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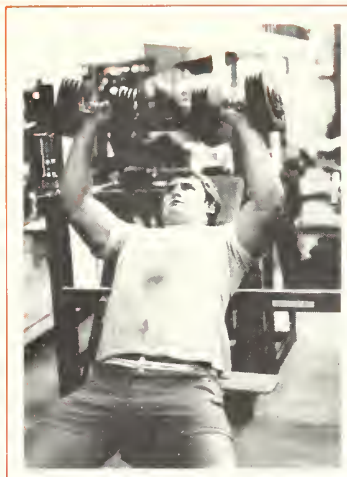
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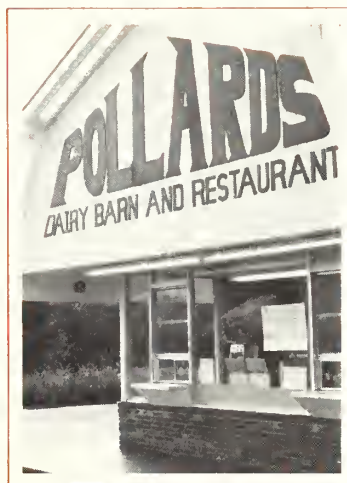
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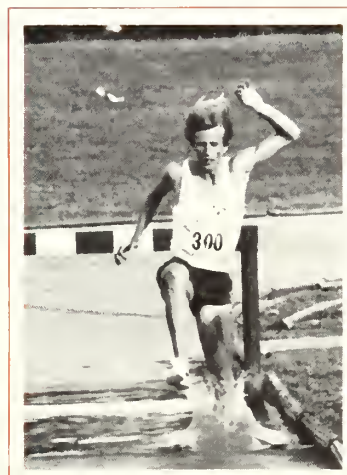

Today's Game

"We are not going over there just to get the check," said Wofford Head Coach Buddy Sasser at a press conference this past summer when it was announced that his Terriers would meet the Tigers on September 5. "This is a good opportunity to bring visibility to our program and we are going to make the most of it. Our players were very positive when we told them about playing at Clemson and they have prepared for this game all summer."

"Many of our athletes played with guys who play at Clemson in all-star games or against them in high school. They've all grown up hearing about Clemson so there is a natural rivalry. This is a chance to play against a class program."

Sasser is rapidly developing a first-class program of his own. The Terriers were 7-2-2 last year and return almost everyone off that successful squad.

With such a deep team, it is difficult to cite Wofford's comparative strengths and weaknesses, but one thing is certain, the Terriers will have an outstanding rushing attack. Sasser's club uses the "Wingbone" offense, an innovative attack that is a cross between a wishbone and a wing-T.

The Terriers began to use elements of the new offense last year in their "upset" tie of Southern Conference Champion Furman, quite an accomplishment considering the Paladins' only loss of 1980 came against ACC Champ North Carolina.

"We have not abandoned the wishbone," said Sasser. "We use another alignment within the same offense in which we can get another receiver outside quicker. We can still run a lot, but this formation allows us some more flexibility with the passing attack."

The wingbone requires outstanding leadership in the backfield and the Terriers have two standout players who can fill the bill. Lenny Best, an NAIA honorable mention All-American the last two seasons, has paced the squad in rushing. With 2,017 career yards to his credit, he is already the fifth-leading career rusher at Wofford.

Wade Lang, who should move into

the celebrated wingback slot, is the other veteran in the backfield. A starter at halfback in four games last year, Lang is a constant threat on the option pass as he has completed nine of 16 passes for three touchdowns over the last two seasons. One of the TD aeriels allowed Wofford to tie Furman last season. Lang is also Sasser's top kickoff returner. He ran 95 yards for a TD against Gardner-Webb last season.

Sprint-out quarterback Charlie Bradshaw is the favorite for the signal calling job this year. The former high school teammate of Lee Nanney, Clemson's All-ACC tackle, started nine games last season and has rushed for 597 yards in the last two years. Wofford passed only 15.5 percent of the time last year, but a pair of talented receivers might change that. Senior Mike Taylor was the top pass-catcher last season with 14 receptions from his split end position. Dirk Derrick, a sturdy tight end, who was an NAIA All-District choice last year, also will be a player to watch.

All five 1980 starters from the offensive line return this season. Guard James Meadors and center Kenny Leonhardt are the top performers as they were both named to the NAIA All-District team in 1980. Guard Jimmy Fowler, and tackles Mitch Stovall and James Brewton are the other returnees on Sasser's fifth Wofford team.

"We are two-deep at every position on defense for the first time since I've been at Wofford," says

Sasser. This is quite a statement, but Sasser may be right as 10 starters return with seven other let-termen backing them up.

Pass defense was a strong suit of the Wofford squad in 1980 and that should be a forte once again. The Terriers picked off 26 enemy passes last year, by far the school record total.

Tony Painter, an NAIA honorable mention All-American at one corner, and free safety Curtis Patterson, are the top returnees in the highly regarded secondary. Both intercepted a school-record tying six passes last season. Phifer Nicholson and Tim Renfrow also return in the backfield.

Johnny Kornegay, a starter at defensive end last year, was an honorable mention All-American. He has been moved to linebacker this season and should be the leader of the second line of defense. Kirk Breland, a third NAIA honorable mention All-American, is expected to be the top down lineman.

While Wofford looks at this contest as a landmark game in its football history, Clemson certainly views the contest with importance as Danny Ford's team attempts to build momentum in the 1981 season. Early season games set a trend for the rest of the year. Oh, if there had been just one more completed pass at Georgia!

No team in the ACC returns more lettermen or starters than Clemson, and this is one reason Tiger fans are optimistic about the coming season. For the first time since Ford arrived

in Tigertown, Clemson does not have to depend on freshmen and sophomores for its life blood. With 51 lettermen returning from a team that concluded the season with a resounding win over nationally-ranked South Carolina, Clemson fans have been counting the days until the 1981 opener.

"Offensively, we are very deep," said Ford, who is 15-9 in his short era at Clemson. "It is not very often that a team gets its entire first two strings back on offense. We should be much better than last year because we have worked together as a unit. For the first time since I've been here we are starting the season with a veteran quarterback (Homer Jordan) and that makes a big difference."

Homer Jordan set a record for total offense by a sophomore in 1980 when he started at the signal calling position in every game. He was especially proficient in the last four games of the season when he completed 56.2 percent of his passes for 585 yards. And the competition was stiff, as three of those teams went on to bowl games.

No receiving corps is deeper than Clemson's and that is another reason most football experts expect Jordan to have a fine year. Perry Tuttle might be the best receiver in college football. The senior from Winston-Salem, NC, was a first-team All-American in **Street & Smith's** preseason poll. "P.T." needs only two receptions to reach the 100-mark in his career, a milestone he should attain in the first half if he continues his normal pattern. He is the third-ranked returning receiver in the NCAA this year and needs only 41 receptions and 909 yards to break Jerry Butler's career standards in those categories.

Jerry Gaillard is the Dwight Clark of the 1981 team. Clark, now one of the top receivers in the NFL, had a solid career at Tigertown between 1975-1978. The present San Francisco 49er watched Butler collect the accolades, and Gaillard has had to watch Tuttle become king of the ball most of his career. But, somehow Gaillard has snuck into the top 10 among Clemson's all-time leading receivers and many pro scouts will be watching his senior season

closely.

A pair of Macs figure to be Clemson's leading rushers in 1981. They are Macs in that they are as big as Mac Trucks, and their names are McCall and McSwain. Jeff McCall suffered through an injury-riddled season at fullback last year, while Chuck McSwain was the club's top rusher as a tailback in 1981.

Lee Nanney is Clemson's all-conference offensive tackle. One of the top linemen in the South, the Spartanburg native was twice named the ACC's Lineman-of-the-Week in 1980. Tony Berryhill is another returning starter who has a good chance to be an all-conference choice at center this year.

The Tigers lost five defensive starters off last year's team, but capable replacements are ready in the wings.

Jeff Davis, the leader of the Clemson D., "is like E. F. Hutton," said Ford. "When he talks, people listen." The senior from Greensboro led the ACC in tackles last season and is a preseason second-team All-American in 1981 according to **Street & Smith** magazine. He had 160 stops last year and should finish his career with over 500 tackles.

Jeff Bryant, Dan Benish, Bill Smith, William Devane and James

Robinson are a quintet of down linemen who should be effective this season. Bryant and Smith are seniors who are wise to the ways of any offense, while Benish and Robinson are a pair of juniors who have been solid contributors since their freshman seasons. Devane came on strong in spring drills and was rated the top middle guard after spring drills.

Danny Triplett should join Davis at linebacker. The prototype defender, Triplett can run through brick walls. He served as the number-three linebacker behind Davis and Chuck Rose last year.

Clemson's secondary is also very deep. Ten lettermen return in all, including Terry Kinard, a red-shirted junior in his fourth year at Clemson. Kinard was third on the team in tackles last year, even though he missed two and a half games with a broken arm. Hollis Hall and Anthony Rose are two more returnees who've seen time at the corners.

With 18 returning starters most expect the Tigers to have little problems with the Terriers. But motivation and momentum can play havoc with the predictions of college athletic events. Clemson will need more than a checkbook this afternoon.

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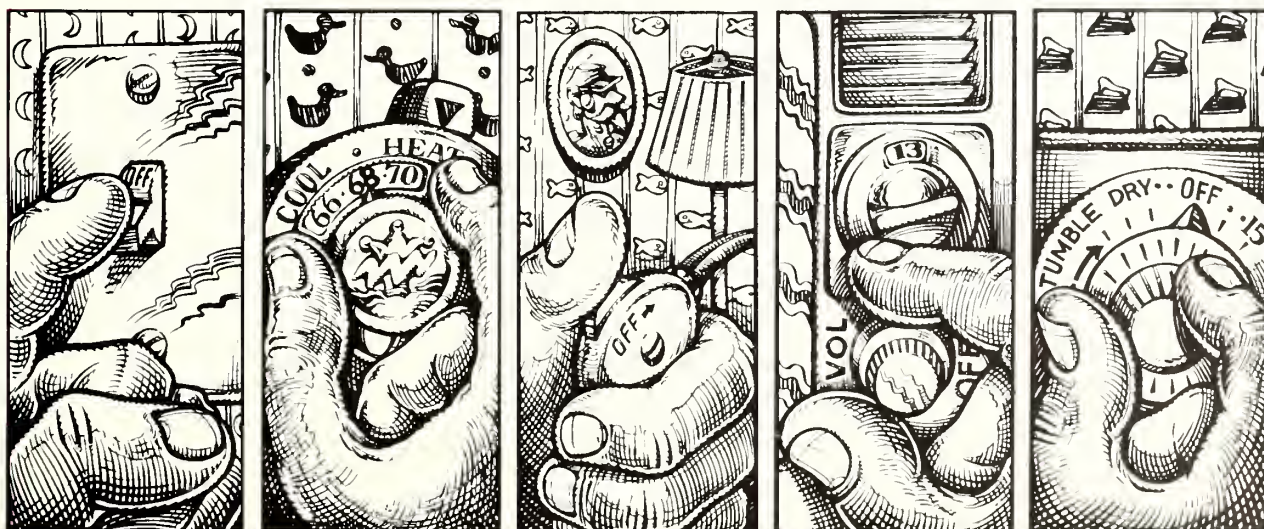
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Lee Nanney

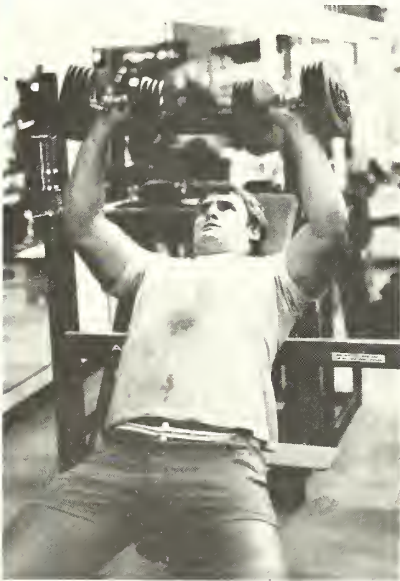
At 6-4 and 260 pounds of muscle, offensive tackle Lee Nanney intimidates defensive linemen, towers over opponents and has been described by foes as "an intense, aggressive player."

But to teammates, Lee Nanney is described as "the quiet team leader." "mild-mannered" and one even went so far as to call him "shy." A teammate and close friend is offensive tackle Brad Fisher. Fisher calls Nanney, "One of the most respected players on the team. . . he is well-liked and one of the best linemen I've ever come in contact with."

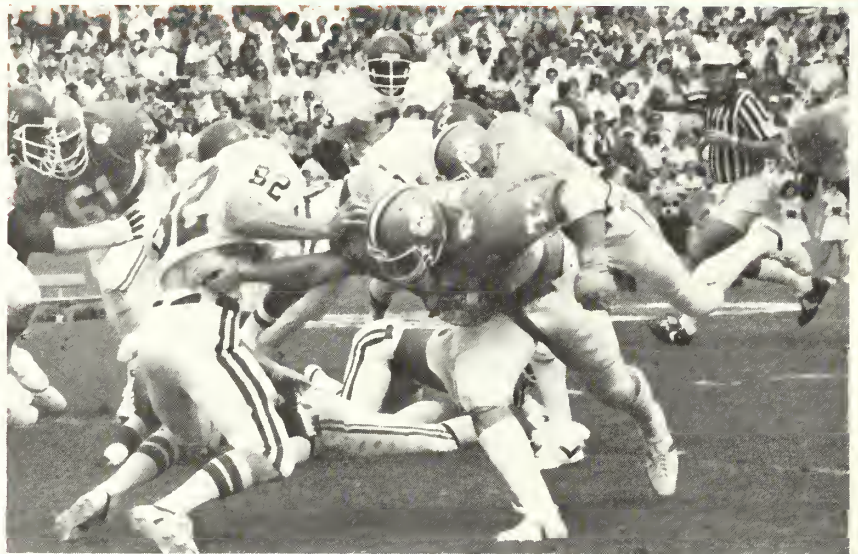
His coaches echo the praise calling him the "Most flexible player on the team." Buddy King, offensive line coach, says this, "When Lee leaves, he will be remembered not only for being a great player, but a great leader as well. He is the kind of young man that you like to coach and be associated with because he is dedicated and likes what he does."

Nanney gets a boyish-grin when he is called a team leader. "I don't just like to tell everybody something and not prove it myself," he explains, "I guess I just try to lead by example." And Nanney sets the example with hard work. He is known as one of, if not the, hardest workers on the team, an asset that is documented by the statements of Strength Training Director George Dostal.

"Lee is a super young man, he hasn't let success get to his head," says Dostal. "He is a special and rare individual. He never misses a workout, never complains

and always does more than he has to. What can I say about Lee Nanney?" continued Dostal, "I have two sons and if they turn out like him, I'll be real happy."

Nanney shares the mutual admiration. "Coach Dostal has really inspired me. He has helped to push me towards the goals I wanted to accomplish. He does that with a lot of the guys. He has always been there for all of us."

The goals mentioned have much to do with Clemson's weight program, which Dostal heads. Nanney credits it and Dostal with his steady improvement over the last four years. "I always put a lot of emphasis on the weights and Coach Dostal has helped me to enjoy it as well."

He currently holds the school record in weightlifting and has been called, "Clemson's strongest athlete ever" by strength training officials. He bench-pressed 525 pounds last month beating his own record.

Outside Nanney's weight program, his on-field reputation is well-earned. In 1980, he was a member of the All-Atlantic Coast Conference team, as well as being tabbed the league's Lineman-of-the-Week twice.

He graded out the highest of any Clemson linemen in 10 of 11 games during last season. In three games, he graded out at over 70% including Wake Forest (75%), North Carolina State (71%) and South Carolina (71%), quite an accomplishment in the coach's difficult marking system. He graded out at 69% against the eventual National Champion Georgia, a mark that earned him ACC Lineman-of-the-Week honors.

Considered one of the premier offensive linemen in the South, Nanney has

worked hard to anchor a line that churned out 3,675 yards in total offense in 1981. He was one of the major reasons Homer Jordan was third in the conference in total offense and passing efficiency, and Perry Tuttle led the league in receiving with 915 yards on 53 catches. Thus far in the preseason, Nanney has been named honorable mention All-American by *Street and Smith's* and *Pigskin Preview*. He was also named to the All-ACC team by Southern Football, and the ACC coach's.

Although Nanney enjoys these accolades, working on the offensive line has never been a glory job. Few people recognize the important job the offensive line does. But Nanney is characterized by his teammates as a team player, and is depicted by Coach Ford as "an unselfish player who is a believer in the team concept."

This form of motivation took him from his spot as a defensive lineman his freshman year to the offensive line after the third game of the 1978 season. The change, said his coaches, was for the good of the team, but he became a second-team player almost immediately. By the beginning of 1979 he was a starter, and he's been a mainstay ever since.

When asked about pro football, he smiles, "I think coming through Clemson has given me a better chance at pro ball. After all the players Clemson has sent to the pros, I think they tend to look here a little more," he says sheepishly, "but right now all I want to do is improve and play the best I can. I know that with hard work, everything else will fall into place."

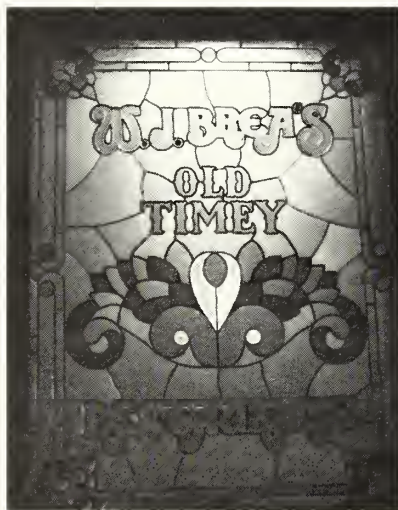
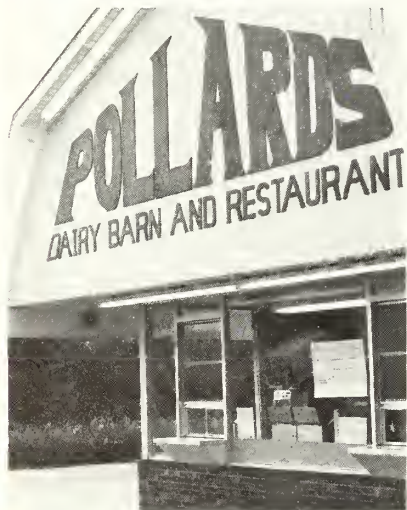

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Danny Ford

Danny Ford is the youngest third-year coach in Division I of the NCAA, but the 33-year-old Gadsden, Alabama native has been associated with more winning teams and programs than many coaches come in contact with in a lifetime. Including his years as a player at Alabama under Bear Bryant, Ford has been associated with college football for the last 14 years. Thirteen of those clubs have had winning records and 10 have gone to bowl games. Additionally, the 14 teams have had a record of 111-47-3, a .700 winning percentage.

Ford has brought this winning attitude to Clemson University. Now in his third full season as head coach, Ford has led the Tigers to a 15-9 record and a pair of bowl games since taking over on December 10, 1978. That was a fine day in Clemson athletics because the University announced Charley Pell had relinquished the head coaching duties of the 1978 Gator Bowl to Ford. Nearly 40 years after hiring 31-year-old Frank Howard, Clemson had hired another gifted 31-year-old to lead the Tiger forces on the gridiron.

Ford conquered all kinds of adversity in leading the Tigers to a nationally televised 17-15 triumph over the perennial power Ohio State in the Gator Bowl in his very first game as head coach. Few mentors in NCAA history have made such a celebrated and successful beginning.

But Ford did not rest on his laurels after that landmark win over the Buckeyes. In the last two years the Tigers have won 14 games, (including wins over nationally ranked teams from Georgia, Notre Dame and South Carolina) gone to a bowl game, nearly upset the National Champion and set countless Clemson records.

With this list of accomplishments it is little wonder that the Student Affairs Committee of the Clemson Board of Trustees only considered one name as Pell's successor. Danny Ford not only had the backing of Pell, but also from the members of the Clemson football team. He was then Assistant Head Coach and offensive line coach of the Tigers.

After two meetings between Ford and the committee on the morning of December 5, 1978, it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that Ford should be named Clemson's 21st head coach.

Ford began his association with college football in 1967 when he started for Bear Bryant at Alabama as Ken Stabler's sophomore tight end. He played three years for Bryant, (including three wins against the Tigers) and was an All-Southeastern Conference choice, All-SEC academic selection and team captain during his senior season.

After receiving his B.S. degree in industrial arts in 1970, Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. Upon earning a master's degree in special education in 1971, he was made a full-time assistant under Bryant for the 1972 and 1973

seasons. The Tide went to four more post-season games while Ford was on Bryant's staff.

Clemson's current head man then accepted a position as an assistant coach on Jimmy Sharpe's staff at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974 to 1976), before he was beckoned to Clemson by Charley Pell, who had just been named the Tiger's head coach. Pell and Ford had served together on the VPI staff for two seasons.

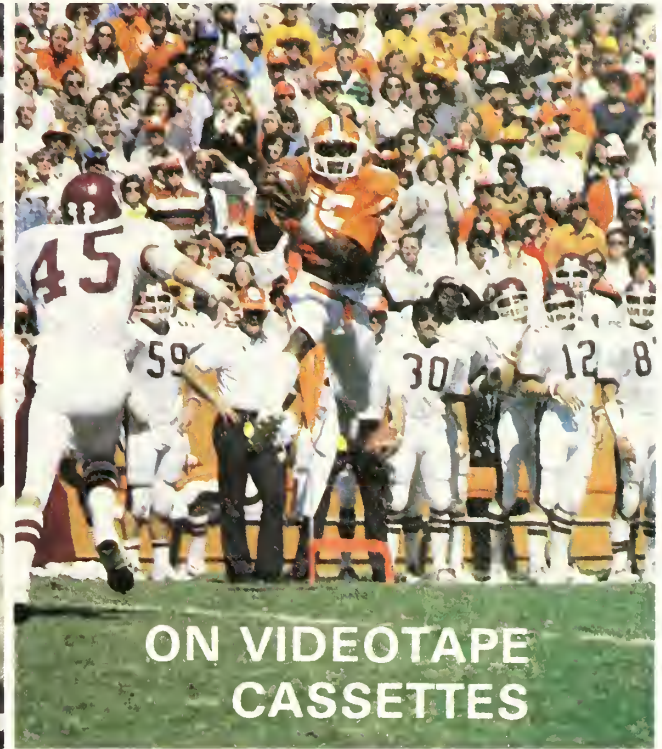
And only 23 games later, Ford became head coach of the Tigers at age 31, the youngest Division I head coach in the country. This season his Clemson team has 17 starters returning, including all 11 off an exciting offense. Based on his past track record, Clemson football should continue to reach previously unattainable heights.

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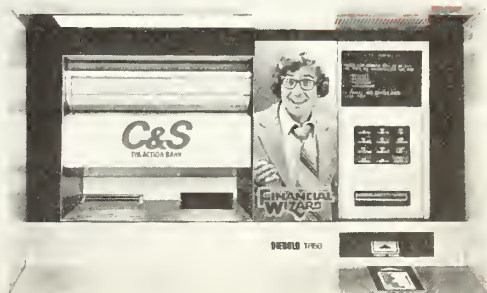

The 1980-81 academic year marked the fifth consecutive season that Clemson's all-around sports program had been ranked in the top 25 in the nation. Twice during that half a decade Clemson's sports program has been rated in the top five in the country in the Knoxville Journal's All-Sports Poll. Without a doubt, the work of Athletic Director Bill McLellan and his dedicated corps of coaches and administrators is the major reason for this consistent appearance in the national limelight.

McLellan is the man most responsible. He has endured countless hours to improve every phase of the athletic program in Tigertown. Under his direction Clemson has built one of the finest all-around athletic facilities in the nation. During his tenure the Tigers have christened the Frank Johnstone Jervey Athletic Center, possibly the most modern and complete complex under one roof, increased the permanent seating capacity of Clemson Memorial Stadium

from 43,451 to 53,306, opened a beautiful swimming facility, which will be the site of the ACC meet this year, constructed a nine-lane all-weather track, and built a new soccer facility.

While he has erected an athletic powerhouse on the varsity level, McLellan has also developed a solid intramural program for the student body which attracts thousands of participants every year. That's why Bill McLellan is recognized as a total athletic director.

Only the third man to own the title in the last 50 years, McLellan assumed his present position February 4, 1971 and since that date has directed Clemson to its greatest decade of athletic prominence. In the last five years Clemson had more All-Americans than in any other five-year period in Clemson history.

An examination of McLellan's experience in athletics explains why Clemson has been so successful under his direction. A native of Hamer, SC, the 49-year-old McLellan was a two-time football

letterman for the Tigers and a member of Clemson's 1952 Gator Bowl team. He received his B.S. degree from Clemson in 1954 and his M.S. two years later.

After joining the athletic staff in 1958 he spent more than a decade with the Tigers as an Assistant Football Coach, Assistant Business Manager, Assistant Athletic Director, and Associate Athletic Director, before his appointment to his current position.

But McLellan will be the first man to say that many knowledgeable people are needed to run an efficient and successful athletic department. Assistant Athletic Director Bobby Robinson is the catalyst of McLellan's group of responsible aides.

Assistant to the Athletic Director Earle Ambrose; Joe Turner, Executive Director of Clemson's very successful IPTAY Club; and Sports Promotion Director Allison Dalton are major reasons Clemson's athletic administration is among the best in the country.

Clemson's IPTAY Club

Number One. There's magic in those two words. Every team battles for the privilege to be called number one, to be recognized as the best. The road to the top is long and rocky and of those teams that become number one, few remain so for very long.

But, one Clemson team is defying the odds as it celebrates its third consecutive year as number one in the nation. IPTAY, Clemson's athletic scholarship fund-raising organization, experienced in fiscal year 1981 the most successful year of any collegiate athletic scholarship fund-raising group in history.

IPTAY enjoyed its 17th consecutive record-setting year in 1981, with total money raised cresting the three million dollar mark. Twenty-thousand members strong, IPTAY is accustomed to success, having raised almost 18 million dollars for Clemson in the last forty-seven years. What's the key to IPTAY's phenomenal success?

"Without a doubt, Clemson people have made IPTAY the best," says Joseph J. Turner, Jr., IPTAY's Executive Secretary. "Our IPTAY representatives are people from across the state and the Southeast who love Clemson University and who want to help Clemson in any way. These folks spend a lot of their time arranging meetings and visiting other Clemson supporters. They're the ones who keep IPTAY head and shoulders above the rest."

IPTAY officers like President John Timmerman, Vice President Bill Reaves and Secretary-Treasurer Lawrence Starkey, Jr., provide sound leadership for the organization.

"IPTAY's officers and board of directors provide the guidance and judgment necessary to administer a successful program. When you take 20 successful businessmen and put them in your boardroom, chances are good ideas will develop," says Turner.

Good ideas were the basis for IPTAY's creation forty-seven years ago. Dr. Rupert Fike and eight other Clemson men met in Fike's Atlanta home in August, 1934 and founded

the I-Pay-Ten-A-Year Club. Originally, IPTAY was a secret society, complete with mystic words and ritualistic ceremonies. Membership was by invitation only.

All that's changed now, but one thing that hasn't changed is IPTAY's purpose: to provide athletic scholarships for Clemson's student-athletes. In the 1980-81 academic year, IPTAY provided more than one million dollars in scholarships for 405 athletes in 19 varsity sports.

IPTAY's tremendous success has made it possible for the organization to aid the athletic department and the university in many ways. In 1978, IPTAY provided funds for new uniforms for the Tiger Band. The band has received \$130,000 from IPTAY in the last two years to supplement its travel budget. This year, the Tiger Band will attend all of Clemson's football games, home and away.

IPTAY has assisted the athletic department in financing capital improvements also. More than \$150,000 has been allocated by IPTAY to construct permanent seats at the Tigers' tennis courts and

baseball field. IPTAY also donated \$22,000 to light the new soccer stadium on Riggs Field.

More than \$300,000 was provided by IPTAY for improvements to Memorial Stadium last year. New stadium graphics, a modern sound system and two new scoreboards help make Death Valley one of the finest stadiums in the Southeast.

The needs of students are also recognized by IPTAY. The organization makes academic tutoring available to all student-athletes at no charge. IPTAY also has contributed a \$125,000 seed grant to begin planning for a Fine Arts Center to be used by all members of the university community. Forty thousand dollars has been contributed by IPTAY for partial funding of a master transportation plan for the University.

"Our commitment is to Clemson and Clemson students," says Turner. "IPTAY is doing several things to make Clemson athletics stronger and to benefit the university as a whole."

With 20,000 Clemson people dedicated to these twin goals, IPTAY can't help but stay number one.

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John Timmerman

"John Timmerman is a man who loves God, loves Clemson, and loves his wife — but not necessarily in that order. And he is smart enough not to tell his wife where she ranks." That is the way John Timmerman, the new President of IPTAY (Clemson's athletic fund-raising organization) was introduced at an area IPTAY meeting last spring. Few people can match him in the devotion he shows to all three.

Timmerman's devotion to his alma mater began early in life. "In 1927, my Daddy kicked a field goal to beat Auburn 3-0, and from the time I was old enough to know what a football was, I wanted to be an athlete at Clemson," the Columbia, SC, dentist said. "My parents were married the Wednesday before 'Big Thursday' (the Clemson-Carolina game used to be played on the Thursday of State Fair week) and I have only missed two 'Braggin' Bowl' games since I was nine years old, and that was because I was in dental school.

"I joined IPTAY before I got into school," Timmerman continued, "and I tried competing on the track team, but I found out I was just not a college-calibre athlete. So, I got involved with student government, and then the Alumni Association and IPTAY once I got out."

As a 22-year member of the number-one athletic fund-raising club in America (over \$3 million in 1980), the 41-year-old Timmerman has followed the normal progression of officers on the IPTAY board. He was an IPTAY representative and then District III (Aiken, Edgefield, Lexington, Newberry, Richland, and Saluda Counties) director in 1975-76. He became secretary under Reeves Gressette and was elected vice president under Charlie Bussey last July. Timmerman was vice president until January when Bussey resigned to become athletic director at Louisiana Tech. He served out his term and then was elected to a full term this summer.

As president, Timmerman's duties include the normal job of presiding over Board of Directors meetings, and also some public relations tasks. Timmerman said, "The

IPTAY President is a voting member of the Alumni National Council and is a guest of the Board of Trustees at its meetings. I try to get to as many local IPTAY meetings as possible to push both the school and its sports. When an athletic program is ranked as high as ours is, the sports also bring a lot of benefits to the total university. The publicity we get from hosting championship events, or a team or individual getting conference or All-America honors, reflects back on the school and the athletic department. I just try to show the whole university in a positive light."

The Hartsville, SC, native sees improved relations with the Clemson students as his number-one goal. "In addition to carrying on the existing programs, I hope to build a better rapport with the student body. I would like to have them more fully appreciate and endorse IPTAY's activities. I hope to involve the students more in the organization, so when they leave Clemson, they will support IPTAY and the Alumni Association.

"Other than that goal, I am just going to step aside and let the organization keep on with what it has been doing. We have exceeded our goal for fund-raising for the last 17 years, and I'm not going to change success, just for the sake of changing. The strength of IPTAY doesn't come from the president — it comes from the Board of Directors and the representatives. The Board is made up of the current directors and the past presidents who have remained active in the organization. The Board blends the 1930's into the 1980's in a real wholesome way."

Timmerman added, "I don't think the role of IPTAY has changed much from the time it was formed. Our primary objective is to provide money for scholarships. We have enough money on hand to pay for the education of all the entering freshmen athletes for the next five years. We also have some additional funds on hand to help with other athletic activities. Since our constitution was changed to allow excess funds to be channeled back into the athletic program, IPTAY has pro-



vided funds for the band, the new practice putting green, and helped with the improvements in the weight room. We also benefit the students by contributing to improvements in the intramural facilities."

While Timmerman is obviously involved with his duties at Clemson, he is also kept busy by his other activities. He is Vice President of the South Carolina Academy of General Dentistry, a member of the American Dental Association, and a member of the South Carolina chapter of the Dental Practice Administration. He is the past president of the South Carolina Society of Dentistry for Children and the Central District Dental Society.

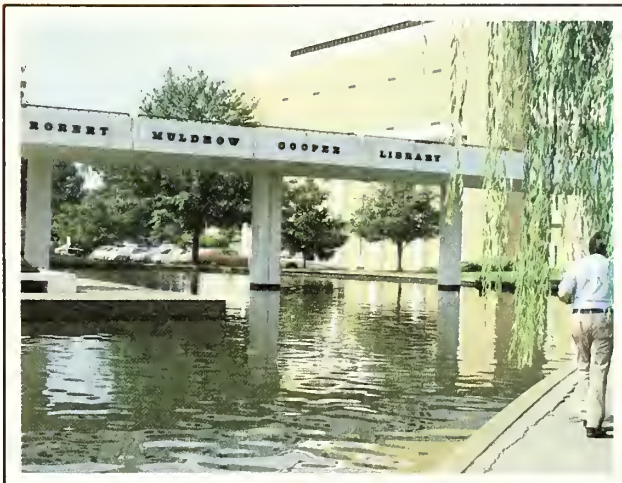
If his dental activities don't keep him jumping, his Chairmanship of the Board of Deacons at St. Andrew's Baptist Church in Columbia will. He also teaches Sunday School for the 18 to 24-year-old singles group at the church, and is a committeeman for his son's Boy Scout Troop.

Timmerman is married to the former Garland Hoffmeyer of Hartsville. They are the parents of four children — Marian, a freshman, who is the first coed in the Timmerman family to attend Clemson; John H., Jr., a 10th-grader at Chapin High School; Betsy, age 8; and Meg, who is 7.

Father, fund-raiser, dentist, church deacon — John Timmerman stays a very busy man and would not want it any other way.

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THE GANT ATTITUDE

Tigers getting stronger

Many ingredients are involved in preparing a Clemson student-athlete for varsity competition. He spends countless hours in the classroom, on the practice field, and in meetings with the coaching staff. But an equally integral part of the sports program at Clemson has been the strength facility. The quarter of a million dollar complex is under the direction of George Dostal and his experienced staff.

"We are here to help the kids and if they weren't here, I wouldn't be either," is the philosophy that George Dostal subscribes to as Clemson's Strength Training Director. "Our objective is to help the athletes reach their potential in every phase of development. We use dead weights for strength, the Nautilus machines for strength and flexibility, and the new CAM II machines for quickness. We want our athletes to think that when they come down here and put out the effort, they are stronger, more flexible, and quicker when they leave."

Without question, since Dostal arrived on the Clemson campus six years ago and began assembling the equipment that is now being used, the physical strength of Tiger athletes has improved markedly. Most athletes work out on the weights three times a week during the off-season preparing for the rigors of their season. And every athlete at Clemson will attest to the difference it makes in their play.

"Using Coach Dostal's programs for lifting has made the difference in my play and made me more than just a better than average linebacker," states Jeff Davis, Clemson's All-America candidate who led the ACC in tackles last season. "Playing linebacker, you run into a lot of physical contact over an 11-game schedule. I averaged 16 tackles a game last

year, so I can't get worn down over the course of a game. That is the nature of my position. Not only do I have to make tackles, but I have to be strong enough to take on offensive linemen who try to block me. Lifting also helps me avoid injuries because my muscles are stronger and able to withstand the punishment of football week after week."

Davis is only one of the athletes at Clemson who has benefited from the strength training at Clemson to attain all-star status. Larry Nance, who was taken in the first round of the NBA draft by the Phoenix Suns last summer, also used the Clemson strength program to improve his game.

"When I came to Clemson, I was a skinny and weak kid," recalls the angular leaper who thrilled crowds at Clemson for four years with his innovative slam dunks. "Since that time, thanks to lifting, I've added some weight as well as gotten stronger on the weight program under Coach Dostal. It doesn't look like I've gotten that much stronger, but I can tell the difference under the boards, and it really helped my confidence."

"The Nautilus machines have improved my strength and flexibility," continued Nance. "Also, the new CAM II machines have increased my quickness on the court which in turn adds to my leaping ability."

The new CAM II machines, which are designed for quickness, are the newest addition to the Clemson strength room. With the dead weights, the Nautilus machines, and the CAM II's, Clemson has one of the most complete body-building centers in the country.

"Having added the CAM II's, we now have an all-around facility," said Dostal. **"We are the first school in the country to have a complete set of CAM II's, and we are doing basic research on them for**



Dennis Keiser of Sports Health Equipment to study the effects of the machine. They are designed to increase the athletes' quickness by strengthening the white muscle fibers of the body. Our athletes who have been using them have shown a marked improvement in their quickness. Our research indicates, for example, that swimmers who have been working out with the machines were able to get quicker starts and swim faster."

Having such a well stocked training facility is a relatively new phenomenon at Clemson. Prior to Dostal's arrival on campus, the Clemson strength training facility consisted of a very limited amount of dead weights and a couple of Nautilus machines. However, in the past six years, the strength development room has become virtually unparalleled nationally.

"When I first came here," remembers Dostal, "I was amazed at how little they had here. It wasn't that the people in charge of weightlifting weren't trying, they just didn't have the facilities. Coach Parker had originally gotten in touch with me because he was interested in strength training to help his program. He wanted to know what I thought a major college program should have in the way of weight training. The administration at Clemson wanted to do the best job they could in developing the strength program and gave me all the support I could have wanted. Bill McLellan and Bobby Robinson wanted a total all-around

strength program at Clemson, not one that was specialized in football."

Because of that desire to build an all-around strength program, all the equipment under Coach Dostal's supervision is not limited to just football and basketball players. It is open to every varsity athlete at Clemson, whether they are male or female. Furthermore, virtually every coach requires that their players lift on the programs planned by Coach Dostal and his staff.

"At Clemson, we've dispelled the myth that men and women cannot work out together," reports Dostal, who has a master's degree in exercise physiology. "We've allowed them to work out together since I've been here and there have been no problems. We don't allow any horsing around down here or foul language. The athletes come down here to work, and they know it."

"One of the great side effects of all the athletes exercising together has been the rapport that has developed between them. Seeing each other work out helps them appreciate how hard athletes in different sports, men and women, work. It has developed a camaraderie among them, so they go support each other in their various sports."

Jennie Lyerly is a member of the

women's basketball team who, like her teammates, uses the strength facilities to get ready for her season in the winter.

"I work out about three times a week," says Lyerly. "We lift to tone up our bodies and help with stamina. We are not out to be body builders. Coach Dostal knows that and has developed programs adjusted for the type of work we need to do for basketball. You can't play basketball and be muscle-bound, and we aren't. But at the same time, we have good muscle tone. The atmosphere in the weight room is relaxed and you can accomplish your personal goals."

Coach Dostal is largely responsible for the relaxed, friendly atmosphere in the strength room despite the tremendous amount of work that goes on there in the course of a day. During the year, 32,000 workouts take place, and even with the heavy traffic that goes on through their domain, Coach Dostal and his staff strive to treat every player as an individual no matter what the sport.

"The best motivation for anybody is to be treated like an individual, and we do that here," said Dostal. "Every year we have a new group of students coming to school, and I try to learn every one of their names as soon as possible to get to know them on a personal basis. We try to begin

paying close attention to the individual athletes beginning their freshman year with the orientation to the facility. We go over the safety factors of using the equipment and show them the proper techniques for using the machines. Beginning then, the attention they get lasts for four years and beyond.

"I'm in a unique situation at Clemson," continued Dostal, "because I see every single athlete that goes to school here if he or she work out. I want to treat every one of them like I would want my two sons to be treated. If they have a problem or want to talk something out, I'm always around to listen and my door is always open. It's really nice getting to know these kids because it means I'll be developing friendships that will last even after they have finished playing a sport at Clemson."

Dostal's approach to being the Strength Training Director has left a big impression on the Clemson athletes who work with him. He has gained the respect, confidence, and trust of these young people. He is always there to help them and devise a program best suited for them.

"As long as I've been here, I've known I have a friend in Coach Dostal, and all the

HANS KOELEMAN — A Man for All Seasons

You would not expect Clemson University to have much correspondence with a Pac-10 university, but the Tigers owe Oregon State University a big favor. You see, if it hadn't been for the friendliness of some of its track athletes a few years back Clemson All-American Hans Koeleman might never have gotten interested in the United States, and thus ended up in Tigertown.

And that would have been a shame for the Tiger track program because the native of Uithoorn, Holland has become one of Clemson's all-time greatest athletic performers in his short stay. He became the first athlete in Clemson history to become an All-American in three different sports in the same year. In 1980-81 he turned the incredible triple by finishing 11th in the NCAA cross country meet; fourth in the two-mile run at the NCAA indoor meet; and sixth in the NCAA Outdoor Championships at Baton Rouge, LA last June. Today, he will be honored by IPTAY as Clemson University's Athlete-of-the-Year for the 1980-81 academic year.

How did the foreigner end up at Clemson to establish such a fine reputation in just a year and a half? "I was in a race in my home country (Holland) and teams from around the world were there. Athletes at track and field events of national scope are fairly friendly because it is interesting to learn of ways of life in other countries," said Koeleman.

"During the meet I met some members of the Oregon State team that competed

for the US and we struck up a conversation. One night we went out together and they told me all about the US and track programs at different levels. That conversation intrigued me about America."

Over the next year Koeleman continued to run competitively in his native country and won the national championship in the steeplechase. He entered a college in Holland that specialized in teacher training. But, soon after meeting another friend, one with ties to Clemson, his adventurous nature got the best of him.

"In 1979 I made another friend through international competition, Ray DeVries. He had been at a junior college in New Mexico, but was transferring to Clemson for the first semester of 1979-80. He had visited the place and told me about the NCAA and the national competition. He told me the winning times in a lot of events and I knew I could do as well.

"I needed to race against better competition and seeing the better times, I knew it would be a challenge, but that would make me improve. Also, the weather in Holland is not the best to train in, and from what Ray told me about the environment in Clemson, it was a very nice place."

So, site unseen, Koeleman packed his bags and came to the United States. It did not take him long to meet challenges he longed for. In his first season of competition, he became an All-American at the NCAA meet in Detroit in the two-mile run. He was also MVP of the ACC indoor championships as he won the mile and the two-mile events. In the outdoor season he set all-time ACC bests in the steeplechase and the 5,000 meter run. And of course last year he accomplished the unprecedented triple.

Twenty months at a school and All-American in three sports already, can there be many hills left to conquer? "I also want to be a national champion but my most important goals are with times," said Koeleman. "I have certain times I want to reach and that motivates me more than anything else."

The highly motivated Koeleman also does well in the classroom, quite an accomplishment in itself because English is not his native language. But, true to his character, what has he chosen to major in at Clemson — English. "It was difficult academically at first because I had to go to such big classrooms and translate everything as I listened. Sometimes I could not hear, or understand everything that was said, so I had to get to class 15 minutes early so I could hear everything," said Koeleman, who can

speak four different languages.

This kind of determination is what makes Koeleman stand above the crowd in collegiate circles and more than competitive on a national scene. "Hans has done so much in only a year and a half, but he has only scratched the surface," said Coach Sam Colson, who spent only a little more than a postage stamp and a few phone calls to get his All-American. "He definitely has a chance to be the national champion in all three of his main events (cross country, the two-mile indoors and the steeplechase outdoors). He is certainly the finest talent I have ever coached and he is one of the finest all-around individuals I have ever known."

Still only a junior, Koeleman has joined another foreign student-athlete in making his mark on Clemson. Obed Ariri made many All-American lists as the most valuable player on Clemson's football team last year when he set seven NCAA records as a placekicker. With two years still to go Koeleman could make the accomplishments of the Nigerian kicker seem miniscule.

Clemson's debt to Oregon State continues to grow.

Modern Homesteaders

This year a group of modern pioneers dug into the soil, checked alternative ways of heating their homes and studied the mating habits of livestock as part of a special course coordinated by the Clemson Extension Service.

Twenty-three people from the Greenwood (S.C.) area took part in an eight-week "Living off the Land" course.

The idea for the class came as a result of numerous inquiries from people in the community who had small acreage — or planned to buy a small farm — and wanted information on how to best utilize their homesteads.

"We were getting lots of questions on everything from chickens to nutrition, goats, home heating, how to grow all kinds of fruits and vegetables and even how to put up out-buildings," says Extension Agent Tom Bryson of Greenwood.

"Each of those persons wanted a 15-minute course summing up what a South Carolina farmer learns in a lifetime," says Bryson. "We gave them as much information as time would permit and often sent them on their way with a brochure or pamphlet. It was frustrating for them and for us because we weren't fully meeting their needs."

The homesteader course, con-

ducted jointly with Piedmont TEC, resulted from that frustration.

The classes drew participants of all ages with a wide variety of skills, incomes, land holdings and interests. Some expressed real and imagined concerns about the nutrition and safety of the food they consume. Others were looking for ways to generate extra income on their farms.

"The one thing they had in common was a desire to use their land to make themselves less dependent on others," says Bryson.

Clemson extension specialists from the University campus, extension agents from Greenwood

County and instructors from Piedmont TEC presented information. Sessions on firewood, home heating with wood, and food production were especially popular.

The course concluded with a tour of the small farm of V.W. Hayes of the Epworth community near Greenwood. Hayes, a retired dairyman whose hobbies include geology and horticulture, discussed his experiences growing fruits, berries and traditional vegetables as well as many varieties not normally found in this state.

"I think the class gave those attending a basic feel for dealing with nature and an appreciation of agriculture," says the extension agent. "They were really surprised at the amount of investment necessary to get into most farming — no matter how small the scale."

(Interest in homesteading is not limited to Greenwood. In recent years extension agents, particularly those near the state's population centers, have fielded an increasing number of requests for this type of information.)

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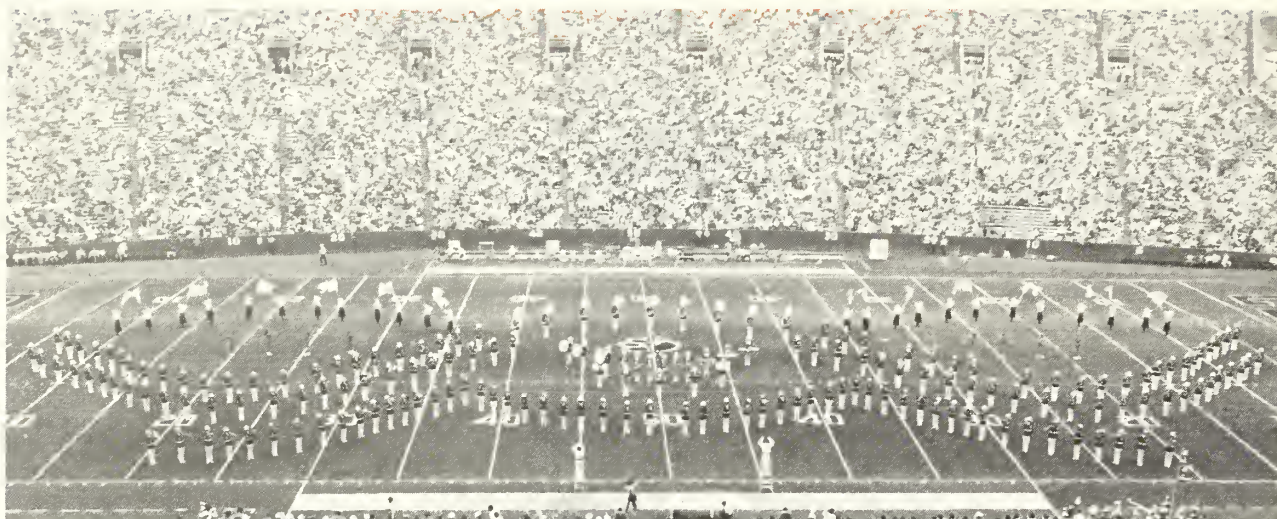

other football players feel the same way," reports Jeff Davis. "He's been a big part of my football career at Clemson, and he is a great coach. Even if you don't come down here and work out, he'll do everything he can to help you. He cares about you as a person, and he treats his job as more than just weight-lifting coach. I work very hard when I come down here, and he appreciates the work I put in. I'd rather be looked upon as a person rather than as a football player, and Coach Dostal treats everybody as individuals."

Larry Nance agrees with Davis' assessment of Coach Dostal.

"I think very highly of Coach Dostal," said Nance. "He's always taken the time out to help me whenever I've needed it over the past four years. He even made a special program for me to help me get ready for pro basketball."

These programs that Dostal and his staff devise are designed for each sport. Every sport is given a program to aid the athletes and some sports are even broken down by position.

"We've put together a program for each sport," describes Dostal. "We study what each athlete has to do. We

break it down by position and study the motions which each athlete has to make. A program is then put together designed to develop the muscles that the athlete will be using the most. With proper strength training using all our equipment here and good stretching techniques, athletes can reduce their chances of muscle pulls and injuries. If that player has been exercising a muscle group around a joint and that area is hit or extended, it is enhanced by the training and can withstand the blow."

Dostal began building the strength room by himself six years ago. But now with the thousands of workouts per year, the growth of the amount of equipment, and the desire to give each athlete individual attention, he has added five assistants to the staff. Whenever an opening occurs, however, Dostal has little trouble finding applicants, as an assistantship in the Clemson strength complex is one of the most sought after jobs in the profession.

"When I announced three openings this spring," said Dostal, "I got 274 applications. Right now we have Craig Bryson from California, Sam Varner from N.C. State, and Don Telle from Ohio on our staff, and they are all working on their master's degrees at Clemson. Jerry Sim-

mons, who came to Clemson from Kansas, recently took the job of Strength Director at Rice University, and Greg Tuza went back to his alma mater, Wake Forest. I try to take people from around the nation to get different ideas from various parts of the country. I can learn from them as well. If they have an idea in developing a new technique that will help Clemson athletes, I'll do it."

In building one of the nation's best all-around sports programs, Clemson has left few stones unturned. When George Dostal was hired, a major stride was taken to help prepare athletes at Clemson for the high competitive level the school is at entering the 1980s. Now, Clemson has one of the finest strength facilities and staffs in the country. Every tool is there to help an athlete prepare himself for his varsity sport.

Jeff Davis sums it up best. "There is no reason for a guy to come to Clemson and not be a strong athlete during his career. Most schools don't have anything to compare with what Clemson Coach Dostal has in the way of equipment and programs for us. The only thing an athlete has to do here is walk in the door and do what they tell him to do, and he will get stronger and thus be successful."

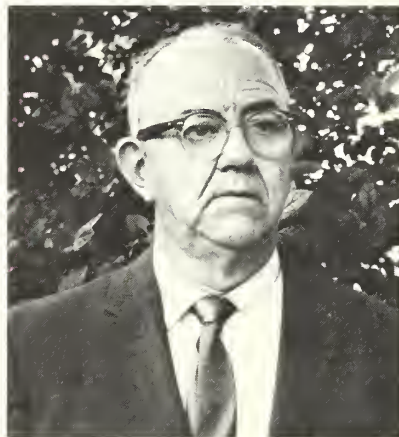

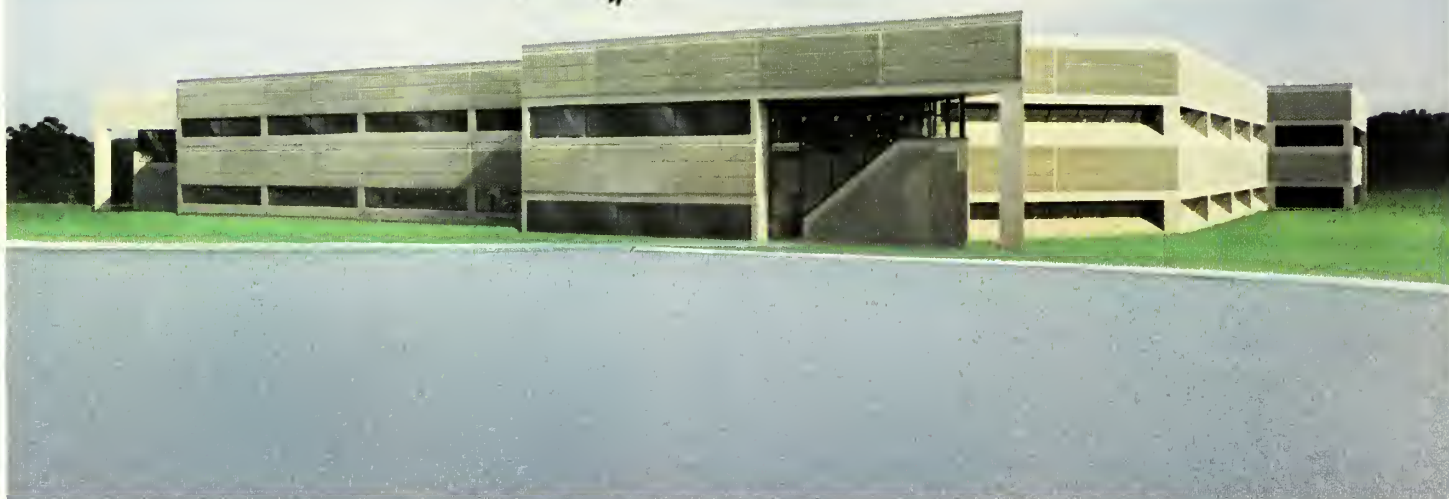
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
