## Outlook For 1971 . . .

Hootie Ingram, entering his second year as head coach of the Clemson Tigers, has 34 lettermen returning from his 1970 squad which finished the season with a record of 3-8. Of this group, 15 were starters, eight for the offense and seven on the defensive unit.

In addition, Ingram will inherit a fine crop of sophomores advancing from last year's freshman unit which went 4-1.

John McMakin and Pete Galuska are expected to start at tight end and split end respectively. McMakin, who led the team in receiving a year ago, is expected to have an outstanding senior season. The interior line is filled by returning lettermen with Force Chamberlain and Jim Dorn at tackles, Buddy King and Steve Lewter as guards and Dave Farnham at center.

Sophomores John Bolubasz and Art Brisacher will be in contention for the guard slots while junior Gary Gernerich and red-shirt sophomore Terry Calhoon will battle for starting roles as tackles.

In the backfield, quarterback Tommy Kendrick and fullback Dick Bukowsky return. Kendrick, returning for his third straight season as the starting signal-caller, already owns nearly all of the Clemson passing records.

Senior Rick Gilstrap is expected to draw the starting nod at tailback while sophomore Smiley Sanders and junior college transfers Dennis Goss and Wade Hughes will be in the running to start in the backfield.

Don Kelley, a starting defensive back for the past two seasons, has been switched to flanker. The speedy Kelley amassed 545 yards and scored three touchdowns on 24 punt and three interception returns last year.

Defensively, the Tigers should have Ben Anderson, Dale Henry, Bobby Johnson and Jeff Siepe in the secondary. All are experienced at this position with the exception of Johnson, who was converted from flanker a year ago.

In the line, seniors Wayne Baker and Charlie Mayer will most likely be the starting ends with senior Ralph Daniel and junior Frank Wirth expected to start at tackles. In both of these positions, Ingram has good depth.

While Larry Hefner will start at middle linebacker, sophomores Luke Deanhardt and Mike Buckner, red-shirt soph John Rhodes and JC transfer Lynn Barter will battle for the other two slots.

Eddie Seigler returns for his junior year as a kicking specialist. Last year Seigler led the team in scoring and will give the Tigers an extra scoring punch.

Overall, Clemson should have a much improved team over last year. "Our running game will improve," Ingram commented, "as we have more backs who are capable of carrying the ball. With the established running game to compliment the passing attack, our offense will be better balanced," the coach added.

## A Note on Clemson University

Clemson University is located in the northwest corner of the state, but its educational, research and public service programs extend from the red hills of the Blue Ridge Mountains to the sandy coast of the Atlantic Ocean.

Thomas Green Clemson, who was the nation's first superintendent (now secretary) of agriculture and a son-in-law of the noted Southern statesman, John C. Calhoun, gave his Fort Hill Estate to the State of South Carolina for the establishment of an agricultural and mechanical college. By 1890, the first buildings were underway. In July, three years later, Clemson College began full time operation.

Founded as one of the nation's land-grant universities, Clemson opened in 1893 with 15 faculty members, 446 students, four buildings, two barns and six silos.

Today, Clemson University is a center of scientific, technological and liberal education in the state.

Once an all-male military institution, Clemson's enrollment has grown to some 8,000 young men and women attending the main campus classes and the two-year centers in Greenville and Sumter. The faculty numbers more than 600 and the main campus has 55 major buildings.

The physical growth of the Clemson University campus is almost beyond comprehension, especially for one

who has not visited the sprawling complex in the last five years.

Plans have been made for an athletic dormitory, an athletic office building and an enlargement of Memorial Stadium.

The history of Clemson University is the story of a prominent scientist's burning desire to improve conditions in the state by proposing a thorough education in science as a means toward that end.

Teaching and research at Clemson cover studies as down to earth as soil and plant analysis and as far out as celestial navigation.

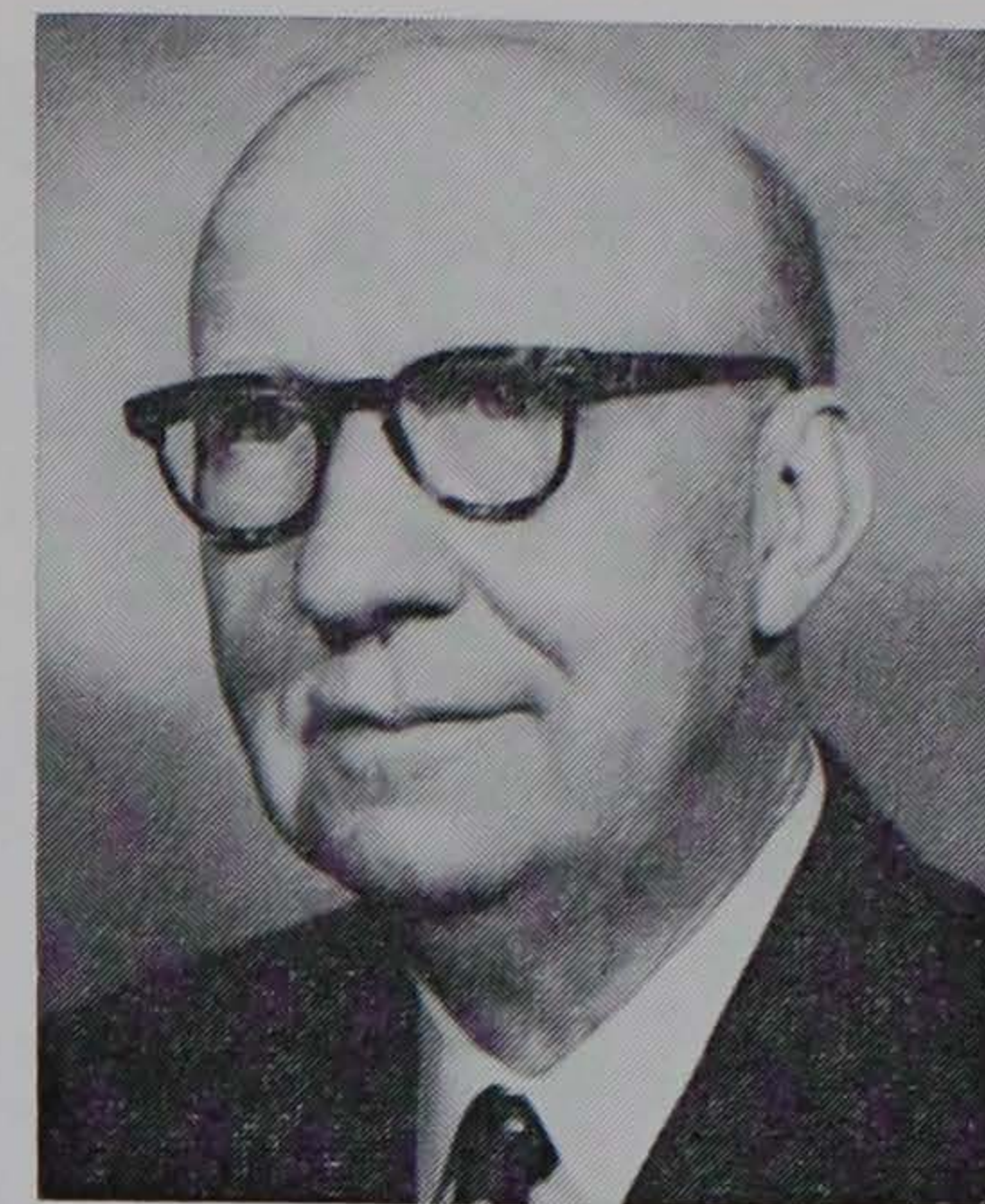
The university is composed of ten schools or colleges: College of Agricultural Sciences, College of Liberal Arts, College of Physical and Mathematical Sciences, College of Architecture, College of Engineering, College of Forest and Recreation Resources, College of Industrial Management and Textile Science, College of Education, School of Nursing and the Graduate School.

There are 44 curriculums at the university for undergraduates, some with a five-year curricula. Graduate work toward a master of science or master of arts is now offered in 40 fields and there are 23 programs leading to a doctor of philosophy degree.

Dr. Robert Cook Edwards was named president in 1959 following the sudden death of Dr. R. F. Poole. Edwards, a 1933 graduate of Clemson, has lead the university on its greatest physical growth.



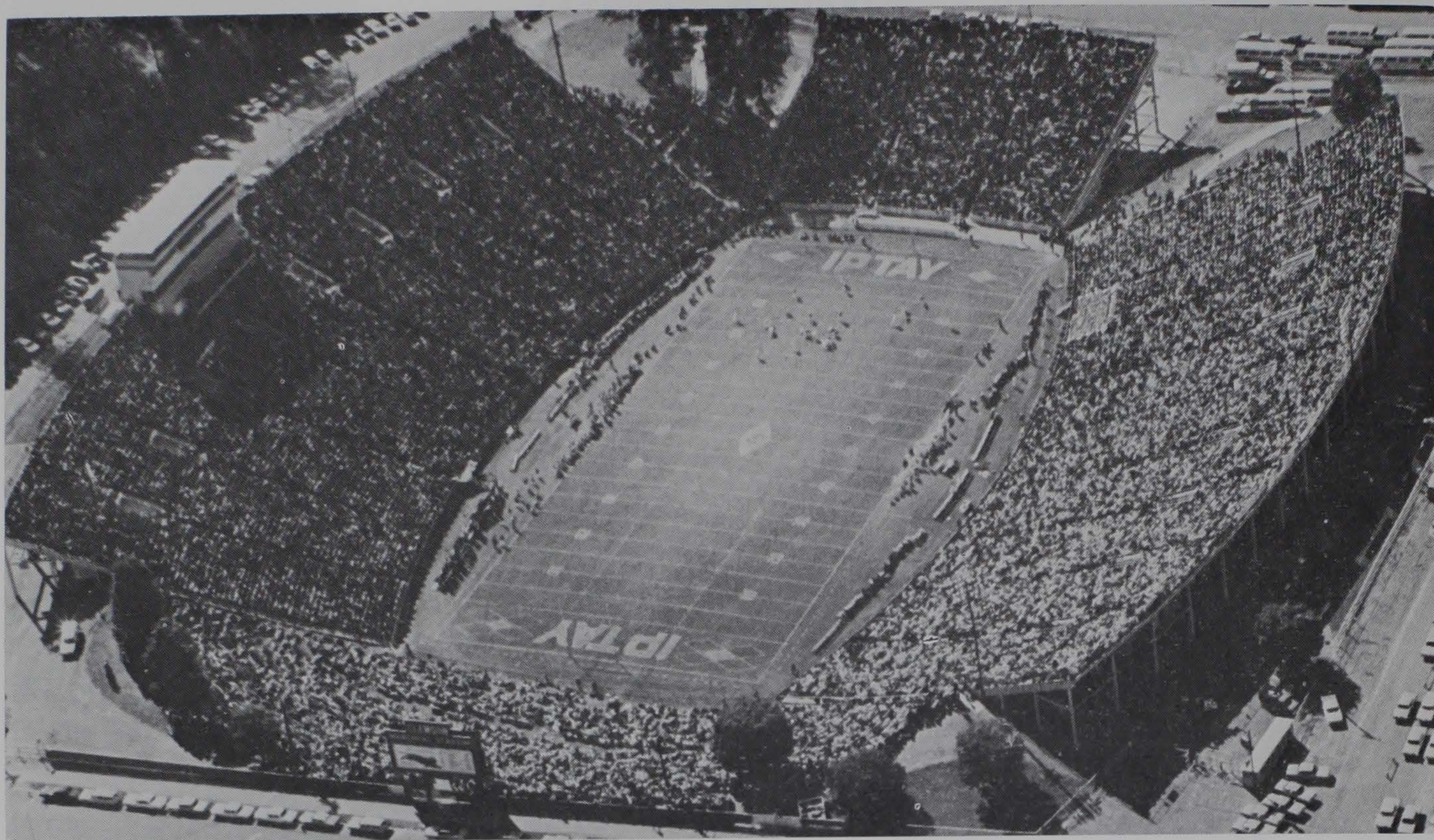

Sen. Brown of Barnwell was elected president of Clemson's Board of Trustees in March, 1966. He has been a member of the university's board since 1934, being chosen a life member in 1948. He is president pro tem of the S. C. State Senate and chairman of the Senate Finance Committee. He served in the S. C. House of Representatives from 1921 to 1926 and has served in the State Senate continuously since 1929. He has given a long and distinguished service to Clemson and the State.





Home of the Clemson football team since 1942 has been Memorial Stadium, commonly referred to as "Death Valley" around grid circles, mainly because the Tigers have won nearly 70 percent of their games in its friendly confines. In 29 years, 23 different teams have played 115 games and have recorded only 34 wins.

## Clemson Memorial Stadium — "Death Valley"

In the past 29 seasons, 23 teams have made appearances in Clemson Memorial Stadium, now pretty widely known as "Death Valley." Six teams (George Washington, Villanova, Maryland, Alabama, Georgia and Auburn) have an edge on the Tigers' home ground and two of these, (George Washington and Villanova) have just played one game in Memorial Stadium.

Clemson has shutout opponents 27 times in "Death Valley" (Presbyterian 9 times; N. C. State 4; Furman, Duquesne and Wake Forest, twice each; and VPI, Auburn, Citadel, Virginia, Duke, North Carolina, Texas Christian and Maryland, once each). The Tigers have been shutout seven times at home in 29 seasons, the last time being in 1970 when Auburn threw a 44-0 white-wash on the Tigers.

Between the Maryland shutout in 1953 and the Duke blanking in 1962, the Tigers scored in 38 consecutive home games.

There have only been two ties in 115 games played in the stadium, one with Mississippi State in 1949 and the other with Georgia in 1963.

In the next column is how Clemson stands against teams who have played in "Death Valley."

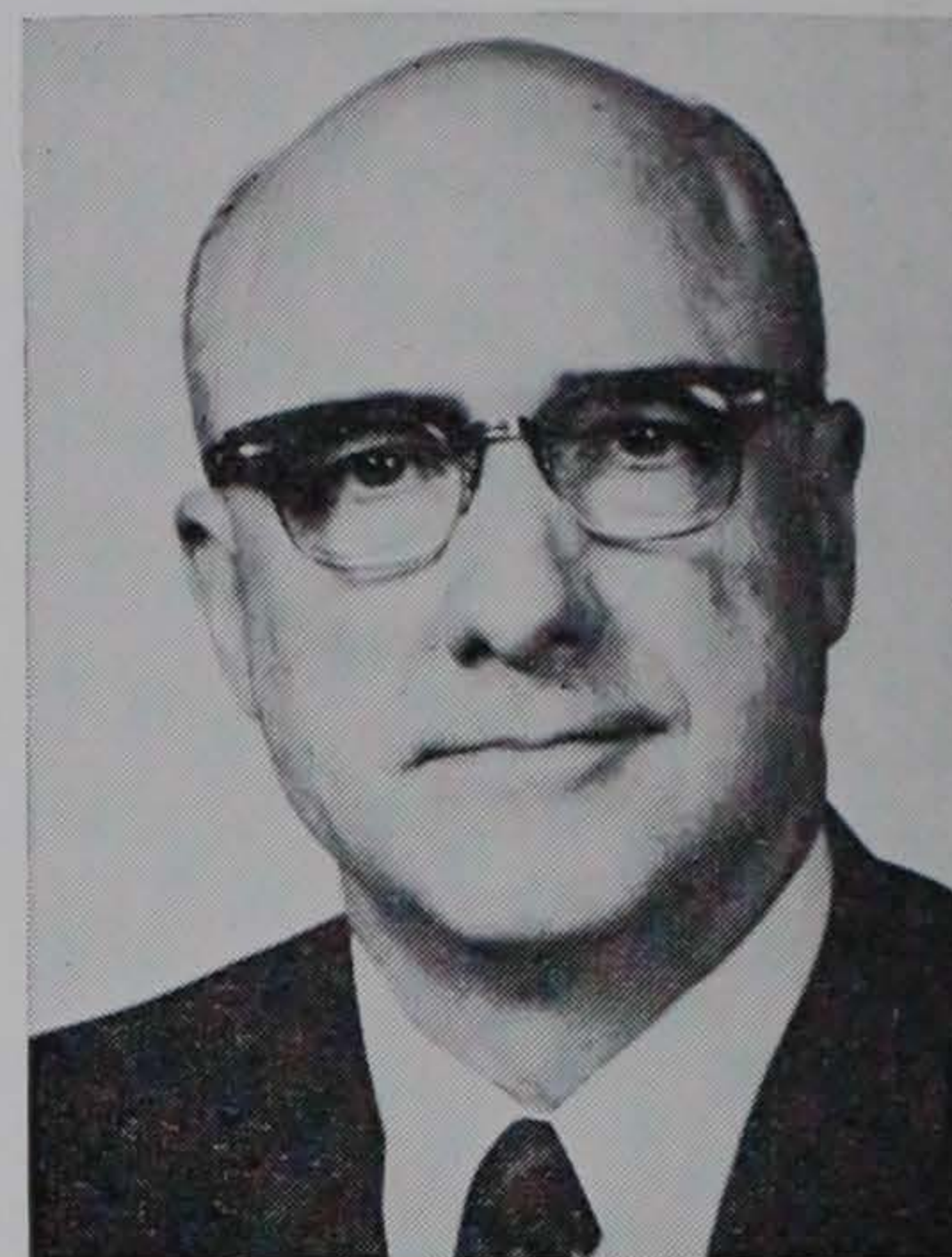

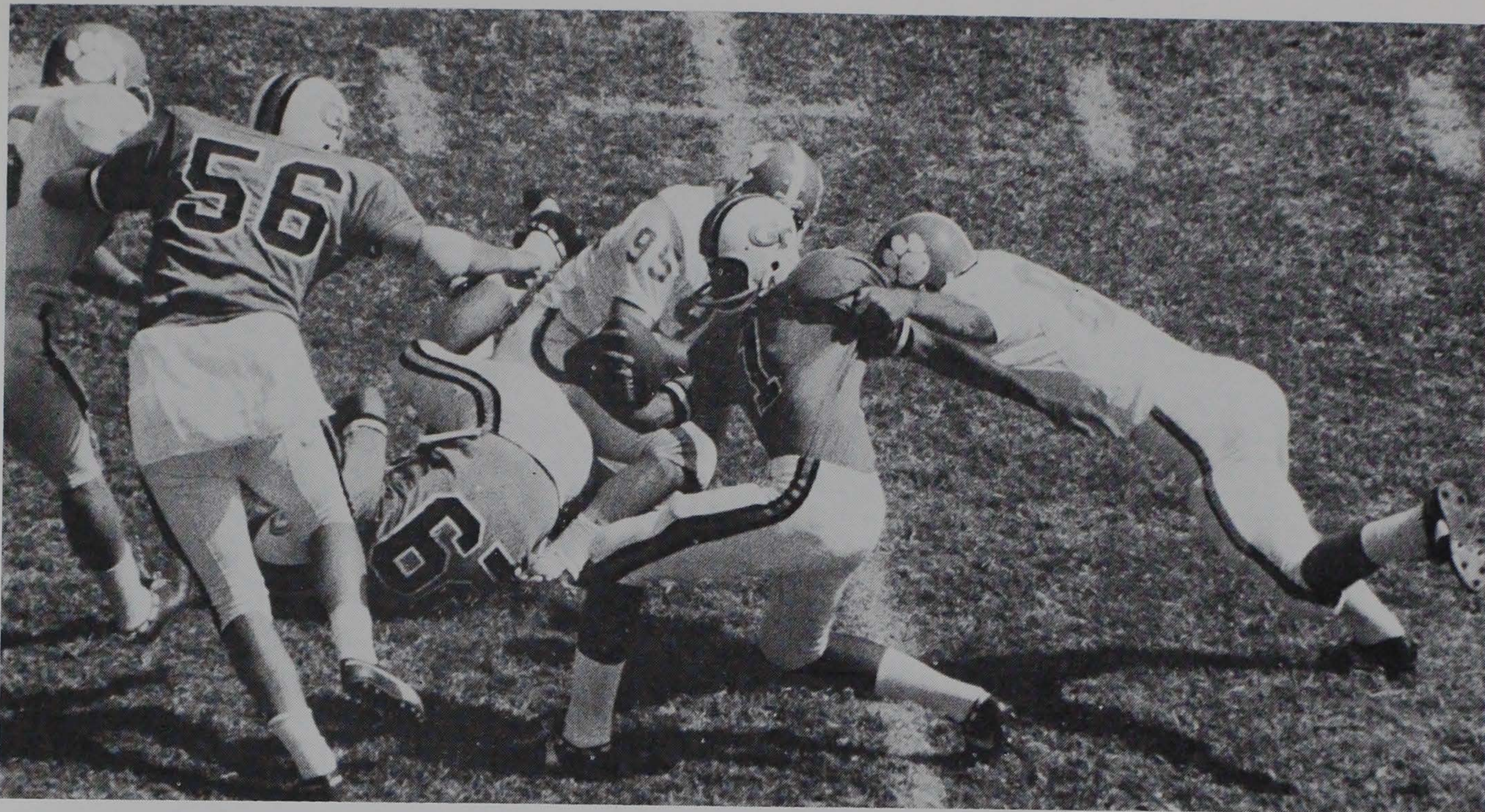

Clemson football teams, down through the years, have been noted for their hard-nosed style of play. The 1970 season was no exception. Linebacker Jim Sursavage (80) has the stopper on Georgia Tech quarterback Eddie McAshan (1) and waits for assistance from defensive end Wayne Baker (95). The Tigers gave McAshan one of his most disappointing days and it wasn't until Jack Williams came off the bench that the Yellow Jackets gained a 28-7 victory.

## CLEMSON ENTERS 76th YEAR OF FOOTBALL

Hootie Ingram, Clemson's 18th head football coach, enters his second season as Tiger boss in 1971 which will be the school's 76th year of gridiron competition.

Clemson has won more ACC football titles than any other conference institution. The Tigers have five titles and one co-championship to their credit. Duke has won four and N. C. State three.

Clemson has participated in seven post-season bowl games, more than any other ACC team. The Tigers are 4-3 in bowl competition and their 24-23 win over Missouri in the 1949 Gator Bowl was voted the best game in that bowl's history.

In addition to the Gator Bowl, Clemson has been to the Bluebonnet, Cotton, Orange and Sugar Bowls.

The Tigers began their intercollegiate play in 1896 and posted a 2-1 record under coach W. M. Riggs.

John Heisman, for whom the cherished Heisman Trophy is named, took over as head coach in 1900 after the Tigers had an 11-6 record their first four seasons. Heisman coached four years compiling a 19-3-2 mark before leaving Clemson for Georgia Tech.

Following some rocky roads and 10 different head coaches in the next 23 years, Clemson turned out winners four straight seasons when Josh Cody became head coach in 1927.

Jess Neely succeeded Cody after the 1930 season. When Neely arrived, he brought Frank Howard along as his line coach. Neely guided the Tigers to his first winning season in 1934 and to Clemson's first bowl appearance before he moved on to Rice University as head coach of the Owls.

Howard, the Bashful Baron, became head coach in 1940 and was one of the chief reasons for Clemson's grid success. He led the Tigers to six bowl games and finished .500 or better in 20 of his 30 seasons as head coach. During those seasons Clemson teams posted a 165-118-12 overall mark.

As the 1969 season came to an end, it also brought an end to the longest head coaching reign in the nation as Howard turned his duties over to Ingram.

Ingram and his staff are dedicated to give Tiger followers winning football teams — a tradition at Clemson since 1896.

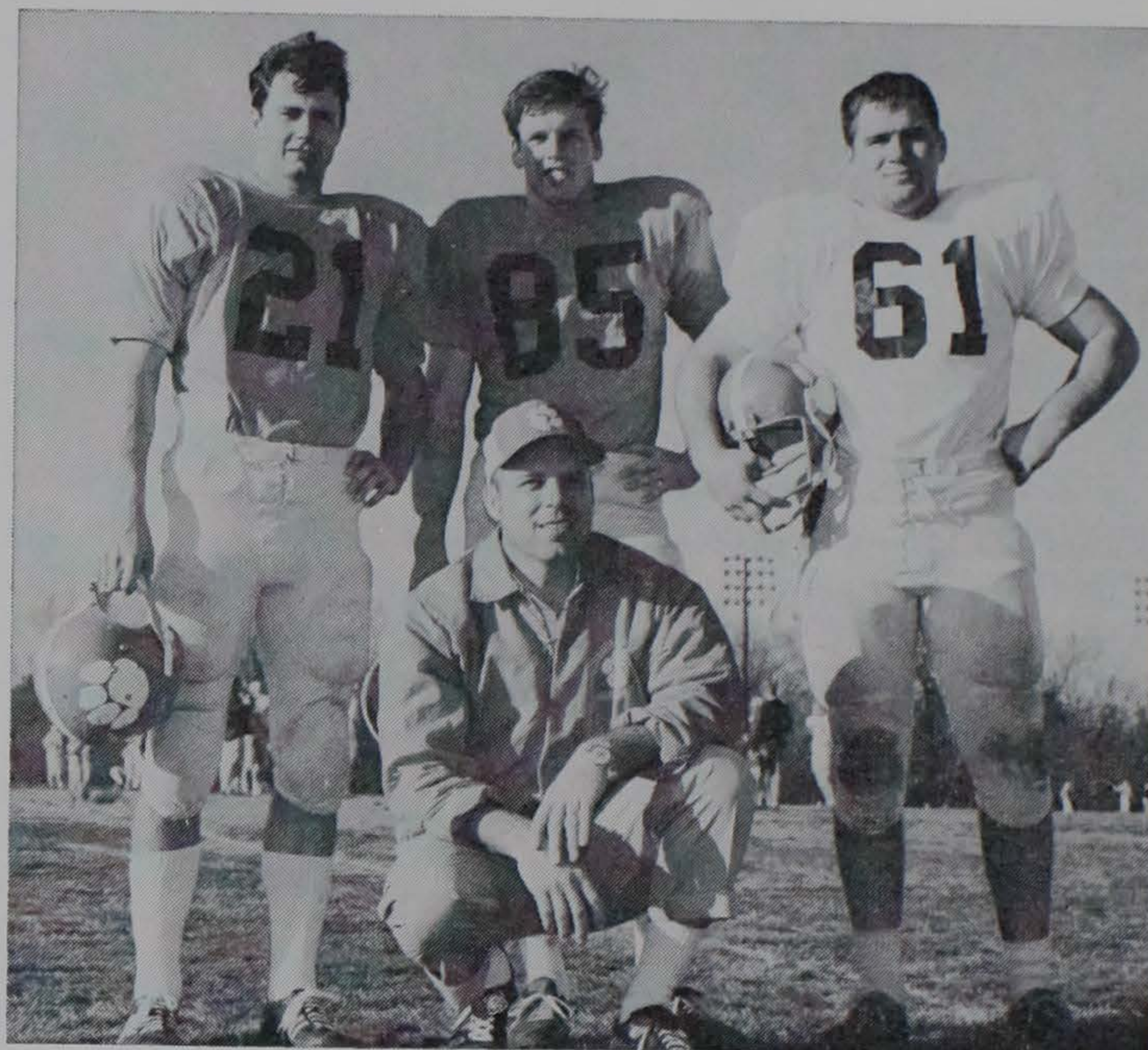

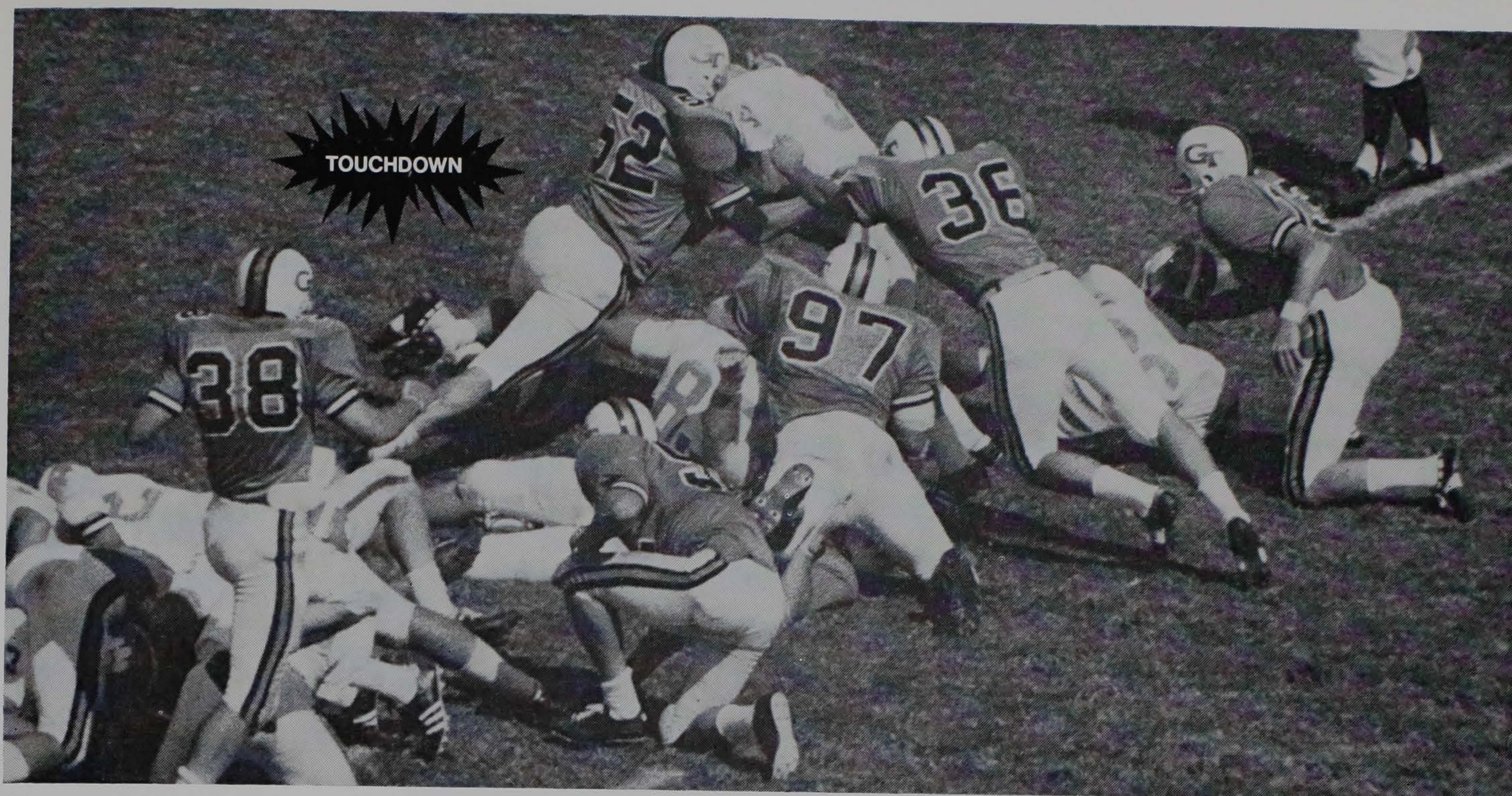

## FRANK HOWARD

Assistant To The Vice President of Student Affairs

In the past two years, Frank Howard has dropped two titles and picked up another one. Following the 1969 season Howard relinquished his post of head coach to Hootie Ingram, keeping the athletic director's position. This past February Howard was named assistant to the vice president of student affairs when Bill McLellan was named athletic director.

Howard, in essence, has the number two post in the student affairs office, and administering the operations of the athletic department is one of the functions of this office.

But instead of being tied down to an endless task of paper work as his present title might indicate, Howard has turned his fulltime in a public relations role, making more speeches and appearances than he ever dreamed possible. His travels now carry him out more often and to many distant places. He has just completed a year where he served as chairman of the South Carolina Heart Fund when he was constantly making personal appearances for this worthy cause.

During his active coaching days, Howard was one of the most successful in business. He carried Clemson to six post-season bowl games while he was head coach which was nothing new to the 62-year-old veteran. He played in the 1931 Rose Bowl with Alabama and was an assistant coach when Clemson went to the 1940 Cotton Bowl.

When Howard retired after the 1969 season he had the longest tenure in the nation and all of his head coaching was at one school. He posted 165 victories, which ranked 19th among all coaches, active or retired. Howard became a task master of hard nosed football. His players knew it as did his opponents. No one did more for football in South Carolina than Howard and few in the nation carried a better reputation.

Joined Clemson staff August, 1931, after graduation from college. Served as Clemson line coach nine years. Was Clemson head football coach 30 years, which at time of retirement, was longest tenure in nation. Appointed assistant to the vice president of student affairs Feb. 4, 1971.

Bill McLellan came up through the ranks in the athletic department. He literally became a jack of all trades, wearing six hats at a time — more if necessary. But his untiring efforts and his ability to grasp any situation paid off for him this past February.

It was then he was named athletic director, succeeding Frank Howard, which would have scared the pants off most people. But Howard himself had said before, "Bill's been doing all the work, so he ought to have the title."

McLellan came to the athletic department in May, 1958, and the personnel office listed him as assistant business manager.

But he handled the tickets, saw that the grass was cut, replaced light bulbs, purchased equipment and when normal working hours were over for most of the university, he was on the football field coaching. During the days of the intricate substitution, McLellan was the sideline bookkeeper for Howard.

Those who are close to McLellan marvel at his boundless energy. But seldom does he waste a minute. He can handle three or four people in his office at one time, all carrying on a different conversation . . . and all leaving with an answer.

Such is the legacy of Bill McLellan, the AD.

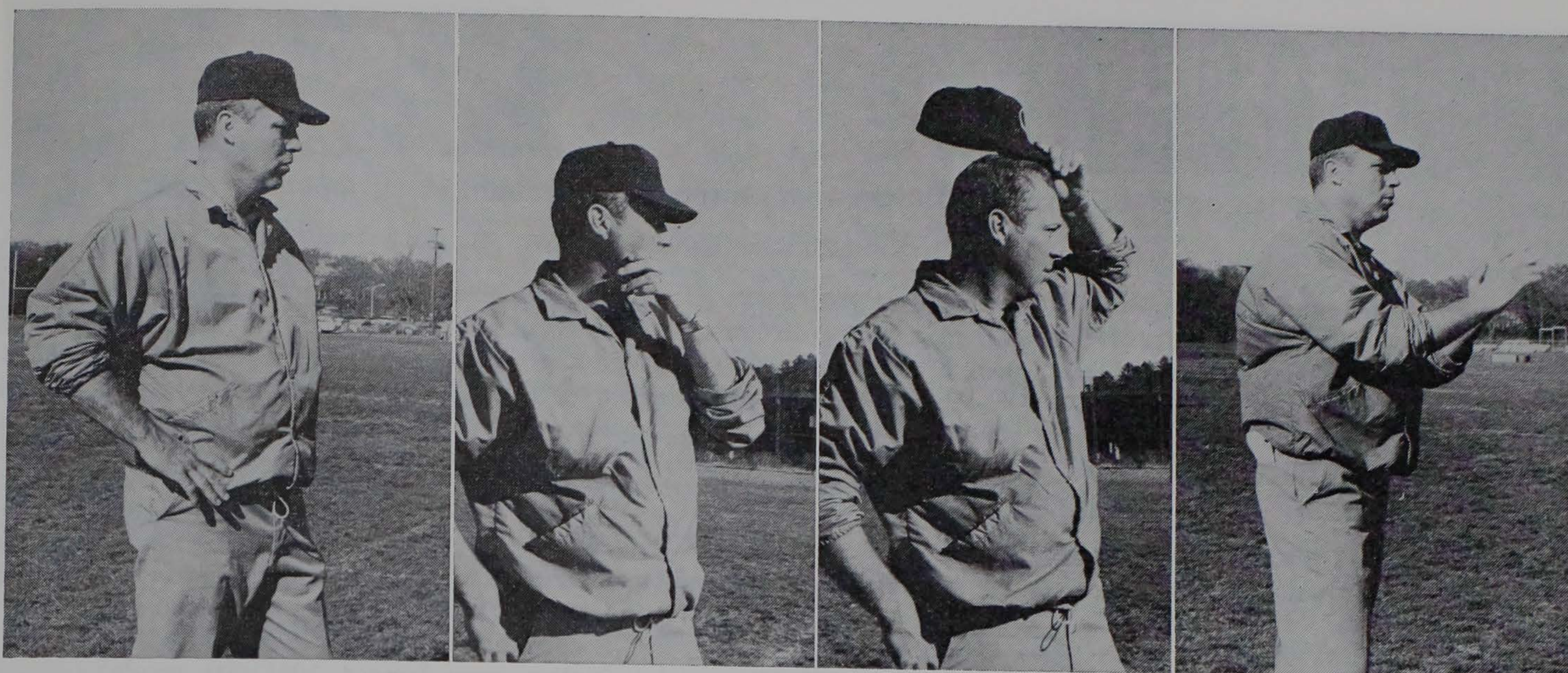

If toil and sweat on the practice field are any criteria, Ingram should see better results each Saturday afternoon this fall.

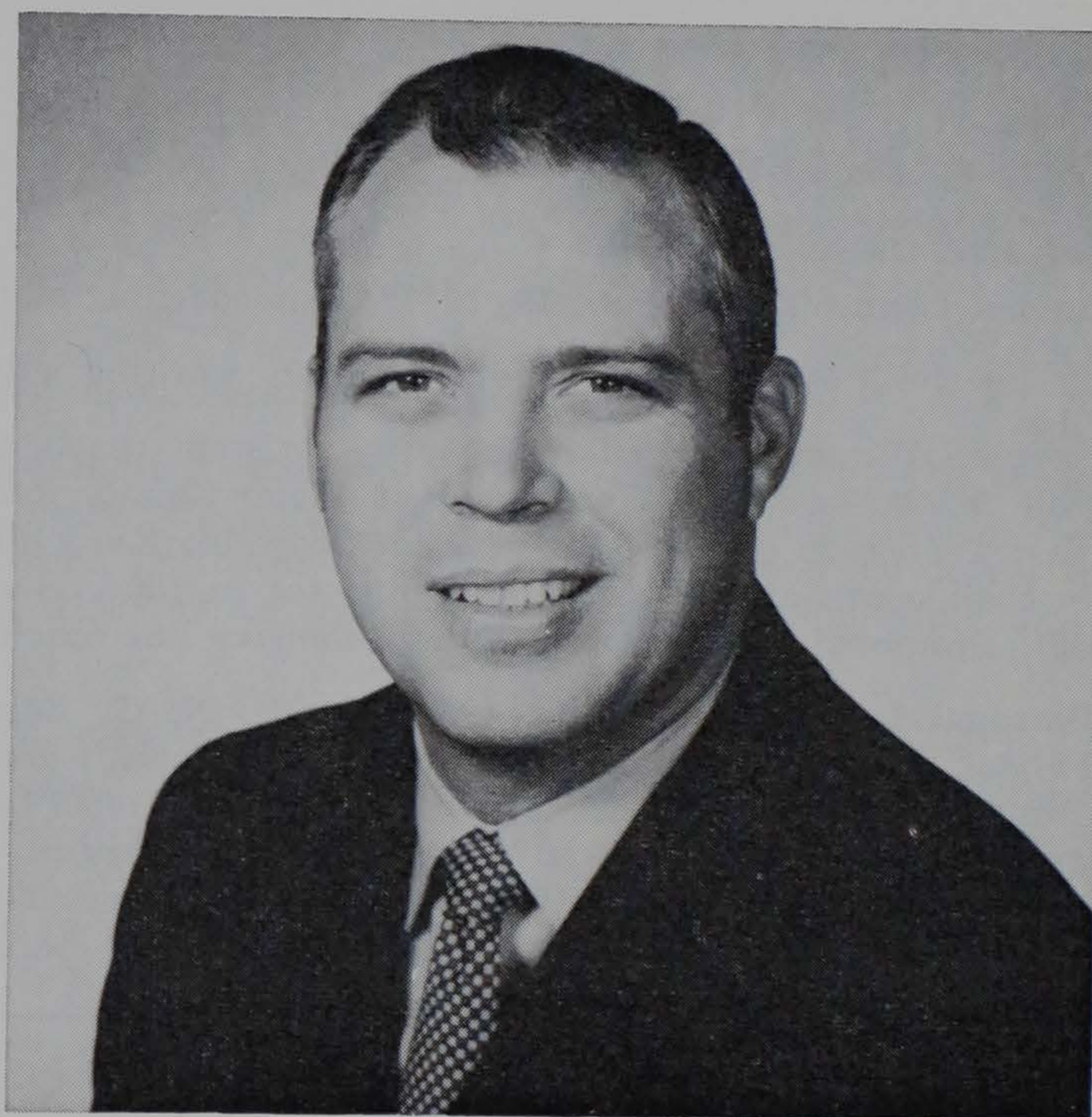

# Letterman's Association . . .

The Association of Tiger Lettermen of Clemson University was organized this past summer by former students and athletes who are interested in promoting the continuing athletic excellence of Clemson, as well as affording the opportunity for fellowship among active members, honorary members, student athletes and members of the university's athletic department.

Charlie Bussey, a quarterback on the 1954-55-56 teams, the latter of which played in the 1957 Orange Bowl, was elected the association's first president.

Doc Morgan was chosen vice president and Gene Willimon was elected secretary-treasurer.

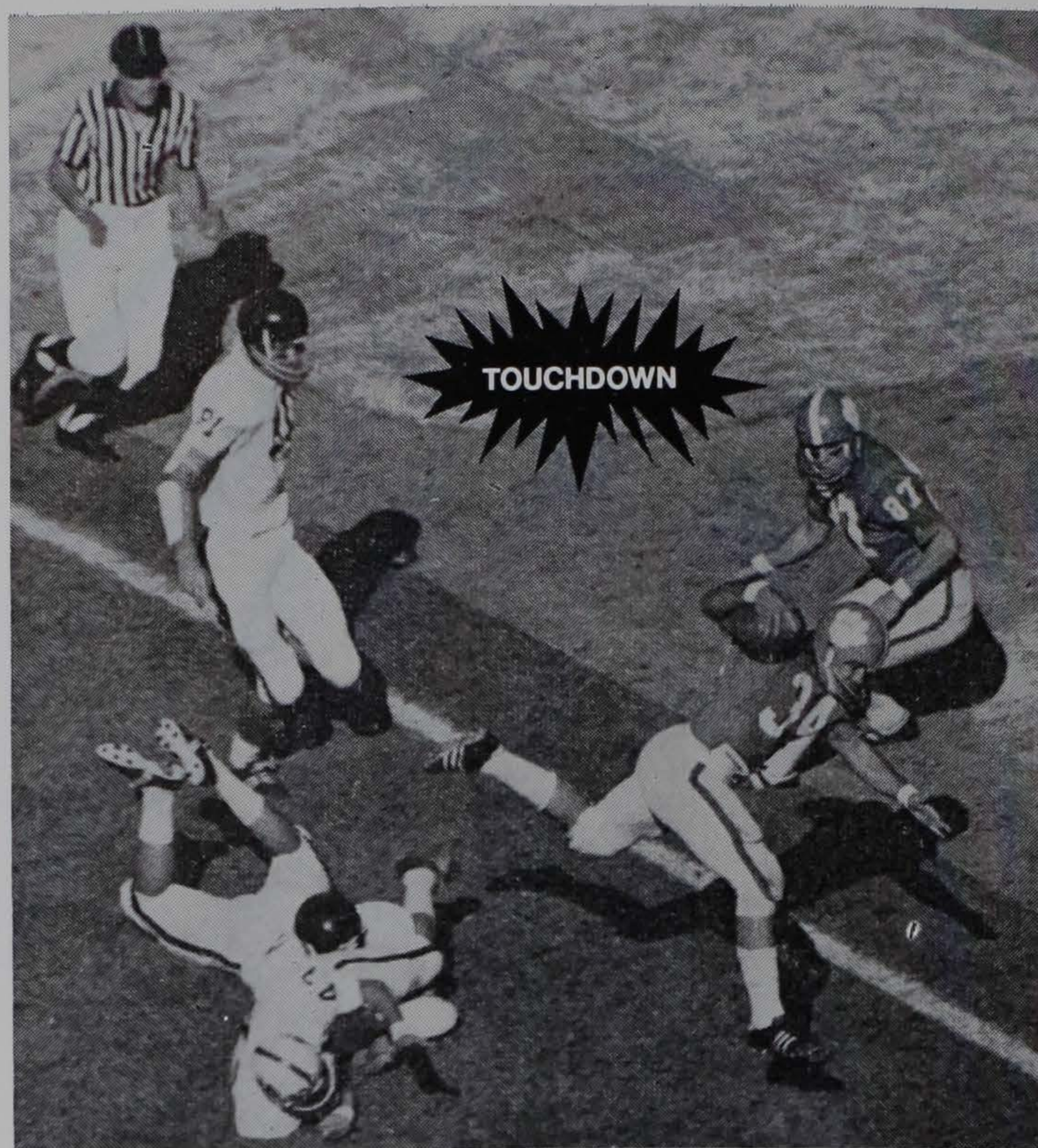
The constitution of the organization stipulates that there shall be 12 directors, with at least six sports represented and no more than three directors from any one sport.

Named to serve on the first board were: Phil Prince, Gil Rushton and Bill Hudson representing football; Ames Wells and Banks McFadden representing basketball; Harold Stowe, Doug Kingsmore and Jim Coleman, representing baseball; Jimmy Wells and Marshall Walker representing track; Bill Yarborough representing golf; and George Bennett representing cheerleaders.

There are two classes of membership in the association. Active membership is open to any former student of Clemson who received a letter from the athletic department in any sport; and a person shall be eligible for an honorary membership upon the recommendation of three fourths of the board of directors and upon subsequent approval by a majority in attendance at any associational meeting.

Coach Frank Howard, former athletic director and head football coach at Clemson, is the first and only honorary member of the association thus far.

After several preliminary meetings an organizational meeting was held at Clemson June 25th at which time officers were elected and a constitution adopted. The

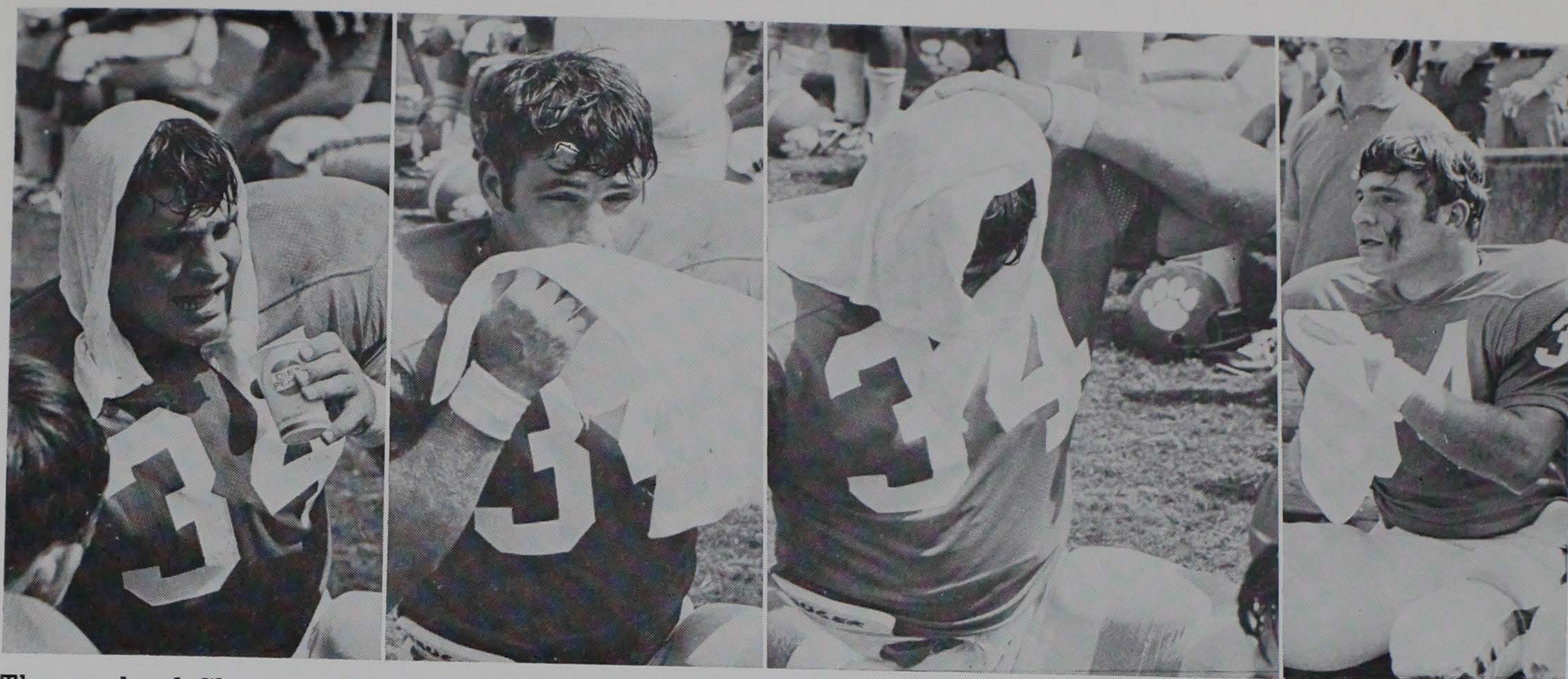

Thousands of Clemson athletes have received their education through the funds contributed to IPTAY, Clemson's scholarship club. One of these athletes was Ray Yauger, who despite a rash of injuries during his three years, ended up as the Tigers' second leading career rusher. Yauger ran hard and he ran often. These sideline breathers were a rarity for him, and he took full advantage of them when they did come.

## IPTAY Educates Student Athletes

The late Dr. Ruppert H. (Rube) Fike organized IPTAY in 1934. From the records available, there were 185 people who were members during that first year.

It was Dr. Fike's idea that something should be done to support athletics at Clemson. His thought was being churned around when the Tigers were at one of their lowest depths of football. The team won only seven games while losing 17 and tying five in three years.

The beginning of IPTAY was an adrenaline to football and the initial success experienced was more than anticipated. For the next eight years, the football teams had break even or better seasons. And the sixth season after IPTAY was born, the Tigers went to their first post-season bowl game.

Over a third of the initial year's members are now deceased, but better than 60 per cent of those still living are members today and a fifth of them are Gold Card members.

IPTAY was started — and still functions — with one purpose in mind, that is, to finance athletic scholarships at Clemson. Not one single penny contributed during the past 36 years has been used for any other purpose. And all contributions are tax deductible.

For the past four years, contributions have broken a record established the previous year.

And with the 1971 fiscal year drawing to a close at the end of August, another record will be set. September 1, 1971 starts the 38th year of IPTAY and probably no other group of people have done more for collegiate athletics anywhere.

Thousands of boys have received an education through IPTAY which otherwise would not have been possible. And the need for increased memberships increases each year.

During the 36th year of operation the club had one of its largest memberships on record with 7,033 regular memberships; 1,470 \$100 Gold Card Memberships, 28 \$250 memberships, 38 \$500 memberships and 18 who have contributed \$1000 to the club.

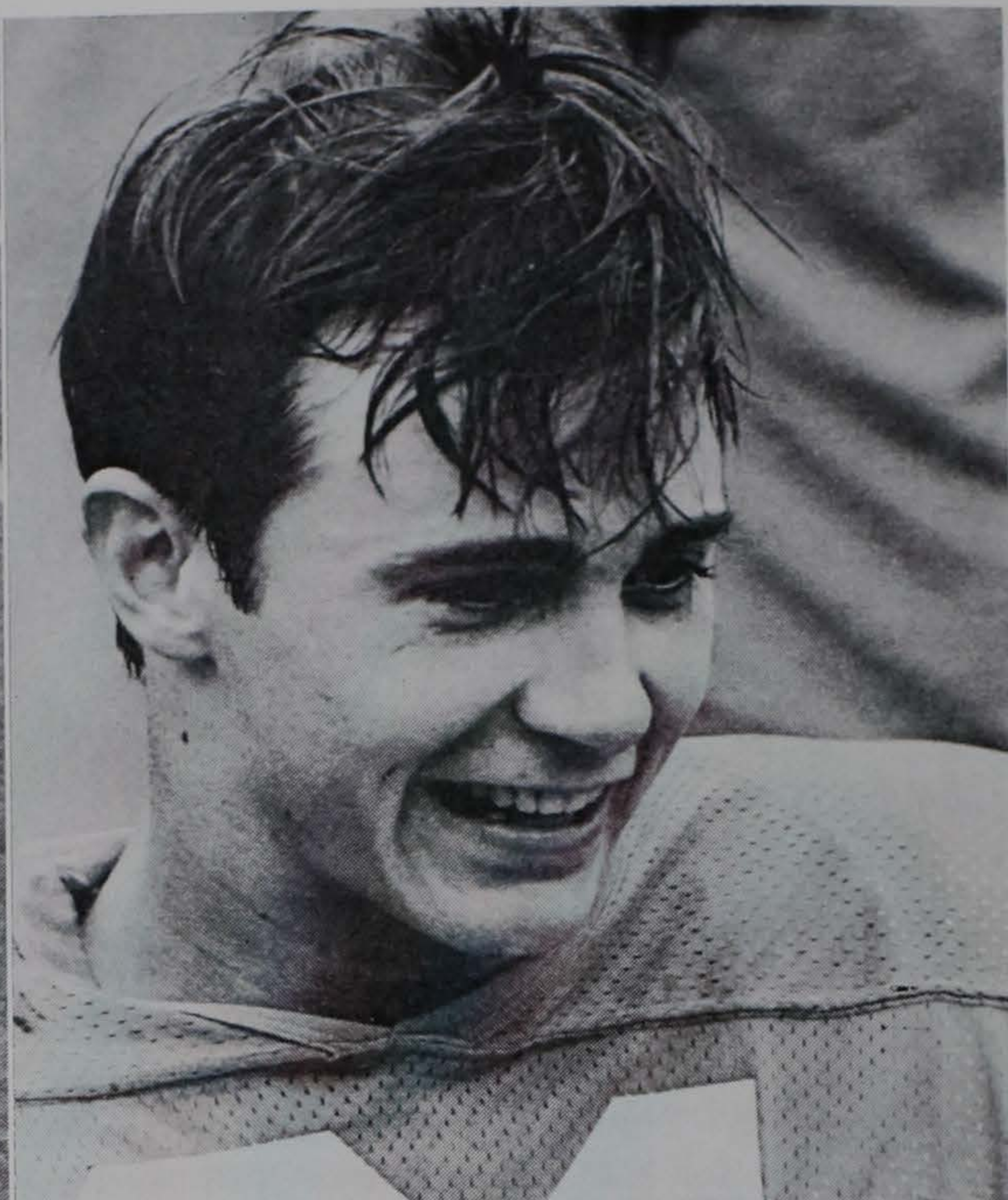
Since IPTAY was formed, the Tigers have had 26 out of 37 seasons of .500 or better ball and have been to seven bowl games.

While football was to be the main beneficiary of IPTAY funds, Clemson's other athletic teams have also benefited from the program. Conference championships have been won in football, baseball, basketball and tennis, not to mention the numerous All-American and All-Conference honors won by individuals.

IPTAY means an investment in the future. Its yearly stream of "alumni" are the leaders of tomorrow.

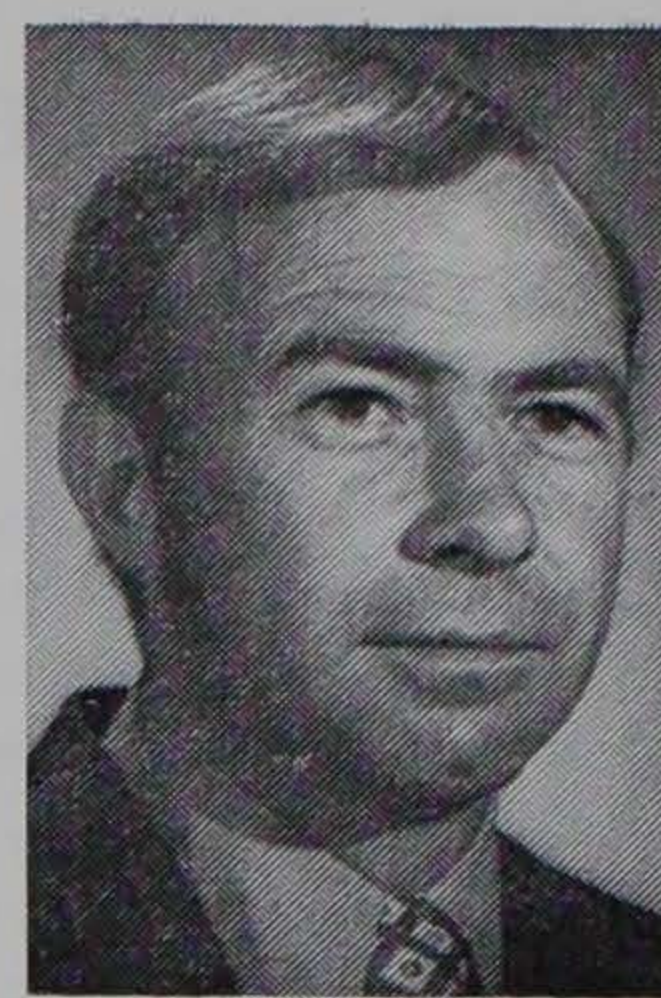

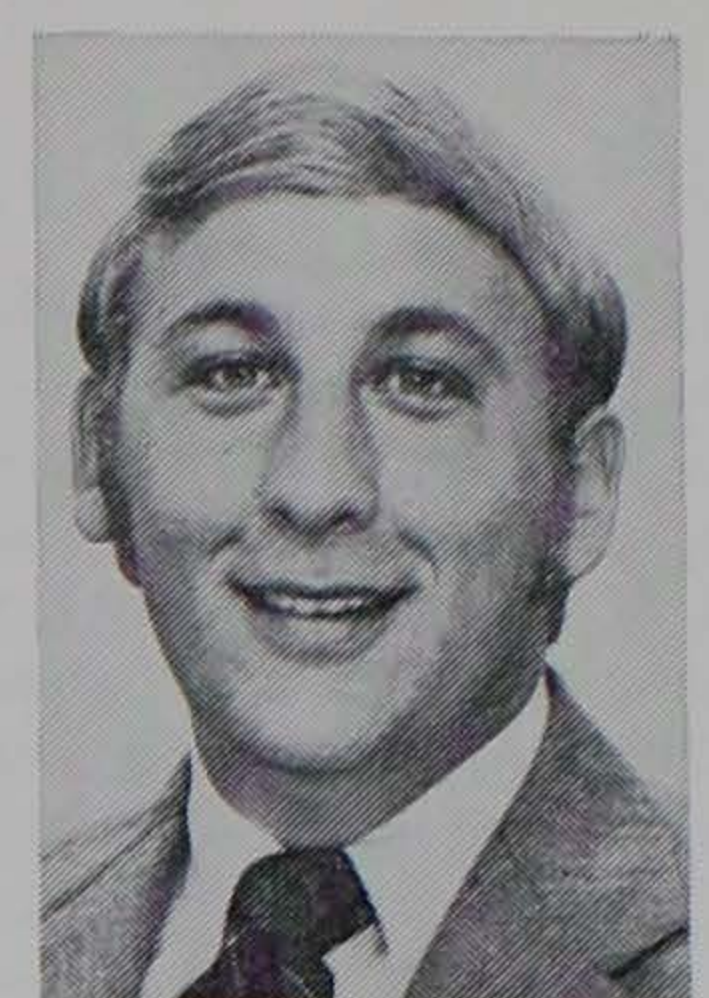

## Best Photo Facilities . . .

Photographers covering Clemson's home games have some of the finest facilities to be found anywhere, in addition to a home crew of photographers who are ready to assist in any way possible.

Cameramen look for ideal working conditions, ample working room and an atmosphere conducive to their needs. All of these can be found in the Clemson press box.

Movie crews filming the game for Clemson and the visiting team have a 27-foot open section right in the middle of the second deck of the press box which will easily accommodate six movie tripods.

One flight up is a 35-yard long "front row" for still cameras and those filming for TV. No one is too far off the 50-yard line with a good angle afforded everyone who shoots from the top deck.

Photographers, as well as sportswriters covering Clemson's home games, have become accustomed to the third floor of the press box. Behind the row of cameras is the famous buffet served for those covering the game where the finest of food is enjoyed picnic style from the "Top of the Valley."

This year facilities for the latest thing in filing press copy are being installed. Many sportswriters now use a telecopier where copy is fed into a machine from the press box and it comes out at the specified newspaper, ready for the composing room.

Chief photographer Charles Haralson and his assistants, Tom Shockley, Hal Smith and Dave Garrison, are on hand for two reasons: to shoot game films for the athletic staff; and to assist visiting photographers covering the game should an emergency arise.

Harry Durham and Jim Burns head up the Clemson Communications Center and devote their time seeing that all runs well, and at the same time, always willing to lend a helping hand.

Game action is shot during the first half of each home game by a staff photographer and a set of pictures (five or six prints) is furnished to any news media requesting this service before the end of the game.

This rapid service is done through a Fotorite machine, a rapid print processing, and is the only one in use in the Atlantic Coast Conference and one of the few in the nation used as such.

During the past nine seasons approximately 3,700 photos have been given free to the press by this process, thanks to the closely-knit and cooperative crew of the Communications Center.

## Radio Adds Frosh Games . . .

Clemson football games can be heard in every corner of South Carolina, and in many fringe areas of Georgia and North Carolina. And this is the way it should be. The Tigers have more fans than anyone in the state and the Clemson Football Network tries to reach all of those unable to come to the game.

The network enters its 18th year in 1971, with Jim Phillips, sports director of WFBC-TV in Greenville, again handling the play-by-play for the third straight year.

Jeff Odenwald, general manager of the Greenwood Braves of the Western Carolinas League, who has had seven years of broadcast experience, will handle the color for the first time.

To assure the best possible professional broadcast, Jim Lynn of the WFBC engineering staff, will serve as producer-director of the broadcast.

The network is being expanded this season to include the three freshman home games. All of these games are to be played Monday afternoon instead of Friday and will not interfere with any high school games.

For the second straight year there will be a pre-game as well as a post-game show by Clemson head coach, Hootie Ingram.

The network will sign on 20 minutes before kickoff and stay on the air 10 minutes following the wrap-up period when Phillips and Ingram will comment on what to expect in the game, then just a few minutes away; as well as presenting quick observations on the game just completed.

Phillips has had 18 years of broadcasting experience. He came from his native Ohio where he was affiliated at various times with stations in Alliance, Ashland and Lima. Before coming with the Clemson network, Phillips did the play-by-play for the Kent State University Network.

Odenwald, also a native of Ohio, graduated from Ohio State in 1969. While in college he worked four and a half years with WBNS-TV in Columbus, going from the floor crew to the production staff and covered all facets of television production. He also worked with the Ohio State closed circuit TV network as producer-director.

Since going to Greenwood in Sept., 1969, Odenwald has done a daily 15-minute sports show on Station WG-SW and last winter did commentary for all 30 Lander College basketball games over Greenwood's channel 2.

Because of one night game last fall the Clemson Network averaged 55 stations a game, but should return to about a 58-59 average this fall, making it one of the nation's largest university-operated networks.

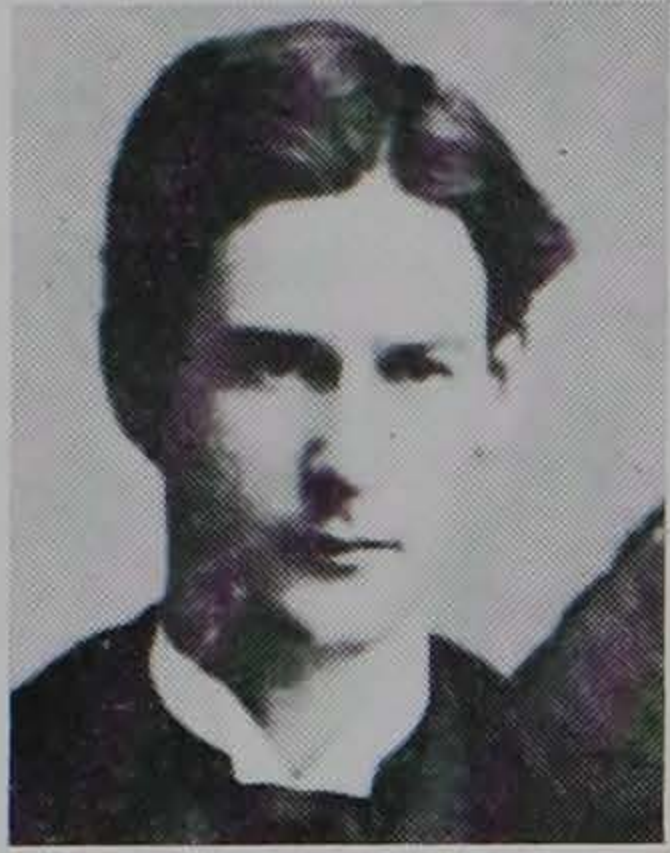

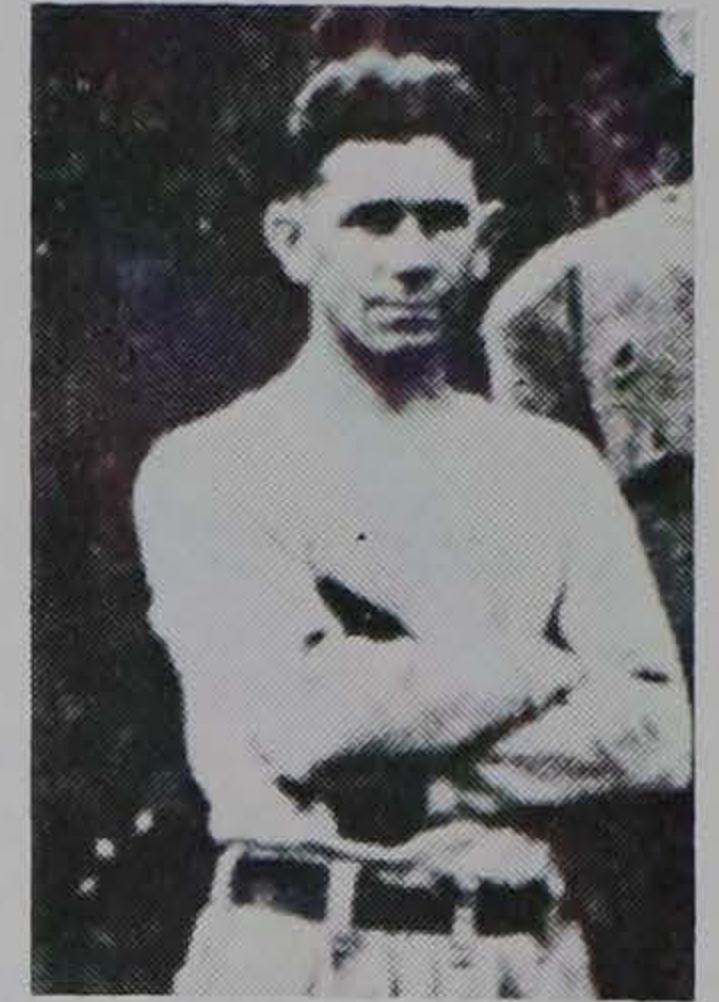

Junior college transfers Anthony Brown and Mel Francisco and redshirt sophomore Mike Browning should give the Tigers more flexibility.

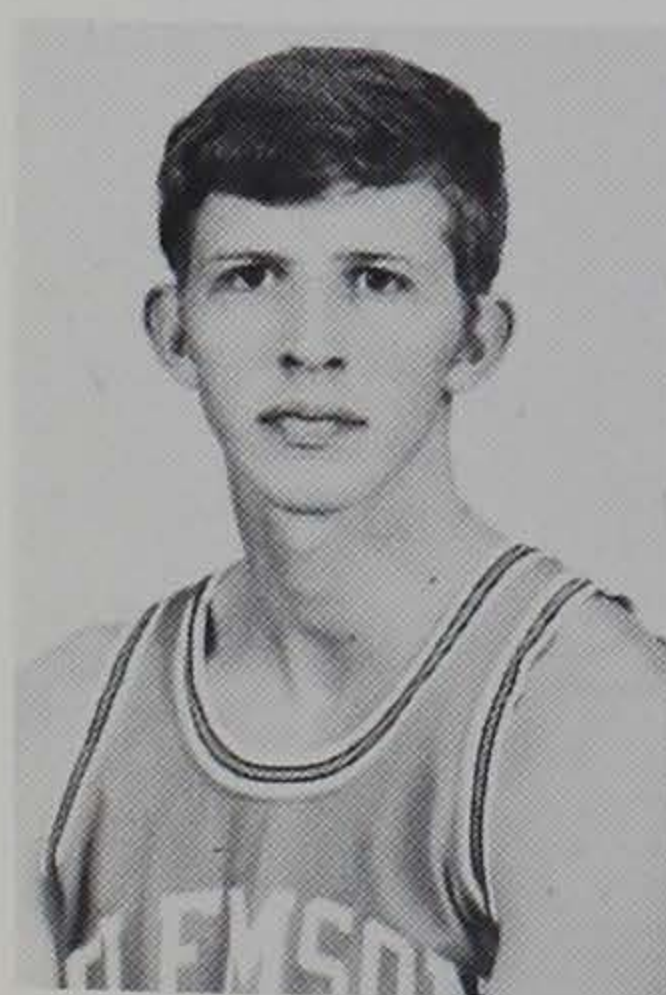

Locke has more depth than Clemson teams of the past few seasons which should put the Tigers on closer terms with foes of the rugged Atlantic Coast Conference.

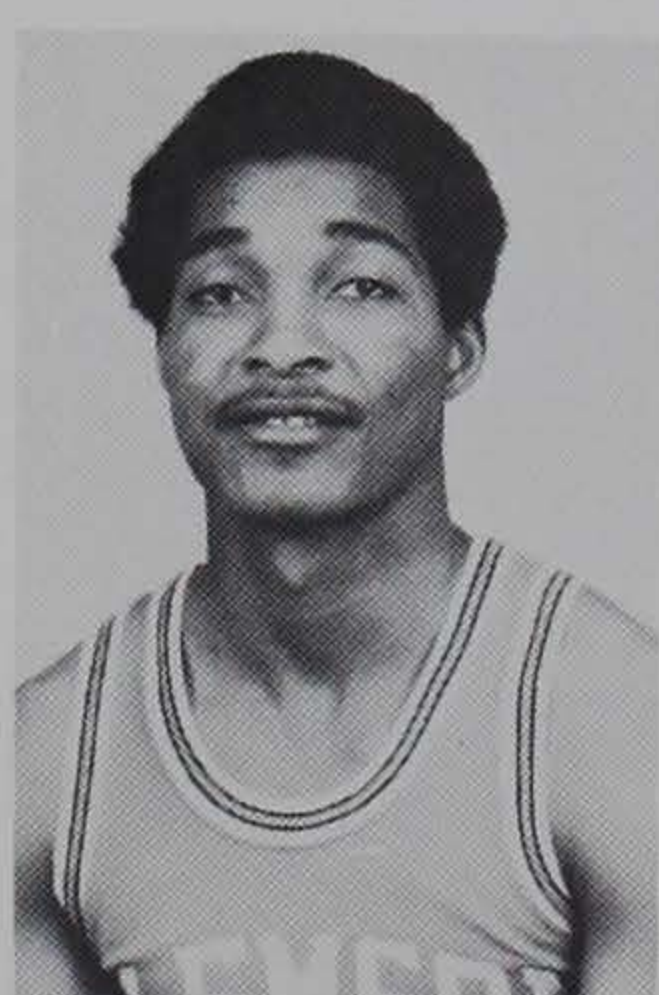
