# Outlook for 1955 . . .

The outlook at Clemson in 1955 is for an improved football team, but such is also the case at those colleges which will field teams to oppose the Tigers.

If there is one factor more important than another in analysing the prospects at Clemson, it's the "injury" one. Any position on a team is a key position when it is occupied by a player of All-America capabilities, and removing a key man or two from action in a big game often proves disastrous.

Don King and Charlie Bussey, Clemson's versatile veteran quarterbacks, hold the key to the team's offense. Each has been forced to miss some action in the past with injuries. While rugged sophomores Bill Barbary and Bobby Fisher are gaining experience, the health of King and Bussey will be of prime importance to the Tigers' success.

Wingo Avery, a veteran center who knows how to call defenses from the field almost as ably as the coaches, is another young man who has missed more than his share of action with injuries. There's very little experience behind him, which means his presence in the lineup will be of tremendous importance.

Dick DeSimone, the most consistent of the Tiger linemen last fall, had a cartilage removed from his knee in mid-July and may or may not be ready for full time action in the fall. He is needed badly at a position which boasts no other lettermen on the present first two elevens.

King, Bussey, Avery and DeSimone—all battle-proven young men who are candidates for the highest of All-Star laurels, together with the more solidly put-together Tiger standouts, could combine to give Clemson a team capable of holding its own with any of the tough foes on the schedule.

Give King and Bussey halfbacks of the likes of Joel Wells, Jim Coleman, Lem McLendon, Joe Pagliei and Crimmins Hankinson and fullbacks as strong as Bill O'Dell, Neuf Ankuta and Bob Spooner and the Clemson backfield will keep the football moving in the right direction.

And support Avery and DeSimone in the forward wall with tackles like Dick Marazza, B. C. Inabinet, Billy Hudson, Hampton Hunter, Johnny Thomason and Jack Bush, guards like John Grdijan and Earl Greene and ends like Walt Laraway, Willie Smith, Pete Wall, Joe Bowen, Bill Few and "Whitey" Jordan and the Tigers should again rank among the stronger defensive teams in the nation.



Clemson will have to be at full strength to cope with teams like Rice, rated number one in the Southwest Conference; Auburn, picked to take the Southeastern crown; Maryland, considered better than even the Terapins' National Champions of 1952; Georgia, rated the "darkhorse" of the South; Virginia, with the best material in a decade; and improved South Carolina, Virginia Tech, Furman and Presbyterian.

No defeatist, Tiger Coach Frank Howard insists, "We could win every game on the schedule, but we could also lose about eight of the ten."

Before getting too optimistic, check the daily practice briefs with regard to injured players. There one may find the crux of the situation.

## Review of 1954 . . .

This time last year the outlook read: "Experience, added depth and a young gentleman by the name of Don King are reasons why optimism reigns on the Clemson campus."

The optimism was well-founded, and except for a disappointing season experienced by King as a result of early season injuries, Clemson might have done much better than break even for the year.

Actually, a five-five record wasn't too bad under the circumstances. Three of the teams to beat the Tigers — Maryland, Auburn and Virginia Tech — were ranked among the nation's "top twenty" at the end of the season. Other losses to South Carolina and Georgia were by five and seven points respectively with Clemson still in the running right down to the final whistle.

Big victory of the year was over the University of Florida, conquerors of strong Georgia Tech and Auburn on successive weekends before entertaining Clemson on Saturday night in Jacksonville, Fla. Another was over Wake Forest, a team which the Tigers spotted a 13-0 lead late in the second quarter before rallying for a 32-20 win. Other victories by the Tigers were over Furman, The Citadel and Presbyterian.

Highlight of the year for Clemson was its strong defense — third best in the nation. NCAB figures in these departments were as follows:

# Athletic Personnel . . .

## SILVER ANNIVERSARY

For obvious reasons, Frank Howard's hair hasn't turned to silver, but in 25 years time the Clemson football coach and athletic director has made a lasting impression in the realm of college football and relating athletics. His reputation as a Southern humorist is without equal, while his renown as a football tactician reached national scope in 1948 and 1950 when his teams went unbeaten and won bowl championships.

It was 25 years ago this fall that the young Howard, fresh from commencement at the University of Alabama where he had played on an unbeaten Rose Bowl football team, first came to Clemson — line coach under Jess Neely. Nine years later, in 1940, after helping Coach Neely put the Tigers into the national limelight with a Cotton Bowl victory over Frank Leahy's undefeated Boston College team, an exuberant 30-year-old Howard took over the head athletic reins at Clemson when Neely headed to greener pastures at Rice Institute.

His first team won the Southern Conference championship, his second was ranked among the nation's "top twenty" teams, and following only mediocre success during the war years and immediately afterwards, his 1948 and 1950 teams went undefeated to rank among the nation's "top ten" while his 1951 squad finished up in the "top twenty" though losing a Gator Bowl battle to Miami. Dame fortune and the toughest of schedules have made the past three seasons disappointing ones for Clemson followers, though some degree of satisfaction was gained when quarterback Don King won the "Swede" Nelson Sportsmanship Award in 1953 and the '54 Tiger defense finished up third best in the nation.

Coach Howard is hopeful that his third season as a split-T coach will prove "the charm" this fall. His first 22 years in football coaching were spent master-minding single wing teams. The current edition of Tigers is expected to offer spectators the same kind of trickery from the "T" that the "dream backfields" of 1948 and 1950 used to confuse opponents with from the single wing.

In addition to heading up the Clemson football program during a period which has seen the Tigers take a back seat to no one in the tough, Atlantic Coast Conference, Howard has also had the job of directing Clemson's entire athletic program and at the same time raising all the required funds. Going into his 25th season at Clemson, he has never known the athletic department to wind up a sports year in the red.

A native Alabaman, with a thick drawl which helps his reputation as a "professional hill-billy," the Clemson coach was graduated from high school in Mobile before attending the University of Alabama. He is married to the former Anna Tribble of Anderson. They are the parents of two children, Alice 19, and Jimmy 13.

## VARSITY ASSISTANTS

**BOB JONES**, Clemson '30, has been coaching at Clemson since his graduation — first working with the freshmen and more recently with the ends . . . During his playing days with the Tigers, he was an All-South end and captain of the varsity basketball team . . . Was head boxing coach until Clemson dropped the sport . . . Came out of World War II a well-decorated full colonel and was promoted to the rank of brigadier general in the Army Reserve early this year . . . A native of nearby Starr, Jones is a partner with his brother and father in a successful peach-growing venture . . . He's married to the former Ellen Moseley of Anderson . . . They are the parents of three daughters, Janet 21, Rose 15 and Robin 8.

**BANKS McFADDEN**, Clemson '40, has been on the Tiger coaching staff since graduation except for one year of pro football with Brooklyn and almost four years in the Army Air Force . . . Considered the greatest all-round athlete in state history, Banks was first team All-America in both football and basketball and still holds three state intercollegiate records in track . . . In addition to serving as assistant coach he has been varsity basketball coach since the 1946-47 season . . . A native of Great Falls, McFadden is married to the former Agnes Rigby of Manning . . . They are the parents of four daughters, Patsy 9, Lil 7, Marcia 4, and Janice 2.

**BOB SMITH**, Furman '34, joined the Clemson varsity staff as a "T" specialist in 1950 on a part time basis, but has been a full time operator since early 1951 . . . Former assistant and head coach at Furman, he began experi-



menting with the "T" while stationed at Jacksonville in the Navy during World War II . . . A three-letterman at Furman, Smith resumed his relationship with baseball in the spring of 1952 as head Tiger baseball coach . . . He was named Atlantic Coast Conference Baseball Coach of the Year in 1954 as Clemson won the A.C.C. championship . . . He's a native of Cartersville, Ga., and married to the former Catehrine Jordan of Dillon . . . They are the parents of two daughters, Sandy 9, and Becky 7, and a son, Bob, Jr., 3.

**CARL WISE**, King's College '37, is the most recent addition to the Clemson coaching staff, taking the post vacated by the retiring Russ Cohen last February . . . In charge of the backs, Wise comes well qualified with experience received in the Virginia high school ranks, at Bainbridge Navy during World War II, at the University of Pennsylvania, Washington and Lee University and last year at Hamilton in the Canadian Professional League . . . He was head coach at Washington and Lee during the 1952 and 1953 seasons before resigning last year when the Generals decided to de-emphasize football . . . Has made a big contribution to the 1955 freshman team with his contacts in Virginia and Pennsylvania . . . A native North Carolinian, he is married to the former Jody Tate of Gate City, Va.

### FRESHMAN COACHES

**COVINGTON (Goat) McMILLAN**, Clemson '30, returned to Clemson as backfield coach in 1937 after first serving as head coach at Griffin (Ga.) High and as an assistant at Furman . . . Today he is head freshman coach . . . An All-South tailback at Clemson, he's coached some of the school's finest backs since arriving on the campus — Banks McFadden, Bobby Gage, Ray Mathews, Fred Cone, etc. . . . Unofficial chief recruiter and statistician he's a stickler for detail, perfection and timing . . . A native of Saluda, he's married to the former Edith Greer of Greenville . . . They are the parents of two daughters, Cheryl 16, Cecelia 12, two sons, Johnny 9 and Timothy, 9 months.

**DON WADE**, Clemson '52, returned to Clemson after one year of coaching at Waynesboro, Ga. . . . Was first string linebacker on Orange and Gator Bowl teams . . . In addition to coaching the freshman line, Wade does a lot of talent scouting for Clemson . . . A native of Lenoir City, Tenn., he's married to the former Barbara Henderson of Clemson . . . They are the parents of a daughter, Donna, 3.

Citadel . . . One of the state of Virginia's great natural athletes in history, Rock is still active today . . . He runs a boys camp in the summer . . . Cross country and head track coach, he was varsity basketball coach before McFadden took over . . . He's married to the former Dorothy Russell . . . They are the parents of two sons, Willis and Joe.

### **FACULTY CHAIRMAN**

**R. R. (RED) RITCHIE**, Iowa State '26, like Frank Howard, came to Clemson upon graduation from college and has been here ever since . . . Teaches in the Animal Husbandry Department . . . Received his Master's degree from Iowa State in 1938 . . . Has been a booster of Clemson's athletic program from the beginning . . . Took over job as faculty chairman from the retiring Dr. Lee Milford the first of this year . . . A native Iowan, he is married to the former Mary Leighton Mills.

### **EXECUTIVE SECRETARY**

**GENE WILLIMON**, Clemson '33, came to Clemson as director of the IPTAY (I Pay Ten A Year) athletic booster club in 1950. He's become general business manager of the Athletic Association since . . . An outstanding Clemson halfback in the early 1930's, Willimon was in the insurance business before returning to his alma mater . . . A native of Greenville, he married the former Lou McClure of Anderson . . . They are the parents of a son, Rusty 15, and a daughter, "Weezie" 11.

### **PUBLICITY DIRECTOR**

**BRENT BREEDIN**, Washington and Lee '47, took over the Clemson sports publicity job during the 1952 football season . . . A former reporter in Corpus Christi, Texas, and sports editor of the Anderson Daily Mail, Breedin has served on the executive committee of the Southern Sportswriters Association and is presently a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference Public Relations Committee . . . Columbia is his home.

### **OFFICE ASSISTANT**

**EARLE MARTIN**, an alumnus of Clemson, has been working for the Athletic Department at many jobs for the past seven years . . . Known to virtually everyone as "Pear Baby" or "Pepper", he's in his second year as manager of the ticket office. Still manages to supervise book and supply room for athletes on scholarship and assists the athletic staff in numerous ways . . . Greenwood is his home.

### **TRAINER**

**HERMAN McGEE**, began gaining experience as a small colored boy many years ago under the watchful eyes of the late "Chappie" . . . Has been in charge of training room since the 1949 season.

LE—**WALT LARAWAY** — Senior 6-0 — 180 — 22 — McKeesport, Pa. . . . A regular last fall; a number one reserve behind All-A.C.C. Dreher Gaskin and Scott Jackson the year before . . . Best pass-receiving end and strong on defense . . . Scored via blocked punt, pass interception and reception of pass last fall.

LT—**DICK MARAZZA** — Junior — 6-4 — 215 — 22 — Greensburg, Pa. . . . A "B" Unit regular last fall, he was the lineman sensation of spring drills with his downfield blocking . . . Always tough on defense, he may well be Clemson's strongest candidate for the Jacobs Blocking Trophy this year.

LG—**JOHN GRDIJAN** — Sophomore — 5-11 — 205 — 25 — Rillton, Pa. . . . The only first year man on the starting eleven, he was last fall's strongest freshman candidate. . . . Strong and quick, he loves the game . . . His experience includes two years of fast service ball.

C—**WINGO AVERY** — Senior — 6-0 — 210 — 22 — Newnan, Ga. . . . Overcame three-year injury jinx to live up to great expectations of coaches as regular last fall . . . Called defensive signals for tough Tiger defense . . . Strong and aggressive, he's regarded "a coach on the field" in analysing the opposition's plays.

RG—**DICK DESIMONE** — Junior — 5-11 — 195 — 21 — Avonmore, Pa. . . . Was only sophomore to start every game last fall . . . Considered most consistent of Tiger linemen . . . Is exceptional linebacker . . . Underwent knee operation to have cartilage removed in early July but should be ready by Virginia game.

RT—**B. C. INABINET** — Senior — 6-6 — 245 — 21 — Columbia . . . Giant of squad, he's played some great ball as a second stringer for two years . . . Was an All-American in playing almost without substitution against Wake Forest's Bob Bartholomew last fall . . . Has tremendous strength . . . Excellent blocker in line.

RE—**WILLIE SMITH** — Junior — 6-0 — 190 — 20 — Spartanburg . . . Was regular on "B" unit last fall . . . Tackled South Carolina back for safety on "Big Thursday" . . . Ran 100-yard dash in 10.4 for track team in spring.

QB—**DON KING** — Senior — 5-10 — 170 — 21 — Anderson . . . Early season injuries last fall prevented his equaling great sophomore record of 1953 . . . Hopes to have best year as senior . . . Has led Tigers in total offense for three straight years . . . Is an exceptional performer in every phase of the game . . . Was "Swede" Nelson Sportsmanship Award recipient in '53.

LH—**JOEL WELLS** — Junior — 6-0 — 195 — 20 — Columbia . . . Played first string ball in final seven games as sophomore . . . Got better as season progressed and was the flashiest performer in spring drills . . . Is rough runner and tackler and can also pass well and play pass defense.

RH—**JIM COLEMAN** — Junior — 6-0 — 170 — 20 — Honea Path . . . Has "beaten out" for time being regular Joe Pagliei . . . Very fast, he's also the slipperiest runner and best pass-receiver on squad . . . Led team in scoring last fall with five TD's and one extra point.

FB—**BILL O'DELL** — Senior — 5-10 — 195 — 21 — Newnan, Ga. . . . Has been runner-up as Clemson's top running back for two straight years . . . Was number one ground-gainer of game against both Maryland and Auburn last fall . . . Is expected to have greatest season as senior.

LE—**PETE WALL** — Senior — 6-1 — 200 — 22 — Charleston . . . Injuries kept him sidelined most of last fall . . . He was a second stringer in '53, lettering as such . . . Not real fast, he's shifty and a fine pass receiver . . . Strong on defense . . . He'll be graduated in February.

LT—**HAMPTON HUNTER** — Senior — 6-4 — 220 — 21 — Central . . . Is a two-letterman at center, having played on both the first and second teams at that spot during the past two years . . . May return there, but right now coaches consider him better as tackle prospect . . . Excellent competitor.

LG—**EARL GREENE** — Senior — 6-0 — 200 — 21 — St. Stephens . . . Handicapped by poor vision, he'll take a new lease on life with contact lenses this fall . . . is rated highest by teammates who have scrimmaged against him . . . Says rugged Joel Wells, "I'd rather have anybody tackle me than Earl." . . . He's anxious to see a lot of action after serving as "bohunk" and scrub in 1953 and 1954.

C—**DONNIE BUNTON** — Sophomore — 6-0 — 190 — 20 — Pelzer . . . Played with first eleven all spring while Avery nursed injured back . . . Considered a fine prospect after "bohunking" last fall . . . Has also worked at guard and end.

# About the College . . .

## CLEMSON ESTABLISHED

On November 27, 1889, the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina drew up an Act of Acceptance of the will of Thomas Green Clemson authorizing the establishment of Clemson as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of this state. Clemson was a distinguished scientist of his day and served as the nation's first superintendent (now secretary) of Agriculture. He married the daughter of John C. Calhoun, the noted Southern statesman

## LOCATION AND SIZE

Located on the former plantation of Calhoun and Clemson in the northwestern corner of South Carolina, thirty miles from the foothills of the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains, the college has grown from an institution with 446 students when it opened its doors in 1893 to the present day enrollment of 2,700. The campus proper embraces 1646 acres.

## THE PRESIDENT

Dr. Robert Franklin Poole became president of Clemson in 1940, succeeding the late Dr. Enoch Sikes. Born in Laurens County, S. C., December 2, 1893, Dr. Poole was graduated from Clemson in 1918. He received his Ph.D. degree from Rutgers in 1921. He spent 17 months in France and Germany with the Aerial Photography Service during World War I. He was assistant plant pathologist at the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station from 1920 through 1926. Dr. Poole went to North Carolina State College in 1926 and remained there until he accepted the Clemson presidency in 1940. He is a past president of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges and Universities, the Association of Southern Agricultural Workers and the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary schools.

## PHYSICAL PLANT

Clemson's physical property has grown from a value of \$250,000 in 1893 to \$18,000,000 today. There has been a great expansion since World War II. Construction added in this time includes a new agricultural engineering building, chemistry building, boiler plant, apartment hotel and faculty homes, ceramics building and laundry. A new \$4 million dormitory was occupied last fall, and a \$4 million agricultural center was completed in August.

## EDUCATIONAL DIVISIONS

The College's main divisions include the Schools of Agriculture, Engineering, Arts and Sciences, Education, and Textiles. Graduate work can be obtained in most of the schools. Thirty curriculums are offered in the five schools.



# Basketball in 1955-56 . . .

Clemson's 1955-56 varsity basketballers promise to vacate the cellar position their predecessors of the two past years have occupied in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Coach Banks McFadden will again rely on high scoring Bill Yarborough to pace his scorers, but newcomers to the varsity include high-scoring Vinnie Yockel and Carl Reamer off last winter's strong freshman team, six-six junior college center Gene Seay of North Greenville, six-six forward Ed Brinkley (ineligible last year) and transfer guard Tom Cameron, who scores points about like Yarborough.

Of course, all of last year's varsity except Barry Ryan are still on hand, including rugged six-four forwards "Rock" Stone and Tommy Smith, guard Bruce Holzschuh and center Billy Riser. They played inspirational ball at times and looked great in the spring intrasquad contest.

Other sophomores who should help the varsity are six-four forward Ed Moncrief, six-five center Billy Williams and fancy dribbling guard Dick Yeary.

Clemson plays its most difficult schedule in history—26 regular season games, including participation in the Charlotte (N. C.), Gator Bowl and Senior Bowl Tournaments.

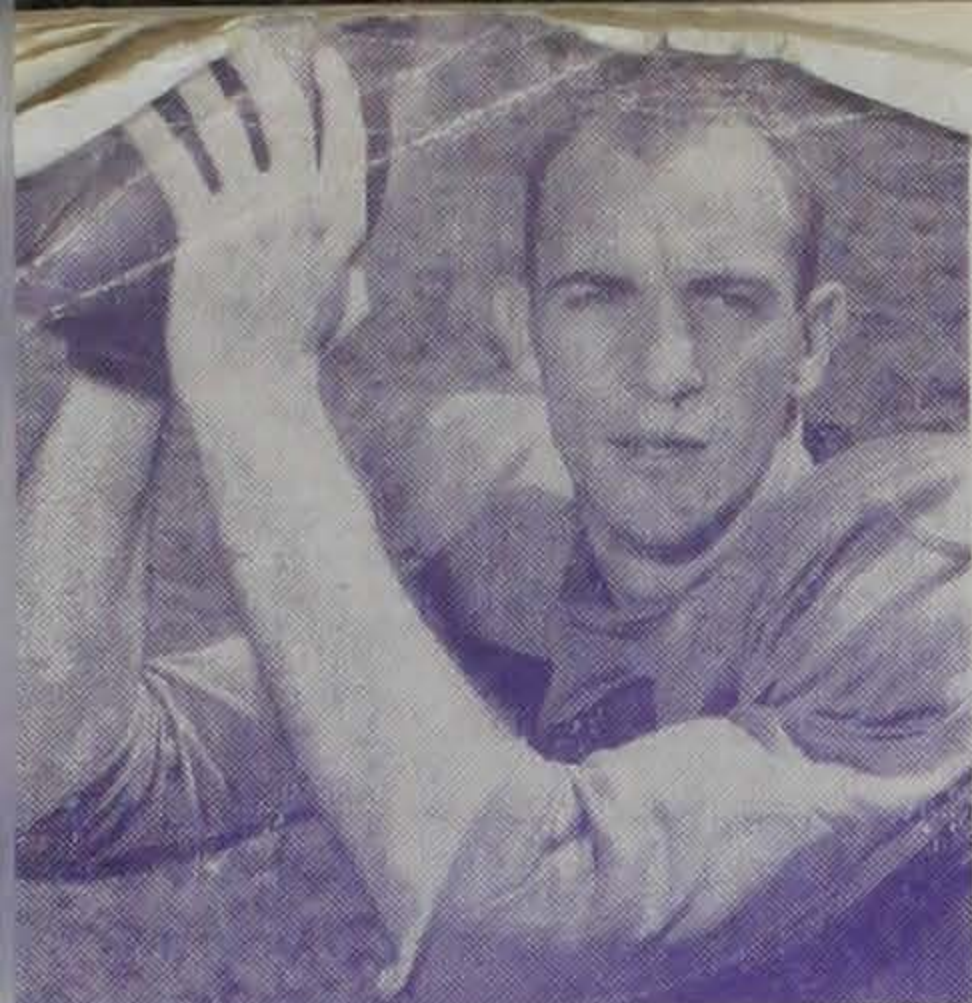
