NO MISSING ISSUES AT NASIG SERIALS MANAGEMENT WORKSHOP IN SAN JOSE/

N. Bernard "Buzzy" Basch, Workshop Chairman

The third NASIG workshop on serials management was conducted in San Jose, California on 2 March, 1990. Co-sponsored by the San Jose State University School of Library and Information Science, the workshop was attended by nearly fifty librarians and students. Associate Director Bill Fisher coordinated the meeting and the School provided publicity, meeting space, and refreshments.

The workshop was conducted by Vicky Reich, Chief of the Serials Department and Miriam Palm, Assistant Chief of the Serials Department, Stanford University; John Tagler, Director, Corporate Communications, Elsevier Science Publishers; and Buzzy Basch, Basch McQueen Associates. The audience responded enthusiastically to the presentations. Miriam focused on the characteristics of serials, the importance of serials in library operations, and approaches to serials management. Vicky addressed library needs and trends, the role of serials in the scholarly communications process, increases in serials prices, and the interdependence among the players. John discussed the different approaches of various types of serial publishers, the refereeing of journals, and the financial aspects of journal publishing. Buzzy outlined the operations of serial subscription agencies, focusing on the services they can offer libraries and the ways in which libraries can negotiate service and pricing packages that best meet their needs.

There appears to be a demand for a repeat of the workshop in the San Francisco area as more people applied to attend than could be accommodated. NASIG is committed to mounting similar workshops in this and other locations. Library schools willing to co-sponsor the workshop should contact: N. TLA/NASIG SPONSORED BINDING WORKSHOP/Bonnie Postlethwaite

On April 3, 1990, NASIG co-sponsored with the Texas Library Association Acquisitions & Collection Development Roundtable a half-day workshop entitled "Constructing Simple Binding Repairs." This was a pre-conference workshop to the annual TLA conference. Designed for support staff, attendees participated in hands-on activities and listened to multi-media presentations on the topic of repairs.

Presentations were made by Suzanne Gyeszly, Preservation/Conservation Librarian, and Jo Ann Williams, Binding Department Supervisor, both from Texas A & M University. In addition to the sponsorship of NASIG and TLA, the program was supported by the Library Binding Company in Waco, Texas who provided refreshments and the Heckman Binding Company in North Manchester, Indiana who provided supplies for the hands-on instruction.

This workshop represents the first program put together by the NASIG Continuing Education Committee's Subcommittee on Programming for Support Staff. This subcommittee is chaired by Marifran Bustion, Texas A & M University, who coordinated this program. The next issue of the NASIG Newsletter will include a report on the success of this workshop. Marifran is to be commended for the hard work she has done to put this program together.

NISO + BISAC + SISAC + Z39 + X12 + CHAOS/NISO Press Release**An [ALA] Preconference on Standards for the Acquisition of Library Materials**

Libraries, publishers, system vendors, and book vendors are developing and implementing integrated automated systems. Enhancements to these systems are likely to include applications for the electronic transmission of acquisitions information. Standard formats for electronic data interchange are critical. A number of standards already exist. New standards are being discussed and developed.

On Friday, June 22, 1990, the National Information Standards Organization (NISO) and the Book Industry Study Group, Inc. (BISG) are presenting a one day seminar on the topic of standards for the acquisition of library materials. At this program, industry experts will provide you with an in-depth look at each of the standards in use today, as well as addressing future standards development and implementation.

Topics will include: MARC, BISAC, SISAC, X12, EDI (Electronic Data Interchange), OSI (Open Systems Interconnection), and bar coding technology.

This seminar is intended for anyone involved in the acquisition of library materials or the technical development of automated systems, including: acquisitions and technical service librarians, publishers, system vendors, book vendors, and subscription agents.

USBE: ALIVE AND WELL IN CLEVELAND, OHIO/USBE Press Release

The new management and owners of the Universal Serials and Book Exchange are pleased to announce that USBE is again in operation, ready to meet the back issues needs of all libraries. During the first year of revived operations at the new location in Cleveland, USBE will waive membership fees to all libraries using its services. Membership fees will be re-instated in January, 1991.

Membership in USBE is open only to institutional, public and corporate libraries and will enable libraries to purchase any serials held by USBE for the low flat rate of \$7.00 per bibliographic issue, plus shipping charges. With holdings of more than five million back issues in all scholarly subjects and representative popular magazines and trade journals in stock, USBE is the logical first source for back issues. The low service fee of \$7.00 per issue applies to all back issues, whether current or older.

Each member library will be entitled to one vote in USBE's annual election of advisory board members. Members will elect five advisors to consult with USBE's management on matters of importance to the membership community. Five librarians will be elected annually to the advisory board; the first election is anticipated for spring, 1991.

USBE is currently preparing a booklet detailing services and policies; it will be sent to all libraries in the U.S. and Canada and to selected libraries elsewhere in the next few weeks.

Libraries using USBE's services are encouraged to send their duplicates and surplus to USBE. Such contributions will enable USBE to update stock continually and maintain a high success rate in supplying issues. USBE needs scholarly periodicals dated 1988 to present, especially in the fields of art, mathematics, economics and business, allied health sciences, physics, chemistry and biology.

REPORT FROM A FULBRIGHT TRAVEL FELLOWSHIP RECIPIENT/Sharon Bonk, SUNY Albany

I was fortunate to be awarded a Fulbright Travel Fellowship which enabled me to work at the British Library Document Supply Centre. The terms of the Fulbright called for me to arrange the affiliation with a cooperating library before applying for the award, so at the point of initial contact with prospective libraries I was not yet a "Fulbright Scholar."

There were no pre-existing programs with the libraries so that organizing this was very similar to organizing the first stage of an independent exchange: identifying potential host libraries. This is perhaps the most difficult part because you must locate an institution in which your skills or special interests are considered appropriate or to which you would bring special skills.

In essence, this calls for a careful review of the current British library literature, and any directories which may be appropriate in order to see what is going on in British libraries. Having a professional contact in Britain would be extremely useful in assisting in indentifying potential exchange partners or institutions. I would expect that a "cold call" without any preliminary information or contacts through librarians would be rather unrewarding.

In my case, I wrote preliminary letters to chief librarians at two institutions where I had determined I would be interested in working and which were of sufficient size to absorb a foreigner. I had met both of these librarians in a professional context several years before. In my case, it was not an exchange, and I was prepared to be self supporting. Therefore, I used the approach of suggesting that I assist them on some special project in an area of mutual interest. I also sent a current vitae that I hoped documented my credibility as an applicant for a position within their staff. Since there was a time restraint, I followed up each letter with a telephone call. The conversations determined that each director was interested, although one more than the other.

Several letters and telexes refined the ideas. My preferred (in a geographic sense) academic institution was not keen to have me at the time that best suited my plans. Therefore, I happily agreed to a placement with the British Library Document Supply Centre, which gave me a totally different and broader perspective on all types of libraries in Britain.

From my contacts with professional staff in Britain, I know that there are many colleagues who would like to participate in a job exchange, but also are stymied as to how to proceed. I think that a package deal of swapping homes, cars, etc. would be most favorably received because it also allows for people with families to consider an exchange and therefore increases the number of possibilities. I expect that placing an ad in the "personals" of one of the British library journals, or writing a letter to the editor, about wanting to receive names of people interested in job exchanges, also might be an avenue to explore.

1991-92 FULBRIGHT PROGRAM WITH THE UNITED KINGDOM: PROFESSIONAL LIBRARIAN AWARD/Press release from the Council for International Exchange of Scholars

The Fulbright Commission in London has announced the availability of an award for a practicing librarian to pursue professional work in the United Kingdom at a degree-awarding institution or major research library. The competitive award is being made available under the Fulbright Scholar Program to provide an opportunity for librarians to broaden their professional perspective and enhance cross-cultural skills and insights. The purpose of the award is to promote the exchange of ideas between library staff in the U.S. and the U.K. and to enable participants to acquire knowledge and experience of library work in a different setting.

Applications will be accepted from individuals working as librarians, library administrators, or archivists at four-year colleges and universities or major research libraries outside of higher education. Proposals from library science educators are not appropriate to this award, which is designed for full-time practitioners.

Applicants must hold U.S. citizenship and a full-time library post at a university or major research library. A minimum of five years continuous professional experience is also required. A Master of Library Science degree is

expected, though extensive professional service may in some cases be substituted for the degree. The program is designed for mid-career professionals who hold positions appropriate to implementing new ideas and insights gained from the exchange experience.

Each applicant is responsible for arranging a work affiliation with a university library, major research library, or national library in the United Kingdom. A list of British institutions which are eligible for participation in the award is available through CIES. A letter of invitation must be submitted with the application.

Projects may be single purpose or comparative in scope; they may be investigative or operational in focus. Professional work attachments should involve some consideration of relevant issues of a larger magnitude than basic employment abroad. Proposals which have a pragmatic bearing on issues of common concern to librarians in the U.S. and U.K. are particularly welcome.

Awards are for a minimum duration of three months and candidates are expected to be on paid leave of absence from their home institution as a condition of the grant. The grantee will receive a fixed grant of approximately 2,500 British pounds, paid in pounds sterling, to cover travel and other expenses.

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

[This letter is in response to a query in the February 1990 issue of the Newsletter: "Why are we receiving so many errata for mistakes made in journal articles? ... I'm interested in knowing how other libraries handle errata, whether or not anyone else has noticed an increase in their numbers, and if any publishers can explain why they appear so frequently and if they have any policies about standardizing their publication." - ed.]

In response to the question in the February 1990 NASIG Newsletter, enclosed is a copy of an article compiled almost 20 years ago by Joyce Loepprich. This gives Joyce's survey results at that time, and also the results of her work inserting errata into the original articles.

I'm also including our present practice, backed up by the present National Library of Medicine errata and retraction policy. We are now stamping the actual articles based on recurring searches of the MEDLINE database under the Retraction of Publication.

Sorry I can't provide any insight into the number of errata slips running around.
