Williams (6-6, 265) are returning starters from the interior while seniors Rob Mangas (6-2, 213) and Todd Shadowen (6-3½, 216) are experienced tight ends. In the backfield, however, there is a host of talent as leading rusher junior Lawrence "Choo Choo" Lee returns. Lee was responsible for 275 yards on 78 rushes and one touchdown.

The defense will be anchored by All-Southeastern Conference safety Andy Molls, a senior who was the team's third leading tackler with 70 solos and 42 assists. He returned 33 punts for 420 yards last season. Molls ranked fifth in the nation with an average of 12.7 yards per return. Fellow senior Tom Petty led the team in kickoff returns with six trips for 144 yards. And although junior linebackers John Grimsley (6-1, 200) and Kevin McClelland (6-2, 200) finished as the top two tacklers on the team, they are still not considered veterans. The return of Scott Schroeder, a junior who led the team in tackles in 1980 and missed last season with a knee injury received in the spring game, will help the defense.

Also returning from injuries is Steve Willis who will be expected to fill the shoes of Don Fielder, the fourth leading tackler on the team. Juniors Jeff Smith (6-3, 231) and Keith Martin (6-3, 232) return as starting tackles and senior noseguard Effley Brooks (6-1, 230), with a team-high nine TFLs and eight quarterback sacks, is back.

Coach Monte Kiffin's top priority going into the fall camp will be to establish solidity at the quarterback position, an area that created many of the woes the team suffered en route to a 4-7 record last season. Candidates for that all-important spot include rising seniors Tol Avery (70 for 138, 825 yds., 3 TDs) and Ron Laraway (25 for 70, 297 yds., 2 TDs) who both saw much action last year.

The middle of the offensive line remains intact with Jeff Nyce (6-2, 238) at center and the tandem of Chuck Long (6-3, 266) and Earnest Butler (6-2, 253) at the guards. The ACC's Rookie-of-the-Year, Joe McIntosh, tops a stable of solid running backs who include Larmount Lawson (104 rushes for 406 yards, 1 TD) and John Peterson (26 rushes for 146 yards, 1 TD). The Wolfpack, which plans to emphasize the aerial game more this fall, has a talented receiver in Ken Jenkins who caught just 10 passes for 152 yards, playing sparingly behind first-round draft pick, Mike Quick.

Defensively, tackle David Shelton (6-1, 226) is the lone returnee among the defensive front-five, which means the Wolfpack face a major rebuilding task in that area. Despite that, a solid secondary is intact with three of four starters back in free safety Eric Williams (6-0, 187), strong safety Louie Meadows (5-10, 189) and Perry Williams (6-2, 193) at the cornerback slot.

Punter Calvin Warren and placekicker Todd Auten are gone, but the major concern for the Pack will be establishing the quarterback position along with a consistent aerial game. State should field a potent ground attack behind Joe McIntosh and the secondary is in top shape, but Kiffin will have to rebuild the defensive line that lost four of its' five starters.

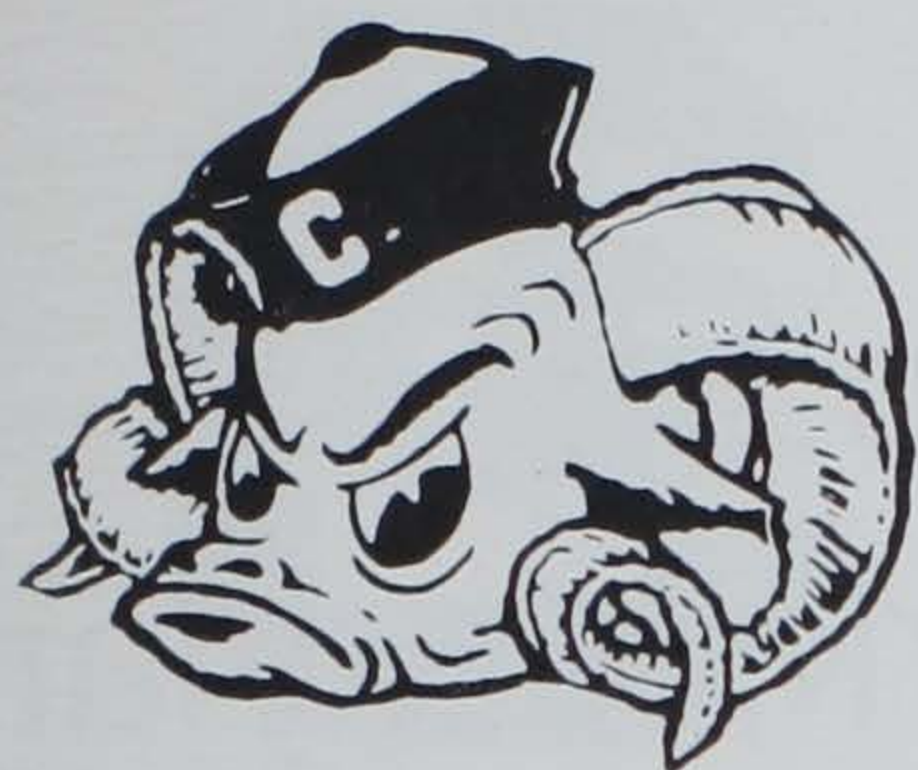

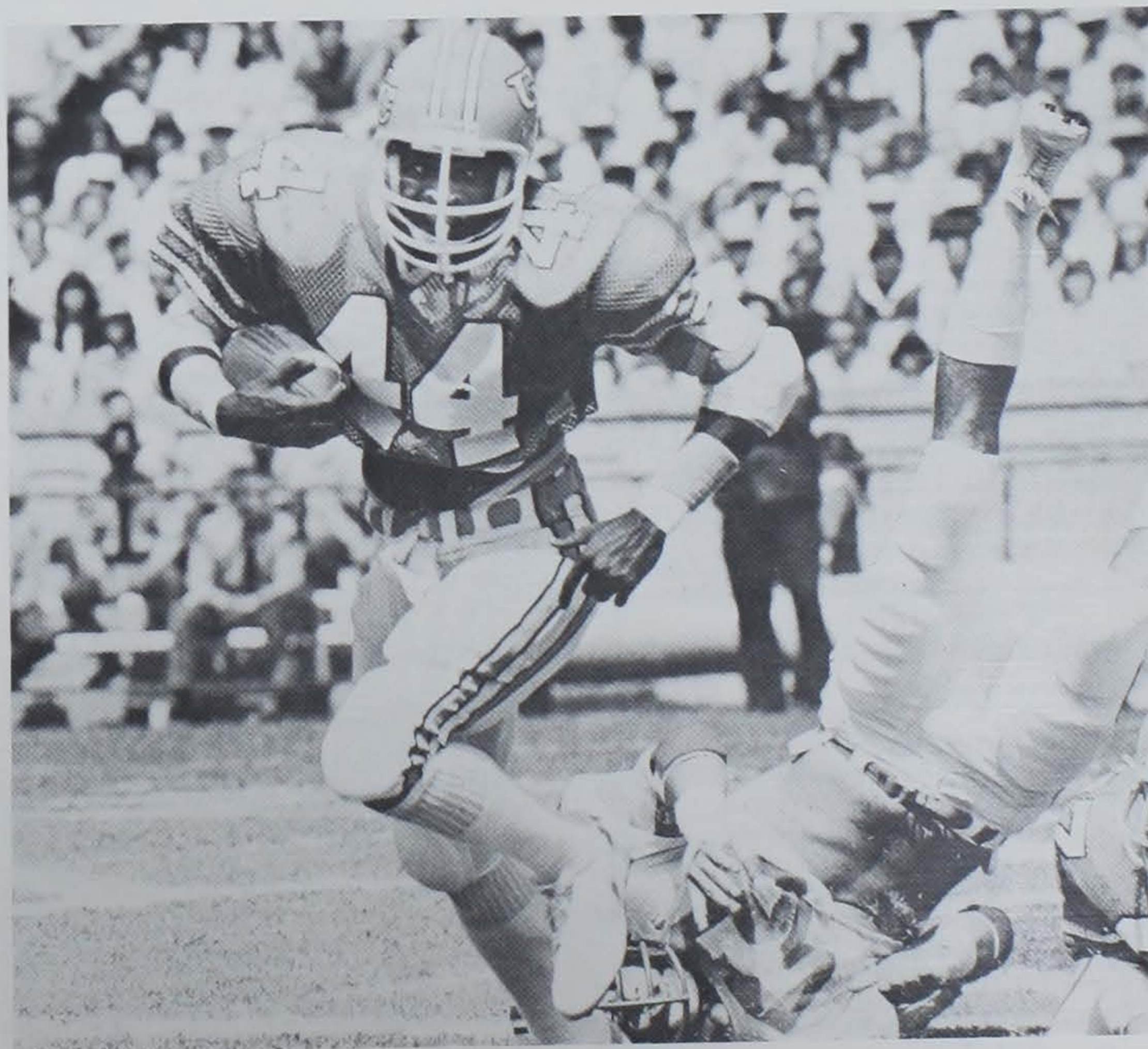

With Heisman Trophy candidate Kelvin Bryant heading a cast of 15 returning starters, North Carolina should again be a leading contender for Atlantic Coast Conference and national honors this fall. Carolina posted a 10-2 record last year, defeated Arkansas in the Gator Bowl and finished eighth and ninth in the final wire service polls. The 1982 team has an opportunity to accomplish even more.

A major reason for the optimism in the Tar Heel camp is the return of Bryant, a 6-2, 195-pound senior tailback, who rates as one of the best players in America. Bryant rushed for 1,015 yards and scored 18 touchdowns while playing just half a season last year. He was sidelined at mid-season by a knee injury, but came back from that to win All-ACC honors and be voted Co-MVP in the Gator Bowl.

However, Bryant is not the only star performer for Carolina. Also back are four other players who won all-conference honors last fall - All-America offensive guard David Drechsler, third-team All-America defensive back Greg Poole, offensive guard Ron Spruill and defensive tackle William Fuller. Offensively, there is great potential. Bryant heads up an attack which also features a great quarterback in senior Rod Elkins. In addition, there are two fine reserves at tailback in Ethan Horton and Tyrone Anthony. The offensive line should be solid with Drechsler, Spruill and 290-pound tackle Brian Blados.

Defensively, outside linebacker Mike Wilcher, tackle Jack Parry, nose guard Steve Fortson and cornerback Walter Black should join with Poole and Fuller to provide the nucleus for a solid unit. Linebacker at one time loomed as a trouble spot, but the fine play of Chris Ward, Bill Sheppard, Micah Moon and Troy Simmons in the spring put those concerns to rest. Carolina's major problem may lie in the kicking game where All-ACC punter Jeff Hayes has graduated. He also handled kickoffs, extra points and long-range field goals.

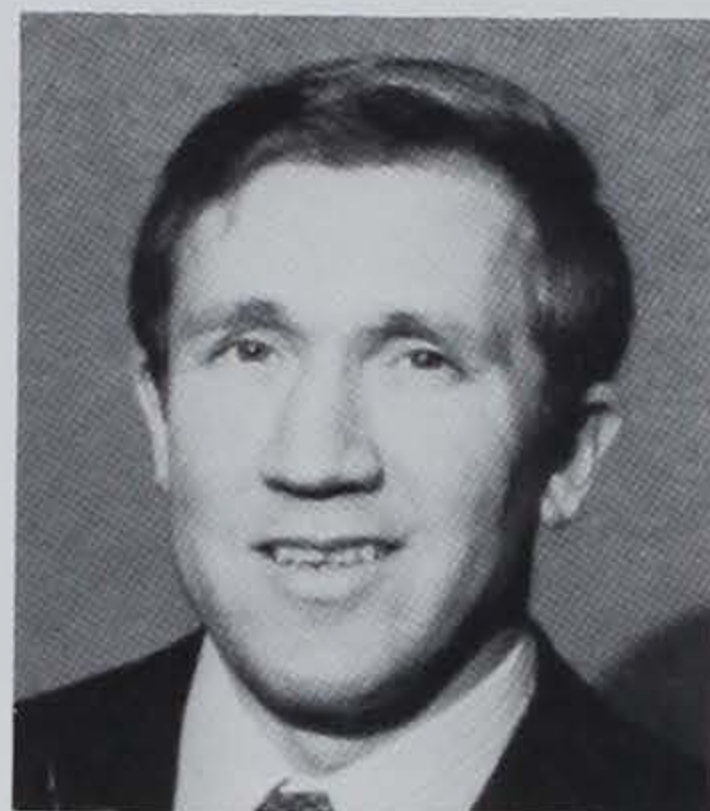

First-year Coach Bobby Ross comes to Maryland from a stint with the Kansas City Chiefs where he served as the offensive backfield coach until joining the Terps in January. He brings with him an impressive resume, staff and a new offensive philosophy.

To compliment the Terps' new multiple pro type offense, Maryland returns seven starters on offense. Senior John Tice (6-5½, 240) is back at tight end after leading the team in receiving last fall with 31 catches for 353 yards and 4 touchdowns. Boomer Esiason (6-4, 198), a junior quarterback who completed 122 of 242 passes for 1635 yards and nine TDs is the Terps established starter.

Defensive tackle Gurnest Brown (6-4, 278) is a three-year letterman and the leader of the Maryland multiple defense. He has recorded 126 tackles, 81 last fall, with 13 quarterback sacks, caused three fumbles and recorded 109 yards in losses by opponents. Senior tackle Mark Duda (6-2, 263) and guard Mike Corvino (6-1, 238) are All-ACC candidates along with linebacker Mike Muller (6-2, 223) who was the leading tackler last fall with 107 and two pass interceptions. Senior Bil McFadden returns at the safety position where he had 52 tackles in eight games, recovered two fumbles, intercepted three passes and returned them for 112 yards including one for 97 yards and a touchdown.

Physical strength is a strong point for the Terps as 15 players have bench pressed over 400 pounds in the spring and 66 players bench press over 300 pounds.

Richard Bell takes over the University of South Carolina football program for the 1982 season after serving seven years as the Gamecocks' defensive coordinator.

The new head coach welcomed 38 lettermen to spring practice, including 16 starters from a squad that finished 6-6 in 1981. Dave Fagg, former offensive coordinator at Hawaii, joined the South Carolina staff in the same capacity with Bill Michael, former head coach at Texas-El Paso assuming duties as defensive

line coach. The remainder of the coaching staff consists of holdovers with Larry New moving up to replace Bell as defensive coordinator.

Fagg installed an exciting, multiple offense during the spring, working with five quarterbacks, veterans Gordon Beckham and Terry Bishop, and rising sophomores Bill Bradshaw, Rich Ingold and Jim Desmond.

At tailback, the Gamecocks were looking for a replacement for graduated Johnnie Wright, and outstanding freshman Kent Hagood. Fullback, on the other hand, was strong with rising junior Dominique Blasingame and two-year letterman Carl West back from a knee injury that sidelined him a year ago.

Horace Smith will be hard to replace at wide receiver, but the Gamecocks have good receivers in split end Ira Hilliary and tight end Chris Corley. Tight end DeWayne Chivers has graduated.

Four of five starters return from last year's interior offensive line, but the Gamecocks must replace tackle Chuck Slaughter.

The defensive line is anchored by All-America candidate Andrew Provence, a 6-3, 255 pound tackle from Savannah, Ga., who made 157 tackles last year, 12 for losses. Another all-star candidate is defensive back Troy Thomas. Other veterans in the secondary are Harry Skipper, Pat Bowen and Chuck Finney.

Wake Forest looks to continue their "offensive proficiency" as Coach Al Groh puts it by returning quarterback Gary Schofield, who last fall completed 241 of 404 passes for 2,572 yards. Schofield finished sixth in the nation in yardage among returning players.

The biggest problem it seems is in finding a replacement for workhorse Richard Baldinger on the offensive line. Glen Campbell (6-4, 266, So) and Lee Vernon (6-3, 256, Sr) look like possible replacements. In All-ACC Phil Denfeld, the Deacons return the junior tight end that caught 51 passes. At split end, Tim Ryan started the second half of the last season after Wayne Baumgardner was slowed down by injuries and he will be the Deacon starter this season. Replacing Kenny Duckett at flanker will not be an easy task in terms of leadership as well as his on the field heroics. Red-shirt Marshall Archie (5-2, 189, So) can be expected to step in and surprise a lot of people in the process.

Eric Metzler (6-3, 260) is the lone returning senior and will team with fellow veteran Mike Hodgson (6-6, 242) to add experience on the defensive front. Senior linebackers Steve Hammond (6-4, 225) and Ken Simon (6-2, 221) are the keys to the Deacon linebacking corp and the secondary will return a lot of familiar faces from last season. Seniors Eddie Green (5-11, 173), who comes back to the corner after missing the second half of last season due to injury, and Henderson Threatt (5-8, 175) should be back at the cornerback spot after starting there last season.

Sophomore Ronnie Burgess (6-0, 170) is coming off an exceptional freshman season (fourth on the team in tackles with 69 total) and should see a lot of action at the safety position. The strong safety slot is up for grabs among several transfer players who are in their first year with the Deacs. Dan Rocco, a transfer from Penn State and Lynn Conner (5-10, 203) who came to Wake from Ferrum Junior College, are the top candidates.

# Tiger Bowl Games Reviewed

## 1940 Cotton Bowl January 1, 1940 - Dallas, TX Clemson 6, Boston College 3

Jess Neely's last Clemson team won eight games in the regular season and had come within a blocked extra point of escaping the regular season without a loss. The 8-1 Tigers were rewarded with an invitation to play Boston College in the fourth Cotton Bowl, but Clemson first had to get permission from the Southern Conference, which they immediately granted. The 1939 season not only resulted in Clemson's first bowl appearance, but also the Tigers' first All-American, Banks McFadden.

On the last play of the first quarter, Bru Trexler punted to BC's Charlie O'Rourke, who field the punt on the Clemson 40 and returned it to the 13. Two running plays lost 10 yards, but on third down Frank Davis gained six. Alex Lukachik then kicked a 34-yard field goal to put the Eagles up 3-0.

Clemson's scoring drive began when McFadden returned an Eagle punt to the 33. Charlie Timmons rushed for 15 yards in two plays, and two plays after that, McFadden hit Wistar Jackson with a 16-yard pass to the Eagle 20. Timmons ran the final 20 yards in three carries, but Bryant missed the extra point.

A 51-yard punt by McFadden started Boston College at its 20. The Eagles fumbled on first down and Clemson's George Fritts recovered at the 24. The Tigers could do nothing with the gift, however, as Joe Blalock fumbled after a short pass.

The game turned into a defensive struggle in the second half, although Boston College did penetrate deep into Clemson territory on two occasions. The Eagles took the opening kickoff to the Clemson 19, but a holding penalty and an incomplete pass ended the threat and BC was forced to punt.

Late in the game, the Eagles drove to the Clemson 11, but Bryant and McFadden broke up two passes and Clemson took over on downs.

McFadden effectively bottled up the Eagles other than those drives with his punting. His 45-yard average on nine kicks, including two boots for 51 and 55 yards in the second half, prevented Boston College from getting good field position, and the Clemson defense made the 6-3 score stand.

## 1949 Gator Bowl January 1, 1949 - Jacksonville, FL Clemson 24, Missouri 23

Clemson opened the 1948 season with a 53-0 shut out of Presbyterian in the Tigers' first-ever night home game and they closed the regular season with a 20-0 blanking of The Citadel in the first game played at the Bulldogs' Johnson Hagood Stadium. In between, the Tigers shut out three more opponents and beat five others on the way to a 10-0 record, a ninth-place ranking in the polls, and an invitation to play Missouri in the fourth Gator Bowl.

Clemson kicked off, but three plays later Missouri fumbled and Clemson's Bob Martin recovered at the 19. A pass interference call gave the Tigers the ball at the one, and Fred Cone scored from there. Jack Miller added the point after and Clemson led 7-0.

Ray Mathews recovered a Missouri fumble later in the quarter to give Clemson the ball at its 35. Mathews took the next play for 26 yards and five plays later Bobby Gage passed to Martin for 19 more. Cone scored for the second time from the one, and Miller's conversion gave the Southern Conference champs a 14-0 lead.

After the kickoff, Missouri launched an 80-yard drive to score its first touchdown. Harold Entsminger capped the 13-play march with quarterback sneak from the two. Robertson Dawson added the seventh point.

Gage was intercepted on the next Clemson drive and Wilbur Volz returned the theft to the Missouri 46. Missouri kept the ball on the ground and Entsminger carried over from the one for the score. Dawson added his second point after and the game was tied at 14.

Clemson took the second-half kickoff and used up six minutes of clock on the way to its third touchdown. Gage ran and passed for 19 yards on two separate plays and the Tigers scored on a flea-flicker pass from Cone to Gage to John Poulos in the end zone. Miller completed the 80-yard drive with his third PAT.

A Missouri punt rolled dead at the Clemson one, and after an incomplete pass, Gage threw an errant lateral that hit the ground in the end zone and was covered by a teammate for a safety. Clemson's lead was then cut to 21-16.

Clemson then launched a 11-play surge to the Missouri 12. With fourth-and-10, Miller kicked a 32-yard field goal that would prove to be the winning points.

Dave Ashley returned the kickoff to the Missouri 40, and seven plays later, halfback Richard Braznell passed to Kenneth Bounds for a 20-yard touchdown. Dawson added the point to bring Missouri within one point with five minutes left. Clemson took the kickoff and ran out the clock to preserve the win.

**1951 Orange Bowl**  
**January 1, 1951 – Miami, FL**  
**Clemson 15, Miami (FL) 14**

Clemson's bid for a repeat of the 1948 perfect season ended when the Tigers had to rely on the toe of Charlie Radcliff to tie South Carolina after three season-opening shut-outs. Clemson regrouped, however, with a 13-12 win at Wake Forest and then won the remaining four games by convincing margins. The Tigers' 8-0-1 mark and second-place finish in the Southern Conference earned them a bid to play Miami, who was also undefeated at 9-0-1, in the 17th Orange Bowl.

After a scoreless first quarter, Clemson got on track with a 45-yard pass from Billy Hair to Bob Hudson that put the Tigers at the Miami one. Fred Cone capped the 76-yard drive on third down with a sweep for the score and Radcliff tacked on the extra point.

Clemson mounted a six-play, 70-yard drive in the third quarter for its second touchdown. Hair threw a 31-yard pass to Ray Mathews, who as the papers said "made a circus catch with two men on his back" to move the Tigers to the Miami 28. Hair tossed a pass to Glenn Smith at the Miami seven and Smith scrambled in for the score. Radcliff's extra point try was blocked.

Miami caught fire two minutes later when Jack Delbello intercepted a pass in the Clemson end zone and returned it to the 40 and then a 10-yard penalty was assessed the Tigers for unnecessary roughness. On the next play, Frank Smith ran a reverse for 45 yards to move to the Clemson five. Harry Mallios took a pitch from quarterback Bob Schneidenbach in for the score and Gordon Watson added the conversion.

Miami went 95-yards in five plays for its second score. Ed Lutes caught a pass at midfield and rambled down to the Clemson 17 before he was stopped. On fourth down, Jack Hackett threw to Frank Smith for the score and Watson's point put Miami in the lead for the first time at 14-13.

Mallios' 80-yard punt return was called back and two clipping infractions and one unnecessary roughness penalty put Miami in a deep hole with six minutes left in the game. Frank Smith took a pitchout from Hackett, but before Smith could get out of the end zone, Sterling Smith, a second-team defensive guard for Clemson, tripped him up for a safety, and Clemson led 15-14. J.D. Wade ended the last Miami threat with an interception, and Clemson ran out the clock for the win.

**1952 Gator Bowl**  
**January 1, 1952 – Jacksonville, FL**  
**Miami (FL) 14, Clemson 0**

Clemson won the first three games of the 1951 season as well as the last four. In between, however, the Tigers dropped games to Pacific and South Carolina on the road. The Gator Bowl Committee invited Clemson with its 7-2 record to play Miami (FL) in a rematch of the 1951 Orange Bowl, but the Southern Conference had decided to ban its teams from any bowl competition that season. Clemson and Maryland accepted bowl bids anyway, and were prohibited from playing any other conference team except each other the next year.

The Tigers opened the game with a bang as Billy Hair took Elmer Tremont's kickoff and returned it 72 yards to the Miami 26, but Clemson could only make six yards in four downs and the Tigers turned the ball over.

After an exchange of punts, Miami mounted an 82-yard drive to score the game's first touchdown. The drive was highlighted by quarterback Jack Hackett's only two passes of the game – a 15-yarder to Frank McDonald and a 40-yard throw to Ed Lutes. Two plays later, fullback Harry Mallios took the pitch and ran 11 yards for the score. Tremont added the extra point and Miami led 7-0.

Miami defensive back Jim Dooley intercepted the first of four passes to kill the Clemson drive at the Miami 15. Clemson got the ball back after a punt, but on fourth down, as defensive end Leo Martin blocked Hair's punt at the Clemson 32. Mallios converted twice on fourth down to keep the drive going and he scored from two yards out. Tremont converted again and Miami had all the points it needed.

The Clemson defense turned stingy in the second half, as the Tigers did not allow Miami to penetrate their 35 and the Hurricane did not gain another first down. The Clemson offense moved well, but a fumble at the Miami 18 and three Dooley interceptions inside the 20 kept Clemson off the scoreboard as Miami handed the Tigers their first bowl loss in four tries.

**1957 Orange Bowl**  
**January 1, 1957 – Miami, FL**  
**Colorado 27, Clemson 21**

Clemson claimed its first Atlantic Coast Conference championship in 1956 on the strength of a 4-0-1 league mark. The Tigers were 7-1-2 overall and were a surprise choice to participate in the 22nd Orange Bowl, as only three weeks before their selection, the Tigers had been shut out by Miami, 21-0, in the same stadium. Colorado, which was 7-2-1 and the Big-Seven runnerup, was chosen as Clemson's opponent.

After a scoreless first quarter, Colorado got on track with a seven-play, 75-yard drive. The Buffaloes' catalyst was a 26-yard run by Bob Stransky that moved the ball to the Clemson 23. Four plays later, John "The Beast" Bayuk scored from the two. Ellwin Indorf added the point after.

Stransky intercepted an errant Charlie Bussey pass at the Clemson 46 and returned it to the 10 to spark Colorado's second score. Boyd Dowler, who later starred with the Packers, scored from six yards out



two plays later. Howard Cook added the conversion and Colorado led 14-0.

Colorado's Frank Clarke partially blocked Horace Turbeville's punt on the next Clemson drive and the Buffaloes recovered on the Clemson 26. Cook then went wide right and scored on the next play, but he missed the extra point.

Trailing 20-0, Clemson coach Frank Howard told his players that he would resign if they did not play any better in the second half. Having been sufficiently shaken, Clemson came out of the locker room and marched 69 yards in 15 plays to score on Joel Wells's three-yard run. Bussey's extra point try was good.

After a Colorado punt, Clemson moved to the 29 on Bob Spooner's two runs. Three plays later, Wells ran 58 yards on a reverse for the Tigers' second score. Bussey's point after made the score 20-14 Colorado.

Clemson recovered the onside kick, but the Tigers were forced to punt four plays later. Colorado then fumbled at its 11 and Tommy Sease recovered for the Tigers at the 10. Spooner, who had been the workhouse on the first scoring drive, carried the ball over from the one, and with Bussey's third extra point, Clemson led for the first time at 21-20, with 11:22 to go.

Although leading, Bussey attempted a second onside kick. Colorado recovered and marched 53 yards in eight plays to go ahead for good on Bayuk's one-yard plunge. Indorf kicked the extra point and the Buffaloes led 27-21. The two teams traded turnovers, and Colorado ran out the clock.

LSU 7, Clemson 0

South Carolina, who had been shut out by Clemson the previous two years, scored early and often to take 26-6 win over Frank Howard's 1958 team. The only other blemish on the ACC Champions' 8-2 regular season record was a 13-0 loss at Georgia Tech. For their efforts, the Tigers were invited to play the nation's number-one team, Louisiana State, in the 25th Sugar Bowl.

LSU drove deep into Clemson territory three times in the first half, but two fumbles and a thwarted fake field goal killed the drives. Clemson could do no better, though, as none of its six drives went past midfield.

Clemson moved to the LSU 27 on its first drive of the second half, but a fumble gave the ball back to the other set of Tigers. On Clemson's next possession, however, LSU got the break it had been looking for. On fourth down, the ball slipped out of snapper Paul Snyder's hands and hit up-man Doug Cline in the leg and Duane Leopard recovered for LSU at the Clemson 11.

LSU picked up two yards on its first three tries, but on fourth down halfback Billy Cannon hit tight end Mickey Mangham in the corner of

the end zone for the only score of the game. Cannon kicked the extra point and LSU led 7-0.

Clemson had one last chance late in the fourth quarter. The Tigers started at their 17 and 17 plays later were on the LSU 28, but Harvey White's fourth down pass to George Usry was incomplete. LSU took over on downs and ran out the clock.

### 1959 Bluebonnet Bowl

December 19, 1959 – Houston, TX

Clemson 23, Texas Christian 7

The 1959 season was one of firsts, lasts, and other milestones. Clemson won the last "Big Thursday" game with archrival South Carolina 27-0, one of five opponents the Tigers would whitewash, the second-highest shutout total in a Clemson season. The 9-2 team was Clemson's third ACC Championship unit, and Frank Howard's last bowl team. After the season-ending win over Furman, Clemson was invited to play Texas Christian in the inaugural Bluebonnet Bowl, which would be the Tigers' second post-season appearance in the calendar year of 1959. The 23-7 win over the Horned Frogs was Clemson's 300th football victory.

Alternate quarterback Lowndes Shingler guided Clemson on a 12-play, 63-yard drive to the TCU five, but the Tigers stalled. Lon Armstrong hit on a 22-yard field goal as the second quarter started to put Clemson up 3-0.

Not to be outdone, TCU second-stringer Donald George moved his team on a 12-play, 63-yard drive to the Clemson end zone. The Horned Frogs scored the go-ahead touchdown on a 19-yard halfback pass from Jack Reding to Harry Moreland.

Neither team scored in the third quarter, but Clemson did drive to the TCU 29 midway through the period. Harvey White's fourth-down pass to George Usry was just one yard short of the needed first down and TCU took over.

Clemson got pass-happy in the final 15 minutes and scored two touchdowns to put the Tigers ahead. With a third-and-18 situation at the Clemson 32, White threw to end Gary Barnes who caught the ball at midfield and sprinted in for one score. After an interception, Shingler threw to Tommy King coming across the middle for a 23-yard touchdown, but Shingler's point after was wide and Clemson led 16-7.

Clemson returned to their running game for its final scoring drive late in the quarter. Shingler, Doug Daigneault, and Ron Scrudato moved the Tigers from their 37 to the TCU one and Scrudato ran off right tackle for the score. Armstrong's kick put the game out of TCU's reach and it capped a 20-point fourth quarter for the Tigers.

### 1977 Gator Bowl

December 30, 1977 – Jacksonville, FL

Pittsburgh 34, Clemson 3

Clemson resurfaced in the national spotlight in 1977 after winning eight games and making their first bowl appearance in 17 years. First-year coach Charlie Pell guided his team to a 7-6 win at Georgia, a near-upset of eventual National Champion Notre Dame at home, and had come within an extra point of claiming the ACC Championship. After Jerry Butler's twisting, diving catch in the end zone beat South Carolina, Clemson accepted the invitation to play defending national champion Pittsburgh in the 33rd annual Gator Bowl.

Clemson won the opening coin toss, but that was to be the only thing the Tigers would win that night as the Matt Cavanaugh-led Panthers scored six of the 12 times they had the ball, set seven Gator Bowl records, and handed the Tigers one of their 25 worst defeats in history.

Cavanaugh threw four touchdown passes (three to fullback Elliott Walker), passed for a Clemson opponent record 387 yards and accounted for 402 yards in total offense. If that was not enough, the Pitt defense stymied the Clemson offense all night by keeping Steve Fuller & Company bottled up or causing turnovers when the Tigers offense did get on track.

Pitt was leading 17-0 when the Tigers began their only scoring drive early in the second quarter. Fuller mixed passes to Anthony King and Butler with runs by Ken Callicutt to move to the Pitt 32. The drive bogged down and Obed Ariri hit on a 49-yard field goal which set the Gator Bowl record for distance.

Although the Tigers were out-classed by Pittsburgh, the 1977 appearance in the Gator Bowl was the start of a new era of football prowess for Clemson.

### 1979 Gator Bowl

December 29, 1978 - Jacksonville, FL

Clemson 17, Ohio State 15

The Clemson team of 1978 was notable for many reasons, and not the least of which was a 17-15 victory over Ohio State in the Gator Bowl. The '78 team won 11 games (eight by convincing margins), had the nation's longest winning streak after the bowl game, changed head coaches 19 days before the Gator Bowl, and ended the coaching career of Woody Hayes.

The first quarter of new Clemson coach Danny Ford's first game was scoreless, although Ohio State had been stopped at the Clemson one-yard line on a fourth down play.

The second quarter was unusual in that there were four possessions in the stanza and each team scored twice. Ohio State drove to the Clemson nine on the passing of Art Schlichter, but the Buckeyes had to settle for Bob Atha's 27-yard field goal.

Clemson quarterback Steve Fuller engineered an impressive 80-yard, 15-play drive of his own after the kickoff. Staying mostly on the ground, Fuller, himself, ran around left end from four yards out to give Clemson the lead. Obed Ariri's point after made the score 7-3.

Schlichter duplicated Fuller's feat nine plays later, but Clemson right end Steve Gibbs blocked Vlade Janakiewski's extra point try, leaving Ohio State in the lead, 9-7.

Clemson got the ball back with 1:15 remaining in the quarter and Fuller passed his way to the Buckeye 30. With only five seconds left, Ariri hit a 47-yard field goal that gave the Tigers a 10-9 lead at halftime.

Clemson scored the only points of the third quarter as the running combination of Fuller, Marvin Sims, and Warren Ratchford ground out 83 yards in 18 plays. Cliff Austin went the final yard for the score, and Ariri's conversion gave Clemson a 17-9 cushion.

With 8:11 left in the game, Schlichter scored his second touchdown to bring Ohio State within two points. Jim Stuckey tackled Schlichter on a sweep to prevent the two-point play, and Clemson still led at 17-15.

Ohio State mounted one final drive, but an interception by second-team middle guard Charlie Bauman (the only theft of his four-year career) killed the drive. Bauman was run out-of-bounds on the Ohio State sideline, and Buckeye coach Woody Hayes swung at the Clemson player. Consecutive unsportsmanlike conduct penalties gave Clemson excellent field position, and Fuller was able to run out the clock, giving Clemson its first win over a Big-Ten team.

# 1979 Peach Bowl

## December 31, 1979 – Atlanta, GA

### Baylor 24, Clemson 18

Clemson made its third consecutive bowl appearance in 1979 after an 8-3 season. The year included a 19-10 win over Gator Bowl-bound North Carolina and a dramatic, come-from-behind 16-10 victory at Notre Dame. The 1979 season was also Danny Ford's first full campaign as head coach.

The Tigers got on the board first with an eight-play, 66-yard drive highlighted by Billy Lott's 27-yard pass to Lester Brown. Brown scored two plays later on a one-yard dive over the middle and Obed Ariri's point after made the score 7-0 midway through the first period.

Baylor took the lead on two second-quarter touchdown passes from Mike Brannon to Bo Taylor and Robert Holt. Robert Bledsoe converted after both scores and the Southwest Conference representatives led 14-7 at intermission.

Clemson took the second half kickoff and a combination of runs by Lott, Brown, and Tracy Perry took the Tigers to the Baylor 22. The drive stalled there and Ariri's 40-yard field goal narrowed the margin to 14-10.

Quarterback Mickey Elam led Baylor on a 64-yard field goal drive after the kickoff, and he later threw a seven-yard touchdown to Raymond Cockrell to push the Bears' led to 24-10.

Andy Headen began Clemson's furious comeback with a blocked punt that was recovered by James Robinson at the Baylor one. Chuck McSwain scored with 20 seconds left in the game and Lott passed to Jeff McCall for the two-point conversion. Headen recovered the ensuing onside kick, and Lott completed a 30-yard pass to Perry Tuttle to move the Tigers to the Baylor 33. An interception killed the winning touchdown drive, however, and Baylor ran out the remaining second for the win.

# 1981 Orange Bowl

## January 1, 1982 – Miami, FL

### Clemson 22, Nebraska 15

After 86 years of playing football, Clemson claimed its first National Championship with a 22-15 win over perennial Big-Eight power Nebraska in the 48th Orange Bowl. After a 13-3 win over 1980 National Champion Georgia at home, the Tigers worked their way to the number-one ranking in both wire service polls by season's end. The win over the Cornhuskers gave Clemson the national title and its third perfect season in history.

Nebraska took the kickoff, but three plays later, Tiger middle guard William Devane recovered a Mark Mauer fumble at the Nebraska 33. Quarterback Homer Jordan drove Clemson to the Nebraska 27 before the drive stalled, and Donald Igwebuike drilled a 41-yard field goal to put the ACC Champions up, 3-0.

Nebraska came right back, however, as the Big-Eight title holder drove 69 yards in eight plays to score on a 25-yard halfback pass from Mike Rozier to Anthony Steels. Kevin Seibel's extra point gave Nebraska the lead at 7-3 with 6:43 to go in the first quarter.

After an exchange of punts, the Clemson offense moved from the Nebraska 42 to the 21 to set up Igwebuike's second field goal. The 37-yard boot narrowed the score to 7-6.

A second-quarter Phil Bates fumble game Clemson the ball at the Nebraska 27, and the running combination of Jordan, Kevin Mack, and Cliff Austin moved the ball to the Cornhusker two. Austin, who had been stuck in the hotel elevator for two hours earlier in the day, scampered in for the score that gave Clemson a lead it would not relinquish.

On its second possession of the second half, Clemson drove 75 yards in 12 plays to score its final touchdown of the night, a 13-yard pass from Jordan to All-America receiver Perry Tuttle in the corner of the end zone. For Tuttle, it was his eighth touchdown grab of the season, which set a school record. Bob Paulling's extra point put the Tigers ahead, 19-7.

After Billy Davis' 47-yard punt return, Jordan moved the Tigers to the Nebraska 20, where Igwebuike kicked a 36-yard field goal, his third of the evening, to put Clemson ahead 22-7 with two-and-a-half minutes left in the third stanza.

Nebraska was down but not out, though. After a near-interception by Jeff Davis, Mauer engineered an eight-play, 69-yard drive that was capped by a 26-yard run by Roger Craig. After a penalty, Craig ran in the two-point conversion from eight yards out to close the gap to 22-15 with nine minutes to play.

The Clemson defense shut down the Big Red on their final extended drive and the offense held on to the ball for nearly five-and-a-half minutes to run down the clock to six seconds. Andy Headen deflected Mauer's desperation pass to preserve the win and the championship for Clemson.

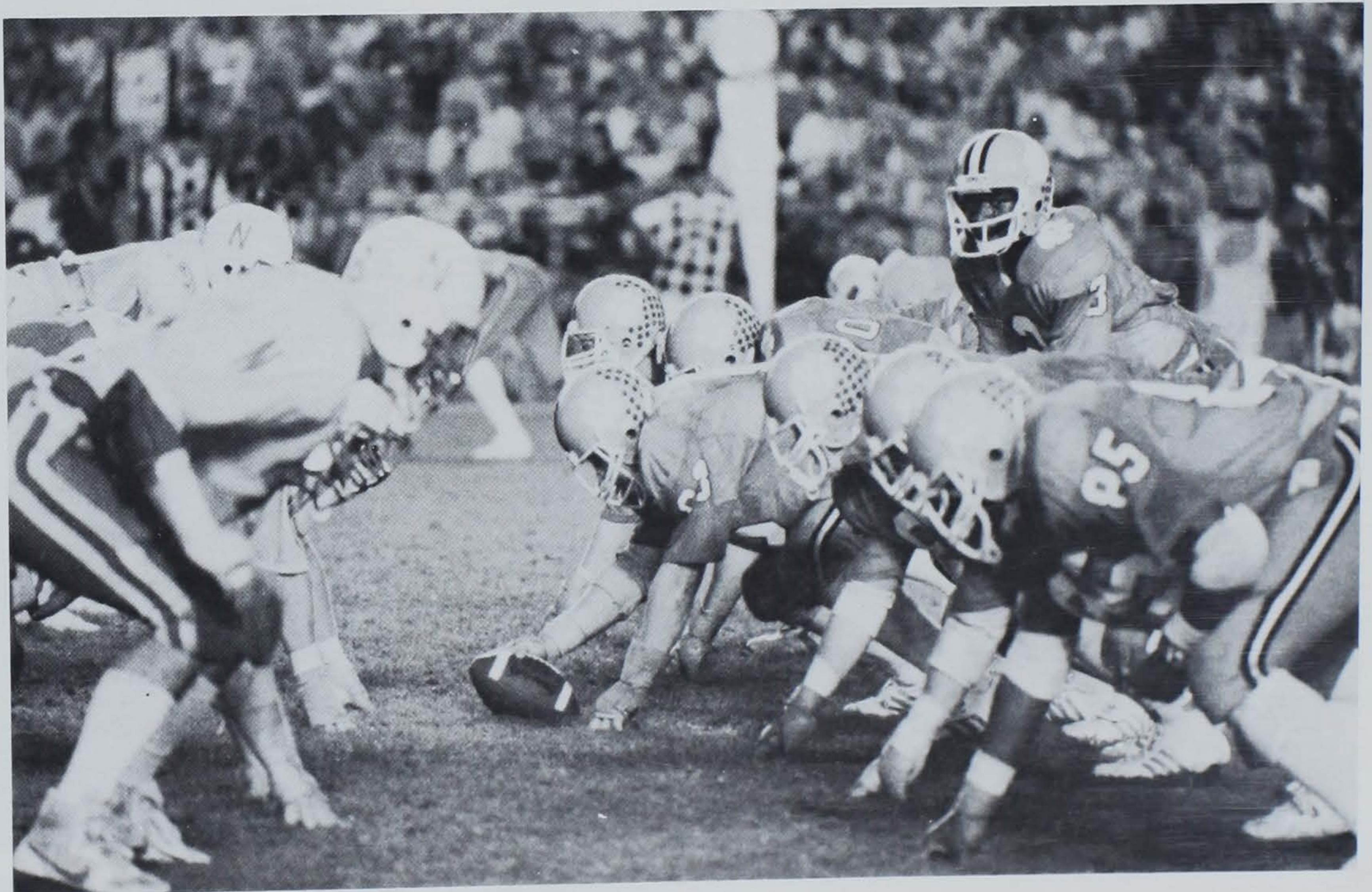

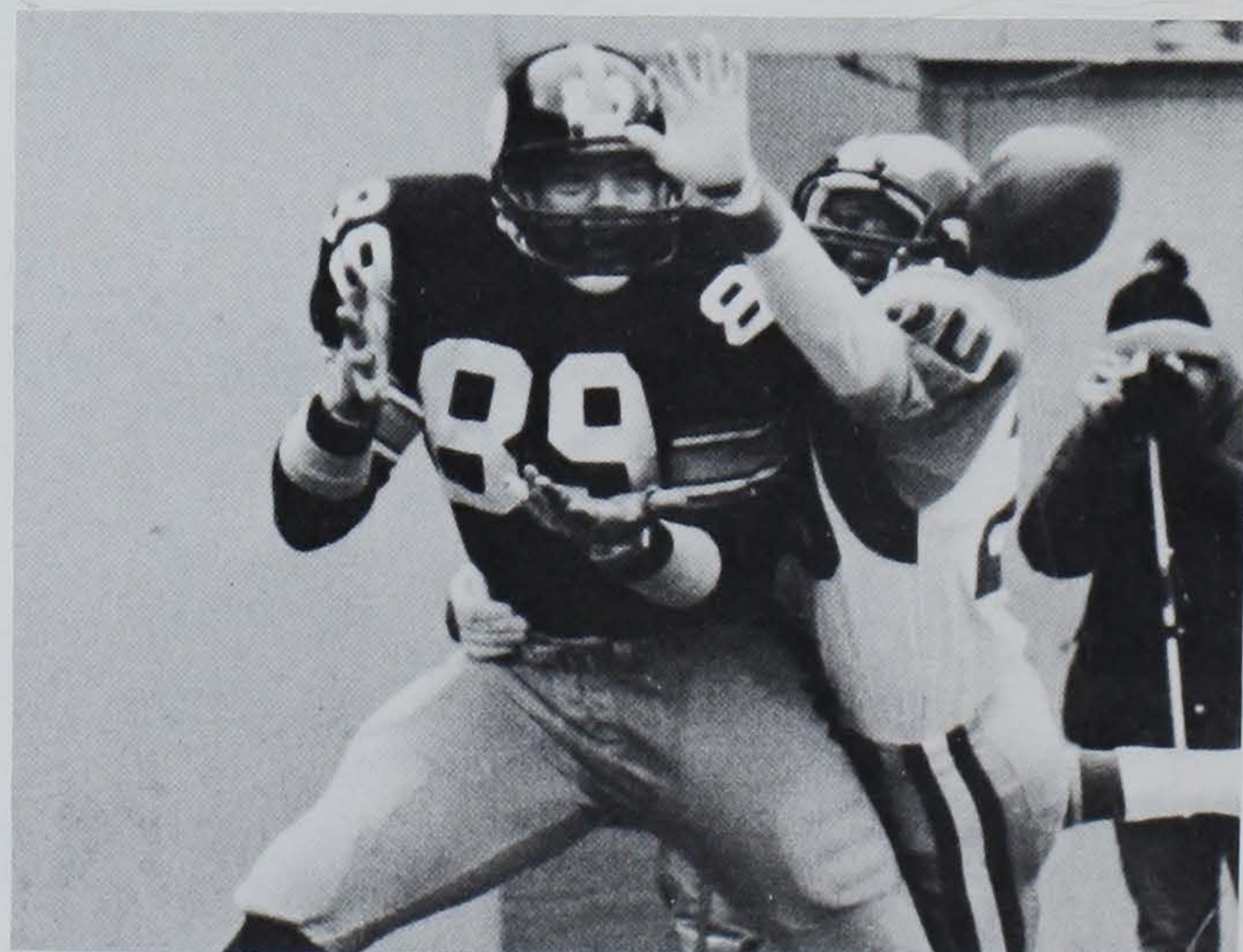
