## Shutouts By and Whom . . .

In 27 seasons at Clemson, Coach Frank Howard's teams have shut out opponents 48 times (20 different teams). During the same period, Howard has seen his teams blanked on 27 occasions (15 different teams). Below is a breakdown of shutouts, both for and against.

CLEMSON SHUTOUTS (48): Presbyterian 10, N. C. State 7; Wake Forest 5; South Carolina 4; Virginia 3; The Citadel, Auburn, North Carolina and Furman, twice each; Wofford, George Washington, Virginia Military, Virginia Tech, Duquesne, Missouri, Boston College, Maryland, Rice, Duke and Texas Christian, once each.

OPPONENTS' SHUTOUTS (27): Maryland 5; South Carolina and Georgia Tech, 3 each; Miami (Fla.), Auburn, North Carolina and N. C. State, twice each; Tulane, Virginia Military, George Washington, Georgia, Louisiana State, Duke, Alabama and Southern Cal, once each.



# Outlook for 1967 . . .

Two platoon has brought about an increased number of lettermen, but nonetheless, the Tigers have an unusually large number of veterans back for 1967. There are 45 in camp, and Coach Frank Howard says he can't recall when that many were around before.

What makes it even more pleasant is that only two offensive starters were lost through graduation and four off the defense.

But Howard was able to move lettermen up in all six of these spots, and in a couple of cases, other lettermen have rooted out a starter of a year ago. But all of this competition makes for a better team, and the grizzled Howard believes this might be his best one.

Jimmy Abrams has moved up at left end to replace Wayne Bell and Gary Arthur took over for Mike Facciolo at right guard. The rest of the line including left tackle Larry Keys, left guard Harry Olszewski, center Wayne Mulligan, right tackle Wayne Mass and right end Edgar McGee return.

Jimmy Addison, a school record setter in three departments last fall, is back at quarterback as is flanker Phil Rogers. Buddy Gore, who led the conference in rushing last fall as a sophomore, has been shifted to fullback and Jacky Jackson stepped up a notch to take over at tailback. Bo Ruffner, who started last season at fullback but hurt in the second game, is currently behind Gore.

Replacements had to be found on defense for left tackle Floyd Rogers, middle guard Mac McElmurray and defensive backs Wayne Page and Phil Marion.

Mike Locklair is the new face for Rogers and Riley McLane takes over the vital middle guard slot. In the defensive secondary Richie Luzzi is in Marion's spot and Frank Liberatore has the angle on the old Page post.

Liberatore started last season as the right corner, but was hurt against Duke and Lee Rayburn played out the rest of the year and is there again this fall. Arthur Craig rounds out the secondary at left safety.

Butch Sursavage, an All-ACCer for two years is back at left end as are the two linebackers, Billy Ware and Jimmy Catoe but they will be playing opposite back up spots from last year.

Junior John Cagle, moved from offense to defense in the spring, has pushed Wilson Childers down a notch at right tackle and Ronnie Ducworth did the same to senior veteran Joey Branton at right end.

In all, there are 20 seniors and 31 juniors on the squad and only seven sophomores are listed on the first 44, two of whom are redshirts. For the first time in the past several seasons, not a sophomore is in the starting lineup on either offense or defense.

Howard expects a winner, and if experience means anything, he'll have it.

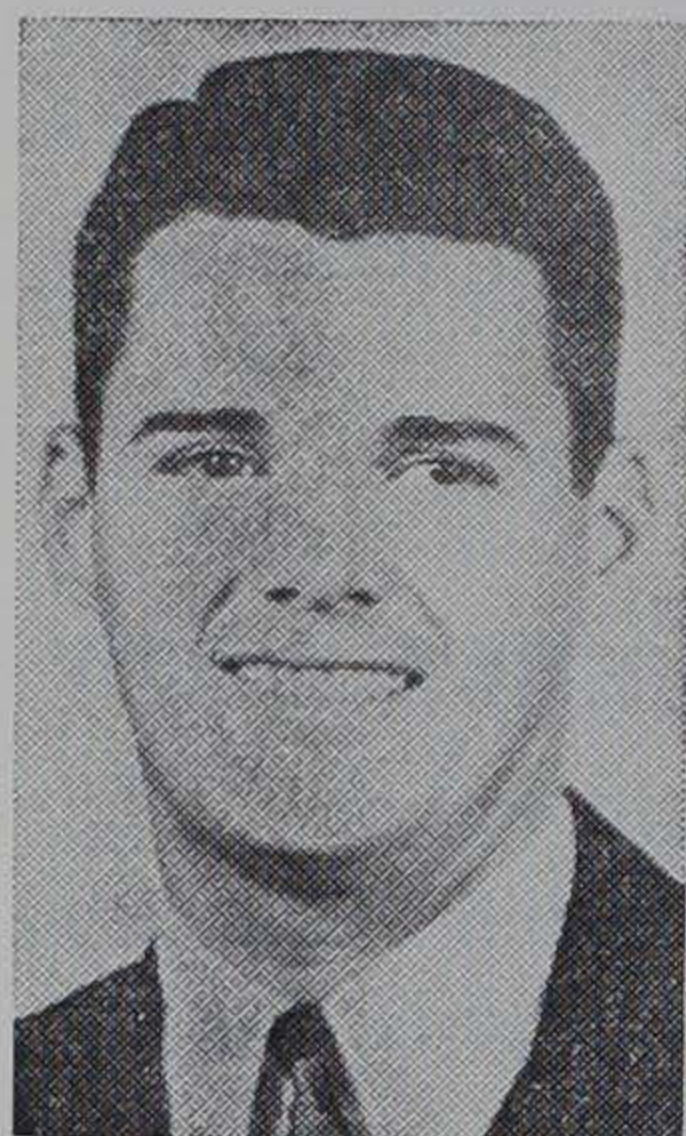

# Clemson IPTAY Club

The Clemson IPTAY Club started its 34th year of operation September 1, 1967, and the day before, closed its most successful 12-month monetary period in history.

During its 33rd year the club had over 9,000 regular members and 749 Gold Card (\$100 or more) contributors. These together represented over 17,000 memberships and the money received was 25 per cent more than had been realized in any other year.

IPTAY—I Pay Ten A Year—was started for just one purpose—to finance athletic scholarships at Clemson. That is still the way IPTAY is run today. The money received during the past 33 years has been used for scholarships and scholarships only. No other use is made of the money.

From the records available, there were 185 people who were members of IPTAY during that first year of 1934-35. Sixty-six of these are now deceased and of the 119 others, 72, or 60.5 per cent are still members today. Of these 72, there are 24 Gold Card members.

The late Dr. Rupert H. (Rube) Fike was the father of IPTAY. It was his idea that something should be done to support athletics at Clemson. His thoughts were being churned around when the Tigers were at one of their lowest depths in football. The team had won but seven games, while losing 17 and deadlocking five in three seasons.

For the next eight seasons, Clemson had break even or better campaigns and had been to its first post-season bowl game. Since IPTAY was formed the Tigers have had 25 out of 33 seasons of .500 or better ball and have been to six more bowl games.

In addition there have been conference titles and athletes have received all-star and post-season honors which was almost unheard of prior to IPTAY.

Other Clemson athletic teams have improved accordingly with baseball and basketball titles being reaped as well as individual conference champions in track and a tennis team that is ranked with the South's best.

Had it not been for that meeting in Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 20, 1934, when Dr. Fike and eight others got together to form IPTAY, Clemson would either be without athletic teams in some sports, or competing with teams of lesser stature. Instead, the Tigers play from coast to coast and meet some of the biggest powers in sports.

IPTAY is no exclusive or secret club such as the founders had thought of its being. Anyone, regardless of alma mater or age, can become a member. The men, women and children who are a part of IPTAY are interested in seeing the Clemson Tigers retain a high ranking in their athletic endeavors.

IPTAY is an investment into the future . . . the future in young men who gain an education through IPTAY.

# A Note On Clemson . . .

Clemson University is now in the middle of a building program with an outlay of close to \$17 million in new structures and another \$10 million should be under-way by this time next year.

A student body of 6,500 is anticipated for the 1967-68 school year, and in another eight years, this figure should be in the neighborhood of 10,000.

Occupied since last year are the Robert Muldrow Cooper Library, a million dollar addition to the chemistry building, two men's dormitories and the 10-story high rise facility for women.

Well underway at the beginning of the fall term are a cafeteria with a 2,000 capacity, the J. C. Littlejohn Coliseum, another high rise dormitory and hospital. Before the first semester ends, a new classroom building and an engineering research building should be started.

The university is located in the northwestern corner of South Carolina, 30 miles from the foothills of the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains. Highways 123, 76 and 28 cross through the campus with Interstate 85 just 12 miles away.

The campus proper contains over 25,000 acres, with other university facilities operated throughout the state in cooperation with the Extension Service and Experiment Station. The main campus of this land grant university is located on the shores of Hartwell Lake, a 60,000 acre expanse with over 900 miles of shoreline.

The university is composed of six schools or colleges: College of Agriculture and Biological Sciences, College of Arts and Sciences, School of Architecture, College of Engineering, School of Industrial Management and Textile Science, and School of Education.

There are 36 curriculums at the university for undergraduates, some with a five-year curricula. Graduate work toward a master's degree is now offered in 34 fields and there are now 21 programs leading to a doctorate degree.

Thomas Green Clemson gave his Fort Hill Estate to the State of South Carolina for the establishment of an agricultural and mechanical college. The General Assembly drew up an Act of Acceptance of the will of Clemson Nov. 27, 1889. The first students (446) matriculated in 1893 and the first graduating class was in 1896.

Clemson was a distinguished scientist of his day and served as the nation's first superintendent (now secretary) of agriculture. He married the daughter of John C. Calhoun, the noted Southern statesman. Calhoun's home stands restored on the Clemson campus today and is open to the public free of charge.

Dr. Robert Cook Edwards was named president in 1959 following the sudden death of Dr. R. F. Poole. Edwards, who had been with industry since his 1933 graduation, returned to Clemson as head of the department of development before being elevated to the presidency.



# A Brief Flash Back . . .

Clemson should score its 10,000th point early this season in launching its 72nd football campaign.

The Tigers have now tallied 9,952 points in 621 intercollegiate games—or an average of just over 16 points a contest.

Clemson has won 336 games (54.1%) and the veteran Frank Howard, who is starting his 28th season as Tiger head coach, has been at the helm in 42.7% (or 265) of the 621 played.

Howard can now lay claim on 151 victories and he is fifth ranked nationally for the most victories and he's also one of five active coaches who has won over 150 games.

Clemson has been to seven post-season bowl games, more than any other team in the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Tigers have a 4-3 bowl record and in each one of these classics, they have been the underdog.

Clemson—like most schools—has had its up and downs in football. The Tigers started their intercollegiate gridiron activity in 1896, playing three games and coming off with a 2-1 record.

In the first four seasons Clemson compiled an 11-6 record, but it wasn't until John Heisman appeared in 1900 that Clemson became known as a football power.

In four years Heisman's teams won 19, lost 3 and tied 2, scoring 731 points and holding opponents to 92. Heisman went on to greater heights at Georgia Tech and it is for him the cherished Heisman Trophy is named.

Heisman left Clemson after the 1903 season. During the next four seasons under four different coaches, the Tigers were 14-9-5. On April 1, 1908 the Pendleton Escapade took place which resulted in the expulsion of 306 students, including many football players.

Because of this, football was thoroughly demoralized and ushered in the so-called "dark ages." The Tigers had only eight winning seasons during the next 19 years and not until Josh Cody arrived at the beginning of the 1927 season could the Tigers put together four winners in a row.

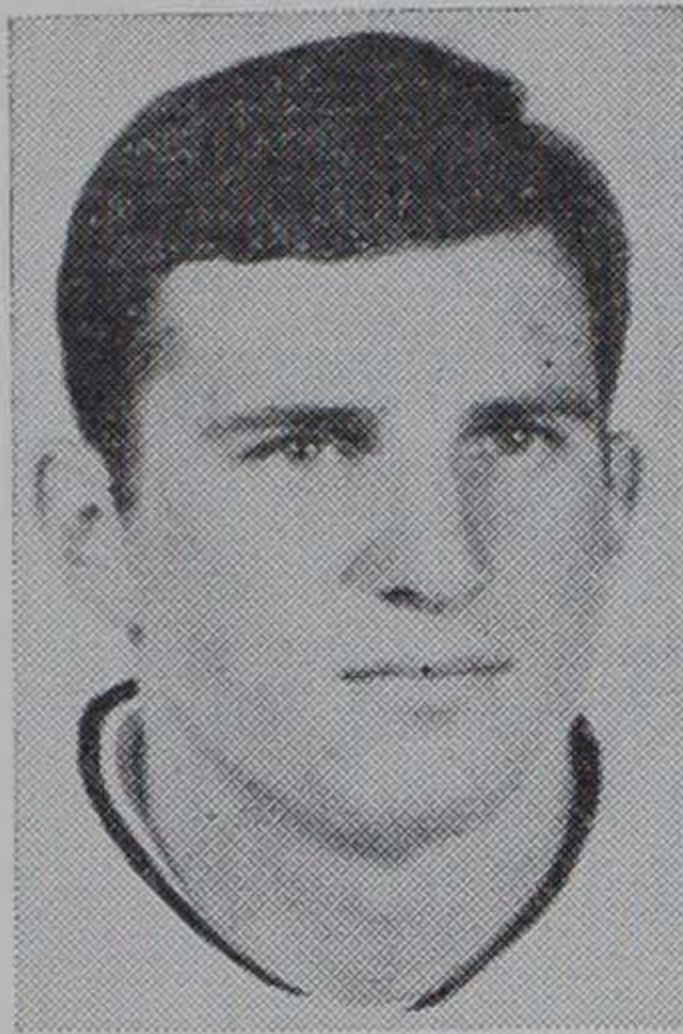
After experimenting a 29-11-1 mark in four years, Cody left and Jess Neely inherited the head coaching job for the next nine years. He had three losers before breaking even. But before leaving for Rice, where he coached for 27 years, Neely carried the Tigers to the Cotton Bowl (1940) and started Clemson on the way to national acclaim with a 6-3 win over Boston College.

Under the guidance of Howard, who also serves as athletic director, Clemson has remained one of the respected power on the national football scene. He has taken six teams to post-season bowls and has finished .500 or better in 19 of his 27 seasons.

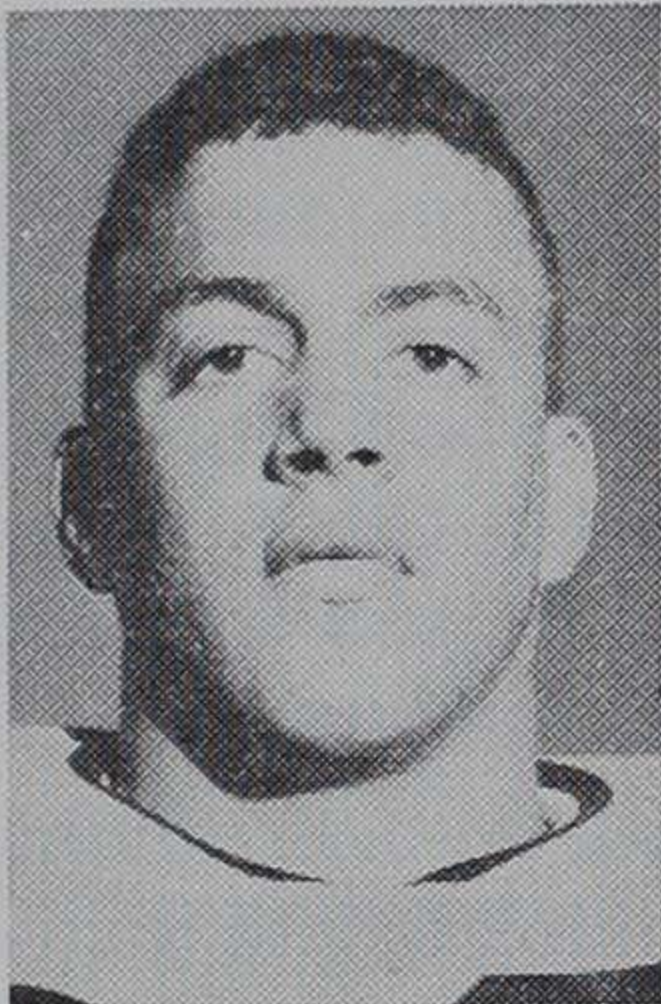
Many think Clemson is set for another banner year on the gridiron.

# Death Valley Record . . .

In the past 25 seasons, 22 teams have made appearances in Clemson Memorial Stadium, now pretty widely known as "Death Valley." Only three teams (George Washington, Villanova and Maryland) have an edge on the Tigers' home ground and two of these (GW and Villanova) have just played one game in Memorial Stadium. # FRANK JAMES HOWARD

## ATHLETIC DIRECTOR AND HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

The Baron comes back this year with a couple of more honors added onto his already illustrious career.

First, he won his 150th game (14-10 over Maryland in 8th game of season) during 1966, giving him a place with four other active coaches; he was named Atlantic Coast

Conference coach-of-the-year; and with the retirement of Coach Jess Neely at Rice, now has the longest tenure of any coach in the nation.

Honors are nothing out of the ordinary for Howard as he has been reaping said accolades for any number of years now.

Only Warren Woodson of New Mexico State has been head coach of more games among active coaches than Howard—359 against 265.

Howard's 1967 team will be his 28th at Clemson. He has been on the staff now 37 years. His first nine were as line coach under Neely.

His connection with intercollegiate football travels back 40 years, including his four as an undergraduate at Alabama. In his four decades as a player-coach, Howard has been connected with 385 gridiron wars, including two in the East-West Shrine game, four at the Blue-Gray and one in Miami's North-South game. He has been a winner 222 times against 163 losses.

Howard is very outspoken when any type of legislation is passed which he thinks will hurt the game. When the punt rule was put in this year, he was one of its most severest critics.

"They tried to put that thing in when I was on the rules committee," he says, "and I told them I wanted to add an amendment where you would have to line the end up 10 yards away from the tackle." Asked by other committee members why this notion, Howard quipped, "Well, my off tackle play hasn't been going very well and if you're gonna help the punt return team that much I want you to help my off tackle play work better."

When someone suggests something he thinks for the betterment of the game, his usual quip is, "That makes too much sense. It won't pass in 10 years."

The man who doesn't smoke, golf or fish—but who has been known to take an occasional chew—would like to see all rules apply to everyone. "You don't race a mule in the Kentucky Derby and expect to win," he says.

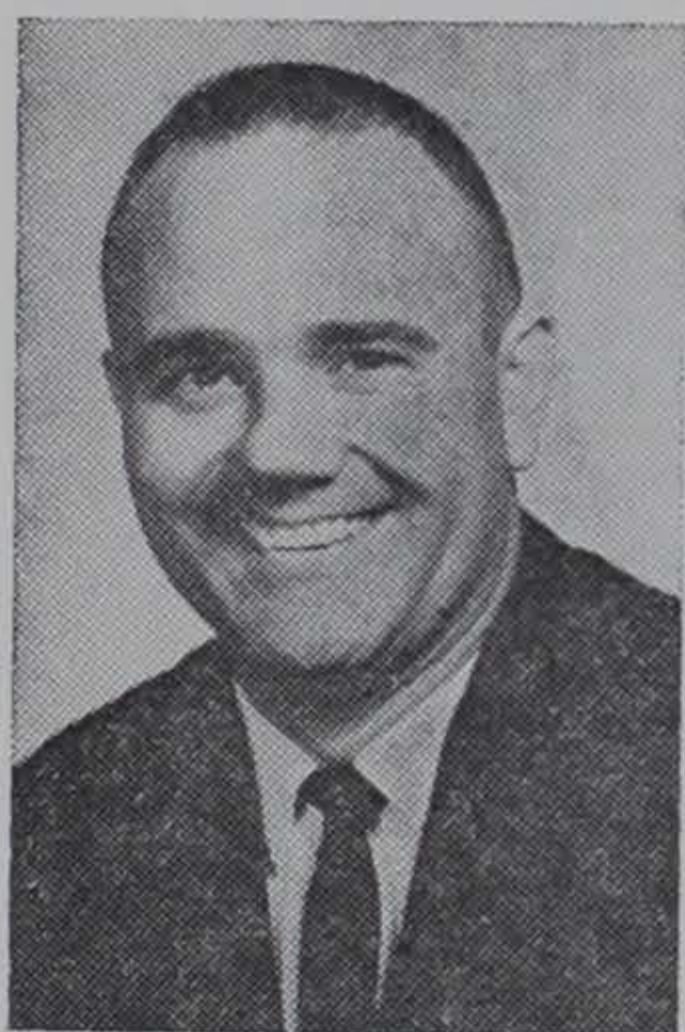

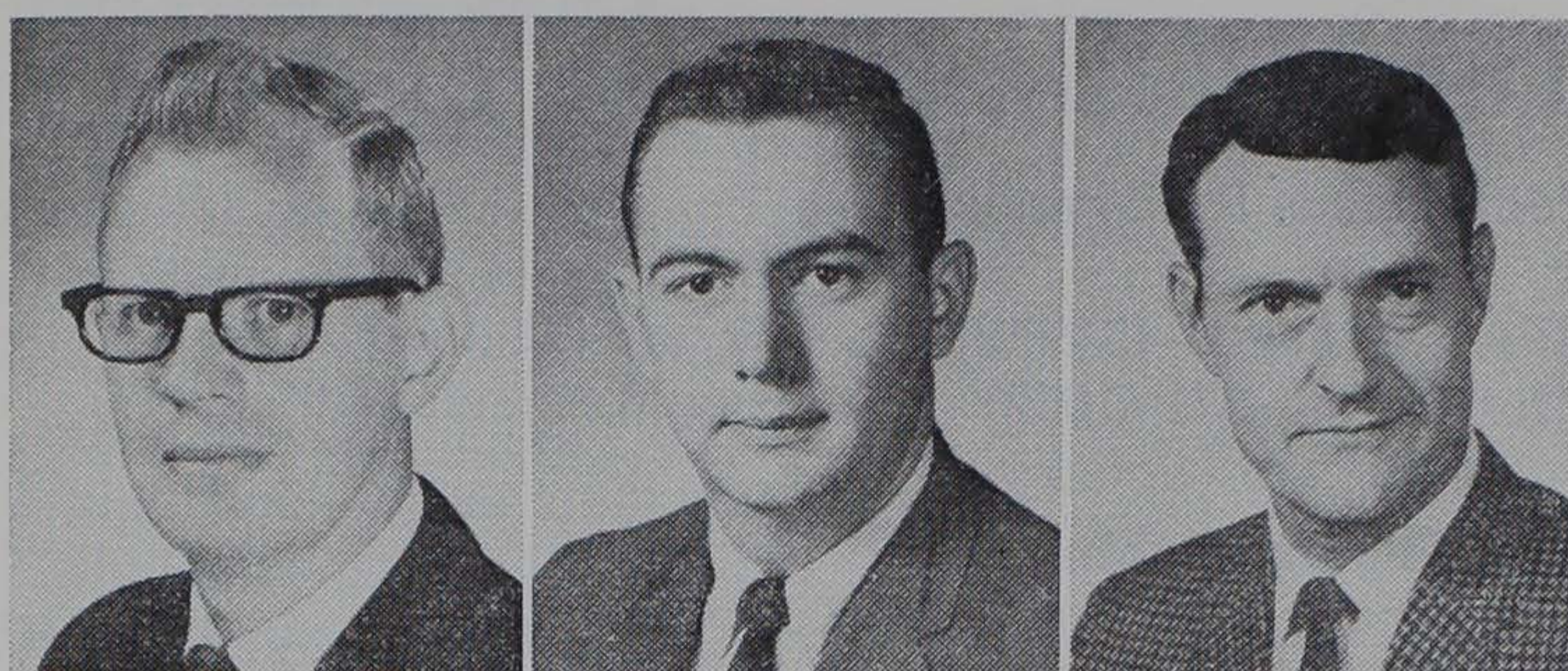

## **Photography Facilities Tops . . .**

Facilities for the working press in the Clemson press box are as modern and up-to-date as possible. Everyone has enough space to work in, whether he be TV, radio, sportswriter or photographer.

Those who record the game in pictures are accorded every facility needed to adequately cover the game.

With chief photographer Charles Haralson and his assistants Tom Shockley and Bill Osteen on hand, equipment, space, chemicals and game action pictures are available for visiting photographers.

With the newly-established Communications Center at Clemson, headed up by Harry Durham, and his right hand man, Jim Burns, almost any request for film, video tape or stills can be filled during the week.

On game day a 27-foot open section on the second deck of the press box is reserved for visiting and home team movies.

This year a cover has been added to the 35-yard top deck which will give TV cameramen and still photographers an unhindered vantage point to shoot from top side.

Within the press box is a complete dark room where film can be loaded, processed and wire photos transmitted during the game.

Movies are taken of each game. One print in color is used for the Frank Howard Show on a five-station hook-up each Sunday following the game. Two black and white copies are also made, one for the Clemson coaches and one for Tigers' next opponent.

Game action stills are also taken during the first half and any news media desiring a set of game pictures may obtain them at the end of the contest.

The Clemson press box is the only one in the Atlantic Coast Conference (and one of the few in the nation) equipped with a Fotorite machine for rapid print processing. This unit enables pictures of the game to be printed within minutes after being taken.

This has proved to be a highly popular feature with those covering Clemson's home games and it will again be offered this coming season. In the past five seasons, over 2,000 pictures have been given free to the press.

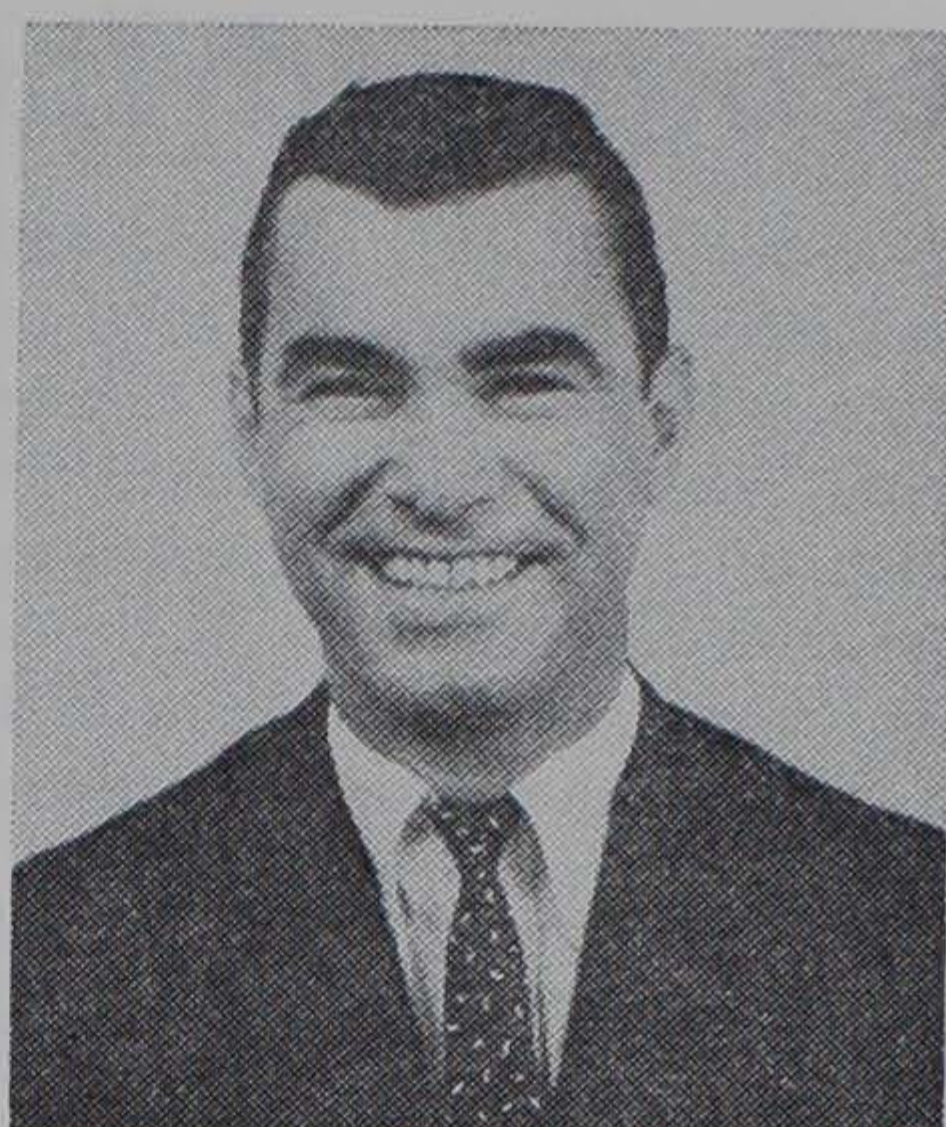

## **Clemson Radio Network . . .**

The Clemson Football Network gets off the ground for its 14th time this season and another banner year is anticipated.

Bill Goodrich, sports director of WFBC Radio and TV in Greenville, will handle the play-by-play for the third straight year; and doing the color portion of the broadcast this season is Jim Kingman, a member of the Clemson family now, and an ex-sportscaster in his own right.

The Clemson network is operated wholly by the athletic department and has been one of the most successful anywhere. It is one of the nation's largest collegiate networks, having averaged slightly over 50 stations a game for the past six seasons.

Goodrich came to Greenville and the Clemson Football and Basketball Networks from Jackson, Miss., where he had furnished play-by-play to as many as 275 stations on one broadcast on the Ole Miss games. He did the action of the Rebel games for seven years.

A 22-year veteran in radio and 12 years in television experience, Goodrich is no stranger to South Carolina sports fans.

While located with WORD in Spartanburg in the early '50's he did Wofford football and basketball and also play-by-play of the Spartanburg Peaches of the old Tri-State League. Later moving to WSPA-TV for two years, he handled the Clemson football films during 1956 and 1957 and broadcast the '55-'56 Tiger basketball games.

Kingman, a native of Seneca and the son of a Methodist minister, graduated from Winnsboro High School and started his radio work with WSSC in Sumter where he did the Edmonds High School and Shaw Air Force Base games.

He worked for a brief stint with WGAC in Augusta, Ga., before going with WSPA in 1958 where he remained until 1964. While with the Spartanburg station he broadcast the Spartanburg High and Wofford College basketball and football games. For the past three years he broadcast Dorman High games over WORD.

He came to Clemson in January, 1967, as assistant radio and TV editor of the Agricultural Communications Dept.

No coach in the nation faces what Bobby Roberts of Clemson does this fall. He has lost four of his starters from the 17-8 team of a year ago and there are only four lettermen returning.

This may sound good on paper, but when you consider that one had a scoring average of 10.2 and the other three were 0.6, 0.4 and 0.8, it puts an entirely different outlook on the season.

Richie Mahaffey, the last of the famed brothers to play for the Tigers, is the only starter back. He played in all 25 games last winter, starting the last 23. He was third in field goal percentage (45.5), second in rebounds (7.8) and fourth in scoring (10.2).

Who will join this lone returnee? Possibly Trip Jones at forward and Curt Eckard at center. Each, like Mahaffey, is a junior. Sophomore Butch Zatezalo should be one of the guards with the other slot being filled by either Dave Demsey or Mike Faer.

Apparently Ronnie Welch will not return to school. He led last year's frosh in field goal percentage (52.4) and in rebounds (15.5) and was second in scoring (15.3). Roberts was depending on his 6-8, 240-pound frame.

Zatezalo led the frosh with a 22.4 average and hit 87 of 100 free throws while Faer was 52 for 57 from the charity stripe.
