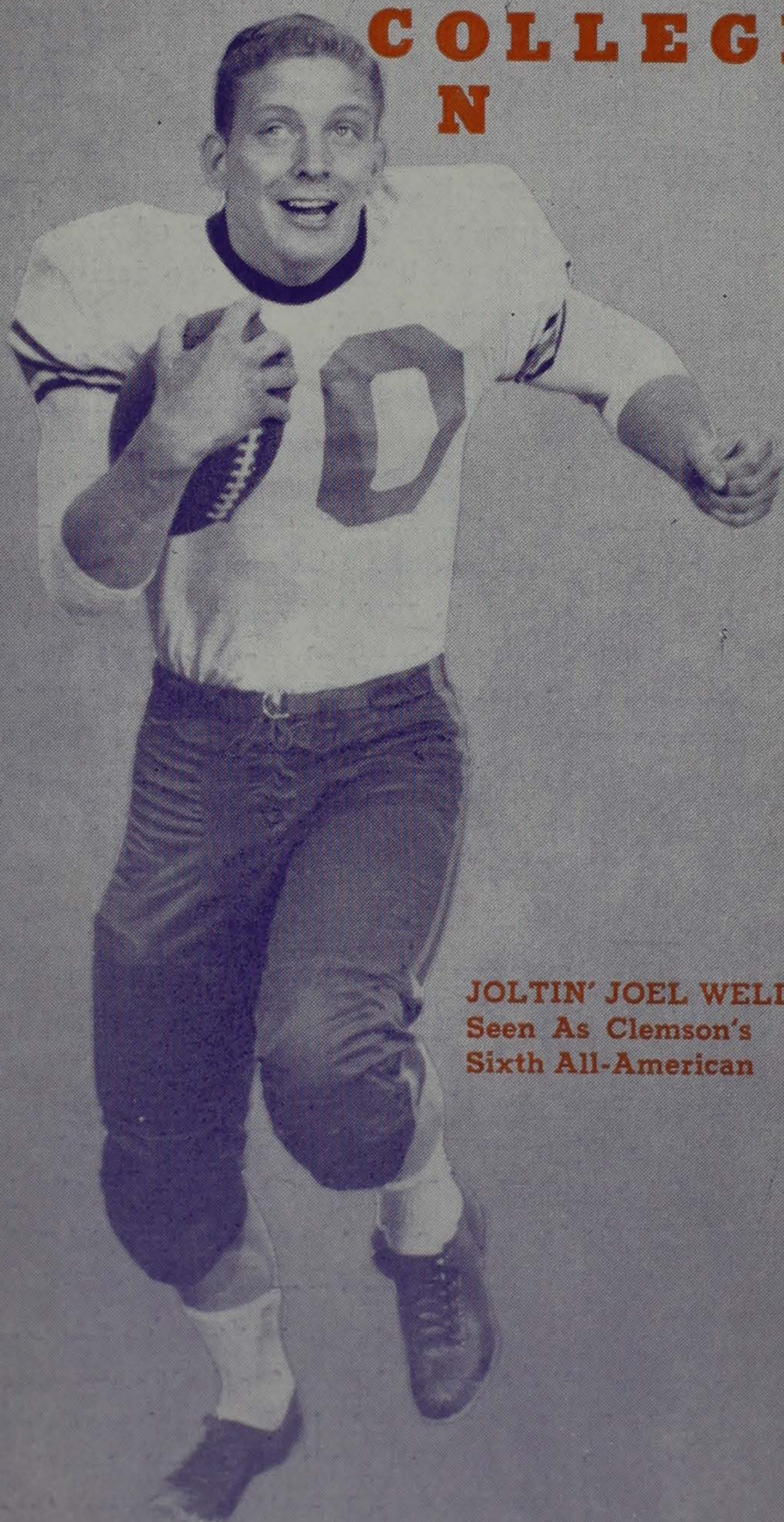

Outlook for 1956 . . .

Clemson will probably have about the same caliber of football team this fall as the one which represented the school last year. Three starting members of the 1955 backfield are gone as are two good linemen. However, some good reserve lettermen are back which should make the Tigers another interesting team to watch.

There are 24 returning lettermen while 14 were lost to graduation.

The Tigers will base their attack around the captain and alternate captain of the team, Charlie Bussey at quarterback and Joel Wells at halfback. Head Coach Frank Howard call Bussey "one of the headiest" quarterbacks he has ever seen. The Henderson, N. C., senior makes up for his size (154 pounds) by being able to diagnose opponents' defenses.

Howard calls Wells "the best back in the Atlantic Coast Conference" and he is pretty sure that Wells is one of the finest backs in the country. Wells made every All-Atlantic Coast Conference team last year and was the leading ground gainer in the conference with 782 yards gained in 135 plays. He rushed for 175 yards in 24 attempts against Furman last year to set a single game record for rushing in the ACC.

Wells could be termed a "free wheeling" back with his slashing, never-give-up type of running. He not only excels on offense, but is one of the best defensive men on the squad. He is very adept to pass defense and capable of furnishing a clear road for other runners with his blocking.

Expected to round out the backfield with Wells and Bussey are Jim Coleman at right halfback and Bob Spooner, one of the three starting juniors, at fullback.

Backing up these four seasoned players will be Charlie "Red" Hope and Horace Turbeville at quarterback, Charlie Horne and Don Gilpin behind Coleman, Rudy Hayes and Lem McLendon relieving Wells and Floyd Lawrence and Mike Dukes taking up slack for Spooner.

Most of these backs are sophomores, but all are expected to see a lot of varsity time this fall.

End will be one of the weak spots in the line this fall with only two experienced men around. Willie Smith and Dalton Rivers are ahead of the others, but watch sophomore Ray Masneri. Jack Bush, a former tackle, Wyatt Cox and Kenneth Rogers are the other hopefuls.

Guard is apparently the strongest position in the line where five lettermen are vieing. John Grdijan and Earle Greene, both '55 regulars are back, but they are being pushed by H. B. Bruorton, Leon Kaltenbach and Ormond Wild. Jim Payne, a Georgia Tech transfer, is also a strong contender.

Two big tackles, Dick Marazza and Billy Hudson, can be counted on for plenty of action, but boys like Ken Pace, Jim McCanless, Tommy Sease and Jim Padgett cannot be forgotten.

Starting center will be handled by a former guard, Dick DeSimone, who did not play last year because of an injury. DeSimone, also noted for his linebacking ability, will be assisted by Bill Thomas—a spring game surprise—and letterman Donnie Bunton.

Coach Howard said "all of the coaches were fairly well pleased with our spring practice game and the sophomores came through a little better than we had anticipated. We will probably get some help from two or three of our sophomore backs this fall and if we get far enough ahead or far enough behind, we will give our sophomore linemen same experience."

Review of 1955 . . .

This time last year Coach Frank Howard figured his team could win every game on the schedule or it could lose about 8 out of 10. As things ended up, the Tigers came up with seven wins and three losses, which was a very respectable average considering the caliber of play most opponents displayed.

Two of the three teams which beat the Tigers last year—Maryland and Auburn—ended up in post season bowls. However, despite a 12-25 loss to the Terps, Clemson lost no fans on the day of that game. At one time the Tigers had the mighty Terps reeling with a 12-0 deficit and 30,000 home fans were fanatic.

The Tigers got through the first three games all right, with Don King displaying his best passing form against Georgia. Billy O'Dell did an outstanding job in the 20-7 win over Virginia.

Rice, who was supposed to be "it" in the Southwest, disposed of the Tigers, 21-7, and then the Owls took a turn to the worse and failed to win another one.

Alumni probably consider the 28-14 win over South Carolina the top win of the year, the first over the Gamecocks since 1948.

Hard-fought wins also were accomplished over Wake Forest, Virginia Tech and Furman. The latter game saw Joel Wells set a one game conference rushing record of 175 yards in 24 attempts.

Athletic Personnel . . .

Frank Howard expects to "graduate" this year from this T-formation football. After that, he will go into a post-graduate course and continue to get a little learning during each succeeding campaign.

If records are any measure of success, the last three seasons will show that the coaching staff and the players have been absorbing the "new course" and have been putting into practice the lessons learned in the open air class room.

In 1953, the first year the Tigers switched from the single wing, they ran and passed less than .500, taking three contests, dropping five and tying one. Some "Grandstand Howards" were ready to go back to the almost-laughed-at-single wing which just a few seasons before had carried Howard and his Country Gentlemen to three bowl games in four years.

But Howard stuck to his convictions and beliefs. In 1954 Clemson broke even in a 10-game schedule, winning five and dropping a like number. Continued improvement was shown in the last campaign when Howard's Hosses enjoyed their best season since 1951, winning seven and losing three.

Some people who make so many words on a typewriter during the year are even going so far as to say the Tigers are headed for another bowl trip this year. Howard, it is true, has a lot of experience hanging off the sidelines this year, but so have a lot of other teams who will meet face to face with the Tigers in the coming year.

Howard is starting his 17th season as head man of the South's most famous Tigers. Actually, he has been tutoring football in the afternoon for the past 26 years since he was line coach here nine years before succeeding Jess Neely at the helm.

The former All-American at Alabama either comes from Barlow Bend or Mobile—both in Alabama. He says if the character he is talking to looks like a country hick, he's from Barlow Bend. Otherwise, he is from Mobile.

Howard not only takes full responsibility for the football team, but is also athletic director which puts all other sports at the college under his command, and that includes all the fund raising in support of these teams. In his 26 seasons here, the athletic department has always operated in the black.

The Tiger mentor carries a thick drawl with him and his after dinner speaking talents are in great demand and he is just about as well known for his witticisms as his coaching ability.

Mrs. Howard is the former Anna Tribble of Anderson and she and the coach are the parents of two children, Alice, 20, and Jimmy, 14.

VARSITY ASSISTANTS

BOB JONES, Clemson '30, has been coaching at Clemson since his graduation — first working with the freshmen and more recently with the ends . . . During his playing days with the Tigers, he was an All-South end and captain of the varsity basketball team . . . Was head boxing coach until Clemson dropped the sport . . . Came out of World War II a well-decorated full colonel and was promoted to the rank of brigadier general in the Army Reserve last year . . . A native of nearby Starr, Jones is a partner with his brother in a successful peach-growing venture . . . He's married to the former Ellen Moseley of Anderson . . . They are the parents of three daughters, Janet, 22, Rose, 16, and Robin, 9.

BANKS McFADDEN, Clemson '40, has been on the Tiger coaching staff since graduation except for one year of pro football with Brooklyn and almost four years in the Army Air Force . . . Considered the greatest all-round athlete in state history, Banks was first team All-America in both football and basketball and still holds three state intercollegiate records in track . . . Gave up head basketball coaching duties this year to devote full time as defensive backfield coach . . . A native of Great Falls, McFadden is married to the former Agnes Rigby of Manning . . . They are the parents of four daughters, Patsy 10, Lil 8, Marcia 5 and Janice 3.

BOB SMITH, Furman '34, joined the Clemson varsity staff as a "T" specialist in 1950 on a part time basis, but has been a full time operator since early 1951 . . . Former assistant and head coach at Furman, he began experimenting with the "T" while stationed at Jacksonville in

the Navy during World War II . . . A three-letterman at Furman, Smith resumed his relationship with baseball in the spring of 1952 as head Tiger baseball coach . . . He was named Atlantic Coast Conference 'Coach of the Year' in 1954 as Clemson won the ACC championship . . . He's a native of Cartersville, Ga., and married to the former Catherine Jordan of Dillon . . . They are the parents of two daughters, Sandy 10, and Becky 8, and one son, Bob, Jr., 4.

CARL WISE, King College '37, is the most recent addition to the Clemson coaching staff, taking the post vacated by the retiring Russ Cohen February of last year . . . In charge of the backs, Wise came to Clemson well qualified with experience received in the Virginia high school ranks, at Bainbridge Navy during World War II, at the University of Pennsylvania, Washington and Lee University and in 1954 at Hamilton in the Canadian Professional League . . . He was head coach at Washington and Lee during the 1952 and 1953 seasons before resigning in 1954 when the Generals decided to de-emphasize football . . . Has made a big contribution to the team both with his coaching ability and with his contacts in Virginia and Pennsylvania . . . A native of North Carolina, he is married to the former Jody Pate of Gate City, Va.

FRESHMAN COACHES

COVINGTON (Goat) McMILLAN, Clemson '30, returned to Clemson as backfield coach in 1937 after first serving as head coach at Griffin (Ga.) High and as an assistant at Furman . . . Today he is head freshman coach . . . An All-South tailback at Clemson, he's coached some of the school's finest backs since arriving on the campus — Banks McFadden, Bobby Gage, Ray Mathews, Fred Cone, Don King, etc. . . . Unofficial chief recruiter and statistician he's a stickler for detail, perfection and timing . . . A native of Saluda, he's married to the former Edith Greer of Greenville . . . They are the parents of two daughters, Cheryl 17, and Cecelia 13 and two sons, Johnny, 10, and Timothy, 2 (in November).

DON WADE, Clemson '52, returned to Clemson after one year of coaching at Waynesboro, Ga. . . . Was first string linebacker on Orange and Gator Bowl teams . . . In addition to coaching the freshman line, Wade does a lot of talent scouting for Clemson . . . A native of Lenoir City, Tenn., he's married to the former Barbara Henderson of Clemson . . . They are the parents of two daughters, Donna, 4, and Beth, 7 months.

CROSS COUNTRY COACH

A. W. (Rock) NORMAN, Roanoke '13, came to Clemson in the late 1930's after first serving as head basketball and track coach at Furman, South Carolina and The Citadel . . . One of the state of Virginia's great natural athletes in history, Rock is still active today . . . He runs a boys camp in the summer . . . Cross country and head

track coach, he was varsity basketball coach before McFadden's 10-year stretch . . . Also handles freshman basketballers . . . He's married to the former Dorothy Russell . . . They are the parents of two sons, Willis, Jr., and Joe.

FACULTY CHAIRMAN

R. R. (RED) RITCHIE, Iowa State '26, like Frank Howard, came to Clemson upon graduation from college and has been here ever since . . . Teaches in the Animal Husbandry Department . . . Received his Master's degree from Iowa State in 1938 . . . Has been a booster of Clemson's athletic program from the beginning . . . Took over job as faculty chairman after Dr. Lee Milford retired the early part of 1955 . . . A native Iowan, he is married to the former Mary Leighton Mills.

BUSINESS MANAGER

GENE WILLIMON, Clemson '33, came to Clemson as director of the IPTAY (I Pay Ten A Year) athletic booster club in 1950. He's become general business manager of the Athletic Association since . . . An outstanding Clemson halfback in the early 1930's, Willimon was in the insurance business before returning to his alma mater . . . A native of Greenville, he married the former Lou McClure of Anderson . . . They are the parents of a son, Rusty 16, and a daughter, "Weezie" 12.

PUBLICITY DIRECTOR

BOB BRADLEY, Clemson '51, took over the Clemson sports publicity post in November of last year after having served as associate director of public relations and alumni secretary of the college . . . former sports editor and editor of college paper . . . worked on Greenville News and Greenville Piedmont sports desk and state news beat . . . currently a vice president of the ACC Sports Writers Association . . . Native of North Carolina, lived in Greenville for 18 years . . . Is married to the former Louise Madewell of Dallas, Texas . . . They are the parents of a daughter, Dorma, 1.

OFFICE ASSISTANT

EARLE MARTIN, an alumnus of Clemson, has been working for the Athletic Department at many jobs for the past seven years . . . Known to virtually everyone as "Pear Baby" or "Pepper", he is in his third year as manager of the ticket office . . . still manages to supervise book and supply room for athletes on scholarship and assists the athletic staff in numerous ways . . . Greenwood is his home.

TRAINER

HERMAN McGEE, began gaining experience as a small colored boy many years ago under the watchful eyes of the late "Chappie" . . . Has been in charge of training room since the 1949 season . . . makes all trips with the team . . . Frank Howard says he wouldn't trade him.

C. . . . played in Tobacco Bowl game . . . probably best remembered for his play against Maryland last year . . . called by his coaches as most improved player on the squad . . . is hard to block out of wide end sweeps . . . civil engineering major.

LT—**DICK MARAZZA** — Senior — 6-4 — 220 — 23 — Greensburg, Pa. . . . expected to be top lineman for the Tigers this year . . . likes rugged action . . . plays as well on offense as defense . . . is a terrific downfield blocker . . . won Jacobs Blocking Trophy as best blocker in state last year . . . will be watched for conference honors in '56.

LG—**EARLE GREENE** — Senior 6-0 — 200 — 22 — St. Stephens . . . one of Clemson's five letterman guards returning this year . . . wears contact lens on field . . . a tough competitor . . . rated by his team mates as a good leader . . . married one of Clemson's co-eds this past summer . . . coaches call him the steadiest player on the club . . . industrial ed major.

C—**DICK DeSIMONE** — Junior — 5-11 — 195 — 22 — Avonmore, Pa. . . . has been switched from guard to center with Wingo Avery and Hamp Hunter gone . . . missed all action last year due to a knee operation . . . looked like the DeSimone of old in spring game . . . started every game as sophomore in '54 . . . considered an exceptional linebacker . . . taking education.

RG—**JOHN GRDIJAN** — Junior — 5-11 — 205 — 26 — Rillton, Pa. . . . oldest player on the squad . . . another player who was married this summer . . . strong and quick, not easily fooled . . . has service behind him . . . played two years while in armed forces.

RT—**BILLY HUDSON** — Senior — 6-4 — 230 — 21 — North Charleston . . . expected to team with Marazza for some outstanding tackle play . . . came to Clemson as an end, but has not played end since sophomore year . . . is third brother to play under Howard . . . Brother Bob in sixth season with Philadelphia Eagles . . . could have his best year in '56.

RE—**WILLIE SMITH** — Senior — 6-0 — 190 — 21 — Spartanburg . . . starting his second year as regular . . . probably the most consistent player around . . . caught 5 passes last year for 129 yards . . . was standout track and football athlete at Spartanburg High . . . majoring in textile manufacturing.

QB—**CHARLIE BUSSEY** — Senior — 6-0 — 160 — 21 — Henderson, N. C. . . . Add to these seven Fred DeBerry, Nick Carter, Robert Lindsay, Craig Hoffman and Doug Daigneault from the freshman squad of last year, and Maravich will probably mould a team capable of leaving the ACC cellar.
