Press, Radio and TV

If you're assigned to cover a game in Clemson's Memorial Stadium this fall, the following hints will be helpful.

ENTRANCE TO STADIUM/PRESS BOX

Enter through Gate 14 which is located on the press box (South) side of the field. Should you have the need to pick up tickets at our press will call gate, you will pick them up here, at Gate 14. Come through Gate 14, turn right, and go straight to the elevator which will take you to the press box.

PRESS BOX

There are three levels to Clemson's press box, located atop the South stands. The first level is fully enclosed with a glass front, and contains seating accommodations for 67 members of the working press. There are eight separate booths on the second level which house the outside PA, stadium operations & security, Clemson and visiting team field phones, Clemson and visiting team radio networks, and Clemson and visiting team athletic director boxes. All of these booths are enclosed with glass fronts. The third level is open, yet covered. It is so arranged to accommodate film crews for both Clemson and the visiting team's movies, as well as space for TV cinemaphotographers. Our buffet line on the third level is guaranteed to satisfy any appetite.

WORKING CREDENTIALS

We'll appreciate getting these as early as you know your assignment. Requests for working press and photo passes are honored from sports editors of DAILY newspapers and radio and TV sports directors ONLY. Make requests directly to BOB BRADLEY, preferably a week in advance of kickoff to insure adequate mailing time. Spouses, dates, non-workers, and anyone 16 years of age or younger, are not permitted in the press box.

PARKING PASSES AND COMPLIMENTARY TICKETS

There are a limited number of these available for use by the members of the working press, and the sooner we know of your need, the closer we will come to filling your request. Your request should be made directly to BOB BRADLEY.

TELECOPIER AND WESTERN UNION SERVICE

Our press box is equipped with eight (8) outside lines and outlets for your telecopiers, and at no charge to your paper. We will have three telecopiers at the game which can be used on a first-come, first-serve basis, and we also have the press box assistants who are available to send your copy as necessary. THERE IS NO CHARGE FOR ANY OF THESE SERVICES. It is the responsibility of each writer to make prior arrangements with Western Union for that company's service.

SERVICES

We furnish a typed play-by-play, individual and team stats, and coaches' quotes. Also, our communications center staff furnishes you with a packet of first half action shots — six 8 x 10 black & white prints. Lunch, of course, is served on the third level of the press box.

LOCKER ROOM INTERVIEWS

Bob Bradley will escort those writers wishing to go to the Clemson dressing room, whereas the visiting SID will make the trip to the opponent's dressing area. This usually takes place with about three minutes remaining on the scoreboard clock. The dressing rooms are located beneath the West endzone stands, opposite the scoreboard end of the field.

Between these covers you should find just about everything you need to know about the Tigers. Please don't hesitate, however, to call on us at any time.

BILL McLELLAN, Athletic Director

Only the third man to own the title of Athletic Director at Clemson over the past 46 years, Bill McLellan was elevated to his present position February 4, 1971, following what had been more than a decade of service to the University's athletic organization.



A native of Hamer, S. C., the 45-year old McLellan graduated from Dillon High School and entered Clemson where he earned a pair of football letters, and was a member of the Tigers' 1952 Gator Bowl team.

He joined the athletic staff May 1, 1958 from Clemson's Department of Agricultural Economics and Seed Certification where he had spent one year as assistant agronomist and two years as assistant economist.

Although carrying the title of Assistant Business Manager, McLellan has been credited with handling the majority of the department's athletic business and operation long before his appointment into his present role.

In 1966, McLellan was named Assistant Athletic Director, and two years later was appointed Associate Athletic Director.

During his reign as Athletic Director, Clemson's athletic program has experienced a major upheaval.

The Tigers can boast of the finest athletic facilities in not only the Atlantic Coast Conference, but in the South as well.

The modern and spacious Jervay Athletic Center is one of the most complete facilities in America, and this complex serves as the home for Clemson's 18 sports — 12 men's and six women's.

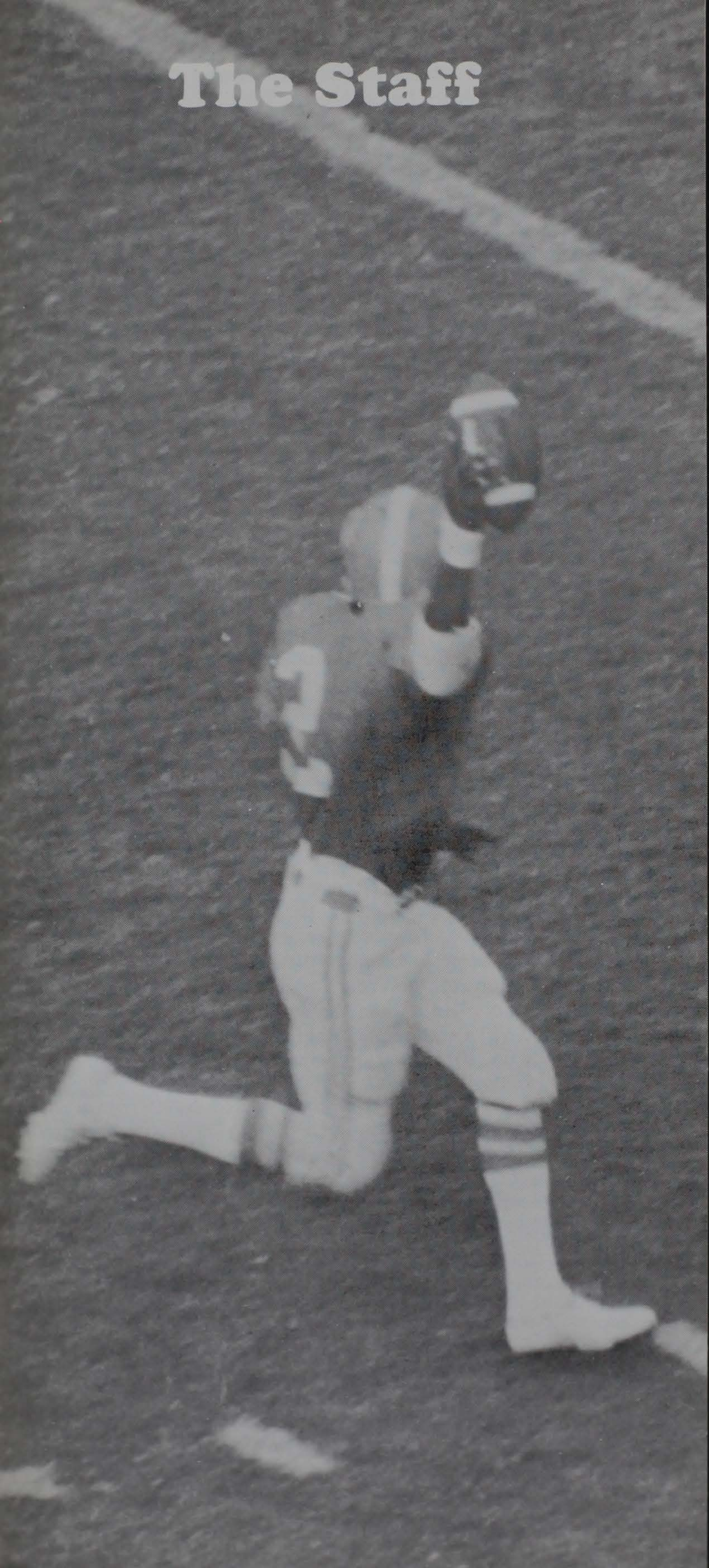
The basketball Tigers play before packed crowds in attractive Littlejohn Coliseum, and many of the Clemson games are telecast on either regional or national networks.

And the football Tigers, after averaging better than 44,000 at home last fall, will be playing in a remodeled Memorial Stadium in '78 that will have some 53,000 permanent seats.

But conference titles and All-American honors have come to other sports as well, and McLellan's direction has given Clemson a program that was ranked 20th in the nation in overall excellence in 1975-76. Moreover, the basketball, fencing, and tennis teams enjoyed top 20 ranking in 1976-77, and the baseball and soccer teams both boasted of the nation's top rank at some point during their respective campaigns.

McLellan earned a BS degree from Clemson in agronomy in '54, and a master's in agricultural economics in '56. He is married to the former Ann Rogers of Fork, S. C. They have four children — Suzy, a senior at Winthrop; Bill, a sophomore at Spartanburg Methodist College; Cliff, a freshman at Tennessee Tech; and Arch Anna, a sophomore at Pendleton High School.

CHARLEY PELL, Head Football Coach

Charles Byron (Charley) Pell was named Clemson's 20th head football coach December 1, 1976.

Born in Albertville, Ala., the 36-year old Pell is in his second year on the Tiger staff, having served as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator during the 1976 campaign.



Pell played but one year of high school football, but went on to the University of Alabama where he was a three-year letterman for the Crimson Tide.

At a light 180 pounds, Pell was a two-way starter as an offensive guard and defensive tackle, and played in the Orange, Sugar, and Bluebonnet Bowls during his career.

In his junior season, '61, Alabama won the National Championship.

Pell entered the coaching profession as a graduate assistant to his former tutor, Paul "Bear" Bryant in '64.

Charlie Bradshaw hired the young Pell as defensive line coach at the University of Kentucky where the latter spent the next four years, from '65 through '68.

Pell's first taste of head coaching came in December of '68 when he was selected to rebuild the Jacksonville, Ala., State University grid program.

During the next five seasons, '69 through '73, Pell built aggressive defensive teams that garnered a five-year mark of 33-13-1, including a 30-7-1 ledger his last four campaigns.

His 1970 JSU team was 10-0 which included a 21-7 win over Florida A&M in the Orange Blossom Classic, and was ranked second in the nation. His '72 team finished 10th nationally, and his '73 squad ranked fourth.

In '70, he was conference, district, area, and state of Alabama Coach of the Year, and runner-up for national coaching honors. He earned the state accolade again in '73.

He joined VPI's staff as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator in 1974, and remained there until coming to Clemson.

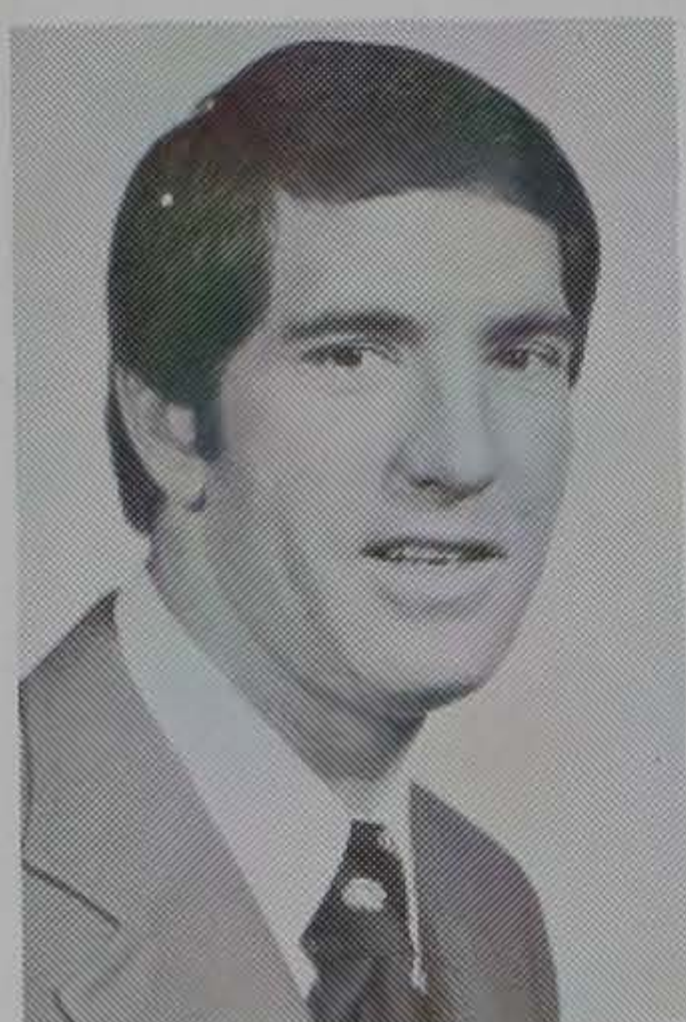
Pell took a defensive unit that ranked 128th nationally prior to his arrival and molded it into one that finished the '75 season as 29th toughest against scoring.

Pell earned his BS degree in business administration from Alabama in '64. He is married to the former Ward Noel of Lexington, Ky., and they have a son — Carrick (7).

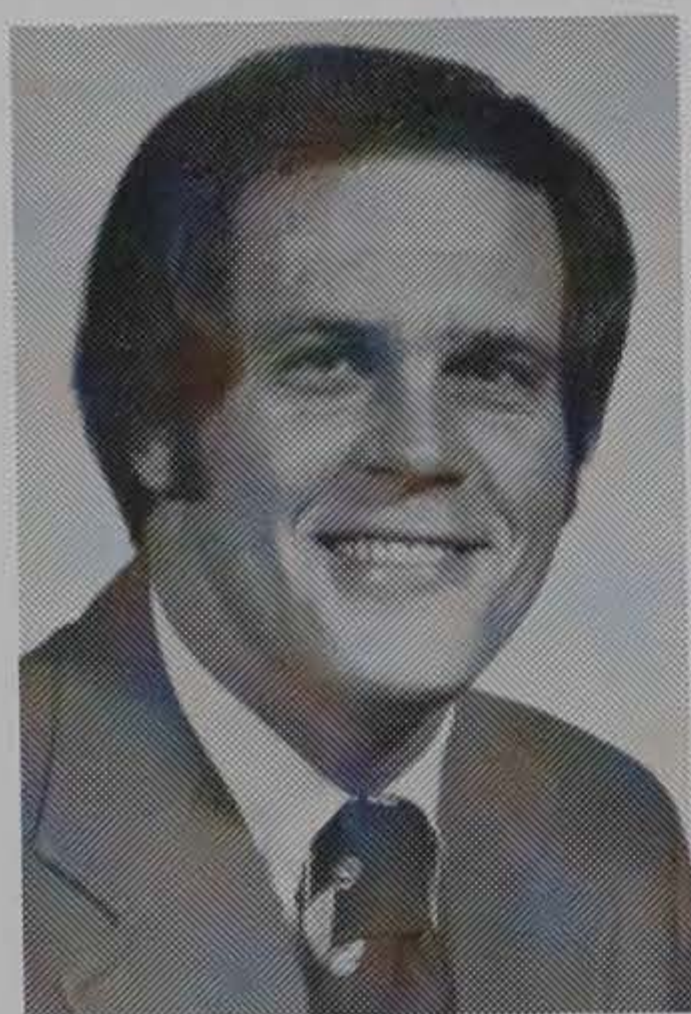
DANNY FORD, Assistant Head Coach & Offensive Line



An All-Southeastern Conference lineman for Paul "Bear" Bryant at the University of Alabama, Danny Ford joined the Clemson staff in January as assistant head coach and offensive line tutor. The 29-year old Gadsden, Ala., native came to Tigertown from Virginia Tech where he was the offensive coordinator and line coach for the past three seasons. A '66 graduate of Gadsden High School, Ford earned all-league and All-SEC Academic honors as an offensive tackle in '69 and played in the Cotton, Gator, and Liberty Bowls as a Crimson Tide gridder. A tight end his first two

years, he played in the Blue-Gray Classic in '69. A graduate assistant at 'Bama in '70 & '71, Bryant made Ford a full time assistant the next two seasons. He went to VPI in '74. Ford, who holds a BA in industrial arts ('69) and an MA in special education ('71) from Alabama, is married to the former Deborah Anderson of Attalla, Ala., They have two daughters, Jennifer Renee (4) and Ashleigh Lynn (2).

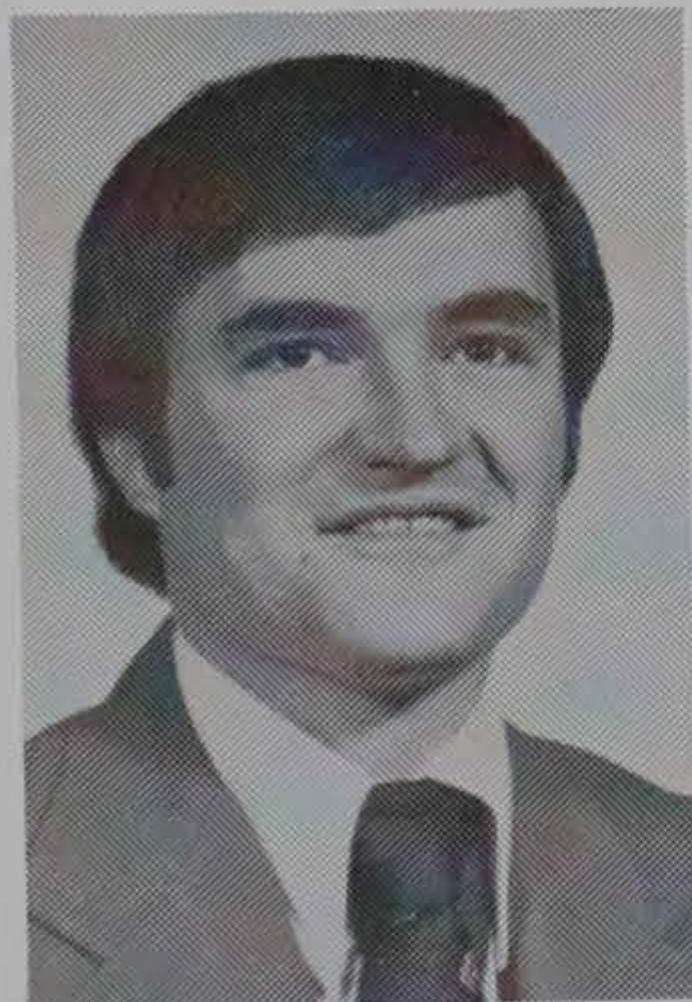
JIMMYE LAYCOCK, Offensive Coordinator



A former graduate assistant at Clemson, Jimmye Laycock returned to Tiger-town in December as offensive coordinator and backfield coach. Born in Leesburg, Va., Laycock prepped at Loudon Valley HS in Purcellville, Va., and played his college ball at William & Mary where he was a starter at both defensive back and quarterback. He was an assistant at Newport News, Va., HS in '70 and grad assistant at Clemson the next two seasons. Laycock was offensive backfield coach at the Citadel in '73 & '74, and in the latter season had a tailback who ranked sixth nation-

ally in rushing. The 29-year old Laycock coached the quarterbacks at Memphis State in '75 & '76, with his signal-caller Lloyd Patterson earning All-Southern honors this past fall. He earned his AB in physical education from William and Mary in '70 and a master's in education from Clemson in '72. Laycock is married to the former Ginnie Klemkowski of Baltimore.

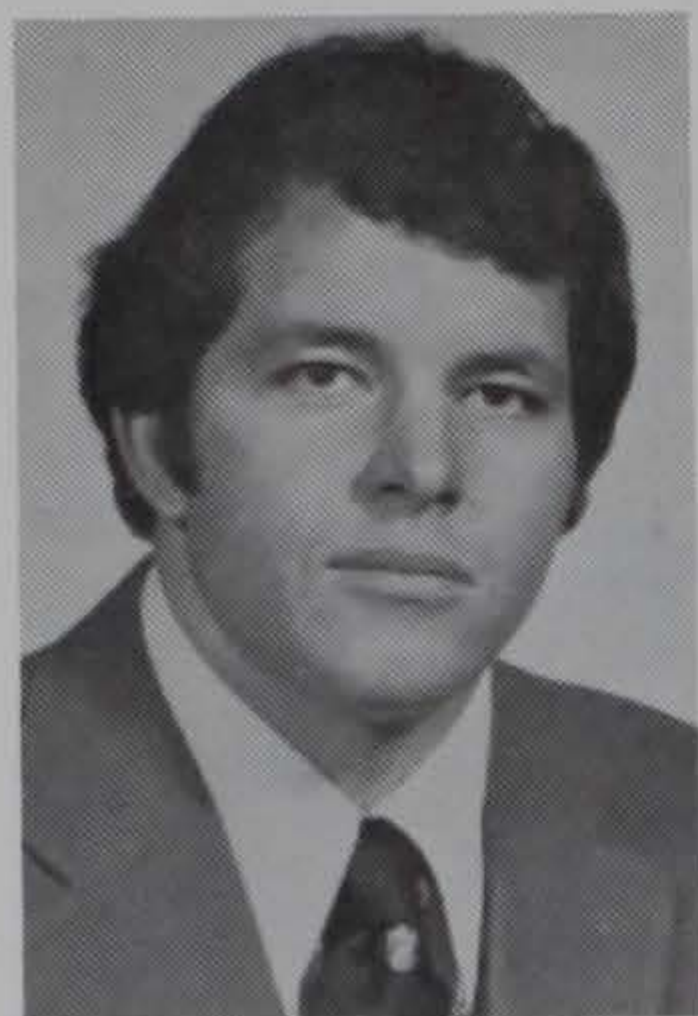
TOM MOORE, Receivers



Tom Moore is in his seventh season as a Clemson football assistant, having joined the Tiger staff prior to the '71 campaign. Born in Dayton, O., the 32-year old Moore prepped at Beaver Falls, Pa., High School where he played in the same backfield with Joe Namath. His collegiate days were spent at The Citadel where he was a running back/split receiver, earning All-Southern Conference honors as a senior. His coaching career began with a one-year stint in '67 as offensive coordinator at Aurora Central, Colo., High School. In 1968 he joined the staff at Wichita State and

tutored the frosh that year, then served as receiver coach in '69 & '70. He was a Jayvee coach at Clemson from '71 through '74, then elevated to the varsity staff as defensive backfield assistant in '75 & '76. Moore earned a BS in political science from The Citadel in '67. He's married to the former Joyce Stewart of Clemson, and they have two children — Rhett (6) and Ashley (3).

BUDDY KING, Assistant Offensive Line and Dorm Director



Buddy King, who started and lettered for the Clemson Tigers as an offensive lineman from 1970 through 1972, is in his third season on the football staff. Born in Conway, King spent his prep days in Concord, Calif., before coming to Tigertown on a grid scholarship offer. King remained at Clemson as a student assistant while completing work on his undergraduate degree, and immediately following graduation was named as offensive line coach at Wofford College. His stint with the Terriers ran through the 1973 and 1974 campaigns. He returned to Clemson prior

to the '75 slate and has worked with the offensive linemen in addition to serving as dormitory director of Mauldin Hall, home of the Tiger footballers. King earned a BS in recreation and park administration from Clemson in '73. His wife, the former Mary Kennerty of Charleston, is Clemson's Lady Tiger tennis coach.

MICKEY ANDREWS, Defensive Coordinator & Secondary



With 12 years of coaching experience under his belt, Mickey Andrews will enter the 1977 season as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Clemson. The 36-year old Daleville, Ala., native was named the most versatile athlete at Alabama in 1964 where he was an All-SEC outfielder and NEA 2nd team All-America defensive back. He played in two Orange Bowls and one Sugar Bowl at 'Bama. After a one year assistantship at Erwin High School in Birmingham in '65, Andrews jumped to the college ranks as an assistant at Eastern Kentucky in '66, and at Livingston, Ala., University from '67 through '69. He was tabbed head coach at Livingston in '70 and had a three-year mark of 23-7-2, which included the NAIA National Championship in '71. Andrews served as head coach and AD at North Alabama for the last four years. He earned a BS from 'Bama in '65 and MA in '70 from Livingston. Married to the former Diane Cook of Ozark, Ala., they have two children — Ronnie (11) and Shannon (8).

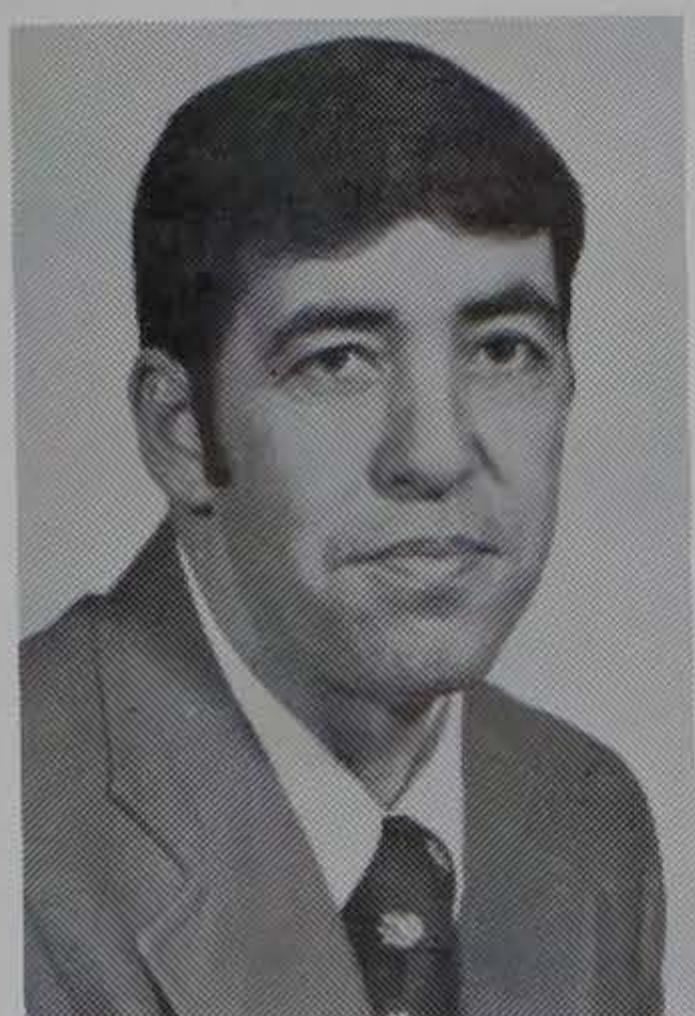
DWIGHT ADAMS, Defensive Ends



Dover, Ark., native Dwight Adams begins his second season as defensive end coach at Clemson, and fifth campaign on the Tiger coaching staff. The 45-year old Adams played at Henderson, Ark., State, then spent five campaigns in the high school coaching ranks before he moved to the college scene. He was head mentor at Pine Bluff, Ark., High School four years and assistant coach at Lake Charles, La., High School one year. In '66 he journeyed to the Palmetto State as an assistant at The Citadel. He remained there through the '72 campaign, and his seven-year coach-

ing tenure with the Bulldogs were spent with the linebackers and the defensive ends. Adams also coached the school's track team. He received his BS in education from Henderson State in '58. Adams is married to the former Jo Bickham of Tillar, Ark., and they have three children — Jana (19), Scott (17), and Ruth (14).

JERRY KIRK, Defensive Line



Jerry Kirk came to Clemson in December after spending the past five seasons with Lou Holtz at N. C. State and the New York Jets. Born in Benham, Ky., Kirk graduated from Benham HS in '56, then entered East Tennessee State University where he was an All-Ohio Valley Conference center for two seasons. The 39-year old Kirk was a grad assistant at Kentucky in '63; assistant at Winchester, Ky., High School in '64; and head coach at WHS in '65. After two years at Lees-McRae JC, where the Bobcats were 2nd in the nation in '67, he was an assistant to Hank Norton at Ferrum, Va., JC four seasons, which included a '68 National Juco title. Kirk went to four bowls with N. C. State from '73 - '75 as a defensive end and linebacker coach, then tutored the New York Jet backs last fall. He earned a BS in biology from ETSU in '63 and a master's in '68 from Kentucky. Kirk is married to the former Frankie Jordan of Lynch, Ky. They have two children — Jerry, Jr. (19) and Terri Lynne (17).

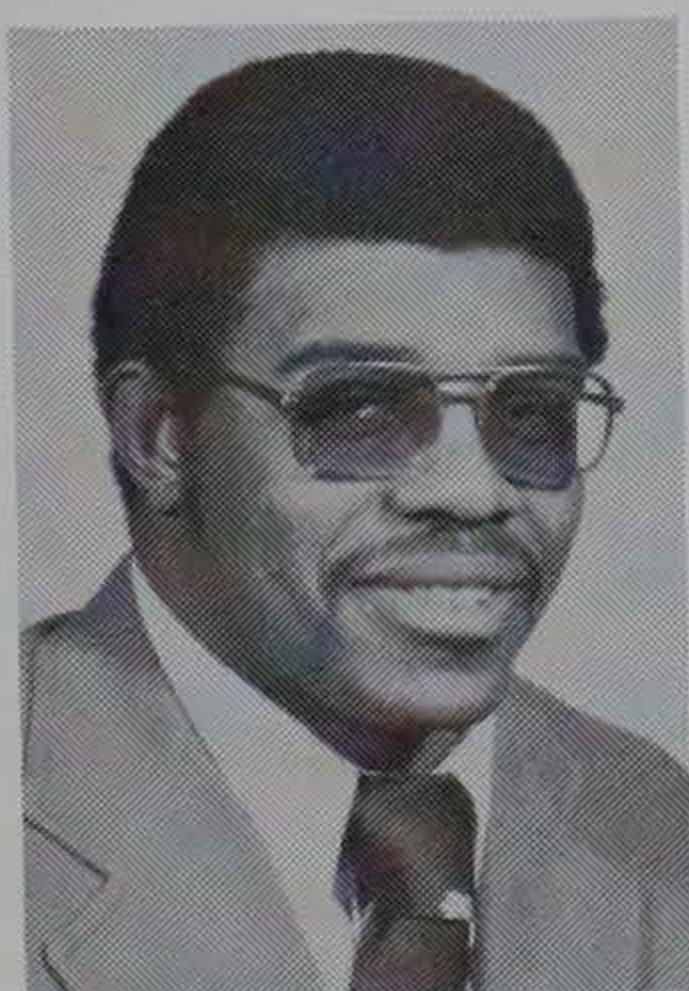
JOE KINES, Linebackers



Joe Kines was the first coach to join Charley Pell's Clemson staff last December. The 33-year old native of Piedmont, Ala., came to Tigertown from Jacksonville, Ala., State where he had spent the past five seasons. His JSU defense allowed but 10 points a game during the last three campaigns. He prepped at Cedartown, Ga., HS and played at Jacksonville State. In '65 he served as grad assistant at JSU, then as an assistant at Newnan, Ga., HS in '67 and '68. Kines was head mentor at Chattooga County, Ga., HS from '69 through '71, then went back to his alma

mater in '72. In 11 years of coaching, Kines has never been associated with a non-winning program. He earned his BS in physical education in '66 and master's in '71 from JSU. Married to the former Ruby Bell of Lafayette, Ga., the Kines have a daughter, Susan Lynn (10).

WILLIE ANDERSON, Graduate Assistant and Jayvee Coach



An All-Atlantic Coast Conference nose guard for the Tigers in '74, Willie Anderson returned to his alma mater last December as a graduate assistant and head jayvee coach. Born in Mayesville, the 25-year old Anderson earned AP National Lineman of the Week honors for a 17-solo tackle performance against South Carolina in '74. He spent the '75 season as a student assistant at Tiger-town, then following graduation that December, was a grad assistant with the basketball staff during the spring '76. Anderson went to Chamblee, Ga., High School as defensive coordinator

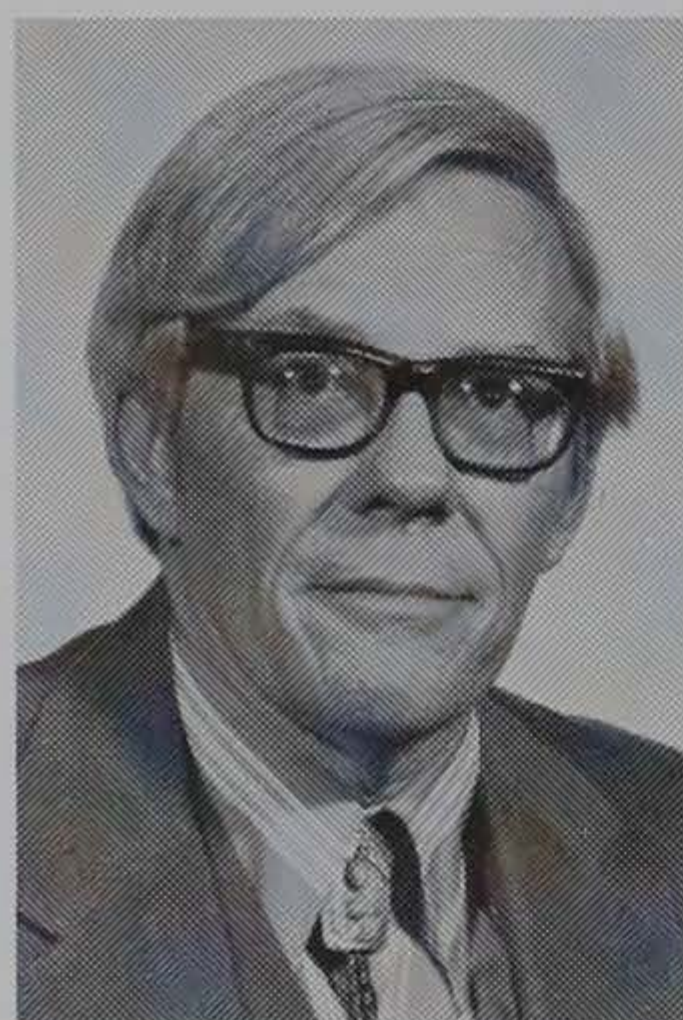
in '76. He earned his BS in history at Clemson in '75, and is married to the former Gail Young of Piedmont, a '74 Clemson honor graduate.

CLYDE WRENN, Recruiting Coordinator



Clyde Wrenn, a former high school coach and athletic director, is beginning his sixth season on the Clemson staff, and fifth as recruiting coordinator for the Tigers. Born in Chester, the 34-year old Wrenn played baseball at Spartanburg JC, then spent his last two years at N. C. State. His coaching career began with a five-year term at Florence's Southside HS as a grid assistant and head baseball coach. He spent the '70 and '71 seasons as head football coach and athletic director at West Florence High School. He was a jayvee assistant in '72, his first year at Clemson. Wrenn earned a BS from NCSU in recreation and park administration in '65 and a master's in education from Western Carolina in '70. He is married to the former Willa Lynn of Chester. They have two sons — Craig (7) and Cal (5).

RICK ROBBINS, Academic Advisor



Austin, Tex., native Rick Robbins has spent the past 10 years as "Braincoach" of the Clemson Tiger athletes. The 56-year old Texan was a career Army officer with over 25 years of active service. Before his retirement with the rank of lieutenant colonel, Robbins' military stint included ROTC assistant professorships at both the University of Houston and Clemson. "Colonel Robbins," as he is known to the Tiger athletes, has also served the department as assistant track coach during his tenure with the University. Robbins received his Bachelor of Business Administration from the University of Texas in '49. Married to the former Clare Eaves of Palestine, Tex., the Robbins have two sons — Dick, who graduated with high honors from Clemson last spring, and entered graduate school at Georgetown University this fall; and Tommy, who entered Clemson in August.

FRED HOOVER, Head Trainer



Fred Hoover is entering his 19th season as coordinator of Clemson's training and sports medicine program. 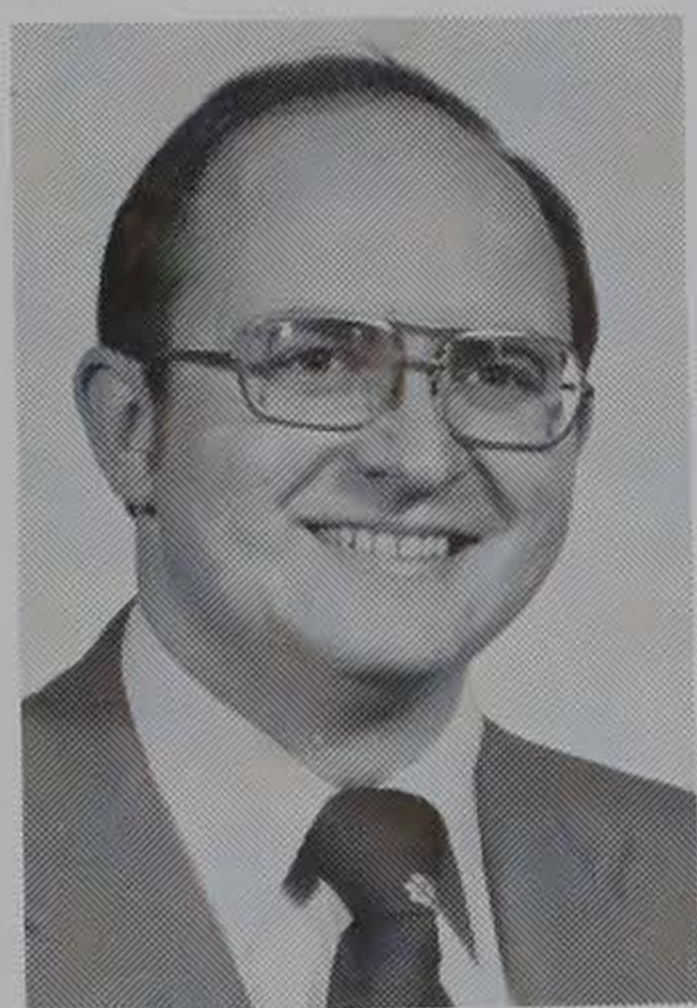
HERMAN McGEE, Assistant Trainer

LARRY SUTTON, Assistant Trainer



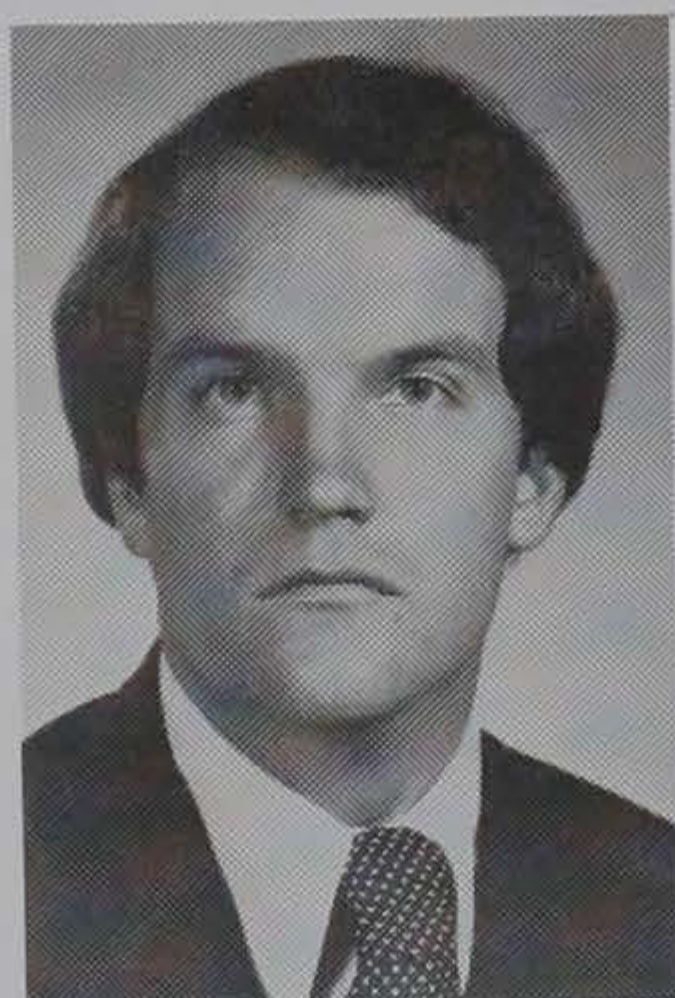

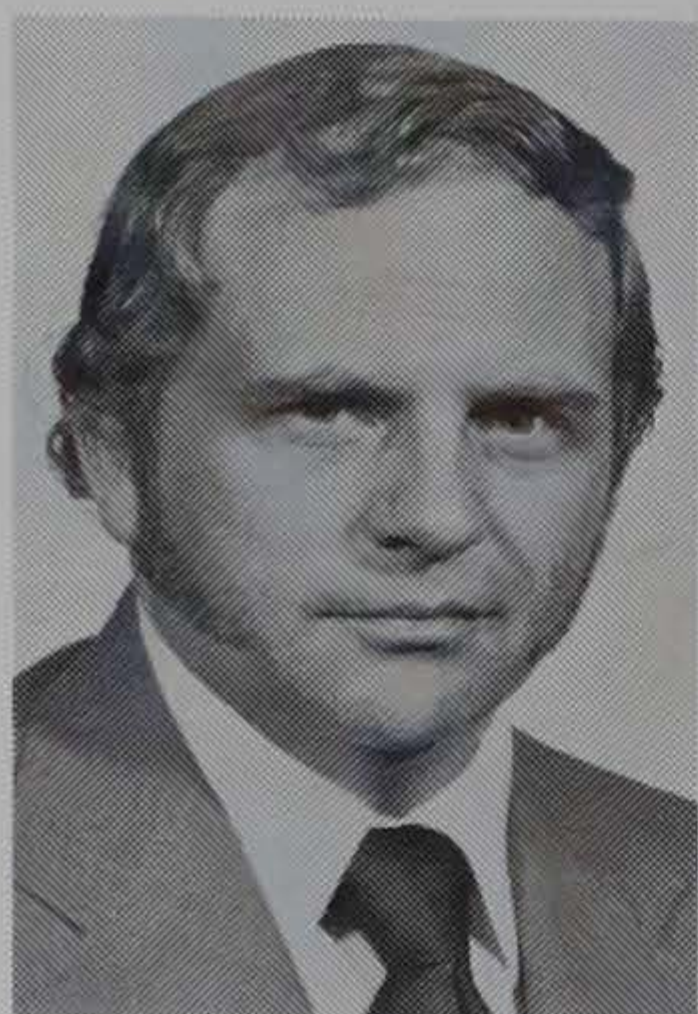

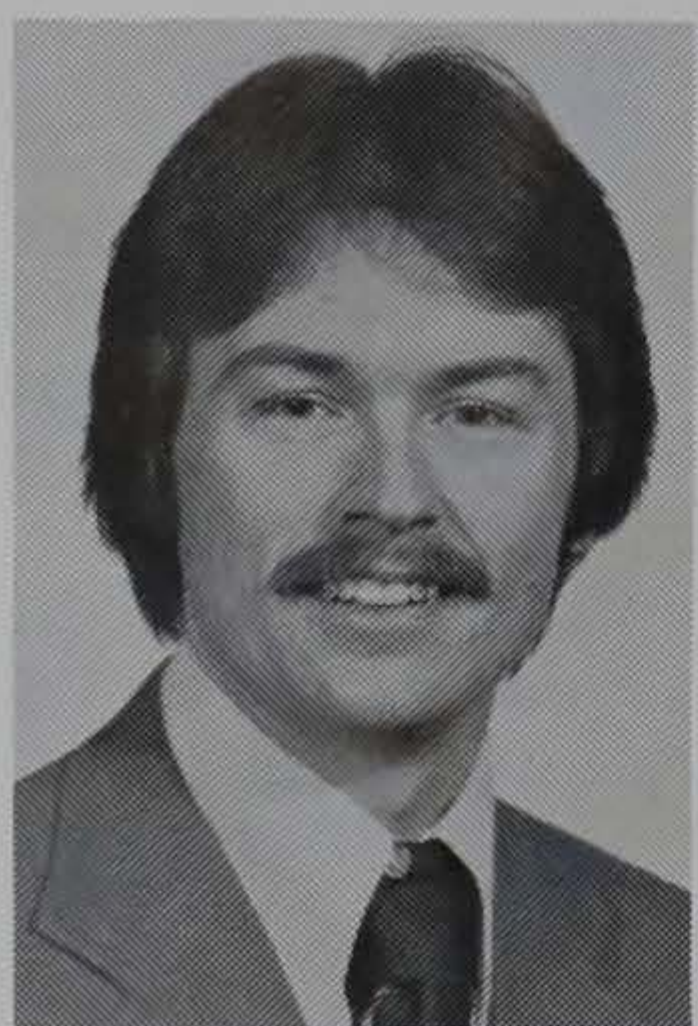
GEORGE DOSTAL, Strength & Weight Development

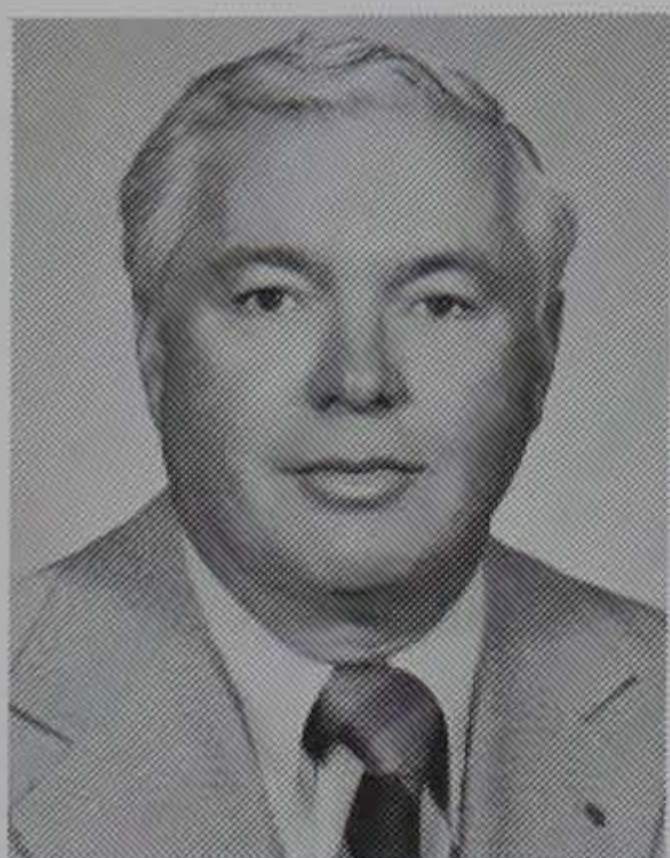
LEN GOUGH, Equipment Manager

brothers — Sammy and Jim — are both serving as student managers at Tigertown. Gough received his BTT degree in December of '74 from CU in textile technology. He is single.

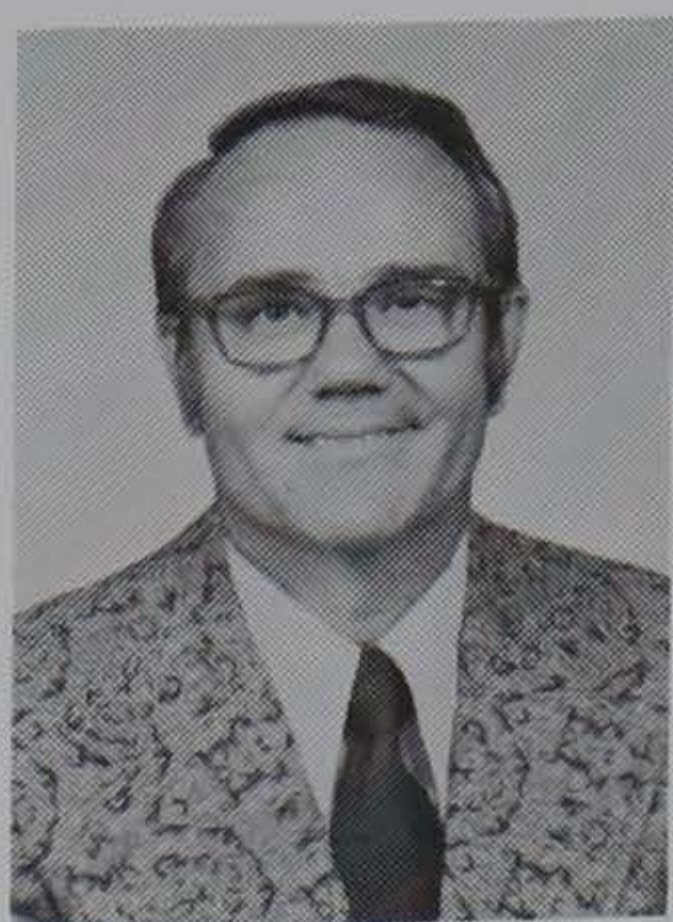

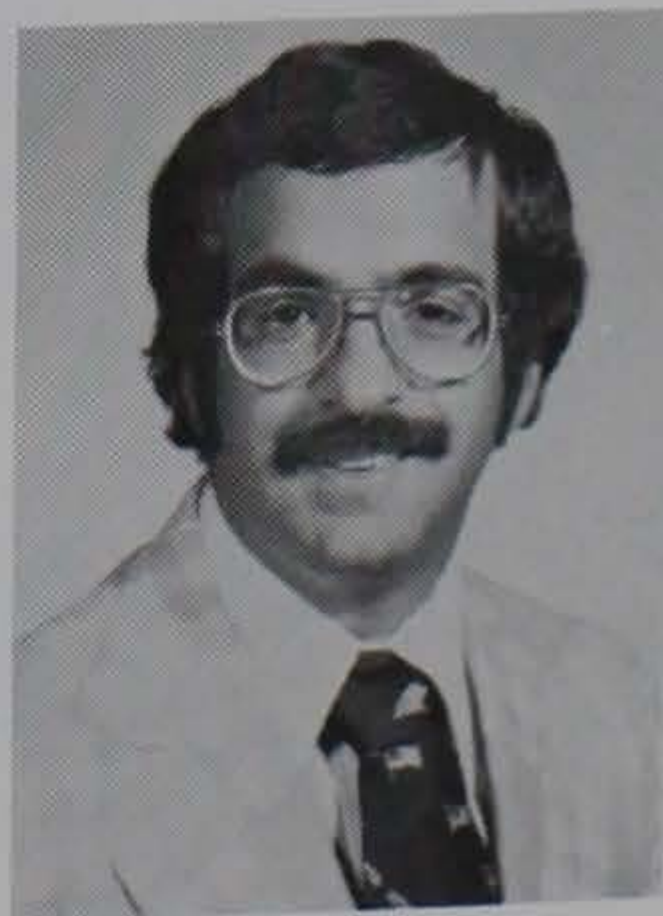

1977 Tiger Outlook

OVERALL

Charley Pell was named Clemson's head football coach December 1st, and directed his Tigers through their first off-season workouts with 45 letterwinners forming the nucleus of his 1977 gridiron team.

Offensively, the Tigers return nine starters, with only FLK Joey Walters and TE Harold Cain missing from the '76 unit. In the spring, Clemson scrapped the veer and went to the "I" formation in what Pell termed "a smooth adjustment." Yet the most satisfying part of the new offense in the spring had little to do with X's and O's, but with a reduction in mistakes and turnovers which have plagued the Tiger attack for the past two years.

Defensively, Clemson will employ a basic "50" front with a four-deep secondary, and Pell has eight starters back from last fall. He'll have to find replacements for DB's Malcolm Marler and O. J. Tyler and MG Nelson Wallace. "We were not able to accomplish as much defensively as we had planned," said Pell of his team's spring drills, "but this was largely because of a slower-than-anticipated development of the secondary. We'll have to catch up during the early fall practices."

FALL PRACTICE PLANS

The Annual Press & Picture Day is tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, August 16th, in Memorial Stadium.

The first practice is slated for Wednesday, August 17th, and the Tigers will work out twice daily until classes begin Friday, August 26th. The team will work at 4:00 p.m. daily after that.

There will be no Sunday practices.

THE OFFENSE

THE QUARTERBACKS

Steve Fuller showed why he was the number one quarterback with a superb spring. He had one start as a freshman in '75 and nine starts last fall, and gained considerable field leadership during the off-season work. Soph Billy Lott gives Clemson a very capable backup with much potential. This should be one of the Tigers' finest areas.

THE RUNNING BACKS

An area of "big-uns and little-uns," according to Pell, and where the Tigers desperately need a pair to move to the head of the class. Diminutive Warren Ratchford had a bright spring at tailback, and right behind him is lean Lester Brown. Tracy Perry and Bob Coffey adjusted well to their new roles as fullbacks in the "I," and both had their moments in the spring. But an automobile accident in the summer ended Coffey's playing career. Marvin Sims, Rick Basich, and Steve Godfrey will all be a factor in the fall, as will Harold Goggins, who missed the off-season workouts for disciplinary reasons. Ken Callicutt missed the '76 season because of academic deficiencies, and is back in quest of Clemson's all-time rushing title.

THE RECEIVERS

This should be a superb group in the fall, following a most impressive spring. Fleet Jerry Butler has great talent and is a bona fide all-star candidate at SE, and his understudy Eric Young performed well in the spring. FLK's Rick Weddington, Willie Jordan, and Dwight Clark are versatile athletes with gifted ability, and there was a three-way fight for the TE spot in the spring among Mark Clifford, Anthony King, and Cliff Bray. Trav Webb, who played two other positions in the off-season, could be a factor here.

THE LINE

There are some players here who have the potential to be very good. But just how good the entire unit will be depends on how Lacy Brumley, Jimmy Weeks, Jim Wells, Steve Kenney, and Danny Jaynes can make up the work they missed during the spring because of injuries. All but Jaynes have been starters. Joe Bostic is truly outstanding, big, and should be one of the best in the ACC. Thad Allen and Billy Hudson had their best springs ever, and Juco Ron West showed promise. Newcomers who demonstrated the potential to help were Chris Dolce, Greg Earley, Jeff Bostic, and Chris Pickens.

THE DEFENSE

THE FRONT LINE

The brightest of all defensive areas in the spring. Archie Reese and Jim Stuckey dominated the tackle spots in the spring, and Ken Weichel showed he was a steady performer. Jeff Mills got in but three days of work after coming off knee surgery and missing the entire '76 season. Middle guard could be a strong point with Toney Williams and Rich Tuten. Tuten fully recovered from a broken leg suffered in the season finale a year ago when the Tigs whipped South Carolina 28-9. Jonathan Brooks heads a cast of ends that includes Mark Heniford and Steve Gibbs. All eight of these returnees have been starters during their respective careers.

THE LINEBACKERS

Bubba Brown and Randy Scott had solid performances on the first unit during the spring game, and look for Ronnie Smith, Matt Smith, and Jim Goehring to contribute playing time here.

THE SECONDARY

A serious rebuilding plan was on the drawing board as the Tigers entered spring practice, and entering the fall workouts this area shows promise. With Willie Jordan converted to FLK, the secondary was without three '76 starters. Rex Varn, the lone returning starter, had a good spring, as did Brian Kier and red-shirt Ogden Hansford. One of the most impressive players was senior Roy Eppes who has not seen much playing time during his career. He found a home at cornerback and made tremendous strides at becoming a top hand. Juco transfers Bubba Rollins and Al Latimer appear ready to help along with Gary Webb and soph Rick Wyatt.

THE KICKING GAME

The most improved area of the entire team may be the placement chores which Jimmy Russell and newcomer Obed Ariri handled in the off-season. But the punting left much to be desired as the Tigers concluded the drills without finding an established punter. Pell, who points out that more games are won or lost on the kicking game than any other area, says that "solving the punting situation will be a strong factor on our fortunes in 1977."

CHARLEY PELL COMMENTS ON . . .

1977 SPRING PRACTICE

"We are pleased with what was accomplished in the spring, and we made some improvements in certain areas. Still, we are far from being a good football team. Our players and coaches realize this, however, and know what we must do if we are to reach our potential in the fall."

STRENGTHS

"Talented Jerry Butler heads a cast of receivers that could be our best area, and they made marked improvement in the off-season, as did our quarterbacks. Also, the defensive front line made solid strides at becoming a good unit. Our field goal kickers, a problem area in '76, gave us consistency in the spring."

WEAKNESSES

"Depth will eventually become our most critical area, mainly because of our rugged schedule early in the year. We must be able to count on the young players who demonstrated the ability to challenge for playing time during the spring."

THE SCHEDULE

"We open with ACC champ Maryland then meet SEC champ Georgia in game number two. We have to expect more from our people because we will have to be as good as we can be, while they (Maryland and Georgia) can afford to be patient. Both have tremendous teams with great talent, depth, and experience, but we're looking forward to the challenge, and know that our young people consider it a great opportunity."

INCOMING FRESHMEN

"It's most difficult to project our incoming freshmen into the picture for the fall, or to know how soon they will help the team. We feel that we have a good group of signees, and feel that there are some with the ability to contribute to the team early in the year."

ALL-STAR CANDIDATES

"Joe Bostic was our most outstanding lineman in the spring, and he is truly one of the best in the ACC."

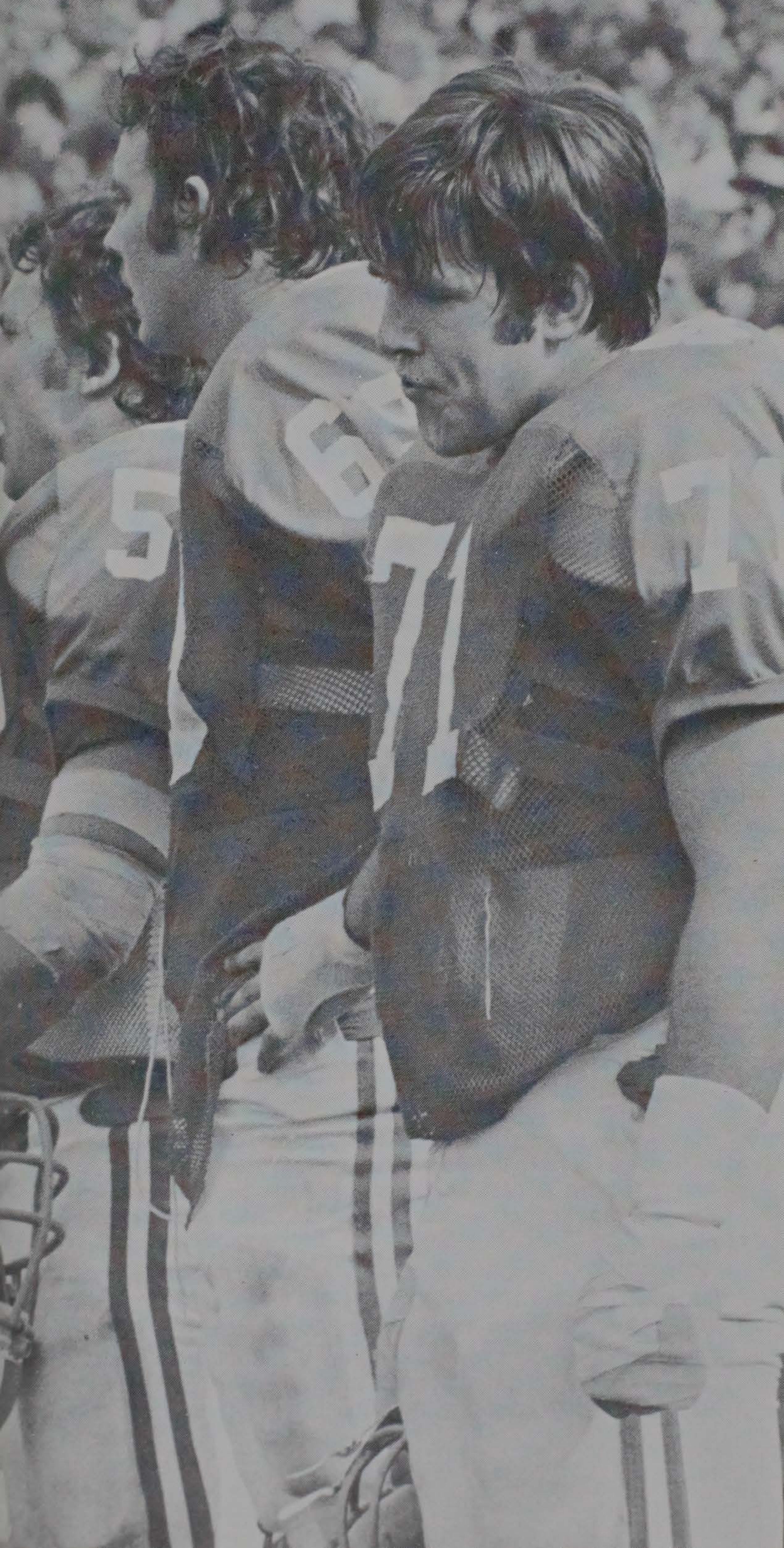
"Jerry Butler is a talented athlete with unlimited potential, and he'll leave his name in the record book before he graduates."

Obed Ariri kicked three field goals, the last a 28-yard effort with 22 seconds showing on the scoreboard clock, as the Orange downed the White 22-20 before 15,000 Clemson partisans in the Tigers' 1977 spring game.

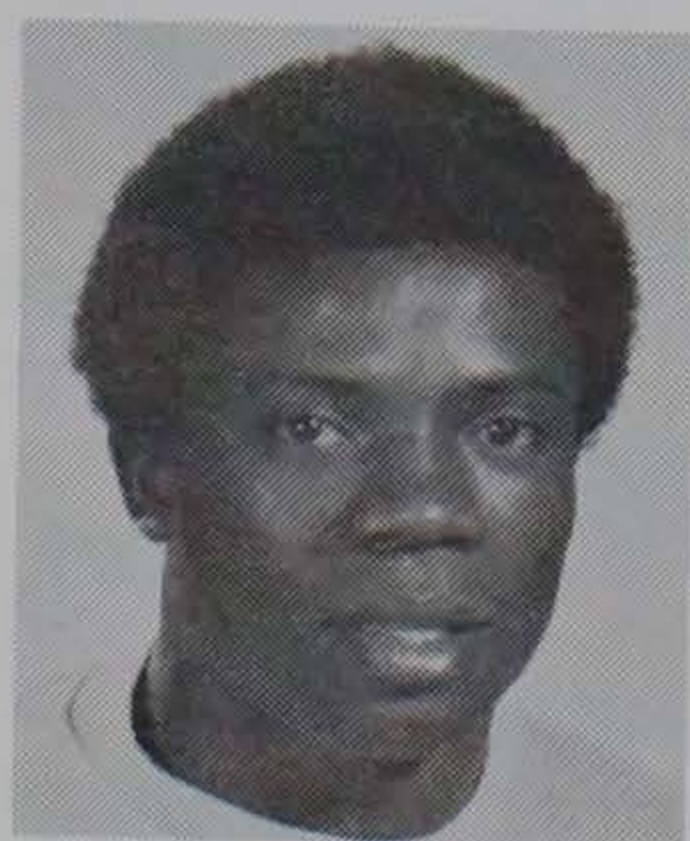
The winning tally was set up by Randy Scott who blocked a White punt with less than three minutes to play, giving the Orange a first down at the White 36.

The contest opened on an equally exciting note as Steve Fuller connected with Eric Young on the very first play from scrimmage for a 65-yard TD. Ariri's PAT spotted the Orange a 7-0 lead.

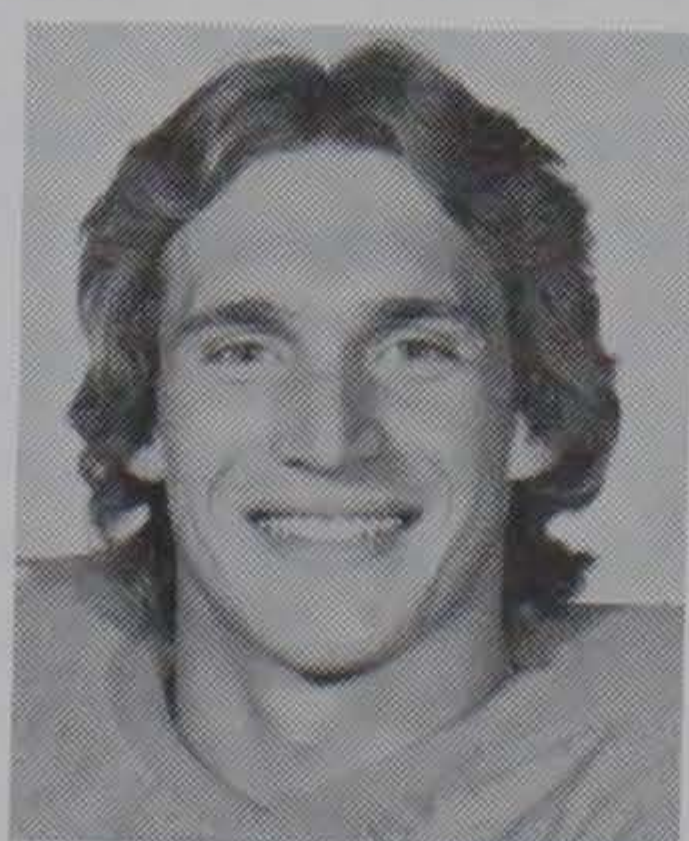
After an exchange of punts, the White team took advantage of a short boot by the Orange and had a first down at the latter's 26. Six plays later Jimmy Russell struck for a 22-yard field goal.

As the first period was winding down, another poor punt gave the Orange possession at the White 30, and on the fourth play of the second stanza, Ariri's 33-yard FG put the Orange on top 10-3.

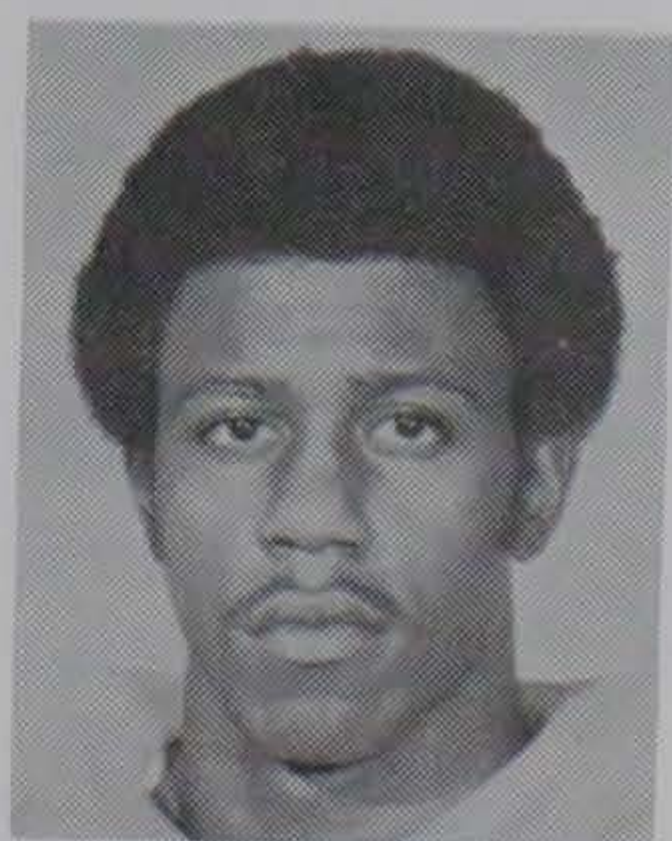

For the sixth consecutive season, Jim Phillips (left) and Scott Shannon will bring Clemson Tiger Football to the homes of fans throughout the entire state of South Carolina.

Phillips, four times named the state's sportscaster of the year and sports director at Greenville's WFBC-TV, has been the Voice of the Tigers since 1968. Shannon, also a member of the WFBC broadcasting staff, joined the Tiger network as color commentator in 1972.

WFBC AM/FM will again originate the Tiger Network, headed by general manager Bob Rice, with a minimum of 35 stations and as many as possibly 65 stations scheduled to air the Clemson games in 1977.

Both teams failed to move the ball after another punt exchange, but the Orange, on its next possession, moved from its 41 to the White 8, and with no time left on the clock, Ariri's 26-yard field goal was sailing through the uprights for a 13-10 Orange halftime lead.

The White took its first lead with 6:02 left in the third quarter when Warren Ratchford dashed around left end for a 37-yard TD. Russell tacked on the point after for a 17-13 total.

Russell extended the White lead to 20-13 with 9:55 to play on a 33-yard field goal, but the Orange came right back for a well-executed 65-yard scoring drive.

Fuller carried the Orange that distance in 10 plays, aided by a 16-yard toss to Rick Weddington on a crucial third down play, and the Orange quarterback got what was a nifty TD run in motion.

Fuller swept to his right for six yards, and upon being contained by the onrushing Whites, flipped the pigskin to Rick Basich who went the final 19 yards down the sideline to paydirt, bringing the Orange within one point at 20-19.

But a fumble on the two-point conversion try seemed to be the deciding factor as only 5:30 remained to be played.

A 15-yard penalty after a two-yard run by Bob Coffey put the ball on the Orange 47 with a first down, and the White looked in command at this point.

However, an incomplete pass and two rushing plays netted just seven yards, setting up the punting situation and the stage for Scott's heroics.

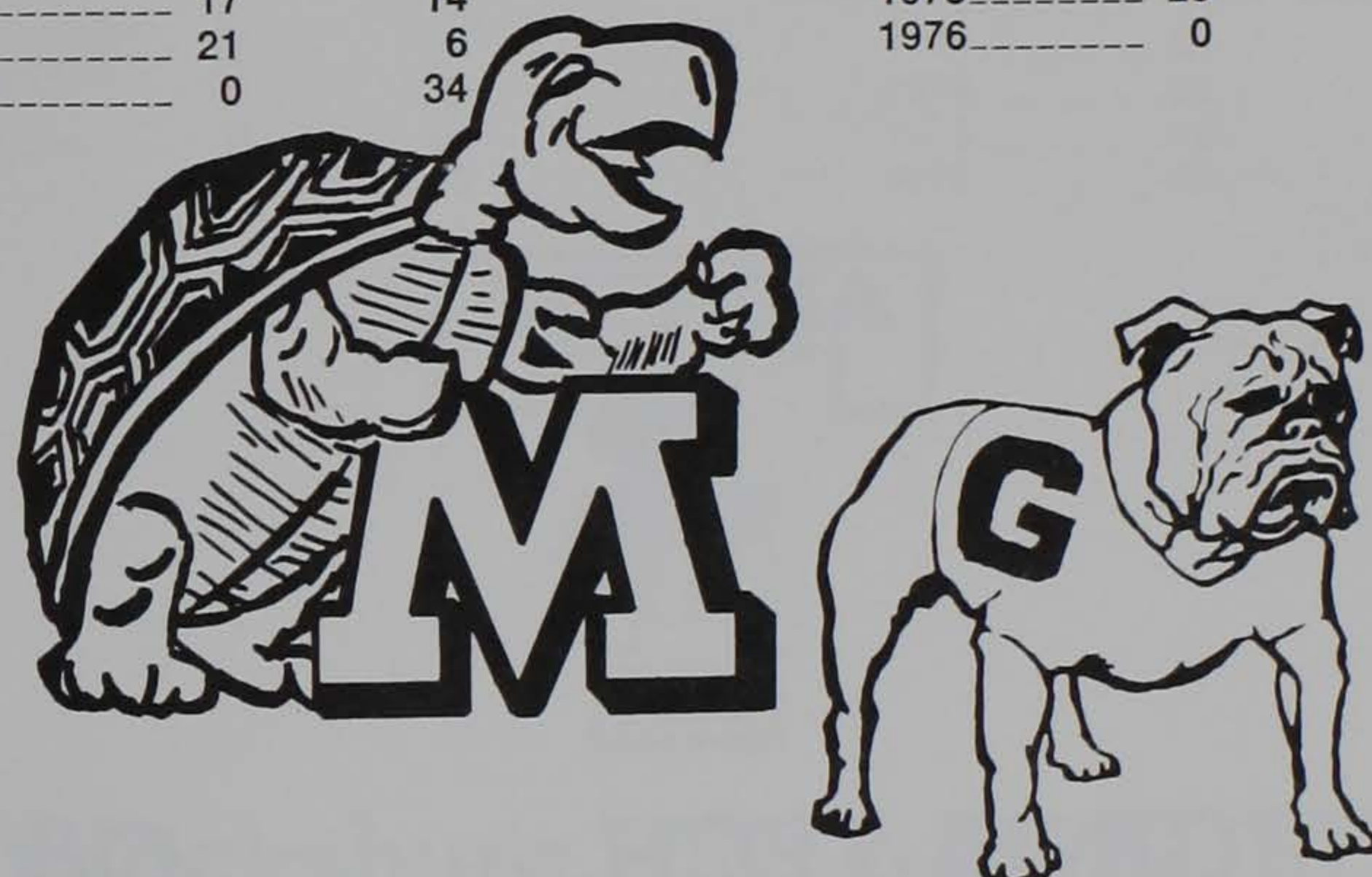

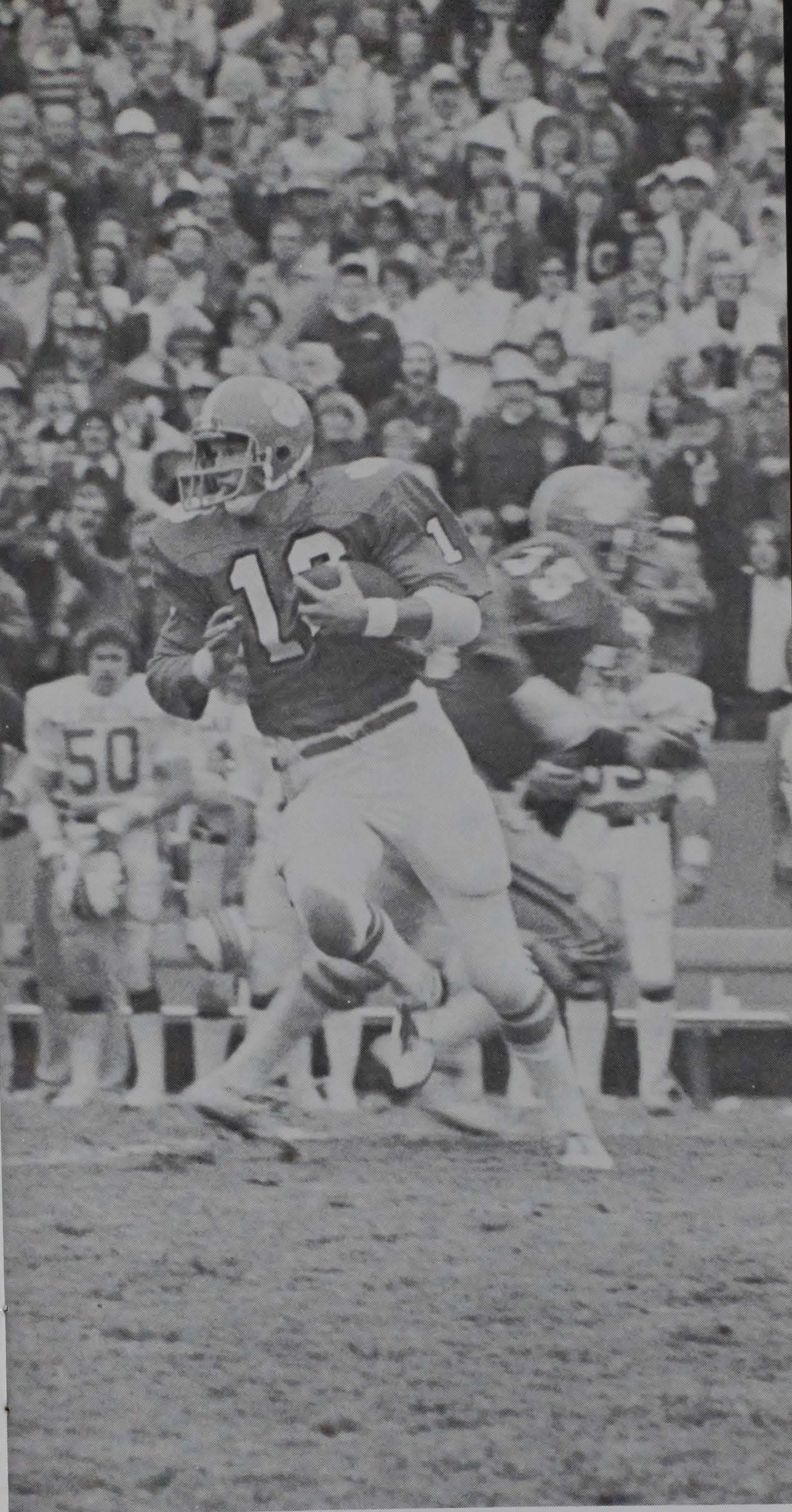

Clemson Memorial Stadium — "Death Valley"

In the past 35 seasons, 27 teams have made appearances in Clemson's Memorial Stadium, now pretty widely known as "Death Valley." Eight teams (George Washington, Kentucky, Villanova, Alabama, Georgia, Auburn, Texas A&M, Florida State and Maryland) have an edge on the Tigers' home ground and five of these, (George Washington, Kentucky, Villanova, Florida State and Texas A&M, have just played one game in Memorial Stadium.

Clemson has shutout opponents 28 times in "Death Valley" (Presbyterian 9 times; N. C. State 4; Furman, Citadel, Duquesne and Wake Forest, twice each; and VPI, Auburn, Virginia, Duke, North Carolina, Texas Christian and Maryland, once each). The Tigers have been shutout 10 times at home in 35 seasons, the last time being in 1976 when Georgia blanked Clemson 41-0.

Between the Maryland shutout in 1953 and the Duke blanking in 1962, the Tigers scored in 38 consecutive home games.

There have been three ties in 147 games played in the stadium, one with Mississippi State in 1949, one with Georgia in 1963, and last fall's 18-18 Duke deadlock.

In 1974 the field was named The Frank Howard Field of Clemson Memorial Stadium in honor of the Tigers' legendary coach Frank Howard.

School Colors and Nickname

The late William J. Latimer, a 1906 graduate of Clemson College, did some extensive research on the football program at his alma mater, and offered the following in regard to the school's nickname and colors:

Professor Walter Merritt Riggs, who coached Clemson's first varsity football team in 1896, and who also served as head coach again in 1899, is said to have "planted the seed" for the school's grid program.

In referring to the players from that first team, Latimer said, "Due to the lack of helmets and head protection they (the players) wore long hair. These long manes might have gained them the name of Lions had it not been for the orange and purple striped jerseys and stockings that resembled tigers. The latter nickname seemed to stick."

Latimer then observed about John Heisman's 1900 Clemson team: "They had been called Tigers early in their career. And Clemson used the insignia of a Tigers' head with bared fangs, with the motto 'Eat Em Up Clemson' before Heisman's day."

Latimer's findings are substantiated by the fact that Riggs had played football at Auburn (nicknamed Tigers) and that its colors were orange and blue.

The official colors of the school are Northwest Purple and Burnt Orange, with the predominant colors on today's athletic uniforms being orange and white.

Joe Sherman '34, former Clemson sports publicist, news bureau director, and director of Clemson's alumni relations, offered the following in his book, **The Clemson Tigers**, which was published in 1976:

"It is extremely doubtful that anyone can tell you with certainty how the Clemson colors swung from purple (and a rather pale purple, at that) and gold to what for several years was described as 'Northwestern purple and burnt orange.'

"But that the colors have changed, unofficially if not officially, is a fact and there is a story about it that is probably as good as any other explanation.

"It says that in the early years of Jess Neely's tenure, he found it almost impossible to get uniforms in purple and gold that would be 'color fast.' In other words, between constant exposure to both the weather and the washing machines, the purple and gold faded markedly and became difficult, if not impossible, to recognize for what they were supposed to be.

"So, working with professional color people in the school of textiles and with sporting goods manufacturers, Neely finally arrived at deeper colors (a slightly deeper purple and a gold that became orange) that were more color fast in that they held up better under the rays of the sun, the agitations of the washing machine and the carry-over from season to season."

Still, most people believe that the purple and orange are the true colors.

The Clemson Tiger was modified somewhat in the summer of 1970, and to separate him from the other tigers at other schools, the University adopted the Tiger Paw. The Paw did not replace the Tiger, but the two go hand-in-hand, or should we say hand-in-foot.

CLEMSON UNIVERSITY

"... this side of Heaven"

"Clemson is just a little this side of Heaven — one stop before Heaven, you might say."

Those are the words of Joe Sherman '34 who gave 34½ years of service to his alma mater before he retired as the University's Director of Alumni Relations in June of 1977.



In actuality, Clemson University's 600-acre campus, located in the northwest corner of South Carolina, lies in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains and is surrounded by the sparkling blue waters of Lake Hartwell. More than 70 modern, well-equipped buildings now occupy the area that once was Fort Hill, the homestead of U. S. Vice-President John C. Calhoun and University Founder Thomas G. Clemson.

The University's heritage is maintained, however, by the many old trees, lots of open green areas, and quiet walkways. From several points on campus and around this lovely college town, Lake Hartwell and the Blue Ridge Mountains provide a spectacular and inspiring view.

The Tillman clock tower, which is visible from just about everywhere on campus, and the Outdoor Theatre, which is the scene of concerts and pep rallies, are among traditional landmarks. They become comforting and familiar friends to everyone who becomes a part of Clemson.

The students, hailing from 48 states and 44 foreign countries, are offered 76 fields of study in nine undergraduate colleges, and 55 areas of graduate study.

The undergraduate academic units are the Colleges of Agricultural Sciences; Architecture; Education; Engineering; Forest and Recreation Resources; Industrial Management and Textile Science; Liberal Arts; Nursing; and Sciences.

Of the University's total enrollment of 11,383, the actual on-campus figure is 10,300, of which 62 per cent are male and 38 per cent female.

Sherman once wrote an article about Clemson on the theme that "There's Something In These Hills." It said, in part:

"There's something in these hills that brings together and binds together and holds together men and women of all persuasions, of all heights, sizes, weights, and cultural backgrounds — something that cuts across every difference, spans every gap, penetrates every wall — something that makes a man or a woman stand taller, feel better and say to all within earshot, 'I went to Clemson!' "
